Construction to start on new OPP headquarters next spring

MANITOULIN—The date for construction to begin on the new Little Current Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment building has been set for April 5, 2019.

Brent Ross, communications branch with the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services, explained, "the new OPP detachment for Manitoulin Island for which funding of \$20 million is being provided, is to be constructed on 488 Boozeneck Road in Little Current (Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands) beginning April 5, 2019 and is to be completed by July 15, 2020."

"That's great news," said Manitoulin-Espanola OPP Detachment Commander Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb when contacted by The

Expositor. "I think it's positive now that we have a date and can start moving forward as to getting

Prediction is that invasive species will be established in Lake Huron within a decade

GREAT LAKES—Invasive grass carp pose a major threat to the Great Lakes basin; with experts warning the species will become established in Lake Huron in 10 years, opinions are strongly divided as to the best ways to deal with the threat, as well as the tactics agencies are using to manage these fish that belong to the Asian carp family.

Mary Muter, chair of the Georgian Bay Great Lakes Foundation, raises strong concerns in a press release her organization had published on July 25. She criticizes the Ohio and Michigan Departments of Natural Resources (DNRs) for their ongoing efforts to catch Lake Erie grass carp, implant them with tagging devices and release them to study their movements and better understand their patterns.

Instead, she says all agencies in the Great Lakes region need to begin eradicating the fish immediately.

Michigan has been a leader in the efforts to tag and study grass carp under direction of the Lake Erie Commission, a group that consists of representatives from provincial- and state-level environment management organizations. This includes the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), the Pennsvlvania Fish and Boat Commission, New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, and the Ohio and Michigan DNRs.

According to Seth Herbst, aquatic invasive species coordi-

nator at the Michigan DNR, the agencies in western Lake Erie have been able to use tagging studies to determine fish movement patterns and what habitats they prefer. "We've been using that to inform where and when we use our response actions, Mr. Herbst

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Cruisers' Net champ Roy Eaton receives Sovereign's Medal

LITTLE CURRENT—Friends, family and a good portion of the boating community gathered Monday night at the Rendezvous Pavilion in the Port of Little Current to honour Manitoulin Cruisers' Net host Roy Eaton, a man who has done as much, if not more, to promote boating in the waters of Manitoulin Island and the North Channel than any other individual as he was awarded the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers.

Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin presented the award on behalf of Her Excellency the Right Honourable Julie Payette, Governor General of Canada and Queen Elizabeth II's representative.

Mayor MacNevin pointed out that Mr. Eaton founded the Cruisers' Net program that acts as a bond (and often lifeline) to those boating in the waters surrounding Manitoulin Island and has hosted the program for 15 years.

"What many of you may not know is that he has a long his-

tory of recognition for his endeavours related to recreational boating," said Mayor MacNevin. "He has a lifetime membership in the Great Lakes Cruising Association, is active in America's Great Loop Cruising Association, the Trailor Sailor's Association, is a recipient of the Canadian Safe Boating Association Volunteer of the Year, is a lifetime member of the Sudbury Manitoulin Children's Aid Society, was a Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands Senior Citizen of the Year, a recipient of the Queen's Sapphire Jubilee Medal, a former educator and curling coach to my kids, and acts as an ambassador for the North Channel Marine Tourism Council (NCMTC) when he flies from Florida to the Toronto Boat Show each year on behalf of NEMI, the NCMTC and the Anchor Inn Hotel to promote the region.'

Mayor MacNevin also gave a brief summary of the background to the medal, including the role of the monarchy in Canada's parliamentary democracy. Many of those attending

the end of year boaters' potluck dinner where the award was presented are American and perhaps not all that familiar with the Canadian system.

The mayor then read out the citation recognizing Mr. Eaton's contribution to the boating community before presenting him with the medal to a standing ovation.

Mr. Eaton was uncharacteristically given to having to clear his throat several times before being able to proceed with his comments, but very characteristically he thanked those who were honouring him and through the spotlight on his beloved wife Margaret, who he noted had just recently received an award of her own from the Shriners—the Dragon Award, presented to those who are dragged along by their spouses to countless events.

Democratic traditions alive and well in Billings Twp.

KAGAWONG—Three mayoral candidates and seven nominees for four council seats presented their views to a packed Kagawong Park Centre at an all candidates meeting on Saturday, August 18. Moderator Jack Clark of Gore Bay welcomed everyone on behalf of organizers and the candidates. "In our democratic system," he said, "probably one thing that is more important than most in voting is to vote both responsibly and intelligently and informed. Your presence here today suggests that you take your responsibility very seriously. On behalf of the candidates, we thank you for that; hopefully we will provide you with some information that will help you with that deci-

Candidates were given three minutes for opening remarks and one minute for closing, with a 30 minute question period in between.

Mayoral candidate Ian Anderson was born 65 years ago in Havelock, Ontario. He was raised on a small farm and "from this very humble start I learned the importance of helping your neighbours and learning to get along with folks in your community.'

He spent 36 years as a conservation officer on Manitoulin. In addition, he has belonged to many organizations and advisory councils, all in a volunteer capacity. Mr. Anderson has lived 43 years in

Billings and felt as a taxpayer, "I wanted good and safe roads, good fire protection, a reasonable tax burden, and certainly one competitive with our neighbours, and accessibility to our mayor and council and municipal staff when I needed help with a problem. I am happy to report that Mayor Aus Hunt and councils past and present delivered on most of my wants and needs over the decades. Life is good in Billings Township."

He sees the role of mayor "as the face of the municipality; a vocal promoter of the township; as a facilitator of the business of council to ensure council meetings run smoothly, effectively and efficiently. The mayor should try to maintain the balance between infrastructure improvements that benefit all citizens of the municipality and those improvements that specifically benefit either those that live in the village or in the outlying areas. Lastly, the mayor should participate in and foster activities that enhance the economic, social and environmental well-being of the municipality and its residents.

Next up was mayoral candidate Barbara Erskine, who noted that Billings is one of the few communities on Manitoulin that is actually growing. "In fact, 10 percent of our population is 14 years of age and younger," she said. "We have Bridal Veil Falls, one of the top two tourist destinations on the Island. We have

welcomed new and expanded businesses. We have dozens of dedicated and energetic volunteers. In so many ways we are in a good place right now. But there's another side to this coin. We have lots of miles of roads to maintain, a relatively small tax base, buildings and bridges that need a lot of attention.' Ms. Erskine feels that openness, accountability and effectiveness are the main characteristics required of a mayor. "As a councillor, I put in time to listen, to prepare for meetings, to talk to people at events, all the events that I could

KAGAWONG—An all candidates meeting held Saturday, August 18 at the Kagawong Park Centre kicked off with school board candidates Linda Erskine and Margaret Stringer.

Ms. Erksine moved to Little Current in 1990 with her husband, Michael. She has worked for the same organization for the past 16 years, initially on Manitoulin but currently travelling to work in Sudbury. She has been a board member with the Manitoulin Legal Clinic for the last 17-18 years and chair for the last 10 and has been volunteering with organizations on the Island since moving here.

"I stand before you now as candidate for trustee because I feel passionately that the children and youth on Manitoulin Island are being shortchanged in their education and development, as are many rural school children under the Rainbow Board," said Ms. Erskine. She noted how a lack of late bus transportation created a divide between children who can access and participate in extracurricular activities after school and those

The Salmon Classic, in its third year, saw a record amount of fisherfolk wet their lines for a chance to win some major cash prizes, totalling \$30,000, and some pretty sweet non-cash prizes too.

Rylan Carrick of Mindemoya, age 10, held on for some time at the top of the youth category with his 16.64 salmon caught at Michael's Bay. While Gore Bay's Nick Purvis bumped him from his top spot on the second last day with his 22.78 lunker (hint: he used a Lyman plug), Rylan's weight was just shy of the mystery weight winner but it was close enough to win he and his family a smoker, courtesy of Jake's Home Centres, valued at \$1,000.

"It has been a lot of work for a lot of people, but we are just about there," nitted the organizer with a little bit of justifiable pride. ing we have we were able to put together a pretty impressive lineup."

That lineup includes headliner Tanya Tagaq, Ansley Simpson, Crystal Shawanda herself, the Ode'min Kwe Singers, Leland Bell, NS3, Josh Stevens, Brittany Manitowabi, Elijah and the Back Burners, and plenty

"We were so grateful to Crystal for helping us get Tanya Tagaq," said Mr. Manitowabi. For those who may have been living under a rock without access to the Canadian music scene, Ms. Tagaq is a Inuk throat singer from Cambridge Bay (Iqaluktuutiaq), Nunavut on the south coast of Victoria Island who has been making waves on the International music scene. Her accolades include JUNO Awards (Classical Album of the Year 2017, Aboriginal Recording of the Year 2015, and nominations in 2015, 2009, 2006), a Polaris music prize (2014), a Canadian Folk Music Pushing the Boundaries Award (2014) and a Western Canadian Music Award (2015)—literally something for everyone.

In addition to the great music on offer, the WAMF is putting forward a host of educational learning opportunities in the arts, with Debaj visual artist-in-residence Barry Beaver facilitating a group painting and learning experiences. "Basically there will be a canvas where people walking by can pick up a brush and add to the painting," explained Mr. Manitowabi. A pot shop referendum should be on local ballot

There are very few things that call for an application of direct democracy in a community. Generally, we have been well served by those elected to office in order to make decisions on behalf of the entire community, but there are a couple of controversial issues wherein the community should be consulted through referendum. One of those issues is whether a community should allow the establishment of a retail cannabis outlet within the bounds of their

One might think municipal politicians would be quite open to the idea, as a clear expression of the will of the people would relieve them of the burden of dealing with an issue that has in some ways been unfairly thrust upon them by the government's decision to allow communities to "opt out" of hosting such a business.

Certainly there is plenty of precedence for such a referendum, as Island communities once voted to keep themselves "dry" during the years roughly contemporary to the American Prohibition on alcohol. Island communities then had to vote themselves "wet" again when the public mood switched. But in both cases, the hotly contested decision required considerable buy-in from the communities in order to

Since the availability of marijuana products will be available online, and undoubtedly in larger urban centres, should the decision be against (as it most likely would be given past experiences), those

wishing to partake in a legal substance would still be able to access the weed.

There is, of course, the danger that the decision to not allow retail cannabis stores to set up shop in a municipality would bolster the black market, but that would be part of the debate leading up to the referendum, along with other considerations. But the decision would be that of the community itself.

Then there is the whole pot tax distribution a la gas tax that a municipality could be forfeiting should they not decide to play ball with the neighbourhood retail store concept. There are a lot of things to consider—but again that is something that would play a part in the debate.

Otherwise, most local politicians would be likely to err on the side of caution and vote to not allow such establishments to gain a foothold in the community. This is one instance, however, where the decision either way should be backed up with a mandate of its own.

The referendum need not be binding, but could act as a clear bell weather for the politicians who have had the decision thrust upon them by an upper tier of government.

The Expositor calls on each Island municipality to put the question on the ballot, and directly to the people, in the upcoming municipal elections.

A rebuttal of a leftist looney head explosion rebuttal

With apologies for more scattered brain matter

I'm accused by a self-described "leftist looney" of writing an "absurdly misinformed letter" regarding the cost of Hydro power in Ontario and I'm also accused of using "biased information" to support my position ('A "lunatic leftist fringe" response to "head explosion" energy cost reduction letter,' August 22, Page 5).

My main point in the article was that energy costs in Ontario have surged largely because of the Green Energy Act and the subsequent moves to replace coal powered generation with renewables. To support my argument, I used reports issued by the Auditor General of Ontario and papers published by The Fraser Institute. I think most of the information released by the Auditor would be accepted by readers as well founded and based on fact. The Fraser Institute tends to also look at issues from a factual point of view and tends to support any positions with available data.

My critic goes on to claim that the real reason for the rate increase is nuclear power generation. The Ontario Energy Board actually provides the public with costs/MWh for the various sources of energy. Here are the relative costs for power per MWh: Hydro is \$58; nuclear next at \$66; wind is \$140; natural gas is \$173 and solar is \$480. However, let's not let facts stand in the way of a good rant about nuclear power.

Here is another reference providing a reasoned review of the energy situation in Ontario. In April of 2017, the Ivey Business School at Western University issued a study entitled, 'The Economic Cost of Electricity Generation in Ontario.' Again, the conclusions do not differ from other sources that I have used as reference.

Speaking of facts vs. opinion, we constantly hear claims from politi-

cians, interest groups, individuals and others regarding issues associated with climate change. For example, extreme weather events are on the rise. Floods, droughts, hurricanes etc. will be the end of us all! Yet, in spite of these statements, the evidence shows that this is not the case. A special report on extreme weather events by the IPCC states clearly that there is no evidence to support these claims. Extreme weather events are not increasing, in fact most of them show a modest decline.

The major issue driving this discussion is carbon dioxide emissions and what to do about them. Listening to the federal minister responsible, a move to a "low carbon economy" is critical. Milton Friedman would tell her that a "low carbon economy" exists only in the minds of those with an extreme left list. In other words, there is no such thing as a low carbon economy at the moment, nor will there be any time soon. Low cost and reliable power drives the world economy. Fossil fuels provide the bulk of this power. When something better comes along, the free market will embrace it. It currently rejects "renewable" power as too expensive and unreliable.

I apologize if this stance causes more heads to explode, but rather than a rant about Milton Friedman or corporate support of think tanks how about a retort based on common sense, reason and most importantly, facts. I don't claim for a moment that my position is entirely correct or without flaws. The left and the right of the political spectrum need each other to develop balanced policy. Sometimes the left is correct, sometimes the other way around. Rants serve no purpose. Reasoned discussion is the way to come to agreement on policy.

Lorne Ebel

At the time of our meeting, Lorne was happily ensconced amid his relatives in Mindemoya, far from his home in Orangeville. Many formative years were spent on Manitoulin and he harbours fond memories of the Island. One such recollection is the 'Jacqueline,' the ferry his dad had commanded from 1942 until that ferry service was discontinued. The Jacqueline had been a lifeline, crossing the North Channel in Little Current to Goat Island, connecting Manitoulin Island with the North Shore. Many vital services on the Island depended on this ferry, before the train bridge was opened to car traffic in 1944.

Grandfather Herbert Ebel was of German origins. He arrived from Southern Germany, near the Swiss border, and settled in the Kitchener area. Grandmother Amy Ebel (nee Myles) lived near Lions Head on the Bruce Peninsula. Maternal grandfather John Matheson was born two months after his Scottish parents arrived Canada and settled in Southampton. He married Annie Anderson and made his livelihood fishing from his tugboat. He would head out for three days and return with close to 2,000 lbs of fish.

Lorne was born in Southampton on September 8, 1934 to Captain Harold (Cap) Ebel and Isabel (nee Matheson) Ebel. They had three more children, John who lives in London, George, deceased, and Heather Highgate, who lives in Chatham.

'One of my first poignant memories of my Dad as a Great Lakes sailor was his being shipwrecked. It had been two months since I had seen him. He was on the trawler 'Gilly' that carried pulpwood from Manitoulin. The boat ran aground during a wild storm, the night of September 18, 1937, partway down Huron coastline, near Goderich. Thankfully, he survived the calamity and was soon back on the freighters.'

Cap became First Mate of the 'Sir Thomas Shaughnessy,' a 500 ft, 10,000-ton freighter carrying iron ore and coal. Coal was picked up in Pennsylvania, Erie and Cleveland, and transported to Little Current. It was unloaded on the coal docks or directly loaded into rail cars headed for Sudbury to fuel the smelter or refinery. The ship went empty to Thunder Bay, then would be loaded with grain or iron ore to be taken to Toronto, Hamilton or Port Colborne. During World War II, iron ore went from Steep Rock, Wisconsin to Port Colborne, Ontario.

"Some of my favourite holidays would be a trip from Southampton with mother, to see dad in various ports of call. We would spend two or three days on the ship with him, sometimes staying in the passenger quarters. Since war was on, dad had to help us through security. Port Colborne, Little Cur-Goderich were ports where we would meet him."

In June of 1942, the war raging in Europe, Captain Harold got hired by the Department of Highways, to command the Jacqueline in Little Current. Previously Captain Ebel had left home in March and returned at Christmas, but now he was home every night. allowing for a much closer-knit family. His wife and three sons were happy. "Heather, our true Haweater, was born later."

The Jacqueline transported cars and people. Three fully licensed captains were required because the ferry ran seven days a week. She ran every 30 minutes between 6:30 am and 11:30 pm, docking at midnight. This worked out to at least 24 trips a day or 168 crossings in a 48-hour week. The captains had two days off each week. The bridge in Little Current was built for the railway at first, allowing the mail train to arrive and depart once a day. The rest of the time the bridge was left open.

When the family arrived in Little Current in 1942, their house was just being built, so the family rented a house. "There was no indoor toilet or running water at the time. The water main just extended to the area behind the OPP office. It was about 1948 when mayor Bill Crabbe decided to include the rest of the town for water mains. A company form North Bay, Baldasaro Construction, did the work for about \$250,000.

"I was eight when we arrived to Little Current and I started in Grade 3. My teacher for three months was Glen Cond. He joined the Royal Canadian Navy and left his teaching profession. He later returned from the war and died just two years ago."

"My mother worked outside the home too. She helped open and then run the Eaton's office in downtown Little Current. It was expected that we would do chores at home, so dishes were often a responsibility I inherited. I washed and dried," he continues. "I was glad we had a dog, Sailor, a Boston Terrier to welcome us home each day, and he was much

After the bridge was planked for

cars, the ferry was no longer needed. Similar ferries ran across Lake Ontario, one such crossing between Adolphustown in Prince Edward County and Glenora near Kingston. (This ferry is still in operation.) "Dad ran that ferry for one season." In the late 1940s Cap worked for the North Shore Timber Company. He was captain of the tug, the Nordawn, that ran from McGregor Bay and Baie Fine, carrying pulpwood to the Northern Paper Mill. The Nordawn escorted the freighter Normill out of the harbour for its journey to Sault St. Marie and Green Bay, Wisconsin. Some of the logs carried on the Nordawn were used to fashion log homes in Little Current.

"Later dad worked for the Timken family of Timken Rollerbearing Company, of Canton, Ohio, managing their private residence and their yachts west of present-day Red Deer Village. When then-President F.D. Roosevelt came for his famous fishing trip to McGregor Bay in 1943, he stayed in the same area as the Timken residence prior to his Quebec conference regarding the war ending. Local fisherman Donald McKenzie was the guide for

the president."

Lorne recalls ships like the Manitoulin that had a one-week schedule, leaving Owen Sound at midnight Monday, reaching Killarney first, then Manitowaning, Little Current, Kagawong, Gore Bay, Blind River, Thessalon, Sault St. Marie, Lake Superior for one day and then back to Owen Sound by breakfast on Saturday. Boats were critical to commerce at the time. The Owen Sound train schedule dovetailed with that of the Manitoulin, carrying passengers and baggage from Union Station to the dock at Owen Sound.

The Temperance Act of the 1920s made it illegal for liquor to be sold in town. Prior to the plebiscite to change the act, Don Delaplante, a reporter from the Toronto Telegram, came to Little Current and took photos of some young locals sitting on the curb of Ritchie's store, drinking beer. The TD bank now sits where the store was. The photo made the Toronto Telegram two days later. The local plebiscite in 1948 led to the legal sales of liquor in Little Current. This meant local citizens no longer had to take a taxi to Espanola to get liquor.

"My first job was at the Fairway Stores in Little Current for \$15 a week. Mr. Elmer Vincent owned that store. His dad had been the first owner of the home that is currently the OPP station in the town. Although I was just a teen, I learned a lot from Mr. Vincent who was a well-respected businessman on the Island." Lorne changed jobs and began to work for Mr. Morland Ritchie or W.D. Ritchie and Sons, the grocery store, where he got more hours and a higher rate of pay. "Again, I learned more about the retail business from another respected businessman and a nice gentleman to work for. Mr. Ritchie also liked to play the piano on Sunday mornings and the music would drift through his open door and down the street."

W.D. Ritchie & Son was basically the only grocery store in town that allowed customers to have charge accounts. About 90 percent of the customers took advantage of that feature and paid their bills on payday. A few customers did not pay their accounts and their credit would be cut off. They would then shop elsewhere but would often return after a few months and ask for the restoration of their accounts. Mr. Ritchie would occasionally give them a clean slate but state that they would have to pay in full or be permanently cut off for credit. This was Mr. Ritchie's way of being charitable and at the same time attempting to teach financial responsibility.

By 1953, Lorne had graduated from high school in Little Current. "To this day, I can recall the great school spirit among the students and teachers. That positive ambience was there all through my high school years. This was reflected in the blue and gold yearbooks." Lorne remembers with fondness, some of the great hockey and baseball teammates he had the privilege of playing with and against. Lorne's dad was the manager of the hockey rink in the winter and he coached as well, helping his teams develop good sportsmanship.

Lorne did the sports writing for the vearbook and for The Expositor through 1949-51 and recalls the many great sports photos taken by publisher and photographer Bill

Patterson in the late 1940s. He has fond memories of the Pool Room and the movies in the Shaftesbury Hall on Saturdays, despite the lack of popcorn. He remembers playing badminton and other activities at the United Church hall.

Meanwhile, Doris 'Dori' Hughson had started working for the Manitoulin and North Shore Telephone and Telegraph Company, or M&NST&T Co. for 'short,' owned by the Turner family. Lorne met Dori on a blind date. "Our first date turned out to be a rather interesting event. It was the 'turkey roll' dance in the old hall at Sheguiandah, on a Saturday night. Tickets were purchased and placed in a drum. The winning ticket would be 'rolled' out. Thus, the name turkey roll.'

The couple were wed in the Little Current United Church on October 11, 1953. "This began what is now our 65-year journey." Lorne started his career with S. S. Kresge Company with his first position being at the Kresge store on Elm St. in Sudbury. He also started his management training. Many years and a lot of transfers later, he ended up as vice president of K Mart Canada at the Canadian head office in Brampton.

The couple had four children, Matheson, Lisa, Gregory and Pamela. Matheson, a University of Toronto graduate, had a surveying practice in Sudbury. He also played the bagpipes and was part of the Copper Cliff Highlanders; but sadly, he passed away at age 44. Lisa Bourdeau, a graduate of Niagara College in Early Childhood Education, is retired mow and living in Elliot Lake. Gregory, a graduate of York University and Harvard Business School, worked in the Energy Field in Houston, Texas. He just retired. Pamela Mauti, a graduate of York University, is a teacher for the Peel School Board in Caledon.

"I am most proud of my family. Being a parent is the most special and awesome opportunity we have had. Watching them discovering their skills as these emerged was rewarding. Experiencing 11 grandchildren was another 'wow'." Lorne retired from K Mart Canada in 1993 after having enjoyed a productive career through 13 different transfers across Canada. Each new location became home for his family for a few years. Lorne also made business trips to China, Japan and Tai-

The Rotary has been a part of Lorne's life for 40 years. He is also a past-president of three different clubs and a recipient of a 'Paul Harris' award. Lorne enjoyed participating in many great Rotary projects. He also became Chair of the Hospital Board and helped build the new Headwaters Health Care Center in Orangeville. Lorne continues to be very involved with the Westminister United Church there. Recreational pursuits included hiking, biking, kayak ing, Tai Chi, reading and, of course, travelling with Dori.

"My favourite time of the year? I really enjoy all seasons; each has its own unique and pleasurable highlights. Favourite book? It's 'Lord Moran's Diary'. Lord Moran was Winston Churchill's personal physician. He always felt Winston had been a bit of a hypochondriac. It was a good read."

Favourite quotation: "You're only as big as the things that bother you so don't worry about the lit-tle things." "The author is not known but the quotation was also used in a book by Joel Osteen and Google has used it as a quote of the day, listed under 'Brainy Quotes'." Lorne had been using it long before Google adopted it. "One person I admired was Little Current businessman Elmer Vincent. He was a straight shooter and very considerate of others. One time he visited me at work in my Brampton headquarters. I

Heywood boat boarding bear strikes again

HEYWOOD ISLAND—The Heywood bear has boarded a fifth boat in the sheltered anchorage at Heywood Island, east of Little Current. This time, it set its sights on a 55-foot, wooden 1962 Chris Craft named AMARA.

Roy Nichols, from Traverse City, Michigan, anchored the boat at about 6:30 pm, and he had three other adults and two 14-year-old girls aboard. He estimates they were about

140 metres from shore in 15 feet of water. They were all below deck at about 10 pm when they heard a loud noise as a chair tipped over on the deck.

"I opened the companionway door and found a bear standing about six feet in front of me," said Mr. Nichols, who described it as standing on its hind legs, about six and a half feet tall and weighing over 250 pounds.

"I closed the door and we quickly made a plan to frighten the bear off the boat. We gathered several flashlights and a halon gas fire extinguisher. I started spraying him with the fire extinguisher; he was sitting on the captain's chair," said Mr. Nichols.

The bear retreated to the back deck, but soon Mr. Nichols ran out of gas and dashed back inside to rearm himself with a new extinguisher—there were fortunately five on board. This time, all four adults went outside to aid in the effort. They all made loud noises and Mr. Nichols blasted its face again with the halon fire extinguisher.

"He finally jumped over the back rail onto the swim platform. Then he stuck his head through the fairing board at the corner of the boat. I took that opportunity to rush forward and spray him from about two feet," said Mr. Nichols.

The bear finally left their boat, but instead swam over to their dinghy and climbed "I think I'll listen to Cruiser's Net a lot more. They've known about it for a week, and if we'd know

Mr. Laux said it appears to be more of a nuisance than a threat at this point, being attracted to the smell of fish. This time, however, Mr. Laux was spared from a close encounter of the furred kind.

Wiikwemkoong man sustains severe beating in home invasion

WIIKWEMKOONG—A 24-year-old man is recovering at Health Sciences North in Sudbury following a home invasion and assault that took place in the early morning hours of Wednesday, August 22.

According to a family member of the young man, who asked to go unnamed, the victim heard a knock at his door at approximately 2 am on August 22. He recognized the person at the door and went to let them in, but four others also entered the residence and that's when the assault began. The family member told The Expositor that a golf club was used in the beating, with the head of the club eventually breaking off. The broken shaft of the club was then used to stab the young man repeatedly.

The victim was able to run the few doors down the street to get to his mother's home where he faintly knocked on a window to alert his mother to his desperate condition. The 24-year-old was transported to hospital in Little Current and then on to Health Sciences North in Sudbury where he was intubated to aid his breathing due to a collapsed lung and underwent two blood transfusions. The victim had surgery on Saturday to repair the lung and sustained "too many stitches to count" from the attack, according to his family.

"They counted 14 stab wounds," the family member said.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police and Ontario Provincial Police Forensic Identification Unit are investigating the incident with two females having been arrested and charged with aggravated assault so far.

"The investigation is active and ongoing," a press release from the Tribal Police states.

"All this means is that Little Current is getting a new detachment," the staff sergeant added, referencing many municipalities' fears that the other detachments would be shuttered with this project. "For all other detachments, it will be business as usual."

Bird Construction won the contract with the Ontario Infrastructure and Lands Corporation to design, build and finance nine Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachments in nine Ontario communities, among them Little Current, on behalf of the ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services and the OPP. Bird will undertake the design and build for the project and will also own the concession responsible for the

Ontario Infrastructure and financing of the project Lands Corporation to through Bird Capital, a design, build and finance wholly owned subsidiary.

Staff Sergeant Webb said the new detachment will modernize the Manitoulin-Espanola OPP's ability to police the community and give opportunities to the OPP's policing partners, such as Manitoulin Northshore Victim Services, among others.

The new building is also important to the mental

health and wellbeing of his officers, Staff Sergeant Webb continued. "It will be a modern facility that provides more space, state-of-the-art equipment, and a fitness facility. The OPP also strives to exceed adequacy standards and this new building will be well above adequacy standards."

The new lockup, too, will create a safe environment for both officer and prisoners

Along with Little Current, new detachments will be located in Moosonee, Fort Frances, Hawkesbury, Huron County, West Parry Sound, Mississauga, Marathon and Orillia and will replace facilities "at the end of their useful lifespan," according to a press release.

"State-of-the-art facilities that respond to the increasing demands of modern police operations are an important part of keeping communities safe," said Michael Tibollo, Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Services. "The safety of the public will always be a key priority of our government."

Equipped with improved amenities that address health and safety issues, the new detachments will remedy inefficiencies due to obsolete design and technology, as well as lack of space.

"Infrastructure modernization projects, including these OPP detachments,

are critical to making life better for the residents of Ontario. Infrastructure investments stimulate our economy, create jobs and help to make Ontario competitive again," noted Monte McNaughton, Minister of Infrastructure.

"This project allows for

the continued renewal of our aging detachments under one major infrastructure project," said OPP Commissioner Vince Hawkes. "This bundled approach to renewing our aging facilities will ensure the OPP continues to provide modern, efficient municipal and provincial policing services to local communities across the province."

The detachments will feature a secure functions area with holding cells and interview rooms, a public admittance area, an administration area for support staff and management, an operational area with offices and evidence storage vaults, according to a press release from Bird Construction.

said, adding that they are completing some eradication efforts while conducting these studies.

An invasive species

Grass carp are native to eastern Asia, with a range from Vietnam to the Amur River near Siberia. They are an herbivorous fish, eating aquatic vegetation in mass quantities. Their voracious appetite is why people began to import them to North America, and is the same factor that makes them such a threat.

Pond owners have been stocking grass carp since the 1960s to manage their weeds without having to use pesticides. Grass carp eat vegetation from the top down, rather than ripping the roots out and increasing the water's

Grass carp are one of four subspecies of the Asian carp family that also includes bighead, black and silver carp. All four are considered invasive species in North America. Grass carp are considered established in the Mississippi River drainage basin, and studies from the past decade have confirmed new fish are now spawning in the Great Lakes basin. Many of those fish have been traced to the Sandusky River in Ohio.

Two types of the same fish

Grass carp had proven themselves to be an excellent way of dealing with nuisance weeds, but sometimes, they were too good to be true. In Texas, officials stocked 270,000 grass carp into Lake Conroe in the early 1980s. After one year, the lake had lost 3,600 hectares of underwater vegetation and close to half of the native fish species had experienced declines. Some states have placed bans on fertile grass carp for this reason, a decision that had major impacts on pond owners who once relied on the fish.

Researchers found an alternative in 1983: If they gave the eggs a shock of either temperature or pressure at a specific time in the development cycle, the fish would keep an extra, third DNA chromosome that is normally discarded. That variation made them effectively sterile, as they would not be able to pass on the proper two-chromosome genes to future offspring. Those fish are referred to as triploid (three chromosomes) and diploid (two chromosomes) by biologists to represent their ability to reproduce.

Although success rates are close to 100 percent, the process is not perfect. Sometimes, best efforts to produce a batch of triploid fish may still result in some diploid individuals slipping through Producers have to test and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service samples 120 fish from each batch before certifying them as triploid, but there is still a small possibility that a presumed triploid fish could turn out to be fertile.

Currently, many states such as Ohio only allow triploid grass carp for vegetation maintenance, while other regions like Michigan and Ontario have outright bans on all grass carp. There are, however, seven states in the continental U.S. that still allow diploids: Alabama, Arkansas, Iowa, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, and the portion of Colorado east of the continental divide.

State of the union

Approximately 12 grass carp have been captured in the Canadian waters of Lake Huron since the late 1980s. Since DFO started its Asian Carp Program in 2012, only two fish have been caught. Both turned out to be triploid.

'It's a species that we're concerned about and we go in with the intention of capturing these species in our early detection locations and removing them from the Canadian waters of the Great Lakes," says David Marson, senior biologist and field operations lead of Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO)'s Asian Carp Program.

Grass carp are not likely to reproduce in Lake Huron for the next five years because of their low populations, as stated in a DFO risk assessment from 2017. However, that same risk assessment states that the numerous wetlands and tributaries around Lake Huron—especially Georgian Bay—would be prime habitat in which grass carp could

live and breed. The risk assessment also says if existing Asian carp populations grow, the risk level for Huron and the other Great Lakes would increase considerably

A population of reproducing grass carp now exists in Lake Erie and is poised to continue growing. Studies have predicted and later confirmed that grass carp spawn in Ohio's Sandusky River, confirmed both by the capture of grass carp eggs in the river and from chemical analysis of mature fish that matched the compounds in the river.

The responsibility to conduct efforts to control and eliminate grass carp within U.S. waters falls to the state level. Higher-up agencies such as the Fish and Wildlife Service and the United States Geological Survey (USGS) help to coordinate a broader, unified effort and provide scientific backing, but the actual work is done by state agencies.

Waterways like the Sandusky and Maumee Rivers in Ohio and the warm water discharge from a power plant in Monroe, Michigan are proven hotspots for these fish, based on previous capture and study work. And while every agency in the Great Lakes basin has a role to play in managing Asian carp populations, because these fish tend to thrive in the western basin of Lake Erie, the response by Ohio and Michigan will play a major role in determining the future of the Great Lakes as a whole. That view is shared by DFO. Ms. Muter and researcher Nick Mandrak at the University of Toronto.

What's at stake?

The most direct impact of grass carp is an environmental and ecological risk. According to a 2017 report, an average 15-year-old grass carp can eat between 60 and 200 kg of vegetation per year. That same study's simulated models showed invaded wetlands lost over half their vegetation after just one year.

Wetlands are key to managing water quality by filtering out pollutants and providing opportunities for animal life to thrive. Wetlands are already under threat from invasive plant species, such as the phragmites infiltration on which The Expositor has previously reported—phragmites appears to be one of the few aquatic plants that grass carp do not eagerly eat.

Wetland loss also directly impacts fish populations, as wetlands provide numerous fish species with spawning grounds, food and cover from predators. As habitats are destroyed and available food becomes increasingly scarce, populations of native species would begin to decline.

That has economic impacts, too. If fish stocks decrease, Canada's fishery industry stands to lose a great deal. As of 2018, commercial and recreational fishing, wildlife viewing and lakefront use total more than \$1.2 billion in economic activity. That number could reach nearly \$30 billion in 20 years, according to a DFO report.

Managing established invasive species is both challenging and expensive. Canada alone had spent \$8.1 million on its sea lamprey program in 2016-2017, an invasive species that is established throughout the Great Lakes.

"Do we want another sea lamprey program, which costs \$20-30 million a year to control them? That's where we're heading if we don't act soon," says Mr. Mandrak.

who can't. "How do the young people who miss out on these opportunities develop skill systems as those that do? How do the young people who miss out on these opportunities develop long term relationships as those that do?" she asked.

Ms. Erskine also spoke about board operations. "I believe in camera meetings should only be used to discuss issues as set out by the legislation governing boards," she said. "I also believe that it is vitally important that boards be transparent and accountable in their processes and their actions. If you vote for me I will be a very hardworking candidate for youth of this

Ms. Stringer and her husband Jim have lived on Manitoulin for 35 years, raising three children here. She is a retired educator who worked within the RDSB as a teacher in Gore Bay and Mindemoya, as a principal in Little Current and Manitowaning, and working with the First Nations communities of Aundeck Omni Kaning, Sheguiandah and Wiikwemkoong. Ms. Stringer also worked as assistant principal responsible for special education programs and services at all the board's elementary and secondary schools.

"Throughout my career I've advocated for students." she said, "whether as a teacher advocating for students and resources, as a principal collaborating with community partners to offer student opportunities, or as a system principal recognizing and allocating services. resources and staff to support schools. To all the common thread has been making a difference for kids and the satisfaction in knowing I helped a student, a staff member, parent, community to do the same.'

Ms. Stringer believes that relationships are key to working effectively within the school system. "I've developed good working relationships with parents, staff and community partners and administration, she noted. "What this means for families is I can be an effective advocate when those difficult but necessary conversations need to take place because those relationships exist."

"My focus will always be on students first, their health and safety, their wellbeing, and their student achievements," she continued. "I value equity, diversity and inclusiveness and I believe in the fair and respectful treatment of all people. I support the uniqueness and diversity of our students and I believe their learning environments need to be caring and safe, peaceful and positive, respectful and enabling to allow them to achieve their potential. Finally, I believe the students of Manitoulin have the right to the very best education that's no different than anywhere else in the province."

Trustee candidates were asked about lead levels in drinking water at Island schools and what they would do to protect student health. Ms. Erskine responded that, "as a parent and a person who lives in Little Current, I was quite upset when I heard this. I think the first thing the school board is going to have to do is deal with that. Until they do deal with it they're going to have to bring water in for the children. They can't be washing their hands. They can't be drinking that. They can't be having anything to do with the water system. If I'm elected, that will be one of my first priorities.'

She continued, "I really think that the issue of water across this province goes beyond education but it has to start somewhere. The school in Little Current is not the only one that is dealing with this issue. You'll notice that most of the schools that have issues are rural schools.'

Ms. Stringer stated that she had done her homework on this question. "I was having the same questions Linda was having. If you go to the RDSB site and Google 'drinking water reports,' it took me a while to find it but I found it; you can find out information about what's going on with the drinking water and you can find it out specifically by each school, and exactly how many taps and whether it's standing water. In other words, they take the test without it being flushed and then after they flush it."

"I come from a background of Health and Safety Level 1 training regionally and my workplace training and my experiences as a teacher and as workplace site trainer has really made me quite vigilant about things like this," Ms. Stringer continued. She noted that all the schools having problems with standing water were fine after the lines were flushed, but "there's definitely some things that need to be done."

The candidates were asked what their top two priorities would be. Ms. Stringer stated that accountability and transparency were her top two priorities. She feels that all public board meetings should be live-streamed. "That way parents can be involved, can be watching board meetings and strategic planning meetings," she said. "They can be more informed about what's going on and I think it can be an all around more collaborative approach to our work.'

Ms. Erskine said the lead in the schools would be one of her top priorities with the other being to ensure that the children on Manitoulin have the same access to courses that students in Sudbury have, providing Island students with the same postsecondary options. they're not offered here because there's not enough students, they can use technology and have the youth participating in a class in Sudbury through distance education."

"There's no reason why our kids on the Island miss out on courses.'

In closing remarks, Ms. Stringer thanked organizers and all those involved. "I've enjoyed this opportunity to share my thoughts and beliefs about our educational system and I appreciate your thoughtful questions," she said. "In my view the key role of trustee is to support the needs of Manitoulin students. I believe that my experience in the education system puts me in a unique position to fulfill my role. As trustee it will be critical to listen to parents and community to be able to represent them effectively and to be their voice. I believe strongly in accountability and transparency and with that in mind as trustee I would move that all public board meetings be livestreamed. If elected I intend to be an advocate for the students, speaking up for the necessary funding, services and staffing to come our way. It would be an honour and a privilege to serve the students, parents and community of Manitoulin.'

Ms. Erskine added a final comment before closing. "I really think one of the things the board needs to be looking at, not just this board but all boards, is keeping kids safe from cyberbullying and teaching them how to not get pulled in online to doing unsafe things," she said. "That part outweighs a lot of the things that parents and other people are concerned with in the healthy lifestyles sex education program. We need to keep our kids safe. We need to make sure they're treated equally to the other kids in this board. We need to ensure that they get the same opportunities. We need to ensure that our kids have the same benefits as kids in Sudbury. I'm not a teacher although I've taught at the college level and I see what comes from the kids who don't get the same opportunities when they're adults trying to get a

I would like to point out the candidates who sit with me, these are the folks that put themselves out there, who care so much about their area they putting themselves forward."

"I served four years on council previously and learned lots as a newbie," she continued. "This time round I feel I am more prepared for the commitment and I am seeing much more of the awareness of the community and its issue. I want to be a part of Billings moving forward and see people who are part of this community move forward in the same general direction."

Ms. Hurcomb believes in hard work, honesty and compassion. "We transplanted here 20 years ago and rescued and refurbished Dodge Lodge. It was a fantastic project and made us want to do it again. Our next project, which is now our home, was Boo-Bah-Lou."

Haweater Sharon Jackson was born and raised in Billings Township and is proud to call Kagawong home. "It is also home to each of you in this room, whether it is year round, two weeks of the year or eight months of the year, you each have a voice," she began. "Billings Township is more than the village of Kagawong. Each of us here

are interested in concerns of people from Maple Point to Rainbow Heights to Main Street to Lakeshore Road and everywhere in between. When I people I live in Kagawong, the response is always, 'I love Kagawong. You have such a forward thinking and fun community and work together to be a success'." She thanked volunteers for their impressive contributions to the community.

"Over the past four years, our council, office staff, public works have taken on a strategic plan, a very ambitious task" she said. "They have checked off many items on the list, including hiring an economic development officer and creating additional safe parking for Bridal Veil Falls visitors and shoppers. One of the top priorities was updating the township website which now has regular posts including a recent well water order, municipal fire ban along with minutes for council meetings. The strategic plan for 2018-2021 is also available online."

Ms. Jackson does not have plans to make changes, concluding, "I am here to listen to your concerns and work together to build on our community's strengths, implement solutions for improvements and explore opportunities. We have to work within financial parameters in order to move forward with ambitious and realistic goals. "I want to be involved in financial business to ensure the maximum use of revenues and to obtain maximum funding available for the township."

He believes in an open door policy and that "open minds and open discussions" make decisions easier and lead to more tolerance.

Candidates were asked questions about their involvement in Billings township activities, zoning and preservation of community heritage and improved communications with ratepayers; all three mayoral candidates agreed there was room for improvement.

All mayoral candidates were equally open to investigating the livestreaming of council meetings, depending upon Internet speed and availability as well as cost and community interest. Further waterfront development was also an issue supported by

mayoral candidates. Questions were asked about municipal staffing and legacies. The final question was directed to all candidates and referred to the current council's purchase of the 100 acre bluff adjacent to the river.

Ms. Erskine and Ms. Alkenbrack both noted that although there was no clear plan for the property, the idea was to protect the natural character and maintain public access to the water; they also noted the possibility of adding to the existing trail system in the future. All candidates agreed that public consultation would be necessary before any plan was developed.

Bonnie Cook, also of Little Current, said she attended the information session to learn more about the proposed plans and swing bridge alternatives.

"It's an interesting problem, isn't it?" she asked thoughtfully. "And so impor-

Bill Hance hails from Ohio but spends his summer on Manitoulin.

"I would really hate to see the existing bridge go, but I understand the problems,' he said. "From what I can see, there is no inexpensive solution to the problem.'

His first choice would be for the aging swing bridge to be fixed, he said. "The bridge is so symbolic of Little Current, and the Island. There's probably nothing more symbolic than the bridge for Manitoulin," Mr. Hance added, noting the constant photo taking of the bridge while it's doing its on the hour every hour dance.

"As much as we all love the old bridge, it's only a matter of time before there's a big emergency and it fails," Gary Morphet of Little Current commented. "We need to have a plan B."

Brad Wright of Gore Bay said he attended the information session to learn more about the process.

Mr. Wright said his first inclination is to keep the swing bridge.

"I see the historical aspect; a reminder of that 'Island time'," he said. He spoke of Stantec engineer Gregg Cooke's quote in the pages of this newspaper that the bridge was costing the Ministry of Transportation upwards of \$600,000 a year in maintenance costs. He believes that is money well spent. "Six hundred thousand dollars a year equals \$50 a head for 12,000 Island residents," he said. To spend millions on an alternative would mean a 200-year return on investment, Mr. Wright added.

'We'd be better off maintaining the current bridge," Mr. Wright continued. "Why not do preventative maintenance? The work could all be done in the offseason.

Mr. Wright said the issue is of importance to people across Manitoulin, not just Little Current. "It's the affected by this," he said. "A lot of these options will have a dramatic impact on the business in the area. Look at the ice cream shop (3 Cows and a Cone), for instance."

Mr. Wright said Islanders have done a terrible job in promoting the bridge to its full extent. "We can effectively manage this better and to the taxpayers' advantage rather than building a new structure," he conclud-

Sean O'Hare of Little Current said he believes the tunnel option is best as it could also mean links for fibre optic cable and natural gas with the mainland.

"It's interesting that they don't note the cost on maintaining the status quo," he added. "I have a feeling they've already decided and that they're just appeasing

us."
Chief Patsy Corbiere couldn't help but feel that way too, as though a decision had already been made, but she invited the engineers to her community of Aundeck Omni Kaning for a private presentation the day following the Little Current sessions. The engineers also made presentations at wemkoong and Sheshegwaning.

Chief Corbiere said the bridge is "a current problem, but a long way off." The chief said she realized that the bridge needs to be replaced, but that all involved need to take a long, hard look at all the options before they even think about relocating it.

"A lot of money has been spent in that area, trying to she said. develop it," "They're not thinking of the impact—they really need to look at it through an economic lens.'

Chief Corbiere noted that the topic of traffic disruption keeps getting lumped in with the bridge study but that it's a distraction from the real task at hand.

"Give me a break," she said of those who complain about having to wait for 15 minutes during an ill-timed summer swing.

"That thing is a monument to Manitoulin, but people on Manitoulin also have to start thinking of the future," she commented, noting that her first choice would be to see the current

Island in its entirety that's bridge fixed, but pending that, a new bridge in the same location is her preferred option.

Phil Blake, proprietor of 3 Cows and a Cone, hosted a meeting at the community room of Orr's Valu-Mart prior to the information session for all Little Current business owners interested, or concerned, in the bridge study.

Fifteen businesspeople attended the last-minute meeting, with many more having contacted Mr. Blake with their support. The feelings among the business owners was unanimousthe bridge, in whatever form it might take, cannot be moved from its current location. Mr. Blake was given the task of also representing those same businesses at the community services 'committee of the whole' meeting of Northeast Town council last

Thursday night. "The MTO has a history of straight-lining highways," Mr. Blake said in his address council, referring to building bypasses around communities. "Look at towns that were once vibrant."

Mr. Blake shared that he provides jobs for 12 fulltime and 17 part-time staff and that with a re-routing of the bridge, many of those jobs could be at

He then launched into a study on the traffic flow of bridge and his thoughts on how to make the three unused traffic lanes work. "It may look good from a desk, but it's a joke," he said of the traffic


Mr. Blake asked council to consider making a motion of support to keep the status quo in terms of entry and exit points of the bridge, new or otherwise, and to share this with the

"We all have a very large investment," he added, speaking on behalf of the businesses he was representing. "It was brought up, council, that if a highway bypassed town, would the township reduce the current assessments?

Council thanked Mr. Blake for his presentation with Mayor Al MacNevin noting that many on council support his position on the bridge.

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
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




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Willisville Mountain stars in feature film 'Entangled'

Willsville—Willisville Mountain and its surrounding vistas have played starring roles in the works of Canada's famed Group of Seven and Manitoulin Island's own Ivan Wheale, as well as countless other less lionized artists of the canvas, but now the mountain will be playing a major role on the big screen as well.

Scenes that include a car chase and a cliff tumbling SUV are part of the Indie sci-fi feature film 'Entangled' shot on the road leading to Willisville. The SUV took a tumble off the Willisville Road lookout point, a couple of times actually, last Thursday evening.

'Entangled' is a sci-fi thriller starring starring Academy Award-winning actress Marlee Matlin as Deirdre, the mother of a student named Amy. Actress Sandra Mae

Frank plays Amy and Paloma Kwiatkowski stars as Loretta, Munro Chambers as Gerry and Robert Naylor as Danny.

The basic story of 'Entangled' follows four university students whose experiments with quantum physics cause them to come face-to-face with their doppelgangers from a parallel universe.

The film budget of \$1.8 million may be modest by Hollywood blockbuster standards, but with a careful eye on expenses, a

tight cast and a lot of ingenuity a little can go a long way, especially in these days of digital film equipment.


"We are shooting with five actors, four of whom are onscreen for most of the time," said location manager Wiliam Andrews.

"Willisville presents one of the most beautiful vistas in Northern Ontario," said producer Jason Jallet. "We were delighted when we discovered the location." Auditioning for the part wasn't a cakewalk, however. "We started our search within 30 minutes of Sudbury, then expanded it to 45 minutes, then an hour," he said. "When we expanded the search to an hour-and-a-half it was 'Oh wow! We found the perfect fit for our storyline'."

Even better was the warm reception the film company received from the Willisville community. "They were really great," said Mr. Andrews. The feeling was mutual.

"The film company was very polite and easy to work with," agreed Willisville council pointman Wayne Gertzen. "They made sure they made the least interruption and were sure to explain what was involved very carefully." Mr. Gertzen and

his son watched some of the filming take place, including the feature shot of the car going over the hill. "It was pretty exciting, they pushed it over once, and then they hauled it back up and pushed it off again," he said. The car was carefully modified to remove the engine and any parts containing oil or other fluids to ensure safety of all involved, including the mountain.

"That is an important part of my job," said Mr. Jallet. "I don't just keep an eye on the finances, I make sure that everyone gets home safely."

Mr. Jallet and his business partner moved to the Sudbury area 10 years ago,

"just as the film industry in the community was getting started." he said. It is a decision he does regret.

The filming itself took Wednesday, place on August 22 and Thursday, August 23 between the hours of 4 pm and 4 am. The Wednesday filming included stunt driving (under the supervision of experienced stunt coordinators and drivers) and Thursday's shoot included

the simulation of a vehicle going over the edge of Lookout Point and plummeting out of sight.

"This was a simulation only and we maintain control of the vehicle at all times," said Mr. Andrews. On both days the site was under the supervision of paid duty OPP officers, who controlled traffic and to ensure the safety of both the crew and residents of Willisville.

'Entangled' is a remarkable film in that it features two deaf actors and will be presented with closed captioning to enable it to be accessible for the deaf and hard of hearing.

The movie is being directed by Gaurav Seth and was written by Doug Taylor and Michael MacKenzie. The film is being shot at locations in Sudbury and North Bay as well as Willisville. Providence Bay beach auditioned for the role of the

ocean side scenes in the movie, but lost out to a rocky shore in North Bay.

"As it turned out the North Bay location was a better match with the story line," admitted Mr. Jallet.

The actual location of where the story takes place is not yet written in stone, noted Mr. Jallet. The story itself is not all that location dependant and a lot in that regard will be settled taking marketing and distribution into account.

But whether it is playing itself or standing in for another location in the world, Willisville's incredible vistas and accessible location have added dramatically to the film according to all involved.

The filming is expected to finish up this week, with only three days of filming left (two in Sudbury and one in North Bay), but the release of the film, and Willisville's sci-fi film debut, remains a year off.

"To all businesses and all attendees, thank you,' she said. "It doesn't matter how hard you plan something, you need people to make it a success.



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
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

Mission accomplished

CCGS Samuel Risley completes resupply mission for Thule air base in Greenland

GREENLAND—From the fresh water of Manitoulin to the salt water of Baffin Bay in the high Arctic, the officers and crew of CCGS Samuel Risley have successfully completed the first leg of their maiden voyage to the Arctic.

CCGS Samuel Risley, a familiar sight on the Great Lakes answered the call to duty this summer as an Arctic icebreaking resource for the Canadian Coast Guard. Their mission was to escort commercial ships to resupply the Thule air base in northern Greenland.

For Commanding Officer John Cork the experience has been excellent, with some notable differences between sailing on the Great Lakes and sailing in the Arctic. "We saw thousands of icebergs big and small, whales, seals and other wildlife that we wouldn't normally get to see. The landscape of Greenland is truly spectacular with many active glaciers."

CCGS Samuel Risley arrived in Iqaluit August 5. Over the past month more than 5,100 nautical miles were sailed, for approximately 500 hours. After a crew change in Iqaluit CCGS Samuel Risley will remain in the eastern Arctic for search and rescue, community visits and some buoy tending in Hudson Bay.

Icebreaking is one of multiple services the Canadian Coast Guard provides to northern communities. Search and rescue, environmental response, aids to navigation, and marine communications and traffic services are also provided by the Coast Guard.

MANITOWANING—Bustling crowds flowed through the doors of the Assiginack arena to attend the 5th Annual Manitoulin Deer Show, taking in lectures on subjects ranging from predator control to women in hunting and visiting the vendor booths that offered up everything you need for a successful hunt.

A sizable crowd assembled for the door prize draws, conducted under the able hand of Steve Wood and assisted by his daughter Peggy, who gave a shout out of thanks for all the hard work over the weekend of the volunteers and especially to organizers Mike Sprack and Jackie White.

The winner of the two firearms were Jeffry Charles Dorland Hartin, who took home the rifle, and Gary Desabrais, who snagged the shotgun (both were required to present a valid PAL certificate).

Bob and Jaime Radojcin, hosts of WILD Televison's 'Homemade Hunters' television program were on hand for the Kids Wilderness Challenge and gave a talk to the youth about hunting before the contest.

In the lecture series, WILD Televison 'Just Hunt' host Amanda Lynn Mayhew presented 'Women and Kids in the Outdoors.' Ms. Mayhew explained that "'Just Hunt,' the television series, started on WILD TV under Canada Hunts in 2016 and now I am filming my first full season this year under 'Just Hunt'."

The impetus behind her starting up the program was "my passion and drive to showcase and share my hunts and what they mean to me and how I was raised."

"Women in the industry and how the numbers are increasing (are what my lecture was about). I founded The Women's Hunting Association in 2011 and organize and host Take Me Hunting, Take Me Fishing and Range Day events to teach women about firearms, hunting and fishing," she said.

As to whether more women are taking up hunting generally, Ms. Mayhew was adamant. "Yes," she said, putting a decided emphasis on her answer. "I have numbers from my classes of girls who move forward into the industry after participating in a range day, whether it be competition shooting, solo hunting or a career change. I know a lot of women hunt on the Island but in southern Ontario the demographic is very different"

While Ms. Mayhew's talk did focuss on hunting, 'Just Hunt' is more than that. Ms. Mayhew stressed that it is "a brand that focusses on chasing lifestyle passions."


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
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


Visiting Manitoulin?

Island's 'Ghost Town' remembered in nostalgic settings

SOUTH BAYMOUTH—It's a little harder to imagine now, looking around the busy ferry transportation hub that is South Baymouth in the summer, the two-family fishing base of 1878 that became the foundation of a booming fishing industry, when the village became known as 'The

The original fishing families, the Ritchies and the

Wilmans, joined by other pioneers, also built the first school in 1891. Heading south to the ferry, that school is the last building before the terminal—a bright red wood structure, trimmed in white, with belfry and bell, it is now part of the complex known as the Little Schoolhouse and Museum, just the place to explore the humble but ambitious beginnings of the port village.

The Little Schoolhouse was in use until the 1960s and is fully furnished with all the accoutrements conducive to learning—small wooden desks, blackboards behind the teacher's desk and cards along the top with the perfect cursive writing all pupils had to master, a globe, a wall map of the world, a woodstove, all authentic to Manitoulin

schools in the 1940s.

The separate Museum building a few feet away, opened in 2001, is a large, bright space holding captivating displays on all sides and curio cases in the centre that feature this community's important role in the development of the Island economy. Highlighted are the early activities of catching, salting and shipping fish, the subsequent commerce in fresh fish, the families, Green, Chisholm, Sim, Owen, who joined the original two in building South Baymouth's thriving fishing industry, the beginnings of regular ferry service to and from Tobermory with the 14-car 'Normac' in 1932.

Among the mounted photos of early settlers, mills and scenes of home and farm life are a hundred-year-old 'Log Cabin' quilt, an alcove honouring spinning and weaving arts, the community's first telephone switchboard, and

photos and artifacts of WWI and WWII donated by local veterans' families.

The Museum devotes a section of the exhibition area to the enduring story of the 'ghost town' of Michael's Bay; the site of the old mill town lies 15 kilometres west of South Baymouth. Here, in the place of a former Odawa



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of South Baymouth's Little Schoolhouse and Museum

was surveyed in 1866, a mill was built on the rushing Manitou River that before long cut and shipped millions of feet of pine, squared timbers and lath; in 1879, a town plot was laid out. Called 'Stumptown' for its only major commercial activity, timbering (which some say account for the rapid rise and fall of Michael's Bay), it saw the building of boarding houses, stores, a hotel, taverns, a bakery, a school and soon spawned such occupations as millwright, cooper, carpenter, lighthouse keeper, fisherman. By the mid 1880s, the population of Michael's Bay had grown to 400 souls.

The whole settlement burned in 1914, razing the mill and the homes and businesses to the ground; the booming town that had appeared overnight similarly vanished in smoke. All that is left today is a large expanse of flat field next to the falls where the mill stood, now almost totally hidden by large trees.

The mandate of the Michael's Bay Historical Society (MBHS) is "dedicated to preserving the history and restoring the Michael's Bay Townsite with the goal of purchasing the land." The MBHS seeks to protect the five found cemeteries from development. One of these, a Methodist burial ground where 43 graves were found, is roughly signed on Michael's Bay Road and may be visited by taking a short path leading into an overgrown, leafy glade where underfoot, little white crosses now bloom in the dense ground cover.

For now, the Michael's Bay town site is under the auspices of the federal government due to an ongoing series of complicated previous land dealings; the old ghost town is

Indigenous burial grounds and Anishinaabe land claims, must be resolved.

The Little Schoolhouse Museum is the repository of the old survey maps of the town plot of Michael's Bay and of records, photos and artifacts of the time of the lumber boom, the bust years that followed and of the ultimate tragic fire. There's not much left now but the poignant memories and artifacts of Manitoulin's first lumbering town and of the dreams and aspirations, not only of the early

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


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Korean Youth Group visits Mindemoya, gives back to community

ministry for multiethnic experiences to bring about the spiritual revitalization of Mindemoya," and Trinity United was more than happy to agree.

The youngsters are also members of the Heritage International School in Toronto that fosters academic achievement, emotional confidence, spiritual growth, character growth and social networks. The school's principal, Hannah Kim, was on hand to talk to The Expositor and the very first words that Ms. Kim said were about Mindemoya.

"It is very beautiful here," she said. "There are a lot of nice people here and a lot of seniors. Next year when we come, I would like to do something for the seniors." This year Ms. Kim had two days of art school for children from Kindergarten to Grade 5. When speaking to two of the school's members, Sky Ha and Katie Kwak, Miss Ha said of Manitoulin, "it's a wonderful place."

Another activity for all ages was the taekwondo lessons. Islanders may be surprised to learn that the Trinity United Church pastor, Reverend Joshua Kang, holds a black belt, first dan, in this Korean martial art. There are normally nine dans, or stages, and accompanying the minister was Master Choi, a black belt holder, seventh dan, and two children,

Praise and Christina Yoon, who also hold black belts. Taekwondo, as Reverend Kang pointed out when the lessons began, is not used for fighting. The World Taekwondo Federation (WTF) stated that this martial art means the right way of using all parts of the body to stop fights and help to build a better and more peaceful world.

Also part of this group of visitors was Jacko Lee, the pastor of the Living Life Community Church in Richmond Hill. He pointed out that these trips are taken every year at this same

time, and that free acupuncture was available for all and performed by a doctor who used to treat members of the Blue Jays team.

The itinerary for the group also included trips to M'Chigeeng and Zhiibaahaasing as well as free Living Water concerts at the church. These recitals included performances with song and dance as well as several outstanding solo performances by violinist Jessica Lee. Throughout the concert, Lily Kwak was on the piano while Bryan Ahn was on guitar for the last night's Living Water

Festival. This event offered a free Korean dinner to all, and the meal was excellent. The first day of school is Wednesday, September 5. There will be no early dismissal on the first day.







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


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The Flu Blues

Fall is almost upon us which means three things: beautiful leaves, apple cider and the flu vaccine. Many people choose to get the quick injection to protect themselves and those they love from getting this viral infection. In this article, we will discuss some of the most commonly asked questions about the flu the vaccine that helps prevent it.

How is influenza spread? Everyone is at risk of developing influenza, or the flu, as we commonly call it. This viral illness is mainly spread between mid-October until the end of April. It is transmitted from person-to-person when an uninfected person breathes in droplets spread by an infected person when they cough, sneeze or talk. Proper handwashing is important to maintain good hygiene and fend off the flu

What are the symptoms of influenza? Influenza mainly affects the nose, throat and lungs causing symptoms such as fever, sore throat, cough, runny nose, muscle aches, vomiting and diarrhea. The severity of the illness can range from mild to severe and may cause complications such as pneumonia and in severe cases, death.

Who should have the influenza vaccine? All people over the age of six months who do not have a contraindication to the influenza vaccine should receive it. Pharmacists are now able to administer this vaccine to those aged 5 years and older. For children under nine years who have never received the vaccine before, two doses of the vaccine are required separated by at least four weeks. For children aged 2-17, there is also an nasal vaccine spray that is

available free of charge. For those 65 years and older, there is a vaccine that contains an adjuvant, which is a substance that boosts your immune system's response to the vaccine, to provide better protection. Once the injection is given, protection occurs in about two weeks. To provide the best protection, it's best to get vaccinated early in the flu season, in mid-late October. Even those with an egg allergy are eligible to get the influenza vaccine after a discussion with their healthcare provider.

How effective is the vaccine? Unfortunately, the influenza virus changes quickly from year to year so a new vaccine is developed each year to match the evolved virus and provide protection. Sometimes, the vaccine's match is better than others, but even if the match is not exact, it still provides some protection. On average from year to year, the vaccine cuts your risk of developing influenza by about 40 percent.

Does the vaccine cause influenza? No. Both formats of the vaccine—the injectable and the nasal spray—do not cause influenza. The injectable format contains killed influenza virus that triggers your immune system to fight off the virus should be exposed. The nasal spray contains weakened influenza virus that are easily overtaken by your immune system. Although, if you have a weakened immune system, you should not get the nasal spray version of the vaccine.

The best thing you can do to prevent the flu is to get vaccinated. If you have more questions about influenza or the vaccine please speak with your pharmacist or healthcare professional.

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
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Tehkummah Talk and Times

Norma and Rick had his sister Wendy and Wayne Grey visiting them at their Sandfield home this past week.


Someone, who?, mentioned seeing three cougars at once this past week. Must have been a family?
