Opioid replacement therapy program will not be leaving Little Current clinic

Mindemoya clinic will be considered to better serve the needs of Central, West End patients

MANITOULIN—Sometimes trying to do a good deed can backfire with unintended consequences and so it seems to have been the case with a recent “good will” consultation held with members of the Central Manitoulin municipal council to provide a heads up on efforts to improve access to those living with addictions in the West End of Manitoulin.

Subsequent to the council presentation by a representative of Dr. Suman Koka's clinic in Mindemoya as the potential host for an additional Manitoulin opioid replacement therapy program, a flurry of misinformation exploded on social media, including suggestions that the current program taking place in Little Current would be pulling up stakes and moving to Central Manitoulin. According to Northeastern Manitoulin Family

Health Team manager Judy Miller, also the spokesperson for Dr. Suman Koka of the Northwood Recovery's Island operations, that is emphatically not the case.

“We are not closing Little Current,” she said.

Currently there are programs running in Wiikwemkoong, M'Chigeeng and Little Current to assist those dealing with addictions and those residing in

Northeast council likes bascule option as replacement for Island swing bridge

LITTLE CURRENT—As council met for its first meeting of August at its downtown Little Current chambers with a view of the swing bridge, the first order of the day was that iconic piece of machinery bridging the mainland to Manitoulin Island.

Mayor Al MacNevin began by noting the community consultation held at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre last month and reminded council that one year earlier, council had asked the swing bridge study engineers to keep in mind the impact a new bridge would have to businesses and residents of the Northeast Town.

The mayor encouraged council to come together and choose one of the options outlined in the

study and make a recommendation to the engineers. The mayor explained that options No. 1 (a movable bridge at the far west side of Goat Island, entering Little Current near the former Kool-It Ice Building) and No. 7 (a fixed bridge/tunnel on the far east side

MTO making no allowances in swing bridge crossing cycle for holiday weekend traffic

LITTLE CURRENT—Many motorists will have noticed a change in the swing bridge's operation this summer with a

short stoplight cycle that allows only seven or eight cars to pass at a time.

At an August meeting of the Northeast Town council, Mayor Al MacNevin noted this change at the council table and reminded those present that the new cycle had nothing to do with the mechanical issue the bridge has been facing in recent years.

“The cycle used to be manually overridden,” the mayor told council. “That's not the bridge being broken; that's the way they're running it.”

Mayor MacNevin explained that, previously, the bridge operators would judge when an increased flow of traffic would require a longer signal, such as Haweater Weekend.

On the Monday of Haweater, the shorter light cycle caused the

The Indian Day School repatriation project is part of a long running effort by Dr. Andrea Walsh, associate professor

Swimming advisories issued for two Manitoulin beaches

MANITOULIN—Public Health Sudbury and Districts has issued two swimming advisories for Manitoulin beaches: Kagawong Village Beach and Providence Bay Beach.

As a result of routine water samples exceeding the acceptable bacteriological water quality standards, Public Health Sudbury and Districts has posted swimming advisory signs to inform the public that the beach water quality is not suitable for recreational use at this time.

A swimming advisory is a precautionary notice that informs the public about specific risks to health and safety.

Going into the water when bacteria are present in high concentrations puts bathers at risk for infections. Illness can occur if swimmers swallow beach water, if water gets into their ears, eyes or nose, or if it comes in contact with open wounds.

“We have enhanced our monitoring and will continue taking water samples,” said Cynthia Peacock-Rocca, a manager with Public Health Sudbury and Districts’ Environmental Health Division.

Public Health Sudbury and Districts will notify the public when the bacterial levels return to acceptable standards for bathing beaches. For information about beach water quality, visit www.phsd.ca.

Northeast Town will begin issuing tickets to those parking on sidewalks

Town hires a private security firm to patrol sidewalk parking over the next few weeks

LITTLE CURRENT—Following a citizen complaint about the high incidence of vehicles blocking sidewalks and, in some cases even intersections, Northeast Town council has again decided to utilize an outside security firm to ticket those drivers who are breaking the bylaw.

In a letter to Councillor Al Boyd, which was shared with council, Zak Nicholls of Little Current writes, “It has once again come to my attention that automobile parking in Little Current has become an issue for pedestrians and cyclists. I take my children out daily for walks and bike rides and we are finding that vehicles are parking directly over sidewalks, or at the corner of intersections with the vehicle extending into the intersection. Often this is occurring kitty corner to the OPP

(Ontario Provincial Police) station. I am assuming that parking enforcement would fall under the responsibility of the town.”

“Our family is extremely courteous of others when we walk or cycle, but find our safety is being placed at risk when vehicle owners are not discouraged from parking in non-parking areas,” Mr. Nicholls continued. “Signage is sufficient, but it appears there is no mechanism for enforcement. I feel this will only get worse without a measured response from the community. It seems fair to say this is a tourist season issue, although I do not infer blame on them.”

“There is an issue with people parking on sidewalks,” said CAO Dave Williamson. “When people report it, we will dispatch the Chief Building Official

(CBO), but we don’t have the resources to have someone do that full-time.” The CAO suggested to council that they could hire a private security firm to ticket those drivers breaking the bylaw as they have done in the past. (In 2015, the Northeast Town hired a security firm to ticket vehicles parked downtown for more than two hours. After a great hue and cry from visitors to the downtown and from the Business Improvement Area [BIA], the bylaw was changed to four hours and stopped being enforced.)

“When you write the ticket, you need to be prepared to pay for the prosecution,” Mr. Williamson warned council, noting that a \$16 ticket could end up costing \$1,000. “Our target has always been voluntary compliance.”

Councillor Michael Erskine said he

recalled a time when the municipality had cars towed that were illegally parked on sidewalks. Mayor Al MacNevin pointed out that someone would still need to issue a ticket before a vehicle could be towed.

Councillor Barb Baker asked how many people the municipality took to court.

“None,” Mr. Williamson replied. “We chose not to. The \$16 just wasn’t worth it.”

Councillor Bill Koehler said something had to be done about it, pointing to the area between the Edgewater Pharmacy and the former Kool-It Ice building as a particularly bad spot for perpetrators.

It was suggested that a warning be issued in the weekly Northeast Town ad found on Page 11 of this newspaper, urging people to report violators.

Great Lakes Islands Alliance to welcome a grant from the prestigious Mott Foundation

ASHLAND, WI—Northland College in Ashland, Wisconsin has acquired some funding on behalf of the Great Lakes Islands Alliance (GLIA) from the Flint, Michigan-based Mott Foundation that the alliance hopes will make other groups stand up and take notice.

Manitoulin Island is a member of the 14-island GLIA group and held its first face-to-face meeting last week in Kagawong where an executive was elected including Todd Gordon as chair, Keith Flaherty as vice chair, Alicia McCutcheon as secretary/treasurer and Joe Shorthouse as Manitoulin’s representative on the GLIA steering committee.

The Mott Foundation grant was discussed during the inaugural meeting.

“The Mott Foundation is an incredibly large Michigan foundation that works on a variety of different areas with a focus on the Great Lakes region,” said Brandon Hofstedt, a professor at Northland College, the educational institute that is a champion of GLIA. The Mott Foundation is known for funding projects with a civil or social focus, the environment and education.

Last year, Michael Childers, GLIA chair, Mr. Hofstedt and Matt Preisser, Lakes Coordinator with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy, which spearheaded GLIA, approached the Mott Foundation for support.

“We were invited to submit a pre-proposal and then a proposal,” Mr. Hofstedt explained.

In July GLIA and Northland College were pleased to announce a \$50,000 grant from the Mott Foundation for an 18-month project meant to establish GLIA as an “influential actor in the area with a focus on policy and communication,” Mr. Hofstedt explained.

In the Mott proposal, three goals were outlined: Firstly, GLIA is seen as having great potential as

a policy influencer, as “a strategic voice in the Great Lakes region around environment and natural resources.” The grant will also establish a groundwork to be done to find commonalities across the 14 islands, together with the mainland, which will give GLIA an opportunity to “raise the connected voice,” Mr. Hofstedt added.

The second goal is for broad communications. “To raise visibility and get the word of GLIA out,” Mr. Hofstedt continued. This goal will also mean maintenance and additions to the GLIA website, the continuation of the annual GLIA summit (to be held on Mackinac Island in October of this year) and to raise the overall profile of GLIA.

Lastly, the third goal is that of ‘institutional stability.’ “We’re still a volunteer network made up of representatives from the 14 islands and supporting organizations from the mainland,” Mr. Hofstedt added. “How do we pull it all together now?” This could mean hiring someone on a contract position or a consulting firm, but this has yet to be determined.

“Ultimately, the money isn’t huge, but the profile of having Mott backing GLIA and the support we’ve seen from the islands has been tremendous,” he continued. It helps us to establish GLIA and raise the profile and get GLIA at the table.”

Mr. Hofstedt noted that having a grant such as this is important because “money begets money.” With a highly thought of organization like the Mott Foundation on board, surely others will follow, GLIA hopes.

Mr. Childers, GLIA chair and a Madeline Islander (Lake Superior, Wisconsin) agrees with Mr. Hofstedt in that the grant gives GLIA credibility on the Great Lakes stage.

Mr. Childers said the money will help to “amplify

Dave De Lisle named AMK candidate for People’s Party

SMOOTH ROCK FALLS—The most important priority is looking after Canada’s needs first for Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing’s newest federal candidate, Dave De Lisle, who has recently been named as the People’s Party of Canada (PPC)’s choice for the riding.

“Our party is the only one that is going to save Canada,” says Mr. De Lisle.

With no local PPC representation in the riding, Mr. De Lisle decided to put his name forward and had soon secured the spot.

“I had been following (Maxime Bernier, PPC founder and leader) since he left the Conservative Party and I voted for him as a Conservative card-carrying member when the Conservative elections were going on. I decided Max seemed to be a pretty good guy,” he says. “I know there’s lots of people out there saying things about him, but that’s irrelevant to the fact that what he’s looking out for is my vision for Canada. Canadians first—our best interest is what’s important.”

Mr. De Lisle moved from Windsor to Smooth Rock Falls about two-and-a-half years ago following a coronary heart attack and a couple of mini-strokes. He enjoys fishing and hunting and said the quieter pace of life was a good fit after his health scare.

“I’ve always been an outgoing person. I can talk to people, I’m not afraid of that,” he says. “The general consensus of the Canadian people I’ve spoken to is we need change. The same-old, same-old is not working.”

Mr. De Lisle describes the PPC immigration policy as the best option and the one that speaks to him.

“(Mr. Bernier) wants to bring down the amount of immigrants coming in but he also wants to get the people who are actually qualified to work. We can’t afford to support people on welfare,” says Mr. De Lisle. “We’re not a racist party. We’re for Canada and Canadians. We accept immigration and immigrants, but we want them properly vetted and those who will benefit society and not go against the grain ... it’s too bad if people are offended, but that’s the way it is.”

April Torkopoulos competing to be CNE ambassador

TORONTO—The annual Canadian National Exhibition (CNE) Ambassador of the Fairs competition is ramping up for its 2019 edition and will see 80 contestants from across Ontario vying for the coveted title, including Gore Bay’s April Torkopoulos

who has served as the Providence Bay Fair Ambassador for nearly a year.

“I’m super excited; I can’t wait. I’ve been reading about the CNE and everything with that. It’s huge, they get over 1.5 million visitors,” said April.

April, at age 18, is one of the

younger people enrolled in the competition. She said a fair number of the competitors are in their 20s.

“It’s a little bit intimidating but it gives me more motivation to be extra confident and more prepared,” she said.

The CNE is considered an agricultural competition which celebrates Ontario’s farming heritage. Some of the questions posed to contestants are designed to test their knowledge of agriculture and the CNE.

“I’m going to be prepared about agriculture today, on the methods and how we’re doing it. I’m looking up agricultural concerns and solutions that we can think of in order to make it more sustainable for the future,” said April.

“Agriculture is something that people don’t learn about a lot today, especially young people,”

But I do have a couple concerns about their location.

Firstly, the noise of chainsaws revving all day long for a few days gets to be a bit much after a while. I'm sure this can be understood by most, though, so I won't dive too much into that.

Secondly, however, my big and main concern is where everyone winds up parking to see the Carver Kings. Since their trucks and their

Abortion letter's statistics are impossible math

If you are going to use data to back an argument, make sure it's demonstrably accurate

To the Expositor:

In response to the letter 'A rebuttal of letter writer's anti pro-life stance' (July 24, Page 4) I would like to offer a correction to the statistics quoted. The letter writer stated that "[t]here are over 100,000 abortions in Canada each year" and that "[n]early 25 percent of all pregnancies end in elective abortions."

According to the Canadian Institute for Health Information (affiliated with Stats Canada) there were 94,030 abortions in Canada in 2017 (the most recent data available as of January this year).

The writer's statistic of 25 percent of pregnancies ending in elective abortion may be a simple misunderstanding of the data. I'm no mathematician, but bear with me:

There were 383,187 births in 2017. If one uses the number of births in calculating the percentage of abortions (94,030 abortions divided by 383,187 births) the answer is 25 percent. However, pregnancies and births are not the same thing, therefore that 25 percent statistic isn't

just meaningless, it's impossible math that compares apples to oranges.

I was not able to get my hands on the number of pregnancies in Canada, but according to the data available, in 2017 less than 1.5 percent of women between 15 and 44 had an abortion, elective or otherwise (as per CIHI, the abortion rate was 13.1 per 1,000 women of childbearing age). These statistics do not differentiate between elective and other terminations, meaning they include all terminations for all reasons.

Regardless of where you stand on an issue, if you are going to use factual data to back up your point of view, be sure it's demonstrably accurate or you risk undermining your entire argument and losing credibility.

History Day in Kagawong celebrates Lake Huron's past to packed houses

KAGAWONG—There was a lot to cover at this year's History Day in Kagawong event which saw packed houses for both the afternoon and evening sessions featuring three presentations about local history.

Authors Joan Forsberg and Cris Kohl began the event with their discussion of past, present and even possible future shipwreck discoveries in the Great Lakes. They also announced and unveiled their newest book, 'Shipwreck Tales of Georgian Bay,' with this gathering serving as the first stop on their book tour.

"You can see history at the bottom of these lakes. We have the best-preserved shipwrecks here," said Mr. Kohl. "It's like an ice-water museum."

They shared how Georgian Bay has been referred to as the sixth Great Lake and that it was, in fact, called Lake Iroquois as recently as an 1846 map. They also referred to the ongoing search for La Salle's 'Le Griffon' which was the subject of a Discovery Channel episode of Expedition Unknown that featured Ms. Forsberg and Mr. Kohl. The two estimated that only half of the shipwrecks in the Great Lakes have ever been discovered.

They spoke next to footage of past dives and indicated that they had several promising clues for the as-yet undiscovered wreck of the 'Asia.'

"It's one of the most hunted shipwrecks in the Great Lakes and certainly the most in Georgian Bay. Everybody wants to be the one who finds it," said Ms. Forsberg.

Next up, Harbour Island's new owner Rob Chandler shared his plans for the deteriorated resort in the North Channel which had been a popular spot for the rich and famous through history.

He described how his childhood cemented his love for the water. At age 14 he found himself strolling the shores of Harbour Island and, little did he know until many years later, his grandparents Grant and Elizabeth Rogers were the original owners of the property.

In his 20s, Mr. Chandler learned of maternal family history on Manitoulin Island and their past ownership of the property.

However, he recalls his grandfather had passed on before he learned of the history and was unable to ask him any questions about the island.

It was nearly 75 years to the day of Mr. Rogers' original purchase of the island that Mr. Chandler signed his own offer to purchase the island. Mr. Chandler travelled from Tennessee and went out on the water in late November to see the property in its current state. Despite the decay, he still described it as his paradise.

"Some say I purchased a mound of rotting buildings and poison ivy for far too much money. I say I purchased a piece of my heritage back at a bargain. I purchased the buildings that contain the wood and the nails that my grandfather and great grandfather helped fashion into what would

become a colorful piece of Canadian history," said Mr. Chandler.

Now, Emmett 'Sonny' Woods and Mr. Chandler, friends through Masonry, have partnered on these plans. They will donate the roughly 10 acres of Harbour Island containing the resort buildings and marina to their charity. They will form a non-profit with the aim of restoring the resort as close as possible to its original condition through merchandising, donations, loans and grants.

Their intent is to run the resort primarily as an off-grid youth camp for those who struggle to find their way; create a sort of 'living museum' for boaters, families and groups; offer the site as a counselling location for those afflicted with PTSD, drug and alcohol abuse and grief; raise money for

Shriners Hospitals and other charities; and teach survival skills alongside Indigenous culture and the history of bonds and friendships with neighbours.

Mr. Chandler said his wife's loss of her daughter when she was two years old was a major motivation to make a change.

"I've seen first-hand how people carry (grief). If we can do some good, that's all I can hope," he said.

Mr. Chandler and Mr. Woods plan to not sit on the board and not draw any salary. They are seeking people to serve on the board of directors and welcome inquiries from those looking to help out. He is seeking to raise \$500,000 and attract people with experience in securing public funding who may be able to help locate money for the project.

"It is our intention to establish a trust to ensure this gem of the Great Lakes continues to provide safe harbour long after our time on Earth is done," said Mr. Chandler.

Finally, Old Mill Heritage Centre curator Rick Nelson spoke about the progress made by the museum to celebrate its 10th anniversary. He presented a slideshow of major milestones in its history such as the relocation and rehabilitation of the post office museum, special exhibits, historic events and barbecue fundraisers—both summer and winter.

The museum will be throwing an anniversary barbecue on August 24 from 11 am to 3 pm at the pavilion to "give back some appreciation for keeping history alive here in Billings Township."

Mr. Nelson said he was happy with the turnout. Close to 300 people attended the day's sessions, the topics of which were chosen due to their relevance in the community.

"Harbour Island was just purchased and Rob has a lot of plans for it, so we thought we might help out with sharing those plans in a presentation," he said.

The museum's focus at the moment is trying to acquire a new exhibit from Ottawa about shipwrecks. Mr. Nelson said he was looking forward to finding out whether they would be able to secure it.

Manitoulin OPP review Haweater Weekend and Civic Holiday long weekend

The Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) completed another summer traffic campaign for the Civic Holiday Long Weekend. With the increase in traffic on the long weekend, coupled with the increased traffic for the annual Manitoulin Haweater Weekend, officers not only targeted enforcement on Ontario's "move over" law, they also monitored the safety and enjoyment of the festival goers on Manitoulin Island.

The "move over" law helps to reduce the incidents of injuries and deaths to police officers, firefighters, EMS personnel, tow truck drivers and members of the public. Members of the North East Region OPP laid 180 charges in 2018, and so far in 2019 laid 53 charges in relation to the "move over" law.

Haweater Weekend draws crowds of upwards to five- to 10-thousand people with all the great events that the festival has to offer. Over the three-day weekend Manitoulin OPP responded to 181 calls for service with 60 in the Little Current area where the Haweater Weekend was located.

Of the 181 Criminal Code and Provincial offences investigated over the weekend, there were four impaired drivers (one by drug), several domestic related incidents, theft of motor vehicle with the suspect being apprehended and 17 Liquor Licence Act incidents that stood out.

Manitoulin OPP also investigated a boating death where not wearing a life jacket contributed to the tragedy.

The OPP reminds the public to take their time in holiday traffic, drive sober and understand that safety is everyone's responsibility. Let's make sure that the summer of 2019 is a safe and happy one for everyone!

Manitoulin OPP responds to sudden death after canoe capsizes

On August 4, at approximately 8 pm, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP, with the assistance of the Anishinabek Police Service (APS) and the Algoma Emergency Medical Services (EMS) responded to a report of a capsized canoe on the waters of the North Channel near Sagamok First Nation.

The investigation has revealed that two persons were fishing in a canoe near Sagamok Point. The canoe capsized and both persons entered the water. One male was able to make it to shore safely and contact emergency services. With the assistance of civilians nearby, the second person was located without vital signs and lifesaving efforts were commenced by EMS.

Forty-eight-year-old

Yvon Toulouse, from Sagamok First Nation, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Neither persons in the canoe were wearing life jackets at the time the canoe capsized.

The investigation is ongoing under the direction of the Office of the Chief Coroner and Forensic Pathology Service (OCC-FPS).

Male arrested after stealing a vehicle and fleeing from police

On August 2, at approximately 9:10 pm, members from the Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP

responded to a robbery from a cottage on the Ketchancookem Trail in Mindemoya.

A male was staying at a resort and departed without his surety. A short time later he entered a cottage on the Ketchancookem Trail and demanded the keys to their vehicle at knife point.

The male drove away at a high rate of speed in a careless manner on Highway 540. The male forced a police vehicle off the road near Little Current, and continued to speed away with no concern for public safety. Additional attempts by police to stop the male

driver were unsuccessful. The male continued his dangerous operation, driving towards police vehicles, nearly hitting police officers and swerving around spike belts.

The male continued east bound on Highway 17 towards Sudbury. Police later located and arrested the male at his residence in Azilda.

The OPP's Canine Unit and the Greater Sudbury Police Service both assisted with the investigation.

Blake Guy-Mackinnon, 23, of Azilda, was charged with: robbery with weapon; dangerous operation; possession of weapon

for dangerous purpose; fail to comply with recognition; Driving while under suspension, contrary to section 53(1) of the Highway Traffic Act (HTA).

The accused was scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice Bail Court in Gore Bay.

WIJKWEMKOONG—For the past five weeks, six members of the Debajehmujig Storytellers troupe have been immersed in the Manitoulin Conservatory for Creation and Performance (MCCP) (aka the Clown Farm) working up their clown chops for an innovative mainstage production at Wiikwemkoong's Holy Cross Mission ruins.

'Ndaa doo waabdaan: The Quest' centres on six people who find themselves in the midst of a chaotic world, directionless and struggling. "They recognize that they are missing something from their existence and so they set out to find the seven values of the Anishinabe (aka the Seven Grandfather teachings)," explained Debaj artistic director Bruce Naokwegijig.

The clown-based show grew organically out of the six-person team's work within the Joey and Augute spectrum. Classic comedy duos are made up of a leader and a follower, usually the clever, bossy type who

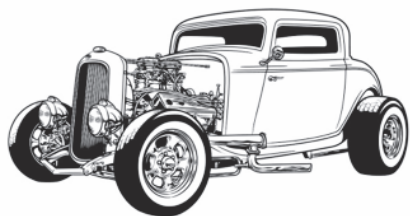

of Goat Island that would bypass Little Current completely were removed entirely from the equation.

Option No. 3, do nothing, was also struck from the list. "I was told that No. 3, do nothing, would not be suitable as they (engineers) were tasked with finding an option to the tune of over \$2 million," the mayor added.

Options 2 and 4 are movable bridges (lift, bascule or swing) located near where the current swing bridge stands while option 5 and 6 (fixed bridge or tunnel) would mean disruption to the residential area found at the end of Harbour View Road.

"Minimization is best," said Councillor Barb Baker, "so No. 2 would be best." Councillor Baker also voiced her concerns with a fixed bridge as it could mean closure in high winds or snowy conditions.

Option 2 would be located just west of the swing bridge and land on the Island at the park area located between the bridge and the Welcome Centre.

Councillor Al Boyd said he had a chance to listen to residents and business owners during the public information

session at the hotel and said option 5 and 6 were of major concern.

"One business owner noted that he employs 40 people in the summer months," Councillor Boyd continued, agreeing with Councillor Baker that a swing or bascule bridge would be better than a fixed one.

"The maximum height for a lift bridge is 36 metres which would preclude some ships from coming through," he said. He also noted the concern of the people who live along the waterfront and whose homes would impede a new bridge build.

Councillor Michael Erskine agreed that option 2 in a bascule format was his preferred choice. "It would be great to have a swing bridge, but I just don't see that happening."

Councillor Bill Koehler and Dawn Orr also picked No. 2. Councillor Boyd recalled the days of the silver bridge linking Goat Island to LaCloche and the many times the Ontario Provincial Police had to close it due to high west winds causing poor visibility in the winter months. He worried a fixed bridge would have the same result.

"From a Ward 1 perspective, taxpayers don't like coming

here because the bridge traffic is a deterrent," said Ward 1 Councillor Laurie Cook. "Let's build something for the next 100 years that will allow that tax base to access the services they pay for."

The mayor noted that he has fielded many phone calls and emails over the past few weeks.

He said he agrees that option 2 is the best to avoid expropriation. "We've got the whole Island chipping into a tourist centre that would be bypassed. Landowners are stressed about that."

A motion was made to recommend option two in a bascule format to the engineers.

Councillor Boyd suggested that, when the new bridge is built, moving the Welcome Centre to Goat Island and having the swing bridge placed on the land there as a tourist attraction.

The mayor said that is not council's current position. "We've got a pretty good setup now. If we're looking at building a new one (Welcome Centre), we'd need some good reasons."

The mayor told council he's been quoted a couple of times as saying he's in favour of keeping the current bridge.

"If it's true it has to be replaced that's fine, but does it?" Mayor MacNevin queried. "We have a bridge that's lasted over 100 years with really minimal problems. They say the bridge has cost \$10 million, but when you factor that over 100 years, it isn't that much. Show me that it has to be replaced."

traffic to be backed up 1.5 kilometres as far back as Barney's Bargain Barn on Highway 540/Worthington Street.

It was also noted that the shorter light cycle means more people are running the red light, thereby causing a vicious circle of cars not being able to utilize the already short green light.

The Ministry of Transportation, which oversees the operations of the swing bridge, however, does not agree with the mayor that a change has been made.

"Staff have reviewed the signal timing at the Little Current Swing Bridge and have verified that no changes have been made to the signal timing, an email from an MTO media spokesperson told The Expositor. "If vehicles are not complying when the traffic signal turns red,

this could result in reduced green signal time available to traffic from the opposing direction. The ministry will request the Ontario Provincial Police to consider this location for increased enforcement action."

The MTO suggested motorists use the overflow

lanes to facilitate traffic.

The MTO also noted that bridge operators can manually extend the green signal time, but only by exception. "The signals function by the programmed timing under normal operational circumstances."

The Expositor asked if a

long weekend with increased traffic would constitute as an exception. The ministry replied that no, "the bridge operator would not consider long weekend traffic an exception to override the signal function on the swing bridge."

the rest of the Island can self refer to the program at the Northeastern Manitoulin Family Health Team. While there are discussions planned with the steering committee overseeing addictions services on Manitoulin on how to improve access for those residing in the western portion of the Island, those discussions, while scheduled, have not yet taken place, let alone settled on a plan for improved access—Facebook reports notwithstanding.

"People can still self

refer to Wiikwemkoong and M'Chigeeng and everyone else can contact the Northeast Manitoulin Family Health Team," said Ms. Miller.

The issue of opioid addiction is still a major challenge on Manitoulin, admitted Ms. Miller, but the success of the program has been nothing short of outstanding. "Of the 140 cases originally left stranded when the Toronto company (that previously offered opioid replacement therapy on Manitoulin) pulled out, 83 percent are stabilized on suboxone, have their fami-

lies back, their jobs back," she said.

With the current system of treatment program placement, most of those tackling their opioid addictions are able to do so in an atmosphere that not only protects their privacy, but ensures that they are not subjected to the societal stigma attached to addictions.

The steering committee dealing with the access to addiction treatment on Manitoulin consists of the executive directors of the health centres, family health teams and Dr. Koka. Those struggling with

addiction issues are urged to contact their local health centre or the Northeastern Manitoulin Family Health Team to learn more about the support services in place to provide assistance. This newspaper will be reporting on any planned expansion or increased access plans as that information becomes available—those currently managing their lives thanks to the current programs are urged to disregard any social media commentary regarding those programs.

"If we're going to enforce it, we're going to have to spend some money," the mayor said.

"If we're going to go that route, we're going to have to make it (the fine) more substantial," added Councillor Bruce Wood.

"I agree that making the fine higher makes it more of an infraction," said Councillor Dawn Orr, suggesting a drop-off zone for boaters along the aforementioned portion of Water Street.

Councillor Baker suggested enforcement of 10 hours a week. Mr. Williamson said that would come at a cost of \$300 should council choose to hire a private security firm. He further suggested that this be done on a trial basis for a few weeks.

Councillor Koehler asked how many managers are designated as bylaw officers. Mr. Williamson responded four. The councillor then asked why they couldn't ticket when they see violations happening.

"They're out doing construction, they're out doing their day job," Mr. Williamson responded. "They have

full-time jobs. It would be exceedingly difficult."

"This sends a clear message to the community that this is not acceptable," Mr. Williamson said.

A motion to hire a security firm for the next few weeks, to ticket bylaw violators, was passed.

she said. "It's good to have these representatives so we can teach about them and promote these fairs so they can get involved and learn about what the subjects around agriculture are all about."

All the contestants received an information package including two pages of the CNE's history.

"I've already got that down, so I went on the CNE heritage site and that's so awesome. I've been reviewing it every night and making notes," said April.

She noted that she found the history of the fair's use during wartime for military purposes to be a particularly interesting study.

"That site has literally everything from the past, present and even some things they're thinking about in the future. I've been doing lots of

There is also a speech component. April has elected to speak about pride of place and will be talking about the Providence Bay Fair, why it is special to Manitoulin and what it means to her.

"This fair in my home community is the whole reason I get to go and have this opportunity at the CNE. I'll be talking about people in my community and how they make it special."

There is an additional component in the marking scheme for 'poise, personality and overall impression,' something April said she would address by just being herself. There is a small allowance for each competitor to purchase professional attire to wear to the competition. She will have to leave the official tiara at home—contes-

tants are only permitted to wear their home fair sashes to showcase their hometown triumph.

There are seven semi-finalists which all receive a cash prize and the top three at the end of the competition receive a bit extra. The winner of the glorious 'Ambassador of the Fairs' title will hold the position for a year and travel across Ontario to represent both the CNE and all agricultural fairs. April said she would be honoured to take home the title of Ambassador of the Fairs.

"I'd be at the fair until September 2, going around meeting people, kind of like I did at the Providence Bay Fair. I'd help at events and activities and introduce people," she said.

Mr. De Lisle says he appreciates Mr. Bernier's emphasis on free speech and freedom of the press.

"We should have truth in our politics. None of this hiding stuff like the shootings going on that Trudeau doesn't want to get out in the media and is buying the media to get his way with our tax money. I really have issues with this," he says, adding that foreign aid money should only be sent after the government deals with its own people, such as seniors and veterans, who are living on the street.

He says taxes are far too high and parents are having to work exceptionally long weeks while their children are raised largely by teachers and babysitters.

"These are not the government's children, these are our children and our families. We need to raise them with the moral values that we have. We need to let the kids be kids and have none of the LGBTQ crap in the schools," says Mr. De Lisle. "Let them, when they reach puberty or older, make the decision as to what they want to do. That's their choice. Don't tell a kid what he's going to be or she's going to be, not something that they have no clue what that even is."

Mr. De Lisle says he wants to work on breaking the wheat, maple syrup and dairy 'cartels' that have increased prices in the name of profits. He says he wants to see the

United Nations removed from Canada so they do not dictate policies and says it is important to get the government's finances in order, create jobs at home and get pipelines built. As for religious values, Mr. De Lisle says he is happy to allow people to practice any faith as long as their views are not extremist.

"I'm against people telling me that I have to do something because they're offended if I don't. This is Canada, this isn't any other country," he says. "I do not want Sharia Law under any circumstances in this country, and (Mr. Bernier) is also against that."

Mr. De Lisle says the PPC is gaining support from former Liberal, NDP, Green and Conservative party members and people of all cultural backgrounds, including immigrants who have "assimilated to our culture." He adds that he is not concerned about vote splitting because votes always get split between the various parties.

Mr. De Lisle says the PPC wants to get rid of the

carbon tax.

"Unlike the Conservatives, we don't want to replace it with another tax. We want it gone permanently so people can afford to eat—less taxes is what we're all about," he says.

One thing which Mr. De Lisle cites as a problem is the globalist position shared by numerous parties, including the Conservatives, which contrasts with the PPC's Canada-first ideology.

"We have borders for a reason. Without borders, why even call it Canada? Just call it 'world,'" says Mr. De Lisle. "Canadians need to be able to survive. Our cultural values are being destroyed."

He says his family and friends in the military have fought and died for the values of Canada. As a patriot, he says Canada's needs should come first.

"I support that 100 percent. I believe in Canada as a free country," he says. "We are a pro-Canada, Canadians'-best-interest party. We're going to get things done and Canadians are the priority."

The player in this year's summer mainstage are

Debaj veterans Samantha Brennana and Ashley Manitowabi, and interns Sheila Trudeau, Stephen Bradleigh, Daniel Mejaki and Sheldon Mejacki.

In a world that places far too much emphasis on the acquisition of money it is easy to see how the players' world is out of balance, becoming an unworkable chaos with each person lacking any sense of direction toward leading a good

on the local project with Laurentian University's Daryl Manitowabi, Laura Hall and Celeste Pedri-Spade of the School of Northern and Community Studies. Other members of the team include Dianna Nabonquot, Naomi Recollet of the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation and Justice Seidel, who is providing administrative support. Hau-ay-aht First Nation elder and residential school survivor Jeffrey Cook from Vancouver Island is also providing support to the project.

"It has been a really enjoyable experience working with this group," said Mr. Cook. "We have grown as a group to appreciate each other."

He noted that a lot of those involved have not been comfortable with public speaking, but that through the project they have found their voices.

"Daryl and I worked closely with Mary Pheasant at Laurentian University back in 2014 when we first brought the collection to the area," said Dr. Walsh.

Bringing the photographs and artworks back to the community has been made possible thanks to a research grant from Laurentian University.

This project grew out of the conundrum faced by the University of Victoria in

2008, when the University of Victoria's Legacy Art Galleries was gifted more than 700 paintings created by Indigenous children between the late 1950s and early 1970s. The paintings were created in art classes taught by Canadian artist Robert Aller. Upon Mr. Aller's death, his family gifted the massive collection of children's art to the University of Victoria.

The majority of the paintings were created by Ojibwe and Algonquin children who attended summer camps with Mr. Aller that were funded by the Department of Indian Affairs in the early 1970s. Prior to these camps, Mr. Aller volunteered in two residential schools, the Alberni IRS in Port Alberni, British

Columbia and the MacKay IRS in Dauphin, Manitoba. Children who attended these two residential schools during the late 1950s and early 1960s created 136 paintings in the collection.

Several of the art camps took place in the Manitoulin region between 1969 and 1970 and the 2014 project held viewings of the photographs and art at the OCF, Wiikwemkoong and Whitefish River First Nation.

The 2011 Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) put out a call for artworks about the residential school experience and legacy. Dr. Walsh contacted the TRC about the newly gifted collection of residential school art and this

resulted in a meeting with Justice Murray Sinclair, chair of the TRC. Since then she has worked closely with elders and survivors from the Elders in Residence program through First Peoples House to create a protocol for working with the paintings from the residential schools.

Over the seven years since the bequeathing of the collection it has been on display in exhibitions

including the National Museum in Ottawa.


"The question was 'what do you do with a collection like this?'," noted Dr. Walsh. The answer that came back through consultation with survivors and their kin was simply to return the works to their creators.

When a photograph is identified by someone visiting the exhibition, that photograph is digitally scanned and given to that individ-

ual.

There are a total of 90 paintings involved in the collection created during the period of 1969 to 1970, 60 of which are from Wiikwemkoong.

In addition to the exhibition of the works at the Debajehmujig Creation Centre in Manitowaning, the collection will also be going to the OCF at M'Chigeeng at dates to be announced.

OPP investigate Country Fest sexual assaults

LITTLE CURRENT—On Sunday, August 11 at 2:10 am, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police and the Manitoulin-Sudbury Emergency Medical Services (EMS) responded to a report of a female with injuries at the Country Fest Fairgrounds in Little Current.

The investigation revealed that a female in attendance at the music festival was walking back to her campsite when she was assaulted by an unknown male. She was transported to hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

While police were investigating the initial incident they received a second complaint at the fairgrounds regarding an assault on another female.

Police believe the two events are linked and are seeking to identify one suspect described as: male, thin build, approximately 5'11", approximately 19 years old with dark hair, short on sides and longer on top.

"First and foremost, we want to extend our thoughts and prayers to these two victims," Kelly Timmermans, co-organizer of Manitoulin Country Fest told The Expositor in a prepared statement. "As a board member of Manitoulin North Shore Vic-

tim Services, I can assure you I am very aware of the prevalence of sexual violence in our society."

"The safety and security of all our patrons is very important to us," Ms. Timmermans continued. "To the best of my knowledge, we have had 12 years with no incidents of this nature. Regardless, we are working closely with the OPP and security to help to identify the suspect(s) and will continue to work with them both to ensure a safe environment for all our patrons."

"There is zero tolerance on the property for any kind of violence," Ms. Timmermans concluded. "We would ask anyone who knows anything about these incidents to contact police or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS."

The investigation is ongoing at this time with the assistance of the Manitoulin OPP Crime Unit. Any person with information regarding these events are being asked to please contact the Ontario Provincial Police at 1-888-310-1122.

Should you wish to remain anonymous, you may call Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS) or submit information online at to sudburycrimestoppers.com where you may be eligible to receive a cash reward of up to \$2,000.

 ton and spends her summers in a cottage in Sandfield. She won several firsts, including for a geranium with variegated leaves, a small leaf begonia, a Hart's Tongue fern, gladioli, miniature, any colour plain and one spike and for her hosta plant with three leaves and eight inches and under.

Penny Palonen, of Evansville, has won many horticultural awards over the years and at this event, she took firsts in ivy geranium, a collection of three zinnias, a heliopsis with three blooms, and a begonia in the fibrous, large leaf, but not an outdoor plant category as well as leaf vegetables, three in a container with water.

Lynda Scott-Harper, of Evansville, displayed a winning entry with a begonia, tuberous, floating in a suitable container, any colour and without foliage. She also took home red ribbons for her orchid, her collection of mixed annuals, and for her caladium in the tuber/bulb/corm plants category.

This flower show is always outstanding and the category where the horticultural members really show their expertise, imagination, and love of plants and flowers in the Specials section where the Treasury of Figurines theme takes place.

Bev Webster of Spring Bay won two of the 10 different categories in this section. 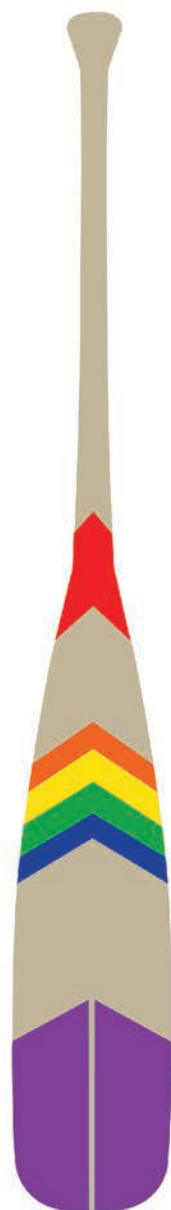



shores from about 1600 until 1620. The saw and grist mills of the 1870s brought more settlers as the bay became a shipping port in the late 80s and the 1890s for the thriving production of railroad ties and pavement posts. When the Providence Bay Fair was founded in 1884, the community had a dock, post office, stores, hotel, boarding house and two churches and was ready to showcase its achievements in 'fancy work,' home baking and in raising prize livestock – all still highlights of the Fair today.

Known as 'the North's longest beach,' Providence Bay's alluringly tranquil expanse of sand lines this broad bay of Lake Huron as it stretches to the horizon. The contoured shoreline saw its share of many shipwrecks during the great era of steam-powered passenger and shipping traffic, giving rise to a mysterious and persistent sighting on these shores.

It's known as the Legend of the Burning Boat and the phenomenon occurs only at about 3 am on the night of a full moon, which just happens to be tomorrow, Thursday, August 15. "Just offshore from the former site of the lighthouse," says Shelley Pearen in 'Exploring Manitoulin,' "a red burning mass" appears over the water, and in it the eerie outline of a phantom sailing ship.

The story of the fiery flames blazing upon the bay's moonlit waves proved to be a popular attraction for the little village in the 1940s when, according to former

Expositor writer Robin Melton (now Duncanson), "tourists and locals alike used to line the shores of Providence Bay, directly in front of the Cornish's camping park to try and catch a glimpse of the flaming enigma."

While some dared to suggest "hot gases" combined with "reflections" caused the dreamlike apparitions, 30 or 40 people at a time would come to witness the event, says Mr Melton, "and all would scan the bay until three or four in the morning." There is film in existence somewhere—with real, actual proof—but today the strange occurrences remain a mystery and seem largely forgotten. Could a selfie with the Burning Boat glowing red in the background provide the definitive confirmation of the elusive phenomenon?

Another legend down here on the south coast is also associated with the Big Water at Providence Bay, and that is of the Sailors' Grave. In a campground at Providence Bay Park, among the forested dunes and the campsites and up a cleared path lie a cluster of three huge boulders, or megaliths, sometimes at the centre of a bunch of kids playing.

Many years ago, the story goes, a boat was wrecked on the rocks in Providence Bay, and the bodies of two sailors washed ashore. An Indigenous man found them on the beach and brought them to the site of the three boulders, where he buried them, according to what he understood to be the sailors' custom. In 1908, the Rev

William Monroe described the man's heroic deed in a long poem that reads in part:

"Within the woods near by,
A quiet, sheltered place.
Beneath the huge, o'er hanging side,
He could the shipwrecked bodies hide."

On Fair weekend and all summer there's lots to enjoy in Providence Bay – with just a touch of mystery to ponder.




"It means a lot to us that you put your hard earned dollars into our event," said Ms. Timmermans to the Paul

Victory I welcomed back to Little Current dock following high water level woes

PORT OF LITTLE CURRENT—As was reported previously, high Lake Huron water levels have affected the Port of Little Current's burgeoning cruise ship industry when the Northeast Town asked the Victory I cruise ship to stop docking at the downtown wall following damage sustained to the dock—a combined result of high water levels and the ship's construction.

During the Victory I's recent visit late last week, the ship could once again successfully dock at the wall, allowing its visitors to peruse the docks and downtown businesses without the aid of a tender vessel.

Dave Williamson, Northeast Town CAO, told The Expositor that the municipality was able to work with the ship's owners and Lakeshore Excursions to mitigate the risk and have the vessel welcomed back to port.

Lakeshore Excursions placed tires along the edge of the dock where the boat's rub rails would hit immediately prior to its

tying up while the ship's deckhands also deployed fenders.

"They're also exercising caution when they come and go in terms of their bow thrusters," Mr. Williamson added. The ship's bow thrusters were also causing damage to the town dock in the current high water situation.

"We will continue to monitor it on a visit-by-visit basis," the CAO said.

The Victory I also had a local tug on standby in case a north wind made it impossible for the captain to use the bow thrusters, which could cause further damage to the dock. The tug would be used to pull the cruise ship from the dock if the thrusters could not be used safely.

Elsewhere in the municipality, high water levels are causing an upswing in the municipal spend. A minimum of \$12,000 has been spent on the downtown docks and at least \$4,000 spent at Spider Bay Marina with the raising of ramp docks two different times, Mr. Williamson shared. The swimming

docks at Low Island are completely under water, but money has not been spent at this location.

The municipal office itself is at risk of flooding due to its proximity to the waterfront and is currently experiencing some basement seepage.

Because of the higher than normal water levels, the Northeast Town has now applied for a FedNor grant for climate change adaptation funding.

"Next year could mean higher water—we just don't know," Mr. Williamson said.

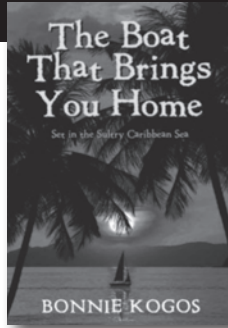

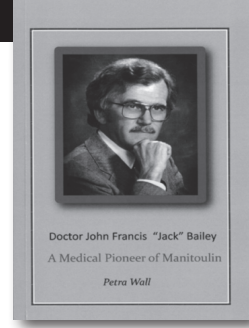

Faith Healing

Rule 1.) It is never God who fails to heal. But it is always man who fails to receive the healing God offers. This works on the same principle as the CBC sending news and me receiving it. If there is something wrong with my receiver (radio, TV) or if I turn the receiver off or to another sender, I cannot blame the CBC for not sending the news.

Rule 2.) Your faith is your receiver. In MAT. 9:22, MARK. 5:34, 10:52, LUKE 7:50, 8:48, 17:19, 18:42. Jesus says to people who are healed, "thy faith has saved thee, or thy faith has made thee whole". Jesus also said, "all things are possible to him who believes," MARK. 9:23.

If the car won't start, you do a diagnostic test to find out what is wrong and then fix the problem. When you do not receive the healing God offers, do a diagnostic faith test to find out what is wrong with your faith and then fix it.

Rule 3.) The healing God offers is mental, emotional, physical and spiritual and God is not a respecter of persons, ACTS 10:34+35. So, the healing like salvation, that God offers is for everyone.

Rule 4.) As faith comes by hearing God's word, ROM. 10:17, we need to study God's word (the bible) to receive the faith we need.

Rule 5.) All God's blessings we receive through reading (studying) God's word (law) meditating on it and obeying it, JOSH. 1:8.

Please note the last point, obedience, without doing what God tells you to do, you may not expect any of God's blessings.

Your ability to receive God's blessings depends on your willingness to study and obey God's word.

Rule 6.) HEBR 11:6 says "God rewards those who diligently seek him."

DEUT. 4:29 says, God will be found if you seek him with all your heart. See also 2 CHRON. 7:14, 15:2 Jesus also says: seek and ye shall find, MAT. 7:7, LUKE 11:9 and seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things (including health) will be added unto you", MAT. 6:33.

To seek God diligently or to seek him with all your heart means you make a 100% commitment to do God's will (obey God's instructions and commandments.)

Rule 7.) You study all the miracles of healing, Jesus did and then because HEBR. 13:8 says "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever", you expect him to do the same for you.

Rule 8.) Jesus is the healer, so you must turn your eyes upon Jesus, who suffered and died on the cross, so you might be healed, IS. 53:3-5. JOHN 3:14 says: as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so the son of man (Jesus) must be lifted up so everyone who looks to him may have life." In NUMB 21:8+9. Israel had sinned, and people were being bitten by poisonous snakes and were dying. God told Moses to make a bronze snake and put it on a pole (this is the symbol of the medical profession) and everyone who was bitten by a snake (Satan-sickness) and looked to this bronze serpent lived (was healed).

Rule 9.) Meditate on scriptures like EX. 15:26, "if you obey my commandments (all 10) I will put no diseases upon you --, for I am Yahweh (the Lord) who heals you". PS. 103:3 "bless the Lord who forgives all your iniquities (when you confess them and repent) and who heals all your diseases". PROV. 4:20-22 "my son pay attention to my words (obey them) for they are life and it will give health to all your flesh". Please note it starts with bless the Lord, God wants you to rejoice, give thanks and praise him, even before the healing and deliverance are manifested see ACTS. 16:24-26, 2CHRON. 20:18-22.

Rule 10.) Faith speaks, ROM. 10:10 with the mouth confession is made unto salvation". MARK. 11:23 "have faith in God, for really I say unto you, that who so ever shall say unto this mountain (sickness) be thou removed and cast into the sea; and shall not doubt (get rid of doubt, JAM. 1:6+7) in his heart but believe that those things which he says shall come to pass; He shall have what so ever he says." God creates all things by his word, GEN 1, you create your own health by your own confession when you make sure that confession agrees with what God says. (PS. 103, IS. 53: 3-5).

Rule 11.) Remember rule 1. God offers healing to everyone there may be other reasons (sins) why a person has not received healing, write me and let me do a diagnostic faith test, so we can find out what that reason is. Remember there is hope, God loves you and desires to heal you.
