Island screenwriters' script on Danny Dodge's life and death hits home with movie producer

Northern Ontario company options film rights

HONORA BAY—The tragic Manitoulin Island story of Danny Dodge, heir to the automobile fortune of the same name, struck down in the prime of his life following an ill-advised adventure with some found sticks of explosives, is several steps closer to the silver screen with the signing of an option deal between screenwriters John Hawke and Deborah Wilson and Edge Enterprise owner Rosalie Chilelli for their 120-page screenplay, 'A Lesser Known Heir.'

"We signed an option agreement, which is basically the right to buy the rights for two years," said Ms. Chilelli.

The deal may have been sealed with the passing

of a single loonie between the writers and producer, but the broad smiles on the writers' faces presages their response.

"We are over the top," beamed Ms. Wilson. "This is absolutely fantastic."

"It's okay," agreed the famously laconic Mr. Hawke.

The experienced film production company is quite the coup for the writing team. The name Edge Enterprises might be familiar to fans of The Trailer Park Boys as the credits on the latest feature film outing of Canada's favourite booze swilling misfits starring Mike Smith, Robb Wells, JP

M'Chigeeng develops youth rehab program

M'CHIGEENG—M'Chigeeng First Nation chief and council have approved the building of Gwekwaadziwin Place, a youth rehabilitation facility in the community to service the recovery of First Nations youth across Manitoulin.

"Gwekwaadziwin is one of the Seven Grandfather Teachings," explained M'Chigeeng Chief Joe Hare. "It means 'living the right way'."

Chief Hare explained that the concept for the project has been "in the works" for a few years, with the support and partnership from the Island's First Nations through the United Chiefs and Councils of

Mnidoo Mnising (UCCMM).

"We have been working with a planning committee over the last two years and now we are at the stage to start implementation," said Chief Hare. "We will be taking our final plans to the UCCMM to inform them of the progress and take any recommendations into consideration."

"Over the past number of years there is strong evidence that our band members are using more and harder drugs," explained Chief Hare, "and it is continuing to spread. This problem is universal across not only Manitoulin, but also the country. We knew


Young man in coma following hit and run early Sunday in Wiky Police seeking information

WIKWEMIKONG—Thirty-one-year old David Andrew Oshkabewisens (known to his friends as Andy) was hit by a truck early Sunday morning while walking on Wikwemikong Way on the Wikwemikong First Nation. The driver of the vehicle fled the scene, leaving Mr. Oshkabewisens on the side of the road with serious, life threatening injuries. He was transferred to the Manitoulin Health Centre in Little Current where he was airlifted Sunday morning to Sudbury where he remains stable, but in a coma.

According to a press release from the Manitoulin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), The Wikwemikong Tribal Service, and the OPP North East Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch Acting Detective Inspector Dave Robinson, are currently investigating what they are referring to as a "serious motor vehicle collision."

"On Sunday, November 2 at 2:40 am, a 31-year-old Wikwemikong male was walking westbound on Wikwemikong Way in Wikwemikong when he was struck by a dark coloured pick-up truck that

failed to remain at the scene," states the press release. "The male sustained serious life threatening injuries and was transferred to Sudbury where he remains in critical condition."

The Expositor spoke to Community Services Officer Constable Allan Boyd Monday afternoon. He was able to confirm that there was an investigation underway and that "witnesses were being canvassed."



Manor receives generous donation from Northeast Town and McLean's Mountain Wind Farm partnership

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Centennial Manor received a generous donation from the Northeast Town and McLean's Mountain Wind Limited Partnership's road use agreement fund to be used toward the purchase of needed equipment for the facility.

The \$10,000 donation from the fund will go to the purchase of a Carendo hygiene shower chair.

"This chair will allow our staff to provide full care to our residents in terms of peri-care, wound care, bathing, dressing and toileting which will decrease behaviours, improve incontinence, reduce agitation and make it safer for our residents and staff," explained Manor Administrator Michelle Bond. "As part of the construction of the McLean's Moun-

tain Wind Farm, which finished earlier this year, the Northeast Town and McLean's Mountain Wind Limited Partnership entered into a road use agreement resulting in a community fund of 20 annual \$10,000 donations from the wind partnership to be used towards or to support Northeast Town organizations and/or initiatives.

Last year, the Northeast Town council supported a \$10,000 donation to the Howland Seniors' Hall renovations.

"We are happy to be able to continue to support the community as part of our agreement," said McLean's Mountain Wind Farm Manager Rick Martin. "The Manor is an important facility in the community and we are pleased to once again be helping a very worthy cause."

Manitoulin textile artist featured in three prestigious shows this fall

MANITOULIN—Accomplished Bay Estates textile artist Judy Martin will be featured in three shows this fall. The Island artist is well known for her beautiful and unique quilts and textile pieces, most recently The Manitoulin Circle Project, which has been shown at the Thunder Bay Art Gallery, Art Gallery of Sudbury and the Espanola Fibre Arts Festival.

WEBBWOOD—Blake Crawford was a regular five-year-old boy from Webbwood (with family ties to Manitoulin Island) who enjoyed hockey, dirt bike riding and playing with his sister until his life changed forever this fall when he was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia.

"This past August, Blake hadn't been feeling well and his mom took him on several trips to the emerg (Espanola Hospital's emergency room)," explained Blake's grandmother Lisa Bond of Whitefish Falls. "The Sunday of Labour Day weekend they wanted to run tests but no one was in the lab so they went back in on Monday and had blood work done and x-rays."

Ms. Bond said that the hospital wasn't able to find anything and continued to run tests until a second ultrasound and x-ray and

Wikwemikong students excel at Science Olympics

HAMILTON—A team of eight Wikwemikong High School students and their science teacher Chris Mara competed against over 2,000 students from across Ontario last month at McMaster's Engineering and Science Olympics, and although the team didn't bring home first place ribbons, they were among the top participants in their events.

"Our rookie team consisting of Grade 10 and 11 students competed against 62 schools and over 2,000 students," explained Mr. Mara. "We were not only the only First Nation school in attendance, but also the only school from Northern Ontario."

The Wikwemikong High School team competed in a number of the many events at McMaster including the global water challenge, chemical forensics, civil Canada arm and the physics paper triathlon.

During the physics paper triathlon, participants learned about the various aspects of physics and engineering through building a paper boat to transport a load, a paper bridge that had to support a mass and allow an object to be pulled underneath the bridge and construct a

Most Island communities top provincial average voter turnout

Gordon Barrie Island's 23.86 an exception

MANITOULIN—The voters of Manitoulin Island have spoken and in the 2014 municipal election did so in numbers that generally exceeded the provincial average. The main exception that stands out in the available data was Cockburn Island, whose ballot count showed barely 23.86 of eligible voters casting a ballot.

Since there is only one year round resident in that municipality, the low enthusiasm for electoral representation can be perhaps safely removed from the tally.

Although the official voter tally for Tehkummah had not yet been posted on the Ontario Votes site, the average of the five municipalities that did file their tallies show 46.38 percent, significantly above the provincial average of 42.91 percent.

The Ontario results were also likely skewed somewhat by the 60 percent (980,000) of electors that turned out to vote in the City of Toronto,



Canada's newest veterans join in a hallowed history of service

Poppy sales officially began October 31, as usual the last Friday in October, and with them Canada's official period of veteran and war dead remembrance commenced, culminating on Remembrance Day, next Tuesday November 11.

It's interesting to note that last weekend, right after the season of remembrance began, Canada created a new cadre of war veterans when, on Sunday, two RCAF aircraft bombed ISIS/ISLI/IS targets in Syria.

These bombing runs by two of the six aircraft Canada has committed to action against the militant group intent on creating an Islamic State in the Middle East, one that will supersede and ignore existing boundaries in countries like Iraq, Syria and possibly Jordan, are Canada's first foray into this Middle East conflict that most Canadians doubtless do not comprehend.

The ISIS/ISIL/IS forces seek to accomplish the ideal Islamic State by any means possible, including terrorist actions against domestic military forces and civilians alike in the Mideast regions they have targeted as the basis for the new state, and so Canada has joined the defense along with allies from Europe, the United States and with support of many Mideast nations.

So the pilots of these CF18 Hornet aircraft, together with their aircrews, join the ranks of those who have gone to war on Canada's behalf.

For many people of a certain age, Remembrance Day means the veterans of the Second World War, just as for those who came of age in the 1920s and 1930s thought exclusively of the veterans of the Great War or, as it came to be known, as World War One.

Of course most of us know, or know of, veterans of our decade in Afghanistan in the conflict in that remote area which represents Canada's largest-ever involvement in a foreign war.

In the early 1990s, Canadian ground and air troops participated in Kuwait in the First Gulf War and, of course, our armed forces have been involved in United Nations peacekeeping missions since the very first one, in Egypt, that defused the Suez Canal Crisis in the fall of 1956 (and the concept for UN peacekeeping was that of former Prime Minister and Algoma East MP Lester B. "Mike" Pearson).

Canadian troops have seen service in Bosnia, Rwanda, Korea and in Cypress as part of United Nations forces or as United Nations peacekeepers or as part of North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces, as allies for a common cause (as is the current situation in the Mideast) and we have committed forces to the two great European conflicts that together, defined not only the second half of the Twentieth Century but continue to impact on the world today.

This year, 2014, marks the centennial of the hostilities that began in August of 1914 and continued until November 11, 1918. It marks the one-year anniversary since we ended our military commitment in Afghanistan and by November 11, Remembrance Day must consider those who are currently putting themselves in peril in Syria and Iraq.

That's a wide spectrum of military activities for a relatively young (147 years) nation but our local community services of remembrance on Manitoulin and Remembrance Week installations such as the one currently in place at the Billings Old Mill Heritage Centre museum in Kagawong offer some important perspectives to those of us who have only heard of war and not experienced it even second-hand.

(The display at the museum in Kagawong is a large one of military artifacts from both the First and Second World Wars taken from a private collection and the Irish Regiment, loaned to the museum for an important display to mark the centennial of the opening of hostilities in 1914. It could easily be part of anyone's Remembrance Week observances, especially young people for whom stories of Canada's heroism is largely rendered as a series of dates and specified significant actions like Vimy Ridge as part of a history lesson at school.)

There is much to think about this Remembrance Week, just as there always is, but most notably we can and should think that through virtually all of the period since the end of the Second World War in 1945, Canada's service people have been helping out, keeping the peace or intervening against terrorist forces, continuously.

Just as they are today.
Lest we forget.

Remembering our Veterans

No sun, No moon,
No morn, No noon
No songs, No birds
November

It is the time again when the days of splendor retreat into the grey mists of late autumn and our only bright colour is the brave red of poppies all wear to remember the sacrifices made by our veterans. It is now we recall the horrendous days when the entire world wept as the Nazis orchestrated unthinkable carnage across the seas in an effort to remake humanity in their own genetic image.

Although I was only seven-years-old when war was declared I still recall the horror the news brought every day as broadcasts on our battery operated radio rang with the fanatic Nazi "Heil! Heil! Heil!" and rattled to the clank of steel boots goose-stepping across Europe. Material printed in our daily newspapers added to the effect by revealing the spread of war through a broader arena. Thus, under the banners not only of Europe's Hitler, but also of Italy's Mussolini and Japan's Imperial leader Hirohito, fear rode our young nights.

But respite was to come. It was a slow relief however as it took a multitude of men and smaller platoons of women from many parts

of the world to effect an offense against the mania. Canada's soldiers left this land and took up the offensive on the Nazi's battle-ground and helped hold the scourge at bay. The cost was tremendous but it stalled the attempt, and left those who had lived through the wretched time with enduring contempt and distrust for that depraved segment of the ancient German race. We rejoiced as that blood bath on distant shores became only a memory recalled in the tide of blood red poppies we would wear each November.

Hatred however knows nothing of time nor place as we were so sadly to learn during the last few weeks of October in this year of 2014. Once again depravity was at work as it reached into the heart of our country and the very halls of Canada's upper Parliament. In the process it took the lives of two of this land's fine soldiers who were employed in guarding our symbolic monuments. These heroes for democracy were Corporal Ethan Cirillo on guard duty at Canada's War Memorial on Parliament Hill, and, a few days earlier and not far away in Quebec, Warrant Officer Patrice Vincent was struck down while positioned outside the Veteran's Integrated Support Centre. Their deaths left us bereft and the manner of their going undermined our long sense of security. Within those few hours our concept of the world as we knew it changed forever.

In light of these recent events, Remembrance Day, held annually on November 11th, will be a greatly enhanced affair this year. Poppies will abound as never before. On all sides Maple Leaf flags will drape Capital Hill.

Small flags will be held aloft by multitudes of mourners of all ages, colors and creeds in a world learning to temper diligence with love and compassion.

But Remembrance Day will also remain the same. Despite the seasonal cold, our heritage will be on display with the red and white of snapping Maple Leaf flags, the flashing red ceremonial dress of our parading Mounted Police and the tattoo of drummer lads in red jackets, white hats and puttees as the scene recalls a time of red blood, white bandages and the eventual freedom from potential oppression.

As always the veterans will be, by far, the most impressive sight of the day. Both men and women will be there not only to represent their role in the defense of freedom but also to pay respect to their fallen and departed comrades. Once again, despite their very advanced age, they will attend without a quiver, as erect as their ancient bodies allow, while staunchly maintaining their impassive demeanor.

Although the veterans are noted for their reluctance to share the specifics of their war experiences, on a recent occasion a television's close-up view revealed their eyes were deep shadowed pools of sorrow. It was our faces that crumpled then, our lips and chins that quivered and our tears that spilled in recognition of the inestimable gift these freedom fighters have given the world. "God bless you, veterans. May we never forget."

Lew Lanktree

Lew immediately strikes one as being very congenial, a 'salt of the earth.' His expressive nature displays an enthusiasm for life that remains unchallenged by his many years. Eyes sparkle as he engages one with his quick sense of humour, something he has intuitively established as an excellent tool for handling the inevitable rough spots that pop up in any conversation.

Baseball was his favourite pastime at school and remains so today. "It was great fun trying to knock the windows out of the building," he shares, beaming. Apparently great excitement ensued if glass was actually broken. "Things have changed over the years regarding my baseball skills. Two years ago I was running to first base and my feet got going too fast. I fell and hit the ground hard enough to knock my glasses off. If the fairground fence hadn't been there, I would have been right up on the road," he insists. "But just my pride was hurt a touch."

Despite his reduced prowess at ball, Lew, 80, is still a contender.

He has many skills he could still boast about if he were so inclined. He curls three times a week, cuts wood and takes care of a few dozen cows. Daughter Susan interjects, "last month, he cut 20 cords of hardwood. That impressed me for sure."

"Looking back to my ancestors," Lew reminisces, "I know my maternal great-grandfather Henry Lewis portaged from Mudge Bay on Lake Kagawong to Lewis Landing on Long Bay. My maternal grandparents were Asa and Mary Jane Lewis (nee Sloss)." They farmed full-time and still managed to bring 11 children into the world. Paternal grandfather William (Bill) Lanktree, originally from Ireland, arrived to Manitoulin in 1898 and married Jane Lougheed. They farmed the land too and had a family of two boys and five girls.

Lew was born on the farm, to Frank and Thelma (nee Lewis) Lanktree, on January 22, 1934. Frank and Thelma had met on the Island. Lew was their first child and it would be seven years before their next child, another boy, was born. "I was given my mother's surname, Lewis, which was shortened to Lew."


The farm was in Britainville, at the junction of Lanktree and Evergreen Roads. An early memory was picking strawberries on Square Bay. "This bay was well-known for its bountiful strawberry crop. We brought cold tea and water to sustain us for the day. Picking wasn't my favourite pastime, but we needed to build up our winter preserves. There was a blueberry marsh near the McAlister place, just south of our own farm. That was a day of picking too."

In 1942, when Lew was eight, he remembers an awesome sight. On the way home from school. He saw all his neighbours standing on wooden beams building a huge barn. They used elbow grease to pound in the wooden pegs. Beams were hauled up with ropes, pipe pulls and pulleys. Sections were framed on the ground and hauled up one at a time. "It was a terrific sight that anyone privileged to see

would never forget." Many years later, in the 1990s, the big barn blew down. Lew's son Dale owned it then.

School was in Brittainville. "I was barely five and not really interested in school but others in the area were going and I could trail along," he offers, grinning. "It was uphill both ways for one and a half miles". There were 35 kids and only one teacher at a time. Lloyd Griffith was one of those teachers. "You liked them all or you got a 'lickin,'" Lew insists, a new sparkle in his eye. "To get to school in winter, we had a team of two horses and a sleigh like most folk."

Some winter days were so challenging with deep snow that the horses had to be unhooked and

hockey too. The Providence Bay Arena was just too far. Cardboard and newspapers were rolled into shin guards and sticks were bent branches cut to fit. Cow pies made good pucks. At night, coal oil lanterns with their chimneys blackened with soot only offered marginal light. It was better when the moon was out, but we found we spent most of our time looking for the puck in the bush."

At 16, Lew finished Grade 8 and left school. "I had had enough by then and I wanted to get on with my life." Like many others on Manitoulin, Lew headed for the Great Lakes freighters. He was about 17 when he and five friends got into one car and headed for Midland. "I started as a deck hand and my job was painting, cleaning and other duties. It was my first time away from home."

Lew's first lake freighter was called the 'Algosteel,' an Algoma Central Railways (ACR) boat. Lew did seasonal work for the ACR too, in the freight yards, loading and unloading rail cars. Another boat was the Norman B. McPherson, a Canadian Steamship Lines (CSL) boat. Winters were spent at home doing odd jobs.

"In the mid-fifties, we were travelling through the lower canals and the St. Lawrence River on the freighters. We also hauled pulpwood from Anticosti Island to Three Rivers, Quebec. I remember three bad storms during those years. The pulpwood was on the deck but survived most of the storms. We generally stayed below deck to avoid being washed away. In one storm, the whole wheelhouse shifted, cracking the welding around the entire base. We crept into port through the storm taking two and a half days for a trip that normally took 15 hours." Lew went from deck hand to watchman and finally wheelman. "I would have made third

used to break the trail before they could be hooked back up to the sleigh to continue. A few old cars could be pressed into service on some days. Four families living in the same area would share this responsibility. In the winters of 1958 to 1959, Evergreen Road was blocked all season. Snow was above the mailboxes, which made them difficult to find, and as high as the telephone wires. These,

however, hung lower than they do today.

"My favourite memories at 14 are playing ball with my dad and my uncle Donald Lanktree," he offers. "This was real ball, not fastball or softball. You pitched overhand. We won a few games against the Britainville and West Bay teams. We played some pond


mate if I had returned to the boats that next year."

Noreen Joanne Greenman (Joanne) came into Lew's life in 1956 at a Gore Bay dance. "I guess we both hit it off, or we wouldn't have kept seeing each other," he claims, logically. "We dated for about two years and then were wed on June 6, 1958 in Spring Bay,

first in Mindemoya and later, in 1989, in Gore Bay. Before that she stayed home to raise her family. The Lanktrees had three children, Sherry, Dale and Susan. Sherry is a secretary at Manitoulin Transport. Her husband Dan Forrest works with Purvis Fisheries. Their daughter Terra is married to Jacob Wood and they have a three month-old son, Liam, the first great-grandchild for Lew. Dale has two children; Chris lives in London and Tanya lives in Kagawong. Susan is a high school teacher at MSS. She is responsible for the co-op education program. Susan recently remarried to Richard Whynott. Susan has two children from her first marriage; Jamey, away at college and Taylor, in Grade 12.

In the late 1970s and through much of the 1980s, Lew went through some challenging times. "I had a terrible time with my nerves, depression and alcohol. I know it was hard on the family and friends. They tried to help me but I shut them out for a long time. The doctor put me on Halcion, a prescription drug to help me sleep but this drug wound up doing more harm than good for me. I had my last drink on November 24, 1987, but I was still on that medication. Two days later I was admitted to a treatment center in Sudbury."

"In 1988 I was admitted to the hospital for a week trying to get weaned from the Halcion. Later I found out it was taken off the market for various reasons, including memory loss. I also attended AA for a number of years," he shares. "Being an alcoholic is nothing to be proud or ashamed of. Only you can change it. You need help just as you would for sugar diabetes or heart disease." Lew was very thankful for

all the support he did get from his friends, once he allowed others in.

"I am one of the few who made it out, who recovered and stayed recovered."

The 1980s saw a lot of farmers losing their land from high interest rates. Lew recalls one farmer in the Bruce Peninsula who was helped by his friends. When the bank came to assess the number of cattle, the banker stood at the barn door and a circle of 30 cows was paraded around the barn and in front of the banker for an hour or so to give the impression of more cattle and more worth. Another farmer saw his friends bid \$5 a cow at an auction and managed to keep the take low for the bank so the property could be purchased back by the original owner at a low price. These farmers stuck together for mutual support.

In 1992, Joanne contracted a virus while she was on a holiday in the States. It was a fierce battle which left her in the intensive care unit on life support." She spent three weeks in Sudbury and recovered enough to come home and go on disability. She couldn't work anymore. She had smoked much of her life and now had permanent COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease.) She rallied for a few years then regressed

Sheguiandah First Nation family loses everything in fire

SHEGUIANDAH—The Tuesday, October 21 Sheguiandah First Nation house fire is still under investigation by the Ontario Fire Marshal's office as a family of eight wait for the results of the investigation, staying at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in the meantime.

"We lost practically everything," home owner Tanya Waindubence told The Expositor during a phone interview

on Monday, "including our puppy and two pet bearded dragons."

As The Expositor reported last week, the Northeast Town Fire Department responded to a house fire on Wing-sh Miikan on the Sheguiandah First Nation on Tuesday, October 21 at 4 am.

Ms. Waindubence, her six children and brother Courtland Williams made it out of the fire safely, but the house

was severely damaged by the blaze.

"I was at home with my six children and my brother," said Ms. Waindubence of the morning of the fire. "We were all asleep. At some time between 3 and 4 am I was woken up by what I thought was my alarm clock, but I rolled over and saw it was still dark out and that there was smoke coming into my room. I quickly realized it was the smoke detector. I heard my brother and my oldest daughter screaming 'fire' and waking up the children. I quickly ran to help and we all got out of the house. It happened so fast. I sent two of the kids down the road to call for help and I tried to go back in to get the puppy but there was just too much smoke and I couldn't find her. I couldn't reach the bearded dragons either. Thankfully our other dog made it out okay—she ran out with the kids and us."

"My brother's room was in the basement and he had headphones on," continued Ms. Waindubence. "He said he smelt smoke, but didn't think anything of it until the smell got really strong, then he took off his earphones and heard the fire alarm. Then he opened the door and saw flames and ran upstairs to wake up the kids and me."

Ms. Waindubence said since her home is a band house, it is covered by the band's insurance, however it has been boarded up and she has been told it could take up to 90 days before the cause of the fire is determined.

"The band has helped us with food, but our funds are running low," said Ms. Waindubence. "I am paying for two hotel rooms and the costs are adding up."

Anyone wishing to help the family can donate through the Waindubence Family Trust Fund at the Little Current BMO.

Kagawong family home destroyed in blaze

KAGAWONG—A Kagawong residence was destroyed in a fire that took place this past Monday evening.

Merv Gilchrist, fire chief of the Billings Township volunteer fire department, said that the fire took place at the residence-cottage owned by Jody Kennedy and her family located just off Arda Road (across from the Billings landfill) near Highway 540.

"We received the call at about 6:40 pm and were on the scene of the fire at 6:55 pm," Mr. Gilchrist told the Recorder. Along with members of the Billings Fire Department the Gore Bay/Gordon Volunteer Fire Department were called in to assist.

"Jona, Jody's oldest son, had been in the home by himself with the rest of the family being away at the time of the fire," said Mr. Gilchrist. "He had turned a portable heater on in the house and had gone to take a bath and when he came back into the room the fire was already going,"

explained Mr. Gilchrist.

"Luckily Jona got out, as the house was basically a total loss due to the fire," said Mr. Gilchrist. "He called his parents who contacted us."

"There was a smoke alarm in the house, but it wasn't working," said Mr. Gilchrist. Provincial regulations call for a properly working fire alarm to be located on each level of a residence/building and car-

bon monoxide detectors are also required in every home-residence in Ontario, as of October 15, 2014.

"It was a wood building and went up really fast in the fire, it was already through the roof on the porch when we arrived on the scene," said Mr. Gilchrist. There are a couple of other smaller cottages in the area of the fire, but firefighters were able

to keep the blaze from spreading to those buildings, or the bush area, he pointed out.

Firefighters were on the scene of the blaze until approximately 12:30 am, said Mr. Gilchrist.

The homeowners "didn't have any insurance on the home," said Mr. Gilchrist.

An account in Jody Kennedy's name has been opened at the Bank of Montreal branch in Mindemoya for those people who would like to assist the family financially.

"The investigation is still in its primary stages," continued Constable Boyd. "The OPP was called in yesterday to assist due to the severity of the incident."

As of press time Monday, Constable Boyd was still unsure when that section of road would be reopened.

The Expositor also spoke with Mr. Oshkabewisens' girlfriend Bronte Peltier who was able to report on his condition.

"He's doing better," Ms. Peltier told The Expositor Monday evening from Mr. Oshkabewisens' bedside. "He's stable now, but he has lacerations to his kidney and liver, brain injuries, he's not breathing on his own and he is in a coma."

"He (Andy) was on his way to a friend's house," explained Ms. Peltier of the Sunday morning incident. "He was alone at the time, but apparently a kid saw the whole incident from his front porch on Wikwemikong Way. He (Andy) was crossing the road by Andy's going onto Sesame Street when

a dark red Ford pick-up sped up and hit him."

Ms. Peltier said she got the call around 3 am Sunday morning and went to Little Current and then on to Sudbury.

"I was so shocked," Mr. Peltier shared. "He is a really friendly guy, outgoing and gets along with everyone. I don't know anyone that would want to hurt him."

Mr. Oshkabewisens is the father of a 10-year old son (Damien) and works as a backcountry site coordinator for Wikwemikong Tourism.

Constable Boyd said he was unable to confirm that a witness had viewed the incident directly or that the vehicle had "sped up."

Mr. Oshkabewisens' brothers Joshua, Jamie and Jason have started a Facebook page (DAVID "Andy" Oshkabewisens Fundraiser) to "help alleviate expenses for Andy, Bronte and family (lodging, rent, travel expenses and meals)," states the fundraising page on the social media site. "Any donation would be greatly appreciated and can be email transferred to joshua_oshkabewisens@hotmail.com or deposited in Jason Oshkabewisens' BMO account, 3363-631. There will also be donation collection boxes at Karen's (Coffeemat) and Andy's."

Tremblay and Pat Roach prominently feature the company as a service company on the production. This deal marks a move into full on production for the company, however.

"We will be first of all looking for development money," said Ms. Chirelli. "That is the money we need for editing the script, setting up the budget and then finding the money to make the film."

Ms. Chirelli said that "we love the project. We loved it from the beginning." She noted that there is a long road between the signing of an option and seeing the final results of filming up on the screen. "It took Avatar 20 years to travel that road and there are no guarantees."

But as a story written by Northern Ontario writers, being produced by a Northern Ontario company, the project is a wonderful story in and of itself.

"There are a lot of people working very hard to do what they love to do," said Ms. Chirelli. While there are many films being shot in the North with plenty of famous names, most of those stories feature southern companies, with southern actors and largely southern production teams telling southern stories. This is a Northern Ontario story with strong southern connections with many of the hallmarks of a great story, including romance, aspects of a


we needed to address this problem and that is how this project was started."

Chief Hare said that the new youth rehabilitation clinic, which will potentially be built behind the powwow grounds, will have a strong focus on traditional healing, as well as counselling and life skills training. It will work in partnership with the current M'Chigeeng Wellness and Recovery Case Management Team, an opiate addition program from the M'Chigeeng Health Centre (in partnership with Dr. Dressler of the Larch Street Clinic, the Mindemoya Guardian Pharmacy, the Manitoulin Central Family Health Team, Ontario Works and Addiction Services), as well as various other services and facilities in M'Chigeeng such as the Kenjewin Teg Educational Institute.

"We have the resources here to complement the rehabilitation clinic," continued Chief Hare. "We want to help people not only with their addiction, but with addressing their spirit and mind."

Chief Hare said that the facility will be focused on Manitoulin First Nations youth, but he hopes they will eventually be able to expand the program to anyone, of any age, in the area who is in need of the clinic's services.

"We hope to start construction in the spring, but in the meantime we will be working on planning and design, as well as developing resources," concluded Chief Hare. "We have a lot of work ahead of us, but this is going to be a great thing for Mnidoo Mnising."



September 14.

"That Monday (September 15) they confirmed Blake had leukemia," said Ms. Bond.

Ms. Bond told The Expositor that Blake has had every set back possible these past few months with complications ranging from a blood clot in his neck to problems with his chest port (where chemotherapy is administered).

After his first round of chemotherapy Blake was able to return home to his home in Webbwood with his mother Kayli Bond and father Beau Crawford, but unfortunately upon his return to Ottawa his status went from a standardized risk to a high risk and he will now have to undergo an extra 52 day chemo treatment, meaning that he will have five rounds of treatment (opposed to his original four).

"He will likely have to stay in Ottawa until next September, only able to come home for a few days in between treatments," continued Ms. Bond. "His sister Haileigh is staying with us (Ms. Bond and her husband John) and family."

Hopefully, Ms. Bond said, Blake's condition will be stable next September and he will be able to move home and con-

tinue his treatment in Sudbury, but doctors have told the family that Blake's overall treatment will take a minimum of three and a half years.

"Kayli and Blake are living at Ronald McDonald House in Ottawa, but she isn't able to work and is still having to pay rent so that they have a home to come back to," said Ms. Bond of the family's financial situation. "Also, not all of Blake's medical expenses are covered."

Last Thursday, the Holy Trinity Anglican Church in Little Current held a fundraising lunch to help Blake and his family raising a total of \$1,650, and other area organizations are also doing what they can to help the family, including 3 Cows and a Cone, which hosted a bake sale last month.

Ms. Bond went to visit Blake last week in Ottawa and reported that he was looking well and had fun trick or treating at the hospital for Hallowe'en.

paper glider out of a single sheet of paper.

For the chemical forensics event, teams had to compete against one another and against the clock, demonstrating their basic knowledge of chemistry through three mini-competitions requiring different chemical forensic skills.

As for the global water challenge, a new event to the Olympics this year, students were challenged to optimize the performance of a flocculation process. They were given a variety of polymers that are commonly used in the water treatment industry to cause small particles to attach together and form a larger structure (a floc) that would settle to the bottom. The teams competed to come up with the best treatment conditions that cause the colloidal particles in synthetic wastewater to flocculate and produce a clean water layer on top.

Finally for the civil Canada arm event, student teams had to build the longest possible arm to hold a mass of

100 grams.

"This is the fifth time since 2005 that we (Wikwemikong High School) have attended the Science Olympics," said Mr. Mara. "Our team did very well and was prepared even though they were a rookie team. They whipped through the events. They had some top competition going against

some of the top math and science students in the province, but they really held their own and were strong competitors."

"I was really excited to go down (to Hamilton) and participate," said Wikwemikong High School Grade 11 student Hannah Peltier. "The water challenge was my favourite."

"Being with all my friends and doing science was my favourite part (of the Olympics)," added teammate Grade 10 student Eileen Letander-Trudeau. "It inspired me to look to a possible career in the sciences in the future."

Fellow teammate Reynold Assiniwe said that the team owed its success to preparation and practice ahead of time.





Sudbury and District Board of Health calls on province to prohibit the use of e-cigarettes on school properties

Rainbow schools ban on smoking already includes e-cigarettes

SUDBURY—A recent motion from the Sudbury and District Board of Health (SDBH) calling on the province to prohibit the use of e-cigarettes on school property and their promotion has gotten attention from both the media and Manitoulin's trustee on the Rainbow District School Board (RDSB), however the school board says e-cigarettes are already included in their no smoking on school property policy.

The Sudbury Board of Health passed a motion at its most recent meeting stating, "whereas in 2013, approximately 5.6 percent of students in Grades 7 to 12 in the Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) area reported having smoked cigarettes daily in the past year (3.4 percent Ontario), and the overall prevalence of smoking in the SDHU area is significantly higher than that for the province (26.4 percent versus 19.2 percent daily or occasional smokers of ages 12 and over, 2011-2012), and one in four Ontario youth in Grades 9-12, who report smoking, say they smoked menthol cigarettes. And, evidence suggests that at least some of the youth smoking menthol cigarettes choose to do so because they didn't like the flavour of regular cigarettes, and whereas the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDS) determined that while menthol in cigarettes is not a toxic ingredient, menthol makes already toxic cigarettes more appealing cigarettes and is therefore a public health risk above that seen with non-menthol cigarettes. And whereas the Sudbury and District Board of Health has a longstanding history of action and advocacy to prevent tobacco use and promote tobacco use cessation, be it resolved that the Sudbury and District

Board of Health strongly endorse the Ontario Medical Association's call on government to reintroduce tobacco legislation banning candy and fruit-flavoured cigarettes while adding to it a ban of the sale of menthol cigarettes and tobacco products."

The board also passed a motion on the manufacture, sale, promotion, display and use of e-cigarettes and prohibiting the use of e-cigarettes on school property, stating, "Whereas electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes) mimic the appearance, use, and sometimes the taste of a cigarette and some use cartridges which contain nicotine, an addictive substance. E-cigarettes that contain nicotine or make a health claim are illegal in Canada, however, there is no legislation that regulates the sale and use of e-cigarettes that do not contain nicotine or make health claims. And e-cigarettes could have potential as a cessation aid, but there is limited data on their overall effectiveness to do so. The Sudbury and District Board of Health support the efforts of alPHa, Ontario Boards of Health and other public health agencies and provincial organizations and strongly recommend implementation of federal regulations on the manufacturing and quality of e-cigarettes, the promotion, display and sale of e-cigarettes to minors, and the use of e-cigarettes in workplaces and public places. And further, that the Sudbury and District Board of Health recommend prohibiting the use of e-cigarettes on school property, and further that this motion be forwarded to Health Canada, the Honourable Rona Ambrose, local MPs, alPHa and Ontario Boards of Health."

The motion prompted a story by the

CBC stating that the RDSB is now including e-cigarettes in its policy banning tobacco on school properties.

Manitoulin trustee on the RSDB, Larry Killens, contacted the paper after the release of the story to express his opinion on the RDSB's decision to ban e-cigarettes.

"The board administration has gone ahead and made this decision (to ban e-cigarettes) without consulting parent/school councils," said Mr. Killens. "I have been getting phone calls from parents that have begged and pleaded with their children to quit smoking and are supplying them with these e-cigarettes. We need to do our homework. Some parent may be trying to help their child quit and using e-cigarettes as a way to do so. I'm not saying e-cigarettes are good or bad, I'm just saying we need to talk to parents first."

The Expositor contacted the RDSB to determine if this decision was prompted by the motion from the Sudbury and District Health Board and to address Mr. Killens' concerns.

"We treat the electric version of the product (cigarettes) the same in our policy," explained Bruce Bourget, RDSB superintendent. "There is a policy of no smoking on school property (at all RDSB schools) and that includes e-cigarettes. When e-cigarettes came along, long before this motion from the health board, we decided to treat e-cigarettes the same (as traditional tobacco products)."

As to Mr. Killens' comments, Mr. Bourget said that the policy had not been changed and that the ban on e-cigarettes on RDSB school properties had been in effect under the existing no smoking policy for several years.

...Most Island communities top provincial average voter turnout

a significant 18.5 percent more than the 2010 election that saw the chain of office draped over the controversial shoulders of Rob Ford.

The Ontario provincial election result reversed a two-decade slide in voter turnout in province, with 52 percent of the province's 9.2 million eligible voters casting a ballot.

Billings Mayor Austin Hunt secured his place in Canadian municipal history as the longest serving municipal politician in the country with a convincing win that nearly matched the combined tallies of his two opponents, Billings Councillor Sandi Hurcomb and newcomer David Yurich. Incumbents Sharon Alkenbrach (who had been earlier appointed by council to replace the late Gerry Mack), Brian Parker and Tom Imrie were also returned to office, joined by newcomer Barbara Erskine.

Five of the other Manitoulin heads of council, mayors or reeves, were acclaimed in their office, including Al MacNevin in the Northeast Town, Ron Lane in Gore Bay, Ken Noland in Burpee-Mills, Paul Moffat in Assignack and Brenda Jones in Cockburn Island.

Of the other contested top council seats, two saw incumbent upsets, with a tight race in Central Manitoulin going to former mayor Richard Stephens by a bare 16 vote margin over incumbent Gerry Strong out of the 1,448 votes cast for the position. Mayor Strong has indicated that he did not plan to call for a recount. Mayor Strong succeeded in winning in Wards 1 and 2, but lost ground in Ward 3 (Sandfield).

Tehkummah Councillor Eric Russell ended long-serving Tehkummah incumbent Reeve Gary Brown's 35-year winning streak in municipal pol-

itics with 153 votes to 118 for Reeve Brown.

While Central Manitoulin's Ward 1 incumbents Patricia MacDonald and Derek Stephens were returned to the council table, but in Ward 2 both incumbents, Gloria Haner and Adam McDonald were replaced by challengers Alex Baran and Dale Scott.

In Ward 3, the only incumbent in the race, Ted Taylor, was returned to office accompanied by newcomer Linda Farquhar.

In the contest to determine who would represent Manitoulin Island on the Rainbow District School Board, incumbent trustee Larry Killens succeeded in fending off a challenge by Maureen Egan, garnering 2,722 votes to Ms. Egan's 2,199 votes.

The new councils take office on December 1, 2014.

Former Veteran's Ombudsman speaks at Espanola gathering

ESPAÑOLA—The words of retired Col. Pat Strogan were inspiring to all who attended the Fighting Together Symposium, held at the Royal Canadian Legion,

Espanola, on Thursday, October 23.

Mr. Strogan told his story of a military career, followed by his term as the first Veterans Ombudsman and in taking on that job, he took the word of several bureaucrats and government officials at face value, all who promised him support and cooperation with the Ombudsman's Office to correct the flaws in the New Veterans Charter that greatly disadvantaged Canadian Veterans.

Two years into the job, Col. Strogan realized that no matter what he as the Ombudsman said or how many collective recommendations of veterans were submitted to government, the wheels of power continued to move slowly as ever and arguments were always of a cheapskate attitude to this flawed piece of legislation called The New Veterans Charter.

Col. Strogan also spoke on the general attitudes of government over the years towards disadvantaged groups, from First Nations to the physically and mentally disabled and those on the streets of our cities, plus the invasion of



privacy incidents against veterans and others, where no one was brought to account and where the general attitude of any form of payment to veterans was of low ball awards or spendthrift spending on other issues, using the excuse of having an obligation to preserve the public purse, but no obligation towards compassionate spending to rectify imminent needs of the poor segments of our society.

Col. Strogan received a standing ovation and many thanks for all that he has done for veterans in his term as Ombudsman and his current day activities in bringing groups together in support of each other's agenda.

The next speaker was Legal Aid lawyer Mike Shane of the Manitoulin Legal Aid Clinic who echoed the words of Col. Strogan in

many ways, speaking on the plight of injured and diseased workers in Ontario and the callous attitudes of the Ontario government, noting former Premier Mike Harris who made a 30 percent cut to employers' contributions and lost sight of workers' needs in a time of injury or disease. He quoted statistics of the McGuinty and Wynne governments decreasing benefit costs by one billion dollars and 28 percent by denial of rightful benefits to injured workers, where denial rates have gone up from four to 24 percent while between 2009-2013, workplace fatalities have increased by 43 percent by downloading their responsibilities on municipalities and the healthcare system.

Between 2008-2013, Ontario Works have increased by 43 percent while injured and diseased workers have been effectively pushed

into poverty.

Because of the acts of homegrown terrorism in recent days, two wreaths were laid at the Cenotaph at noon on behalf of WO Patrice Vincent and Cpl. Nathan Cirillo, their families, those of the injured and all veterans at home and abroad. Col. Strogan laid the Canadian and Ontario wreaths, as Mayor Lehoux, members of council and those running for election looked on in unison and Mrs. Joan Byers and husband John also looked on, their son David Byers having sacrificed his life in Afghanistan.

back to life support in 2002. "She was never the same after that," Lew shares. "In October of 2006 we said our final goodbyes. We had to bury her on Susan's 40th birthday."

"I love all the seasons on Manitoulin, except winter. It's too cold for me now, but I still love the curling we do." In December of 2013, Susan and Sherry took Lew to see Kenny Rogers in Sault Ste. Marie, at Kewadin. "I really enjoyed that show. I like country and western music, especially the old songs sung by guys like Johnny Cash. My granddaughters Jamey and Taylor (Susan's girls) both sing and Jamey plays guitar. They are quite talented. Jamey wrote a song for my 79th birthday. It was a terrific song and captured me nicely: on YouTube: www.youtube.com/watch?v=Z9G7sc5b4Z4.

Lew is still involved with ball activities and with the Curling Club in Mindemoya. "I curl about three times a week. I gave up an eight-end this year," he concedes. "I golf in the 'Old Men's League' each Thursday. We play best ball most of the time so there is less

pressure on any one of us. For five or six years, I ran the beer cart. I stayed on the fifth to seventh holes normally so people could have a nice break in the middle. I had fun telling 'lies' to nice people I met. I even saw a hole in one on the seventh during a tournament."

In addition to the 54 curling trophies, Lew also got a Certificate of Appreciation from Community Living for helping with the Special Olympics. In 2012 he won the Sandy McCutcheon volunteer award as well.

Daughter Susan reminds us that he still cuts lots of wood and looks after cattle at 80. Lew pauses and says, "what is most important to me is having good health, good friends and keeping relatives and family close. I am not much of a cook so my neighbours bring over some tasty food or a cake from time to time; just when I need to be sweetened-up."

When asked if there is someone he admires, Lew responds: "I would like to be like my Uncle Donald. He was almost 95 when he died a few years ago. He was still active, cutting wood with a chainsaw and walking four miles a day. He had this odd habit of jumping out of a chair that seemed so funny to us," Lew explains. "Maybe that was done to gain the needed momentum," he questions. "We lost another good friend recently. Harold McCutcheon was a member of our small

group that gets together at Mum's. We meet most mornings to hear local gossip and 'tell a few lies' ourselves," he smiles. "Cousin Elwood Lewis was told by Carol at Foodland that I am first in line as a 'greeter' if that position ever comes up."

"What are my strengths?" Lew repeats and pauses. Susan inter-

jects, "his sense of humour. He is quick with the comeback, quick with little quips he has learned over the years." To this Lew adds, "I like to think I am also a good friend to people."

"What would I still like to do? I guess perhaps a visit to Ireland or Scotland, the home of my distant ancestors." Lew ponders over the next question. "There is nothing I would change if I could go back. We both enjoyed our time in Elliot Lake but if the mines hadn't closed we might never have bought the old farm and moved back here. I would have missed out on so much that I love here, the friends, the farming and of course, the good ball and curling."

"I hope that all my children and grandchildren and great-grandchildren do well in life. Granddaughter Taylor will often visit for a night. We have a good feed


of potatoes and fried baloney when she comes. My recipe for happiness is work hard. Working hard will never kill you. I always felt others were smarter than I was because I didn't get a full education. At that time, you worked as soon as you could, to help the family. People did not anticipate getting an education first. From the time I was a little boy I have seen so many changes during my life. We went from horse and buggy, dirt roads, small local schools to highways, fast cars, big central schools and government control."

"I guess I am most afraid of getting older and sick, and not being able to stay in my own home. My hips bother me a little but generally I am in pretty good shape considering the shape I'm in," he chuckles. "As long as I can get up in the morning, I will be happy. I still smoke a bit but I eat what I like. I guess when I go it would be best if I just go quickly, in the ball field, on a curling rink or in a pasture. I don't want to linger as my Joanne had to do. That was so hard on everybody."

"When it comes to Manitoulin, my home, I tell newcomers when I get the chance, 'One more step and you're up in heaven.' I have seen quite a few other places in the world and I have not seen anything better than what we have here," Lew confirms. "When you look over the North Channel on your way back home, can you really say you have seen something better? Sometimes it takes a bit of maturity or old age to make this realization. Most Island people are very friendly," he concludes. "There is no place I would rather be than right here, one step away from heaven."



Fifty-four students graduate from Kenj AIMS program

M'CHIGEENG—Fifty-four young men and women graduated from the Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute's (KTEI) Anishinabek Identity, Mind and Spirit (AIMS) program and received their diplomas on October 24 at the M'Chigeeng community complex. The event was held not only to honour the graduates but also to celebrate the project's successes and the impact the courses had on the student's personal goals and outlook for the future.

Master of Ceremonies and KTEI Elder in Residence Josh Eshkawkogan welcomed the students, staff and educators of the AIMS program followed by an opening prayer and smudge ceremony by Elder Alma Jean Migwans and an Anishinaabe preamble by the students of Mnidoo Mnising Anishinabek Kinoomaage-gamig (MMAK), M'Chigeeng's Ojibwe-based learning curriculum for children.

KTEI Executive Director Stephanie Roy addressed the gathering saying, "I am very glad to be here today," as she went on to explain

that the AIMS program was holistically designed and included subjects such as math and science and the upgrading of skills in reading and writing, as well as important learnings about the Anishinabek history and culture.

Beverly Roy Carter, the director of operations for KTEI, who developed the AIMS program, also spoke at the graduation celebration. "It is a great day to see the culmination of all your efforts," she told the students. "Today is exactly what I envisioned for those who applied for the AIMS program—to find your purpose and gifts to share with the world. Never stop learning."

There were three keynote speakers at the ceremony and all were graduates of the courses. Lynn Migwans spoke of learning about First Nation language and rights and forming lasting friendships while Joe Ense said, "I learned a lot," and Steve Antoine remarked that he hoped all those who graduated would continue their learning journey.

M'Chigeeng First Nation Chief Joe Hare also spoke to the students, saying, "You have a heads up and a head start on learning about yourselves and your history. Through programs such as this and others, we can instill pride in ourselves. You can achieve what you set your mind on to do, something tremendous."

Christine Migwans is the project manager of the

AIMS program and she explained that a team had to work from scratch to develop a curriculum as well as operational policies and services arrangements. As she noted, there are three components to be completed before one can receive a graduation certificate. Firstly, the students must complete five to seven certificate courses which include such subjects such as first aid, WHIMIS, customer service, Smart Serve, driver's education, chainsaw operation and others. Secondly, attendance in classes must be at 90 percent and thirdly, there must be a three week placement participation with students working at such places as

Theatre Cambrian, Vale and Pine Needle Productions as well as businesses on the Island.

"The program was basically for the unemployed and the underemployed," Ms. Migwans explained. "We started the program in 2012 with six intakes and we had program reviews in between each intake with reports from counsellors, the teachers and the students. We have had a high degree of success and the program will now be shared across Canada and we will be presenting a module for other First Nations to try. We are very proud of the students' accomplishments."

We will remember them

Captain Jeff Caselton of Manitowaning shares his military story Soldier returns to home community for Remembrance Day

PETAWAWA—Twenty-seven-year-old Captain Jeff Caselton of Manitowaning joined the Canadian Armed Forces in 2006.

"It was something I always wanted to do," said Captain Caselton of his decision to join the military. "My father (John Caselton) served in the (Royal Canadian) Navy and my uncle is a lieutenant colonel."

Mr. Caselton, an infantry officer, started his service in the 3rd Battalion with the Royal Canadian Regiment at Garrison



Petawawa (the largest military base in Canada).

He told The Expositor that his favourite time with the military was with the 3rd Battalion as a platoon commander.

"It is rewarding working with soldiers and non-commission officers," shared Captain Caselton.

Recently, Captain Caselton returned from a year-long tour in Israel's West Bank, his first tour.

He explained the tour was a joint liaison mission between the Israeli government, Canada, the United States and Britain.

"We were there on behalf of the

Israeli government to help the Palestinians build security infrastructure in an effort to help make them a viable partner for Israel," Captain Caselton explained.

During his tour he served as the executive assistant to the Canadian general task force commander and lived in Israel, dressed in civilian clothing.

Of his time in the armed forces, Captain Caselton said it has been "a privilege to serve my country."

Captain Caselton is currently on leave for Remembrance Day, a first for the Islander who will be

returning to Manitowaning to attend the November 11 ceremonies in his hometown.

"Remembrance Day is a day to reflect back on the individuals who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our country," the captain shared.

"We are so proud of Jeff," said his parents Colleen and John Caselton. "It is wonderful that he will be coming home for Remembrance Day."

his back," as he would also do for them.

Although he and his friends did not see 'action' in the form of battle, they were not exempt from personal tragedy. Mr. Osborne shared the story of how his buddy Ted was the victim of an accident on a foggy S-turn on the highway. A memory that is still very vivid and emotional.

Mr. Osborne and his wife had a second daughter, Georgia, while in Germany and returned back to Canada just two weeks before Christmas in 1962.

When two of our own were tragically killed last month everyone, including the Osbornes, felt many emotions including sadness and anger in the violent acts. This type of thing just doesn't happen here.

Each year Mr. Osborne lays a wreath at the Remembrance Day service held at the Kagawong Park Centre and will again on Tuesday, November 11.

Military policeman Les Osborne shares recollections of years served

ICE LAKE—Les Osborne comes from a military background. His father was in the Canadian Armed Forces and his Uncle Sonny is buried in Africa.

"It was what I grew up with," stated Mr. Osborne when asked what made him choose his occupation. There is a long line of service to Canada in his family.

Mr. Osborne joined the army in 1957, spending two years in Petawawa for boot camp and then Gagetown, New Brunswick for seven weeks in the bush doing maneuver training.

In September of 1959 Mr. Osborne, wife Gloria and with infant daughter Bonnie, went to Soest, Germany where his role was that of a Lance Corporal.

Officers would police those from their own country. For example, if an altercation occurred and there were two or more people involved, one from Holland, another from Great Britain and

one from Canada, Mr. Osborne would be assigned to the Canadian and the others by an officer from their home country.

The people in Germany were "super nice," shared Mr. Osborne.

Approximately 1,000 men from his unit were stationed in Germany. As a corporal Mr.

Osborne was the equivalent of 'city police' where the military police, or provost corporal, were more like Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers.

While Canadian officers were stationed in Soest, Americans were in Frankfurt and the Brits closer to Holland.



Having spent some time in Holland, what surprised the couple was the number of bicycles they saw.

"Each base," shared Mr. Osborne, "had a hockey arena that held 3,000 people." When he asked the locals why they liked hockey so much their response was that they often played against Canadians and there were always plenty of fights.

Mr. Osborne shared his recollection of visiting Belsen, Germany where there was a large mound, "higher than my house (a bungalow) of murdered Jews who were buried there."

He also said that birds and butterflies were seen everywhere but none at this site in Belsen. "It was so quiet," he commented.

While in Germany Mr. Osborne had two guardian angels, Jean Paul and Gerry, who "always had



Allied losses. However, there is to be found in a November 1914 edition of this paper a small article reporting that the German people would not be able to bear the incredible losses already piling up in the battles taking place in Belgium.

This was no accident. Journalists were not allowed to report from the front. Lord Kitchener's experience during the Boer War had left him convinced that reports from the front were an aid to the enemy and more than one journalist had been threatened with being shot if found wandering near the front lines.

To a generation that has followed the downward progress of missiles on the 6 o'clock news from the comfort of our living room couches courtesy of embedded cameras, it is almost impossible to imagine the dearth of news available to families in 1914. The lack of any information in the local newspaper is lit-

advances on the Central Powers that they would be in Berlin before Christmas.

The Expositor at the time was urging farmers not to enlist, saying that Europe had plenty of men, but what the Allies really needed from Canada was food.

A soldier's life was not a route to wealth. Recruits received \$1.10 a day as privates and, if married, the wife received \$20 month and an allowance for each child of between \$4 and \$7.50, depending on age.

We are all too familiar of the grim toll of casualties from that first conflict, where Canada was to see industrial warfare at its most horrific, even as our direct

memories of the aftermath of the First World War have faded into dust, but the readers of The Expositor, like all of the public at that time, were completely ignorant of the casualties already piling up.

The pages of The Expositor, like all British media, were devoid of any references to

Soldier's family requests photo be removed from Wall of Honour

MANITOULIN—The recent attacks on Canadian service personnel in Ottawa and Quebec has led to a mixed bag of security responses across the country as the military responds to an unfamiliar threat to members of the military on Canadian soil.

The ripples of that heightened concern reached all the way to Manitoulin Island as one family member of a serving Canadian serviceperson requested that the photograph of their child currently serving be taken down from the wall of honour at Turners of Little Current and the Old Mill Heritage Site in Kagawong.

Debby Turner of Turners of Little Current confirmed that she had received such a request and that the store had immediately complied. "Apparently the troops were to remove photos of themselves if they are on any types of social media," said Ms. Turner, of what she was told by the parent. "We took it down with much sadness and regret."

Ms. Turner said that she was told that the service personnel had held a meeting and agreed that photos of the service people in uniform posted in public places be temporarily removed.

"We did have a request to remove a photograph and we, of course, reluctantly complied," said Old Mill Heritage Centre curator Rick Nelson.

Reports of base lockdowns across the nation were somewhat overblown, although the lockdown response to the attacks on the soldiers was in fact confirmed by the chief of defence.

"On my order, the Commander of Canadian Joint Operations Command has issued direction for bases across Canada to increase local Force Protection measures as appropriate. In the National Capital Region, this resulted in the lock-down of all Canadian Armed Forces facilities," wrote General Tom Lawson, chief of defence in a missive to all personnel and the Canadian public. "While this lockdown has since been lifted, beginning on October 23, 2014 members in the NCR have been instructed to not wear their uniforms when travelling to and from their places of

work. This is to be a temporary measure. The intent will be to resume wearing uniforms when transiting to and from our place of duty as soon as practicable. This order was not given lightly. As Canadian Armed Forces members, we wear our uniforms with pride and we will continue to do so. However, with the recent attack in Saint-Jean-sur-Richelieu, in which we lost Warrant Officer Vincent, and with the shooting in Ottawa today, this is viewed as an appropriate and measured response."

The chief of defence went on to say "I have further instructed the CJOC Commander to develop and issue updated Force Protection instructions CAF-wide to include restricting access to DND bases and facilities. Additional information on this will be forthcoming. These orders build on other measures that have been implemented in recent days to increase security. In the days to come we will continue to monitor this space, and may take further action. The safety and security of our members, our families, and our civilian partners depend on this diligence. I am proud of the work that you do, of the operational excellence that you demonstrate in service to our country, and of all that we are able to accomplish together. You, and your families, should be proud too."

When soldiers in Britain received a similar command in the wake of terrorist attacks on uniformed service people in that country, soldiers in that country responded with a barrage of social media postings that eventually led to the command being rescinded. There have been media reports from across Canada indicating that many of this nation's soldiers are also opting to continue life as usual as they serve their country across the nation.

Many cadet programs across the nation were also curtailed in the wake of the shooting and automobile assault on uniformed soldiers. Rear Admiral Jennifer Bennett sent out a message noting that all military cadet and junior ranger activities were to cease until October 27. The precautions were described as "taking control, using common sense and acting responsibly."


With the nation preparing to recognize the sacrifice of

hundreds of thousands of Canadian Armed Services personnel with Remembrance Week, the ceremonies surrounding Remembrance Day on November 11 will likely hold a new resonance those attending those events as the new paradigm of a war without borders or boundaries becomes more than just a concept in the media.

tle short of eerie to the modern eye.

Not that there wasn't plenty of worrying going on. An advertisement in a November 1914 edition of The Expositor was flogging nerve pills ostensibly to help calm women's delicate nerves frayed by worry over the war in Europe.

Britain had entered the war largely to maintain the balance of power, as was her wont. She could not abide the German Empire capturing the Belgian ports and threatening Britain's imperial hegemony over the English Channel, North Sea and the Atlantic. Germany already had the most powerful army in Europe, should he defeat Russia and France the Kaiser would inevitably eclipse the

British Empire. As part of that empire, Canada was de facto in the conflict as soon as Britain declared war.

At Ypres, the Germans had two armies, the Fourth and the Sixth and they had what should have been a decisive advantage in men and material. It was the German's one chance to win the war with a quick knockout blow and it failed. By November 20 the Germans were withdrawing from their attack.

Sadly, this battle which should have led to diplomatic overtures to find a peaceful solution to the conflict, failed to awaken the German Chancellor Bethmann-Hollaender and general staff Paul von Hindenburg and Erich

Ludendorff to the impending disaster facing their nation and the world. The First Battle of Ypres provided plenty of foreshadowing with 54,000 British casualties, around 80,000 German casualties and as many as 85,000 French losses. The carnage was absolutely unthinkable, literally destroying the core of the highly trained British professional army and the British prime minister of the day, when informed of the butcher's bill, declared that the news must be kept from the public at all costs.

The Third battle of Ypres is better known by its other name, Passchendaele (July 31 to November 6 1917). The fourth (also called the Battle of Lys) took place in April or

1918 and the final Battle of Ypres took place between September 28 and October 2, 1918.

Surely, these heart-felt reactions are genuine enough, but in the absence of special days or significant events the well-being of our veterans is not as much of an ongoing national concern as it should be.



PTSD are being ushered out of the forces to save the government from providing them pensions later in life. While many are given lump sum payments the problems associated with that and the finality of the response does not match the commitment these individuals made or the gratitude we say we have to those men and women who have made sacrifices on our behalf.

In this era of social media and instant response too much emphasis is put on how things seem, as opposed to how they really are. Although we may wear a poppy or change our Facebook status to show support for our veterans and our troops, it is also important to speak up against things like the closure of regional Veterans Affairs offices and in support of items that veterans themselves deem important. That message has to be made to our government or they will mistake the lack of it as consent for their tight-fisted approach.



This is not meant to doubt the sincerity of people who don a poppy for Remembrance Day, but it is a challenge for everyone to up their game in support of our veterans of all ages and circumstance. Despite our challenges, Canada is a rich and blessed country. When the government walks away from our veterans in their hour of need, it speaks volumes about what kind of society they are creating. If we continue on this trend the phrase 'Lest we forget' is in danger of becoming ironic. I doubt that is what anyone really wants.



This may sound cynical in the shadow of the grisly deaths of two Canadian soldiers killed on our own soil in recent weeks, but it is a sad fact. Even the most patriotic among us manages to forget about the real plight of many veterans when we are not reminded of their circumstances regularly. Too often veterans have been the target of government penny-pinching which is one of the consequences of an era where tax cuts are the biggest political carrot. The budget at Veterans Affairs, like all other departments, was indiscriminately slashed by 10 percent to make up for overly generous corporate tax cuts. Now, as we enter into a supposed federal surplus, that shortfall is not being addressed.

There have been other controversial cost cutting moves that save us money but make us look like lick-penny misers in the process. Young service members who are injured in the line of duty or suffer from

Record high owl counts in spring 2014 survey on Manitoulin Island

MANITOULIN—Four of the five spring owl survey routes on Manitoulin Island reported above average counts in the spring, with three of the routes having the highest counts on record. “There are five established routes and each of these were surveyed and returned,” said Kathy Jones, Ontario programs volunteer coordinator for Bird Studies Canada. “Considering the snow loads and road access issues throughout Ontario this past April I am absolutely delighted that everyone managed to get their surveys in. We had a great mixture of new and experienced people.”

Ms. Jones thanked The Manitoulin Expositor for helping the organization to fill two empty routes. She noted that both new teams have indicated their interest in surveying again next spring, which helps provide consistent data over time.

In Sheguiandah a record high 19 owls were counted, including barred owls, great horned owls, and northern saw-whet owls. The participant, who has surveyed this route for 18 years, also recorded sandhill cranes, American

woodcocks and frogs, saying, “the owls came to us.”

On Lake Manitou’s northwest shore, four barred owls were recorded, as well as sandhill cranes, Canada geese, an American woodcock and a common snipe. This was an above average count for the participant, who has surveyed this route for 15 years.

In Allan, a record high eight owls were recorded by the participants, a couple who have been surveying this route for eight years. This included great horned, barred and northern saw-

whet owls. Other species noted were American woodcock, Canada geese, and spring peepers (frogs).

Two routes had first time surveyors. The Lake Kagawong route recorded a record high count of 14 owls, including northern saw-whet, barred, and great horned owls. In Mindemoya, four owls were counted, an average count for the route. Barred, northern saw-whet owls, and a long-eared owl were recorded. Long-eared owls are unusual but have been recorded on Manitoulin in

the past.

When asked how the count on Manitoulin Island compares with other regions, Ms. Jones explained, “The fact that they all managed to survey says a fair bit as the weather prevented a lot of access north of Manitoulin.” While the 2014 analysis has not been completed yet, the simple data as recorded suggests that Manitoulin had an above average population of owls this year. “We know the northern regions had a late and heavy snow load,” she said. “Perhaps many of the birds counted on Manitoulin in 2014 normally breed further north.”

The data is analyzed at a regional level. “How is a species doing in Northern Ontario? How is a species doing in Central Ontario?”

This is where the data has the most power. Certainly there is data for more regional and local extrapolations if the opportunity or need arises. Scientists and conservation managers can request the data for their own stewardship and research needs as well,” explained Ms. Jones.

None of the species targeted in this survey are species of concern or threatened at this time, Ms. Jones said. “But we want to keep our ‘common bird common.’ Thus, let’s keep an eye on them and ensure they are doing well. Particularly as these species use our northern forests and this is one of the best techniques for monitoring them.”

There are opportunities for all bird lovers to assist

with ongoing monitoring. The southern owl migration is at its peak in mid-October and Bird Studies Canada is asking that anybody who hears or sees migrating owls such as boreal, screech, and northern saw-whet owls to report their observations at www.eBird.ca.

Project Feeder Watch is another program that bird-watchers can participate in over the fall and winter months. At regular intervals from November to April, thousands of feeder watchers count the kinds and numbers of birds at their feeders and submit those observations. The information helps scientists study winter bird populations. Find out more at www.birdscanada.org/volunteer/pfw.

Recipes from Rose's Kitchen

I came across an article that suggested if you begin your main meal with a nutritious soup you will eat less. By starting the meal with a healthy and light soup you may eat less and by-pass the nutrient-deficient white breads many of us are tempted to eat before and during a meal.

The following soup recipe you can change to make it become a bigger part of the meal. To make it heartier add filling ingredients such as diced ham or bacon, cooked grains or beans, or additional vegetables.

Traditional Czech Garlic Soup

I love this soup because it has my favourite ingredient—garlic. Remember garlic is immune-boosting, and antiviral, just what everybody should be eating for the cold season. This soup is perfect for one or two people. Make a larger amount and freeze for later use.

For the croutons:

1 slice hearty, whole-grain bread, cut into small cubes

1 Tbsp olive oil

1/2 tsp garlic powder

1/2 tsp dried oregano
1/2 tsp sea salt
1/2 tsp black pepper

For the soup:

1 medium onion diced
1 Tbsp butter
8 cloves garlic, minced
2 cups vegetable broth
1 medium potato, diced into small pieces (optional)

1. To make croutons, preheat oven to 350°F. Line a baking sheet with bread cubes in a single layer. Drizzle evenly with olive oil. Sprinkle with herbs, salt and pepper. Toss to mix well. Bake about 15 minutes, tossing once or twice, until golden.

2. In a saucepan over medium heat, sauté onion in butter until soft, about 10 minutes. Add the garlic, and sauté 2 to 3 minutes more. Stir in the broth and heat to a low boil. Add optional potato, and simmer until soft.

3. Divide soup into 2 bowls. Sprinkle each bowl with croutons, fresh parsley and minced raw garlic.

CNIB Eye Van a much-needed tool for Island residents

MINDMOYA—For 42 years, the Canadian National Institute for the Blind (CNIB) Eye Van has been providing vision care for the residents of 30 remote areas of Northern Ontario including Island locations. The van is fully equipped and includes a reception and waiting room, a vision screening spot and a doctor's examination area. Vision exams, eye condition treatments and minor surgeries are performed and medical advice about vision health is provided.

The van travels throughout the northern reaches of the province from March to November and 25 ophthalmologists participate in the program with two CNIB assistants travelling with each doctor. As Monique Pilkington, the CNIB Regional Director for Ontario North explained, the eye van travels more than 6,000 kilometres and the on-board ophthalmologists examine more than 5,000

patients.

Recently, the Eye Van was in Mindemoya and many Islanders registered for the program which included ophthalmologist assistant Kelly Bowland who is from Stratford and not only welcomes patients and inputs their information, but also drives the van while the regular driver, Shelley Stoddart, enjoys a week off. Stefanie Couto, a resident of Kingston, is an

ophthalmologist technician and she is on board to conduct eye exams while Dr. Mark Fava of Hamilton assesses each person's eye health.

Dr. Fava, a graduate of McMaster University, is a cornea specialist and has participated on the Eye Van five times. This is his first time on Manitoulin as he tries to visit a different area of Northern Ontario with each trip. "It is really nice to be able to come here," Dr. Fava told The Expositor, "as the patients are very appreciative. This van has everything that I have in my office and it is very good to be able to fill the niche that we do." Indeed, on one trip to a remote community, the Eye Van specialists were able to help a resident who had glass in his eyes after hitting a moose.

The CNIB Eye Van will finish up this year's trip with a visit to Wikwemikong and then start the northerly visits again next March.

Looking for information on cover crops?

Cover crops have a lot of places where they can fit in horticultural crop rotations. Before late planted crops like pumpkins to provide weed suppression. After early harvested crops like peas or snap beans to cover and protect the soil

while enhancing soil structure. After winter wheat to suppress resistant weeds in the rotation or as a part of the overall crop rotation to suppress nematodes in preparation for planting strawberries. Looking for more details on how a cover crop can fit, herbicide concerns or the basics on a particular cover crop species? There is an improved version of the Purdue Midwest Cover Crop Field Guide available now. The pocket guide, released September 22, is produced by Purdue University and the Midwest Cover Crops Council. The first cover crops guide was released in February 2012. The updated guide is in response to the increasing interest in cover crops in the Midwest and to requests for additional

information. Topics include: getting started in cover crops; rationale for fitting cover crops into different cropping systems; suggested cover crops for common rotations; cover crop effects on cash crop yields; climate considerations including winter hardiness and water use; adapting seeding rates and spring management based on weather and "Up and coming" cover crops. The guide's second edition is available at Purdue Extension's The Education Store at www.the-education-store.com. Search by the name of the publication or product code ID-433.
