## Attempted murder charge laid after Wiky hit and run Victim remains in coma

WIKWEMIKONG—The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) North East Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) Acting Detective Inspector Dave Robinson, have made an arrest in relation to the ongoing investigation of a serious motor vehicle collision that has left a young man in a coma.

As The Expositor reported last week, 31-year-old David Andrew Oshkabewisens (known to his friends as Andy) was hit by a truck on Sunday, November 2 at 2:40 am while walking on Wikwemikong Way on the Wikwemikong First Nation. The driv-

er of the vehicle fled the scene, leaving Mr. Oshkabewisens on the side of the road with serious, life threatening injuries. He was transferred to the Manitoulin Health Centre in Little Current where he was airlifted Sunday morning to Sudbury where he remains in a coma, but in stable condition.

On Sunday, November 9, Wikwemikong Tribal Police and the OPP arrested and charged 48-year-old Noel Darin Peltier of Wikwemikong Unceded First Nation with attempted murder and failing to remain at the scene of a collision, contrary to the Criminal Code.

## Health Canada survey claims energy-producing windmills safe for human proximity

CANADA—Last week, Health Canada released its landmark Wind Turbine Noise and Health Study which the ministry called "the most comprehensive study of its kind," finding that there are no ill effects on health for those living within close proximity of wind turbines, but local wind farm opponents say the study is flawed.

Health Canada, in partnership with Statistics Canada, conducted the study between residents of southern Ontario and Prince Edward Island (PEI), where turbines are prevalent, "to better understand the impacts of wind turbine noise on health and well-being," a press release states. A total of 1,238 households participated out of a possible 1,570.

The study was comprised of three parts: an in-person questionnaire given to randomly selected participants living at var-

ious distances from wind turbines; a collection of physical health measures that assessed

## Ethics training mandated, fine levied against dentist following service withdrawal over wind turbine stance

TORONTO—The case of Gore Bay dentist Dr. Bill Studzienny was presented before his peers at a November 7 disciplinary hearing of the Royal College of Den-

tal Surgeons of Ontario in Toronto after being charged with professional misconduct for refusing to serve supporters of wind turbine projects on Manitoulin Island. Dr. Studzienny had maintained that he was so upset by the issue that his hands shook so badly he could not safely work on wind turbine supporters.

The dentist refused service to members of the M'Chigeeng First Nation band council, which has built two turbines and, as part of the UCCM Mniidoo Mnisning Power Corporation, has partnered with Northland Power's 24-turbine McLean's Mountain project as well as at least one member of the Northeast Town council where the McLean's Mountain project is located, leading to accusations of human rights abuse and engendering a heated debate on the subject in the community and online at The

## Wiky's Josephine Pelletier receives Ontario Senior Achievement Award

TORONTO—When Josephine Pelletier retired from teaching after 34 years in 1988 she took a year to “get a few things I had put aside done.” Then she rolled up her sleeves and really got to work volunteering with a number of local organizations. On October 29, Ms. Pelletier received her due recognition when Lieutenant Governor Elizabeth Dowdeswell presented the Wikwemikong elder, volunteer and actress with an Ontario Senior Achievement Award.

“I am delighted to honour these 20 seniors who have so generously contributed to the strengthening of communities in Ontario—and even throughout the world,” said Lieutenant Governor Dowdeswell. “Through their leadership, wisdom and talents, they bring us inspiration. We can create just and sustainable communities in Ontario.”

Ms. Pelletier was among the three Northern Ontarians who were honoured at this year's awards as outstanding seniors who have made “significant contributions to their communities and the province.”

The process of even being nominated for the award takes dedication and determination on the part of the nominators, who must gather documentation and information to be submitted as part of the nomination. That process began in July, when folks at the Wikwemikong Board of Education decided to put Ms. Pelletier forward for the award.

“It was all very hush, hush,” laughed Ms. Pelletier after she got back home to Wikwemikong. “Every now and then somebody would let something slip, but then they would put their finger to their lips and say ‘I am not supposed to say anything.’”

As time went on, Ms. Pelletier began to think she hadn't made the grade. “I just kind of forgot about it after a while,” she said. “Not everybody who gets nominated gets chosen.”

But her dedication to keeping the Ojibwe language and culture alive and service to her community was far from forgotten; that selfless dedication brought her to the forefront of nominees. When the notice that she had been selected came about two weeks before the ceremony, it came as a surprise.

A member of the Wikwemikong Board of Education who has served on the boards of the Amikook Seniors Centre and Rainbow Lodge, Ms. Pelletier began her formal schooling in 1940 when she attended the St. Joseph Girls' School in Spanish. Ms. Pelletier said that she took away many good memories from there and “learned a lot.”

Following her completion of Grade 10, Ms. Pelletier continued with her Grade 13 in Pembroke, where she graduated in 1951 and then went on to teachers' college in North Bay. Over the next 34 years, Ms. Pelletier taught in a number of schools, got married and had “five beautiful children.”

Not content to rest on her education laurels, Ms. Pelletier worked diligently on upgrading her credentials through summer courses, securing her BA and B.Ed. Ms. Pelletier finally retired in 1987. “I thought I might stick it out to 35 years, but then I thought there were a lot of young people who needed jobs,” she recalled.

She may have retired, but that certainly did not slow Ms. Pelletier down. She continued to substitute teach at various schools on Manitoulin Island and then took on a gig at the Ojibway Cultural Foundation (OCF) in M'Chigeeng. “I did a lot of translation work for the OCF,” she said. She went on to be an instrumental part of the Anishinabemowin Teg Language Conference at Sault Ste. Marie.

In recent years she has been involved in sitting on language committees with a focus on curriculum development that supports teachers with language

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## Wikwemikong launches Anishinaabe language app

WIKWEMIKONG—The next time you are searching for the perfect phrase in one of the Three Fires Confederacy languages, Odawa, Ojibwe and Pottawatami, remember that there is now an app for that.

Shane Cooper, Wikwemikong's Language App Coordinator, headed up the project to create a 21st century resource for those working on retaining and strengthening the region's indigenous languages.

“The Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve chief and council have made an investment in language retention and promotion by utilizing modern technology,” said Mr. Cooper. “The ancestral language of the community is Odawa,” he explained, “but the app now includes all three distinct dialects of the Anishinaabe language.”

The language app, now available on Google Play and soon to be available in the Apple Store and iTunes, will work on both the Android and Apple platforms for smartphones and tablets.

“The new app is an excellent tool that can be used to assist us in our 10-Year language strategy plan to preserve and retain the language of our nation here in Wikwemikong,” said Wik-

wemikong Chief Duke Peltier. “This new technological tool is a viable option to provide easy access to our language for our youth and others who want to learn the language. This is an exciting development for us.”

“Wikwemikong language speakers are a valued asset throughout the Great Lakes region,” said Wikwemikong Band Councillor Luke Wassegijig. “We now have a modern technological tool that we can use to teach our children the language while at the same time, offer a viable product to the market.”

Mr. Cooper explained that the process of developing the app began in 2013, when the Naagdaawendaandaa Anishinaabemowin subcommittee of the Wikwemikong Heritage Organization determined through its regional gatherings throughout the Wikwemikong territory that the “most important outcome from these gatherings is the recognition and acknowledgement that retention of the language is critical.”

“It started out as an Odawa language app, but because of the three dialects of Anishinaabemowin it grew to encompass all three,” he said. Mr. Cooper noted that the nuances of Anishinaabe-

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## Ontario re-introducing invasive species legislation, protecting Ontario against invasive species

TORONTO—Ontario is taking action to protect communities from invasive species through prevention, early detection, rapid response and eradication of invasive species in the province.

The Ontario government re-introduced the proposed Invasive Species Act, 2014, which the government claims, if passed, will protect the province's natural environment from invasive species and the significant social, environmental and economic costs they pose for Ontarians.

The act would give Ontario the tools to ban activities such as possessing and transporting certain invasive species, allow the government to intervene earlier and enable rapid response actions, including working with partners to stop an invasive species from spreading (for example by preventing the movement of contaminated firewood) and help promote compliance through inspection and enforcement measures.

Preventing the spread of invasive species supports the government's economic plan for Ontario. The government says the four part plan is building Ontario up by investing in people's talents and skills, building new public infrastructure like roads and transit, creating a dynamic, supportive environment where business thrives and building a secure savings plan so everyone can afford to retire.

“Invasive species pose a significant risk to our natural environment and our economy. This legislation would make Ontario a national leader in invasive species prevention and management,” said Minister

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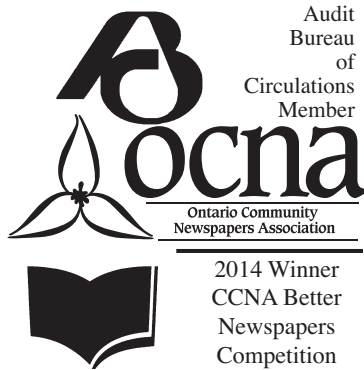

## Ghomeshi affair has opened an important dialogue

It's become a truism to observe that the legacy of CBC's pop culture show Q's fired host, Jian Ghomeshi, will be to open the doors wide to a national, even international, conversation about the extent of violence to women both outside and inside the workplace.

Would national Liberal leader Justin Trudeau have moved so quickly last week to boot two now former Liberal MPs out of his caucus after two female NDP MPs spoke to him of inappropriate behaviour by the two men, had Mr. Ghomeshi's very public firing for behaviour on the same spectrum not been so prominently in the news?

The chances are that he would not have taken this step quite as quickly as he did and apparently without any consultation except with the complainants.

The next day NDP Leader Thomas Mulcair complained that the two female complainants from his caucus had no expectation that their complaints would lead to such a public airing of the matter when Mr. Trudeau called a press conference to name his own party's apparent perpetrators and to dismiss them. Mr. Mulcair stated that his MPs could feel re-victimized by the publicity although Mr. Trudeau certainly did not name them nor did he indicate of which party they were members, apparently, and ironically, leaving this to the NDP themselves.

Federal Green Party Leader Elizabeth May quickly went on the record in support of Mr. Trudeau's actions, saying that "he was damned if he did and damned if he didn't" act promptly and decisively when the allegations had been brought to his attention.

Mr. Trudeau's response in the light of all that has happened since the country heard about Mr. Ghomeshi's firing was likely coloured, to a greater or lesser extent, by the CBC's dismissal of its media star and the "going public" shortly thereafter by the two women who claimed he had abused them in non-consensual situations.

These two public events—Mr. Ghomeshi's firing by the CBC and Mr. Trudeau's firing of two Liberal caucus members about a week later—have bookmarked this debate, at least so far.

But the conversation goes on in every major news media that must be taken to be a very positive thing to all of the people, not all of them women, who were already concerned at the way girls and women are still very much objectified in our society.

No charges have yet been laid against Mr. Ghomeshi although two women have formally complained to Toronto police about his past actions in their relationships following his dismissal by the CBC. In anticipation of charges being eventually laid, Mr. Ghomeshi announced last week he had hired a prominent defense attorney.

Mr. Ghomeshi's popular Q radio show, that runs weekday mornings, made him a national star, and this fall from his status as a prominent positive to that of a prominent negative reference gave the national conversation an enormous kick-start.

Whatever happens to Mr. Ghomeshi in the long term will happen.

What is much more important is the new voice that has been made available to women, and men too, at every strata of Canadian society.

Just now, as previously noted, the discussion so far has been maintained by and among the nation's chattering classes and in the past two-plus weeks, this has played out on all major national television networks, large daily newspapers like the Toronto Star and Globe and Mail and on Ontario's own TVO network where evening host Steve Paikin has led several discussions on the topic.

But the possibilities for positive changes based on this high-profile incident are limitless: Mr. Ghomeshi's first accuser, actress Lucy Decoutere, is also a career army officer who holds the rank of captain.

Within the nation's military organizations, like the one to which she belongs, there have long been charges of ingrained sexism with women the target group. We have heard the same charges leveled at the RCMP and various other police organizations across the country.

Ms. Decoutere, in making her brave public declaration and then taking her concerns to the Toronto police force, becomes a national role model for all women in uniform.

The assertion that violence, sexual or otherwise, by men directed against women is unacceptable at any level is self-evident, a simple truism and is based on such a simple thought that, in an ideal society, such a statement should not ever have to be made.

But, unfortunately, it's necessary to re-state this over and over and parents of both genders should use the current conversation as a prompt to teach their sons the proper ways of interacting with girls and women just as their daughters must be taught the total unacceptability of being on the receiving end of this kind of social behaviour and what to do about it.

Mr. Ghomeshi's firing and the ensuing discussion, leading directly as it did to Mr. Trudeau taking the two female NDP MPs complaints as gospel and then firing their imputed abusers apparently on their say alone, must surely add credibility to the demand by the collective Canadian aboriginal community that the government of Canada must convene a commission to investigate the disproportionate number of missing and murdered girls and women from First Nations backgrounds.

The whole topic is of vital importance as our society proceeds into an environment that is more and more influenced by the Internet and social media, the only real antidote to which is one-on-one common sense and the goal of an enhanced collective wisdom (something we once had, seem to have lost, and need desperately to reclaim).

If Mr. Ghomeshi's personal debacle has turned a brighter light on these topics of vital importance, then the only way to keep it lit and focused is to demand changes for boys and men to act respectfully and responsibly towards girls and women.

With November here we are challenged to remember and learn from the past wars and peacekeeping efforts, as we celebrate Remembrance Day on November 11. As a child we remembered our departed veterans including my uncle Doug Wagg, who died in the war, by participating in Remembrance services in our public and high school, community, church, and cenotaph sites. It was a special time in that my Dad, the late Dufferin Vincer Brown, also served overseas coming home to create a houseful of baby boomers—born after the end of World War II. As this old baby boomer ages I contemplate the act of remembering, and find myself identifying with my Mom, the late Marion Laurel (Wagg) Brown, who was prone to be forgetful. # Survey Says...

## Part V: Surveying Manitoulin's Tehkummah, Allan, Campbell and Carnarvon Townships

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This week Shelley Pearen continues her series on the 19th century Manitoulin surveys. The January 15 and 22, April 2, and July 9 2014 editions of *The Expositor* carried her accounts of Manitoulin's initial survey, the Anishinaabe reaction to the surveyors and the surveyor's descriptions of Assiginack, Bidwell, Billings, Howland and Sheguiandah Townships.

The surveying of Manitoulin proceeded despite the ongoing protests by the Anishinaabe residents against the 1862 treaty. Five townships were surveyed by the end of 1864. Concurrently the Anishinaabeg carried out a campaign to have the treaty cancelled. They petitioned the governor repeatedly and successfully captured the attention of the nation's journalists and members of Parliament.

In March 1864 the Anishinaabeg issued a statement for the press: "We, Indians of the Ottawa and Chippewa Tribes, sole proprietors of the Great Manitoulin Island, do wish to inform all the colonists and speculators desirous of securing lands in the aforesaid Island, that we never ceded to the Government, our rights to any portion thereof and consequently the Crown Land Department can neither cause the said Great Manitoulin to be surveyed, nor put up for sale, or alienate any portion of the aforesaid Island, which we possess in common." The following year, in July 1865, a grand council was held in Wikwemikong where a petition was written to the governor demanding the cancellation of the treaty and signed by 17 of the 18 treaty signatories.

Nevertheless the surveying continued as did local superintendent Charles Dupont's attempt to assign the Anishinaabe residents to specific lots. Tehkummah township was surveyed in 1866. Allan and Campbell in 1867, and Carnarvon was partially surveyed in 1867.

### Tehkummah

George Brockett Abrey surveyed a large portion of Tehkummah township in 1866. "The whole south shore of the township, bordering on Lake Huron, extending inland a distance of a couple of miles, is a smooth limestone rock, supporting a growth of small cedars growing very closely together, with some spruces, balsams, birches and balm of Gilead intermixed." He described the soil as sandy in the hardwood ridges and clayey loam in the swampy areas.

Abrey recommended South Bay for a town plot. It had an excellent harbor and was "one of the best fishing stations on the island." South Bay was a traditional Anishinaabe fishing settlement but most of the original inhabitants had already been persuaded to relocate according to the terms of the 1862 treaty. Apparently by 1866 only "a few Indians, remain at the point, at the entrance to South Bay, during the fishing season."

Michael's Bay was the site of an ancient Native settlement. Within months of the survey it was transformed into a timbering and sawmill settlement. By the fall of 1867 it was home to about 20 sawmill workers. Abrey described "Michall's Bay" as a good place for fishing but lacking security as a harbor for large vessels.

He was not overly impressed: "At present the township offers very little inducements to the settler, the south side being barren, the township of Sandfield on the north unsurveyed, and Assiginack not opened up, renders this township quite isolated.

Tehkummah must be settled from towards the north, as in that direction will be the markets, and in that direction lies most of the best of the land." He recommended constructing a road between South Bay and Manitowaning to encourage settlement.

Like most of his colleagues Abrey was skeptical about Manitoulin's land, but unlike his colleagues he actually settled on Manitoulin where he continued to work as a surveyor for many years. In 1867 alone he surveyed Tehkummah, Campbell and Carnarvon townships.

### Allan Township

Francis Bolger surveyed Allan Township in 1867. "The portion of the township best adapted for agricultural purposes lies to the south of the line between the 8th and 9th concessions." "I did not deem it necessary to sub-divide, acting according to your instructions, that no lands unfit for settlement were to be surveyed."

"The greatest variety and the best quality of timber, as also the richest agricultural lands, are invariably to be found around Kagawong and Ice Lakes." A belt of excellent hardwood that was used by the Indians as a sugar-bush was noted in the central part of the township.

Kagawong Lake "abounds in whitefish, bass, herring, and other varieties of fish, affording the Indians living on its shores an

inexhaustible supply of food." The Kagawong River's potential was noted.

Ice Lake was described as very shallow, with some fish, and some excellent and timbered land bordering its eastern and western shores.

The Indian village of Kagawong was reduced to four houses by 1867 because many residents had already been relocated according to the terms of the 1862 treaty. Bolger did not have high hopes for Kagawong village because of the shallow water and exposed position of Mudge Bay.

### Campbell

George Brockett Abrey surveyed Campbell Township in 1867. "I have to regret that very little land suitable for settlement was found in any portion." He described the land as quite level with rock lying within a very few inches of the surface covered with a few inches of vegetable deposit. "In some places a few inches of light sand intervenes between the rock and the surface deposit."

Abrey explained that "it is possible that some small patches of good land may exist which were unobserved at the survey in consequence of the considerable depth of snow which concealed the ground at the time, but they cannot be sufficient extent to be worthy of search or the attention of the agriculturalist." He described the township as covered in cedar, balsam, spruce, birch,

and balm of Gilead, except for some spots of maple hardwood.

### Carnarvon

George Brockett Abrey surveyed part of Carnarvon Township in 1867. Edgar Bray completed the survey in 1870. Abrey's report was not favourable. "Excepting a narrow strip of land on each side of the Portage Road" between Mindemoya Lake and Providence Bay and a strip extending into the Township of Campbell, and others just east and west of Lake Mindemoya "no land exists within the survey fit for agricultural purposes." "The soil in these sections is a light sandy loam, pretty free from stone and timbered mostly with hardwood chiefly maple. The remainder of the township, except where swamps occur and around Providence Bay, is a smooth limestone rock covered with a few inches of sand."

Abrey found a large cedar swamp south of Lake Mindemoya and several smaller swamps. At Providence Bay the "tract of red and white pine of inferior quality stretches a belt of about a mile in width" but "its quality and quantity would not, in my opinion, warrant its being advisable to set it apart for lumbering purposes."

"The advantages for settlement here are the fisheries of Mindemoya Lake and Providence Bay, taken in connection with the small quantities of good land intervening that might be divided into small plots for producing vegetables and food for their owners."

In 1867 when Abrey visited he found Anishinaabeg living along the river between Providence Bay and Mindemoya Lake, and around the southwestern shore of Mindemoya Lake.

Edgar Bray surveyed the eastern half of the township as far south as range B. He declared that less than half of the 22,000 acres he surveyed were suitable for settlement. Bray found an abundance of cedar, some pine largely birch, spruce, ash, balsam, and a few tamaracks, and elms.

As the surveyor's worked the Providence Bay Mill Company was setting up a large lumbering operation with a grist mill, post office, farmland and stores.

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# Assiginack Council Notes

## Assiginack Museum doings

Curator Jeanette Allen noted in her October board minutes that 947 people visited the museum this season. The museum hosted five bus tours, the Community Heritage market and an Heirloom Quilt Show.

In 2015 the board will begin planning for its 60th anniversary season.

## Cheque registry

Council passed a motion to approve accounts payable in the amount of \$404,224.48, general, and \$17,117.30, payroll.

## Drinking water inspection report

Council reviewed its latest drinking water inspection report from the Ministry of Environment with the municipality in full compliance with all standards. Reeve Brad Ham did note with some annoyance, however, that under the heading 'other inspection findings' the municipality was taken to task for its recent purchase of used membranes for its water treatment plants.

"As noted during previous inspections, the membrane filtration technology used in the Manitowaning plant has become obsolete and the type of membranes used are no longer manufactured," the inspection report states. "The Township of Assiginack has addressed the short term implications of this issue and has purchased all available replacement filters. They are also planning to purchase additional membranes from a nearby water treatment plant using the same membrane technology that is currently undergoing a retrofit."

"Although the purchase of the replacement membranes will allow the plant to continue operating for a number of years, it should be viewed as an interim solution," the report continues. "The long term operation of the treatment system remains a concern and the Township of Assiginack is strongly urged to plan, both operationally and financially, for the ultimate replacement/retrofit of the membrane technology in the plant."

CAO Alton Hobbs said he would like to see an engineer's report to back up those statements.

"It was a very poor choice of wording in that report," the reeve added.

## Wikwemikong seeks support

The Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve sent a request to Assiginack seeking a motion of support for a Wikwemikong Centre of Diabetic Excellence, which they did with great gusto.

"It's always nice to support our neighbours," the reeve said.

"It's a great idea," Councillor Les Fields added.

## Christmas fun

This year's Parade of Lights will be held on Friday, November 28 during the annual Manitowaning Christmas Madness event. The community is encouraged to get involved by lighting up a float and entering the parade. There will also be community events throughout the evening for the whole family.

Assiginack is also sponsoring another great event: the Catch the Candy Cane Contest.

Between November 20 and December 20, 20 two-foot candy canes will be hidden throughout the township. Residents of Manitoulin will be encouraged to find all 20 candy canes. Once this is done, your name will be entered into a draw for gift certificates from each of Assiginack's 11 businesses. See a future ad in this paper for more details.

## Backflow bylaw

Council passed bylaw 14-26, "being a bylaw to establish a backflow prevention program for buildings receiving potable water from the corporation for the Township of Assiginack."

The bylaw applies to all lands, buildings and structures connected to a municipal water treatment plant and municipal distribution system within the jurisdiction of Assiginack henceforth.

The owner of lands, buildings or structures being serviced by a municipal water supply or system shall be responsible for all costs associated with the installation, testing, operations and ongoing maintenance of the backflow prevention device.

## Weighted Vote

Assiginack Reeve Brad Ham noted to his council, upon review of the September 30 Manitoulin Planning Board minutes, that the vote on the proposed weighted voting system at the planning board table had finally passed and that it involved "quite the discussion."

Reeve Ham explained that the weighted vote, when requested by the municipality in which the planning issue under considerations is located, will be based upon a number of votes pre-amalgamation, meaning Assigi-

nack will have one but the Northeast Town will have three votes, as will Central Manitoulin, while Burpee-Mills and Gordon/Barrie Island each have two votes.

"Hopefully it works out," the reeve said.

## Chief Building Official report

Council reviewed a report from Chief Building Official (CBO) Gerry Strong about a recent conference he attended in Niagara Falls where two issues came to light that "directly affect (the) municipality."

"The smaller issue is related to our Emergency Management Plan," Mr. Strong wrote. "The 2012 disaster in Goderich illustrated the need for the CBO to be a member of the Emergency Control Group. In their situation several buildings were damaged and orders had to be issued to demolish or repair. The CBO was hindered in the performance of her duties because her exclusion from the Control group."

"The more shocking issue," he continues, "is the dramatic increase in liability for municipalities due to the issuing and non-issuing of building permits. With the increased use of title insurance, municipalities are being sued by insurance companies for permits issued as far back as 20 years. The duty of care is no different for small, rural municipalities with part-time building inspectors than it is for large municipalities with full-time building departments."

Mr. Strong concluded by calling the continuing practice of part-time building inspectors "questionable."

While council agreed with what Mr. Strong had to say, the reeve said he doubted if the municipality could ever afford a full-time CBO.

CAO Alton Hobbs said he would like to begin discussions with the Northeast Town to see about sharing its building inspector. "We likely wouldn't need someone from, say, November to April, but come May we will," Mr. Hobbs said. (The Northeast Town has both a CBO, part-time, and a building inspector, full-time.)

"The arrangement we have now is not good," Councillor Paul Moffat said. "It's too hard for him (CBO) to cover everything."

## Accounts for payment

Council passed a motion to issue payments for the general account, \$159,419.39, and payroll, \$17,634.03.

## Application for consent

Council received an application for consent from the Manitoulin Planning Board "to provide for the technical severance of Lot 7, Concession 7 together with right-of-way."

The reeve explained that the severance is not in Assiginack, but on a shared concession with the Northeast Town.

Council moved that "we inform the Manitoulin Planning Board that we have no objection to Consent Application B 29-14, provided that the municipalities have not opened the road allowance between concessions 6 and 7 Bidwell Township, east of the Bidwell Road, and confirming that Assiginack has no intention of, and will not be providing any maintenance on this road allowance, and that the current and future owners be requested to complete a 'hold harmless' agreement, protecting this municipality from any liability claims for use of this unopened road allowance."

## Landfill expansion update

Assiginack council received word that the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry species at risk study was completed and that "preliminary results indicate there are no red flags." Once the study is finished, it will be incorporated into the municipality's Ministry of Environment's environmental assessment submission and posted on the ministry's Environmental Registry.

"If no issues or further comments are raised within 60 days after posting, we will submit a study completion notice to the MOE at which time we can commence the Environmental Compliance Approval application with the local MOE to construct and operate the landfill expansion," writes John Smith, solid waste management practice lead, Exp. Services Inc.

"It's been seven years," said Reeve Ham. "When you can actually see the light at the end of the tunnel, I think that's a good thing."

## Commercial unit write-off

Council passed a motion, recommending a tax write-off of a vacant industrial unit located on the Assiginack side of the Manitoulin East Municipal Airport as of October 1 and as such has filed a tax appeal.

regarding the incident, the police team were treating the investigating as a "serious motor vehicle collision." The Expositor contacted Community Services Officer Constable Allan Boyd last Monday evening after learning from Mr. Oshkabewisens' girlfriend, Bronte Peltier, that a witness had reported seeing a vehicle "speed up and hit him."

"He was alone at the time, but apparently a kid saw the whole incident from his front porch on Wikwemikong Way. He (Andy) was crossing the road by Andy's, going onto Sesame Street when a dark red Ford pick-up sped up and hit him," said Ms. Bronte.

Constable Boyd said at the time he was unable to confirm that a witness had viewed the incident directly or that the vehicle had "sped up," repeating that the incident was being treated as a "hit and run."

When asked this week what had led to a change in the investigation and subsequent attempted murder charge, Constable Boyd explained, "As a result of the work of investigating detectives, charges were laid of attempted murder. Witnesses came forward and as a result there was evidence to support the charge."

"The (OPP) Forensic Identification Unit has been on scene (in Wikwemikong) since the incident and has collected evidence that will be part of the case," Constable Boyd responded to questions about evidence found on Mr. Peltier's truck. "The investigation is still ongoing and police are continuing to seek the public's assistance and asking anyone with information about this crime to call the OPP at 1-888-310-1122, Wikwemikong Tribal Police at 705-859-3141 or if you wish to remain anonymous call Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS)."

As to Mr. Oshkabewisens' condition, his brother Jason Oshkabewisens spoke with The Expositor Monday, reporting that his brother remains in a coma, with lacerations to his kidney and liver and brain injuries, but is stable.

"Andy is still in a coma, but in a stable condition," said Jason Oshkabewisens on route to visit his brother in Sudbury along with their mother Jennifer. "We are hoping for a very positive turn in his condition."

"My mom received word yesterday (from the OPP) that they had someone in custody and evidence he was responsible for hitting Andy," continued Mr. Oshkabewisens. "My mom said it was a big weight taken off her shoulders that someone had been arrested. Now we can focus all our energy on Andy getting better."

Mr. Oshkabewisens said that the fundraising efforts for his brother and the family have been going well with over \$3,000 being made at the fundraising bingos last week.

"It's moments like these I am so proud to be from Wikwemikong," Mr. Oshkabewisens concluded. "We are so grateful for everyone's support and well wishes. It has been very heartwarming. We also want to thank the investigating officers, the forensic unit and the many officers from Wikwemikong Tribal Police Services, United Chiefs and Council of Mnídoo Mnísing and the Ontario Provincial Police for not giving up on the investigation."

"Dr. Studzienny pled guilty to professional misconduct in four complaints," said Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario Registrar Irwin Fefergrad when contacted Monday. Dr. Fefergrad said that Dr. Studzienny was fined \$4,000, must write a

letter of apology and has been ordered to take a course in professional ethics, a sentence largely congruent with that handed down by the Ontario Human Rights Commission heard earlier this fall. "He has also been reprimanded," said Dr. Fefergrad. "That stays in the online registry."

The panel considered a joint submission on the

issue before rendering their decision, noted Dr. Fefergrad. "The detailed reasons for the decision will be on the website in about three weeks," he added.

"The complainants were very satisfied with the apology," said Dr. Fefergrad.

M'Chigeeng First Nation Chief Joe Hare described his reaction to the conclu-

sion of the issue as "partial satisfaction."

"It is unfortunate that this ever occurred," said Chief Hare. "There is the fact that he is apologizing." Chief Hare said his ambivalence to the resolution was in that the dentist was "being forced to apologize."

Dr. Studzienny was unavailable for comment.

stress levels using hair cortisol, blood pressure and resting heart rate as well as measures of sleep quality; and more than 4,000 hours of wind turbine noise measurements conducted by Health Canada to support calculations of wind turbine noise levels in all homes in the study.

Health Canada broke the findings into five parts: illness and chronic disease, stress, sleep, annoyance and quality of life and noise.

Under illness and chronic disease, Health Canada states, "no evidence was found to support a link between exposures to wind turbine noise and any of the self-reported illnesses (such as dizziness, tinnitus, migraines) and chronic conditions (such as heart disease, high blood pressure and diabetes).

Under the heading of stress, Health Canada states no association was found between the multiple measures of stress (such as hair cortisol, blood pressure, heart rate, self-reported stress) and exposure to wind turbine noise.

As for sleep, "the results of this study do not support an association between wind turbine noise and self reported or measured sleep quality." However, the study states, while some people reported some of the aforementioned health conditions, their existence was not found to change in rela-

tion to exposure to wind turbine noise.

An association was found, however, between increasing levels of wind

turbine noise and individuals reporting to be "very or extremely annoyed," the report continues. "No asso-

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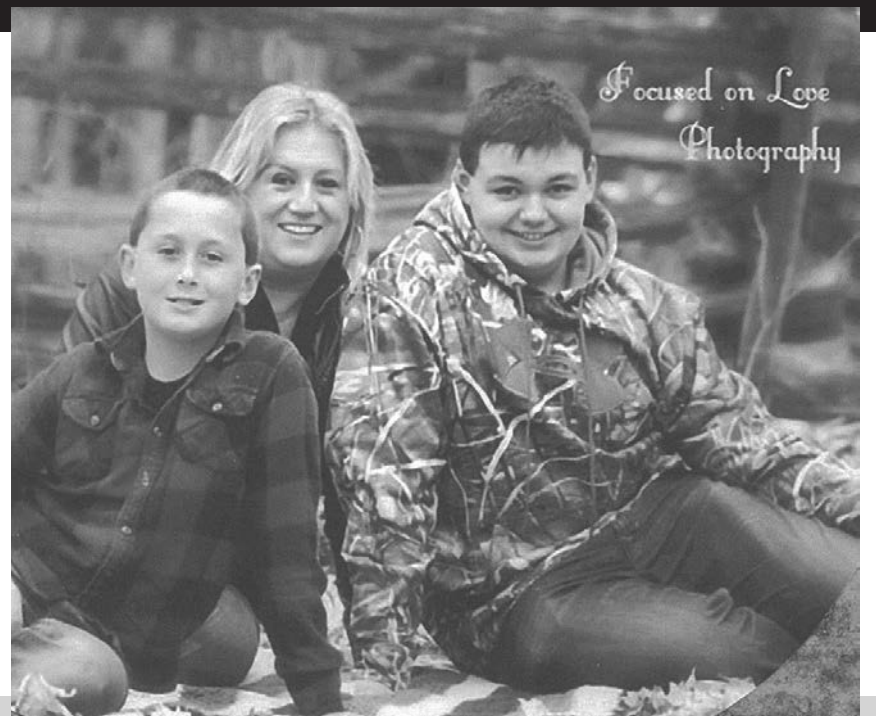

mowin take on slight variations in the different communities of Wikwemikong. "In the village itself it can be sort of a combination of all three," he said. As the three language groups come together in Wikwemikong's largest community, they have tended to become somewhat mixed and mingled.

Once the idea to produce an app was decided, Mr. Cooper was brought on board for his expertise as a graphic designer and marketer and he brought with him a solid dose of reality. "I think the committee originally thought that this would be a quick project," he laughed. In fact, creating an application took a remarkably quick turnaround of nine months, despite its increased complexity.

The original idea was simply a list of nouns and verbs, but language is far more complex than that. "They said to us, 'okay, we know how to say the nouns and the verbs, but how do we use them in a sentence?'" recalled

Mr. Cooper. The app soon expanded into common phrases and conversational sentences.

Mr. Cooper started out at a tiny desk on the ground floor of the WHO building, but it wasn't long until the upstairs of the building, largely utilized for storage, was reorganized to create a studio and much larger work-

space.

The project, which is funded by the Wikwemikong Band, took on an experienced partner, Thorton Media Inc, a Las Vegas based group of software developers who have created applications for over 200 North American tribal groups spanning the entire continent. "They helped us a great deal," said Mr. Cooper.

The resources available through the Wikwemikong Board of Education's language resources project were also a major boon to getting the project up and 'complete.' But Mr. Cooper noted that as a living language, Anishinaabemowin continues to create words to describe the many new things that appear in the modern world.

With the success of the app now complete, the WHO has been inspired to take on a new challenge. "We are getting into animation," said Mr. Cooper. "We are looking at a series that will be similar to a Dora the Explorer format."

of Natural Resources and Forestry Bill Mauro. "Working with our key partners, our proposed Invasive Species Act will serve as a critical tool in our collective fight against the growing threat of invasive species in Ontario."

"I am pleased the Ontario government has re-introduced the Invasive Species Act, a positive step in the fight against invasive species," said Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH) Executive Director Angelo Lombardo. "The sale, movement and importation of invasive species in Ontario are serious concerns. This legislation will provide the minister with the much needed tools to immediately react when a new species or threat is identified."

"Invasive species have already impacted our lakes and woodlands, and the potential long term economic impact is staggering," explains OFAH Invasive Species Program coordinator Matt Smith. "The cost of not addressing this threat to our environment and the economy can be meas-

ured in the billions of dollars."

The Invasive Species Act would position Ontario as the first and only jurisdiction in Canada to enact standalone invasive species legislation.

Invasive species costs to the environment, agriculture and communities, including control costs, are estimated at \$1.4 trillion globally. That is the equivalent of five percent of the global economy and seven times the cost of natural disasters.

"She is one of the busiest ladies I know," said Amikook manager Kim Genereux. "She has a lot of talents, quilting is only one of them. She is very strong on family and family values. She is an inspiration."

Ms. Pelletier said that she especially enjoyed her time volunteering with Meals on Wheels. "I would take my grandchildren with me to meet the elders," she said. "There are a lot of little memories."

The Honourable Mario Sergio (Ontario Minister

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# Wikwemikong Economic Awareness Days work toward a sustainable future

**WIKWEMIKONG**—The 14th annual Zhiimaachtaan Economic Awareness Days 2014 has as its motto 'E'Gaakikaabminaagok Kwiinwin (A prosperous and sustainable future)' and the Wikwemikong Development Commission (WDC) (Enaadmaagehjik) is looking toward an exciting new era in economic development in the community complete with a new board made up of (mostly) new faces.

The WDC hosts Economic Awareness Days each year as a means to both bring a greater transparency to the work of the economic development organization with the hope that greater knowledge in the community of the initiatives being undertaken will result in stronger public support for those endeavours.

"We are trying to make economic development a priority and to gain support for the projects we are doing," said WDC general manager and economic development officer Mary Lynn Odjig. "The Economic Awareness Days provides a lot of the people who are working on the projects at WDC an opportunity to show people in the community what they are working on and where the projects are currently."

Ms. Odjig said that she was very proud of the work that her team at WDC have been doing and that she was excited to work with the new board members toward creating a prosperous and sustainable future.

The new five-member WDC board will serve for the next two years and consists of returning board member Lloyd McGregor and newcomers to the

board Lynn Brissard, Dallas Bondy, Thecla Neganigijig and Jason Oshkawabesins.

Economic Awareness Days began with a traditional smudging ceremony and an honour song and prayer by Franklin Fisher and Adam Kaboni followed by welcoming remarks by Lawrence Enosse and Wikwemikong Chief Duke Peltier.

Some of the exciting new projects that WDC is working on is a wood pellet manufacturing facility and a biomass innovation centre. Project Manager Dawn Lambe spoke on those opportunities. These projects herald an approach of "thinking outside the rez" when it comes to economic development. The opportunities to create revenue generating operations for the band do not necessarily have to be located within the boundaries of the band.

"The wood pellet project is a good example of that," said Ms. Odjig. The band has already had some success with projects that extend beyond the boundaries of the reserve. "We are working all across southern Ontario with a company that builds solar

power projects," she said. Ontario Solar Provider Inc. partnered with the WDC to build a significant installation in Barrie, for the Ontario National Training Rinks. That 200 kilowatt system will annually generate more than 262,000 kilowatt hours of clean electricity for the province of Ontario while the profits from the endeavour will help build a more sustainable economy for the WUIR by providing a new income stream for the bands operations.

Over the course of three days community members learned about dozens of economic initiatives being worked on within the community, such as the Art Authentication Seal presented by arts coordinator Mike Cywink.

Mr. Cywink explained that the seal was available to certify the works of local artists and artisans. "We need people to come forward to sign up for the program," he said. By applying the Art Authentication Seal, the artists work will have an appellation that will help consumers determine that a piece that is authentic and the work of a Wik-

wemikong artist. From bee keeping to maple syrup production, fishing and agriculture, golf courses and wild rice production, the economic projects in Wikwemikong span a wide range of activities that run the gamut from the traditional to the ultra high tech, such as FirstTel TV5.

The conference sponsors include government ministries such as the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs and the Indian Agricultural Program of Ontario, local businesses such as Steel-

hawk Buildings, Your Dollar Store, FirstTel, the Biomass Innovation Centre and Rainbow Ridge Golf Course, as well as band

organizations such as the WUIR Department of Lands and Natural Resources and Housing as a Business.

ciation was found with any significant changes in reported quality of life or with overall quality of life and satisfaction with health." This was assessed using the abbreviated version of the World Health Organization's Quality of Life Scale.

Lastly, under noise, calculated noise levels were found to be below levels that would be expected to directly affect health, according to the World Health Organization Community Noise Guidelines, 1999.

The study locations were drawn from areas in Ontario and PEI where there were a sufficient number of homes within the vicinity of wind turbine installations. Twelve and six wind turbine developments were sampled in Ontario and PEI, representing 315 and 84 wind turbines, respectively. All potential homes within approximately 600 metres of a wind turbine were selected, as well as a random selection of homes between 600 metres and 10 kilometres.

In a Monday interview with The Expositor, Ray Beaudry, president of the

Manitoulin Coalition for Safety Energy Alternatives Inc., called the study "a slap in the face of the people who are suffering."

He said the study seems to be industry-led due to what he calls the push for turbines by the government, noting that the study participants did not include those "forced out of their homes" from ill health due to turbines.

"It hasn't been researched by peer reviewed articles either," he said. "It's just a summary, not fully reviewed."

Mr. Beaudry said his family has filed 41 noise complaints citing vibration, amplitude, grinding gears and high pitched noises, to name just a few of the disturbances, none of which have been answered by the Ministry of Environment.

"It's the mandate of the government to push these things through," he added.

Following the release of the study last week, Wind Concerns Ontario announced they would be convening an expert panel to review the findings.

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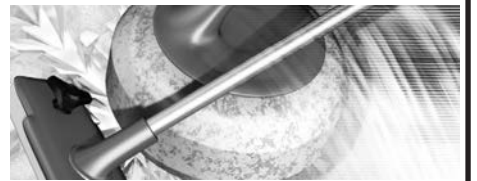

with youth discovering their favourite places to play outside and looking at where in their communities they can find those places,” explained Ms. Babcock. “After collecting their thoughts we start talking to them about their health and linking active play with their overall wellbeing. Our goal is to improve communities so kids can find more places to spend active time outside. Later this afternoon, we will be working with the youth outside, playing traditional games and teaching through play.”

Ms. Babcock shared that as a follow up to the event, community leaders from across Manitoulin would be meeting this week to look at how the communities can initiate change to improve access to outdoor spaces and active transportation (ie. bike trails, routes to school).

“KidActive fosters the development of healthy kids through active outdoor play, learning outside and active transportation,” explains the KidActive website. “We know that increasing the daily physical activity levels of children and youth posi-

tively impacts their mental and physical health. Research supports the built and natural environments as determinants of children’s health and wellbeing. Our work focusses on getting more kids outside with inspiring, safe and natural environments in their communities—nearby and accessible.”

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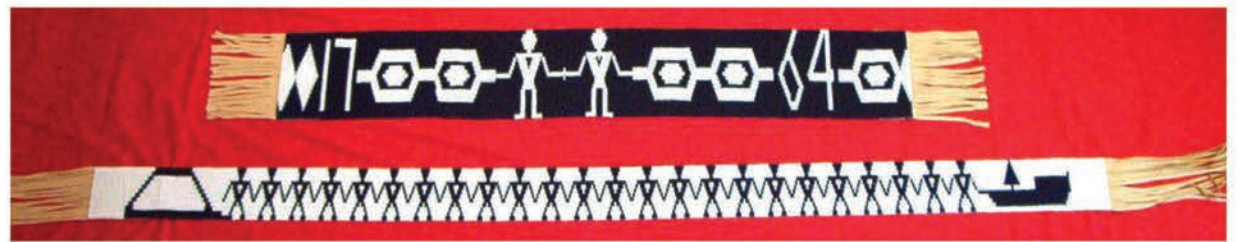

# Expanded Little Current daycare boasts more room for early learners

**LITTLE CURRENT**—Last month, in partnership with the Rainbow District School Board, the Little Current Daycare Centre (formerly the Magic Rainbow Daycare) expanded its early learning space. This means the Little Current facility can now increase its Ministry of Education licenced spaces.

The daycare's toddler room has doubled its capacity from five children to 10 and can now welcome 16 pre-school-aged children, 10 Junior and Senior Kindergarten and 30 school-aged children.

And thanks to funding from the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB), the daycare has been outfitted with new furniture and equipment too.

Now all the Little Current Daycare Centre needs is the children to fill those added spaces and will be inviting parents and guardians to come check out the daycare.

"It's an exciting time in early childhood education because there is a lot more focus on early learning," explained Diana St. Pierre, children's services program director with Manitoulin Family Resources (MFR). The Little Current Daycare has registered and approved early childhood educators (ECE), licenced and regulated through the College of Early Childhood Educators, working with enrolled children in order to "provide developmentally appropriate activities based on the children's interests and needs," Ms. St. Pierre explained.

"And being at the school (Little Current Public School), the daycare gets the children ready for school and familiarized with their surroundings," she said.

Ms. St. Pierre spoke of the emergent curriculum of play-based learning being phased in across registered daycare facilities. In a statement from the Council of Ministers of Education, Canada, they write: "The benefits of play are recognized by the scientific community. There is now evidence that neural pathways in children's brains are influenced and advanced in their development through exploration, thinking skills, problem solving, and language expression that occur during play."

"Research also demonstrates that play-based learning leads to greater social, emotional, and academic success. Based on such evidence, ministers of education endorse a sustainable pedagogy for the future that does not separate play from learning but brings them together to pro-

mote creativity in future generations. In fact, play is considered to be so essential to healthy development that the United Nations has recognized it as a specific right for all children."

"Learning through play is supported by children," the statement continues. "It is their natural response to the environment around them. When children are manipulating objects, acting out roles, or experimenting with different materials, they are engaged in learning through play. Play allows them to actively construct, challenge and expand their own understandings through making connections to prior experiences, thereby opening the door to new learning. Intentional play-based learning enables children to investigate, ask questions, solve problems, and engage in critical thinking. Play is responsive to each child's unique learning style and capitalizes on his or her innate curiosity and creativity. Play-based learning supports growth in the language and culture of children and their families."

Putting it simply, the early learning activities are based on the children's interests. If, for example, Johnny took a trip to a farm and came back to the daycare, excited to share all that he saw and learned, the ECE would pick up on this and use Johnny's farm adventure for lessons. This could range from farm animals, the food we eat, farm implements and so on. The lessons could last for days or even weeks, as long as the children are interested.

The MFR Best Start Hub and Home Child Care Office in Little Current has also moved into a new room in the Little Current Public School since the

addition to increase daycare spaces.

The Manitoulin Best Start Hub offers early learning, school readiness, parent supports, community events and referral services.

"Come out to see what your Best Start Hub has to offer," Ms. St. Pierre urges. Eligible participants must be 18 years of age or younger at the time they submitted an entry, enrolled in an Ontario school, self-identify as an aboriginal person and be a permanent resident of Ontario.

# Health Canada consumer product safety experts visit Manitoulin

*Things you don't want to buy at the local yard sale*

LITTLE CURRENT—When a consumer walks into a store in Canada there is a sense of confidence that the products sitting on that store's shelves are safe to bring home. Ensuring that sense of security is based on fact is the job of people like Health Canada's Consumer Product Safety Officer Farah-Michelle Manigat. Ms. Manigat dropped by The Expositor's offices recently to go over how the federal ministry helps to protect Canadian consumers from dangerous or defective products.

Trailing behind Ms. Manigat was a large purple-wheeled suitcase that the safety officer opened to reveal an interior packed to the seams with examples of toys and clothing that do not make the safety grade to be sold by Canadian retailers and are as such banned in Canada. Along with the tools were a set of machined stainless steel tools designed to test toys, soothers and other common items that could present choking hazards for young children.

One example of such a hazard appeared to be every baby parent's dream machine, an automatic baby bottle holder that can attach to the side of crib, stroller or high chair. "This is banned in Canada," explained Ms. Manigat. "There is no way for the child to remove this from their mouths." The result is that a child could easily choke or drown while the parent's attention was distracted.

One baby soother in the safety officer's bag appeared to be a safe bet as it did not pass through the opening of the tool. But when a product is likely to be boiled as

Health Canada's role in promoting public safety, the types of dangers to be aware of with children's toys and clothing and how to promote accident prevention.

In addition to the work of the safety officers, Health Canada maintains an active website where consumers can register concerns, find out about the latest recalls and check products, particularly second-hand items to find out if they have been subject to a recall or safety ban.

"Health Canada helps protect the Canadian public from potential health hazards by posting

up on a chair," she said. "When he jumped off the chair there was no one there to save him. He hanged himself."

Any cord that can form a loop is a danger to young children and if the cord hangs down, it can easily become a hazard. Ms. Manigat described another recent incident where a cord dangling from a young child's jacket became caught in a school bus door. "Luckily the driver noticed in time and the child was not dragged far when the bus left," she said.

Wherever possible, cordless is best. Even Roman blinds can pose a hazard should one of the slats become detached.

Chemicals in the home can also present a danger to young children and should always be kept out of reach and under lock when young children could be present. That includes grandparents' homes, where child safety practices might be a little rusty.

The inspectors visit retailers to check on compliance and if they find products that pose a safety hazard they inform the store that the products must be removed from sale. Retailers are usually very compliant. "The only time

it is mostly up to manufacturers and importers to ensure that the products they offer for sale meet proper standards. "The onus is on industry," said Ms. Manigat. All manufacturers and importers are required to report any issues with

As many regulations south of the border are not as stringent as those in Canada, that includes products made in the good old USA. Canadian officials have met with their Chinese counterparts to bring them up to date on our standards as well to ensure that exports from that country meet Canadian requirements.

During the Christmas gift buying season, shoppers should pay particular attention to anything that could be pulled off of a toy and be swallowed or present a choking hazard to a young child.

"Make sure the product is age appropriate," said Ms. Manigat. "Check the label on the toy." Even if your child or grandchild is amazingly advanced for their age, as most grandparents will surely attest is the case, resist the temptation to move the toy up an age category.

"Make sure there are no small parts," she said. One of the examples from her voluminous suitcase of maleficent toys is a set of strong magnets that can be formed into various shapes. Those parts can also be easily swallowed and can puncture or perforate a child's bowels, often

part of the sterilization process, as a soother will many times over, it also must meet the test after being boiled. A second example of the soother showed that the boiled version had shrunk dramatically, easily slipping through the tool

advisories, warnings and recalls from industry concerning consumer products," explained Ms. Manigat. Those warnings are not meant to endorse any products or companies. "The recall and safety alerts database provides easy access to a comprehensive list of recalls, advisories, and safety alerts," she explained. "This database includes recalls from Health Canada, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency and Transport Canada."

There are many hazards that can exist in children's homes, noted Ms. Manigat, and one of the focusses of their efforts are publicizing those hazards people should look for in their homes. Drawstrings are a particular issue and a number of children have died over the past few years when a drawstring on their jackets or hoodie is caught in playground equipment, but that is not the only source of dangerous strings, she cautioned, holding up a set of blinds.

Ms. Manigat relayed the story of a recent tragedy in which a young child was playing Peter Pan. "The child tied the (blind's) cord around his neck and climbed

we usually find an argument is if the retailer is frightened that they are in trouble," she said. If a retailer balks at removing the items for sale, the inspectors do have the authority under the Canadian Consumer Product Safety Act to seize the offending product.

Another key product that the officers watch for is clothing, especially sleepwear. Loose cotton can be a dangerous material in children's clothing she explained. "Young children will not know to stop, drop and roll if their clothing catches fire," she noted.

Health Canada also keeps an eye on many products for adults,

their products that come to light or are reported to them. "If a company becomes aware of a safety issue, they are obligated to let Health Canada know."

These rules apply regardless of where the product is manufac-

with little early evidence beyond a sore stomach for a doctor to go on.

"If a product becomes damaged, check to see if there is a repair kit available from the manufacturer," she said. "Check on the Health Canada website (www.hc-sc.gc.ca) to check if the product has been subject to a recall."

The website provides a wealth of useful information to consumers and consumers are encouraged to report any incidents they encounter with a product. On the form available online are places to indicate what happened and the product's model and/or UPC number.

While Health Canada tries to ensure that all products sold in Canada are safe for consumers, the best line of defence in public safety is an informed consumer.

opening—presenting a definite danger to a child's breath if swallowed.

Ms. Manigat explained that she and her fellow safety inspectors travel to communities across Canada to meet with public health nurses and early childhood educators to deliver presentations on

November is marching on with Christmas right behind. For me it is time to start thinking about the food to organize during the holiday season, for parties, presents and cookie exchanges.

The following recipe you can make ahead and it is excellent on top of a Brie appetizer (quick and simple) or with chicken.

**Apricot Chutney**

You can keep it in an airtight container in the refrigerator up to one month. For long-term storage, chutney can be transferred into sterile mason jars and processed in a water bath.

- 4 cups dried apricots, quartered
- 2/3 cup raisins
- 2 large cooking apples, peeled, cored, diced

- 2 onions, finely chopped
- 5 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh ginger
- 1 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1 1/3 cups brown sugar
- 4 cups water
- 2 cups cider vinegar
- 1 tbsp yellow mustard seeds
- 1 1/2 tsp whole cloves
- 1 1/2 tsp freshly cracked pepper
- 3/4 tsp ground allspice
- 1/2 tsp salt

1. Combine all ingredients in a large stainless steel pot. Place over medium-high heat. When it starts to boil, reduce heat to maintain a gentle simmer. Cook, stirring often with wooden spoon, until mixture thickens to your liking, 25 to 35 minutes.

2. Let cool. Then transfer to an airtight container and refrigerate.

TEHKUMMAH—A tar kettle headed up a rise in the Government Road in Tehkummah caught fire around noon on Wednesday, November 5, resulting in a spectacular if short-lived fire.

"They were coming from Sudbury with a load of tar for the work on the bridge," said Tehkummah Fire Chief Jeff Wilson. "They keep a flame lit under the kettle to keep the tar melted."

As the tar kettle was drawn up a rise in the road, tar appears to have leaked out and onto the flame. "The tar was coming out and pretty soon the whole thing was going up," said Mr. Wilson. "It did not take us very long to get there and about 15 minutes to put it out. There was a good bit of tar spilled out onto the road."

Tehkummah Reeve Gary Brown and Lyle Gordon, volunteers on the fire department, were also on the fire team that suppressed the fire. "I think they had the three oldest guys on the department out there," chuckled Mr. Brown.

The reeve said that he did not anticipate the fire causing a delay in completion of the work on the bridge, scheduled to be finished on November 14. "They must have found another tar kettle somewhere because that part of it looks to be done," said Mr. Brown. "It is a specialized piece of equipment."

The guardrails need to be installed on the bridge, as well as the completion of the paving, but it is likely that traffic will soon be flowing over the span.

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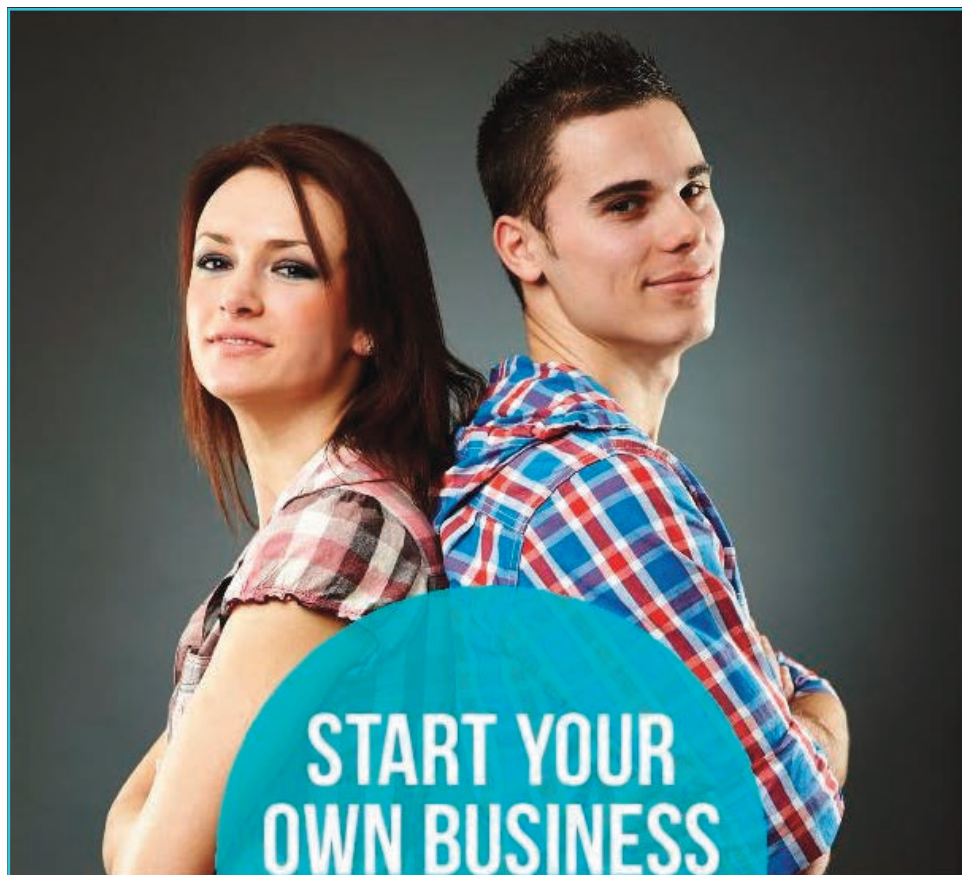

**Compost is the ultimate fertilizer!**

It contains virtually all the nutrients a living plant needs and delivers them in a slow-release manner over a period of years. Compost made with a wide variety of ingredients will provide an even more nutritious meal to your growing plants.

How it works: Compost serves primarily as a soil conditioner, whether it's spread in a layer on the soil surface or is dug in. A soil regularly amended with compost is better able to hold air and water, drains more efficiently, and contains a nutrient re-serve that plants can draw on. The amended soil also tends to produce plants with fewer insect and disease problems. The compost encourages a larger population of beneficial soil microorganisms, which control harmful microorganisms. It also fosters healthy plant growth, and healthy plants are better able to resist pests. On the garden: Some people recommend late fall as a good

time to spread compost over a garden bed (about 1 inch), and cover it with a winter mulch. If your supply of compost is really limited, consider side-dressing, a way to use compost sparingly by strategically placing it around certain plants or along certain rows. By spring, soil organisms will have worked the compost into the soil. There is really no wrong time to spread it. The benefits remain the same. Around trees: compost mulch can benefit trees and shrubs just as it does other plants. Spread a 1/2" to 1" layer of compost on the bare soil under the tree as far as the drip line. Then cover with a 2-3" layer of some other kind of organ-

ic mulch. The mulch will hold the compost in place and keep it from drying out.

**Fence line weaning**

Try fence line weaning or two-step weaning to reduce the stress on beef calves when you wean them this year. It could improve the health and performance of the calf. First, place cow-calf pairs in the pasture the calves will be in following weaning so they become familiar with the fences and water sources. Second, upon weaning, place the cows in the pasture adjacent to the calves so they cannot nurse the calves, but can still see, hear and smell each other. This may require some fence modification to keep cows and calves separated. Page wire and electric work well when calves are trained to the electric fence—the key is to maintain separation.

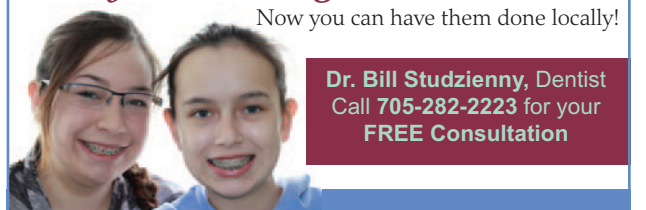
