Injured turtle back in L. Mindemoya after being mended

Turtle rehabilitated thanks to team of volunteers and Ontario turtle centre

MINDEMOYA—An injured painted turtle named Tutu has made a full recovery and has returned home to Lake Mindemoya after a stay at the Ontario Turtle Conservation Centre (OTCC) in Peterborough.

"The turtle, which we named

Tutu, was brought in by a client who found him on Highways 551," said Doctor Janice Mitchell, a veterinarian at the Island Animal Hospital. "He had a badly broken shell, but I was told by the OTCC in the past that as long as the turtle's eyes were not protruding and their intestines were not coming

out, they are able to help them. We gave Tutu fluids and pain meds and reached out on Facebook to find him a ride to the OTCC. Julie McDermid has a lot of connections through her pet rescue group and put us in touch with Kayla Bison who drove Tutu all the way to the OTCC in Peterborough."

Turtle Program Manager at the OTCC, Donnell Gasbarrini, said that Tutu arrived at the OTCC on May 27 with fractures near the back of his shell.

"He had orthopedic wires put in place to stabilize the fractures and to stop the broken pieces of shell from moving, so that the edges of the bone could fuse back together," she said. "The turtle actually

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Clint Haggart back in jail

SUDBURY—The man charged with arson to three properties in Little Current over the course of three terrifying months in 2014 for that community's residents was again in court last month.

Clinton Haggart, age 34, was charged in April 2017 with the assault of a female following a break and enter at a Sudbury residence, thereby breaking his probation order. He was also charged with stealing 12 packages of cigarettes from the female victim, or theft under \$5,000.

After being indicted on the four charges, Mr. Haggart appeared in Sudbury court on July 19 where he was found guilty of charge one, assault, and charge three, keeping peace and good behaviour as per his probation. Charges two and four, break and enter and theft under \$5,000, were withdrawn.

The judge sentenced Mr. Haggart to serve 11 days in jail for the charges, concurrently, as his pre-

sentence custody of 86 days actually counts for 129 days due to jail-house conditions. He was also sentenced to 12 months' probation, including having to provide a DNA sample. Mr. Haggart must also pay a \$400 victim surcharge fee within 12 months.

Rural Tehkummah residents concerned with MTO herbicides, will seek the support of reeve and council

TEHKUMMAH—Some Tehkummah residents are upset with what they feel is a lack of proper notice regarding the spraying of herbicide on Tehkummah roads by the Ministry of Transportation (MTO).

An advertisement posted by the MTO alerting Tehkummah residents to the spraying appeared in the July 12 and July 19 editions of the paper, as per Pesticide Act and Regulations, Pesticide Control Products Act and Regulations and The Environmental Pesticide Act and

Regulations Part V and Reg. 309, but stated that spraying could commence as early as July 15. This has George Kopylov, a Tehkummah carpenter, concerned as those same Acts clearly state that 10 days' notice must first be given.

While the first sight of a spray truck, operated by MTO contractors DBI, was spotted by at least one Tehkummah resident on July 25—within the 10-day timeframe—Mr. Kopylov said he isn't convinced that the spraying hadn't commenced earlier.

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Salmon Classic begins well: first three days see tripling of weigh-ins over last year

MANITOULIN—As of press time Monday, over 100 fish have been weighed in at the second annual Manitoulin Expositor Salmon Classic—and that's just three days into the month-long event.

"Over the first four days of last year's Salmon Classic there were 38 weigh-ins compared to over 100 this time last year," Salmon Classic organizer Dave Patterson stated.

"The free salmon lures are

going fast so make sure you bring your yellow weigh-in slip to The Expositor Office to redeem yours," Mr. Patterson added. "It is first come first serve."

Manitowaning continues to produce the most fish, however the south shore of Manitoulin is starting to come alive, he notes.

"Generally speaking, the fishing has been much better this year than last and right now the majority of the salmon are being taken 40 to 60 feet down," Mr. Patterson shared. "This could change at any time as last week they were more than 100 feet down."

So far this Salmon Classic there does not seem to a true 'hot lure.' "Like always, hues of purple, watermelon and high visibility fluorescents are still taking in their fair share of fish," he added.

MANITOULIN—When asked how he first came to discover Manitoulin Island, international award winning photographer and videographer Giovanni Capriotti replied that it was "complicated."

"It was in 2010, I was working on project on the North Shore," he recalled. "I was looking at a map

and I saw that there was this big island. I said to myself, 'I should go and check it out.'

Main Street Café Andrew Cohen lecture recalls Pearson

KAGAWONG—How soon we forget. Even so-called political junkies (like most journalists) seem to have a short memory when it comes Canadian iconic figures. Lecturer, author and columnist Andrew Cohen brought the late Lester Bowles Pearson to life for a rapt audience in a packed house at Kagawong's Main Street Café.

Mr. Cohen is the author of 'Extraordinary Canadians: Lester B. Pearson' which explores the life and times of a man who for a generation was literally the world's best known Canadian—even before he became a political legend in Canadian politics and Canada's 14th prime minister.

The evening began with Old Mill Heritage Centre museum curator Rick Nelson discussing some of the history of Mr. Pearson who served as Manitoulin's Member of Parliament for 20 years, from 1948 to 1968. Mr. Nelson recalled that the late Senator Thomas Farquhar had relinquished his seat so that Mr. Pearson could run and he noted several members of Senator Farquhar's family that were in the audience.

Mr. Nelson referenced a 1961 letter from Mr. Pearson to Senator Farquhar's son in which Mr. Pearson wrote that he was sending the missive as he "just wanted you to know he is appreciated." Sadly, Senator Farquhar passed away in 1962 and never got to see his friend become Canadian prime minister.

Mr. Cohen introduced himself as a teacher to whose students the name Lester B. Pearson "doesn't mean a lot." He said that he considered it his responsibility to impart that information to them.

The author began by describing Mr. Pearson's early life as the son of a minister and growing up "in genteel poverty, if any poverty could be described as genteel." In any event, there was always a big house with a large yard in which to play sports. Sports were one of the defining parts of the late prime minister's life, and he was by all accounts a very accomplished athlete.

Mr. Pearson received his Nobel Peace Prize for unravelling the Gordian Knot of the Suez Crisis and he was the prime instigator of the United Nations peacekeeping force, but he was also a warrior who served in two fronts of the First World War. Mr. Cohen posited that it was Mr. Pearson's experiences in the war, the losses he personally felt and the horror he witnessed, that framed a lifetime of diplomacy and a life that would see him lauded as a "prince of peace."

It was during a short stint in the Royal Flying Corps that Mr. Pearson was first labelled with a nickname that would follow him for the rest of his life. Mr. Cohen explained that the flight commander of Mr. Pearson's squadron thought the name Lester was somewhat sissified and that a pilot in his flight required a more martial moniker.

Author Andrew Cohen delivered a lecture on the life and times of Canada's 14th Prime Minister Lester Bowles Pearson at the Main Street Café in Kagawong that kept the audience in thrall. Mr. Pearson, who represented Manitoulin in Ottawa for 20 years from 1948 until 1963 was the most recognizable Canadian in the world for much of his lifetime.

So he began calling him Mike.

Despite being in a part of the armed forces whose member's longevity was measured in weeks, if not hours, Mr. Pearson returned to Canada largely unscathed. "I had a very good war," he is recalled as remarking. This might have been in part that

his war injuries came not from the air, but from being hit by a bus in London.

"They were literally dropping out of the air," said Mr. Cohen. "They were flying in was really just a glorified box kite."

His other injuries were deeper, and his return to Canada was delayed by a bout of what we would term today as post traumatic stress disorder.

A good portion of his time in

uniform was actually spent as a quartermaster of some form or other, an occupation that allowed him to employ his easy and gregarious manner.

Mr. Cohen went on to outline the incredible accomplishments of Mr. Pearson while he was in the foreign service, including, in part,

in the foreign service that would define his legacy and make him the single most recognized Canadian in the world.

Mr. Cohen also took the audience through the many accomplishments of Mr. Pearson as a Canadian prime minister, albeit one that never enjoyed a majority government.

Following his presentation, Mr. Cohen took questions from the audience. The main question asked was why, given his immense roles on the global and Canadian stages, the Pearson office was removed from the Laurier Building three years ago. Mr. Cohen laid the "blame" squarely on former Foreign Minister John Baird, who he pointed out removed the name Pearson Building from his business cards. Mr. Baird, he noted, was a strong devotee of former Progressive Conservative Prime Minister John Diefenbaker. Mr. Pearson and Mr. Diefenbaker were not collegial in their political lives (Mrs. Pearson referred to the Tory adversary as "that bad man.")

Mr. Cohen signed copies of his book following the presentation and commended Mr. Nelson and the Billings museum committee for their efforts in bringing the Lester B. Pearson office out from

storage and back into the public eye.

The Pearson Exhibit can be viewed at the Old Mill Heritage Centre in Kagawong from 9 am to 4:30 pm until October 7. Hours may change in September.

"Mark O'Neill, the CEO of the Canadian Museum of History and the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa, is flying up to Manitoulin Island to visit the museum," said Mr. Nelson. "This is a VIP of the highest order and we will be putting on a reception for him at the museum Wednesday (July 26)."

The historical lecture series, of which Mr. Cohen's presentation was a part, began with a July 12 panel discussion that included TVO's Steve Paikin and Billings' Mayor Austin Hunt, moderated by Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha.

The final editions of the Kagawong Historical Lecture series will take place on Thursday, August 10, with matinee and evening lectures by Lester B. Pearson's granddaughter Patricia Pearson.

started to pick it up and are able to communicate with us and let us know what they want or need. The translators have also been a huge help just being a call away.”

Ms. Rochon Shaw told The Expositor that road safety has been a big focus for the volunteers with the children.

“Road safety has been a huge adjustment for them as they are not familiar with it at all,” Ms. Rochon Shaw shared. “We have been teaching them about crossing the road and what side to walk on and going for daily walks to the school in preparation for the kids in the fall.”

Five of the children will be attending Central Manitoulin Public School this fall, which Ms. Rochon Shaw said the parents are thrilled about as not all the children had the opportunity at the refugee camp.

“There were bikes donated for everyone in the family so we have been teaching them how to ride bikes,” she added. “By day three the 12-year-old was biking and by day four the dad was too. We have also had a smaller bike with training wheels donated, which is helping the younger children learn how to ride.”

The family has been going to the grocery store daily and cooking their own food as well.

“The dad even came home the other day and had made an appointment to get his hair cut—they are adjusting well,” said Ms. Rochon Shaw. “They are also learning about computers and progressing quickly.”

She said that the community as a whole has been very welcoming to its newest members.

onto us, creating a whole new generation of storytellers to carry on the traditions.”

Many of the stories and traditions that Debajehmujig have acquired over the years came from the late Odawa elder and traditionalist Eddie King who acted as elder in residence for Debajehmujig for many years.

The stories of Nanabush trace back through the centuries to the time when animism was central to

the lifestyle of the Indigenous peoples, in whose territories the nation of Canada shares.

The figure of Nanabush features in the petroglyphs engraved in rocks across Turtle Island, particularly evident in Peterborough. “When you see a figure of a man with rabbit ears, that's Nanaboozhoo,” said Mr. Osawabine. “He was also known as Waynaboozhoo, the rabbit.”

He went on to note that you can find Nanaboozhoo in the traditional

greeting of the Anishinaabe. “When we say boozhoo, we have dropped the ‘wayna’ part and shortened to boozhoo honouring him.”

‘Nanabush Stories: interpreted in a whole new way’ is being performed at 7 pm on August 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 in the first run and again from August 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20. All performances will be at the Holy Cross Mission ruins in Wiikwemkoong with a \$10 minimum suggested donation.

does most of the work healing itself, similar to a cast helping someone with a fracture."

Ms. Gasbarrini said that the turtle was an adult, so over the age of 15 to 20 years, but that it is impossible to know its exact age, noting that painted turtles can live to 70-years-old.

"The turtle was listed a week and a half ago to be released," said Ms. Gasbarrini, who delivered Tutu back to Manitoulin personally, as she was coming to the Island for a trip. Ms. Gasbarrini worked with turtles at Misery Bay Provincial Park while working on her Masters of Science through Laurentian University in 2014/2015. Ms. Gasbarrini met with Heather Jeeves, representing the Island Animal Hospital, who showed Ms. Gasbarrini a marshy area of Lake Mindemoya, along Ketchankookem Trail, to release Tutu. "We try to release the turtles as close to where they were found—the closest suitable habitat."

It has been a busy year for the OTCC, with the centre taking in over 700 injured turtles this season, over 600 of which have been hit by a car.

"It (the number of injured turtles) is about twice as many as last year for multiple reasons," said Ms. Gasbarrini. "We have been putting a lot of effort into creating awareness—

with more people knowing what to do when they come across an injured turtle. That has led to us taking in turtles from far away and not just the Peterborough/Kawartha area. We have taken in turtles from as far as Sudbury, Manitoulin, Windsor, London and even some from Quebec. Another factor is that its been great weather for turtles this summer, not too hot, not too cold, so they've been moving more often than last summer when conditions were very hot and dry. With such extensive road networks in Ontario and more and more drivers on the roads, turtles often have to cross a road to access part of the habitat that had once been continuous, and risk getting hit by cars."

Although painted turtles aren't listed as 'at risk' in Ontario (they are listed as 'data deficient' meaning that more study needs to be done to determine their population), the other seven species of turtles found in Ontario are 'species at risk.'

"Turtles naturally face high mortality rates when they are young and the payoff is that those who survive to adulthood should stick around for a long time—some species can live upwards of 100 years," explained Ms. Gasbarrini. "Turtles continue to reproduce throughout their entire lives, they do not stop with old age like humans

do. Less than one percent of the eggs that are laid will survive to adulthood, so it can take over 40 years for an adult turtle to replace herself. The increased loss of adult turtles through habitat loss and road mortality is seriously harming populations."

You can help turtles by volunteering to be a turtle taxi with the OTCC.

"You just send an email with your name and contact information to turtle-taxi@ontarioturtle.ca," said Ms. Gasbarrini. "When a taxi is needed we send out a message and if you are able to help, you reply, if not you wait for the next message. It is a great way to help out without making a big commitment."

The OTCC is a multifaceted conservation centre that works to preserve Ontario's turtle species and protect the habitats in which they live. The OTCC operates a Turtle Trama Centre where the injured turtles from all over Ontario are brought to receive treatment and care with the goal always being to release the turtle back into the wild where he or she came from.

"The OTCC also operates a hatching program, which involves incubating eggs and raising the young through their first winter, getting them stronger and more able to handle the challenges they will face in the wild," said Ms. Gabarri-

ni. "Some females who are gravid (carrying eggs) will lay them while receiving care at the OTCC. Other gravid females may not survive due to the severity of their injuries, but the staff at the OTCC can harvest the eggs from deceased females so that the fate of the young does not have to be the same as the fate of their mother. The hatchlings are all released in suitable habitats near where their mother had been found. The OTCC is working to monitor wild populations and compare movement patterns, habitat use, and growth rates to wild turtles, to determine if any of these differ between wild turtles and those who are hatched and raised in captivity for the beginning of their lives."

If you find an injured turtle, you can call the OTCC (705-741-5000) and they will walk you through what to do and arrange a turtle taxi to get the turtle to the nearest Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre (Wild at Heart in Sudbury) or straight to the OTCC.

When contacted by the Expositor, the MTO stated that the spraying took place on Highway 542 on Wednesday, July 26 and that as per the aforementioned Acts and Regulations, the contractor (DBI) must submit the following information to the ministry 10 days before spraying: a contractor name, who must be accredited with the Integrated Pest Management Council; a contract number; and the herbicide name and product number.

Upon completion of the spraying, the contractor must submit the following records of all herbicide applications to the ministry: date, highway number, location, hectares treated, weather at time of application, targeted vegetation, type and quantity of herbicides applied; and name of applicator and pesticide licence.

"The contractor is also required to submit herbicide information a minimum of 10 business days prior to the start of the spraying operations," Lara Cantin, media spokesperson for the MTO, northeast region, states. "Notification in the newspaper is required one week in advance of spraying or alternatively could place signs every 100 metres. Our contractor submitted all the necessary documents and followed the notification requirements."

When asked if the MTO requires a municipal resolution, as Hydro One requires when it seeks to spray herbicide, the MTO replied that it did not need municipal approval, as "the contractor is only spraying on MTO property."

Of particular concern to Mr. Kopylov is the herbicide ClearView. Just like Garlon, ClearView is highly toxic to fish, aquatic plants and invertebrates.

One resident of Highway 542 in Tehkummah shared her encounter with an MTO contractor who was spraying herbicide last week. Bernadette Phillips notes that she and her husband spotted a tanker truck in the early evening hours that was obviously spraying something on her and her husband's property followed by a sweet chemical smell.

Tracking the tanker truck and accompanying MTO vehicle down, Ms. Phillips asked a man in the MTO vehicle what it was the tanker was spraying. He responded by saying that he was not aware of the name of the chemical, "but it was something to keep the weeds down."

"I asked him if it was ClearView or Garlon, and I told him that I had not been notified that herbicide was going to be used at the end of my property," Ms. Phillips said. "I asked for a copy of the documentation and material data safety handling sheet and the gentleman in the MTO car said he did not have one. I explained to him I was under the understanding that there was to be more discussion and awareness made with the residents in the area prior to the spraying of the herbicide. As an MTO employee he was unaware of this."

"I backed up and asked the employee in the sprayer truck if he knew what he was spraying. He said he was not sure but checked on his clipboard and told me that the product was ClearView," she continued. "I explained that neither myself nor my husband were aware that our property was going to be sprayed with this herbicide, and the employee had no satisfactory response."

"I mentioned to the MTO employee in the lead car that I had not been notified that this product was going to be used on my property. I also mentioned to him that ClearView was toxic to fish and other forms of wildlife," Ms. Phillips said. "He told me we were not near any fish. I stated, 'look around. Everything runs downhill and goes into the river and into the lake. You are near fish.' He said he would discontinue the spraying."

A delegation will be brought forward to the August 15 meeting of Tehkummah council to raise their concerns on herbicide use in the municipality.

In other areas of Manitoulin, Hydro One told The Expositor that crews are still working on Manitoulin, spraying the herbicide Garlon and that no new work areas have been proposed.



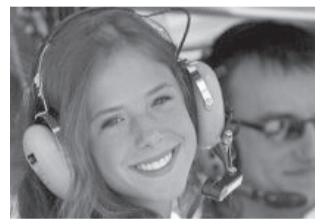

Police following up leads generated by \$50,000 reward

WIKWEMKOONG—The sign on the left hand side of the road leading into Wiikwemkoong bears the faded image of a young man and a family’s desperate plea for justice and closure. Almost 11 years ago, Anthony (Antz) Samuel Mandamin was walking on Kaboni Road after a house party in the Village of Wiikwemkoong when he was struck and killed by a driver who then fled the scene. Mr. Mandamin was only 25 at the time.

On the 10th anniversary of his death, the provincial government offered a \$50,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who were responsible for his death.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service and the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) are continuing their investigation under the direction of OPP Detective Inspector Gilles Depretto.

Wikwemikong Tribal Police Special Constable Alana Eshkawkogan confirmed that the police have received numerous tips since the announcement of the reward and

that the investigation is still ongoing.

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Anishinabek Nation leadership will continue supporting Chippewas of the Thames Line 9B plight

NIPISSING FIRST NATION—The Supreme Court of Canada has issued its ruling in favour of the National Energy Board's (NEB) approval of Enbridge's Line 9B plan to reverse the flow of Line 9B, part of an existing crude oil pipeline, that presently runs from Sarnia to Montreal, and through the traditional and Treaty territory of Chippewas of the Thames First Nation.

"We are tremendously disappointed in this ruling. This is not the end," stated Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee following the ruling. "We will continue to support Chippewas of the Thames in this toilsome fight for our rights. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, Section 35 of the Constitution Act, the treaty relationship, and the 10 principles outlined by Justice Minister Raybould speak to a Nation-to-Nation relationship, not about third-parties that do not have any business in a Nation-to-Nation relationship."

Enbridge's proposed plan to reverse the flow and increase capacity of Line 9B was approved by the NEB in 2014. Chippewas of the Thames is claiming that the NEB failed to properly assess and consider the full scope of their aboriginal and Treaty rights and the impacts of the infringement of those rights. The community filed an appeal to challenge the

NEB's approval of Enbridge's Line 9B project, citing that the federal Crown failed to provide consultation with the community on the project. The Crown is required to accommodate and consult with First Nations before they consider an action or decision that may affect a First Nation's aboriginal and Treaty rights.

Section 35 of the Canadian Constitution Act recognizes, confirms, and protects aboriginal rights as well as Treaty rights. The 40-year-old pipeline runs through the Chippewas of the Thames traditional and treaty territory, and has been doing so without the consultation of the community since its inception.

Grave environmental concerns from Chippewas of the Thames stem from the age of the pipeline and knowing that it was initially constructed to transport light crude oil. The added density of a new substance and increased temperature and pressure could cause the pipeline to rupture. Should this occur, the community's surrounding traditional territory's air, water, land, and ultimately, its people, would suffer.

Chippewas of the Thames and the Anishinabek Nation, along with Chiefs of Ontario, will continue their efforts and support in protecting their traditional and Treaty rights.

Tail Deer’ by Robert Cram, a highly polished bronze that will patina over time, located at the west side of the Kagawong River Trail downriver of the blue foot bridge; a sculpture by KWEST, Matt McNaught, which will be located near the entrance of the Kagawong River Trail by the tennis courts; ‘Ascend/Transcend’ by Ted Fullerton, three cold cast, resin figures on steel lifts, located on the Park Centre Lawn; ‘Drum Circle’ by Quinn Smallboy, a welded steel drum, on the Kagawong downtown lawn near chess set; and the Community Sculpture Project with Cree architect Jake Chakasim.

Also as part of the Billings Connection Trail is the installation of 32 historical interpretive plaques throughout Billings and a brand new Billings map with the new stops and sculptures listed.

The Township of Billings, 4elements Living Arts, Billings Recreation

Committee and the Old Mill Centre are all contributing to a year-long series of engagement and community development projects through the Billings Art and Heritage Project.

“The Community Sculpture Project is a community arts project facilitated by 4elements Living Arts and Cree architect, Jake Chakasim, a lecturer at the Laurentian School of Architecture where he teaches Architectural Design Studio,” explains a press release from 4elements. “The project is designed to bring together community members of Billings Township and high school students (from any Island School) to collaborate on the design and build of a permanent public sculpture.”

“There will be two parts,” explained 4elements Executive Director Sophie Edwards, “a design workshop with Jake Chakasim at Manitoulin Secondary School August 9, 10 and 11 from 10 am to 5 pm and a project build with Mr. Chakasim September 19 and 20 from 9 am to 3 pm, also at Manitoulin Secondary School.”

Mr. Chakasim says his residency will “serve to be a ‘cross-cultural’ discussion with local students and community members exploring notions of place, shared histories, personal experiences, that speak to displacement and settlement, including migration—very much in the same ‘vein of the rocks’ that make up the Manitoulin Island fabric.”

“This cross-cultural discussion aims to foreground ‘cultural values’ informed by the meaning of the site,” added Mr. Chakasim, noting that participants will “utilize the natural materials of the site (wood and stone) as a way to draw our collective attention back to the layered histories of the

rience is necessary.

“He has facilitated several community builds with non-buildings/architects and looks forward to working with local students and community members,” she said.

Elder Josh Eshkwagan and knowledge keeper Sunny Osawabine have been working closely with project facilitators Ms. Edwards and Sarah King-Gold.

“Participants don’t need any artistic experience,” stressed Ms. Edwards, “and drop-ins are welcome.”

The sculpture is one of seven commissioned sculptures being developed around the themes of environment and Truth and Reconciliation as part of the Billings’ Connections Trail, part of The Billings Art and Heritage Project, and is funded through the Canada 150 Fund, Ontario 150 and is supported by the Township of Billings.

Ms. Edwards explained to The Expositor that last September a call for artists was sent out nationally and that a jury made up of Billings community members narrowed the applicants down to a short list. A community input night in November allowed votes to be cast for the favourite designs, followed by interviews with the finalists and a jury selecting the winners.

Community groups receive \$10,000 in donations from Northeast Town and McLean's Wind Farm partnership

LITTLE CURRENT—The McLean's Mountain Wind Farm Road Use Agreement donation committee donated a total of \$10,000 between two Northeast Town groups last week.

The committee donated \$5,000 to the 2018 Travelers Northern Ontario Men's Curling Championships being held in Little Current and \$5,000 to the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy (EBC) and the development of the Cup and Saucer Trail.

"It was felt by the committee that this is a significant community event which will benefit all of the municipality," said committee member Councillor Marcel Gauthier.

"The EBC is working hard to develop the Cup and Saucer Trail and there are a lot more costs down the line such as a traffic study that are going to need to be done," said fellow committee member, Mayor Al MacNevin. "We felt this was a good investment."

As part of the construction of the McLean's Mountain Wind Farm, which was concluded in 2014, the Northeast Town and McLean's Mountain Wind Limited Partnership entered into a road use agreement resulting in a community fund of 20 annual donations of \$10,000 from the wind partnership to be used to support Northeast Town organization, groups, initiatives or events.

The first year a \$10,000 donation was made to the Howland Seniors' Hall for renovations. In 2014, \$10,000 was donated to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor for the purchase of a Carendo hygiene shower chair. In 2015, \$5,000 was donated to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor Calling on You Campaign to replace the call bell system that residents can use to summon assistance, \$1,250 to the Little Current Legion to help with improvements to the hall and \$1,250 to the Manitoulin Sea Cadets towards their trip to Vimy Ridge in 2017.

found himself being quickly accepted and welcomed.

"I didn't know much about Indigenous issues back then," he said. "I did not really know anything about the divisions between the Natives who lived here before and the people, the settlers, who came after. I began getting informed."

His journey led him to discover the almost unique dichotomy of the Island's culture. "On Manitoulin Island there are two peoples sharing the land at the same time," he said. He quickly came to realize that there were at least two distinct points of view of the relationship between the two groups. "My knowledge about the dynamics between the white and aboriginal communities grew," he said. "Both people are living in a rural way, but they have very different lives."

Mr. Capriotti said that he came to recognize early on that The Expositor was a local newspaper that covered a lot of First Nations news and that factor played a deciding role in his applying to the newspaper for an internship. Although Mr. Capriotti has impressive credentials from universities in England and Italy, he decided after coming to Canada that he should obtain Canadian credentials and attended Sheridan College's photojournalism courses. At both The Expositor and the college Mr. Capriotti won significant awards for his work, including an Ontario Community Newspaper Association award for a news feature that explored a day on the water with the Purvis fishing fleet.

As he came to learn more about Manitoulin and its cultures, Mr. Capriotti formed plans for a long term project that would delve deeply into exploring the cultural and viewpoint divides between two groups of people that history has placed in close proximity to each other.

"I am not judging," he emphasized. "I am not going into the why or trying to list the causes (of any issues that exist between the two groups)."

Rather, his goal is to document the kinds of lateral violence that have been caused by indifference to the issues.

"When I came to Canada, I took it for granted that the Indigenous peoples didn't have a good life and that it was their own fault," he said. But after a stint living with a First Nation family he became aware of more of the history and current reality that lies behind the historical relationship. "There are factors that are ruling their lives." Those factors included being told where the original Indigenous occupants of the land could live, and that being on a fraction of their former range, set far away from economic hubs and what were then the means of production.

The result of that history resonates to this very day. "You look at who are the oldest white people on the Island, they are a 100-year-old," he said. "But the oldest Native person is close to 90." Those differences exist, whatever the root causes.

Mr. Capriotti has a theory

that a key factor in the different life outcomes between the two communities comes down to indifference. "I want to create an awareness of the indifference," he said. "It is because of indifference that people do not react."

It is in documenting those indifferences that he hopes to create a worthwhile project, a project that says something important.

"A photograph is not going to change the world," he said. "I don't care how good a photographer you are, that is not going to happen. All you can do is create awareness."

But as a passionate storyteller, Mr. Capriotti hopes that his documentary project will help inform those people so that they overcome that paralyzing indifference that keeps them from reacting.

It is not a project that captures only comforting and safe images, the photographer seeks to document life on both sides, warts and all.

Mr. Capriotti said that it has taken him three years to come to understand his project. He refers to his way of working as "slow journalism." These are not stories that can be told in a handful of hastily composed photographs. Each photograph must be in-depth and a single event cannot encapsulate the complexity of the story. Those photographs are not necessarily in and of themselves controversial, indeed the opposite can be quite true.

"If it bleeds it reads," is the way of the news media, he said, but it is not his way.

He also notes that there is no jackpot to be found at the end of this particular rainbow. "You do not do this kind of project to make money," he said. "It cannot sustain you."

But Mr. Capriotti is fortunate in that he has a career as a university videographer that carries the freight on keeping the wolf from his door and a roof over the heads of his young family.

"I believe there is room for this kind of in-depth documentation," he said. "You are not going to make a living out of this, but you don't do it for the money."

As to changing the world "you are not going to do it from the macro," he said. "You are if you start from the micro."

Mr. Capriotti identifies himself as an outsider to both Island communities. "I am looking with the eyes of an outsider," he said. But that vantage

goal is to be able to help them to become photojournalists, to tell their own stories."

In the meantime, and for some time going forward, Mr. Capriotti hopes to inspire young Anishinaabe

to follow the path he has and to create their own documentary records from their own viewpoint.

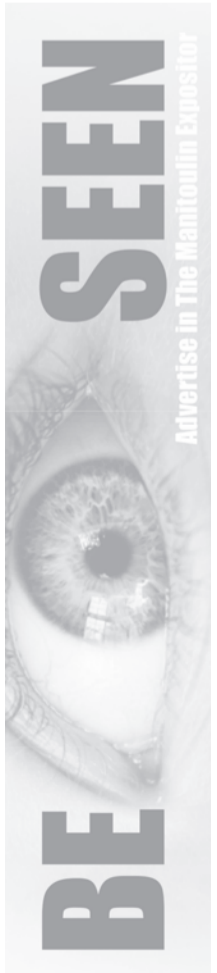

Dance and clown theatre come together in 'Kittly Bender' to create a mighty meld

 MANITOWANING—It's no accident that award-winning playwright Jennifer Dallas entitled her latest modern dance/clown theatre performance 'Kittly Bender.' Melding clown theatre with modern dance could definitely be described as akin to "running across thin ice" (as

the term is defined), but Ms. Dallas's brings her audience to shore with a confidence that belies any that there was ever any danger of slipping below the surface.

Ms. Dallas received the 2017 Dora Mavor Moore Award for Outstanding Female Performance and was a nominee in both the

choreography and production categories. The awards cited her "daring" work in blending the two art forms and if there was ever any doubt about how she pulled that off, dropping into catch a performance of 'Kittly Bender' at the Debajehmujig Storytellers Larry E. Lewis Centre will quickly put that to

rest. 'Kittly Bender' deftly explores society's loss of connection to the earth and the seductive/destructive love affair we have developed with the manufactured world.

Utilizing the traditionally counterpoised clown memes of comedy and tragedy, Ms. Dallas has created a story through movement that, like both clown theatre and modern dance, transcends dialogue to deliver its message.

"I wanted to get away from the abstract when telling a story," said Ms. Dallas when asked why she decided to enter the world of clown theatre. By melding the forms of clown theatre and modern dance, Ms. Dallas has succeeded in outstanding fashion.

"I was approached by Jennifer to direct the piece," recalled John Porter of the Manitoulin Conservatory for Creation and Performance (MCCP),

previously known as The Clown Farm. toulin Island." Mr. Porter noted that when he and his clown partner were writing their own works they typically retreated into the bush to find their muse. Cycling in 2017 to Help End Poverty One Big Bike Ride Coming Your Way

MANITOULIN—One of the biggest and most unusual trans-continental bike rides across North America is set to wheel between Sault Ste. Marie and Manitoulin Island August 4 to 7.

Amazingly the cyclists are by no means athletes but just ordinary churchgoers wearing jerseys marked with the words "SeatoSea fighting to end poverty." The 130 participants, some only cyclist novices, are pedaling all or parts of a challenging 10-week ride of 6,757 km that left Canada in Vancouver, B.C. on June 26 and is set to reach Halifax, Nova Scotia on August 29. This is nearly twice the distance the world's best cyclists go in the Tour de France!

SeatoSea is a venture of the Christian Reformed Church in North America to which nearly 300,000 people belong in over 1,000 US and Canadian congregations.

The 2017 SeatoSea ride

aims to raise at least \$1.5 million for relief agencies World Renew and Partners Worldwide and boost awareness of poverty issues. Already this target has been hit and looks to be exceeded.

Having left Canada southeast of Winnipeg for a 700 km pedal through the US the ride is set to reach Sault Ste. Marie on August 3. Early next day it is to reenter Canada. The scheduled August 4 ride is 151 km to Blind River for an overnight camp at Ecole Secondaire Catholique Jeunesse-Nord. August 5 sees a 159 km pedal to Batman's Cottages and Campground at Sheguiandah on Manitoulin Island for a two-night stay as every Sunday is a designated rest day. On Civic Holiday Monday (August 7), cyclists are to catch the South Baymouth ferry to Tobermory. The ride then winds its way through southern Ontario to reach Ottawa on August

12. From there cyclists go into Quebec and on to Nova Scotia.

To join the trip cyclists going the complete distance have had to raise or personally contribute \$12,000 for the cause. Yet, one rider, Eric DenOuden, president of the Canadian Home Builders Association, has already got \$70,000 in contributions. The ride has 80 men and 50 women with 50 participants going all the route and others six legs of 573 km to 1,753 km.

The age range of riders is 12 to 81 and 70 percent are Canadians, mainly from Ontario. The oldest cyclist is from the US, Jim Beezhold, 81, from Pauma Valley, California. The senior Canadian is George Vanderkuur, 75, from Pickering, near Toronto. Eve Luimes, 12, from Kemptville, Ontario, is riding from Vancouver to Ottawa with brother Seth, 14, while their mom, Karen goes on to Halifax.

Peter Slofstra, 65, a retired Ontario pastor, now living in Kitchener, is pedaling the complete route on a tandem with his wife, Marja. They did SeatoSea the same way in 2005.

In 2005 and similar rides since, in 2008 and 2013, the CRC raised \$5.4 million to support over 100 organizations focused on the fight against poverty. One current church agency support program in Kenya and Tanzania trains 10,720 farmers to improve crops.

Ida Kaastra-Mutoigo, of Hamilton, co-director of World Renew, rode the 1,500 km between Calgary and Winnipeg to help relate better to what millions face in many countries when they have only bikes or their feet to haul water or to get to and from places like markets, health clinics

and schools. She says the agency gets about \$14 million a year from Canadian and US churches.

However, this can expand to \$35 or \$40 million when matched with government funding and donations from other international donors

and partners.

The CRC is recognized for its volunteerism and in trying to alleviate human suffering world-wide. This ride is an exceptional pilgrimage of Christian faith plus a serious physical and emotional test.

While the work retains some aspects of the abstract that Ms. Dallas said she was seeking to eschew, the story is unmistakable, so...mission accomplished.

Ms. Dallas established Kemi Contemporary Dance Projects (Kemi) in 2008 and she serves as the company's artistic director. According to the company's website, "Kemi is dedicated to social and artistic interface across perceived borders and views the creative process as a profoundly collaborative and intimate one. Vulnerability and generosity are prized qualities throughout Kemi's collaborations in art as well as in society. To this end the company fosters exploration and education between artists as well as providing learning and discovery avenues for the general public."

Ms. Dallas has travelled and worked extensively in Africa, Asia and Europe. While Ms. Dallas performs the central role in 'Kittly Bender,' she is most ably supported by the work of Emma Kerson, a Toronto-based dancer and choreographer in her own right. Ms. Kerson packs a walloping dollop of humour into her supporting role. Her incredible ability to move across the stage in a toe-cramping pose while bearing aloft a large rock is nothing short of awe-inspiring, but her poise and understated expression spoke volumes sans words.

It would be remiss to overlook the lighting of Oz Weaver which helped set the mood throughout the production, never overstated but always appropriate, his work complements the production without ever threatening to overwhelm what

is taking place on the stage. The same can be said of the production's sound designed by the JUNO nominated John MacLean (of CBC Studios fame).

Developed over the past two years at MCCP, 'Kittly Bender' proves that when it comes to inspiring world-class art and theatre, Manitoulin Island has a seat at the front of the class. If you love theatre

and dance, or just want to explore what a world class production brings to the stage, drop in to the Larry E. Lewis Centre for the Thursday, August 3, 4 and 5 performances, doors open at 6:30, 7 pm curtain. A matinee takes place today, Wednesday, August 2. Admission is a \$10 (minimum) donation.

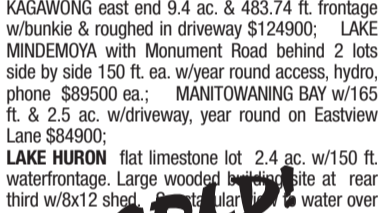

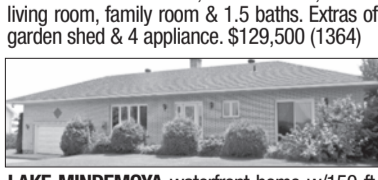

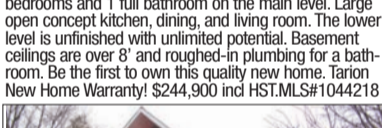

MANITOULIN—Walking away from the early seminars on phragmites, an invasive reed that has infested Ontario's shores from southern Ontario to Manitoulin and beyond, one might be forgiven for thinking it was already a lost battle, but the results of the first annual Manitoulin Phrag Week and the host of volunteers from across Manitoulin prove that is anything but the case.

Phragmites spreads through a wide variety of ways, from the thousands of tiny seeds released by mature plants into the wind or by rhizomes through the plant's vast root networks. Tough, resilient and close-packed, the plants can quickly take over the waterfront squeezing out native flora (and fauna) and causing a massive environmental impact for cottagers and other waterfront properties (and the many creatures who depend on access to the shoreline to live and procreate) if not stopped early and aggressively in its tracks.

"Turnout was excellent," beamed biologist Judith Jones, of WinterSpider Eco-Consulting. Ms. Jones and her compatriots at Manitoulin Streams have been leading (read organizing, but they certainly have been getting their hip waders wet) the charge in the battle to keep invasive grasses off of Manitoulin's shorelines. "We had 80 people come out. They came from all over, the turnout at White's Point was great and we had a really good team at Michael's Bay."

So far this season, teams have tackled and knocked down phragmites patches in Providence Bay, Dean's Bay, Sand Bay and a host of other locations across Manitoulin's shorelines. "We hope to have Misery Bay done by summer," she said. "We have made huge progress."

Turnout is one measure for Phragmites Week, but success in this case is also in the knowledge and skillset being transferred to local landowners.

"People are learning how to deal with phragmites on their own properties," she said. "They can identify it and help their neighbours understand how important it is to deal with the patches before they get a hold on the shoreline."

With NGOs such as Manitoulin Streams and private enterprises such as WinterSpyder Eco-consulting working together with private landowners and volunteers to pool resources, those scarce resources can be stretched far beyond what could be done by any one group alone.

"It is a question of funding," admitted Ms. Jones when asked about the possible scope of the work. "But I am optimistic."

But there are larger sites, such as Lake Wolsey and Clover Valley, that will require a significant effort to tackle in the near future. But as the success of this first annual Phragmites Week has proven, where there is a will there is a way.

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New Expositor-made Island map proves wildly popular

MANITOULIN—The free map of Manitoulin Island produced by The Manitoulin Expositor proved so popular that the first printing of 15,000 copies flew out the door with alarming speed—so much so that folks here decided a second printing was definitely called for.

“No, I wasn’t,” said Manitoulin Publishing Co. president and Expositor editor Alicia McCutcheon when asked if she was surprised by the popularity of the new map. “We had been hearing from all quarters that there was a definite need for such a map, so we decided it was a project that we should take on.”

Although there are plenty of maps of the Island around, putting one together for Manitoulin that is contemporary and gives a nod to tradition had its own challenges. The map was designed by Dick Maloney and the Expositor’s own production manager Dave Patterson, who noted that some names have changed over the years and others provide their own challenges.

“There was one destination called Eagle’s Nest which was problematic,” said Mr. Patterson. “We had to take it off because so many visitors were going down the road and looking for an actual eagle’s nest. It was surprising, some days there would be 20 people down there looking for the eagle’s nest.”

Other roads have seen

their names change in the years between the printing of various maps of the region. “We tried to make it as up-to-date and accurate as possible,” said Mr. Patterson, “but we have had a couple of calls from people pointing out where they believe we have gone off the path.” Those minor adjustments, once verified, will be incorporated into the next

week,” said Joyce O’Connor of Red Lodge who dropped by to pick up more from the second printing. “I saw that the new batch was in and thought we better get down here to get some while they last,” she laughed.

For any publication, a printing of 30,000 is pretty impressive. But why is there no advertising or cost to the map?

“We distribute ‘Manitoulin’s Magazine’ locally and it is very popular,” Mr. Patterson added. “We have the same map printed inside ‘Manitoulin’s Magazine’ as well.”

Both ‘This is Manitoulin’ and ‘Manitoulin Magazine’ are also “free,” but are financed through paid advertising from local businesses, tourism operators

and municipalities. Years of experience and a professional design team have helped make those two publications become highly successful avenues for advertisers and local event organizers to get their message out.

“We decided that putting advertising on the map would have cluttered it up quite a bit and we would have had to sacrifice infor-

mation that would have been useful for visitors to have,” said Ms. McCutcheon. “The map was important enough that we decided to go ahead with it as our contribution. A rising tide raises all boats, so when our clients prosper, we do too. It is important to everyone that tourism on Manitoulin thrives.”

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Mad Hatter Tea Party tackles residential school reconciliation

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—Humour plays an important role in healing, which might go a long way toward explaining the resilience demonstrated by so many residential school survivors. Humour was a central theme during the Mad Hatter Tea Party for Indian Residential Schools and Families hosted by Noojmowin Teg Traditional Health.

“We are very fortunate to have Barbara Nolan as our guest speaker,” said Mad Hatter Tea Party organizer Janice Trudeau, Noojmowin Teg Health Centre Resolution Health Support worker. Ms. Nolan is herself a residential school survivor and her presentation ‘Personal Forgiveness Journey’ was greeted by plenty of laughter from an audience bedecked in a collection of hilarious ‘mad hats.’

Ms. Nolan’s personal story began in her childhood, when her parents sent her off to residential school to gain an education and to learn English. Education, she noted, was very important in her family. While Anishinaabemowin was the language she was born into, it was generally recognized that “if you wanted to be a nurse, or a teacher, you had to learn English,” she recalled. “I wanted to be a teacher.”

“I have forgiven my parents (for sending her to residential school),” noted Ms. Nolan. “They thought they knew what they were

doing.” The more difficult path of forgiveness for her was far more personal—she had to learn to forgive herself.

Ms. Nolan recounted how the negative lessons she learned in residential school on child-rearing impacted on how she had raised her own children. “I would scream at them, that is how they did it at the residential school,” she recalled. Children are very resilient, however, and memories tend to block out the negative of the past.

“My children told me ‘oh you weren’t that bad.’”

Most of Ms. Nolan’s presentation was given in Anishinaabemowin, leavened with occasional sojourns into English, but so consummate a storyteller is Ms. Nolan that someone with only a nominal grasp of the language could actually follow along with much of what she was imparting.

She spoke of her early years in Toronto and how she came to meet her future husband Tom Nolan

of Sagamok—“tall, dark and handsome.” Her husband passed away a year and a half ago.

When she came home to Wiikwemkoong to tell her father that she wanted to get married he had two questions: “Is he Anishinaabe? Is he Catholic?” Although the first answer was yes, the second was more problematic. “He was Anglican,” she recalled. “I was so worried he was going to say no,” she laughed.

Ms. Nolan segued her

personal experiences and life story into her own healing journey, and the steps of the grief cycle, recalling an experience where she attended a healing circle. Magaret Pitawankwat assisted The Expositor in interpreting the story. Ms. Nolan recounted how while at university, she went to a grieving workshop in order to learn about the process, not believing she herself had any grief that needed healing. An instructor placed the group in a circle. During the healing circle, a young woman began to cry. The instructor told the others in the circle to close their eyes. Ms. Nolan admitted to her insatiable curiosity and that she peeked. What she witnessed amazed her. The facilitator was washing the young woman and Ms. Nolan could see something cascading from her body as the facilitator cleansed her, but there was nothing on the floor beneath the distressed woman.

Ms. Nolan had entered the healing circle believing that she had no pain that needed remedy, but she discovered that those who have unbearable pain will push those memories deep into their psyche, forgetting that there is pain. But that pain is still there, festering and poisoning the lives of those within whom it lies.

Some survivors of residential school believe the experience was positive, that they enjoyed their time there. “That’s okay,”

said Ms. Nolan. “They have that right to believe that.” But that time in the grieving circle had taught her how deep her own pain had been buried and she was able to begin her own journey towards healing.

“My kids had forgiven me, but I had to learn to forgive myself,” she said. “I had to learn to forgive those teachers for what they did to me. Forgiveness is the last step in the grieving cycle.” Forgiveness, she added, does not mean forgetting. “You will never forget.”

Within each of us is a little child, a child that wants to play, that wants to laugh. “You have to let that little child within you come out to play,” said Ms. Nolan.

At this point a pair of clowns from Debajehmujig Storytellers came into the room and began to interact with the residential school survivors and their families. The pair of clowns lightened the atmosphere while they took photographs with the audience.

In the afternoon presentation, Noojmowin Teg child nutritionist Cody Leeson brought insights into the many benefits of the humble blueberry. “Blueberries really are nature’s true superfood,” he said. “There are just so many health benefits contained in these little sweet packages.”

Good nutrition is also an important part of taking care of oneself and laying the foundations of a healing journey.

PROVIDENCE BAY—Threatening clouds overhead did nothing to deter a group of volunteers who were intent on removing invasive species from the sands and dunes of the Providence Bay beach.

This year's efforts follow on a major cleanup effort that took place last year and the results from last year's outing were clearly evident on the beach this year. "What a difference," said Manitoulin biologist Judith Jones as she took a moment out from overseeing the volunteers' efforts.

Although the work was taking place a little earlier this year than last, so the plants were somewhat smaller than they would be later in the summer, it was clear there were far fewer plants cluttering up the beach than was the case last year.

"We have to be really careful to only remove those plants that don't belong here," cautioned Ms. Jones. "I know that some people would like us to be taking away everything, but we are not allowed to do that." Actually, removing all of the vegetation would be very counterproductive, even if it was allowed, as the natural grasses that inhabit the beach area help to stabilize the sands and the dunes where people want them to be.

Photographs from decades past, as well as

council reports from back in the day, make it clear that errant sand blowing through the streets was a significant challenge. By concentrating on only the invasive species, i.e. those plants like sweet clover that do not belong on the beach, the ecology of the beach will return to something much more natural and sustainable in the future.

As the volunteers began their work, threats turned to reality and a torrential downpour inundated the beach area, soaking those on the beach and sending a young family who had been fishing running for shelter.

"I am so proud of everybody who came out," said Ms. Jones. "Nobody took off, they all stuck around

and kept working through it all."

Volunteers hauled a large blue tarp across the beach on which the volunteers piled their harvested plant matter so as not to allow any errant seeds to spread. Paper bags were also on hand as receptacles.

Further down the beach a distinct lack of vegetation spoke volumes to the effectiveness of the municipalities' efforts to combat invasive phragmites that have been bedeviling the beach in recent years as well. The municipality applied for a permit to conduct the phragmites control work last year.

"It has really been a suc-

cess story," said Central Manitoulin Economic Development Officer Nancy Kinoshameg. "We are looking at doing some work in that vein in my own community (Wiikwemkoong) in the near future as well."


Hitting stands of invasive species impacting Island waterways and beaches as early as possible, before they are firmly established, helps play a huge role in keeping the spread and congestion under control.

"It really shows that this isn't a hopeless fight," said Ms. Kinoshameg. "If you


get on it early, you can make a real difference."

As to the work on Providence Bay beach the old adage that "many hands makes light work" was demonstrated as the volunteers swept across the landscape, quickly putting paid to stands of unwelcome greenery infesting the dunes.

"If we can make these kind of events a yearly thing, we can really help to keep our waters clear and our waterfronts accessible," noted Ms. Jones. "It can be done."

One of my favourite fruits to eat and cook with are blueberries. When they become available, the wild blueberries sold by the roadside, tame ones from your garden or farmers markets they all bring the feeling of mid-summer. Here's hoping for another four weeks of sunny and hot weather to ripen the tomatoes and peppers.

Blueberry Coffee Cake

This cake is quick to make and I switched the white flour to spelt. It makes the cake denser but a bit healthier.

TOPPING:

1 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup softened butter
2 tsp cinnamon

CAKE:

3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup softened butter
1 egg
1 cup sour cream
1 tsp vanilla
2 cups all-purpose flour
1 tsp each baking powder and baking soda
2 cups fresh blueberries

Topping:

In small bowl, using a fork, stir together sugar, butter and cinnamon until well combined and crumbly; set aside.

Cake: Preheat oven to 350°F; lightly grease a 9-inch springform pan.

In a medium bowl using electric mixer, cream together sugar and butter until light and fluffy. Beat in egg on low speed until well combined. Stir in sour cream and vanilla.

In separate bowl, stir together flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Gradually stir flour mixture into sugar-butter mixture until well combined (batter will be stiff).

Spoon two-thirds of cake batter into prepared pan, spreading evenly. Top evenly with blueberries. Drop remaining batter by spoonfuls on top of blueberries; spread evenly to more or less cover blueberries. Sprinkle evenly with topping.

Bake 50 to 60 minutes or until well risen, golden brown and firm to touch. Let cool in pan on wire rack. Release sides of pan; place cake on serving plate. Serve warm or cold.



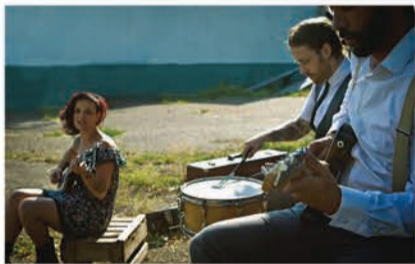

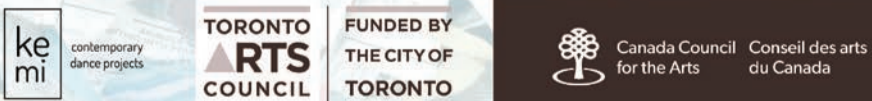
