Province's new mental health, addictions minister praises Island land-based program

AUNDECK OMNI KANING-Ontario's mental health and addictions services are undergoing a review and restructuring under the purview of the recently appointed associate minister of mental health and addictions within the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC), who was touring Manitoulin-area service offerings last week to learn about the programs avail-

"We're in the process of completing consultations around the province for creating a complete mental health network to address the issues outlined in a report from 10 years ago," said Associate Minister of Mental Health and Addictions Michael Tibollo following a visit to Aundeck Omni Kaning's Gwekwaadziwin Miikan last Thursday.

The report in question refers to

on Mental Health and Addictions, a committee made up of members of the provincial Progressive Conservative, NDP and Liberal parties. Its final report released in 2010 called for the creation of Mental Health and Addictions Ontario, a sub-unit of the MOHLTC that will look after the province's mental health and addictions services and ensure consistent offerings across Ontario. It also recommended merging all mental health and addictions services, including those for children and youth, into the umbrella of the MOHLTC.

Mr. Tibollo said 70 percent of kids suffer from some problems in their mental health. Of that group, he said 70 percent experiment with substances as a coping mechanism.

"If we can work with kids to provide coping skills, we can reduce that," he said.

In its 2019 budget, the Ford government confirmed it would be

Final barriers removed for women who married out of the culture, children and grandchildren

Jeanette Corbiere married a non-Native man in 1970 and became Jeannette Corbiere-Lavell, she was dismayed to discover in the coming months that the federal government no longer considered her an Indian (in the parlance of the day) and the loss of this born and bred Wiikwemkoong citizen's official status vaulted her into a lifetime of protesting this law.

There have been gradual changes over the intervening 49 years and last week the federal government passed Bill S-3, legislation aimed at removing sex dis-

crimination from the Indian Act. In a news release, the government in Ottawa said that as of August 15, 2019 (last Thursday) all

descendants born prior to April 17, 1985 to women who lost Indian status or who were removed from band lists because their marriage to a man without status dating

RAMA—Four of Manitoulin Island's Anishinaabe community leaders were celebrated at a ceremony last week by the Anishinabek Nation, at which they received lifetime achievement awards from the organization.

'It was a very good evening. There was lots of friends and people I knew from all over the said Wiikwemkoong artist Leland Bell, one of the award recipients. He, along with 17 other people, was slated to receive an Anishinabek Nation Lifetime Achievement Award this year at the annual gala celebration.

Mr. Bell received his award in the arts and culture division. He helped to design the Laurentian University coat of arms (the same school from which he holds two degrees, including an honourary doctorate) and has recently participated in the nationwide Artists Against Racism public art campaign.

'I'm still very honoured and humbled by the whole situation and for the people that had the forethought to see that I might be eligible for it," said Mr. Bell.

Former Wiikwemkoong band councillor and community volunteer Cecilia Pitawanakwat was another recipient for her work within her community and as a water walker.

"There was a good spirit of

accomplishment. All four regional chiefs were there to say congratulations as well as Grand Council Chief Glen Hare. The (Anishinabek Nation) Regional Chair Chief Scott McLeod presented me the award," said Ms. Pitawanakwat.

In her acceptance speech she made reference to all those who helped support her efforts and create opportunities for people like her to become involved. She also said it was great to see council's efforts such as the Wikwemikong High School coming to fruition.

"I mentioned the people who went before me and talked about my commitment to community leadership and taking care of people in the community. I want to continue on with that for those who couldn't continue because their lives had ended," said Ms. Pitawanakwat. "Their commitments influenced my commitment for helping out in the community.'

Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK) Ogimaa-kwe Patsy Corbiere said it was an interesting evening that allowed the recipients to share their insights and stories of what they had learned through their experiences.

"It feels good because, at the end of the day, somebody's recognizing you for your work. I've always worked for the betterment of my people in AOK and have done a lot of work on other things like the UCCM Tribal Council," said Ogimaa-kwe Corbiere. "It's an honour to get an award for your hard work."

She acknowledged all of her fellow award recipients from Mnidoo Mnising who have put in countless hours of tireless work to achieve the things they had accomplished.

"They all deserve to be recognized. Cecilia worked hard for Wiikwemkoong. She was on council and worked in the administration. Leland Bell for his paintings and teachings, and he has a doctorate. Shirley Cheechoo has done a lot of work with the film institute. I know how much work she does because she's used AOK for her film festival," said Ogimaa-kwe Corbiere.

"Those are all high accomplishments. Everyone from the Island, they're all deserving.'

Ms. Cheechoo, who founded Weengushk Film Institute as well as Debajehmujig Theatre Group, has had a hand in creating numerous community building opportunities. She was of few words when asked about winning the award, but expressed her gratitude and acknowledged the team effort that is involved in any successful community initiative.

"I went up on behalf of everybody that's helped me get where I am. I didn't go up for myself," she

Tour de Meldrum Bay raises record amount for hospital

Renovation/expansion project is a step closer to getting approval

MINDEMOYA—The 19th annual Tour de Meldrum Bay event took place recently and the Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) received \$10,712.50 toward its Mindemoya emergency department expansion and renovation, with the public fundraising campaign for that project to get underway in the coming months.

"We had very nice weather, not much wind-especially against us. It was a lovely tour," said organizer Dale Scott. The Tour de Meldrum Bay is an annual bicycle trip from Mindemoya to Meldrum Bay, with an optional dinner, overnight stay and return ride the next day. The ride has always raised money for the Mindemoya hospital, either for its equipment fund or for its building needs.

This year's total is the greatest amount ever raised by the riders. It was originally driven by family, friend and co-worker donations who would pledge a flat amount or a price per kilometre. The riders have since expanded to asking area businesses for support, with many contributing every year.

"It's evolved very well over the

vears and it's become a fairly wellorganized ride now. We have breaks every quarter of the way and lunch is served. We make it an enjoyable ride," said Mr. Scott, who stressed that the event is not intended to be a race. The rider count for 2019 was 26, with 36 present for the dinner portion.

MHC president and CEO Lynn Foster said this funding will be used toward the board-approved expansion and renovation of the emergency department at the Mindemoya hospital site. She added that the fundraising committee is meeting in September to start preparing for the public campaign to raise funds for the proj-

"We were very pleased that the Tour de Meldrum Bay has agreed to contribute at this very early stage to the (expansion/renovation) effort," said Ms. Foster. "Next year will be the 20th year and we're looking forward to having a fair MHC representation at the event. We're hoping to get some mangers involved and do a relay.

Removal of gender discrimination from Indian Act was long overdue

It often comes as a startling revelation to many Canadians when they discover that the laws governing our nation contain regulations and references that discriminate against women. This past week the federal government announced that the remaining portions of Bill S-3 would be enacted, thereby removing the last vestiges of gender discrimination that remained within the confines of the Indian Act. This is long overdue.

Successive governments have balked at the costs associated with removing discrimination from the Indian Act on the basis that literally hundreds of thousands of descendants of those women whose children were stripped of their heritage and the rights and obligations associated with that heritage would be enfranchised and entitled to various transfers and payments that should have been their birthright. Equality before the law is a fundamental building block of a liberal democracy, yet somehow our society has managed to hold tenaciously onto the long discredited tenets of a patriarchal society which also held to the concepts that might is right and trial by combat as a valid determinant of justice.

Even among some leaders in the First Nations, the prospect of an influx of newly enfranchised members competing for ever stretched resources was viewed with considerable trepidation, especially before there was any commitment made to increase those resources to account for that augmented population. Even with such promises made, experience has taught many to be wary of the implementation of those increased resources. But that view leaves out one important consideration.

There is simply no valid justification for gender discrimination in a free and democratic society—period.

The work of a handful of brave and determined group of Anishinabe-kwe, women who never gave up the fight despite a legal and social system stacked heavily against them, women like Mary Two-Axe Early and Manitoulin's own Jeannette Corbiere-Lavell who did not relent

despite defeats in the highest courts in the land has come to fruition in victory, but they will be among the first to explain that the battle is not yet won.

There remain many historical instances of discrimination and injustice within our society, many deeply ingrained within how our society reacts to race, religion and gender and not officially codified within the law. These systemic issues of imbalance will take a very long time to eradicate, not because they are not egregious, but rather for too large a portion of the population they remain invisible. The lens through which the vast bulk of our lawmakers view these issues induces a certain blindness, whether wilful or not. It is systemic.

Not all systemic injustice is sexist, much of it is in fact racist, but in truth the vast majority of systemic discrimination actually tilts our society against the poor. Since a disproportionate number of women, the Indigenous and other minorities are also members of the impoverished class, those instances are often labelled as sexist or racist. They are incidentally so, but they all share one thing in common—they are fundamentally wrong and hold no place in a free and democratic civil society.

So, while we applaud the decision to remove the last vestiges of sexist discrimination from the Indian Act, we cannot afford to rest on our laurels. There is a long road that remains ahead and much that still needs to be done to create a level playing field for all members of society.

The road to a just and civil society is not an easy path, nor will there ever likely be an end in sight. But this journey is not something to fear, it is a voyage we should embrace with all the passion and energy we can muster.

A rising tide lifts all boats and the rising tide of freedom and equality will eventually benefit each and every one of us—if only we have the eyes to see.

One decade since Gordon's Park recognized as dark sky preserve

TEHKUMMAH—It has now been 10 years since Tehkummah's Gordon's Park Eco Resort received its status as a Royal Astronomical Society of Canada (RASC)-recognized dark sky preserve, a call to all astronomical enthusiasts that the property offers some of the country's darkest accessible skies for their stargazing pleasure.

"It's attracted a lot more people and astronomers for sure. We're one of the darkest skies in Ontario; it's a huge attraction for people wanting to stargaze without the light pollution of the city," said Gordon's Park marketing coordinator and staff supervisor Alexandria Hahn.

When it received its designation on August 15, 2008, Gordon's Park was Canada's first and only commercial property to be named a dark sky preserve by the RASC. Au Diable Vert, an eco-resort in Quebec's Eastern Townships,

Manitoulin missionary doctor shot three times in Haiti

LITTLE CURRENT—As Christian missionary and physician Doug Burbella, formerly of Little Current, floated above his body while friends and colleagues pleaded with the Haitian gang members who had just shot him three times, he quickly decided to have an important heart-to-heart conversation with God.

Dr. Burbella has been travelling to Haiti for over 30 years with the Living Water Ministries of the Palm Beaches and just hours after his arrival in Pap, Haiti, the two-vehicle convoy in which he was travelling with a six-member team was ambushed by gang members. Dr. Burbella recently sat down with The Expositor to relate his harrowing story of survival.

"We were four hours into the trip about 45 minutes outside of St. Marc," he said. The missionary group was making its way to the clinic Dr. Burbella helps sponsor, travelling in two SUVs stacked to the brim with computers along a narrow and twisting road. The group had travelled together from Miami, Florida and while the region can be dangerous, the team was comprised of experienced visitors to the area.

"We passed two men, twentysomethings, standing by a stack of rubber tires and canisters of gasoline," he said A sense of foreboding was beginning to build, but the convoy members handed over a few dollars and continued on their way. As they drove off, Dr. Burbella saw them talking on their cellphones.

They really began to realize something was amiss when they entered the next village.

"We noticed that there were no women or children to be seen anywhere," said Dr. Burbella. "Usually the children are all over us and we give out candy as we pass through," he said. "There were a couple of old men standing on the side of the street and one of them made a gesture with his hand held low," said Dr. Burbella, demonstrating a kind of "calm down" motion with his own hand. "In hindsight we should have turned around and gone back right then."

Dr. Burbella has a finely honed survival sense that comes from a lifetime of experience in conflict zones. He has fought against ISIS in the Middle East among other adventures. "That's what I like," he said, a bit of a self-admitted adrenaline junkie.

But this time the medical missionary was about to fall into the hands of a gang that numbered

around 150 members.

When the vehicles turned a bend in the road after leaving the village they were confronted with a barricade of burning tires and soon the convoy was surrounded by a horde of men brandishing AK-47 automatic assault rifles and handguns. Dr. Burbella and a friend were in the second

SUV.

"I saw them pulling our friends out of the vehicle ahead and realized that this was something different," he said. "I thought 'this looks like an assassination'."

He yelled at his driver to get them out of there and as the vehicle began reversing rapidly, the gang members started shooting at them and bullets were careening off of and through the vehicle. Checked after the incident, the driver counted more than 150 bullet holes in the Land Rover.

Despite the mob surrounding them, Dr. Burbella's vehicle managed to get turned around and they attempted to make a run for it.

"One of the tires was completely shredded," he said. "We could barely make five or 10 miles an hour."

Soon a couple of gang members on a motorcycle overtook them and Dr. Burbella, looking out of the window and realizing the rider on the back was aiming a machine gun at them said to his companion 'when I say duck, duck.'

"That is the last thing I remember before everything went dark," he said.

It was at this point that he found himself floating in the air, looking down at himself and the people surrounding the vehicle. "I yelled out that I was shot, but nobody seemed to hear me," he said. "It was then that I realized that I must be dead. I yelled out

that I was dead, but of course nobody could hear me."

It was then that Dr. Burbella decided to speak to someone he knew could hear him at any time.

"I was thinking about my wife and my son, I said to God 'they need me, this can't be my time, there are a lot of miles left on my sneakers yet'." Dr. Burbella went on to promise that if God would spare his life he would dedicate the rest of his days to doing God's work. "I said put me back and I will serve you until the day that I die," he recalled.

A few moments later he came to but realized that he had still better "play possum."

"I made a face and slumped over," he said. "The window was smashed and one of the men placed his gun muzzle against my head, I figured he was going finish me off."

It was at this point that someone Dr. Burbella described as "an angel" appeared beside the vehicle and intervened.

"My friend was crying and pleading with them and the man put his hand on his shoulder and said in perfect English 'be calm.' My friend said that he felt a wave of calm flow down his body," recalled Dr. Burbella.

At the urging of the new arrival the gang members put down their guns, but the missionary members were not out of the woods just yet.

"They climbed right on top of my body and took my wallet with \$11 in it and my cellphone," he said. "They didn't get the \$2,000 clinic payroll I had stuffed down the front of my pants though."

An argument then broke out between the missionaries, the villagers and the bandits. "The bad guys wanted the new truck but the villagers were telling them that they needed to get me to the hospital and that we were there to help the villages with the clinic," he said. Eventually the bandits relented and Dr. Burbella, bleeding profusely from his wounds, was transported to an aid station where he was stabilized. "My friend was laying on the computers in the back storage area and keeping pressure on my neck so I didn't bleed out," he recalled.

"It was actually a Canadian aid group called HERO that transported me to the hospital in Port Au Prince and then from there to the Lear jet for the flight back to the States."

What followed was 30 hours of surgery in a Del Ray Beach Florida hospital and two months of convalescence in the hospital. Three operations later, Dr. Burbella said that even one of the surgeons began to believe in God. "They couldn't figure out how the bullet managed to go around my carotid artery to lodge in my spine," he said.

Dr. Burbella is still wearing a brace to keep his neck stabilized so the fracture can heal, but he is determined to fulfill his promise to God and return to his ministry in Haiti.

"God willing I will be going back August 31," he said.

Today, Dr. Burbella's son wears the mangled copper jacket from one of the bullets on a chain as a memento of the time God spared his father's life.

There is a GoFundMe account set up to assist with the considerable medical bills that remain from the incident as Dr. Burbella did not have insurance to cover the injuries from the attack. A video online at Vimeo 'Man on a Mission' details the aftermath of the attack.

received this same designation in 2018 to become the second commercial property on the list.

At the 2009 Manitoulin Star Party, a special ceremony took place with local politicians, a representative from the RASC and stargazer regulars such as 'Island astronomer' John Albers who served as emcee. The Expositor reported on the occasion when proprietors Rita and Terry Gordon shared their thoughts on the designation.

"We could not have done this without all those who are present and those who are not," Ms. Gordon said, adding that it was "very important to Terry and I that we are a designated dark sky sanctuary. I also want to thank Terry who is the hard-working man behind it all."

According to reports from a decade ago, people from as far as Indiana and Pennsylvania were present at Gordon's Park when they received their designation.

"Thank you for witnessing this moment; it is very special to us," said Ms. Gordon. "As long as we have Gordon's Park, this will be available to you."

The team at Gordon's Park takes special provisions to ensure the darkest possible conditions are available for their stargazers. No white lights or campfires are permitted in the dark sky preserve; all must use a red filter on any lights to minimize the amount of light pollution at the site.

The Gordons have created a wide variety of activities for those to experience the darkness in its fullest glory. Every Thursday and Saturday in July and August they host an astronomy night for attendees to look through telescopes and wide-angle binoculars.

"You're able to see Jupiter, Saturn, look at the moon if it's out, and also get a laser-guided sky tour of the Milky Way. You'll learn how to sky-hop using your hands and use a planisphere," said Ms. Hahn.

On Fridays in July and August, they offer a stargazing night hike which offers a more immersive nighttime experience. This is a new activity for 2019.

"It goes along one of our hiking trails. We get to listen and learn about some of the animals in our forest, and during one part on the trail you stop and get a laser-guided tour of the sky and look for key constellations," Ms. Hahn said.

Twice per season they host star parties: Stargazing Manitoulin at the end of June and a Perseids Meteor Party which took place this past weekend during the Perseids meteor shower. They also host aurora borealis weekends in late May and early September with a new-for-2019 addition of aurora photography workshops on the Sunday of each weekend.

"It really helps, being able to say we're a dark sky preserve and having certificates proving it. It definitely helps our business; we can say we've gone through the process of getting tested to get that designation," said Ms. Hahn.

"It should definitely be on your bucket list to come here and experience the preserve we have. It's just breathtaking, seeing all the stars in the sky," Ms. Hahn said.

National drug drop-off month runs throughout August

CANADA—August is national drug not proceed and call the drop-off month, a time to dispose of old police immediately about medications and improve the safety of households everywhere.

> 'We encourage people to open up their medicine cabinets, check expiry dates on their medications and bring them back to their local pharmacy for safe disposal," said Naushin Hooda, a doctor of pharmacy student at the University of Waterloo who has just completed a placement at Manitoulin Health Centre's Little Current site.

> "Because of the increased use of prescription and non-prescription medications, it's an increasing issue that's only going to get bigger so awareness of it is important," she added.

> Past medicine disposal methods have included flushing old drugs down a toilet or tossing them in the trash, but this leads to higher concentrations of pharmaceuticals in the natural environment and can cause harmful effects.

> Pharmacies run take-back programs for all medications, whether purchased at their location or not, and will collect

and safely dispose of these items. They accept these year-round, but this month serves as a reminder to those who may not have the issue on their mind.

'That's why there's a month dedicated to it, where different organizations will voice their support and remind people to empty their cabinets. Hopefully they get rid of them once a year, but more frequently is better," said Ms. Hooda.

The no-questions-asked process is simple—bring old medications to any pharmacy, speak with a staff member behind the pharmaceutical counter and they will take care of the rest. Accepted products also include inhalers, creams and ointments. Family members can drop off their relatives' old drugs, too.

Prescription drug abuse is a problem in Canada. After alcohol and cannabis, psychoactive pharmaceuticals are the most-often used substance by Canadian students from Grades 7 to 12, based on a 2014 study. In Ontario, a study revealed that one in seven high school students reported using a prescription drug for a non-medical purpose. These drugs tend to be easy to access and may carry a false sense of safety because they originate from a medical professional.

However, when pharmaceuticals are used by people for whom they have not been prescribed, or in higher amounts than safe limits, they can lead to overdoses and long-term health problems.

"If you're not disposing of medications that you're not using, you're not just putting yourself at risk, you're putting your whole household at risk. There's a lot of implications of having old medicines at home that people don't really think about," said Ms. Hooda.

This is the second year that Drug Free

Kids Canada has led the national August campaign. In 2017, before the campaign started, Canadian pharmacies gathered 725 tonnes of unused and expired medication. Last year, the first year of the campaign, that number jumped 14 percent to 828 tonnes.

Kingston paddlers stop in Little Current as part of three-year Canadian odyssey

LITTLE CURRENT—The Expositor had the opportunity to catch up with Glenn Green and Carol VandenEngel as they passed through Little Current, just one stop on a three-year cross-Canada canoe odyssey to raise funds and awareness for the Kingstonbased organization Loving Spoonful (not to be confused with the 1970s band, 'The Lovin' Spoonful').

The pair explain that Loving Spoonful seeks to achieve a healthy, food-secure community by facilitating fresh food access, skill development and community engagement in the Kingston community, but food security is something the couple believes in strongly for all Canadians.

In 2017, on Canada's 150th birthday, the pair departed Ottawa for Sydney, Nova Scotia via canoe. Then, last year, the couple began their journey in Vancouver, portaging through the Rocky Mountains, through the Prairies all the way to Fort Francis, Ontario.

This year, the couple began in Fort Frances with the goal of ending their trip-of-a-lifetime back in Ottawa. As an added bonus they will make their way down the Rideau Canal, something they have yet to do, back to Kingston. They anticipate another month-and-a-half of paddling ahead of them.

"Canada is beautiful," Mr. Green pronounced. "The northern shore of Lake Superior is

stunning," Ms. VandenEngel added.

The biggest challenge the couple has faced so far was Lake Winnipeg. As a shallow lake featuring an almost constant chop, many canoeists and other recreational boaters choose to avoid it on their cross-country adventures, but not this pair. They saw a steady and constant eight-day wind that, at one point, left them in the canoe for 12 straight hours—the shore too rocky to safely land. At the end of that 12 hours the couple capsized, but did make it safely to land.

The adventurers say they are largely using the voyageur paddle routes, but are also using famed solo paddler Mike Ranta's routes as well.

From Little Current, the couple was heading for Killarney, on to the French River and then into Lake Nipissing.

"Our goal is to raise \$25,000 for our charity," Mr. Green said.

"Twelve percent of Canadians are food insecure," Ms. VandenEngel explained.

"We're so wasteful as a society—58 percent of our food is wasted," Mr. Green added.

"When you eat well you feel well, and when you feel well you do well!" Mr. Green exclaimed.

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...Province's new mental health, addictions initiative praises land-based program

matching the federal Liberals' contribution of \$1.9 billion for a total of \$3.8 billion over 10 years toward mental health and addictions in Ontario. It created Mr. Tibollo's new position in June of this year to focus specifically on this element within the health file.

Mr. Tibollo said he is no stranger to working with addictions and mental health. He ran the Toronto-based Caritas School of Life, a residential therapeutic community that hosts a two-year abstinence program. He is currently completing a doctorate in clinical psychology that focuses on the rates of people turning back to vices after finishing treatment. He said his passion for the topic is what pushed him to run for the first time in last year's election.

"I consider myself an advocate more than a politician for people doing this kind of work. That's why I shelved my law career and took a pay cut to become a politician and an advocate. I'm fortunate to be part of a government that recognizes the importance of mental health and addiction and created a ministry for it; it needed to be done," he said.

Part of the province's plan for mental health and addictions is to create an Ontario-wide structured psychotherapy program, based on the English model, which treats mental health clients using cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT).

"We're trying to break the cycle of mental health and addictions using a holistic model of safe beds, encouraging community alternatives and different strategies for different groups of people. The net effect is saving many people, but not costing the system and improving the quality of life for the people of Ontario," Mr. Tibollo said.

A robust mental health and addictions program that takes into account cultural teachings tied to the communities it serves will reduce hospital visits, reduce absenteeism and presenteeism (those who attend work but are ineffective due to their mental health) and should pay for itself in increased productivity over time, according to Mr. Tibollo. He added that the cost-neutral aspect was shown to be true in England and Australia.

According to 2010 and 2015 studies by the Mental Health Commission of Canada, Health Quality Ontario and the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, mental illness costs Canada an estimated \$51 billion per year. Substance use cost Canada \$38.4 billion in 2014. Funding programs to help reduce these figures can cause a net gain to the economy if they manage to generate more benefits than their

However, calculating this at the present time is a challenge, according to Mr. Tibollo.

"There's no data that can tell us what we're doing right or what we can improve in the system," he said, adding that only time will indicate whether or not the proposed resources are successes.

"There's no point providing services if it won't improve a person's life and we're not getting the results we need. Harm reduction is especially important, providing opportunities for people to get their lives back.'

Part of his research for this phase includes travelling around the province to identify 'centres of excellence,' a description he said likely would apply to Manitoulin's Gwekwaadziwin Miikan.

"You have to identify centres of excellence, ones that are evidence-based, use specialized and culturally sensitive therapy," he said, adding that turning to centres of excellence will improve the government's ability to create a successful system.

"We want to connect people to centres of excellence and want to aid these centres by providing the support they need so they can expand and grow," he said.

Mr. Tibollo said using culturally sensitive programs is important and that the government can learn a great deal from studying their practices and effectiveness.

'If you can build those up well and offer good services, people will come. You have to make sure there's connectivity too so if there's a person in Toronto who could make use of a program like this, you can give them the option to come heal here and re-join the community to continue their journey," he said.

The government will also be looking at youth education and affordable housing as vital parts of an addictions and mental health strategy.

Gwekwaadziwin Miikan programming impresses Minister Tibollo

by Warren Schlote AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—Ontario Associate Minister of Mental Health and Addiction Michael Tibollo recently visited Gwekwaadziwin Miikan in Aundeck Omni Kaning to learn more about the unique program that provides land-based treatment for Indigenous youth and young adults.

"I applaud this program. I'm so happy as a minister that the community has land-based healing available to help Indigenous youth," said Mr. Tibollo during the visit.

"This is reconciliation to me, giving opportunities to heal, grow and have a life that every one of us as Ontarians deserves.'

Gwekwaadziwin Miikan, or Gwek for short, started accepting clients last May and offers a much more indepth program than many other addiction and mental health treatment offerings. The Seven Grandfathers program, which is available for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous persons between the ages of 19 and 30, incorporates 90 days on the land to serve as a basis for heal-

The residency phase runs from six to 12 weeks and allows participants to participate in education, develop life skills, therapeutic treatment and outdoor experiential learning. A requirement for this phase is that all clients must be actively working, volunteering or studying. The current jobfinding success rate sits at an impressive 100 percent.

After this phase comes aftercare, when clients gradually shift back into their regular life. Gwek staff follow up with them on a regular basis, though executive director Sam Gilchrist notes that this can be a challenge.

"Measurement is tough at times because of the transience of the population. Our staff have been turning to social media to keep in touch," he said. Despite its challenges, he said aftercare is the keystone of the program that makes it a success overall. Clients often thrive in the land-based portion of the



program but can easily lose track of their goals when thrust back into their daily

Another element of the aftercare which makes it a success is the support offered to family members and other close relations of the client. These individuals can act as partners in the healing journey and offer support at home while also trying to minimize behaviours that may reduce a client's success.







There also exists a sister program for youth aged 13 to 19 called the Four Directions. This program is still in the works pending government funding and Mr. Gilchrist said they have consulted Jordan's Principle, a Canadian policy that aims to ensure all Indigenous children living on and off reserve have equal access to government-funded public services as other populations.

The Gwek residence facility is designed to be

...continued from page 1 back to 1869 will be entitled to registration, bringing them in line with the descendants of men who never lost status.

Here are the particulars of Bill S-3:

Eligibility for Indian status is provided for women who had previously lost status as a result of marrying non-Indians; children omitted or removed as a result of their mother marrying non-Indians; persons who had been removed from the Indian Register as a result of protests based on non-Indian paternity; persons omitted or deleted from the Indian register under the double-mother rule; and the illegitimate children of Indian women born prior to August 14, 1956 who were omitted or deleted because of non-Indian paternity.

Status of the next generation is also addressed by the new bill: grandchildren, born prior to April 17, 1985 (or after April 16, 1985 if their parents married one another before April 17, 1985) of an Indian grand-mother who parented out of wedlock with a non-Indian.

Great-grandchildren are also included: eligibility for them is also based on if they were born prior to April 17, 1985 (or after April 16, 1985 if their parents married one another before April 17, 1985) where one of the parents was affected by the double-mother rule and the other parent is not entitled to registration.

Dr. Corbiere-Lavell's

protests about the law of the day began shortly after her marriage (and corresponding loss of status) and she campaigned for change all across Canada. Eventually, the issue was brought before the Supreme Court of Canada which upheld the existing law.

But the April 17, 1985 date already noted is significant because that was when Dr. Corbiere-Lavell's efforts, and those many others, paid off and the Mulroney government passed a law that made Dr. Corbiere-Lavell eligible to apply to have her status reinstated.

But it did not go the full distance and last Thursday's Bill S-3 seeks not only to remedy those left behind but also to "make whole" those women who lost their status and had to apply for its reinstatement under the terms of Bill 6 (1) paragraph (c), which applied to women

who had lost status as a result of marriage to a non-Indian partner. Another provision of that same 1985 edict, Bill 6 (1) paragraph (a) applied to women who had held Indian status prior to 1985.

Dr. Corbiere-Lavell told The Expositor Monday that after 1985, she had her Indian status reinstated by

store authorization were allocated on a first come, first served basis as determined by the time of submission of a complete, online Retail Store Authorization (RSA) Intent to Apply application. Complete applications were required to include a band council resolution that approved the location of the proposed store on their reserve.

Wiikwemkoong was one of those eight communities and applied through the Wikwemikong Development Commission (WDC).

Nikki Manitowabi, business development specialist with the WDC, has helped work on the cannabis file and told The Expositor that it's imperative that the commission has everything in order so that things progress smoothly, and quickly, or else they run the risk of being fined. Case-in-point is the Highlife cannabis store in Sudbury that saw repeated fines for not being open on April 1 of this year—the first day of legal cannabis store sales in the province.

The new store will be housed in the soon-to-be-built light industrial park that will be located on Wikwemikong Way,

just outside and west of Wiikwemkoonsing limits. The 6,000-square foot building will be parted out into several different outlets, one of which will be home to the cannabis store.

The tenders have gone out for the building and the WDC hopes to see construction commence soon.

"(The cannabis store) will be designed to spec and will contain all the security standards that it will require," Ms.

Chief and council did much soul-searching before deciding to make a bid for one of the eight cannabis stores, balancing the need for safe, provincially-regulated drugs and alternative medicine with the idea of cannabis as a 'gateway drug.'

The WDC did a lot of research in the lead-up to the applying to the AGCO. Some of the research they read showed that communities that have access to the purchase of legal cannabis will see a decrease in alcohol use among youth. That, Ms. Manitowabi said, is promising news for the community.

"It's good for the whole Island," Ms. Manitowabi said.

...continued from page 8 client-centric and its goal is to help participants find their identity in order to create resiliency. The programming at the centre and on the land incorporates elements of cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) and dialectical behaviour therapy (DBT) though the practitioners do not rely on these for their treatment.

Accommodations on the land are spartan. Three cabins exist at the facility's main summer site on Clapperton Island, one each for men, women and staff. Inside the uninsulated structures are a handful of cots with a sleeping bag atop each one. Some participants have a guitar or a few photos of loved ones next to their cots.

The land-based portion includes therapy, healing circles and sharing in chores such as cooking, cleaning and gathering firewood. During the hunting season and the winter, the program moves into prospector tents. It also changes locations depend-

ing on the time of year and the needs of the group.

When Mr. Tibollo visited the land-based therapy site last week, he took part in a talking circle during which counsellors, staff and clients shared their experiences and what the program meant to them. Some had just joined the on-theland program while others were one day away from graduation.

One client shared just how much the program has meant to them and became emotional when describing just how much they felt that they were part of a family. Mr. Gilchrist acknowledged that a great deal of trauma originates in a family setting, so to see these individuals feeling like part of a healthy family once more can have profound effects.

The clients' start times are staggered in part so new arrivals can see the impacts after being in the program for some time. That gap was evident at the talking circle, with new arrivals being hesitant to say much at all and those on the cusp of graduation willing to share more about their experience.

Another major factor

that fosters the program's success is the element of trust. Almost, if not all of the counsellors and staff at the facility have lived experience with trauma. The vast majority of staff members are Indigenous and share similar language and life experiences with the clients. Because of this, Mr. Gilchrist said they may be quicker to open up and trust counsellors who are attempting to help them heal.

He added that he was appreciative of Mr. Tibollo making the trip to visit the operation.

"It was a great visit and very positive. As we continue to advocate for further funding gaps, it's these sorts of visits that really are beneficial and make it seem promising," said Mr.

Gilchrist.
Mr. Tibollo said he was very impressed with the Gwekwaadziwin Miikan program and that he would be keeping it in consideration as the province develops its mental health strate-



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
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Redrum holds first international run on Manitoulin



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Vaccinate and report now to avoid potential suspensions

MANITOULIN—With the 2019 school year nearly here, Public Health Sudbury and Districts (PHSD) would like to remind parents that now is the time to make sure that student vaccinations are up-to-date and reported.

"Schools and daycares are settings where infectious diseases can be spread easily due to the nature of their environment of playing and eating close together. It is important students are vaccinated to be protected from serious diseases that can be prevented," said Karly McGibbon, public health nurse, PHSD. "In Ontario, children need up-to-date vaccination records to attend school and licenced child care centres. It's the law.'

Each year PHSD reviews the vaccination records of thousands of students enrolled in schools and licensed daycares. Letters are sent to parents or students when records are incomplete. Students must be vaccinated to continue to attend school and must send their updated vaccine information to PHSD in order to update Ministry of Health records on each child.

The reporting process has been made easier. Ontario has introduced Immunization Connect Ontario (ICON), a secure online system for submitting child vaccination information to public health units. "Parents and students can view their own immunization record online and can report any new vaccinations students received to this online site found at phsd.ca/reportvaccines," said Ms.

The student's Ontario Health Card number is required to use ICON. Children 16 years of age and older can use the service themselves.

...continued from page 3 "Kagawong has a lot of newcomers and young families moving into town," she said. "Kagawong has always had a reputation for community, for neighbours helping neighbours." That's why Ms. Buie and her husband John moved here 45 years ago. "I came as a nurse and married a patient," she laughs. "We've never left. We live in the

same house we built in 1975

and raised our kids in." Ms. Buie left home in England at 19 years and trained as a nurse. "That's what women did in those days," she said. "They became a teacher, a secretary or a nurse." She worked in London until she decided to come to Canada at 25, sailing across the ocean on the Empress of England and landing in Montreal. "I came with two trunks and didn't know anybody," she said. She's never regretted it, noting "to actually live here was just amazing."

She worked as a nurse in Mindemoya when the hospital was first built, then in Little Current. She continues to work as a community nurse in M'Chigeeng First Nation. "It's special," she said, having known and worked with M'Chigeeng community since her arrival. "I will always be a village nurse."

Ms. Buie was the first official midwife on Manitoulin Island and assisted with 315 births between 1998 and 2007, and very much enjoyed watching those babies grow to adulthood.

During a bout with cancer, Ms. Buie shared her experiences in a series in The Manitoulin Expositor. "I was a nurse but didn't know about radiation and chemotherapy, so I thought, 'let's educate people'." She remains involved in her cancer support group and stays in touch with the gang she stayed with at Daffodil Lodge in Sudbury during her treatment. She is also Team Captain for her Run for the Cure team, an annual race to support breast

cancer, and has participated since 2012.

She is currently a member of three Island choirs, the Island Singers, the Norisle Choristers and Jane Best's choir. "I sing to live and live to sing." She has been a member of Burns Wharf Theatre Players since its inception and is already looking forward to next season.

Ms. Buie is deeply committed to St. John's Anglican Church in Kagawong, taking turns with fellow church members conducting services and acting as tour guide and historian. "Our church always attracts visitors because the pulpit is the bow of a boat involved in a 1965 marine tragedy," she said. "The building was originally a warehouse for Snow's store dating from 1898. It became a church in 1936." That's special, she said, because the history is still alive.

Ms. Buie's family is proud of her. Jen Buie offered congratulations in a message read by Mr. Coomes. "I wanted to say congratulations to my Mom on receiving the Citizen of the Year award this year for Kagawong. She is an incredible woman and very fitting of this award. Mom has always given back to the community and embodies what I feel a 'true neighbour' is," she wrote.

'She may not have been born in Kagawong or even grew up here, but she sure became part of the fabric of our town very quickly," the letter continued. "When new people move into Kagawong, she's the first to show up with tea biscuits and jelly to welcome them and let them know about what our town offers. She loves being the 'town nurse' and enjoys helping others. She may have been out singing or had just gotten back from her family and grandchildren the night before, but she makes time to do it as she feels it's important. This is the type of woman she is. She always thinks of others before herself and always

gives back. She is the fabric that holds our family together and I truly feel she is also the fabric that holds Kagawong together.'

Mr. Coomes shared some humorous memories of their childhood before noting, "When she left home in 1963 I got the warm bedroom." The siblings had little contact for 30 years but while Skyping with daughter Jen from Shanghai in 2004, he learned that Mary needed to have her garage fixed. "I came to fix the garage and bought a house," he said. "I never thought we'd live within five minutes of each other. Now I dread her call," he laughed. "Deep down, I love her to bits," he admitted. "It's an honour to be known as MBB (Mary Buie's brother). Long may you reign."

Ms. Buie, in character, requested permission from Lord Anderson to address the kingdom. "To my fellow countryfolk in the kingdom of Kagawong, young and old, I would like to express my most humble thanks for the honour thus bestowed upon me," she said. "It is a great privilege to live here amongst such generous, welcoming, kind people. I am happy that I can help and support them in any way I can."

"John and I chose to live in Kagawong 45 years ago. It is a community that cares for each other and supports them in good times and

"You are our family of Kagawong and we are very proud that we live here,' she continued. "We boast about Kagawong and the Township of Billings wherever we go. We live on this wondrous Manitoulin Island. Right now we can sit out, listen to the birds, look over the sparkling waters of our bay, bask in the sunshine, enjoy the fruits of our labours-food on our tables. We can enjoy our summer days and cool off in crystal clear waters. We live in a peaceful kingdom. We are blessed abundantly."

"I also serve another Lord," she reminded Lord (Mayor) Anderson, "and it is through Him that I do what I do. My God is your God—creator of all the beauty around us human folk, the birds, the beasts, the bounty and the beauty of the land. We are all asked to Love our neighbour as ourselves. Jesus is my Lord and I try to listen to his voice - the Holy Spirit - and do what he asks of me."

"I love serving you all here in this beautiful kingdom. My life is perfect with a wonderful husband, family and friends – you are all my family and community."

She concluded by offering "my most grateful thanks for this great honour bestowed on me" before cutting the celebratory cake and mingling with wellwishers.

applying to the Department of Indian Affairs. "But now, I'm restored to the status I had growing up," rather than one conferred by government.

Her initial response to The Expositor was, "It's over! Finally, as women, we have been recognized back to our full community. This will make it possible for me to have the status I had before 1970 (when she married) and my children as well."

She went on to say that "our people, down to the second and third generations, will be recognized which will strengthen our nation. The right to belong is guaranteed to us by the United Nations' Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."

"Now," she added, "It's going to be up to us as First Nations to enact our own community codes."

The new bill, according to a Ministry of Crown-Indigenous Relations release, will date back to the early years of Canada as a nation and will entertain Indian status for all descendants born prior to April 17, 1985

to women who lost Indian status or were removed from band lists because of their marriage to a non-status man as far back as 1869. This brings this cadre in line with those who never lost status, and their descendants who also retained their status.

Carolyn Bennett, Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations, said the government must prepare for an increase in status Indians. The release from Dr. Bennett's ministry says there could be between 270,000 and 450,000 individuals, over the next decade, being newly entitled to registration under the Indian Act.

Dr. Corbiere-Lavell, a retired teacher, holds honorary doctorates, is a recipient of the Persons Award and, last year, was admitted to the Order of Canada for her heroic efforts on behalf of Indigenous women.

The enactment of Bill S-3 gave her, and others in the same position, what she began campaigning for 49 years ago.

"I feel good about it, finally," she told The Expositor and then joked, "I'll just have to find something else to keep me occupied!"

Providence Bay Agricul-

tural Society secretary/treasurer Dawn Dawson noted that the board lost two members this year—Mr. McDonald and Lavina Galbraith. Ms. Galbraith passed away over the winter at age 90, but was still lending a hand at the fair last August.

Ms. Dawson said Mr. McDonald's passing has had an effect on the board. "He was so young and so involved," she said, explaining that the moment of silence was not just held in the horse ring but throughout the fair as the musicians stopped playing and the midway music also went quiet.

Indeed, Mr. McDonald and his fellow board members past and present will have a legacy at the fair for years to come.

with or as pleasing to the eye. They can also be causing unseen damage to the tissue of the oral cavity and jaw joint. Over the years the teeth wear down and become flatter. The teeth are only able to mash food when they get to this state instead of slicing into the food as they did when the dentures were new. You need to chew harder to do the same job. You may even lose enjoyment during meal time due to the extra effort needed to chew. The wear occurs slowly over the years and you adapt without any notice. Years later though there is a great difference in the dentures and you are likely coping without even realizing it. The teeth can also wear unevenly, affecting your bite. This causes more discomfort and possible problems with your jaw joint. 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

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
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
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Visiting Ontario's Island Retreat?

Misery Bay Provincial Park: Remote 1800s log cabin

hroughout the settlement era on Manitoulin, stories popped up about people who lived alone in the forest, shunning others while making a go at the difficult art of survival. There was an air of mystery about them: rarely seen, with no need for human company, there was little information to feed the rumour mill, or the historical records

A legend of sorts arose about a very real man by the

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
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name of Edwin Saunders, who called himself Ned. He is credited with being one of the very first settlers in Gore Bay, back in the early years of settlement, soon after the Treaty of 1862.

Not much is known about him in local history books; Shelley Pearen, in 'Exploring Manitoulin,' writes that Ned Saunders was born in Crediton, England, in 1822 (sometimes given as 1820) and educated there, coming to London, Ontario with his family in 1849. He was "a bachelor, scholar and musician who preferred to live alone with nature in as remote a setting as possible."

In a more revealing chronology of events from the Saunders Family genealogy, it is recorded that Edwin (Ned) Saunders "soon went to Manitoulin" on several visits after arriving in Canada. In 1873, when he was in his 50s, he "arrived in Gore Bay in a small sailboat and landed in a small cove on the east entrance to the bay and later moved to a small cove at the lower part of the bay. Here he built a small house or dugout in the bank. How he lived is not known as he is considered the first resident, no other resi-

dent being within miles of him. His home was a large hogshead [described as a small cliffside] and poles covered with brush and earth."

On his last visit to his family in London in 1872, before finally settling on Manitoulin, he had "sailed to Owen Sound in his own boat, walked 125 miles to London and arrived looking like a tramp."

Eight or 10 years later, Gore Bay had become too crowded for Mr. Saunders, so he moved west, first to Elizabeth Bay where the new settlers of the Ainslie family soon arrived. In 1878, they recalled finding "one white man living alone in a small log shanty near where they landed. Edwin Saunders, known as Ned, was somewhat of a character [....] He lived there on the bank of what is now Black Creek ... His home there was a log construction and partly buried in the bank of the creek."

That same year, Ned Saunders "walked regularly to Colin Campbell's home to pick up mail for the residents of Elizabeth Bay." He bought some land, 130 acres then another hundred, all at 50 cents an acre.

Ned's younger brother, William, came to visit in 1880 with his wife and six children; he was a pharmacist, naturalist and agriculturalist of international repute who founded the Experimental Farm in Guelph.

"Sometime around 1882," reads information in the Visitor Centre, Ned Saunders built his shanty in what is now Misery Bay Provincial Park, across the highway from his former shanty in Elizabeth Bay, but deep in the woods away from other settlers. Built against a low limestone cliff, it is of the type built by Manitoulin settlers in the 1870s and 80s, often abandoned once a proper cabin was

built; Ned Saunders built and lived only in shanties, considering them adequate to his needs.

The genealogy entry for 1884 reports on Ned Saunders' being "well-educated for his time," and visiting the home of James David-son Ainslie to "discuss various items of the news of the day," as well as the new books in the Ainslie's "good library." Ned also brought fish to Mr. Ainslie to trade for bread and supplies.

In 1891, the Ainslie family needed a new schoolteacher for the schoolroom in their home as it was getting to be too much for grandfather Ainslie. "A man by the name of Ned Saunders happened to be living over on the sand beach," reads the entry. "Old Ned, as he was called, moved in with the Ainslies and taught the children until his health failed."

In 1894, it says, simply, and sadly, "Mr. Saunders is untimely destitute."

James D. Ainslie elaborates, "We have partly supported him for many years, and this last few months we have taken him in our house, he is not fit for to take care of himself. All the land he had he transferred to Mr. Leeson, formerly storekeeper in Gore Bay, for food supplies and clothing some years ago [....] worthless land or it would have been gone too.'

The last record of Ned Saunders is the registration of his death in Sault Ste. Marie in December of 1895, at 73 years of age. A man of obvious talents and certain social skills who chose a solitary life over community comforts until the survivalist could no longer sustain it.

Today, Ned Saunders' cabin, within the boundaries of Misery Bay Provincial Park, about 30 kilometres west of Gore along with many others, explains that Ned Saunders picked this beautiful spot-Saunders' now called Cove—because the 75m walk to the water's edge was convenient for his boat.

A shelter was built in 2014 right by Ned's shanty, providing shade and "a spectacular view" in which to learn about the historical and geological interest of the

On Tuesday, August 27 at 10 am, Maddie Wagar, operations manager/naturalist at Misery Bay, will lead a hike to the Shelter at Saunders' Cove. The hike will focus on the historical aspects of Ned Saunders when he resided here and on the geological features found along the hike. 

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Hundreds of Islanders join in 2019 Pride Manitoulin celebrations

LITTLE CURRENT—It was a fabulous weekend of celebrating individuality and uniqueness at this year's Pride Manitoulin, which took place from August 16 to 18 at locations across the Island.

Ms. Sheppard said that she goes to Burnt Island every summer to help the fishery and that she now drives the Friday fish truck that her mom and grandfather used to drive. Purvis Brothers is 137 years old, Ms. Sheppard noted, and finished her talk by saying that one of her relatives said, "A bad day of fishing is better than a good day in the office.'

Kyra Bayer M'Chigeeng was the final contestant to speak and her talk centred on the beauty of Manitoulin and why she is proud to call it home. She told her audience of the many medicinal uses of the plants around us. "A large leaf in our yard can be used to treat wounds and rashes," she said. "Red willow, boiled to make a pain reliever like aspirin, cedar from a branch, boiled as a tea to help treat a cold. Chaga is a fungus that grows on birch trees and boiled as a drink can be used to treat disease and boost your immune system." Ms. Bayer also spoke of the plants and berries on the Island as well as the great differences that each season brings from the Trilliums and fiddleheads in



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
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

Fire department called to child stuck in Sheguiandah swing

by Alicia McCutcheon SHEGUIANDAH—Fire-

fighters respond to all kinds of emergencies and last week was no exception as members of the Northeast Town Fire Department responded to the playground at the Centen-Museum Sheguiandah to reports of a child stuck in a swing.

Deschamps, Duane Town Fire Northeast Department fire chief, told The Expositor that crews received a call on Thursday, August 15 at 11:15 am about an eightyear-old girl stuck in a baby swing at the museum park.

Crews responded and found the girl crying and distress. Deschamps said swing appeared to apply more pressure on the legs when the child had tried to wriggle out.

"We had to cut the swing down," he said.

"She was shaken up and crying but by the end she was happy and got to go continue playing with friends, Deschamps added.

This is not the first time the fire department has been called to rescue a child stuck in a baby swing. Two years ago, crews also removed a boy from a Low Island Park swing in which the swing itself had to be cut to set the child free.

Williamson, Dave Northeast Town CAO, told The Expositor that the incident was reviewed and it was determined that the swing was not defective in any way. "Swings are standardized across the province and are safe for use," he said.

Both Mr. Williamson Fire Chief Deschamps urged parents to be ever-vigilant when their children are using playground equipment.

"We do recommend proper adult supervision of children using playground equipment to is age and skill appropriate for the child's use," Mr. Williamson added.
