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Chi-Cheemaun statistics confirm cycling tourism's Island growth

OWEN SOUND—Although the complete statistics broken down by month for all classes of travellers have not yet been released, the initial stats on cycling travellers onboard the M.S. Chi-Cheemaun ferry, running between the northern tip of the Bruce Peninsula and South Baymouth on Manitoulin Island, have heartened local cycling advocates.

"The Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) have been working diligently since 2010 to raise awareness, create safer roads and increase cycle tourism on Manitoulin and the LaCloche Region," said spokesperson Maja Mielonen. "So this year's ferry bicycle counts are very encouraging. The total ferry count is over 5,200 bicycles for the 2014 season. That is an increase of more than 25 percent over 2013. MICA has been working to increase this newly emerging tourism segment on Manitoulin in partnership

with the Owen Sound Transportation Company (OSTC) for several years."

LITTLE CURRENT—The bell is tolling at Royal Canadian Legion Branch 177 in Little Current and this time the situation is truly grim. According to Legion stalwart Jeff Marshall, if the executive positions are not filled at a December 11 emergency election meeting the branch will close.

In fact, the Legion has already been closed at the behest of the Royal Canadian Legion's Provincial Command following the recent resignation of the executive. "They did tell me to close it down," said Mr. Marshall. "I got a call a little while later telling me that we had a bit of a reprieve until the 7 pm December 11 meeting, but if all the executive positions are not filled they will close it down."

Sadly, the dwindling ranks of Second World War veterans seems to be a major factor behind the crisis facing so many Legion branches across the country.

"It is when the parent who was the veteran passes away, the kids just seem to lose interest," said Mr. Marshall. "I think I could count the number of veterans we still have on one hand."

Compounding the issue is the anecdotal observation that today's veterans seem to be less engaged in the Legion than those of earlier conflicts or perhaps it is just that modern wars produce fewer veterans than were to be found in the "greatest generation."

"Today, most people seem to look at the Legion as the place they go to help fund their ball team or hockey team," said Mr. Marshall.

While many organizations can limp along with less than a full complement of officers, the Legion is somewhat different, he explains. "Dominion Command sets the rules down to provincial.

M'CHIGEENG—According to the latest statistics, the danger of sexual assault will follow female children on into adulthood, while for most boys the likelihood of being

sexually assaulted diminishes with age. Those were some of the sobering facts delivered to a Friday morning assembly of Manitoulin Secondary School students during a recent address by 2013 Governor General's Award winner and former MSS student Julie Lalonde.

The stats are truly unsettling. "One in three women and one in six boys will experience sexual violence in their lifetime," she said. "Young women under 25 show the highest rates of sexual assault. Women face that reality for the rest of their lives," continued Ms. Lalonde, while in comparison, "the chances of a grown man being sexually assaulted are almost zip."

"Who has marathoned through an all-nighter watching CSI or Law and Order episodes?" asked Ms. Lalonde. "Come on, hands up, no shame," she quipped. "Watching on television, its always

Grace Fox reappointed as Rainbow District School Board FN trustee

MANITOULIN—Rainbow District School Board First Nation Trustee Grace Fox has been appointed to serve a third term as the Manitoulin Island First Nation representative on the board.

"It is probably a good thing, because education is the only thing I know," laughed Ms. Fox.

Ms. Fox she was "pleasantly surprised to see the results" at the improvement in First Nations students Education, Quality and Accountability (EQAO) scores reported this year, which outstripped those of the provincial average in some categories, but she steadfastly refused to take any credit for the improvement.

"Recognition has to go out to the parents who send their kids into school, encourage and support them to achieve their best," she said. "(Parental) encouragement is essential to student success and I really am thankful to parents."

"I think a lot of thank yous has to go out to the First Nation Advisory Council whose representatives come from the 11 First Nations schools who have education agreements with the Rainbow Dis-

trict School Board," she added. "They are very active and a lot of the hard work takes place at their level."

Ms. Fox described the advisory group as being dedicated to their roles and embodying the very best principles of teamwork. "Along with the Aboriginal Support Workers, everyone working together, we continue to encourage students to work hard and to meet their potential," she said.

The role models that First Nations students have within the classroom are also having a tremendously positive effect, she said, as is the role and importance being placed upon First Nation culture and language within the classroom.

"All this plays a part and it is good to see," she said. "Our students are gaining self confidence and they are discovering the doors that education can open for them."

Ms. Fox said that she is looking forward to continuing to work on behalf of First Nation communities at the Rainbow District School Board over the next four years.

Harper government takes new measures to fight against aquatic invasive species

LONDON—The Honourable Gail Shea, Minister of Fisheries and Oceans, joined by MPs Dave Van Kesteren, Pat Davidson, Bev Shipley and Joe Preston, announced last week a significant step in safeguarding Canada's waterways from the spread of aquatic invasive species.

The proposed Aquatic Invasive Species Regulations would provide a national regulatory framework to help prevent intentional and unintentional introductions of aquatic invasive species in Canada from other countries, across provincial and territorial borders, and between ecosystems

within a region. It would also provide measures to facilitate response and control activities. For example, these regulations would give Canadian Border Services Agency officers the ability to enforce prohibitions against import at the Canadian border.

Fisheries and Oceans Canada developed the proposed regulations in consultation with federal, provincial and territorial governments, with a common goal aimed at addressing the threat of aquatic invasive species and protecting the economic well-being of Canadian waters.

The proposed Aquatic Invasive Species Regulations will be published on December 6, 2014 in the Canada Gazette, Part I, for a 30-day public comment period.

Species impacted by these proposed regulations include Asian carp (four species), zebra and quagga mussels as well as sea lamprey. The regulations will also include a list of species that are not prohibited in specific geographic regions but for which control activities may be undertaken. Initial list includes tunicates, green crab, and species such as smallmouth bass and

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Chiefs of Ontario look forward to working with the province on the expansion of mental health strategy

TORONTO—First Nation leaders in Ontario are welcoming the expansion of mental health services and look forward to working with the province in addressing the needs of First Nation people in achieving mental wellness.

"The province of Ontario will move forward on the next phase of its mental health strategy. We are supportive of an advisory council with a mandate to advise government on the implementation of this next phase as well as the investments that need to be made," Regional Chief Stan Beardy said. "This means the re-launch of the strategy becomes an important component in our relationship priorities with the province of Ontario."

The First Nations Mental Wellness Continuum Framework is a shared vision between the Assembly of First Nations, the National Native Addictions Partnership Foundation and the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch for the future of First Nations mental wellness programs and services.

The strength of the framework has been the process of

ensuring connection to regional and national First Nation health and wellness networks in the development of the shared vision. Achieving the envisioned continuum of mental wellness will require sustained commitment and collaboration as well as leadership support across the continuum of care among provincial, federal and territorial programs, the press release states.

While chiefs welcomed the expansion of tele-mental health services for children, as well as the 86 new mental health workers placed in First Nations or aboriginal agencies, effectiveness of these initiatives has yet to be measured as access may still be limited in some areas of the province.

The First Nation Mental Health working group looks forward to establishing a dialogue with the advisory council to help shape the responsiveness to First Nation peoples in this expanded strategy. "In order for First Nations to truly have a presence in the mental health strategy for Ontario, there needs to be space in the strategy for an acknowledge-

ment of our cultural world view and the importance of a holistic approach that considers the individual, the family, and community together in that strategy," said Anishinabek Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee, chair of the Ontario First Nations Chiefs Committee on Health. "Ontario's strategy must provide opportunities for us to approach mental wellness in a similar way to the national First Nations Mental Wellness Continuum Framework that achievement of physical, mental, emotional, spiritual well-being can only happen through a comprehensive approach that respects First Nations cultural knowledge, approaches, languages and ways of knowing."

The Chiefs of Ontario support the province in the developing a funding model that reflects discussion from the advisory council as well as the people that are on the ground doing the work. Resources need to be used effectively and efficiently that will benefit First Nations regardless of where they live, and all Ontarians.

Great Lake ice coverage predicted to return to near normal conditions

LAKE HURON—Last year's near-historic ice coverage of 96 percent is not likely to be repeated over the winter of 2015, according to Jia Wang, PhD, research scientist/ice climatologist, whose job entails gazing into the data prediction crystal ball at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Great Lakes Environmental Research Lab.

"Overall Great Lakes max ice cover was projected to be 54 percent, around the mean of 52 percent based on a statistical regression model using climate indices of NAO (North Atlantic Oscillation), ENSO (El Nino and Southern Oscillation), PDO (Pacific Decadal Oscillation), and AMO (Atlantic Multidecadal Oscillation)," said Mr. Wang in an email reply to a request for comment on the expectations for next year's ice cover. Asked to put that reply into a more "public viewer/reader friendly" wording, Mr. Wang supplied, "This 2014/15 winter's projected ice cover of 54 percent is much less than last winter's of 92 percent."

Last year's coverage certainly approached to within a whisker of the all-time recorded maximum ice coverage of 94.7 percent, coming in a close second in all time coverage and this year's more average 52 percent coverage well and far above the 9.5 percent recorded in 2002 or the 11.5 percent that formed during the strong El Nino year of 1998 or even 2012/2013 coverage of 38.4 percent.

Heavy ice coverage was credited in part with helping to bring water levels in Lake Huron back to normal levels this past year by reducing the impact of evaporation and according to NOAA publications, the impact of heavy ice cover can be also be positive for the fishing industry. "In the shallow waters where whitefish spawn, ice cover protects their eggs from destructive wind and wave action," reads a pamphlet from the NOAA. "Ice cover with little or no snow cover allows light penetration at the surface to promote algae growth. At the base of the foodweb, algae support living organisms in the lakes, including valuable commercial and sportfish species. With \$4 billion flowing into the commercial and sport fishing industry each year, ice cover can be a significant factor affecting the region's economy."

The NOAA also points out that ice forming in bays and inlets on the lakes provide "a stable platform for winter recreational activity such as ice fishing. This stable ice also protects wetlands and the shoreline

LITTLE CURRENT—The Sudbury-Manitoulin North Bay and Districts Alzheimer Society held an open house last week celebrating its new permanent Manitoulin location in downtown Little Current.

"We held a drumming ceremony and welcome prayer this morning to celebrate our new Manitoulin office," explained district Executive Director Lorraine LeBlanc last Friday. "We have been on Manitoulin for 20 years, but borrowing office space everywhere until recently the board decided to invest in a permanent office space in Little Current. We are very happy we will now be able to offer our services on a larger scale here on Manitoulin."

Ms. LeBlanc explained that the organization will assist anyone who has concerns or has been diagnosed with dementia and help them understand the disease and link them with family coun-

cellors and programs to help them and/or their caregiver.

"Our mission is to assist individuals and their families and help them navigate the system so individuals can stay at home."

The Sudbury-Manitoulin North Bay and Districts Alzheimer Society provides a wide list of services in general, but not all are offered on Manitoulin, something that Ms. LeBlanc said will be changing moving forward.

"We are hoping to grow the services we provide on Manitoulin and introduce programs such as art and music therapy," added Ms. LeBlanc.

"The Sudbury-Manitoulin North Bay and Districts Alzheimer Society was established in 1983 by a group of concerned caregivers of clients with Alzheimer's disease," explains a press release. "The goals were to provide education, awareness and advocacy for Alzheimer clients



Proper raising of boys is fundamental to Canada's future

Last Saturday, vigils and many other ceremonies appropriate to particular groups and communities marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Montreal Massacre, the pivotal event that remains Canada's largest mass murder.

The event was and is, of course, so much more than "Canada's largest mass murder" because all of the 14 victims gunned down in cold blood at their school, École Polytechnique de Montreal, were female engineering students. Men in the vicinity, with the exception of murderer Marc Lépine (who killed himself as the finale to the rampage), were separated from the women students and mostly spared by the gunman.

As guest speaker Julie Lalonde pointed out at one of Manitoulin's vigil events, "this was our 9/11 and, after it happened, things have never been the same again."

A quarter century ago, The Expositor Office's Christmas staff get-together was only a few days following the Montreal Massacre and the issue was on everyone's mind. One person at the gathering earnestly asked whether others felt that Marc Lépine's unprovoked murder of 14 university students (who had been successful in accomplishing something that he had failed to do: gain entry to the university's engineering faculty) was merely between one deranged man and 14 young women who happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time or whether this terrible action was giving us a peek at a more universal evil.

The discussion went on for a time with most people clearly hoping that the "one man, 14 unfortunate women" was the correct assumption and that Mr. Lépine's antisocial behaviour could be relegated to the "one-off" bin, presumably because of the comfort this view of such a terrible event afforded.

Others in that small gathering weren't so sure and from their own experiences and observations felt that what Marc Lépine had done was an extreme example of a major societal ill.

It was a holiday gathering and so that dark topic did not dominate the whole party but it did cast a pall over the evening and 25 years later, considering recent events in our country and certainly abroad, we have to come down heavily on the side that considered Marc Lépine's action, while horrible in and of itself, was nevertheless something of a miner's canary, at least in Canada, on the issue of the violence that women face at the hands of men.

Former CBC star Jian Ghomeshi's apparent routine abuse and harassment of girlfriends, female acquaintances and co-workers is a high-profile example of the persecution that girls can grow up expecting may happen to them, to one degree or another.

Sadly, this is very gender specific and boys do not grow up to become men with negative expectations even remotely similar to the ones girls learn may be their lot in life, together with the situations and circumstances of which they should be wary.

There is nothing comparable for men to the grisly murders of an as yet undetermined number of women committed by Vancouver-area pig farmer Robert Pickton. He was convicted absolutely of the murder of six women in 2007 and is in prison but is a suspect in the murder of 26 more women.

There is nothing comparable for men from any particular social or ethnic group to the more than 1,300 girls and women of First Nations origins who have either been murdered or have simply disappeared in this country during almost the same period of time since Marc Lépine committed his mayhem in Montreal.

The so-called honour killings that claimed the lives of the three women whose bodies were discovered in a car in the Rideau Canal near Kingston in 2009 represent many more such murders. Men are not the victims of honour killings.

These are high profile examples we've all heard about in Canada.

But what about the 200 girls in Nigeria, abducted by the radical Islamist group Boko Haram because they dared to go to school and to get an education? If this sounds comparable to Marc Lépine's ostensible motivation, it is, but the fanatically conservative Islamist faction that decided school is inappropriate for females has not executed them but, they tell us, has required this group of young women to convert to their Islamist cult and, further, has married them off to be a second or third (possibly even a first!) wife to male members of the cult. These are things that are not inflicted on boys and men.

Rape is unimaginably commonplace in India, a nation that is proud of its status as the world's largest democracy and in spite of that complicated and populous country's public promises to the world that it will get the issue in hand, in fact rapes are steadily increasing there by a factor of over seven percent annually.

At last Saturday's vigil, candles were lit, as is the custom, for each murdered Manitoulin woman.

As happens year after year in this moving ceremony, the list takes a long while to read out while vigil attendees light candles in each individual woman's memory. It takes a long time for this part of the vigil ceremony simply because there are a lot of women who have been murdered on Manitoulin, usually by their intimate partners, and this list is by no means exhaustive; it is only a record of local women who have been murdered on Manitoulin Island during the past 35 years.

These are facts. They are not pleasant and they represent only a tiny fraction of the world's women-hating and some of its extreme consequences.

Once again, there is nothing even remotely comparable for boys and men. That is to say, this misogynistic and misanthropic behaviour is not reciprocated by women against men.

While this is not, in the course of history, by any means a unique phenomenon, what is disturbing and frightening is that in spite of all of the information about motivations and inappropriate behaviours now available to us, abuse directed by males to females continues, seemingly unabated.

This has been a constant theme in this space but the fact remains that the best defense against boys growing up to be abusive men is for their families, as a priority, to tell them and to demonstrate to them that a very important aspect of being male is to have an abiding respect for girls and women that would preclude any suggestion of abuse.

There is no question that this can be a tall order, especially with the images of violence—often directed against females—that is delivered into our homes through the Internet and by video games.

This means, in turn, that as well as schooling boys appropriately about relations with the other half of the population, parents, grandparents and other caregivers who have the opportunity to supervise and influence young boys' development must give every attention to screening external influences.

Raising children has always been an enormous responsibility.

Raising boys properly in these times is probably one of the most difficult tasks the modern social order has thrust upon us but in light of what we are taught by these annual memorials of the December 6, 1989 Montreal Massacre and of course the other murdered and abused women closer to home, the proper raising of boys in this particular context is of the utmost importance to the future of our country and whether or not it will continue to be one of the best nations in the world in which to live.

The behaviour of other cultures in other countries is, of course, an entirely different issue but as citizens of Canada, we must continue to do whatever we can to oppose governments and political and religious groups that take it as a matter of faith that they have the right to treat women as objects and chattels.

Recent Veterans Affairs funding debacle shines a light of truth

\$1.3 billion dollars of returned veteran funds highlight Harper government incompetence

To the Expositor:

The November 19 release of 1.13 billion dollars of unspent monies returned to the treasury by Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) and the Minister of Veterans Affairs suddenly let the public, as well as our veterans, see that once again the Harper government has duped us. Naturally veterans vented their anger, because there are so many veterans and their families suffering and in need within this country, while VAC Minister Fantino and the Harper government has been sitting on this money as if it did not exist!

Further, this is not the first time this has happened. In September 2007, after announcing a \$20,000 token payout for veterans who were suffering diseases caused by Agent Orange, it took over 10 years to make those payouts, then VAC tried to close the books with millions left unspent and veterans still trying to appeal the criteria used, of which we have a major case of veteran Jim McDonald trying to appeal, right here on Manitoulin Island.

Because Minister Fantino has had so many controversial issues when dealing with veterans, and because of his condescending and argumentative attitude, the War Pensioners of Canada, along with other veterans organizations, have asked for him to be replaced, the bottom line being that he obviously needs a few lessons diplomacy, but regardless of the unspent monies, he is not the man for that job.

An example of his manipulation of words after the release of the 1.13 billion, as reported in the Toronto Star, Minister Fantino stated: "It's totally false in the context that its been portrayed...We are in no way shape or form disadvantaging veterans who does need our help."

My reply to those comments is 'tell it to the Marines Minister'

because we have three major cases of disadvantaged veterans on Manitoulin Island, several others in Sudbury, including triple-amputee veteran Bill Kerr; all of whom need additional help for themselves and their families. In Edmonton, there is double-amputee, Major Mark Campbell whom, along with other disabled veterans, has filed a class action lawsuit. This action comes on the heels of the successful lawsuit by Veteran Dennis Manuge, who sued the government and SISIP insurance to stop claw backs on monies paid to disabled veterans. The bottom line being that this government is not treating our veterans in a fair and just manner.

After the release of the \$1.13 billion, look at the mad scramble for a CYA damage control meeting, where the outcome was: "Oh throw two million dollars back into the pot to cover PTSD and mental health issues over the next five years and that should quiet thing down." Then only a few days later, it's like: "Oh, on second thought, that two million dollars is taken a little out of context, it's not over five years, it's over the next 50 years."

What better demonstrates the lack of forethought of that press release which got veterans hopes up followed by the flip-flopping of information and lack of concern for veterans' feelings? The incompetence of the minister's office and the political maneuvering by the Harper government leaves much to be desired because it appears they no longer know what the truth is anymore.

A tribute to the best of men: Jean Marc Beliveau 1931-2014



We were all 14-years-old. We were all fanatic hockey fans whether it be ice pond, the lake or the flashy ice of the NHL. We were a group of four (ironic now when we think of who we are writing this piece for and about) and we were always together playing a sport (any sport of some sort). Looking back now, we probably didn't realize that any other world existed—except, of course, that our parents shipped us off to school each day.

We lived in North Bay and in the late summer, early fall in the mid-1950s 'magic' came to our local arena. The famed Cleveland Barons of the American Hockey League (AHL) set up their training camp in our stomping grounds and we could hardly have been more excited. Bob, Andy, Raymond and myself would trek off to Memorial Gardens whenever the Barons were on the ice. Under the direction of Mr. Jim Hendy, they were the most famous non-NHL team in the world. They were an independent (not affiliated with an NHL team) entry and the owner had deep pockets.

Because of this, the Barons could literally 'buy' the best non-NHL players available and thus were the class act of all the minor hockey leagues. Each fall they would prove this by playing exhibition games against NHL teams. For a number of years, this brought the Toronto Maple Leafs and the Montreal Canadiens to the little Northern Ontario city of North Bay.

This is how we met "Le Gros Bill." Jean Beliveau was a giant of a man in the 1950s NHL hockey where being 6 feet tall was big. By comparison, Beliveau was literally huge. At 6'3" he was the proverbial giant among men. However, he was not a bruiser. Indeed, he was a cruiser, all grace and elegance on the ice. He was the gravy to Boom Boom's slapper and the Rocket's red glare. He stood out because he was a painter on ice, a man seemingly a little too classy

jects as they combined for two goals in less than one minute. Beliveau's goal was an illustration of his size, strength and class. Though being inhibited completely, his left arm pinned by the Barons' Steve Kraftcheck, he shifted the puck to the back of his stick which he now held in his right hand only and with a flick of his massive wrist from 40 feet

and was the first All-Star Centre and recipient of the Hart Trophy as the NHL's Most Valuable Player. None of these accolades ever changed this "jewel of a human being."

Our little group of four had come to the arena with reams of paper to collect autographs after the game as we had when the Leafs came to camp earlier in the Barons' training season. It was not to be on that October night, however, as Montreal management whisked the Habs out of the arena and onto a bus all at once in one short burst of ferocious activity. Needless to say, our band of four was devastated. We must have been visibly upset as someone volunteered the information that the team was on its way to the local Merlin (named after owner and infamous North Bay mayor at the time, Merle Dickerson) Hotel for a post-game meal.

As the Merlin Hotel was but a mile-and-a-half down from Memorial Gardens, we decided to chance on 'crashing' the party. In truth, we were very timid crashers.

Some 20 to 30 minutes later, we were pacing back and forth in front of the Merlin discussing what to do since that same bus was, indeed, in the parking lot. We decided to send one of our braver (not me!) cohorts into the hotel lobby. He was promptly and unceremoniously booted to the curb despite his plans. We paced some more and changed our strategy. All four of us, after seeing the hotel clerk momentarily disappear, did do a little crashing and made it to the door of the dining room before once again being accosted by the hotel's S.S. Stormtrooper who came towards us yelling wildly. His loud incantations, however, only served to draw the attention of the Montreal players who now noticed these four impoverished, shivering, very intent star-seekers. A number of the Habs shouted to the 'police' to leave us alone and let us in. Among the first to greet us was Mr. Beliveau (we would never have called him or the Rocket, or

away, drilled the puck one-handed over the shoulder of goalie and future New York Ranger Marcel Paille for the Canadiens' seventh goal in an 8-3 victory. Remember, Beliveau was a left-hand shot; this goal came only from his right hand—and on the back-hand side at that—while being restrained by former Ranger Kraftcheck. He had at least 4,500 others (besides myself) who burst into applause. I describe the play mostly because, though it was an exhibition goal, it illustrated so much about the player and the man. The execution of the goal was all Beliveau and so it was on his bowed head that all 4,500 fans heaped the praise because of how he had scored this counter. Jean quietly went back to centre ice as if it were a routine goal and humbly ignored the raucous cheering. That one play illustrated the character and personality of the men who had the year before won the league scoring title

for the rough sport of the 1950s. And when he stepped off the ice he was even more classy, if such a thing were possible.


On the night of Friday, October 5, 1956 he and the firewagon Canadiens came to the Bay's then spanking new Memorial Gardens. The Cleveland Barons were no pushovers. In a game against the Leafs a week earlier, they held Horton, Bauer, Armstrong, Duff, Sloan and company to a single goal 3-2 victory.

This October night, a record North Bay crowd of 4,552 turned out to see the Stanley Cup champions pitted against the AHL Barons. Going into the third period, Montreal held only a 4 to 3 lead over the hard working Barons. It wasn't till the last 10 minutes that the Habs figured it was time to put away these pretenders and unleashed a four-goal attack in less than nine minutes.

Two players, Bert Olmstead and 'Jentleman Jean' were the archi-


any of them for that matter, anything but Mister).

All of them were welcoming and gracious but clearly Mr. Beliveau was most accommodating, taking time to address each of us personally. We obviously were in awe of them all. Each and every one signed our crude autograph 'books'...Big Jean, the Rocket, Boom Boom, the Pocket Rocket, Doug Harvey, Dickie Moore, Jacques Plante and the rest. Never again would we be in a room with so many Hall of Famers and yet in terms of sheer 'presence,' Mister Beliveau stood out!

If one were able to describe a man based on one night of hockey and one face to face encounter, this would do it for me and my buddies. Anyone I've ever met who saw him aspired to be just like him on, and even more so off the ice.

The man who many years later turned down the offer of the Governor Generalship of Canada when offered it by then Prime Minister of Canada Jean Chretien was just that: thoughtful and humble.

How truly impressive was this

man? The Montreal Canadiens purchased the entire Quebec Senior A hockey League (this was well before the NHL draft) in order to secure the rights to a young Beliveau. Jean was then playing for the Quebec Aces Senior A club and tearing up the league as a youngster. His popularity was so high that the city built a new arena, the Colisee, in order to accommodate the surging number of fans who wished to see him play. The arena came to be well-known as the rink that Beliveau built.

A year or two later, the Habs convinced Jean to sign a three-game tryout contract (which was the norm in the day when teams couldn't get a player to sign a long-term contract).

Beliveau then promptly scored

five goals in the three games he played before returning to Quebec where he was such a folk hero and, in fact, was being paid more than Montreal offered him to come to the NHL. Beliveau indicated that he would prefer to stay where he was. Montreal then bought the entire league to secure his rights but they still were unable to get his signature on a contract. They had prevented the other Original Six teams from tampering with him but they still needed his John Hancock and Jean was perfectly happy in Quebec City.

The Canadiens then turned the entire Quebec Senior A league into a minor-pro circuit, thus obtaining the NHL rights to all players in the entire league, yet they still could not get Jean to sign the NHL contract. The five goals and three games had just whetted the Montreal appetite even more and they more than redoubled their efforts. Eventually, with an undisclosed contract offer and much urging by all French Canadian fans (including those in Quebec City who wanted him to prove that he could play at the highest level of hockey), Mr. Beliveau relented and arrived in the NHL to loud fanfare. Asked how he was able to get his signature, Montreal manager Frank Selke Sr. simply said: "All I did was to open the vault and say, 'Help yourself, Jean.'" A very mature Beliveau then entered the NHL in 1953 at the age of 22 and ready to start his Hall of Fame career.

Before he left for Montreal, Jean's dad, Arthur, gave him this advice (as quoted in Roy McGregor's book 'The Home Team: Fathers, Sons and Hockey,' page 231): "Loyalty is another form of responsibility. If you feel that you owe something to someone no matter what the debt, it behooves you to pay it. Sometimes these very people will do or say something to indicate that they are discharging the debt, but only you will know what the best policy will be. Your good name is your greatest asset."

I was going to write much more on Mr. Beliveau but I believe the final sentence of Arthur Beliveau sums up his son Jean's entire life. No one could say it better. With the social media access to information 51 years after Mr. Beliveau's NHL debut, one can find many thousands of tributes to Number 4 by simply searching the Internet. Just Google 'classy Beliveau' and you will find everything you ever need to know.

Jean, himself, lived his father's words: "your good name is your greatest asset," and he is appropriately referred to as "The Lion Regal" in the history of the Montreal Canadiens, 'The Lions in Winter' by Allen Turowetz and Chrys Goyens.

Rest in peace, Mr. Jean Marc Beliveau.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Larry Leblanc of Mindemoya is a lifelong Habs fan. He was also the Page 7 sports columnist for *The Expositor* for many years with his column *Ice Chips* (now *Ice Chips and Canoe Quips* and penned by his son Andre). Larry Leblanc has coached hockey for over 40 years. He met the late Jean Beliveau when he was 14. In the mid-2000s, he brought Junior A hockey to Manitoulin: the *Manitoulin Wild of the NOJHA*. He has written several scholarly books on Manitoulin First Nations issues and is a retired educator. His encounter with the Montreal Canadiens Stanley Cup winning team during an exhibition game series in North Bay in 1956 cemented his view that the team is the best in the world and he maintains this loyalty today.



Council passed and read a resolution, supporting its proposal to the Small Community Fund, which states: "Whereas Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve First Nation (the Applicant) proposes to reduce its energy consumption and carbon footprints through energy conservation measures integrated with non-exporting grid interactive solar electricity generations (the Project) in Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve (under the Federal and Provincial Small Communities Fund); and whereas the Applicant has requested that council of the Municipality of Assiginack indicate by resolution council's support for the construction of the Project on the property; and whereas the Project will benefit the community of Assiginack through job creation, economic and environmental sustainability; and whereas the Project will be of no cost to the municipality; and whereas, pursuant to the federal government requirements that an Indian Act Band Council whose Project receives the formal support of local municipalities will be given considered for application; now be it resolved that the council of the Municipality of Assiginack supports the construction and operation of the Project on the lands of Wikwemikong."

"If it's solar, I think it's a great idea," Councillor Fields commented.

Manitoulin Health Centre recruitment

Council reviewed a letter received from the Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) regarding its recruitment campaign and the soon-to-be struck physician recruitment committee that is

already being enforced, with Mr. Hobbs explaining that the new costing model takes effect on January 1, 2015.

Wayside Motel

After some time, council passed two motions regarding Wayside Motel's encroachment on municipal property: bylaw 14-27 authorizes the permanent closure of a portion of municipal highway (extending easterly along Queen Street from the intersection of Highway 6, a distance of 122.28 feet) and bylaw 14-28, enables the municipality to sell surplus property within the Township of Assiginack to Susan Major (proprietor of the Wayside Motel) for \$2.

Assiginack appoints clerk

Assiginack council passed bylaw 14-30, appointing Jeremy Rody as the municipal clerk for Assiginack Township.

Councillor Moggy questioned Mr. Hobbs on the new position, asking if it was permanent full-time, to which Mr. Hobbs responded in the affirmative.

Councillor Moggy said there was much concern in the community about the new position and whether it was warranted.

Mr. Hobbs, former clerk and now CAO, explained that a staffing assessment was performed on the municipal office that found there to be a need for a clerk position separate from that of the CAO.

The CAO said there would be a three-month probation period for Mr. Rody.

"Well," Mr. Hobbs added, "if it doesn't work out I expect it will be my position you let go."

Assiginack renews BMO lease

Bylaw 14-31 was passed, extending an existing agreement with the BMO Bank of Montreal for the rental of commercial space at 115 Arthur Street in Manitowaning.

Although those are all positive effects, the NOAA notes there can also be negative consequences. "Huge ice jams can form in rivers connecting the Great Lakes," they point out. "These jams constrict the flow of water from one lake to another, causing flooding upstream and less water for hydropower plants downstream. When the jam finally breaks, the resulting surge of ice and water can damage the shoreline and property."

For Great Lakes shipping, heavy ice through the winter season is a mixed blessing for those shipping cargo through the lakes while increased

water levels due to lower evaporation helps to increase capacity to transport cargo, the heavy ice conditions in early spring can also delay the shipping season and cause navigational problems.

For marinas whose life blood is the tourism dollar, higher water levels are also a benefit, especially "to those who spend millions to dredge boat slips, channels, and harbours when lake levels are low."

Many factors impact ice cover each year, with global warming topping the list most often cited these days. But the NOAA points out "in addition to changes from global warming, Great Lakes ice is heavily influenced by natural climate patterns, such as the

ENSO (El Nino and Southern Oscillation) and the NAO (North Atlantic Oscillation) or AO (Arctic Oscillation)."

Those terms might be familiar from Mr. Wang's exposition above. According to NOAA publications, those "long-term oscillations cause shifts in position of various high and low pressure systems that are defined in terms of a numerical index, representing the distribution of temperature and pressure over a wide ocean area that affects global weather patterns."

These airflow patterns have been receiving great airtime in media weather reports over the past decade and help to explain the sudden and severe

unseasonal variations in temperature such as those experienced by our neighbours to the south recently, when all 50 states reported sub-freezing temperatures, much to the chagrin of Canadian snowbirds sojourning in the popular destinations of Florida and Arizona, or honeymooners taking a once-in-a-lifetime trip to Hawaii.

One thing is certain, however, regardless of whether the ice coverage on the Great Lakes is up or down, those venturing out onto the ice should ensure that the thickness is appropriate to bear their weight and, if in doubt, stay off until it is safe.

...continued from page 3 walleye, which are native to some parts of Canada but are considered invasive elsewhere.

The Government of Canada has also invested \$17.5 million over five years (2012-2017) to address key activities related to prevention, early warning, response, and management and control designed to prevent the introduction and establishment of Asian carp in the Great Lakes. Included in these efforts is the opening of a new Asian carp laboratory in Burlington.

Since 2006, no aquatic invasive species attributed to vessel ballast water discharge have been found in

the Great Lakes. This is due to strict enforcement of science-based ballast management regulations through a joint bi-national inspection program.

"Our Government is committed to protecting our recreational and commercial fishing industries by keeping our waterways safe from invasive species," Minister Shea said in a press release. "Since 2006, we have invested in science, prevention, early warning, rapid response and management and control. We must remain vigilant in these efforts, and our proposed new regulations under the Fisheries Act will bolster our ability to

fight the entry and establishment of aquatic invasive species and give those stewards of our fish and fish habitats more ammunition in that fight."

"The Great Lakes support commercial and recreational fishing and shaped communities," the minister continued. "Our government is committed to prevent and mitigate the damage caused by invasive species such as sea lamprey, zebra mussels and Asian carp into Canadian waters. Our proposed regulations include measures to ensure rapid response capabilities to effectively manage aquatic invasive species. The Canadian Border Services

Agency, under these new regulations, will have the authority to stop aquatic vessels at the border to check for invasive species."



They send them to the provincial, which then sends them on to us."

Should the Legion be taken over by the Legion Provincial it will spell its death knell.

"They won't take it over to run it, you can be sure of that," suggested Mr. Marshall. The routine is well established through the example of dozens of branches that have been closed over the past decade. "They will sell off the assets to pay the bills and then sell the land," he said.

"You should wait until after Thursday's meeting to write your story," suggested Royal Canadian Legion District H Commander Gerry Ferguson, who explained that if the Legion is unable to elect a president, their charter would be pulled, but he said he did not anticipate that being an issue. "I am sure that you will get a president," he said. "I will be at the meeting."

The dire situation does have some Legion members rallying to the cause and several longtime members have been overheard discussing the issue on the main street following an online story posted when The Expositor first learned of the issue. That story raised the ire of Ed Pigeau. "The article is full of inaccuracies," he wrote. "Dominion Command does

not take over the branch. Nor do they sell the branch assets to pay Dominion's bills. There are specific protocols in place administered by the provincial command. Dominion Command has no direct role in the closure of a branch."

Branch 177 public relations officer Roy Eaton sent in a comment by email from his southern wintering grounds. "It is very impor-

tant there be a good turnout for the meeting of people who see the value of keeping a Legion in our community," he said. "(People) who wish to show their support of veterans, not just on Remembrance Day, but throughout the entire year. helped the three Blue Goose sites (Wabuno Channel, formerly North Wind Fisheries, Meeker's Aquaculture in Evansville and the Burnt Island hatchery) immensely.

Blue Goose is also awaiting an application that is currently before the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) to create a new fish farm site at the former Camp Adanac property on the West End. This property was sold in the Blue Goose sell-offs that took place over the past year, but Mr. Meeker explained that a long-term lease has been signed with the new owner, allowing for a farm to take place. What won't be happening, however, is the proposed research centre, at least not at that location. An aquaculture research centre is definitely on the Blue Goose list of future projects though, he said.

Blue Goose took over the lease from one of the buildings at the Purvis Fisheries Burnt Island site last spring and has been growing fish there since April.

"The fingerling situation in the province has gotten really tight," Mr. Meeker said. "Growers in southern Ontario were designed to grow small fish, five grams, but the bigger the fish we

can put in the cages, the better."

Mr. Meeker explained that during the 1980s a 3/4 pound whole fish was the standard, but four to five pounds is the new standard.

"From now (December) until April, we're not growing fish, so we have to optimize that," he continued, noting that the Island farms are growing fish faster than anyone else in the province, thanks largely to climate. The optimal temperature for growing a rainbow trout is between 18°C and 20°C, which can be attained in Island waters.

"If we put in a fingerling in the spring that's 100 grams, we can take that fish to market size by February," he said.

Having southern Ontario suppliers that are designed to grow small fish works out well for Mr. Meeker and his crew, who buy them and continue to grow them. At the new facility at Burnt Island, ground water means the water stays close to 7° and 8°C in winter, which means the fish will continue to grow all winter long.

"This is really important to the economics of the situation," he added. "Just like any farming, if your animal isn't growing, you're not making any money. The cost involved in

growing a fish until November, then keeping it for six months to not grow, that definitely cuts into your profit margin."

Each of the Blue Goose sites sees one million pounds of fish harvested each year—the maximum allowed for their size, which is relatively small, he explained.

The company is also working closely with research biologists to perfect the genetics of the fish they are growing, including making sure they are native to the province, which in turn means that the fish are acclimatized to Ontario waters and the bacteria that are found within them.

Word is spreading about the rainbow trout too, with Blue Goose putting more focus on seeking out chefs who like, use and will tout their product, including Ted Reader, who is known for his love of the barbecue, and now his love of Blue Goose rainbow trout, as stated on one popular Toronto morning television program.

The organic brand of trout is hugely popular, Mr. Meeker explained, as it is the only certified organic rainbow trout farmed in the country, right in Evansville. "It's a niche market, but it's a large niche market that's growing," he

said. "Everything we have swimming in the water is sold out."

Much of the product is also being trucked to British Columbia where the love of steelhead is growing in leaps and bounds and where there is a shortage of the fish. Steelhead, Mr. Meeker explains, is a large rainbow trout.

Blue Goose is currently supplying Loblaw's, Sobeys, as well as a number of restaurants, with grocery store chains in the United States also expressing an interest.

While Blue Goose rainbow trout continues to grow by leaps and bounds, the industry is lagging behind worldwide.

On Tuesday, Mr. Meeker was to speak to the Senate committee on what is stopping the industry from growing and finding ways to bring federal and provincial agencies together to streamline the process.

The final report from the Senate committee on aquaculture is expected to be completed by the end of June with promises of changes to the industry following soon after, Mr. Meeker said.

'stranger danger,' right?"

The truth of sexual assault paints a far different picture than what is portrayed on television. "Between 80 percent and 95 percent of people are assaulted by someone they know," she said. "The highest rates of sexual assault take place in the home or a college or university campus and the reported incidents are just a fraction of what is going down."

These days, everybody and their neighbour has been talking about Jian Ghomeshi and/or Bill Cosby, she said. "A lot of this stuff happened 30 years ago. Why are we talking about it now? I like to think it is because we are moving from this to this," she said, referencing a slide showing hands pointing down with a caption of "blaming the rape survivors" and another with hands pointing up captioned "supporting rape survivors." The slide posed the question "which culture do you want to live in?"


Ms. Lalonde is a veteran speaker whose public speaking skills far belie her youth. Her Governor General's Award in Commemoration of the Persons Case was awarded for her "outstanding contribution to improving the quality of life for women in Canada." Her citation says that she "has made a real difference in improving the lives of women and girls through her work to end sexual assault and sexual harassment." A graduate student at Carleton University,

where she studies the impact of poverty and isolation on elderly women, Ms. Lalonde co-chaired the Miss G Project for Equity in Education (Ottawa chapter), successfully lobbying for a new curriculum on gender equality for Ontario high schools and as a young professional, she developed and manages "Draw the Line," the Province of Ontario's anti-sexual violence public education cam-

Ottawa-based community radio station CHUO, was shortlisted for the 2009 YWCA Women of Distinction Award and was the winner of the 2011 Femmy Award for strengthening women's equality in the National Capital Region.

She quickly captured the attention of the MSS students in her audience as she first took them on an exploration of society's and their own views on sexual vio-

lence, particularly focussing on the exploitation of young women on social media and the bystander effect. The bystander effect, she explained, "occurs when the presence of others hinders an individual from intervening in an emergency situation." It is the belief that inaction is an option because "someone else will do something" or "they did nothing, so why should I bother?"

It was largely that last excuse that Draw the Line and Ms. Lalonde's address put in the crosshairs.

She used the real-life example of downloading a song by your favourite singer, who you learned has assaulted his girlfriend. "Do you download his latest song (and support him)?" she asked the students.

By doing so, you are participating in the culture of

sexual violence. "Your money, your Facebook likes and/or vote is supporting them," she said. "You are saying, 'I agree with this!'"

Instead of downloading that song, Ms. Lalonde advised the students on a number of strategies. "Talk about it," she said. Let others know where you stand; don't support a perpetrator with money, Facebook likes

 friends and family back home to collect winter clothing and bedding to fill up her travel allotment and bring resources back with her from the Island to the Northern communities.

Throughout the last year-and-a-half Ms. Wade collected and brought donations with her to the communities of Attawapiskat, Fort Hope, Muskrat Dam First Nation and Sandy Lake, as well as bringing back stray or surrendered dogs to various Sudbury area dog shelters.

In mid-November Ms. Wade organized her largest single donation delivery and animal rescue yet, chartering two planes and bringing 4,000 pounds of clothing, toys, bedding, dog food, leashes, collars and vials of the parvovirus vaccine (for area puppies) to Sandy Lake and bringing back with her 40 dogs and puppies in need

of homes.

"I did a few stunts (while working for Health Canada) in Sandy Lake and the community and the people really touched my heart," Ms. Wade told The Expositor. "I wanted to do something to help them for the holidays and to get out any animals in need."

Ms. Wade, who now works as a dental assistant in Wikwemikong, got to work collecting donations and fundraising to charter the planes to transport the items up north. Through a dance at the Little Current Legion and many generous donations from Manitoulin residents and organizations Ms. Wade raised enough money for the charters.

"Manitoulin Transport shipped a lot of the donations to Red Lake where one of the chartered planes departed from and delivered the items to Sandy Lake," explained Ms. Wade.

"Myself, Aaron (Peltier, Ms. Wade's husband) and Sam Miller (fellow Islander) flew on the second charter out of Thunder Bay."

"When we got to Sandy Lake community members with trucks were waiting to help us transport the donation items to the community hall to be distributed," continued Ms. Wade. People were lined up for the clothes when we got to the hall;

there was definitely a need and everyone was so grateful."

Prior to Ms. Wade's arrival, Sandy Lake community volunteers rounded up area stray dogs that were confirmed homeless and collected puppies and dogs that people had surrendered.

"It was really a team effort," shared Ms. Wade of her work with the commu-

nity. "We had enough crates and space to take 40 dogs and puppies back with us, but we still had to leave some behind. It was heart breaking."

After landing in Thunder Bay Ms. Wade used a 16 foot trailer she had been loaned to transport the dogs to Schreiber where an emergency rescue team met her to feed, water, walk and change the dog's bedding before travelling to Sudbury to Pet Save where another team helped wash, deworm and process all the animals. The dogs were then divided between various shelters in Sudbury.

"Most of the dogs have already been adopted out," Ms. Wade was pleased to report. "I just found out last night that all the dogs have found families that were at the Saints Animal Shelter."

"I am overly impressed with the abundant generosity of people on Manitoulin that donated and helped pay to charter the planes," Ms. Wade added. "It is thanks to the dedication and effort of so many people that helped make a difference in the lives of the people and ani-

mals of Sandy Lake. Thank you to everyone who helped."

Not only has Ms. Wade helped many animals and Northern communities, but her work has also inspired others to help.

"A young woman in Marathon heard about me and wanted to go into Sandy Lake for the rest of the dogs," shared Ms. Wade. "I gave her my contacts and she got to work. The Toronto Humane Society heard about her quest and paid for her whole charter and she was able to rescue another 45 dogs."

Ms. Wade said that groups and veterinarians have come forward as well, offering to run spay and neuter programs in Sandy Lake and other Northern communities in need.

"It is great that so many people want to help," said Ms. Wade. "As I said, these are great communities that care for their pets, they just need some assistance. It's cool how everything has snowballed."

 bicycle count since 2013.

The ferry stats are only part of the cycling tourism equation, of course, but anecdotal reports from across Manitoulin have also been encouraging. "Accommodation providers have told us that they saw a significant increase in bicycle tourism last summer," said Ms. Mielonen. She added that the increase in some cases represented

between five and 10 percent of those providers overall business. "It is especially good that we are starting to see the shoulder season numbers climb," said Ms. Mielonen. "The Manitoulin Passage Ride (a marketing initiative that pairs accommodation discounts with passage on the ferry) helps this trend along as riders experience how quiet the roads are in the off-season and how very few bugs there are on Manitoulin."

Manitoulin's small businesses are welcoming this opportunity to fill their accommodations in early June, continued the cycling advocate. "MICA is very happy with the increasing number of small businesses that wish to advertise on our website www.manitoulincycling.com," she said. "This helps our volunteer efforts greatly."

Ms. Mielonen, who operates the popular Maja's in Mindemoya and is a famil-

iar sight at local food promotional events and farmers' markets, puts in a good portion of her off-season time to promoting cycling and Manitoulin Island.

"MICA is also very pleased to be able to attend the 29th International Bicycle Show, March 6-8, 2015 with support from our municipalities, OSTC, The Expositor and our MICA volunteers," she said. "This three-day show attracts around 25,000 visitors and we will do our best to repre-

or a vote, said Ms. Lalonde. "Think twice about the choices you make every day. Can you take a stand, make a statement and draw the line?"

The challenge before the youth of today is clear, asserts Ms. Lalonde. Youth can make a difference by refusing to buy into the outdated culture that supports sexual predators and embracing a culture that supports the survivors.

Ms. Lalonde offered the topic of sexting and the sharing of naked photographs, posing the question "a friend sends you a naked picture of a girl he knows, is it a big deal to share it with others?" It is.

Ms. Lalonde had posed the question of consent at the beginning of her talk and the answer was quick and clear. These days "every Grade 5 knows the answer to that question," she said. The definition is clear in law, "consent is voluntary, sober, enthusiastic and never assumed."

If there is no clear, explicit consent on the part of an adult in the photograph, if a third party sent it, you cannot assume consent on the part of the person in the photograph. It is simple and it is clear, sharing that photograph is a sexual assault on the person in the photo—full stop.

If the photograph is of a minor, then it is classified as child pornography, even if the person in the picture consented to it being taken and shared—full stop.

Moreover, under new laws coming out soon, should you use a phone or computer or tablet or any other electronic equipment registered to your parents to send or store that photograph, your parents are guilty of possessing and/or distributing child pornography. "If your parent crosses a border with a laptop containing that picture, they are now facing international trafficking in child pornography charges," she said. "Do you want to put that on them?"

The stratagems for dealing with a picture you know is wrong are fairly straightforward. "Don't open it," is the simplest. "Don't share it," is also simple. "Literally do nothing and you are better than anybody else," said Ms. Lalonde. The prurient interest that drives us to condemn an action and then rush off to Google the photograph must be resisted.

But Ms. Lalonde exhorted her audience to go further, however.

"You have to report it," she said. "The second you get it, report it to someone in

authority but not the whole world. If you sit on it, the police have to assume that you are okay with it."

Ms. Lalonde said that she was "okay" with people choosing to act simply "to save your own skin."

But she also told the students to "have a backbone" and to tell the person who is in the photograph. Not knowing that the photograph is out there robs the person who is being assaulted of any opportunity to limit the damage or to respond. "For Amanda Todd, the pictures were going around for weeks without her knowing about it," she said. Everyone she knew was complicit. If someone had the courage to tell her what was happening, her tragic death might have been averted. "But nobody, nobody, had her back." That is a devastating realization for anyone, but for a vulnerable teen it proved unbearable.

Ms. Lalonde asked her audience to commit to doing three things to help make our culture a better world: "Call out the behaviour, support the person and speak out," she said.

Student Skyler Danville was among a group of students, all young women, who were gathered around Ms. Lalonde following her presentation. Her verdict? "It was awesome," she said. "People need to know how wrong it is and how to stop it."

Alexis French agreed, pointing out that the subject matter was far from theoretical. "It is definitely an issue in our school," she said, noting that silence on the subject may leave parents with a false sense of security.

"We need more presentations like this," agreed student Alisha Ledain. "A lot of people don't talk about it."

Manitoulin and North Shore Victim Services Executive Director Ashley Jewell said that she was excited about how the presentation was inspiring students to talk about the issue and to learn about the importance of supporting the victim and learning what they can do about the issue.

Manitoulin Family Resources Executive Director Marnie Hall Brown was also in the audience watching the students interact with the speaker. "I think the presentation was fantastic," she said. "Thanks to funding through the Ontario Women's Directorate we were able to coordinate these talks at three high schools (MSS, Wikwemikong High School and Espanola High School) in our area and that too is fantastic."

sent Manitoulin and the LaCloche region."

"Our visitors love cycling on the Island," continued Ms. Mielonen. "They have purchased over 6,000 Manitoulin Island Cycling Routes and Road Maps in the past three years and have indicated in a MICA survey done in 2013 that they would like to see cycling infrastructure improvements, cycling racks, way-finding signage and water fountains."

MICA has been approaching local municipalities to explore funding for way finding with municipal support, but Ms. Mielonen said that she would like to see some provincial tourism dollars flowing into the sector as well.

"It will be interesting to see whether there has been an increase in motorcycle numbers from the ferry," she said. "We don't begrudge the motorcyclists, as local business people need all the people coming we can get, but if the numbers have stagnated in the motorcycle sector (where the regional tourism organization has been pouring in tens of thousands of marketing dollars), perhaps we can encourage the province to put some money into promoting cycling tourism too."

"In 2013 LAMBAC started their cycling infrastructure strategy plan and MICA will help wherever we can to continue this LAMBAC initiative," said Ms. Mielonen. "Let's welcome these very encouraging numbers of new visitors by providing the infrastructure our cycling visitors hope to

find in a place they choose for their active living vacation."

MINDEMOYA—The swearing in and meeting of the new council for the municipality of Central Manitoulin took place December 2 with newcomers including Mayor Richard Stephens and Councillors Alex Baran and Linda Farquhar in attendance.

Mayor Stephens began the meeting by acknowledging the service of the members of the previous council with special mention of former mayor Gerry Strong and councillors Gloria Haner and Adam McDonald and thanking them for their hard work. He then congratulated the new council members and pointed out that Councillor Derek Stephens had been elected for a fourth term. "We will look to you for leadership," the mayor told Councillor Stephens as he also talked of the experience and know-how of Councillors Pat MacDonald and Ted Taylor who joined the panel three years ago. The mayor also talked of the financial side of life that Councillor Baran would bring to the table, the community work of Councillor Dale Scott and the attributes and political name of Linda Farquhar.

In a special mention of township clerk Ruth Frawley the mayor noted that she is "the glue that holds the whole package together."

The council agenda then saw the appointments to committees of council with six working groups being formed. The roads committee will be chaired by Dale Scott with members Ted Taylor, Linda Farquhar and Derek Stephens while Ted Taylor will head the property committee with members Pat MacDonald, Dale Scott and Alex Baran. The waste, water and education committee will see Derek Stephens at the helm with Alex Baran, Pat MacDonald and Ted Taylor sitting as members and the safety, security and health board will be chaired by Linda Farquhar with Derek Stephens, Alex Baran and Ted Taylor serving as members. Alex Baran will serve as chairperson for the finance and economic development committee along with Linda Farquhar, Dale Scott and Pat MacDonald. Councillor MacDonald will be in charge of the office and administration committee with members Dale Scott, Linda Farquhar and Derek Stephens. As usual, the mayor will sit on all committees and each committee will have a staff member.

Appointments to other boards and committees were also discussed at the meeting with Pat MacDonald sitting as chair of the beautification committee and Linda Farquhar serving as alternate. Councillor MacDonald also heads the Central Manitoulin Cemetery Board along with Alex Baran while Ted Taylor continues to head the Central Manitoulin Historical Society with the mayor being the alternate. The Central Manitoulin Public Library board will be chaired by Derek Stephens with the alternate being Linda Farquhar and Alex Baran will head the Discovery Centre board with Pat MacDonald as the alternate. Eric Russell has been appointed to sit on the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board while Ted Taylor, Steve Orford, Jim Anstice and Al Tribinevicius serve as fence viewers and Dale Scott as head of the livestock evaluator with Jim Gilpin sitting as the alternate member. Pat MacDonald will also head the Manitoulin Centennial Manor board with Linda Farquhar as alternate while Mayor Stephens will be the appointee to the Manitoulin Planning Board, which does not allow alternates, and the Manitoulin Municipal Association. Dale Scott will lead the Mindemoya Arena Advisory Committee with alternate Ted Taylor and the Community Policing Advisory Committee with Derek Stephens as alternate and he will be the alternate for the weed inspector committee which is headed by Jim Gilpin. Councillor Farquhar has been appointed to head the Provincial Offences Act Committee and Alex Baran will serve as the appointee to the Providence Bay Community Centre board. Derek Stephens will be the alternate for both of these committees.

Deputy mayor appointments were also announced at the meeting with Pat MacDonald serving for the first 16 months, Linda Farquhar for the next 16 months and Dale Scott finishing up the term. As Mayor Stephens noted, these appointments reflected the fact that there was one person appointed from each of the regular townships.

Mayor Stephens also announced an emergency management training seminar to be held in the council chambers on December 9 from 9 am until noon. Mayor Stephens will attend the session and issued an open invitation for councillors to attend.

Over 800 head of cattle processed at 2014 Manitoulin Island Cattle Exchange

MANITOULIN—The Manitoulin Cattle Exchange (MCE) has ended its second year on a high note, processing over 800 head of cattle at record high market prices at its Assinack sales barn.

At its May sale, the MCE saw 202 head of cattle through the gates, 15 sellers and 11 buyers. On September 15 there were 202 head sold from 15 sellers and 11 buyers while November 15 was the biggest sale of the year with 231 head from 22 sellers and 12 buyers. The last sale of the year, which took place on Saturday, November 29, had 152 head from 15 sellers with 12 buyers attending the sale.

The Saturday sale brought in 68 steers and 69 heifers with steers fetching between \$1,630 and \$1,680 for animals weighing between 600 and 700 pounds; \$1,385 and \$1,495, 500 and 600 pounds; and \$1,210 and \$1,300 for steers between 400 and 500 pounds.

Heifers weighing 700 to 800 pounds brought in \$1,720; 500 to 600 pounds, \$1,305 to \$1,410; and 400 to 500 pounds, \$1,110 to \$1,300.

"The thing with having a sale this late is you start to lose buyers," Dave McDowell, who runs the MCE along with Dean Millsap of Evansville, explained. "But on the other hand, there are the guys who don't want to start their feedlot yet."

Mr. McDowell said there is "certainly a lot of optimism" for a Manitoulin sales barn. His only concern, he added, is that the cattle going to market were contracted at between \$2.50 and \$2.60 per pound for carcass weight whereas the markets are now at \$3 per pound.

"I'm interested to see how this will affect the cost of beef at the supermarket," he said. "Will this mean consumer resistance? In 40 years of farming, I've never seen the weather or the markets so wild."

Sweet Slumbers Campaign passes the half-way mark

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) launched a new fundraising campaign, which aimed at raising \$200,000 to buy 20 new hospital beds (10 for each site), with that goal reaching ever closer.

To date, the campaign has been very successful, with businesses, the two hospital auxiliaries, other service organizations, and individuals coming forward to raise over \$100,000, which equates to 10 beds, a press release from the MHC states.

"One of the most important factors in healing is proper rest and sleep," the press release continues. "A hospital bed that is designed with the right features to assist in this healing is an essential part of the equation."

"Our population is aging and so are our beds," said MHC CEO Derek Graham. "When our current beds were purchased in the '80s and '90s, the health needs of our patients were very different and general medical/surgical admissions were the order of the day. Today, the focus has shifted to senior's issues, with more chronic health conditions; as a result, the features required of our hospital beds have also changed."

"Today, what's needed are hospital beds with enhanced features that are more 'senior-friendly,'" Mr. Graham continued. "Enhanced adjustment options, the ability to lower the beds, and alarm features that notify nursing staff when patients who require mobility assistance are trying to get out of bed—features that help produce a more comfortable and safer healing environment."

Each bed costs an average of \$10,000. To keep the momentum moving forward, the MHC will be working over the next year to expand upon its current circle of patrons, by bringing other interested persons and groups on-board.

"The generous spirit that exists across our Island home is our greatest source of strength, and we are confident that this important campaign will successfully reach the 20-bed goal!" Mr. Graham enthused.

Wkwemikong commemorates the Montreal Massacre with vigil

WIKWEMIKONG—People gathered in solemn ceremony at an early morning ceremony held at the Wkwemikong Health Centre's medicine lodge to partake in a pipe ceremony led by elder Urban Mejaki and to hear the inspiring words of survivor and counsellor Shauna Pitawanakwat, but most of all to remember the 14 women who lost their lives in the 1989 Montreal Massacre on the 25th anniversary of that tragedy.

"Today, 25 years after the massacre in Montreal, we come here to honour the memories of the women murdered across Canada," said Mr. Mejaki following a prayer in Anishinaabemowin. "Here in Wkwemikong we always do our best to help out. We offer support for the ones who were massacred in Montreal. When we look back 25 years, it seems like just yesterday. Our hearts go out to the families of the people who have lost their loved ones."

The elder related a dream his wife had where the fires across the land went up, from east to west, and how a young man at the Friendship Centre had the very same dream, a vision of hope that pressure from the people would end government indifference to the ongoing plight of the missing and murdered women. "Here today, in the circle, we think about the women being murdered."

"If we do two or three of these things (the Seven Grandfather teachings) that is our hope, if we do seven, it would be like floating on air," he said.

"I am very honoured to be here in this building for this vigil," said Marnie Hall Brown, executive director of Manitoulin Family Resources. She spoke of the importance of reaching out and supporting each other. "We will spend as long as it takes to reach the day when we can look back at what has happened in the past and know that it will not happen again."

Duke Peltier thanked those in the medicine lodge for being there early on a Saturday morning to show their support and to do their part to meet the challenge of ending violence and abuse "not only in our own community, but across the land. It is important to go back to the basics," he continued, "our Creator put women on the earth to walk beside men. We are all equal, none are better or greater than the other, that is what I try to remember as I sit by this fire. Awareness of the issues facing our community is a good thing."

Elder Dorothy Wakegijig Kennedy, a community wellness worker, spoke of her work with people experiencing family violence. "I thank the elders for this building," she said. "I want to thank each and every one of you for being here today for the remembrance of the women killed in Quebec."

Ms. Kennedy welcomed and introduced the morning's keynote speaker, Shauna Pitawanakwat, who came to share her own experiences of violence and abuse.

"Miigwetch for this beautiful lodge," she said. "I want to thank the spirit helpers and our Ogimaa and these gentlemen for

taking a Saturday, first thing in the morning."

She spoke of the pain that parents feel for the loss of a child, no matter what their age and the suffering they must still be experiencing even after the passage of a quarter century. Ms. Pitawanakwat noted that there have been many changes in the past 25 years. "Some good, some very slow," she said. "We look at where we are today in regards to violence against women."

Ms. Pitawanakwat shared the story of the sexual abuse she suffered as a child of four in Michigan, where her family had travelled, as many did in those days to find economic opportunities. "A child is supposed to be safe," she said. She shared the story of her own journey through life, her experience of racism, her marriage to a non-Native. "I didn't like who I was, I thought it would be better for me, I didn't like to be Native" and then found herself in a cycle of abuse that ensnares many women.

Ms. Pitawanakwat said that she hoped that one day there would be a women's shelter in her own community to help women safely escape from that cycle.


Liberal Aboriginal Affairs critic Dr. Carolyn Bennett was present in the circle with AMK Liberal candidate Heather Wilson. Ms. Bennett was in Wkwemikong to meet with Chief Peltier about the concerns, goals and needs of his community and what the federal government can do to assist the community in meeting their goals.

"I don't pretend to know all the answers," said Ms. Wilson, "but I am here to listen and learn. This morning I am here to honour the memory of not only those who were murdered 25 years ago, simply for being women, but also those missing and mur-

dered women who are victims of violence and abuse today."

Following the vigil, those in the medicine lodge

joined a crowd gathering outside for a march around the community to show their solidarity as a community.



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
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
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

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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Manitoulin Family Resources holds ‘magical’ daycare open house

care for children aged 18-months to 12-years. Before and after school care is also available at Central Manitoulin Public School in Mindemoya for children aged three-and-a-half to 12 years of age.

Daycare activities at both sites provide children with early learning and play opportunities, stimulation, and healthy development.

Ms. St. Pierre pointed out that both centres are governed by the Day Nurseries Act, are compliant with the Ontario Ministry of Education’s Early Learning Program and are staffed by qualified Early Childhood Educators and that subsidies are available to qualified applicants through the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board.


licenced home daycare providers located throughout the region.

In our family cookies are a favourite anytime of the year, but at Christmas they are a little more special and a little more delicious. I like to use recipes that have different ingredients that I normally wouldn’t use throughout the year like hazelnuts, Hershey Kisses, candy cane, and lots of butter.

Apricot-Cranberry White-Chocolate-Chunk Cookies

If you’re not a fan of white chocolate substitute it with dark chocolate and I switched the macadamia nuts to almonds. You can also use chocolate chips which are easier to work with then chopping the squares. Don’t forget to use the cookie scoop and parchment paper.

- 3/4 cup butter
- 1 1/4 cups brown sugar
- 3/4 tsp baking soda
- 1 egg
- 2 Tbsp milk
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 tsp coconut extract
- 1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 6-ounce package white chocolate baking squares, chopped
- 3/4 cup chopped dried apricots
- 1/2 cup dried cherries, chopped
- 1/2 cup macadamia nuts

1. Preheat oven to 325°F. Beat butter with an electric mixer on medium speed for 30 seconds. Add brown sugar, and baking soda. Beat until combined. Beat in egg, milk, vanilla, and extract until combined. Beat or stir in flour. Stir in white chocolate, apricots, cranberries, and nuts.

2. Drop dough by tablespoons or cookie scoop 2 inches apart onto a parchment lined cookie sheet. Bake in preheated oven about 11 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on cookie sheet for 1 minute. Transfer cookies to a wire rack and cool completely.

3. To store place cookies in layers separated by waxed paper in an airtight container. Store at room temperature for up to 3 days or freeze for up to 3 months.

Little Current vigil recognizes 25th anniversary of the Montreal Massacre

Candles lit for 14 women lost as well as local victims of violence

LITTLE CURRENT—An emotional vigil was held last Saturday, December 6 in Little Current at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church hall recognizing the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women and marking the 25th anniversary of the Montreal Massacre where 14 women were murdered at the L'Ecole Polytechnique in 1989.

"Thank you for coming today to take pause and remember the 14 women who lost their life simply because they were women," said Brenda Clark of Manitoulin Family Resources (MFR) before introducing Leslie Neshkiwe who performed 'Stand By Me.' "We have lit 14 unnamed candles in their memory, as requested by the women's families."

Following Ms. Neshkiwe's performance, Ms. Clark listed staggering statistics of women in Canada such as on any given day, 8,200 women and their children are living in emergency shelters and transition houses to escape violence, 400,000 women report sexual assault annually and 90 percent of sexual assaults go unreported.

"December is a busy time of year, I am glad to see so many people here today," said MFR Executive Director Marnie Hall Brown. "Twenty-five years sounds like a long time, but it is a blink of an eye. I was finishing high school in 1989 and I remember watching the news that night (December 6) and not understanding the chaos."

Ms. Brown led the group in lighting candles for women who had been killed in the Manitoulin and North Shore area due to violence against women. A number of individuals who attended the vigil were given names when they first arrived. As Ms. Brown read the names, individuals from the crowd stood up and lit a candle in their memory. A moment of silence followed.

"That is a lot of candles for a small community," began the vigil's guest speaker Julie Lalonde, an award-winning social justice advocate based in Ottawa and project manager of Draw-the-line.ca, a provincial anti-sexual violence campaign that targets bystanders, who is originally from Kagawong. "Today is a day of remembrance and action, but we often forget about the action part."

Ms. Lalonde spoke of Ottawa Centre MP Paul Dewar's recent speech in the House of Commons recognizing December 6 and the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women and how, even today, Mr. Dewar didn't state that Marc Lepine's actions were directed at women.

"Mr. Dewar said 'we don't know what motivated Marc Lepine,' but we do know, he wrote it down, he yelled it at people, his violent actions were specifically directed at women," said Ms. Lalonde. "It is appalling that even today people can't say what happened, 25 years later."

Ms. Lalonde said that according to the Femicide list for 2014, 29 women and girls died in Ontario from November 2013 to November 2014 as a result of gender-based violence.

"That is one year, one province, and Ontario doesn't even have the highest rate in Ontario," Ms. Lalonde said.

Ms. Lalonde also spoke of a fellow women's advocate, Anita Sarkeesian, who has a video blog 'Feminist Frequency' and who has been the target of an online harassment campaign following her launch of a Kickstarter project to raise funds for a documentary about sexism in video games.

"Anita was scheduled to speak at the University of Utah, but someone threatened to recreate the Montreal Massacre if she did," said Ms. Lalonde, explaining that since Utah is an open

firearm state and she had to cancel her appearance for both her and the audience's safety.

She also spoke of Elliot Rodger and the Isla Vista murders near the University of California.

"If you connect the dots between all of these stories, the motivation is a hatred of women," said Ms. Lalonde. "They all have the ripple effect of violence against women."

Ms. Lalonde also recognized how the recent media attention involving Jian Ghomeshi has "started an international conversation" about violence against women.

Ms. Lalonde said that as pleased as she was at the progress made in the last year about bringing the issue into the spotlight, she hopes that momentum will continue, eventually reaching a place where "everyone knows about

December 6, but can't wrap their heads about why women were shot for simply

being women."

Ms. Brown concluded the vigil, thanking Ms. Lalonde

and repeating her hope for change moving forward.

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
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Tehkummah Talk and Times
