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Ontario budget hits the vulnerable, ignores the North: critics

QUEEN'S PARK—Booze figures large in the first Ford Conservative budget, but critics are slagging the fiscal blueprint for a lacklustre tackling of the deficit that places most of the burden on the poor and vulnerable. Conservatives, on the other hand, while expressing a slight dismay at the length of time it will take to bring the books back to black, are pleased at the right-hand turn.

This is a budget that is geared to hurt the most vulnerable," said official opposition member Algoma-Manitoulin NDP MPP Mike Mantha. "This budget is about booze and rebranding. A budget is supposed to reflect the values and priorities of the government. This budget is very cruel to Ontarians and there is nothing in it for Northern Ontario." He noted that the budget mentions "booze over 40 times, but not one mention of poverty."

Mr. Mantha pointed to cuts that will disproportionately hit the North, where many communities are economically challenged.

"I am hearing an abundance of positive about the budget," countered Sault Ste. Marie MPP Ross Romano. "I think we have a budget, finally, that will bring us into a sustainable balance that will protect that which is most important, our publically funded health care and education systems.

Mr. Romano reiterated the Progressive Conservative claim that their government inherited a \$15 billion deficit, a number expressed by the premier the night before the budget was released, followed by Finance Minister Vic

Mr. Romano noted the budget projects that the scales will return to balance in five years. "We have chosen to take a responsible and sustainable approach," he said. "We were on a path to bankruptcy, now we are on a path to balance."

The Sault MPP said that the course has been plotted "without a single tax increase" while still managing to return \$10 billion to Ontario taxpayers through the cancellation of the cap and trade program and what he characterized as other "tax grabs."

The budget slashed funding to Indigenous Affairs in half, from \$146-million to \$74-million, but some First Nation leaders are choosing to remain upbeat despite that ministry taking the largest percentage hit in the budget.

"Despite the cut to core funding for Indigenous Affairs, the priorities of our leadership towards improving the well-being of our communities will continue with vigor," said Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Glen Hare. "I will continue to advocate on behalf of our citizens to advance what is in the best interest of our nations.'

But that positive view is tempered by other parts of the budget that placed funding cuts and freezes on programs and services that disproportionality serve the poor and

"The Anishinabek Nation has long advocated for opportunities that will benefit the lives of our children, families, and communities—this budget contains very little in that tion, and health in the short-term and over time are a deepening concern." The reality of having inadequate funding to carry out duties and responsibilities is a concept far too familiar for First Nations.

'The release of today's Ontario Budget titled 'Protecting What Matters Most' provides for some serious concern on the direction by the Ford government, which neglects direct investments and commitments to First Nations in Ontario," notes a release from Ontario Regional Chiefs RoseAnne Archibald. "As the Ontario regional chief, I have communicated with Premier Ford, and shared that I understand his commitment to enact policy and measures that support and lift up Ontario's lowest economic earners. While we can see the investment and substantive commitments he has made in the budget to economic investment. transit and healthcare infrastructure, what we fail to see is a specific mention of First Nations inclusion in these investments. It is also a bit alarming to see Budget 2019 provide an almost 10 percent cut to core funding for Indigenous Affairs, to \$74.4 million, further reducing the capacity of the ministry, and also not to see any additional investments in one-time investment dollars, which raises

\$200,000 Mindemoya arena renovations raise concerns

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—Recommendations from the Central Manitoulin property committee to proceed with required repairs to the Mindemoya arena to the tune of a maximum of \$200,000 and to replace a three-phase electrical wire at the arena with an estimated cost of \$5,000 engendered a significant amount of debate during the April 11 meeting of the Central Manitoulin council.

The motion to replace the electrical line was moved by Councillor Derek Stephens and seconded by Councillor Angela Johnston. Acting Clerk Denise Deforge noted that there have been at least three splices to the existing line and that the town staff are not sure that the line can be counted on to hold up. "We are not sure we can count on it," she said. 'We would lose power to our arena if it should fail.'

"This would be a relatively cheap fix," noted Councillor Stephens as he spoke to the motion. He pointed out that there are a number of events coming up that take place at the arena. "We are ready to start (planning for) the Pearson Cup and other events," he said.

"I am not comfortable with the information we have received," said Councillor Steve Shaffer. "I have been talking to people and it is only six or seven years since we had a brand new line put in." Councillor Shaffer noted that the line had been damaged by a construction company. "Hydro put a splice in at the pole, then another splice was put in," he said. "That work was all coded (to building code specifications). If the two splices failed, there might quite possibly be another damaged part at the pole. If the splice was at fault, I don't know.'

'That is why we are going with the \$5,000," said Councillor Stephens.

Inaugural 'Current to Killarney' paddling race coming to Georgian Bay this summer

LITTLE CURRENT—Manitoulin Brewing Company president Blair Hagman and Killarney Mountain Lodge general manager Kelly McAree have partnered to create a unique experience on the waters of Georgian Bay-Current to Killarney Canoefest, a 40kilometre race that may be on track to become the largest canoe race in Ontario in 2019.

"We're hoping to create Killarney as a paddling destination, maybe even the Canadian paddling destination down the road," said Mr. McAree.

It's such a unique waterway to travel and both locations are great places to visit," said Mr. Hagman. "It's very exciting to see this come to fruition. I'm really looking forward to seeing all the boats in the water."

The race on Saturday, July 6 will see as many as 12 Voyageur-style canoes—massive boats between 26 and 35 feet in length that can hold between seven and 12 paddlers—hit the water along with canoes, solo and tandem kayaks and OC6 outrigger canoes, for a strenuous trek across the open waters of Georgian Bay from Little Current to the safe harbour of Killar-

"We worked with Rob Melon (retired OPP officer, Voyageur canoe builder and Manitowaning resident) on the route, and when we organized previous canoe races we looked at the map and figured out what was

the best route to take. We have a premier route and an alternate route in case the winds are high, to protect the paddlers."

Plan A for the race is approximately 36 kilometres in length and will take paddlers from the starting line at Spider Bay Marina in Little Current under the swing bridge and past the Strawberry Island lighthouse. They will then travel along Heywood Island, across the big water a second time to Partridge Island, then follow the somewhat protected waterway past Centre, Badgeley and George islands to finish at the Sportsman's Inn in Killarney.

The poor-weather plan B route instead goes across the south edges of the LaCloche and Mary islands in Frazer Bay before dipping down to Boyle Cove and following the north edge of the long peninsula that extends as far as Partridge Island. When they reach Rat Portage, there will be a one-kilometre portage to reach Portage Cove on the opposite side of the peninsula where the paddlers will rejoin the main route.

Mr. Hagman has first-hand experience with the long journey and some of the challenges present along the route. Members of the Manitoulin Brewing Company team (including Mr. Melon) paddled a Voyageur canoe with Canadian paddling icon Mike Ranta along the same route this past October to offi-

Industry Canada, Mr. Boyd explained, is the regulatory body for amateur radio operators, and grants them the use of certain radio channels for free, but with one caveat: they must give back by providing emergency communications free of charge when called upon.

Should "terrestrial communications" break down, such as cellphone, internet or landlines, MARC can rush in, set up their equipment and

The books should not be balanced on the vulnerable

Tax cuts for the wealthy and balanced budgets at all costs would appear to be goals at natural loggerheads, unless you are an acolyte of the latest brand of conservatism, where the term progressive most definitely need not apply. The latest Ontario budget, and its precursor in the economic statement last fall, are clear examples of the doublethink that now seems to pervade the Tory psyche. Gone are any indications of compassion for the poor, the vulnerable and the disadvantaged which might have existed in those heady bygone Red Tory days of the likes of a Bill Davis. Apparently there is no room for such weakness in an Ontario that is "open for business." Truly, the sentiments stressed by no less a Progressive Conservative luminary than former Sudbury mayor and Progressive Conservative MPP Jim Gordon, who recently remarked that "There is no room for a red tory like me anymore" are playing true.

In the curious catechism of the new Conservative playbook, hallway health care will be eliminated through the efficiencies of de facto budget cuts and freezes. The magic wand of Ford "efficiencies" will take a health care system that has been known for decades to be under serious strain, due largely to the aging baby boom population, and which is facing even further stress due to years of severely shortsighted funding shortfalls under all partisan banners, and alleviate all ills by spending less.

The new government is taking things much, much further down the populist alley than any previous government would ever have dreamt. Gone is any pretence that media releases are anything but partisan government propaganda as Ontario's self proclaimed "government for the people" moniker leads off each pronouncement of a further funding cut to vulnerable sectors as "investing" x number of dollars in that sector as though it were an increase in funding.

By focussing cuts on those in our society with the weakest voices, this government is cynically placing the burden of balancing the books onto the backs of those who can least afford it. This budget will bring real pain and real suffering, but this government is banking on the indifference of those who are not in pain, those who are not suffering but who are encouraged to feel hard done by through the use of social media propaganda.

It is vitally important that the books of this province are brought into order and since the employment rate is at an all-time high and the economy is running at near-capacity, this is definitely the time to do so. But that balance is not going to happen if the route is charted by allowing businesses to exploit workers, gutting environmental protections, human rights and placing the burden of that balance on the backs of the poor, the sick and the infirm.

Reganonomics has long been debunked by economists (hardly the most left-wing of analysts) as a complete failure and the trickledown effect has only succeeded in pouring more wealth into the hands of those who need it the least. Populism manipulates the very worst of our human instincts against us. Buck-a-beer and tailgate parties might be popular, but they are not a sound basis for a just and pros-

Conference discusses highlights of Manitoulin Indigenous research

LITTLE CURRENT—Researchers in several disciplines convened at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in the late winter to discuss highlights of their research and share perspectives on their experiences and challenges in completing the work, while addressing the issue of how research can contribute to reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities.

"This is the third research conference on Manitoulin Island," said Lorilee McGregor, the chair of the Manitoulin Anishinaabek Research Review Committee (MARRC), in her opening address.

MARRC started in 2001. In that time, more than 60 research projects have passed through the committee. The people behind those projects were invited to share their findings with community members at this event.

"For a long time, our communities had mostly negative experiences with health research and so the committee was established as a way to ensure that research happening on Manitoulin was ethical, from an Indigenous perspective," said Ms. McGregor.

The focus of the presentations was on research projects that have taken place in the past five years. The event was open to any interested persons, whether they were a community member who was interested in the results or just someone who wanted to see examples of the cutting-edge Indigenous research taking place on the Island.

Leona Nahwegahbow led an opening prayer on the first day of the conference and the attendees also smudged. Ryan Corbiere offered some introductory statements on behalf of Noojmowin Teg, whose board he chairs. Then Ms. McGregor welcomed the room with an overview of MARRC.

"In 2001, Noojmowin Teg sponsored a research conference at the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation. We brainstormed what makes research ethical from an Indigenous perspective," she said.

From there, representatives from Island health centres and other organizations formed a working committee and developed guidelines for ethical Indigenous health research. Since then, the committee has begun to explore all types of research beyond the health field, including educational, environmental, social and economic research.

A key aspect that the group strives to maintain is the importance of the host community for any research project. Through their review process, they assess

how community members will be involved and how they will be benefited as a result of supporting a research project. They also assess how fundamental guidelines like the Seven Grandfather Teachings will be followed in each project.

Deborah McGregor had the next speaking role. She was the morning's keynote speaker and gave an hour-long presentation about the future directions of Indigenous research. She has taught an Indigenous Research Methods course for 12 years and joked that this presentation was essentially condensing a semester-long course into one hour.

"A lot of past research has essentially boiled down to, 'First Nations have alcohol problems.' They think we're the problem and there's been a lot of research about solving 'the problem'," said Ms. McGregor.

"Past research has often been done by non-Indigenous people, giving Indigenous peoples little to no opportunity to provide feedback, offer corrections and combat racism," she said. "There's been billions put into solving the 'Indian problem,' and I wonder what would have happened if that money was put into the communities."

She continued to say that former research has often treated Indigenous peo-

ples as one homogeneous group, rather than the diverse and nuanced collection of peoples with their own unique customs, values and beliefs.

"People are calling it Indigenous research now, but it should eventually be Anishinaabek research, Cree research or Métis research," she said, adding that an important first step is following communication protocol within Indigenous communities and recognizing elders as knowledge holders.

"We had our own ways of scholarship (traditionally). Research did not start with colonization," she said, then led into several of the major periods of Indigenous research and said that the research mentality needs to shift from studying Indigenous peoples to researching with Indigenous peoples.

This was all not to say that she thought research should be conducted by Indigenous people only; rather, she said a respect for their language, metaphors and symbols is needed in order to be effective and respectful, along with trauma-informed research to avoid re-traumatizing individuals who have lived through challenging experiences.

She also said that Anishinaabek need to determine what reconciliation means to them and that they should make that known to researchers. That way, they will be able to work towards an acceptable standard.

Following a short break, Rob Wabegijig and Mark Forsyth presented their survey findings as part of the Manitoulin Drug Strategy. The survey, whose results have previously appeared in this newspaper, found that 90.7 percent of people have been directly impacted by drug or alcohol addiction, whether in themselves or in a close friend or family member.

The survey also found that while the respondents overwhelmingly knew where to obtain substances like alcohol, cannabis, cocaine and crack cocaine, among other narcotics, they did not know as much about the support services for Island residents living with addictions. Manitoulin Drug Strategy is now developing a work plan to address the concerns found through the survey, find alternate service providers and advocate for change.

Susan Snelling and Danielle Bourgault then presented their experiences in running three-day-long digital storytelling workshops with Zhibaahaasing youth as a way of promoting health and identifying community challenges. They discussed some of the merits and challenges with this approach and then showed some examples of work the children had produced.

Following those two presentations, there was a discussion in the groups seated together about their research experiences on the Island and a question of what could be done to improve how research is conducted involving Anishinaabek.

Chelsea Gabel and Nicole Goodman discussed findings related to online voting in First Nations elections, using Whitefish River First Nation as a case study. A majority of respondents expressed satisfaction with online voting, compared to a much less favourable review of paper voting. Digital voting also addresses concerns about off-reserve members participating in elections.

Further presentations throughout the afternoon were Mary Jo Wabuno and Nancy Young's work in implementing the Aboriginal Children's Health and Well-Being Measure in Wiikwemkoong schools, Leslie McGregor and the impacts of climate change in Whitefish River First Nation, an evaluation of the Northern Food and Vegetable Program by Chantel Belanger and Michele Lim, Sean Meades and Deb Pine's investigation on the regional labour market for Indigenous language teachers, administrators and service providers and Carol Mayer's findings from a cancer symptom management initiative.

The following day featured a keynote from Cindy Peltier about Indigenous research methods with participatory action research. Karen Pitawanakwat and Marion McGregor's work on dementia and aging populations, Mark Bruner and Kieran Pelletier's study of Indigenous youth development through sport and physical activity, Sheldon Tobe's hypertension work, Marion Maar and Randy Trudeau's study on Indigenous perspectives on domestic violence on an Island First Nation, Shelley Trudeau's examination of social assistance and service delivery on a First Nation, Joshua Manitowabi's study on incorporating Anishinaabe knowledge into the education curriculum and Melanie Manitowabi's examination of integrating Anishinaabe culture into elementary school curriculum.

Small group discussions centered on offering advice to researchers wanting to do studies with Anishinaabek, good practices to share with other researchers, what 'reconciliation' means to each individual, how research has impacted Anishinaabek people and communities on Manitoulin, and the role of research in reconciliation.

OPP training officers on use of new drug detection units

MANITOULIN—Members of the Greater Sudbury Police Service and the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are undergoing training on new drug detection systems for use in gathering information about impaired individuals.

At a recent meeting of the Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA), the group voted to support lobbying efforts to have cannabis laws mirror the restrictions on alcohol use, such as banning public consumption of the substance.

The province has banned cannabis use in certain locations such as near schools, hospitals and municipal buildings, but enforcement falls to the responsibility of a municipality. By mirroring alcohol laws, the association hoped enforcement could be conducted by police offi-

Technology to detect impaired motorists at roadside traffic stops is improving but still not at the level to be considered a reliable method of determining impairment levels.

Charges result from raid at illegal dispensary

facing charges after the

executed a warrant at an
illegal cannabis dispensary located on the
Sheguiandah First Nation
on Wednesday, April 10.

UCCM Anishnaabe Police received information that the High and Buy cannabis store was operating without a licence on the Sheguiandah First Nation. Following that report, a Criminal Code search warrant was executed by the UCCM Police at the High and Buy Cannabis Dispensary located on Highway 6 in Sheguiandah First Nation.

Marijuana, firearms and cash were seized during the raid.

High and Buy owners face the following charges: A 60-year-old male of Sheguiandah is charged with distribute illicit cannabis, possessing cannabis for the purpose of selling, careless storage of a firearm, prohibited device or ammunition and unauthorized possession of a prohibited or restricted firearm. A 61-year-old female of Sheguiandah is charged with possessing cannabis for the purpose of selling and distribution of illicit cannabis.

Both individuals were arrested and released on a promise to appear in Gore Bay Court on Wednesday, May 8.

UCCM Police Chief Rodney Nahwegahbow is reminding the public that purchasing cannabis from illegal dispensaries could result in charges against customers; however, no charges have been laid against the customers in this investigation. only, not for investigations. The units can detect the presence of both cocaine and THC, the psychoactive component in cannabis.

"For impaired investigations, we still rely on drug recognition experts and field sobriety tests," said Ms. Dunn.

The devices merely detect the presence of these compounds and cannot accurately predict the exact level of impairment in an individual. Due to this restriction, it will be most useful for drivers who have zero-tolerance licencing classes such as commercial motor vehicle drivers, those in an early stage of the graduated licencing system and young drivers.

OPP northeast regional media co-ordinator Shona Camirand said the force's provincial traffic

Some of the competitors also play competitively on a national level

Mr. Chandler was unable to offer The Expositor an interview by press time, but he shared a debriefing memo he penned to GSPS's police services board. Mr. Chandler's team won the Northern Ontario Police Curling Championship and, by extension, the right to represent the province at the national level.

By finishing in fifth place, they were just one spot away from advancing to the playoff round. Team British Columbia ultimately won the title in the final match against Team Saskatchewan.

"The competition was excellent, considering several curlers have played at national events such as the Tim Hortons Brier, Scotties Tournament of Hearts and Canadian Mixed Nationals," wrote Mr. Chandler. These are all world-stage events that are televised nationally and determine the players who go on to compete in international and Olympic tournaments.

There were many activities as part of the event that went far beyond the games themselves. Mr. Chandler said the camaraderie and fellowship was outstanding and that a live band played every night. Many of the attendees and supporters gathered to socialize, sing and play music.


in Sudbury in 1993. "You could hear a pin drop in the room as I spoke of Joey's last shift, how his memory lives on and the impact his death had in

The remarkable feats of the Wikwemikong High School team are all the more impressive when it is recognized that they are coming from a small rural community that, for all its pride and storied heritage, lacks the deep pockets and resources of larger urban communities. But what they lack in financial clout the students more than make up for with resourcefulness and determination.

"The first team had to recycle parts from the landfill," recalled Ogimaa Peltier. "Their first robot frame came from an old recycled cabinet and they build it up from there. They eventually caught the attention of people that wanted to help and now there are some sponsors that are supplying parts and financial support that assist them in being able to compete at the provincial level.'

The Wiikwemkoong community has been busy fundraising to help make the climb up the ladder to the world championships. "There was a \$13,000 contri-

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

"We would like to put out a heartfelt thank you to him on behalf of the Dewar family and the Northern Cancer Foundation. Because without that challenge, I don't think we could have reached the heights that we did," Mr. Dewar said.

The Scott family has not participated in the auction in the past and was not familiar with it until reading about it in this newspaper.

"That's when we decided to jump on the bandwagon. I know it was something Adam had in his mind that he was looking at as part of his own therapy for what he's going through. He would have happily paid that price himself," Mr. Scott said.

"For myself and our family, this is somebody that's near and dear to our hearts. Adam and his kids. My kids are quite close to his son and daughter so we just wanted to do our little bit to make Adam happy," said Mr. Scott.



though she was determined to be sober, her license was suspended for a week and her car was impounded due to her failing the roadside screening.

Royal Canadian The Mounted Police have since said that these outcomes were made in error and apologized. However, the incident raises questions about enforcing the laws surrounding cannabis impairment in Canada.

The Draeger DrugTest 5000 unit is the first unit to be certified to detect THC and cocaine in Canada. It can only detect the presence of a substance, not the level of a user's

"Nobody said that the splice failed," suggested Councillor Shaffer.

"George did at the (property) meeting," replied Councillor Stephens.

Councillor Scott suggested that there was still time to collect more information on the replacement of the line before events were taking place. "There will be time to get information and go back to get the repair done," he said.

The motion was called and decided in favour of replacing the line by a vote of three to two.

Discussion then moved on to the recommendation from the property committee to proceed with required repairs to the Mindemoya arena "as reported as a temporary fix to a maximum of cost of \$200,000." The motion was moved by Councillor Linda Farquhar (to put it on the floor) and seconded by Councillor Shaffer.

'I would like to put the motion about what to do at the next council meeting,'

suggested Councillor Farquhar. "I would like to see the report from the engineer before we proceed." The report in question was from Tulloch Engineering.
"I would agree with Linda," said Coun-

cillor Stephens. "I would like to see an engineer's report. I am definitely opposed to putting money into a white elephant. This is a very expensive Band-Aid." He suggested that the community would be better served by building a new arena. "I am definitely opposed to this motion. I think you will see this will cost much more than

"I don't think we have enough information," said Councillor Shaffer. "My feeling is that there is not enough information. I fully support sending it back to commit-

"I am also comfortable on sending it back (to committee)," said Councillor Johnston. "I am not comfortable with spending a lot of money on the arena. We need to put thought into what is best."

"I think we need direction on a timeline," said Councillor Scott. "How long will it take? How soon can we get a clear idea on what it will cost?'

"Was there not a timeline in the report?" asked Mayor Stephens. "It would take two weeks to get started."

"When I see \$200,000 and I see temporary, I take a zero off for temporary," said Councillor Tribinevicius. "I am not comfortable without the details."

Councillor Stephens asked staff what the (engineer's) report would cost.

Mayor Stephens offered up the amount of \$7,000. "We have to be aware that there is a cost

(to commissioning an engineer's report)," said Councillor Stephens.

"Is the report just focussed on the wall?" asked Councillor Johnston.

"Roof framing, wall framing, miscellaneous structure," said Mayor Stephens. "We received a cost estimate for repairs and the next structural inspection date."

Council moved to refer the recommendation back to the property committee. In the meantime staff was directed to get a cost for the report.

The Southeast Manitoulin Lions Club also contributed \$3,000 toward the application fee. Club president Lisa Hallaert said this was a worthwhile cause for all concerned.

"With better facilities, we'll be able to have more tournaments as far as the Lions Club is concerned. I think it's going to be beneficial for youth, too, and get them more involved," she

The upgrades to the ball diamond include a rehabilitation of the infield and outincluding field, drainage and replacement of the playing surfaces. A total of \$1.3 million will be distributed among the winning communities across Canada.

second council member on the committee and with his acquiescence he was added to the roster. Council further agreed to add Marcus Mohr and Mr. Phelps to the committee motion.

The discussion turned to the makeup of the committee, with Councillor Stephens expressing concern that the number of council members on the committee (three, including the mayor who sits as ex officio on all committees of council). "They could pretty much sway the vote on the committee," he suggested.

Mayor Stephens noted that the previous committee struck to examine the potential for a new recreation complex had only two members. "That committee had only two, now we have nine and we are a lot further ahead," he said.

During discussion, it was noted that the two members of

that previous committee had only met once in a largely informal manner to look at a potential site for a new centre. "We really didn't do much more after that," said Councillor Al Tribinevicius.

"That was the problem, I think, we didn't get a report from that committee," said Councillor Stephens. "We waited for it at the last term of council and it never came.

Councillor Steve Shaffer asked for a clarification of the mandate of the new committee. "Is it really only to look at a new facility or will it look at whether such a facility is really needed?" he asked.

"Steve raised a very good point," said Councillor Tribinevicius. "You really need to have terms of reference at the start of the process—you have to have it clear."

"It is probably better that the committee determine what the terms of reference are," suggested Mayor Stephens. "Then bring it to council."

"No, it's council's job to determine the mandate of committees," countered Councillor Shaffer, "not the commit-

"What I understood the mandate to be is to look at the needs of the community as in terms of hockey and other users of the services," said Ms. Johnston. "Do we keep the arenas open, do we build a new facility?

'Sounds good to me," said Councillor Shaffer.

Councillor Scott pointed out that the Old School Repurposing Committee created their own terms of reference. 'We didn't really have any input into any of that," he said. "I think it is important to know and accept the terms of reference. I think the committee can come up with the terms. but council needs to accept those terms.'

lar to Gilbert and Sullivan in the style of the sound, but not as operatic," said stage director Patrick Therrien.

Previous Burns Wharf productions have been copyright-free works such as the oeuvre of British playwriting duo Gilbert and Sullivan. This is the first time the group has licensed the rights to produce a play, offering them the chance to put on a more modern production—in fact, the first play of theirs that is set in the 20th century.

"It takes place in a small village, there's a great chorus, the staging and the costuming is quite simple; it felt like a real good progression," said Mr. Therrien.

'The Baker's Wife' is set in a village in 1935 France that had recently suffered the loss of its baker, much to the dismay of the pastry- and bread-loving townsfolk.

To the rescue comes a new baker, but he comes with a socially-questionable (for 1935, at least) catch—his wife is much younger than he.

Tension emerges between the couple that ultimately leads to major rifts. The townsfolk then rally in support of the baker and his wife in the hopes of bringing back their beloved boulangerie and its baguettes, breads and buns.

"We're not just doing the big grand gestures, there's a bit more acting involved and very, very quick interaction between the actors," said Mr. Therrien.

"This is a feel-good play. It's a comedy and there's a sense of redemption," he said. "It's a fun production. There's some really neat characters, real neat developments of emotions and stuff like that."

Peter Baumgarten, who plays the baker, said that despite the comedic nature of the production, the audience can expect a good variety of moods.

"There are also some serious moments in it and tear-jerking moments. I'll be disappointed during parts of the production if there aren't some people with tears in their eyes," said Mr. Baumgarten.

The play will be showcased in a new location this year. The players have not been able to perform in the waterfront Burns

Wharf Theatre for five years due to concerns about the theatre's accessibility and fire safety. Last year's production was cancelled altogether because the troupe couldn't find the space they needed at Debajehmujig Creation Centre, an organization with whom they've partnered in the past, but was becoming increasingly busy with its own activities.

That's when Rev. Martin Garniss of Manitowaning's Knox United Church stepped in with a much-needed offer.

"They weren't able to use their theatre last year and it was too bad for the community," said Rev. Garniss. "We contacted them to see if they'd like to use our building and so they thought about it, we had a couple of meetings, and figured it could be done."

The church looks vastly different than it has previously. The front platform has been expanded and reinforced to carry the weight and space requirements of the production. Not a single pew remains in place, with seating brought in to accommodate 80 people in the same space. This is part of the church's interest in becoming more of a community space.

"Martin and others want to see the church used for a myriad of things; they've already talked about having other concerts in there all year long and some smaller performances," said Mr. Baumgarten.

For the time being, church services are being held in the hall adjacent to the sanctuary until the renovations are completed. Rev. Garniss said the church services would resume in the sanctuary within the next couple of weeks.

There are members of the church who are actively involved with the Burns Wharf Theatre Players, including the church's organist Marilyn Wohlberg who is a music director in the production, so the partnership may seem to be a natural fit

"We are thrilled to be able to perform at Knox United this year. They have been overwhelmingly generous and accommodating," said Burns Wharf Players music

Key information about autism spectrum disorder

TORONTO—Autism has been a major topic of discussion in the past two months, sparked by the Ontario government's changes to its funding program to support the families of people on the autism spectrum. There are some basic elements as to how autism and its main types of therapy function, important to understanding some of the discussion about the neurodevelopmental disorder that affects one in 66 Canadian children.

Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) does not discriminate against people of any particular background or lifestyle. People on the autism spectrum (or people diagnosed with autism—not "autistic people," as is often said) are born with neurological differences from their peers and have brains that process the world around them in unique ways.

The spectrum nature of the condition means that autism can take many forms that vary in severity and their impact on an individual. Someone with lesssevere autism may have little to no difficulty communicating and may have above-average intelligence, but may struggle to relate to others. This end of the spectrum was previously known as Asperger syndrome or high-functioning autism. It is now classified as Level 1 ASD.

as Level 1 ASD.

Level 2 ASD refers to people who have greater social challenges and more difficulties with their communication skills. They may

not respond in a conventional way to social interactions and have intense focus on a particular interest, such as trains or obscure sports facts about a certain team.

Level 3 ASD is the most severe case, where individuals have severe communication challenges and are often non-verbal and do not begin social interactions with others. They have the greatest challenges of the three levels when their daily routines change and often use repetitive behaviours for comfort.

Treating ASD varies widely between an individual's needs and the therapy to which they best respond. Generally speaking, for those toward the more severe end of the spectrum, the best treatment outcomes only occur when intensive therapy is begun as early as possible—starting by age two or by age five at the latest.

The treatment method for less-severe cases is applied behavioural analysis (ABA), which involves therapy sessions that are tailored to a child's needs and aim to teach communication and social skills. ABA can be done in small groups, as long as the groups are tailored toward a child's individual program goals.

Intensive Behavioural Intervention (IBI) is based on the same principles as ABA but its schedule is much more vigorous—the Geneva Centre for Autism recommends a minimum of 25 hours of therapy per week in a one-on-one ratio

or very small group setting only, but many experts recommend as much as 40 hours per week in order to have the greatest impact on a child's future.

The most intensive therapy for children on the autism spectrum can range from an annual cost of \$60,000 to \$100,000 per year. But that's only one part of the total expenditures. Many of the children require learning or communication aids, require transportation assistance because they cannot use public transit, have to pay for drugs and other special education programs or additional therapies. Further, when they become adults, many are unable to work to support themselves.

year shift the program exclusively to direct funding. There is currently a wait list of about 23,000 Ontarian children who have yet to receive any money to cover their programs, with 8,400 children currently receiving treatment.

The Ford government pledged to eliminate the waiting list within 18 months by allowing families to apply to receive support money in the form of "childhood budgets." The Ontario Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services lists eligible uses of the childhood budget on its website.

With direct funding, families have the choice to spend their allotment on whatever treatment makes the most sense for their child. However, the maximum amounts available for each child-\$20,000 per year for children under the age of six and \$5,000 per year for children up to age 18—will only partially cover the costs of most therapy programs.

The government will also double the funding for Ontario's autism diagnostic hubs for two years, places where children receive autism diagnoses. They will form an independent intake agency to bring families into the program and support them through funding decisions.

Having an early diagno-

sis of autism spectrum disorder is crucial to successful treatment. Children should ideally begin intensive treatments as young as two years of age and as late as five. However, the process to get an official diagnosis can take as long as one year. As children age, most require lessintensive therapy and their treatment costs accordingly decrease.

When the changes were first announced in early February, many concerned citizens protested the overhaul that would disrupt the services their children had been receiving.

Critics also took strong issue with moves the Ford government made to stop moving children off the waitlist, effectively inflating the numbers of children waiting to receive treatment. They further said that the lower amounts of funding available to families would only partially fund most therapies and that the push to eliminate the waiting list would negatively impact the quality of treatment children receive.

Against the backlash, the Ford government later announced a six-month

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LCPS students release 8,000 brook trout into the wild

SHEGUIANDAH—Little Current Public School (LCPS) students saw the fruits of their labour released into nature late last month as the Grade 4 class's brook trout fry, reared successfully in the classroom's microhatchery, found a new home in a Sheguiandah First Nation creek.

After 9,000 brook trout eggs were dropped off to the students and following some final instructions, the students were left in charge of their brand-new microhatchery. They monitored the dissolved oxygen, pH levels and temperature of the water; they tried to remove any dead eggs from the bell jar with the pipette and they watched the eggs to make sure the water was circulating through the bell jar, keeping the eggs moving and well oxygenated.

The eggs started to hatch on January 7. Once hatched, the brook trout fry would swim or float to the top of the bell jar and flow into the aquarium. It took a couple days for all the eggs to hatch. The ones that didn't hatch and turned white were removed from the system so they wouldn't infect the surviving fry. Once all the fry made it into the aquarium the students watched their development and continued to monitor water quality.

At this stage in the fry's development the students had to monitor the size of the egg sac (the orange bulge hanging below their belly). When the fry hatched and moved into the aquarium they were getting all the nutrients and sustenance they needed from this egg sac. Once the egg sac disappeared, the students knew it was time to either start feeding the fish or move them into a local creek.

"Ultimately, we wanted to move the fry into a creek before their egg sac disappeared to ensure they could adjust to their new surroundings with some nutrients left in their egg sac," said Maria Diebolt of Manitoulin Streams. "It's also best to move the fry earlier, rather than later, to reduce the risk of a large die-off in the hatchery. The longer they're kept in the hatchery the more chances there is for bacteria and disease to start and spread."

On February 26, it was decided that the fry needed to be released into the wild as soon as possible and the release date was planned for Friday, March 1 at a Sheguiandah First Nation waterway.

Chief Andrew Aguonie co-ordinated the community's public works department to clear the snow from an area near the creek with a trail down to the water's edge to release the brook trout. On March 1, the students scooped the fry from their hatchery into buckets and took them on the bus and headed to Sheguiandah Creek. Once at the creek the students carried their fry down to the water's edge. They placed the bucket in the water and added a bit of creek water to let the fry adapt to the temperature change. While they were giving the fry time to adapt, a small talk was given to the students and community volunteers about the importance of the project. Each student then scooped some fry out of the bucket and released them into the water. Some of the students' comments included "bye little fishy," "good luck in the future," "see you later" and "grow big so I can catch you and eat you!" After all the students had a turn, the volunteers released some of the fry and then Chief Aguonie released the remaining fish

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The Grade 4 students laughed in the sunshine, climbed up huge mountains of snow only to slide back down, warmed up by the bonfire, ran down to the creek to look for their fish, felt how cold the water was and burnt off a lot energy.


"We finished the day off around the bonfire with Chief Andrew talking about the importance of the work the students were doing," Ms. Diebolt said. "He then offered tobacco to the Creator and gave thanks. This was a great day for the students and volunteers who came out. We learned about the importance of our aquatic habitat and the impact humans can have, positive or negative. For the students, this project helped them develop a sense of environmental stewardship, brought awareness to potential career opportunities and showed them the importance of giving



...continued from page 19 the Ford government later announced a six-month extension for kids currently receiving therapy and scrapped proposed tests that would allocate funding based on family income. They also pledged to consult parents on the changes and attempt to find more money for children who had more intensive needs.

Mandy Case, formerly of Manitowaning and now living in the Ottawa Valley, has been working through Ontario's autism program with her son Gavin for nine years since he received his diagnosis with 'Level 3' or severe autism at age two. They were on the funding wait list for two and a half years before relocating from Manitoulin and finally made it off the list four months after that.

"I feel for the parents of kids between the ages of one and six who will not get the full services that we benefited from. The new changes will actually be benefiting us; we're getting more money now than we have received for the last few years," said Ms. Case.
The family currently

receives \$2,500 per year for respite care and family relief funds, an amount that is doubling to \$5,000 with the changes, and may be spent on more areas such as getting Gavin an iPad to help him communicate or helping to pay for speech therapy services.

Ms. Case noted that many treatments in the Manitoulin region can only be done in Sudbury, adding time and expense to a family's considerations. When Gavin was in intensive therapy at an early age, Ms. Case did not go to work in order to support him. That's a luxury many families cannot afford.

Gavin now attends school full-time in a special education class, but Ms. Case expressed concern about what will happen when he moves onto high school. There are no special education classes there and she said he still needs life skills training so he can become more independent.

"I feel bad for other kids with Down syndrome or other disabilities. Sometimes I feel like the autism family gets a lot of attention; I know there's a lot more of us but there's a lot more disabilities that need supports that aren't getting them, too," said Ms. Case.

For Manitowaning's Robbie and Denise Shawana, autism is a condition they have navigated on their own, outside of Ontario's funding program. Mr. Shawana said they were not made aware of the available funding when his son Kaelan Peltier was growing up. Their main focus has been on care services.

There needs to be more spaces available as far as day programs and in-home care are concerned," said Ms. Shawana. "Being able to have a respite bed at those locations would be extreme-

ly beneficial."
"Overall, it feels like the government wants to have one big party. Legal weed, buck-a-beer, tailgate parties. Now they're talking about changing the

plates—I'm sure Canadians and Ontarians have more important things to worry about than that," Mr. Shawana said.

Kaelan is non-verbal and the only language supports he's received have been with his parents and through teachers at his schools.

"The teachers have been fantastic at the schools with teaching life skills, language and everyday things but there's still only so much you can do. I'm grateful for the help we do have," said Mr. Shawana. "I remember when he was going to school in Wiky. First Nations people, our funding is even lower compared to other schools, so the teachers did the best they could with the help they did have trying to find stuff online that wasn't being supplied by the ministry.

Pam McLaughlin of Gore Bay has a daughter named Molly who has severe autism. However, due to early intervention and intensive, "life-changing" therapies from an early age, Molly can now talk, read and write.

"I am so disheartened and upset by Doug Ford's drastic and cruel cuts to the Autism programs and to school supports. It's devastating to families in Ontario who struggle with a loved one on Autism Spectrum. Access to life-changing therapies and supports is a human right," said Ms. McLaughlin, before echoing Mr. Shawana's concerns that the government was more focused on frivolous measures than important

therapy services for children with special needs.

"There is nothing fiscally responsible about what the Conservatives are doingthey don't care about our children's future, they are passing the buck. These cuts will hurt children and they will not be able to reach their full potential," said Ms. McLaughlin, adding that there will be impacts for decades as these children become

Gore Bay's Terri Elgie, who worked as an instructor therapist in the autism intervention program until 2010, said she was concerned about the decision to make these changes.

"Why break a publiclyfunded model that has been proven effective, to replace it with an unknown model with far less funding and unequal access." she said. "In rural areas, it's going to be real hard to find trained

She says the shift in delivery models will cause stress on families who have to hire, train and pay care staff. When she worked in intensive therapy, a psy-chologist oversaw the program that ran for 20 to 30 hours per week for each child. That program had cost about \$80,000 per year.

"Parents of young children could receive up to a maximum of \$140,000 over their lifetime until they're 18. That's quite a concern. Will the decreased hours of therapy even be effective to help them reach their potential? I don't know about that," said Ms. Elgie.

However, she did say that

the Ford government's goal of diagnosing all kids in a reasonable time frame is a good starting point—although it needs support through later years to be effective.

"I had the pleasure of

working with these great kids diagnosed with severe autism for six years. Strong support gives all kids the tools they need to reach their full potential. It's just the right thing to do," said Ms. Elgie.

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Wikwemikong High School students star in PSA

LITTLE CURRENT—A group of students from Wikwemikong High School, working with the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service and Debajehmujig Storytellers, have produced a public service announcement (PSA) about the dangers of drug use, with the video being shared hundreds of times on social media and amassing over 5,000 views in two weeks.

"You are the future. We need you and that's why we've called you all here together," said Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service Police Chief Terry McCaffrey at the Youth Empowerment and Safety conference held recently at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current.

Police Chief McCaffrey premiered the PSA as part of his opening remarks at the conference.

"With that, I want you all to recognize the importance of getting help," he said as the video concluded, emphasizing the importance of the message.

He stressed that if com-

munities want youth to listen to the important messages they are sharing, they need to be involved in the process of solving the problem itself.

"Youth don't want to be talked to; they want to be part of the solution," said Police Chief McCaffrey.

That was true for the PSA's lead actor, Ashtin Ominika, a Grade 12 student at Wikwemikong High School.

"My age group is the age of when kids are starting to do (drugs), I guess, because their friends of friends might be doing it and they share it with another person who shares it with another person," he said. "At least someone you know is going to be like that, and it was definitely better for someone my age to do it rather than an old guy."

The message seemed to resonate with the audience at the conference but it was destined to reach an even wider group. People of all ages and backgrounds have shared the Facebook post and the original video has been viewed close to 6,000 times within two weeks of

its posting.

"A bunch of people have seen it and it makes you feel good that that much people are seeing it because it means people and their children are seeing it. I heard someone say they showed their kid and their mother started crying," said Ashtin.

Now, Ashtin gets noticed from time to time and complimented on his role in the video.

"It was pretty fun. That was my first time acting," he said.

The PSA was written and directed by Kerry Assiniwe and shot by Justin Deforge of Debajehmujig. The other students who acted in the production were Alex Desmoulin, Dustin Lavallee, Anina Pangowish and Hope Osawamick. Adam and Jesse Kaboni provided their skills in hand drumming and singing in the video.

Police Chief McCaffrey expressed his hope for the next generation and their capacity to strengthen their communities and improve lives for their own children.

"You are the future and

you can make the change. Please be the leaders I know you all are," said Police Chief McCaffrey.

The PSA was not the only video to come out of the conference. Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service has produced four videos directly related to the discussions at the conference to obtain perspectives from elders, youth and the presenters. There will also be a recap video of the conference going up on the service's Facebook page at facebook.com/ wemikongTribalPoliceService. Those videos will be released as a four-part weekly series beginning this week.

"We're hoping for a 'wow' when they walk into that door on opening night," said Mr. Baumgarten.






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




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

nary Service. That "Wascally Wabbit"

by Dr. Janice Mitchell rowing up I had pet rabbits and one of my most favourite novels of all time was 'Watership Down.' From the white rabbit in Alice's Wonderland to the Velveteen Rabbit, bunnies have been pervasive in our North American culture they are just plain charming! However, since my childhood and through veterinary medicine, I have learned that there is more than just hutches, hay and carrots with regards to care of these delightful pets. Since Easter is just around the corner, I thought a little 'Peter Cottontail 101' was in order.

There are 49 different breeds of rabbits according to the American Rabbit Breeder Association, ranging from the miniature Netherland dwarf rabbit weighing in at 2.5 lbs to the Flemish giant rabbit weighing in at over 20 lbs. Rabbits can live eight to 12 years with proper care. This decade commitment is

something to keep in mind before one makes a hasty purchase or adoption after being mesmerized by those

school.

adoring eyes and cute little twitching noses. Before one considers purchasing or adopting a bunny, one should educate themselves on proper nutrition, husbandry and health care. As well, it should be noted often humans are allergic to bunnies, whether it be their dander or even the hay that these little guys live off. This was something I unfortunately discovered when I rescued a lab rabbit in vet

A bunny's ideal diet is represented in a food pyramid. At the bottom of the pyramid and moving our way consecutively up to the peak, the food order is respectively as such: fresh hay, fresh vegetables, pellets and fruit. It is most important to follow this guide so that a rabbit gets enough fibre for its intestinal system to work properly and so that he/she does not get overweight.

Hay ho! The key ingredient in a rabbit's diet is just this: large, unlimited amounts of good ol' fresh

hay. Starting as a young bunny, alfalfa hay should be introduced eventually switching over to Timothy hay as the bunny ages as it is less in calories and calcium than alfalfa. Next up on the nutrition list is fresh vegetables. We are all familiar with Bugs Bunny and his carrot, but it is important that rabbits get at least three types of vegetables daily in order to obtain the necessary nutrients. Ideal-

ly, one cup of vegetables for each four lbs of body weight, introduced gradually so as to not cause diarrhea. Leafy greens (no iceberg lettuce), sprouts, carrots, dandelions, clover, celery, parsley, and broccoli are just a few veggies that one can select. A good quality Timothy-based pellet makes up only a small portion of a pet rabbit's diet—only an eighth to a quarter cup per five lbs of body

weight. An example of a good quality pellet is one made by the Oxbow Animal Health company, which

focuses entirely on rabbit and small pet nutrition. Finally, one must limit the fruit consumption to one to two Tbsp per five lbs of bunny weight. Bunnies, like me, have a sweet tooth and if left to their own devices will devour sugary foods to the exclusion of healthful ones. Some of the more acceptable fibre-laden fruits would include apple, berries, orange, pineapple, pear, peach and melon. Rabbits should never eat chocolate, cookies, crackers, breakfast cereals, or bread as these items would cause an overgrowth of bad bacteria in their gut.

Should you spay or neuter your rabbit? The answer is 100 percent yes! Spayed female rabbits will live longer than their unaltered selves as the risk of reproductive cancers (ovarian, uterine, mammalian) will be virtually eliminated. Unneutered males rabbits will spray urine, and both males and females are much easier to litter train, and much more reliably

trained, after they have been altered. Altered rabbits make better companions as they are calmer and more loving once the urge to mate has been removed. They are less prone to destructive (chewing, digging) and aggressive (biting, lunging, growling) behaviour after surgery. As well, altered rabbits won't contribute to the problem of overpopulation which has become a problem in some Canadian communities, such as Canmore, Alberta which is being overrun by unwanted abandoned bunnies that are multiplying at astronomical rates.

To chew or to chew...yes, that is the rabbit's prerogative. They are, after all, lagomorphs, the definition of which is 'the order of gnawing herbivores.' Rabbits' teeth are always growing and it is important that they chew on appropriate items to keep these growing incisors and molars filed down. Again, hay is a good item to have on hand at all times, but other dental aides include apple, willow, aspen branches; pine firewood; cotton towels: untreated fresh pine lumber attached to the cage; hard cardboard; and com-

Tehkummah Council Notes

Public participation

Loretta Mucha asked whether council would be advertising in Manitoulin's Magazine this year. Generally, the South Baymouth Little Schoolhouse and Museum conducts the majority of the fundraising with the municipality covering the remaining amount. Ms. Mucha will offer an amount to the township for its next meeting, when council will vote on the item.

Paul Bowerman asked that care for burial sites be included in the 2019 budget and presented figures on past township contributions for similar initiatives. He expressed disappointment that nobody from council had contacted him after he submitted photos and a request on March 6 to speak at the previous meeting.

Reeve David Jaggard said council had not seen the photos he had submitted. Mr. Bowerman said he was hoping to move forward and show respect to the dead, and that he would return to the next meeting.

Delegation

Resident George Kopylov gave a delegation to council on his budget questions and concerns. These included a call for marina and camping rates to increase at the same rate as the taxes in the interest of fairness, a suggestion to add the South Baymouth Marina to Google Maps for free, implementing self-serve fees at the Michael's Bay boat launch, improvements to the website and reducing street lighting expenses.

He shared concerns about landfill costs and revenues and offered some suggestions to improve the situation at the site.

Procedural bylaw updates

Deputy clerk-administrator Barbara Grigg offered some changes to Tehkummah's Procedure Bylaw. These included changing the title of clerk-treasurer to clerkadministrator, changes to minute approval timelines and a change to one scheduled meeting per month instead of

Councillor Eric Russell was opposed to having one meeting per month, saying that it was impractical and a step backwards.

Budget exclusion report

Clerk-administrator Roy Hardy presented a budget exclusion report, something he said was a regulatory requirement. This included long-term financial liabilities such as amortization expenses, post-employment benefit expenses and an estimate of landfill post-closure costs.

Investing in Canada Infrastrucutre Program (ICIP)

Mr. Hardy presented a verbal report about the town's Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) application to rehabilitate the 10th Sideroad. OCIF has suggested Tehkummah redirect its OCIF application to the federal ICIP Rural and Northern Stream where, if it's resubmitted without changes, it will be in a special pool of applicants that have been redirected from OCIF.

Changes to the program include a longer roll-out timeframe (until 2026) and a lower municipal contribution (OCIF was 10 percent, ICIP only requires 6 percent of the project costs from the municipality).

Mr. Hardy said this funding could also possibly be used for the Rogers Creek Bridge project. Council approved applying to the ICIP fund.

Unconditional provincial grant

Mr. Hardy told council the province will be providing



Fuel Charge Exemption

Here is information for the Fuel Charge Exemption and the link for CRA: The Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act (GHGPPA) established a federal standard for reducing carbon pollution for provinces and territories without carbon pollution pricing systems that meet the federal standard. The federal carbon pollution pricing system now applies in Ontario. Starting in April 2019, the federal carbon pollution pricing system will add a charge to everyday fuels for fuel delivered in Ontario for Air, Marine, Rail and Road use. Ontario farmers are eligible to receive an exemption from the fuel charge for fuels (gasoline and light fuel oil) used in tractors, trucks or other farm machinery, by completing an exemption form available through Canada's Revenue Agency (CRA). Eligible farming machinery is property that is primarily used for the purposes of farming and that is a farm truck or tractor, a vehicle not licensed to be operated on a public road, or an industrial machine or stationary or portable engine. Fill out the exemption form today, available online on the CRA website, and provide a copy to your fuel distributor. Keep an additional copy for your own farm records. Access the form here: www.canada.ca/en/revenue-agency/services/formspublications/forms/1402.html L402 Fuel Charge Exemption Certificate for Farmers under section 36 of the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act The form asks for the farm business number, which is issued by CRA.

small municipalities with a one-time unconditional grant, meaning they can use it for any purpose so long as its aim is to "improve efficiency." The grant is worth \$228,000. The money will be put into an interest-bearing account until council formulates a plan, and he strongly recommended it be used for capital upgrades, not operat-

Staffing and hiring policy

Tehkummah's policy on this topic was developed in 2008 and is being refreshed. Council largely expressed strong interest in being involved in the hiring process. Reeve Jaggard suggested council could make a shortlist for positions but leave the interviewing to the clerk, the direct supervisor of the position and one councillor.

Mr. Hardy said that having the policy require the whole council be part of the interview process can be a hassle and that he had seen circumstances in the past where councils or staff made selections without hiring managers and caused major conflicts in the roles.

He said that while council was elected to represent the public, the town staff like the clerk-administrator were there to help with other operations such as hiring. Having council involved in interviews can also muddy the chain of command for workplace disputes, he said.

Councillors Michael McKenzie, Lorie Leeson and Russell were strongly in favour of having council directly involved in the interview process, but Councillor Rick Gordon supported the proposal of having interviews conducted by the proposed panel and deferring to the hiring advice of the department head and clerk.

Council resolved to defer the item until a later date.

Marina space rental

Council received a request to rent the space at the South Baymouth Marina by Tina Bolonga, who rented the space for a coffee shop during part of last summer. Council

moved the discussion to the closed session and resolved to tender the rental offer.

Easter egg hunt donation

Residents Linda Bowerman, Yogi Martin and Rhonda Middaugh requested a donation to help fund the Easter egg hunt. Although council was in favour of the event taking place, Councillor Leeson had concerns about last year's event and said the three organizers, who also ran last year's event, had raised a substantial amount of money from community donations, "enough to probably do a few years," she said.

Council resolved to offer \$100 to the Easter egg hunt, with a recommendation for the volunteers to work with the recreation committee in the future.

Budget

Mr. Hardy presented an updated budget which accounted for the funding program change, the doubling of the federal gas tax (up to \$52,814), fewer council meetings, the elimination of the \$50,000 loan and other adjustments.

The modified total tax levy dropped in the draft budget from 7.5 percent to 5.4 percent, with the mil rate increase dropping from three percent to one percent.

Councillor McKenzie strongly believed that the mil rate should be split in the middle at two percent, with the extra percentage point (roughly \$11,000) being deposited directly into the township's reserves for future growth potential. This is still a lower tax rate than initially forecasted but provides for some future planning considerations.

Councillor McKenzie also wanted to further discuss council honorariums and registered a notice of motion on the item for the next meeting. Council was in favour of the two percent mil rate increase and Mr. Hardy will prepare a user fee bylaw and tax rate bylaw to adopt the budget at the April 23 meeting.
