Answer to frequently asked question

MANITOULIN—As more cases of COVID-19 emerge in Canada, Ontario and within Public Health Sudbury and Districts (PHSD)'s catchment area, many individuals have expressed concern about people coming to Manitoulin Island and carrying the virus with them, and those concerned people have advocated for checkpoints or opening the swing bridge to screen traffic heading to Manitoulin. The ability of Islanders to implement these measures, however, is a different question altogether.

The Northeast Town, which is home to the only link between Manitoulin and the mainland, has discussed the possibility of restricting Island-bound traffic.

As a conversation starter during the March 31 meeting of the Northeast Town, Councillor Michael Erskine asked Mayor Al MacNevin that oft-asked query:

Island paramedic re-engineers snorkel masks to deliver oxygen. protect front line medical staff

CURRENT—Retired LITTLE paramedic Bill Cranston of Mindemoya has created a novel method of delivering oxygen to COVID-19 patients while also potentially reducing the exhalation of viral droplets and airborne particles using an ordinary object with a series of one-way seals—a full-face snorkel mask.

Mr. Cranston is a member of both the emergency committee and the patient advisory committee at Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC). He has been spending considerable time in his modest home workshop in recent months to help find solutions to make Manitoulin Island better prepared to fight the coronavirus.

"Dr. (Mike) Bedard is a personal friend of mine and we have been talking about this since mid-January and building ideas since then," said Mr. Cranston.

"(Mr. Cranston) can silicone in an oxygen tube and this rigidity provides PEEP-positive endexpiratory pressure (which refers to the pressure left in the lungs after breathing out) and he also, on the exhale, put a (bacterial and viral) filter. It's pretty cool, I think," said Dr. Bedard, the president of the medical staff at MHC who has also offered to be the lead

Sub-acute care centre will accommodate up to 30 patients

by Warren Schlote LITTLE CURRENT—Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) has partnered with the Northeast Town to create a standalone sub-acute care centre (SCC) for COVID-19 patients at the Little Current-Howland Recreation Centre, designed to be a stage of treatment between intensive hospital care and less-involved home and community care.

"A number of minor miracles have taken place to allow this all to click into place," said Dr. Mike Bedard, who serves as the president of the medical staff at MHC and has offered to be the lead physician of the SCC. "I reiterate: this is the best place in the world to ride this out.

The designated Manitoulin Island COVID-19 hospital will be MHC's Little Current site. In-hospital care will be provided to patients with severe cases of the virus and that department will be overseen by Dr. Roy Jeffery.

Up the road, the town's arena and curling club is being transformed into the SCC, with that facility legally becoming a branch of MHC until it is no longer needed. Dr. Bedard has offered to oversee this facility which will support up to 30 patients.

"This is intended to be frontline support to the Manitoulin Health Centre's main front line of action," said Dr. Bedard.

Services available at the SCC will include the delivery of 100 percent oxygen, medical supports such as intravenous care, administration of a patient's regular medications, nutrition and some form of mental health support. Its main purpose is to give patients more time for their immune sys-

Island ventilator appeal fund tops \$149,000 Four units ordered for Manitoulin hospitals' use

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC)'s ventilator campaign has now received donations far exceeding the purchase price of the four additional ventilator units, which will allow all surplus funds to go toward the health group's efforts to fight the virus through other needed activities such as purchasing

As of 3 pm on Friday, April 3, MHC had taken in \$149,190 in confirmed donations from a large num-

ber of Island foundations, businesses and individuals. The original goal was \$80,000 to cover the purchase of the four ventilators and the additional funds will be used for other COVID-19-related purposes such as the new sub-acute care centre in Little Current and exploring techniques to disinfect medical objects.

Because the surplus funds are being directed toward the COVID-19 fight, the hospital is still wel-

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Kagawong man believes more COVID-19 testing is needed

KAGAWONG—A Kagawong resident is strongly requesting to be tested for COVID-19 after living with symptoms such as fever, chills, cough, fatigue and a sore throat for nearly a month but having been denied testing because of the Ontario Ministry of Health's testing policies.

"There needs to be more testing. I'm in this situation where I don't know if I have it or not and I'm stuck in isolation," says Charles Beckett. "I'm not even going back to work. I was supposed to go back today but I told them I'm still not feeling well and didn't want to risk it. Thankfully they're pretty good about that."

Mr. Beckett, 35, works at a grocery store and says he is regularly around people who

cough in the store. However, since he cannot prove that he has been in contact with any other positive-tested cases, he is unable to get tested himself.

"I have Crohn's and colitis; any time I get the flu it always lasts for more than 14 days and it's usually three or four weeks before any symptoms go away because my immune system is shot. I think even people with mild symptoms should be tested, especially snowbirds and people who have been away," he says, noting that people who recently returned have been coming into the store where he works.

Testing is limited in Canada and around the world because of a finite supply of testing kits and lab capacity. This is why public health directives are to only test people who match specific criteria.

Although that policy helps to ensure there are tests available for those who need them the most, it also means testing centres have to turn away many individuals without being tested and instead share information on public health best practices in order to keep them and their communities as safe as possible.

Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) president and CEO Lynn Foster has declined to comment on this specific case because making public comments about a particular patient is against hospital policy. However, she says the hospital is following all of the testing recommendations from public health agencies and she is confident in the decisions made by those in the testing

centres.

Public Health Sudbury and Districts has likewise declined to comment on any specific cases, but says in a statement that the decision of whether or not to test is based on an assessment of each person—the overall priority is to inform clinical and public health management. It adds that the health care provider has the ultimate decision on whether or not to test a patient.

If anyone is experiencing symptoms, regardless of receiving a positive test result or not, they must self-isolate for at least 14 days and remain in their homes, even for errands, instead using delivery services or volunteer groups to help with these tasks. Those without a fever whose

Popular smelt fishing municipalities' message to smelters: stay home!

MANITOULIN—With what is possibly the most popular smelt fishing location on Manitoulin Island, based on the numbers of eager fishers who show up each mid-April to scoop up the tiny morsels, the Township of Billings was first out of the gate to discourage anyone from travelling to their municipality to smelt fish. Since then other municipalities have followed suit.

"We haven't dealt with it yet and like many recent issues, it comes down to a question of enforcement," said Assiginack CAO Alton Hobbs, but he added the caveat "we are likely to encourage no smelt fishing." Mr. Hobbs reiterated that enforcement would be something of an issue for the municipality, given the limited resources. "We don't have a bylaw officer as such," he noted, "so unless the OPP are going to enforce the provincial ban on gatherings of five people

or more "

The same enforcement concerns were voiced by Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin during a recent Manitoulin Municipal Association meeting. Mayor MacNevin also pointed out the conflicting messages Island municipalities have received on who actually owns shoreline allowances.

Nonetheless, Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson encouraged folks to forgo their annual pilgrimage to Manitoulin streams this year. "As everyone should know by now, all parks and marinas are closed," he said. "Municipally we would encourage people to not go smelt fishing this year. Everyone recognizes the need for physical separation, so it is in their best interest and their families' best interest to avoid smelt fishing at this time."

M'Chigeeng Ogimaa-kwe Linda Debassige was unavailable for comment by press time Monday.

All Island nursing homes enact strict lockdowns during COVID-19 spread

MANITOULIN-The advent of the COVID-19 pandemic and harrowing accounts coming out of some southern Ontario long-term care facilities where the virus has already managed to infiltrate has led to some heroic efforts on the part of Island nursing homes in order to defend their vulnerable and close-packed residents from a virus for which humans have no natural immunity. Those efforts have brought along with them challenges for the mental health and well-being of residents and staff alike, calling for equally robust efforts to lift spirits and make connections

"We've done so much, where do I begin?" said Manitoulin Centennial Manor administrator Tamara Beam, speaking to The Expositor following a series of Monday meetings with staff and provincial health officials. "First of all.

we locked all the doors. When the Ministry of Health directive came down, it seems like months ago now, but it was just a couple of weeks ago we took steps to lock down."

It was more than a simple locking of doors; as regular visitors to the facility would know, there is a number-lock system that usually permits visitors to punch in a posted code to gain entry—no more.

"We physically rewired the front door so people can't get in until they are screened," said Ms. Beam. "At first we put in visiting hours, but then the word came down Saturday to restrict entry. The only people coming in are our staff."

Deliveries are strictly monitored, with calls ahead by Life-Labs ensuring that there are medical samples that need to be picked up before the delivery person even sets out for the facility. "They call us and if, and only if, they have stuff to pick up do they even come. Even then, there is no physical contact between the staff and the delivery people. The same goes for our food deliveries. The staff opens the dock doors and leave. The delivery people, Sysco, bread, milk, they come in and drop off the supplies with no physical contact with staff."

"There are lockers here and staff are encouraged to change into their uniforms here and to take them off and change into their street clothes before they go home," she said.

Even the medical staff who come into the facility are isolated, bringing in personal protective gear to protect the residents and staff from any contact. Doctors and other health professionals are now conducting examinations via

Stressful times often mean families are at a greater risk for domestic violence

MANITOULIN—As soon as COVID-19 began to spread globally and it was evident that Canada would not be spared, Marnie Hall, Manitoulin Family Resources (MFR) executive director, became concerned. "Physical distancing goes against how we run almost all of our programs," she told The Expositor.

"Shelters across Canada have been over capacity for months," Ms. Hall continued, "nor are these shelters set up for physical distancing."

Ms. Hall said that the 10-bed women's shelter in Mindemoya is not over capacity now, but because of physical distancing

measures, there will be less space available at the current location. Plans are in the works to create an emergency secondary space with extra beds should the need

While MFR might not be able to provide the same face-to-face contact to women in this time of physical distancing, Ms. Hall assures the women of Manitoulin that MFR will continue to support them in every way they can. MFR recently launched a new text-only line for women to reach out if they find themselves in crisis.

"Women are most at risk from the people housed with them," ...continued on page 10

The Expositor partners with Gimaa Radio to provide news services in Anishinaabemowin

M'CHIGEENG—Gimaa Radio station manager and founder Anong Beam has travelled a long and winding road to bring her father (renown Anishinaabe artist) Carl Beam's dream of creating an Anishinaabemowin radio station into fruition. Gimaa Radio is based in M'Chigeeng and broadcasts "stories and conversations for learners and speakers to celebrate and laugh together in Oiibwe."

A few weeks ago, Ms. Beam approached The Expositor with an innovative idea on how this paper could assist in the Gimaa Radio goal.

"For a long time I wanted to have some kind of relationship with different news media outlets," she said. "I had approached the CBC before, but that never panned out. We are really too small an audience for that to really work."

She came to realize that the news of greatest interest to her audience was hyper-local. "I thought that The Expositor would be a good fit," said Ms. Beam. "The Expositor is so local and local news with the community is what we really want." So she reached out to staff writer Michael Erskine with the concept.

"I thought it was a great idea," said Mr. Erskine, who has taken several Ojibwe language courses over the past three decades, albeit with what he admits has been very limited success. "I have always been a strong supporter of maintaining Indigenous languages," he said, "so I jumped at the opportunity. I thought that not only would I be doing my small part to strengthen Anishinaabemowin here on Manitoulin, but I might improve my own grasp of the language at the same time."

Mr. Erskine brought the plan to his editor and Manitoulin Publishing owner Alicia McCutcheon, whom he knew as also being a strong supporter of strengthening Anishinaabemowin and who has encouraged the use of Indigenous words in local news stories and articles as did her father before

"I thought it was a great idea," she said. "We have often wondered how we could do more to assist in strengthening Anishinaabemowin and with Michael willing to take on the project it seemed like a good step in the right direction."

On Tuesday, the day following the production of The Expositor, Mr. Erskine takes the news stories from the front and third pages of the newspaper, those with the lead stories, and writes a short synopsis of the story which he then sends to the radio

Taking care of mental health during the COVID-19 pandemic

MANITOULIN—The COVID-19 pandemic has caused mass disruptions to daily life in Canada and around the world; in the midst of this, perhaps more than ever, it is important to maintain a healthy state of mental well-being and learn strategies to manage mental health before the crisis escalates any further.

"It's too early to tell what the full impacts will be. We only got sent home recently and while there has been a few people reaching out, I think we'll really start to see things change in the next week, week and a half," said Delaney Campbell, mental health counsellor at Noojmowin Teg Health Centre, who is also adjusting to working from home.

Noojmowin Teg's mental health team is still providing counselling services via phone and video meetings during this time as a way of continuing to aid those in need while also contributing to the important physical distancing practices in place in Canada.

"When we don't have struc-

tured patterns for working at home, it might be okay for a few days but then it might set in that you're not being as productive, not able to work a full-time job and watch your kids at the same time. That can cause feelings of guilt and you might start missing the infrastructure of daily life,

This is why experts recommend designating certain spots within the home as work-only spaces, as well as keeping the same patterns such as waking up at a steady time, getting dressed and taking care of personal hygiene needs. Sleep is a key portion within all aspects of well-being.

Away from the pressures of work, the uncertainty and lack of control over the state of the world can increase anxiety and worries during daily life.

Based on her experiences so far, Ms. Campbell said only some people are worried about getting sick themselves; many more are concerned about the broader implications.

"Young people believe that

they're relatively safe (from getting severe symptoms). But a lot of them are more worried about the guilt of having contributed to the spread of the disease or giving it to someone who is more vulnerable," she said.

Worry does not have to be seen only as a negative emotion. In fact, worry is essential to the brain's function because it helps people plan ahead and manage risks. However, when one starts worrying about hypothetical issues, worry can quickly become

Being worried about the spread of disease, for instance, can be constructive because there are things one can do to change the outcome of the virus' spread such as washing hands, minimizing inperson contacts and following public health directives.

Conversely, worrying about the global spread of COVID-19 or other countries' decisions regarding the virus is not helpful because an individual does not have a way of managing the decisions of foreign governments and their health

Mental well-being must be viewed alongside physical and spiritual health, such as getting fresh air and exercise, keeping a healthy diet and using traditional medicines if desired (Noojmowin Teg is an aboriginal health access centre, so promoting the use of traditional medicines where appropriate is part of its mandate).

In tougher times like these, Ms. Campbell said reaching out to community members, while keeping physical distancing in mind, can be beneficial. This can include offering support or just being there for a conversation.

"Older people, who experience loneliness at higher rates on a regular basis, are going to be experiencing that more these days," said Ms. Campbell. "Our routines might be different now but we can create new ones to build that sense of connection with each

When asked about the rise of online communities on Manitoulin Island where people are

publicly shaming those who are not practicing self-isolation after returning from places where COVID-19 has spread, Ms. Campbell was sympathetic but discouraged that practice.

"Shaming others is rarely a useful tool at our disposal. I will say, though, that these people are probably trying to gather some element of control over the world around them, but that's not the good kind of worry. People are trying to control the actions of others and you just can't do that," said Ms. Campbell. "It's not only ineffective but mean-spirited too. I can't imagine it being a strong community resource.'

As for people who are trying to stay busy, Ms. Campbell said this was a good time to try new hobbies or get outside for fresh air away from others-Manitoulin's low population density makes it is easy to enjoy the outdoors away from crowds.

There are also online support networks for people of all ages who are trying to learn new skills or get mental health support.

People who care for others can have a challenging time, especially when these activities conflict with physical distancing directives. The Ontario Caregiver Organization has an online support group that hosts several onehour discussions each week on its

OntarioCaregiver.ca/find-support/peer-support.

Youth in Manitoulin District can also access remote support through Compass Child and Youth Mental Health Services. Full details are available on its website, CompassNE.ca.

Ms. Campbell suggested two self-directed services—Big White Wall and BounceBack.

BigWhiteWall.com is an anonymous service that offers mental health support from both peers and professionals. There are also courses and tips on managing mental and physical health and the service is moderated by professional counsellors.

BounceBackOntario.ca is a platform to help people aged 15 or older learn new life skills to help

Just what are Manitoulin long-term care homes doing to ensure residents' safety?

'A call to The Expositor to find out this and more'

The extraordinary times we are now living in today compels me to attempt to have this letter approved by the editor, printed in the next available spot in The Expositor and shared with the public.

In the recent words of Doctor Bedard, one of our local 'tips of the spear' in the fight against COVID-19 to protect our citizens, "Please bear with me folks as I have to give you the background so you can understand the rest of it."

As a lot of you may or may not know, I am retired from a long career in long-term care (LTC) nursing and have ined a staunch advocate for LTC ers and this is not the first letter that I write in regards to LTC in Ontario. Most of you will also know that I have never hidden my political feelings or party affiliation. Just shortly before the last federal election I submitted a letter to the editor of The Expositor. The letter contained a lot of the same subject matter that I always touch on in both the political arena and from a long-time LTC worker's experience and perspective. After noticing that my letter was not being printed I emailed the editor of The Expositor to inquire as to why. The editor emailed me back telling me that my letter was "full of liable" and that the paper had been contacted by a lawyer about my libelous letters. I will not delve any further into that aspect of the letter other than to highlight a particular issue which I had spoke about in a previous letter which The Expositor had printed. Again, I ask that you bear with me while I give you the background to that issue which will help you fully understand the rest of my letter.

My issue was with the newly appointed Conservative Minister of LTC in Ontario, Merrilee Fullerton. I cannot tell you directly what my issue was with the minister as this is something the editor refused my letter on, so what I will do is give you some facts from accredited media outlets and then some information on what she has just done in the LTC sector, citing COVID-19 as the reason: The following are statements made by Merrilee Fullerton as reported by the Toronto Star: Islamic radicalism is usually not in the first generation of immigrants or refugees; that is most dangerous in their second generation; she

tweeted advising people to watch a march by thousands of anti-Islam PEGIDA members in Dresden, Germany; she called the home of 20,000 Muslim immigrants "The Ghetto" (it was the Rosengard housing area in Sweden); she railed against a "wear-a-hijab" day in Ottawa; and her blog on Squarespace entitled 'Doctors as Terrorists' where she insinuated Canada should not allow any Muslim doctors in

Just the other day Minister Fullerton LTC announced sweeping changes to LTC in Ontario, citing COVID-19 as the reason. The changes eliminate long-held rules that pro-

The order removes training requirements for workers and eliminates the need for administrators to report complaints to the ministry

With high levels of COVID-19 in Ontario's LTC facilities, allowing untrained people to work on nursing in these homes will be a disaster, stated Jane Meadus, a lawyer for The Advocacy Centre for the elderly.

Infection control will be scary let alone all the complex issues LTC patients have which require properly trained nursing staff to look after.

The emergency order lists more than a dozen changed or deleted regulations! I will let the readers of The Expositor set their own thoughts on why I have an issue with Minister Fullerton being the minister of a sector that is responsible for the province's most vulnerable citizens. I need to say that over the past, The Expositor has done an excellent job of reporting on Island issues such as the changing out of the Swing Bridge, a Tim Hortons in Little Current and the attempt to save the Old School in Mindemoya, all of which I am sure are very dear to some Islanders' hearts. I certainly hope that The Expositor will embrace Ontario's LTC sector in the time of COVID-19 with the same zeal as the other issues of concern to all Islanders and with their usual high quality of investigative journalism. I'm sure they could produce a very informa-

To be quite blunt, while I am writing this letter LTC residents are dying of COVID-19 and LTC workers are testing positive for COVID-19! This is not fear mongering or being

over-dramatic on my part. Sadly, these are hard verified

At Pinecrest Nursing Home in Bobcaygeon, 24 residents have died of COVID-19 (as of press time Monday) and even more staff have tested positive for COVID-19. CTV News aired segment that showed a parade of townsfolk in their cars driving by the home to show their appreciation to the staff. Some staff came outside to watch and wave and the camera zoomed in on them and if you are a healthcare worker you would have noticed that in a nursing home ravaged by COVID-19 not one of those workers were wearing a N95 mask just plain old surgical masks! Eight residen dead in an LTC facility in Scarborough of the virus, four dead in an LTC facility in Hagersville of this scourge and it goes on and on!

Anyone who knows anything at all about the recent history of LTC in Ontario knows it is an extremely underfunded, under-equipped and understaffed sector. Minister Fullerton is complicit in causing the LTC crisis which has now become a provincial and national disaster! Minister Fullerton will have to answer some hard guestions: Why were an adequate supply of N95 masks not readily available for all LTC staff; and why was their such a shortage of all personal protective equipment (PPE) for LTC workers which forced them to go into harm's way with

CTV News interviewed a staff doctor from the Pinecrest Nursing Home and he stated that "The PSWs were basically beat right from the start" due to years of underfunding and staff shortages and from years of being grossly under-

Of course at the end of the day I guess it is completely up to The Expositor if they want to run a story on our local LTC facilities and their heroic staff who walk into harm's way every day because that is who they are and that is what they do.

Manitoulin man faces impaired driving charges

On March 30, members of the Manitoulin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service received a report of an older model Toyota 4-runner travelling eastbound on Hwy 540. The vehicle was reported to be operating with only two tires on one side and only rims on the other.

Members of both police services responded to the incident and after a brief pursuit, the vehicle attempted to evade police on a snowmobile trail and got stuck.

One of the occupants of the vehicle fled into the woods and the driver of the vehicle was arrested at the scene by a UCCM police officer.

Charged with operation while impaired, and operation while impaired over 80 mgs is Derrick Gary Leeson, age 31, of South Baymouth. The accused was released on an appearance notice for June 17 at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay.

The investigation is still ongoing and more charges are forthcoming.

The UCCM Police would like to remind the public that if they see a suspicious vehicle or suspected impaired drivers to please call 911 to report.

Manitoulin OPP arrests impaired driver

On March 24 at approximately 3:56 pm, officers from the Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP responded to a traffic complaint of a vehicle on Highway 6, Whitefish River First Nation.

Officers stopped the vehicle and it was determined that the driver had been consuming alcohol.

As a result, Jennifer Campener, 36 years old, from North Bay has been charged with operation while impaired, alcohol and drugs, and operation while impaired, blood alcohol concentration (80 plus).

The accused was issued a 90-day administrative driver's licence suspension and the vehicle was impounded for seven days. The driver is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on June 17.

The Manitoulin OPP would like to thank the public for its assistance with this investigation. We rely on the public to report crime and impaired driving is a crime that should be treated no differently. If you suspect that someone is driving or about to drive impaired, call 9-1-1 and report it.

Manitoulin OPP investigates collision

On March 27 at approximately 6 pm, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP responded to a motor vehicle collision involving an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) on Gore Street in Gore Bay.

The driver of the ATV was transported to the hospital with serious injuries.

As a result of the investigation, a 37-year-old from Gore Bay was arrested and charged with operation while prohibited under the Criminal Code (CC) contrary to section 320.18(1)(a) of the CC. The vehicle was impounded for 45 days.

The accused was released on an appearance notice and is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on July 9.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Northeast Town meets electronically for first time

Acknowledging the need for physical distancing in this time of the COVID-19 pandemic, council for the Northeast Town met virtually during its March 31 meeting for the first time, utilizing the Zoom video conferencing application.

To begin, council made an amendment to its procedural bylaw, Bylaw 99-36, specifically items 5-7: that members of council can attend council meetings through electronic methods and be counted toward quorum; that council can participate electronically in a closed meeting; and in the case of a 'declare emergency order' by the premier, "the cabinet or municipal head of council under the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act, members of councils, committees and local boards who participate in open and closed meeting electronically can be counted for the purpose of quorum."

Ventilator campaign

Council reviewed the letter from M'Chigeeng Ogimaa-kwe Linda Debassige requesting a donation toward the ventilator campaign for the two sites of the Manitoulin Health Centre.

"After speaking with our representative at the hospital and hearing the issues facing them, there may be better ways to support them. They have sufficient money to order the number of ventilators they need and can manage," Mayor Al MacNevin told councillors.

The mayor suggested council defer a donation and wait for a response from MHC "as to the best way they can help to battle the pandemic."

"I think we should wait and see exactly where we're going with this and hold off on it," said Councillor Bill Koehler.

"I concur to go with your plan and wait and see about requirements from the hospital," Councillor Barb Baker added.

"When the hospital requires something, we should assist them," Councillor Dawn Orr said, adding that the public needs to know this. The mayor pointed out that the press was on the call.

"We need to make it clear that the MHC

knows that we will step up where needed," said Councillor Michael Erskine.

"And that's what we're working toward with the hospital," the mayor said.

Councillor Bruce Wood said he "totally agrees" that council should wait and see what the hospital needs in terms of support with Councillor Laurie Cook also voicing her agreement.

"We're still too early into this pandemic and don't know how things will progress," Councillor Al Boyd said. "Certainly it was a good thing that Chief Debassige did and it seems she attained her goals."

EDITOR'S NOTE: Since this meeting was held, the Northeast Town has leased its recreation centre to the MHC as a COVID-19 sub-acute care centre.

Taxpayer financial relief

Council suggested three proposals for taxpayer financial relief: Extend the due date on all current and future charges for water/sewer and taxes to 90 days from 30 days. This will have the effect of eliminating interest on April 1 water/sewer bills and the second installment on the interim taxes for 90 days. This measure will provide NEMI residents with approximately \$40,884 in financial relief over the next three months. Interest would continue to accumulate on any balance that predated the COVID-19 outbreak; double the base amount of water permitted to be used from 45 cubic metres to 90 cubic metres per billing period (three months). This will provide \$45,000 of relief to the users on the system; and suspend all new tax registrations for the next three months.

The proposals were moved by Councillor Cook and seconded by Councillor Erskine.

Councillor Baker asked if council increased the water limit, would this push the municipality over its allowable limit as per ministry order. CAO Dave Williamson said it would not.

Councillor Jim Ferguson asked if the relief proposals could be extended if the pandemic goes on longer than anticipated.

"It's always at council's discretion and can be extended on past 90 days at council's will," Mr. Williamson explained.

'can we close the bridge?'

The mayor deferred to CAO Dave Williamson, who explained, "The municipality does not control the provincial highway or a provincial structure (the swing bridge)that authority resides with the province.

Mayor MacNevin said some communities have suggested having people at the bridge to hand out information about COVID-19 or even doing testing.

"If people were tested at the bridge, the people would have to be trained and we currently are facing short supplies of PPE (personal protective equipment)," the mayor continued. "It's not sustainable for the health care system and it's not sustainable for us.'

The mayor said it would be more likely that the province would institute a travel restriction for all Ontarians.

"I think it's clear that it's (COVID-19) already here, it takes weeks to show up, and we need to act as though it's

The Expositor contacted the Ontario Ministry of Transportation (MTO) for context into the possibility of a swing bridge closure to protect Manitoulin Island. Spokesperson Kristin Franks did not directly address the legality of citizen-run blockades, but said there were no provincial plans

already here," Mayor MacNevin added.

bridge at this time.

MTO is not a traffic enforcement agency, but Ms. Franks did state that the ministry urges all drivers to stay home except for essential travel. She added that essential services such as grocery stores, manufacturing facilities and gas stations will continue to be accessible to all Ontarians.

to restrict traffic on any provincial highways or the swing

To determine the legality of a citizen, or municipalityled screening checkpoint, The Expositor contacted the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). OPP is responsible for traffic enforcement on all provincial highways in the District of Manitoulin.

OPP North East Region spokesperson Carlo Berardi said that unofficial checkpoints would come with significant public safety concerns.

"Municipalities and/or volunteer organizations have no authority to conduct checkpoints (or) slow down traffic on any provincial highways," he stated. "The OPP encourages all Ontarians to voluntarily comply with the recommendations and Emergency Orders set out by the federal and

coming donations that will be used for those purposes.

Several donations of \$10,000 came in from sources including M'Chigeeng First Nation (which organized and launched the campaign), Sheshegwaning First Nation, Manitoulin Transport, The Douglas A. Smith Foundation, Corbiere/Wright Memorial Hockey Tournament, Little Current Lions Club, Bousquet Realty/Bousquet Family Holdings, Whitefish River First Nation, the Municipality of Central Manitoulin, the Township of Assiginack and Zhiibaahaasing First

Nation. Donors who agreed to be named at the \$5,000 level were the Town of Gore Bay and Marcel and Lucille Gervais. At the \$3,500 level were Stanley Park and Kim Moor.

MHC will be using the funds to purchase four LTV-1200 ventilators. These are well-known units that are a staple in emergency stockpiles across the United States and are well-used in health care settings across the continent. LTV-1200s, while not the largest or most intricate pieces of equipment, are known for their reliability; one American health care worker referred to the model as "the Ford Econoline van of medical air movement.'

LTV-1200s carry the brand names of several companies including CareFusion and VyAire and they are sold through many medical equipment resellers. The 1200s are a portable ventilator unit like the existing ones at MHC but they provide diverse functionality within intensive care units

Campground and JK Automotive's Joe as well as mobile applications.

MHC physicians and nurses are already trained on the LTV-1200, which is another advantage compared to bringing in an unfamiliar model. Once the units arrive, biomed will have to certify the units and then they can be put into operation.

The Expositor contacted a medical equipment supplier which had originally offered MHC a quote on these units, but that company declined to comment on any specific transac-

Some of the original correspondence indicated a usual delivery time of two to three weeks following order; however, this is the turnaround time under more 'normal' circumstances. Given the massive spike in global demand, those orders are expected to take longer to fulfill.

tems to fight off the virus.

"The goal, of course, is to make sure that we keep as many beds available at the hospital for those who are critically ill and who will need that expertise," said MHC president and CEO Lynn Foster.

The hospital site and arena were chosen in conjunction because they are physically close. This will enable a twoway patient flow between the locations—if a patient experiences severe symptoms at the SCC, Dr. Bedard will send them for more intensive care at the main hospital; if a hospital patient stabilizes and is no longer in critical condition, they will be sent to the SCC.

The Little Current arena is also fully heated and there are two separate ventilation systems within which will reduce the possibility of airborne contamination.

Admitting will take place in the upstairs portion of the arena, just outside of the large conference hall. That hall will be the main ward and a series of simple cubicles (built similarly to the internal walls at the Mindemoya COVID-19 test centre) will offer some privacy. Licenced contractor John Deforge has volunteered a crew to construct those

From the stage at the far end of the room, physicians and nurses will be able to look out over the whole ward and see if anyone is in need of assistance.

Next to the stage, also at the rear of the ward will be a designated "COVID-positive" staff area and washroom this means that the virus may exist within the area as opposed to a "COVID-negative" space that is separate from the patients.

Discussions were ongoing at the time of the tour about protocols for the space between the ward and the "clean" area, including the possibility of a three-stage "airlock" with different stages for employees to take off their personal protective equipment and decontaminate.

All patients will receive food at the SCC and M'Chigeeng Freshmart baker Pam Roy has offered her help, if needed, in the kitchen. The arena has two separate kitchen facilities, one on the second floor and one on the ground level, which will help to keep the COVID-negative and COVIDpositive areas of the building separate.

Patient washrooms are down the upstairs hallway past the Lions' Den and no patient showers are available. Downstairs, the curling club ice surface will be used for storage and as a morgue.

The dressing rooms near the main ice rink will be con-

verted into sleeping quarters for health care workers if they should need to stay on-site overnight. Dr. Bedard expressed his interest in staying there if demand at the

will then be stepped down to either home-based care or community-organized aid stations, if individual communities choose to set up these facilities. The lead physician at the SCC will also connect with those independent community-based recovery centres to offer information and


Oxygen delivery equipment is in short supply nationwide due to the pandemic but Manitoulin is well-positioned to handle the increased demand. The SCC is home to 12 large oxygen tanks that were on hand before the

"Supply of oxygen is not the problem; cylinders and regulators are the problem. But we've overcome that," said Dr. Bedard. "Thankfully we were ahead of it."

Oxygen flows through regulators between the tank and the patient. These are devices that take the massive amounts of stored pressure and reduce it to an adjustable amount that is safe for patient use.

Most regulators feed a single user. However, MHC has obtained triple-output regulators, meaning all 30 patients in the SCC can be oxygenated using only 10 tanks (theoretically leaving the remaining two to be refilled and ready to replace tanks as they run out).

Retired paramedic Bill Cranston recently devised a novel solution for patient oxygen delivery, which is discussed in further detail in the story on Page 1 of this newspaper, 'Island paramedic re-engineers snorkel masks...



video conferencing as much as possi-

"So our residents are still getting their regular weekly checkups," said Ms. Beam.

Staff and residents are having their temperature taken twice a day, with 38°C acting as the case directive. One of the bonuses of the lockdown regime is that there are actually less high temperatures than would normally be found among the population. "Basically, nothing is getting in right now and that is a very good thing," said Ms. Beam. "Right now I don't have anything in here."

On the downside, the increased isolation is having an impact on the residents' mental health and well-being, admitted Ms. Beam. But the Manor is taking steps, along with great community volunteers such as Wendy Gauthier and Linda Bowerman, to help lighten any mental duress being felt by the residents due to increased isolation.

'Our activities co-ordinator Julie (Omnet) has set up a Facebook page, ManorResidents, where we can do virtual meetings between our residents and their families," said Ms. Beam. "That's really one of the hardest parts for a lot of our folks."

A closed courtyard provides the ability to get some fresh air safely isolated from the general public and even entertainment is close, but not too close, at hand.

'We have some wonderful entertainers who have volunteered to perform outside, up on a rise well away from the residents but where they can still hear the music," she said.

The aforementioned volunteer cadre have marshalled local children to create a festive Easter montage, 'Hop into Easter,' on the lawns outside the residence with displays and posters and the residents have responded in kind with window decorations.

"Easter is going to be hard on a lot of the residents with families not able to visit," said Ms. Beam, but she said the virtual connections are working well and anyone is encouraged to pop by virtually to set up a meeting, even if you don't know any of the resi-

The Wikwemikong Nursing Home made the national news recently with a montage of photos of their residents holding up signs thanking people for keeping them safe.

Wikwemikong Nursing Home administrator Cheryl Osawabine-Nursing Home Peltier noted that all visitors are restricted from the residence, with a strict exception for palliative care. "We (residents and staff) are trying to keep busy and engaging in all kinds of stuff," she said. Her facility also shut its doors following the Ministry of Health directive on March 14.

"That includes our outside staff such as physiotherapists and our health professionals are doing virtual examinations," she said. "Staff were told 'stay home.' We are all under the same rules—don't even go to the grocerv store. We are ordering in groceries for the staff with our suppliers. You don't need to be wandering around a grocery store unless it is absolutely necessary."

The nursing home is also facilitating virtual visits and has been incorporating a lot of hitherto unfamiliar technology in order to maintain family connections.

"We are using Zoom (a popular video conferencing platform)—oh-so many Zoom meetings, I have never had so many Zoom meetings-and Facetime, Facebook Live,' said Ms. Osawabine-Peltier. "My assistant is fairly young and she has hooked us up with TikTok (a social media platform very popular with youth)."

"Meeting the directives coming out to protect nursing home residents is a constantly moving target," said Ms. Osawabine-Peltier. "It is changing daily for long-term care."

When it comes to new residents, the home is accepting them, but while at first they were told there was no need for isolation, now the protocol is a full 14 days of isolation.

A lot of the new rules are very difficult to implement, Ms. Osawabine-Peltier admitted. "Especially for the residents with dementia and at mealtime. They want to come in to the dining room and it is hard to stop them.'

Ms. Osawabine-Peltier encouraged those outside the residence who want to help to write and connect through letters. "Anything like that, kids sending pictures, it really helps to lighten the day. I was looking at an 'adopt a grandparent' program I saw a while back and maybe we can get that going too. A lot of our residents really enjoy letter writing, so you could become a pen pal to brighten someone's day.'

The Expositor also reached out to Jarlette Health Services, the company that runs Manitoulin Lodge nursing home in Gore Bay, but did not hear back by press time Monday.



she said. In times like this, with families being forced to stay out of the community as much as possible, with layoffs and job uncertainties and tensions higher than normal, women know what they need to do to maintain their safety, which is a frightening thing, Ms. Hall said.

According to the Gender and Disaster Network, following Hurricane Andrew in 1992, calls to domestic abuse hotlines in the Miami area increased by 50 percent and more than one-third of 1,400 people surveyed in the city reported that someone in their home had either lost verbal or physical control in the two months following the natural disaster. Studies following Hurricane Katrina and the floods of Bangladesh show similar increased rates in intimate partner violence. The pandemic and natural disasters are similar in that there are increased rates of isolation, stressors and a decreased ability to seek help. "Desperate times can trigger certain situations."

If women reach out to the MFR crisis line, via text or telephone, there are still counsellors available to talk by phone, Ms. Hall said.

The executive director said that while people don't typically like to get involved in other people's family lives, she reiterated the fact that women and children are at a much higher risk for domestic abuse in times of community crisis and urged neighbours or other family members to be vigilant. "If you have a concern, this may be the time to reach out and report to police," Ms. Hall said.

"We know that this will be a very violent time for individuals and that there will be people in their homes being hurt," she continued.

...continued from page 3 condition is improving after 14 days may return to their usual activities but continue to practice physical distancing.

If someone with symptoms has to visit the emergency department at the hospital due to their condition becoming much worse, they must call ahead before entering the facility so that staff can take appropriate precautions.

Mr. Beckett has been in self-isolation since he first called the MHC self-assessment line and was advised to do so. He is living with his daughter who has not shown any symptoms to date

"I definitely think we should be doing more testing. How can we know that there's not any other cases on the Island unless we test?" he says.

The Expositor has contacted the ministry of Health for further clarification on its testing policies, but due to the high demand was unable to receive comment by press time Monday.

Anyone on Manitoulin Island who begins to feel symptoms of COVID-19 (mainly cough, shortness of breath, fever and sometimes a sore throat) should stay at home and call the MHC COVID-19 assessment lines at 705-368-2300 for Little Current or 705-377-5311 for Mindemoya. Once on the phone, press 1, then 4, then 1 again for the assessment centre.

Ontario provides electricity relief to families, small businesses and farms

TORONTO—To support Ontarians through the rapidly evolving COVID-19 situation, the Government of Ontario is providing immediate electricity rate relief for families, small businesses and farms paying time-of-use hydro rates.

For a 45-day period, the government is working to suspend time-of-use electricity rates, holding electricity prices to the off-peak rate of 10.1 cents per kilowatt-hour. This reduced price will be available 24 hours per day, seven days a week to all time-of-use customers, who make up the majority of electricity consumers in the province. By switching to a fixed off-peak rate, time-of-use customers will see rate reductions of over 50 percent compared to onpeak rates.

To deliver savings as quickly and conveniently as possible, this discount will be applied automatically to electricity bills without the need for customers to fill out an application form.

"During this unprecedented time, we are providing much-needed relief to Ontarians, specifically helping those who are doing the right thing by staying home and small businesses that have closed or are seeing fewer customers," said Premier Doug Ford. "By adopting a fixed, 24/7 off-peak rate, we are making things a little easier during these difficult times and putting more money in people's pockets for other important priorities and necessities"

The Government of Ontario issued an Emergency Order under the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act to apply the off-peak time-of-use electricity rate for residential, small business and farm customers who currently pay time-of-use rates.

"Ontario is fortunate to have a strong electricity system we can rely on during these exceptional times, and our government is proud to provide additional relief to Ontarians who are doing their part to stay home," said Greg Rickford, minister of Energy, Northern Development and Mines.

"We thank the Ontario Energy Board and our partners at local distribution companies across the province for taking quick action to make this change and provide immediate support for hard-working people of Ontario," said Bill Walker, associate minister of Energy.

"There is room at the shelter and we have created a system whereby we stay open to those at high risk," Ms. Hall added.

So far, MFR has not seen an increase in calls for domestic violence, but they have fielded calls from women outside of the region looking for a bed in the shelter for reasons of homelessness and shelters at capacity in their area. In these cases, MFR staff direct them to the appro-

priate resources in their area.

"Things are quiet, but it's an eerie quiet," Ms. Hall continued.

The following day, Wednesday, when the paper hits the newsstands, Mr. Erskine and radio host Eric Hare and technician Erica Hare connect by telephone. Mr. Erskine reads the English version of the news item, followed immediately by Mr. Hare speaking in Anishinaabemowin. When Mr. Hare says "nahow (okay)" that signals Mr. Erskine to continue reading the news items.

"It seems to be working pretty slick so far," said Ms. Beam.

Ms. Beam notes that the newscast helps move in the direction of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. "Indigenous people have and need the right to be in control of their own media," she said.

The challenge for many Indigenous communities is their relatively small

populations and the vast number of individual dialects involved.

"Even here on Manitoulin Island and along the North Shore there are different ways of speaking," said Ms. Beam. "Wiikwemkoong has their own dialect, which is different than Sagamok or M'Chigeeng. There are a lot of variances." So Gimaa Radio's reach, even though they are online, tends to be very localized and involve small audiences.

By having the news, local news, broadcast in Anishinaabemowin Ms. Beam said she hoped to encourage more use of the language in everyday interactions and conversations. "We are hoping to bring the language into the community in a very relevant way," she said. "We are not seeing language acquisition taking place in the community, even though we have children in language emersion, it seems to be more linked to ceremony and

culture."

Like Latin became?

"Yes, exactly," she said. "We need to build active speaking. We can't just leave it on the shelf."

Despite being extremely widespread for literally thousands of years, Latin became an esoteric and specialized language used primarily for ceremony and, to some extent, scientific discourse—soon to be supplanted by the more common tongues in use. A case of use it or lose it.

"We can't allow ourselves to put it (Anishinaabemowin) on the shelf and just take it down to dust it off for ceremonies and special occasions," she said. "It has to be a living and breathing thing."

Part of that endeavor is to harness technology and incorporate it into the process.

...continued from page 1 physician at the hospital's temporary sub-acute care centre (SCC) which is set up at the Little Current-Howland Recreation Centre.

The base for these contraptions is a full-face snorkel mask. The entire face area is enclosed and there are separate internal chambers for mouth/nose and the remainder of the face. A built-in snorkel extends out of the top of the mask to a top-mounted intake.

"The advantage of this is it's all a one-way system. There's three one-way valves in here," said Mr. Cranston.

Just as purpose-built oxygen masks have reservoirs between the oxygen supply and the patient, so too do these masks. Oxygen is brought in through the snorkel, stored in a reservoir around the eyes and inhaled through a one-way valve into a chamber around the mouth and nose. Exhaust air is exhaled through another one-way valve out the front of the

It is important to note that the snorkel mask technique has not been tested for its efficacy, nor has it been approved by Health Canada. However, given the unprecedented circumstances, Dr. Bedard said it was a lot better than noth-

Dr. Bedard said the masks could also be useful for care staff because the same 'barrierbac' filter that would be put on patients'

exhalation valves could be attached to the air intake. Since it is at the top of the snorkel tube, all incoming air for the physician would be up and away from the patient's face.

Dr. Bedard and Mr. Cranston believe hospital staff could also wear N95 respirator masks underneath the snorkel mask as an extra layer of protection. Mr. Cranston experimented with wearing an old surgical mask under the snorkel setup and said it still performed as designed.

Using the modified snorkel masks will hopefully extend the lifespan of

personal protective equipment such as N95 masks. Last week, MHC emergency preparedness committee representative Dr. Maurianne Reade issued a call for physicians to save their N95s in biohazard bags pending the possible implementation of sterilizing techniques.

Each of the replaceable barrierbac filters can be used for 24 hours and are easy to change once their useful life has expired. Because the masks themselves are designed for snorkelling, they can be submerged in a tub of soapy water and scrubbed

to kill the virus.

Mr. Cranston said he was still investigating whether or not the masks could be sanitized using UV light or whether it would harm the plastic, but he suspected that the masks' intended purpose of outdoor snorkelling would likely mean they use UV-safe plas-

A spin-off benefit of the snorkel mask setup is that it prevents the wearer from accidentally touching their face, which is one of the main ways the virus is presently known to enter one's body.

One issue Mr. Cranston was still working on at the time of his brief demonstration was creating a good seal for mask users with glasses. For users without glasses, though, Mr. Cranston demonstrated the natural tight seal of the mask. With his assistant Dr. Bedard plugging the intake hole, no air could be heard seeping through and the mask was suctioned tightly to Mr. Cranston's face.

Those leading the Manitoulin Island COVID-19 effort have placed an order for 40 snorkel masks which will be retrofitted for use if and when traditional oxygen delivery options cannot keep up with demand.



"Certainly, water levels are high," Frank Seglenieks, water resources engineer with Environment Canada, said in a Thursday interview. "Unlike last year where other Great Lakes hit records, Lakes Michigan-Huron didn't."

Lake Huron was eight centimetres above the record high in January, 14 centimetres above the record high in February and eight centimetres above the record high in March.

Lake Huron is "a full 90 centimetres above average—that is pretty crazy,' Mr. Seglenieks admits.

"Moving forward, this is when we typically see a rise," he continued. "If we see our typical rise, from now to mid-summer, we will be in record territo-

Mr. Seglenieks said a 'typical rise' is between 25 and 30 centimetres, but that all depends on the amount of precipitation Lake Huron will see between now and June.

He noted that snow was "relatively average" for Lakes Michigan-Huron this year, but due to temperatures, warmer precipitation often fell in the form of rain, which helped to raise levels over the winter months.

Mr. Seglenieks said he and his fellow Environment Canada engineers are concerned about what is yet to come.

"We're trying to get the word out that people should be prepared, especially during high winds. High water, combined with storm events, can mean increased flooding and erosion."

Mr. Seglenieks said Environment Canada has been reaching out to conservation regional authorities, those with "boots on the ground," to help spread the word.

On Manitoulin, the "boots on the ground" organization is Manitoulin Streams whose project manager Seija Deschenes offered some advice for Islanders on dealing with high water.

"Manitoulin Streams would like for people to be aware of the higher water levels especially as families are trying to get outdoors during self-isolation," Ms. Deschenes told The Expositor. "Higher water levels may cause additional erosion along the river banks or shorelines and we wouldn't want anyone slipping into the cold water."


"Higher water levels and stresses put on our local watersheds from climate change reinforces that our restoration work is extremely important," she continued. "We appreciate the continued community support toward our restoration efforts. A lot of spawning occurs during in the spring (rainbow trout, walleye, etc.). Preventing erosion and

sedimentation from occurring over critical spawning grounds is important otherwise the sediment will cover the fish eggs and could impact their survivability."

Ms. Deschenes offered the following tips for those looking at ways to help prevent erosion from occurring along their waterfront properties: "We would suggest planting trees or shrubs along the shoreline so that the roots take hold and keep the soil in place. The trees are also great at absorbing nutrients (phosphorus, nitrogen, potassium etc.) before it enters the water system.'

In the Northeast Town, council approved FedNor funding of \$196,500 to allow dockage to continue at its downtown Little Current piers.


The climate adaptation funds will be used to raise the dock at the weir to accommodate cruise ship tenders (although the municipality does not expect any this year because of the COVID-19 pandemic), raise the dock in front of Wally's Dock Service (on the downtown dock) for fuel service, purpedestals chase upgrade the electrical to accommodate high water, install new ramps for all five finger docks, and place stone along the dock edge to control wave action and prevent ero-

...continued from page 8 provincial governments in an effort to reducing the spread of COVID-19."

Another controversial topic has been whether seasonal residents should be allowed to visit their Manitoulin properties, when their permanent addresses are located elsewhere. On March 27, Ontario Premier Doug Ford said mayors

have also been urging people to stay at their permanent residences to help contain the spread of the virus, including federal Chief Public Health Officer Theresa Tam.

But while these are logical viewpoints that should be followed to avoid spreading the virus and further straining the health system, many cottagers have rejected those pleas and clear that people can spread this virus without showing signs or symptoms. If you're feeling good, you'd feel like you could go to the cottage but that can be really dangerous," said Township of Billings Mayor Ian Anderson.

"Not a single leader anywhere in the world wants to discourage tourism and hurt the local economy," said Mayor Anderson. "We

from rural Ontario, especially in 'cottage country,' were having a hard time supporting their yearround residents when seasonal visitors come to town.

"The retail stores don't have the vital essentials to keep the people that live up there all year round (supplied), and also the hospitals—they don't have the capacity we do in urban settings," said Premier Ford, who added that he was personally staying away from his Muskoka cottage.

Public health officials

vowed to come to their seasonal residences anyhow. Under Ontario's state of emergency declaration as it currently stands, there is no way of enforcing seasonal residents to stay put despite Canada's chief public health officer urging everyone to remain at their


main homes.

"Right now, staying (at a primary residence) is voluntary and we're hoping people will pay attention to it. I believe a lot of them will but these are interesting times and it's becoming

have simply been enforcing what the federal and provincial governments have been telling people for weeks; that is, to stay within their principal residence and follow all (physical distancing) guidelines."

A recent meeting of the Manitoulin Municipal Association revealed strong agreement among Island communities that seasonal residents should avoid visiting Manitoulin until public health officials say it is safe to do so.

Councillor Cook said she still has a concern about the interest rate and said she would like to revisit a motion she made at a previous meeting to put a moratorium on water rates interest, which had been defeated at that time.

'We looked at it from the point that we don't want to disadvantage anyone who's already paid their taxes," the CAO said.

"I'm just very happy we're doing something for the taxpayers," Councillor Cook responded.

What about the extra amount of water being put into the lagoon?" Councillor Koehler asked.

"It won't change dramatically," Mr. Williamson responded, adding that the municipality is prepared to undertake an early discharge.

It was decided that the start date for non-accumulating interest would be in effect as of the meeting date, March

FedNor funding

Council received word that it had received \$196,500 in FedNor funding for climate adaptation, which will be used toward downtown dock infrastructure to maintain access during times of high water levels.

A motion was made to approve the funding. (Please see more on high water levels on Page 1 of this newspaper.)

Mayor's update

Mayor MacNevin shared that he and Mr. Williamson have been involved with weekly phone calls with the Island emergency health committee comprised of municipalities, First Nations and other community health organizations.

The mayor noted the hospital's personal protective equipment (PPE) drive, the need for test kits and spoke of the two COVID-19 assessment centres.

The mayor told council he also sits in on a weekly Public Health and Sudbury District meeting.

"I think all of us can be helpful in turning people to the Expositor who will pair people up with volunteers," Mayor MacNevin said of the community's vulnerable citizens. "We have also released some press releases when there is new information."

Councillor Cook asked at what point does a municipality declare a state of emergency.

The mayor explained it's a tricky question to answer but that such a declaration needs to be made by the mayor in conjunction with other community services and, of course, council.

"We would do so if there were not sufficient resources to manage the state we're in," he explained. "I would say we're not in a state to not be able to handle what's happening, but as soon as that does happen, we would consult the emergency planning people.

Staff report

Mr. Williamson reminded council that municipal staff are working in 'pods,' which means no mingling of Sheguiandah and Little Current public works crews or 'upstairs and downstairs' municipal staff in the downtown Little Current municipal office.

He again noted that roads, garbage and water are the Northeast Town's priority and, as such, the landfill hours have been extended to Sundays effective immediately. The extended hours are designed to help people social distance with their choice of three landfill days per week (Tuesdays and Saturdays are the other days). Mr. Williamson noted that at this point, there has been no issue with people gathering together at the landfill.

Additional bins have also been placed in the downtown core.

'It's spring so we're dealing with 'percolating' roads," the CAO said.

He noted that all the parks and trails in the municipality are now closed by provincial order, including the Cup and Saucer, which encourages visitors to stay away.

Mr. Williamson spoke about the issues with the downtown Little Current sewage lift station which saw both pumps fail due to residents flushing improper items such as wipes, gloves and paper towels.

Councillor Ferguson commended staff for ensuring

that essential services in the municipal are being looked after to the highest standard during this time. "I'm happy we've taken the stand that we're going above and beyond. Great job, thank you."
