Island suffering drought conditions according to Agriculture Ministry

MANITOULIN—The shriveled up leaves, brown patches that once passed as grass and never-ending fire bans are just a few of the telltale markers of an abnormally dry summer on Manitoulin.

According to Environment Canada (which balked when this newspaper suggested the word 'drought'), for the months of April through July, Gore Bay Airport (where the Environment Canada weather station is located) received 153 mm of rain.

"Normal for that period would be 249 mm, so you've had about 61 percent of normal," said meteorologist Peter Kimbell. "Definitely a dry summer so far."

"That would not be a record, however," Mr. Kimbell added. "That belongs to 1923, when 103 mm fell during that same period."

(Due to a tight press deadline, Mr. Kimbell could not say if this is the driest year since 1923, but The Expositor is working on finding that information for the next issue.)

He told The Expositor that the last dry summer in recent years was 2012 when 161 mm was reported in the months of April to July ("admittedly with six missing days of data in April," the meteorologist noted). Mr. Kimbell explained that

Environment Canada does not use the word drought, noting that this is more of an agricultural term.

Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, however, does use the term and according to their latest interactive map, two-thirds of Manitoulin, and all of the West End, is experiencing 'moderate drought' with the east and south of Manitoulin listed as 'abnormally dry.'

"Much of southern Ontario continued to experience patches of significant drought in July; the majority of the agricultural region was impacted by abnormally dry conditions for yet another month," the Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada website states. "As of July 24, nearly 55 percent of the agricultural area in Ontario was impacted by very low to record low precipitation since April 1, 2016, affecting more than 17,000 farms and close to 1.5 million cattle. While certain pockets received good precipitation over the past month helping to alleviate drought concerns, such as west of Ottawa and west of London, a large pocket surrounding Lake Ontario remained in moderate drought. Drought conditions in Northern Ontario only shifted slightly, with some areas experiencing drier conditions while others improved.

Central moves to close Mindemoya hard-to-heat 'Old School' building

CENTRAL MANITOULIN-The Central Manitoulin town council passed a motion at their August 11 meeting to close the building known as the Mindemoya Old School at the end of October 2016. The motion, moved by Councillor Alex Baran and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens, passed unopposed.

"Are we planning on heating the building in any way over the winter?" inquired Councillor Ted Taylor, who pointed out the building contains plaster and lathe wall construction. "It is going to deteriorate pretty badly if there is no heat."

"The general idea when we were closing it was to save costs,' said Mayor Richard Stephens.

We will close it up, seal it up

and not be spending money on heating," said Councillor Dale Scott. "I am not sure how much damage it will do. I assume we

Conservationists fear coyote-wolf trapping ban may creep to Island, endangering deer

TORONTO—The province is seeking input on expanding a proposed ban on the hunting and trapping of covotes and wolves to several units surrounding Killarney Park in order to help protect the threatened Algonquin wolf

population. The proposals have sounded an alarm for the hunting and fishing organizations across the province and raised serious concerns among local trappers as well, but wolf protection groups are applauding the move and would like to see the ban on trapping and hunting extended even further.

"If the province implements a total ban on trapping in those townships surrounding Killarney Park it will have a huge impact on the trappers in those areas," noted local trapper Ian Anderson of Kagawong. One of the few remaining bright lights in the depressed fur industry are the prices for covote and wolf pelts, he noted, but aside from that "it is going to be an uphill battle for the deer and moose populations."

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Wikwemikong Election Gladys Wakegijig hopes to see Wikwemikong retain its language through good leadership

EDITOR'S NOTE: In the lead up to this Saturday's election for chief and council, The Expositor interviewed chief candidates incumbent Duke Peltier and Ron Odjig in last week's paper with Gladys Wakegijig's interview on her candidacy for chief appearing below. The Expositor was unable to reach fellow candidate Robert Corbiere by press time Monday. Polls open at the Wikwemikong band council chambers at 9 am this Saturday, July 20.

Gladys Wakegijig Born and raised in Wikwemikong, Ms. Wakegijig was employed with the Assembly of First Nations in Ottawa for 10 years in the early 1980s before moving back to her community in 1992. She has been on band council intermittently since 1997, and served



as chief in 2000-2001.

"I am always active in being up to date on First Nations, national, provincial and regional issues," said Ms. Wakegijig. "We here in Wikwemikong are among the largest First Nations in Canada. A leader has to be informed and has to realize the bigger picture of indigenous issues—this is unity and unity is not a narrow focus."

Ms. Wakegijig said she first became involved with council because of her passion for indigenous issues born out of her role with the Assembly of First Nations.

"In our ideals, our culture, our traditional spiritualism, we encompass the children, the youth, the adults, the grandmothers. the grandfathers, again this is unity and in indigenous issues, my focus is our language, our youth, our health and our economic well being," said Ms. Wakegijig of her platform. "I mention ecobeing nomic well because employment is an issue-not only for Wikwemikong but for many. many First Nation communities. I also want to help encourage bringing back our language. One of the Truth and Reconciliation report's calls to action, number 13, specially addressed language and culture and I feel this is important

for our community. I am fluent in the language and I would like to see all leadership speak it as well. Our schools are doing an excellent job of teaching the reading and writing of our language, but I would like to see a focus across the community of people speaking it. "

In terms of educational programs, Ms. Wakegijig said that they are very strong in Wikwemikong.

"Our education programs need the continuing support from a solid leader and leadership to pursue the promised First Nation dollars that Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has set as one of his mandates for First Nations," continued Ms. Wakegijig, stressing the need for more band funding to support post secondary education. "Our public works program has

SHEGUIANDAH—Early childhood language learning can establish a foundation that will last a lifetime as young children are uniquely equipped to learn languages. With indigenous languages under pressure across the globe, and barely a handful of the hundreds of indigenous languages in North America expected to last into the next century, the clock is ticking on efforts to preserve and revitalize First Nations languages—but thanks to an historic collaboration between Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI) and Canadore College, new generations of early childhood educators will be uniquely equipped to join the front lines in shoring up Anishinabemowin.

The two educational institutions made a formal announcement of an immersion-based early childhood educator program during the annual Three Fires Confederacy gathering in the traditional roundhouse at the Sheguiandah Heritage Park. This is a one-of-a-kind Ontario Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development certified post-secondary program, the 'Early Childhood Education Anishinabemowin (ECE-A)' program, and is the first to be estab-

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

Better intercity transportation needed in the North

The deterioration of intercity transportation in the North is fully evident to those who can still recall being able to board a train, or in more recent times a bus, from Little Current to travel to the outside world. Today it generally requires owning your own vehicle, inducing someone to provide a lift or hiring a taxi at great expense to reach Espanola—the nearest connection to what remains of Ontario's transportation network in the North.

The last scheduled bus service, operated by Abe Shamess (AJ Bus Lines) and his sons for years even as declining ridership and parcel service competition made it unprofitable to do so, severed a link to the outside world for those who, for many reasons beyond income, could not drive themselves.

But even if a traveller manages to reach the Highway 17 corridor, the challenges of travelling east, west or south have not been overcome, as the shortcomings of Ontario's intercity transportation network will quickly become clear.

An example of the shortcomings in the intercity transportation network was made evident to one group of young visitors from Thunder Bay during the recent Little Current Lions Haweater Weekend festivities when they found themselves bereft of a vehicle and stranded on the Island come Monday morning. Upon inquiry to the bus lines operating in the North, they discovered that the soonest a seat on a bus heading to Thunder Bay could be secured was August 15, a full two weeks away. No passenger trains travel to Thunder Bay either and air service is prohibitively expensive to book on short notice.

Transportation has always proven to be a steep challenge to the delivery of programs in the North. The dispersed population across the North, many living in small rural and/or First Nations communities, have found innovative ways to meet those challenges, such as the Aging at Home Transportation operated by Noojmowin Teg Health Centre for the benefit of all of those people 55 and over for non-emergency transportation to local medical and mental health appointments, social purposes such as banking, grocery shopping, traditional gatherings and social community events.

But the Aging at Home van is not wheelchair friendly (although movement to and from the vehicle can be facilitated with the assistance of a companion) and is currently so oversubscribed that users are limited to booking the transport twice a year.

Ontario clearly needs a better solution to public transit—especially between communities.

Some of the stumbling blocks cited as being in the way of improving intercity transportation are the regulations that currently govern licencing of transit routes between communities. The province is currently seeking input to changes to those regulations that stifle competition and lead to monopolies on bus routes as well as innovative ideas on how to better deliver services between communities. Comment can be made by going online to the Environmental Registry (ebr.gov.on.ca) and searching registry number 012-7896. Comments can be left with the click of a button (there is also a mailing address and telephone number for those who wish to send their message retro-style). It is important that citizens (and businesses) in the North step up to make their concerns known on these issues.

Too often the power of speaking up and being heard is discounted with a nihilistic shrug these days. Governments live or die by how well they serve the people and (with apologies to Dr. Seuss) if enough people demand action, it doesn't take an elephant's ears to get the message.

It is often said that the squeaky wheel gets the grease—on intercity transportation issues it is long overdue that we here in the North squeak loud and clear.

Debaj reinvents Lupi the Great White Wolf 25 years after first production

WIKWEMIKONG—Twenty-five vears after its Debajehmujig debut, the long-told tale from Whitefish River First Nation, Lupi the Great White Wolf, again came to life at Wikwemikong's Holy Cross Mission Ruins last week

Joe Osawabine, Debajehmujig Storytellers' artistic director, directed this important summer main stage production from a unique perspective, as one who had started his acting career as a child with the troupe in that very play in its first production.

The story of Lupi was passed on to Debajehmujig by Whitefish River storyteller Esther Osche, who had been told the tale of love and loss by her grandmother and undoubtedly, her grandmother before her. Ms. Osche and then artistic director Larry Lewis collaborated to create a script for Lupi, "But I didn't want to just create the script again, but go back to the story itself," Mr. Osawabine explained.

With Ms. Osche's consent, Mr. Osawabine said, he set to work to do just that with Ms. Osche being "extremely thrilled" at the suggestions and said it was the most important thing Debajehmujig could do, to share those old stories.

"Debajehmujig's very name is 'keeper of the stories' and our job is to ensure that those stories are passed on," the artistic director shared.

He explained that the story of Lupi the Great White Wolf comes from a people, the people of Birch Island, who lived by the Seven Grandfather Teachings, a kind and gentle people who lived by strict protocols, and so began the tale peppered with beautiful hand drumming songs by Danielle Roy of Odemin Kwe Singers.

Lupi begins with the introduc-tion of the chief and his lovely daughter, Anongoonhs, who has just finished her berry fast and is of the age to accept a suitor for marriage. In those days, the chief, her father, lets it be known that he would be accepting proposals of marriage for his daughter, and included with that, dowries.

Anonghoonhs, however, was already in love with a young man from the village, one she had grown up with and who loved her too, Nimkii.

Nimkii got to work straight away with his dowry bundle, but felt it was inadequate and so sought advice from his father, who told him he did his very best, there was nothing more to do. In Nimkii's dowry bundle, however, he included three wampumsrare shells from the sea that were used in trading.

When Nimkii was about to present his dowry bundle to the chief. the village, then located on an island close to Birch Island's present location became aware of 10 canoes arriving on the beach. In the lead canoe sat a strange old woman, in the rear a young man, unspeaking. The old woman approached the chief, urging him to accept the proposal from her grandson while the 10 canoes were unloaded with at his feet. Nimkii approaches, bearing his small bag of offerings for Anonghoonhs' hand. Mr. Osawabine, the storyteller, explained that the chief needed to uphold the cultural protocols of his people, and the old lady knew this too, but the chief also did not want to let his daughter go to strange people and decided that some traditions were made to be broken and made the announcement that he would accept Nimkii's proposal. The wedding ceremony was a happy affair, full of feasting. round dances and two-stepping that included the audience, who were, after all, the wedding guests. That night, Nimkii placed the wampums around his bride's

who had just lost his mother and was about to throw him into a fire when the grandmother begged and pleaded for his life. The chief shot the baby down onto the ground, sparing him from the fire, and the boy never spoke a word from that day forward. The old woman spent the next years learning the ways of that raiding community, studying the people. If the chief had accepted the dowry, all would be forgiven and the slate would be wiped clean, but since they were rebuked, she summoned all of her powers and medicines, invoking the four directions. The grandmother placed white wolf pelts around her grandson and transformed him into a half wolf. half man creature, Lupi the Great White Wolf, and set him loose in the community to get his vengeance. Lupi lurked in the woods around the village, devouring victims that crossed his path. With more and more of his villagers disappearing, the chief prayed to all the spirits he could until finally the water spirits answered and showed him a vision of when he had led a raid on the neighbouring village, who the old lady and

the grandson-turned wolf were, and he understood. He called for his people to fill their canoes and flee, including Anonghoonhs, who was waiting for Nimkii to return

from his first trip away from her. As the people began to pile into their canoes, Anonghoonhs realized she had left her wampum necklace behind and ran to get it. When she entered her lodge, there was Lupi, holding her necklace. He pleaded with her not to leave. "Without you, all my dreams die with you," he told her, transforming into her husband. Frightened, and not knowing who he really was, she ran. But while escaping from the wolf creature she tripped, hitting her head, and died. Lupi ran to her, mourning her in howls and nuzzling her, for he never wanted to hurt her. "He

loved her," the storyteller said. At that moment Nimkii arrived to find Lupi over his dead wife and a battle ensued between the two, with Nimkii losing to the wolf-man in the end.

The chief returned to find his daughter and husband dead and is chased by Lupi into the water where the wolf is burned by the water spirits, destined to never leave the island again.

And as for Anonghoonhs and

Nimkii, they lived on in eternity. Veteran Debajehmujig Storyteller Matt Manitowabi played the role of Nimkii while first-time actor Katie Peltier portrayed Anonghoonhs.

Unique to Lupi the Great White Wolf, as it was 25 years ago, is the use of the Ojibwe language throughout the play, a new and exciting challenge for most of the actors.

Cotnee Kaboni, the grandmoth-er in Lupi, also acted as the theatre's language teacher.

Both Mr. Manitowabi and Ms. Peltier explained that, like most youth taking Anishnaabemowin classes, they only learned the words for things, but not conversational Ojibwe, so learning the lines was a struggle, "but it opened a door, definitely," Mr. Manitowabi said, noting he has a son in the immersion program and he hopes that his son will actually be able to have someone to talk to in the home through him.

Ms. Peltier too said she hopes to keep learning her language, spurred on by Anonghoonhs.

'It was always our intention to go back to the story," Mr. Osawabine said of Lupi the Great White Wolf.

He noted that, 25 years ago, he was one of the young village boys in the production of Lupi, chosen after Larry Lewis asked him to read and audition, as was Bruce Naokwegojig (now in charge of outreach for Debaj), who acted as the chief in this summer's production of Lupi.

"Who would have ever thought at I would be here. 25 years later. as the artistic director," Mr. Osawabine continued. "It was an amazing experience from Larry having that vision. That was the very beginning, and I don't know how much foresight he had, but I don't know where I'd be now if it wasn't for Larry calling me in and asking me to read.' Lupi the Great White Wolf has been an important piece for the Debajehmujig Storytellers. It has been performed, as it was last week, in a combination of Ojibwe and English, in Ojibwe only and also largely in English. When the Debajehmujig players made their first international tour to three venues in the northeast United States, it was Lupi the Great White Wolf that they brought to brand new audiences (who received the story with positive enthusiasm). It was wonderful to see Debajehmujig returning to the Holy Cross Mission Ruins once again with a significant performance.

The strange old woman, who was camped on a nearby island with her grandson, learned the news of Nimkii's acceptance into the family through a messenger from the chief. When the messenger left, she sat her grandson down and told him of the atrocities that the chief and his war party had led against her village, killing his mother and almost killing him.

The chief, she told him, had picked him up as a wailing baby

In the early hours of August 9, the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service responded to a a family dispute at a residence on the M'Chigeeng First Nation.

As a result, a 20-yearold female was arrested and charged with aggravated assault and mischief under \$5,000. The accused was released on a promise to appear with conditions and a court date set on September 12, 2016.

The victim was taken to the Manitoulin Health Centre in Mindemova and was treated for her injuries.

Search warrant yields drugs, cash and firearms

A Little Current man has been charged following a five month-long investigation by the Manitoulin Detachment of the **Ontario Provincial Police** (OPP).

On August 10, members of the local detachment, assisted by the OPP Emergency Response Team (ERT), attended a private residence in Little Current with a search warrant. As a result of the search, marijuana products, cash and firearms were seized.

A 55-year-old man of Little Current has been arrested and charged with two counts of possession for the purpose of trafficking a controlled substance, contrary to section 5(1) and section 5(2) of the Controlled Drug and Substances Act, one count of production of a controlled substance, contrary to section 7(1) of the Controlled Drug and Substances Act, careless storage of a firearm, contrary to section 86(1) of the Criminal Code of Canada, unauthorized possession of a firearm, contrary to section 91(1)of the Criminal Code of Canada, and possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000, contrary to section 354(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada. The accused person is to appear in the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on October 18, 2016.

ing lake can help spread with native species, taking and they negatively affect any water body. harmful invasive species. And that these invadersleft unchecked-can seriously harm your favorite lakes and rivers.

Fish, plants or invertebrates can be spread by humans-either on purpose or by accident-to new areas of the province. These species can become invasive, causing harm to the environment and the economy. In fact, in Ontario, the impacts from zebra mussels alone cost between \$75 million and \$91 million per year.

And the presence of invasive species means fewer of the types of fish you like to catch, since invasives often compete

away their food and space or introducing parasites and diseases that harm native fish and other species.

When invasive species are introduced and get established, their numbers can increase rapidly. Some invasive species that have already invaded Canadian waters include: zebra mussels (mussel), round goby (fish), spiny water flea (invertebrate), Eurasian watermilfoil (aquatic plant) and the rusty crayfish.

Invasive species are among the leading causes of native fish and other aquatic species being threatened or endangered,

global biodiversity, economies and human health around the world. How to stop the

spread of these invaders

Here are five steps boaters can take to make sure they are not spreading invasive species to new areas.

Inspect your boat, motor, trailer, and boating equipment (anchors and fishing gear. centerboards. rollers and axles). Remove any zebra mussels and other animals and plants that are visible before leaving any water body.

Drain water from the motor, live well, bilge and transom before leaving

Wash or dry your boat. tackle, downriggers, trail-

er, and other boating equipment to kill harmful species that were not visible at the boat launch. Some aquatic species can survive out of water for long periods of time. Therefore, it is important to either: rinse your boat and equipment that normally gets wet with hot tap water (greater than 50°C); spray your boat and trailer with high pressure water (>250 psi); or dry your boat and equipment in the sun for at least five days before transporting them to another body of water.

Empty your bait bucket on land 30 metres away

from the water. Never release bait into water, or release aquatic animals from one water body into another. It is illegal to use gobies, ruffe or rudd for bait.

Five specifically deal with sport and recreation such as No. 88 which states, 'We call up upon all levels of government to take action to ensure long-term aboriginal athlete development and growth, and continued support for the North American Indigenous Games, including funding to host the games and for provincial and territorial team preparation and travel.' It can't be highlighted enough the importance of sports and wellness."

Ms. Trudeau said that every three years the games alternate between being held in the US and Canada, but as there were no bids for 2017 from the US, the Aboriginal Sport and Wellness Council of Ontario mounted a bid for the games to be held in Toronto and were successful.

"We have garnered financial support from the provincial and federal government and the City of Toronto as well," said Ms. Trudeau. "A big piece for us is obtaining enough sponsorship for our 10.1 million dollar budget, but we are well on our way to successfully meeting our target to deliver the games."

The administrators of the two educational institutions determined that it would be "most fitting and appropriate" to make the announcement at the Three Fires Confederacy, where the introduction of teaching lodges within educational systems was discussed by KTEI elder-in-residence Josh Eshkawkogan.

Also raising excitement at the announcement was the possibility of the construction of a teaching lodge for KTEI that may also be on the horizon, noted Mr. Eshkawkogan. The lodge would be intended not only for the use of students and faculty of the new ECE-A program, but for other community organizations and groups as well.

"Bringing back and acknowledging our ways of learning and knowing within our education systems, and most importantly, teaching our children in our own language, Anishinabemowin, is putting into action what our elders have told us to do for so many years," said Stephanie Roy, KTEI executive director. "Together, the great team members of Canadore College and our staff have yet again demonstrated their commitment to higher education and indigenous learning with this new program-and we are thrilled to support First Nation community schools and early learning centres everywhere by providing this opportunity."

Ms. Roy gave much of the credit to the development of the program to the KTEI team, particularly to Rhonda Hopkins, Anishinabe Odziiwin team leader and immersion instruction, and Mary Wabano, associate dean of the School of Indigenous Studies at Canadore College. "Mary has been a strong and committed advocate and supporter within the college system for aboriginal institutes to create new post-secondary programs where language and worldview is a cornerstone to indigenous student identity, infused with our cultural traditions as a central foundation to overall well-being for students," said Ms. Roy.

"We truly teach our children our value system and lessons through our language," said Ms. Wabuno. "We are beyond merely translating from English to Anishinabemowin and it is this kind of work that further support our communities in their language and immersion goals."

Canadore College vice-president enrollment management, student services, recruiting and marketing Shawn Chorney was on hand for the announcement and he too had high praise for Ms. Wabuno and Ms. Hopkins in "our journey together."

Mr. Chorney noted the challenges that have been faced in creating the program and managing to fit the round peg of an Anishinabemowin and culture based program into the square holes of the provincial bureaucracy. "We were told that we could not have the program descriptions and course numbers in Oiibwe." he recalled. "We said that was the province's problem, not ours."

Ms. Wabuno broke the ice in her remarks during the announcement. "You are probably asking yourself what a Cree woman is doing speaking Ojibwe up here," she said, noting that she was far from Moosonee, the territory of her birth. "I have lived in your territory longer than I have lived in my own." Ms. Wabuno has been living and working in Nipissing for most of her career.

In a recent visit to her home community, Ms. Wabuno made a disturbing observation. "People my age are the last of the fluent speakers," she said. "For the younger generations, Cree is a second language. English is

their first language."

While the importance of the immersion program will be felt within its first generation of students, Ms. Wabuno pointed out that the real impact will come with the second, third and fourth generations. "Not just in reserve schools, but in provincial schools across the province," she said.

Ms. Wabuno was described as being the "most feared" of the KTEI team, a description she wore as a badge of honour. "Sometimes I speak boldly," she admitted. "I have no filters, I just say things-but it seems to work. They (provincial government bureaucrats) have a lot of questions and we had answers that didn't fit in their neat little boxes."

Ms. Wabuno and Ms. Hopkins were presented with a number of symbolic gifts including toddler moccasins, figurines dressed in jingle and shawl dancer regalia and medicines.

The two-year Early Childhood Education—Anishinaabemowin diploma program has been approved for delivery at Canadore's partner institutions, Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI) in M'Chigeeng First Nation and Seven Generations Educational Institute in Fort Frances. The Ontario College two-year diploma in Anishinaabe Early Childhood Education is delivered solely in Anishinaabemowin (Ojibwe) over four semesters. The Anishinaabe knowledge based program meets all the standards of the Ontario Early Childhood Competency guidelines and was officially approved by the Ontario Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development (formerly known as the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities) earlier this month. The first cohort(s) are expected to be delivered at partner sites starting in the 2016-2017 academic year.

...continued from page 3 always worked with a minimal budget, doing an excellent job for the community. The current federal government has indicated that infrastructure is a priority not only nationally but specifically mentioned for First Nations and I will ensure that our voice, Wikwemikong's, will benefit from the proposed funding revenues so that our employees and our community will see the strength that good leadership can provide. Economic development is a stronghold in our community and must continue to be strengthened by the leadership's advocacy to pursue and access economic incentives entitled to the people of Wikwemikong."

Wakegijig also Ms. stressed the importance of communication, and keeping band members informed of current and future developments both nationally and in the community.

"What happens nationally comes down to the grass roots level," explained Ms. Wakegijig.

"When the prime minister met with the chiefs in December 2015, I was in attendance," she said. "He said that it was time for renewed relationshipsnation to nation—based on respect and cooperation. This really resonated with me. Wikwemikong has been working with the federal and provincial governments regarding our

claim to islands in Lake Huron and the prime minister also said at that December meeting that no relationship is as important to him as the one with First Nations."

"I will continue to work hard and to speak on issues that are of concern," concluded Ms. Wakegijig. "I would also like to take this opportunity to wish all candidates best wishes on your election campaigns.'

Billings History Day reveals the story behind the ship wreck Erebus

First public viewing of Allan Tustian documentary

KAGAWONG—It was a full house for both the matinée and evening presentation at the Kagawong Park Centre for the annual Billings Heritage Museum's History Day which focused on the recent discovery of the wreck of Erebus, the flagship of famed arctic explorer Captain Sir John Franklin, as well as a special viewing of the documentary of the military career of Mindemova's Allan Tustian.

This is the story of two ships who hoped to find their way through the Northwest Passage and got lost," said Billings Museum Curator Rick Nelson, "never to escape." Mr. Nelson introduced Marty Magne, director of the Archaeology and History Branch of Parks Canada, who gave a presentation on the Franklin expedition and the discovery on September 9, 2014 of the HMS Erebus.

"In 1845 Franklin set out for the Northwest Passage," said Mr. Magne. "Franklin was no novice and had been the governor of Tasmania for 10 years. The two ships were reinforced battleships, the HMS Erebus and HMS Terror, and had bows clad with iron 10 feet back to help with the ice. They had 12 ton locomotive engines installed, which was a first at the time."

Mr. Magne explained that the boats left on May 19, 1845, carrying 129 men and enough gear for three winters, as they knew there was a good chance that they would get iced in during the winters.

Some of the gear include four tons of meat preservatives, four tons of chocolate, 16 thousand litres of liquor, an organ, and even a chimp given to the crew of Erebus by Franklin's wife Jane Giffin.

In the winter of 1845 is when the first trouble began, Mr. Magne said, noting that three men died wintering near Beechey Island.

Mr. Magne talked about how the bone analysis of the three bodies found buried on Beechey Island indicated a high level of lead. but that in the industrial age of England, many individuals would have had high levels of lead in their systems.

After two years of no word from Franklin, in 1848 search expeditions began.

Mr. Magne stressed the importance of the Inuit in the search, directing the search parties to the locations they had last seen the ships.

"There was a report in 1849 of 40 men that were spotted by the Inuit," said Mr. Magne, "but when they went back the next year they only found graves and artifacts (on King William Island)."

In 1859 the Victory Point letter was found on King William Island from 1847 by a party led by Royal Navy Lieutenant William Hobson. "The letter describes Franklin's death," said Mr. Magne. He said that it also had conflicting messages, with the first reporting that 'All is well' on May 28, 1848 and the second from April 1848, reporting that the ships had been trapped in the ice for a year and half and that the crews had abandoned the ships and nine officers and

During his expeditions Mr. Hall discovered camps, graves and relics on the southern coast of King William Island and gath-

ered a lot of Inuit testimony and accounts. There were many other expeditions over the years, but in 2014, when Parks Canada, partnered with other government agencies under the 'Victoria Strait Expedition' items were found on Hat Island in the Queen Maud Gulf near King William Island.

One item was found which was part of the boat-launching device and featured the Royal Navy's broad arrows. This led the boats searching the water for the wrecks using sonar to start looking closer to the area the artifact was found.

"Erebus was found a short time later," said Mr. Magne. "It was only 15 feet below the surface. The first thing we did is send down equipment to take high definition video. We were pretty sure it was one of Franklin's ships but we didn't know which one.'

By comparing sonar scans and architectural drawings, the ship was found to be Erebus due to the two ships being a difference of two feet in length.

There was tremendous excitement in the press," added Mr. Magne. "There were over 600 stories that were run across 30 countries and in 40 different languages."

Mr. Magne explained how the team. when back, began exploring the ship wreck, finding the ship's bell on the top of the deck. The bell was removed from the ship as there were worries it would be taken. Shortly after, a 10 kilometer protected area around Erebus was put in place. In 2015, Park Canada's underwater archeologists and the Royal Canadian Navy's Fleet Diving Unit Atlantic cut holes in the ice and dove under the Arctic Sea to study the wreck. Among the artifacts retrieved were a cannon, an illuminator, hook block, buttons a ceramic plate, rigging block and a ... continued on page 27



15 crew had died, including Franklin.

"Had they fallen through the ice? Were they attacked by polar bears?" said Mr. Magne. "It was a very strange situation."

Mr. Magne spoke of the expeditions led by Charles Francis Hall in 1860 and 1869. He spoke with an Inuit husband and wife who helped him and drew a map of where they had last seen Erebus.

"If it was to scale, where they said the ship was would have been bang on to where we found it (in 2014)," said Mr. Magne.

Australian quilter travels Manitoulin to experience the Manitoulin Circle Project

LITTLE CURRENT—Australian quilter Jane Milne has been following the Manitoulin Circle Project since its inception several years ago and made the 7,248 km journey to Manitoulin to see the completed collection in person last week.

"I learned about the project from a link in a blog I explained Ms. follow" "I really like Milne. reclaimed textiles and I have been following the project for years so I made the three-plane trip and 1,000 km drive to Manitoulin to see it. My husband peter wanted to go to New Orleans and I said I would only come if we could come here to see it (the quilt collection)."

In her community in western Victoria, Ms. Milne has been a part of two community quilting projects—a Korean war quilt and the second, a quilt of the townscape.

"I've been sewing since I was eight," shared Ms. Milne. "My sister taught me. In 1975 I started quilting after I won a quilt in a raffle while on an exchange in the Catskills (Mountains) in New York. The quilt got me interested, and I actually still have it to this day."

Julia McCutcheon of Little Current, who was an active participant in the Manitoulin Circle Project, met the Milnes during their visit to the Little Current United Church where the collection is on permanent display. She showed Ms. Milne the quilts and shared memories from the creation of the pieces.

"They are even better in person than on the computer screen," said Ms. Milne. "I knew I wouldn't be disappointed. Seeing them in person allowed me to see how sculptural they are and the way the light hits them."

The four-year Manitoulin Circle Project was born out of an assignment by Manitoulin fibre artist Judy Martin through the Julia Capara School and a course she was taking on Liturgical embroidery.

Though the original assignment was simply the planning and consultation on a project, which Ms. Martin did with the former reverend of the Little Current United Church Faye Stevens, Ms. Stevens and members of the congregation became so passionate about the project that Ms. Martin decided to take the project on, thus the Manitoulin Community Circle Project was born. Over the four years, a total of 140 women met at the church Thursday afternoons to work on the project. The result was a collection of four large panels-'Layers of Time,' 'Mended World,' 'Precious Water' and 'Earth Ark.' After they viewed the panels, Ms. Milne and her husband visited Ms. Martin at her Sheguiandah home. "It blew me away when I got her (Ms. Milne's) letter saving that she was coming," Ms. Martin told The Expositor, "but she did and

a design workshop. Instead it offers guidance towards a sensitive yet conceptual approach to found, saved, gifted or newly purchased cloth and threads. Through close observation and hands on exploration of materials and techniques, ideas for poetic art become evident. This is an idea workshop. Textiles have power and beauty when they can be understood on several levels. Hand embroidery allows Y-O-U to make art that is conceptual and real."

"Other tutors that are going to Austrialia and New Zealand that I am looking forward to meeting are Donna Watson, Caroline Barlett and Claire Wellesley Smith," said Ms. Martin.

...'Telehomecare' for COPD patients pioneered by DSB, CCAC

... continued from page 1 matter where they live in the region.

"When we get a patient for telehomecare in the area, we tell them they will receive a visit by a paramedic and a brief description of what will take place," explained Tammy Windsor, manager, clinical services, North East CCAC.

"The paramedics are basically the eyes in the home," she added, "and they do the first visit."

Once in the home, the paramedic will install a tablet, blood pressure cuff, scale and pulse oximeter (which monitors oxygen levels)

That data is automatically sent to the tablet and then uploaded to the nurse, who has already been briefed by the patient's doctor on what typical vitals should look like. The patient must also answer a daily set of question on the tablet, such as 'how did you sleep?' how is your appetite?' and 'do you have a cough today?

"As soon as they see vital signs that aren't normal, the nurse will call the patient and say 'hey, what's going on'," Ms. Windsor said. "If the vital signs don't come in, they will call, if no answer, they will try again, or try a different contact. If there is still no answer, the nurse will call the paramedics and get them to go and check on the patient.'

One Little Current woman who lives with both CHF and COPD told the Expositor she is very happy with the program.

"I was in the hospital for two weeks, I was pretty sick," the woman, who asked to go unnamed, told this newspaper. "My blood pressure was all over the place and my oxygen was low.

The patient said she's been part of the program since June and is pleased with the good habits she is learning from the process, such as checking her vitals each day.

"It gives you the opportunity to share more information and it's easy to use," she shared.

The woman was pleased to note that, since her time in hospital and her time on the program, she hasn't had any flareups and suggests other people with her conditions take advantage of the telehomecare program. "You keep track of yourself, and they keep track of you too.'

"It's really quick at capturing something that's gone wrong, right away," Ms. Windsor added. "The either paramedics can address the issue there or refer them to the hospital and their physician."

Fern Dominelli, Manitoulin-Sudbury DSB CAO, explained that this program fits nicely into the DSB's paramedicine program, noting that every medic is trained by the CCAC on how to install the units, as well as how to give referrals to the CCAC about patients they see who would be good fits for telehomecare.

the most effective method of control on predator populations are the licenced trappers. "Hunters take a few," he said, "but even the most experienced covote and wolf hunters have low success rates." Allowing the predator populations to rise unfettered and without any form of effective control will inevitably "impact resident wildlife,"

he said. "That is going to lead to long term impacts."

"A large coalition of organizations has gathered together to call for full protection of Algonquin wolves across their entire range," notes a release from Earthroots. "Algonquin wolves are sparsely distributed across Central Ontario. The groups are ... continued on page 14

"This is all about becoming a greater part of the healthcare system," added DSB Chief of Paramedic Services Michael MacIsaac. "There are a lot of gaps where we can assist, and if we can avoid 911 calls...'

The six nurses who cover the whole northeast region also do medication reconciliation with their patents. "The nurses will go through all the medications in the home, compare it to the pharmacy records and what the doctor says is best," Ms. Windsor said. "The nurse

also sets up healthy coaching sessions on how to better manage their condition.


When the telehomecare program is wrapped up in five months, the paramedics will again go to the home and retrieve the equipment. The patients really like that the paramedics are there," she said. "We've had many successes and feel good moments.'

Ms. Windsor explained that the paramedic-partnered telehomecare program is unique in the province, adding that the North West CCAC is also looking to start its own program and the hope is that it will expand across the province.

"Telehomecare has been around since 2012, but the partnership with para-medics is brand new," she added, noting that in 2012, patients with CHF and COPD were identified as the group with the highest number of hospital and emergency department vis-

"It's been a success story." Ms. Windsor said proudly. "It means better care for the patient."

urging the public to comment on two government proposals (EBR #012-8104 and EBR #012-8105) before Monday, August 22, 2016 to ensure the ESA is used to recover the Algonquin wolf population as intended."

The MNRF calls for comment are to move the Algonquin wolf from "of concern" to "threatened" and to ban hunting and trapping of wolves and coyotes in a range of townships surrounding a number of parks. The hunting and trapping of wolves and coyotes is currently prohibited in a number of other provincial parks, including Kawartha Highlands, Killarney, Killarney Lakelands and Headwaters, French River and Queen Elizabeth II Wildlands.

"The coalition stresses the need to extend protection to eastern coyotes and their hybrids," notes the Earthroots release, "neither of which can be differentiated from Algonquin wolves without a genetic test."

To help support the protection and recovery of the Algonquin wolf, it is proposed that hunting and trapping of wolf and coyote be prohibited in three additional core areas where Algonquin wolf is known to occur. This proposal addresses wolf and coyote collectively within these core occurrence areas because they are difficult to visually distinguish from other canids (gray wolf, Great Lakes-boreal wolf, eastern coyotes, hybrids) due to their similar appearance (colouration, markings and overlap in size). As such, the following regulatory changes are being proposed under the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act to ban trapping and hunting of wolves and coyotes in the area of Kawartha Highlands Provincial Park, which includes the geographic townships of: Anstruther, Burleigh, Cardiff, Cavendish, Chandos, Harvey, and Monmouth; and in the area of Queen Elizabeth II Wildlands Provincial Park, which includes the geographic townships of: Anson, Dalton, Digby, Longford, Lutterworth, Minden, and Ryde; as well as in the area of Killarney Provincial Park, which includes the geographic townships of: Allen, Attlee, Bevin, Burwash, Caen, Carlyle, Cox, Curtin, Dieppe, Eden, Foster, Goschen, Halifax, Hansen, Humboldt, Killarney, Kilpatrick, Laura, Roosevelt, Sale, Secord, Servos, Struthers, Tilton, Truman and Waldie.

But anecdotal observations clearly indicate that the populations of coyote, at least, on nearby Manitoulin are very healthy indeed.

"My parents and I have been regularly sitting at the kitchen table at my parents' farm (where they raise a large herd of goats) and we can hardly talk over the sound of the coyotes," said Kyla Jansen of Honora Bay. "We find ourselves racing out to bring the dogs in because they will want to protect our property."

Ms. Jansen, who operates the Honora Bay Riding Stable, stresses that she does not have any kind of hate on for wolves or coyotes. "I was raised in the wild. I sleep outside in the woods and I love the sounds of the wild," she said, "but we have never seen (or heard) anything like this in 40 years."

Ms. Jansen recalled a recent morning ride where she spotted what she thought was a herd of deer in one of her hay fields. "I thought to myself 'oh look at the deer' then I realized that it wasn't deer I was looking at," she said. "This was around 9:30 in the morning, they were not concerned about us at all." Unlike wolves, coyotes tend to be less skittish around humans.

Ms. Jansen has serious concerns about the proximity of coyotes to her barns. "I am up about four or five times a night because they are so close to the barns," she said. "My old mare Angel is 32-years-old, living with a little miniature horse in one of the far pastures. They would not be able to defend themselves against these packs that I have never experienced difficulties with before."

Finding the balance between control of predators like the coyote and endangered species like the Algonquin wolf pose challenges, particularly when concerns about moose and deer populations are thrown into the mix.



Mrs. McCauley's life was certainly a busy one as Mr. Martin attested. Some of the activities of this mother of





Three Fires Confederacy meeting in Sheguiandah seeks to strengthen bonds

SHEGUIANDAH—The historic alliance of the Three Fires Confederacy is celebrated and reinvigorated each year at a conference hosted by the Kenjegwin Teg Educational Institute. The Three Fires Confederacy is made up of the Ojibwe, Odawa and Potawatamie, three Anishinabe nations that share many language and cultural norms and formed a political and military alliance that helped sustain their communities through several major conflicts that shook their world both pre- and post contact.

With rotating locations, this year's Three Fires Confederacy conference took place August 9 and 10 at the Sheguiandah Heritage Park (at the beach area and roundhouse) and attracted elders and speakers from across Mnidoo Mnising.

Elder Gordon Waindubence spoke on the teachings of the sweat lodge, a key binding tradition in which both healing and traditional knowledge have been passed on down through the generations.

This year, Wikwemikong elder Gerry Kaboni spoke on the tree teachings, relating the knowledge passed on to him by elders in his community home of Kaboni. Mr. Kaboni recalled coming across a strange tree in his youth and asking one of the local elders about it.

The tree was formed by the melding of three separate trees, twisted as young saplings around each other. The trees were planted in the centre of the settlement or village, symbolizing the unity of the Three Fires. As time went on and the trees grew up, they would fuse into one. The tree Mr. Kaboni had found was located some distance from the current settlements in Wikwemikong, but was at the site of one of the earlier

territories now known as Wikwemikong.

On Thursday, August 11, following the conference, one of the triple-trunked bundle of saplings was planted at the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation in M'Chigeeng.

The setting of Three Fires gathering on the picturesque shores of Sheguiandah Bay included the impressive roundhouse constructed of local timber and built with local labour. Speakers stood on a cedar (one of the sacred medicines of the Anishinaabe) strewn platform in the centre of the roundhouse, the sun streaming down from a central skylight to provide natural illumination. With doorways in the four directions open, the cool breezes from the bay kept the inside of the structure remarkably cool, despite the oppressive heat outside.

During the gathering, children and other community members took part in workshops on traditional artisan work and games, including Canada's national sport (no not hockey, lacrosse, a part of our national heritage that has languished too much from neglect in recent years).

During the second day of the conference, an historic announcement of a partnership unique between Canadore College and Kenjegewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI) to deliver an early childhood educator program that will take place completely in the language illustrated the efforts being made to strengthen and enhance Anishinabemowin.

Elder-in-residence Josh Eshkawkogan spoke on the teaching lodge concepts that are being explored by KTEI and which infuse the learning that takes place in that

settlements in the unceded institution. Too often, he said, people wait until the bureaucracy allows something to go ahead, but when it comes to passing on the culture and knowledge of the Anishinaabe, something that is so important to building the pride and confidence that young people need to succeed in the modern world, to understand their place in the world. there is no time to wait upon the whims of the provincial and federal governments.

> "This is for the benefit of our children," he said. "Sometimes you just have to go ahead and do it.'

'Sometimes you have to stop looking back and look at where you are going," said Mr. Eshkawkogan.

The key element, the number one teaching, he noted, is "respect." From that teaching, the other six

Salmon Classic

Inaugural Salmon Classic wraps up with \$25K in prize giveaways

MANITOULIN—That's a wrap, folks! The inaugural Manitoulin Expositor Salmon Classic wrapped up on Sunday before an enthusiastic crowd of fisherfolk at the Providence Bay Marina, swapping tales of the ones that got away, while \$25,000 in cash prizes was awarded to six successful souls.


Manitoulin Expositor publisher Rick McCutcheon began the Salmon Classic proceedings by explaining how the idea for Northern Ontario's largest salmon fishing tournament came to fruition. Following a meeting of independent newspaper publishers in the fall of last year, at which Expositor production manager Dave Patterson was a guest speaker on the topic of social media, Mr. Patterson left with the idea of hosting a salmon derby following another presentation on newspapers as events coordinators.

Mr. Patterson, an avid fisherman himself, pitched the idea to the publishers and the blessing was given to run with it.

Mr. McCutcheon noted that more than 30 years ago, he was at a meeting between the Manitoulin Tourism Association, when he was president at the time, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Jim Sloss and his late father Elwood who were representing recreational fishing interests. At that meeting, the talk was of stocking splake and lake trout (the Sloss family was adamantly opposed to splake), but Mr. McCutcheon recalled Jim Sloss also giving an impassioned plea for salmon, "which was coming into its own then. 'People like catching big fish'," he recalled Mr. Sloss as saying. Mr. Sloss has been active for many years in the Gore Bay Fish and Game Club and its salmon hatchery program and just recently retired as the founding chair of the United Fish and Game Club of Manitoulin.

"Thirty years later, here we are," he added, thanking everyone for coming, for participating, and acknowledging the many sponsors who helped make the Salmon Classic possible and assisting in the costs of off-Island marketing.


"We started this because we wanted to bring some tourism dollars back to Manitoulin and to get back out fishing the way people used to," Salmon Classic coordinator Dave Patterson said, addressing the crowd of avid fishermen gathered on the marina deck. "There were lots of fish caught, and we're definitely going to continue the derby next year."

First place went to Reinhard Roick of Ottawa for his 22.75 lb salmon caught off of South Baymouth, \$12,000; second place, Kevin Boyd of Hanmer for his 21.69 lb salmon caught at Providence Bay, \$4,000; third place, Neil McNally of Massey for his 20.08 lb salmon caught in the North Channel at Darch Island, \$2,000; Ian Anderson with his 20.04 lb salmon, also caught in the North Channel at Clapperton, \$1,000; and fifth, John Henderson with his 19.69 lb salmon caught at Meldrum Bay, \$500.

Local fisherman Don Hysert of Tehkummah won the heaviest sic. Mr. Roick fished with Screamin' Reels Charters of South Baymouth for the derby.

One thousand dollars a week was awarded over the three weeks for heaviest fish of the week. Those winners are: week one, Kevin Boyd of Hanmer; week two, Neil McNally of Massey; and week three, Reinhard Roick of Ottawa.

Winner of a stay for two at Huron Motor Lodge was Kevin Boyd. Winners of the heaviest fish caught on July 26, 27 and 28 for the prize of a Buck fishing knife courtesy of Mac's Camp are, respectively, Nick Purvis, Robert Zandarin and Christian Seguin.

Winner of the heaviest fish on July 29 was Al Murdoch of Hanmer, winning \$80 in gift certificates to the Red Dog Grill in Whitefish Falls.

Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens came to Sunday's windup event at the Providence Bay Marina to thank The Expositor for organizing this new event. "It's been a great thing for our municipality and. I would think, most Island municipalities," he told Expositor publisher Rick McCutcheon. Mayor Stephens encouraged The Expositor to come to a Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) meeting and tell municipal representatives the economic impact of this event. Tickets for next year's Salmon Classic will go on sale starting September 1 at www.fishmanitouln.com and at The Expositor office in Little Current and at The Recorder in Gore Bay.

He noted with a grin that next year's derby ticket will go up in price by \$5, to \$65, as he made the mistake of not factoring in tax, which left his office manager unhappy.

There will also be a change in date for the Salmon Classic for 2017, running from the last Saturday of July, July 29, for four weeks.

"We're also going to hand out another \$5,000 in prizes—\$100 a day for the biggest fish for each day and we're also going to run the leaderboard up to 25," Mr. Patterson explained. "The main cash prizes will remain the same." tastic job and I can't thank them enough," he said to much applause, giving a special shout out to Assiginack, who got behind the Salmon Classic from the very beginning, hiring a summer student, Claire Hutton, to run the Manitowaning weigh station over the three weeks.

"We're also going to have a little competition—'who can out-fish Dave'," he said of next year's derby. 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Visiting Manitoulin? Misery on Manitoulin? Hardly, when a guided

MISERY BAY—Any day is a good day to visit Misery Bay, Manitoulin's exquisite gem of a provincial park. Thirtyfive miles west of Gore Bay, the 1,100-hectare tract of protected land with over 21 kilometres of marked trails through unique ancient landscapes is a joy for all ages in all seasons. Classified as a nature reserve by Ontario Parks, Misery Bay Provincial Park protects the alvars, wetlands, upland forests and animal and plant species at risk that are found here.

In summer, some folks come to the park, deposit their \$2 admission into the Ontario Parks machine, and race past the Interpretive Centre straight down to the sand beach. Who can blame them? The water is shallow and refresh-



ing, the charming gazebo offers shade from the tropicalstrength sun and the southwest water views are expansive. Lie on a beach towel and that's it, done for the day.

Meanwhile, all around, the park does what it has done for 10,000 years: it's a kind of living museum, one in which the 'artifacts' were deposited when the glaciers of Lake Nipissing retreated and left huge boulders and rocks on a moonscape of alvars, sprawling limestone pavements that host rare vegetation in deep fissures and tiny cracks. Globally rare, alvars only can be found off the coast of Sweden, in the eastern European Baltic region, the United Kingdom and Ireland. In North America, almost 75 percent of these alvars are located in Ontario, according to the Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC)

Misery Bay's massive alvar swaths stretch out as far as the eye can see: on the beach, they sweep into the water like a welcome mat rolled out for royalty, they carpet parts of the forest floor and play host to countless rare and endangered species of plants (last count was 470).

The park's alvar setting looks surreal, and its weighty gravitas through millennia seems to transport the visitor back in time. It's easy to wander around like this is the movie set for Planet of the Apes; that's one way to get to know Misery Bay.

And it's also why it's good to visit again and again, because each time will be different, every experience will teach us finally to look more closely. "Manitoulin Island,' says the NCC, has "the greatest richness of globally significant species and communities of any ecological district within the Canadian portion of the Great Lakes Basin....some of the best representative examples of ecological communities that are found nowhere else in the world, including globally significant alvar habitat." So, what's the best way to "see" Misery Bay Provincial

Park? Stop in at the Interpretive Centre and browse the collections of butterflies, turtle shells, bones, bird nests and fossils; leaf through books and binders on forest ecol-

ogy, biology, geology and social history from one of the easy chairs; enjoy as the kids listen to audio recordings of frog calls and make fossil rubbings. Pick up an 'Illustrated Guide to the Flowering Plants of Misery Bay Provincial Park and Manitoulin Island' or 'Great Lakes Alvars,' both handy-sized booklets guaranteed to enhance your hike. (Needless to say that further enhancement can be had by toting water and snacks for the trails.)

For an eye-opening, hands-on experience, consider touring the park with a guide. Contact the park to check availability for the day you'd like to visit, then show up for your personalized Misery Bay encounter with extraordinary natural habitats.

On this hot August Sunday afternoon, the park is buzzing with visitors, kids and adults in happy groups strolling through the shady forest paths, crossing the alvar prairies and the boardwalk across the vernal pool. Gaynor

Orford, plant ecologist and chair of the Friends of Misery Bay board of directors, arrives looking awfully keen to guide a curious but woefully uninformed reporter through Misery Bay's mysterious terrain.

We set out together on the Coastal Alvar Trail as Ms. Orford describes the park's origins as an ancient flat rock sea bottom first inhabited by Aboriginal people then settled in the 1870s by one man, the highly educated hermit Edwin 'Ned' Saunders who moved from Gore Bay because there were "too many people" into a log shanty he built himself in Elizabeth Bay. When the Ainslie family arrived in 1878, Ned couldn't take the crowds and moved to Misery Bay, where he built a cabin that still stands today. Many of the park's trails, points out Ms. Orford, are old logging

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



"Some of the lichens," says Gaynor Orford, "are 500 years old," as we look at how unicellular organisms called diatoms-a type of algae-colonize the rocks, followed by lichens and then the mosses that hold moisture; this organic and gradual process provides a habitat for the growth of ferns. And voila! Ms. Orford points to maidenhair ferns growing under and right in the rock where soil has gathered, nourished by water dripping off the rock. Is everything a minor miracle here-or is it


