## Turtle rehabilitated thanks to team of volunteers and Ontario turtle centre

MINDEMOYA—An injured painted turtle named Tutu has made a full recovery and has returned home to Lake Mindemoya after a stay at the Ontario Turtle Conservation Centre (OTCC) in Peterbor-

The turtle, which we named

Tutu, was brought in by a client who found him on Highways 551," said Doctor Janice Mitchell, a veterinarian at the Island Animal Hospital. "He had a badly broken shell, but I was told by the OTCC in the past that as long as the turtle's eyes were not protruding and their intestines were not coming

## Rural Tehkummah residents concerned with MTO herbicides, will seek the support of reeve and council

TEHKUMMAH—Some Tehkummah residents are upset with what they feel is a lack of proper notice regarding the spraying of herbicide on Tehkummah roads by the Ministry of Transportation (MTO).

An advertisement posted by the MTO alerting Tehkummah residents to the spraying appeared in the July 12 and July 19 editions of the paper, as per Pesticide Act and Regulations, Pesticide Control Products Act and Regulations and The Environmental Pesticide Act and

Regulations Part V and Reg. 309, but stated that spraying could commence as early as July 15. This has George Kopylov, a Tehkummah carpenter, concerned as those same Acts clearly state that 10 days' notice must first be given.

While the first sight of a spray truck, operated by MTO contractors DBI, was spotted by at least one Tehkummah resident on July 25—within the 10-day timeframe—Mr. Kopylov said he isn't convinced that the spraying hadn't commenced earlier.

## Clint Haggart back in jail

SUDBURY—The man charged with arson to three properties in Little Current over the course of three terrifying months in 2014 for that community's residents was again in court last month.

Clinton Haggart, age 34, was charged in April 2017 with the assault of a female following a break and enter at a Sudbury residence, thereby breaking his probation order. He was also charged with stealing 12 packages of cigarettes from the female victim, or theft under \$5,000.

After being indicted on the four charges, Mr. Haggart appeared in Sudbury court on July 19 where he was found guilty of charge one, assault, and charge three, keeping peace and good behaviour as per his probation. Charges two and four, break and enter and theft under \$5,000, were withdrawn.

The judge sentenced Mr. Haggart to serve 11 days in jail for the sentence custody of 86 days actually counts for 129 days due to jailhouse conditions. He was also sentenced to 12 months' probation, including having to provide a DNA sample. Mr. Haggart must also pay a \$400 victim surcharge fee within 12 months.

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

## Nanabush returns to Debaj mainstage at Holy Cross Ruins

WIIKWEMKOONG—Debajehmujig Storytellers Artistic Director Joe Osawabine has been suffering for his art these past two weeks, a side effect of bringing the Nanabush stories back to the mainstage this summer.

"They say you shouldn't tell Nanaboozhoo stories in the summer time because you will attract the attention of the Trickster," he admitted ruefully. "It's definitely been a couple of those weeks. I am just taking it as an opportunity for long term growth," he laughed. Anishinaabe tradition holds that you should avoid telling Nanabush stories when the coverlet of snow has left the ground because once his blanket is gone and the Trickster is up and about and invoking his attention it is not always in one's best interests.

Despite the challenge of having the Anishinaabe jokester hopping about the place, things have been going remarkably smoothly and the production is well on track to take to the Holy Cross Mission ruins stage this August 9 through 20. Perhaps the Trickster's famous vanity is staying his hand a bit. In any case, this production is taking him back to his roots.

"We are going back to Nanabush," said Mr. Osawabine. "Much like we did with 'Lupi the Great White Wolf' last year, we are revisiting the story through the lens of where we have developed into our role as contemporary storytellers."

The company has taken the base provided by Esther Odjig-Beaven's 'Ever That Nanabush' and expanded the stories from the series included in that work to include a number of stories gleaned from an elder who related the stories to a university researcher back in 1912.

"It was the same university as in 'Sunlight Woman,' but a different person," said Mr. Osawabine. "The elder was about 80-years-old at the time he related the stories. These are the same stories that he would have learned as a child, so they stretch well back into the 1800s."

The stories, originally part of an oral tradition stretching back literally thousands of years, will be very close to those that imparted life lessons to the Anishinaabe before contact. But the source material presents its own considerable challenges.

"The original translation was very literal," said Mr. Osawabine. "So there are the verilys and the thees and thous to deal with, but also a lot of repetition, where they might say 'and then he was told by his father, as his father told it to him'." So the company had to translate the translation as it were, in order to bring the stories to a modern audience. "We had to if we were going to keep the audience's attention," he said. While the repetitive cadence and syntax would have assisted with the mnemonics of an oral tradition, the literal translation would have lost the rhythm and cues of the original.

That being said, Debajehmujig Storytellers is incorporating a good portion of Anishinaabemowin into the production.

The six mainstage actors who will be interpreting the Stories of Nanabush will include both Debajehmujig veterans such as Mr. Osawabine (who has portrayed Nanaboozhoo a number of times onstage) and Bruce Noakwegijig as well as a number of the company's new actors.

"We have a number of new actors that will be onstage," said Mr. Osawabine. "We will be passing on the stories as they were passed

# Pearson granddaughter to headline History Day events

KAGAWONG—History Day in Kagawong has always raised the bar when it comes to presentations of interest making it a highly anticipated way to spend a summer evening (or afternoon in the case of the matinee), but this season will prove very hard to top.

Each year the Old Mill Heritage Centre creates a special, and timely, exhibit upon which to anchor their season. This year, being Canada's 150th anniversary, the museum has created a Pearson Exhibit that focusses largely on the life and times of Canada's 14th prime minister, the Right Honourable Lester B. Pearson, as well as those Manitoulin sons who figured large in his life while he represented Algoma-East for 20 years, the incomparable Thomas Farquhar and the inimitable Billings Mayor Austin Hunt, Canada's longest serving public official. That exhibit runs deep into the fall.

As is usually the case, History Day in Kagawong's theme corresponds to that exhibit and Lester B. Pearson's life and times with a keynote speaker intimately linked—Lester B. Pearson's granddaughter, journalist and author Patricia Pearson.

"A number of members of Mr. Pearson's family will be coming up for the event along with Patricia Pearson," said Old Mill Heritage Centre Curator Rick Nelson. "The museum board will be hosting a private meet and greet where the family will be given a private tour of the exhibit after bours"

The History Day presentations will begin with a welcome by Billings Museum Committee Chair Dianne Fraser, who will read a proclamation from current Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau before introducing Ms. Pearson.

Ms. Pearson will give a 30-minute talk on her recollections of her grandfather, followed by a question and answer period with the audience.

A short intermission will feature light refreshments after which Mr. Nelson will step up to the plate for a 30-minute presentation that will feature never before seen video of a 1966 trip by train to Ottawa to meet Mr. Pearson by Algoma East high school students. One of those excited young students was Gore Bay author Margo Little, who joined others

from across the riding to meet Mr. Pearson in his office at the Parliament Building before lunching at 24 Sussex Drive and going on to spend the day with the prime minister at his Harrington Lake cottage. "They also got to meet the governor general and saw the RCMP musical ride," said Mr. Nelson.

Mr. Nelson will also be screening a slideshow of historical photographs.

"As is usually the case we will also have a static display of artifacts available in the hall," said Mr. Nelson. Those artifacts include both local items and some rare items being brought to Manitoulin by Mr. Pearson's family.

"I am really excited to see a signed poster that we have on loan from another of Mr. Pearson's granddaughters, Barbara Hannah, for one day only," said Mr. Nelson. The 'War is Over' poster is signed by the late Beatle John Lennon and his wife Yoko Ono. "This was back when they were having their sleep in," said Mr. Nelson. "They happened to be travelling on the same plane as Mr. Pearson and they both signed the poster for him." Mr. Pearson wound up giving the poster to his granddaughter who was a teenaged Beatle fan at the time.

Both the matinee and the evening History Day in Kagawong events take place on Thursday, August 10 and last about 90 minutes, with the matinee starting at 3:30 pm and the evening event starting at 7:30 pm. Admission is a free will offering donation to the museum.

#### New refugee family settles into Canadian life on Manitoulin

MINDEMOYA—Mindemoya has welcomed a new Eritrean refugee family to Manitoulin. Mindemoya sponsors picked the family up from the Sudbury Airport in mid July and have been working with them to acclimatize the family to Canadian culture and life on Manitoulin Island.

"The pick up at the airport went well," said committee member Monic Rochon Shaw. "We had two of the Eritrean individuals who arrived on Manitoulin last February come with us as translators, as the new family didn't speak any English. It was interesting to hear from them what it was like when they first arrived last year and they were able to use that experience to help elevate the fears and concerns of the

new family.

Ms. Rochon Shaw said that the committee has been long awaiting the family who had a baby at the time they were to leave for Canada, thereby prolonging the family's wait to get to their new Island home.

A year and a bit later, the family—which consists of parents and their six children ranging in age from a baby to 13-years-old—are now settled on Manitoulin.

"They are a younger family with six children under the age of 12, so they are very busy," said Ms. Rochon Shaw. "We have been doing daily English lessons with them for two hours. They have already

#### Swimming advisory in effect for Kagawong, Providence Bay beaches

KAGAWONG—The Sudbury and District Health Unit has again announced swimming advisories for two Island beaches, Maple Ridge Sandy Beach in Kagawong and Providence Bay Beach.

As a result of routine water samples exceeding the acceptable bacteriological water quality standards, the Health Unit has posted swimming advisory signs to inform the public that the beach water quality is not suitable for recreational use at this time.

A swimming advisory is a precautionary notice that informs the public about specific risks to health and safety.

nd safety. Going into the water when bacteria are present in high concentrations puts bathers at risk for infections. Illness can occur if swimmers swallow beach water; if water gets into their ears, eyes, or nose; or if it comes in contact with open wounds.

"We have enhanced our monitoring and will continue taking water samples," said Cynthia Peacock-Rocca, a manager in the Health Unit's Environmental Health Division.

The Health Unit will notify the public when the bacterial levels return to acceptable standards for bathing beaches. For information about beach water quality, visit www.sdhu.com.

## Canadians quickly forget the giants who walked among us

Canadians are not much for self aggrandizement. That quiet calm reserve that defines our national character to much of the world only seems to slip when the honour of our favourite hockey team is challenged (insert Toronto Maple Leafs dig here). For those who are not die hard hockey aficionados (say it ain't so), our national hubris generally only rises every couple of alternating years with the Summer/Winter Olympics.

Perhaps this unusual trait comes from living next to the most powerful (and once dynamic) countries in the world. For all of our nation's 150 years of existence we have largely defined ourselves as the "not Americans," eschewing the jingoistic bombast that came to epitomize the boisterous and much caricaturized Ugly American; we have made a virtue out of self effacement and idealized our demure public character. You can see the current prime minister's political opponents trying to capitalize on that national character quirk in their Facebook advertising on any given weekday (although apparently without much traction in the current selfie nation environment according to polls, at least beyond the grumpy old white man brigade).

Now that is not to say there is anything terribly wrong with our national character, but it does have some rather unfortunate side effects. One of the most unfortunate of those is our lamentable collective amnesia about the many giants who have walked among us during our 150 years as a nation, even those whose accomplishments are still within living memory.

A perfect example of such a giant is the late Canadian diplomat and prime minister Lester Bowles Pearson. Mike, to many of those Islanders who knew and loved him, re-electing him again and again over the course of 20 years.

During his lifetime Mr. Pearson was indisputably the most recognized Canadian in the world. Not because he was the prime minister who (with the NDP as allies during his minority governments) brought in universal health care, the Canadian flag, the Canada Pension Plan and who, as foreign minister before becoming prime minister, charted the honest broker course that defined Canada's presence on the world stage for generations. He was generally recognized as "the man who saved the world" during one of the most intense periods of nuclear confrontation to ever face the world. By diffusing the

Suez Crisis, a confrontation that saw the world's nuclear powers standing nose to nose, each with their finger poised over the buttons that would hurtle us all into nuclear Armageddon; actions for which a grateful world awarded him Canada's first (and only) Nobel Peace

That's pretty gigantic by anyone's standards and, considering current world events, the world could desperately use his like again.

Despite striding among humanity as a giant on the world stage, Mike Pearson's low-key gregarious personality defined the very epitome of the Quiet Canadian. We might even go so far as to say our global persona has been cast in his image. He was quite the hockey player in his day too, fitting as his diplomatic stick handling was his forte as a diplomat.

Despite his world shaking accomplishments (or steadying as the case may be) and the indelible impressions Mike Pearson passage left upon the Canadian landscape we know and love today, too many Canadians have no idea who he was and what he means, let alone meant, to Canada.

Journalist Andrew Cohen, a university lecturer, noted the historical amnesia apparent in his students during his recent Kagawong History Series lecture. An amnesia he has determined to rectify.

Locally, the Billings museum board and Old Mill Heritage Centre curator Rick Nelson have taken heroic steps to celebrate the life and times of Mike Pearson by creating an exhibit that incorporates personal items cajoled from the National Archives to create a mini-replica of Mike Pearson's home office and have brought lecturers from across the nation to recall his legacy for us. On Thursday, August 10, Mike Pearson's granddaughter will come to Kagawong's Park Centre as part of History Day to bring her personal recollections of Mike Pearson the man.

On this, the 150th anniversary of the founding of our nation, a visit to the Pearson Exhibit in Kagawong might prove the antidote to the constant barrage of reminders of our nation's shortcomings and failures. As a nation we have much to celebrate and be proud of, and in the legacy of Mike Pearson we might just discover the pathway to overcoming those challenges we still face as a nation. He proved that nothing is impossible if we are determined to find the way.

Regarding Bill Sloan winning this year's senior award ('Bill Sloan named Senior of the Year for Gordon/Barrie Island,' Manitoulin West Recorder, July 7), I would like to add one more thing to his list of accom-

It happened 35 years ago when members of both the Espanola and the Manitoulin Women's Institute chartered a bus for a tour of southern Ontario with Bill as our driver. On the bus that day were myself, my mom and 26 other women, many of whom were seniors.

An incident, however, happened on that trip that if not for Bill none of us would be here today.

We were heading south on Highway 8 when, just as we began to descend that part of the Niagara Escarpment known as Dundas Hill, the brakes on the bus failed.

After barely making the first curve in the highway, the bus careened down the hill with the escarpment on our right hand side the whole way down. To avoid going over the cliff Bill took the bus to the opposite side

of the road, knocking down sign posts and streets lights as we went. Oncoming traffic swerved to avoid us and we scarcely missed the abutments of a train overpass.

Bill was finally able to get the bus off the road and we came to a stop on the railway tracks beside the Dundas train station. We were relieved to be alive but the ordeal didn't end there. An employee of the railway rushed out to tell us that a train was due to come along any minute and that we had to get off the tracks. After much difficulty, Bill was able to back off the tracks with just moments to spare.

Bill's handling of the situation that day, his quick reaction and skill, was later credited by the OPP as the only thing that prevented that bus from going over the escarpment and plunging 80 feet into the valley

Thank you for your letter, and your efforts to raise awareness about this situation. As a lifelong Northerner, an Ontarian, and an MPP, I am just as frustrated as you to see the mess the Wynne Liberals and the Conservatives have made of the province's hydro system. ## Main Street Café Andrew Cohen lecture recalls Pearson

KAGAWONG—How soon we for-Even so-called political junkies (like most journalists) seem to have a short memory when it comes Canadian iconic figures. Lecturer, author and columnist Andrew Cohen brought the late Lester Bowles Pearson to life for a rapt audience in a packed house at Kagawong's Main Street

Mr. Cohen is the author of Extraordinary Canadians: Lester B. Pearson' which explores the life and times of a man who for a generation was literally the world's best known Canadian even before he became a political legend in Canadian politics and Canada's 14th prime minister.

The evening began with Old Mill Heritage Centre museum curator Rick Nelson discussing some of the history of Mr. Pearson who served as Manitoulin's Member of Parliament for 20 years, from 1948 to 1968. Mr. Nelson recalled that the late Senator Thomas Farquhar had relinquished his seat so that Mr. Pearson could run and he noted severmembers Senator of Farquhar's family that were in the audience.

Mr. Nelson referenced a 1961 letter from Mr. Pearson to Senator Farguhar's son in which Mr. Pearson wrote that he was sending the missive as he "just wanted you to know he is appreciated." Sadly, Senator Farquhar passed away in 1962 and never got to see his friend become Canadian prime

Mr. Cohen introduced himself as a teacher to whose students the name Lester B. Pearson "doesn't mean a lot." He said that he considered it his responsibility to impart that information to them.

The author began by describing Mr. Pearson's early life as the son of a minister and growing up "in genteel poverty, if any poverty could be described as genteel." In any event, there was always a big house with a large yard in which to play sports. Sports were one of the defining parts of the late prime minister's life, and he was by all accounts a very accomplished athlete.

Mr. Pearson received his Nobel Peace Prize for unravelling the Gordian Knot of the Suez Crisis and he was the prime instigator of the United Nations peacekeeping force, but he was also a warrior who served in two fronts of the First World War. Mr. Cohen posited that it was Mr. Pearson's experiences in the war, the losses he personally felt and the horror he witnessed, that framed a lifetime of diplomacy and a life that would see him lauded as a "prince

It was during a short stint in he Royal Flying Corps that Mr. Pearson was first labelled with a nickname that would follow him for the rest of his life. Mr. Cohen explained that the flight commander of Mr. Pearson's squadron thought the name Lester was somewhat sissified and that a pilot in his flight required a more martial moniker.

Mr. Pearson, who represented Manitoulin in Ottawa for 20 years from 1948 until 1963 was the most recognizable Canadian in the world for much of his

So he began calling him Mike.

Despite being in a part of the armed forces whose member's longevity was measured in weeks. if not hours, Mr. Pearson returned to Canada largely unscathed. "I had a very good war," he is recalled as remarking. This might have been in part that

uniform was actually spent as a quartermaster of some form or other, an occupation that allowed him to employ his easy and gregarious manner.

Mr. Cohen went on to outline the incredible accomplishments of Mr. Pearson while he was in the foreign service, including, in part, in the foreign service that would define his legacy and make him the single most recognized Canadian in the world.

Mr. Cohen also took the audience through the many accomplishments of Mr. Pearson as a Canadian prime minister, albeit one that never enjoyed a majority government.

Following his presentation, Mr. Cohen took questions from the audience. The main question asked was why, given his immense roles on the global and Canadian stages, the Pearson office was removed from the Laurier Building three years ago. Mr. Cohen laid the "blame" squarely on for-mer Foreign Minister John Baird, who he pointed out removed the name Pearson Building from his business cards. Mr. Baird, he noted, was a strong devotee of former Progressive Conservative Prime Minister John Diefenbaker. Mr. Pearson and Mr. Diefenbaker were not collegial in their political lives (Mrs. Pearson referred to the Tory adversary as "that bad

Mr. Cohen signed copies of his book following the presentation and commended Mr. Nelson and the Billings museum committee for their efforts in bringing the Lester B. Pearson office out from

"I don't want to overuse the hockey metaphor, but like Wayne Gretzky, he was always aware of where the puck was going," noted Mr. Cohen. Instead of the relatively quiet and safe sinecure of ambassador to Brazil, he lobbied to be sent to where the action was going to be, England.

Despite his wartime service and the arguably hero status that conferred upon him, Mr. Cohen was adamant that Mr. Pearson "was not politically a war profiteer.'

The lecture followed Mr. Pearson's career from a short unhappy stint in an American meat packing plant (that reminded him too much of his time in the First World War) to his time at Oxford University and the next 30 years

As a result of this investigation, Patsy Corbiere, age 60 of Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation, has been arrested and charged with: criminal breach of trust, criminal harassment and intimidation of justice system participant.

#### Don't drink and boat this long weekend

Drinking and boating accounts for approximately 40 percent of boating-related fatalities on Canadian waterways. To raise awareness and reduce alcohol related deaths, the Canadian Safe Boating Council (CSBC) is launching year five of an initiative called "Operation Dry Water." Its goal is to discourage this dangerous practice.

With the summer boating season in high gear, the August 5 long weekend is the perfect time to remind Canadian boaters about the risks of drinking and boating. Combined with sun, wind, waves and the rocking motion of the boat, the effects of alcohol on the water can be greatly increased.

"The CSBC, its partners and sponsors would like, through this and our other initiatives, to raise attention to the problem of boating under the influence and to remind boaters not to drink and boat," stated John Gullick, chair of the Canadian Safe Boating Council. Operation Dry Water will focus on the potential risks of drinking and boating, and remedies that are currently in place to discourage it.

Federal statutes dictate that, whether or not your craft is motorized, you can be charged with Impaired Operation of a vessel under the Criminal Code of Canada if your blood alcohol level exceeds the .08 threshold. This means you can be charged even if you are impaired while operating a canoe and a judge is able to, upon conviction, suspend your boating privileges. But that's not all; it can get worse.

Some provinces have enacted legislation where drinking and boating can affect your automobile driving privileges. In Ontario, for example, Bill 209 amended the Highway Traffic Act to also apply to "anyone operating or having the care or control of a vessel." As such, anyone found boating with a blood alcohol level above .05, faces an on-the-spot automobile drivers' license suspension. Should the person's blood alcohol concentration exceed .08, upon conviction, an additional suspension of up to one year can be applied.

Operation Dry Water is aimed at reducing the number of alcohol-related accidents and fatalities on the water while fostering a stronger and more visible deterrent to alcohol use while boating. The end goal? To achieve safer and more enjoyable recreational boating.

#### What are your teens up to this weekend?

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is reminding parents and caregivers to spend some time talking with their children about respectful and acceptable behaviour during summer holidays.

Common occurrences police attend throughout the

summer time are; acts of mischief. vandalism, shoplifting, loitering, trespassing, under-age drinking, field parties and general noise complaints. Police encouraging parents/caregivers to take some time to not only teach

young people about acceptable behaviour but also to supervise their activity.

Police experience tells us that more often than not, youth who end up in trouble with the law were not properly instructed or supervised, prior to or leading up the situation they found

involved themselves in. Open and frank conversations between parents/caregivers and young people need to happen often, especially during the summer months when many young people have less formal structure and guidance.

Enrolling youth in summer programs always a great way to keep them properly moti-

vated and community minded. Summertime is a great time for students to build up their volunteer hours as well.

The OPP reminds parents and youth about the curfew provisions of the Child and Family Services

Act. Under this act, no parent of a child less than 16 years of age shall permit the child to loiter in a public place between midnight and 6 am. This offence is punishable by fine if warranted and youth can be apprehended by police without warrant and taken to their parent/caregiver.

It is the hope of the Manitoulin OPP that everyone will have an enjoyable, safe and respectable summer vacation.

#### Sparse winds make for interesting North Channel Race Week

NORTH CHANNEL—The 2017 North Channel Race Week is complete and this year's sailing was a marked change from the three previous years.

Many of the yacht entries were identical as previous but Mother Nature provided a different array of elements to consider. Other years provided heavy weather with challenging winds. 2017 offered very light winds of a fickle variety demanding patience from every skipper in an effort to make the best of the circumstances. The weather remained this way for most of the week save for a little more blustery Wednesday into Spragge.

Monday, July 17 was Day 1/Stage 1 which started off with a drifting send off from Hilton Beach. Both Jib and Main (JAM) and Spinnaker (SPIN)



fleets floated about for hours trying to capture a knot or two of wind to try and pull away and head toward Thessalon. The North Channel Race Week is a Performance Handicap Racing Fleet (PHRF) event which allows for varying size boats to compete against one another with handicap ratings adjusting times to equalize the fleet. The aim is to cancel out the inherent advantages and disadvantages of each class of boats, so that results reflect crew skill rather than equipment superiority.

After several hours, winds did pick up on the eastern end of the course allowing two yachts to jump ahead of ...continued on page 8

## Wiikwemkoong band member founds non-indigenous youth camp

WIIKWEMKOONG—Kaella-Marie Earle is an actively engaged young Anishinaabe-kwe, recently Ms. Earle joined the NDP Northern Council executive and the team decided to brainstorm proactive ways to tackle the recommendations contained in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls Action.

"Indigenous peoples in Canada have time and time again faced racially motivated injustice in Canada and continue to struggle to overcome it," noted Ms. Earle. "Part of that struggle, and something that is mentioned in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action, is an

educational gap between indigenous peoples' way of life and non-Indigenous peoples' understanding of what that is."

The NDP team came up with an innovative concept for dealing with the education gap at the grassroots

"Together with some other youth of Northern Council Executive team, we are currently planning to run an Indigenous Cultural Training Camp for young adults," said Ms. Earle. "The purpose of the camp will be to change the narrative for Canadians on Indigenous culture, values and humanitarian issues. It will also serve as a platform to bridge the aforementioned educational gap and to strengthen relationships between Indigenous people and Canadians, and hopefully help to address racialmotivated violence against Indigenous peoples in Canada. We believe that providing a safe and culturally significant space to learn will be life changing for our participants."

So far, noted Ms. Earle, the team has recruited three facilitators, including elder Winnie Pitawanakwat and Laurentian University sessional lecturer Will Morin, to help run events at the camp. "Participants will be learning abut sweetgrass braiding, Indigenous governance, medicine pouch making, Indigenous identity and have a chance to discuss and reflect in a dreamcatcher weave sharing circle."

While the concept and organization for the youth camp originated within the NDP Northern Executive team, Ms. Earle stressed that the camp itself and its goals are strictly non-parti-

Ms. Earle noted that Wiikwemkoong Tourism will also lead participants in a cultural tour and that those attending the came will have the opportunity to experience wemkoong's Annual Cultural Festival.

'We will have about 20 participants between the ages of 18 to 30, the majority of them students, selected for their passion and willingness to change the narrative of Indigenous peoples in Canada," she said, as well as helping to change the existing misconceptions however they can. "We also chose Indigenous participants looking to reconnect with the culture.'

Lack of resources should not be a barrier to learning about Indigenous culture and traditions, noted Ms. Earle. "Our participants will be helping us be fundraise. We are really looking for financial support right now since we are trying to cover everyone's travel expenses to get to the camp."

The results of the impact of colonization and the residential school system has meant that there are a lot of Indigenous youth, particularly those living in urban communities, who have had their connections to their heritage severed but who are seeking ways to recon-

crew member. Day 2/Stage 2 saw an equalling frustrating start out of Thessalon with both fleets jockeying the bay southbound out of Thessalon for what little wind was offered enroute to Blind River. Natural High managed to squeak out a lead fered a blown head sail and ahead of the fleet rounding the first mark well ahead of the majority of the vachts save for Elusive a short distance behind. The winds picked up shortly after this mark, spinnakers were popped and these two boats took off again. This second day was a longer course and a few others managed to take advantage of the wind and catch up. In the end, the SPIN fleet finished with Natural High first, Harmony II second and Elusive third. Harmony II is a Northstar 38 out of Lions Head skippered by Jack Groom with three crew members. In the JAM fleet, Annual Hope placed first again followed by High Heels and Echo. High Heels is a CS 33 out of the Algoma Sailing Club skippered by Ron Wilson with one crew member. Winds picked up for Day 3

and Stage 3 as the race wound its way to Spragge and home of the North Channel Yacht Club, Several boats exchanged positions while coping with a close reach point of sail. Unfortunately on this stage, Pegasus sustained mechanical failure and was unable to finish the course. Repairs were challenging and emergency assistance requested. The yacht ended up being assisted back to a nearby marina and pulled out of the remainder of the race series. As well on this stage, Annual Hope sufslowly limped into the finish well below their usual pace.

The yacht 14/14, an Express 35 out of Lions Head skippered by Bruce Draper with three crew members, experienced a crew member overboard during this stage. Winds were blustery and spinnakers were in action. The crew member was scooped back up and no injuries were sustained however their placing for the day was skewed. After this third day, the SPIN fleet finished Harmony II, Skyship and Natural High. Skyship is a C&C 32 out of the Algoma Sailing Club skippered by Gord Simpson with two crew members. The JAM fleet finished with Echo in first, Banana Wind in second and High Heels in third. Banana Wind is a Mirage 27 out of Little Current skippered by Jim Machum with two crew

members. Day 4/Stage 4 was the race south across the North Channel to Gore Bay. This 21.5 nautical mile stage wound its way around several marks finishing at the sheltered entrance to the marina anchorage. Though not dramatic winds, the course was demanding making for an exciting stage. Annual Hope had been able to effect repairs beforehand and was quick to jump back into the fray. The SPIN fleet finished relatively close to one another with Natural High first; Elusive second; and Blue Teal, third. The JAM fleet finished with Annual Hope in first, Riga in second and High Heels third. Riga is a Tanzer 31 out of the Little Current Yacht Club skippered by John Abols with one crew member.

The last stage, Day 5/Stage 5 is always the most exciting in this series. The 19 nautical mile course winds its way north out of Gore Bay and around the top of Clapperton Island and finally turns back to finish in front of downtown Little Current. The majority of this course is generally downwind to which the SPIN fleet took full advantage flying their colourful chutes, dowsing them in a hurried frenzy as they

crossed the finish. The fleet was again close to one another coming into the finish. The SPIN fleet finished with Skyship in first, Natural High second and Harmony II in third. The JAM fleet finished with Echo in first, Riga in second and Good News in third, Good News is a Nonsuch 30 out of Bluffers Park Yacht Club skippered by Bob Jenkins with three crew.

There was little consistency in the finishes, unlike other years, making every stage count in establishing the overall winner of the event. After the five days and five stages, overall in the SPIN fleet it was Natural High first, Elusive second and Harmony II third. started to pick it up and are able to communicate with us and let us know what they want or need. The translators have also been a huge help just being a call away."

Ms. Rochon Shaw told The Expositor that road safety has been a big focus for the volunteers with the children.

"Road safety has been a huge adjustment for them as they are not familiar with it at all," Ms. Rochon Shaw shared. "We have been teaching them about crossing the road and what side to walk on and going for daily walks to the school in preparation for the kids in the fall."

Five of the children will be attending Central Manitoulin Public School this fall, which Ms. Rochon Shaw said the parents are thrilled about as not all the children had the opportunity at the refugee camp. "There were bikes donated for everyone in the family so we have been teaching them how to ride bikes," she added. "By day three the 12-year-old was biking and by day four the dad was too. We have also had a smaller bike with training wheels donated, which is helping the younger children learn how to ride."

The family has been going to the grocery store daily and cooking their own food as well.

"The dad even came home the other day and had made an appointment to get his hair cut—they are adjusting well," said Ms. Rochon Shaw. "They are also learning about computers and progressing quickly."

She said that the community as a whole has been very welcoming to its newest members.

onto us, creating a whole new generation of storytellers to carry on the traditions."

Many of the stories and traditions that Debajehmujig have acquired over the years came from the late Odawa elder and traditionalist Eddie King who acted as elder in residence for Debajehmujig for many years.

The stories of Nanabush trace back through the centuries to the time when animism was central to the lifestyle of the Indigenous peoples, in whose territories the nation of Canada shares.

The figure of Nanabush features in the petroglyphs engraved in rocks across Turtle Island, particularly evident in Peterborough. "When you see a figure of a man with rabbit ears, that's Nanaboozhoo," said Mr. Osawabine. "He was also known as Waynaboozhoo, the rabbit."

He went on to note that you can find Nanaboozhoo in the traditional

greeting of the Anishinaabe. "When we say boozhoo, we have dropped the 'wayna' part and shortened to boozhoo honouring him."

'Nanabush Stories: interpreted in a whole new way' is being performed at 7 pm on August 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 in the first run and again from August 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20. All performances will be at the Holy Cross Mission ruins in Wiikwemkoong with a \$10 minimum suggested donation.

...continued from page 1 does most of the work healing itself, similar to a cast helping someone with a

Ms. Gasbarrini said that the turtle was an adult, so over the age of 15 to 20 years, but that it is impossible to know its exact age, noting that painted turtles can live to 70-years-old.

"The turtle was listed a week and a half ago to be released," said Ms. Gasbarrini, who delivered Tutu back to Manitoulin personally, as she was coming to the Island for a trip. Ms. Gasbarrini worked with turtles at Misery Bay Provincial Park while working on her Masters of Science through Laurentian University in 2014/2015. Ms. Gasbarrini met with Heather Jeeves, representing the Island Animal Hospital, who showed Ms. Gasbarrini a marshy area of Lake Mindemoya, along Ketchankookem Trail, to release Tutu. "We try to release the turtles as close to where they were foundthe closest suitable habi-

It has been a busy year for the OTCC, with the centre taking in over 700 injured turtles this season, over 600 of which have been hit by a car.

"It (the number of injured turtles) is about twice as many as last year for multiple reasons," said Ms. Gasbarrini. "We have been putting a lot of effort into creating awareness—

with more people knowing what to do when they come across an injured turtle. That has led to us taking in turtles from far away and just the Peterborough/Kawarthas area. We have taken in turtles from as far as Sudbury, Manitoulin, Windsor, London and even some from Quebec. Another factor is that its been great weather for turtles this summer, not too hot, not too cold, so they've been moving more often than last summer when conditions were very hot and dry. With such extensive road networks in Ontario and more and more drivers on the roads, turtles often have to cross a road to access part of the habitat that had once been continuous, and risk getting hit by

Although painted turtles aren't listed as 'at risk' in Ontario (they are listed as 'data deficient' meaning that more study needs to be done to determine their population), the other seven species of turtles found in Ontario are 'species at risk.

"Turtles naturally face high mortality rates when they are young and the payoff is that those who survive to adulthood should stick around for a long time some species can live upwards of 100 years,' explained Ms. Gasbarrini. "Turtles continue to reprothroughout their entire lives, they do not stop with old age like humans do. Less than one percent of the eggs that are laid will survive to adulthood, so it can take over 40 years for an adult turtle to replace herself. The increased loss of adult turtles through habitat loss and road mortality is seriously harming populations."

Ms. Gasbarrini. When a taxi is needed we send out a message and if you are able to help, you reply, if not you wait for the next message. It is a great way to help out without making a big commitment."

The OTCC is a multifaceted conservation centre that works to preserve Ontario's turtle species and protect the habitats in which they live. The OTCC operates a Turtle Trama Centre where the injured turtles from all over Ontario are brought to receive treatment and care with the goal always being to release the turtle back into the wild where he or she came from.

"The OTCC also operates a hatching program, which involves incubating eggs and raising the young through their first winter, getting them stronger and more able to handle the challenges they will face in the wild," said Ms. Gabarri-

When contacted by the Expositor, the MTO stated that the spraying took place on Highway 542 on Wednesday, July 26 and that as per the aforementioned Acts and Regulations, the contractor (DBI) must submit the following information to the ministry 10 days before spraying: a contractor name, who must be accredited with the Integrated Pest Management Council; a contract number; and the herbicide name and product number.

Upon completion of the spraying, the contractor must submit the following records of all herbicide applications to the ministry: date, highway number, location, hectares treated, weather at time of application, targeted vegetation, type and quantity of herbicides applied; and name of applicator and pesticide licence.

The contractor is also required to submit herbicide information a minimum of 10 business days prior to the start of the spraying operations," Lara Cantin, media spokesperson for the MTO, northeast region, states. "Notification in the newspaper is required one week in advance of spraying or alternatively could place signs every 100 metres. Our contractor submitted all the necessary documents and followed the notification require-

When asked if the MTO requires a municipal resolution, as Hydro One requires when it seeks to spray herbicide. the MTO replied that it did not need municipal approval, as "the contractor is only spraying on MTO property."

Of particular concern to Mr. Kopylov is the herbicide ClearView. Just like Garlon, ClearView is highly toxic to fish, aquatic plants and invertebrates.

One resident of Highway 542 in Tehkummah shared her encounter with an MTO contractor who was spraying herbicide last week. Bernadette Phillips notes that she and her husband spotted a tanker truck in the early evening hours that was obviously spraying something on her and her husband's property followed by a sweet chemical

Tracking the tanker truck and accompanying MTO vehicle down, Ms. Phillips asked a man in the MTO vehicle what it was the tanker was spraying. He responded by saying that he was not aware of the name of the chemical, "but it was something to keep the weeds down."

"I asked him if it was ClearView or Garlon, and I told him that I had not been notified that herbicide was going to be used at the end of my property," Ms. Phillips said. "I asked for a copy of the documentation and material data safety handling sheet and the gentleman in the MTO car said he did not have one. I explained to him I was under the understanding that there was to be more discussion and awareness made with the residents in the area prior to the spraying of the herbicide. As an MTO employee he was unaware of this."

"I backed up and asked the employee in the sprayer truck if he knew what he was spraying. He said he was not sure but checked on his clipboard and told me that the product was ClearView," she continued. "I explained that neither myself nor my husband were aware that our property was going to be sprayed with this herbicide, and the employee had no satisfactory response.

"I mentioned to the MTO employee in the lead car that I had not been notified that this product was going to be used on my property. I also mentioned to him that ClearView was toxic to fish and other forms of wildlife," Ms. Phillips said. "He told me we were not near any fish. I stated, 'look around. Everything runs downhill and goes into the river and into the lake. You are near fish.' He said he would discontinue the spraying.'

A delegation will be brought forward to the August 15 meeting of Tehkummah council to raise their concerns on herbicide use in the municipality.

In other areas of Manitoulin, Hydro One told The Expositor that crews are still working on Manitoulin, spraying the herbicide Garlon and that no new work areas have been proposed.

#### Police following up leads generated by \$50,000 reward

WIIKWEMKOONG—The sign on the left hand side of the road leading into Wiikwemkoong bears the faded image of a young man and a family's desperate plea for justice and closure. Almost 11 years ago, Anthony (Antz) Samuel Mandamin was walking on Kaboni Road after a house party in the Village of Wiikwemkoong when he was struck and killed by a driver who then fled the scene. Mr. Mandamin was only 25 at the time.

On the 10th anniversary of his death, the provincial government offered a \$50,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who were responsible for his death.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service and the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) are continuing their investigation under the direction of OPP Detective Inspector Gilles


Wikwemikong Tribal Police Special Constable Alana Eshkawkogan confirmed that the police have received numerous tips since the announcement of the reward and

## **Anishinabek Nation leadership will** continue supporting Chippewas of the Thames Line 9B plight

Supreme Court of Canada has issued its ruling in favour of the National Energy Board's (NEB) approval of Enbridge's Line 9B plan to reverse the flow of Line 9B, part of an existing crude oil pipeline, that presently runs from Sarnia to Montreal, and through the traditional and Treaty territory of Chippewas of the Thames First Nation.

"We are tremendously disappointed in this ruling. This is not the end." stated Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee following the ruling. "We will continue to support Chippewas of the Thames in this toilsome fight for our rights. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, Section 35 of the Constitution Act. the treaty relationship, and the 10 principles outlined by Justice Minister Raybould speak to a Nation-to-Nation relationship, not about third-parties that do not have any business in a Nation-to-Nation relationship.

Enbridge's proposed plan to reverse the flow and increase capacity of Line 9B was approved by the NEB in 2014. Chippewas of the Thames is claiming that the NEB failed to properly assess and consider the full scope of their aboriginal and Treaty rights and the impacts of the infringement of those rights. The community filed an appeal to challenge the

NATION—The NEB's approval of Enbridge's Line 9B project, citing that the federal Crown failed to provide consultation with the community on the project. The Crown is required to accommodate and consult with First Nations before they consider an action or decision that may affect a First Nation's aboriginal and Treaty rights.

Section 35 of the Canadian Constitution Act recognizes, confirms, and protects aboriginal rights as well as Treaty rights. The 40-year-old pipeline runs through the Chippewas of the Thames traditional and treaty territory, and has been doing so without the consultation of the community since its inception.

Grave environmental concerns from Chippewas of the Thames stem from the age of the pipeline and knowing that it was initially constructed to transportlight crude oil. The added density of a new substance and increased temperature and pressure could cause the pipeline to rupture. Should this occur, the community's surrounding traditional territory's air, water, land, and ultimately, its people, would suffer.

Chippewas of the Thames and the Anishinabek Nation, along with Chiefs of Ontario, will continue their efforts and support in protecting their traditional and Treaty rights.



# Community groups receive \$10,000 in donations from Northeast Town and McLean's Wind Farm partnership

LITTLE CURRENT—The McLean's Mountain Wind Farm Road Use Agreement donation committee donated a total of \$10,000 between two Northeast Town groups last week.

The committee donated \$5,000 to the 2018 Travelers Northern Ontario Men's Curling Championships being held in Little Current and \$5,000 to the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy (EBC) and the development of the Cup and Saucer Trail.

"It was felt by the committee that this is a significant community event which will benefit all of the municipality," said committee member Councillor Marcel Gauthier.

"The EBC is working hard to develop the Cup and Saucer Trail and there are a lot more costs down the line such as a traffic study that are going to need to be done," said fellow committee member, Mayor Al MacNevin. "We felt this was a good investment."

As part of the construction of the McLean's Mountain Wind Farm, which was concluded in 2014, the Northeast Town and McLean's Mountain Wind Limited Partnership entered into a road use agreement resulting in a community fund of 20 annual donations of \$10,000 from the wind partnership to be used to support Northeast Town organization, groups, initiatives or events.

The first year a \$10,000 donation was made to the Howland Seniors' Hall for renovations. In 2014, \$10,000 was donated to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor for the purchase of a Carendo hygiene shower chair. In 2015, \$5,000 was donated to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor Calling on You Campaign to replace the call bell system that residents can use to summon assistance, \$1,250 to the Little Current Legion to help with improvements to the hall and \$1,250 to the Manitoulin Sea Cadets towards their trip to Vimy Ridge in 2017.

...continued from page 1 found himself being quick-

ly accepted and welcomed.
"I didn't know much about Indigenous issues back then," he said. "I did not really know anything about the divisions between the Natives who lived here before and the people, the settlers, who came after, I began getting informed."

His journey led him to discover the almost unique dichotomy of the Island's culture. "On Manitoulin Island there are two peoples sharing the land at the same time," he said. He quickly came to realize that there were at least two distinct points of view of the relationship between the two groups. "My knowledge about the dynamics between the white and aboriginal communities grew," he said. "Both people are living in a rural way, but they have very different

Mr. Capriotti said that he came to recognize early on that The Expositor was a local newspaper that covered a lot of First Nations news and that factor played a deciding role in his applying to the newspaper for an internship. Although Mr. Capriotti has impressive credentials from universities in England and Italy, he decided after coming to Canada that he should obtain Canadian credentials and attended Sheridan College's photojournalism courses. At both The Expositor and the college Mr. Capriotti won significant awards for his work, including an Ontario Community Newspaper Association award for a news feature that explored a day on the water with the Purvis fishing fleet.

As he came to learn more about Manitoulin and its cultures, Mr. Capriotti formed plans for a long term project that would delve deeply into exploring the cultural and viewpoint divides between two groups of people that history has placed in close proximity to each other.

"I am not judging," he emphasised. "I am not going into the why or trying to list the causes (of any issues that exist between the two groups).'

Rather, his goal is to document the kinds of lateral violence that have been caused by indifference to the issues

"When I came to Canada, I took it for granted that the Indigenous peoples didn't have a good life and that it was their own fault," he said. But after a stint living with a First Nation family he became aware of more of the history and current reality that lies behind the historical relationship. "There are factors that are ruling their lives." Those factors included being told where the original Indigenous occupants of the land could live, and that being on a fraction of their former range, set far away from economic hubs and what were then the means of production.

The result of that history resonates to this very day. "You look at who are the oldest white people on the Island, they are a 100-yearsold," he said. "But the oldest Native person is close to 90." Those differences exist, whatever the root causes.

Mr. Capriotti has a theory

that a key factor in the different life outcomes between the two communities comes down to indifference. "I want to create an awareness of the indifference," he said. "It is because of indifference that people do not react."

It is in documenting those indifferences that he hopes to create a worthwhile project, a project that says something important.

"A photograph is not going to change the world," he said. "I don't care how good a photographer you are, that is not going to happen. All you can do is create awareness."

But as a passionate storyteller, Mr. Capriotti hopes that his documentary project will help inform those people so that they overcome that paralyzing indifference that keeps them from reacting.

It is not a project that captures only comforting and safe images, the photographer seeks to document life on both sides, warts and all.

Mr. Capriotti said that it has taken him three years to come to understand his project. He refers to his way of working as "slow journalism." These are not stories that can be told in a handful of hastily composed photographs. Each photograph must be in-depth and a single event cannot encapsulate the complexity of the story. Those photographs are not necessarily in and of themselves controversial, indeed the opposite can be quite true.

"If it bleeds it reads," is the way of the news media, he said, but it is not

He also notes that there is no jackpot to be found at the end of this particular rainbow. "You do not do this kind of project to make money," he said. "It cannot sustain you."

But Mr. Capriotti is fortunate in that he has a career as a university videographer that carries the freight on keeping the wolf from his door and a roof over the heads of his young family

"I  $\bar{\text{believe}}$  there is room for this kind of in-depth documentation," he said. "You are not going to make a living out of this, but you don't do it for the money."

As to changing the world "you are not going to do it from the macro," he said. "You are if you start from the micro."

Mr. Capriotti identifies himself as an outsider to both Island communities. "I am looking with the eyes of an outsider," he said. But that vantage

goal is to be able to help them to become photojournalists, to tell their own sto-

In the meantime, and for some time going forward, Mr. Capriotti hopes to inspire young Anishinaabe to follow the path he has and to create their own documentary records from their own viewpoint.







In partnership, M'Chigeeng Health Centre and Noojmowin Teg Health Centre are seeking the full-time services of a Registered Social Worker. The Candidate will require previous work experience with First Nation and aboriginal populations between the ages of six and eighteen(less a day). The position is responsible to provide one-on-one and group counseling, as well as providing targeted prevention programming (ie. Parenting Programs, Mental Health First Aid, Safe Talk, etc.).

The aim of the service is to provide supportive counseling to M'Chigeeng children and youth to support their holistic well-being. The position will further contribute toward capacity building opportunities within the community's Health Centre program and services, as well as with the children/youth and families.

The incumbent will consult and work in collaboration with M'Chigeeng and Noojmowin Teg mental health teams, as well as other multi-disciplinary professionals. The services of the Aboriginal Child and Youth Worker are to strengthen a widening circle of care responsive to the needs of each young person. Services are both community and school based, working with teachers, school counselors, principals and parents.

Given the traditional practices of the Anishinabek, from time to time, exposure to wood smoke and the burning of sacred medicines, including tobacco, sweet grass, sage or cedar, may occur within the work setting.



## Cycling in 2017 to Help End Poverty One Big Bike Ride Coming Your Way

MANITOULIN—One of the biggest and most unusual trans-continental bike rides across North America is set to wheel between Sault Ste. and Manitoulin Island August 4 to 7.

Amazingly the cyclists are by no means athletes but just ordinary churchgoers wearing jerseys marked with the words "SeatoSea fighting to end poverty." The 130 participants, some only cyclist novices, are pedaling all or parts of a challenging 10-week ride of 6,757 km that left Canada in Vancouver, B.C. on June 26 and is set to reach Halifax, Nova Scotia on August 29. This is nearly twice the distance the world's best cyclists go in the Tour de France!

SeatoSea is a venture of the Christian Reformed Church in North America to which nearly 300,000 people belong in over 1,000 US and Canadian congregations.

The 2017 SeatoSea ride

million for relief agencies World Renew and Partners Worldwide and boost awareness of poverty issues. Already this target has been hit and looks to be exceeded.

Having left Canada southeast of Winnipeg for a 700 km pedal through the US the ride is set to reach Sault Ste. Marie on August 3. Early next day it is to reenter Canada. The scheduled August 4 ride is 151 km to Blind River for an overnight camp at Ecole Secondaire Catholic Jeuenesse-Nord. August 5 sees a 159 km pedal to Batman's Cottages and Campground at Sheguiandah on Manitoulin Island for a two-night stay as every Sunday is a designated rest day. On Civic Holiday Monday (August 7), cyclists are to catch the South Baymouth ferry to Tobermory. The ride then winds its way through southern Ontario to reach Ottawa on August

aims to raise at least \$1.5 12. From there cyclists go into Quebec and on to Nova

> To join the trip cyclists going the complete distance have had to raise or personally contribute \$12,000 for the cause. Yet, one rider, Eric DenOuden, president of the Canadian Home Builders Association, has already got \$70,000 in contributions. The ride has 80 men and 50 women with 50 participants going all the route and others six legs of 573 km to 1,753 km.

> The age range of riders is 12 to 81 and 70 percent are Canadians, mainly from Ontario. The oldest cyclist is from the US, Jim Beezhold, 81, from Pauma Valley, California. The senior Canadian is George Vanderkuur, 75, from Pickering, near Toronto. Eve from Luimes. 12. Kemptville, Ontario, is riding from Vancouver to Ottawa with brother Seth, 14, while their mom, Karen goes on to Halifax.

Peter Slofstra, 65, a retired Ontario pastor, now living in Kitchener, is pedaling the complete route on a tandem with his wife, Marja. They did SeatoSea the same way in 2005.

In 2005 and similar rides since, in 2008 and 2013, the CRC raised \$5.4 million to support over 100 organizations focused on the fight against poverty. One current church agency support program in Kenya and Tanzania trains 10,720 farmers to improve crops.

Ida Kaastra-Mutoigo, of Hamilton, co-director of World Renew, rode the 1,500 km between Calgary and Winnipeg to help relate better to what millions face in many countries when they have only bikes or their feet to haul water or to get to and from places like markets, health clinics and schools. She says the agency gets about \$14 million a year from Canadian and US churches.

However, this can expand to \$35 or \$40 million when matched with government funding and donations from other international donors

The CRC is recognized for its volunteerism and in trying to alleviate human suffering world-wide. This ride is an exceptional pilgrimage of Christian faith plus a serious physical and emotional test.

While the work retains some aspects of the abstract that Ms. Dallas said she was seeking to eschew, the story is unmistakable, so...mission accomplished.

Ms. Dallas established Kęmi Contemporary Dance Projects (Kemi) in 2008 and she serves as the company's artistic director. According to the company's website, "Kemi is dedicated to social and artistic interface across perceived borders and views the creative process as a profoundly collaborative and intimate one. Vulnerabilty and generosity are prized qualities throughout Kemi's collaborations in art as well as in society. To this end the company fosters exploration and education between artists as well as providing learning and discovery avenues for the general public."

Ms. Dallas has travelled and worked extensively in Africa, Asia and Europe. While Ms. Dallas performs the central role in 'Kittly Bender,' she is most ably supported by the work of Emma Kerson, a Toronto-based dancer and choreographer in her own right. Ms. Kerson packs a walloping dollop of humour into her supporting role. Her incredible ability to move across the stage in a toecramping pose while bearing aloft a large rock is nothing short of aweinspiring, but her poise and understated expression spoke volumes sans words.

It would be remiss to overlook the lighting of Oz Weaver which helped set the mood throughout the production, never overstated but always appropriate, his work complements the production without ever threatening to overwhelm what

is taking place on the stage. The same can be said of the production's sound designed by the JUNO nominated John MacLean (of CBC Studios fame).

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



MANITOULIN—Walking away from the early seminars on phragmites, an invasive reed that has infested Ontario's shores from southern Ontario to Manitoulin and beyond, one might be forgiven for thinking it was already a lost battle, but the results of the first annual Manitoulin Phrag Week and the host of volunteers from across Manitoulin prove that is anything but the case.

Phragmites spreads through a wide variety of ways, from the thousands of tiny seeds released by mature plants into the wind or by rhizomes through the plant's vast root networks. Tough, resilient and closepacked, the plants can quickly take over the waterfront squeezing out native flora (and fauna) and causing a massive environmental impact for cottagers and other waterfront properties (and the many creatures who depend on access to the shoreline to live and procreate) if not stopped early and aggressively in its tracks.

stopped early and aggressively in its tracks.

"Turnout was excellent," beamed biologist Judith Jones, of Winter-Spider Eco-Consulting. Ms. Jones and her compatriots at Manitoulin Streams have been leading (read organizing, but they certainly have been getting their hip waders wet) the charge in the battle to keep invasive grasses off of Manitoulin's shorelines. "We had 80 people come out. They came from all over, the turnout at White's Point was great and we had a really good team at Michael's Bay."

So far this season, teams have tackled and knocked down phragmites patches in Providence Bay, Dean's Bay, Sand Bay and a host of other locations across Manitoulin's shorelines. "We hope to have Misery Bay done by summer," she said. "We have made huge progress."

Turnout is one measure for Phragmites Week, but success in this case

Turnout is one measure for Phragmites Week, but success in this case is also in the knowledge and skillset being transferred to local landowners.

"People are learning how to deal with phragmites on their own properties," she said. "They can identify it and help their neighbours understand how important it is to deal with the patches before they get a hold on the shoreline."

With NGOs such as Manitoulin Streams and private enterprises such as WinterSpyder Eco-consulting working together with private landowners and volunteers to pool resources, those scarce resources can be stretched far beyond what could be done by any one group alone.

"It is a question of funding," admitted Ms. Jones when asked about the possible scope of the work. "But I am optimistic."

But there are larger sites, such as Lake Wolsey and Clover Valley, that

But there are larger sites, such as Lake Wolsey and Clover Valley, that will require a significant effort to tackle in the near future. But as the success of this first annual Phragmites Week has proven, where there is a will there is a way.

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
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




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## So much to take in for Haweater's 50th this weekend

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### New Expositor-made Island map proves wildly popular

MANITOULIN—The free map of Manitoulin Island produced by The Manitoulin Expositor proved so popular that the first printing of 15,000 copies flew out the door with alarming speed—so much so that folks here decided a second printed was definitely called for.

'No, I wasn't," said Manitoulin Publishing Co. president and Expositor editor Alicia McCutcheon when asked if she was surprised by the popularity of the new map. "We had been hearing from all quarters that there was a definite need for such a map, so we decided it was a project that we should take on.'

Although there are plenty of maps of the Island around, putting one together for Manitoulin that is contemporary and gives a nod to tradition had its own challenges. The map was designed by Dick Maloney and the Expositor's own production manager Dave Patterson, who noted that some names have changed over the years and others provide their own chal-

"There was one destination called Eagle's Nest which was problematic.' said Mr. Patterson. "We had to take it off because so many visitors were going down the road and looking for an actual eagle's nest. It was surprising, some days there would be 20 people down there looking for the eagle's nest.

Other roads have seen

their names change in the years between the printing of various maps of the region. "We tried to make it as up-to-date and accurate as possible," said Mr. Patterson, "but we have had a couple of calls from people pointing out where they believe we have gone off the path." Those minor adjustments, once verified, will be incorporated into the next

week," said Joyce O'Connor of Red Lodge who dropped by to pick up more from the second printing. "I saw that the new batch was in and thought we better get down here to get some while they last," she laughed.

For any publication, a printing of 30,000 is pretty impressive. But why is there no advertising or cost to the map?

"We distribute 'Manitoulin's Magazine' locally and it is very popular," Mr. Patterson added. "We have the same map printed inside 'Manitoulin's Magazine' as well."

Both 'This is Manitoulin' and 'Manitoulin Magazine' are also "free," but are financed through paid advertising from local businesses, tourism operators mation that would have been useful for visitors to have." said McCutcheon. "The map was important enough that we decided to go ahead with it

as our contribution. A rising tide raises all boats, so when our clients prosper, we do too. It is important to everyone that tourism on Manitoulin thrives.'



The Manitoulin Expositor map is free of charge, but because of the high demand the paper has had to put some restrictions on the number being given out. Resorts and other businesses were given a few pads of 50 from the first printing, while individuals were limited to single maps.

"We went through the first batch in the first

"We produce 57,000 copies of "This is Manitoulin' that are distributed through locations across the province every spring. It has been in existence since the 1960s. We also have 'Manitoulin's Magazine,' with a circulaand municipalities. Years of experience and a professional design team have helped make those two publications become highly successful avenues for advertisers and local event organizers to get their message out.

#### Mad Hatter Tea Party tackles residential school reconciliation

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—Humour plays an important role in healing, which might go a long way toward explaining the resilience demonstrated by so many residential school survivors. Humour was a central theme during the Mad Hatter Tea Party for Indian Residential Schools and Families hosted by Noojmowin Teg Traditional Health.

"We are very fortunate to have Barbara Nolan as our guest speaker," said Mad Hatter Tea Party organizer Janice Trudeau, Noojmowin Teg Health Centre Resolution Health Support worker. Ms. Nolan is herself a residential school survivor and her presentation 'Personal Forgiveness Journey' was greeted by plenty of laughter from an audience bedecked in a collection of hilarious 'mad hats.

Ms. Nolan's personal story began in her childhood, when her parents sent her off to residential school to gain an education and to learn English. Education, she noted, was very important in her family. While Anishinaabemowin was the language she was born into, it was generally recognized that "if you wanted to be a nurse, or a teacher, you had to learn English," she recalled. "I wanted to be a teacher."

"I have forgiven my parents (for sending her to residential school)," noted Ms. Nolan. "They thought they knew what they were

doing." The more difficult path of forgiveness for her was far more personal—she had to learn to forgive herself

Ms. Nolan recounted how the negative lessons she learned in residential school on child-rearing impacted on how she had raised her own children. "I would scream at them, that is how they did it at the residential school," she recalled. Children are very resilient, however, and memories tend to block out the negative of the past.

"My children told me 'oh you weren't that bad'."

Most of Ms. Nolan's presentation was given in Anishinabemowin, leavened with occasional sojourns into English, but so consummate a storyteller is Ms. Nolan that someone with only a nominal grasp of the language could actually follow along with much of what she was imparting.

She spoke of her early years in Toronto and how she came to meet her future husband Tom Nolan

of Sagamok—"tall, dark and handsome." Her husband passed away a year and a half ago.

When she came home to Wiikwemkoong to tell her father that she wanted to get married he had two questions: "Is he Anishinaabe? Is he Catholic?" Although the first answer was yes, the second was more problematic. "He was Anglican," she recalled. "I was so worried he was going to say no," she laughed.

Ms. Nolan segued her

personal experiences and life story into her own healing journey, and the steps of the grief cycle, recalling an experience where she attended a healing circle. Magaret Pitawankwat assisted The Expositor in interpreting the story. Ms. Nolan recounted how while at university, she went to a grieving workshop in order to learn about the process, not believing she herself had any grief that needed healing. An instructor placed the group in a circle. During the healing circle, a young woman began to cry. The instructor told the others in the circle to close their eyes. Ms. Nolan admitted to her insatiable curiosity and that she peeked. What she witnessed amazed her. The facilitator was washing the young woman and Ms. Nolan could see something cascading from her body as the facilitator cleansed her, but there was nothing on the floor beneath the dis-

tressed woman.

Ms. Nolan had entered the healing circle believing that she had no pain that needed remedy, but she discovered that those who have unbearable pain will push those memories deep into their psyche, forgetting that there is pain. But that pain is still there, festering and poisoning the lives of those within whom it lies.

Some survivors of residential school believe the experience was positive, that they enjoyed their time there. "That's okay,"

said Ms. Nolan. "They have that right to believe that." But that time in the grieving circle had taught her how deep her own pain had been buried and she was able to begin her own journey towards healing.

"My kids had forgiven me, but I had to learn to forgive myself," she said. "I had to learn to forgive those teachers for what they did to me. Forgiveness is the last step in the grieving cycle." Forgiveness, she added, does not mean forgetting. "You will never forget."

Within each of us is a little child, a child that wants to play, that wants to laugh. "You have to let that little child within you come out to play," said Ms. Nolan.

At this point a pair of clowns from Debajehmujig Storytellers came into the room and began to interact with the residential school survivors and their families. The pair of clowns lightened the atmosphere while they took photographs with the audience.

In the afternoon presentation, Noojmowin Teg child nutritionist Cody Leeson brought insights into the many benefits of the humble blueberry. "Blueberries really are nature's true superfood," he said. "There are just so many health benefits contained in these little sweet packages."

Good nutrition is also an important part of taking care of oneself and laying the foundations of a healing journey.



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#### Hardy group of volunteers brave rains to clean Providence Bay beach

by Michael Erskine **PROVIDENCE** BAY-Threatening clouds overhead did nothing to deter a group of volunteers who were intent on removing invasive species from the sands and dunes of the

Providence Bay beach. This year's efforts follow on a major cleanup effort that took place last year and the results from last year's outing were clearly evident on the beach this year. "What a difference," said Manitoulin biologist Judith Jones as she took a moment out from overseeing the volunteers' efforts.

Although the work was taking place a little earlier this year than last, so the plants were somewhat smaller than they would be later in the summer, it was clear there were far fewer plants cluttering up the beach than was the case

"We have to be really careful to only remove those plants that don't belong here," cautioned Ms. Jones. "I know that some people would like us to be taking away everything, but we are not allowed to do that." Actually, removing all of the vegetation would be very counterproductive, even if it was allowed, as the natural grasses that inhabit the beach area help to stabilize the sands and the dunes where people want them to

council reports from back and kept working through it all.'

Volunteers hauled a large blue tarp across the beach on which the volunteers piled their harvested plant matter so as not to allow any errant seeds to spread. Paper bags were also on hand as recepta-

Further down the beach a distinct lack of vegetation spoke volumes to the effectiveness of municipalities' efforts to combat invasive phragmites that have been bedeviling the beach in recent years as well. The municipality applied for a permit to conduct the phragmites control work last year.

"It has really been a suc-


cess story," said Central Manitoulin Economic Development Officer Nancy Kinoshameg. "We are looking at doing some work in that vein in my own community (Wiikwemkoong) in the near future as well.'

Hitting stands of invasive species impacting Island waterways and beaches as early as possible, before they are firmly established, helps play a huge role in keeping the spread and congestion under control.

"It really shows that this isn't a hopeless fight," said Ms. Kinoshameg. "If you get on it early, you can make a real difference.'

As to the work on Providence Bay beach the old adage that "many hands makes light work" was demonstrated as the volunteers swept across the landscape, quickly putting paid to stands of unwelcome greenery infesting the dunes.

"If we can make these kind of events a yearly thing, we can really help to keep our waters clear and our waterfronts accessible," noted Ms. Jones. "It can be done."

One of my favourite fruits to eat and cook with are blueberries. When they become available, the wild blueberries sold by the roadside, tame ones from your garden or farmers markets they all bring the feeling of mid-summer. Here's hoping for another four weeks of sunny and hot weather to ripen the tomatoes and peppers.

#### **Blueberry Coffee** Cake

This cake is quick to make and I switched the white flour to spelt. It makes the cake denser but a bit healthier.

#### TOPPING:

- 1 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup softened butter 2 tsp cinnamon
  - CAKE:
- 3/4 cup sugar 3/4 cup softened butter
- 1 egg
- 1 cup sour cream 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp each baking pow-
- der and baking soda 2 cups fresh blueberries

#### Topping:

In small bowl, using a fork, stir together sugar, butter and cinnamon until well combined and crumbly; set aside.

Cake: Preheat oven to 350°F; lightly grease a 9inch springform pan.

In a medium bowl using electric mixer, cream together sugar and butter until light and fluffy. Beat in egg on low speed until well combined. Stir in sour cream and vanilla.

In separate bowl, stir together flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Gradually stir flour mixture into sugar-butter mixture until well combined (batter will be stiff).

Spoon two-thirds of cake batter into prepared pan, spreading evenly. Top evenly with blueberries. Drop remaining batter by spoonfuls on top of blueberries; spread evenly to more or less cover blueberries. Sprinkle evenly with topping.

Bake 50 to 60 minutes or until well risen, golden brown and firm to touch. Let cool in pan on wire rack. Release sides of pan; place cake on serving plate. Serve warm or cold.
