Manitoulin votes 2018

West End acclaims councils while east Island opts for vote

MANITOULIN—The race is officially on for the 2018 municipal election on Manitoulin and Killarney and while Western Manitoulin residents generally seem content with their municipal affairs and councils have been acclaimed, it would seem the same can't be said for part of the eastern region of the Island where many of the electoral races are competitive ones.

Gore Bay, Gordon-Barrie Island and Burpee and Mills have all acclaimed their councils. In Gore Bay, businessman Dan Osborne, a councillor on past terms of council, has been acclaimed as mayor. His council is made up of Kevin Woestnerek (incumbent), Aaron Wright, Paulie Nodecker, Patricia Bailey, Leanne Wostenenk and Ken Blodgett (incumbent), all acclaimed.

Gordon-Barrie Island's council was also acclaimed with incumbent Reeve Lee Hayden remaining in office. Reeve Hayden's council

Rainbow Board's dismissal of Trustee Killens outrages ratepayer group at town hall meeting

MINDEMOYA—A substantial crowd arrived for a "town hall meeting" at the Mindemoya Community Centre last Wednesday night, July 25. At the front of the hall vacant chairs were placed facing the audience, each bearing a photograph of one of the

trustees of the Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) that had been invited to the event—except the chair occupied by Manitoulin Trustee Larry Killens.

It was clear from the outset that the majority of the audience in attendance had come to the meeting in a show of support for

Trustee Killens. Trustee Killens was recently sanctioned by the RDSB and banned from attending any board or committee meetings.

Small white laminated signs festooned the walls of the hall bearing slogans such as "Bring Larry Killens back," "Down with Dewar," "Larry Killens is Mani-

toulin's Voice" and "Manitoulin is not the RDSB's poor cousin."

Town hall meeting organizer Jason Chandler opened the meeting with a statement that "nobody put me up to this," followed by a detailed description of the chal-

Knox United would welcome Burns Wharf Players

MANITOWANING—Burns Wharf Theatre Players' fans were disappointed to learn that the 2018 season of the popular community theatre troupe had been cancelled, but Gilbert and Sullivan fans can now rejoice, plans are already afoot for the 2019 season.

"There will definitely be a show in 2019," said Marilyn Wohlberg, co-chair of the Burns Wharf Theatre committee. "The Knox United Church has offered their sanctuary up until the time that the Burns Wharf Theatre is repaired."

To be sure, the troupe has not given up on their namesake venue. "No, heavens no," said Ms. Wohlberg. "We are still trying to get the township to submit funding applications. We are very, very hopeful."

The committee already has architect's drawings for the work that needs to be done on the Roller Mills building to meet the building code criteria and accessibility issues necessary to take to the stage in the heritage buildings on the Manitowaning waterfront.

(Note: all donations over \$20 to the building fund will be issued a tax receipt from the township.)

The Burns Wharf Theatre Players will also be approaching the Debajehmujig Storytellers to see if they may be able to work something out for next season.

"We were not able to use the Creation Centre until late in the summer, early fall," said Ms. Wohlberg. "That wouldn't really

work out. Hopefully, we can work something out next year because it would mean a lot less adjustments would have to be made with the church."

If the church is to be the temporary home for the theatre troupe, the company would need to expand the altar area for use as a stage, install the company's lighting and sound equipment in the church and put air conditioning

into the building as well. "The Debaj space would be a lot easier," said Ms. Wohlberg.

The theatre company had already had two or three rehearsals for a reprise of the popular 'Pirates of Penzance,' with new leads, before discovering that the Debaj space would not be available and by the time a potential

Federal minister announces nearly \$5 million in funding for Anishinabek education

M'CHIGEENG—Funding of nearly \$5 million for an Anishinabek education support program is coming to Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI), following an announcement by federal Employment, Workforce Development and Labour Minister Patty Hajdu.

“Your turn is coming to run this country, and I want to leave it in a better place than where it is right now,” says Minister Hajdu, addressing the Anishinabe youth ambassadors standing behind her during the announcement. The funding comes from the Skills and Partnership Fund under Employment and Social Development Canada.

Mshiigaade Miikan, or The Path is Clearing, is a program that will enable over 270 Indigenous youth and adults to attend school who might otherwise have

difficulty getting an education. Its overall goal is to “increase the employability and labour market readiness for aboriginal/Anishinabek youth and adult members,” according to a KTEI newsletter.

“I see this as going to help out a lot,” says KTEI Elder-in-residence Josh Eshkawkogan. “The program is a stepping stone to whatever that is we need to do to help our people, to understand not only First Nations people, but Manitoulin in general.”

Following the announcement, Elder Eshkawkogan led current students and guests through a lesson on community in the recently built traditional teaching lodge.

The courses within Mshiigaade Miikan are focused on the apprenticeship sectors of skilled trades, hospitality and tourism and early childhood education. KTEI Director of Operations Brenda Francis says the program differs by pro-

viding more support outside the classroom.

“The significant difference with this program is the participants will be compensated as

they're trained,” says Ms. Francis.

Minister Hajdu mentioned at length that Indigenous and other marginalized individuals often

lack the ability to attend school because, among other barriers, they may have to work to support themselves, may be raising chil-

Eliminate the use of Garlon for removal of trees and shrubs, say petitioners

MINDEMOYA—Manitoulin Island is known for its beauty and pristine waters. A group of concerned citizens is advocating for municipalities to regain control of herbicide use, in particular the use of Garlon on roadsides and Hydro One right-of-ways, in order to “avoid more chemicals in our water and food supply,” said Square Bay resident Petra Wall.

Ms. Wall spoke recently to Central Manitoulin's Safety Security and Health Committee. “I'm afraid of the long term effects of Garlon spraying,” she said. “I am asking

Central Manitoulin to put something in place. I am asking you (the municipality) to consider publishing a statement in lieu of an herbicide control bylaw which would state, ‘Central Manitoulin is opposed to utilities and ministries or agencies of other levels of government spraying herbicides within its jurisdiction purely for vegetation management purposes.’”

Ms. Wall asked Hydro One to “consider hiring and training students or other Islanders to cut down short trees and shrubs in the summer to give them work and discontinue the use of pesticides and herbicides.”

Councillor and committee chair Linda Farquhar suggested that someone draft a petition and canvas Central Manitoulin residents as to whether they are concerned with Garlon spraying in the municipality. Ms. Wall agreed to start the petition.

The petition states, “We are asking the provincial government to allow communities to regain control of chemical spraying on ‘rights of way’ for Hydro One. Central Manitoulin will be part of a coalition with Tehkummah, Billings and Assiginack that will seek to declare the munic-

Uprooted: a story about how a teaching assignment turned into the ultimate field trip

Author Joan Sparling will attend a book signing event in front of The Expositor offices in Little Current this Saturday, August 4 from 12 pm to 2 pm

MANITOULIN—In August 2005, Joan Sparling Migwans uprooted her children when she accepted a teaching position at an international school in Aleppo, Syria. Her book, ‘Uprooted’, tells how they “lived and travelled in a world outside their comfort zone, where they were challenged with different languages, religions, customs, monetary systems, climate and general world view.”

Ms. Sparling Migwans had always wanted to travel around the world with her children, she explained. Having heard from other people about their good experiences, she submitted her name with Search Associates, a search site for teachers seeking international opportunities. “Usually it was one teacher, one child,” she said, “and I had four.” That didn't

matter to ICARDA International School of Aleppo, which offered her a position teaching Grade 1 at their school. The offer came in May 2005; by August, Ms. Sparling Migwans and her three younger children, aged six, eight and 13 years, had arrived in the “hot, hot, hot” city of Aleppo. Her oldest daughter stayed behind to attend university but did visit Syria.

“The kids were a little excited, which surprised me,” said Ms. Sparling Migwans. “My 13-year-old was a little worried about social stuff but was still looking forward to meeting other people. The younger ones had each other. Eight-year-old James looked up Syria on a map and told us what we were in for: a desert city near the border of Iraq; a good central location for travel to surrounding areas.

Travel they did. The family visited Turkey, Lebanon, Egypt, Italy, Jordan and Greece. “It was the ultimate field trip,” said Ms. Sparling Migwans. “Every chance we got we took road trips, generally with other English-speaking expats in our caravans of the same white Volkos. The camaraderie with all the other expats was very enjoyable.”

They often visited the beaches of Turkey; once they enjoyed a luxurious camping trip with Bedouins in the desert. Another time, the Sparling Migwans family went on a cruise on the Nile River with another of the Aleppo families.

Six months into her two-year teaching contract, the family endured a crushing culture shock, said Ms. Sparling

Following retendering, Assiginack fire hall will not proceed under current municipal council

ASSIGINACK—After a disappointing second round of retendering, Assiginack made the decision during special meeting held Thursday, July 26 that it would not proceed with the proposed new fire hall.

The first round of tendering saw two tenders come in at almost double the budgeted amount of \$800,000. Council met with its

engineers to find ways to knock the price down and re-tendered. During the opening of the latest tenders last week, the figures were still far too high, clerk-treasurer Jeremy Rody explained.

“Council felt that, although it was high on their list of priorities, due to the bids coming in high it would be put on the list for the next council in the hope that it goes through,” he told The Expos-

itor. “Council isn't comfortable with the timing either,” he added, noting the close proximity to the municipal election and lame duck period where no major spending is allowed.

Mayor Paul Moffatt said CAO Alton Hobbs is looking into how the engineering company managed to be so far off in their estimations.

“It's very disappointing,” the mayor said.

Currently, the fire hall operates from a shared space with Assiginack's public works department on Highway 6, across from the Ontario Provincial Police detachment. The current building is in need of repairs.

The fire hall was to be 4,160 square feet and host three bays

and be built at the corner of Arthur and Vankoughnet Streets (the northeast corner of the fair-ground lot) and would include two offices, a kitchenette/training room, one washroom and one barrier-free washroom, a bunker room, electrical room and compressor room. There was also to be a mezzanine offering 1,322 square feet of added space.

Make safety a full time community concern this weekend

Last year saw a significant jump in the number of fatal accidents taking place on Ontario roads, making 2017 one of the deadliest of the decade.

The August long weekend, known to those on Manitoulin generally as either Haweater Weekend or Wiky Powwow Weekend (cultural festival weekend has yet to catch on), provides a near perfect storm for potential tragedy as family and friends come together to enjoy the mid-summer weather, usually with far too heavy an overindulgence of sun and fun.

Mixing drugs or alcohol with any type of vehicle is definitely a very bad idea. This year, resist the temptation to go out on the water after having a few, let alone a few too many—and that includes non-motorized vessels. It goes without saying, but we are going to say it anyway, don't drink (or drug) and drive. It just isn't worth it when you stack up the potential to really ruin the day for everyone.

These days the temptation to tweet and drive must be added to the list of just plain don'ts. Never mind checking up on what everyone is

up to on Facebook or posting a party pic to Instagram, it can wait until you arrive or take a pit stop.

It can be done. It does take a bit of common sense (alcohol consumption is not the best environment to enhance that sense) and a bit of paying attention, what self defence instructors like to call "situational awareness." It doesn't mean you can't have fun, but look before you leap—in fact, quite literally. Diving headfirst into the water without checking for rocks is an all-too-common source of summer injury.

Accidents happen, but too often accidents happen that could so simply be avoided. Let's all work together this weekend to reverse recent trends and make this a "vision zero" moment. Vision zero is the Swedish concept that can be summarized in one sentence: "No loss of life is acceptable."

Have fun this weekend, but try to keep your wits about you and even be your brother's (sisters and non-binary specific) keeper, especially if they can't seem to manage to do so themselves. With a little bit of vision, we can have a vision zero weekend.

Young women show great courage under challenging circumstances

Gratitude expressed for standing up to share their stories in the face of great trauma

To the Expositor:

I want to thank Destiny Douglas and Brooke Williams-Manitowabi for sharing their harrowing stories of being sexual assaulted and the challenges that they faced in the aftermath. I am in awe of their courage, their ability to think clearly in the face of danger, and their choice to share their stories. I see both of these young women as trail blazers and life changers. Through breaking the silence, they shed light on the injustices victims of sexual assault suffer on Manitoulin Island and help encourage the necessary changes we need in our society.

As a registered social worker who worked as a sexual assault counsellor for two years at Manitoulin Family Services, I am encouraged by their ability to fight even when I know it would have been really easy to give up. It warmed my heart that their stories included how loved ones surrounded them and helped them find safety in situations that were traumatizing. I want to thank them for allowing readers to get a glimpse into the aftermath of re-traumatization; curling up, crying, and hiding away can very necessary parts of the process, especially with the psychological wounds they would have endured. Despite the grievous harm that they have both endured I can, through The Manitoulin Expositor's well written articles, see that both young women have strong spirits and the internal fortitude necessary to help guide them along their healing journey.

According to Statistics Canada, one third of Canadian women and over one half of Indigenous women have been sexually assaulted. Most women are sexually assaulted between ages 11 and 18. Likewise, one in five men have been sexually assaulted. Once a woman has been sexually assaulted, the possibility of being revictimized is high. Sexual assault can negatively affect a person psychologically, physically, and economically which sets in motion long-term collateral damage not only for the victim but also for her family, employment, future health and economic stability.

Common psychological issues that survivors experience include: an inability to trust their own perceptions, intense fear of rape-related situations, distrust of one's surroundings, inability to understand and express emotions, and reduced self-esteem. Common mental health issues experienced by sexual assault survivors include anxiety, depression, personality disorders, substance abuse, suicidal ideation, and

post-traumatic stress disorder. For anyone healing from the trauma of sexual assault, know that the path can be difficult, it can have some rather interesting twists and turns, and there are myriad of ways of walking it. Know that you have the right to your healing and to be heard. Trust your gut and don't ever be afraid to ask questions.

Over a year ago I left Manitoulin Family Resources so I could research how to lessen sexual assault and train further on helping people heal from trauma. I found some really interesting programs that could lessen sexual assaults by half, even for women who had been hurt before. Unfortunately, I could not find any evidence-based programs for Anishinaabek women. So, I devoted my master's thesis to developing one. I worked under the supervision of two local elders. Our preliminary model and program were shared with a focus group of local Anishinaabe helpers. Their findings can be found in my thesis which should be published this fall. My next goal is to find means to test and refine the model and ensure that within a few years, all Anishinaabe women could have access to the program that culturally relevant, evidence based and adaptable for their own communities.

All of this to say, there is hope, and sometimes, together we create it. Years ago, I worked with Dorothy Wassegiig-Kennedy to support a sexual assault talking circle at the Wikwemikong Healing Centre. In that space I offered sharings from western best practices and latest evidence to support women's wisdom. I do believe that sharing circles like this are an essential piece of sexual assault healing for some women. They help break the silence, offer information that helps break down rape myths and foster post traumatic growth. If any elder or agency would be interested in developing a healing circle program, I am available to help in any way. I am committed to assisting women who have been sexually assaulted along on their healing journey and to find means for lessening sexual assault on this beautiful island home that we share. Tenting a stand against evictions

BIRCH ISLAND—Whitefish River First Nation elder Mary Marie McGregor Pitawanakwat thought she had found a solution to her homelessness after being evicted by her brother three years ago from the house she asserts she was left by her parents, Violet and Archie McGregor, but after building a tiny house out of two sheds on the band property known as the Hawkin's Mill Site she received an eviction notice for trespassing.

"An Indian cannot trespass on an Indian reserve," asserts Ms. McGregor Pitawanakwat, who adds that she does not accept the jurisdiction of the non-Native courts. "They don't listen to me," she said.

In protest she erected a temporary tent in front of the band office to bring attention to her protest. "I am not going away," she said. "I am doing this for all of the other elders who have wrongly been evicted from their traditional land."

The band has offered Ms. McGregor Pitawanakwat alternate living arrangements, but she is adamant that she should not need to accept that offer. "I already own two houses," she said. "The one my parents left me and the one I built."

Three generations of resort owners greet three generations of clients

SHEGUIANDAH—When families of customers stretch back for five generations do they become family? Overhearing the banter between the Strain family, proprietors of Whitehaven Cottages, and the Durbins of Ohio, who have been coming to the resort on the shores of Sheguiandah Bay, a listener would be hard put to deny it.

Sixty years ago, Bill Durbin's daughter Sherrie was diagnosed with Guillain-Barre syndrome, a rare disorder in which her body's immune system was attacking her nerves. "It is a bit like polio," she said.

The battle for Sherrie's health took a heavy toll on the family, as it does with most families facing illness in a child.

"A group of men said to me that 'when she gets out of hospital, you need to take a vacation'," recalled Mr. Durbin, who will be 91 this coming September. "They talked us into coming up here for a week of fishing. That first year we stayed at Manitou Haven, with Jule and Edith Chisholm. We ended up bringing my brother up."

That is a theme that was to repeat itself over and over, throughout the years, as the Durbin convoy to Manitoulin grew nearly each and every year. "So mother and I, a brother and aunt were soon coming along, so I called up Whitehaven," recalled Mr. Durbin.

The Durbin clan soon made the move to

the more numerous cottages of Whitehaven. "At one point we filled nine of the cottages," laughed a now quite hale and happy daughter Sherrie. At that time the entire resort encampment consisted of 12 cottages. It was a real family affair.

"I even brought the mother-in-law up one year when the wife couldn't make it," laughed Bill Durbin. "She loved to fish. Been coming back every year, but one."

Aside from the people, it is the fishing that largely acts as a draw, enticing the Durbins to travel the 580 miles from their home in Piketon, Ohio every summer to settle into the cabins on the shores of Sheguiandah Bay, although Bill Durbin quite often makes it up again in the fall for a bit of hunting.

"Bill (Strain) takes me out duck hunting," said Mr. Durbin. "We go hunting too, Pop," pipes up Tom Durbin. But all agree, the family that fishes together dishes it out together. The comfortable teasing would be familiar to most families that get along well together.

The Durbin family stays at Whitehaven Cottages range from a single week, to as much as five, and sometimes are repeated a couple of times a year.

"We don't get together at Christmas or holidays," said Sherrie. "So we try to all make it up here during the summer." Sherrie has the longest trek of the Durbin siblings, hailing these days from Athens, Georgia.

"This was a really great place when Dave and Dorothy (Strain, Bill's parents) had it," said Mr. Durbin, shaking his head ruefully to a chorus of laughter. "That's when things changed."

"It changed so much we had to bring everybody," chimed in Kelly Durbin, one of Bill's sons. The other son on hand for the Expositor interview is older brother Tom.

Bill Durbin reaches into his pocket and pulls out a dog treat for Sam, the Strain's camp dog, lying comfortably at his feet. Sadie, the other red Irish setter works security, explains Laurie Stillwaugh, Bill Strain's daughter, who along with husband Matt are the new generation taking over the resort. "Sadie hides behind the tree and watches everyone who arrives, Sam just goes up to greet whoever is here."

"There are five generations who have come to Whitehaven," said Bill Durbin. "My mother has come with us and now my grandchildren come." This year there were 14 Durbins at the resort.

Although Bill Durbin worked for Goodyear in a high security uranium enrichment plant ("I never knew what my dad did when I grew up," notes Sherrie), most of the family works in the education field, a career they share with long-time Whitehaven proprietor Bill Strain. Mr. Strain was a teacher for 30 years. Matt and Laurie Stillwaugh are educators working in Sudbury.

Bill Strain, who is now well retired, was only 15 when the Durbins first began coming to resort. The families have literally grown up together.

So close have the families grown together over the past six decades that the Strains vacation home in Florida is across the street from that of the Durbins.

dynasty that shows no sign of ending. Good thing Matt enjoys presiding over the Saturday fish fry.

Bill Strain brings out a display of camp brochures taped to a framed corkboard. The Durbins feature in nearly every one. "There's Edith," says Laurie, pointing to a picture of a somewhat younger Durbin matriarch taken sometime in the 1970s.

Whitehaven was established circa 1948 as an indirect result of the quarry operation across the bay. "The accountant from the quarry called and asked if my father could build him a camp for the summer," said Bill Strain. One thing led to another and soon a small resort was in operation. "Dad decided to sell his trucking business and go into the camp business."

Matt and Laurie Stillwaugh have the fishing resort business (and teaching) in their blood, as they set out as the third generation of the family to operate the resort.

"We really grew up looking forward to our friends coming each year," said Ms. Stillwaugh. "We knew that when the second week of July was coming that this family would arrive, the next week it would be

"We are really impressed with what they do with that walleye club (the Little Current Fish and Game Club (LCFGC) operates a fish hatchery on the Whitehaven property)," said Tom Durbin. "We are very impressed with what they are doing with the kids." The LCFGC hold educational seminars each spring where students from local schools come to learn about conservation and the fish restocking program.

Bill Durbin recalls a story from when he first started coming to Whitehaven that illustrates why the family has returned every year.

It was a dark and stormy night, well, "a cold and drizzly day anyway," he recalled. They were returning to a dark camp after a long cold day fishing when they discovered that their cabin was warm and inviting. "Dorothy came out and said 'I hope you don't mind, I built a fire in your fireplace.' Attention to their client's comfort and well-being laid the foundation for a family

someone else."

Whoever was arriving, there would always be a friendly smile and a warm welcome waiting for them.

"There aren't that many left," said Mr. Strain of the resort operations in the area. A combination of high taxes and operating costs have taken their toll through the years. But the Strains and their children have managed to buck the trend and a large part of that is the relationships they have built with their clientele over the years, a family tradition that the newest generation is determined to uphold.

As we prepare to part ways, Tom Durbin whispers with a grin "ask Dad how his fishing compares to his grandson's."

Well?

"I haven't caught a single fish," he growls. But there's a twinkle that suggests he really doesn't mind, all, that, much.

Beaver Island

Beaver Island has been known for generations as America's Emerald Isle; settled in the 19th century primarily by Irish immigrants the Island's cerulean waters, beautiful forests, and verdant fields held poignant echoes of their distant homeland. That idyllic sense of place resonates just as clearly for present-day visitors and residents as it did for those early non-native settlers.

Located 51 kilometres off the coast of Charlevoix in Lake Michigan, Beaver Island is served by ferry and barge service as well as two airlines. With its rich hardwood forests, dense cedar swamps, dynamic dune landscapes, and secluded bogs and fens the Island houses an amazing diver-

sity of wildlife and plant species—some of which are endemic to small areas of the Great Lakes and found nowhere else in the United States. Migrating birds find in the archipelago an array of diverse habitats which serve as a critical stopover site and offer birders 12,000 acres of readily accessible public lands. The night sky itself puts on a brilliant show with a procession of celestial objects undimmed by mainland light pollution.

For those seeking to immerse themselves in history, Beaver Island's rich past includes not only an early Irish fishing community, but also vestiges of Native American

inhabitation, and the turbulent story of a doomed Mormon kingdom, along with a short but intense lumbering boom.

Today, islanders are proud to share their community's abundant resources with visitors. Two township boards govern Beaver Island while a long list of non-profit organizations support community missions. A Community Center provides year-round hospitality and events as well as housing WVBI, the only island-based radio station in the Great Lakes. Beaver Island Community School provides a quality education for Grades K-12. Health care is provided by the Rural Health Center, with two full-time nurse practitioners and a physician assistant, and a sheriff's deputy, volunteer fire department, and Emergency Medical Service provide for the safety of residents and visitors alike.

The Island's rich bounty of morels, blueberries, raspberries, cranberries and apples offer plentiful rewards to foragers, while the archipelago shorelines and seven interior lakes offer fishing opportunities and unparalleled water recreation for outdoor enthusiasts.

This sense of stewardship and pride runs deep among island inhabitants. A survey respondent during the recent master planning process cited the Island's "remoteness...history, tranquility...and unspoiled beauty" as reasons for living here. Indeed, many of the same attributes that made Beaver Island special 150 years ago continue to charm today. As they like to say, "Once you get sand in your shoes, you'll always want to come back."

Wiikwemkoong Cultural Festival on this weekend

WIKWEMKOONG—Beginning in 1960, the Grandmother of Powwows is 58 this year, and although it has long since expanded into a full blown cultural festival, the Wiikwemkoong Annual Cultural Festival is still one of the brightest jewels on the powwow circuit.

This year the festival has pulled in a heavy hitter master of ceremonies to complement Chris (the Pleasant) Pheasant, Ruben Little Head Sr., hailing all the way from Lawrence, Kansas.

This year's arena team includes arena director David Trudeau of Wiikwemkoong, head veteran Walker Stonefish of Walpole Island, head drum judges High Eagle Singers, head dance judge male Jesse Osawamick of Wiikwemkoong and head dance judge female Alanna Trudeau of Wiikwemkoong.

"We have a head staff that are all paid positions," noted Sheena Wassegijig, cultural coordinator with the Wikwemikong Heritage Organization (WHO), "but there are a large number of volunteers that handle the gate, admissions, raffle sales, medicines, smudging, tabulation, registration and trade booth. The volunteers rotate on a four-hour shift basis and there are more than 50 volunteers working over the three days. We basically operate from 10

am to 10 pm, but some people are still working after midnight."

The Cultural Festival is a real community effort bringing a host of cultural events and demonstrations unrivaled in the North. Unlike the community's traditional powwows, the cultural festival does not have a "theme" as such, but each year the festival highlights a cultural event and/or one of the dances.

"This year we are highlighting the hoop dance in the cultural forum," said Ms. Wassegijig. "Ascencion Harjo, the 2018 world champion will be giving demonstrations. He won the world championship in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He holds the same title as Wiikwemkoong's Lisa Odjig did. He is only 16 but has danced for the Indigenous Games and the Black Eyed Peas."

Lisa Odjig will also be

holding interactive workshops on the hoop dance, its background history and symbols for aspiring young dancers or those wishing to learn more about the form.

The art pavilion will return with Nikki Manitowabi presiding and there will be a focus on the Challenge for Change program, including a demonstration of the language app that helps link those wanting to learn more about the language with community resources.

The Miss Wiikwemkoong Pageant is also back, with outgoing Miss Wiikwemkoong Aurora Enosse-Ominika holding a going out ceremony and a coming in ceremony for her successor.

"As usual there will be lots of food and lots of crafts," said Ms. Wemigwans. And dancers, lots and lots of dancers, as

some of the best dancers from across Turtle Island will be in attendance vying for prize boards, most of which start out at \$1,000 and range down to \$500 for fourth. Teen categories start at \$300 and children from \$150. But the drum competition hauls in the chi-zhooniyaa with a top prize of \$5,000.

Rural Roots will be performing for the free Friday night social at Thunderbird park on August 3, from 4 pm to 8 pm, hosted by Wikwemikong Department of Lands and Natural Resources.

"The Wikwemikong Heritage Organization would also like to acknowledge generous fundraising contributions for this event made by Chase the Ace Wikwemikong Group," said Ms. Wemigwans.

This year will also see a strong emphasis on pedestrian safety.

"There will be no parking on the Kaboni Road, we are going to try and keep that as a pedestrian area," said Ms. Wemigwans.

The Wiikwemkoong Annual Cultural Festival is an alcohol and substance free event. Anishinaabe vendors only and there will be 24-hour security at the event grounds.

Daily admission is \$10 for adults, \$2 for children and an adult weekend pass is \$20. Children under 6 and elders over 65 are free. See the ad on page 8A-9A in this newspaper.

The fishing is hot for 3rd Salmon Classic

 MANITOULIN—As of press time Monday, it's only three days into the Manitoulin Expositor Salmon Classic, but the fishing, as organizer Dave Patterson puts it, has been "insane."

"It's three days in and already we have a few salmon over 20 pounds—you need over 18 pounds to make the top five," Mr. Patterson said.

"The fishing's been incredible on the south shore, and it's heating up on the North Channel," he continued.

Mr. Patterson, one half of the popular online duo the Ontario Fishing Guys, urged salmon anglers to use lures with greens and blacks. "They're consistently producing the most fish."

Monday, July 30 saw the biggest fish of the derby, so far, with 'Captain' Moe Gauthier of Screamin' Reels Charters, while out for a solo fish, hauling in a 21.09-pound salmon from South Baymouth.

Gore Bay got on the board on Sunday with the leading trout coming from the North Channel, a 20.23-pound lake trout courtesy of fisherman Rob Ouellette.

Meldrum Bay is also producing salmon, albeit smaller ones than the south shore. Mr. Patterson doesn't expect that trend to continue, however. "I expect the bigger fish to arrive in a week or so."

The first of the daily prize winners, which has been bumped to \$200, was Richard Brobent with his 18.84-pound salmon, also caught in South Baymouth.

As of press time Monday,

82 salmon and 39 trout had been weighed in. You can check out the leaderboard, which is constantly updated, at fishmanitoulin.com.

Mr. Patterson said he expects, with the way the fishing's been, the winning fish will be at least 27 pounds, "the first time for salmon that size since the decline."

"There's still lots of time to fish," Mr. Patterson added, urging everyone to get their lines wet. Tickets for adults are \$65, youth are \$35, and can be purchased at fishmanitoulin.com, at The Expositor and Manitoulin West Recorder offices, Up Top Sports Shop in Mindemoya, South Baymouth Marina, Trailside Sports and Fishy Fishy Bang Bang in Espanola, Moxie's Bait and Tackle in Lively and Ramakko's Source for Adventure in Sudbury.

 lenges that he faced in trying to deal with a family member's expulsion from school. That story was covered in detail in a previous edition of The Expositor. Mr. Chandler made it clear that he did not condone the actions of his family member, which he said involved posting something on the social network Snapchat. Mr. Chandler emphasized the post was clearly inappropriate, but called the expulsion and subsequent arrest of his family member during school hours in front of their classmates totally inappropriate.

Mr. Chandler then focussed on what he characterized as the Byzantine labyrinth of communications that took place between himself and the RDSB administration.

"I discovered that the first tool in the toolbox for the RDSB is a closed meeting," he said.

Mr. Chandler produced numerous slides illustrating documentation of those interactions, including policies, procedural documents, sections of the education act and copies of communications between himself and the RDSB. His presentation lasted around 45 minutes, but only displayed a fraction of the 230 pages of documentation he has amassed.

Trustee Killens was first mentioned by Mr. Chandler at the 32-minute mark of the presentation, when he noted that the trustee had assisted him with making connections—but never stepped outside of his role as trustee.

Among the documents that Mr. Chandler displayed was a "confidential draft." "I am not supposed to have this," he said. "But at this point I don't care."

Mr. Chandler alleged that the education director had held up a copy of a petition from the students at his family member's school that showed a low level of support for the expelled student. "That page only had nine signatures on it," said Mr. Chandler. "What he didn't hold up were the other six pages." Mr. Chandler then displayed the single page, followed by what he alleged were six pages filled with signatures (each of which had the names blurred).

Mr. Chandler described the interactions of the RDSB administration as "bullying" toward his family member and while the eventual resolution was reasonable, the process taking his family member out of school for over 150 days was, in his mind, totally unconscionable. Judging by the audience reaction, Mr. Chandler had made his case.

"If you have a kid in school, ask for their Ontario Student Record (OSR)," he advised. After one year a parent can ask to have any disciplinary note removed. "So it can't be used against them for years after." That is what Mr. Chandler alleged happened to his family member.

Mr. Chandler noted that after spending countless hours familiarizing himself with the Education Act and other relevant

regulations, essentially becoming something of an expert in board governance, he decided to run for the RDSB trustee position in Alban, where he now resides.

As for ongoing litigation and the cost of lawyers for those administrators involved in that litigation, Mr. Chandler noted that the board had delegated permission to the RDSB director of education to pay the school board employees' legal bills.

The raise being provided to the director of education was questioned, along with a reserve fund earmarked by the board for the cost of building a "bubble dome" sports facility in Sudbury—juxtaposed with the lack of late buses and adequate textbooks for Manitoulin students.

The next speaker was Dylan Gibson, who along with his wife had been banned from RDSB property. "My wife and I were tried and sentenced to a lifelong ban," he alleged. Mr. Gibson went on to describe six years of what he characterized as "incredibly disrespectful" interactions by the RDSB, which he attributed to his activities as an education advocate.

Mr. Gibson cited an interview with the RDSB in which he paraphrased the chair as saying "I know it says that in the policy, but that is not what we meant."

"Larry stood up to them," said Mr. Gibson.

"I never thought I would ever say this," quipped Mr. Gibson, "but if you want to

know my story, Google my name."

Mr. Gibson is also running for the RDSB trustee position, in the same district as the board chair.

Former Manitoulin Secondary School principal Gary Chandler (Jason's father) then spoke. "I am probably responsible for getting Larry off the board," he said, by way of explanation relating how, when he heard about the issues his relatives were having with the RDSB he said "call Larry Killens'."

Gary Chandler went on to say that he was "so proud of the way Jason defended my grandson and nephew."

Gary Chandler alleged that the timing of the police action smacked of collusion between the police and the board. He pointed out that there had been plenty of time between when the initial complaint about the Snapchat post had been made to the police and when his family member went to school on the following day to have made the arrest either before he left for school or as he got off the bus. Instead the arrest took place during class hours.

"They arrested a 14-year-old, took him out of school without his shoes, without his boots," he said. "It just doesn't make any sense to me."

"I think they did it to make an example, I think the school and the police colluded in this," he said. Gary Chandler's remarks drew strong applause from the audience.

"They don't care about kids," Gary Chandler said referring to the other board trustees. "Larry Killens cares about kids."

At this point an audience member asked Mr. Killens "how does anybody manage to piss off every other trustee on the board?"

"Good question," responded Mr. Killens. "The elephant in the room is the unanimous vote to remove me from meetings. In my opinion it was that I insisted on asking questions on your behalf. I ask difficult questions."

Little Current resident Mike Maciuk suggested that the RDSB trustees have become complacent and that they view the school board as "their business."

Ed Ferguson characterized the proceedings of the RDSB as a "Star Chamber" and acting with a complete lack of transparency. Mr. Ferguson's wife handed two \$50 bills to Mr. Killens, asking him to run for office again. (The money was intended as a donation to cover the \$100 application fee to run for office. Mr. Killens returned the bills to Mr. Ferguson at the end of the meeting.)

"Doug Ford should do the same as with these guys as he did with Ontario Hydro," suggested Mr. Maciuk. "Get rid of the guys at the top."

Mr. Killens was asked about the six "sanctions" mentioned in the motion that removed him from board meetings for the

Migwans. "Everybody wanted to go home. It was partly the lack of green. Being in a desert, I really missed the lakes and greenery of Ontario. I felt my body was dehydrated, but so was my spirit."

They pushed through it. "I had to," she continued. "I had a two-year contract. We had to buckle down." They travelled more, met more people. "I loved my job. I was in my element when teaching. I loved the environment and the students."

Knowing about the culture shock is important, Ms. Sparling Migwans feels. Refugees and people who are uprooted need a lot of support at that time, and not just during the initial move. It's part of the reason why she wrote 'Uprooted,' she said. "I want to tell people what it was like to be

uprooted and live in another culture."

She also wanted people to know how beautiful Syria was, how well everyone got along. The outbreak of civil war was "devastating" to hear about. "It doesn't seem to make sense," she said. "There is so much depth to it. I don't pretend to understand."

She doesn't try to make sense of the politics.

This book is for teachers or parents who are considering a similar journey. "There is something for everybody," said Ms. Sparling Migwans. "I have done readings for children in young grades right up to adults. At first I thought my audience would be women like myself, but that hasn't been it at all. For example, while doing a reading at Chapters in Sudbury, there were so many men who asked questions and bought the book." Many inquiries were related to regional politics, but most men were interested in the immigrant experience also.

Reintegration into life in Canada was not always smooth, according to Ms. Sparling Migwans. While communication and shopping was easier, "everything seemed quite ordinary and unexotic compared to the Middle East." Sharing how their world view had changed and "how there were different ways of seeing what is important in life"

helped to reconnect and reintegrate.

Soon after the family left Aleppo in June 2007, unrest broke out and eventually led to war in June 2010. The school where Ms. Sparling Migwans taught for two years closed its doors in 2012. Many of her Syrian friends became refugees or continued to live and die in Aleppo as the ancient city was destroyed around them. Ms. Sparling Migwans encourages Canadians to support and welcome Syri-

an refugees.

It was truly an uplifting experience for her family, said Ms. Sparling Migwans. "It truly was a profound opportunity that caused us to grow closer as a family, more compassionate and open to other cultures, more confident, more aware of our own biases and fears as well as our own strengths and what we each had to offer the world."

Ms. Sparling Migwans will be offering readings and book signings at Storyopolis in Kagawong on August 1 from 11 am until 2

pm, and on Haweater weekend in Little Current, in front of The Manitoulin Expositor office on Saturday, August 4 from 12 pm until 2 pm.

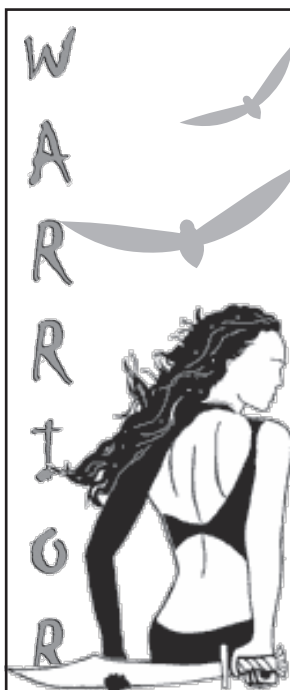

dren or struggling with addiction and mental health issues.

The funding is designed to help offset living costs, and provisions will be available for some childcare and transportation allowances.

“We don’t want them to be thinking about the expenses that they have to incur through other avenues like, like Ontario Works,” says Ms. Francis.

Minister Hajdu says programs such as this benefit the country as a whole.

“Canada can’t succeed unless every single person sees themselves as having a pathway,” says Minister Hajdu. “We can’t be a successful country if we leave a whole bunch of people behind.”

Elder Eshkawkogan has been part of the funding application process. He has worked to identify aspects of the curriculum where traditional cultural teachings would best fit into the apprenticeship-focused learning.

He says that while the funding is a positive aspect, the most important part of Mshiigaade Miikan is outreach to promote well-being among the community.

“It will make a big difference about identity, it will make a big difference in regards to understanding the history of who they are and how they can move forward,” he says.

Ms. Francis offers words of encouragement for the youth ambassadors. “You are examples of our people who are learning and are going to make positive impacts in our communities.”

Mshiigaade Miikan is a year-round program that students can complete on their

own schedule. KTEI expects to launch it in the fall and will hire four staff positions to support the program. The federal funding will last for three years, and the school hopes to renew the funding in 2021.

ipality ‘pesticide free’ for use of Garlon RTU and other Garlon variants and similar herbicides in vegetation management on Hydro One Rights of Way. Garlon RTU’s active ingredient is triclopyr. Knowledgeable scientists say its persistence in the ground is at least one year and they are not clear about the long-term effects of this chemical in our food and water

supply.”

It also states that, “Canadians have been kept out of the loop for too long. We have a right to clean air, water, soil and forests. We need to respect and protect this beautiful land and all of its amazing plant and animal life.”

“Central Manitoulin wishes to bring back the bees,” said Ms. Wall. “Part of that initiative is reducing chemical spraying of toxins.”

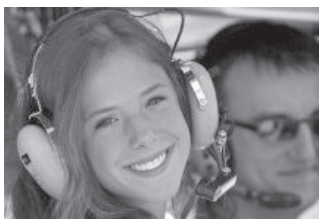

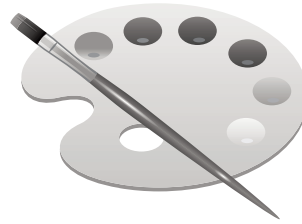

is as follows: John Turner, Marian Hester, John (Jack) Brady and Jack Bould (incumbent).

Burpee and Mills will see Reeve Ken Noland at the helm for another term with his council of fellow incumbents Wayne Lloyd Bailey, Arthur Hayden and Pentti Pallonen. New to the Burpee and Mills council table for 2018 is Martin Ainslie.

Cockburn Island's council has also been acclaimed with Brenda Jones serving as mayor and Robert Brown, Glen Cressman, Evan Papineau and Scott Stewart serving as councillors.

There are three running for the mayor's position in Billings Township with the news that Canada's longest serving politician, Austin Hunt, at age 92, will not be seeking re-election. Mr. Hunt has served 65 years in municipal politics, first elected to Billings council in 1953.

The three candidates for Billings mayor are Ian Anderson, Barb Erskine and Margaret Tuomi. Ms. Erskine has served on the previous council and Ms. Tuomi is also a former Billings councillor and, in fact, she previously ran for the mayor's position.

There are seven running to fill the four seats at the council table: Sharon Alkenbrack (incumbent), Bryan Barker, Paul Darlston, Michael Hunt, Sandi Hurcomb (a former councillor and a one-time challenger for the mayor's job), Sharon Jackson and Eric Parsons.

In Central Manitoulin, Mayor Richard Stephens has been acclaimed. There are contests in Wards 1 (Campbell) and 2 (Carnarvon). David Gilchrist, Angela Johnston and Derek Stephens (incumbent) are running for the two spots in Ward 1. John P. Bisailon, Dale Scott (incumbent) and Steve Shaffer are running for the two spots for Ward 2.

Linda Farquhar (incumbent) has been acclaimed in Ward 3. No other residents agreed to let their name stand for the second councillor in the Sandfield ward. The election for Ward 3 will open today, Wednesday, August 1, and will be open from 9 am until 2 pm—one day only.

In Tehkummah, two are running for the position of reeve: Ron Hierons and David Jaggard, who have both served on Tehkummah council, Mr. Hierons as part of the most recent group. There are four spots on Tehkummah's council table and nine candidates: Paul Bowerman (incumbent), James Fawcett, Jose Garcia, Karen Gerrard (the former clerk), Rick Gordon, Mary Catherine Johnston, Lorie Leeson (incumbent), Michael McKenzie (incumbent) and Eric Russell (incumbent, and reeve in the past term).

The Town of Northeastern Manitoulin Islands (Northeast Town) has two vying for the mayor's position: incumbent Al MacNevin and two-term councillor Melissa Peters.

Laurie Cook has been acclaimed in Ward 1 while Ward 2 has four candidates for the three councillor positions: Barbara Baker, Al Boyd, Michael Erskine (incumbent) and Cody Leeson.

Bill Koehler (incumbent) and Sean O'Hare are running election for the sole Ward 3 seat while in Ward 4, Jim Ferguson, Dawn Orr (incumbent), Paul Skippen (incumbent) and Bruce Wood (incumbent) are running for the three seats.

The Northeast Town has also produced Manitoulin's only two candidates for Rainbow District School Board trustee, Linda Erskine and Margaret Stringer.

Assiginack has the biggest race on its hands, with five running for mayor of that municipality. The candidates are Rodney (Barney) Deforge, Dave Ham (who has previously served as Assiginack reeve and councillor), Paul Moffatt (incumbent), Michael Phillips and Brenda Reid (who currently serves as councillor).

There are four seats around the Assiginack council table with nine candidates running in the election: Keith Harfield, Jennifer Hooper, Christiana Jones, Bill Lafleur, Rob Maguire, Dave McDowell, Hugh Moggy (incumbent), Joyce O'Connor and Tom Pudas.

In Killarney, there are two candidates for the position of mayor, incumbent Ginny Rook and Geoff Cosh.

As to his time on council, Mayor Hunt was philosophical. "Good things happen," he said, "but it always seems you are working from crisis to crisis in municipal government."

But over the more than half-a-century that Mayor Hunt has been in municipal government a lot has come to pass. "Oh there have been tremendous changes," he said. "Manitoulin has gone through many changes. Municipal government associations have gotten bigger and there are a lot more meetings to attend."

For much of his time in office, Mayor Hunt has represented the Manitoulin Municipal Association on the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities, and sat upon the governing body of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.

"Municipal affairs have come a long way in the last half century," he said.

Asked if there was anything still on the table that he was reluctant to step away from, Mayor Hunt demurred. "Not really," he said. "Over the years some things you win, some things you lose, if people are not ready to go along with you..."

But there is one thing Mr. Hunt did not hesitate to share. "I am happy to have contributed to the community in my own small way," he said. "It

...Silver Water man finds the secret of living the good life in his wood pile

 hardwood logs. She thought it could make a nice story. "It wasn't my idea (to do a story on the woodpile)," said Mr. Armstrong, putting his disclaimer in right from the start of the conversation.

The raw logs Mr. Armstrong started out with were mostly maple. "But there was the odd ironwood log in there as well. Maple is about the best, in my opinion, but the ironwood is pretty good too; just a little bit harder to cut."

The hardwood is destined to combat the winter's cold in the family's house, but when it comes to the small stove in his garage Mr. Armstrong said he prefers poplar. "It burns fast and it burns really hot," he said. The perfect thing to quickly take the edge off in the garage. "You have to put it in the stove more often," he admits, but that's all part of the fun of wood heat.

Mr. Armstrong retired to Manitoulin 30 years ago after leaving his job of 23 years as a funeral director in Port Colborne, but he was very familiar with the Island long before that. "We built the old hunt camp back in '78 on 100 acres," he recalled. But in 1986 he and his wife made the move to Manitoulin.

"My parents fell in love with Manitoulin in their early years when Dad used to travel there to hunt," said Ms. Fabiani. "When opportunity to purchase some property became available he set his sights on retiring as early as possible to live out his remaining years in what he refers to as 'God's Country'."

Travelling the eight to 10-hour drive from Port Colborne to Silver Water on weekends did not deter Mr. Armstrong's eagerness to start building their dream home to prepare for their move, noted his daughter. "With only a framed building to start, he completed the inside and built most of the furnishings bit-by-bit, piece-by-piece, weekend after weekend."

Once the house was complete, the couple made their move. "With only a few savings, he retired from his occupation as a funeral director in Port Colborne and he and my mother packed up their pickup truck with an attached trailer with only a few belongings and made the journey to start a new life on the Island. Picture the image of the Clampetts on the old sitcom 'The Beverly Hillbillies' and you can envision the scenario," she laughed.

Wood cutting, and piling, is certainly nothing new to Mr. Armstrong. "I have been cutting wood most of my life, it's something I pretty much have always done," he said. "I was almost born in the bush."

When it comes to working on the woodpile, Mr. Armstrong said that he really prefers to fly solo, but that a number of people tend to show up to help.

"They wanted to help cut the logs, but I made sure I had the cutting all done before they got here," he laughed. "So a few of the guys helped out with the splitting. They just couldn't believe someone my age can get it all done."

His secret? "You just take your time," he said. "I find that at my lifespan working makes you feel better. You realize that things are going to keep working as long as you do." There may come a day when you can't, he admits, but keeping on does tend to put that day off for quite a while, judging from his own experience.

Besides, "I like piling wood," he said. "I like to look at it all neatly piled." There is a great deal of satisfaction to be found in a neatly stacked supply of winter fuel.

As to his wife's take on the woodpile philosophy? "She thinks I am a little off," admits Mr. Armstrong. His daughter agrees. "We think he's crazy doing all this at his age, in this heat," she wrote when she sent the final woodpile photo, "but

he's standing proud and happy!"

"I am astounded that at almost 86 years of age my father has the stamina to tackle these logs; to cut, split and then pile all on his own," said Ms. Fabiani, but she admits that it has a pretty big upside. "I believe life on the Island has certainly attributed to his longevity and more significantly his physically active lifestyle."

When he isn't cutting, splitting and stacking wood, Mr. Armstrong still has plenty to do. "I have a pretty big garden," he said. But he has cut it back a bit this year. "I usually have around 100 tomato plants," he said, "but this year there is only around 70 or so. I give it all away anyway. I put it all on the table in my shop and when people drop by they take some away with them. It isn't

going to be too good a year this year though, too hot and dry."

"Thirty years later as a resident of Silver Water Dad has made his mark in the community," said Ms. Fabiani. "On a daily basis local residents congregate at their property, sometimes as many as 15 people at a time. They sit in the garage that Dad lovingly and proudly built, complete with a wood burning stove, a fridge and stove to entertain, or to sit outside in a circle either surrounding the fire pit or sitting under a large spruce and enjoying the breeze from Silver Lake. Dad is well known for his infamous 'fish fries' that he hosts for all their friends when he reaps benefits of a great catch."

Mr. Armstrong still enjoys hunting and fishing.

Then there is the grass. "I have about 20 acres here (no, not all of it is grass) and a riding mower," he said. "Trimming is the worst."

"I'm not surprised that Dad still wants to take on the woodpile," said Ms. Fabiani. "The wood is a source of heat to get them through the cold snowy winters, but electric heat is an option if required (it's an option I wish he would utilize). That being said, as much as I fear the danger of this feat—a feat that even a youthful person would find challenging—I understand that letting go of this chore would mean he would be succumbing to old age and that is not something he's ready to do."

Dad is 85 going on 25."

Mr. Armstrong doesn't mind sharing the secret of staying hale, hearty and content into the mid 80s, but suggests that, not to be

ungrateful, but...perhaps it would be best if people were to find the secret to life in their own woodpile.

Indigenous youth give a voice to justice

Week-long theatre workshop provides training, both dramatic and cultural

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—The Centre for Indigenous Theatre (CIT)'s Giving Justice a Voice project brought tears, hugs, laughter and beaming smiles to the Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK) Community Centre during its final performance Friday, July 27.

"I'm not really an emotional kind of guy, but there were a lot of emotions. I was mainly happy," said participant Franklin Assiniwe. "Really happy."

Giving Justice a Voice was a youth initiative run through the CIT, in partnership with renowned playwright Alanis King. The week-long workshop culminated in a performance which brought out friends, family and community members to cheer on the participants.

Star Nahwegahbo, project coordinator for Giving Justice a Voice, is originally from AOK. She said the workshops provided a rich experience for the participants.

"We recruited around seven youth from different First Nations around the Island to participate in learning some theatrical skills, but also talking about justice and alternative ways of justice," said Ms. Nahwegahbo.

Drama therapy is growing in popularity as a way of getting participants to expand their comfort zones and find their voices in a safe space that fosters creativity. It can

also be tailored to resonate more with participants, as Ms. Nahwegahbo did by including land-based knowledge and cultural teaching within the workshops.

"The group has been working together, sharing stories of resiliency, a lot of challenges and obstacles we face within our community, intergenerational trauma, and also resilience and trying to provide a better life for our children," she said.

Cree Trudeau from Wiikwemkoong said she had never participated in anything like this before, and that it was an enriching experience. "The best part was coming out of my shell and learning more about myself that I didn't know, like the talent and certain things that I didn't even know that I had," she said.

To explore different meanings of justice, Ms. Nahwegahbo collaborated with the United Chiefs and Councils of Manitoulin (UCCM) Anishinaabe Police force to highlight its restorative justice programs. Among its many aspects, restorative justice involves the use of a diversion program to keep youth away from the criminal justice system, and healing circles, both of which were discussed in the workshops.

"Throwing people into prison isn't a great solution, so we're looking at how to take care of the whole community when

that happens,” said Ms. Nahwegahbo. Giving Justice a Voice started at CIT in Toronto. Following two weeks of training there for the artists travelling with the production, the small team took the show on the road. Their first stop was in Thunder Bay for one week, followed by another week on Manitoulin for workshops and a final performance at the AOK community centre.

In addition to Ms. King, participants also received expert instruction and feedback from actress Gloria May Eshkibok. Both are from Wiikwemkoong, and Ms. King was the first Indigenous woman to graduate from the National Theatre School of Canada. She has written and directed a number of theatrical productions since she began her career in the mid-1980s.

Ms. Trudeau said the experience grew her knowledge of theatre as an entire industry. “It really opened my eyes to seeing the different aspects on both sides, even what Star’s doing, getting everything coordinated,” she said.

Mr. Assiniwe expressed how thankful he was to have participated in the program.

“It was one of the better things that I’ve

tried in my life,” he said. “It was safe, it was fun, a lot of laughs, there were a lot of tears, and I’m going to remember this for the rest of my life.”

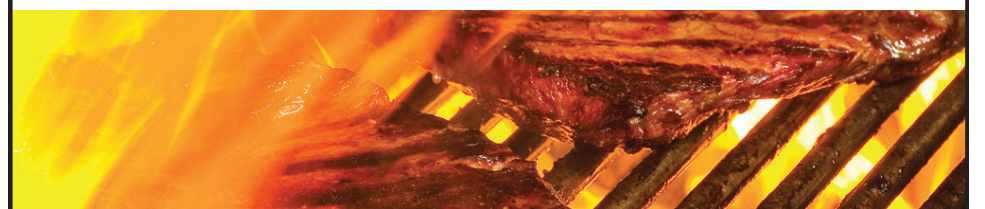



...continued from page 10 remainder of his term. He maintained that he has never received documentation on when those six incidents occurred, but offered explanations for two of the alleged infractions. He noted that one referred to comments he made outside a closed meeting that did not relate to what was discussed in that closed meeting.

In response to a request by the Expositor for clarification from the board, RDSB Chair Doreen Dewar responded with an email stating:

"Rainbow District School Board conducts its business in accordance with the Education Act that includes a Code of Conduct.

"The Code of Conduct for Trustees is available online for all members of the public to read.

"The Board members imposed a sanction based on the Code of Conduct for the reasons outlined in the motions that were approved unanimously by the Board members on July 3, 2018 and subsequently confirmed by the Board members on July 19, 2018. These motions have been shared.

"Trustee Killens is accountable for his actions. "Trustee Killens received a letter at the time of each of the previous five breaches. The current breach is the sixth.

"On or about June 11, 2018, Trustee Killens received copies of the original five letters along with a number of documented items. These are currently in his possession.

"Upon written request from Trustee Killens, these letters will be re-sent to him and/or to you.

"Trustee Killens continues to represent Manitoulin Island and collect his full honorarium of \$8,375 plus mileage, fax and Internet costs (total of \$15,641 last year).

"The decision to impose a sanction was not taken lightly.

"Rainbow District School Board will continue to focus on student achievement and well-being."

Informed of the chair's response, Trustee Killens stuck to his guns, categorically denying that he had received the documentation referenced by Chair Dewar and supplying copies of email communications requesting copies of the letters and supporting documents and Ms. Dewar's response indicating he had already received those documents. He also copied The Expositor on an email requesting the documents also be sent to The Expositor.

At the end of the meet-

ing there were numerous calls for Mr. Killens to run for trustee again.

It was noted by Toronto criminal defence lawyer Susan Von Achten, who gave an impassioned speech on the importance of political action in democracy, that a loud enough outcry would force the provincial government to take notice of the issue.

It was represented by a number of the participants that Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha would secure an interview with the minister of education should there be a large enough public outcry. A petition was circulated at the meeting and audience members were encouraged to write letters to Mr. Mantha urging him to get the government to intervene.

Asked why the trustees of the RDSB were on the board, Mr. Killens responded "I hope it is for the same reason I am, for

the kids." Although he encouraged people to run for the RDSB, Mr. Killens maintained that the only

reason someone should run is to do the best they can for the students of the RDSB.

Almost all those who spoke at the town hall meeting voiced their support for the teachers of the RDSB and asserted that their criticisms of the board should in no way reflect upon the teachers.

Mr. Killens said that he was deeply touched by the outpouring of support that he received from the people attending the town hall meeting.

Visiting Manitoulin?

Passionate lifetime collection highlights

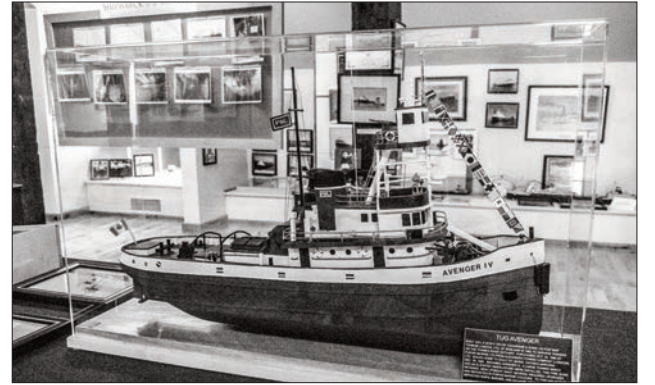

GORE BAY—Overlooking the distinctive V-shaped bay bordered by the lushly-cedared heights of the East Bluff on one edge and the town and the gentler slopes of the West Bluff on the other, the Harbour Centre extends a commanding welcome to Gore Bay's waterfront.

Within, on two floors, is a warren of light-filled, wood-lined artist studios, galleries and shops offering all manner

of Manitoulin-made fine art, glass works, textiles, soaps, jewellery and much else to browse. On the third, topmost floor, up a broad staircase to a bright lobby, is the William Purvis Marine Centre, housing the Town of Gore Bay's huge collection of nautical memorabilia gathered by historian G. I. 'Buck' Longhurst during his long career on the Great Lakes.

Visitors, researchers and boating enthusiasts are treated to a unique display that comprises an impressively thorough history of commercial shipping on the Great Lakes. In the temperature- and humidity-controlled loft space, the lives of the legendary fishing, freight and passenger boats are laid bare in original log books, ships' wheels, lanyards, flags, photos, shipping company cap and jacket badges and even little plates and coffee mugs decorated with a ship's name, from a long-ago ship's dining room. Intricate handcrafted model boats dot the room, re-creating all the details, in miniature, of the great commercial

sailing vessels of the past.

Mr. Longhurst is the curator of the collection, including an archive room of "17,000 slides and 20,000 prints and the history of practically every company and vessel that sailed on the Great Lakes," amassed over a lifetime of working on their waters and shores.

But his love of the ships started way before then. "As a kid, I was always at the dock watching the boats unload. I watched all day as the boats came through, the boats I'd read about."

After high school, Mr. Longhurst went into the navy

Gore Bay's marvelous Marine Museum

until Canada's defense forces were amalgamated in 1965, then became a letter carrier and supervisor until 1970 when his life changed on meeting Jack Purvis on the waterfront in Sault Ste. Marie.

The marine museum is named in honour of William Purvis, explains Mr. Longhurst, the Scottish patriarch of the Purvis commercial fishing clan, who was appointed the first lighthouse keeper at Great Duck Island in 1872—13 miles from today's Purvis Fisheries location at Burnt Island. By 1882, William had started to fish commercially with his five sons.

"The Purvis family is one reason why Gore Bay grew to be a boomtown in the 1880s and 90s," says the historian. "They built the town, many of their huge

old houses still stand today. The boys all were commercial fishermen. William's son James started Purvis Brothers Fisheries, and he also ran the mail, snowplow and motorcar services, a livery stable and a dairy. The Purvis's were the prime movers behind Gore Bay becoming the judicial seat of the Island. By 1934, they owned the largest independent fishing fleet in the Great Lakes."

Mr. Longhurst started working for Jack Purvis soon after their meeting on the docks, spending years on Mr. Purvis's 'YankCanuck' as a deck hand, crane operator and second engineer, earning his tug master and marine and hoisting engineer credentials as he went. In the museum, he proudly

shows off the YankCanuck's steering column, wheel and ship's bell

below a photo of the ship as he fondly remembers it.

"I used to see all these old boats out there. With the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway, all the little canal boats, the small upper lakes boats, were disappearing. I started taking photos and whenever I got a vacation I'd be at Sarnia or the Welland Canal taking pictures or getting rides on boats and taking more pictures. My hobby turned into an obsession." As he towed ships to their final resting places in the scrapyard, he'd salvage unwanted name plaques, keys, flags, log books and brass railings to add to his growing personal collection.

In the museum, there's a model of the 'Gore,' the ship that got stuck in the ice of the bay until spring and gave Gore Bay its name, built by Mr. Longhurst himself, along with his models of the SS

'Manitou,' the 'Mindemoya' and the 'Langell Boys.' The SS 'Manzutti' has a miniature crane on the deck, a replica of the very crane Mr. Longhurst operated for 20 years. "This model was

built by a professional model builder," he says, pointing to the fine detail work, "and cost \$11,000."

The 'Avenger IV' display

New Art Gallery of Sudbury exhibit views La Cloche history ‘Through the Camera Lens’

SUDBURY—The long and storied history of Willisville and the La Cloche area are featured in an innovative exhibit ‘Through the Camera Lens: La Cloche 1900-1950’ curated by photographers Jon and Kerry Butler and currently on display at the Art Gallery of Ontario. The exhibit grew out of an online Facebook page started by the Butlers featuring the history of the La Cloche region through shared photos, and consists of a selec-

tion of 130 photographs selected for their ability to “tell the stories of residents of the eastern La Cloche area of the District of Sudbury.” “This collection is the result of many individuals and families who were willing to share their stories of this iconic region,” said Ms. Butler. “We are so grateful to everyone who has shared your family photographs and history, they encapsulated the beauty of life in La Cloche.” Ms. Butler relayed how she and her husband Jon had first visited the area in the early 1980s. “We were awestruck by the mountainous geography of white quartzite and the sparking lakes and rivers,” she recalled. “From the beginning, we were also captivated by the stories of local people such as Harold Golden, a man who spent his entire life in Willisville. His stories took place decades before our arrival and they helped us to learn about the people who had lived, worked and played in our area of La Cloche. It was Harold Golden who sparked this journey of wonder.” Ms. Butler said that in 2002 the couple began posting photographs of the area on two websites, willisville.ca and lacloche.ca. The photographs came from those given to the couple by people they knew in the area and each new posting seemed to generate new leads. “These contributions continue to weave an even richer tapestry of the region on our ‘La Cloche History’ Facebook page,” she said. “What you see here tonight is only a small selection of what we have collected and shared.”

Art Gallery of Sudbury Curator Denetra Christakos welcomed everyone to the event and introduced the speakers at the reception, as well as citing the tremendous amount of work and research that went into the exhibit. Lise Labine, incoming chair of the Art Gallery of Sudbury/Galerie d’Art de Sudbury began her remarks by acknowledging that the gallery resides in the Robinson Huron Treaty territory and “the land on which we gather is the tra-

ditional territory of the Anishinaabeg.” Ms. Labine noted that the photographs displayed in the exhibit explore the lives of residents of the Willisville, Charlton Lake, Whitefish Falls, Bay of Islands, McGregor Bay, Iroquois Bay, Grace Lake and Cranberry Bay “as seen through the eyes of settler and visitor photographers.” The exhibit, she noted, “provides significant context for future major exhibitions of (Group of Seven member Franklin) Carmichael’s work and that of his contemporaries at the Art Gallery of Sudbury.” Ms. Labine noted that “Jon Butler has been a volunteer board member of the Art Gallery of Sudbury since 2009. He has been a tremendous advocate of the gallery’s ongoing project of establishing a new gallery building in the name of La Cloche artist Franklin Carmichael.” Ms. Christakos gave special thanks to a small army of summer students and volunteers who had worked diligently above and beyond to get the exhibit ready for the opening, including “Karley Staskus, Rebecca Black, Danielle Wetselaar, Isabella Scola-Lawryshin, Sarah Blondin, Tadd Tremblay, Nancy Gaveh and Martin Kessler.” Mr. Butler related the story of a circus truck that had struggled to climb the Highway 6 hill at Willisville containing three elephants. One elephant was used to push the truck up the hill while two others were tied to a tree. The two left unattended made good their escape

and proved quite a surprise to the fire tower ranger returning home from a local bar. Super 8 film of the proceedings was lost when family members who did not recognize its significance threw the film out. 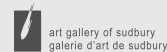

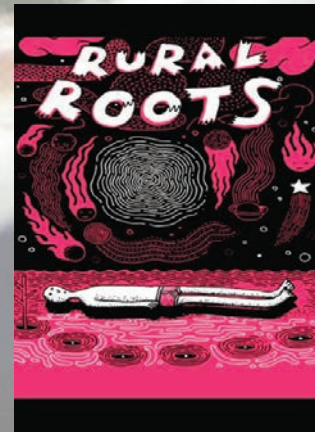

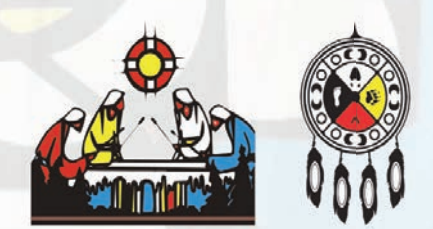

Soapbox derby returns to Haweater Weekend

LITTLE CURRENT—After a nearly 20 year hiatus, soapbox derby racing is back at Haweater Weekend and kids aged 5-11 are welcome to participate for free and win prizes Saturday morning, August 4.

“It’s a lot of fun,” says Billy Moore of Spring Bay, who is bringing the race back to Haweater Weekend. “They can race against their friends. Everyone is going to get a prize, no matter if they’re first or last,” he says.

Mr. Moore began hosting soapbox derbies in Cambridge 15 years ago. Gateway to Life Church and the Little Current Lions Club are supporting this event.

“Fifteen years ago, we built four cars and 12 kids showed up,” says Mr. Moore. “Now we have 30 cars and we get about 200 kids at the event in Cambridge.”

His team from Cam-

bridge uses a custom-built trailer to transport the cars to events around Ontario. The trailer’s side folds down to become the take-off ramp.

All participants must get a parent or guardian’s permission to register. Mr. Moore’s team will provide the cars. The event starts at 9 am, and kids can take practice runs and try out the course until 10:30 am. They are not required to enter the competition stage.

“It’s no pressure. If they just want to come for the first bit and get a prize, that’s fine,” says Mr. Moore.

At 10:30 am, the competition will start. Four cars race per heat and the top two racers will advance to further rounds. The other two will be out of the competition, but still receive a prize. Mr. Moore encourages all the racers to stay by the track and cheer on

the winners.

The top four competitors will receive trophies and larger prizes.

All participants are required to wear a helmet and are encouraged to bring one from home. Mr. Moore has a limited number of helmets available to borrow in case the racers forget theirs.

“We have hay bales lining the sides of the track,” says Mr. Moore. “Nobody has ever got hurt.”

Having Mr. Moore’s team supply the cars also ensures a fair competition. “All the cars are built from the same kit. They’re basically identical,” he says.

The difference between the cars is the paint scheme, ranging from Jurassic Park to Wonder Woman. Racers will be assigned a car based on which lane they are in, and won’t be able to choose at the starting line. Mr. Moore was inspired

to start this event after living through some tough times in his past. While living in Sudbury in 1999, he became homeless, losing everything he had due to a drug and alcohol addiction.

Mr. Moore sought treatment and moved to Cambridge to start his new life. He joined a church and started off-road racing to promote positive choices. Mr. Moore has shared his story at high-profile events like Monster Jam, and later encouraged kids to get hands-on by creating a soapbox derby.

“We just want to show kids that there’s a lot of things you can do to have fun without getting high,” he says.

the exhibit and listing their names. That list reads as a Who’s Who of La Cloche and Manitoulin Island’s settler history.

The Butlers both spoke of the invaluable resource of Harold Golden, whose countless stories formed the foundation for the audio presentations accompanying the photographs and presented via iPads mounted on the wall. The Butlers also wrote the scripts for those presentations. From the labels to the scripts, Ms. Christakos suggested that the couple had probably authored in excess of 50,000 words.

Among the many La Cloche and Mani-

toulin Island residents in attendance was Dawn Smyth, a Willis descendant. Ms. Smyth said she was very impressed with the scale and scope of the exhibit, and the amount of work and dedication that went into setting it up.

The exhibition was made possible through the support of the City of Greater Sudbury, the Ontario Arts Council, the Canada Council for the Arts and the Northern Ontario Heritage Foundation Corporation for their support for paid internships and federal support provided through the Museums Assistance Program of Canadian Heritage.

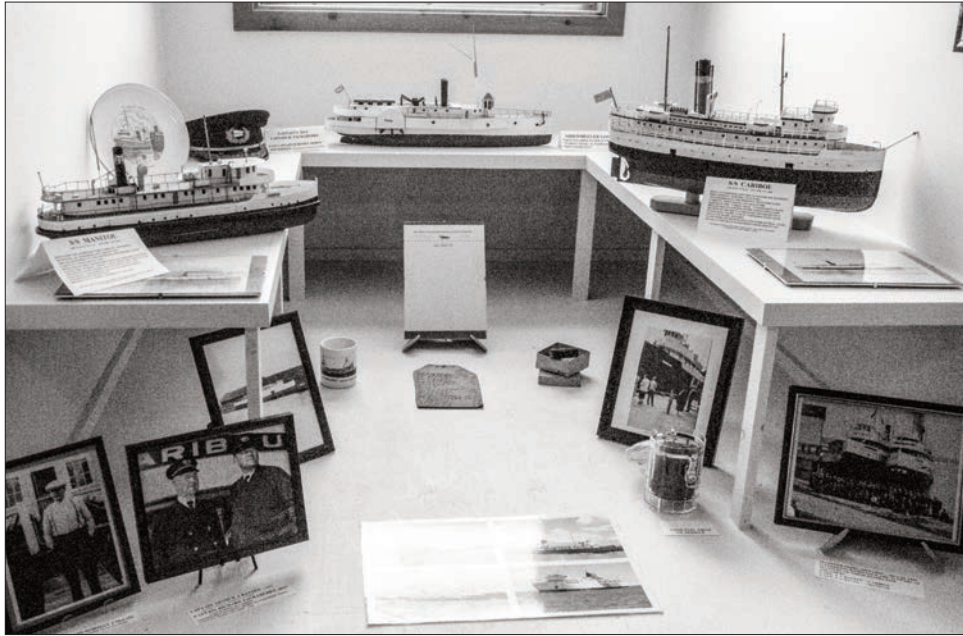
SHORELINE REJUVENATION PROJECT

features a beautiful large model of the tug and the log book of her decommissioning trip to Gravesend, England in 1985. Yes, Mr. Longhurst was on that trip, "as a crew member for 59 days. There was no heat on those English tugs."

Here's a model of the 'Edmund Fitzgerald,' immortalized in song by Gordon Lightfoot, tragically sunk in hurricane-force winds on Lake Superior in 1975, drowning all 29 aboard. "It's a great song," says the marine history expert, "but Lightfoot got some details wrong. He says she was fully loaded - she wasn't. And that she was bound for Cleveland - but she was going to Detroit." There's no reason to disbelieve this author of eighteen books and fervent devourer of maritime lore.

Buck Longhurst remembers the long-gone days when "you couldn't get a semi-trailer truck onto the ferries until the 1960s, and they'd only get as far as Espanola on the north shore. The road

from Espanola to Little Current "was impassable in all seasons" for trucks, and was nicknamed the Drunken Snake Trail. "Supplies were hard to come by and costly. Boats got through where cars and especially trucks could not.

"When I look around today I can say, 'I dredged the marinas at Gore Bay, the Sault, at Spider Bay in Little Current. I put in the helipad at Gros Cap Lighthouse, built the Lafarge docks at Birch Island. In Gore Bay, all the boats in the marina are making use of the work I and others did; it makes the toil and hardship worthwhile. If you helped to shape the face of the area, it's great to know your work means something."

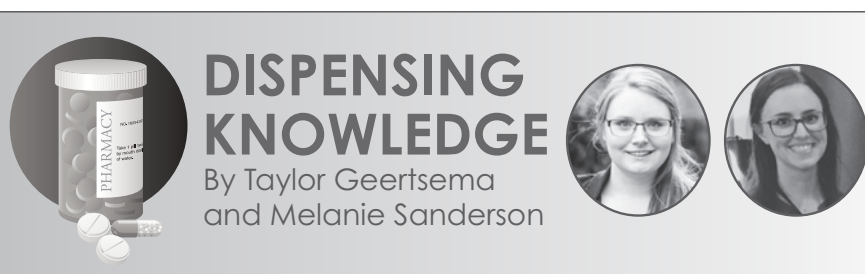

these pests live and bite is one strategy. This means avoiding tall grasses, swamps and marshes for mosquitoes and avoiding wooded areas, bushes and tall grass for ticks. In your own yard, you can do a number of things to reduce the number of mosquitoes present. Removing sources of standing water, such as rain barrels and clogged gutters, may reduce the number of mosquitoes you see, as standing water is where mosquitoes breed.

If avoidance isn't the strategy that will work for you, then your next line of defense is covering up. Wearing loose fitting, long-sleeved, light-coloured clothing with closed-toe shoes can help to prevent mosquitoes and ticks from coming into contact with your skin. If you have a child in a crib or stroller, you can place a fine mesh net over the crib or stroller to prevent mosquitoes from reaching the child. For ticks, wearing light-coloured clothing provides a nice backdrop so the dark-coloured ticks can easily be identified and removed. Additionally, tucking your pant legs into your socks will help to prevent ticks from biting your ankles.

If you'd like to take the next step and employ the weapon known as insect repellent, then you have a couple of

options. When selecting insect repellent, check the ingredient list and look for either DEET or icaridin as they are the most effective ingredients to keep these pests away. For both of these products, a higher percentage strength indicates a longer time of protection. For children less than six months of age, these products are not recommended. For children six months or older, icaridin is the insect repellent of choice as the same percentage strength can be applied in both adults and children. With DEET-containing products, a lower percentage strength must be used with younger children. In any child or adult aged six months or older, icaridin 20 percent is safe to use to prevent mosquito and tick bites.

Ticks may stay attached to your skin for five or more days after they bite. If you live or enjoy a day outside in a wooded area, it is important to check your body at least once daily to see if this pest has found a way past your layers of defense. Inspecting your body for ticks and removing them early on in this process helps to prevent the spread of Lyme Disease.

Sunscreen is important to protect us from the ultraviolet radiation from the sun. When applying both sunscreen and insect repellent, apply the sunscreen first, wait 20 minutes, then spray the insect repellent. This ensures both products are working their best.

If bug bites do happen—and they always seem to—don't panic! There are multiple products available at your local pharmacy to help you out! Whether it is an allergy medication or a cream, your pharmacist is able to provide a recommendation tailored to your needs.

"Mosquitoes and ticks and bites, oh my!"

Now that the warm weather is finally here, many of us are heading outdoors to enjoy the sun. Hiding in the long grass and the summer breeze are numerous different bugs that rely on human blood for their next meal. Once they feed, all that's left is an itchy bump on your skin to remember them by.

There are many ways to protect yourself and the ones you love from these pests. Not only are mosquitoes annoying, but they may also transmit diseases such as West Nile virus. Recently, there has been more tick-talk buzzing in the community. It's possible to find a tick virtually anywhere in Ontario. Not only do tick bites cause a characteristic bullseye rash, but they also have the potential to spread Lyme Disease.

If you're not a fan of using insect repellent, there are other ways to protect yourself. Avoiding the areas where

Veterinary Creepshow

Caveat lector - reader beware! The following article is dedicated to one of our employees who finally heard the chorus 'creepy crawly' in a Who song, 'Boris the Spider.'

Yes, for those who like gross things, this is all about some of the past year's unusual and exotic worms that we have discovered in some of our pets. Remember, these are rare occurrences and I do not mean to create panic...just a fun, Manitoulin Veterinary "Ripley's Believe It or Not."

Early this year, on a routine urine examination, an unusual egg was discovered under the microscope. Eggs in urine sediment are definitely not a common finding and thus the scientific antennas pick up. The shape and size of this egg, confirmed by textbook photos, revealed a parasite called *Diocotophyma Renale* aka the giant kidney worm. In veterinary school, it was mentioned briefly in the multitude of parasites veterinarians had to learn, and freaky stories of finding a large alien-like worm in the abdomen of a dog while performing an ovariohysterectomy were mentioned. Ewwwww. Would we vet students ever see one? Well, after this year, the life cycle of this worm needed to be reviewed as we did discover one case.

As the name indicates, the giant kidney worm is

one of the largest round-worms. Females can reach one meter in length.

This parasite is found more frequently in the centre of the right kidney or free in the abdomen. The parasite is a bad tenant and destroys the kidney. The adults produce eggs that develop in water. Eggs do not hatch until ingested by earthworms or may parasitize crayfish. The crayfish in turn are ingested by catfish. Dogs become infected by ingesting crayfish, earthworms or catfish.

In our situation, this dog had been a Northern Manitoba rescue, and had to have been eating a raw fish based diet. Once diagnosed, there are no antiparasitic medications that are effective and the damaged kidney and resident worms should be removed. However, it is very unlikely for these worms to inhabit and damage the remaining kidney. Many dogs can live a normal life with this disgusting inhabitant.

So, if you haven't been turned off yet we will venture into our next 'creepy' case. A little dog was presented with a lump on the top of his head. It had developed pretty quickly and thus the reason for concern. Upon examination, the centre of the lump seemed to be open, and a creamy white colour

was noted within. This little dog actually had a little grub-like worm inhabiting the 'lump.' A diagnosis of cuterebra was made...or rabbit bot fly. Adult cuterebra flies lay eggs at the entrance of rodent and rabbit burrows during the summer months. Eggs are stimulated to hatch from the warmth of the animal's body as it enters the burrow. Larvae attach themselves to the animal's coat and enter through any opening. The larvae migrate through the host and usually stop in subcutaneous tissues. After approximately three to four weeks, the larva forms a visible nodule (a warble) with an external breathing hole. After completing development, the larva, approximately 1-2 cm, exits the host and pupates on the ground. Cats and dogs may become infected by sniffing or sticking their head in a rabbit or rodent burrow. Any age, breed, or sex of dog can be infected; however, in one study of 20 dogs with cuterebriasis, 80 percent weighed less than or equal to 4.5kg. Yorkshire terriers accounted for 40 percent of the study population, which is not surprising since terriers were bred to slip down rodent holes.

Affected patients may have no clinical abnormalities other than a focal swelling containing the larva (a warble). No treatment is necessary other than removing the offending 'grub'.

Now to an even more exotic worm that apparently evaded the veterinary parasitology lectures at school, one that this author has endearingly called "the Dracula worm!"

Dracunculus insignis

infection was diagnosed in a dog that presented with a swelling on his lower

front limb. A long thread-like worm was discovered to be living within and removed.

Infection with *D. insignis* occurs by ingesting infected tadpoles or frogs. Larvae penetrate the small intestines of the dog and migrate to the subcutaneous tissues of the thorax, abdomen and inguinal area. After mating, the male worms die while the females migrate to the subcutaneous tissues of the limbs and abdomen. The

presence of the adult worm in subcutaneous tissues leads to formation of a nodule that eventually fistulates. When the dog enters cool water, the female worm releases larvae that exit through the fistula. Overall prognosis for *D. insignis* infection is good, with complete removal of the worm. Antiparasitic medication is ineffective.

Now that you are thoroughly grossed out, the take home message of this creepshow is: Don't eat raw fish, don't eat raw frogs, and don't go sniffing around rabbit holes. And finally, don't go down to the garden and eat worms, especially the big, fat juicy ones.
