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Island schools take delivery of locally made seed starter frames

Food security issues gain in importance

MANITOULIN—From seeds, big things can grow. So it has been with the Kids Can Grow program, a concept which grew out of the kernel of an idea 10 years ago and which has now spread into a network of community gardens and several locally designed, constructed and installed seedling incubators in area schools.

Heartwood Mushrooms took on the challenge of creating the new "grow ops" for the classroom after a discussion with Kids Can Grown co-founder Chuc Willson.

"We were getting them from a commercial operation," said Mr. Willson, who also assisted in developing the units. "I said to Shane (O'Donnell, co-owner of Heartwood Mushrooms) 'I think we can do better'.'

"He listed some of the shortcomings of the commercially available units," recalled Mr. O'Donnell. "One was the florescent lights. They were in half-foot one-and-a-half-foot increments.' That tended to result in very "leggy" seedlings. The new units utilize state-of-the-art LED grow lights designed to meet the full spectrum of light needed for healthy seedlings to develop. "There are some colour gaps in fluorescents." The LEDs rate at 6,000 kilo-ohms. "Pretty much

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Hospitals now reporting opiate overdoses

ONTARIO—The rate of opioidrelated deaths in Ontario has increased almost four-fold, or 285 percent) over the past 25 years, according to a new report released last week by researchers at the Institute for Clinical Evalu-Sciences (ICES), Michael's Hospital and the Ontario Drug Policy Research Network (ODPRN).

"According to the most recent data from the Ontario coroner, 734 people died of an opioid-related cause in 2015, which averages to more than two people every day in Ontario," Tara Gomes, a scientist at ICES and the Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute of St. Michael's Hospital and a principal investigator of ODPRN, says is a press release.

The report published last week

on the ODPRN website shows that opioid-related deaths involved other drugs (both legal and illicit) that could have contributed to these deaths. Postmortem toxicology identified benzodiazepine in the system of over half (51 percent) of individuals and cocaine in nearly one-third

(32 percent).
"The presence of these other drugs may be indicative of the concerning practice of combining cocaine with illicitly produced fentanyl, which is relatively inexpensive, to extend the drug supply," Ms. Gomes adds. "The findings highlight an important public safety issue that needs ongoing focus given the high degree of accidental opioid overdoses that we're seeing across the province.

The researchers also found that prior to 2012, oxycodone was the opioid type most commonly involved in opioid-related deaths.

Ontario chooses Thunder Bay, Lindsay and Hamilton

HAMILTON—Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne announced her government's plan to provide 4,000 residents of Hamilton, Thunder Bay and Lindsay with a guaranteed basic income as part of a pilot study to determine if that approach will assist lower income families improve their job prospects and quality of life.

Under the plan, the province's working poor and homeless residents would receive a basic income that would pay for their basic needs, food and shelter.

Under the pilot project, recipients will be randomly chosen and will begin receiving the funds as soon as this summer. The basic income plan would provide up to \$16,989 per year for a single person and

Ms. Shkaabewis is studying biology at Algoma University and plans to graduate with an honours degree in biology and a minor in Anishinaabemowin, after which she will be applying for her Masters in Public Health. "I hope to specialize in aboriginal health and then apply to medical school," she explained to The Expositor.

Ms. Shkaabewis also competed in the Miss Indian World pageant last year, but wanted to return again this year.

"I have decided to return because it has always been a dream of mine after meeting Miss Indian World 2003, Onawa Lacy," she shared. "The title to me is to represent the beauty and diversity of my culture. It is the opportunity to shed light on topics that affect Indian country. For me, I want to speak to issues such as aboriginal health, the importance

of our water, education, both traditionally and new age education, and our beautiful missing and murdered indigenous women."

"I want to have the opportunity to empower not only youth but everyone in Indian country to continue to chase after their dreams and follow their ambitions," added Ms. Shkaabewis. "I have epilepsy and have worked really hard to get where I am in my education and there has been huge bumps in my road, but I never gave up on my educational goals, and I hope that my story can help inspire others dealing with disability to continue to perse-

The pageant includes a written essay, personal interview with the judges, a public speaking presentation, a talent component and a traditional

"For my talent portion I will be showcasing some of the quillwork techniques used in the Great Lakes area," she explained. "I am a jingle dress dancer, however for the dance portion I will be dancing old style scrub."

New report highlights Northern health challenges

by Health Quality Ontario paints a damning picture of the health of Northern Ontario residents. While it has long been given that Northern Ontario residents have many poor health indicators, the April 18 report notes that those trends have done little to abate.

"A lot of what is in the report comes as no surprise," said Manitoulin Health Centre CEO Derek Graham. "We have known about these findings from a variety of sources for some time."

But that does not mean the report doesn't provide a useful purpose.

"They are providing the very broad definition of quality, which I like," he said. "The report explores things like access. It is encouraging they are looking at health though that lens." By identifying the deficiencies in access to services across the region, the report could pave the way to developing

The Health Quality Ontario report notes that life expectancy rates for those living in Northern Ontario continue to be lower and that mortality rates are higher than the rates found in the province overall. "Despite many improvements in health and health care across the province in recent years, there are stubborn and persistent

Manitoulin Centennial Manor audit shows **\$8,000** surplus for **2016**

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Centennial Manor board was pleased to learn that according to its 2016 audited financial statements, the Manor has an \$8,000 surplus.

"It is very good news when working with a balanced budget," said Manor administrator Michelle Bond of the surplus. "We had some savings under expenditures—we didn't have any large issues with equip-

ment or other repairs like we have had in past years."

Cory Houle of Freelandt Caldwell Reilly LLP presented the 2016 audited financial statements to the board.

The report identified an \$8,723 surplus, compared with a \$134,282

Despite the surplus, Ms. Bond said that administration and the board will continue to keep a close eye on the budget and review expenses

'Overall it was a clean audit and we are happy with the results, but

we will continue to really watch expenses," concluded Ms. Bond.
As The Expositor previously reported, the board increased the Island municipalities' contributions to the Manor by 17 percent for 2017. The increase was done to allow for a balanced budget for the Manor in 2017, with the board passing the budget last month.

Spring is definitely a time to become "ticked off"

As Canadians, global warming often seems to be the problem of some other world, a world inhabited by desert sands and date palms. Shorter winters and rising temperatures are hardly the stuff from which boogies to infest our dreams would seem to be fashioned, yet warming temperatures are bringing new and hitherto unimagined concerns to bear—or deer for that matter.

Harsh winters have a definite upside, inhibiting as seems to be the case, many of the more poisonous and nasty creatures that Mother Nature has dreamed up to inhabit warmer climes.

One of those relatively new threats is the lowly tick. Well not so much the tick as to what hitchhikes along with these little bloodsucking creatures—Lyme disease.

As the fastest spreading vector borne disease in North America, Lyme disease has been elevated to a real concern, particularly in regions where deer are common. As we are generally blessed with a surfeit of deer, so will we also be cursed with a bounty of borrelia burgdoreri, the Lyme disease bacterium that is spread through the bite of the blacklegged tick (deer tick, ixodes scapularis if you please). If not now (as the Sudbury and District Health Unit attests), then in the all too near future.

Accustomed to taking walks through the woodlands and meadows

with our canine companions bounding about through the tall grass beside us, or letting the cat out for the night, we can bring those bacterium bearing insects too close to home.

It isn't just humans who can be infected with Lyme disease. Dogs, horses and even cattle can contact the disease.

So with rising temperatures increasing the range of the blacklegged tick exponentially across the landscape, it behooves us all to remain vigilant against ticks, examining our pets and children upon their return from the tall grasses of nature to ensure they are not carrying unwanted passengers.

Global warming will bring with it many unanticipated threats and, even with our best efforts, it's impact will remain with us for the next couple of generations. We must each of us remain on our guard against these threats in a way that we have never been called upon before.

Medical professionals are going to be called upon to spread their imaginations further to diagnose new and unfamiliar threats and those costs will be borne by each and every one of us into the future.

It seems Old Man Winter was a better friend to us than we had ever imagined—and global warming will certainly prove to be a fickle friend to those who might be tempted to welcome its embrace.

An expansion on The Expositor's view on war and adventure

We still live in a world where the use of military force will remain necessary

To the Expositor:

RE: 'War is not a glorious adventure,' editorial of April 5. I thought I would wait until most of the flag waving and triumphalism had died down before I offered my own comments on the celebra-

tions involving the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge. Those were different times in the Canada of 100 years ago, and no doubt our ancestors would take this military success as a sign that God was on our side. I think of Oliver Cromwell, the crypto-fascist Puritan 'parliamentarian' at the Battle of Marston Moor in 1645, during the English Civil War. Having led a successful cavalry charge down the Royalist right flank that day, Cromwell had been 'unhorsed' and received some nasty wounds in the fray. However, by ten o'clock that night he had recovered enough to be sitting up in a makeshift bed, writing his correspondence. In a letter to a colleague, Cromwell boasted how victory that day proved once again that his was "the army of God."

Unfortunately, Cromwell lived about 125 years too soon to have been aware of Voltaire's cynical observation that Divine Providence always seemed to be "on the side with the larger battalions."

Personally, I have never been a big subscriber to the belief that Canada came of age as a nation in the mud and the blood of Vimy Ridge. On the other hand, I don't plan on making a pilgrimage any time soon to the front steps of the Saskatchewan Legislature, where Tommy Douglas proclaimed into force the first medicare plan of any jurisdiction in Canada—or North America.

And my point is? It is difficult to pinpoint the exact foundations of what turns a country into a nation. Myths, legends and folklore are often as important as raw historical facts when assessing the key binding agents that hold a country together, and give it a sense of identity.

Make no mistake: The Battle of Vimy Ridge was a magnificent feat of arms for Canada's young army. Our soldiers achieved what the armies of Britain and France had been unable to do on several earlier occasions—namely, take the ridge.

Was it worth it? Mmmm...hard to say. By the spring of 1917, aircraft were in widespread use, as was aerial photography for reconnaissance purposes. Holding the high ground to get a 'one-up' on your enemy was no longer as important as it once was. Consider, too, that 3,600 young Canadians were killed in just four days, and 7,000 more seriously wounded. Then there are the psychological scars that the survivors suffered for the rest of their life (think "PTSD") that can never be meas-

Nor did Vimy Ridge change much in the big picture, from a strategic point of view. Granted, our success in that battle seemed to be—at least temporarily—a glimmer of hope in a bleak military situation. Canada, along with the other armies on the Western Front, was just emerging from the horrible bloodbath of the previous year's summer campaign, now known as the Battle of the Somme.

Nothing really changed in the day to day military operations after Canada's big win in April of 1917 either. All troops on the Western

Front—our own included—would continue to pay the high price of the "butcher's bill" during the summer campaign of that year, which professional historians would later call the Battle of Passchendaele.

When Canada's Prime Minister, Robert Borden, visited England in December, 1917, he demanded a private audience with David Lloyd George. The British Prime Minister was shocked when a mere 'Dominion leader' proceeded to give him a severe dressing down. Borden made it clear that there would not be one more Canadian soldier sent to Europe on his watch, unless something was done to stop using them as cannon fodder in these senseless mass offensives.

Mention is made in The Expositor's editorial about the responsibility of the writings of Karl Von Clauswitz (Von who?) in causing the greatest cataclysm in world history up to the time of The Great War. From the safety of his teaching position at Lichterfelde, the Prussian military academy in Berlin during the 1820s, this philosopher of war as he is called, expounded the thesis that, "War is a continuation of politics"—at least, as politics apply to the area of foreign policy. When sovereign nation states interact, they first pursue their interests through diplomacy. If that does not work, it is natural for them to resort to military force to get their way. Or so argued Von Clauswitz.

His theory fell into disrepute after World War I, because of the extreme destructiveness of that conflict. In Professor John Keegan's acclaimed book "A History of Warfare," there is a photo of a large mushroom cloud from one of the many atomic tests conducted back in the fifties. The caption under the photo states that nobody has been able to explain how nuclear warfare could be "a continuation of politics."

Don't be so sure. Keegan himself admits that the greatest disciples of Von Clauswitz in the twentieth century were the Marxists—Lenin, Trotsky, Chairman Mao, Ho-Chi-Minh, Fidel Castro, the list goes on. They all applied Clauswitzian theory with great success, and with great brutality. Moreover, there was plenty of material found in the archives after the Soviet Union collapsed, to indicate that the Stalinist louts who ran the Kremlin, were toying with the idea that nuclear war just might

Remember, too, how we live in a world with ISIS and Al Qaeda. We also live in an era of third world nut cases like Kim Jong Un in North Korea, and the medievalist mullahs of Iran. Any one these organizations, or rogue states, would use weapons of mass destruction in a heartbeat, if they thought they could get away with it.

No doubt war is a nasty business as the headline in The Expositor's editorial so rightly suggests. Unfortunately for the countries in the West, we still live in a world where the use of military force will—from time to time—still be necessary.

Instead of "Never again," perhaps we should say: "The odd time, and on a much reduced scale.'

Dan and Mary Larouche

Dan grew up in the CPR town of Britt in an era when trains ruled. "We lived in the CPR boarding cars, while on the mobile construction crew, working on bridges and buildings. My mother did the cooking for the construction workers. My father supervised bridge and building maintenance. My dad also did some work on the swing bridge in Little Current in the mid-1930s. After two years, we moved back to Britt, but returned to Little Current in 1943."

Dan started his own working life with the Department of Highways the spring he turned 16. By summer, he was working for the CPR, first as a labourer then as a Bridgeman for four years. In 1952, he would follow the footsteps of his father, maintaining and operating the Little Current swing bridge. As a sideline, he taught himself upholstering and sign painting. In 1986, he became an Ordained Deacon for St. Catholic Bernard's Roman Parish.

"Distant ancestor, Charles Langlade, married an Anishinaabe woman and reportedly led a group of native warriors against the Americans in the War of 1812." Maternal grandfather Jacob Longlade (changed from Langlade), a farmer, born in 1865, died before Dan was born. Grandmother Adelie sold the farm and lived with Dan's parents until she died in 1942. Paternal grandfather Ernest Larouche had five boys. He did B&B, (bridge building) and maintenance for 50 years for the CPR in Northern Ontario, eventually becoming a foreman. After his wife, Catherine (nee McKenna) died of 'yellow fever' in 1909, at age 30, the children were placed in neighbouring homes so dad could earn money for his family.

Dan was born on March 17, 1931 to Louis and Florence Larouche. There would be eight siblings: Veronica, Bernice, Stanley, Geraldine, Daniel, Damien (his twin), Joseph and Vernon. Only Joseph and Stanley are still alive. After the children were older, Mother Florence did housekeeping in the Parry Sound hospital. She never learned to read or write because she had to work while her brothers were off at war. Dan adds, "My grandmother would smile and call me 'Mary' after a young girl she knew who was bowlegged like me. Despite the teasing, I knew she loved me."

"Getting Christmas gifts from my godparents was an annual event. One year, when I was about three, I asked them kindly, 'Why didn't you bring a gift for my twin brother Damien?' They didn't have an answer for their godchild. From then on, they always brought a gift for both twins. "Another memory was picking up free coal from the train tracks. Money was scarce in the hard years of the 1930s. When work was being done on the coal docks. we could salvage some of the old fir timbers. Damien and I used a cross-cut saw to make firewood. Unfortunately, we left the old saw in the snow one winter and the points rusted off."

School in Britt, and later in Little Current, turned out to be something young Dan didn't latch onto well. "I tended to fight with the teacher over various issues," he confesses. "One day in Grade 1, I had gone home for lunch and I was playing with my friend and didn't hear the bell. After I realized my error, I began to run. Mother saw me going by and called me. 'If you are late for school, I am sending you to your bedroom'."

"The next day, the teacher asked me in class why I had missed school the day before. I heard from the back, 'He was playing

hooky.' I got angry and said, 'none of your business.' Apparently, she made it her business and I got the strap, but I resisted the best I could and got a few little punches in myself."

Something similar happened in Grade 3, when Dan closed the storm door of the main entrance, after school. If you didn't have a pencil, you couldn't open the main door from the inside because the thumb latch was broken. The kids just went to the other door, but the teachers were

annoyed. The next day, the same teacher called me into her classroom. When I didn't come, she pulled me in. I got the strap again but resisted in the same manner. I cried but went back to my own classroom. The strap was pretty common those days."

Dan lost a couple of years and wound up in Grade 7 at 15 years of age. "I moved from Britt in Grade 5, doing well, in May. Nobody registered me in Little Current and I didn't have my last report so when I started in the fall, they put me back in Grade 5. The following spring, dad had to leave for work so Damien and I had to clean up the huge garden which meant we missed two weeks of instructions. On our final day of school, all I heard was 'there was no homework'. When I got back in the fall, I was still two weeks behind and Grade 6 was a big class. The teacher got tired of trying to help me get caught up so I was back in

Grade 5 again. I did eventually finish Grade 6."

"That first day back after New Years, in Grade 7, however, I walked into school at 9 AM in the new year and walked back out again at 9:15 AM. I was close to 16 and the oldest in the class. I was happy to be free." After Dan left school, he did a short stint with the Department of Highways in 1947, for 40 cents an hour, before he joined his dad at the CPR yards later that year. Dan helped his dad repair the piers for the swing bridge in Little Current and for other bridges in the Sudbury Division. He recalls one time they had just finished lunch in Sudbury and were sitting on a side track when they were hit by another train. Everything went flying including the cook's stove but nobody was seriously hurt.

Mary was one of 13 siblings, born to John and Delena (Cousineau) Black, starting life on May 24, 1933, in MacTier: Marie, Celina, Marie, Olive, Evelyn, Bill, Theresa, Mary, Joe, Bernard, Veronica, John and Betty. Another sibling died as a baby. "My dad arrived in Canada, as a young man, alone, in the early 1900s. He was joined later, by his brother who died in a traffic accident in Toronto. His poor hearing likely contributed to his demise."

"My first memory is walking in knee-deep snow two miles to school and back to the farm," Mary recalls. "One day a fine lady stopped me and gave me a beautiful doll. She had a big house and maybe extra dolls, so she kindly gave me one. I was so surprised and so happy, I wanted to keep her all for myself and not share her with my sisters. I hid the doll under my clothes and went up to the attic. I placed her on what I thought was a shelf, only to hear her tumble down inside the wall. My mother tried to fish her out but without success. Years later the house was torn down and I always wondered if someone found my doll."

Another memory etched in stone, at five, is being chased by a ferocious pig. "I liked little pigs but their mother didn't like me. I made it to safety but I had to be careful. Another time I played a trick on my sister and then ran and hid behind a big rock. Somehow, I was spotted and I got a spanking. I couldn't figure out how they found me. Years later when I went back to the house and looked at that rock, I realized how small it really is. No wonder I was found."

Victoria Harbour and the Martyrs' Shrine in Midland were favourite visiting places for

Mary's family. "We would take the train to see our aunts and uncles and visit the shrine." she explains. "I loved to play ball at home too." Dan grins as he adds that Mary's team was called the 'Beaverettes'. "Yes, that was our name. It was a different time; people were friendly. We had no bullies and girls were safe. It was a great time to grow up." In 1947 Mary was voted 'Miss Popularity' for MacTier. "I was given a watch. I still have it but it no longer works."

"We delivered papers every morning, and telegrams for the CPR," Mary continues. "I picked telegrams up after school and walked the two and a half miles from one end of the town to the other to deliver them. The paper delivery was a family enterprise." As a late teen, Mary began work with the CPR, making sandwiches and meals at the canteen. "I had to

get up whenever the train came in, which included three in the morning. I wanted to help my family."

Mary met Dan in MacTier when he came in to the restaurant and asked for a Coke. For some reason, the young lass was a little nervous and asked him, 'What kind?' Dan noted her 'straight face' so wasn't sure if he heard right. 'There is only one kind,' he responded. Mary finally smiled in acknowledgement. "We still laugh about

that," Mary adds. "I knew his older brother and his dad, both of whom had worked for CPR, but I also had heard about some bad habits," she joked. "Best of all, he was good looking."

Mary soon cooked breakfast, lunch and supper at the CPR boarding house and cleaned up afterwards, seven days a week. Most of the money went to the family but occasionally, some went for a movie ticket or a treat. Some time later, Mary got assembly line work at Orient Perfumes in Toronto. "A small group of four would fill the perfume bottles, then cap them and label them. I liked that job." Mary stayed for a year and then came back home to Dan who was waiting for her.

Mary and Dan wed on Monday May 5, 1952 in MacTier. Dan usually had Tuesday and Wednesday off but he traded with a buddy to get Monday and Tuesday off from working on the swing bridge. The wedding was held at eight in the morning. A choir from town serenaded the couple. The town folk knew Mary and Dan; Mary from her days as a paper girl and Dan because he had frequented the CPR boarding house. At 'high noon' the train left for Sudbury. The newlyweds had one night in a hotel. The next day it was back on the train to Little Current and back to work for Dan. Later that year, Dan became 'bridgeman' in Little Current, learning carpentry and sign painting in his spare time. "I was one of five bridge operators. Cars had been sharing the bridge since 1945."

Dan also became an active member of St. Bernard's Parish



Dan with his kerosene lantern from the early days of the bridge. He has donated it to the Sheguaindah museum. in Little Current. Many years later, in 1986, he became a Deacon holding services in Little Current, Birch Island, Gore Bay and Mindemoya. He joined the Manitoulin School Board, and when the three boards amalgamated, the new high school was built in 1969. The contentious issue of where the school would be located was solved when M'Chigeeng, close to the center of the Island, was chosen.

The couple had four children of their own: Linda, Dan, Bernie and Colleen and they took in Mary's youngest two siblings when her parents died within five months of each other. "Dad died in 1955 and mother shortly afterwards. Five young children were orphaned, ranging in age from nine to 15. We took the two youngest girls, Veronica and Betty. We had to take girls because we had one daughter already and no more bedrooms for boys. I was pregnant with Dan Jr. at the time. We kept in touch with the other children."

Mary became a curler first and then Dan. Often the kids were brought to the rink in their snowsuits for a two o'clock match, so they were well known. In fact, they claimed they grew up in their snowsuits. The girls also loved to visit dad at the swing

Marked increases in Ontario deaths on and off the road in 2016

ORILLIA—The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has firmed up its 2016 traffic data, which revealed increases in many fatality categories, including the

most tragic snowmobile season in 14 years. The OPP is sharing the data publicly to raise awareness of the impact ongoing behaviours have on the number of deaths on Ontario roads, waterways and trails.

Motor Vehicle Collision Deaths (All data applies to OPP jurisdictions only)

A total of 307 people were killed in motor vehicle collisions in 2016, marking a four-year high.

Persons killed: 2016, 307; 2015, 301; 2014, 290; and 2013,

Every year, without exception, the majority of the fatalities are attributed to the "Big Four" main causal factors in road deaths. Three are linked to driver behaviour (aggressive, inattentive and impaired driving). The fourth (lack of seat belt use) applies to drivers and passengers

These behaviours were responsible for 165 (more than half) of last year's 307 deaths with little change over the previous year.

Persons killed, speed-related: 2016, 55; 2015, 63.

Persons killed, inattentive-related: 2016, 65; 2015, 68. Persons killed, alcohol/drug-related: 2016, 45; 2015, 45.

Collisions

The OPP investigated 67,372 motor vehicle collisions in 2016, down from 2015 (69,934 collisions).

Marking another four-year high are the 275 collisions that resulted in fatalities.

Fatal motor vehicle collisions: 2016, 275; 2015, 262; 2014, 268: 2013, 254

Of last year's crashes, 11,506 of them resulted in injuries. The majority (55,591) were property damage collisions with no injuries sustained, but these collisions came with a significant economic cost to Ontarians.

Large commercial transport trucks

Last year saw little change in collisions involving large commercial transport trucks. The data is another stark reminder of the significantly greater threat these collisions pose when compared to those involving regular-sized vehicles.

Collisions involving transport trucks resulted in more than three times the number of fatalities than those involving regular-sized vehicles - a statistic that holds steady from year to year. As was the case in 2015, the majority of those who died in last year's transport truck collisions were occupants of other involved vehicles. Many of these fatalities are attributed to the Big Four.

Collisions involving large commercial transport trucks

Number of collisions: 2016, 5,357; 2015, 5,381. Number of fatal collisions: 2016, 57; 2015, 56. Persons killed: 2016, 67; 2015, 71.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Fire department

Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey presented the Northeast Town Fire Department report for April to council. He reported that the department responded to a report of smoke in a Meredith Street basement on March 30, a fire alarm ringing at the Harbour View Road Manitoulin Transport depot on April 11 and a report of a grass fire on Indian Mountain Road on April 13, which ended up being a false alarm as it was a permitted fire.

Library bylaw

Council carried a motion to approve a bylaw to establish the NEMI Public Library. Mayor Al MacNevin explained that council had previously reviewed a proposed bylaw prepared by staff as the town did not currently have a bylaw for the library in place. Mayor MacNevin said he also went over the proposed bylaw with the library board.

Group benefits

Town CAO Dave Williamson went over the tenders for town staff group benefits. The municipality had two bids: the Cooperators with a bid of \$10,730.48 a month and Schuster Boyd McDonald for \$10,487.64 a month. Mr. Williamson explained that these bids reflect a nine percent increase over last year. Mr. Williamson said that staff recommends going with the lowest bid from Schuster Boyd McDonald.

Councillor Cook asked how many people are covered under the benefit plan. Mr. Williamson responded that based on the number of staff and dependents, roughly 60 to 80 people.

Council carried a motion to accept the bid from Schuster Boyd McDonald.

Canadian Heritage funds

Council passed a motion to accept a funding grant from the Ministry of Canadian Heritage for $\$4,\!500$ under the

Motorcyclists

While last year marked fewer collisions involving motorcycles than in the previous year, there was little change in the number of deaths.

The OPP responded to 749 motorcycle crashes in 2016 which resulted in 33 fatalities. Speeding and losing control continue to be common contributing factors.

Motor vehicle collisions involving motorcycles Number of collisions: 2016, 749; 2015, 837. Number of fatal collisions: 2016, 31; 2015, 27. Persons killed: 2016, 33; 2015, 35. Motorcyclists killed: 2016, 31; 2015, 31. Motorcyclists, drivers: 2016, 28; 2015, 27.

Motorcyclists, passengers: 2016, 3; 2015, 4. **Pedestrians**

Sadly, 2016 marked the highest number of pedestrian deaths in more than 12 years, with 39 deaths. There were 25 such deaths in 2015. The year 2009 was the last time the number exceeded 30.

Boaters/Paddlers

2016 marked the highest number of marine deaths in three years, with 23 people dying in 19 incidents on OPP-patrolled waterways. Seven of last year's fatal incidents involved non-motorized vessels (e.g. canoes, kayaks).

Falling overboard was the primary cause in nine of the incidents. Capsized or swamped vessels were involved in seven of them and alcohol in eight of the incidents.

Every year, the majority of the victims are found not wearing a Personal Floatation Device (PFD). Last year, 19 of the 23 victims found with no PFD and in 2015, all of the deceased were found without one

Number of fatal collisions/incidents: 2016, 19; 2015, 16.

Persons killed: 2016, 23; 2015, 18.

Persons killed, no PFDs (includes PFD not used correctly): 2016, 19; 2015, 18.

Off-Roaders

It was a particularly tragic year for off-road vehicle (ORV) enthusiasts, with 22 deaths marking a ten-year high in 2016. More than half (13) of the incidents were alcohol-drug-related and nine of the victims were riding without a helmet. These two behaviours were a common theme in 2015 as well as in previous years.

Number of fatal collisions/incidents: 2016, 22; 2015, 14.

Persons killed: 2016, 22; 2015, 14. Persons killed, alcohol/drug-related: 2016, 13; 2015, 6.

Persons killed, no helmet: 2016, 9; 2015, 6.

Snowmobilers

With the data just in for the entire 2016/2017 season, the OPP is reporting 26 snowmobile deaths, which is the highest number of lives lost since the 2003/2004 season. There were 12 deaths in February alone. Speeding, driver inattention and losing control were primary causes in half of these deaths. Notably, 17 of the 26 victims were between 45- and 64-years-old.

"Our traffic data is compelling evidence that poor, careless behaviour is at the core of the majority of the fatal collisions and incidents we investigate on roads, waterways and trails," OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair, Provincial Commander, Traffic Safety and Operational Support. "Despite the hard facts, some people fail to grasp the magnitude of their role in preventing these senseless deaths. The OPP remains committed to changing these costly behaviours through robust enforcement and education campaigns. The rest is up to Ontarians."

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Island runners take on 5K for mental health

SUDBURY—Nearly 500 runners braved a chilly Sunday morning to lace up their shoes and run the five kilometre Rotary Park course of the first Unbreakable Spring Open in support of mental health awareness. At least two Island runners, Romme Hamid and Akasha Piche of Little Current, travelled to the Nickel City to take part in the run.

Both Island runners came in with respectable times, Mr. Hamid crossing the finish line in seventh with a time of 18:58 and Ms. Piche passing the marker at 71 with a time of 25:58. Winner of the 5K run was Laurentian University Voyageur indoor track team member Caleb Beland, who clocked in at 17:12.

"Romme was incredible," enthused Ms. Piche. "One of the runners from the Laurentian team couldn't believe he didn't have a running coach.

"I like to run," admitted Mr. Hamid who is currently enrolled in Cambrian College's satellite campus in Little Current, topping up his courses for college or university this fall.

But there was no podium recognition in the run, because as co-organizers, high school students Josh Tillson and Lauren-Ashleigh Beaudry noted, it was all about raising awareness and having fun.

The two students hail from different high schools with a long history of intense competition, but the organizers put rivalry aside to pull together in aid of a good cause. The duo hopes to raise enough money through the event to bring the suicide prevention program Cameron Helps to area schools.

The goal of Cameron Helps is "to reduce the stigma of youth mental illness, build awareness of the issues and to promote the positive aspects of physical health on mental health." The program does this through speaking engagements, workshops, special events and media and by working with students, parents, social workers, school boards, hospitals, universities and a host of other health and community partners.

Cameron Helps was born out of a terrible and all-too-familiar tragedy. In 2005, 19-year-old Cameron Harris took his own live, unable to deal with the pain and despair of depression, despite being surrounded by those who loved him.

Personal tragedy and depression was also the motivation for the creation of the Unbreakable Open. Josh's stepfather also took his own life, sending the 16-yearold into his own struggle with depression. It was through running that Josh found a way to

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among young people and depression ranks foremost among catalysts for youth taking the decision to cut their

lives short.


"We are overwhelmed," said Lauren-Ashely of the response to this first run. "We have almost 500 participants." For Josh, there

was almost as much satisfaction in noting there were nearly 200 youth running. "It's awesome," he said. "Youth are what this day is all about."

More than 100 volunteers took part in helping make the day a success, registering runners, distributing water, recording results and offering support.

Unfortunately, there is still stigma surrounding the outlets we do have offered in our community," notes the Unbreakable website. "That is why we've started the Unbreakable Spring Open. Accounts receivable

Town Treasurer Sheryl Wilkin reviewed the accounts receivable for water/sewer and taxes for the month of March.

There were \$296,599.79 made in tax payments in March Ms. Wilkin told council, with the next due date on April 28.

Donations

The Northeast Town council carried a motion to donated \$100, the Gold Sponsor amount, to the Bluegrass in the Country fundraiser for Manitoulin Special Olympics June 9 to 11 in Providence Bay.

Council also carried a motion to donate \$200 to the Little Current Fish and Game Club towards the purchase of fishing rods and reels for Island Grade 4 students that visit the walleye hatchery in Sheguian-


Manor funding

Council discussed how the Manitoulin Centennial Manor would benefit from additional government funding and carried a motion requesting that the province reassess the case mix index which determines the amount of funding the long-term care home receives. The motion was moved by Councillor Koehler and seconded by Councillor Erskine which read: "Whereas the Manitoulin Centennial Manor provides critical long term care to Northeast Town, residents and whereas the Manor has extensive operating and capital needs and lacks the available financial resources to meet those needs, be it resolved that

the council for the Northeast Town request that the province reassess the case mix index to ensure that the operation of the Mano are properly funded and; be it further resolved that the province commit the necessary capital dollars to ensure the infrastructure is updated to properly service the residents."

Builder's terms for subdivision

Council decided to offer building terms on the Hayward Street Subdivision in Little Current to encourage development. A motion was moved by Councillor Erskine and Seconded by Councillor Koehler, "authorizing staff to prepare and offer qualified bidders the following builders terms on the purchase of three or more lots in the Hayward Street Subdivision: a minimum \$60,000 purchase price for three lots; a 25 percent deposit on agreement to purchase with the balance payable upon sale of the first developed lot; a requirement that the first is built within 12 months of closing; and the transfer of ownership of the lots with a buy back option at 60 percent of the original purchase price.'

...continued from page 1 what you would get from the sun on a summer day with a bright blue sky," he said.

The design of the commercial units also left something to be desired when it came to the potting trays, so the designers took that into account. "The new units can fit nearly twice as much," claimed Mr. Willson.

"They do have double the size of a growing area," admitted Mr. O'Donnell.

Rather than being constructed of somewhat tenuous aluminum framing, the new units are more robust, being constructed of Manitoulin cedar in a three-tier configuration. The units are designed to look attractive and live in a home yearround.

"They look absolutely great," said Mr. Willson. "They are really more like a piece of furniture. Lynda and I are going to get one for the apartment to have fresh greens through the winter."



Made of sturdy Manitoulin cedar, the new seed starter frames are pieces of furniture that would not look out of place in anyone's livingroom.

Mr. Willson and his wife developed the Kids Can Grow program a decade ago in response to what they saw as a decline in backyard gardens and the associated skills. The couple decided to be proactive and developed their program to tackle that decline by bringing community gardening and gardening skills into classroom. Through partnerships with the Good Food Box program and the Child Poverty Reduction Task Force the program

has expanded steadily with a well-established track record of success.

Noojmowin Teg (Health Service) has been really instrumental in helping make this happen, noted Mr. Willson. "Of course they have brought a lot to First Nations communities, but they have also made things available for other communities as well," he said. "We are building a community garden just outside Gore Bay that is part of their programming."

The new units have now been installed in eight local elementary level schools and Mr. O'Donnell is now looking forward to expanding into the general market. "I have to take a look at the pricing though," he laughed. "I think the profit on the units we put into the schools is about \$30 a piece. But we learned a lot from the experience."

Heartwood Mushrooms are working on innovative greens production methods and hope to be active with those products in Manitoulin farmers' markets this year and are conducting research and development into land reclamation strategies that they hope will provide small scale remediation options for small property owners.

"It's a pretty exciting time," noted Mr. O'Donnell, as there are increasing numbers of property owners who are taking their environment seriously.

...continued from page 1 \$24,027 would be provided to a couple.

"One income used to be enough for most families," said the premier during her announcement of the three-year pilot project. "Now with even two people working, it is tough to feel as though you are getting ahead and it is tough to feel confident that your job will still be yours or even around in 10 years, in five years or even less."

"It's a novel idea and a really interesting pilot," said District Services Board CAO Fern Dominelli. "It will be very interesting to see what the results are, if they are really going to save the amount of money in other areas that they think they might. I think it is a worthwhile experiment."

The announcement did not include details on how the three communities were selected for inclusion in the pilot, but Thunder Bay has been heavily impacted by a loss of forestry jobs (with plenty of angst on the horizon with the ongoing softwood lumber dispute) and Hamilton is facing much the same with the steel industry. Other communities, on the other hand, have been experiencing strong job growth as Ontario's economy rebounds thanks to technology sectors.

"Technological progress

"Technological progress and automation are creating new industries," said Premier Wynne. "But they are also creating new pressures and they are putting existing jobs at risk."

The project cost will come in at \$150 million over the course of three years tagged at \$50 million a year.

Under the pilot plan, roughly 1,000 recipients will be chosen from Thunder Bay, while another 1,000 will be selected from Hamilton, Brantford and Brant County. Another 2,000 will be selected from the Lindsay area.

While the general concept of a basic guaranteed

income is universal, the pilot will work on a graduated system, with about half of job earnings being deducted from the amount allocated. So a basic income recipient earning \$10,000 in employment income would receive about \$11,989 from the pilot program—that would be based on the maximum \$16,989 less half the \$10,000. That would bump the recipient up to \$21,989 a year in income.

While this is a pilot program, studies from other jurisdictions and earlier pilot programs have indicated that there are improvements in people's lives

"People get a chance to go back to school," pointed out Housing Minister Chris Ballard during the announcement. "They don't have to work low-paying dead-end jobs. They get a chance to finish college or go on to university."

Also as part of the project, people on Ontario Works or the Ontario Disability Support Program

will not have to give up their benefit supports such as dental and drug plans.


Participants currently receiving child benefits, such as the Canada Child Benefit (CCB) and the Ontario Child Benefit (OCB), will also continue to be eligible to receive them during the pilot, but participants on Employment Insurance (EI) or on the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) will have their monthly basic income payment reduced dollar for dollar

under the pilot.

A separate program targeting First Nations on reserve will be coming later this year, but First Nations people living in the pilot areas are eligible to participate.

The province will be engaging researchers to determine what the impact of the basic income is on people's lives, and in the case of Lyndsay, the impact across the entire community will be assessed.

The results of the program are to be reported back in 2020.

...continued from page 1 However, after the introduction of a tamper-deterrent formulation in 2012, oxycodone involvement in these deaths decreased, and opioids became other increasingly involved. In particular, fentanyl involvement increased by 548 percent between 2006 and 2015 and is now the opimost commonly involved in opioid-related deaths, the press release continues. The involvement of hydromorphone also increased by 232 percent over this time period to become the second most commonly involved opioid. Despite small numbers overall, heroin involvement in opioidrelated deaths has increased by 975 percent over this same period.

"The introduction of tamper-deterrent long-act-

ing oxycodone appears not to have led to any reductions in opioid-related deaths in the province, and instead seems to have shifted opioid use to alternatives, both illicit and prescribed, that do not have these tamper-deterrent properties," Ms. Gomes continues. "This underlines the challenges in dealing with the opioid crisis

ing oxycodone appears not we are currently facing."

The report also shows that more than 80 percent of all opioid-related deaths in 2015 were accidental. The researchers were able to break down the accidental deaths by age, showing almost 60 percent of accidental deaths occurred among youth and younger adults (15 to 44 years), the

...continued from page 3 northern Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) regions and those living in the rest of and what Ontario. attempts are being made to address those inequities.

report focuses specifically on the area of the North East and North West LHIN regions that extend north of Lake Huron (including Manitoulin) to Hudson Bay and James Bay and from the Quebec border in the east to the Manitoba border in the west.

The region covered by the report encompasses nearly 80 percent of Ontario's landmass, and has a combined population of over 800,000.

Among the key findings in the report are that people in Ontario's North have a much shorter life expectancy than those in the province overall, living shorter lives by as much as 2.9 years in the North West LIHN region and 2.5 years shorter in the North East LHIN region of which Manitoulin is a part. People in the North are more likely to die prematurely (that is before age 75), with the main factors influencing that lower rate being suicide, circulatory disease and respiratory disease.

Compounding factors are people in the North are much less likely to report being able to see a family doctor, nurse practitioner or other regular health care provider when needed and that Northerners are more likely to report having multiple chronic conditions.

The report attributes many of these inequities "to systemic challenges faced by health care professionals and the many challenges involved in serving a population spread over such a wide area with a low population density, including many fly-in communities.'

These inequities are also the result of many variables beyond the health care system, those factors known as "the social determinants of health.

The report illustrates the situation facing Northern residents through the example of "Pierre," 71, a double-lung transplant recipient who lived in Nakina, a village north of Thunder Bay with his wife Suzanne. It personalizes the issues by relating how tough it was for Pierre to travel for the health care he needed, and to pay for accommodation and medication expenses.

"I had to move to Thunder Bay and travelled five or six times back and forth to Toronto," Pierre says in the report. "My wife drove there. It took about 20 hours every time. Twenty hours when you're sick was really tough.'

The report also details the specific challenges indigenous and francophone populations face in the North, pointing out that nearly one in five people (18.3 percent) identify as indigenous in the North West LHIN region and more than one in 10 people (11 percent) in the North East LHIN region, compared to 2.4 percent in Ontario overall.

The report points out that "over the last several decades in Ontario (and across Canada), indigenous peoples have faced discriminatory policies that have affected health, including forced relocations and residential schools."

Another factor are the differences in the way health care is funded and delivered for Nations, Métis and Inuit people in Ontario, which performance means measures may not represent their experiences as well as they do for the general population of the Northern regions.

"The solutions to the inequities facing people in the North need to be found in the North by those who live and work

there," said Dr. Jennifer Walker, Canada Research in Indigenous Health at Laurentian University and a member of the Six Nations of the Grand River in the release. Solutions cannot simply be imported from the southern part of the province. The landscapesocial and cultural as well as geographic—is totally different.'

There are some lights appearing at the end of the tunnel, however, as there are several region-specific efforts underway improve access to care for people living in the North. The report cites Aboriginal Health Access Centres that provide a place of safety and belonging for First Nations, Métis and Inuit people; the development of an action plan by the North East LHIN in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission report; that some Community Health Centres focus on, or prioritize, the needs of indigenous peoples and of francophones; a range of health services and supports offered by the Métis Nation of Ontario.

Also on a positive note are telemedicine and virtual critical care services that help people manage disease and critical illness, along with mobile services that deliver care to patients where they are. As well, the provincial travel grant program helps patients get to the care they need when it is

unavailable in their local communities (at least 100 km).

There are language services to enable doctors. nurse practitioners and other health providers to effectively communicate with patients who speak other languages.

Rounding out those positive initiatives are: personal support services to assist patients after discharge from hospital and help with everyday tasks, and focused medical education. That the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) recruits students from indigenous and francophone populations as well as from small communities across North—the bonus is that the majority of NOSM graduates remain in Northern Ontario to practice, adds the report.

"These initiatives demonstrate the commitment of all of those working in the North to find solutions to the unique challenges they face," said Dr. Walker in the release, going on to point out that Health Quality Ontario has developed a Health Equity Plan to encourage everyone involved in providing health care to consider equity prominently when developing plans to build a safe and patientcentred system. This plan includes support for the development of a health equity strategy specific to Northern Ontario.

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

...continued from page 1 whoever is in charge of that, decided that it was too much of a safety risk to not take it down, I guess," said Ms. Reynolds.

"We had no insurance on the house as the insurance companies would not cover us," she explained. "The insurance company came out to inspect the building. but they said that (insurance) wasn't happening." In the end the Reynolds were only able to purchase liability insurance. "In case someone wandered onto the property and got hurt," she said.

The couple originally purchased the property in 2010, but "the house was not liveable when we bought it," explained Ms. Reynolds. What followed were years of determined renovations and planning. The couple hoped to turn the historic house into a bed and breakfast.

To add to the tragedy, the couple are not only facing a tremendous financial loss, but they are also facing the considerable cost of removing the remaining rubble from the site. Daniel Reynolds, one of the couple's adult sons has set up a GoFundMe account assist with that expense.

Rebecca Smith is a long time family friend and is assisting with the fundraising efforts. It was Ms. Smith that first broke the news of the fire to the family. "Daniel and I have been best friends since we were 16," said Ms. Smith. "I live directly across the street. I was asked to take photos and video to keep the family informed and did so all day until the fire was smoldering.

She has a different view when she looks out her win-

dow these days. "Now when I wake up, I see rubble and a broken house," she said. "It's hard, I know what was inside. I can't help feeling that I didn't do enough.'

Among the items inside that home was the secretary desk of Ms. Reynold's grandmother, her grandfather's antique book collection and a host of irreplaceable items. "It had become the storage place for all of the things that we wanted to keep," said Ms. Reynolds.

Ms. Reynolds is no stranger to adversity, in 2009 she was diagnosed with breast cancer. "I was declared cancer free after five years, and so far so good," she said. Much of their retirement savings were eaten up during a year-long strike at Vale, where Mr. Reynolds is employed.

"We are looking at maybe holding a benefit dance,' said Ms. Smith. "My friend has a lot of experience in setting that sort of thing

able history for the Reynolds family and the community. "My sister rented it back in 1987-88,' said Ms. Reynolds. "Just about everyone in town has told me that they have family that rented that house at some time in the past."

The house figured prominently on the Manitowaning Historical Walking Tour and according to Assiginack Museum curator Kelsey Maguire, the house was originally built in 1897 by Methodist lay minister William Allen Beatty, and was an exact copy of his house in Kirkton, Ontario. Mr. Beatty became reeve of Assiginack in 1899. According to 'A Time to Remember' the house was sold to John and Janie Robbins, who retired there in 1933. It was the Robbins family who sold the land upon which the last two Assiginack Public

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Schools were built. Mr. Robbins passed in 1958.

The tragedy could have been much worse, as the Reynolds' daughter was scheduled to move into the house in a couple of weeks.

Ms. Smith has issued a plea for those contractors or workmen on the Island with a little time and equipment to spare to get in touch with the family and lend a hand with the cleanup. "I know there are a lot of people my age who

Northeast Town calls for customer equality for Hydro delivery fees

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town is calling for customer equality regarding Hydro One delivery fees and sent a resolution to this effect to Premier Kathleen Wynne, Energy Minister Glenn Thibeault and municipalities across Ontario.

Last month, the Northeast Town council discussed the premier's announcement that Hydro One would be waiving delivery fees for customers who reside on First Nations.

Councillor Bill Koehler noted that the change would be "good for First Nation people, but will mean a loss of millions of dollars. Where is Hydro One going to make up this money from?"

"Many people in our rural, Northern communities are struggling too," added Councillor Koehler. "What about them?"

Councillor Koehler moved a resolution, seconded by Councillor Paul that Skippen reads. "Whereas the premier has announced that Hydro One will be waiving delivery fees for customers who reside on First Nations; and whereas the many families in the Northeast

The cause of the fire has not yet been determined, Ms. Reynolds said that she believed the current theory is that the source was electrical in nature.

Gravelle. Carol spokesperson for the Office of the Fire Marshall and Emergency Management said that the cause of the fire was under investigation. "Samples have been collected and sent to the forensic centre to be analysed," she said. "At this time there is no indication that the cause of the fire is or isn't arson. The OFM is exploring all avenues.'

Town are having trouble meeting their financial commitments because of the exorbitant delivery fee charge by Hydro One; now therefore be it resolved that Northeast Town requests that the Province of Ontario treat all of Hydro One's customers equally and eliminate the delivery fees for residents of the Northeast Town; be if further resolved that, in the interest of transparently, Hydro One explains to the municipalities which costing measures or alternative revenue sources will be put in place to replace the revenue losses it experiences from the elimination of the delivery charge to its customers; and further, that a copy of this resolution be sent to Premier Wynne, Minister Thibeault, and the other municipalities in the Province of Ontario."

The resolution has had mixed support across Manitoulin. Burpee Mills and Gore Bay have supported the Northeast Town's resolution, while Billings Township voted unanimously in opposition ofTehkummah council and Assiginack did not discuss resolution. Gordon/Barrie Island discussed the matter, but didn't not formally support or oppose it.

Billings council expressed that they felt the Northeast Town's position would create a wedge between First Nation and non-First Nation residents and were confused as to why the Northeast Town would not support the government's measures to reduce hydro costs.

MSS students encouraged to 'Give the Gift of Life' and sign their donor card

M'CHIGEENG-Grade 11 and 12 students at Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) learned about the importance of signing their donor card and 'Giving the Gift of Life' at a special assembly last week organized by one of the students.

Grade 12 student Garret Gauthier organized the assembly in support of his friend and fellow MSS student, Connor Croft, who is in need of an organ transplant.

"When I set up the assembly I had talked to my mom about how I wanted to do something for Connor, so she suggested having someone in and speak on behalf of organ donation," explained Garret. "I believe that awareness being spread is key to helping people like Connor to be able to receive a kidney or any other organ. Signing your organ donation card is important to help people overcome hardships such as needing a new kidney. It is the biggest gift you can give in life, to save another once you are gone."

The guest speaker for the assembly was Wikwemikong High School teacher and Island powwow emcee Chris Pheasant

cious gift of life."

Mr. Pheasant explained that anyone 16 years-old and older can register their consent for organ and tissue donation.

He explained that the organs or tissue that can be donated include the heart, kidneys, liver, lungs, pancreas, small intestines, eyes, bone, skin and heart valves.

"Today in Ontario, there are over 1,500 people waiting for a lifesaving organ transplant," said Mr. Pheasant. "This is their only treatment option and every three days someone will die because they did not get their transplant."

He said that the average waiting time for a heart is 187 days; 198 days for a lung; liver, 175 days; and 1,804 days for a pancreas."

"This is my third year, my third birthday since I received the gift of life," shared Mr. Pheasant. "For me it was very last minute when I received my liver-I felt very fortunate.

Mr. Pheasant said he was diagnosed with Stage 4 liver disease which effected the valves attached to his liver. "Everyone thinks liver issues are associated with drinking, but I stopped drinking the day my son was born," he said. "For me it was hereditary—my mom passed away

He said that prior to his transplant he


don, Ontario. He said that in the last week he wasn't coherent and that while he was unconscious a liver became available that was a match and his life was saved.

"The gift of life gave me a new lease on life," said Mr. Pheasant. "I was so grateful. I was also grateful to the people of Manitoulin who pulled together to support me, and donated money to help my family."

"Sign your card and make a choice," concluded Mr. Pheasant. "Choose to give the gift of life."

To register as a donor you can do so online or by visiting a Service Ontario centre. Donation registration is confidential and will not impact one's medical care. Registration status is only accessed at end-of-life to share a person's donation wishes with their family. Donation in Ontario is managed by Trillium Gift of Life Network, a not-for-profit agency of the Ontario government.



With the sunny weather, my gardening spirit is alive and well and on the move. What this means is that my time spent in the kitchen, cooking, is put on the "back burner." We eat late and I cook quick and light. Light to me is cooking with one pan, maybe two, or how about just a sandwich!

Pork Stir-Fry

You can serve this dish with rice or noodles. Switch the asparagus with snow peas or kale or zucchini. Don't like pork? Use chicken breasts. Garnish with chopped peanuts and fresh basil.

*Place pork tenderloin in the freezer for 20 minutes to make it easier to slice.

- 1/2 cup water
- 2 Tbsp fish sauce
- 1 Tbsp oyster sauce 1 tsp honey, cornstarch
- and soy sauce 1/4 tsp crushed red pep-
- per flakes 1 Manitoulin Island pork
- tenderloin (support our local farmers!!!!) 1/4 tsp pepper
 - 2 Tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 lb asparagus, trimmed and sliced into bite sized pieces
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced shallots
- 2 tsp fresh gingerroot, minced
- 1 sweet red or yellow pepper, sliced into strips
- 1 Tbsp rice vinegar
- 1. In a small bowl, whisk together, 1/4 cup of the water, oyster sauce, fish sauce, honey, cornstarch, soy sauce and red pepper flakes: set aside
- 2. Slice pork or chicken into bite-size strips; season

with pepper. In large skillet, heat 1 Tbsp of oil over medium-high heat. Stir-fry pork in batches until browned; transfer to bowl. 3. Add remaining oil to skillet; add asparagus (or

veggie of choice), shallots, ginger, garlic and pepper strips; stir-fry for 2 minutes. Stir in remaining water; reduce heat to medium, cover and cook until asparagus is tender-crisp, about 4 minutes. Stir in reserved sauce and pork with accumulated juices; stir-fry until pork is heated through and sauce is thickened, about 2 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vinegar.

4. Before serving sprinkle with peanuts or sesame seeds and fresh basil.

Brown Rice

Make a large batch of brown rice and you will have extra to use throughout the week. It can then be used to make a salad for lunch, stir-fry for dinner or a rice pudding for dessert. You can cook the rice in plain water with salt or use an organic vegetable stock.

To cook brown rice do the following:

The two-to-one water-torice ratio that you'll find on the back of a bag or box of rice isn't the best. Use 1 1/4 cup of water to one cup of rice for long-grain brown rice, and 1 1/2 cups of water to one cup rice for short grain brown rice. The 30-minute is a better working time, not the 45-50 that is recommended. Finally let your rice stand for 10 minutes and fluffing with a fork before serving.

been closer to the center of the channel. The current caught him and ran him into the bridge. Sometimes cars would flip right over on the train tracks when crossing the bridge. Motorcycles had even more problems if they hit the tracks from the wrong angle."

"Generally, the wind made opening and closing the bridge more challenging. There was a locking device in the center of the bridge along with wedges to anchor the bridge on both sides, when open. The strong winds would blow the bridge closed again and re-latch. One morning shift, I had the Norgoma do an extra circle in the Strawberry Channel because we couldn't open the bridge. By the time, she got back to us, we had it open." When Dan retired in 1970, he salvaged one of the old bridge marine lights and donated it to the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah.

After the children were all in school, Mary was hired at Christmas, at the Fairway Department Store owned by Elmer and Vi Vincent. "I earned a dollar an hour in 1958. After the layoff, I spent a year at the Manor but my shifts often didn't coincide with Dan's so we didn't see much of each other. I left a year later and returned to Fairway after the Turners took it over and spent two summers there.

When Newson's Pharmacy in Little Current was looking for help, Mary worked there until it closed. She went on to become a dietary aide at the hospital. Part-time cooking was also included in her job description until she retired at 65.

Dan loved his work as a Deacon. He was also proud to be a charter member of the Little Current Community Credit Union organized in the late 1950s.

Re-upholstering furniture and building signs added to his achievements. In 1963, he became the contractor for his own home. In 1967 and 1968 he upgraded his education to grade 12. In 1974, he built a sign shop followed by a garage in 1975. The garage was renovated for Mardan Glass. The name Mardan is a blend of Mary and Dan. "I worked there until 2000 when I retired and my son-in-law took over."

Their four children remain busy. Bernie owns the flower shop in Little Current and her husband took over Mardan Glass. Daniel lives in Prescott where he worked for a cable company setting up cables and television systems. He has also installed fields of solar panels. Linda is semiretired. She was a soldier in the armed forces and later had her own business teaching health and safety to government and private organizations. She also taught business law at college level and had transported prisoners in Winnipeg. Lastly, Daughter Colleen lives in Ajax where she is a nutritionist. She also works at Shopper's Drug Mart in the 'handicap'
