Manitoulin association opposing wind turbines supports Charter challenge of Green Energy Act

LONDON—Monday saw the beginning of a three-day wind turbine appeal by the Coalition Against Industrial Wind Turbines (the Coalition) in the Ontario Superior Court of Justice in London, which is being supported locally by the Manitoulin Coalition for Safe Energy Alternatives (MCSEA) Inc.

According to the Falconers LLP website, the firm representing the Coalition, "at issue is the constitutionality of the government's approval process for wind turbine projects and their effect on human health for those living in close proximity to wind turbines." In effect, the province's Green Energy Act is being challenged under the terms of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms on the grounds that owners who live near approved wind turbine projects have had their guaranteed rights superseded by the Act.

Scotty and Jennifer Dixon, Thomas and Catherine Ryan, Shawn and Tricia Drennan and Kenneth George and Sharon Ann Kroepin are representing 'the Coalition,' "made up of 14 community-based public interest organizations with substantial interests in the outcome of the appeals," among them Manitoulin's MCSEA Inc. Other member groups hail from Niagara Region, the Counties of Haldimand, Middlesex, Lambton, Norfolk, Wellington, Dufferin, the Municipalities of Kincardine, Saugeen Shores, Grey Highlands, Central Huron and the Township of West Lincoln.

The Coalition will be using the arguments that an additional principle of fundamental justice, under Section 7 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, that arises on the appeals in the principle that a statute designed to protect health cannot be illusory and that the test for 'causation'

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Ontario Supreme Court establishes supremacy of aboriginal parents to choose children's medical treatments

ONTARIO—The Grand Council Chief of the Union of Ontario Indians is applauding the Friday decision of the Ontario Court of Justice, which ruled that a hospital couldn't force a First Nations girl from the Six Nations community to take chemotherapy. The girl, known as J.J., and her mother, D.H., have opted to use traditional medicines to treat the 11-year-old's acute lymphoblastic leukemia, ending her chemotherapy treatment 10 days into the 32-day course this August. This is the second child to have been withdrawn from Western medical treatment for an acute illness. The other, also a young girl, is from the Mississaugas of the New Credit community.

"Our people have been treating ourselves for thousands and thou-

sands of years," Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee told The Expositor. "Nobody has the right to impose their beliefs on a people."

NetCentral partnership completes seven-site cellular expansion on Manitoulin

Additional four-site West End project planned pending funding

SHEGUIANDAH—Representatives of NetCentral, Rogers, the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC), the Northeast Town and Island residents gathered last Thursday in Sheguiandah at one of the seven new cellular tower sites servicing Manitoulin to celebrate the completion of the cellular and mobile broadband services expansion project.

Funded by the NOHFC and Rogers, in partnership with NetCentral, the seven new Rogers wireless cell sites in service include: south of Espanola on Highway 6, Little Current, Sheguiandah, Manitowaning and South Baymouth; Mindemoya (Hwys 542 and 551); and on Hwy 540 northwest of M'Chigeeng. The sites provide cellular and high-speed Internet services via Rogers High Speed Packet Access (HSPA) Plus (+) technology.

"I would like to thank everyone for being here this morning," said Morry Brown, general manager of NetCentral, before introducing special guests including Northern Development Officer Amanda Gunner with the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines, founding chair of NetCentral Jim Gordon, Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin and Shane Kendrick, Derek Bain and Steve Norman of Rogers Communications.

Mr. Brown noted how the event marked a milestone for the Island, expanding wireless services and improving coverage for residents thanks to the partnership between NetCentral, Rogers and the NOHFC.

Mr. Gordon spoke on the history of NetCentral, explaining how the not-for-profit, community-based information and communications technology organization was born.

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Wikwemikong hit and run victim remains stable, still in hospital

Bail hearing for Noel Darin Peltier remanded until December 8

WIKWEMIKONG—Noel Darin Peltier, the man arrested and charged with attempted murder and failing to remain at the scene in relation to a serious motor vehicle collision earlier this month in Wikwemikong, appeared in court in Gore Bay this past Monday where his bail hearing was remanded until December 8.

As The Expositor previously reported, the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) North East Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) Acting Detective Inspector Dave Robinson, made an arrest on Sunday, November 9 in relation to the ongoing investigation of a motor vehicle collision that has left a young man with serious injuries.

Thirty-one-year-old David Andrew Oshkabewisens (known to his friends as Andy) was hit by a truck on Sunday, November 2 at 2:40 am while walking on Wikwemikong Way on the Wikwemikong First Nation. The driver of the vehicle fled the scene,

leaving Mr. Oshkabewisens on the side of the road with serious, life threatening injuries. He was transferred to the Manitoulin Health Centre in Little Current where he was airlifted Sunday morning to Sudbury where he remained in a coma until last week.

"He is awake now, but unresponsive," Mr. Oshkabewisens' brother Jason told The Expositor on Monday. "He is able to move his eyes and look around the room, but they still don't know the extent of his brain injuries. The doctors say some days he can do what they ask, but he can't speak right now and is still on assisted breathing. Our family is just happy he is awake and it is just a matter of time before he is responsive."

Jason Oshkabewisens was also pleased to report that the fundraiser held for his brother this past Friday at the Rainbow Ridge Golf Course was well attended and extended his family's thanks for all the support and well wishes from the community.

Mr. Peltier remains in police custody in Sudbury.

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

Children in poverty impacts all of society

Conference Board of Canada statistics indicate that, in 2014, one child out of seven in our country is deemed to live "in poverty," that is to say, there is insufficient household/family income for these "seventh" children to afford them the comforts that the other six children will take for granted: healthy food, warmth in the winter, adequate clothing for every Canadian season, the expectation of a stress-free education and home life, to name just a few ordinary expectations.

That "one in seven" formula translates to a percentage number of 15.1 percent of kids living in our seemingly wealthy nation born into families unable to provide them with what most Canadians expect will be their lot in life.

In the days of Prime Minister Brian Mulroney's second mandate, parliamentarians voted unanimously to end child poverty in Canada by the year 2000, to celebrate the upcoming new millennium (that was, at the time of the vote, more than a decade away) by having ended child poverty by that time.

That optimistic vote was taken in 1989, the year 2000 came and went and now, 25 years after the commitment by the House of Commons, it is still unfulfilled.

According to the Conference Board of Canada's research, our country scores 15th out of 17 peer countries. We are just behind Italy and slightly worse than Japan. The United States rates 15th with about 22 percent of children 17 years of age and younger living in circumstances where the disposable income is less than half of the median household earnings in that country and, of course, this is the same measure that is applied to Canada and the other 15 countries the Conference Board examined.

So what happened after the parliamentarians in Ottawa unanimously decided that, somehow, a redistribution of wealth was in order in this country back in 1989?

For one thing, the very next year, Canadians entered into one of our periodic episodes of recession and this was a situation that market forces took until 1993 to rectify. But during that period, Canadians' incomes purchased less and businesses of every stripe, large and small, realigned their priorities with the inevitable loss of jobs.

Canada, and Ontario in particular, saw an enormous outmigration of jobs starting about that time, a trend that, while it has slowed, still continues as the Canadian "branch plants" of international (usually U.S. based) businesses have closed their doors in this country and have correspondingly opened plants in the U.S., Mexico or another offshore country.

The "Great Recession" of 2008 hasn't helped either as many ordinary Canadians suddenly found that the savings they had invested as a nest egg for their eventual retirement were worth a good deal less from one day to the next.

And so it continues: some people are poor (have as household income less than half of the average Canadian family's earnings) because of job losses due to worldwide economic forces far beyond their control. Others are ill-equipped for the modern-day workforce because they have insufficient education or marketable skills to qualify them for anything but minimum wage jobs and still others sadly lack, or fail to master, coping strategies required to exist in today's wired world and this cadre of Canadians is often also lacking in the life skills (living on a budget, shopping strategically) that most people have learned along the way to adulthood.

These are just some of the reasons why Canada, in spite of that optimistic declaration by elected MPs a quarter century ago, has not made the progress on the child poverty file that had been anticipated then.

But this is a goal that we should not, in fact cannot, abandon.

To his credit, John Tory, mayor-elect of Toronto, has already stated that as a priority he will do whatever possible to diminish the level of child poverty in Canada's largest and wealthiest city.

Toronto will be a good model to follow because it has all to itself a myriad of agencies for whom Mr. Tory's pledge will, hopefully, inform priorities over the next four years.

For rural places like Manitoulin Island, we share agencies with our neighbours, often in jurisdictions encompassing much of Northeastern Ontario and so the successes Toronto may yield on this important file will be measurable and the methodology can be transferred to

rural and Northern reaches of our province.

From the mid-1960s to the present, nearly a 50-year span, two income families have been more and more the norm so that in 2014, one partner acting as the breadwinner while his or her spouse or partner has the traditional homemaker, stay-at-home mom/dad, role is so unusual as to be deemed quaint.

Beginning with the feminist movement of the mid-1960s, women more and more demanded to be in the workplace, at every level.

In traditional two-parent households, as both parents began to work regularly and contribute to the household income, coincidentally the cost of living began to rise concordantly. This is most blatantly obvious in the cost of home buying where, up until about 1968, a single family earner could reasonably expect to pay the bills, including the cost of a home mortgage, from one salary while the other spouse stayed home.

Not any more.

For those families ripped apart by family strife, where one parent has left home and leaving the remaining parent to both support financially and raise the children, there is usually little joy and an expectation that because of these circumstances the children in the home, through no fault of their own, will be raised below the poverty line and be numbered among the "one in seven" kids in Canada living in unfortunate circumstances.

It is our tradition, our expectation, that people either as individuals or as a family unit will as adults be able to look after themselves which, of course, means looking after the children they're rearing.

Governments of every stripe have been reluctant to give people living in straitened circumstances much more than minimal assistance because they do not want to discourage the attitude of self-sufficiency and in the hopes that people will eventually be able to solve their own problems, hauling themselves up, "by the bootstraps."

It's difficult to disagree much with this ideal.

But the social order of the country in which we live has changed so much since the revolutionary times of the mid-1960s that it is barely recognizable.

Unskilled jobs that require no education basically do not exist and, for people who fall into this category and do find work, their earnings are no match for the 21st century price of necessities such as housing, food, transportation and the costs associated with children's education, even at elementary and high school levels.

Even if someone with a college or university education is forced to continue living with their parents for a few years until their career is underway, they will be, in the course of their working lives, immeasurably better off and able to help care for their eventual children than their classmates who dropped out of high school or took no post-secondary education.

Having a substantial proportion of our country's youth raised with lowered expectations is not a healthy model for Canada to follow and so we must do whatever is possible to lower this number.

Mayor-elect Tory's promise was an important statement to Ontarians and Canadians so it will be significant to see how this city, as a microcosm of Canada, attempts to fulfill the new mayor's dream and promise.

Lowering the number and percentage of financially disadvantaged young people in our country is not merely reaching for an ideal; it is, in fact, of vital concern to the social and fiscal health of the Canada of the future and the other 84.9 percent of the 17-and-under group of young people who will be part of the 100 percent of up-and-coming who will run Canada in their day.

In very practical terms, this is also a public health and public safety issue as a disproportionate number of people convicted of violent crimes were raised in poverty, on the outside looking in at the good life that others seem to take as their right and, feeling they have no particular stake in the country or even their community, they are less constrained to lash out in a wide spectrum of anti-social behavior. Drug abuse and its attendant evils bear a direct relationship to the outsider mentality as we know only too well from various dire events on Manitoulin, right up to murder. Given Toronto's rising tide of violent crime, this is doubtless a contributing factor to Mayor Tory's promise.

Robbing Peter to pay Paul

How Canada stole from aboriginal schools and water plants

To the Expositor:

Aanii, hello, to all my non-aboriginal relations. I am Chief Shining Turtle of the Sturgeon clan, of Whitefish River First Nation of the Anishinaabe, which is near Sudbury.

I want to tell you a story about discrimination. It is a story that has been told for years by people living on reserves like the one where I live. It also a story that has long been denied or ignored. Now a document prepared by federal bureaucrats has been released that describes in cold, analytic and precise terms the yawning gaps between social services provided to aboriginal people living on reserves and everyone else.

The story goes like this:

Way back in 1995, when Québec almost separated Paul Martin was in charge of the country's finances and the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples was about to recommend a renewed respectful relationship between Canada and its Native people, Canada decided to put a two percent cap on increases to spending on aboriginal reserves for education, health and social services. No matter that inflation eats most of that growth, or that the aboriginal population has been growing at five percent a year. The two percent spending cap has remained in place in

place to this day, 20 years later, which means every year each individual receives less and less funding.

Imagine raising a growing young family on the paltry interest of Canada Savings Bonds and you get the picture.

Now compare the situation on reserves to what provinces spend on social services for everyone else. Provincial spending has grown at a much faster pace, at three or five or even six percent every year. For example, the federal government increases its health transfer six percent every year to the provinces, which allows provinces to keep up with rising costs and improve care.

Over time—and, like I said, it has now been 20 years of this—the gap between services on and off reserves has grown wider and wider. Every year, the difference compounds and the inequality becomes more and more grotesque. People living on reserves may seem like they live in a different world, but we are often literally your neighbours.

We are experiencing a slow motion march towards second-class citizenship. We're talking about billions of dollars that are not being spent on education for children, healthcare for the sick, and clean drinking

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Remembrance Day among the gravesites marking the front lines

We live in a charming fishing village on the English Channel. This village is between Calais and Boulogne-sur-mer in France. Each morning, as we drive the windy road to school, we notice the ships, seabirds and seals, as well as the chalk cliffs of Dover in the horizon. As we turn inland, we are surrounded by the open fields of sugar beets, canola, corn and flax; we always see many pheasants, rabbits and small deer. Amongst all this beauty, we also pass many concrete blockhaus and bunkers scattered along the shore and fields.

These structures were at the center of the Atlantic Wall, built by Field Marshall Rommel in anticipation of an Allied landing by sea. They are sobering reminders of what happened here in WWII. In fact, we live only 200 yards from several blockhaus structures on the shore. The four batteries built here housed the largest German canons that could shoot 56 kilometres into England and these

are part of our everyday scenery.

Last November 11, we went to the Calais Canadian War Cemetery close to us. It is a cemetery well maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, near Leubringhen and St. Inglevert. There are hundreds of Canadians buried here, along with some British, Australians,

ent avenues to acquire flags for the graves, I had almost given up. This past September, when we were home for my Mom's funeral, I happened to pass the Royal Canadian Legion in Gore Bay and thought I would try one last time to see if anyone could help us to achieve this goal. I was so fortunate to speak with Jim Wood, who not only got us enough

of the events that happened here. Although much of it is quite technical and complicated (like any action of war), here is a short synopsis of the operations.

The Canadian 1st Army landed on Juno Beach, Normandy, the 6th of June, 1944. After successfully liberating Caen, they continued up the coast, freeing Channel ports as they went. By mid-September, they arrived in the area of Boulogne-sur-mer.

Because of its location, it was heavily fortified and used as a major port for German submarines. There were approximately 10,000 German troops under the command of Lt. General Heim and, once the arrival of the Canadians was imminent, he ordered the destruction of the harbour.

The Canadian soldiers were led by General Spry, who planned Operation Wellhit to finally liberate Boulogne. They were also accompanied by a French corps of about 100 volunteers and aided by tanks that had flails in front to remove mines, 'crocodiles' which were tanks with flame throwers and troop carriers. They had 328 cannons, 17 artillery regiments, air support and cannons shooting from England. Because of the heavy fortification of this city, the soldiers had to take all the bunkers and blockhaus surrounding Boulogne first.

According to the testimonial of one civilian, there were at least 9,000 civilians left in the city. A negotiation between the Germans and the Canadians allowed them to leave the area, with one piece of luggage. He said that the Germans were understanding and even helped them safely negotiate the areas planted with mines.

Boulogne is an old medieval city that has a chateau and surrounding wall that was difficult to penetrate. The Canadians were led through a secret passage into the old city to break down the last of the German stronghold. The fighting began the 17th of September and by the 22nd the last of the Germans had surrendered.

The Canadians had suffered 462 deaths and 172 injuries and they had cap-

tured approximately 9,500 prisoners. Eighty-five percent of the city had been destroyed and 98 percent of the harbour. This harbour was very important to the Allies because it was needed to land more troops for the march towards the Rhine. Because of the utter destruction, no ship could get into the harbour until the 26th of October and a pipeline from England was built.


The Canadians, in the meantime, had departed right after the liberation of Boulogne-sur-mer and continued their march north, along the coast. They continued to destroy the heavy German batteries and bunkers as they headed towards Calais.

The operation to liberate Calais was called Operation Undergo. Calais was a necessary port, along with Boulogne and Dunkirk to supply troops and silence the heavy coastal batteries that threatened the ship-

ping to Boulogne, as well as the assaults on Dover and other places in England. The plan to liberate Calais followed the same approach as the operation that had worked in Boulogne: seal off the city, soften up the defenders with strikes from land, air and sea. Two hundred and sixty Allies lost their lives and approximately 9,100 German prisoners were captured.

I have tried to keep this simple and concise with the details as accurate as possible. It is a little of what happened in this area, where brave Canadians fought valiantly for freedom. When we visit the Canadian graves here from both WWI and WWII, I always think of the lines that Dr. McCrae wrote:

"We are the Dead.
Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn,
saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved,
and now we lie
In Flanders fields."

Czechs and Poles. The graves are generally, but not all, soldiers who fought in the operations to free Boulogne-sur-mer and Calais during WWII. As we walked along the graves and noted that there was no ceremony, not even a wreath, I decided that we should do something the following year.

After trying many differ-

ent flags, but sent them to us in time also! We were thrilled to receive them and ever so grateful to the Gore Bay Legion and Mr. Wood.

Last week, we returned to the Canadian cemetery with our box of flags. It was a beautiful sunny day and as we placed a flag on each grave, the sun sparkled off the white gravestones. Flowers are planted in front of each grave and the whole cemetery is surrounded by a stone wall and pine trees. After placing the flags on each grave, we had our time of silence in front of the memorial in the centre and recited the poem "In Flanders Fields" by Dr. John McCrae. It felt nice to know that we had done something to respect the sacrifice of so many who died so far from home.

This past week, I spent some time in the archives in Boulogne-sur-mer to find out a little more about what happened to the soldiers who lost their lives here. There were several fascinating pictures and a couple of personal testimonials

water for all just because people are unlucky enough to be aboriginal. This is wrong.

As you might guess, the people responsible for this discrimination have been reluctant to admit as much. Until now, that is. The extent of the gaps in spending on health, education and infrastructure are spelled out in a confidential draft report prepared by the Department of Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development and Canada (AANDC) in June 2013.

Of course, the government did not release this report of its own accord. It was forced by a court because of a human rights complaint alleging discrimination.

The report details what it would take to provide "province-like services on reserve" (translation: "treat aboriginal Canadians fairly"). The numbers are staggering. Let's just talk infrastructure spending, the mon-

ey that builds homes, schools and drinking water systems. The report acknowledges a \$8.2 billion gap between what is needed on reserves and what has been funded. (Keep in mind that the entire annual infrastructure budget for reserves is a total of \$1 billion.) That includes \$6 billion missing for adequate housing and \$1.2 billion for safe drinking water.

Partly the infrastructure gap is so huge because of the funding divergence I described earlier. But there is also something else going on, which the report also admits. The federal government has been pilfering dollars from on-reserve infrastructure spending to meet urgent needs in education and social spending. Between 2006 and 2012, AANDC took \$505 million from infrastructure budgets to cover shortfalls in education and social programs.

This is like robbing Peter to pay Paul. Now, on top of what is clearly a general pattern of discrimination, we have an infra-

structure crisis because of many years of short-term sloshing from one nearly empty pot to another.

Right now, a committee of senators, led by Dennis Patterson, is travelling across Canada to document the state of infrastructure on reserves. They are seeing and hearing a harsh reality—the situation is not pretty.

For example, many aboriginal Canadians cannot access safe and clean water. In addition to systemic federal underfunding for water systems, the federal government has been applying lower standards for these water systems than their provincial counterparts for decades. When federal planners set up water systems in my own community, they built a system that supplies far less water than the province requires. In 2011, an assessment of reserve water systems commissioned by the Canadian government found that 39 percent of all on reserve drinking water systems

across the country have major deficiencies that result in a high probability of unsafe water.

A group of six First Nations recently began a lawsuit claiming that Canada's failure to ensure safe drinking water on reserves violates their Charter rights. They say that lack of access to safe drinking water is a threat to their lives and security. They say that it is a violation to the right of equal treatment before the law. I believe they are right. And I believe that the unjustifiable cap on social and health funding for on reserve communities is also a threat to our lives and security, and violates the Crown's most basic ethical and moral (not to mention legal) obligations.

Aboriginal people on reserves are asking for comparable services as other Canadians. This is not too much to demand.

Missing hunter 'did everything right,' Ontario Provincial Police reports

MELDRUM BAY—The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is hailing the outdoor survival skills of an 81-year-old hunter who went missing in the bush around Meldrum Bay last Thursday evening.

On Thursday, November 13 at 5:19 pm, the Island OPP was notified by family members that their 81-year-old father had gone bow hunting earlier in the afternoon and failed to return home. The area he was hunting in was located off Highway 540 in Dawson Township near Meldrum Bay.

Members of the OPP Emergency Response Team and the OPP Canine Unit attended the area and commenced a search for the elderly man. His tree stand was located with his backpack covered in snow, the OPP reports. Officers continued throughout the night to search for the man.

At around 5:30 am on Friday, November 14, officers located the man in a sheltered tree area in good condition. Officers learned that the hunter left his tree stand to survey the property and became disori-

ented in a snow squall. He was an experienced outdoorsman and was dressed for the weather with insulated thermal wear, together with a warm hat, gloves and waterproof boots. When the gentleman got lost he obtained shelter and stayed put. He did not require any medical attention.

Community Services Officer Constable Al Boyd explained that a search and rescue helicopter had been queued for day-break and that the man was not from Manitoulin Island and was unfamiliar with

the area.

"So many times these searches end in tragedy," said Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb, detachment commander of the Manitoulin OPP. "In this incident the hunter took responsibility to let family know where he was and when he would be home. He was properly dressed for weather and he knew enough to obtain shelter and stay in one place so he could be found. These are simple rules that averted a real tragedy."

Police remind drivers to slow down this winter and drive according to conditions

MANITOULIN—The Manitoulin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) reported Monday that they had been busy with calls last week from the first snowfall and are reminding drivers to drive according to conditions.

Constable Al Boyd, community services officer with the Manitoulin OPP, said police responded to eight calls for service following last week's snow. The most serious of the calls happened on

Highway 542 on Thursday when a driver lost control and rolled their car. The driver needed to be extracted from the vehicle by the jaws of life and was sent to hospital in Sudbury with non-life threatening injuries, Constable Boyd reported.

He noted that the police were not advised of bad roads in any of the cases, but drivers admittedly did not drive according to road conditions. Speed or not having winter tires were a factor

in all of the incidents, the constable added.

"Even though the posted speed limit says 80 km/h, it doesn't mean you should be driving that fast," he warned.

Following last year's uproar from Ontario drivers, largely from the North, over the winter maintenance of provincial roads by Ministry of Transportation (MTO) contractors the MTO is seeking driver feedback, either in the form of complaint or com-

pliment. This can be done by logging on to www.mto.gov.on.ca/english/feed-back/service-commitment.shtml and clicking on 'winter road conditions.'

Police also responded to a number of vehicle/deer collisions over the weekend—10 from Friday night to Monday morning—and urged drivers to be cognitive of wildlife while travelling Island roads.

With the influx of hunters

swelling Manitoulin's population this week by between 6,000 and 7,000, ride checks will be held throughout the week across the Island. Nine held over the past weekend resulted in 1,500 vehicles checked and 28 Highway Traffic Act charges laid, Constable Boyd said.

"We will be out throughout the week," he added.

Aboriginal Economic Development Fund greeted with caution

TORONTO—The recent announcement of the launch of a three-year \$25 million Aboriginal Economic Development Fund (AEDF) was greeted with caution by First Nation leaders.

The fund, touted as “an investment in First Nation, Metis and Inuit communities to grow businesses and create employment” and first announced in the 2014 Ontario Budget as part of Ontario's Jobs and Prosperity fund, may be welcome news, but the addition of the phrase “is an important part of Ontario's Treaty Strategy” set off some alarm bells at the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) Anishinaabek Nation.

“It really is too early to comment on this,” cautioned UOI Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee. “We have learned to wait for the details before commenting on these type of

announcements.”

The addition of the reference to “Ontario's Treaty Strategy” was an apparent error in the production of the original press

release announcing the fund.

The fund is touted by the province as a means to “help abo-

original communities develop long-term strategies to diversify their economies, improve community capacity for economic development, provide access to financing to start and expand aboriginal businesses and enable communities to collaborate on region-wide employment and skills training projects."

"Our government recognizes the importance of economic development to aboriginal communities and through the AEDF we are working to provide the tools they need to thrive and pursue greater economic opportunities," said David Zimmer, minister of Aboriginal Affairs, in the press release. "This is an investment in Ontario as a whole, because when aboriginal people and businesses

prosper, all of Ontario prospers."

"Our Jobs and Prosperity Fund will improve Ontario's ability to attract significant business investments and support the province's future economic growth," said Brad Duguid, minister of Economic Development, Employment and Infrastructure. "The AEDF is providing aboriginal communities and businesses with the tools they need to strengthen and diversify our economy."

Although the political First Nation leadership have generally expressed caution, there has been some positive response from First Nations business leaders.

"As an aboriginal entrepreneur, I welcome news of this fund," said Don Barraclough, founder and CEO of NationTalks.ca, quoted in the

launch announcement press release.

"A primary goal of my business is to bring economic benefits to aboriginal communities and the AEDF has great implications in this regard. I know I'll be considering the programs offered under the fund as I plan to grow my business."

"We support the AEDF as it provides a much needed foundation and framework for long-term economic growth," agreed J.P. Gladu, president and CEO of the Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business. "Support from the fund, combined with our important research, has the potential to open doors and level playing fields on the way to improved economic opportunities for all aboriginal businesses in Ontario."

health cards, SIN cards and birth certificates. A compromised identity can have profound consequences on individuals, businesses and government. Being a victim can affect your job, reputation, credit rating, benefits or access to your own business and financial accounts.

What can you do to protect yourself from being a victim of identity theft?

Guard your personal information:

- Never give personal information by phone, Internet or mail unless you initiate the contact
- Shield your debit card PIN and never lend your cards
- Report missing credit or debit cards
- Shred documents with personal information
- Your SIN should only be used for employment and tax information
- Guard your computer and its information:
- Select complex passwords combining letters, numbers and symbols
- Install firewall, anti-virus, anti-spyware and security software

If you discover that you have become a victim of a fraud or scam, contact the local police immediately to report the crime. If your credit cards or bank accounts are involved, notify them as soon as you can so they can assist you. OPP and MTO working together to keep roads safe

The more than 33,000 road collisions on Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) patrolled roads last winter has the OPP asking road users to be part of the solution to reduce the number of preventable collisions over the 2014-2015 winter.

Poor driving behaviour—not poor weather or road conditions—was a primary contributing factor in many of last winter's single and multi-vehicle crashes, taking an unrelenting toll on road users, the movement of traffic and the provincial social costs associated with motor vehicle collisions.

Between December 1, 2013 and March 31, 2014 a total of 33,334 collisions occurred on OPP-patrolled roads compared to 25,953 collisions over the same four-month period in 2012-2013. The crashes resulted in deaths and numerous serious injuries. Among the injured were OPP officers who responded to these crash scenes and whose cruisers were struck by drivers who failed to adjust their speed to the conditions.

The OPP will be working closely with the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) to ensure that roads are kept as safe as possible over the winter months, but the OPP admits that they cannot do this alone.

"No other road safety partner can have as strong an influence on reducing the number of collisions during winter as drivers can through positive driving behaviour. During the winter months, the way people drive needs to be very different than the way they drive the rest of year. If every driver makes this critical change this winter, we will not have another chaotic winter that ends with a staggering number of collisions and the associated injuries and deaths," OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair, Provincial Commander of

Traffic Safety and Operational Support, said in a press release.

"The safety of our roads is always a top priority and we continue to work closely with our road safety partners to promote safe and responsible winter practices. Ontario winters can be challenging for drivers. Be sure to check road conditions on MTO's Ontario 511 Traveller Information Services. Please stay alert, slow down and drive according to road and weather conditions," Steven Del Duca, Minister of Transportation, added.

Over the winter months, the OPP will be providing a steady flow of safety-related tips, information and reminders on its social media sites in an effort to keep motorists on track with safe driving behaviour and to keep them informed about winter driving issues on our roads. One strong and recurring message people can expect to hear over winter is the need for every driver to adjust their speed and slow right down when visibility and road conditions deteriorate and to avoid non-essential travel during these periods.

Another important message will be the need for all drivers to use their full set of headlights every day throughout the winter months. Far too many vehicles could not be seen by the drivers behind them last winter because their rear lights were not on. Using the full set of headlights is the only way to completely engage your rear lights and this is critical in helping to reduce the risk of collisions when driving in poor visibility.

The OPP will also be encouraging drivers to use MTO's Ontario 511 Traveller Information Services which provides easy access to up-to-date winter information on road conditions and road closures on provincially maintained roads. Ontario 511 also provides voice-activated, hands-free service. Drivers are expected to observe Ontario cell phone laws when using Ontario 511 while on the road and are encouraged to pull over to a safe location to use it as the safest option. Planning ahead and being prepared will help keep road users safe so help spread the word about Ontario 511!

Because drivers and passengers have many eyes on the road, they are in the favourable position of exerting an even stronger influence on reducing the number of collisions if they too take part in the OPP's social media dialogue on safe winter driving.

The OPP is asking road users to tell them what driving behaviours they believe Ontario drivers need to change in order to help prevent another chaotic winter on our roads. Constable Boyd explained to The Expositor that the drug recognition officer was called in to work from his day off to deal specifically with this case.

The officer was trained specially through an intensive two-month course offered by the OPP which enables him to determine the impairment of a person under the influence of both prescription or non-prescription drugs.

While charging a driver with the 'impaired by a drug' charge is rare on Manitoulin, "we're starting to see it more and more," Constable Boyd said.

In a case such as this, the trained officer would be called in, on suspicion from the first officer on the scene, and a battery of tests would commence, the constable explained.

From amphetamines to barbiturates and everything in between, the time it takes to answer the officer's questions, and the responses, are noted, as are the suspect's pupils, eye focus, dexterity and movement and a determination of the offender's past history with drugs. Each drug has a different affect on the body and the officer can make the determination of which drug or drugs the offender has used.

"We don't have a breathalyzer for this like we do for blood alcohol content, so the officer must make an extensive report from his findings for the courts," he said.

It is the hope of the OPP to eventually have a drug recognition officer on each shift, Constable Boyd said.

The 23-year-old male was released on an undertaking with conditions to appear in Gore Bay at the Ontario Court of Justice on December 15, 2014.

He added that disease did not come to the Americas before Europeans came into contact with First Nations people.

He himself uses both traditional and Western medicines and believes it is up to the individual alone to decide which treatment is best for them.

In the ruling, Justice Gethin Edward said, "This is not an 11th-hour epiphany employed to take her daughter out of the rigours of chemotherapy. Rather, it is a decision made by a mother, on behalf of a daughter she truly loves, steeped in a practice that has been rooted in their culture from its beginnings..."

"It is this court's conclusion therefore, that D.H.'s decision to pursue traditional medicine for her daughter, J.J., is her aboriginal right," the justice continued. "Further, such a right cannot be qualified as a right only if it is proven to work by employing the Western medical paradigm. To do so would be to leave open the opportunity to perpetually erode aboriginal rights."

The case first made headlines when D.H. penned a letter to a First Nations paper, saying she would be taking her daughter to a holistic healing centre in the United States. This prompted the hospital, McMaster Children's Hospital, to contact the Brant Family and Children's Services, asking the agency to wade in to force J.J. back into treatment. When Brant Family and Children's Services denied this request, the hospital took them to court.

In a joint press release from the Six Nations of the Grand River and the Mississaugas of New Credit councils, they write: "Our communities have two girls and families

directly affected by this decision. Both families are loving, diligent, and conscientious in the care they provide for their daughters, and in the decisions they make concerning their medical care. Both have elected to discontinue chemotherapy, and are relying, instead, on traditional medicines."

"Forcing a First Nations child to undergo unwanted, mainstream medical treatment is an affront to the dignity and autonomy of the child, our cultures, and our nations," the press release continues. "Had our children been forced into treatment, it would have had a disastrous effect on their emotional, psychological, and spiritual well-being. Instead of being proud of their own traditions, they would learn that the laws, governance, teachings and medicines of the Haudenosaunee and Anishinabe cultures were wrong and even dangerous. This is simply not true."

"We sincerely hope that this decision is part of an emerging era of healing and reconciliation between Canada and our nations," the councils conclude. "We hope that our children and generations to come will no longer experience the mistrust, misunderstanding, and mistreatment by the Canadian government that have been our daily reality for over 200 years."

"The decision of these parents must be respected," Ontario regional Chief Stan Beardy said in a press release. "I agree with what the judge decided. That ultimately it is the mother's choice to pursue indigenous medicine and her right," Regional Chief Beardy said. "As part of the treaty-based nation-to-nation relationship, we agree to work with organizations and government but we have the right to govern ourselves and our children."

(to prove a direct link between the defendant's negligence and the claimant's loss) should henceforth be the 'material contribution test' (which is typically only applied in special circumstances and specifically where it is impossible for the plaintiff to prove that the defendant's negligence caused the plaintiff's injury using the 'causation', or 'but for,' test, according to Darryl A. Cruz of McCarthy Tétrault).

The Coalition is seeking a constitutional remedy in the form of a reading down of section 145.2.1 (2) of the Environmental Protection Act (EPA) which requires that an appellant must prove that a wind project will cause harm

to human health, as well as seeking the revocation of the Renewable Energy Approvals granted for each of the three projects (in each of the three families' communities that are represented in the Coalition). "That reading down order, if granted, would improve the legislated protection with respect to residents and communities that are near or affected by wind turbine projects," the appeal states.

This case comes hot on the heels of Health Canada's Wind Turbine Noise and Health Study released last week that found no ill effects on the health of those living within close proximity of wind turbines.

The appeal is expected to wrap up today, Wednesday, November 19, in London.

span. "They did a good job."

Ms. McKenna, who works in South Baymouth, dealt with the impediment to her daily work commute by keeping one vehicle on each side of the bridge.

She described the workers as being "very polite and courteous. They told me when I needed to move the car so it wasn't in the way," she said.

Ms. McKenna expressed satisfaction that the bridge-work is finally being completed. "They had a number of delays that were beyond council's control," said Ms. McKenna, who sat on Tehkummah council when the decision to refurbish the bridge was made. Ms. McKenna conjectured that the bridge issue played a role in her electoral

defeat and that of longtime Tehkummah Reeve Gary Brown in this October's municipal elections. "The weather didn't help either," she added.

Reeve Brown noted that delays due to steel shortages played a role in the delay and that the contract signed by the township had included a penalty clause should con-

came to the realization that fiber and cellular towers were the future for the economy of Northern Ontario so I got Sudbury Hydro on board and started speaking with other Northern mayors," said Mr. Gordon. "We set up a number of non-profits to get cellular and wireless services into rural areas in the North such as NetCentral. We then approached the government about helping close the financial gap between companies like Rogers and Bell."

He explained that NetCentral was officially established in 1999 as a not for profit corporation by the mayors of Greater Sudbury, Chapleau, Parry Sound, Elliot Lake and the Northeast Town. Since 2000, NetCentral has secured more than \$33 million in capital funding and services from the private sector, the Province of Ontario and FedNor to bring advanced telecommunications services and communications infrastructure to Northern Ontario.

In June of 2011, the NOHFC board of directors approved \$6.98 million in funding for two NetCentral projects to install seven cellular and mobile broadband sites on Highway 6 and Manitoulin and seven sites on Highway 11 (Temagami), Highway 63 and Highway 64. NetCentral also secured funding commitments of \$3.3 million from Rogers.

Ms. Gunner brought greetings from Michael Gravelle, minister of Northern Development and Mines and chair of the NOHFC, who sent his regrets for not being present for the event.

"I am pleased that, by the NOHFC partnering with NetCentral, our government is helping countless residents, businesses, visitors and motorists on Manitoulin Island and along nearby highways have improved access to cellular and wireless Internet services," Minister Gravelle said in a press release.

"There has been a lot of work done to bring this expansion in services to Manitoulin and we are very grateful,"

said Mayor MacNevin. "We are fortunate to see this success and it will bring improved cellular and wireless high speed services to residents, students, visitors and businesses. Thank you."

Mr. Brown was also pleased to share that NetCentral has submitted applications to the NOHFC and FedNor to complete the expansion of cellular and wireless broadband services to Central and Western Manitoulin. He explained that the company has secured funding commitments from Rogers and Bell to construct four towers to service Highways 551, 542 and 540 and communities including Providence Bay, Evansville, Sheshegwaning First Nation, Zhiibaahassing First Nation and Meldrum Bay.

"If we are successful with our funding applications, we will be able to provide complete coverage across Manitoulin," concluded Mr. Brown. "We expect to know in the near future."

tions. They need the information and tools that will guide them to the best care and supports."

Addictions Awareness Week provides an opportunity for Canadians to learn more about substance abuse prevention, to talk about treatment and recovery and to bring forward solutions for change.

This year the CCSA will mark each day during Addiction Awareness Week by placing emphasis on different substances and youth-related issues, including the use of alcohol, cannabis and prescription drugs, as well as the problem of impaired driving.

Preventing and reducing harms associated with substance use and abuse by youth is a priority for CCSA and its many community partners as a substantial amount of change and growth—including significant brain growth and development—takes place during the years of development. Youth 15 to 24 years of age have the highest self-reported past-year use of illicit substances, compared to

older Canadians, and are approximately five times more likely than adults aged 25 years and older to report harm because of drug use.

Substance use and abuse during this critical time can have impacts that persist long after the high has worn off, including chronic disease, addiction and mental health disorders. Preventing these harms is key to helping reduce the demand on an already strained treatment system.

Not simply a progressive issue, evidence-informed prevention and early intervention programs plainly shows that reported savings from reducing the cost of substance abuse to society would result in savings of \$15 to \$18 for every dollar spent on drug abuse prevention.

To facilitate the development of effective programs, CCSA created the Canadian Standards for Youth Substance Abuse Prevention, Canada's first national resource for schools, families and communities. The Standards provide guidance on how to plan, implement and evaluate multi-faceted prevention efforts.

"She and Dave Smith also played and sang at the church in Manitowaning," said Mr. McDougall.

"I did have the opportunity to sing with the Voyageurs one night," said Ms. Robinson. "They were actually my inspiration to sing country music, from the time I was 10-years-old. I had gone to a dance with my parents' at the Orange Hall and my mother said the rule is you can't leave the hall during the night."

"But my mother didn't have to worry because from the time I walked into the hall and sat down I didn't move," said Ms. Robinson. "I told my mother afterwards that's what I want to do when I grow up, sing country music. The Voyageurs were great musicians."

It was a couple of years later that she had the opportunity to sing with the Voyageurs.

"I was so excited in 2009 to be named by the NOC-MA into the Great Northern Opry," said Ms. Robinson. "To be nominated and indicated into the hall of fame is right over the top for me, I gasped when I was told I was being inducted. When you realize that there is not a lot of people in there, and the amazing musical talent of the people in there already, it's unreal."

"I've been very fortunate in my life to have good and generous musicians to sing with," continued Ms.

Robinson. "David Smith talked to me and taught me how to sing and stand while singing at St. Paul's church, and singing in church stretches your vocal range. Those were lessons that helped me greatly."

"I started singing with Bill Omnet when I was 13-years-old, and we sang together for 37 years," recalled Ms. Robinson. "Bill was an amazing talent, and was probably the most gentle soul I have ever known. And there was nothing he couldn't play."

"I remember when I first sang with him I went through the doors of the fair hall, and the man at the door said you're on my list to perform tonight," explained Ms. Robinson. "He then introduced me to Bill, and looked at the two of us and said you have 10 minutes to get ready. Bill asked me what kind of music I liked and I told him I really like country music. Then he asked me what I like to sing and I said I liked a new song by an up and coming singer, Tanya Tucker. He told me to sing it twice and by then he had the music down pat for the song. As the line goes in the movie Casablanca, this was the beginning of a beautiful friendship."

"It was 10 years ago this month that Bill passed on. He was an incredible person and totally expanded my range of country music," said Ms. Robinson.

"But as I say, I've been very fortunate to have so many people around me who have been so supportive. My parents were very supportive, mom loved country music, and my dad was always encouraging me and they were both very supportive. And my brothers, sisters, husband and children have all been very supportive."

Mr. McDougall said Ms. Robinson was shocked when she was informed she was going to be inducted into the hall of fame. "We had all gone out to supper at Green Acres restaurant one night last fall, and she thought we were going to be talking about someone else that

was going to be inducted. Her husband was there and we got the picture of Debbie when she was told she was being inducted...her mouth was wide open, she was so shocked to be told she was being inducted."

"This group honours musicians that decided not to make music a career, had family and decided to make that their career, and not go out to make music a professional career," said Mr. McDougall.

"We had about 40 local people on a bus to go up to the Sault to support Debbie and see her be inducted into the hall of fame," said Mr. McDougall.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Council reviews plans for 2015 Pan Am stop on Manitoulin

Northeast Town staff provided council with an update on Little Current being included as a stop during the 2015 Pan Am Torch Relay.

“Staff is currently working with TO2015 to finalize the Northeast Town’s participation in the Pan Am Torch Relay,” states the report. “The Northeast Town looks forward to hosting the Pan Am flame here next year and will announce the details of our community’s participation in February 2015. Three-thousand torchbearers will proudly carry the flame and share its welcoming Pan Am spirit on the 41-day journey towards the lighting of the cauldron on July 10, 2015 to officially open the games.”

Little Current will be one of 130 communities that the Pan Am flame will be stopping at during its route.

“Residents are encouraged to enter the TO2015’s torchbearer contest for their change to be a Pan Am torchbearer in our community next year,” the report continues. “Posters and flyers will be distributed throughout the

Northeast Town and we encourage residents to visit www.toronto2015.org/torch-relay/torchbearers to enter the contest. The contest is open to individuals 13 years of age on or before May 30, 2015 and closes on December 1, 2014.”

The Northeast Town will also be selecting its own special community torchbearer to run on the town’s behalf when the flame comes in early 2015, however details were not finalized by council on how this individual will be selected.

Council reviews financial reports

Council reviewed the financial reports with town treasurer Sheryl Wilkin at last week’s administration and finance committee meeting.

After reviewing the municipal vouchers for October 2014, Ms. Wilkin went over the October accounts receivable reports for water/sewer and taxes.

She reported that there had been \$157,031.25 in payments and that there were currently 36 accounts over \$500,

of which two were due to penalties applied for October and 26 due to recent billing and which resulted in eight disconnections.

As for taxes, Ms. Wilkin said that there had been \$181,606.14 in payments made in October.

Town to hire accounting intern

Town CAO Dave Williamson reported to council that the town had received funding from the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC) to hire an accounting intern for one year.

“NOHFC will provide 90 percent of the funding, leaving a \$3,200 cost to the municipality,” explained Mr. Williamson. “It is an opportunity to give a recent graduate experience while training someone for the future. If we have an opening in the future we will have a trained individual—it’s good planning.”

The administration and finance committee made a recommendation to council to support accepting the funding and the hiring of an intern.

 MANITOWANING—This Remembrance Day the students and teachers of Assiginack Public School (APS) welcomed veterans and the community into their school for a moving service to honour Canadians service in each of the wars and peacekeeping efforts.

Margaret Stringer, APS principal, acted as the master of ceremonies and gave the school's "deepest thanks to our veterans and their families, as well as our community partners who are in attendance today," and welcoming veterans in attendance Jeff Caselton, Trevor Leeson, Bob Newman, Kevin Smith, Brian Sprack, Vivian Lafrenniere, John Marcel and Gerry Kitts.

"Today, we pay tribute to the men and women who have served and continue to serve our country of Canada during times of war, conflict and peace," Ms. Stringer said. "We remember the more than 1.5 mil-

lion Canadians who have served throughout our country's history and the more than 118,000 who have died while serving our country."

"This year marks the 100th anniversary of the beginning of WWI," she read. "It was known as the Great War because it was the first time in history that almost every country in the world was at war. However it was not a great place to be. The war lasted four years

and every spring the soldiers, who lived and fought in the trenches noticed a red flower blooming on the battlefields and on the graves of friends who died in the fighting. When the war ended and the people who were in the military came home they continued to think about their friends who were buried overseas. Each time they thought of the graves they remembered the poppies, which grew around the graves. They did not want Canadians to forget that their friends died serving Canada. The poppy became a symbol that everyone could wear to show they remembered."

"Remembrance Day marks the end of the First World War which ended on November 11, 1918, at 11 am, the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month," the principal continued. "Since then, Canadians have fought in other conflicts and many have given their lives so that we might enjoy freedom today. But it's not enough, students, to

remember to say thank you to our veterans each year on November 11. Each one of us needs to do our part to ensure this world we live in is one of peace and understanding."

"For those of you in Kindergarten, Grades 1, 2 and 3 this could mean learning to listen carefully to your classmates, making sure that children aren't being left out of games at recess, and sharing with others," she urged. "For our

students in Grades 4 through 8 it could mean having the courage to speak up when something is wrong, being supportive of those that are being treated poorly, showing them compassion and support. It could also mean learning how to resolve personal conflicts through non-violent means. Each of us can do our part. On this Remembrance Day we remember the veterans' sacrifices, we honour their brave deeds and we contin-

ue to work for peace each of us in our own way."

The service continued with performances by the APS choir featuring special guest singer/songwriter Errol Lee, the reading of poetry and the laying of wreaths.

The service concluded with each of the children shaking the veterans' hands, thanking them for their years of service to Canada.

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Kagawong Remembrance Day commemorates 100th anniversary of World War I

Community remembers Island vets through 'Men O' The North' song

KAGAWONG—It was an especially touching Remembrance Day ceremony at the Kagawong Park centre, as Old Mill Heritage Centre curator and the day's guest speaker, Rick Nelson, connected the events leading up to World War I and the aftermath with the recent tragedy in Ottawa.

"At the end of the war (WWI), when it was all over, on November 11, 1918, 60,000 Canadians were dead, close to 7,000 couldn't be identified," said Mr. Nelson following a presentation on 'The Assassination That Started the First World War.' "Many still lie in unmarked graves, known only to God. One such soldier was buried in a cemetery in France near where he fought at the battle of Vimy Ridge. Fourteen years ago his remains were brought back to Canada and re-interred at the National War Memorial in Ottawa where the tomb for this unknown soldier was created. A symbol of all soldiers who died for our country in all wars, past present and in the future."

"It was this tomb, this unknown soldier, that Corporal Nathan Cirillo was guarding last month when he was ambushed-shot twice in the back by a coward-a lone wolf I am ashamed to call a Canadian."

Mr. Nelson when on to describe the last minutes of

Corporal Cirillo's life told through accounts from the bystanders and first responders who were present.

There wasn't a dry eye in the audience following Mr. Nelson's touching presentation.

There were many other special moments throughout Kagawong's Remembrance Day ceremony this year, including the singing of 'Men O' The North' by Mary Buie, Susie DeKuyper, Jim Munro, Victoria Mazzuchin and Peter Gordon, accompanied by Donna Beam on piano.

Colonel C.H.L. Jones commissioned Harry Pearse to write 'Men O' The North' in a rallying effort to gather men of the region to join a regiment during WWI manned by people they knew and shared a common interest with.

Service leader Diane Fraser was also pleased to welcome special guests from the Second Battalion Irish Regi-

ment of Canada who laid a wreath at the cenotaph following the service inside the park centre.


'In Flanders Fields' was read by Miranda MacKay, while Karen Chandler read 'We Shall Keep the Faith.'

Manitoulin's Split Rail Brewery to locate in Gore Bay

GORE BAY—Gore Bay's gain is Billings' loss, as the entrepreneurs behind the proposed Split Rail Brewery recently announced that they would be setting up their manufacturing facility in Gore Bay, hopefully launching the facility in the summer of 2015.

"We had the opportunity to open up/launch in Gore Bay and it is what we feel is a really good fit," said Andy Smith, co-owner of Split Rail along with Eleanor Charlton. "Having the building secured is a big relief. It is across from the Gore Bay Harbour Centre building and we are very excited to get started in this location."

Ms. Smith described the location as "just about ideal" being on the water. "We have been looking for a location for about four years," she said. "It has been a very long process."

Billings council had hoped to add the business to its community, but in the end it was not to be.

"We knew last summer really," said Billings Mayor

Austin Hunt. "But it was only in September that we knew for sure it was going to be in Gore Bay." Although he admitted some disappointment, Mayor Hunt was philosophical about the decision. "We always knew that they were looking at other places," he said, adding that all was not lost. "They are looking at perhaps setting up a sales office or something."

Mayor Hunt said that the town was aware that locating the facility in Kagawong would be a challenge. "They went so far as to look at what a building would cost," he said. "We talked with provincial and federal agencies about what we could do."

The requirements of the brewery were a challenge, however. "The building in Gore Bay has really high ceilings as I understand," he said. "There are not many communities on the Island that have the kind of building that would accommodate the delivery trucks and that sort of thing."

Ms. Smith made it clear in a letter to Billings council that

the company was grateful for their support.

"We're targeting the summer of 2015 to launch (the manufacturing facility)," Ms. Smith told the Recorder. "Although there is any number of hurdles that could mean changing this date. We're still sourcing financing, and final licencing approvals and are looking for investors. We are getting close, but we still have a ways to go. But we're excited about the business and locating in Gore Bay."

The brewery has settled on their inaugural brew, a lager, but they also have a couple of other recipes in development. "One is a hawberry wheat beer, but that is proving a challenge in sourcing a supply of hawberries," said Ms. Smith. "We have been involved in some very intensive research in perfecting those recipes."

One thing that isn't in short supply is offers to help taste test the brew. "No taste testers are not in short supply at all," she laughed.

Wikwemikong leadership seeks Centre of Diabetic Excellence for community

WIKWEMIKONG—Diabetes is a growing health concern in North America and nowhere more so than in First Nations communities where it has been described as being at epidemic proportions. Wikwemikong Chief Duke Peltier has approached local municipalities and First Nations for support in having the province locate a Diabetes Centre of Excellence in his community.

"The idea of a Centre of Excellence came about from the community after we took a look at the available data," said Chief Peltier.

He said that the province has indicated that they will be seeking to establish such centres in the province and he said that the reality of the prevalence of diabetes in Anishinaabe communities clearly indicate that such a centre should be established in a First Nation community. Wikwemikong being the largest indigenous community in Northern Ontario makes it the perfect candidate for such a regional centre, said the chief.

"We have approached the Northeast LHIN (Local Integrated Health Network) to fully explore the

identified gaps in the health delivery system in our community," said Chief Peltier. By creating a Centre of Excellence in a rural community, the province would be able to explore approaches that would be best applicable to rural communities.

Chief Peltier said that his community was therefore soliciting letters of support from neighbouring communities. He pointed out that the Manitoulin Health Centre in Little Current has been building a strong base for triage, emergency response and care while the MHC site in

Mindemoya has been building a strong centre for the treatment of cancer on Manitoulin.

"Our goal is to have a variety of treatments available, but more importantly to have the educational opportunities and collaborations amongst health institutions so that people on Manitoulin can receive the best possible support for diabetes management," he said.

The availability of dialysis support already in place in Northeast Manitoulin and the diabetes education programs available through the auspices of

Noojmowin Teg means that a lot of the infrastructure to support such a regional centre of excellence are already in place.

Wikwemikong will be seeking the necessary funding support to explore the feasibility of establishing a regional Diabetes Centre of Excellence in Wikwemikong. "With such a centre, we will be able to identify and confirm the best practices for diabetes management in First Nations and rural communities in the North," said Chief Peltier, indicating that the establishment of such a centre could have

benefits for all Northern rural Northern populations.

North Channel Marine Tourism Council revisiting marketing plan

SPANISH—Recent production statistics from the boat manufacturing industry are proving a mixed bag for the North Channel Marine Tourism Council. The statistics are indicating a solid rebound in boat manufacturing, figures reinforced by both Manitoulin's own Henley Boats and Legend Boats of Sudbury, but the devil is in the details it seems.

"Most of the increase seems to be coming in the 20-foot and under categories," said NCMTC Chair Stan Ferguson. "The jump is in what they refer to as multi-purpose boats."

These are the smaller fishing boat type vessels that a family might tow behind their vehicle on a day or weekend outing.

"The question is 'should we be rethinking our marketing strategy to take that segment of the market into account,'" said Mr. Ferguson. Currently, the NCMTC generally targets its North

Shore and Manitoulin marine marketing efforts on attracting the larger boats to what the organization promotes in its brand as "the best freshwater boating in the world."

"Do we go after this market? Do our members want to go after this market," asked Mr. Ferguson, who noted that segment of the market has been identified in the NCMTC's recent marketing plan as having significant potential for marine communities along the North Shore and Manitoulin.

Following a lively debate, the NCMTC board decided to research those questions and the best routes to reach the small boat market.

"Our job is to market this region to the boating community," said Mr. Ferguson, adding that the NCMTC has an obligation to stay abreast of developments in the boating industry and the marine

tourism market.

The NCMTC marketing committee will be chaired

by NCMTC director Michael Erskine and includes directors Gloria

Fischer of Hilton Beach and Mal Clarke of Iron Bridge.



New support added for Manitoulin Health Centre physician recruitment

MANITOULIN—A new local approach to physician recruitment has been launched involving multiple organizations from across the Island. With several outstanding full-time physician vacancies remaining unfilled, coupled with future pressures (such as the potential for retirements in the not too distant future), the need to add greater supporting resources to the recruitment portfolio has become

more apparent, a press release from the Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) states. To help provide greater capacity, MHC has joined with the physician clinics in Mindemoya, Little Current, Gore Bay and Manitowaning, along with the three Family Health Teams and Noojmowin Teg Health Centre, to form a core committee of stakeholders who will help steer future efforts. In addition, a physician recruiter has been hired on

a contracted basis to help with tasks like outreach contact efforts with candidate physicians throughout Ontario, and helping to market the local opportunities of living and practicing medicine on Manitoulin, in one of the many professional settings.

There are a growing number of vacant physician positions across Ontario and competition between communities is the new reality. Historically, Mani-

toulin has enjoyed a favourable complement of family practice physicians and vacancies have rarely been prolonged. This no longer appears to be true. The new reality is that communities must link resources together and truly "market" their opportunities, incentives and lifestyle. Relationship-building with prospective candidates is a large part of this process, as is helping to ease the relocation transi-

tion for new hires.

As part of this effort, the core committee will be reaching out across other potential stakeholder groups to build upon this initial work.

Leaders from other key organizations could potentially add their resources and expertise to the new recruitment team.

It has been said that it takes a community to attract and retain a physician; with well over 500

family practice vacancies currently listed across Ontario (see the Health Force Ontario website), this has never been more valid.

FIRST HUNT

First time hunters on Manitoulin share their stories

MANITOULIN—Five years ago this reporter was a city girl living in southern Ontario who had never picked up a gun or crossbow, let alone thought about deer hunting, but this year all that changed when I got my hunting licence, aimed a crossbow and actually succeeded in harvesting a doe.

I guess I should back up a few years to when I first moved to Manitoulin Island and became interested in hunting. Within my first few years on the Island I met an incredible group of friends, many of whom are hunters. I quickly learned that not only was hunting a great outdoor activity, but also a way to harvest your own meat while also helping to maintain a balanced ecosystem for my new home.

The last few years I accompanied my boyfriend during both rifle and bow season, shadowing the whole experience from baiting stands, shooting a deer and even cleaning it.

This fall I finally felt ready to try hunting myself and signed up for the Ontario Hunter Education Program Ontario Firearms Safety Course in Little Current taught by long time instructors Rob Paxton and Bill Elliott.

The courses not only taught me everything I needed to know about hunting and firearm safety, but also introduced me to many other novice hunters.

Upon the completion of the course, I started practicing with a crossbow and went out hunting (under the guidance of my boyfriend and his dad) on their property in Kagawong.

Earlier this month (Sunday, November 9), I went out hunting late in the afternoon. I was recovering from a cold, so I had been told to bring cough drops to ensure I didn't "scare away the deer." I got out to my ground blind which looks onto a group of apple trees at around 3 pm and not even 10 minutes later a large group of deer came in. There was a young fawn, three does and


a yearling buck. Unfortunately, the only deer within shooting range was the young fawn so I patiently waited for one of the large does to move closer to my blind.

As I waited I sucked on cough drops, but they were no match for my cold and soon I was having a huge coughing fit, sure enough scaring away all the deer.

Almost two hours later, I had suppressed my cough but no other deer had come. Discouraged, I got ready to pack it in for the day when all of a sudden a yearling doe emerged on the trail in front of me and began walking towards the blind.

Ever so slowly (as I had been taught in my course), I raised by crossbow and sighted the deer.

As it munched on corn in front of me, I shifted my weight and resighted. I was getting shaky waiting for the deer to turn broadside. She slowly turned so that when

she raised her head to check behind her, her shoulder turned giving me a clean kill shot. I waited for her to lift her head but this time she turned to face me. I shot. It was so quick I could barely see where my arrow went, but I know I had sighted properly and that it was a good shot, two inches behind the shoulder blade and not too low. She bolted into the woods to the right and out of sight. After a few minutes (in which I sat shaking in disbelief that I had actually done it), my boyfriend and I walked quietly back to the house where we waited before heading out to retrieve my deer. I was told that we had to wait in case my shot wasn't as good as I had thought, as not to scare the deer further into the bush.

Thankfully, as there was no blood trail, we found my deer just a few feet from the blind where we had seen it dash into the woods. Due to the angle of the deer when I shot, the arrow went through its side,

through both a lung and the liver, killing the doe in a matter of seconds.

The next few minutes were a blur of putting the tag on and many photos and congratulations. I smiled brightly for the photos and praise, proud that I had successfully completed my first hunt.

This year not only marked my first hunt, but the first hunt of other Island residents and hunting week visitors such as 25-year-old Kristine Bootsma of North Bay.

"I have been coming to the Island for opening weekend for the last four years, but just to visit," Ms. Bootsma told The Expositor Monday (opening day). "My boyfriend Geoff (Farquhar) comes here to hunt."

This year Ms. Bootsma said she decided to get her own licence and try hunting herself.

"It was my first time ever hunting," said Ms. Bootsma of her hunting trip Monday morning. "I practiced shooting with the 308 I had borrowed yesterday and then just went out this morning with Connie (Ferguson, Geoff's aunt). We were in an enclosed tree stand, which we got to around 6:20 am. We saw a small yearling buck and two doe before we saw the six point buck come up from behind. It was still walking when it came into view, but it was broadside and Connie told me to shoot."

"After I was just shaking," laughed Ms. Bootsma. "I even started crying a bit. I was in shock and just so excited. It was a perfect heart shot and after I could move my legs again we found it not too far from where I shot it."

Ms. Bootsma said she would be getting help cleaning her beautiful six point buck later Monday afternoon and was excited to use the meat to make venison wraps with cream cheese and bacon.

This reporter spoke with other hunters from her class and first time hunters, but as of press time Monday they hadn't filled their tag. See next week's Expositor for more first hunt stories and a round up of Manitoulin hunting week 2014.

Cougar encounter in South Baymouth

In the past five years—much to my husband's amusement—I have carried my camera any time I've driven on the Manitoulin, hoping to cash in on that \$500 "capture a cougar photo" contest. I may not have won, but we at least have our own cougar encounter story (included below).

My husband and I had our cougar encounter on Hwy 6 near South Baymouth. It happened on January 1, 2001 shortly past 10 pm (some 2-3 weeks after our friend Lyle Dewar had told us he'd seen a cougar on the Government Road). We were half way up the hill between Lakeshore Road and the rock cut just north of South Baymouth when an animal suddenly leapt over the guard rails on our left and into the glare of our headlights. At first sight its body size and greyish-brown colouring made me think it was a yearling deer. Then I realized it didn't have the long, gangly legs of a deer; instead its supple legs tucked up close beneath its body as it ran. In seconds it had flowed across the road and up and over the guardrail on the right. My last image as it disappeared into the darkness was that of its extremely long, tubular-like tail. No deer,

this! In the split second it took me to process this fleeting glimpse, my husband Ted—who (like me) has a reasonable knowledge of wildlife after working 30+ years at the Ontario Veterinary College—declared, "No doubt what that was!" We both agreed: it had to have been a cougar. We checked with several experts, including someone with COSEWIC (Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada) who said, "The eastern cougar is mythical." They didn't believe us. But Lyle Dewar sure did!

A kitty encounter

In May of 1992, my wife and I purchased a property just west of Shrigley Bay, on the south shore of Manitoulin. It was a remote lot on an unopened road allowance and very deep in the bush. We made a camp on the beach there in early August that year and began the hard work of clearing and building a roadway to the Poplar Road (a few kilometers away). Over the next three weeks we felled several thousand trees and pulled their stumps with the tractor, heading closer to Poplar Rd. each day. Carol and I would drive out on the tractor every morning with our two daughters and Marble, the cat, in the loader bucket. Our goal was to clear 300 yards of

road every day until we broke through to the Poplar Rd. and then would make our first trip to Gore Bay for supplies. The girls' cat was our constant companion in the bush and returned in the bucket with the girls and our gear every night near dark. Then one day the cat refused to return with us and planted herself on a large pink boulder at the side of our newly built road. She was still there the next morning when at last we broke through the final trees to the Poplar Rd. and all celebrated by getting in the truck and be the first people to drive to town on our new road.

When we returned later, licking ice cream cones in the cab of the truck, Jessi, our three-and-a-half-year-old daughter yelled "LOOK A LION!" and sure enough, there was a fully grown cougar sitting on the large pink boulder that our cat (now in the truck) had to be dragged off of three hours earlier. The lion gave us a regal scowl and then, from a sitting position, jumped across the entire road (14 ft in two bounds) and vanished.

Over the years we would occasionally see his tracks in the sand or snow, but never saw him again. It is one of our family's greatest moments and the worst blind date our cat could have picked!

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Manitoulin business owners learn of international francophone immigration recruitment possibilities

LITTLE CURRENT—Business owners from across Manitoulin learned of the opportunities of international recruitment of francophone immigrants through a luncheon hosted by the Northern Ontario Francophone Immigration Support Network.

The luncheon explored how business owners can recruit internationally for skilled professionals as well as information about immigrant investors and entrepreneurs who might be interested in buying up or starting up business on Manitoulin.

Christian Howald, project coordinator with the Northern Ontario Francophone Immigration Support Network, gave the opening presentation, explaining how the Conference Board of Canada estimates that by 2015, Canada will face a shortage of 1.2 million skilled workers and that in Ontario alone businesses already lose \$24.3 billion in economic activity because they are unable to find workers with the skills their companies need.

The Northern Network works with key partners in Canada immigration such as Destination Canada and the Canadian Embassy in Paris to build bridges between organizations across Northern Ontario to implement a system that promotes and facilitates recruitment, settlement and the integration of newcomers to the area.

Mr. Howald explained that in the Sudbury-Manitoulin-Algoma region there are 60,000 individuals that are French

speaking in 26,000 households.

“French speaking tourism is rising each year by six percent,” said Mr. Howald. “We have 149,000 French tourists spending 129 million dollars annually in Ontario. Island tourists are French, Swiss and Belgian and want to feel at home during their stay, which means they want businesses that speak French.”

Mr. Howald also reviewed with luncheon participants the changes to the immigration system for 2015 and some of the programs that exist connecting skilled francophone immigrants with Ontario businesses owners.

Other presenters included representatives from La Bonne Affaire, an organization dedicated to helping French

speaking immigrants find work or go into business, and Conseil de la coopération de l'Ontario on the cooperative model of business and how it can help build businesses with immigrant population.



This week the two recipes that I am writing up are pretty loose, more like a guideline, and you adjust according to the numbers that you need to feed. The one recipe is a slow cooker venison roast and I don't cook or eat venison. In this case John becomes the cook and he is determined to cook venison that anybody can eat (which means me). Magic—he found a recipe and it works!

Slow Cooker Apple Venison Roast

The recipe was changed by switching the water to red wine and adding a cup of applesauce. The gravy was excellent.

- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 3 pounds venison roast (use any kind, with bone or without or the toughest cut)
- 1 or 2 or 3 large apples cored and quartered
- 2 onions, sliced
- 4 or 6 cloves diced garlic
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 cube beef bouillon

Spread the olive oil on the inside of a slow cooker. Place the venison roast inside, and cover with apple, onions, and garlic. Add the water with the bouillon cube or red wine and applesauce. Turn to Low and cook the roast until tender, about 7 to 9 hours.

When the roast has cooked, remove it from the slow cooker, and place on a serving platter. Puree the gravy with an immersion blender. Heat the gravy and add some cornstarch to thicken it. Serve alongside the roast.

Turnip, Sweet Potato, Pear Mash

You can use this recipe as a side for vegetables or mashed topped with the venison gravy.

- 1 small to medium turnip peeled and diced
- 1 medium to large sweet potato peeled and chopped
- 2 medium pears cored and quartered

Layer the vegetables in the pot. Turnip, then sweet potato then the pears on top. Add water just to cover the pears. Bring to a boil, and boil until tender. Drain then mash altogether and taste with salt and pepper.


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Island students experience an afternoon at the opera

Glencore Ensemble Studio School Tour performs at Manitoulin schools

LITTLE CURRENT—Students at Little Current Public School (LCPS) and Central Manitoulin Public School (CMPS) had a unique cultural experience last Thursday when the Canadian Opera Company's (COC) Glencore Ensemble visited the two Island schools and performed The Bremen Town Musicians by Canadian composer Dean Burry.
