MANITOULIN—There were some startling changes at Manitoulin Island council tables as the ballots were counted on Monday night. Although four municipalities had their candidates for the top office acclaimed, those mayors and Reeves who faced challenges generally went down to defeat.

A 35-year run by Tehkummah Reeve Gary Brown came to an end as challenger Eric Russell won a convincing victory and a tight race in Central Manitoulin saw incumbent Gerry Strong lose to former reeve Richard Stephens by a mere 16 votes.

While nearly all of the votes had been counted and reported by municipal electoral officers by around 11 pm on Monday night, the race in Billings, where the undisputed record holder for municipal office longevity Mayor Austin Hunt was facing off against two challengers, Sandi Hurcomb and David Yurich, lingered on until nearly 2:30 am before reporting the tally.

In the end Canada's longest serving municipal politician was once again victorious, handily defeating all comers with 326 votes. Billings councillor Sandi Hurcomb, who challenged Mayor Hunt for office, garnered 205 and David Yurich received 124 votes.

Incumbents Sharon Alkenbrack (362 votes), Tom Imrie (318 votes) and Brian Parker (279 votes) will be returning to the council table in Billings along with newcomer Barbara Erskine

(346 votes). Nora Bath-Haring (262 votes), David Montgomery (211 votes), Delroy Prescott (269 votes) and Connie Suite (133 votes) did not make the cut in the end.

There will be a number of new faces around the Central Manitoulin council table when the new council is sworn in this December, but the race for mayor was a tight one. Former reeve and challenger Mr. Stephens was ahead of incumbent Mayor Strong at the final count by 16 votes, but Mr. Stephens was not yet declaring himself victor on Monday night.

"It was a really close race," said Mr. Stephens. "I want to congratulate my opponent on the campaign." The former mayor was not breaking out the celebration just yet however. "With a 16 vote difference, there is likely to be a recount," he said.

If the count holds, Mr. Stephens said that he was looking forward to returning to the council table. His two key issues remain the same as he spoke about at the all candidates' meeting. "I definitely want to take a close look on why our assessments are going up and yet our taxes are going up when

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Status of Michael's Bay site likely decided soon

TORONTO—One of Manitoulin's most storied pieces of property has been in legal limbo for years, as the Michael's Bay property containing the old Michael's Bay townsite still has a caution on title, although reports that the property had been seized on behalf of the Belgian government have been proven to be inaccurate.

An email from Public Works and Government Services Canada case officer Danielle Pilon to local historical activist Doug Tracy of Little Current recently confirmed the properties' status. "Please be informed that the property is still under a restraint and management order. No offer to purchase has been approved by the SPMD

(Seized Property Management Directorate) pursuant to the terms of the restraint and management order dated 27 September 2005 by the Superior Court of

there have not been any major changes," he said. "The other is to look at bringing in assisted living accommodations to the community."

Mr. Stephens also congratulated Mayor Strong and his council on completing a number of projects in the community, particularly finishing work on the bridges in the community and in finding the money to complete the drain project.

The results of the count on Monday night saw 732 votes for Mr. Stephens and 716 for Mr. Strong.

In Ward 1 (Campbell) Patricia MacDonald (214 votes) and Derek Stephens (149 votes) will be returning to the council

table, overcoming challenges from Wes Cline (97 votes) and Petra Wall (137 votes).

In Ward 2 (Carnarvon) Alex Baran (427 votes) and Dale Scott (472 votes) will replace incumbents Gloria Haner (250 votes) and Adam McDonald (votes 399) at the table.

In Ward 3 (Sandfield) newcomer Linda Farquhar (184 votes) and incumbent Ted Taylor (169 votes) will be on council, overcoming John Finlay (103 votes) and Keith Legge (65 votes).

A change is coming this December 1 for Tehkummah with Eric Russell (153 votes) beating out incumbent Reeve Gary Brown (118 votes). Joining Reeve Russell at the council table will be Paul Bowerman (180 votes), Ron Hierons

(157 votes), Laird Lee (128 votes) and Lorie Leeson (124 votes). Defeated were council candidates Lydia McKenna (113 votes), Michael McKenzie (112 votes) and Donald McMurray (90 votes).

"It took a long time for the votes to be calculated," said Mr. Russell when contacted by The Expositor Monday night. "I just found out about half an hour ago, but I feel pretty good. I'm looking forward to getting to meet the councillors. I'm sure they are all good people and we all have the same goal, to make Tehkummah the best community possible. I'm sure there will be challenges, but we will meet them head on."

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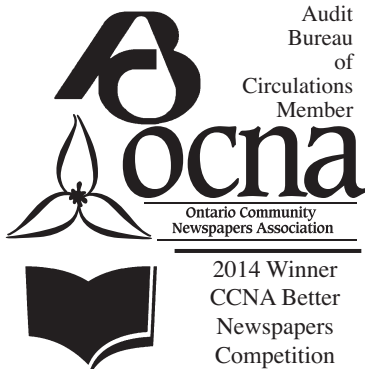

Terrorism against soldiers a wakeup call to vigilance

A week and more has passed since the tragic murders of Warrant Officer Patrick Vincent, run down by Martin "Ahmed" Coutare-Rouleau in Sait-Jean-Sur-Richelieu, Quebec and Corporal Nathan Cirillo, dramatically shot at close range at the National War Memorial in Ottawa by Michael Zehaf-Bibeau.

The second murder had the added drama of the shooter being able to cover the ground between the War Memorial and parliament buildings and to enter the centre block through the main doors below the Peace Tower. He was famously fatally shot by Sergeant At Arms Kevin Vickers before he wreaked any further havoc he had no doubt planned for our elected parliamentarians and House of Commons staff.

Canadians were left spinning last week as these domestic attacks on military personnel and the fact that the Ottawa shooter and his weapon had been able to avoid security and invade the main building of Canada's parliament.

At first, in panic mode, it was tempting to think that this was our "mini 911" event and, just as President Bush's administration had put it in 2001 a day or so after the World Trade Towers attack, that "things will never be the same again," these Canadian events, as tragic and unsettling as they were and are, by no means require us to live in fear as we live our day to day lives.

For sure, the day-to-day security surrounding the government buildings in downtown Ottawa will need to be addressed and appropriate measures put in place to ensure that lone terrorists do not have unrestricted access to these important places.

But the reality is, as we learn more and more about the pair, Martin "Ahmed" Coutare-Rouleau and Michael Zehaf-Bibeau, that they each acted alone although possibly (and likely) each was motivated in some way by, and was certainly attracted to, the terrorist methods that characterize Al-Qaeda and, more recently, the militant Muslims attempting to subjugate part of the Middle East to become part of a new Islamic State (IS) that would be superimposed across borders including those of Iraq, Syria, possibly Jordan (among others).

Each young man was a fairly recent convert to the Muslim faith and each had embraced the most radical extremes that look to terrorist activities to define them.

It is not unreasonable to think that had these two young men, both of them Canadians from middle class backgrounds, not embraced the Muslim faith and found within it this extremely antisocial way of dealing with the world that they would have found an alternative and equally anti-social way of manifesting their hatred and disdain for the Canadian status quo.

It's easy to say they were politically motivated in the same way that, say, Patrick Whelan was in 1868 when he assassinated one of the Fathers of Confederation, Thomas D'Arcy McGee (in Ottawa, close to the National War Memorial, as it happens) because Whelan was associated with the Irish Nationalist Fenian movement and McGee (originally from Ireland) was deemed to be part of the British establishment in North America.

This is a vastly simplified story of Canada's first political assassination, but Whelan, although he swore he did not do the deed, was convicted of murder and was hung, publically.

But it was a political assassination.

The angry young men who committed last week's mayhem probably knew as much about the ISIS/ISIL/IS terrorist tactics as any of us do from what we glean from television news reports and if they saw themselves as political activists their explanations would have been, at best, confused.

They were, however, radicalized and if these unhappy souls hadn't taken this particular anti-social path in all likelihood they would have found another, equally socially unpleasant way to lash out at a society with which they did not identify.

True internal political terrorism in Canada, beginning with McGee's assassination 146 years ago, has been rare.

Of course the Quebec nationalist FLQ in Quebec, also a terrorist organization, managed to kill and injure several people by means of planting explosives in, among other places, public mailboxes in the late 1960s and then in 1970, they kidnapped and murdered Pierre LaPorte who was at the time Quebec's labour minister.

The Air India bombing in 1985, through which 329 people, most of them Canadians, were killed when the infamous "Flight 182" exploded in the air space over Lockerby, Scotland, stands as this country's most notorious act of political terrorism as the aircraft and its lethal load embarked from Vancouver International Airport.

The motivation was political, once again directed at freedom struggles for a political group (the Sikhs in India's Punjab province) in another foreign land.

The outcome of the Air India bombing revealed that those behind this crime were already known to police and intelligence services who had failed to move cooperatively and swiftly enough to avoid the carnage over Scotland.

If nothing else, this should have been a lesson to those tasked with collecting intelligence about and monitoring individuals within this country who have shown to be radicalized and possibly be capable of doing what Martin "Ahmed" Coutare-Rouleau and Michael Zehaf-Bibeau did last week.

Coutare-Rouleau, we know for sure, was known to authorities. Zehaf-Bibeau was in the process of seeking a passport so he could travel to Saudi Arabia.

Had Coutare-Rouleau been tracked and stopped before he murdered Warrant Officer Vincent on the Monday, there is a real possibility that we might not have had a Wednesday incident at all.

Our government and our police authorities at every level have as their first order of duty the protection of Canadian citizens.

If people known to them as radicals need to be tracked and monitored on an ongoing basis, so be it.

The Air India tragedy should have taught this lesson to these authorities. Last week's murders at the hands of radicalized people must be, if nothing else, a wake-up call for increased vigilance.

Assiginack Public School to 'bring back' its library with help from Canada Post

MANITOWANING—The library has always played a major part in the community life of Assiginack Township, so it makes perfect sense that the Assiginack Public School (APS) Library, named the James O. Lockyer Resource Centre in honour of the long-time Manitoulin School Board trustee, for many youngsters the start of their life-long relationship with libraries, will receive an upgrade befitting its growing student population. The library is, in fact, getting a facelift thanks to a Canada Post grant.

APS Principal Margaret Stringer

explained that Assiginack events coordinator Jackie White approached the school about a Canada Post grant that was available and was a perfect fit for the school's 'Bring Back the Library' project. The school applied and was pleased to learn that they had qualified for \$8,293, Ms. Stringer explained.

The library, for the past seven years, has been operating as a computer lab and a learning resource centre, Ms. Stringer said, but the school decided it was time to revitalize the space and make it the library it once was.

"Our school has a lot of books, including

many books in our classroom libraries," she said. Because students needn't venture far from their own class libraries, the library itself fell into disuse for its original intended purpose.

"The notion that books aren't valued anymore, I don't believe that," the principal said. "I see that they enjoy curling up with a book—the kids are really enjoying and valuing rich literature."

The library, on top of needing new titles, is also in need of carpeting, furniture and shelving units, which this grant will address.

The library will also continue to house

the wireless laptop lab.

"The kids already are so excited about using it," Ms. Stringer said.

The school has never had a full-time librarian and Ms. Stringer sometimes acts in that capacity herself, but the school allows one period a week per class for book checkout and is trying to "put a focus back on it," she added.

When the renovations are complete, the James O. Lockyer Resource Centre will likely come alive with a volunteer work bee to see the shelves stocked once again and the library returned to its former, but better, self.

A history lesson on the trials and tribulations of beach cleaning

Bring a wheelbarrow and a rake, but leave the tractor at home, jail food is not that great!

To the Expositor:

Dear Mrs. Robinson,

Let me try to help to relieve your frustration I felt from your letter of October 15, 2014 you wrote to the Expositor ('Condition of Providence Bay beach causes surprise for tourists, Page 5). And I do sympathize with you.

I'm sure you think we Prov-arians never tried to solve the beach bark problem, let me give an update.

In the late 1950s some gardeners in Providence Bay wanted to mix the beach bark and sawdust with their Sand City gardens, to give their gardens more body with "organic matter." With very few tourists roaming the beach back then—we were actu-

ally doing the town folks a favour, not trying to get rid of the bark. As time went on Mr. Cornish at the Providence Bay Park asked my Dad if he would consider moving all the bark off the beach, just to get rid of it.

So Dad, Melvin Liscumb, Keith Sterling and I would shovel load after load into a wagon box pulled by our horses and dump it elsewhere off the beach.

Years went by and the lake water kept going down. In the late 1950s water was so high it would splash on the road on a windy day over past where the sand ends and the rock begins. So now we have low water levels and more beach—so the folks in Providence Bay worked very hard to rake and

clean the beach for years, but without machinery the job was too large.

So a friend and I brought our tractors and hauled countless loads of bark off the beach and even cultivated some sand down at the waters edge.

Moe and MNR came by and told us never to bring our tractors there again, or there would be heavy fines and may be jail time for polluting the environment.

In the mid-1870s a sawmill company cleared the land of trees and left their sawdust behind in the river and lake. Also bark came off thousands of logs that were in booms in the Bay waiting to be loaded onto boats and barges for faraway destinations.

In Sudbury you have maintains of tail-

ings that are not that pleasing to the eye. Well we have the lumber company tailings that is also an eyesore.

So, Mrs. Robinson, I guess I'm saying that we hate to be scolded with all the letters about how we sit on our hands and do nothing. Yes, the Providence Bay folks really care but the government has us tied in a knot.

So bring a wheelbarrow and rake. I'll help you. But I'm not bringing my tractor, as I heard the food in jail is not that great.

P.S. I'm on your side. But!

Larry Killens weighs in on Children's Aid Society staff reductions

A chance to reach out and advocate for equality and to strive for excellence

To the Expositor:

The executive director of the CAS Sudbury/Manitoulin announces that Kina Gbezhgomi is reducing its staff on Manitoulin and closing its office. To a point this is a good news story. After 20 years of advocating for stand alone children's services, it has finally has come to fruition.

If you have personally had involvement with the CAS, several questions come up. Once First Nations do take over, they (Sudbury-Manitoulin CAS) do not have an office here in our geo-

graphic location. The closest office is two hours away. The CAS will be increasingly causing once again more stress to the family unit even more so than currently, not being able to respond to parental visits that the court makes mandatory and so many other issues. Each worker will have two hours of travel time, court time and increased costs.

I would hope our Member of Parliament works towards having Kina Gbezhgomi Children Services take over the contract on the complete Manitoulin Island.

Think about it, what a great happening that would be. Ask those who are affected by CAS issues. With the reputation First Nation communities have for caring for their elders that would indeed carry over to our youth and the family unit, I think they would "raise the bar" many times over the current CAS. The current CAS, which is as well a private entity contracted by the government, free of any ombudsman's examination, accountability and not a government organization.

The Rainbow District School

Board has recently hired four social workers who, without question, are better qualified and moreover, in total, are registered with the college of social service workers of Ontario as required by law. Not all current CAS workers are registered now stating they are called child protection workers even though they are holding themselves out and performing the daily duties of a social worker.

We can only hope and pray the First Nations will consider serving our needs here on Manitoulin

It is quite clear by the contents of letters popping up in recent editions of The Expositor that Island residents are becoming ever more concerned about the seemingly ever-increasing Hydro One rates including exorbitant delivery charges along with the notorious and infamous "debt retirement charge." I believe that these letters are just the tip of the iceberg because, well, let's face facts, if Hydro One rates continue to rise at this alarming rate (some experts have projected a 40 percent rise over the next few years) regular working families simply won't be able to afford it. It's almost unthinkable to believe that hydro may become a commodity that only the rich can afford!

The funny thing is Hydro One doesn't even seem to attempt to hide this gouging; this ongoing "debt retirement charge" goes way back to the old Ontario Hydro Crown Corporation when they let a retiring CEO write their own severance and pension settlement and it has been on hydro bills ever since and like sheep to the slaughter, local hydro consumers have just continued to pay year after year after year.

A few years back I was at a store in Mindemoya and a few locals were gathered and the subject of higher hydro bills cropped up and discussion on the subject was going back and forth and the debt retirement charge was mentioned. All of a sudden an elderly woman stopped in the aisle and said, "You fellas don't actually pay that, do you?" Every one kind of stood there with there mouths open. She continued, saying, "Does anyone help you pay your debt off? I simply deduct that charge from my bill each month and attach a note to Hydro One stating that this charge is unjustified and I have no intention of paying for someone else's debt!" She concluded that she had done this for years and had never heard a peep out of Hydro One!

In a letter from Beth Richards ('Facing another winter of Hydro One discontent, October 8, page 4) on the subject,

she states that she feels we should have our own hydro corporation locally like they do in cities. I certainly concur but, therein lay the problem of living in an area where a lot of residents for various reasons (personal incomes, environmental concerns, property value concerns, business concerns, retirement and vacation potential etc., etc.) really resist change, especially in the area of power generation.

Any local power generation corporation would be too small to purchase hydro from other areas like most of the city companies do so the alternative is to produce your own power using natural elements like sun, wind or water and as we all know from the past, just mentioning these kinds of industries could be paramount to starting a Manitoulin Civil War!

On a personal note, my preference would be solar farms, which maximizes the number of units per area and gives you the best return!

As for Hydro One, solutions need to start at the top. Note: The CEO of a public corporation is worth a million

dollar salary (and I have no reason to believe that Ms. Richards' statement on this isn't completely correct—I'm sure she did her research). You hear of these outrageous wastes of public dollars all the time but it seems that the Ontario government is simply doing nothing about it. If the CEO of WSIB, David Marshall, can keep his job after being found to get a \$400,000/year salary with bonuses for every denied or reduced worker's claim it doesn't give you a lot of hope that this government will act to correct any of the other travesties.

At the end of the day one thing all this disgust with hydro delivery to the North does is continue to solidify the idea that a separate "Province of Northern Ontario" just may be the way to go! Let the Big Smoke generate their own power and let our Northern sun, wind and water take care of its own!

Olympic women's hockey players visit Manitoulin to inspire female athletes

M'CHIGEENG—M'Chigeeng First Nation hosted a series of hockey workshops last week for Island female hockey players led by two time Olympic gold medalists Cheryl Pounder and Becky Kellar.

"It was a joint effort between the Union of Ontario Indians, the Anishinabek Educational Institute and Lakeview School," Union of Ontario Indians Health Policy Analyst Tony Jacko told The Expositor. "The program is a mix of on-ice instruction focussing on skill development and a presentation about the girls' Olympic journey."

"Cheryl and Becky were such high energy," added Lakeview School Principal Neil Debassige. "The students really enjoyed the workshops and learning from the women."

"Their whole platform is being yourself, setting goals and putting a plan in place to achieve your goals," continued Mr. Debassige. "They had their golden tickets (Olympic gold medals) to prove that it works—anything is possible with hard work."

Mr. Debassige said Lakeview School had been working with the Union of Ontario Indians on a number of projects including a recent project which brought an optometrist into the school to check the students' vision and supplied students with two pairs of glasses (for school and home use). "We have a good working relationship and when this opportunity came up we were thrilled to host the program and help organize it," said Mr. Debassige. "We also brought in students from Wikwemikong and Sagamok because we wanted to include as many girls as possible. As well, we had local girls who have played for the Lady Wolves and college hockey come and help out with the on-ice workshops."

The workshops were held over three days with 25 girls from Wikwemikong participating the first day, 21 girls from Sagamok on the second day and 21 girls from M'Chigeeng (including Lakeview and Manitoulin Secondary School) the final day.

"We love to give clinics and work with young female hockey players," explained Ms. Pounder.

"We didn't have the same opportunity growing up, coming from smaller towns, to play girls' hockey," explained Ms. Kellar.

"We like to share our journey

and the message that you need to find your own path, your passion," added Ms. Pounder. "To do that you have to try different things. We do on-ice work, but sharing our medals and our journey I think is the most impactful."

"If you look at the Canadian Women's Hockey team you see a lot of success," said Ms. Kellar, "but there have also been also of challenges along the way and we try to tell the girls that success doesn't come easily—it comes from hard work."

 refuge, the security officer, more familiar to Canadians as the man carrying the ceremonial mace into the House, landed on his back firing upwards at the gunman with his service pistol. It was scene more to be expected from a television police thriller than the hallowed halls of the usually sedate Canadian Parliament.

There have been two confirmed shootings, one took place at the National War Memorial, where the unarmed soldier Corporal Nathan Frank Cirillo was killed while standing ceremonial guard. The second was the gunman slain within the Parliament Buildings themselves. A third reported shooting at the Rideau Centre was later declared to be a false alarm.

Conservative Minister of Employment and Social Development and Minister for Multiculturalism Jason Kenny announced on Twitter that the soldier shot at the National War Memorial had died, even as the hospital treating the soldier refused to confirm the death.

Additional shots had been reported in the vicinity of the Chateau Laurier that was later attributed to echoes of the gunfire on Parliament Hill. It was confirmed that there was only ever one shooter.

An email sent to members of the Prime Minister's Office ordered staff members to "shelter-in-place" and to not leave the building for their own safety. The same 10:49 am Wednesday email indicated that "there are currently active shooters in the Parliament Hill vicinity."

All the party leaders were reported safe shortly after the shootings were reported in the media.

Prime Minister Stephen Harper was hustled into a small alcove/closet in the back of the Conservative caucus chamber while his MPs fashioned makeshift spears from flagpoles in the room, hovering in ambush beside the chamber doors.

Following the shooting, the prime minister's RCMP security detail hustled him out of the building.

Island expat Brock Size had a prime front row seat for the drama, high above the events unfolding below.

"We are about 100 feet above Centre Block," said Mr. Size. "I am building a tower right now."

Perched on the scaffolding, Mr. Size and his co-workers at RJW Gem Stonemasons have a perfect view of the front and west of Centre Block. At first they did not think too much of the sirens they heard approaching.

"This is Parliament Hill and they are always holding drills and stuff, and sirens are not uncommon," he said. "But this time there were a lot more sirens than normal and we starting looking over to see what was going on." What they saw was startling.

There were more and more police arriving on the scene. "There were people walking around with machine guns and police officers with their handguns drawn," he said. "There were people hiding

behind statues and cars."

Chain link fencing surrounds Mr. Size's worksite, like most such construction sites in an urban area, but there is an open gate for trucks to travel bring in equipment and supplies.

"People were coming through the gate and hiding in the sea containers we use as job boxes on the site," he said. "I said 'this isn't a drill.'"

Being on the outside of the building, Mr. Size heard the gunfire going off within the building and was witness to the heroics of some of his co-workers on the ground. "Some of the guys were over beside the building getting ready to put up some scaffolding for a job we are doing there," he said. "People were trying to crawl out of the windows, saying 'there is a gunman in here shooting people.'" The workers began fashioning makeshift ladders to assist people trying to escape the building.

"I saw them take (Prime Minister) Stephen Harper and his people out of the building," he said.

As to the action going on inside, Mr. Size did not even begin to try to hide his admiration of the sergeant at arms and his security team. "It was like something out of a Steven Segal or a Die Hard movie," he said.

Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes responded to a text indicating that she was safe and spoke to The Expositor even as the drama was unfolding outside her office door. She described herself at the time as "shaken and under

lockdown."

"They are still looking for the shooter," she said. Ms. Hughes said that she could see SWAT team members on rooftops across the street. "The gunman was between the Conservatives and the NDP caucus meetings," she said, adding "it would have been much worse had it been earlier."

Ms. Hughes explained that one of her colleagues, who had just returned from maternity leave, had left to nurse her baby and could have been in the lobby at the same time as the gunman, but she reported that everyone was accounted for. "We are relieved that everyone is okay."

Ms. Hughes was sombre as she discussed the day's events. "We are all concerned about what has transpired," she said. "Our thoughts are with the soldier who has been shot and our thoughts go out to the family."

"We are fortunate to have

the security we have on the Hill," she said. "We are very grateful to the members of the security service."

Ms. Hughes described herself as "still a bit shook up" as she spoke from the warmth and safety of her home on Monday afternoon. She expressed hope that the government would take its time in a measured response to the events. "We will of course expect a full review of the shortfalls, if any, in the security, but I hope there is no impetuous response."

Ms. Hughes said that she understood that the government has indicated plans to table legislation, but that she fervently hoped that the majority government would not rush into legislation that would unnecessarily erode Canadian rights and freedoms.

"The professionals are saying that we have the necessary legislative tools to deal with this, we just have to enforce and apply what is already there," she said. "No matter how much legislation you put in place, there will still always be someone who will get through."

"We need to protect the Charter of Rights and Freedoms and to maintain people's rights to a fair trial," she said. "We need to learn, not just react. We need to learn from tragedies and to protect our rights and freedoms. Tolerance is important."

Ms. Hughes surmised that some of the old security measures would have likely been more effective than some of the infrastructure that has more recently been installed. "There are these barrel-like structures that rise or lower to allow buses in," she said. "Before, there was a police car that would move back and forth to let the buses pass. If that had still been in place it is likely there would have been an alarm raised sooner. I don't know how safe that would have been for the police officer driving the car."

Ms. Hughes reiterated her concern for both the fallen soldiers, the one shot in Ottawa and the soldier in uniform run down by a terrorist a couple of days earlier.

"One thing I do know," she said, "we need a really good turnout at Remembrance Day ceremonies this year to show our support for our people in uniform. Our thoughts and prayers are with the families of our murdered soldiers."

"That seeker should...regard backbiting as grievous error, and keep himself aloof from its dominion, inasmuch as backbiting quencheth the light of the heart, and extinguisheth the life of the soul."

Justice in London, Ontario," she wrote. "The owners of the property are still the Vandroemme family and Eso Agri Canada Inc. I hope this clarifies the issue."

JM Pellerin, the developer who represents a group who have made an offer to purchase the property, said that he hoped to hear back from the SPMD some time in the next week. "The property title has always shown the Vandroemmes as being the owners," he said. "What is on title is a caution by the Government of Canada."

What that means in practical terms is that any transfer of the property would need to be signed off on by both the Vandroemme family, the company and the Canadian government in order to move forward.

Mr. Pellerin said that he had difficulty understanding the position of the government on the property. "The funds from any sale of the property goes into a trust fund," he said. "You would think that the government would prefer that they hold the money instead of having to manage a property."

The impact of the convoluted control of management of the property has led to severe deterioration of the site, par-

ticularly the Royal Michael's Bay Restaurant, which was forced to close due to leaking and water damage over last winter. "The manager had told SPMD that if something wasn't done there would be grave consequences," said Mr. Pellerin. In the wake of that missive, the owners of the property apparently received an email from SPMD indicating that the government would soon be entertaining competitive bids on the property despite the offer to purchase made by Mr. Pellerin's group.

At peak operation, the restaurant employs as many as a dozen workers, noted Mr. Pellerin. Those workers have been unable to report to work due to the state of the restaurant facility.

"There are all kinds of people who will be employed in the development of the property as well," said Mr. Pellerin. "I don't understand why the government would want to stand in the way of that happening." To create that needed local employment, he contends, the government does not have to do anything. "They just have to get out of the way," he said. "We want to expand on what is there to make it economically viable and sustainable."

In the meantime, Mr. Tracy has vowed to continue his

battle to ensure the historical Michael's Bay townsite and its graveyards are preserved from development.

Mr. Pellerin is on record as promising to respect any proven graveyard on the property and as to the townsite's future, he has also been clear. "Make us an offer," he said.

KAGAWONG—It has been a century since the youth of Manitoulin answered the call to fight for king and country in the War to End All Wars and this year The Old Mill Heritage Centre's Remembrance Week annual military exhibit is placing a special focus on the Great War as they present 'A Salute to our Veterans and Their Families.'

"This is the greatest collection we have ever had," enthused museum curator Rick Nelson. "This will be the largest collection we have ever put on display. In fact, it will be the largest collection on display in all of Manitoulin Island."

The pieces in the collection are on loan from the Irish Regiment and from private collections on Manitoulin. The bazooka being held by museum board member and councillor

and medals on display." Mr. Nelson explained that this year, the prime focus will be on materials from the First World War. "It being the 100th anniversary of the start of the First

World War we felt it would be appropriate."

As is the custom for military exhibits by The Old Mill Heritage Centre, the display will end on November 11, as the ceremonies recognizing the contributions of Canada's veterans takes place at the Park Centre in Kagawong. "The Irish Regiment will once again be sending an honour guard and there will be lots of local veterans on hand."

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District Services Board pleased with 2015 budget

Less than one percent increase for Island municipalities

ESPANOLA—Members of the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) are giving themselves a pat on the back this week as the board passed the DSB's over \$30 million budget with only a 0.86 percent increase to its member municipalities for services.

The board made a point of noting in its final resolution, however, that due to its commitment to the five-year EMS staffing plan (which in 2015 means an increase in staffing to the Killarney, Gogama and Folyet EMS bases) this created the 0.86 percent increase. Without this factor, the

budget would have decreased by -0.13 percent.

The Territories Without Municipal Organization (TWOMO), of which Dawson and Robinson are a part, will see a rise of 1.59 percent in service costs, which are paid by the province.

Of the \$30,525,483 budget, the municipal share is \$11,280,264 or an increase over 2014 of 2.45 percent. The TWOMO share comes in at \$174,800, or 1.59 percent, while the municipal share increase is \$95,043 or 0.86 percent.

The following is a breakdown of the 2015 budget: Ontario Works, \$7,541,747; Children's Services, \$5,030,677; Social Housing, \$3,611,131; EMS,

\$14,441,091; and interest revenue, -\$99,163 for a total of \$30,525,483.

"I am happy to go back to my council and say 'look, we're finally getting it, we're done'," Central Manitoulin's Derek Stephens said.

The final resolution to pass the budget was made by Mr. Stephens and seconded by Espanola councillor Jack McMillan.

DSB Chair Les Gamble thanked chief financial officer Connie Morphet and the staff for their work on the budget. "They know the predicament municipalities are facing and want to make sure EMS is well-equipped," he said.

After 35 years in politics (less a three-year hiatus), Gary Brown will be leaving municipal politics with the outcome of this election.

"A lot of people ran their own campaign, and I just went on my past record," he said. "I don't think the (Manitou River) bridge project helped much," he added, referring to the overdue bridge reconstruction project.

"Eric's (Russell) an honourable man and I hope he does his best for this municipality," Mr. Brown said.

"After 35 years I have a new lease on life," he continued. "Next year I'll be 60

and I've given up the best years of my life for this job. No one likes to lose but I can bow out gracefully as I've accomplished a lot of projects over my years."

"I wish them the best," Mr. Brown concluded.

It was a tight race in Gordon/Barrie Island with Lee Hayden's votes for reeve totaling 221 earning him the seat at the head of council over opponent Barbara Barfoot who garnered 141 votes. Mr. Hayden's council will include Ted Culgin (275 votes), Bill Baker (270 votes), incumbent Betty Noble (244 votes) and Perry Patterson (267). Defeated were candidates Sea Mars-

land (41) and Adrienne Merylees (155).

"I'm feeling elated," said Mr. Hayden. "I'm really looking forward to leading the next council. I congratulate my opponent on her campaign and her efforts. I think we have a great group of councillors and I look forward to the next four years. Three of the council members are new so we will be spending some time come December getting everyone up to speed, but I look forward to this council's fresh ideas. My main objective will be transparency for my term in office."

In Cockburn Island, one of the oldest incorporated municipalities in Northern Ontario, voters elected two new faces to its council table, Robert Brown (77) and Glen Cressman (79), choosing to keep Evan Papineau (54) and Don Rogers (89) as elected officials for this term. Brenda Jones was acclaimed as mayor of Cockburn Island. Jason Stewart received 15 votes while incumbent Scott Stewart had 50 votes.

There will be familiar faces around the council table in the Northeast Town with acclaimed incumbent Mayor Al MacNevin taking the lead, joined by Ward 2 incumbents Michael Erskine with 278 votes, Bill Koehler with 454 votes and Melissa Peters with 262 votes, Ward 3 incumbent Marcel Gauthier with 113, Ward 4 incumbents Dawn Orr with 313 votes, Paul Skippen with 366 votes and Bruce Wood with 331 votes. New to the council table is Ward 1 representative Laurie Cook with 87 votes who beat out incumbent Christina Jones (17 votes). Defeat-

ed candidates include Martha Boyle (Ward 2, 176 votes), Tom Spry (Ward 2, 186 votes), Debby Turner (Ward 2, 235 votes), Mike Bailey (Ward 3, 56 votes), Tony Ferro (Ward 4, 252 votes), Dan Leblanc (Ward 4, 184 votes) and Jamie McCulligh (Ward 4, 141 votes).

In Assiginack Township, voters, like the Northeast Town, chose to go the familiar route and voted for incumbents Bob Case (385), Leslie Fields (458) and Brenda Reid (362). Rounding out the council table is Hugh Moggy (476), who has served in the capacity of reeve or councillor for Assiginack in the past for 34 years, losing his seat in the last election but gaining it back on Monday. Paul Moffat, who sat as a councillor during the last term, was acclaimed as reeve last month. Fionn Closs came in with 279 votes while Cole Bowerman, Assiginack's youngest candidate, received 231 votes.

In Killarney, Ginny Rook was elected as the new mayor with 443 votes, defeating Geoff Cosh with 358 votes. For Ward 1, Debbie Burant (330 votes), Eileen Lewis (300 votes) and Nancy Wirtz (333 votes) were all elected to council. Ward 2 councillor Pierre Paquette and Jim Rook were acclaimed. Defeated for council was Greg Seguin (Ward 1, 206 votes).

In the Township of Burpee-Mills, incumbent Ken Noland was acclaimed as reeve, as was the rest of his council. Incumbent councillors Wayne Bailey, Lyle Honess and Pentti Palonen will all sit for the

next term, joined by newcomer Art Hayden.

Gore Bay did not have an election for council either as incumbent Ron Lane was acclaimed as mayor along with incumbent councillors Yvonne Bailey, Jack Clark and Ken Blodgett who will be joined by new councillors Larry Eirikson, Dan Osborne and Kevin Woestenenk.

In the race for Manitoulin Island trustee on the Rainbow District School Board, veteran and incumbent trustee Larry Killens was handily re-elected with 2,722 votes while first-time challenger Maureen Egan polled 2,199 votes.

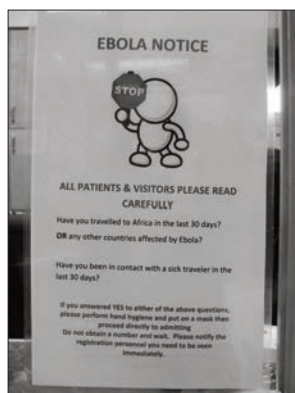
Ebola readiness and patient screening efforts on at MHC

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) has moved forward with the latest provincial directives for Ebola, including patient/visitor risk screening and with increased staff protection, despite the low risk of local transmission.

Patients and visitors to MHC's two sites will notice new signs around the hospitals with screening steps in place, designed to identify those who may be at increased risk for Ebola infection.

The screening is designed to identify those who have travelled recently to potential problem areas and who may be showing symptoms, including fever.

In addition, MHC's Ebola Readiness Committee has been moving forward with plans across many departments, leading the various steps that would be required to safely handle the assessment, initial treatment and transfer of a positive case to Health Sciences North in Sudbury (the designated treatment site for Northern Ontario). Initial stocks of gloves, gowns, masks and other types of personal protec-

tive equipment (PPE) are on hand to aid in staff safety. Training for staff in the proper use of PPE is a priority for the Readiness Committee.

Although the risk of contracting Ebola remains low in Ontario, local hospitals are working closely with the Ministry of Health, Public Health, the North-East Local Health Integration Network and the Ontario Hospital Association to make sure the local health system is ready to respond to any potential increases in positive cases in the province.

...continued from page 11 meeting minutes with council.

"Things have slowed down," said Councillor Gauthier. "But right now we are where we should be in our projected budget for this time of year. We have had to fix some of the runway lights because wolves had been chewing them."

Councillor Gauthier added that the airport had two new potential clients looking for storage (in hangars).

Council supports Killarney

The Northeast Town council carried a motion to support the Municipality of Killarney regarding the new OPP billing model and a resolution requesting that the province implement a billing method "for those properties located in unorganized townships so that they contribute their fair share to the overall provincial policing costs."

Fire Department report

Northeast Town Fire Department Chief Darren Bailey reported to the community services and public works committee that there had been 53 calls for service so far this year.

Most recently, "there was a single vehicle accident on Burnett's Side Road on September 28, a CO alarm on Campbell Street East on October 5, a propane leak on Campbell Street West on October 7, a chimney fire on Red Mill Road on October 18 and a house fire in Sheguiandah on October 21."

He also reported that all the apparatus and equipment was in good working order.

Community services and public works reports

Mr. Williamson explained that both Reid Taylor and Gary May were unavailable to deliver their reports as they were working on a force main break on Robinson Street.

According to Mr. Taylor's report, the ice at the recreation centre is being used regularly and user groups are using the rooms weekly.

"Staff are completing maintenance tasks daily and are finishing the floors and painting," continued the report. "The new dishwasher is installed and the Circus Jonathan event went over very well."

He also reported that the marine facilities were closed for the season and that the dock disconnection and relocation was underway.

As for the public works report, grading and patching is being completed, weather permitting, and culvert replacement is being done where needed.

"The landfill is back to Tuesday and Saturday openings," the report continued. "The docks are removed in the rural areas and we will be closing parks for the season. The equipment is working well. The new public works garage building is coming along well. They are working on the roof

and the floor is to be poured this week."

Councillor Paul Skippen asked when the new building was to be completed. Mr. Williamson responded that the company was working diligently and that the project is to be completed by December 31.

Building controls

Brock Sanftenberg reviewed the building controls and bylaw report. "To date the department issued 59 building permits with an estimated construction value of \$3,452,579 (not including the municipal garage)," said Mr. Sanftenberg. "The parking is being monitored and tickets issued on violations."

Mayor MacNevin read a letter to council regarding Mr. Sanftenberg's good work and informed council that Mr. Sanftenberg would be leaving the Northeast Town and had accepted a job in Peterborough. Councillors congratulated Mr. Sanftenberg and wished him well in his future endeavours.

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farm facts and furrows

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Frame's effect on cattle

For most cattlemen, cow maintenance costs are the major production cost for the cow herd. Larger-framed cattle weigh more at maturity and therefore have higher maintenance needs. These cattle will need to have additional growth genetics to generate increased income to offset the increased cow feed cost. This cost/return balance is important to determine management systems. For example, if larger feeder calves are desired and replacement heifers are retained, it may result in larger mature cows that will increase feed costs, or if feed resources are not increased, the herd's reproductive performance will suffer.

Frame's effect on feedlot performance and carcass weight: As a general rule, larger-framed cattle tend to grow at a faster rate when striving to reach their optimum heavier finish weight. Therefore, large-framed cattle require

greater amounts of feed and have greater expenses due to longer growing periods in the feedlot. The real problem occurs when cattle of varying frames are fed together to a constant endpoint. The average of the group will meet a desirable finish, but there may be a large percentage of over- and under-finished cattle in the group. Grouping cattle according to type going into the feedlot or sorting the cattle out as they finish is essential in producing a uniform, acceptable product.

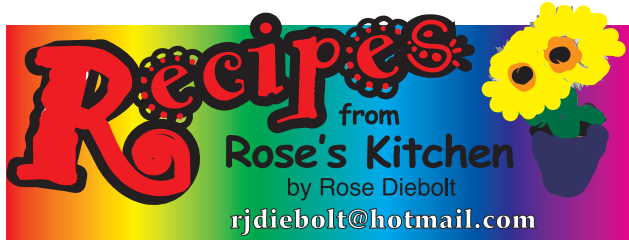

Every now and then I clean out the fridge and am amazed at what I find at the back of the fridge, tucked in behind the something else! I guess when it is out of sight you forget to use it and then it becomes "compostable" or "oh, I need to use it now." I found a package of cranberries to use in a new recipe.

Kale Salad with Cranberry Dressing

I find that when you make a salad with kale, dressing on, it will keep in the refrigerator up to three days (longer if you forget). The leftover dressing will keep in the fridge for two weeks. I used Savoy cabbage instead of the kale and if you don't have either use mixed greens. Cinnamon is not one of my favourite spices so I interchanged it with grated rind of one orange. If you find the dressing to thick thin it out with extra water or olive oil.

6 cups kale, de-stemmed and torn into bite-sized pieces
1/4 cup chopped pecans or walnuts or pumpkin seeds

DRESSING

1 cup fresh or frozen cranberries
1 cup chopped onions
2 garlic cloves, minced
2 Tbsp balsamic vinegar
2 Tbsp maple syrup or honey
1/2 tsp ground black pepper
1/4 tsp cinnamon
1/4 tsp sea salt
2 Tbsp olive oil

To make the dressing, in medium saucepan over medium heat, combine all dressing ingredients, except olive oil. Bring to a boil, reduce to a simmer, cover and cook for 10 minutes. Cool for 10 minutes then transfer to a blender or food processor and add olive oil. Pulse to combine, leaving dressing slightly chunky for texture. Cool completely.

To prepare salad, in large bowl, tenderize kale by gently squeezing the torn leaves (this breaks down the fibres). Mix in the chopped nuts. Toss with 1/2 cup of the dressing (or more to taste).

Cover and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. The salad can be eaten at room temperature.

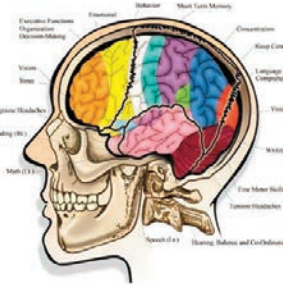
