Province signs Political Accord with Ontario chiefs recognizing treaty relationship import

Monday the Chiefs of Ontario and the Government of Ontario signed an historic Political Accord at Queen's Park that will guide the relationship between First Nations and the province moving forward.

"This political path forward for First Nations in Ontario is the most important collective milestone in modern times. With this First Nations and Ontario have committed to strengthening a new relationship," said Regional Chief Isadore Day. "I look forward to working with Ontario in developing a comprehensive strategy and framework that will fully utilize this Accord to advance our jurisdiction and Treaty rights on our terms."

In June of 2014 the Chiefs in Assembly mandated a Political Confederacy to establish a task force that would develop a strategic plan to promote a new relationship with the province. The Accord was born, designed to affirm Ontario's commitment to working within a government-togovernment relationship and to further frame their joint priorities and action, a press release from the regional chief's office

Ontario Premier Kathleen

Wynne signed the accord for Ontario, while Chief Day signed on behalf of the Political Confederacy and Chiefs-in-Assembly. The Accord creates a formal bilateral relationship between First Nations and the Ontario government, framed by the recognition of the treaty relationship, press release continues.

The Accord affirms that First

Nations have an inherent right to self-government and that the relationship between Ontario and the First Nations must be based upon respect for this right. The Accord also commits the premier and First Nations' leadership to meet twice yearly in order to further priorities.

Providence Bay phragmites assault planned to defend contentious thistle

PROVIDENCE BAY-Local conservationists, business and resort owners have expressed strong concern about the impact that phragmites pose to the Island's signature beach at Providence Bay (many of whose letters are regularly featured in the comment pages of The Expositor), but recently the beach proponents may have found an unlikely ally in the oft-reviled but endangered Pitcher's thistle.

Invasive species often pose a tremendous threat to native plants, particularly those that are already wavering near the edge of oblivion as endangered. This is the case of the Pitcher's thistle, whose precarious hold on existence is threatened by the European common reed, aka invasive phragmites.

The Pitcher's thistle, often called the dune thistle, is a species of thistle native to sand dune shorelines along the upper Great Lakes and is native to Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and Ontario—notably Manitoulin Island and Providence Bay in particular.

Seija Deschenes, project coordinator at Manitoulin Streams, noted

TORONTO—Crickets remain in the hallways over the fate of Ontario elementary school classes this fall, as the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) will not be heading back to the bargaining table until September 1 with further talks to take place Friday, September 4, just before the Labour Day weekend.

Although there has been no sign of movement in either side's bargaining position, there is some hope illuminated in a statement by Public School Boards Association President Michael Barrett that the resumption of negotia-

MPP fears residency cuts to impact the North

TORONTO—News that the province will be cutting 50 medical residency positions across Ontario landed with a startling thud recently, but it is the other shoe that has Northern medical professionals and politicians on edge.

"Most alarming is that we do not know where these cuts are going to take place," said Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha. "The province made this announcement without any consultation or discussion with the medical field before the decision was made. Now these places are going to be cut and we are concerned that most of them will be in the North."

Mr. Mantha noted that the twoyear residency placements that conclude a doctor's training play a key role in the Northern Ontario School of Medicine's strategy to recruit and retain doctors in the North. Any reduction in those spaces in the North will have a much greater impact than they would if made in the south.

"Any reduction will greatly impact our ability to recruit doctors in the North," he said. "In southern Ontario they have a much easier time attracting doctors and other health professionals. Over that two-year period that the residents work in the North they become more familiar with the North and are more likely to decide to settle down here to practice"

The province is defending its decision to cut the 50 positions,

Northeast Town holds 2016 budget public input session

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town council held a special public input session for the 2016 budget earlier this month. This meeting was a first of its kind for the municipality, as usually a public input session is held earlier in the new year after the draft budget is prepared.

"This is a new concept, holding a public budget meeting prior to the budget deliberations," Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin explained to the small group which had assembled for the meeting. "Staff and council haven't even started on the budget yet, but we wanted to hold this meeting to hear your thoughts and suggestions for the 2016 budget. We are holding this meeting in the summer to ensure that summer residents have the opportunity to voice their input as well."

"This is an excellent opportunity for staff and council to hear suggestion prior to getting into the development to the budget," added CAO Dave Williamson. "Hearing the ideas and suggestions ahead of time will allow us to integrate the ideas into the budget. In the past, public input has always been considered, but as the mayor explained, historically not until after the draft budget was presented."

There were a few ratepayers present at the meeting including Barbara Baker of the Little Current Library board.

Ms. Baker told council that the library board was doing their best to stay close to a two percent increase in creating its budget but was struggling with the loss of two employees, one off due to illness and another retiring.

"The budget might come closer to three or four percent," said Ms. Baker. "But we are doing our best to keep it under that."

Manitowaning youth 'forever changed' by volunteer trip to Africa

MANITOWANING—While other fourteen-year-old youth were hitting the beach, visiting with friends or going on family vacations, Manitowaning's Cassie Kuntsi spent the majority of her summer in a village in the Maasai Mara region of southwest Kenya with the Me to We program building a classroom, hauling water and helping the community.

"The most rewarding aspect of the program was connecting with locals," shared Cassie, "playing with the kids and getting to know the families. The connections I made—I still feel them—they will always be with me."

Cassie said it will be hard to keep in touch as the limited paper and pens the families have are for the children for school, but that she plans to go back and visit.

On July 23 Cassie departed from Toronto to Nairobi, joined by 45 other youths from across Canada and the US.

"We stayed and worked in a village called Olorien," explained Cassie. "We were there for 19 days, building a classroom at an elementary school, carrying water for families (four kilometres) and visiting with the locals. We also went on a safari and vis-

ited a local police station."

The trip has been a dream of Cassie's for a long time.

"I want to make a difference in a community, in the lives of others—I want to change the world, even if it's just a little," Cassie told The Expositor before she

Meeting Craig Kielburger, the co-founder of Me to We, was also a dream of Cassie's, and one that was fulfilled when Mr. Kielburger decided to join her group.

"It was amazing to meet him," said Cassie. "He was so inspiring and such a great person. When he spoke to us he was so confident and amazing. Later when we actually got to talk to him he was really nice, so interested in what we want to do and very supportive."

The connections Cassie made with the other youth on her trip are something else that she will hold on to.

"I made so many new friends," she said. "The people in my group were amazing and I know we will stay connected for the rest of our lives. We won't ever want to let go of each other because of the experiences that we shared."

The food was something that Cassie found surprising. "I wasn't sure what to expect," said

Educational labour front provides a challenging path

With students getting ready to return to elementary and secondary school following their summer break, it was a relief last week to hear that, at least in provincial issues, the union representing Ontario's public high school teachers had reached a tentative agreement with the Ministry of Education and Training, one that last week was ratified by members of the teachers' union.

That's a relief for it was just last spring when high school teachers from the Rainbow District School Board went out on strike, one of the three boards in Ontario where the teachers' union had decided to make a stand so of course activities at Manitoulin Secondary School ground to a standstill until the teachers were sent back to work following strike-ending legislation passed at Queen's Park.

Premier Wynne's Liberal government did not take this action in a hurry, however, and gave the union almost three weeks to flex its muscles while negotiations continued before forcing the teachers back to work before the end of the school year.

The province's elementary teachers were also in a legal strike position at that time but, strategically, the message was carried on all teachers' behalf to politicians and the general public by the three boards whose teachers withdrew their services.

During most of the summer, information on negotiations at any level was scarce and so the announcements of the successful negotiations by the high school teachers' union is met with much relief and it was encouraging to hear, late last week, the president of the provincial elementary teachers' union congratulating everyone concerned on the successful end of the secondary teachers negotiations. Hopefully they will be making their own similar announcement before long and being congratulated by the high school union.

This is, in effect, a first contract for both high school and elementary teachers union for it is the first time that all issues have not been negotiated locally and separately on a school board by school board basis.

This time, all contracts are being negotiated simultaneously with the added wrinkle that some issues (primarily wages and benefits) are negotiated on behalf of all local unions by their provincial federation that is dealing directly with the provincial government.

Other issues, including local working conditions, are being negotiated by union locals in discussions with local school boards.

As "first contracts," in labour parlance, are often finalized only after much tough talk and posturing by all sides, it would have been more of a surprise if strike action had not figured at some time during negotiations. It was also prudent for the Wynne government to recognize this and to allow the walkout to continue for a representative period before enacting its back-to-work legislation.

For their part, the politicians in government at Queen's Park have a delicate road to tread for Premier Wynne has firmly promised tax-payers that there will be no public sector wage increases until her government is able to present a balanced budget.

In speaking of the recent successful talks with the high school unions, the premier vaguely explained that wage and benefit increases would not be funded by tax increases but, rather, money to meet this new obligation would come from savings realized in other areas.

It is not clear whether these funds would come from clawbacks in other areas of education funding or from other areas entirely. That will be a challenge left for Ontario Treasurer Dwight Duncan and we may learn something of it when he presents his next budget.

Education support workers, largely represented by Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE), are also seeking a new contract so this year is an interesting one, a unique one, for the Ontario government. It was, however, their idea to take on the role of employer and to negotiate the big ticket items with all teachers and all at the same time.

This is how Ontario has always dealt with its community college staff, both academic and support, and there have, memorably, been several system-wide strikes during this bargaining history.

The success of the negotiations between Ontario and its high school teachers is an important signal, especially to parents with children in school, that agreements will also be reached with elementary teaching staff and with the school's support staff.

In any event, it's a welcome 'back to school' gift to parents who had spent the summer worrying about what might happen when school resumes after Labour Day and while nothing is certain until union members vote and agreements are announced, we can rest fairly easily that, for this cycle of contracts, we have seen the end of major work interruptions.

At last...an article acknowledging Samuel Champlain's contribution to the exploration and knowledge of Canada ('400 years ago, Champlain's first European contact with First Nations in Georgian Bay met sound society,' August 12, Page 1). I am truly thankful that Alicia McCutcheon and Shelley Pearen have published this ground-breaking historic fact, long suppressed.

Champlain was the only and the first explorer forging strong links between European people (it didn't matter what nationality they were, Champlain welcomed them all) and the native peoples living in North America at the time. He was, up to then the only colonizer to succeed in establishing a colony, both in Nova Scotia and Quebec because he respected native people, learned from them and was willing to work with them. He never underestimated them as so many have done since, including today.

Native people already had a strong agricultural economy which he was quick to recognize. He envisioned working together to produce a new society based on the best of both. It was this cooperative spirit that impressed early native people to the point that Champlain's oral history among them, lasted for many years after his death. It was too bad that successive leaders did not seize on his early success with them but they were dismissive of French and Native people in general.

I refer anyone interested in this subject to a wonderful book by David Hackett Fischer, 'Champlain's Dream.' It extensively researches his life and first opened my eyes to how influential and far seeing this great man was for those times. He truly deserves to be known as the father of Canada.

anada. Also, North American foods revolutionized the European diet with tomatoes, potatoes, squashes and so many other foodstuffs that Europe that it had a permanent effect on their diet. Their contributions meant more storable foods, especially potatoes, meaning people had a better survival rate over the winter. People there had had to rely on gruel to subsist over the winter whose storage capabilities were not great. That fact alone means we owe native peoples a huge debt.

Audrey 'Toots' McDermid

Toots spent much of her working life involved in Manitoulin's friendly hometown retail business, McDermid's Home Hardware in Providence Bay. She started the first figure skating club on the Island, was Citizen of the Year, a Red-Hatter, wrote community news from Prov for The Expositor and fundraised for the Manitoulin Health Centre Auxiliary. "I have always enjoyed meeting and helping people from all walks of life. So many visitors came to our family hardware store in Providence Bay. I thoroughly enjoyed finding out what part of the Canada or the world

they had come from. That was usually ascertained before we found out what they actually needed in the store.

McDermid's Home Hardware Store became the unofficial gathering place for Providence Bay. The store boasted everything from boards to butter. Nails, nickknacks and birthday gifts were available too. You could find stuff you wouldn't find anyplace else in the world, and you might be

assisted by the patriarch, Murray's dad (the late J.F. McDermid). Neighbours ran into neighbours as well as a few strangers each summer. You were taken back to a

gentler, more nostalgic time. McDermid's and Buie's Groin Spring Bay became anchors for the writer's family each summer, arriving from either Windsor at first and later from Edmonton to build a little more of a cottage. It was a place to catch up on local happenings. The writer recalls browsing through the gift isles while hubby was in the back ordering important stuff from the lumber yard.

When the McDermids retired in 2006, three generations of their family had been in the hardware business. Murray had taken over his dad's store at 17. At that time, all items arrived by boat. A lot of hard work over the next five decades had Toots declare "Glory Halleluiah, I won't have to do this again." when she locked up the store for that last time in 2006.

"My maternal grandparents were Pennsylvania Dutch. My mother was just two-and-a-halfyears-old when her mother died. Audrey Leola Lockyear was born to Anne May (Cockle) and Clifford Lockyear on October 13, 1927. "My grandfather spoiled me. He lovingly called me 'Toots,' which he could recall eminently better than 'Audrey.' Nobody knew me as Audrey. Grandfather remarried and, later, I used to visit my grandmother and help her with little

tasks, like watering her plants."

"Going back, my first memory is struggling to get up and move on the ice wearing my dad's hockey skates. My foot was lost in the cavernous boot. Remaining upright enough to propel myself forward was a challenge. Thankfully Santa brought me some skates that Christmas." Toots shares the story of her brother Floyd who decided to find his father at the skating arena. Confusion reigned when he encountered a team of fathers, all dressed alike in hockey gear. "Which one of you is my dad?" he blurted out. Laughter was the response until the 'real dad' skated forward.

"I really didn't want to go to school on my first day and this fear was compounded when mother threw a broom at me. 'This is for good luck,' she insisted. It turned out that school was not as bad as I thought. I liked handwriting the best." However, her enthusiasm may have waned when the teacher declared, "You are a wonderful writer, but your sister Betty is smarter.'

Little Toots was slapped once by her teacher when she tried to answer another student's question. "Both he and I got the strap but he cried and I didn't." Toots and a friend managed to hide the strap twice but the teacher always found it again and seemed to suspect, correctly, the identity of the guilty parties.

'I really wanted to be outside to play sports." Gymnastics and baseball were favourites. "I was good at running and hitting the ball but not so good at catching. One day, in Grade 8, I was asked to be an extra for a softball game in Mindemoya. They put me out in center field and in no time a hit ball was coming straight for me. I panicked, 'I can't do this,' I thought, but I held out my glove and closed my eyes." Somehow the ball hit the glove which led to tumultuous cheering and hugging from the team.

Dad Clifford was the supervisor

at Morley Richie's Grocery store in Little Current. The TD Bank is located in the same spot today. "My dad would come home and tell us the day's events. I just loved to hear those tales. At 15, I decided

to quit school and follow in my father's footsteps, but mother adamantly refused." In the early 1940s, some of Toots friends left to serve the country. "I was too young for that too and neither of my parents would sign a paper saying I was 18," Toots shared. "My dad told me he had lost a brother in the war and he didn't want to lose his daughter too."

At 16, Toots got her wish. She was hired as a clerk for Elmer

Vincent's Fairway Store in downtown Little Current for a dollar a day. At 14 she had gone into his store and asked for work. He told her to come back at 16; she did and was hired. "I loved being a jack of all trades, meeting customers, stocking shelves and running the cash.'

Murray McDermid had accompanied his friend Walter Frank to Little Current. The Frank family had just bought the old McDougall Hotel and Walter wanted to visit the site. Murray Toots and Donna spotted McDougall, whom he knew. He asked the girls if they wanted to go for a ride. While the boys were trying to figure out who would sit in the back and who would sit in the front, Donna and Toots both got in the back. The foursome drove to the docks where they had fun chatting and getting to know each other. Toots and Murray soon paired off and Murray would visit Little Current weekly to see his sweetheart.

Murray thought Toots was cute and very compatible. "I thought he was really nice and very polite," Toots holds. There was another young man interested in Toots but Murray won her heart. I remember the day he proposed. We were under the willow tree at home on Vankoughnet St. I hesitated a little with my response because I had wanted to wait. Murray nervously asked again, 'Well?" Toots knew in her heart that she wanted to be his bride, so she said yes, much to Murray's relief. The ring would come later.

Toots was an excellent figure skater and several girls asked her to teach them. She happily agreed and the first Manitoulin Figure Skating Club was begun. "We put on quite a show in Gore Bay. Tommy Porter helped set up the event." As more students came on board, clubs were spread to other communities. Several communities began to put on shows and Toots was in heaven with the success of her protégées. In 1949-1950, a new rink went up in Providence Bay with Murray's father J.F. McDermid the driving force behind the new facility.

That same summer of 1949, Murray was asked by a Brooklyn Dodgers scout to come to Fort Erie for a try-out. He travelled to the Dodgers farm team camp and spent an exciting time, mixing with the big wigs of baseball. Later he was sent to New York to play with the Dodgers. He was the first person from Manitoulin to do so.

Toots was still working for Elmer Vincent. After six years of employment, Elmer decided she could help with the window displays. He offered to send her to Toronto to take a display course, all expenses paid. Toots was flattered but she had to decline. She told Elmer that Murray was coming home from baseball camp and they were to be married. The girls in the store began to tease her about marrying the ball player from Providence Bay.

That September, just before the wedding, there was an exhibition game between Copper Cliff and Little Current. Uncle Stanley Bailey, an old ball player living at Murray's family home, had asked to come. He had taught his nephew a lot and wanted to see Murray pitch the game. Up at bat, Murray hit a home run that brought in three runners: Larry Frank, Lyle Chemsley and Murray himself. Uncle Stanley Bailey got so excited he suffered a sudden heart attack and died. Murray, deeply saddened and upset, could not continue with the winning game despite appeals that insisted his uncle would have wanted him to finish the game.

The September wedding was postponed to October out of respect for Uncle Stanley. Soon an aunt on Toots' side passed away and the wedding was rescheduled again, this time for November 16, 1949. "The boys all wanted to know why I would schedule a wedding during hunting season,' Murray recalls. "I told them I could always get a four-legged deer but I didn't want to lose my two-legged deer." The wedding was kept small out of respect for the recent deaths. Although only a few were invited, the couple found that the whole church was packed with people, both upstairs and downstairs. A dinner for family was held in the Little Current United Church hall.

Murray took his new bride to New York to show her where he was playing ball. The couple moved state-side to Hornell, New York in 1950. They made lots of friends there. Ball players seemed to attract acquaintances so Murray got to know two catchers quite

On March 8, 1950, Murray found out his dad's store had burned down. It was not clear how the fire had started but it could have been an electrical issue or it might have been a chimney that had only a single wall of cement board between it and the building. The wall could have cracked and spewed hot timbers into the building. Mike Smith rushed to bring the portable water pump to the site, but it was too late to save the store. To make matters worse, Murray's dad had accidentally insured one of his two sites twice but this confusion meant there was no insurance on the building that burned. An appeal was made to the insurance company and eventually they paid the claim which was used to build an addition to the existing store.

In 1951 Murray's dad began to have a lot of migraine headaches so Murray felt he should stay home that fall. A terrible accident ensued. "I fell off the back of our delivery pick-up truck, in transit,

and hit my shoulder and my head on the hard road surface." A float plane took him from Mindemoya to Sudbury and then he was transported to Toronto. "I was in a coma for two weeks," he shared. He smiled, adding, "I was told that young Art Oakes had come along with his dad, also named Art, had taken a look at me lying on the road and declared, 'I think the b--is dead' and he was nearly right." Art shared this light moment with Murray after his recovery.

Toots recalls walking into his Toronto hospital room, afraid of what she might see. As the door opened and Toots tentatively peeked in, she heard a resounding "hello Hon." Murray was smiling and sitting up, watching the Grey Cup parade on television. Toots was terribly relieved as she wiped a tear from her eye. "The doctor asked me if Murray was an athlete and I told him yes." He responded, "He must have been or he would not have survived.'

Murray's baseball career was over but his career in merchandising was about to kick up a notch. He and his father expanded the business to include building materials and lumber. Toots began to work in the store as well. In 1953, daughter Sally Denise was born. She was a big baby. Her size and the forceps used for her birth resulted in a broken tail bone. Dr. McQuay was assisted by Dr. Bailey. Murray recalls his first magic look at his daughter. "I remember Maude Galbraithe, the nurse, holding her up for me to see." It had been such a challenging birth that Dr. Bailey told Toots he hoped he wouldn't see her for another 10 vears!

"I waited eight years for my son Jamey to be born, so we came close to that goal." Jamey was a smaller baby and both Dr. McQuay and Dr. Strain from Gore Bay helped with the delivery. The morning he was to be born, Toots was scheduled for a C-section. At the same time, a terrible accident happened just outside Providence Bay. A German couple had rolled their car. Their Volkswagen was upside down in the ditch and the lady was trapped inside, unconscious. Murray drove to the scene and saw Dr. McQuay arriving. He quietly asked if he had started the C-section yet and Dr. McQuay said no, he hadn't, much to Murray's relief. Murray helped to get the lady out and they loaded her into a station wagon heading for Sud-

bury, but she died on the way. Later, the husband remarried and he is now buried in the local cemetery between his two wives.

"My favourite season is winter, when we married and when we visited the Barbados. We must have been there at least 40 times. One time, walking down the beach, we saw one of the Tenors of the 'Four Tenors.' Luciano Pavarotti, I think. I actually said hello to him and chatted for a few minutes. The following year when I ran into him again, he remembered I was from Canada. I like summer too because it's warm outside and I love the beach."

"Murray was a member of the board of directors for all Home Hardware Stores in Canada for 29 years. Every summer, we went to Home Hardware meetings. We visited all the provinces in Cana-

Charges and calls for **OPP** service down from Haweater 2014

During the holiday weekend, from Friday, July 31 to Monday, August 3, Manitoulin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers were busy responding for calls for service. Over the threeday weekend OPP responded to 89 calls for service, reports Constable Allan Boyd, Community Services Officer with the Manitoulin OPP.

"The Civic Holiday weekend is our busiest time of the year and the amount of people attending the Island reflects the needs for police assistance and response. Out of the 123 calls Islandwide, 89 were in the Little Current area during the Haweater Weekend festivities, which is a decrease of 21 calls for service from 2014. Haweater draws crowds of upwards of three to five thousand people with all the great events that weekend has to offer. With this amount of people the calls for service definitely increases from the rest of the year, however I am pleased to report that no major incidents took place and we had no alcohol related motor vehicle collisions." The OPP is also pleased to report that there were no disturbance calls at any of the venues.

S/Sgt. Kevin Webb, detachment commander for the Manitoulin OPP, thanked the organizers, the Little Current Lions Club, and all the volunteers with the Haweater event. "Their efforts made this Haweater Weekend a success. Police presence is an extremely important function insuring everyone has a safe and enjoyable weekend. It also shows anyone intending to cause any problems that the OPP is ready to respond. Strict enforcement has ensured that families attending these functions feel safe and makes it enjoyable for everyone. We had a reduction in officers this year due to the decrease of problems from previous years, however we made sure that each officer on duty was visible in the communities. I am pleased to report this has paid off making this Haweater Weekend a quiet and safe one. We will continue to take an analytical approach to the level of response needed for this event, with a strategic response to public safety within our communities and on our roadways. waterways and trails."

The following is breakdown of total patrol hours for the four-day weekend by all officers: cruiser patrol, 150.75 hours; ATV patrol, 24.75 hours; bicycle patrol, 12.50 hours; and foot patrol, 17.50 hours.



MANITOULIN—Manitoulin women baseball players from across the Island united this summer, casting aside years of friendly community competition to join forces as one team, 20 Shades of Grey, representing Manitoulin Island in the Espanola Slo-Pitch League. 20 Shades of Grey was the only team in the league from Manitoulin and showed the league what Island women are made of when they took home the second place title of the A division championships this past weekend.

"The last couple of years Manitoulin women's fastball just wasn't going as well as previous years," explained 20 Shades of Grey player and manager Kendra Madahbee. "The league folded last year because ladies just weren't showing up consistently."

"I learned about the Espanola Slo-Pitch League and took it upon myself to try something different," continued Ms. Madahbee. "Teresa Recollet told me about the league and spoke on my behalf at the spring league meeting about a Manitoulin team joining the league. From there, we joined the Facebook group and got involved."

Ms. Madahbee said that she was able recruit 18 women for the league and that the team was also successful in fundraising the \$1,200 league fee to cover the cost of the baseball fields, balls and end of the year tournament and

"We had players from Gore Bay, Mindemoya, Aundeck Omni Kaning, Little Current, Wikwemikong, Manitowaning and M'Chigeeng," shared Ms. Madahbee. "The girls' backgrounds all varied with some having a history of playing slo-pitch and others fastball, but we all came together

and worked well as a team. My dad Duke Madahbee also came on board mid-way through the season as coach, which was great."

Travelling to Espanola or Sagamok for one to two games each week, 20 Shades of Grey played 22 games, accumulating 37 points, 18 wins, three losses and one tie.

Their high number of wins earned the Manitoulin ladies a place in the A division round robin leading up to the league championships with the team winning three and tying one of their five games.

"In the championships this past weekend we won our first game against Nick's Cat House 21 to 4," Ms. Madahbee said. "Our second game was against the Sagamok Gunners and we won 10-5. In our final championship game against Dan's Towing we unfortunately lost 11-7."

"I am really glad we got involved," said Ms. Madahbee of the league. "It was a good experience to all come together from across the Island and represent Manitoulin. We are looking forward to the 2016 season and another shot at the championship. We had a lot more interest from other Island ladies half way through the season, so I strongly recommend anyone else who is interested on Manitoulin to look into forming a second team—you only need 10-13 ladies on the roster."

EDITOR'S NOTE: This spring, the Manitoulin Nature Club launched a Notable Trees of Manitoulin (NTOM) initiative to catalogue significant trees of Manitoulin Island. This distinction is also used to describe trees present at key historical events or events specific to a particular person such as a wedding or engagement. Notable trees can include notable specimens because of their size, form, shape, beauty, age, colour, rarity. genetic constitute or other distinctive features. They can also include living relics that display evidence of cul-

tural modification by aboriginal or non-aboriginal people including having strips of bark or knot-green wood removed, test hole cuts made to determine soundness, furrows cut to collect pitch or sap or blazes to mark a trail. As well prominent community landmark trees, trees associated with local folklore, myths, legends or traditions or specimens associated with an historical person, place or event also qualify for nomination.

The Expositor will be following this initiative and will be highlighting a selection of these nominated trees and sharing the special stories behind them.

MISERY BAY—Mary Hastings of St. Louis, Missouri has been coming to Mani-toulin since the '80s with her husband Jim to his family's Lake Kagawong home (which has been in the Hastings family for 60

"About 9-10 years ago we started volunteering at the Misery Bay Provincial Park and joined the Friends of Misery Bay (FOMB)," said Ms. Hastings. "I've led hikes for several years and now we volunteer at the visitors centre on weekends throughout the summer."

"I decided to nominated the striped maple tree because it is not a well known or common tree on Manitoulin," she shared. "It is tucked away right next to the visitors centre so individuals who can't make the trail can see it

"Misery Bay is a special place on Manitoulin," Ms. Hastings said. "It is beautiful and there is so much to see and learn from the nature and wildlife there."

According to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) the striped maple (acer pensylvanicum) grows in central Ontario, from Toronto, east to Ottawa and north to Sault Ste. Marie, as well as the Bruce Peninsula and Manitoulin. It is also known as moosewood and moose maple.

It is a small deciduous understory tree, growing between 5-10 metres tall with a trunk up to 20 cm in diameter. It is distinct because of its green and white striped bark. The tree features large, wide leaves with three main lobes and its flowers and seeds hang in long clusters which mature in the fall.

...continued from page 1 that phragmites had been determined to be a threat to the Pitcher's thistle. "We held a stakeholders' meeting to try to determine 'how we start combating phragmites'," she recalled. "(Local biologist) Judith Jones had some funding for where phragmites was going to overwhelm the Pitcher's thistle."

The Town of Central Manitoulin threw in another \$1,000 and the war chest was in place—but combating something like phragmites is far from an easy task, physically, environmentally and above all, bureaucratically.

Chemicals that are effective in combating phragmites over water are not licenced for use in Canada, and even those that are used on land have strict requirements—not just anyone can wield the spray wand, it must be a specially-licenced technician.

"It can only be on land and they have to hand-wick the plants," said Ms. Deschenes. "Judith did amazing work in filling out the paperwork, getting together the permits and dealing with the Ministry of Natu-Resources and Forestry.'

there are Although undoubtedly hundreds of willing volunteers ready to lend a hand to save the beaches from phragmites, because of the need to use chemical methods and the fact that only specially licenced personnel can apply the chemicals, the best thing one can do is stay out of the way.

"It is particularly important to keep dogs from running through the area, but if there are lots of people around it will slow down the process as well," noted Ms. Deschenes. "It would be best if people just stay back and let the licenced people do their jobs.'

Since there are no overwater chemicals licenced for use in Canada, dealing with patches of phragmites that have been overtaken by rising lake levels the require a more innovative approach.

Ms. Deschenes explained

that a recent seminar on a pilot project at Dean's Bay given by wetland ecologist Dr. Janice M. Gilbert provided a guidepost for dealing with submerged plants. Since phragmites need access to air to survive, teams of reed combatants armed with sharp spades head out into the water to cut the plants off just above the roots. Unable to access air, the plants literally drown. "It should suppress the plants," noted Ms. Deschenes.

Hitting the patches of phragmites now, before they are more established, is a key part of any strategy to deal with the beach and stream choking plants.

In the past, conservationists have expressed concern that provincial governments have already thrown in the towel. But there have been some successes in limiting the impact of phragmites when concerted action is taken in a region.

Although phragmites would not normally be seen as falling within the perof Manitoulin Streams, the threat the impact on fish and other aquatic creatures' habitat posed by phragmites tends to make dealing with the issue everyone's problem.

"The signing of this Accord represents a renewal of the relationship between the First Nations and Ontario and is an important step in the ongoing revitalization of First Nations communities," states Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne. "Most of all, it is an opportunity to make a real difference in the lives of peoples across the province, and to start to build a better future for our children and grand-

Minister of Aboriginal Affairs David Zimmer said, "The signed political Accord is the culmination of months of negotiation between our government and the Chiefs of Ontario. I'm proud of my ministry's role in this historic agreement, and our government's commitment to working together with First Nations in a spirit of mutual respect

Madahbee told The Expositor that the signing of the Accord helps to elevate discussions to higher level tables and gives the opportunity for a more regional approach with more focussed discussion.

Grand Council Chief Madahbee said he and the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) would be holding its own meeting with the premier and eight or nine cabinet ministers today, Wednesday, August 26, at Fort William First Nation near Thunder Bay. The UOI has been developing thier own relationship building documents with the province, which this meeting is in aid of. The Political Accord, however, complements the UOI's work of a number of years with the province, he added.

We're optimistic we've got a premier and her cabinet that are listening and can make some progress," Grand Council Chief Madahbee concluded.

Although the agreement has yet to be ratified (it will go before the teachers for ratification sometime in September) media reports indicate that the province stepped back from a number of demands that had proven to be deal killers in reaching an agreement.

Under the tentative agreement, OSSTF members will see a 2.5 percent increase over the next two vears and a onetime lump sum of one percent for all teachers and occasional teachers for the upcoming year, a .5 percent salary increase "for teachers and persons of responsibility" halfway through the 2015-2016 school year, to be followed by a one percent salary increase in September 2016.

Government officials assert that the agreement meets the criteria of a "net zero" contract where any increases in wages would be offset by other cost sav-

Under the agreement, OSSTF members will be allowed to take sick leave medical or dental appointments, while longterm substitute teachers will double their maximum allowable sick days from 60 to 120. In addition, teachers will get one additional professional activity day. The teachers' union also secured wiggle room in professional judgment, includthem about any changes to student grades.

Management backed off on meddling with a number of items the union was adamant be kept at current levels: the amount of time they're required to spend supervising students outside of class and class size limits, which the province and boards had wanted to remove entirely.

"Miigwetch to our special guests who have joined us today," said Wikwemikong Tourism Manager Luke Wassegijig. "Like Chief Peltier said, today has been a long time coming."

Mr. Wassegijig explained that in 2007 the Wikwemikong Department of Lands and Resources began this project at Point Grondine to capitalize on the overflow from Killarney Provincial Park.

"In 2010 we looked at a plan and created a partnership with Georgian Bay Coast Trail," continued Mr. Wassegijig. "We have been working hard these last five years, learning how to build trails and training staff. We now have a quality product and our trail staff are now at the point where they are training other First Nations across province.

"We are here today to celebrate the opening of the park and 21 km of back country trails, including Merv's Landing, a five kilometer loop, and the 15 km Wemtagoosh Falls Loop, as part of the Georgian Bay Coastal Trail," added Mr. Wassegijig.

Chief Peltier and Mr. Wassegijig presented a paddle to the mother and sister of the late Merv Pitawanakwat, Rosa and Jean Pitawanakwat. Merv was a dedicated worker on the trail that is named in his memory.

They also presented a gift to Colleen Wassegijig-Migwans, manager of Wiini n'guch-tood (the Wikwemikong Development Commission) for the organization's support.

"For the more adventurous outdoor enthusiast, the Wemtagoosh Falls Loop is a self-guided hike that will take you into the interior of Point Grondine Park for an overnight adventure along the Georgian Bay Coastal Trail. The trail begins at the park trailhead at Merv's Landing and has a water crossing at the Mahzenazing Lake via a self-propelled raft called the 'water spyder."

education workers is being taken seriously. Our members have been without a contract for a year. All education workers deserve respect."

CUPE represents education workers such as educational assistants, office administrators, custodians, tradespeople, instructors, library technicians, early childhood educators, IT specialists and speech pathologists, among many others.



Assiginack Council Notes

Michael's Bay Road deputation

The August 18 meeting of Assiginack council began with a deputation from Michael's Bay Road Manitowaning residents Louise Begin and Laura Markley whose homes are located on Michael's Bay Road in the town. They presented council with a petition on the maintenance of their road.

"The sewer line went in a few years ago," the petition states. "Since that time, the road has sunk significantly where the sewer line is. We request that the mentioned portion of Michael's Bay Road be brought up to

The petition, signed by 16 residents, goes on to note the "deteriorating patchwork, sunken sections and potholes" leading to Sunova Beach Road.

Ms. Begin noted that work has since begun on the road since the petition was signed, thanking council, noting that there is still a large dip in the road that needs to be fixed. Councillors Hugh Moggy and Leslie Fields both acknowledged the dip, stating that they had both, individually, taken a drive along the road since receiving the petition.

Paul Moffat Mayor explained that the road is a line item in next year's budget.

"Besides road maintenance, what do we get for our taxes?" Ms. Begin asked.

CAO Alton explained that besides road maintenance taxes pay for police, ambulance, fire protection, property assessments, social services, the landfill, library and education, among other things.

Public Works Superintendent Ron Cooper explained to Ms. Begin that on the Assiginack website there is a place to punch in your annual taxes which will then give you a com-

plete breakdown of what those taxes go toward. "It's a nice little feature," he

New ice rental rates

Council passed a motion to approve the new ice rental rates for the Assiginack arena. The hourly ice rental rate for regular and private users is set to increase by 2.11 percent. The hourly rates for regular users will go from \$65 to \$66.37 while for private users the rate will increase from \$85 to \$86.79. The reason for the increase is to closer align with the increase in hydro costs.

Councillor Moggy said he received a concerned phone call from a parent saying the rates were too high as it was. The mayor said he too received a call about the increase in rates.






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

Ignite our Vote encourages First Nations youth to cast ballot on October 19

by Alicia McCutcheon WIKWEMIKONG—As the arena hall began to fill last Tuesday night for Wik-wemikong's first Ignite our Vote event, Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing NDP incumbent Carol Hughes Liberal candidate Heather Wilson chatted amicably about upcoming all candidates' nights on the election circuit, waiting for their turn at the microphone and a chance to share their parties' platforms before the large, and eager to learn, crowd.

It was thanks to Wikwemikong youth Gerrilynn Manitowabi that her first Ignite our Vote event was such a success. The event, emceed by her father and former chief, Wally Manitowabi, was designed to encourage First Nations people, particularly youth, to get out and vote in the upcoming federal election on October 19 and "have a say and effect change in the government to come."

Mr. Manitowabi began the evening's events with a presentation on how the federal government works, explaining that Canada's government is based on the British parliamentary system. He then gave an overview on how elections work, the number of seats in the House of Commons and how majority or minority governments are formed.

"It's your vote for who will do the best job in the riding, but also for what their party stands for," Mr. Manitowabi explained, "especially as it relates to First Nations people—not just relating to the last term of office, but historically."

Manitowabi also explained the new Fair Elections Act and how it pertains to First Nations people who sometimes don't have photo ID and would rely on the vouching system, which has since been abolished under the new act. She gave great detail as to how one can get on the voters' list and what pieces of ID one needs to vote and how one can go about getting ID, such as the Ontario photo ID card for those who do not have a driver's licence.

Can First Nations votes make a difference? the father and daughter duo posed the question. It certainly can

According to the Assembly of First Nations there are 51 swing ridings in the country that could go any way based on the First Nations vote, among them Algoma-Manitoulin-

Kapuskasing (AMK). There are also 25 aboriginal candidates Canada-wide. "First Nations participation will make a difference," Ms. Manitowabi said.

By way of example of the power of the First Nations vote, Mr. Manitowabi explained that while former Liberal MP Brent St. Denis was in Ottawa, he had a contingent of chiefs ask him to vote against the First Nations Governance Act, which was seen as a further stranglehold on First Nations self-gover-

nance.

"First Nations leaders fought that legislation as hard as they could," Mr. Manitowabi explained. Mr. St. Denis was challenged to vote against the act with a warning that if he didn't there would be consequences with the loss of First Nation support. He stood by his party and, in the 2008 election, lost to the NDP's Carol Hughes.

In the 2011 election only 44.8 percent of First Nations people voted as opposed to 61 percent of the electorate, yet this is the fastest growing segment of the population, Ms. Manitowabi noted. But in AMK, 49.8 percent of First Nations (17.7 percent of the AMK electorate) voted. In the last election one-third of First Nations people were under the age of 16, meaning that a large number of these individuals are now eligible to vote, the young woman enthused.

"I was 19 in the last election and I didn't vote because I thought it didn't matter," Ms. Manitowabi admitted.

The young woman has since learned that it does matter and shared her own personal reasons for voting on October 19. The first reason is the missing and murdered aboriginal women, and she shared statistics with the crowd on the staggering numbers. Second was water safety, she said, noting "how lucky we are to live in a community that has its own water treatment plant." Her third reason is poverty and the many communities that live in thirdworld conditions. She cited the statistic that one in four aboriginal children live in poverty while 20 percent of First Nations adults are hungry because they can't afford to buy food. Education is also high on her list of reasons to vote, noting to the audience that First Nations children receive between \$2,000 and \$3,000

less per child from the government than non-First Nations children.

"There are so many reasons we need to get Steven Harper out of government," Ms. Manitowabi said, adding that he's ignored all the things she's just mentioned and cares deeply about.

"Ît's beyond any of us as to why he would refuse to call a simple enquiry," Mr. Manitowabi added, referencing the call for a national enquiry into missing and murdered aboriginal women. He went on to speak of the post-graduate graduating ceremony held the week before the community's annual powwow and the great successes that could be found there. "Imagine how many more successes there would be if disparity

The floor was then turned over to Carol Hughes, NDP, and Heather Wilson, Liberal. The Conservative Party's André Robichaud was also asked to attend the Ignite our Vote event but declined due to prior engagements.

Ms. Hughes was up first and began by acknowledging the Anishinabek land that they were gathered upon and thanking the community for inviting the candidates to participate and saying what an honour it has been to serve as MP.

"The unique relationship between your nations and Canada is one that demands a different level of attention by any MP whose constituency includes First Nations, and those communities are a defining feature of AMK," Ms. Hughes said. "The primary reason for this is that the relationship is, and must be viewed as, a nation-to-nation relationship."

She said it is "time for the tide to turn" on issues such as poverty, education, photo by Alicia McCutcheon

basic infrastructure and "a justice system that really isn't working all that well for aboriginal communities," as the NDP has watched as these challenges are put off for another day "time and again."

Ms. Hughes also listed statistics for First Nations poverty, education, drinking water and missing and murdered aboriginal

"We have gone through 10 years of Conservative rule which started with some real hope in the form of an official apology to residential school survivors, but it has become abundantly clear that was the highwater mark for the Conservatives," the incumbent continued.

"First Nations should be expected to get the same

results with less and less every year," Ms. Hughes said. "Because less and less every year is exactly what the outcome of the two percent funding cap ensures. It has been in place for almost 20 years and the results are predictable and sobering."

But far from the problems facing many communities, there is also hope, joy, resiliency, determination and, of course, humour, she continued. "I think those qualities are important and must be preserved as the heavy lifting is done to build the brighter future that sees improvements across the board."

If elected, Ms. Hughes said the NDP would call a national enquiry into missing and murdered aboriginal women within 100 days. They would also implement the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples; consult and act on the findings of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission; invest in "essential physical infrastructure work that is also a great stimulator of economic activity;" address the education deficit; and "reject the prescriptive nature that has come to define the relationship between First Nations and Canada."

"New Democrats are committed to working on a nation-to-nation basis to build a respectful and productive relationship that will show to all Canadians that your interests are our interests and that together we can be strongest."

Heather Wilson of the Liberal Party spoke next, giving the audience background on her personal and work life, from farm girl to financial controller with an eye for social justice. "My parents showed me that a passion for what you do and love of family and community is what is important in life," she said.

Following the death of her mother, and just before

the birth of her third son, Ms. Wilson realized that "if you're not doing what feeds your soul you better get doing it." She then went back to school to obtain a degree in English and Women's Studies and then earn a Master's degree in Interdisciplinary Studies with a focus on Gender Equality and Social Justice. "My unique experience in financial administration, human resource management, public relations and social justice is something that I think will serve me well in my entry into federal politics.

"The Liberal Party of Canada, led by Justin Trudeau, believes that Canada only succeeds when we all succeed," Ms. Wilson continued. "This election is about our future, and Canadians know that better is possible. Only Liberals are offering a plan that will deliver growth that works for everyone. Our plan will make a real, positive difference for all Canadians."

The Liberal candidate noted how the week before the event, Justin Trudeau announced in Saskatoon how his government would build a renewed partnership with First Nations that ensures high quality education and economic opportunity for all First Nations. "As the fastest growing demographic in Canada, it is critical to our shared future that First Nations have the same education and economic opportunities as everyone else," she said. "It must be a real priority for the federal government. We will immediately re-engage in a renewed, respectful and inclusive nation-to-nation process with indigenous peoples to advance progress on the issues prioritized by First Nations, Métis and Inuit communities. "We had a cottage up here for years," noted Ms. Greer-O'Leary. "We became quite involved in Knox United Church." Like many small rural churches, the Knox UC congregation was always searching for fundraising ideas, she said. "One day I had this idea." From that euphony was born the dinner mystery theatre.

"The first year we didn't know what to expect," said Ms. Greer-O'Leary. But that first year the performance and dinner sold out, raising a whopping \$1,200 through the 60 people attending the dinner. "We could have sold a lot more tickets.," she recalled. "So the second year we had two nights of performances and raised \$2,900."

The advent of significant surgery last year put this year's performance in doubt. "I had surgery about four months ago and I didn't know how I was going to be able to do it again this year," she said. "I was thinking about what else I could do."

She hit upon the idea of contacting a young Elvis

impersonator. "He was all too glad to help," she said.

With the Elvis to anchor the program, the words began to flow and the ideas took shape. So popular was the idea, this year's tickets "sold out before we could get them printed," laughed Ms. Greer-O'Leary.

She was never a playwright before undertaking this project, confided Ms. Greer-O'Leary. "I had never written a play before," she said. "I just sat down and started writing."

shop owner, was named Ineeda Coffee. "I try to plug local businesses," laughed Ms. Greer-O'Leary.

This year the emphasis is largely on the singing, she said. "Of course if you have Elvis in the building how could it be any other way?"

This year's production is entitled 'Where are You Elvis?' with the namesake actually being a lost horse. The church hall has been renamed 'Knocks Haul' for the event.

Although the single night production has left many would-be audience members disappointed, the playwright suggested they should look forward to next year's production. "We could have sold enough tickets for three nights," said Ms. Greer-O'Leary. As it was, this year was limited to a mere 84 tickets.

Ms. Greer-O'Leary already has the theme "Hunters vs Fishers," she said. "Don't shoot until you see the whites of their tails."

to address the educational, health and infrastructure inequities that aboriginal people currently experience."

Ms. Wilson said her party would also work to return to the principles of the Kelowna Accord that sought to "close the gap" between the aboriginal and non-aboriginal standard of living in Canada.

Last week Mr. Trudeau also announced a plan for \$515 million per year of new investment in core annual funding for First Nations Kindergarten to Grade 12 education, rising to over \$750 million per year by the end of their first mandate. "In addition, we would implement an immediate new investment of \$500 million over the next three years for First Nations education infrastructure," Ms. Wilson continued. "Plus \$50 million to support post-secondary support programs; substantial new funding to promote, preserve and enhance indigenous language and culture; and work collaboratively to include aboriginal and treaty rights, residential schools and the contributions of indigenous people to Canada in classroom learning.'

She added that a Liberal government would also focus on developing a reconciliation framework, holding mandatory annual meetings between the prime minister and First Nations chiefs, while working to implement all of the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission by establishing a National Council of Reconciliation.

"A Liberal government will immediately launch a fully inclusive public inquiry into murdered and missing indigenous women and girls," Ms. Wilson said. "The mandate of such an inquiry will be to recommend concrete actions that governments, law enforcement and communities can take to understanding and solving these crimes. The current government has ignored uncomfortable truths and has done nothing to address the root causes of this national tragedy."

She also spoke of the Liberals' plan to combat climate change and their commitment to protecting our water and environment by increasing the protected marine and coastal areas and reinstating the funding for freshwater research including Northern Ontario's Experimental Lakes Area. Ms. Wilson added that her party would also ensure that the Crown is committed to its constitutional duty to consult

and respect aboriginal people on project reviews and assessments, changes to the Fisheries Act and the elimination of the Navigable Waters Act.

"I am an avid runner, and with a loyal running group we run up to 40 kilometres a week, 12 months of the year," she explained. "I have run the Wiki 10K Road Runner Race for about eight consecutive years now. I am not the fastest runner but I stick with it and complete every race that I enter. Running is a good lesson in politics. It takes commitment, dedication, patience, support and a will to complete the race. I have made this riding my home, and I want you to be proud that your representative in Ottawa has your best interests in mind when it comes to getting the job done."

Following the candidates' speeches Ms. Manitowabi posed questions from the floor that had been written down and placed in a box. Questions included: how the candidates will support Anishinaabe-kwe in keeping our water safe (referencing the water walkers); a commitment to a national enquiry; National Native Alcohol and Drug Abuse Program funding disparity; whether their parties' leaders stood for the freedom of candidates to suggest their own ideas; addressing the high unemployment rate; new schools; funding for First Nations libraries; "how will there be evidence-based decision making over dictatorship in your government": and "what will you do to make sure public servants aren't muzzled?'

Ms. Manitowabi thanked the community for attending the event, encouraging people to spread the word by visiting her Facebook page called Ignite our Vote.

Chief Duke Peltier gave the closing remarks, thanking the candidates for making themselves available and wishing them "the best of luck" on October 19.

"We've heard platforms that will give us some food for thought," the chief said, "now you do have the opportunity to vote."

He encouraged any government to increase the funding for infrastructure. "This is essentially the way forward." The chief noted the age of his community's schools, which aren't deemed a priority to replace, the cuts in funding for new houses and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission findings, language and their relationship with the Crown.

ship with the Crown.

"We need you, as our representatives, to make things right," the chief concluded.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Council holds public meeting for zoning bylaw amendment

The Northeast Town council held a public meeting for zoning bylaw amendment No. 2-32ZBL-15-001 for the Davis McLay Developments (subdivision). Members of the public with input were asked to speak.

The other input came from the applicant, Doug McLay. Mr. McLay explained that the project was ongoing for six years and that he has finally received approval on a six-lot pilot project. He was present at the meeting, he said, to answer any questions.

"What was the Ministry of Environment's concerns with the project?" asked Councillor Laurie Cook.

Mr. McLay explained that the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) has frozen development on Lake Manitou (which the subdivision is on) and that they were concerned with increased phosphorus levels from more septic systems.

"I will prove through the pilot project that with these new special septic systems I am installing that no phosphorus will enter the lake," said Mr. McLay.

"This meeting is to look at changing the zoning from agricultural to shoreline residential," added Mayor MacNevin.

"We are holding this public meeting as part of the process, but council has already commented to the Manitoulin Planning Board that they have no comment or concern with the bylaw amendment," said Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson. "Staff recommends that council defer this zoning issue until the OPA has been signed and approved."

During the subsequent council meeting, council deferred the zoning amendment.

Water treatment report

Mr. Williamson reviewed with council the water treatment plan reports for both the Little Current and Sheguiandah plants.

In his review, council learned that last year, the Little Current plant exceeded its raw water flow (what the plant pulls from the lake) and its daily flow (what it pushes out for distribution).

"The water main break last year and the high use of water last summer for the number of fires (from the arsonist) accounts for these increases," explained Mr. Williamson.

"The Sheguiandah plant is actually only using 10 percent of its raw water flow, which tells you there is room for potential development in the future," said Mr. Williamson.

Mr. Williamson also reviewed that there were a few non-compliance issues, but that they were being corrected by OCWA.

Signage request

Council received a request asking for signage notifying users of the Rockville boat launch that there are blind spots.

Council carried a motion to post signs on either side on each direction of the road by the Rockville boat launch.

Council also received a request for stop signs to be placed at the corner of Park Street and Water Street.

"I have witnessed many times children coming down Park Street towards Water Street to get to the park area travelling high speeds on bikes, skateboards and wagons, without looking both ways when reaching the intersection," wrote Jim McBane to council, suggesting that the town install two more stop signs, making it a three-way stop.

Council carried a motion to place two more stop signs at the intersection.

Library board appointment

The Northeast Town council carried a motion to appoint Nina Coates to the Little Current Library board.

AMO review

Council heard a report from the town staff and council members that attended the recent Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) conference in Niagara Falls.

Mayor MacNevin said that the munici-

pality met with two ministers throughout the conference including the Minister of Aboriginal Affairs David Zimmer for an update on the 1990 land claim and Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) Laurie LeBlanc on the Northeast Town becoming its own planning authority.

"There hasn't been much progress with the 1990 land claim negotiations," said Mayor MacNevin. "During our meeting with the deputy minister (of MMAH) we reviewed our discussions with the past minister and our history with the Manitoulin Planning Board. She explained that the minister wouldn't be in a place to do anything until they receive our report from the MMAH Sudbury District office, which is what we are currently working on."

Councillor Michael Erskine commented that Niagara Falls put on a great reception and that there were a lot of good workshop speakers.

Councillor Laurie Cook remarked that the highlight of the conference for her was the climate-friendly workshop from the minister of environment. "He was a really inspirational speaker," she told the rest of council.

Mr. Williamson said that the most valuable element of the conference for him was the networking with individuals in similar roles as himself in other municipalities and the learning and knowledge that comes from those conversations.

"The workshops were extremely invaluable as well," added Mr. Williamson.

Age Friendly Community Plan

Mr. Williamson updated council on the Age Friendly Community Plan for the municipality. He explained that staff had received six tenders for the plan and that McSweeney and Associates had been the successful bidder of the \$25,000 planning project that the town received funding for.

Mr. Williamson told council that McSweeney is a very reputable firm and has done other age friendly plans before for other municipalities as well as a cultural plan on Manitoulin.

Community services/ public works report

Reid Taylor delivered the community services/public works report to council. He reported that user groups will be using the recreation centre for new programs starting in the next couple of weeks including ballet, martial arts, Sea Cadets and fitness classes.

"Staff are completing maintenance tasks daily and beginning preparations to put the ice in," said Mr. Taylor. "We also have a wedding at the end of this month."

"Spider Bay Marina remains busy on weekends, but downtown dock traffic is slowing down," he added. "Staff are taking care of customers and completing maintenance tasks at both facilities. Many staff will be leaving shortly to return to school. We also have cruise ships coming on August 24, 27, September 1, 5 and 12 to finish the season."

He concluded that the public washrooms and parks are being cleaned and maintained regularly.

Mr. Williamson reviewed the public works report with council as public works manager Gary May was unavailable.

He read that regular maintenance is being done on the roads and that culverts are to be changed on Town Line Road at Bass Lake.

"Also there will be a grade raise in this area," said Mr. Williamson. "Ditching will start in these areas as well where needed in the next week or so. The winter sand tender closed on August 14 and Calvin Pearson was awarded the contract."

It was also noted in the report that landfill operations are going well and that the landfill bulldozer and compactor are still open for bids.

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Lakeview students join Junior Rangers in rehabilitating Manitoulin Streams

M'CHIGEENG—The staff at Manitoulin Streams were kept hopping recently as students from Lakeview School in M'Chigeeng and a group of Stewardship Rangers in Kagawong provided the sweat equity in Island stream rehabilitation projects.

Each year the Grade 8 Lakeview students have initiated working M'Chigeeng Creek flowing into West Bay to restore a portion of the stream for migrating salmon and rainbow trout," said Manitoulin Streams project coordinator Seija Deschenes. "By hand they shoveled gravel and cobble into buckets and placed it into the stream to create spawning habitat for the fish. They also put in constrictors increase the flow of the stream to scour out sediment." But the students didn't stop there, she noted. "They planted 300 trees along the shoreline and conducted a stream cleanup removing wooden pallets, tires and garbage. Great bunch of students to work with!"

Meanwhile, a hardy bunch of Stewardship Rangers were scouring the shores of the Kagawong River below Bridal Veil Falls, digging and pulling out chunks of metal and cleaning up refuse as part of a project on that stream.

"There were so many peo-

ple stopping to congratulate the young people on the work they were doing," noted Manitoulin Streams' Sue Meert. "It was really nice to see young people being given credit for the work they were doing."

"Lots of metal and glass

were removed, and we found a bottle that was dated 1873 with a cork and, we think, booze in it still," said Ms. Deschenes. "We gave it to the museum in Kagawong."


Among the efforts being worked on in the stream at

Kagawong was a cofferdam that was constructed to divert the water down another channel so that construction of the shoreline banks with root wads and boulders could start to take place, explained Ms. Deschenes.

"Construction will take place the rest of this week, and we advise the public to not go past the barriers that we have installed so that they are not within the construction site while the machinery is operating," said Ms. Deschenes. "We also planted 507 trees along the Grimesthorpe Creek, where we are installing fencing to restrict livestock access and are providing a livestock watering ramp."

The hardy Stewardship Rangers were undaunted by the weather. "It was pouring rain that day and the Stewardship Rangers were great, and there was lots of laughter going on as we were drenched by the rainfall," said Ms. Deschenes. "The trees were funded by TD Friends of the Environment."

It is important that onlookers and visitors to the work sites refrain from crossing safety barriers as work must stop when they do and there is much that needs to be done.

Cassie. "It was completely different than North American food. It wasn't even remotely similar, but it was so good. Everything was very flavourful, and they do a lot with what they have."

Cassie said that the overall trip as a whole was life changing.

'It has forever changed me," Cassie said. "The experience has changed the way I look at everything. When we got home I was having lunch with my family, I looked at all the food on the table, and the food we had for eight would have fed 42 of us in Kenya. I've made a point to finish everything on my plate and not to waste anything. I also stagger shower. We did it there and I brought it back as a way to save water. Also, when I do dishes now I only fill the sink a quarter of the way up. We are so fortunate here with everything we have; it's not fair to waste

Before her visit Cassie planned to becoming a neurosurgeon. Since her trip Cassie said she is even more inspired to reach her goal in order to return to Kenya and volunteer as a doctor with Me to We.

"After high school I want to return to Africa and backpack across Kenya, visiting villages like Aloria and reconnecting with everyone," said Cassie. "I also want to return after med school as a volunteer doctor with Me to We and work with Doctors Without Borders."

Back on Manitoulin, heading into Grade 10 at Manitoulin Secondary School, Cassie is planning two speaking engagements this fall to share with Island residents her experience, especially with the many Islanders and busi-



One day I said to them, 'If we don't go now we may as well shut up about it'." They all decided to go, so the trip was arranged and they had a glorious time. The girls saw the Eiffel Tower and the Vatican. A lot of fish was on the menu and the girls noticed that Toots wasn't eating much. "I finally confessed I didn't like fish and they found me alternatives. I found the bedding was crisp and white in Europe. The glass was so clean I nearly broke my nose when I tried to walk through a closed door." The girls laughed and teased her about it for several days.

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
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Visiting Manitoulin?

New Wikwemikong Point Grondine Park

KILLARNEY—The Point Grondine Park officially opened to the public this summer, offering hiking trails, canoeing and camping in Wikwemikong's traditional territory in Killar-

The development of the trails started five years ago, headed by wemikong Tourism Development, and this summer saw the opening of three trails, including a 6 km day loop, a 21 km overnight loop that includes backcountry camping and canoeing and kayaking water trails with backcountry campsites.

The Expositor was on hand for the grand opening of the park and had the opportunity to hike one of the trails and explore the beautiful mountain range.

Merv's Landing, the 6 km looped hiking trail, is self-guided and perfect for a day hike.

The trail leads you to the summit that overlooks the Killarney mountain range. The single track, naturally surfaced trail flows

through hardwood and pine, crossing beaver damns via handcrafted pine bridges, until you reach Recollet's Summit. The view from the top is breathtaking, and interpretive signs along the trail explain the Anishnaabek cultural significance of the trail and area.

The Wemtagoosh Falls Georgian Bay Coast Trail Loop is a 21 km loop which takes you on a self-guided adventure hike and backcountry camping. The trail begins at the trail head at Merv's Landing and includes a water crossing at the Mahzenazing Lake via a self propelled raft, the Water Spyder. It then guides hikers through the interior of Point Grondine Park along rugged trails and pine forests and along the Mahzenazing River to Cedar Lake, with an overnight stay along the Georgian Bay Coast Trail.

The iournev includes a hike along the river to the stunning Wemtagoosh Falls and concludes with a hike along Cedar Lake, down the nar-

row passages to the lookout site at Smugglers Canvon.

For canoe and kayakers, the Kaa-Gaa-Genhs Water Trail connects paddlers to the French River and Killarney Provincial Parks. photo supplied

Beginning at the French River Park at Hartlev's Bay, paddlers make their way to the southern coast of Point Grondine to Collins Inlet with campsites nestled along the sheltered pink granite

This journey follows the historical trade routes of the Odawa of Manitoulin and the French River.

In 2016, the park will expand its offerings to include canoe tripping with routes through the interior of the park, traveling to the eight interior lakes that connect paddlers to Georgian Bay. Construction is underway, with the routes to include

portages and canoe camp sites.

For those looking for guided hikes or other adventures there are a variety of historical and cultural experiences offered through Wikwemikong Tourism, including the 'Making Footprints Interpretive Hike' at Merv's Landing.

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

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

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

"This education experience has a focus on the way the Anishnaabek use plants for utility, edibility and medical purposes," states the Point Grondine Park website. "Our knowledgeable guide Joseph has devoted his life to learn the ways of his people, and through his wealth of knowledge, will connect you with nature by showing you the traditional uses and sciences behind the teachings."

Through the tour, individuals will also learn about fire making, cooking and building a shelter and will walk away with a new understanding and appreciation of Anishnaabek culture.

end until Thanksgiving weekend.

Merv's Landing passes are \$14 for vehicles and \$100 for buses and include access to Mahzenazing Lake.

Kaa-Gaa-Gehns Water Trail permits are \$24 per person/per night and \$8 for youth with school groups/per night.

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Dora Bebamash keeps basket weaving tradition alive

by Betty Bardswich M'CHIGEENG—First Nation people having been making baskets for everyday use for hundreds of years. Here on Manitoulin, Dora Bebamash of M'Chigeeng has been keeping the tradition alive

through a lot of hard work

and a love of the process.

Preparation for the practice begins with the selection of a good black ash tree. Ms. Bebamash was accompanied on this journey with Gene Bebamash, Bert Panamick, Archie Panamick, Bonita Bebamash and a resident of the M'Chigeeng Wellness Centre

"We harvest the tree in the spring," Ms. Bebamash explained, "as the bark lets go easily as the sap runs up the tree. This makes it easy to peel the bark and to make black ash bark baskets for berries. We scout for a good tree about a month before we start the baskets. We probably looked at eight or nine trees over a couple of days to find the right one. We look for the tree, fairly straight and without a lot of knots or branches. If we find one that looks suitable, we take a wedge out of it to see the rings. The thickness of the growth rings should be about the thickness of a quarter or nickel. If they are too thick, they are not easy to work with. If the thickness is too thin, that is not ideal

either. Black ash grows in swampy areas. The tree we chose was on an elders property and we asked him for permission to take the tree. He said yes when we explained what we wanted it for."

In keeping with Anishinaabe culture and tradition, Ms. Bebamash offered thanks to the tree and left semma (tobacco) as a thank you. "You explain to the tree what you are going to do with it," she added. The group also gave semma to the elder as a thank you and in addition gave a beef loin

cut up and packaged in smaller pieces for him.

After the tree is cut down and brought back to Ms. Bebamash's home, the real work begins. "You peel the bark off and then you pound the tree," she said, "and the tree must be pounded over every inch with the blunt edge of an axe, otherwise it cannot be split. Processing is 75 percent of the work. Pounding the tree separates the growth rings. We got four sticks out of this tree and it can take up to 15 hours to pound one stick." Pounding the six foot stick with photo by Betty Bardswich

every part of it touched is hard work and is done to cause thick splints to separate at the annual growth rings. Once the splints are removed from the tree, they are split again to create two splints which are shaved to make them smooth and then used for weaving.

Ms. Bebamash learned basket weaving from Renee Wasson Dillard who resides in Michigan and received that state's Heritage Award in 2010. She is an artist and educator who seeks to keep the aboriginal culture alive and was

invited by Alan Corbiere, who was then the executive director of the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation, to come to M'Chigeeng. Ms. Dillard is also a natural fibre weaver and teaches that art as well.

Ms. Bebamash spent the winter weaving along with Andrea McGraw and Bonita Bebamash and noted that weaving can be done with bulrushes, milkweed and bass wood as well as black ash. "Bass wood she noted, cordage," "makes handles that are stronger than any rope you can buy." Ms. Bebamash also commented that there is a lot of process when you are working with natural elements, but one can see the love she has for this artwork as the baskets she has made include a hamper which took 35 hours to finish from the splints as well as bark baskets with drawings inside and natural fibre baskets. Ms. Bebamash also keeps busy, along with her sister Bonita, making star quilts for members of her family.

To purchase woven baskets visit Ojibwa Cultural Foundation Open Air Market every Thursday.

There is a sober side to consider regarding not only the making of black ash baskets, but most importantly to the health of our forests and community plantings. The emerald ash borer attacks and kills every type of ash tree

and is spreading across the country, including Ontario. According to Ontario's Invading Species Awareness Program, this pest, native to Asia, has killed millions of trees in southwestern Ontario and the Great Lakes states. As its name implies, the borer is metallic green in colour and is about half an inch long. Residents of Ontario are asked not to transfer wood, lumber and wood chips, but rather to use local products. All of southern Ontario as well as areas including Sudbury, Sault Ste Marie and Manitoulin have been deemed regulated areas for this species. Residents of these areas are not to move the mentioned regulated materials without the permission of the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) or could face fines and prosecution.

Sightings of the emerald ash borer should be reported to the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (OMNR) or to the Ontario CIDA office in Guelph at 226-217-8555.

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Billings History Day packs Kagawong Park Centre, twice

KAGAWONG—The decision to hold a matinee presentation of the Old Mill Heritage Centre's popular History Night after it was standing room only last year, thus making it into a 'History Day,' seemed inspired by the time the audience had taken their seats for the afternoon event

The afternoon presentation began with an introduction by sponsor Mani-Expositor representative Michael Erskine, who noted that the Griffon and its fate have providing the paper with an endless source of popular stories. "This is really one story that, as we say in the newspaper industry, 'has legs'," he said. Mr. Erskine congratulated Billings' museum curator Rick Nelson and the museum committee for all of the hard work that they have put into making History Day a resounding success before formally introducing Mr. Nelson to the podium. Mr. Nelson, in his turn, also lauded the work of the museum committee and made special note of the presence of author Buck Longhurst, who had supplied many of the artifacts on display at the back of the hall at the Kagawong Park Centre. Mr. Nelson also thanked the Dutch embassy in Ottawa and their consulate in Toronto for providing artifacts for the display before introducing the afternoon's keynote speakers Great Lakes shipwreck

authors and Griffon researchers Chris Kohl and Joan Forsberg to provide a presentation on the history and significance of the wreck and the strong connection of Manitoulin Island and its claim to be the final resting place of a significant portion of the remains of the first decked vessel to ply all of the waters of the Great Lakes.

In the evening session, Manitoulin Publishing owner Rick McCutcheon provided the introduction, including a brief history of the significance of the wreck to Manitoulin Island.

"When Billings' museum director Rick Nelson called me in the spring to ask me if the paper would like to sponsor this year's History Day, and when he told me the principle theme was going to be "where is the wreck of the Griffon?,' there was no question that we would be involved for the Griffon, from a news perspective, is one of those gifts that keeps on giving," he said. "The Expositor and the Recorder have published countless stories on the historic ship's remains possible local provenance for at least the past 95 years, and people here still read them."

Mr. McCutcheon went on to reference the 400th anniversary of explorer Samuel de Champlain's visit to the region in 1615 and the accomplishments of his fellow explorer Robert de LaSalle, a French adventurer and businessman who built the Griffon for the purposes of expanding trade and dominating the Great Lakes for the French king.

Mr. McCutcheon explored the different attitudes towards colonization we have today and those of his childhood. "Old atti-

tudes die hard," he said, noting how the legacy of colonialism led to the residential schools and, like the Griffon, have led to an endless supply of stories but unlike the fascinating mystery of that tale are "tempered with sadness and melancholy rather than romanticism."

The second halves of the two History Day presentations consisted of a screening of a video production of the museum that highlighted the stories of two Manitoulin Island residents whose perspectives on the war were those of liberator from the skies and insurgent on the ground.

The video, produced by the Old Mill Heritage Centre and directed by Mr. Nelson, tells the story of Dutch resistance member Dennis Zylstra and RAF bomber pilot Don Freeborn, both deceased. Mr. Freeborn was shot down and wounded in his efforts, while Mr. Zylstra lost family members to the occupying Nazi forces. The video was filled with pathos, drama and emotion as the stories of both men were relayed, in their own words, onscreen.

Mr. Kohl's and Ms. Forsberg's book 'The Wreck of the Griffon: The Greatest Mystery of the Great Lakes' is available at the Expositor's bookstore in Little Current, as well as many of the other books written by the couple, including autograph copies of the Griffon book the popular 'The Great Lakes Diver's Guide,' 'The Christmas Tree Ship' and 'Titanic' The Great Lakes Connections'."



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


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Tehkummah Talk and Times



The Last Sunset Concert Series is this Thursday, August 27 at 8 pm at Huron Island Time. Make sure to join us for some fun tunes featuring the


Kagawong Folk Roots Collective with our friends from Kagawong who will be playing in Providence Bay.

Oh so very slowly my heirloom tomatoes are ripping. What this means to me is that I can't do any canning yet but instead I use the tomatoes here and there for a salad, pasta dish or bruschetta. Vine ripened heirloom tomatoes have such an intense flavour that they are great in a summer salad

Heirloom Tomato and Watermelon Salad with Almond Ricotta

This salad is vegan minus the honey and is also very filling because of the nuts. I substituted the almonds with feta cheese. If you have different coloured tomatoes, great, otherwise just use regular red. I didn't have any arugula so I made up the recipe without it and then placed the tomato mixture on top of a bed of leaf lettuce.

1 cup blanched almonds ½ cup water ½ tsp sea salt, divided Pinch of pepper ¼ cup olive oil

- $2\ {\rm tbsp}\ {\rm thinly}\ {\rm sliced}\ {\rm fresh}\ {\rm basil}$
- 2 Tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 1 clove garlic clove, minced
- 1 tsp honey or maple syrup
- 3 cups cubed seedless, watermelon flesh 1 each red tomato, yellow tomato, and
- orange tomato, cut into wedges 2 cups arugula

For almond ricotta, place almonds into small bowl and add enough water to cover them. Let soak for 2 to 3 hours or overnight. Strain water from nuts and place them in a food processor with ¼ tsp salt and pinch of pepper; blend until contents resemble ricotta cheese.

For dressing, whisk together oil, basil, vinegar, garlic, honey, remaining salt, and pepper until combined.

Place watermelon, tomatoes, arugula, and dressing in medium-sized bowl and

Garnish with almond ricotta or feta cheese by placing small dollops on salad.
