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Murder charges laid in beating death of M'Chigeeng man

M'CHIGEENG—Following two months of investigation by the Ontario Provincial Police's (OPP) North East Crime Unit, the OPP announced late last week that an arrest has been made in the murder of M'Chigeeng elder Johnny Panamick.

The United Chiefs and Council of Manitoulin Anishnaabe (UCCM) Police and the OPP North East Region Crime Unit, under the direction of Detective Inspector Tracy Dobbin of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB), arrested 26-year-old Kimel Corbiere of Mindemoya last Thursday, July 17 and charged him with the first degree murder of Mr. Panamick.

On Sunday, May 11, between 7 and 11 pm, Mr. Panamick, age 70, was assaulted inside his residence on Back Street in M'Chigeeng. The elder was discovered later that same night by a neighbour who called 911, requesting an ambulance. Mr. Panamick was transported to the

Manitoulin Health Centre where he was then transferred to Health Sciences North in Sudbury with two broken legs, broken ribs, a punctured lung, a broken cheek bone and numerous facial injuries. Mr. Panamick succumbed to his injuries on June 13 in hospital. Regional coroner Dr. David Eden conducted a post-mortem examination with his findings then shared to police.

A motive for the assault has not been released by police at this time.

Mr. Corbiere had his first appearance at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on Friday, July 18.

Burns Wharf Theatre's future in hands of Assiginack council

MANITOWANING—Arts-rich Manitoulin is missing an element to its theatre component this summer with the temporary closure of the Burns Wharf Theatre on the iconic Manitowaning harbour, home to the Burns Wharf Theatre Players and a popular summer concert series.

The theatre, which sits at the top of the historic Burns Wharf,

seats 105 people during the Players' busy summer season when the Burns Wharf Theatre Players presents classic Gilbert and Sullivan productions each summer, the last, in 2013, was 'Ruddigore.'

Until Fire Code and Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act requirements are met, Burns Wharf Theatre is closed.

When Assiginack's engineers drafted a report for council regarding its purchase of the former Wally Harasym Insurance building for the new library, council also asked for an engineer's report on the Burns Wharf with two options: bring everything up to code or build a new theatre of similar size. While the matter has been discussed in camera, the report is scheduled to be discussed in an open session of council in August, Assiginack clerk-treasurer Alton Hobbs explained.

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Winner named in Ontario Tourism's Best of Outdoor Ontario contest trip to Manitoulin Island this summer

MANITOULIN—Out of thousands of entries, a winner was recently selected to visit Manitoulin Island as part of Ontario Tourism's 'The Best of Outdoor Ontario' contest, which ran from this spring until June 30.

"We received a total of 11,074 entries (in the contest)," Lydia McCourt, corporate communications manager with the Ontario Tourism Marketing Partnership Corporation (OTMPC), told The Expositor on Monday. "The winner is Susan Seccombe of Dearborn, Michigan who will be bringing her daughter Megan (19-years-old), her life-long friend Marie Ahonen and Marie's daughter Carly (18-years-old) with her."

The group will be arriving on Sunday, August 10 for the seven-day adventure on the world's largest freshwater island. The trip is valued at \$11,000. The trip includes round-trip airfare to Sudbury, a guided trip to Manitoulin Island featuring a floatplane fly-in to the North Channel, a traditional aboriginal feast with private dance perform-

ance, overnight camping, a sailing trip to the Benjamin Islands, three nights at the new Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre, canoe heritage tour of the North Channel of Lake Huron, a horse and teepee overnight adventure including glamping and swimming with horses and \$4,000 in outdoor gear from Mountain Equipment Co-op.

"We are very excited," Ms. Seccombe told The Expositor of her upcoming trip to Manitoulin. "You enter contests like this but you never think your going to win—I was so surprised."

A nurse at the Oakwood Hospital in Dearborn, Ms. Seccombe said she has been to Ontario before, but never as far north as Manitoulin.

"This is going to be a once-in-a-lifetime experience," continued Ms. Seccombe. "We are outdoorsy, but this is going to be a completely new adventure for us."

Tom Farquhar runs for Elliot Lake mayor

ELLIOT LAKE—Politics runs deep in the Farquhar bloodline and standing on the firing line of public service is the lifeblood of former Carnarvon Township reeve Tom Farquhar. Mr. Farquhar announced his candidacy for mayor in the Elliot Lake municipal election during a July 10 public information session he hosted at the Moose Family Centre.

Mr. Farquhar has more than 35 years of experience in municipal politics under his belt. He began his career winning a seat on the municipal council of Carnarvon Township (now part of Central Manitoulin) in 1978. Two years later he moved to Elliot Lake to work in the family business, returning to the Island in 1986 and running for the position of reeve, which he filled for two terms. An active participant in municipal politics, Mr. Farquhar served as president of the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities and sat on the executive of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.

Mr. Farquhar served as executive assistant to former Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Brown for

two decades, living in Sault Ste. Marie and then Elliot Lake to better serve the western and south-central ends of that riding. During his sojourn in that office, Mr. Farquhar said that he dealt with 37 municipalities in the riding.

Mr. Farquhar ran for a seat on the Elliot Lake municipal council during the last municipal elections and secured his place at that council table just in time to meet the biggest challenge to be faced by that community since the closure of the uranium mining industry in that town, the catastrophic collapse of the Algo Centre Mall that took two lives and devastated the local economy.

An experienced hand at all things political, Mr. Farquhar said that he never takes anything for granted, but with hard work, clear thinking and good planning, most things can be accomplished.

"I am dedicated to Elliot Lake," he told those attending the public information meeting. "I love a challenge and we are facing lots of them. I think working cohesively as a unit, respecting our volunteer boards and each other and those coming forward with new ideas is the first step in making good things happen."

Cruise ships return to Little Current with Pearl Mist

LITTLE CURRENT—The cruise ship Pearl Mist will be making a call to the Port of Little Current at the northern gateway to Manitoulin Island this Friday, July 25, marking the return of the cruise industry to the Island in style.

At a length of 335 feet and a beam of 56 feet, the ship only draws 12 feet of draft, still the largest vessel to tie up at the waterfront in Little Current in over a century. "Maybe the largest ever," noted Lakeshore Excursions' Bruce O'Hare.

The Pearl Mist is a brand new vessel, launched just this past June 25 with a New England cruise, and is touted as being the perfect combination of comfort, safety and elegance. Capable of carrying over 200 passengers in rooms ranging from 300 to 580 square feet and boasting six lounges and a spacious dining room, this vessel represents the global epitome of luxurious cruising. This is a top tier resort floating on the waters of the Great Lakes and it has something for just about every taste in cruising

The Pearl Mist will be in Little Current this Friday at 1 pm for her first visit, returning on August 3 (at 9 am) during Haweater Weekend, again on August 14, 24, September 4 and 15 (at 8 am).

The passengers disembark in Little Current to take part in a wide range of activities, including the Wikwemikong powwow on the August 3 visit and many of the excursions include partnership events with the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation and the Great Spirit Circle Trail.

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

Shooting down airliners is playing with historical fire

The shooting down of a civilian airliner by a reactionary, pro-Russian group of Ukrainians last week is nothing short of chilling because history demonstrates that acts of violence on the part of an unhappy faction can lead fairly directly to much larger conflicts.

We are just now 100 years from the start of the First World War and the parallel act of assassination by Serbian nationalists in Sarajevo of a representative of the colonial power in that region at that time, the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

Parallel, in that the ground-to-air missile that downed the Malaysia Airlines plane, resulting in the death of more than 200 passengers and crew members, was fired by Ukrainians who are unhappy with their new president's efforts to have closer ties to the European community rather than with Russia and it is widely presumed that the sophisticated firepower required to hit a high-flying jetliner would have been acquired from the Russian military forces.

In the aftermath of the incident, initially the rebel group (which has never denied responsibility for the terrorist act) claimed it had recovered the aircraft's "black boxes" (which would detail the last events of the plane in flight, including pilots' remarks) and would turn them over to the Russian government.

While Russian President Vladimir Putin was quick to blame the newly elected, pro-West Ukrainian government and its president for the act (for reasons known only to himself) he did prudently decline to accept the black boxes, instead suggesting that this evidence should be made available to international civil aviation investigators.

The rebel group, which has been collecting the dead bodies of the aircraft's passengers and crew and storing them in refrigerated railway cars, had also initially stated it would send this grisly evidence to Russia but as of Monday of this week, the remains of the victims were still awaiting a destination.

Had Mr. Putin agreed to accept the black boxes and thus be seen as possibly interfering with the investigation of the terrorist act, this

would have significantly heightened tensions. But he didn't no doubt sensing that he had already strained the limits of the international community's goodwill with his annexation of Ukraine's Crimea region in the late winter.

But nevertheless the idea of a renegade organization having the wherewithal to bring down a passenger aircraft because it had determined that the plane somehow invaded "their" air space is enormously disturbing.

There was at least one Canadian aboard, that individual en route to what he imagined was a happy holiday in Bali, just to put this event in perspective.

So what should be the response of the international community to this act of terror and how will this response square with the fact that these particular terrorists are Russian allies in the squabble over the future of Ukraine?

If, for example, United Nations or NATO peacekeeping forces arrived in Ukraine to help that government deal with their terrorist element, Russia would almost assuredly interpret this as an act of aggression against their country and the results could be catastrophic.

What would be the right response, in light of this terrible action directed against civilians (the rebel group may have thought the targeted aircraft was a military one but, if they did, this is another example of their epic lack of judgment) would be for Russia to align itself with the West, and with Ukraine, and help to root out paramilitary organization that would consider such aggression appropriate.

This isn't likely to happen and the western world will continue to chastise the Ukrainian rebel group, (and Russia for doing nothing) but not much more.

This is a cynical prediction but with the memories of the Cold War still fresh in most adults' minds, no important nation is likely to poke the beast.

Buffy Sainte-Marie is one of Canada's greatest artists; she is a singer-songwriter, musician, composer, visual artist, educator, social activist, and philanthropist. She is a Native Canadian superstar.

She has won recognition, awards and honours, from around the world for her music, her painting and her work in education and social activism. Her life of accomplishments is written up in Wikipedia (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Buffy_Sainte-Marie) and it is awe-inspiring.

With such a personal record of accomplishment, why is her music seldom heard on Canadian airwaves? Why is it few Canadians today have heard of Buffy Sainte-Marie?

Canadians take pride in the excellence of our many musician artists and we should all take pride in this native Canadian. Her songs and music have an endless relevance that must touch the soul of not only our aboriginal population, but to all Canadians.

Buffy Sainte-Marie is shown as having been born February 20, 1941 on the Piapot Cree Indian Reserve in the Qu'Appelle Valley, Saskatchewan. She never forgot her native roots and many of her songs are a cry for aboriginal justice. The noble inspiration found in the stand tall message of 'Star Walker' generates uplifting spirits and serves to uplift the self-image of the Indian nation.

'Darling Don't Cry' should stir the hearts of all Canadians.

'Listen to the Winds Blow,' sung on Sesame Street where she was featured for five years, connects perfectly.

An early 1960s song written at the Purple Onion in Toronto's Yorkville was 'Universal Soldier,' which became and remains an anthem for the peace movement.

In the 1970s, her music was blacklisted by the US Johnson Administration for her outspoken activism in raising awareness to Native injustice and peace. You may better understand why the authorities censored her music as you listen to a segment of oppressive American history in 'Bury my Heart at Wounded Knee.' It is as if that black listing was never removed. Surely, our mostly music radio can find play spots for such a Canadian musical genius and human talent.

Her repertoire crosses differing musical genres; witness the romantic sensuality in 'Take my Hand for a While' or her writing of 'It's Time for You to Go' popularized by Elvis Presley but sung better by Buffet. She branched into western with 'He's an Indian Cowboy' and many others.

Having lived my youth in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan my sentimentalities are stretched when she sings 'Qu'Appelle Valley Saskatchewan,' or 'Piney Wood Hills' or for those who may have had their souls tormented by drugs 'Cod'iné' is meaningful.

Whitefish River band member wins Alltech Youth Scientist award

BIRCH ISLAND—The folks at the Whitefish River First Nation have a pretty good reason to be proud of one of their expat members these days with the recent announcement that doctoral candidate Marlene Paibomesai of Guelph captured first place in the Canadian division of the Alltech Young Scientist Competition and placed second overall in the North American division—no small feat when it is considered that 8,500 young scientists registered for the competition and submitted a paper on their research for consideration.

Ms. Paibomesai is studying epigenetic control of immune factors and its relation to immune phenotypes in dairy cattle. The doctoral student chuckled when a puzzled journalist called her up and asked for a translation of what that actually means. “Basically, I am studying the impact that the stress of calving has on the immune systems of cows,” she laughed. In these days of growing concern over the use of antibiotics in agriculture, that seems like a pretty important field study. “It does,” she agreed.

Ms. Paibomesai, who has secured a fulltime gig at the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Agri-food, is currently working about 20 hours a week on her doctorate. She credits Professor Bonnie Mallard of the Department of Pathobiology at the University of Guelph who supervises Ms. Paibomesai’s PhD dissertation with inspiring her work. “Over the past 25 years she has been successfully working on selective breeding to be naturally healthy,” she said. Ms. Paibomesai’s work with OMAFRA fits into her skill set wonderfully, “I work with dairy cows and dairy cattle health,” she said.

Ms. Paibomesai is in the final stages of her PhD program, working toward her dissertation. It has been a daunting odyssey but one in which she said she has had a lot of support and that she has found to be very rewarding. “I really have to thank Whitefish River First Nation,” she said. “They have provided tremendous support to me in attaining my educational goals.”

Her dissertation has grown to a massive five-chapter

project. The paper she submitted for the competition was based on her original research, but the competition entries can also be literature reviews.

To young people thinking about a career in the sciences Ms. Paibomesai had a few words of advice. “You have to be very self motivated,” she said. “It is up to you to finish the work. At the end of the day, it is you who has to make sure it happens. I have had a tremendous opportunity presented to me, but it has come through a lot of hard work and self motivation.”

Her volunteer work has had a huge impact on her career opportunities, she noted. “It is a huge thing,” said Ms. Paibomesai. “You set yourself apart by being involved in your area of study.” The connections and networking that volunteerism provides is a definite bonus to the feel good aspects. Ms. Paibomesai has worked as a 4H leader and worked with Alltech’s ‘Let’s Talk Science’ youth outreach program.

In fact, Ms. Paibomesai’s work with the Alltech program is as a volunteer ambassador in a program aimed at instilling a love of science amongst youth. The Alltech Young Scientist program work is how she came to be entered in the competition. The program aims at promoting all aspects of science in the elementary and high school systems.

“Science has taken a bit of a hit in society recently. There is a distrust of scientists,” she noted. “The more information we can get out there, the more we can promote critical thinking among young people.”

Ms. Paibomesai’s life is not all about sitting in front of a computer screen and pouring over deep scientific tomes and number charts. She keeps very active physically as well. “I play a lot of sports,” she said. “I am heading out to play ultimate Frisbee with friends this evening.”

Manitoulin Special Olympians bring home gold from national championships

Island athletes win 10 medals

VANCOUVER—Manitoulin Special Olympic (MSO) athletes demonstrated amazing talent and sportsmanship at the Special Olympic Canada National Games held earlier this month in Vancouver, garnering 10 medals, including seven gold.

No stranger to the nationals or the podium, Austin Featherstone earned three gold medals, including first place wins in the 800 metre race, 1,500 metre race (with a time of four minutes and 43 seconds) and the 4x400 metre relay race along with fellow MSO athlete Matthew Bedard.

In addition to his gold relay win with Austin, Matthew brought home gold in the 1,500 metre race and bronze for high jump.

Also from Manitoulin, Jamie Pyette received gold in high jump, the first gold of the competition for the MSO athletes on Team Ontario. His 4x100 metre relay team also came in first in their division.

Mark Dokum earned a silver medal in both the 100 metre race and the shot put, bringing the MSO athletes' total count to 10 medals.

Jeff Panamick was also a strong competitor at nationals, placing sixth in golf.

"It was a lot of fun," 20-year-old Matthew Bedard of Manitowaning told The Expositor on Monday. "It was challenging, but I had a great time."

"It was my first time going to nationals and my first time in Vancouver," continued Matthew. "I made a lot of new friends from Team Ontario and from across Canada. It was great seeing the other athletes compete and how much they pushed their limits. Winning gold was great, but making friends and doing your best and forgetting the rest was the most important thing to remember."

Matthew commented that the weather was beautiful throughout the competition and when the MSO athletes weren't busy competing, they had fun exploring Vancouver, especially liking the nearby mountains, beaches and aquarium.

"It went amazingly well," said MSO coach Janet Anning of the national competition. "They are terrific athletes and were dedicated, working hard to get to games and committed to training. All the athletes did wonderfully. Even the competitions they didn't win, they still had personal bests and great times. It was tough competition this year, but they all did so well."

"They were also terrific sportsmen and gentlemen and I was

proud to have them not only representing Ontario, but Manitoulin Island," added Ms. Anning.

Ms. Anning said she will be notified in the fall if any of the MSO athletes have qualified for the World Special Olympic Games in 2015 in Los Angeles.

The 2015 Special Olympics World Summer Games will fea-

ture roughly 7,000 athletes and 3,000 coaches from over 170 countries. The 2015 World Games are also expecting an estimated 30,000 volunteers and another 500,000 spectators to lend their support. The 2015 World Games will be the largest event hosted by Los Angeles since the 1984 Olympic Games.

Water levels and fracking concerns at Lake Manitou Area Association AGM

SANDFIELD—The Lake Manitou Area Association held its annual general meeting on Saturday, July 12 at the Sandfield Community Hall. Mike Costigan Sr., president, welcomed everyone and introduced the head table. Upcoming events were announced and minutes from the 2013 AGM were approved.

Paul Moffatt gave an update on Manitoulin Streams. "There are three employees at the back (of the room) that are engaged in invasive species, both vegetative and animal type," he began. "I'm sure they have a lot of great information for you. They're travelling all over the Manitoulin, all summer long, visiting campgrounds and summer events. Sue Meert is here from Manitoulin Streams. She does a lot of our outreach. Last summer was a busy and successful year."

"This year we have one large project just north of the bridge on the Mindemoya River," Mr. Moffat continued. "It will be starting next month and will have quite a large reach. There's a lot of erosion. Last year we did a major one at the mouth of the Mindemoya River. There's a fishing platform going in that will be available to everyone. You can fish right off the platform, even if you're in a wheelchair. It's easy to cast out from there. There will also be a viewing platform provided by Manitoulin Streams in conjunction with Central Manitoulin. There's a lot of smaller projects going on also that will be advertised and we'll be grateful for any volunteers." He encouraged members to view a chart at the back of the room that

showed the results of electrofishing on Norton's Creek.

Treasurer Don Payne presented the financial statement. "As far as the books are concerned the LMAA recently audited my numbers," he said. Marlene Dewar and Betty Heis reviewed the statement. "You come every year and nurse me through an audit," he said, thanking them. There was a net operating surplus for the year. "Last year there was a deficit, this year a surplus," Mr. Payne said. "Some years you spend more, some less."

Michael R. Costigan was unable to attend but in a letter urged members to "keep the cards and letters and pictures coming because there wouldn't be a newsletter without the members' input."

Dave Anderson presented a report from the education committee. "Last year in August, Calvin Crisp spoke about invasive species in Lake Manitou and how they change the

ecosystem," he said. "This year he will be providing an update with more on what's happening on Lake Manitou but also the whole Island. Last year we heard from Paul Methner about MNR's stocking program and the health of the lake and he'll be providing an update again this year. Thirdly, we'll have a speaker who is an author. She'll speak to us on this thing called lyme disease. It's actually a very, very timely subject. We don't deal with lyme disease much on Manitoulin Island, but it's starting to spread in southern Ontario. It's prevalent in the US and there are hotspots across Canada." This year's information meeting will be August 12 at the Sandfield Schoolhouse.

Mr. Costigan made a special announcement. "The membership fee will remain at \$20 again this year," he said. "That's 21 years at \$20. Compared to similar associations you guys are getting a great deal. That's because our executive manages our dol-

lars well and spends little money. In all these years, we've had members out in the boat doing water quality readings, setting or maintaining buoys and markets, and I've never received a gas bill. Paul Moffatt has been out there for 20 years and never sent in a bill. Timberlane Lodge looks after markers in the channel and has for many years. Our secretary keeps us on the straight and narrow. The education committee sells maps, hats, flags, and our Lake Manitou Tidbits book. That's just a brief synopsis of some members and what we do. Let's keep our lakes great. Please encourage your neighbours to become members so we can do another 20 years. I don't want to forget to thank our set up crew, Janet Bessley and her family, the ladies in the kitchen. Manitoulin Streams, thank you. That's all I have to say."

Sandfield resident Peter Hutchinson brought up his concerns about water levels. "This summer I have a few concerns I would like to address," he said. "It has to do with high water levels on Lake Manitou. The Manitou River is high in the spring and low this time of year. The MNR has an overall plan—they're supposed to control the overall levels. Over the last two years every sluiceway is open March, April, May and then in June they drop every log. Last year the water dropped 26 inches in one week. This year it was 20 inches. Now we've had a little rain so there's a little flow over the logs. The only way water comes into the river is through the logs. The river used to be a stream, home to rainbow and speckled trout, kids played in it. Now with the erosion due to high water, all the limestone rocks have just about fallen into the lake."

Mr. Hutchinson's aunt passed away last December and looking at her photo albums got him thinking about this subject. He con-

tinued, "In 1960 the dam was built. There are many old pictures. You will see at the cement pier, the water is down one to two feet. So the water in Lake Manitou is high. Look at the river, the erosion in the river. Go down to Case's bridge. There's a half-inch of water going over the rocks. In White Lake there's two inches of silt. In five years time it will be grown over."

Mr. Hutchinson has contacted the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) but isn't happy with the lack of feedback he's received. "I'm concerned about the water, about erosion," he said, "and would like a little support. The MNR has a document one-and-a-half inches thick on controlling water in Lake Manitou, but there's nothing for the river."

I would like a letter to the MNR that we have concerns."

Another Sandfield resident, Brenda Edington, agreed. "I for one have spent a lot of time in the lake and the river," she said. "I can tell you something is not right—I can't tell you what it is but it's not right."

"A quarter-inch difference in Lake Manitou means a huge difference in the river," Mr. Hutchinson added. He has received verbal statistics from MNR but they've told him "everything is okay, nothing has changed in 60 years." He asked for support from LMAA. "It's not a war; let's get to the bottom of this. The island is completely gone in spring. It's feast or famine."

Mr. Costigan said the

script for Lynda Martens' 'Just For You' a good 11 weeks prior to the first performance. "Piece of cake," I said to myself. "Piece of cake," said my wife Linda. "That's lots of time," we chanted in blithe unison. Enter baptisms, baby showers, weddings, the plethora of visiting family and friends familiar to any Island resident, mix in a steady and unremitting diet of committee, council and volunteer organization meetings and most of those weeks had evaporated like a rain shower's puddle on a hot summer day.

The patience and perseverance of community theatre directors should be legendary. Mr. Maskel patiently explained the techniques most likely to get us 'off-book' before the fast looming opening night performance. One had to examine the veteran director's features very closely in order to discern any tightening of his neck musculature. "Never let them see you sweat," may go the old saw, well Mr. Maskel and Ms. Emmerton could audition for any antiperspirant commercial in a heartbeat. Calmly, coolly, the duo provided us with stage blocking and acting lessons literally on the fly—never seeming to doubt that the end product would come together. When one considers that this pair was simultaneously dealing with eight productions, along with numerous other neophyte thespians, awe cannot help but be inspired.

"Good actors make it look easy," said Mr. Maskel. "But learning 22 pages of lines requires a tremendous amount of hard work and focus." He should know, in addition to his directing and production duties, Mr. Maskel also acts in both the extremely challenging Dreams and Duets' 'Blind Date' with its intricate timing along with the very talented Tara Bernatchez and the touching Love and Laughter offering 'Post Its, Notes on a Marriage.'

The last few weeks were rather intense, if not tense, as Linda and I struggled to get the lines down pat.

"I don't want to go upstairs, mom and dad are fighting," said our youngest daughter to our son when she arrived home from an evening shift at the Anchor Inn. "Dad got another speeding ticket and mom is really ticked." Our son laughed as he explained that we were simply running lines. Apparently we were successfully convincing in our deliveries.

After several weeks of helping monitor our lines, our daughter-in-law Kierstyn is probably capable of stepping in

for either of our roles now. She is coming to this week's Friday night performance, but under strict admonition to refrain from any coaching from the audience.

Not to suggest that our first performance was not completely as rehearsed, but the vision over Linda's shoulder of Mr. Maskel frantically flipping through pages of the script backstage as he desperately tried to figure out where we had leapfrogged our lines to will inhabit my darkest dreams for years to come.

Somehow, miraculously, we managed to bring the ship back on keel and hit all of the laugh lines and cues in something remotely resembling a cohesive order and Mr. Maskel's coronary event was blissfully postponed to another season. The second performance brought its own interesting variations on the theme of middle-aged memories, yet again it somehow came together. Regular church attendance probably played a role, although Mr. Maskel insists that it comes from actually knowing the script inside out and backwards. Linda and I are certain that he and Ms. Emmerton are offering up their own prayers that we will soon know our lines right side out and frontwards. It is curious how running lines at the kitchen table can flow seamlessly, while standing before the glare of the footlights places a whole new dimension on the production.

Giving a review on a production in which one takes part is in itself challenging—although Linda and myself are the only two actors in our particular contribution. We did sneak down to watch the other plays following our own performance and took in an evening of the other four performances.

Without fear of bias I can freely say that Linda and I are brilliant—that's what our closest friends are telling us to our faces in any event, but a cautionary note on the subject matter, this is 'acting' people. Enough said. But be forewarned, 'Just For You' deals with adult subject matter and is not suitable for young children (or perhaps the actors' own adult children either).

The second part of act two is 'How I Spent My Winter,' both written and performed by the very talented Susan Garlock. The play centres on the experiences of a newcomer to Manitoulin Island and the many challenges of operating a business in the teeth of a Northern winter. Singing is involved.

Mr. Maskel and Susan Garlock deliver poignant performances in Love and Laughter's act two, 'Post Its, Notes

on a Marriage.' Chemistry is decidedly easier when the two acting are actually married, as is the case with Linda and I, but Mr. Maskel and Ms. Garlock carry it off with aplomb.

Jack Clark, former military man and august politician that he is, carries off the classic 'Casey at Bat' with timing that demonstrates Canadian military training has plenty of applications outside of uniform.

The final one-act of Love and Laughter, Jena Lenox Tod-

association would have a discussion on it and continued on the topic of fracking. "Does anyone have any feelings on fracking? You can tell how I feel by the way I worded the question." He referred to 'What the frig is fracking?,' an article in LMAA's June 2014 newsletter.

Mr. Anderson explained fracking for those who were unfamiliar with the practice. "In simple terms, fracking is deep drilling using high pressure to crack apart rocks and harvest gas or fuel down there," he said. "The problem is that water is basically polluted then. It's no longer usable."

Ms. Edington added, "I have friends down in Arizona and fracking is practiced there. Initially everyone thought it was great. What happens is they use chemicals to open up the earth or rock and that allows a travelway for the chemicals to now leach into a neighbourhood up to three or four miles away. It's very serious," she said.

The practice of fracking affects water tables and wells, Mr. Costigan explained. Members agreed the LMAA should have a strong opinion on fracking.

The LMAA website was completed last year. Members were asked to keep the photos and stories coming to help maintain contact throughout the year.

The final item discussed was the McLay Subdivision. "One and a half years ago the MNR and LMAA made a stand on the development of the McLay subdivision," Mr. Costigan said. "It's been in limbo the last few months because of planning changes on Manitoulin Island. There may be some quiet negotiating between the Ministry and McLay but that's all I can tell you."

Ms. Edington asked about the involvement of the association in a decision like that. "What is the protocol?" she asked. "I own waterfront property. I contacted the Planning Board and Central Manitoulin about land use and they can't give me an answer. My understanding is there's a moratorium on building. I'd like to know, as a member, how this came about."

Mr. Costigan answered that, "the Planning Board has been in discussions for a couple of years. It was brought out as a concern about oxygen levels and lake trout populations. We only had an opinion on that subject based on the science. What I understand is there's still 150 lots that can be developed. The Official Plan is still not finalized, so you're probably in a state of limbo."

Ms. Edington stated that the planning board had indicated that LMAA had put a hold on it (new development).

Mr. Costigan disagreed that LMAA had that influence but said, "we don't want overdevelopment. You put 500 more cottages on Lake Manitou and you have a cesspool. We have an opinion on it, that's all."

Ms. Edington recommended the association "look into

septic systems as well. I've been to the health department. A subdivision may cause problems but older septic systems cause more."

"Over the years we have been educating people," said Mr. Costigan, "for instance, to put in steel tanks. In some areas of the province they have done inspections. We posted the question to the health department. They thought it was a good idea but it costs money. We were involved in a couple cases where people had called me and it was looked after. They don't seem in favour of inspecting every septic system."

One member stated, "you're supposed to pump the tank every two years and a lot of people don't." Several members agreed that it would be impossible for the health unit to inspect every septic system on the lake. It would take several years and require more staff. However, they could be called if there was a specific problem and they would investigate. People were urged to talk to their neighbours about maintaining and upgrading their septic systems.

"We built 30 years ago on Lake Manitou, at the north end," a member said. "At that time you could drink the water. The last survey said it wasn't fit to drink because of E. coli. You can't drink the water. I think it's becoming obvious. We're all going to have to worry about the quality of the water now, not in the future."

Paul Moffatt was acclaimed as the new vice-president. The six available director positions were filled by Michael R. Costigan, Jim Booth, Steve Mann, Bruce Fraser, John Coulter and Mike Thompson.

Door prizes donated by Jerry Zelle and the LMAA were drawn and the meeting was adjourned.

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Northern Ontario School of Medicine seeks input

NORTHERN ONTARIO—The Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) is seeking the public's input in developing its next strategic plan for 2015-2020 in order to ensure that the school remains accountable to the needs of Northern Ontarians.

"Aboriginal communities, Francophone communities, health service partners, host universities, funders, local and provincial governmental officials, LHINs and many others will have a say in the future of the school. These collaborators share the dream of equitable, responsive health care for all Northern Ontarians, and their feedback ensures that we develop a plan for

NOSM that will continue to meet their needs."

"Our many successes – positive influence on recruitment and retention, innovative use of technology, unique distributed community engaged learning model and our long list of national and international awards – have created a global reputation that has only been possible because of the contributions of so many," Dean Strasser concludes. "With the new NOSM Strategic Plan, we hope to continue to work with Northern Ontarians to reach beyond extraordinary, charting our future with 2020 vision of the road before us."

posed Circle Project for the next four years, hosting weekly stitching groups that became so much more and would eventually become the final home for the four works of art created. Oh, they added, "We like to sing."

"Yes, you do love to sing, Little Current United Church," Ms. Martin said during the dedication service, following the hymn. "Your singing is joyous and full of life. You sing in so many ways—pie baking, yard sale minding, plant selling, fish dinner making, attending regularly, caring deeply."

Ms. Martin shared that the project had its origins as a theoretical exercise for a course she was taking at the time in liturgical art. It was ideological in its origins, but her vision was to make it a reality. "When the Manitoulin Circle Project morphed from being something that only had to be an idea on paper (for the university course) into something that this church would actually carry out, I can't recall," she said. "My liturgical course was finished in October 2009 when we started stitching. I went on to study other courses for that degree and graduated from it in London, England in June 2012."

"This particular project was all theoretical for the university," Ms. Martin continued. "It did not have to actually go ahead to receive this mark—but it did go ahead. It went ahead from September 2009 and continued on. That was not me. That was you. The many people who supported the idea of a wider community coming into this building to work together and create contemporary art using materials, rich with past domestic rituals. That was you, Little Current United Church. That was you, dear women and men who placed their hands on this work every week for four years."

Ms. Martin's proposal to the church, made in August 2009, stated that the project would take two years, with the installation planned for 2011. The panels were finally finished in 2013, four years later (and

taking an additional two years of steady stitching by many hands) in time to meet a deadline for the Thunder Bay Art Gallery where the four panels went on display last September and then on to the Art Gallery of Sudbury in the winter. After a brief stop at their home at the church, the panels will again be on the move with at least four more tours, but this church, Ms. Martin said, is their home. Over the weekend, the church and the panels were also a stop on the Manitoulin Art Tour.

She explained that the panels were made for this particular church, and for those particular walls in the sanctuary. They are meditation panels, she said. "Perhaps they work best if you are alone with them, seated in one of the pews. Feeling their accumulated touch. They are also intended to work when you are together as a congregation, helping each to listen to and meditate on the ideas presented during the service."

The wall behind the choir, which houses the cross, is a bright blue and this element is featured in all of the panels.

"The design element of the circle that is in every panel is one of the simple shapes that Carl Jung identified as being within the collective unconscious," she shared. "Everyone. Every. One. Around the world, from all periods of time, understands this shape."

Ms. Martin explained that the circle represents wholeness and completion. "The circle is the most natural shape. It is perfect. Because there is no beginning or end of a circle, it represents eternity. The circle also refers to the circle of women who participated in the construction of these pieces every Thursday. Manitoulin Island is a circle. The earth is a circle."

The square, the shape of the panel, represents solidity, boundaries. "If the circle is heaven, the square is earth."

The panels all contain a message of environmental appreciation, Ms. Martin continued, as they were made with donated and thrift-shop damask tablecloths and domestic textiles such as lace doilies, women's handkerchiefs and wool blankets. Their titles are intended to raise awareness about caring for the earth: 'Earth Ark,' 'Mended World,' 'Precious Water' and 'Layers of Time.'

"One thing that handmade items do is hold time. They catch us," she continued. "Those four years of time are caught in these panels and saved for future generations to appreciate. The people who touched and worked on these pieces, who even just walked by the quilt while it was in its frame in the church hall, will look at these panels and remember something about this particular present time in our lives and in the church's life."

"This is life affirming work. To slowly make things by hand shows faith that there will be a place for those things in the future."

In a prayer of thanksgiving, the congregation prayed: Creator God, source of all inspiration and beauty, we thank You for the gift of these mediation panels now dedicated to the glory of Your name. May the beauty of the symbols and colours of these works of art invite us to ponder our quiet centre, the stories of our faith and the rhythm of life's seasons. May they continue to remind us of You, Creator of us all."

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

16 months ago, Mr. Howard packed up his belongings, including his Belgians Sandy and Joker, and headed west. And the pulling didn't stop there. Entering the rodeo circuit in Alberta, Mr. Howard and his team spent weekends in horse pulls, just like he did before, only this time he had his eye on the prize—the Calgary Stampede—and he made it too.

Last year Mr. Howard made it to the championship round, edging out 60 teams to make it to the top 10. Coming in sixth place just wouldn't cut it, though.

"We trained six hours a day, every day," Mr. Howard told The Expositor from his Rocky Mountain House home. "It pays off."

He explained that the Calgary Stampede only takes those with so many wins and so many championships on the circuit. And with a win at all six pulls he entered this year, Mr. Howard was in, but he was facing some stiff competition, especially from Randy Dodge of Albany, Oregon.

"I was so nervous," he said, speaking of the big screens, the audience and the media attention inside the arena. "Once you've made the finals, your stomach is just in knots for those few days in between."

"Coming into the heavyweight pull on the evening of Sunday, July 13, Mr. Dodge had a chance to score an extremely rare clean sweep of the Stampede's horse pull events," a press release from the Calgary Stampede states. "Mr. Dodge won both the lightweight class on Friday evening and the middleweight division on Saturday. After nine trips down the track, his team of Fritz and Tommy was still pulling strongly going into the showdown with Mr. Howard's outfit. Both teams were sponsored by New West Truck Centres."

"A soft spot had developed in the pulling lane and several competitors had already fallen afoul of it," the release continues. "Mr. Howard's team pulled first in the final and made it 92 inches before becoming bogged. Mr. Dodge hooked up his horses and they gave it all they had, but 80 inches was all there was. Mr. Dodge had to settle for the Reserve Champion's cheque of \$2,500 while Mr. Howard got the champion payout of \$3,000."

"I'm still shaking, I can't believe it," Mr. Howard told The Expositor. "The guy I beat was expected to win with 97 to 1 odds." When asked how Mr. Dodge responded, Mr. Howard said, "he was missing words, he couldn't believe it happened."

Mr. Howard's parents, Len and Ilene, were in the audience as was his wife and child. By the time Mr. Howard and his team made it back to the barn following his win, 22 congratulatory messages had already appeared on his phone.

Following the win, the horses are tested for drugs, Mr. Howard explained, noting that it's often in the backs of people's minds that there is nefarious business going on with the animals, but that's not the case.

And what of those champion horses? Did they get a special treat? this reporter asked.

"Oh yeah. They got lots of loving—they deserved it," Mr.

Howard responded, noting that Sandy and Joker also took home the Best Team award for their good behaviour in the arena. Never once did they rear up, he said proudly.

"Joker was three when we left Ontario and he's turned out to be a real crackerjack."

"It worked out the way a horse pull should," he added. "It's a big achievement."

Horse pulls differ slightly in the west than they do "back home," Mr. Howard said. While the pulling distance is the same, 14 feet, Stampeder only have two attempts, and the horses must stay hooked. The pull must be a 'tight tug' too, meaning there can be no slack in the chain once the horses start pulling. "So you need real strong horses," he said. "It was a big learning curve once I got here and I think that's why I didn't do as well last year. It takes a lot of concentration with them."

And while the purse is nice, having that buckle is what makes it worthwhile for Stampeder.

"It's hard to explain, it's just an amazing feeling—it's the biggest show on earth and you can't get any better than that," he said. "There are only two Ontarians to have ever won the Calgary Stampede and we both did it the same year." (The other Ontarian Calgary Stampede champion this year is Morgan Grant of Granton who won his championship buckle in steer wrestling and tie-down roping.)

When Mr. Howard was called to receive his buckle the announcer told the crowd that he was from Manitoulin Island—a fact that made him very proud.

Following the horse pull at Manitowaning Summerfest on Saturday afternoon—a pull Mr. Howard used to frequent with his team—The Expositor spoke with some of the contestants about Mr. Howard's good news.

"Good for him," Katie Pyette-Cyr said.

Jerome Pheasant, who won the pull, said he recalled competing against Mr. Howard at that very pull when Mr. Howard came first and he came second. "His horses are strong," he said.

ing the theatre is a benefit to the community," Mr. Hobbs said.

When asked about the municipality applying for funds from grant organizations to see these code requirements met, the clerk-treasurer spoke of the ongoing need for money for road improvements in the community and the "one per year" unspoken rule of groups such as Trillium and FedNor. While council is aware of the loss the theatre brings to the community, they also fear 'putting their eggs in one basket,' so to speak.

While the Roller Mills, another historic waterfront building, has also been a topic of discussion at the council table of late, Mr. Hobbs said Burns Wharf definitely takes priority.

Marilyn Wohlberg, artistic director and founder of the Players, is anxiously awaiting council's decision on what to do with the theatre. "This has been a long, slow process, at least it seems that way when you are waiting with bated breath for the outcome," she told The Expositor.

The option was given to operate at half capacity, but Ms. Wohlberg explained that this would not cover the expenses incurred in putting on a production and was therefore not worth the time or investment.

Over the past six or seven years, the theatre has been a thriving hive of activity and the music has echoed throughout the old building and poured out into the beautiful Manitowaning waterfront and across Manitowaning Bay," Ms. Wohlberg said. "Even the majestic, aged Norisle would groan with delight as each and every performance took to the stage!

Burns Wharf Theatre players, a community theatre that I founded in 2008 with the Gilbert and Sullivan production of 'HMS Pinafore,' the summer concert series that included such well-known and gifted artists as Kevin Closs, Ian Tamblyn, Rick Fines, The Good Lovelies, Sheesham and Lotus to name a few and of course Manitoulin's own Down Yonder."

I have had so many calls, emails and meetings with people in the local stores asking what production(s) are going on at Burns Wharf Theatre this summer," Ms. Wohlberg continued. "It's difficult to come out with the words 'there is nothing going on at the theatre this summer.' Peter Baumgarten, the co-chair of the Burns Wharf Theatre Committee, posted on our website (www.burnswharf.net) 'It's a tragedy, not a comedy.' How appropriate to describe how we feel about this interruption in what has proved to be an amazingly successful enterprise, bringing to this area many lovers of live theatre as well as providing great entertainment for local residents as well and folks who come every summer and look forward with great anticipation to what is on the 'menu' for Burns Wharf."

Ms. Wohlberg also noted the summer rec program that in the past included a one-week theatre program run by her son D'Arcy Closs that saw the students rehearse musical performances such as Cinderella, Alice in Wonderland.

Ms. Wohlberg said that both she and the Players are willing to help the

municipality with funding applications or any fundraising.

"It's being in this state of limbo that's very hard," she said. "I feel, and I know, that the theatre and the work I do there is a big part of me. I feel I'm missing something, and the same goes for a lot of the others involved in the Players."

"It's really grown to be something bigger than I ever thought, and not just for Manitowaning, but for

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


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Central Manitoulin Council Notes

Motions from the June 11 Finance and Administration Committee

Old School windows deferred for engineering study

Council passed a motion from Mayor Gerry Strong and Councillor Ted Taylor to reconsider the purchase of the Old School windows after discussion with staff and that the municipality postpones moving forward with this project be postponed until Tulloch Engineering has assessed the whole building for the municipality.

"We had a lengthy discussion and staff explained what we were up against," said Councillor Beverly Cannard-Pearson in moving the motion, seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens. "It was felt (it was) best that we hold off (since there needs to be more engineering conducted on the building)."

"It was a good catch by staff," agreed Councillor Stephens.

Customers can continue to use VISA and MasterCard for payments

Council passed a motion from Mayor Gerry Strong and Councillor Derek Stephens that the municipality continues to accept Visa and MasterCard payments, without any service fee charged.

"Since we are not allowed to charge a fee for accepting Interact, VISA or MasterCard we discussed our options," said Councillor Beverly Cannard-Pearson.

Councillor Adam McDonald noted that the matter came to the committee due to the significant costs (\$13,000 per year) associated with accepting credit card payments at the municipal office. "There was concern that we were subsidizing a perk for some taxpayers at the expense of others." Councillor McDonald indicated that he would not support the motion.

Councillor Ted Taylor inquired if there were a lot of credit card transactions, to which CAO Ruth Frawley replied "yes."

Mayor Gerry Strong asked if there was any indication that arrears were down since the payments were being accepted. Ms. Frawley replied that this aspect had not been analysed.

"Once we are offering the service, it is hard to take it away," said Mayor Strong.

"I agree with Gerry (Mayor Strong)," said Councillor Derek Stephens. "It is the cost of doing business. In other businesses it is costed into the price of everything also."

Councillor McDonald called for a recorded vote. His was the only vote against the motion.

Council supports rodeo

A motion from Councillor Derek Stephens and Gloria Haner "that we rec-

ommend to council that we donate the same amount to the Manitoulin Rodeo Committee under the same conditions as last year," came forward with no specific amount listed. The motion was moved at council by Councillor Beverly Cannard-Pearson and seconded by Councillor Patricia MacDonald.

"How much did we allow last year?" queried Councillor Adam McDonald.

The amount of the donation last year was not clear, although there was some suggestion that the amount was \$500.

Councillor Adam McDonald expressed concern that the rodeo was taking place on the same weekend as the community's Homecoming Weekend. "I don't think we even considered that at committee," said Mayor Gerry Strong.

"I didn't think of it either, to be honest," said Councillor McDonald.

"I think a lot of our ratepayers would find this as an attraction," said Councillor Cannard-Pearson. "Are we not big enough to support this? We always encourage other communities to put their best foot forward."

"I think the community has been doing a very good job of supporting this," said Councillor Derek Stephens, "this community and the Island both. The more people we can attract to the Island the better it is for all of us."

"We have always had this stance," said Councillor Patricia MacDonald. "If it is good for Manitoulin, it is good for Central Manitoulin. Not everybody accesses Homecoming."

"I thought the rodeo was in July," said Mayor Strong.

"The weekend has moved though," said Councillor McDonald.

Council supports the Manitoulin Sea Cadet Corps

A motion brought forward from committee by Councillors Gloria Haner and Ted Taylor "that we recommend to council that the municipality donate \$150 to the Manitoulin Sea Cadet Corps" was moved by Councillor Beverly Can-

nard-Pearson and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens. "We do have members of our community who are members of the Manitoulin Sea Cadets," said Councillor Cannard-Pearson. "This is a very positive organization for youth," agreed Councillor Stephens.

Solar panel bylaw sent back to committee

A motion from Mayor Gerry Strong and Councillor Gloria Haner "that we recommend to council that Bylaw 2014-11, being a bylaw to establish a permit fee for the installation of solar panels, be given its several readings and be duly passed, with the changes as suggested by this committee" generated debate on the free use of property.

"There was quite a discussion held," said Councillor Beverly Cannard-Pearson. "The motion was simplified to include only ground and roof mounted."

"There needs to be a process," said Councillor Adam McDonald. "If people put up 10 panels (on the adjacent property), I couldn't see."

CAO Ruth Frawley noted that the building code requires setbacks on construction.

"This is for roofs?" asked Mayor Strong.

"This is for both," corrected Ms. Frawley.

"Is there anything stopping people now if I paid the \$50?" asked Councillor McDonald.

"There are the setbacks," reiterated Ms. Frawley. "Structures have to meet the requirements of setbacks."

"We have more and more of them," said Councillor McDonald.

"The setbacks are 30 feet from the front, 10 feet from the side and 10 feet from the back," supplied Mayor Strong.

"We did discuss this question," said Ms. Frawley.

Councillor Cannard-Pearson said the matter was discussed in committee and that the issue was considered largely from the perspective of keeping the municipality in the loop as to where the panels

are going.

"We need to review our zoning bylaws," said Ms. Frawley.

"We need to review our zoning, especially with the new Official Plan," agreed Councillor Patricia MacDonald. "I don't think solar panels are the only concern. We need to have further discussion."

"I think this permit is a problem," said Mayor Strong. "When I was thinking about it, I was thinking roof top units. As for setbacks, yes they are a structure. If you want to put a solar panel in your front yard in a residential area..."

"Are we putting the cart before the horse with this bylaw?" questioned Councillor McDonald.

"We will be reviewing our zoning after the Official Plan is passed," said Ms. Frawley.

"I recommend we send this back to committee," said Mayor Strong.

The motion was withdrawn.

Councillor Derek Stephens voiced his objections to the motion on principle. "If I want to put up a solar panel on my property, you should be able to put one up if you want to," he said. "It's my yard."

"Basically you are saying build anything you want," replied Mayor Strong. "This is something to discuss in committee."

Fall Fair supported

A motion brought forward by Councillors Derek Stephens and Gloria Haner "that we recommend to council that the municipality donate \$1,500 to the Central Manitoulin Public School 2014 Fall Fair" was moved by Councillor Beverly Cannard-Pearson and ...continued on page 13

seconded by Councillor Stephens.

"I believe this is the longest running school fair," said Councillor Stephens.

"It covers the whole community," said Councillor Ted Taylor.

"It is great for the community and great for the school children," agreed Councillor Haner.

"They do a lot with that donation," said Councillor Patricia MacDonald.

Council recesses for July

A motion by Councillor Beverly Cannard-Pearson, seconded by Councillor Patricia MacDonald, called for no meetings to be held during the month of July.

"This is a longstanding tradition in our municipality," said Mayor Gerry Strong. "Previous councils have done the same."

June 16 Community Improvement Committee recommendations

A motion from Mayor Gerry Strong and Councillor Beverly Cannard-Pearson that council "approve application 2014-04 (Mac's Camp) for the Building Renovation, Restoration and Improvement Program for the amount of \$15,000" was carried.

"This is for renovations to the tourist camp," explained Councillor Cannard Pearson. "They meet all of the criteria for the CIP." The motion was made by Councillor Cannard Pearson and seconded by Councillor Patricia MacDonald. "This is the maximum amount under the program."

"I am in support," said Councillor MacDonald, but that the applicants would have to secure the necessary approvals.

Mayor Strong noted that the municipality would recoup the money from the CIP grants through the increased revenue generated by the increase in property assessments.

June 25 Public Works Committee recommendations

Yonge Street construction contract revised

A motion from Councillors Patricia MacDonald and Beverly Cannard-Pearson was brought forward that "we recommend to council that the municipality approves the revision to

the contract of June 23, 2014 with Labelle Bros. Construction for extra rock removal on Duke, Yonge, Thorne and Anglin Streets."

"We ran into rock, which is pretty evident to anyone within hearing distance of the hammering," said Councillor Adam McDonald. "We have to revise the contract to remove the rock. We set a cap on the amount of rock they will charge us for." Councillor McDonald moved the motion, seconded by Councillor Gloria Haner.

"Hats off to staff for negotiating a good rate on this," said Councillor Derek Stephens.

"Yes, thanks," said Councillor McDonald. "Although I am a bit disappointed that we did not find the rock in the preliminary study."

"You use the term 'we,'" objected Mayor Strong. "It was the engineers."

"I think this was a project that has been promised," said Councillor Patricia McDonald. "Do it, put it to rest. We received a substantial grant. It is essential for Central Manitoulin to have that road improved."

"The contractor is doing a great job," said Councillor McDonald.

"The financial impact is not going to be as hard as had previously been thought," said Mayor Strong. "It has come down substantially from the original assessments. It will still hurt a little bit. The contractor had us in a real bind, they really could have put it to us."

Council stands ground on new bleachers

A motion was put forward by Councillors Patricia MacDonald and Beverly Cannard Pearson that "we recommend to council that the municipality write to Crista King regarding her concerns about the safety of the Mindemoya ball field's new bleachers, letting her know that any additions to the bleachers would pose greater liability to the municipality and not comply with the CSA and Ontario Building code standards, and further that council is satisfied that staff did its due diligence when purchasing this manufacturer's product."

Discussion centred on the issue of liability for the municipality should the town make modifications to the engineered design.

"I have an issue with this," said Councillor Derek Stephens. "If people would just take responsibility for

their own actions, there would not be issues like this. Don't let your kids play on it and they won't fall off."

"We have met the standards," interjected Mayor Gerry Strong.

"Don't order the second set," said Councillor Gloria Haner. "We can save \$20,000."

Fishing platform tender awarded

A motion from Councillors Derek Stephens and Ted Taylor recommended to council that "Hill Property be awarded the contract in the amount of \$84,000 plus HST for the construction of the educational and fishing platforms at the Mindemoya River in Providence Bay."

"This came to committee on recommendation from staff," noted Councillor Adam McDonald. "This was the lowest bid."

Councillor McDonald moved the motion "for discussion" seconded by Councillor Stephens. "Do we have the specifications?" asked Councillor McDonald.

"It is basically plug and play," said CAO Ruth Frawley, who indicated that the assembly will be done under close observation from town staff.

Councillors indicated that they had received phone calls in regards to the connections between the bidders.

"I had the same phone calls," said Mayor Strong. "Council is expected to take the lowest tender, but the work must be completed to standards."

"Everything was fair," noted CAO Ruth Frawley regarding the bidding process.

"I just want clarification that the contractor can do it to what it has said it can," said Councillor McDonald.

"Just like every other project," noted the CAO.

"No payments will be made until the engineers have reviewed it," said Mayor Strong.

"Quality of workmanship is what we are left with," said Councillor McDonald.

"We have to guard the

money of our taxpayers," said Mayor Strong.

"We are not obligated to take the lowest bidder," said Councillor McDonald.

"No, but we would have to have a pretty good explanation," replied Mayor Strong.

"It is plug and play," reiterated CAO Frawley.

"I didn't get the call," said Councillor Patricia MacDonald, who appeared to be uncertain as to what issue was being discussed by those who had.

"It is the right of all taxpayers to call the councilors," said Mayor Strong.

Lions use of parking lot granted for yard sale

A motion by Councillors Gloria Haner and Derek Stephens "that we recommend to council that the Providence Bay and Spring Bay Lions Club be allowed to use the Providence Bay Community Centre parking lot to hold their annual yard sale on June 28" was moved by Councillor Adam McDonald and seconded by Councillor Beverly Cannard Pearson.

Additional work okayed for Monument Road boat launch

A motion from Councillors Derek Stephens and Beverly Cannard Pearson that "we recommend to council that we approve the additional work required by the Ministry of Natural Resources for the Monument Road Boat Launch in the amount of \$9,594.90" was carried.

Extra work was required due to changes in the MNR permitting process. "It was initiated by them, but it resulted in a bigger cost. This was extra work the MNR said had to be done," said Councillor Derek Stephens.

"The ministry changed the rules," agreed Councillor Adam McDonald.

"We have to guard the

option No. 2 in the amount of \$1,000.05 for the installation of two outdoor bullet cameras at the Mindemoya Water Treatment Plant by Direct Satellite and Security Inc" was moved by Councillor Adam McDonald and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens.

"Water treatment is the biggest asset of the municipality and this is about the security and safety of our water treatment plant," said Councillor Beverly Cannard Pearson.

"Don't play around people," said Councillor Adam McDonald, referring to the theft of the previous monitoring system.

A further motion that "we recommend to council that the municipality enter into a fire protection agreement with the Township of Billings for the provision of fire protection services for various locations that are adjacent to the Municipality of Central Manitoulin" was also passed.

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Sunshine, scenery and hundreds of motorcycles at Ride Manitoulin 2014

PROVIDENCE BAY—Gates opened at 4 pm Friday but the bikes started rolling in a day early. There were more campers Thursday night than there were the first year, when only seven riders stayed at the Providence Bay fairgrounds. Now in its 4th year, the Ride Manitoulin motorcycle rally has become a favourite weekend for its friendly volunteers, easy camaraderie, and great rides. Riders came in from Owen Sound, Orillia, Blackstock, Hamilton, Burkes Falls, Sudbury, and even as far away as Vancouver Island, to meet, mingle and share rides and stories with locals and other enthusiasts.

Organizer Brian Mitchell was very pleased with the attendance. He couldn't confirm the numbers but judging from the pile of registration forms, he was confident there was another increase this year. 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Trustee believes that making First Nation history classes compulsory in secondary schools a mistake

RAINBOW DISTRICT—The Rainbow District School Board's First Nation Advisory Committee put forward a motion at the board's June 30 meeting that would make the study of First Nations history compulsory for secondary school students, which raises serious questions for Manitoulin school board trustee Larry Killens.

"I put up quite an argument about this," Trustee Killens told The Expositor.

The agenda for the June 30 meeting came just four days

before the actual date and with a motion such as this on the table, more time to gain insight from his constituents on Manitoulin was needed, Mr. Killens said.

The motion reads: "That, as a result of the Charter of Commitment to First Nation, Métis and Inuit Education adopted by the Ontario School Boards' Association, that the Rainbow District School Board recommend that Native Studies courses be compulsory for all secondary students, given that adequate funding for resources be provided by the Ministry (of Education)."

The trustee explained that at the beginning of the school year in 2013, the board endorsed the Charter of Commitment for First Nation, Métis and Inuit Education as guided by the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

"Why are we endorsing it if we don't do it ourselves?" Mr. Killens asked. "We're trying hard to be inclusive, but we need a little more time," he said of the compulsory classes.

Mr. Killens said he worries that because the board is now signed on, it can now be measured on its performance.

Currently, teachers of Grades 1 through 6 take mandatory Native awareness courses. "And I'm proud of that, especially when we're led by a director who is advancing First Nation concerns, but the only person who can mandate (compulsory classes) is the government."

"With only four days notice, I'm not going to recommend it without discussions with education stakeholders," Mr. Killens said. "And because of the way the motion is worded, I feel like if I don't support it, I could be accused of being discriminatory."

The trustee said he worries that adding compulsory classes to secondary students' schedules, especially for those who have a clear career path and know the courses they need to take to get into university, is not fair.

"I want to make it clear that I'm not opposed, in fact I think it's necessary, but not to be compulsory," he added.

Grace Fox, the chair of the First Nations Advisory Committee and fellow Island trustee, was not available for comment.

jected date for a more permanent set of digs next spring.

"On a more positive note we continue to brew small test batches, including our seasonal offering of a hawberry ale and will continue to offer sampling opportunities as possible," notes the team. "As well, we are hard at work behind the scenes to finalize a site location (a priority) and continue to augment our equipment and ingredient inventory."

The Expositor has been invited to drop by the test laboratory to sample the wares in the next few days, so stay tuned for an update.

"Good things come to those who wait, they say, and we hope you'll agree," concludes the Split Rail missive. If the initial test batch sampled last Thanksgiving are any indication, it will be well worth the wait, even if it is after winter's snows have given way to spring showers.


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Sea Cadets enjoy the high seas aboard a real life pirate ship

LITTLE CURRENT—The pirate ship Liana's Ransom stole into the Port of Little Current early last week and made off with a treasure-trove of Sea Cadets and their officers.

Liana's Ransom, and her pirate crew, are the nicest kind of brigands as, after a fun-filled six hour cruise, they brought everyone back to port safe and sound...and well fed.

Everything about Liana's Ransom, whose home port is Halifax, is somewhat whimsical: she is named for example after owner/captain Joe Tilley's wife Liana and her childhood dog, Ransom.

The ship's hull is steel, but is cleverly clad with wood and her impressive wheel was part of the décor in a Texas restaurant that was converting from a seafood place to a steak house. Captain Tilley is a man who clearly enjoys what he is doing.


He built his boat himself and, like the eighteenth century pirates he and his crew conjure up for the young people who come aboard for a fun experience, he goes where

...high seas aboard a real life pirate ship

he wants. Every fall, he and his wife make the trip from Canada to the Caribbean where he bases himself at a particular port, like Roadtown in Tortola, British Virgin Islands, and gives local residents and tourists the same kind of experiences (but in a setting where nearly 300 years ago, actual pirates did ply their trade).

He hires local crews there, just as he does in Canada in the summertime. Of the three barefoot youths that were the crew on the Sea Cadets' trip, the lone young woman, who is from Nova Scotia, has just

completed a two-year course towards her welder's ticket and, in the fall is heading west to gain hours and practical experience towards realizing this goal. She described herself mysteriously as "a pirate's daughter" and the back of her neck was proudly tattooed "East Coast".

Another member of the good natured barefoot crew in period dress was from Jamaica and had crewed last winter aboard Liana's Ransom during her Caribbean cruise, coming north to explore the Great Lakes. The lone lucky central Canadian crew member is a second-year pirate from the Niagara Peninsula who met Liana's Ransom at lock five on the Welland Canal and jumped aboard for another season, suitcase in hand, according to Captain Tilley.

On her return to port in Little Current, the Sea Cadets had another opportunity to quickly travel nearly the entire 85 foot length of the ship, pirate style, grasping a rope that was firmly tied high overhead to one of the masts and then pushing out over the water and, acting as the pendulum weight, flying quickly from stern to bow.

One Sea Cadet, Tim Vanvolkingburgh from Mindemoya, like the champion hamburger eater, repeated the trick a half dozen times. Nearly all of the cadets (and one nine-year-old Navy League grandson) had more than one ship-long swing, dockside, with a small onshore audience looking on.

Another bit of whimsy that is part of a Liana's Ransom cruise is the "firing of the cannon". She is fitted with four miniature cannons and, returning to Little Current, the town received a four-gun salute after the tiny barrels were

packed with black powder, the ramrod driving down paper to hold it in place (no shot) and a crew member poured a little powder on top of each cannon barrel leading to the detonation hole by way of a fuse. The four adult members of the party (two Navy League board members and the two Sea Cadet officers) were recruited to each fire a cannon and sing out the memorable and classic line "fire in the hole!" when the fuse powder was detonated.

Another special event was the welcoming aboard Liana's Ransom of Sea Cadet Quinton Cosby's brother Josh when the ship docked in Little Current.



filled, laid-back whimsical group, a life and death experience in which the ship and her crew played a pivotal rescuing role only a few days before the Little Current stop demonstrates how businesslike they are in their seamanship.

Nothing was mentioned of the event last week, but The Expositor subsequently learned that Liana's Ransom had played a heroic part in a rescue at sea only a few days before her Little Current visit.

During a pirate adventure cruise out of Collingwood on July 12, Liana's Ransom had come upon a man and a woman who were in the chilly waters of



Georgian Bay, each in the early stages of hypothermia.

The woman had gone into the water from a sailboat with the idea of a refreshing swim but quickly had begun to succumb to the cold temperatures. A man had jumped in to help her but the cold water quickly took its toll on him as well and other people on their sailboat were inexperienced sailors and didn't know how to use the emergency gear they had aboard.

The crew of Liana's Ransom quickly had the ship's seaboat in the water and raced to pick up the distressed pair who, fortunately, did not require medical attention.

Captain Tilley said when he and his crew saw what was going on, they immediately initiated the emergency drills they practice every week, giving his crew accolades for their quick thinking that interrupted what could easily have been a tragedy.

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You're on Manitoulin: Wishin' you Get reel! Make fishin'

EDITOR'S NOTE: This year's series of stories is geared to giving tourist visitors insights into activities Manitoulin has to offer and will focus on unique experiences available to everyone.

Manitoulin Island is said to be the largest freshwater island in the world. Situated in Lake Huron, its North Channel has been fished since before recorded time. The Island has an enormous number of lakes (108 at last count), each with its own unique fishing attractions. Whether you choose a resort or a dinghy on an isolated pond, there's sure to be a fish tale to tell at the end of the day.

Most resorts rent boats and motors for guests, and many have an expert on hand to take them out for a few hours, or to show them where the fish bite. Just about anyone you talk to has a favourite lake or two, and some folks will even tell you their secret spot for landing the Big One.

Not Bob Tuomi, though. Oh, the lifelong fisherman will reveal plenty of locations where to catch perch (Lake Wolsey), or pike and rainbow trout (Kagawong dock) but when it comes to where he catches his prize largemouth bass, well, he will just chuckle. "Sawbill Lake!" he laughs. This is code for a lake "somewhere" on Manitoulin, not even remotely called Sawbill, so, time to change the line of questioning!

Bob uses only live bait—frogs and fishes—"accident-free" with weedless hooks. Bob insists that his wife Margaret is better at fishing than he is; she'll only say that she's "very competitive. If Bob loses a fish, I'm right there casting for it!" Margaret adds, "I love to let my mind escape on a sunny day," and advises that "sunscreen and insect repellent are essential to a great trip." And catching some largemouth bass, her favourite since her husband introduced her to it when they first met.

decades, Bob leafs through a thick binder of Ontario Fishing Regulations booklets from 1980 to the present. He says: "Whether the fish is big or small, obey the law."

"All of Manitoulin is good for fishing," Bob declares, "just go out with someone who knows." He is quick to add, "I don't fish for fun, I fish for food." That's a lot of fish-eating as he will not freeze the catch, because, in his opinion, that would affect both consistency and taste; so he and Margaret also give away fish to friends who don't have a chance to, or can't, fish themselves.

At Wee Point Resort on Lake Manitou near Manitowaning, Jim Hembruff loves to tell stories about the old days, when his grandfather built the fishing lodge in 1917 for the American owner who had purchased the Crown land

for a resort. When the owner died, a Mr. O'Bleennis, Jim's dad was deeded the 26 acres with lodge, cottages and boat house, "for 20 years of service to Wee Point." The will is framed in the lodge.

In those days, fishing was a grand adventure, and Jim vividly remembers his mother's stories of Senator Dawes, just up the road, where "servants dressed all in white, the cottagers arrived in chauffeur-driven limousines, stayed all summer and ate fish at every meal. There was never any rush." The 18- to 20-foot wooden boats with inboard motors would purr across the lake, hooks were baited by staff and shore lunches served in style. "The sound of a hammer hitting an old ploughshare meant it was dinner time at the Dawes'," says Jim, "you could hear it across the bay." Next year is Wee Point's 50th

anniversary, the beautiful old lodge still stands, the boathouse still docks rental boats, and Jim's wife Pat reports that "just this year, when the MNRF (Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry) tested the lake, they said the lake is really healthy and has lots of pickerel, trout, and smallmouth bass." The MNRF also has been re-stocking the lake's speckled trout, and "people are catching 5-pounders."

On the other side of Lake Manitou, everybody knows Jack Hayes, 82, who's been fishing since he was given a cane pole at age five. "I fell in love with it," he admits, and still goes out almost every day in summer with the same

Northeast Town Council Notes

Council approves zoning bylaw amendment

The Northeast Town council approved a zoning bylaw amendment that was requested by Vanessa Pierce concerning her part lot on Wilson Street west.

"The subject land has been in the ownership of Ms. Pierce for three years and the rezoning would allow for uses permitted in the residential zone, i.e. a dwelling unit," states the application. "Residential uses are not permitted within the development zone. Therefore, a zoning amendment is required."

There were no objections to the request during the public meeting, however Peggy Young, representing her parents who live on Wilson Street West, spoke to council regarding the roadway, requesting that the town officially take over the road.

Council directed staff to enter into discussions with the property owners regarding the road.

Council urges MTO to pay for roadwork

Councillor Bill Koehler brought up under 'old business' during last week's council meeting that the town had still not heard back from the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) regarding the bill council sent the ministry for phase three of the 'connecting link project.'

Town CAO Dave Williamson reviewed with council how council had directed staff to send the MTO an invoice for the work the town completed, finishing phase three of the connecting link road work on Highway 6 from China City to the Little Current swing bridge.

"The project was three parts and the MTO completed the first two and kept putting off finishing the third part and then cancelled the funding, leaving us to spend the \$99,000 to complete it," said Councillor Koehler. "I think we should send another letter telling them that we are waiting for our refund. This is nothing we should let go by the wayside."

Council agreed with Mr. Koehler and a motion was carried directing staff to send a letter along with another invoice to the MTO.

Review of drinking water report

Mr. Williamson reviewed the Little Current drinking water system annual inspection report with council. He specifically directed council to page 12 of the report that contains the various recommendations, noting that the report points out that the water treatment plant is 14 years old and will need maintenance and upgrades when it reaches its twentieth year. Mr. Williamson recommended to council that it consider budgeting for an engineer in the 2015 capital budget to begin looking at what these maintenance and upgrades will be.

Northeast Town council supports golf fundraiser

After reading a letter from Larissa Lopex of the Canadian Cancer Society, council carried a motion to donate \$100 to the Canadian Cancer Society's Reggie Leach and Friends' Golf to Cure Cancer event at the Rainbow Ridge Golf Course in Manitowaning.

Councillor Melissa Peters requested a recorded vote stating, "I will not be supporting this due to the lack of budgeting with council's donations."

In the recorded vote, Councillors Michael Erskine, Marcel Gauthier, Christina Jones, Bill Koehler, Dawn Orr, Paul Skippen, Bruce Wood and Mayor Al MacNevin all voted in favour of the donation while Councillor Peters opposed it.

Northeast Town Fire chief report

Council reviewed Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey's July report. He noted in the report that there had been a reported car fire on July 5 and a house fire on Blake Street West on July 13 in Little Current. He also noted that the apparatus and equipment is in good working order.

Community services report

Reid Taylor delivered the July community services report. He reported that maintenance and repairs to prepare for upcoming events and the ice season were ongoing at the recreation centre, in addition to painting and capital upgrades.

"This month at the recreation centre Drive Test continues," noted Mr. Taylor. "The Haweater Weekend events are coming up and pickleball continues."

As for the marina, Mr. Taylor said that the service dock has been busy on weekdays and very busy on weekends, adding that "this past Sunday night the marina reached

capacity, which is good."

"The Port of Little Current has been very busy this month," he continued. "Lots of transient boats have arrived and stayed overnight. Staff are completing maintenance tasks when not servicing boats and the new Spider Bay launch ramp/fuel dock has been installed and completed."

He added that the first cruise ship of the year would be coming on Friday, July 25 and that the port would also be hosting the North Channel Regatta on Friday, July 25.

In terms of the town parks and outdoor spaces, Mr. Taylor told council that the Community Picnic at Low Island earlier in the month was a "great success," noting that 200-250 people had attended.

"The new Low Island swim dock is installed and open, as is the new Low Island gazebo," said Mr. Taylor. "Preparations for Haweater Weekend have started and all washroom facilities, parks and playgrounds are open and being maintained regularly."

Councillor Marcel Gauthier commented that he was pleased with the town staff's work maintaining the local parks, especially the Little Current library park.

Public works report

Ian Phillips presented the July public works report to council at last Thursday evening's meeting. He said that the construction on Limekiln corner was still in progress and that the lift of Harbour View Road was complete.

"Lacroix Construction is finishing up the force main," he continued. "And in terms of equipment, it is working well and maintenance and repairs are being done as required. The hazardous waste day was on Saturday, July 12 and everything went well, though numbers were down."

Councillor Gauthier said that he had received many positive comments regarding the work that Lacroix Construction did on the Robinson Street force main.

"Can we ask staff to send a letter to them, thanking them for a good job completed on time?" asked Councillor Paul Skippen.

Council agreed that that would be a good idea and directed staff to contact Lacroix.

Building controls report

Brock Sanftenberg delivered the building controls report for July to council.

"To date we have issued 31 building permits with an estimated construction value of \$1,057,410," said Mr. Sanftenberg. "Parking is being monitored and tickets issued on violation. Also, Low Island Park is being patrolled for dogs off leash. In property standards, we are gaining compliance with registered owners in respect to grass-cutting for unoccupied lots and vacant lots."

Mr. Sanftenberg concluded his report by presenting graphs on issued building permits over the past five years and the estimated construction value over the last five years.

Council approves Artisan Incubator and Technology Centre rental policy

Mr. Williamson presented an Artisan Incubator and Technology Centre rental policy that staff had prepared for council at the community services/public works committee meeting last week.

"This policy sets the rates and policy for the space rental," explained Mr. Williamson. "We designed it to help stimulate community activity within the arts sector. The policy is to provide this space to the not-for-profit arts sector. We want to create the opportunity for individuals in all sectors of the arts to display work, while growing the downtown core."

He noted that in order to help stimulate the art sector, the space will continue to be free of charge to local artists, artisans and arts related organizations, but that after this year the policy and rate structure will be reviewed by council.

As for commercial activity, users will be charged \$50/hour with a minimum of a two hour booking or \$200 a day, the rental policy notes.

The policy also outlines commission rates for arts and activity. "Artists, artisans and arts organizations who are utilizing the space for the sale of artwork will not be charged a rental fee to utilize this space, but a commission fee of 10 percent will be applied to the total sales per artists or organization."

During council's review of the policy, Councillor Michael Erskine suggested that a cap be added to the commission rates so that the fee doesn't exceed the commercial

rental fee.

The committee made a recommendation to council to approve the Artisan Incubator and Technology Centre rental policy.

Airport report

Councillor Marcel Gauthier reviewed the

Manitoulin East Airport report with the Northeast Town council. He noted that fuel sales were up this year and that the Young Eagles program earlier this month went well.

boyhood enthusiasm. "I fish and I garden," Jack explains, tending to 4,000 raspberry canes. Born during the Great Depression, he and his family moved to Manitoulin from Hamilton in 1947. He worked at resorts as a fishing guide, "when ice houses stored the catch, the ice was cut from the lakes and dragged to shore by teams of horses."

Jack fishes all the lakes, especially Lake Manitou, and makes his own jigs for the lake trout he loves to catch there. His favourite fish are rainbow trout and small-mouth bass—"they give a good fight"—and for those he'll go to Lake Wolsey, the North Channel, South Bay, and to Pike Lake for yellow pickerel "or walleyes, as the Americans call them." "Pickerel bite best after dark," he notes, "and one and a half to two pounds is ideal eating."

As a guide, Jack taught people how to tell what was on their line by "how the fish is biting. And you can't just haul off and jerk the line when you get a bite, you have to let it go so the fish can swallow the hook." For Jack, too, "it's very important to read the fishing regulations carefully for the zone you are in. Observe the length limits; you have to have a ruler with you." If you're lucky, Jack will share his tips on where to go, which lures to use and where to get bait. "The right bait is important because on the Island you get minnows in one place, worms in another, leeches somewhere else." Now you know.

Conservation is critical to these fishermen and it's reiterated by Ken "Duke" Madahbee of Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK) First Nation, a member of the Fish and Game Club in Little Current. The members sometimes go into schools to talk about protection of game. "Education is key," says Ken, "we have to conserve the stock of fish for the future."

Ken's wife, Ingrid, has run Duke's Fish and Chips just

off Highway 540 in AOK for 14 years, serving whitefish and hand-cut fries to the community and passers-by; she also takes pride in her homemade fresh-ground burgers and special baked beans. Ken used to supply the whitefish for the stand, fishing the North Channel just beyond the family home, but now works full-time for the band office. He still likes to fish with Ingrid for supper, catching bass or pike, or with his kids and grandkids, to teach them his strongly-held conservation principles. "You have to respect limits," he says, "the fish won't last forever. I tell my kids: just take what you need, don't go overboard."

Even if Sawbill Lake is off the map, there are plenty of other lakes on the Island, as well as the surrounding waters of Lake Huron, that come with near-legendary reputations for various species. Choose your preference, pick up your fishing licence and a copy of the current regulations from any of several licence issuers on the Island, and enjoy your fishin' expedition!

Manitoulin Island artists shine amongst the stars at 37th annual La Cloche Art Show

WHITEFISH FALLS— When the La Cloche Art Show first began, 37 years ago, every piece of submitted art went into the show. But that was then. Since those nascent days the show has grown each year and, with a rising reputation across Northern Ontario and beyond, the

number of submissions that have come into the little art show at the foot of the mountain that inspired Canada's fabled Group of Seven has long since outgrown the display space available on the walls of the Whitefish Falls Community Centre.

In fact, competition to enter the show grew so swiftly following its inception that the organizers had

to move to a juried format, leaving an artistic jury to make the difficult decisions as to whose work would be awarded the honour of being selected for the show—let alone secure a placing ribbon or honorable mention.

The art show committee selects a distinguished artist to headline the event each year and among that artist's duties is assisting on the selection jury. This year's distinguished artist is Martin Foley of Sudbury. Although Mr. Foley is a longtime contributor to the show, being awarded the prestigious title of Distinguished Artist held a few surprises.

"I wasn't quite sure what being the distinguished artist would be like," said Mr. Foley. "My first task was to jury the entries submitted. I did this with the assistance of Nancy Gareh and Rebecca Allen. Together with many interesting and lively debates, we were able to select 145 works for the exhibit. Hugh Kruzel and Garth Wunsch selected the photography portion of the show."

The gig came with a few fringe benefits as well. "The La Cloche volunteers provided us with a fantastic luncheon that day," he said.

"I was provided with enough space to hang thirteen of my own works as the distinguished artist," said Mr. Foley. "It was great meeting and discussing with visitors to the show the tremendous variety of works gracing the walls.

The submitted works are truly worth viewing. It is a very strong show again this year."

It wasn't all just talk and nibbling, however, Mr. Foley provided a workshop for the art community on "Volume Shading."

"This is a method of shading that does not require either natural or artificial light," explained Mr. Foley on the La Cloche Art Show website. "Its intent is to maximize contrast for various planes within a drawing." All that was required of the participants was several graphite pencils, HB or 2b, 6b or 8b, and a large sketchpad. "This method of shading can be applied to either indoor or outdoor, large or small images," he said.

Please be reminded that there is no open burning allowed in the Town of Little Current unless under the following conditions:

For the purposes of this paragraph, a permitted fire is a fire set for the bona fide purposes of cooking or warmth and set in a fully enclosed wood burning appliance bearing a CSA or ULC registration label or other device, including a "chiminea", as authorized in writing by the Fire Chief or designate.

No person shall set out a permitted fire unless all of the following conditions are met to the satisfaction of the Fire Chief or designate:

- the appliance is in good working order and is not located on a balcony, or on any combustible surface and is located at least three (3) metres from any structure;
- all openings in the device are completely covered by metal wire mesh with grid openings no larger than 12mm in width;
- the permitted fire is confined to the appliance and
- the material burned is limited to charcoal or clean, dry wood yielding little smoke.

Any person who contravenes any provision of this by-law is guilty of an offence under the Provincial Offences Act.

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Assiginack Public Library Feature

We know many of the facts, facets and fables of the sinking of the luxury-liner Titanic. How she sailed on her maiden voyage in April 1912 and met her fate at the hands of a roving Atlantic iceberg. There has been a myriad of books, films and documentaries about this enduring tragedy. Andrew Wilson's book 'Shadow of the Titanic: the Extraordinary Stories of those Who Survived' is a different take on a tale that continues to fascinate the world even after 100 years. This book gathers onto its pages the unique and varied memories of several of Titanic's pitifully few survivors. The stories range from the recall of Titanic's first class, rich and famous travellers to the remembrances of her little known second and third class voyagers. This book injects a relevant and improved depth to this intriguing seafaring legend.

What is an apron? According to the Canadian Oxford Dictionary it is: 'a garment worn to protect the front of a person's clothes from dirt or damage during tasks - fastened at the back.' Aprons have been around for centuries and they make great gifts for all occasions. If you enjoy sewing, the book 'A is for Apron: 25 Fresh and Flirty Designs' by Nathalie Mornu is the pick for you. I rarely remember seeing my great-grandmother without an apron on. She had several of them, varying in style, fabric and colour, but they all had a pocket, which became the home to stray buttons, bits of string, a band-aid, a peppermint, a small pair of scissors to trim threads or plants and a hand-

kerchief (in her later years, Kleenex). Generally her apron pocket would also contain a 'found' dime that would be given to a deserving child, perhaps for a Popsicle at the General Store. I so loved her—and those wonderful aprons!

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
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
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Providence Bay News and Notes



RAIN visits Manitoulin

RAIN (Rural Agri-Innovation Network) will be discussing funding opportunities in West-Sudbury and Manitoulin Island on Tuesday, July 29 from 7 to 9 pm at the Spring Bay Hall, 9298 Hwy. 552.

RAIN focusses on a pan-northern approach to helping agricultural producers build capacity within their business. Through research, relationship building and market development, the RAIN seeks to increase production and market demand for rural based crops and value added products. On Tuesday, July 29, we will be traveling to Manitoulin Island to share some of RAIN's funding opportunities. The RAIN and the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation have implemented an infrastructure development project that includes tile drainage and on/off farm storage facilities. This project has begun in Algoma/Sault Ste. Marie and is progressing forward for Manitoulin Island, meaning we are looking for growers who are interested in tiling their land.

The second program we will be talking about is the Sustainable New Agricultural Products (SNAP) Program. This program is a pilot for Northern Ontario agriculture and food producers, businesses and collaborations, which will provide up to \$5,000 (per collaborator, to a maximum of \$15,000) at 80 percent cost-share toward the purchase of processing equipment that would result in the creation of a food or agriculture product new to the business. The SNAP program is administrated by the Rural Agri-Innovation Network in collaboration with Clover Valley Farmers' Market, Eat Local Sudbury Co-operative and the Northeast Community Network. DEADLINE FOR THIS PROGRAM IS SEPTEMBER 1, 2014. More information at rainalgoma.ca/SNAP. We encourage growers interested in tile drainage or value-added processing to attend the information session on Tuesday July 29 or contact Katie Filion (below) to discuss these funding options.



Every spring, as soon as I can, I plant shallots in my garden to use in recipes that call for green onions. Later on in the season they slowly turn to shallots where I use them sliced raw in bruschetta or halved and roasted with vegetables. Easy to grow and use.

Lemony Scallion Pilaf

Scallion or green onions (I use shallots) in this dish is perfect with grilled fish or chicken. It is simple to make with a bold flavour and looks pretty.

3 Tbsp butter or olive oil
20 to 24 green onions thinly sliced, whites kept separate from greens
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
1/4 cup dry white wine
1 cup basmati rice
1 3/4 cups vegetable or chicken broth
1 tsp finely grated lemon zest
2 tsp fresh lemon juice

Melt the butter in a saucepan over medium heat. Add the scallion whites, 1/4 tsp salt, and a few grinds of pepper and cook, stirring often, until tender but not browned, about 5 minutes.

Add the wine and bring to a boil for a minute. Add the rice, broth, lemon zest and 1 tsp salt; bring to a boil. Cover and turn the heat down to low. Cook until the rice is tender and the liquid is absorbed, about 15

minutes.

Remove from the heat and let sit, covered, for 5 minutes. Fluff the scallion greens and lemon juice into the rice with a fork and serve.

Pickled Coleslaw

This is a great salad to take to a picnic or have with a backyard barbecue. I always like coleslaw in a vinegar base than a mayonnaise-based, much healthier. I made one with chunks of pineapple and one without. Both were good.

1 small green cabbage cored and thinly sliced to equal about 9 cups
1 medium carrot, grated (1/2 cup)
2 Tbsp kosher salt
1/4 cup white vinegar
3/4 cup canned or fresh pineapple juice
1 cup small-diced fresh pineapple

In a large bowl, toss the cabbage and carrot with the salt. Let sit at room temperature until wilted, 5 to 10 minutes.

Using your hands, wring out as much moisture from the mixture as you can, and transfer to a large, dry bowl.

Add the vinegar and juice and toss well. This slaw may be served immediately, or placed in a nonreactive container and refrigerated for up to 10 days.

Add the pineapple just before serving.
