The summer drought that has seen near record low precipitation across most of Manitoulin has hit farmers hard, noted Reeve Russell, who also farms. "I have been watering my cattle for a month now.

LITTLE CURRENT—The Little Current Public Library has introduced a new senior outreach program in cooperation with the CNIB and CELA (Centre for Equitable Library Access), providing area seniors with library materials.

"It is a program across Canada, but I wanted to bring it here because I think all people should have the maximum access to library services," said Little Current Public Librarian Jake Marion

The program is open to anyone with vision loss or limited abilities that prevent them from travelling to the library in the Little Current.

Mr. Marion plans to have the program streamlined by the fall so that an individual can contact the library directly to register, but currently interested individuals are to contact the CNIB if they have vision loss at 1-800-563-2342 or CELA if they have any other limiting abilities at 1-855-655-2273.

"If the individual has a (Little

Current Public Library) library card they can register with CELA and start to receive library material through the mail such as books on CDs, electronic audio downloads or in braille form," explained Mr. Marion. "If they don't have a library card, they can contact the library

Once an individual is registered, Mr. Marion and his staff will get to know the individual in the program and will deliver DVDs, audio books (CDs), DAISY Reader disks, large print books or regular print books depending on the person's interests and needs.

# Two new faces at the Wikwemikong council table following election

WIKWEMIKONG—Wikwemikong Chief Duke Peltier received an overwhelming endorsement from the electors of Wikwemikong, garnering 868 out of 1,271 votes cast.

Candidate and former chief Gladys Wakegijig received 172 votes, former chief Robert Corbiere received 164 votes and newcomer Ronnie Odjig received 47 votes. There were 18 rejected ballots.

The 12 candidates who will be joining Ogimaa Peltier around the band council table for the next two years include incumbents Tim Ominika (687 votes), Lawrence Enosse (587 votes), Bernadine A. Francis (518 votes), John J. L. A. Dube (424 votes), Lorraine A. Fox (407 votes), Margaret (Tish) Manitowabi (403 votes), Dominic Beaudry (399 votes), Gladys Wakegijig (365 votes), Maureen E. Trudeau Manitowabi, (353 votes) and Cecillia J. C. Pitawanakwat (303 votes) who will be joined by new councillors Rachel Manitowabi (368 votes) and Sylvia Recollet (424 votes). Former councillors Agnes Kanasawe and Robbie Shawana were not on the ballot in this election.

## Worthy projects wither on the vine without champions

The fate of the Mindemoya Old School building appears to be sealed, despite a lively public consultation meeting where the submissions were clearly dominated by those in favour of keeping the facility—with literally dozens of innovative ideas on how to save the historic building coming fast and furious. So how did it come to be that the Central Manitoulin municipal council passed a motion last week to close the building as of the end of October 2016—with one councillor opining in open council that no one had come forward with a plan to save the historic edifice that supposedly means so much to so many?

Ideas are not plans and articulated concepts are not architectural drawings and to get from vision to reality takes not only a lot of elbow grease, it requires a particular ingredient that is critical to the success of large scale projects and is missing from this debate—a cham-

Champions not only can, they do—often despite all odds. A champion is someone with the passion and drive to bulldoze through the obstacles. The first indication you are not talking to a champion is often the words "the problem with that is," while the question "what's the problem?" might well indicate that a champion is in the offing.

There are a lot of examples of how a champion can impact a project available as a template right here on Manitoulin. People like the late Dr. Jack Bailey, whose drive and vision helped propel the Manitoulin Centennial Manor into being, despite all obstacles in the way, or the very current Dr. Roy Jeffery, who is championing a push to build an assisted living complex to complement the Manor

Champions are the people who, despite their own often busy lives, take up a challenge for the greater public good. Champions are not always the most popular person in the room (not to say Dr. Bailey and Dr. Jeffrey were and are not beloved), but the fire of their passion and their insistence that the project will go forward to completion often produces a discomforting heat.

Another current example of a champion is the redoubtable Maja Mielonen, whose steadfast pressure to develop cycling routes across Manitoulin Island and to see the province pave the shoulders of Highway 540, as they did Highway 6, has made her instantly recognizable by as influential personage as the premier of Ontario herself (witnessed by the reaction of Premier Kathleen Wynne when greeted by Ms. Mielonen during the premier's recent visit to Manitoulin Coun-

Champions are not the spark that ignites an idea, they are the flame that hardens resolve in the kiln that is the real world, the heat that fully bakes an idea and the fire that keeps everyone moving forward. Ideas are easy, irresolute resolve is not.

Before the age of smartphones and tablets, you could often recognize the champion by the thick dog-eared calendar in which they iotted down commitments made, dates to call back, deadlines for applications. Anyone who experienced the bulldozer personality of the late Frank Reynolds, himself a champion of many causes, would recognize the type in an instant. They are the people who get things done, brook no obstacle and simply refuse to take no for an answer.

Champions are rarely bureaucrats or other managers; they are not often politicians, although like Little Current's John Hodder they may choose to follow that route at some point in their lives, but they are often highly successful businesspersons, teachers or involved in sales. Small town politicians usually have their eyes too firmly glued to the mill rate, and their fingers too tightly clasped on a community's purse strings, to comfortably take on the role of champion.

What champions do share in common in an indomitable spirit, a drive and passion that will not be suborned. What the Mindemoya Old School needs is a champion and it needs one soon if its fate is to be secured, for without a champion, all the best ideas and good intentions in the world will likely come to naught.

#### Earthroots corrects record on the coyote-wolf ban story

We must make more of an effort to understand and accurately interpret their behaviour

To the Expositor:

RE: Conservationists fear coyote-wolf trapping ban may creep to Island, endangering deer (August 17, Page 1).

There are several factual errors in the recent article outlining the controversial government proposals to expand wolf and coyote hunting and trapping closures to protect rare Algonquin wolves.

Firstly, the public commenting period plays no part in the at-risk designation of species in Ontario. The Algonquin wolf has already been designated 'threatened' by an independent scientific panel called the Committee on the Status of Species at Risk in Ontario.

Secondly, wolf and coyote populations self-regulate and are further impacted by prey availability, meaning that non-human, natural processes are the effective control that prevent them from rising "unfettered." Indeed, no research has ever concluded that hunting and trapping are effective at boosting prey populations or preventing livestock depredation. Wolf and coyote species' pack-based social structure, the number of transient animals roaming the landscape in search of free territory in which to establish, and the larger and more numerous litters that result when packs are splintered by hunters and trappers all lead to a rebounding of the population that is targeted. Moreover, longterm research shows that this social chaos that lethal control causes actually exacerbates livestock depredation.

Thirdly, there are many tools and techniques to prevent livestock

depredation by wolves and coyotes. MNRF (Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry) should be working with the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs to subsidize the implementation of preventative methods in lieu of compensating farmers for depredations and encouraging them to destroy coyotes, neither of which make up for lost livestock.

Lastly, compared to wolves, coyotes have successfully adapted to living in close proximity to humans. However, neither animal poses a significant risk to us. In fact, deer kill more people every year than all top predators combined. Pets should be kept on leash to prevent conflicts, and attractants should always be removed to deter all wildlife from becoming habituated around people.

Wolves and coyotes play a very important ecological role on our landscape. To benefit from them and coexist with them, we must make more of an effort to understand and accurately interpret their behaviour. The human population continues to rise "unfettered," we are already causing the sixth mass extinction event on earth. If we do not modify our behaviour, we will lose the biodiversity and natural processes that the human species unknowingly depends on.

## Boaters join eXXpedition Great Lakes 2016 plastics assessment

NORTH CHANNEL—Boaters across the North Channel of Lake Huron and the west end of Georgian Bay took to their dinghies, kayaks, paddleboards and other assorted small vessels on Saturday, August 20 to scour the shorelines for plastic debris, while a mini-trawl in the Port of Little Current focused on the search for microbeads.

"We had a very successful participation in the eXXpedition Great Lakes initiative here in the North Channel of Lake Huron and the west end of Georgian Bay on Saturday," said organizer Tom Boyce of the sailboat Traveller. "Sincere thanks to everyone who participated."

Mr. Boyce, his wife Brenda, and Lilli the plastic sniffing dog have been coming to the North Channel for 30 years (well Lilli for somewhat less, but still all her life) and they are effusive in their praise for the reverence Canadians hold for the waters of the Great Lakes. It is a passion they share.

"Just look at this," said Ms. Boyce as she produces a photo she had captured a couple of days before on her smartphone. The photo, taken at night, shows a stunning view of the Little Current waterfront, lights glimmering off the waters of the North Channel. "We have sailed all over the world. This looks like it could have been taken in the Greek Islands." It does.

It is the protection of the pristine waters of the North Channel and Georgian Bay that led the Boyces to approach Roy Eaton to enlist his Cruisers' Net broadcasts in helping organize a local response to the eXXpedition Great Lakes 2016 mission.

The eXXpedition Great Lakes 2016 mission seeks to "make the unseen seen by leading the world's largest simultaneous

through the Cruisers' Net to sweep their areas to collect any plastic debris. "Of those, 12 boats reported findings in the areas of Heywood Island, Mosquito Island, Amendroz Island, the Benjamins, Gibson Island, Snug Harbor, Sturgeon Bay and Gal-

ly oblivious to the threat that plastics and microbeads in particular pose to the world's wild fish stocks. His sojourn aboard the Sea Dragon was a definite, and alarming our opener.

"These plastics don't biodegrade, they photo-degrade," he noted of the bulk of the plastics ending up in the ocean (and the Great Lakes). Gradually breaking up into smaller and smaller pieces, the tiny bits of plastic find their way into the food chain, being mistaken by smaller fish as food.

"Larger fish eat the little fish, and bigger fish eat those fish, eventually, those fish find their way onto our dinner tables," he said. "They end up in the human body."

The biggest hope that Mr. Boyce and the researchers have for the plastics survey is to raise awareness of the issue, to help educate consumers and, in turn, bring pressure on manufacturers to switch to biodegradable plastics and stop using microbeads in their products (microbeads are now listed as a toxic substance in Canada)

The results of the trawls and mini-trawls such as that used by Mr. Boyce and his compatriots will be made public in a report following their analysis.

"We have to give a special thank you to Roy Eaton for his help in promoting this event over his Cruisers Net," said Mr. Boyce, who also thanked The Expositor for taking an interest in the story. "Finally, another big thank you to the following boats for their special contributions: Persistence, Windfall, Annie's Song, Slo Motion, Sleek, Into the Mystic, Wind Swept, Georgian Mist, North Star and Giverny."

Mr. Boyce and many of his fellow boaters are American citizens, making their way

water sampling project for microplastics," according to the group's website.

Enlisting citizen scientists from around each of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence Seaway, eXXpedition Great Lakes 2016 was a community-led initiative open to everyone in the Great Lakes region of America, male and female, adult and child, solo or in groups, who all took time out on a summer Saturday to "stand up for the health of your lakes."

e neam of your takes. "We conducted a major shoreline sweet "Another sweep along the north shore of Goat Island, across the channel from Little Current, produced another two large garbage bags full of debris, in addition to (believe it or not) two five dollar Canadian bills."

resulted in seven large garbage bags filled

with a variety of plastics and other debris being collected," reported Mr. Boyce.

Interestingly, the two bills were held down by stones according to the finder.

There were 76 boats at various anchorages throughout the North Channel, from the Whalesback Channel east to the Bad River in Georgian Bay, who were asked

lant Island near John Island," reported Mr. Boyce. "In total these anchorages produced another four large bags of plastics and other debris."

On a very bright note, Mr. Boyce noted that "many other anchorages were reported dahris free"


After the sweeps, at 1400 hours (that's 2 pm in landlubber terms), Mr. Boyce and some fellow volunteers deployed a minitrawl (based on a 'Babylegs' design he found on the Internet) to sample the waters of the North Channel on the Little Current waterfront for signs of microbeads (tiny bits of plastic added to many hygiene and household products for their scrubbing potential).

The Babylegs mini-trawl was constructed from a baby's nylon tights, a plastic pop bottle and, according to Ms. Boyce "many, many trips to the hardware store to make sure it would stay attached." The final successful adhesive measure have done Red Green proud—that good old Canadian standby, duct tape.

"The trawl will be given to the organizers of eXXpedition GL 2016 for lab evaluation and a follow up report," said Mr. Boyce. He adds that it is his fervent hope that the search for microbeads in North Channel waters will prove fruitless.

Mr. Boyce, who holds a master's certification, became involved in the eXXpedition efforts when a friend mentioned to him that there was a need for a ship's master to shuttle the Sea Dragon, the ocean going vessel the group uses to survey the oceans of the world with a mantra trawl (a much larger version of the mini-trawl Mr. Boyce constructed, but still only about five feet wide) from the Baltic to the English coast.

Like most people, Mr. Boyce was general-

#### Drugs seized, driver and passengers charged at OPP traffic stop

A 28-year-old male of Toronto and a 35-year-old male of Sheshegwaning First Nation have been charged with possession of a controlled substance (cannabis marijuana) for the purpose of trafficking, contrary to section 5(2) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, possession of property obtained by crime, contrary to section 354(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada, and having open liquor in the vehicle, contrary to section 31(2) of the Liquor Licence Act of Ontario.

The accused are scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on November 15, 2016.



community. "I have to express my thanks to my family, without them I would not be able to fulfill my role as ogimaa. I know I have my family's

"I also want to thank all the other candidates for chief for the offer of their ideas, for bringing forward their ideas on what they feel is important to the community," he said. "I want to congratulate them and the other members of council for putting their names forward for these very important roles. I know the councillors that have been elected are prepared to help create a vibrant, healthy community so that we can all raise out families.

Ogimaa Peltier said that there are three things that are always important to the community: "the protecting of our resources, that is the people, the land and the water.'

The newly elected chief said that there are areas that have to be prioritized going forward over the next two years. "One of those is reconciling the issue of the islands claim and the resolution of long standing issues," he said.

The preservation of language and cultural knowledge will also be front

and centre on his agenda, he noted. "This is especially important for our young people. The youth need to be nurtured and taught their roots and their identity."

In order to be able to make the kinds of investments needed to provide that support, the band also needs to keep a close eye to economic development, "especially with some of the projects that are currently going through a due diligence process," said Ogimaa Peltier, pointing to two innovative projects in the technology sector being pursued. "One is forestry resources based and the other in agriculture."

"I think that health should be a priority also," he said, noting that current efforts focussed on identification and prevention of chronic diseases is important, citing as an example the Ontario Renal Network project.


"The expansion of our long-term care home is necessary," said Ogimaa Peltier. "I still feel that we as a community deserve a family health team." The chief pointed out that Wikwemikong is the largest community on the Island and yet a number of smaller communities already have a family health team established. "We are going to continue to raise it with the Local Health Integration Network.'

Another health related project he would like to see brought to fruition is the building of a healing lodge, completing the work and vision that was started a number of years ago.

Finally, Ogimaa Peltier said that the coming term would see the development, with deep community consultation, of new governance laws for the Wikwemikong Unceded Terri-

"That is our way," he said. "We have a reading, then it goes back to the community, we have a reading and then it goes back to the community, and then we have a reading before it is passed."

Ogimaa Peltier noted that the old term of council ends as of August 26 and that the new council will be sworn in at a ceremony starting at 10 am on Wednesday, September 1 at Thunderbird Park (rain location is the arena). 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## Manitoulin Island: a mecca for fabulous fossil finds

KAGAWONG-Students of River School, hosted by 4elements Living Arts and Manitoulin Streams, were in for a special treat this past weekend when retired history (Manitoulin Secondary School) teacher Bill Caesar shared his love and knowledge of fossils.

"Manitoulin Island," stated Mr. Caesar, "is one the most amazing areas for fossils. It is a gold mine. I have travelled Europe and the Americas and (they have) nothing to what we have here. Hook Island (beside Benjamin Island) is loaded with fossils," he added.

Mr. Caesar shared that, "We have what the Germans call lagerstatten: fossil deposits that are rich with varied, well-preserved fossils."

In 1913, when the swing bridge was built, paleontologists flooded the area due to the amount of granite and limestone deposits.

Gordon's Park in Tehkummah has some of Manitoulin's best coral finds. The two varieties are honeycomb and

"Kagawong," he said enthusiastically, "is the heart of fossil country." He explained that Bridal Veil Falls is the dividing line between two age groups: Silurian (395 to 430 million years) and Ordovician (430 to 500 million years).

Prior to 480 million years ago, there was no plant life—nothing but bare rock. Shallow ocean water covered the Island and what we know as the Cup and Saucer was abundant with sea shells.

"How are fossils made?" asked one of the students.

'When a creature falls down to the sea, if soft bodied, they disintegrate," Mr. Caesar responded. However, if they have a hard shell like a crab, mud seeps into the cracks, fills the shell and everything hardens.

The stick or moss fossils—one of 5,000 species alive in the world, are thought to contain a cure for cancer.

A few years ago when a crew was working on McLean's Mountain, Mr. Caesar asked if he could remove some of the fossils found. They said help yourself and he drove away with a 1/2-ton truck bed full of treasures.

Mr. Caesar, whose ardor for fossils is apparent, has a vast collection at his home that he shares with wife Mary. He carries tools in both his boat and vehicle just in case. Mary, who is an avid gardener, supports his pas-

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

M'Chigeeng based aboriginal educational institute
had applied as usual for
funding from Indigenous
and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) from the Post
Secondary Partnership Program. "We have been part
of the project for 20 years,"
noted Ms. Roy. In order to
receive the funding, an
applicant must be an abo-

riginal institute and there

are nine such in Ontario.

"We were first told on July 26 that our proposal for this year's allocation, 2016-17, would not be funded," she noted. Of the nine aboriginal institutions in Ontario, only three were to receive the funding this year. "That was with only four weeks left before programs with our college and university partners are set to start."

When KTEI has not heard back on a funding application that has been running for several years, the norm is to assume and plan for the status quo, noted Ms. Roy. So if there is a problem, the institution would normally hear earlier rather than later? "Exactly," said Ms. Roy.

"You go with the status quo. (The notice that KTEI would not be receiving the federal funding) took us all by shock."

Ms. Roy noted that the drop in funding "has a big impact. We had to start scaling down operations, staff has no security."

Over the next three weeks an intense lobbying effort began, with the local federal representative Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes and different departments within the federal government. The result was a message received on August 17 that the application had been reconsidered and that some federal funding would flow.

"We will receive about \$197,000, enough to run about six programs," said Ms. Roy, "but that is about a quarter of what we receive."

Although they had received no clear indication of why their fortunes had plummeted so drastically, Ms. Roy said their independent research suggests that the funding had been reallocated to the mainstream colleges and universities. "It seems to be a part of their agenda to move stu-

dents into the mainstream system," she said. "That might not be half bad," she said, should that then flow to the partnership programming, but "the funding is not going to the institutions that we partner with."

The decision to cut funding is particularly puzzling given that KTEI has an outstanding success rate, particularly with difficult to serve groups. "In particular, over the last five years we have graduated over 260 students with different certificates, diplomas and degrees," said Ms. Roy. "Then you get the rug pulled out from under you."

"KTEI is exactly the kind programming that makes a real difference for First Nations students and their communities, which is why it's so difficult to understand why federal funding would suddenly dry up," agreed Ms. Hughes in a press release. "This is the first time in 20 years that funding has been denied," said Ms. Hughes. "This threatens the institute and stands in stark contrast to the government's commitment to close the First Nation education gap."

"It's critical that the funding continues to flow to KTEI for the students who are the most important component in this whole dilemma," said UCCMM Chief Executive Officer Hazel Recollet, quoted in the release from Ms. Hughes office. "We are so fortunate to have an institute with immense knowledge like KTEI—and it's local so students don't have to leave home, it's all right here." The release noted that KTEI provides training to between 50 and 75 students a year.

Despite the setback, KTEI is determined to soldier on, noted Ms. Roy. "We still have a provincial partner and we are going forward. We will move to Plan P."

"The school year is just about to start so it's critical that this process gets moving," said Ms. Hughes. "I am confident there is a solution that will maintain this institute and others like it. The opportunity it allows these youth is well worth a little extra effort all around."

Requests for clarification on the rationale for the reduced program funding from INAC and Minister Carolyn Bennett's office on the rationale for the

reduction in funding had not been received by press time Monday.

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## ...'This is a farm community,' Tehkummah reeve responds

...continued from page 1 of the truck driving down the road with hoses dragging. "I flashed my lights in an attempt to stop the tanker truck."

The truck pulled into a farmer's field where the driver thanked Mr. Killens for noting the errant couplings and indicated that he had been bringing water to the cattle.

"Two days later I spoke to Mr. Kay (the farmer in whose field the fire truck had stopped) and he explained that the township truck is being used (to deliver water to farms) as it is considered to be an emergency and the truck is used by farmers," wrote Mr. Killens. "I wish to know if this is township policy, is a fee charged for use of the equipment in the event of damage and is there a back up plan for a tanker should it be needed while watering cattle?"

Questioned as to whether he was seriously challenging the use of the tanker to

bring water to farmers, Mr. Killens responded, "As a follow up, just so you are aware, and I am not on a witch hunt, I called my insurance underwriter and they shared with me that should it be found that I called for fire services of the township, at this scorching time and the truck was tied up watering cattle, my insurance coverage would be void. This is aside from any damages that may or may not happen to the township vehicle and its equipment.

One of the recipients of the email, farmer Jim Anstice of Tehkummah, responded to Mr. Killens as follows: "Larry, southeast Manitoulin is in an unprecedented state drought with less than 35 millimeters of rain since the first of June. Farmers have been scrambling to find enough feed and pasture this summer and now an even more stressful situation as watering sources are drying up. These cattle must have water or they will die. Most farmers are already feeding the upcoming winter hay three months before they would normally start feeding. Most farmers don't have the equipment at the ready to haul water and finding water tanks on short notice is difficult.

"I am not privy to the method of payment, but I would assume a nominal fee would be offered by those needing the service. In my view a likely appreciated source of income for the volunteer fire department and a good way for the fire members to practice using the equipment. It is the fire department members who drive the truck and use the equipment to provide this service bringing water to the cattle when requested by the farmer.

"As far as the advice from your insurance company— if the fire truck is active in the township, should a fire emergency occur, the fire members in radio contact

would be able to respond more quickly that if they had to travel from their home to the fire hall and activate the fire equipment. Would the insurance company's policy include the participation of the fire equipment in the July 1st parade? Insurance companies don't always know the circumstances.

"I hope this will shed some light on what in my view is a desperate situation for our agricultural community and a highly justifiable and much appreciated action on the part of our fire department."

Mr. Anstice closed his reply by noting that he is not currently a member of the Tehkummah council, or a member of the fire department. "I have not been using the fire service to haul water. Pray for rain."

Mr. Russell added that in any event, the township has three pumper trucks available to it in the event of a fire emergency.

opening of the gates, we still found a good sized lineup, where CBC Radio North personalities were joined by storied Sudbury music scene promoters Paul Loewenberg and Scott Merrifield in checking ID (it was a licenced event limited to those 19 and over, did I mention those bonus lights?) and scanning tickets. The onerous gig of checking bags for contraband fell to other volunteers. The mood in the line was definitely upbeat, with many old friends greeting one another, despite the threatening clouds overhead, most of the fans were carrying some form of raingear obviously prepared to weather the worst.

Rain it did, hard for a couple of minutes, causing quite a rush to the shelter of the stage's overhang or the two large tents at the back of the venue and a mushroom field of umbrellas to bloom across the seats. By the time the concert actually began, the rain had settled to an intermittent drizzle and most fans had drifted back to the seats. Having brought a rain poncho and an umbrella for the occasion (we reporters, and our wives, are resourceful),

it was quickly discovered that the lineup to the beer counter had thinned out considerably—there is always a silver lining.

One in three Canadians tuned in to watch the farewell concert, made particularly poignant by the reason for the end of three decades that The Tragically Hip have painted their musical portraits of the Canadian psyche—lead singer Gordon Downie has been diagnosed with an aggressive terminal brain tumour.

The Tragically Hip have formed the background score to the formative years of more than one generation of Canadians, including most of the staff at The Expositor

For Expositor Editor Alicia McCutcheon, the music of the Tragically Hip "formed the soundtrack to my adolescence." She vividly recalled her discovery of the album 'Day For Night' (that would be the one from which three songs in the grand finale were drawn) in Grade 7 that began to lay down the musical tracks of some of her most formative years, "well them, Bob Marley, Neil Young and the

...continued from page 1 imminent danger. I knew we had to take cover. It sounded different and I said to my daughter, 'Get up, we are going to the basement.' We weren't even in the basement more than 10 seconds and we started hearing different noises and banging. Noises like elephants running across the deck. I thought I would look out and see the roof

gone.

The family was visiting Cathy and Doug King who live on Highway 542 on the outskirts of Mindemoya and the damage to their property was extensive, caused by a microburst, a sudden downdraft of air that explodes off in all directions as it hits the ground. Latticework on both ends of the deck was blown out; two lawn chairs were picked up, blown off the side of the deck, around the house and on to the highway. Trees in the backyard were uprooted, the barbecue was picked up and thrown off the deck onto the lawn where it lay in pieces, the siding that was piled up awaiting renovations at the house next door ended up against the guardrail across the highway and a heavy Roosterant Restaurant sign lay on its side, up against a fence.

A sizeable, hefty settee on the deck was moved and two very large trees quite a distance across the highway in the King's acreage lay on their sides. As well, the chimney cap was torn off the roof of the house.

Ms. Patreau also spoke of the nervousness of their dog Midas long before the microburst. "The dog must have known that something was coming because he paced and paced," she explained.

"And the dog went down in the basement, which he never does," added daughter Leah.

The family was busy throughout the night, picking up siding and debris off the highway. Mr. And Mrs. King had been at a function in Providence Bay and so had missed the serious weather episode. "As we got near our house on our way home," Ms. King commented, "I said, 'Are those my lawn chairs?" Sure enough, the red chairs lay on the highway.

son told The Expositor that what the Patreaus described is consistent with a downburst event, the generic term for a microburst, as he was still gathering evidence to list the storm as such (a storm within a four kilometre radius), but noting that due to the south to north pattern of the damage, it was likely a microburst.

Mr. Coulson said Environment Canada had learned of another downburst near Halfway Lake on Saturday night which felled trees and damaged cabins between 11:30 pm and 12:30 am. He explained that a downburst is essentially a "big gust of wind" that leads the storm and encouraged anyone else who witnessed the event or received damages from the winds to contact Environment Canada by emailing storm.ontario@ec.gc.ca or by calling 1-800-444-9276 (WARN).

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## ..Waterspout touches down near Little Current

Environment Canada could be seen from various areas around Little Current in the North Channel around White's Point, terrifying onlookers who thought they were seeing a tornado heading for that community.

According to Geoff Coulson, a meteorologist with Environment Canada, the most frequent time to see waterspouts is the late

"With the warm temperatures of the North Chan-

nel, if a cool outbreak of air comes in from the north, mixing with warm temperatures neath, it makes for an unstable condition as warm air wants to rise,3 Mr. Coulson explained.

Waterspouts can create wind speeds of 80 to 90 kilometres an hour, he explained, urging people to maintain caution if they see a waterspout, especially for those out on the water in small crafts.

When a waterspout

makes contact with land, it then becomes a tornado, as was the case in Goderich in 2011.

"Those are much more rare, but super danger-Mr. Coulson said, reiterating the importance of giving waterspouts a wide berth.

There have been five confirmed tornadoes in Ontario this year, which is well below the seasonal average (which ends in late September or early October) of 12.

"I have this memory of our Grade 8 trip, (one of the other students on the trip) bought the album with 'Ahead by a Century' on it, and then he went ahead and bought every other album The Tragically Hip had put out," she laughed. "He literally had a fist full of albums." Hard to suggest that her fellow student's school trip budget was blown, given the stature to which Canadian icons Gordon Downie and The Tragically Hip have risen.

Staff Writer Robin Burridge recalled her university years: "My best friend in university went to Queen's in Kingston (the Hip's hometown) where The Hip guitarist Rob Baker was living," she said. "It was an interesting but modest house. Whenever we were walking back from Kingston's downtown at night we would walk by his house singing Hip songs in the hope that he would come out." Alas the stratagem failed and the dream unrequited.

Among the reports of interesting places to catch the final Hip performance (as yet unsubstantiated) was of one enterprising soul who apparently set up a screen at the Benjamins to live stream to the boating community and a fully documented sojourn aboard the Grand Heron off the shores of Kagawong.

As is our wont as reporters these days, The Expositor published photos and comments from the concert venue in Sudbury through Instagram, receiving likes and shares for the effort. Once such post garnered a negative reaction, however. Anyone who watched the performance could guess when that occurred. Singer Downie had apparently met with Prime Minister Justin Trudeau before the concert, and the singer used the opportunity of the incredible national focus on his final moments in the spotlight to give a shout out and endorsement of Prime Minister Trudeau and exhorted him to redress the wrongs committed against indigenous peoples.



The musicians hugged each other and kissed Mr. Downie unabashedly before the nation. Many could be seen with tears streaming down their faces as the final goodbyes took place.

The Tragically Hip were Gordon Downie, guitarist Paul Langlois, guitarist Rob Baker, bassist Gord Sinclair and drummer Johnny Fay and their music touched a nation, reflecting its soul with small town

"Thanks for listening in the back," Mr. Downie said as he left the stage for the final

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## Alan Corbiere talks chieftanship at opening of OCF lecture series

M'CHIGEENG—A Masters Degree in Environmental Studies from York University and a degree from the University of Toronto notwithstanding, Alan Corbiere of M'Chigeeng is a gifted historian studying the language and the past of his Ojibwe forefathers.


He was born in Toronto, but his family returned to M'Chigeeng when he was six-years-old. After graduating from Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS), he went back to southern Ontario for his university education, but he also wanted to learn to speak Ojibwe, not just the basic language, but the words, the verbal skills, that would allow him to, as he said, "tell our stories in Ojibwe."

Long hours were spent at community classes after school and researching in the Toronto Reference Library and the university libraries. Books studied included the 'Ojibwa Texts,' written by William Jones, who had studied the people and the language while a research assistant at the Carnegie Institution. Mr. Corbiere also undertook the recordings of the old stories, the legends, of his people as told by the elders.

Johnny "The late Debassige told me some stories," he said, "and Lewis Debassige. I found some of these same stories in the archives. I was all excited and wanted to find more. Like my friend says, 'the joy is in the finding.'" He also spoke of his family. The Corbieres have been traced back to the War of 1812 and their movement to Manitoulin took place in the 1850s.

Mr. Corbiere shares his findings with teachings at the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation in M'Chigeeng and has also included talks about the First Nation Treaties from 1764 up to the Manitoulin Island Treaty of 1862. In mid-August, there were three more topics, beginning with Ojimaawin: Historic Chieftainship and Anishinaabe Governance.

It was evident with Mr. Corbiere's beginning lecture that his research was first class as he spoke of one of the first references to chieftain customs on Manitoulin with the LaCloche ceremony of 1671. This was included in the Jesuit Relations and Allied Documents and said in part, "Among a number of islands opposite Ekaentouton (Manitoulin), toward the North, there is one called Ouiebitchiouan where sixteen hundred Savages of various nations assembled, to perform certain superstitious rites which they are accustomed to render to the departed. The Captain (Chief) of the Beaver Nation having died three years before, his eldest son had invited various tribes to attend the games and which he spectacles wished to hold in his father's honour. He intended, too, to take this opportunity to resuscitate him, as they say, by taking

his name: for it is customary to recall the illustrious dead to life at this festival, by conferring the name of the deceased upon one of the most important men, who is considered his successor and takes his place.' These Jesuit Relations were documents sent by priests back to their superiors in France. Mr. Corbiere also found letters at the Jesuit archives in Montreal, as, he said, "Our grandfathers used to write in Ojibwe."

Mr. Corbiere also explained more of chieftainship, saying, chiefs of their bands used to call themselves father. All the band was their children. They also had many children. And the chief could not do anything until he met with his council. He would not act without consensus." He also said that Indians were very strict in their ways and told the story of a man named McGregor who came by boat to Manitowaning. "The boat was filled with alcohol," Mr. Corbiere said, "and the young men went out and dumped the liquor. None was to be brought into the harbour."

The story of the Odawa Chief Jean Baptiste was told. He had settled in Wikwemikong and wanted to give the Island to the British. However, the other chiefs would have none of this and Chief Baptiste left and formed his own group with sons and grandsons. Mr. Corbiere mentioned that the Odawa chiefs would wear the feathers of the red-winged blackbird in their hats if they were going to war as these birds can eat poisonous seeds with no ill effects. The chiefs would wear their medals if they were going to Ottawa to complain about certain things. These medals would include ones given to them for their participation in the War of 1812 and later, WWI.

Another very interesting example of chieftainship that Mr. Corbiere talked about was the fact that, in the areas along the North Shore, each band had a territory, one right after another and everyone knew whose land was whose. The land was allotted into districts, each clan had a district headed by a head chief and no one hunted on other lands except their own.

Mr. Corbiere also spoke of the archeology dig done in Providence Bay some years ago. "There is a myth that 100 years ago there were no people here, but I disagree. I am sure there were always people here."

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
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## Lily Fielding donation creates public corridor to Georgian Bay

SUDBURY—Philanthropist Lily Fielding has made a generous million-dollar donation to the City of Sudbury, turning over 300 acres of land on the site of the former Long Lake Public School to the municipality adjacent to Kivi Park, boosting that park to become Sudbury's largest, some 23 times the size of Bell Park and helping to create a public access to three pristine lakes (Crowley, Linton and Camp Lakes) and creating a public land corridor connection to Killarney Provincial Park and Georgian Bay.

"Kivi Park is designed as a destination park for resiand vibrant city.

"The community response to Kivi Park and its long term strategy has been wonderful," said Sudbury Councillor Deb McIntosh, who represents the Long Lake area. "Lily Fielding was inspired by the vision of businessman William F. Bell in the creation of Bell Park, the originators of Lake Laurentian Conservation Area, founding members of the Walden Cross Country Ski Club (WCCS), the dedicated board of Rainbow Routes, and Fielding Memorial Park, which was founded by her husband, Cliff, along with his brothers and sis-

Sudbury into a dynamic year round destination for outdoor adventure and sport tourism.

"I would like to thank Mrs. Lily Fielding for the generous contribution of more than \$1 million to the creation of Kivi Park in the City of Greater Sudbury," said Sudbury Mayor Brian Bigger. "It will continue to further our community's status as a green city and outdoor recreational hub and will be a wonderful active space for our citizens and visitors to the entire region.'

Outdoor enthusiasts will be able to reach the region's most picturesque spots through a series of trail systems for cross country basketball court and sports fields will all be upgraded to provide up to date venues to support active lifestyles, youth and adult sports leagues, up-and-coming high performance athletes and community wellness throughout region."

"They say you spend half your life making money and the other half figuring out how to spend it," said Mr. Wallace. Certainly in the case of the donations to Sudbury and the Northeast Town, it has been money well spent.

Brian Savage, former NHL Star added, "The outdoor hockey rink, soccer field, baseball diamond,



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## Foremost phragmites expert gives talk in Providence Bay

PROVIDENCE BAY—Perhaps one of the nastiest words people have been hearing lately is phragmites. Known as European common weed and phragmites australis, this tall grass-like plant is raising havoc across Canada including Manitoulin.

An information session was held at the Providence Bay community hall on August 9 to outline the destructive nature of this plant. Judith Jones, an environmental consultant from Sheguiandah, and Dr. Janice Gilbert, a wetland ecologist, spoke of the negative impacts phragmites are causing and talked of the solutions to eradicate it.

Ms. Gilbert began to track the plant in 2011 and said, "phragmites are a very serious issue and is Canada's worst invasive plant and is happening all along Lake Huron and Lake Erie shorelines. They are found everywhere except Antarctica.'

Ms. Gilbert explained that these plants spread from seeds and predominately underground through rhizomes and that there can be 20,000 seeds on a phragmite head. The parent stalk has more than one stalk out of it, it does well in ditches and the ph of an area does not matter. It is a strong competitor for nutrients and is allelopathic,

meaning it exudes chemicals from its roots that harm other plants. "There is nothing in the landscape to stop them except us." Ms. Gilbert noted, "You can see the Great Lakes are in trouble and this is a big problem for farmers in southern Ontario. Agricultural drainage ditches are full of this plant."

Ms. Gilbert outlined other concerns, including the loss of recreational opportunities, a negative impact on tourism, a decline in shoreline and also in property values. Other hazards are the blocking of views at intersections, a significant fire hazard and a noteworthy reduction in biodiversity with turtles being particularly susceptible.

There are no natural controls to eradicate phragmites, but three management options were put forth including biological, manual and chemical controls. Ms. Gilbert introduced the audience to the work of Bernd Blossey an ecologist and assistant professor at Cornell University who has an ongoing project titled: 'Developing Biological Control of Phragmites Australis.'

As far as manual controls, there are several, including covering and smothering the plants, drowning them, cut-

...continued from page 19 ting below the water line, which is not a fix, but cutting in July can help. There is also spading and Ms. Gilbert mentioned that the Georgian Bay Forever group of cottagers are working on their lots to remove the plants.

Wherever there are thousands of acres of phragmites, Ms. Gilbert spelled out that there are effective chemicals that can be applied, either by handwicking in which a chemical is applied directly to plants or, an emergency use, the chemicals that the United States does and apply airily. A site specific approach must be used. The removal of the biomass means the improvement of native plant and response.

'We are at the crossroads," Ms. Gilbert told her audience. "We are in

mites are moving north. We need to get a concerted effort going. If we don't destructive activities will become more prevalent." She went on to list several key components that are needed including the use of proper herbicides, public education, sufficient funds for at least ten years from all levels of government, locally driven efforts that focus on a watershed scale and a management plan, and a province wide effort. "You are in a great position on the Island to eradicate this," she added.

Ms. Jones began her talk by saying that she received a little bit of money in 2015 to cut back

serious trouble as phrag- the perennial grass, but realized it was too much for her. She wrote a paper to ask for help and now has hired three people and had monies for backpacks and other items. "This is a large, large grass," she said. "Grass on a beach is not what we are talking about." She went on to say that the western part of the Island is showing a growth of the invasive species and noted that Misery Bay is showing great

growth in two years. Other areas on Island that have phragmites include the mouth of the Blue Jay, Dominion Bay where a control action took place, Lonely Bay, which a phragmite team covered last year, a really bad condition at South Baymouth and Michael's Bay, which Ms. Jones thinks is the worst area.


To remove the plants, Ms. Jones said,"You need to take phragmites high and dry. Do not take it to another spot. Do not take it to a landfill. It's labour intensive, but everything helps. To do seed heads, bend the plant over into large garbage bags and then cut the plant."

In response to a question about what else an individual can do. Ms. Jones encouraged those present to write to their MPs and MPPs. "The more support we have at the provincial level, the better. There are lots of groups working around Lake Huron and community groups are the ones getting things done."

Visitors come from far and wide, from on- and off-Island. Vendors are all locally-based purveyors of the

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

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
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## Mackenzie Gilmore represents Manitoulin

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

Weather support

There are a number of areas of the province experiencing lower than average rainfall this growing season and many crops are stressed due to that lack of rain, including the Manitoulin-West Sudbury Region. OMAFRA and Agricorp are actively monitoring the situation across the province. Business Risk Management programs are in place to help farmers mitigate the risks that may be beyond their control. These programs work together by providing protection for different types of losses, including those resulting from adverse weather conditions. Farmers who feel they may be eligible for support under any of the BRM programs they are enrolled in, should contact Agricorp for further information. Ministry staff are available to provide producers and agri-businesses with advice and information on best management practices to help deal with the impacts of dry weather. Farmers are encouraged to contact the Agricultural Information Contact Centre (AICC) for information on any resources. ministry (1-877-424-1300)ontario.ca/agweatherissues

#### Peach and Pistachio Cobbler

I didn't want to spend the time peeling peaches so I used nectarines and then I switched the pistachios to walnuts. You can use any nut or even pumpkin seeds would work. I substituted half of the white with spelt for added fibre.

- $3/4\,\mathrm{cup}$  sugar, plus more for sprinkling
- 2 tbsp cornstarch
- 3/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 8-10 peaches, peeled, pitted, and sliced 1 inch thick
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup unsalted pistachios, finely chopped
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 3/4 cup butter, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 3/4 cup whole milk

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Grease a 12-inch oval or 9-by-13-inch rectangular baking dish.

2. To make the filling, in a small bowl, stir together 1/2 cup of the sugar, the cornstarch, and 1/2 tsp cinnamon. Place the peaches or nectarines in a large bowl, sprinkle with the sugar mixture, and toss to distribute evenly. Spread the peach mixture in the prepared baking dish and set aside while you prepare the topping

set aside while you prepare the topping.

3. To make the topping, in a large bowl, mix together the flour, pistachios, the remaining 1/4 cup sugar, and the baking powder. Using a pastry blender or your fingers, cut or rub the butter into the flour mixture until the texture resembles coarse cornmeal. Add the milk and stir until the mixture pulls together.

4. Pinch of chunks of the dough and place them on top of the peach mixture, covering it nearly completely.

5. In a small bowl, mix together the remaining 1/4 tsp cinnamon and 1 Tbsp sugar and sprinkle the cinnamon sugar on top of the dough.

6. Bake until the topping is firm and golden brown and the filling bubbles slowly, 45 to 60 minutes. Remove from the oven. Let cool 30 minutes then serve the cobbler with a scoop of vanilla ice cream.

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# L. Manitou Area Association education night focusses on Manitou restoration

SANDFIELD—The Lake Manitou Area Association (LMAA) information and education night took place on Tuesday, August 9 at the Sandfield Community Hall.

An estimated 100 attendees, mostly residents living on Lake Manitou, were present to learn about conservation and mitigation efforts to maintain the lakeshore and underwater ecosystems in the region. Guests speakers of the evening were Clare Nelligan, PhD candidate from Queen's University, and Seija Deschenes, project coordinator of Manitoulin Streams. The discussion topic of the evening was titled 'Secrets from the Depths of Lake Manitou.'

Research by Ms. Nelligan is based off the PEARL Lake Trout Project—a team of an estimated 30 research scientists, post-doctoral fellows and professors that reconstruct the paleoenvironments of inland Ontario waters. Ms. Nelligan's preliminary research studies the presence of nutrients in sediment deposits to determine how climate change has affected Lake Manitou.

Ms. Nelligan's preliminary research found Lake Manitou among several lakes in Ontario that are of significant management concern. Issues includes pressures from increased shoreline development, changes in the hypolimnetic—the dense cold bottom layer of lakes—glass sediments and the hypolimnetic being below the provincial guideline of 7 ppm (parts per million) end-of-summer means volume-weighed. The lake is also experiencing significant algal blooms.

The PEARL research team at Queen's University will continue their field research in further assessing the acidification, eutrophication, contaminants and pollution of Lake Manitou.

Ms. Deschenes from Manitoulin Streams spoke after a short intermission. In her presentation, she proposed creating a cooperative project that would involve locals to rehabilitate the lake's ecosystems with the educational initiatives from Manitoulin Streams. According to Manitoulin Streams research, there are an estimated 850 cot-

tages on Lake Manitou that have an impact on the lake and rivers upstream.

Further suggestions include creating natural shoreline buffers that goes to high water marks and reducing excessive vegetation reduction in lawn care. In cooperation with Manitoulin Streams or Fisheries and Oceans Canada, creating shoreline buffers that suit the homeowner's habitat would diminish erosion and allow for natural self-management of the Lake Manitou lakeshore.

Further suggestions for the project include local business incentives for cooperation or homeowner self-evaluation cards on lakeshore health. Ms. Deschenes is open for public opinion or suggestions in regards to a cooperative lake management project.

The presentations were met with favourable opinions by LMAA meeting attendees. "I am not satisfied with what's happening with the lake," said Mike Costigan Sr., president of LMAA, "but I am satisfied with the information we're getting."

Laurie McCracken, whose family has lived by the lake for 80 years, was happy with the overall work of Manitoulin Streams. "The do a nice job, it is a very good association."

The meeting was adjourned after audience Q&A and doorprize winner announcement

The LMAA was established in 1993 and currently holds 238 members. The non-profit, volunteer-based organization oversees the environmental integrity of Lake Manitou and its surrounding rivers and water systems. The association is a member of the Federation of Ontario's Cottager's Association.

The Manitoulin Streams Improvement Association is a non-profit that integrates community approaches to rehabilitate aquatic ecosystems on Manitoulin Island. They have completed 34 major restoration project around Manitoulin Island's lakes, creeks and rivers, and hold provincial and federal approval to rehabilitate water ecosystems.

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
