estrogen introduced into a lake has led to the near-extinction of the fathead minnow, interfering in the minnow's ability to reproduce.

The article, 'Direct and Indirect Responses of a Freshwater Food Web to a Potent Synthetic Oestrogen,' discussed their findings of endocrine disrupting chemicals in municipal effluents (sewage, waste water, etc).

The experiments were conducted at the Experimental Lakes Area in northwestern Ontario and involved a long term, whole lake experiment using a before and after control impact design to determine the direct and indirect effects of the synthetic estrogen used in birth control pills.

The findings, which provided a clear link between very small amounts of estrogen and the disturbance of reproduction among

## Leila Thureson named Central Manitoulin Citizen of the Year

**MINDEMOYA**—Central Manitoulin Mayor Gerry Strong and Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) CEO Derek Graham caused some looks of surprise when they entered the board room of the Mindemoya hospital on October 15 and interrupted a meeting of auxiliary members. Mayor Strong was there to present a Citizen of the Year plaque to Leila Thureson of Mindemoya, a dedicated volunteer.

Ms. Thureson was born on the Island and spent her first five years in Green Bay before moving to Mindemoya. She started teaching in 1956 when she was just short of the age of 18 in a rural schoolhouse that housed all eight grades, which was perhaps a little unsettling as some of the students would be close to her age.

Ms. Thureson taught for five years and then supply taught as she followed her military husband Peter to such places as Germany and New Brunswick as well as Ontario. She had received her degree from the teachers college in Toronto and has also taught in Sudbury.

The Thuresons moved back to Mindemoya in 1987 and, as she said, "saw big changes here in the village." She also went on to work

She has worked with the Mindemoya hospital auxiliary for nine years and has held the positions of vice president and president in that role and does odd jobs such as fundraising and typing up the bulletin in her position as a general treasurer for the United Church Women (UCW), who meet once a month.

## Time is running out for mail-in ballot voting

**MANITOULIN**—For those voters from Island municipalities that have utilized the mail-in ballot system but where voters have not yet mailed their ballots, Canada Post recommends they be sent by mail by no later than tomorrow, Thursday, October 23.

According to John Caines, a Canada Post media spokesperson, all Ontario mail-in ballots were sorted locally beginning Monday of this week, meaning the trip to Toronto for sorting has been bypassed for the municipal election.

"There will be no issues," Mr. Caines assured.

He asked voters who use the mail-in ballot to make sure that the secrecy envelope, which has the name of the return municipality printed on its front, is placed clearly in the yellow return envelope window.

For those voters whose municipality does not use mail-in ballots or who wish to do things the old fashioned way, by placing an 'x' in person, polls are open from 10 am until 8 pm next Monday, October 27. Contact your local municipal office for a list of polling stations.

To vote in an Ontario election, you must be a resident of the province aged 18 or older. Those residents who have not received notification that they are on the voters list should contact their municipal clerks and can do so until 8 pm on Monday, October 27, Election Day.

For those casting paper ballots, a piece of identification showing your name and address, such as an electricity bill, must be brought to the polling station. Photo identification is not required.

A reminder for those municipalities whose councils were acclaimed and for the unorganized townships of Dawson and Robinson, the vote for Rainbow District School Board trustee is still on the ballot with Islanders having the choice between incumbent Larry Killens of South Baymouth and Maureen Egan of Sudbury and Little Current.

This newspaper encourages all Island residents over the 18 to exercise their democratic rights and vote this Monday, October 27.

## Be wise and immunize! Where to get your flu shot across Manitoulin

**MANITOULIN**—The fall season means leaf jumping and pumpkin carving, but unfortunately it can also mean the flu for you and your loved ones.

According to Immunize Canada, the flu is responsible for about 12,200 hospitalizations and 3,500 deaths per year and can affect everyone, including those who are healthy.

The flu vaccine has benefited millions of Canadians since 1946, with a new flu vaccine available each year to protect citizens against the ever-changing flu viruses.

"Influenza, or the flu, is a respiratory infection caused by influenza A or B viruses," states a release from Influenza Canada. "In Canada it generally occurs each year in the late fall and winter months. Symptoms typically include the sudden onset of headache, chills, cough, fever, loss of appetite, fatigue, sneezing, watery eyes and throat irritation. Nausea, vomiting and diarrhea may also occur, especially in children."

The best way to protect yourself from the flu and those around you is to get a flu vaccine every year. Any Ontario resident six months and older is eligible for the free vaccination in Ontario.

Other things you can do to prevent the spread of the flu is cleaning your hands frequently and thoroughly, coughing and sneezing into the bend of your arm and cleaning and disinfecting surfaces and things that you often touch.

Flu clinics have already started on Manitoulin Island, but there are still many opportunities to get vaccinated across the Island, just be sure to bring your Ontario Health Card.

In Little Current, there are flu shot clinics at the North East Manitoulin Family Health Team (next to the hospital) for rostered patients on Friday, October 24 from 9 to 11 am and 1 to 3 pm and on Monday, November 10 from 4:30 to 6:30 pm.

Shots are also available at the Little Current Guardian Pharmacy during regular business hours. Call 705-368-2530 for more information.

Mindemoya residents have four options, at the Manitoulin Central Family Health Team (MCFHT) in the basement of the Mindemoya Hospital, at the Mindemoya Medical Pharmacy, at a clinic at Central Manitoulin Public School (CMPS) on Monday November 3 from 3:30 to 6:30 pm and at the Sudbury District Health Unit Mindemoya Office by appointment.

MCFHT clinics for patients are on Wednesday, October 22 from 9:30 to 11:30 am for patients ages 65 and over for high risk patients, Thursday, October 23 from 1 to 7 pm for all patients and Thursday, October 30 from 1 to 7 pm.

Flu shots are available during the regular hours of operation at Mindemoya Medical Pharmacy (the Guardian). Individuals are asked to call ahead to ensure the pharmacists who can administer the shots are available (705-377-5411).

The Aundeck Omni Kaning Naandwehgigamik Health Centre is having its next flu shot clinic this Friday, October 24 from 9 am until 12 pm and is open to anyone.

The M'Chigeeng Health Centre is offering flu shots from 8 am to 4 pm on October 22, 23, 27, 28 and 29.

In the West End, the Gore Bay Medical Centre is hosting flu shot clinics on Friday, October 24 and Friday, October 31 from 9 am to noon and 1:15 to 3 pm.

Residents can also get their flu shots from the Sudbury and District Health Unit at C.C. McLean Public School on Monday, November 10 from 3 to 6 pm.

The Zhibbaahsing Health Centre is offering a clinic on Thursday, October 30 from 10 am to 2 pm, while the Sheshegwaning Health Centre has a walk-in clinic on Tuesday, November 4 from 12 to 5 pm.

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

### SARS gave Ontario a leg up on epidemic preparedness

While the spectre of the Ebola virus spreading worldwide is a frightening one, in Canada and particularly in Ontario, we have the advantage of having had to deal with the airborne SARS (severe acute respiratory syndrome) threat just over a decade ago.

Toronto, through no fault of its own, became the epicenter among developed nations in what was threatening to become a worldwide epidemic from its origins in China.

SARS became a Toronto phenomenon, brought back to Ontario's capital by a person who had been visiting Hong Kong and had stayed in the same hotel as a physician who had treated patients in Mainland China for the as then unidentified illness. Then, without warning, there were sadly many early casualties, mostly among health professionals. People died from the illness, contracting it in its early days. Most of them were from Toronto.

But health officials in this province responded quickly. Protocols were rapidly worked out and put in place as were mandatory requirements that were initiated among health professionals and ordinary citizens visiting health care facilities.

In Toronto particularly, the sale of face masks that covered people's mouths and noses increased enormously and in that city during the spring and summer of 2003, a pedestrian walking in any part of the city would encounter citizens who had chosen to don the (usually) blue masks as prophylactic measures for their own benefit or, if they happened to have a cough or cold, because it quickly became the politically correct thing to do.

Screening processes were quickly put in place to isolate anyone entering the country who might be bringing new cases of the disease with them and, perhaps as importantly as anything, in Ontario, the chief medical officer of health made every effort to keep citizens abreast of what was happening on the SARS scene by way of reassurance.

We're fortunate in that the relatively short time span since SARS was a public health concern means that our health institutions are prepared with people at every level who dealt rapidly and effectively with the SARS threat 11 years ago.

While Ebola is quite a different disease, the SARS experience means that we are not starting from scratch; far from it.

In our own region, Health Sciences North in Sudbury has been designated one of 10 hospitals in the province, and the only institution in Northern Ontario, that will deal with any suspected cases of Ebola in the region.

There will be strictly monitored and enforced isolation protocols put in place at Health Sciences North and local hospitals and medical teams such as ours on Manitoulin have very specific directions about dealing with individuals with suspicious symptoms in the very rare event they are required to do so.

When we first heard about SARS, we were often told in the same sentence that this could (or even would) be the next worldwide "pandemic" with comparisons made to the influenza epidemic of 1918 that claimed far more lives worldwide than had the carnage of the First World War that, in fact, somewhat overlapped with the early days of what was truly a pandemic.

We haven't heard the treat of Ebola couched in these terms, possibly because the national and international press has thought better of their role in frightening the general population with this kind of hyperbole.

More likely, though, we haven't been told that the relatively small number of cases of the disease that have surfaced outside of the West African countries where the disease has taken hold represent a pandemic because of how effectively Canada and other western countries dealt with the treat of SARS.

The response, particularly in Ontario, to that last public health threat was effective and provides an enormously useful framework in dealing with current and future health issues that are bound to come to our shores from time to time simply because of the nature of modern international travel.

And don't forget to wash your hands, thoroughly and often, as a basic rule against any form of contact-based contagion. It's the easiest and simplest thing we can do to protect ourselves and our families against disease.

### Taxpayers' Association weighs in on tax distribution

*Asks if there is a plan in place to use refunds to lower 2014 tax hit*

#### To the Expositor:

The NEMI Taxpayers' executive wishes to clarify and provide a more complete summation of information to residents of the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands (NEMI) regarding data that has been circulating from our local election candidates. Although we respect every individual and recognize their good intentions, we believe it is equally important to release information that is complete, reflecting the realities of our entire municipality.

1. With respect to taxes being charged to the four wards in our municipality (based on a

\$100,000 MPAC assessment), in actuality, Ward 1 pays \$779.08, which represents a difference of \$408.39 less than Wards 3 and 4 and a difference of \$539.29 less than Ward 2 (Little Current). These are important figures for all taxpayers when considering the overall taxation equity and distribution among wards in NEMI.

2. With respect to the average tax rate in NEMI - in actuality, our municipality received a refund from the Ontario Provincial Police in 2014 in the amount of \$21,071 and a District Services Board refund in 2014, in the amount of \$69,631. With these refunds being credited back to the municipality, totalling over \$90,000

(this is equal to a change of 2.3 percent on the overall tax levy), is there a proactive plan in place to help avert the average tax increase of 4.92 percent that our municipality is slated for?

The NEMI Taxpayers Association extends to all candidates the best of luck in the upcoming municipal election. We would also remind all eligible residents to exercise their democratic privilege by voting on October 27!

### An open letter to council and planning board members

*Do not allow development of Ireson Island*

#### To the Expositor:

I have just sent this letter to the four NEMI (Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands) council and Planning Board members and wanted you to also understand my concerns regarding the above issue.

My brothers—one from Chicago, one from St. Louis and one from Cleveland—are co-owners of R Island, a small island with main house, bunkhouse, outbuildings, etc., located on the north side of the main channel, just across the from the Island Lodge's property. We have owned this cottage since 1969 and have spent many wonderful vacations there. The Island Lodge used to be a treasured part of our experience, especially when we would go over for an evening meal and play pool as a special outing!

We love the area, and as avid fisherman, have been concerned at the decline in the quality of fishing over the past 15 years. We believe that the significant amount of new development on the mainland, especially in Red Deer Village, has taken a toll on both the water quality and the amount of fish removed (we observe catch and release).

Recently we have become aware of potential development of the Island Lodge property into 16 parcels. We believe that, if allowed to occur, there would be far more significant deterioration in both water quality and quality of life that we have come to truly appreciate. The fact that the island is only reachable by water transportation, means many more boats would be on the water, many more slips would be needed on

the river (which are already in very short supply) and many more people would be fishing in areas already experiencing far more pressure than ever before. It also means, versus the new homes on the shoreline, that most of these parcels likely would be developed into rental properties, with far greater use (and misuse) than cottages on the shoreline and the various islands. Most important, the number of homes in this one location would have a major effect on water quality through the use of many more septic systems (in addition to numerous systems already constructed on the shoreline back to the Whitefish River).

My reason for taking the time to write is to state that we are vehemently opposed to any development of this property beyond its originally intended use. Quite frankly, when that property was purchased, it was closed in a very abrupt manner and not used at all. This would appear to be the originally contrived plan—to delay a non-controversial period of time, then request development of the island as an alternative to operating as a small resort, as constructed and intended. We hope that you will give this matter the serious attention it deserves and determine that the proposed plan is unacceptable and be rejected, and that the only permitted use is as originally designed.

### Lake trout in Manitou are already under stress

*Let's give them a chance to recuperate*

#### To the Expositor:

On Manitoulin there is a ban on fishing for lake trout from October 1 to December 31, a ban that is important to respect. At this time of year the lake trout come from their deepwater habitat to shallow water to spawn, and they become more vulnerable. They must survive at least five to 10 years before maturing into adults and they need every chance we can give them at spawning time.

On Manitoulin lake trout can only thrive in Lake Manitou, none of the other lakes are deep enough and cold enough at their depths. It's a provincially significant lake, one of only two lake trout lakes in Ontario with limestone to buffer against acid rain. We should be proud to have it

and the lake trout it supports. But due to excessive sewage loads in Lake Manitou, by the end of the summer these fish are already suffering from oxygen depletion in their deepwater habitat. The fall turnover, when surface water cools and sinks to the bottom, allows them to come up from the deep water and spawn. The lake trout population is already under stress, so it's especially important to give the adults a chance to spawn and not catch them for the dinner table.

# Plenty of local interest in Northeast Town elections at candidates meeting

LITTLE CURRENT—For the first time in its Little Current history, Royal Canadian Legion Branch #177 played host to an all candidates' night for the candidates running for election in the Northeast Town and to fill the position of Manitoulin trustee for the Rainbow District School Board. While the showing of candidates for the position of councillor was low (none for Ward 3, one for Ward 4, two for Ward 1 and four for Ward 2), a fact that was noted by members of the audience, participation from the crowd was solid with many taking the time to pose questions from the floor.

In attendance, running in Ward 1, were incumbent Christina Jones and challenger Laurie Cook; Ward 2, incumbent Michael Erskine, challenger Tom Spry, incumbent Melissa Peters and challenger Debby Turner; and from Ward 4, only challenger Dan Leblanc. Neither of the candidates for Ward 3 took part in the all candidates' night.

The first question of the evening was posed by one of the candidates themselves, Maureen Egan, who is running for the position of Rainbow District School Board trustee. As a Ward 3 taxpayer, Ms. Egan noted Little Current's downtown core and questioned the candidates on what they had planned for retaining and attracting businesses to the main street.

Michael Erskine noted that he represents council on the Business Improvement Area and has brought "plenty of ideas" forward to that table, but what the community needs to do, "most assuredly," is shop local. "And I think we all have a role to play in that," he said. "We can't just depend on tourism and we do really need to encourage the community to shop local."

A seasonal resident of the municipality asked the candidates how much of the recycling collected at the landfill actually gets recycled "or does it just end up on the hill that's getting bigger all the time?"

"Quite a lot of it gets recycled," said Mr. Erskine. "And it just keeps getting better and better. The life of the landfill has been increased, and we're now making money from recycled electronics." Mr. Erskine agreed that there is always more that can be done.

Marnie Bond of Little Current questioned the contenders, and specifically Melissa Peters, about the new subdivision located along the Boozeneck Road. She wondered why the lots have not been selling and said the subdivision is costing taxpayers money. She wondered if the lots could be lowered in price to help them sell.

Ms. Peters said the subdivision has been in existence since before her first term on council and said council was working diligently to do more to move the lots.

Tom Spry said he would like to see the municipality spend some money on the subdivision for landscaping purposes to make the area more appealing for the buyer.

"Would you want to live there?" he asked the audience to a chorus of "no" in response.

"There are some buildings going up," Mr. Erskine responded, adding that sales tend to start slow. "If you have an offer, bring it to the town. Price is always negotiable, but

it's a balancing act between how low do you go. None of us are happy with how slowly things are moving and have discussed it at length at the council table."

Gary White, who lives on Morphet's Sideroad, asked the candidates, and specifically Ward 4 candidate Dan Leblanc, why there has been no chip and tar on Morphet's Sideroad, especially on the road's hill and with no upgrading (other than gravel) in the last 20 years.

Mr. White encouraged Mr. Leblanc to take a drive along the road and questioned why none of the other Ward 4 candidates came to the meeting. "How accountable is that?" he asked.

Mr. Erskine noted that there is a strategic plan for roads that should see 10 kilometres of new chip and tar each year.

White's Point resident Bill Caesar asked Ms. Egan if she had a good handle, as a Sudbury resident (Ms. Egan also owns property in Little Current), on Manitoulin's schools and how they are running.

Ms. Egan said she did and that they are "beautiful, absolutely gorgeous," saying she knows the administrators, having worked for the Rainbow Board for a number of years, and is excited, if elected, to work with the principals, vice principals, teachers and non-teaching staff.

Jim McMillan of Little Current posed a question to Mr. Erskine, who noted the systematic implementation of sidewalks in Little Current as a campaign platform at the start of the evening.

"When you do the sidewalks," Mr. McMillan asked, "will they be the same standard as Blake Street (where a new sidewalk was added two years ago) or will you raise the standard?"

Mr. Erskine noted the sidewalks in front of his home

located at the intersection of Campbell and Hayward Streets and said he expected all sidewalks to be built to the same standard.

Gary Green of Little Current was next to the microphone. He spoke of the petition to council he raised regarding commercial traffic on Wilson Street—a residential area. Council's response, he said, was to place two signs, one on each highway, warning against heavy trucks.

"We're just waiting for something to happen," Mr. Green said. "I think it's time for council to move. They spent a lot of money fixing the corner of Meredith Street (Highway 6 at the Hilltop Shell corner) and yet heavy trucks continue to use Wilson Street."

"I totally agree with you, Gary," Ms. Turner said, noting that, during a recent trip to Sudbury, she encountered a traffic-calming zone with temporary speed bumps. Such a solution in Little Current would likely stop trucks from using Wilson Street, she said.

"We've had many long conversations about that very issue," Mr. Erskine said. "A lot of people talk about how eager politicians are to spend other people's money, but you'll never find a tighter bunch of individuals than those around the council table."

"If you get enough push, however, they're (council) more likely to act," he added. "So keep pushing."

Mr. Leblanc said he agreed with the "speed bump theory," noting that he drives a fifth wheel trailer and that speeds bumps would definitely deter traffic.

Mr. Spry questioned why, if the municipality is paying so much for police services, are they not enforcing a bylaw for heavy traffic on Wilson Street.

Mr. Green explained that there isn't a bylaw as council was concerned that the traffic would simply be moved one street over—to a school street. Mr. Erskine explained that the police do not enforce bylaws.

Gerry Michaels, another Wilson Street resident, said that he agreed with Mr. Green. "In terms of speed bumps, Wilson Street will soon take care of that itself," he joked. Getting to his question, he said, "I think there should be a truck route, defined, a connecting link that would run from Harbour View Road to Highway 540 (past the public works garage). In the next five years, how would you position planning a connecting link so there are no trucks driving through residential streets?"

"It's something that Gary (Green) has brought up, and he's brought it up to council, but there's always a cost involved," Mr. Erskine said. "You're quite right in that it needs to be done," he added, encouraging residents to put pressure on council in order for them to move on an issue. "There's one councillor that will be behind it."

"And I'm behind it too," Ms. Turner added.

Stu Harris of White's Point said that the Northeast Town has four wards and, according to the Taxpayers' Association, the mill rate in each ward is different with Ward 1 being the lowest. "Why?" he questioned.

Christine Jones said the mill rate has to do with the services rendered to each ward. "You pay for what you get," she

## A packed hall but not many questions at Tehkummah candidates' night

TEHKUMMAH—Interested residents packed the Tehkummah Community Hall on October 8 for an all candidates' night. Moderator Paul Methner started off with the ground rules: each candidate would have a total of 10 minutes for any prepared speech and to answer questions from the audience. Mr. Methner noted that while everyone has concerns, not everyone will agree. "Keep it respectful," he said. "At the end of the day, we still have to live together."

Not all candidates were asked the same questions, so comparisons on specific issues were not always straightforward. Up first were the candidates running for reeve, incumbent Gary Brown and current deputy reeve Eric Russell, with the harbour, infrastructure and youth as the main issues.

**Q: Over the years the marina has deteriorated from a first class facility to less than acceptable. What are you prepared to do to return the harbour to its previous state, keeping in mind that this is one of the few revenue producing facilities in the area?**

Eric Russell: I'd like to see the marina brought up to standards and leased out. Even if we got a dollar a year it'd be better than losing \$25,000 or whatever every year. We don't want the marina to close because that's the main thing going on in South Baymouth, the marina. I think council could get more involved with it and maybe help the merchants in some way. The merchants want more things happening so more people will come on the ferry. We had some meetings last spring but nothing really came of that. I'd like to see the marina run like a business. I find that we just throw money at it and nothing comes out of it. I've never seen a budget for the marina. If there's work to be done, we just do it. We never really fix it right. I'd like to see it fixed right and then we could lease it out

and let somebody run it like a business, when there's somebody there 30 or 40 hours a week. It just doesn't operate like that.

Gary Brown: I was there when we created the harbour. I know how much is involved in putting it back together again. I was quite proud at the time when we built the harbour. It was budgeted for \$2.4 million and we did it for under \$900,000. To put it back in shape again, our council is looking, or we are hoping to look, at finding an engineer to put the documents together to find funding for us and to rebuild the docks and the boardwalks to a standard that they were 20 years ago.

**Q: There were no specific questions about infrastructure, but both candidates referred to this issue.**

Eric Russell: Now that the bridge has been just about built, we should have some thoughts about more road work and our equipment. Our roads and fire equipment is old. We have a new fire hall but the new truck we just got is 27 years-old. Our snowplow is 25 years-old. I don't think this is acceptable. Who depends on a vehicle that is 25 years-old? I don't know, not too many.

Gary Brown: There never seems to be

enough money. We have been faced with many challenges and we have had many successes. I feel it is best to try than not to have tried at all. I also feel it's best to be proactive and look after problems before they become disasters. I'm very proud of Tehkummah Township. We're a very small municipality with unique responsibilities. Our Asset Management Plan will need to be updated which includes roads, properties, equipment and buildings of our township. These plus the day-to-day concerns of our taxpayers are my primary consideration.

**Q: You mentioned children of the township as one of your main concerns. What have you done in your current four years as deputy reeve for the children?**

Eric Russell: The kids in Tehkummah seem to be ignored. We don't have a recreation committee. We don't spend any money on the ball field. We wanted to get some basketball posts up but it didn't happen. I think we should maybe hire somebody in the summertime and have games, ball games for the kids, and swimming lessons. Our rec money now is spent on cutting grass, which doesn't make sense to me. I've

tried to do things. Paul (Bowerman) and I tried for two years to have a rink and it didn't work. I asked to buy new equipment for the playground but there's no money for that. You've got to get a grant. I'm only one vote, you know that. We have to do more for the kids of Tehkummah. That's my main concern.

**Q: What kind of support or initiatives would your council take that would help young entrepreneurs in this township and create a real future for the youth of Tehkummah? As an example, the pellets (for pellet stoves) that are sold at Home Hardware are manufactured in Hearst. We have a fantastic potential for forestry on this Island and a lot of people use pellet stoves. So why can't we do it right here? We could be generating sustainable, reasonably well paying jobs in the process.**

Gary Brown: I like your idea because I have three young people that had to move away from our township to find work. It's always been a challenge for a business or for people wanting to set up a business on Manitoulin. Through the economic studies that I've been looking at, there's really only a six-month business season here. That's pretty much what we have unless the person wants to get into farming or some other software programming or other creative job that can be worked from anywhere in Ontario. There's a lot of possibilities for young people, but they need backers. As a municipality what we can do is create the environment for them to work in. As far as going out and funding them, that's not what we're about. But there are different federal agencies and provincial agencies that do fund those projects and the township can probably help in acquiring that help for them to develop whatever they might want to create.

## **Arson case adjourned for a week until October 27, suspect to remain in custody**

GORE BAY—This past Monday, October 20, the man charged with seven counts of arson in five suspicious fires in Little Current over the summer appeared in the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay.

The last court appearance of Clinton Gordon Haggart of Little Current, aged 30, had been set over from September 29 to October 20 to set a date for a two- to three-day trial.

Mr. Haggart was arrested, charged and detained in connection with a series of suspicious fires in Little Current homes and businesses within a three-

month period this summer, and appeared in court in Gore Bay for the first time on August 14 via video conference from the detention centre where he is being held.

GORE BAY—The Ontario Court of Justice opened its session on Monday morning, October 20, with Her Worship Judge L.A. Toulouse presiding over the courtroom in Gore Bay.

Among the cases listed on the day's docket was that of Kimel Corbiere, aged 26 of Mindemoya, who is charged with murder in the death of Johnny Panamick of M'Chigeeng, aged 70.

Mr. Panamick was found in his home on Back Street on the evening of Sunday, May 11, 2014 by a neighbour, having suffered extensive bodily injuries. Mr. Panamick was taken to hospital then transferred to Health Sciences North in Sudbury where he died on June 13.

Kimel Corbiere, who is represented by barrister and solicitor James Weppler, again appeared in person in court this week. A short man of medium build with close-cropped dark hair and dark eyes and whose expression was impassive but alert, Mr. Corbiere was escorted by a police officer into the prisoner box wearing a light-coloured open-collar shirt and dark pants.

Mr. Weppler then requested another adjournment as the defense counsel awaits complete disclosure of evidence from the Crown before responding to the charges. Judge Toulouse granted the adjournment until Monday, November 10 to be held in the same courtroom of the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay.

On July 17, 2014, the United Chiefs and Council of Manitoulin (UCCM) Anishnaabe Police and the OPP North East Region Crime Unit, under the direction of Detective Inspector Tracy Dobbin of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB), arrested Mr. Corbiere and charged him with the first degree murder of Mr. Panamick.

Mr. Corbiere, who has remained in custody since his arrest, made his first appearance at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on Friday, July 18. At his previous appearance in the court on September 29, the case was put over to October 20.

In his appearance last Monday, the latest in a series of court dates in the case, Mr. Haggart, who is of medium height and thin, occasionally glanced restlessly about the courtroom as he stood in the prisoner box in an orange prison jumpsuit; he remains in custody in district jail in Sudbury.

lors raised concerns about internal audits, transparency, alternate voting methods, the harbour, and the young people in the township. Not all questions were asked of all candidates.

**Q: Will you call for an internal audit to see where we are if you are elected?**

Don McMurray: I certainly would. I think that is something that is well needed here. We need to get started off on the right track.

**Mike McKenzie:** Absolutely. The sooner the better. Even if I'm not elected, an audit still needs to happen.

Lorie Leeson: We have audits now. Everybody has always been told to go to the office and ask for what they want to know. If you don't get the answer you want, then ask again. If it's out there, it's at the office. It's not a secret.

Ron Hierons: There's nothing wrong with an audit. You have to know where you're going, where your costs are and where your dollars are being spent. We need to curb overspending and over-budget projects. It's too late after the fact. We need councillors who can think for themselves, be prepared, and make wise decisions.

**Q: Do you believe in more transparency?**

Don McMurray: Yes, I do. I would like to have at least two public meetings a year so council would have some idea whether they were going in the right direction or not. We need to know what the public is facing, what you want. We're here to represent you, not to represent us. We have to change the way council meetings are conducted.

Mike McKenzie: I believe in transparency. There's too much done in camera and the public never gets to know. I get the council minutes every month and look through them. There's never any mention of motions passed in camera, which is public information but the public doesn't get to know. It's as if they're sneaking something behind the backs of taxpayers, in my opinion. You people pay the taxes in this township. We're here to represent you, to do what's best for the majority of you. What the majority wants, not what I want.

Lydia McKenna: I think more people should attend council meetings. It'd be a good idea if those people who have a true interest in the running of the township would come to council meetings. I know they don't always go as planned but it would give you an insight into how difficult it sometimes is.

Lorie Leeson: We have differences of opinion. Council can't promise the world. It's about moving forward and being open and honest. Some things are out of our control. We have to deal with them and move on. There's not always the dollars to do things. Staff works very hard at finding funds to carry on.

Laird Lee: I'm very transparent. I believe in working through issues together. Part of that is

people coming out.

Ron Hierons: We need a more transparent council to work in the best interests of the township. I don't totally agree with in-camera sessions. Not only that, they seem to happen in the middle of a meeting when they should be at the end. I believe in transparency. Nothing should be hidden.

**Paul Bowerman:** I believe taxpayers vote in good faith, expecting all councillors to conduct all municipal business in an open manner. Your new December 31, 2014 accounting package may eliminate some negative municipal accountability and transparency concerns. Whether it's good or bad, bring it out in the open. That way either you'll find out you made a mistake or you'll find out that you did the right thing.

**Q: Have you ever considered voting by mail or electronic voting?**

Don McMurray: I am not happy with proxy votes. I feel people should vote either in person or by mail. No other way.

Mike McKenzie: I am definitely in favour of mail in votes. People need to have their own say. Not based on someone else's proxy. There's people that will gather up proxy votes for all seasonal residents who expect them to vote their way and it doesn't happen. Not everybody's honest. But mail in can be sent out with the tax bill and then the person has the option.

Lorie Leeson: I agree with mail in voting. I look forward to electronic voting. It's the way of the future it seems. One way we are going in that direction, we're getting some new equipment. That should help with mail in and proxy voting.

Laird Lee: Electronic voting, absolutely. That's my thing. We're trying to move into a greener tomorrow. There are barriers. What are we doing in the community to overcome these? There are people in the community who know computers. There are other things we can look at.

**Q: What are your plans for helping the children and young people of Tehkummah Township?**

Don McMurray: I feel that we have to create activities for the young people of the township. An ice rink, Eric (Russell) and Paul (Bowerman) and I already tried this last year. We got the ice just about ready and then the fire truck pumper was taken away. For what reason, we never did get an answer. I think we also have to encourage the young people to come up with new ideas for employment on the Island. Because I can tell you, there's a lot of jobs

that are going off the Island, and a lot of our young people. We need them here.

Mike McKenzie: As I look around the room I see one thing. Most people here are older than I am. That brings me to the one thing that concerns me the most, and that's a lot of young people have to move away for jobs. There are no jobs in this township, very few. We need year round employment. I don't have all the answers. I'm just an ordinary person that believes we need to start doing something to try and help the young people.

Lydia McKenna: I'm in favour of better use of the public beach. I saw in another township how they were cleaning up the public beach of weeds, etc. If one township can do it, then why can't we? We need some kind of recreational facility for kids in the township. Parents could ask their children what they would like and then pass it along to council in the form of a suggestion.

Lorie Leeson: I'd like to see the beach cleaned up. The community park: I've put my heart and soul into that place. It needs some work but it's a great spot. I really would like to see a recreation committee again. I'm all for it. There are lots of volunteers out there who have held back, who don't want to go to a lot of meetings, but they don't have to go to all of the meetings. There are other ways they can help. I think it's a great idea to form another committee. Whether I am re-elected or not, I want to be a part of this community. I would like to see a basketball court too. We should be able to have funding for that.

**Q: What would you do to improve the harbour?**

Lydia McKenna: I would like to see a more effective running of the marina. There must be some ideas out there that can help us run the marina at a profit and not at a continuous loss.

Lorie Leeson: The harbour is a pet project of mine. I certainly want it to prosper. Running it as a business is the way. I don't mind going down there and hammering nails. Some of you may have seen me down there this year. I just don't want to see anything fail.

Laird Lee: It is a concern of mine. To see it fall apart is really disheartening. That in itself has to be looked at. It is being looked at. Council will have to respond and come up with an idea. Maybe lease it out. That could create jobs and bring in extra revenue dollars.

Paul Bowerman: As far as our marina, we had meetings on May 13 and 14 with goals, but without a marina committee and no

finance committee meetings and nothing has happened. I was upset about that myself. I truly believe we need people who are interested to take the bull by the horns. For example, this building here (Community Hall). There's a group in South Baymouth that could do something like that. We've got so much knowledge in our township and we're not using it. We're not asking if those people are interested. I think we've got it and we just need to use it.

Tehkummah resident Larry Killens, the incumbent school trustee running for re-election, couldn't miss attending the all candidates' meeting on home turf. He was asked about his track record and his perspective on arts in the schools and whether he feels it is important in their development. "I'm already working on it," he responded, citing as examples the outstanding music program at Assiginack Public School and the Little Current Public School arts program. Mr. Killens also spoke about "speaking up for Manitoulin" in Sudbury and detailed how he successfully lobbied for additional transportation for high school students participating in sports activities and extra classes. He expressed concerns with the lack of communication to parents about the school board's new homework program.

In closing, Mr. Methner reminded the audience to make sure they vote on October 27. An advance poll was held at the municipal office on October 11.

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

fish, have pointed to a critical need to revamp municipal sewage treatment plants to deal with the chemicals.

"Our results demonstrate that small-scale studies focussing solely on direct effects are likely to underestimate the true environmental impacts of estrogens in municipal wastewaters and provide further evidence of the value of whole-ecosystem experiments for understanding indirect effects of EDCs and other aquatic stressors," reads the conclusion of the study's abstract.

Dr. Michael Paterson works with the Experimental Lakes Area facility and was a co-author of the report and he spoke to The Expositor on Monday following the release of the study's findings. Dr. Karen Kidd of the University of New Brunswick was the lead researcher on the project that has been ongoing since the late 1990s.

It was in the late 1990s that a study in the United Kingdom had discovered that male trout were developing female characteristics due to estrogen being introduced into their environment.

The first moment that the researchers introduced the chemicals into the water in 2001, the fish began to

respond to the exposure, noted Dr. Kidd. "Right away, the male fish started to respond to the estrogen exposure by producing egg yolk proteins and shortly after that they started to develop eggs," she said.

The result was dramatic as the flathead minnow population plunged to barely one percent of its pre-estrogen numbers.

"It was really unexpected that they would react so quickly and dramatically," she said. The plunge in population numbers was clearly linked to the introduction of the hormone.

As all ecosystems are, just that, systems, the impact of the food source fish echoed into the minnow's main predator species, lake trout, which began its own decline due to the loss of its main food supply. On the other end of the food chain, the lake's insect population, which is the flathead minnow's own prey, saw a dramatic increase in population.

In a clear message to municipal planners, the removal of the estrogen had an almost immediate impact as well, as once the estrogen was no longer being introduced into the environment the fish populations began to rebound.

Unfortunately, the study does not go into how to remove the estrogens from the water, according to Dr. Paterson.

Paterson, but the study did look into how long it took for the estrogen to disappear from the lakes once the introduction ceased.

"We found that within a year we couldn't detect it in the lake," said Dr. Paterson. The researcher could not extrapolate the impact of estrogens into the Great Lakes from the municipal sewage plants operating along the lakes and Georgian Bay. "The concentrations we were working with were a lot less than what you would find in a toxicity study, but a lot more than what you would likely find in a larger body of water." The study worked with concentrations resembling what might be found just downstream from a sewage treatment plant.

The location of the experiment itself was the subject of considerable controversy when a federal government threat to close the facility was averted by the intervention of the Ontario government and a not for profit which took over official responsibility for the facility in June of this year.

The research station was labeled by the Ontario government at the time as being "the only freshwater research facility of its kind in the world." That assertion was made because the facility is the only one that provides scientific access to entire lakes.

The study and its importance for marine communities that depend on fisheries and tourism dollars from the sports fishing industry do appear to validate the two provincial government investments in the facility.

The estrogen study is pretty much wrapped up with the release of this paper, said Dr. Paterson. "That is pretty much consistent with all of our long term studies," he said.

Ontario government agreed to provide the \$2 million a year the federal government wanted to save and the Manitoba government kicked in \$900,000 over six years through a not for profit institute focused on sustainable development policy.

"We are very thankful to Premier Wynne and the Manitoba government for their support of this facility," said Dr. Paterson.

He noted that the facility was able to retain much of its core research staff and has been successful in attracting top scientific personnel. "This is really the only facility of its kind, it is unique in the world," he said. The Experimental Lakes Area is the only facility where researchers can study the impact of human activity on whole lakes. "Nowhere else in the world can you do that." That capacity also allows for the study of how lakes recover from the impact of human activities.

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
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

 This is followed by vomiting, diarrhea, rash, symptoms of impaired kidney and liver function, and in some cases, both internal and external bleeding (e.g. oozing from the gums, blood in the stools). Laboratory findings include low white blood cell and platelet counts and elevated liver enzymes.

Last week Dr. Eric Hoskins, Ontario Minister of Health and Long-Term Care, and Dr. David Mowat, Interim Chief Medical Officer of Health for Ontario, issued the following statement on Ontario's preparedness for Ebola virus disease in Ontario:

"We know that Ontarians may have concerns related to the ongoing challenges in West Africa and recent events in the United States regarding the spread of the Ebola virus," they said in a press release. "Let us assure you that the safety of Ontario's health care workers, patients and the public are our top priority."

"We are confident that Ontario is prepared and ready to contain and treat any potential case of Ebola virus in our province—protocols are in place and we've seen the system work well in Ontario hospitals," they continued. "With the experience and lessons learned from the Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) epidemic

ic, our health care facilities now have sophisticated infection control systems and procedures to protect health care providers, patients and all Ontarians. They are fully equipped to deal with any potential cases of Ebola."

But all health care workers, especially those providing care to patients, must be safe and protected," they continued. "This is why we are working with health care employers to ensure they are providing appropriate training for their staff on the proper use of personal protective equipment and other occupational health and safety measures. We are also continuing to work with health care workers and employers to further strengthen protective measures and ensure they're in place at all times. Our health care workers are on the front lines and it is times like these when we are all reminded of how critical their work is in protecting the public. We want them to feel safe. We will be reaching out to our health care partners to ensure they have the maximum protection possible and plan to release revised guidelines by the end of the week."

The government is indeed working with local hospitals and had sent out directives regarding the Ebola virus by Friday evening for implementation in all Ontario hospitals.

tals, explained MHC CEO Derek Graham in an interview with The Expositor.

Leading up to Friday night, the MHC had been in constant contact with the ministry and the Ontario Hospitals Association (OHA) with bulletins about the spread of the disease and any suspected cases in the province.

Locally, the hospital has made sure they are stocked up on protective gear and already have an N95 respirator mask fitting machine which ensures that there is a tight seal between the mask and the wearer's face. (The N95 mask is the most common of face piece respirators on the market and filters over 95 percent of airborne particles.)

The province also revealed the 10 hospitals province-wide that will be equipped to deal with any Ebola patients, among them Health Sciences North—the only hospital designated as such in Northern Ontario.

"If SARS is any lesson to us, once things start to unfold, the information changes rapidly and we need to take that ever-changing information and implement it," Mr. Graham said.

The CEO said the hospital has created a readiness team which is meeting regularly to discuss and digest the province's constant directives.

Those attending the two hospital sites will soon notice signs posted on the

entrances asking them to stop and think about questions regarding travel and fever. They may be questioned again at both admitting and the emergency room.

"We're not at the SARS level yet," he said, referring to the level of screening that went on at Ontario hospitals during the 2003 crisis.

"This is poised to hit us rapidly," Mr. Graham said, noting that while the virus has not been deemed an airborne contagion, it is still not certain whether this may in fact be the case.

"If there are any cases with symptoms, we will collect screening samples, get them to a rapid screening lab while isolating that patient and treating their immediate needs, communicating with central sources and transporting them as required," the CEO explained.

Testing Ebola specimens at Public Health Ontario's provincial labs began on Monday, October 20.

The province is expected to roll out further instructions regarding rapid transfer protocols for lab testing and transport protocols for patients.

"Because we have such a global society and fairly open borders, these things have the potential to move rapidly—viruses don't respect our rules and regulations," Mr. Graham said.

 said. "A bag of garbage costs \$8 in Ward 1 to get rid of. For services rendered, it's a fair system."

"In Ward 1, there's no services whatsoever," Laurie Cook answered. "To suggest raising taxes is a huge kettle of fish. Eight dollars when they are paying for the landfill? Ward 1 residents are asking the same questions."

Ray Beaudry of Morphet's Sideroad questioned why council is not petitioning the provincial government to reassess the McLean's Mountain Wind Farm site to industrial, which, in his estimate, would bring in over \$1.3 million in taxes which would in turn lower residents' tax bills.

"That was a fight I lost at the council table," said Mr. Erskine. "When you look at the value of windmills, it didn't make sense to me that they would get out of that. I pushed for it—it only makes sense. Property assessment should be taxes on value just like everything else."

"I don't know why we wouldn't," Mr. Spry said. "It doesn't make sense to me."

"Mike won't be a minority," Ms. Turner said. "I'll back you."

Ms. Egan questioned Ms. Turner about one of her platforms, a pool in Little Current, which she thought was a "fantastic idea."

Ms. Turner explained

that there is plenty of 'healthy lifestyles' funding available currently that the municipality could access. Economically, she said, a pool works for everyone because of the draw it would bring to the community.

"I'm not crazy about the idea of a pool," Mr. Erskine added. "There's a municipality near by, Espanola, which has the highest tax

rate in Ontario. Am I willing to raise taxes for a pool? No. It's not the cost of the building, it's keeping it going—it's going to be expensive to maintain and operate."

"I think the pool would be an incredible service," Ms. Cook said. "It would just be a win-win all around."

# Six-foot festival celebrates the past with the future

MANITOWANING—The annual 6 Foot Festival's fifth anniversary edition focussed on "Transformations" by providing an exhibition of the most intriguing projects since the festival began and an update on where they are today.

Permaculture plays a central role in today's 6 Foot Festival and the discussions and workshops throughout the three-day event centred on exploring strategies for "for integrating permaculture design principals on a community-wide, organization wide or regional level."

"We also explored the relationship between permaculture and indigenous knowledge," said Debajehmujig Storytellers executive director/artistic producer Ron Berti. "We will be placing a particular focus on the principles of or teachings that each of those approaches uphold."

Two local speakers, indigenous plant-based medicine teacher Joe Pitawanakwat, whose book 'The Creator's Garden: The Legitimacy of Plant Based Medicine and the Doctrine of Signatures' is eagerly awaited, and Justin Tilson, the Island permaculture practitioner whose Honora Bay based operation has become a Northern Ontario mecca for aficionados of the approach, that leads to more integrated and sustainable lifestyle for the future.

Permaculture is defined as "a branch of ecological design, ecological engineering, environmental design, construction and integrated water resources management that develops sustainable architecture, regenerative and self-maintained habitat and agricultural systems modeled from natural ecosystems," a decidedly

The new installations, such as this one still being worked on behind the Creation Centre, were complemented inside by photo displays showing many of the earlier works and where they stand today.

He described the first as "by far the most simple. This is how the ancients described medicine," he said. "This is where people like my grandmother would walk by a plant and say 'that is kidney medicine' or 'that is lung medicine' and 'that is heart medicine.'"

Mr. Pitawanakwat described his own skepticism at accepting traditional medicines on the word of the elders, although he sheepishly admitted feeling some remorse at doubting his grandmother. "There was too much mysticism around plant-based medicine," he said, describing his view of the field as 'folk medicine' and 'home remedies.'

Still, he found that he was driven to get to the bottom

of the science behind the traditional claims of efficacy in treating diseases with the traditional plant-based medicines. "I was able to prove what the ancients have been practicing forever, using modern empirical science," he said. Although he was not a stellar student in his early years of study, he soon found himself consumed with the project and discovered a remarkable facility for the subject. What he found in the science inevitably and invariably backed his grandmother's wisdom.

The third 'proof,' the Doc-

trine of Signatures,' is somewhat more esoteric, or perhaps even problematic, as Mr. Pitawanakwat admitted a healthy skepticism of the theory behind much of the 'scientific' inquiry leading back into antiquity. Mr. Pitawanakwat explained that the doctrine interprets each plant's medicinal use by examining that plant's features that are indicative of its medical application.

Mr. Pitawanakwat started out his discussion by examining some common foods and how those foods seem to be specifically designed to nourish the body part that they resemble. He went on to apply the concept to medicinal plants and herbs and harnessed modern tools to find the comparisons, even down to microscopic images and features that can only be examined through the use of electron microscopes.

Mr. Tilson described many of the projects that are taking place on his and other properties across Manitoulin and facilitated an open discussion on the subject of permaculture.

Sébastien Bacharach and Bonita Ford, members of the Permaculture Institute of Eastern Ontario and Transition Perth, joined the 6 Foot Festival discussions and led workshops for the Debaj crew investigating the applications of the permaculture model to the creative structure and operation of the theatre and artistic group.

"This Manitoulin is a wonderful place," said Ms. Ford, who noted that she was very impressed with the works taking place across the Island and the role that permaculture concepts are playing in those projects. "We have really enjoyed our time here."

The 6 Foot Festival is

playing a central role on Manitoulin in helping to educate and inform people about permaculture and its

applications to making our everyday lives more sustainable and enriching experiences.

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# M'Chigeeng encourages economic growth with new Island grocery store

M'CHIGEENG—M'Chigeeng First Nation will be opening a large grocery store in 2015 in the community to service both its residents and Islanders from across Manitoulin.

"The grocery store is a band initiative," Chief Joe Hare told The Expositor on Monday. "The community has wanted to see a retail grocery store for many years, but in the past we didn't quite have the numbers to sustain one. We have done our homework (a feasibility study) and we now believe the time is right to build."

The grocery store, which is supported by band and council, will be located next to the UCCM Castle Building Material Supply.

"We have started the preliminary work such as soil testing, drawings etc." continued Chief Hare. "We hope

to have all the preliminary work done and start on construction in the early spring."

Chief Hare said that the band is looking into retail franchises and is leaning towards Independent Grocer or just developing its own.

"We are still exploring that element (retail franchise), but we know we want it to be as large as the largest on Manitoulin because we want it to be competitive," said Chief Hare. "We want to be able to store a large variety of merchandise and we want it to be big and spacious allowing our customers to shop in comfort."

The chief explained that the revenue from the grocery store will be "recycled back into the community and invested into other projects to benefit the community."

"We believe the store will create at

least 20 new jobs for the community," added Chief Hare. "It is a good investment and we have a couple more projects in mind, but we want to establish each carefully and over time."

The grocery store is just one of several band initiatives over the past several years to encourage economic growth for the community including the M'Chigeeng wind farm, a partnership in the McLean's Mountain Wind Limited Partnership (in the Green Bush), a partnership in the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre and are landlords of an apartment building in Sudbury.

"We want to encourage economic prosperity for M'Chigeeng and our band members, while continuing to grow and improve our community," concluded Chief Hare.

## Little Current OPP boat house to be demolished next month

LITTLE CURRENT—The Little Current Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) boathouse will be demolished next month, Infrastructure Ontario (IO) confirmed earlier this week.

"The boathouse property is no longer required by the OPP, as they're leasing a nearby boat slip to ensure the delivery of policing services on local waterways," explained IO Communications Manager Jeff Giffen. "On behalf of the government, IO is proceeding with demolition of the boathouse. We've completed our due diligence, which included an environmental assessment and a demolition contractor is being engaged through an open and competitive process. It's anticipated work will begin on site next month (November) and will be

completed in early 2015."

"Once the demolition is complete, IO will be able to initiate its disposition process for the property," continued Mr. Giffen. "The Township (the Northeast Town) has expressed an interest in acquiring the

property and we've had discussions with them regarding our sales process. However, we're not currently in a position to negotiate. IO's mandate is to dispose of publicly owned assets at market value to ensure fairness and the best value

for the people of Ontario."

This development has come after several years of discussions between the Northeast Town and the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services (MCSCS) and IO regarding the disrepair of the downtown boathouse.

The Northeast Town council had lobbied hard for the demolition or replacement of the deteriorating property when the underwent a multi-million dollar makeover.


The Northeast Town has confirmed that it is in discussions with the province, but that the negotiations are ongoing.

# Turbine blade warranty work makes for heart racing photographs

**MCLEAN'S MOUNTAIN**—During the Sunday of Thanksgiving weekend, Dr. Joe Shorthouse and his wife Marilyn spotted two orange specks high above the landscape, dangling precariously from the tip of one of the massive McLean's Mountain wind farm turbine


blades and snapped the accompanying heart racing photos.

Dr. Shorthouse said they sat mesmerized by the duo for half an hour before carrying on and were eager to share the photos with this newspaper.

When asked about the work late last week, Paul

Kaminski, project manager, Northland Power, explained that the workers were performing warranty work on the blade serrations. (Look closely at the photo and one can see that the blades are indeed serrated, like a steak knife).

"This means that some of the serrations did not fully meet General Electric's (GE) quality specifications and required an additional touch up as part of warranty," Mr. Kaminski explained.

The blades the workers were operating on measure 50 metres long and are approximately 55 to 65 metres off the ground. Not work for the faint of heart.

While there have been some rumours circulating that GE has taken over operations of the wind farm from Northland Power, which Mr. Kaminski acknowledged he had also heard, he explained that GE, the turbines' manufacturer, signed a long-term

service agreement to maintain the wind turbines "so that they are available for power generation." The operations of the McLean's Mountain Wind Farm, however, are performed by Northland Power under manager Rick Martin.

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## Fall dives on alleged Michigan Griffon site stymied by storm

**GREEN BAY, MICHIGAN**—Darkening skies along the southwestern horizon were first indications of trouble for underwater explorer Steven J. Libert and his team from the Great Lakes Exploration Group LLC as they travelled out on the waters of Lake Michigan 10 weeks ago. The threatening skies appeared as they were suiting up to prepare for a dive on the wreck which they hope will prove to be the legendary Le Griffon, the first decked vessel to sail the Great Lakes and the pride of 17th century French explorer René-Robert LaSalle's fleet. But in the end it was a squall from the northwest that stymied the endeavour.

This was to be the second dive of the summer, the first had produced several "great" images of a very old wreck near the site where Mr. Libert believes his team has found the bow sprite of the ship built to trade and explore the Great Lakes during the first years of contact. "The visibility was great," he said. "I was topside seeing what was going on below." The excitement proved to be short-lived, however, as unfortunately the hard drive containing the images from that expedition crashed and its data proved unrecoverable. The second dive faced impossible challenges.

"There were 12-, 13-, 14-foot waves," said Mr. Libert. "The water was so badly churned up that we couldn't get photographs."

A journalist from a major newspaper was along for the dive, he had taken diving lessons in order to take a first hand look. "I was a little nervous letting him dive," he said. "The journalist confirmed that he was operating entirely

by feel while on the dive. Visibility was nil.

Coincidentally, it was a similar storm to the one that bedeviled the search team that is alleged to have claimed Le Griffon on September 18, 1679. LaSalle himself always harboured suspicions that his crew had scuttled the vessel and absconded with its valuable cargo of furs and trade goods.

The mystery of Le Griffon's fate will have to wait. Although Mr. Libert's critics have laid severe challenges to his claim that the ancient wooden spire he found earlier was a bow sprite, pointing to an "erosion" collar around one end of the wooden construction as evidence it was pounded into the lake bottom as a net stake, Mr. Libert has answers to those challenges.

The erosion collar may well have come from the spire being driven into the bottom by the attached cables from the sunken vessel. The type of fishing in which the pound stake would have played a role was not to arrive in the area until the mid-19th century, he adds.

So the mystery of Le Griffon's fate will remain unresolved and Mr. Libert is already making plans for next year's dive. The process is hampered by the necessary 'evil' of having to acquire permits to excavate the site and the need to maintain secrecy over the location of the site to prevent antiquities raiders from dragging the site for artifacts. Although Mr. Libert has acquired a federal Admiralty permit to exclude others from the site, not all so-called explorers are so finicky about observing legalities.

"We had a group come up from Florida with airplanes and sophisticated equipment trailing us," he said. The danger of revealing the site limits the time the divers can spend beneath the water.

In the meantime, the mystery of whether the Michigan site is really the last resting place of Le Griffon will remain unknown for at least another season.



**Construction underway on new public works building**

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# Teaching Days

## Wikwemikong Educational Conference lays educational foundation

WIKWEMIKONG—Educators from across the North, including representatives from each of Manitoulin Island's Native and non-Native schools, gathered at Wikwemikong High School for the two-day Education Conference 2014: First Nation Success Kinoomaagewin Giizbiadoon (Teaching Days).

The event, presented by the Wikwemikong Board of Education (WBE), brought together an impressive lineup of education experts and academics to facilitate and inform the discussions that took place during the workshops and keynote addresses.

"We are delighted to host in our community the distinguished academics and educators that will assist us towards our ultimate goal of maximizing student success," said WBE Education Director Dominic Beaudry. "Presenters include Dr. Mary Jean Gallager, Dr. Garfield Gini-Newman, Dr. Ruth Beatty, Wab Kinew, Dr. Cindy Blackstock and Dr. Darrel Manitowabi."

Mr. Beaudry noted that the keynote speakers were "complimented with an excellent array of workshops, whose topics include Inquiry-Based Learning, 3C Inquiries, Differentiated Instruction, Data to Support Instruction, Reggio Emilia Approach, Building PLCs, Tools for Capturing Stories, E-Learning, Anishinaabemowin App, Mathematical Thinking at Home, Literacy at Home, Manitoulin History, Traditional Indigenous Knowledge and Staying Safe Online."

Wikwemikong Chief Duke Peltier welcomed the participants and speakers to the Wikwemikong Unceded Territory on behalf of the band council and the community. "We are excited to welcome into our community leaders in the field of education with extensive knowledge and expertise," he said. "To all the conference participants, please take the time to explore our community and territory here on beautiful Manitoulin Island. Enjoy your stay."

Chief Peltier also used the opportunity to encourage all those in attendance to "support the First Nations Child and Family Caring Society and to follow its case closely."

Dr. Gallager delivered the first keynote address of the conference. As deputy minister of the student achievement division of the Ontario Ministry of Education and an educational speaker and workshop leader in high demand around the globe (she delivers overseas keynotes on her vacation time), Dr. Gallager brought a unique perspective to the proceedings. She was named the 2013 Phi Delta Kappan Educator of the Year, has been awarded an Honourary Doctor of Laws degree from the University of Windsor in 2006 and was a recipient of the Queen's Jubilee Medal in 2003 for her leadership in education and community service.

Dr. Gallager spoke extensively on changing the perspective paradigm on educating children. "Every child is born with a gift," she said. It is up to teachers and the educational system to uncover that gift.

Critical to that process is for educators to adopt a "growth mindset," she said. Every child is capable of growth, but each student may do so in a different way at a different pace. Workshops and keynotes at educational conferences bring a host of new ideas and concepts, but just as important is for educators to put in place a plan to implement those ideas in the classroom. "We must plan to implement and change something we do every day to

increase students' development," she said. "If we don't take them within two days those ideas are left on the shelf."

As a strategy, Dr. Gallager suggested taking away three things, "three new learnings that will change my practice," she said. "At the end of these two days, I am going to share those three things that I am going to bring into my classroom."

Dr. Gallager noted that First Nations students today are being asked to walk in two worlds, but that those two worlds are not mutually exclusive. "They need to walk with pride in the Anishinaabe world," she said. Dr. Gallager took a moment to explain that she is still finding her way in Anishinaabe culture and practices, and she apologized in advance if she should make a misstep and say something disrespectful.

Dr. Gallager noted that the present premier of the province was minister of education herself and that she had begun the process of increasing awareness of the relationship between Canada and the First Nations within the Ontario curriculum. "Premier (Kathleen) Wynne was in the North just a few days ago where she said that "we are all treaty people." She noted that the treaties were signed by both sides and that both sides are party to the process. Dr. Gallager's PowerPoint included the ministry's new map of Ontario showing each of the treaty regions of the province. "Those treaties cover that map," she pointed out. "Anywhere in this province we are on the traditional lands of the First Nations." It was of key importance going forward in the province that all students learn an accurate history of that relationship.

"We need to focus not on the First Nations people of 200 years ago," she said, "but on the trends of today."

There is a long way to go ahead, she noted. "I know nothing about teaching First Nations pride and

culture," said Dr. Gallager, "but I do know about good teaching."

Ontario has been recognized internationally as having one of the best education systems in the world and recently "it has been recognized as one of the most improved systems and that was starting from an already very good position. We have moved from good to great."

There is only one route to a better educational system and that pathway lies through teachers.

Dr. Gallager cautioned educators to not expect changes to immediately be reflected in improved educational scores. "When we start doing something differently, we are not really very good at it," she said. Often, there is a dip in the stats following change. But the data bears out that improvements do take hold and bear fruit with perseverance as "we learn to do it better."

Dr. Gallager displayed charts and graphs that showed a remarkable improvement in student scores over the past decade, although the gaps between First Nation students and the mainstream are still far too wide, there has been steady improvement as the gap closes.

A key to better educational attainment is found in early reading comprehension, as it plays a greater role by far than socio-economic position. Although students from a lower economic strata are 14 times more likely to drop out before finishing high school, students who attain a high level of literacy early on those statistics show no difference between the classes.

An important part of encouraging higher educational attainment is to stop making excuses based on background and economic status. Studies have shown that one of the main hindrances to educational attainment is the concept of "the poor dears, what can you expect?" Set the bar high and expect that students will reach that bar and the results will improve, expect that they will fail

to attain that level and they will meet that expectation as well.

"You don't get a higher score result simply by asking harder questions," she cautioned. The framework and tools to reach that goal has to be in place and accessible by students.

"Every child can learn," said Dr. Gallager. "We can expect results if we turn the key."

One of the changes taking place in schools is a realization that children are learning differently, with different tools today. Classes are being encouraged to join in group learning and classrooms should be noisy, interactive places with plenty of discussion and learning going on. "Learning floats on a sea of talk," noted Dr. Gallager. "Our classes should be really noisy places."

For those raised in the "seen but not heard" era of classrooms, the changes can be both bewildering and terrifying. "Change is not an easy thing," said Dr. Gallager.

In any event, she had one vital message for educators. "It is absolutely urgent that as teachers we up our game," she said. "We have a golden opportunity for about 14 years of a child's life that as a teacher we have a gift to program them for success."

The second keynote speech of the first day was Dr. Garfield Gini-Newman from the University of Toronto. Dr. Gini-Newman is a widely sought after speaker who blends humour with a deep understanding of effective curriculum design centred around the infusion of critical thinking for all." A

senior lecturer at OISE and a national consultant with The Critical Thinking Consortium, Dr. Gini-Newman has helped countless teachers to frame learning around engaging and provocative activities and authentic assessments. He is the author of seven textbooks and has taught at York University and the University of British Columbia.

Dr. Gini-Newman began his keynote by exploding one of the key myths of teaching, that changing the words changes the learning. "It is the qualifiers," he said. "Take any task and add a qualifier."

Understanding that caveat allows an educator to tweak questions and tasks so that they "invite the child into the process."

He described one exercise he had used in the class, the creation of a CD containing the top 10 anti-war songs of all time. The process included many different aspects of critical thinking and assessment.

Dr. Gini-Newman further illustrated the interactive process through the use of an ancient photograph taken in South Bay. He asked the assembled educators to use their knowledge of the world to work out season and the time of day in which the photograph was taken and why they decided on their answers. The answers were very good and insightful. At the end of the session, Dr. Gini-Newman admitted that he did not "know" the correct answer which segued into a discussion on when, or even if, you tell a student involved in a qualitative and critical thinking exercise the "correct" answer. The answer to that question involved a surprising number of qualifications that focus on the individual student's personality.

Education today, with its barrage of data and information through the Internet and digital media, needs to enhance and nurture critical thinking skills through brain compatible classrooms, curriculum design and effective assessment practice

posed the professor.

One of the routes to that goal is to build our teaching strategies around an inquiring approach, one that is not linear and utilizes a far more organic process. The world is "too big to know" in its entirety and it is important to recognize that reality in building a new more organic process and one of the key elements in that new process will be "kids talking to kids."

"Yes, we need basics," said Dr. Gini-Newman. "But we don't want to 'go back to basics,' we want to go forward with basics."

If you want to teach for a deeper understanding you have to put in place the environment for deeper understanding.

Research has shown that a major source of dopamine, the feel-good chemical that courses through our brains to make us happy, is success at achieving challenges. Understanding that is important for learning in the future as teachers "choreograph learning."

"We must invite kids to dare to dream," said Dr. Gini-Newman. "Dare to dream of a better society."

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
# 'Cranial adjustments' offered at Espanola's Inner Connections

## New ReachUp North indigenous youth program launches in Ottawa next week

OTTAWA—The Assembly of Seven Generations (A7G), an Indigenous youth-led organization, and Digital Opportunity Trust (DOT), an international non-profit, have launched a unique new pilot program, ReachUp! North, aimed at supporting Indigenous youth as they enter the modern economy.

"We (A7G) saw a gap between Indigenous youth and their ability to connect to career opportunities," explained one of ReachUp! North's program coordinator Brock Lewis, a Wikwemikong band member who grew up in Sault Ste. Marie. "Elders connected us with DOT and we realized that we both had similar goals to reach out to aboriginal youth."

"ReachUp! North will address the risk factors affecting young Indigenous people in Canada: a shortage of employment opportunities, a lack of family and community support and a misunderstanding of cultural practices," states a release from DOT. "A unique aspect of ReachUp! North is the integration of Indigenous cultural teachings and traditional knowledge to DOT's international leadership program, ReachUp!, which has been implemented in countries in Africa, Latin America and the Middle East. This is the first program on home soil for DOT."

"This program is different because it's our own initiative—it's led by youth," said Gabrille Fayant, another project coordinator for ReachUp! North and a founder of A7G. "ReachUp! North will be steered by youth, and because of our experiences, we will make sure the youth voice continues. We want to pass it down to the next generation because they need that support."

Organizers predict that the program will reach 150 Indigenous youth in Ottawa between its start on Monday, October 27 and June 2015, with four cohorts. The program is free to those interested in participating and geared towards youth aged 15 to 30.

Mr. Lewis explained that participants

will sign up for the six week program and participant in daily modules which will take between two-three hours to complete, combining both computer and classroom work.

"The modules will work towards revealing the participants' passion and experiences and then helping them utilize their abilities and networks to create career and business opportunities."

"The modules will focus on elements like resume writing, job interviews and leadership, but also cultural components," continued Mr. Lewis. "A7G developed four modules to complement the others, specifically on cultural components like the medicine wheel. There are different medicine wheels, but they all have the same underlying teachings with a focus on balance."

"I think Indigenous youth in Canada and young people in other parts of the world face similar obstacles," said Grant Thomas, vice president of strategic development with DOT, in a release. "After the nine months (of the pilot program) we will evaluate the participants and the program and hopefully look at expanding it to areas like Manitoulin," concluded Mr. Lewis. "I want this program to reach areas like my community of Wikwemikong."

The A7G is an Indigenous youth-led organization investing in the futures of First Nations youth that uses traditional knowledge and teachings to promote and sustain the well-being of Mother Earth, cultural heritage and to empower young people as leaders in the community.

DOT is a leading international social enterprise based in Ottawa, with local operations around the globe that aim at harnessing the power of youth to transform young people into leaders of change as they facilitate technology, business and entrepreneurial learning experiences to people in their own communities.

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# District Services Board Notes

## Year-end surplus projected

At the September meeting of the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB), chief financial officer Connie Morphet told the board that a year-end municipal share surplus of \$189,928 is projected. This surplus includes an Ontario Works surplus of \$17,907 while Social Housing is under budget by \$65,492 as is Emergency Medical Services by \$107,798. In addition, non-reserve interest revenue is forecasted to be \$1,269 under budget.

## 2015 budget to proceed

DSB CAO Fern Dominelli explained that the DSB's 'lame duck' (restricted powers) period occurs following the election, unlike municipalities, and that they would proceed with the 2015 budget before the election as they have the authority to do so.

The Territory Without Municipal Organization (TWMO) candidates for the DSB have all been acclaimed, he noted, and will again be represented by Edgar Lovelace (Dawson and Robinson), Bruce Killah and David Leonard.

## Funding announcements

The DSB received word from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) that it would be receiving \$191,635 in Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative funding for 2014-15.

The DSB also learned that it received \$160,000 for its 2014-15 funding for the Investment in Affordable Housing pro-

gram. Allocation for the final five years of the program (2015-20) will be based on the new census data and will be provided once this data becomes available.

Mr. Dominelli explained that the majority of these dollars are spent on the Ontario Renovates program. This money could be used to construct new affordable housing, but with less and less funding, "we can't do much."

## EMS reports

The board learned that there is money coming from the province to replace aging defibrillators, among them those within the DSB.

The North East Local Health Integration Network review of the non-urgent patient transfer system was also noted by the board, which is still in operation and has had much success over the 17 months. A total of 939 patients (from Manitoulin and Espanola hospitals) have been moved between facilities with crews travelling 181,675 kilometres.

Overall utilization is 68 percent, which is very high, Mr. Dominelli said, "and indicative of a system that is functional and efficient."

There will be requests for proposals coming soon from the Northeast LHIN to find a permanent solution to the non-urgent patient transfer program, which is still a pilot project, "and I'm looking forward to that," Mr. Dominelli said.

Mr. Dominelli also spoke of community

paramedicine, a push by the Ontario government that will see paramedics assuming a larger role in community health other than just EMS services. The DSB recently partnered with the Cochrane and Algoma DSB to create a joint submission for funds from the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care for a paramedicine pilot project, which has been approved to the tune of \$212,000.

Some paramedicine projects could include blood pressure clinics as well as follow-ups with patients who were discharged from hospital and returned home by the paramedics themselves.

Gore Bay's ambulance station will be included in the pilot project.

## Jobs for Youth

Central Manitoulin DSB rep Derek Stephens commended the DSB on another successful summer of Jobs for Youth, which covers the cost of summer employment at area businesses for at-risk youth or youth from disadvantaged communities.

## Association of Municipalities of Ontario

Mr. Dominelli attended the Association

of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) conference with the Northern Ontario Service Deliverers Association (NOSDA) and the Sudbury East Municipal Association, meeting with the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care. They were able to speak to the minister on the locally-relevant topic of non-urgent patient transfers and the fact that southern Ontario non-urgent patient transfers are funded 100 percent by the province.

Mr. Dominelli also met with Minister of Education Liz Sandals on the topic of what the province plans to do with space for full-day Kindergartens in small schools and the topic of surplus schools and the possibility of them being transferred over to the DSB.

With representatives from the MMAH, the groups discussed concerns with the funding formula for affordable housing as the statistics are skewed since information previously gathered on the now-defunct long form census forms is no longer available. (These forms were discontinued by the federal government prior to the last national census on the grounds that they sought too much information that the government deemed was private).



The spring gardening season this year was very unusual, wet, then dry, then wet for most of the summer. So when it came time (a bit late) to plant the beet seeds I had already talked to some gardeners who were planting beet and carrot seeds second time around. Beets are one of my favourite vegetables so to be sure I would have beets to eat I planted numerous packages.

#### Rich Beet Chocolate Cake

This is a very dense chocolate cake almost like a brownie. If you want a lighter cake switch to all-purpose flour and white sugar and use two 8-inch cake pans.

2 cups spelt or whole-wheat flour  
1 3/4 cup coconut sugar  
2/3 cup cocoa powder  
1 tsp baking powder  
3/4 cup unsalted butter at room temperature, cut into pieces  
2 large eggs at room temperature  
1 tsp vanilla extract  
3/4 cup finely grated cooked beets (about 2 large beets)  
1 1/4 cup hot water  
1. For the cake, preheat the oven to 350°F. Grease a 9-inch bunt pan.  
2. In a large bowl add the flour, sugar, cocoa powder, and baking powder. Add the butter and with the hand mixer on low work the butter into the flour (it will seem dry and crumbly).  
3. Add the eggs and vanilla and mix in slightly, then mix in the beets. Add the hot water while mixing on low speed, then increase the speed to medium high and continue to mix for 2 to 3 minutes, until the batter is thick. Scrape the batter into the prepared pan.  
4. Bake the cake for about 50 minutes,

until a tester inserted in the centre of the cake comes out clean. Cool the cake in the pan for 30 minutes then turn it out onto a cooling rack to cool completely.

5. Before serving you can sprinkle with icing sugar or leave plain.

#### Pistachios over Roasted Beets

I used pumpkin seeds instead and switched the red wine vinegar to organic cider vinegar. If you can't find golden beets just use all red.

2 large (450 grams) red beets, well scrubbed

2 small (225 grams) golden beets, well scrubbed

1 shallot, minced

2 tsp Dijon mustard

2 tsp red wine vinegar

2 tsp maple syrup or honey (optional)

1/8 tsp salt

3 Tbsp olive oil

Freshly ground pepper to taste

1/3 cup unsalted pistachios, roughly chopped

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Put the beets in a baking dish and cover with tinfoil. Roast until tender (about 50 minutes). Let cool in the baking dish, then peel. Pour the juice into a small bowl and set aside.

Slice all the beets into 1/4 inch slices and arrange them on a large platter.

Make the vinaigrette by whisking together the shallot, mustard, vinegar, salt, and 1 tsp of the set-aside beet juice in a medium bowl. Add the oil in a thin stream while whisking constantly. Taste and season with pepper.

Drizzle the vinaigrette over the sliced beets. Sprinkle with the pistachios or sunflower seeds.

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## farm facts and furrows

### Crop rotation and nutrients

How much nutrient is removed from your fields during the span of one crop rotation? You may be surprised! With or without manure or biosolids, there are often more nutrients removed from your field than what is added through manure and/or fertilizer. Are you curious? The "quick" version of the NMAN3 software field plan is for people that do not need a nutrient management plan, but are interested in knowing what their manure is providing or how their soil test compares to their crop removal, or how much commercial fertilizer is required to supplement applied manure or biosolids. There are many useful features in the tool, including Ontario-specific information (township average crop yields, N-P-K recommendations), instant imperial to metric, and an economic tool and much more.

A step-by-step guide will lead you through the "field" version of the NMAN3 software. It can be used online (or downloaded) <http://apps.omafra.gov.on.ca/NMAN/NMAN3.html>

### Forage quality of frost-damaged immature corn silage

Producers need to consider the nutrient quality of frost-damaged corn silage. Frost damaged corn silage will have a lower grain-to-stover ratio. Use wet chemistry laboratory analysis, and newer measures (including crude protein, NDF, fibre digestibility, starch, ash and fat) to more accurately estimate corn silage digestible energy. Slightly immature, frost damaged corn that has dented can make good silage. In general, this will have slightly higher fibre and crude protein and slightly lower energy levels than normal corn silage. Quality may not be optimum for high producing dairy cows, and it is sometimes a good idea to consider harvesting the better cornfields for silage. Very immature corn silage at the milk or early dough stages will have lower starch and higher fibre levels. This can be fed to animals with low to moderate energy requirements, such as beef cows and stockers. Additional grain can be more easily included in feedlot rations to increase the energy content.
