

Great Lakes mayors challenge diversion of L. Michigan water

GREAT LAKES—The Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative (Cities Initiative) is requesting a hearing to challenge the June decision by the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Basin Water Resources Council (Compact Council) to allow Waukesha to divert water from Lake Michigan. The challenge is to make sure the long term integrity of the Great Lakes and the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Basin Water Resources Compact (the Compact) is preserved, a press release from the Cities Initiative states. Mayor Denis Coderre of Montreal, chair of the Cities Initiative, said, "for the Compact Council to grant an exception to the first application that does not meet the conditions of the Compact sets a very bad precedent. To make sure the Compact and Great Lakes are not compromised in the future, this decision should be overturned." The Cities Initiative has expressed opposition to the approved diversion during the course of the proceedings on a number of issues, including the availability of reasonable alternatives to Waukesha for water

supply, the impact of the return flow of Waukesha sewage on the Root River, and the service area that includes communities that are not part of the City of Waukesha. Now that the Compact Council has approved the

MINDEMOYA—They say that behind every cloud there lies a silver lining and Jan McQuay and the Manitoulin Nature Club are hoping the recent sale of a small portion of the park known as Waggs' Wood will provide the impetus (and funds) to make improvements to the remaining 40 acres of the property.

Friends and family searched unsuccessfully for Mr. Wemigwans for approximately 10 minutes before contacting emergency services.

The class action lawsuit has been filed against the Government of Canada and alleges that between 1962 and 1996 as a result of a federal-provincial arrangement that saw Ontario child welfare services place as many as 16,000 aboriginal children with non-Native families from Decem-

Speed on Highway 6 in front of RONA to be reduced to 60 km/hr

LITTLE CURRENT—The posted speed zone in front of the new RONA Little Current Building Centre will be reduced from 80 km/hr to 60 km/hr according to the Ministry of Transportation (MTO).

Earlier this summer, Northeast Town Councillor Michael Erskine expressed his concern to council with the speed limited being 80 km/hr in what had become a high traffic area. He put a motion on the table to reduce the speed to 60 km/hr, expanding the 60 km/hr area of the highway until after the RONA (by the Hydro One building), however the motion was defeated. Following the meeting a letter was sent to the MTO making them aware of the new building on the public highway.

"Based on our overall review of this highway segment, the ministry is proposing, pending minister's approval, to request an amendment to Regulation 619 of the Highway Traffic Act to extend the existing 60 km/hr posted speed zone to include the new commercial development," stated a letter to the Northeast Town from Ron Turcotte, head of the Traffic Section of the MTO. "Kindly be advised that this process takes several months."

"I'm quite pleased to see this moving forward," commented Councillor Erskine. "It is important that the speed limit get changed because people need to be warned to slow down as traffic is turning into the new business. A new commercial business is great, but it is busy, especially in the summer, and people need to slow down."

Councillor Erskine said he can't take the credit for bringing the idea forward, as it was one of his constituents who suggested the idea to him and he in turn brought it to council.

GORE BAY—Gordon's Lodge Resort and Conference Centre in Gore Bay is officially up for sale.

The sale was confirmed by listing agent Jack Rocca of Century 21 Select Realty Ltd. Brokerage (of the Sudbury Real Estate Board) by the Recorder on Monday of last week.


"The property is now for sale and the land and buildings are all for sale," Mr. Rocca said. "It's on the Sudbury Real Estate Board and it is being pretty widely promoted."

Mr. Rocca pointed out, "I'm the real estate agent for the limited company that owns the buildings and property. It is a beautiful piece of property, one of a kind."

The limited company name is 900351 Ontario Inc. (Laura and Drew Pinkerton) and the recreational property on One Water Street East, Gore Bay is for sale only, building and land for 10.0-49.99 acres with water frontage, year round road access.

As has been reported previously, the business is currently under a power of sale.

"The business is now officially on the market and anyone who has an interest in purchasing the property and buildings can call me and make arrangements to see it," said Mr. Rocca. The listing of the buildings and land is at a price of \$2,200,000.

Canada Revenue Agency tax rule will impact some Manitoulin campgrounds

ONTARIO—The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) has decided that some privately-owned campgrounds are too small to qualify for the small business tax deduction—a decision that could force some campgrounds on Manitoulin to close.

"I know of at least five campgrounds that will be affected by this (the CRA) decision," said Sam Nardi, of Sam Nardi Business and Tax Consulting, in Little Current. "The tax rate for a corporation (which qualifies for the small business tax deduction) is 15 percent, but if a business doesn't qualify, they will have to have the full corporate rate which is 35-36 percent—that's more than double."

Rita Gordon of Gordon's Eco Resort said she hasn't received a letter from the CRA, but that she knows of other campground/resort owners who have.

"This is a problem for all of us on Manitoulin," said Ms. Gordon. "To qualify for the small business tax deduction you have to have at least five employees employed year round. On Manitoulin and in the north,

Manitoulin Health Centre receives additional funding for hospital repairs and upgrades

MANITOULIN—The Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) has received a portion of the additional funding being provided by the province to address the critical need for hospital repairs across the province.

"We had received notice of our original funding through the Health Infrastructure Renewal Fund (HIRF) of \$130,000," said Derek Graham, chief executive officer (CEO) of the MHC. "We then applied for an additional one-time funding allocation and have now received an additional \$306,000 for a total amount of \$436,000. We just got confirmation of these funds."

The funding, "was part of the province's announcement of increased funding for hospital repairs and upgrades," said Mr. Graham.

Ontario is providing \$175 million in 2016-2017 to hospitals across the province-an increase of \$50 million over last year's funding-to keep them in a state of good repair so patients can continue to receive high-quality care in a safe and healthy environment.

Premier Kathleen Wynne made the announcement on Thursday of last week at Michael Garron Hospital (formerly Toronto East General Hospital). "Many hospitals need to repair or replace roofs, windows and fire alarms," she said. "Our government has more than tripled our investment in this crucial infrastructure to ensure that patients can continue to receive high-quality care in a safe and healthy environment."

The government increased funding for hospital renewal from \$56 million in 2013-2014 to \$125 million in each of the following two years. This year, the province will provide an additional \$50 million in funding to help address the critical need for hospital repairs across the province. Across Ontario, 135 hospitals will receive HIRF funding to support crucial infrastructure projects to extend the useful life or improve the quality of their facilities. Projects may include upgrades or replacements to roofs, windows, HVAC systems, fire alarms and back-up generators.

Ontario also plans to invest \$12 billion over 10 years in capital grants to hospitals to build modern infrastructure. About 35 major hospital projects are now underway across the province. Ontario is also increasing province wide funding to hospitals this year by more than \$345 million. This is part of a total investment of \$51.8 billion in health care-a two percent increase over last year.

Mr. Graham explained, "the program itself, HIRF, is a fund that we have often benefitted from. Originally with the \$130,000 we had received, it was less than we had received last year. So we applied for additional funding under an exceptional services claim. We had some repairs had to make to shore up



Liberals need to revisit local education funding

News that the federal government had reduced funding to Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute was received with some considerable shock, along with a somewhat reasonable sense of betrayal, by those who have placed great stock in the Liberal government's promises to address the education gap being faced by First Nations.

A close examination of funding changes suggests that much of the missing funds have gone to Laurentain University, a laudable beneficiary it may be, but when measured against the success of a First Nations institution, located on reserve and with a committed mandate to provide education within a culturally infused milieu—clearly in keeping with the goals and aspirations of the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission—observers are left shaking their heads.

As has been often pointed out by First Nations leaders recently, although the party at the helm of the government may have changed, those bureaucrats doing the actual paddling remain the same as they were under the previous regime, with what appears to be much of the same agenda.

With less than a week until classes are set to begin in the new school year, there is still a deafening silence coming from the bureaucracy as to the fate of a large portion of the KTEI federal funding. If this is how a demonstrably successful approach to improving the educational attainment of indigenous people on the ground is treated by the government—the only reasonable conclusion an outside observer can come to is: plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose—the more things change, the more things stay the same.

If they are truly serious about changing the way that the government deals with First Nations and indigenous peoples across this nation Prime Minister Trudeau and Indigenous Affairs Minister Carolyn Bennett need to put a much stronger bite in their steering oars.

Local educational institutions like KTEI not only provide culturally appropriate approaches to learning, they also bring a significant economic benefit to the communities in which they are based. KTEI is not alone in facing the cuts that have impacted local education, there are a number of such institutions across Ontario that have also been hit with these cuts, delivered almost without warning, far too late in the day to allow effective planning and the consideration of other avenues to provide the training and education the federal government has historically failed in its obligation to provide.

Putting more money in the institutions that have historically, and somewhat spectacularly, failed to address the challenge at the expense of innovative approaches that incorporate local expertise that have a proven record of success is not following the path to a building a new relationship. It is a vindication of those who have painted the current government as presenting an old doll wearing new hair. At the end of the day it will fall apart.

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Ill-conceived cormorant kill bill decried as unnecessary

Bill 205 should be killed, not the cormorants

To the Expositor:

Last May MPP Robert Bailey introduced the unnecessary and regressive Private Member's Bill 205 that, if passed, would allow the uncontrolled killing of cormorants in Ontario. It could set our still highly vulnerable, cormorant population back on the road to near extinction.

Persecution by humans and pesticide poisoning nearly wiped out cormorants on two occasions in the past, but in recent years they have repopulated parts of their former range. Their return to the Great Lakes is a good news environmental story. But the recovery of cormorants could be short-lived if Bill 205 is passed.

Regretfully, the irrational dislike of cormorants runs deep, so they have been scapegoated for almost every kind of problem from destroying the environment to eating all the fish. In fact, if cormorant detractors were to be believed, you'd think the birds were some kind of apocalyptic black plague decimating everything in their path. But nothing could be further from the truth.

The reality is that cormorants are a native bird and an integral and beneficial component of Ontario's natural ecosystems. Their numbers in the province, while still modest, have already leveled off and are dropping in some areas. Cormorant colonies are not common and where they do exist, they are vulnerable to harassment.

As the primary predators of invasive fish species, like round gobies, cormorants are ecologically beneficial and in areas where cormorant colonies exist, sport fish populations can be robust. There is no substantive scientific evidence that cormorants have any significant impact on the fish caught by commercial fishermen or recreational anglers.

Some people are concerned about cormorant guano killing trees, usually because they don't like how it looks, but the total number of trees killed by all the cormorants in Ontario is minuscule. And changes in vegetation, including tree deaths, are a normal, natural process in colonial waterbird colonies around the world, as well as in a multitude of other natural situations.

Trying to stop normal, natural change through killing is disruptive and misguided, especially since the killing has to occur every year, because new cormorants will just replace the ones that have been killed before them. So, if keeping a few trees intact is the goal, unless cormorants as a species are almost entirely wiped out in Ontario, the killing can never stop.

Remarkably, while the ill-conceived and unnecessary Bill 205 sits active in the Ontario government process, a US federal court just ended systematic cormorant killing in 24 eastern US states saying there was little scientific basis for it.

It's Bill 205 that should be killed, not the cormorants.

Kay Burns

Kay, just three years short of her centennial birthday, harbours a wonderful dry humour that is truly reflective of the 'Burns' name. For those not in the Baby Boomer category, George Burns, no relation, used to entertain us with his straight shooting wife, Gracie during their television show (Burns and Allen), back in the '50s and '60s.

Kay lives in Gore Bay in a beautiful brick home overlooking the bay. "When we first moved here many decades ago, the waves would wash right up to the road in front of the house. The town eventually filled in this low area, to create some parkland and set-up a buffer zone for us at the same time."

Today, Kay and her daughter Sandie sit on Kay's front porch, enjoying the sunlight and the scenery as they greet and welcome this writer. Stories were shared on the porch, Sandie helping with a few memories from time to time. The ambience was pleasing and relaxed, as Kay began her history.

"My grandparents, the Lehmans and Stewarts, hailed from Ireland originally, but they settled in southern Ontario and only the Lehmans came North." Paternal grandfather Jesse Lehman, born in 1874, married Catherine McLeod. Jesse opened his own store in Kagawong and later purchased the Killarney Hotel, which he operated for several years with his wife Catherine. Jesse was also reeve in Killarney for two terms. In addition, he prospected, traded in furs and livestock, and sold automobiles."

Jesse and Catherine's son Franklin, born in 1897, married Mary Stewart. They had five children: The first was Floyd, who worked for De Havilland in Toronto, in the department that tested new planes. "Mostly I remember he was the one who always annoyed me. Stewart was in the Air Force. I remember him being rather creative by taking the wheels off a toy to make a skate board. He also ran Lehman's camp, that my grandfather owned, on Lang Lake, near Espanola. The next child was Kathleen (me), then Marguerite, and the youngest, Leonard, was also in the Air Force. He was killed in the service, overseas."

Kathleen Dorothy (Kay) was born to Frank and Mary Lehman on September 18, 1919 in Pembroke, the home of her maternal grandparents. Frank was an accountant there early in his career before moving to Toronto to work in a local bank there. "It was exciting going downtown to visit the big department stores. If any of us got lost, we knew to meet at Timothy's toe. Timothy Eaton had erected a large statue of himself in front of the big Eaton's store downtown. This



took the train and then walked to their home. We often strolled to the park for a picnic, my grandmother trailing five kids. Everyone walked at that time. Hide-andseek was a favourite."

'Ground' rules different were when Kay was growing up. "We could play outside all day and show up for meals or even stay out all day and just come back for supper. Dad had strict rules. 'No talking at the table' was one of them. I usually forgot this edict and this eventually compelled him to threaten us with a written sign. He insisted it would declare talking

written sign. He insisted it would declare talking 'off limits' at the table. 'I guess that The Beauty Salon in Little Current with Kay at the door.

sign won't be for me,' I responded sincerely, 'because I can't read'."

Kay's family lived in Killarney for a short while and she enjoyed her time there. "In the winter, we would travel over the ice in a horse-pulled sleigh to pick up the mail at Little Current or Whitefish Falls. Our guide would walk ahead to test the thickness of the ice with his axe. It was 22 miles across and the trip was quite an adventure for a young girl."

When Kay was six, her family was back in Little Current. "My first day of school must have been pretty traumatic for me. As soon as I was left alone with all those kids I didn't know, I wet my pants." Kay found school more to her liking after she got used to the people and the routines. "School was just part of 'things we did' at the time. We all went to school and we feared the teachers even though we didn't do anything bad. That fear translated into respect. Kids respected their teachers." Kay liked art the best. From those early years at school, she remembers the King and Queen coming to Sudbury by train just before the Second World War. "Mother kept up the walking routine for all of us on Manitoulin. One day we were strolling downtown with her when an older man playfully hit our mother with his cane. We all laughed because we thought that was pretty funny. He was just a stranger in the street and I don't think he meant anv harm. Mother was a bit upset but she took it in stride."

was very popular, as was softball. "We were active in the winter too. Ritchie's Hill in Little Current offered skiing. We cross-country skied as well," Kay adds. "In the summer we would drive down the hill on our bikes. This was quite thrilling. I often fell when I got to the bottom and my friend Mildred would yell, 'Get up, get up' because there was a car coming. I would be hurting from the fall so could only move in slow motion.

Swimming in the local lakes

The cars would stop anyhow." Dad Frank, who later owned th Lang Lake Resort, came to run the Killarney hotel for a year. "I worked there that summer with my aunt Irene, who was only two years older. Grandfather opted to manage the Lang Lake Resort instead.' However, Kay spent most of her 'teenage' summers working at Lang Lake, waiting on customers, setting tables, cleaning up and making beds. "Chores still had to be done at home too. These included helping with dishes, cleaning the floor and hauling water from the lake. I didn't have any hobbies. I remember my brothers collecting stamps, though." After finishing Grade 10, Kay decided to open a beauty parlour in Little Current. Her shop was established in a small building between the old Edgewater Restaurant and the building where the laundromat is now located on Water Street. "I had taken a hairdressing course in Sudbury first. I enjoyed helping

the local ladies cut and curl their hair."

The tragic day of the Danny Dodge accident, where he fell overboard and drowned following being severely injured by a dynamite explosion, created another memory for the young lass. She recalls the arrival of the boat in Little Current. The Dodge's caretaker at the family resort at Maple Point had also been wounded and was carried to a spot in front of her shop. There he was propped up against the front wall so that Ball or those held at the Orange Hall. The two-step was popular, as was square dancing. It seemed that Kay enjoyed the twirling more than Chester or perhaps Kay might have been a better dancer. Nevertheless, the couple relished being together.

Their wedding was held at the home of the bride's parents on Cherry St. in Little Current. "We were wed on my birthday, a beautiful sunny, September 18, 1940. I was 21 years old." The honeymoon took them to the ever popular Niagara Falls. "We went on the ferryboat Maid of the Mist and we visited Chester's Uncle Henry who ran a bakery in that city. He made the best buns for special occasions like Lent."

After they returned home, Chester went back to his job in the mines in Sudbury. Coincidentally, the newlyweds lived on 'Kathleen' Street. Kay liked to imagine that the street may have been named for her at the time.

When the Second World War started, the couple had moved to Manitowaning working at the Shell Station Chester had purchased. The government was restricting the movement of German people. Kay, who had some German ancestry, was afraid that she might be taken too, but that never happened.

After two years, the couple moved to Toronto where Chester did his stint for the war effort by working in at the Massey Harris plant on King Street welding tanks and airplane wings bound for Europe. "Chester told me about his friend, Maynard Le Breck who was a soldier overseas when he was accidentally strafed by 'friendly' gunfire during an attack. He had to cut off what was left of his own arm to survive. That must have been horrific."

First-born Stewart was about two years old when Chester saved the family from a gas leak in their apartment. Each time Chester tried to stand up, he would pass out from breathing in the concentrated natural gas. After several attempts, he crawled to the window and opened it wide. Then he got his family to crawl to the window and all were saved. Little Stewart was safely handed out to the waiting arms of his family.

Eventually, the couple returned to Manitoulin, to Gore Bay where Chester worked as a mechanic for Bill Smith's Ford dealership. subsequently Chester did mechanical work for Ontario Paper on the Island and followed that job with the purchase of the lease for the Shell station and garage in Gore Bay. The lease was later sold to Harry Witty and Chester became a mechanic and welder for EB Eddy (later Domtar) in Ramsey.

Kay found work too. When the kids were young, she taught swimming for the Red Cross at Tobacco Lake near Gore Bay. When Chester was working up north, she was employed at the telephone office in Gore Bay. The phones were being switched to the rotary format. "I often left the switch open so I could chat with Chester when he took a break in Ramsey. He would come home to us on weekends. His friend Orville Myers worked there with him. Chester stayed there until he retired. After the telephone office, Kay became an assistant to the local dentist, Dr. Humphries. "He was a very nice dentist" and she enjoyed this work, as she had all her other jobs over the years. Three children ensued from this happy household. Stewart. born in Mindemoya, is now living just off Perivale Road. In the early 1960s. Stewart purchased the Shell Station lease from Harry Witty who had bought it from Stewart's dad, and he kept that lease for twenty years. Donna, born in Toronto, lives in Arizona now. "When she was born, the

immense statue possessed a big bronze toe. Everybody knew of this sculpture, and the grand toe, so it was an ideal place to meet."

"We found out about Manitoulin and made the decision to move there, while dad was still an accountant in Toronto. I was pretty small and Marguerite and Leonard were born on the Island. Our house was up on the hill in Little Current where the Guardian Pharmacy is now. "One of my first memories is getting on the train in Little Current to visit Grandad's camp in Espanola," Kay shares. "Grandfather Jesse would pick us up at the Fox Lake station, opposite Lang Lake Road. My dad ran the cottages at the camp in the summer. The Lang Lake Camp offered the American plan which included breakfast and supper. It was an exciting place to visit and we always had lots of fun."

Visiting the maternal Stewart family in Pembroke offered a different kind of excitement. "We pressure could be applied to his gash until help came. It was an unusual day for the salon and for Little Current.

Kay's aunt Irene asked her niece to be a bridesmaid for Irene's marriage to Lorne Bousquet. It was a beautiful wedding in Killarney and a photo of the wedding party on the steps of the hotel still hangs in the Lodge. After the nuptials, someone joked that the wedding wasn't really legal because Kay was not old enough to sign the register. It seems that allegation was never tested.

"Chester Burns of Gore Bay used to follow me around at baseball games. He seemed to be very enthusiastic about appearing where I happened to be. At first it was a bit annoying but then I began to like him. When he wasn't teasing me, he was kind, and he had a great sense of humour," Kay shares. Chester and Kay enjoyed going to dances like the Sailor's

Haweater incidents down from last year

LITTLE CURRENT—During the Civic Holiday weekend from Friday, July 29 to August 1, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), with assistance from the OPP Sudbury Traffic and Marine Unit, and the OPP Northeast Region Snowmachine, All Terrain Vehicle, and Vessels Enforcement (SAVE) Unit responded to 96 incidents compared to 111 incidents handled in 2015. This continues a downward trend in calls for service since 2011.

"The Civic Holiday weekend is our busiest time of the year," said Staff Sgt. Kevin Webb, Detachment Commander for the Manitoulin OPP. "The officers were visible and took a proactive, zero tolerance approach when dealing with breaches of the law at Haweater Weekend. strict enforcement The allowed police to effectively deal with civil disorder in a timely fashion, ensuring everyone had a safe, and enjoyable, time."

"Fifty percent of our calls for service were of a proac-

tive nature, where officers were in the right place, at the right time to deal with the incident," the Staff Sgt. continued. "We took a measured approached when determining staffing levels for the weekend, and we will continue to do so in the years ahead."

Of the 96 incidents investigated over the weekend there were: two impaired drivers (there were 26 charges related to violations of the Highway Traffic Act in 2015); two charges of assault police; seven drug related incidents; several domestic assault related incidents; 42 Liquor Licence Act charges laid by police (compared to 49 in 2015); 22 people were held in the local detachment cells for a time during the period (10 people were taken into custody in 2015); 12 drug related charges (compared to four Controlled Drug and Substance related charges in 2015); and two Criminal Code charges were laid by police (there were eight in 2015).

"There were many hours of proactive patrols involving ATVs, bicycles, foot patrols and cruiser patrols with lots of positive interaction with our local citizens and visitors."

"I would once again like to acknowledge the many event volunteers, the Lions Club and the community of the Northeast Town for a successful Haweater Weekend," said Staff Sgt. Kevin Webb. "I would also like to thank the local OPP members and the officers from the OPP Highway Safety Division for the measured response to public safety at this year's festival. Although the police were busy, there were no criminal incidents at any of the venues once again this year. Over 50 percent of the police action taken was proactive in nature which prevented more serious incidents or disturbing behaviour in the community. One of the best compliments from our public is when they tell me that they enjoyed interacting with the police and did not witness any civil disobedience during the festival."

Childhood Cancer

Dayna Caruso, executive director of Northern Ontario Families of Children with Cancer, made a deputation to the Northeast Town council requesting that September be declared Childhood Cancer Awareness Month in the municipality.

"Given that cancer is the number one disease killing our children in Ontario, two children die of cancer every week in this province, it is imperative to raise awareness about the disease and its effects," said Ms. Caruso. "One in every 285 children will be diagnosed with a malignant

cancer by their twentieth birthday. In Ontario alone, over 400 children are diagnosed with cancer every year and at any point in time over 4,000 of this province's children require cancer care. It is estimated that treatment related expenses cost a family onethird of their after-tax income, and often forces them into a lifetime of debt. NOFCC provides programs and service to all Northern Ontario families during and after their journey through childhood cancer."

Council carried a motion declaring September 2016 Childhood Cancer Awareness Month in the Northeast Town. Council also directed staff to raise the flag on top of the town office for the month and to work with Ms. Caruso to hang gold ribbons on trees and poles around the downtown.

Road use agreement donation

The McLean's Mountain Wind Farm Road Use Agreement annual donation committee informed council that they had decided to split the \$10,000 donation this year between the Legion, Skate Canada Manitoulin and the Manitoulin Health Centre Auxiliary. Air ambulance makes emergency landing at Spider Bay Marina

LITTLE CURRENT—The sight of an Ornge Air helicopter circling Low Island in Little Current rather than its usual helipad at the Manitoulin Health Centre caused a stir in that community Sunday evening as streams of traffic flowed to the park and neighbouring Spider Bay Marina, where the air ambulance eventually landed.

According to Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson, a 9-1-1 call had come into the communications centre regarding a man with a head injury who was unconscious aboard a boat that was headed for help to Spider Bay Marina. The 9-1-1 dispatcher then lost contact with the caller and, not knowing the gravity of the situation, made the call to dispatch the air ambulance. By the time the vessel reached Spider Bay, the injured party had regained consciousness and the air ambulance was no longer needed. A land ambulance then transferred the man to hospital.

The condition of the person was not known as of press time Monday.

'Emily (Ritson) and I hadn't met in person so we decided to participate in the games together," she said. "We were room-


During her week Ms. Casson met members of the Toronto Blue Jays and also met Ashlee Simpson and her husband Evan Ross on her flight home to Sudbury.

Ms. Merrylees said that up until learning about Hope Air, she and Hope would have to leave Hope's siblings, 15-year-old Seth and 12-year-old Nate, at home, travelling to Ottawa with Hope's uncle to Ottawa numerous times each year.

"Hope can't be alone in the back of a car, so I would sit with her and my brother would drive us to Ottawa, drop us off at CHEO, drive back to Manitoulin and then come back to get us," Ms. Merrylees told The Expositor. "I was away from Seth and Nate for days and it was really hard on the whole family."

Driving between Gore Bay and Ottawa for Hope's treatments meant leaving at 8 am and arriving in Ottawa later that evening. A drive that should have taken eight hours, took 11-12 hours because Hope was on an apnea monitor to check her breathing which rang frequently, causing them to pull over and check on her status.

In 2010, Ms. Merrylees learned about Hope Air from a nurse at CHEO. "I called them and they asked a couple questions and then started flying us right away," she said. "Hope Air flies us directly from the Gore Bay Airport to Ottawa and we take a cab to the airport and then they fly us

home again. The flight only takes an hour and there are no costs associated with the flight—it's free.'

Eleven-year-old Hope is able to travel back and forth to Ottawa, now in and out on the same day, and because getting to the appointments is easier, it allows the neurologists at CHEO to monitor her better.

Since its inception in 1986, the charity has arranged over 100,000 flights.

"Hope Air is the only registered, national charity

that provides free flights to people who cannot afford the cost of an airline ticket to get medical expertise or specialized medical technologies that usually exist only in larger urban centres," notes the Hope Air website. ber 1965 to December 1984, severing their connections to family, language, culture and community, providing a direct link to major dysfunction for both those individuals, their families and communities.

The lawsuit seeks a settlement of \$1.3 billion in damages, or \$85,000 for each affected person, for the plaintiffs suffering emotional, psychological and spiritual harm from the lost connection to their aboriginal heritage. Lawyers for the plaintiffs are arguing they have enough evidence to forego a trial and prove that Canada had an obligation in law to ensure that indigenous children removed from their homes retain their cultural identity and heritage. "We, as you know — as a government — would like to get things out of court and to a table where we can make those kinds of agreements together, as a way forward," Minister Bennett told reporters in Winnipeg in the week before the start of the trial. "We want to work together with all of the litigants that are presently in court and try and get to the table."

Minister of Indigenous and Northern Affairs Carolyn Bennett is on record as expressing a hope that the Canadian government and the plaintiffs can find an out of court settlement to the case.

'Today I stand with the survivors of the Ontario Sixties Scoop as they fight for justice and acknowledgement after decades of heartache," said AFN National Chief Per-

ry Bellegarde, in a statement. "Survivors of the Sixties Scoop deserve just resolution and restitution without further delay. The federal government said recently that they would prefer to resolve this issue outside the courtroom. If they are serious then they should work with survivors of the Sixties Scoop to get a respectful, acceptable process in place."

Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee has a personal experience of the Sixties Scoop, having been removed from his family, the oldest of nine siblings. "I was the luckiest as I went to my biological grandparents," he recalled. "The next oldest went to my stepfather, the remaining seven were sent all over the place."

Some of the siblings did not meet again for 30 years.

"The seven sent to various families, three of them wound up in really awful situations," said Chief Mandahbee. For most of the siblings the loss of language and cultural connections was nearly completely severed. Chief Madahbee himself has had to work diligently over the years in order to learn Ojibwe. "I still have a long way to go," he admits.

For those who find their way back to their communities, they often wind up adrift, with little or no connections to their families and communities. "I know so many people, when they come back they

donor can save up to eight or nine lives and that there

Ms. Casson's family came to support her in the games, including her mother Anne Casson, who was Kinga's kidney donor.

At age 16 Ms. Casson was diagnosed with focal segmental glomerulosclerosis (FSGC) and by the end of high school she only had 50 to 60 percent kidney function. At 19, and in her first vear of college, Ms. Casson became pregnant and went through with the pregnancy despite the danger that it could have presented to her health. Two weeks prior to her son Jack being born, her kidneys began to fail and she had to be hospitalized—her kidney function dropping to 15 percent.

Ms. Casson started dialysis and was put on the transplant list, which was a three to four week wait.

Although it was a long shot, Ms. Casson's adoptive

mother Anne decided to get tested as a possible kidney donor and was found to be a match. The match was extremely rare as the two aren't blood related and Anne was able to give this

precious gift to her daughter.

"I am a huge advocate for organ donation," said Ms. Casson. "It is so important that everyone be one.

She noted that one organ

are roughly 1,500 people waiting for organs and about a third of those people die while waiting.

Ms. Casson and her son Jack are happy and enjoying life living in Little Current. She hopes to participate in the 2017 World Transplant Games being held in Spain.

Since 2000, the Canadian Transplant Games have been a showcase where organ transplant recipients from across the country come together to enjoy competition and camaraderie while celebrating a second chance at life. Held every two years, the games are a family oriented event. This year marked the first games where donors could also participate.

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Trudeau government reinstates Experimental Lakes funding

KENORA—The federal government has announced \$1.7 million in funding over two years for environmental research at the International Institute for Sustainable Development-Experimental Lakes Area (IISD-ELA) in Northwestern Ontario.

Kenora MP the Honourable Bob Nault confirmed the investment in freshwater research at the IISD-ELA on behalf of the Honourable Dominic LeBlanc, minister of Fisheries, Oceans and the Canadian Coast Guard, at a joint announcement during Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne's August 10 visit to the facility. Manitoba Premier Brian Pallister was also on hand for the announcement.

"The Government of Canada and the International Institute for Sustainable Development share a common commitment to understanding and protecting our freshwater fish-eries and the ecosystems that support them," said Minister LeBlanc in a press release following the announcement. "We are pleased to provide federal funding to IISD Experimental Lakes Area and to support its legacy of informing important policy decisions in Canada and around the world.

"The unique environmental research being done at the Experimental Lakes Area is a crucial source of insights into some of the most important issues of our time," said Premier Wynne. "It is why, when the previous federal government cut its support for the ELA two years ago, the Ontario government stepped forward to keep the ELA going and support this essential research. Today I am delighted that the federal government is renewing its partnership in the ELA and once again investing in this vital scientific work."

"Manitoba is proud to provide IISD its largest, stable grant. The IISD Experimental Lakes Area has the potential to achieve breakthroughs in the science around sustainable solutions to many of our province's water issues," said Premier Pallister in the release. "Our lakes and waterways are more than a source of drinking water, they are a significant component of our province's economic, recreational and tourism potential. Working in partnership with organizations like IISD, we will ensure that future generations are able to rely upon and enjoy our waterways.

"IISD Experimental Lakes Area, situated in beautiful Northwestern Ontario, is internationally known for its unique, whole-ecosystem research and its influence on policy decisions, such as the removal of phosphorous from household cleaners," said Mr. Nault. "This government recognizes the value of this important research facility and is committed to protecting our environment. It's also very encouraging to see premiers and ministers from Ontario and Manitoba attend this important event, which demonstrates their commitment to science and the ELA.

"We welcome this funding from the Government of Canada. With other partners, notably the Government of Ontario, IISD Experimental Lakes Area will continue to protect fresh water for future generations," said Scott Vaughan, president and CEO of the International Institute for Sustainable Development in the release. "Since the International Institute for Sustainable Development assumed operation of the Experimental Lakes Area two years ago, we have expanded its research and reach, from tracking the effects of pollutants in our lakes to assessing the impacts of climate change. For the first time, we have opened the facility to local communities and students, and are proud to have established a dialogue and partnership with local First Nations.'

This support along with our existing partnerships with the governments of Ontario and Manitoba is vital to maintaining IISD Experimental Lakes Area's unique repository of nearly 50 years of ecological experimentation and research," said Matthew McCandless, executive director of the IISD Experimental Lakes Area. "We are grateful to the federal government for recognizing the value of expanding our research capacity to provide evidence-based insight into the effects of pollutants, climate change and other threats to our lakes and rivers.'

'Certainly we welcome the announcement," said Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes, but she questioned the long-term commitment of the federal government to the program. "There needs to be continuity," she said, pointing out the importance of the longitudinal data collected by the IISD-ELA. "Is this just to fulfill their promise that they were going to reinvest?


Ms. Hughes noted that there has been a steady decline in the number of scientists employed by the federal government. "There has been an 11 percent reduction in jobs for scientists," she pointed out. "There are 406 fewer jobs than there was two years ago-that is 12 percent fewer than two years ago. I am not saying that it is not because of the previous cuts by the Conservatives," she added, "but it is questionable that they have not been reinstated.'

Mike Wilton of Spring Bay, a member of Algonquin Eco-Watch, was somewhat more upbeat on the announcement. 'I am pleased," he said. "It's a big thing. The IISD-ELA has been collecting so much good data over the years, and that is what is really important, the trends that data shows. It was a great loss when the federal government cut back the funding, now it's back!'

The announced funding comes from the \$197.1 million investment in ocean and freshwater sciences, which was announced in the May 2016 budget. The federal funding to IISD-ELA will cover the salaries of researchers and technicians and contribute to the facility's maintenance, data management and equipment costs. That research will cover the long-term study of freshwater ecosystems; fisheries productivity; and, aquatic invasive species and other stressors influencing freshwater fisheries.

For almost 50 years, IISD-ELA has pioneered research into threats to freshwater supplies such as phosphorus. nanosilver, acid rain, climate change and more, influencing water-management policies in Canada and around the world, points out the news release.

In the wake of the previous government's cutbacks, the provinces of Ontario and Manitoba stepped up to help fill the gap. The Government of Ontario currently provides up to \$2 million each year to IISD-ELA, while the Province of Manitoba has committed more than \$6 million over six years to support and advance IISD's operating costs, including the advancement of freshwater science and policy research.

Fire report

Ms. Gordon said that she has signed an online petition against the CRA tax rule and is encouraging her resort guests to sign a petition from Cheryl Gallant, MP for Renfrew-Nipissing-Pembroke.

"We quickly ran out of pages and had to request more we had so many signatures," said Ms. Gordon. "I sent out an email lobbying for the various Island and First townships Nations to pass a resolution stating that they weren't in favour of the tax rule and to the Manitoulin Tourism Association. Several of the townships have passed a resolution and have forwarded it to the CRA and Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport.'

"The decision to go after private, family-fun campgrounds as a source of revenue to pay for out-of-control spending is a direct assault on middle class Canadians," said Ms. Gallant in a press release. "Jobs in Northern Ontario are scarce. This is another attack on rural Canada. Scattering a few crumbs at Northern Ontario ignores the real problem of unfair payments at rates that are

taxation. Small campgrounds are asking to be treated like any other small business, which they are. By changing the way small campgrounds are taxed, they could be looking at a tax increase up to 50 percent higher than many billion-dollar corporations."

"In Northern Ontario, camping is a seasonal business," Ms. Gallant notes. "Employing five, full-time year-round employees is not realistic. This is penalizing children, seniors and working couples by taking away an affordable family vacation.'

The petition to the House of Commons in Parliament Assembled states, "we, the undersigned citizens of Canada, draw the attention of the House to the following: whereas, camping is about celebrating the great outdoors and is an integral part of our nation's heritage and our identity as Canadians, with nearly 5.8 million Canadians going camping each year; And whereas, the Trudeau Liberal government has decided that some campgrounds are too small to qualify for the small business tax deduction, demanding tax

greater than those of billing-dollar businesses; Whereas, campand grounds in Ontario have begun receiving calls and letters warning them of reassessments in part because they are deemed not to qualify for the small business tax deduction since they employ fewer than five people; with many family-run campgrounds being seasonal businesses that must close during the winter to meet their municipal bylaws and consequently easily fall below the five full-time equivalent (FTE) employee threshold set by Trudeau's tax collectors; Therefore, your petitioners, call upon all Members of Parliament to implement changes that ensure campgrounds are recognized as small businesses and pay the same taxes as other small businesses.



the roof area at the Little Current site adjacent to where the emergency department services work is being completed and other word related to that," continued Mr. Graham. "And at the Mindemoya site we needed the funding for the fuel tank storage and some other necessary work, such as new metal doors and exterior doors replacement.'

"This additional funding is great news," stated Mr. Graham. However, he cautioned, "things will be challenging for the next year, without a doubt. The original planning numbers (HIRF funding) for next year is quite low, \$39,700, and we still have a long list of infrastructure needs. This is reflective of the situation across the province;

where those hospitals with aging infrastructure compared to others will be receiving more financial assistance. That is why the HIRF funding is a great investment by the government because it prevents hospitals from getting to that state."

All parties admit that the park has been flying largely under the radar in recent years.

"A lot of people aren't really aware of it," said Ms. McQuay. "The sign is kind of back from the road and it is pretty low, about three feet high."

Mr. Beneteau noted that a lot of the best parts of the trail going through the woods seems to have been the part of the property that has been sold and is being developed.

Ms. McQuay stressed that she was not interested in becoming part of any controversy surrounding the sale or disposal of the land, but rather is focussed on what positive results could come of the property now that it is on the community radar.

"I have not been up there a lot myself," she admitted, noting that she regularly goes out to the Misery Bay park site. "I think the reason it has not been as popular is that a lot of it is close to the highway and the developments. That's not

really what people want to see."

But the property extends up beyond a cliff even though the current trails do not, so there may be possibilities to explore.

Trails have been a popular destination for both tourists and local residents across the province and Waggs' Wood may yet prove to be a positive asset to the town—an undiscovered gem.

diversion, there is grave concern that it will set a bad precedent for future applications.

"This decision opens the door to every neighboring city and county to the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Basin in the US and Canada to get water from the basin without meeting the conditions of the Compact," said Mayor Paul Dyster of Niagara Falls, New York, vice chair of the Cities Initiative. "This is not in the best interest of these resources that are so important to our region."

The mayors of the Cities Initiative were also disappointed with the public consultation provided during the review and approval process, the press release continues. "The only public hearing held by the Regional Body that recommended approval was held in Waukesha, which is hardly representative of the people in the region. When the final decision included conditions related to some of the problems with Waukesha's application, no

opportunity for comment was permitted on those changes."

Mayor Sandra Cooper of Collingwood, secretary/treasurer of the Cities Initiative, added, "we are taking this step to launch a legal challenge to the Compact Council's decision regarding the Waukesha water taking application because we do not feel that Waukesha met the rigorous standard set in the Compact to qualify for an exception to the ban on water diversions to communities outside of the basin."

The Cities Initiative has also written President Obama, Prime Minister Trudeau and the International Joint Commission requesting appropriate action within their authority to stop the diversion.

The Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Cities Initiative is a coalition of over 120 cities from the United States and Canada representing over 17 million people who work together for the long term protection and restoration of the Great Lakes.

wind up as lost souls," said Chief Madahbee

Some of his siblings "wound up being little more than glorified slaves" when they were placed in foster homes. For many years, both Native and non-Native foster children were something of an industry. Although there were certainly many families that sought to provide good homes and safe havens for children in care, there were plenty who simply sought the monthly cheques and provided very little in the way of physical, let alone emotional support and nourishment to their charges.

"They grew up tough," said Chief Madahbee, "but they also grew up bitter. A lot of violence came about as a result of that bitterness." For many, violence became a Saturday night diversion. "There just wasn't much of anything else to do but to get in fights."

Many retreated into the solace of drugs and alcohol, and that just made the violence worse. "I was fortunate," said Chief Madahbee. Eventually, he turned his back on that lifestyle and has not looked back. "It has been about 20 years I haven't been drinking," he said.

Chief Madahbee steps away from being cast as a role model, although there are those in his community who have cited him as such. "If I had an impact, I attribute it to my grandmother's values," he said. "I was just reflecting what was put onto me." But the disconnection that came about from the sundering of his own family in the Sixties Scoop has not been healed. "I probably see about three of them once in a blue moon," he said. "There are only eight of us left.' For actor Gloria May Eshkibok the trauma of the loss of her mother at age eight, and her father who was charged with her mother's death in what Ms. Eshkibok characterized as "the kangaroo court atmosphere at the time" has left lifelong scars and a strong antipathy to the community in which she was placed. Ms. Eshkibok's ordeal began in 1969, when "my dad was charged in the murder of my mother," she recalled. "I couldn't testify because I was eight at the time." Her mother's death came about following a domestic argument between her parents, but to this day Ms. Eshkibok remains convinced that what happened at the time was misconstrued by the court and that her father's implication in her mother's death was a miscarriage of justice that would not have happened had he been a middle class white person with access to high priced legal counsel.

The first inkling that she was being sent away from her family came at the feast at the Buzwah community hall following her mother's funeral, and it was a cruel awakening.

"I remember that there was this white woman with platinum blonde hair who was driving a red convertible who was there, I remember thinking 'Oh ever nice, even white friends have come to my mother's funeral'," she recalled. "The white lady asked me if I would like to go for a ride in her car. What kid wouldn't want to? But after I was buckled into my seat I saw my grandmother come out with a small suitcase. It was right after the funeral feast." She was taken to Gore Bay and placed in the Queen's Hotel. While her experiences with the family at the hotel were not entirely negative, "although they were very busy with the hotel," Ms. Eshkibok's recollection of the reaction to her in the community was not at all positive.

"Why was I taken to such a racist community?" she said.

Ms. Eshkibok suffered from a childhood



cancer that left part of her face disfigured, a setback that has not stopped her from enjoying a somewhat storied career as an actress mingling with the likes of Tomson Highway and taking part in the such seminal plays as 'The Rez Sisters' and playing an early role in the Debajehmujig Theatre Group (now Debajehmujig Storytellers).

"I remember walking from the hotel to school and the snickering old men," she said. The racism she said that she encountered on the street came as a terrible shock, even though it was far more common to see racist comments and actions overtly expressed in those days. "I had known white people all my life, from the days when I had surgery and when I went to Sick Kids every year." Those experiences did not prepare her for what she faced as a scared, lonely eight-year-old Native girl. "How could people be so hateful to a little kid?" she asked.

What she met on the streets for that one school year could have set her on a path of anger and hatred, and in fact it did colour her views for many years. Her saving grace, what kept Ms. Eshkibok from walk-... continued on page 12



Central Manitoulin council offer to Old School tenant falls short

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—Central Manitoulin council considered an Office and Administration Committee motion (moved in council by Councillor Patricia MacDonald and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens) to compensate Proulx Law Offices \$2,500 for a percentage of the leasehold improvements, time and expenses incurred in moving the law office due to the municipality closing the Old School building, but agreed to defer the motion when it became evident that Janelle Proulx, the owner of the law office, was dismayed by the offer.

Councillor Derek Stephens made note of the presence of the lawyer, accompanied by her mother, in the council chambers and suggested that council might wish to hear her views on the offer.

Ms. Proulx pointed out that she was unaware that the council had been debating an offer of compensation to her in committee. "I learned that it was on the agenda (for that evening's council meeting), that's how I knew to come."

Mayor Richard Stephens explained that most of the discussion of municipal business actually takes place in committee meetings. "The way it works is that committee meets and all discussion takes place within those meetings," he said. The mayor pointed out that there were usually only five members of the council on the council committees.

'It was in Office and Administration because it didn't deal directly with property," noted Councillor MacDonald.

"I heard about it, but it was a shot in the dark to hear that," noted Ms. Proulx. She pointed out that one of the municipal councillors had said that he would "personally undertake to compensate" her for any loss that she might incur-which she took to mean she would receive a tax break on the property she had to purchase to move her law office, among other expenses. "I sent a detailed letter," she said. "Frankly, I find the offer of \$2,500 offensive and shocking when you look at all of the expenses." She noted that amount would hardly even cover the cost of a door that she had to install.

Ms. Proulx went on to suggest that the council would not have made such an offer to any of the "older male established lawyers."

She objected strongly to the process, noting that the motion could easily have passed and she might have been totally unaware that it had even been discussed. She pointed out that she has spent "thousands of dollars and \$2,500 is a fraction of it" adding that "I am happy you have let me speak.'

Councillor Baran noted that the letter provided by Ms.

Proulx to council did not have costs for the incurred expenses attached and that the committee made its best guess as to the costs in determining what they should offer. 'I think we misinterpreted your letter as saying 'okay guys, make me an offer'," he said.

"I am still incurring expenses," interjected Ms. Proulx, adding that she would have answered any questions had she been given an opportunity to respond.

Councillor MacDonald commented that it was not within the purview of one councillor to commit council to a course of action.

"I signed the lease with one person," rejoined Ms. Proulx. (CAO Ruth Frawley later noted that she was authorized to act on behalf of council to enter into the lease agreement in question.)

"I think we are trying to be fair," said Councillor Mac-Donald. "That was the number we came up with, it was higher than what we were originally presented with. I am not sure what you are asking for."

"I think maybe we could reconsider this," suggested Mayor Stephens. "We want to be fair. You were caught in the process.

Councillor Linda Farquhar asked if Ms. Proulx would be willing to provide detailed expenses by the end of October. Mayor Stephens interjected that costs associated with the purchase and outfitting of a new building would not be part of any agreement.

Councillor Stephens weighed in that the lease agreement indicated that it could be terminated with 60 days' notice from either party. "I think that we have been very fair," he said. He suggested that it was not necessary to defer the motion.

Councillor Baran spoke in favour of a deferral until the detailed expenses could be provided and Councillor Scott noted that he believed that there was a "communications problem. I think we should have notified her that we would be discussing this." He indicated that he was still willing to see a compensation of two-thirds of leasehold improvement costs, but not paying for the cost of a new building.

"Is that not what we did?" asked Councillor Stephens. "It came out to \$2,500. It was more than what I had predicted."

Councillor Ted Taylor also noted that while he felt it was fair to pay a portion of the incurred leasehold improvements, he did not extend that to a new building.


Ms. Proulx and her mother left the council meeting before the final decision was made to defer the motion until a clearer picture of the leasehold expenses could be determined.

ing down a dark path, was becoming part of the theatre and her experiences working at the Anchor Inn Hotel in her teenage years, where she made connections with the theatre crowd and met people like the playwright Tomson Highway and Debaj's Larry Lewis.

When she returned to her own community of Wikwemikong, Ms. Eshkibok found many of her family connections were damaged and she had a difficult time connecting

'The official story (as told to her) was that my father was in the hospital," she recalled. But as a young rebellious teenager she recalled using her father's conviction for her mothmurder as a weapon when she was angry at him, something she now regrets when she reflects back to those arguments.

was placed upon him. "He hid himself in drink," she said. Unable to cope with her family life, Ms. Eshkibok fled to Toronto to become an artist. But despite the disconnections, there were some solid events in her life in Wikwemikong that led to rich experiences later in her life, particularly when it comes to the church.

"My dad was not much for expressing emotions," she said. "Whenever I needed a hug, dad would say 'go to church'." It was at church that she learned to sing the old hymns in Anishinabe, something that would lead to her creation of the 'Magnificate Opera,' a collection of Anishinabemowin hymns.

Both Ms. Eshkibok and Chief Madahbee say that ultimately, their experience of the Sixties Scoop was at the lesser end of the negative scale, although it was to have a disproportionate impact on the rest of their lives, they were able to accomplish remarkable things with their lives.

But that success came with a large cost.

Ms. Eshkibok spent many years in psychotherapy, learning the tools that she uses today to transcend the negativity in her life. She credits people in her community, such as the late Kitty Bell who taught her a lot of the culture that she had lost and people like the very much alive Bea Shawanda who taught her to believe in herself.

"When white people shoot you down, you start believing it," she said. "I am glad I became involved in the theatre, it saved my life."

"We are a resilient people," noted Chief Madahbee, but added that the Anishinabe are also ultimately human beings and the impacts of the residential school system and the related Sixties Scoop are generational and repairing the damage will not be a quick fix.



United Church Outreach Committee supports South Sudan orphanage

LITTLE CURRENT—At church service on August 28, the congregation of Little Current United Church was treated to both an object lesson in the personal importance of volunteerism and also learned about a small orphanage in far-away South Sudan in the Horn of Africa.

Tracy Coghlin and her husband Brad Hoover were introduced by Wendy Gauthier. Ms. Gauthier explained that she and her husband Marcel had met the couple during a vacation earlier this year and she was so impressed by what Ms. Coglin does as a volunteer that she had asked them to speak to her church family.

Ms. Coghlin holds the rank of sergeant with the Ontario Provincial Police. She explained that she is a 24-year veteran of the OPP and works at the police service's Orilla headquarters where she is tasked with investigating sexual and domestic assault cases. Her husband, Brad Hoover, is also a policeman and has been a member of the Toronto police service for 30 years. His work in Toronto is similar to Ms. Coglin's.

Ms. Coghlin explained that, about five years ago, she was finding the nature of her police work stressful and so looked at spending a year abroad but still doing police work.

She applied for a United Nations position, was accepted, and was assigned to work in the nation of South Sudan.

South Sudan, after years of political turmoil and civil war, was able to break away from Sudan and was recognized as a country on its own by the United Nations. It is presently the newest nation in the world.

In her one-year role with the U.N., Ms. Coghlin was given responsibilities at a women's prison.

She explained that, after a couple of months, she was finding this work as stressful as the job she had temporarily vacated in Ontario and had passed this onto her supervisor who was, like her, on leave from police duties in Canada, specifitinued to fundraise for the Juba orphanage and plans her vacation time so that she can go back and work there.

Last year, her husband joined her for the first time on one of these "working holidays" and the couple is planning to go back to Juba in November to take supplies to the orphanage and to help out.

Ms. Coghlin's secondary message was about the importance of volunteerism, at home or abroad. "There are so many hardships and children in need in Africa that helping 40 children isn't going to make a huge difference," she stated. But the fact was, she went on to say, that these 40 orphans are being helped.

It was very clear that the dedication of Cathy Groenendijk, the founder of the Juba orphanage, has made an enormous impression on Ms. Coghlin and has, in fact, changed her life.

"Cathy is a person who, if she sees a child who is dying in the streets, will bring that child back to her home, to her own bed, where the child will die with her," Ms. Coghlin said.

But she also told the story of Moses, a child Cathy found as an infant left in a puddle and brought back to the orphanage. Moses is now five and speaks four languages and the slide presentation that Mr. Hoover showed during his spouse's talk showed Moses as an infant as well as a current picture of a smiling and happy child. Ms. Coghlin also said that a young woman who had lived her life at the orphanage is now in medical school in Uganda and Cathy Groenendijk is hopeful that, when she becomes a physician, she will return to Juba to help the community there.

The charity that operates the orphanage (and also supports 600 other children in the region by providing them with school uniforms and supplies so they can get an education) is called Confident Children Out of Conflict (CCOC) and Ms. Coghlin advocates for this organization by spending much of her own time giving talks to church groups and service clubs. She said she is hoping that this week, the Canada Revenue Agency will recognize CCOC as a charitable organization in Canada, allowing it to issue tax receipts for donations. Following Sunday's presentations Ms. Coghlin and Mr. Hoover were presented with a cheque for \$500 from the church's Outreach Committee (funds were earned at a quiche luncheon put on by the Outreach Committee after church that same day). The Little Current United Church Outreach Committee had also sewed bags for every child in the orphanage and stuffed each of them with a homemade dress (for the girls), underwear, flip flops, toiletries and personal care items. CCOC is inspired by Christian compassion to take care of the most vulnerable children and their families in society by commitment to community participation and development and by passion to advocate for the rights of vulnerable children and youth through partnerships. One of these partnerships was demonstrated Sunday as the church's Outreach Committee helped fulfill this mandate.

He also suggested a particular orphanage that could use help.


Ms. Coghlin said she visited the orphanage (it was a 1.5 hour walk each way from where she was stationed), and was so completely impressed by its director, a Ugandan woman, Cathy Groenendijk, who had begun to take orphan children into her own home and had then begun to work with the U.N., eventually building a permanent shelter.

The orphanage is located in a centre called Juba and has space for 40 children, most of whom are girls who have been rescued from the streets of that city. The alternative for many of these children would have been to face a life in the sex trade in order to feed and shelter themselves.

Ms. Coghlin said she immediately began to dedicate all of her spare time to helping at the orphanage and, when she returned to Canada and her job with the OPP, con-

River School: the art and science of rivers with 4e and Manitoulin Streams

Where science and nature combines education and fun

KAGAWONG—4elements Living Arts and Manitoulin Streams came together once again this summer to take on another successful partnership project: River School—the art and science of rivers. Both children and adults took part in classes focusing on plant and animal life in the Kagawong River.

The kids' day programs were well attended with 12-14 kids in each class. This included a very popular workshop held during Kagawong's annual Summer Fest where children drew snails and worms and snakes and frogs.

Twelve paddlers (including this writer) filled four canoes and spent an afternoon on the Kagawong River in mid-July as they attended River School's watershed through photo documentation. Participants learned about mapping, photography and watersheds from Susan Meert of Manitoulin Streams and 4elements facilitator Heather Thoma while Katie put them through their paces with paddling skills.

Five guides and seven students underwent dry land training prior to stepping into the canoes. The pupils learned paddle strokes: forward, C stroke (wide sweeping motion) and the J turn. Each of them was given a whistle to attach to their PFD (personal floatation device). Three different signals were demonstrated: 1, I want your attention; 2, come to me or 'raft up;' and 3, I need help now. Luckily only one signal was heard during the afternoon: come to me.

"What does water mean to you?" asked Ms. Thoma prior to taking to the river. Responses included: I play in it, swim, cleanse and heal, play, study, no life without it, gives life. Ms. Thoma gave each canoe a clipboard and paper to draw the water at the beginning and end of their time on the river. "As you paddle, look around at what you're seeing and sketch or take a picture."

Each canoe held three people, two to paddle and one in the centre to take photos and draw trees, lily pads, wildlife and other life in, on and around the river.

moves and collects into the same place," she replied. "It is in essence 'a collector;' naturally formed by mountains and rivers—moving together to one cluster." After a short stop at a

After a short stop at a tent and trailer park site, paddlers were back in the water for what was a quick return to the launch across from Bridal Veil Falls.

"There is life in it" and "it brings balance to everything in existence," were two of the responses to Ms. Thoma's question 'what is the river?" which summed up their experience perfectly.

River School wrapped up its summer session this past weekend with guest artist Brenda King Gold of Sudbury and retired Manitoulin Secondary School history teacher Bill Caesar. The purpose of the class was to "deepen your knowledge of the river along with your watercolour and creative writing skills as we examine the micro world of river invertebrates, riparian habitats, plants and fossils."

sils." Mr. Caesar shared his knowledge and love of fossils with the class along with Ms. Thoma and Ms. Meert who acted as guides for the day, 4elements Living Arts program director Patricia Mader, Ms. Gold and three students (including this writer). Ms. Thoma asked each student what question they have about the river, some of the answers were: what type of stones are in the river besides limestone, what will it look like in 100 years. how old is the river, with all the rain we had recently, how high will the water level be today, and Mr. Caesar asked, 'how many treasures are in the river that I want?" The first stop along the river had students sitting on rocks, dipping brushes in the river and simply using the brush and texture of watercolour paper to move the colours across the page. What Ms. Gold enjoys about watercolour painting is to be surprised and to "let go of control; let it happen.

"I want you to experience the brush," she said. "What marks does it make on your skin and how it feels different from another brush." Acrylic is more coarse as is pushes the paint around. She invited them to slow down and "look at the material you're working with."

Different painting techniques were explored as students learned layering and textures of paint and paper.

When asked to describe water and colour in one word, the responses were alive, life, movement, place, refreshing and play. For colour the responses were vibrant, change, surprise and space.

After spending some time painting and working with colour, brushes and technique, one of the students asked Ms. Gold how do you know when it's finished. Her reply was, "it's a feeling. If you ask the question, it's probably done. Take a break from it and then come back."

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The cool temperatures overcast skies did not dampen the spirits of the paddlers as they made their way down the river.

One of the students, Shelba, who is First Nations, shared the Ojibwe names for several of the creatures seen along the way.

Some of the creatures included a beaver (ahmik), duck (ziishiib), and two turtles (mizheekay). The wind got up several times along the way which caused the lily pads to flip up, showing their pinkish hued underside which was a pleasant surprise. Beaver dams, cattails, tree stumps and huge oak trees made good subjects for sketching and photos.

One of the River School participants asked Ms. Thoma "what is the definition of a watershed?"

"It is where the water

The last stop of the afternoon was at the mouth of the river where students had an opportunity to draw using permanent markers and water to make a smudge effect.

Nets and rubber tubs were used to dip into the river to hold rocks carrying mircoscopic invertebrates. Several crayfish, water penny beetle larva and flat head mayflies were found.

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Rainbow Lodge celebrates 40th anniversary of helping individuals overcome challenges

by Michael Erskine WIKWEMIKONG—Born out of a crisis that faced the Wikwemikong community 40 years ago, the Ngwaagan Gamig Recovery Centre Inc. (Rainbow Lodge) has assisted more than 4,000 individuals and their families to deal with the challenges of addictions during the four decades of its existence.

On Friday, August 26 staff, board members and volunteers were joined by politicians and community members at Thunderbird Park for a celebration of the lifesaving success that has been the hallmark of the work being done by Rainbow Lodge since its inception.

Master of ceremonies Chris Pheasant kept the celebrations going smoothly, beginning with a lunch at noon until after a dinner feast at 7 pm, providing a steady banter and explanation of the events going on that kept everyone well in the loop.

Many of those joining the celebration were dressed in powwow regalia and the events of the day officially began with a grand entry and the posting of eagle staffs while host drum High Eagle and guest drum Thunder Earth provided the songs. Honour songs were sung for the many staff and volunteers of the Lodge along with healing songs for those whose life's journey took them through the programs offered by the Lodge.

"There are so many people who we have to celebrate," said Rainbow Lodge President Andrea Wemigwans, "full-time, part-time, volunteers and students, all seeking to make our community a better place. Today we take time celebrate the contributions of all of these people."

Ogimaa (chief) Duke Peltier spoke for several minutes in Ojibwe about the importance of following the path to good health. "I want to thank all of the people for coming here to celebrate 40 years of great work," he said, calling for applause for the staff and volunteers, noting that they have all played a large part "particularly at a time when the community is looking for re-introduction of our ways into our lives. I offer my heartfelt congratulations to all of the staff for continuing to help them to find their path. We all get there in our own ways." Anishinabe Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee recognized the eagle staffs and other sacred objects that were present at the ceremonies and acknowledged "the foundations of what we celebrate today, family and the recognition of the value of life." Rainbow Lodge Executive Director Rolanda Manitowabi thanked everyone who came to the celebrations on behalf of

"Thank you Joe Corbiere for the pipe ceremony this morning to get us started in a good way. We acknowledge and remember the many people who have first started Rainbow Lodge, the late Chief Ron Wakegijig, the late David Osawabine and those who have been instrumental in building its reputation of sincere helping, those such as Peter Manitowabi, Alex Fox, Glen Corbiere, Clarence Pangowish, Lorney Bob, Willie Trudeau, Joanna Manitowabi, Hank Mandamin, the late Al Shawana and Ben Spanish and so many, many more."

"For about 420 people of our own community, Ngwaagan Gamig Recovery Centre Inc. has been a place of work, of serving on the governing board, or a place where students have done their school placements," she said. "We acknowledge and thank every single one of those who have worked for, or served, on the governing board, or a place where students have done their school placements."

Ms. Manitowabi noted that Rainbow Lodge has been many things to many people over its 40 years, but that for her personally it has been "12 years of continued growth and learning, of working with

an amazing team, and a place of constant change." She recalled her first day on the job when she was welcomed with "a breakfast, a card and flowers. It was an amazing feeling."

While the day was very much about the many staff and volunteers, Ms. Manitowabi stressed that it was also about the "the clients who choose to come into treatment, they are absolutely to be celebrated for their courage in seeking help, for their bravery

...continued from page 16 to go from surviving to choose living and for the fortitude to strengthen their wellbeing."

Ms. Manitowabi also recognized the many volunteers who helped organize the 40th celebrations and make them the success they were, including: "Alfreda, Cheryl, Yvonne, Martha, Matthew, Wanda, Stuart and all the others."

Ms. Manitowabi pointed to a large prayer wreath constructed by Bruno Recollet and a message book in which well wishers were encouraged to write down their thoughts and to construct a medicine bundle to attach to the wreath which would be displayed at Rainbow Lodge.

"Sometimes it is a very difficult job to work in this field," she said. "Our team often listens to stories of hurt, abuse and trauma. Sometimes high expectations for quick fixes can be unrealistic, yet our staff carry on, they must continue to be authentic, they must continue to take care of themselves to avoid burnout. I certainly hold out team in high regard."

Bea Shawanda, one of the original founders of Ngwaagan Gamig Recovery Centre Inc., was on hand to recall the early years of the organization and how it came to be, harkening back to 1976 and the suicide epidemic that saw Wikwemikong "splashed across the newspapers" which she said she regarded as "the worst thing you could do to a community, to shame them" instead of highlighting what a resilient community it truly is.

Convinced to return to the community, or perhaps blackmailed ("they said the Lodge would close if I did not come back to run it"), Ms. Shawanda noted that the experience of running the centre was one of the most challenging and rewarding experiences of her life. She noted that adjusting mainstream approaches to dealing with addictions and community healing to more culturally appropriate and inclusive methods often led to struggles with her Alcoholics Anonymous trained staff.

One anecdote she recalled involved a planned boat trip for a group of school children that nearly foundered when it was realized that they not only did not have enough life jackets for the children, but also had no funds or resources to buy the needed equipment.

"I looked around at the houses, I saw the ones that had two cars, two boats, two snowmachines in the yards," she recalled. "Those were the houses of the bootleggers in the community."

Writing a letter to the bootleggers, Ms. Shawanda appealed for money on behalf of the children. Suddenly, envelopes with cash began coming into the centre. "We raised \$1,300," she recalled. "Every single bootlegger responded."

Ms. Shawanda recalled the slave auctions where the local hockey team donated the receipts from their games and where the members of the community, big and small, offered their services for hire. In a series of humorous anecdotes Ms. Shawanda recalled the dog shows the Lodge would put on as fundraisers. She recalled the entry of the late Angus Pontiac one year when he took his dog across the stage relating a story in Ojibwe and in English (he wanted points for being bilingual, she explained)

where he was increasingly

intoxicated. The dog would stagger across the stage on cue, and ended up at the end of the story on his back with his tongue lolling out and his legs in the air. "They won that year," she deadpanned.

In each of the last 40 years community members have been winning back their lives, for themselves, their families and their communities," she noted. Many of those who have gone through the programs at Rainbow Lodge have gone on to hold important positions and jobs both within the community and elsewhere.

"Everything we did was with passion," she recalled. A passion that lives on in the organization to this day.

...continued from page 10 build their resiliency by empowering them with their innate creativity," she said.

In addition to her publishing ventures, she is also a respected painter in her home community and she uses her own personal poetry to inspire others and to illustrate concepts in her publications.

In a candid Saturday night session of question and answer, Ms. Scholz addressed some of the concerns expressed by audience members. She draws upon some of her own early childhood experiences to forge empathetic bonds with her listeners. After coming to Canada from Germany at age two and a half, she endured some difficult times in Kindergarten where mild dyslexia led to some switching of letters and numbers. Later on in high school she was fortunate to encounter teachers who were supportive and encouraging.

In her current practice, she has discovered that many students and employees suffer from a high level of anxiety. In fact, she reports that a half million people miss work every week because of stress in school, home and workplace. Since worry and chronic looping thoughts appear to be universal in our fast paced society, she has devoted a substantial part of her book and workshops to the management of fear and distress.

A second edition of the Loving Your Life guide has been released with an additional forty pages of resources. First published in 2004, this illustrated guide provides prompts and exercises for self-discovery and self-realization. Journal kits can also be purchased.

"I want to be helpful so I designed the book so that you can jump around in it and not read it cover to cov-

er; you can use it as a resource book by going to the table of contents and choosing the topic that interest you. I know that when you need information, you need it right now so you can also go to the web site for more practical information. I want to really listen to people and to see their successes and build on that.'

In her view, people have lost touch with their authenticity in the midst of a demanding technology based world. She believes there is a still a strong need for human touch and for meditation and breathing exercises to alleviate anxiety. During the evening meet and greet, she shared some of her poetry and led the spectators through a guided visualization exeractivities Those cise. served as a sneak peek into the workshop to follow.

The Sunday gathering allowed participants from Manitoulin, Sudbury, Welland and Tampa to themselves stretch through poetry, drawing, colouring, journaling and creative crosspollination. From 10 am to 3 pm Ms. Scholz provided opportuni-

Sandie, born in Mindemoya, now lives in Gore Bay, near her mother's home. "When Sandie's birth was near, Dr. Strain kindly offered to drive me to the hospital. Chester was away at deer camp. On the way, the good doctor stopped at a house fire in West Bay to see if anyone was hurt. Luckily, nobody needed the services of a physician, so we continued on to the hospital.

A collie named Pal was added to the family after Stewart was born. He would sit on Stewart if the toddler decided to leave the property. Later this wonderful canine service was extended to the other Burns children.

The family continued to visit the Lang Lake resort. "I can still see young Stewart and my brother drive to the Fox Lake station to pick up milk and bread in the old Dodge pickup." A new generation was enjoying the quality of camp life in Northern Ontario.

"Chester always liked race horses. When Stewart and Donna were younger, he would race his horses around the track, riding in a sulky. There were two racing facilities, one behind the curling club in Gore Bay

and another in Manitowaning. Chester did quite well, winning a number of races until that fateful day when he fell off the sulky during a race in Manitowaning. That was the last time he raced his horses."

Chester died in 1997 of a heart attack. It was a hard time for the family. Today, Kay still lives in Gore Bay. Daughter Sandie and son Stewart are not far away. Kay's house is filled with lovely oil canvases of ducks and geese. She has one painting that reminds us of Ivan Wheale's style with its 'Benjamin' rocks and windswept spruce trees. She informed us that indeed she had taken some classes with him years ago, at the high school in M'Chigeeng. Curling was another pastime Kay enjoyed, as her mother had. She curled in Gore Bay and Little Current but got to other clubs on the Island from time to time.

"I am quite well, apart from breaking my hip at 94. I had a fall and realized I might need more help at home. Kind ladies from Bayshore help me now." Kay injects a bit of her humour, detectable by the glint in her eye. The last time I fell, I was bouncing off the walls from side to side. I crawled to my bed and managed to get in." the nonagenarian claims. Then she adds a mischievous,

Area cake maker learns from world-renown sugar sculptress and celebrity cake maker

TORONTO—Birch Island's Candace Perrault of Candy Cakes had the experience of a lifetime recently when she had the opportunity to study under one of her favourite cake makers, world-renowned cake baker and decorator Liz Marek of Artisan Cake Company in Portland, Oregon.

Ms. Marek's work has been featured in many magazines including BRIDES, Oregon Bride, Portland Bride and Groom, Cake Masters, American Cake Decorating Magazine and more. She has competed and won on Food Network's Duff Till Dawn and her work has been televised on the Food Network's Outrageous Cakes.

"I have been a big fan of Liz Marek's work for years and I follow her on social media," explained Ms. Perrault. "I had been hounding her to come to Canada to do a workshop and she finally said yes. She only did one workshop and it had 15 spots and sold out in four days. I was lucky enough to get a spot and fundraised to pay for it through a cake raffle."

Through the workshop, Ms. Perrault learned about anatomy and facial features, creating a fairy bust made with modeling chocolate, wafer paper, isomalt, fondant and gumpaste.

"It was a first for me working with modeling chocolate," explained Ms. Perrault, who usually creates her stunning cake sculptures using Rice Krispies covered in fondant. "I've never worked with modeling chocolate (a mix of chocolate with corn syrup) before. It is temperature sensitive, but you can knead it, mold it and work it out so you don't have any seams. It's definitely my new favourite medium."

"Liz was an awesome instructor and I'm still on a sugar high from the weekend," said Ms. Perrault. "It was a very detailed class and I learned so much. I'm so excited for applying everything I learned on future cakes."

Ms. Perrault said she was also "thrilled" to attend the Bonnie Gordon College of Confectionary Arts, which hosts students from all over the world. In her workshop with Ms. Marek, she said there were students from Egypt, Halifax, Ottawa and Michigan.

"I also stocked up on new cake pans and

supplies when I was in Toronto which was great," added Ms. Perrault. "I'm excited to continue to learn and grow my business and to one day teach (cake decorating) myself."

"I am always so honoured to be able to teach," said Ms. Marek in an Instagram post from the Artisan Cake Company following her Toronto workshop. "The fairy class is not an easy one and my students work so hard for two days, pushing their skills and talents—striving to grow. At the end of the day, backs are aching, brains are

like jell-o and sometimes they may even want to quit, but they don't and that makes me so incredibly proud."

Ms. Perrault started making custom specialty cakes in 2013 while looking for a job she could do at home while on maternity leave.

Her business, Candy Cakes, grew quickly with word of mouth of her amazing cakes growing as Ms. Perrault's skills blossomed.

Ms. Perrault started with no formal training in cake making, but has always had an artistic nack and was self-taught, eventually taking some courses through Wilton (cake decorating company) at Michael's in Sudbury.

Michael's in Sudbury. Everything on Ms. Perrault's cakes is edible and she makes her cake and buttercream icing from scratch.

Earlier this year Ms. Perrault had to stop offering birthday cakes due to the high demands for her cakes, but continues to take bridal and corporate orders.

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Visiting Manitoulin? **Manitoulin's Notable Trees:**

by Isobel Harry

MANITOULIN—The Manitoulin Nature Club, founded in 1979, is a very active group of about 70 members—both residents and visitors are warmly welcomed-with a shared interest in the Island's plant and animal biodiversity who meet monthly in Mindemoya from September to May. Speakers cover topics from mushrooms to migrating birds and unusual trees, and meetings highlight the sharing of travel experiences and local "What did you see?" moments.

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This unusual Balm of Gilead tree in Little Current has been nominated as a Notable Tree of Manitoulin.

Bird counts take place at Christmas and in February; in October, Sandhill cranes are counted; in summer, field trips are organized to interesting habitats on- and off-Island, and there's a club picnic in August.

In the spring of 2015, the Manitoulin Nature Club launched the Notable Trees of Manitoulin Island project, following up on a previous mission begun in 1992 by Edith and Grant Garrette. The Garrettes' "Great Tree Hunt on Manitoulin Island" sought nominations for the largest trees based on a points formula used by the Ontario Forestry Association in the Honour Roll of Ontario Trees. They produced an Honour Roll of Manitoulin Trees book-let, which, if you can find it in a library, is a fascinating read. The winning tree, selected from among 84 entries, was a sugar maple nominated by Norman Aguonie of Sheguiandah First Nation; standing in a sugar bush, the tree is "a magnificent specimen as befits our national

arboreal emblem," and is between 200 and 300 years-old. What Nature Club members and tree nominators also uncovered was more intangible, a feeling that another Tree Hunt organizer in Kitchener-Waterloo, Samm McKay, had described: "The most striking discovery of the Tree Hunt was the deep affection, if not passion, that peo-



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


Ms. Robinson is the collector of nominations for Notable Trees; holding dual American and Canadian citizenshipshe was born in Toronto to American parents-and having inherited, with the rest of her family, her great-great uncle's island cottage in McGregor Bay, the retired teacher of horticulture's connection to nature on and around the Island is deep, with 70 years' love of the area worn on her sleeve like a proud badge of belonging. In fact, Ms. Robinson moved to Little Current seven years ago because, she says, "I wanted to live closer to McGregor Bay."

Put tree-loving information gatherers together with passionate tree nominators and you have the makings of an exciting undertaking. Nominations include a Balm of Gilead in a front yard in Little Current that has "family significance," many "regionally uncommon" trees—such as the Catalpa in a Manitowaning garden, and a Black Walnut on Monument Road for its "size, shape and beauty," among many others.

Trees often are planted to commemorate special events such as a birth, death and other milestones, and there are plenty nominated as Notable Trees. We have memorial ornamental cherry trees, Ginkgo and Weeping Caragana to remember loved ones; an ancient hawthorn (aka hawberry) in Sheguiandah that was planted in 1869 to mark the grave of the Rev. Jabez Waters Sims.

Some nominated trees are on private property and permission must be obtained for a viewing, but many more are in public spaces for all to see. In June 2015, The Expositor reported on the first nomination received: Jan McQuay, photographer, writer, publisher and eco-activist, had nominated a hawthorn tree, native to the Island and legendary for saving lives during a famine and preventing scurvy with its tart berries. In recognition of the hawberries' gift of survival, Manitoulin-born settlers are called Haweaters.

Ms. McQuay wrote that, "Since visitors are always asking to see a Manitoulin hawthorn tree, and there are very few to point out to them that are accessible, I'm suggesting this one at the Strawberry Channel Lookout, a healthy hawthorn tree on Highway 6 east of Little Current, near the lookout structure," on the east side of Highway 6,



When I plant the garden in the spring my goal is to mark and remember everything that I planted. As the summer progresses, weeding becomes sporadic and labels get lost. directly across from the turnoff to the Green Bush Road.

A very tall Striped Maple (also called Moosewood for the moose further north that chew the bark) at Misery Bay Provincial Park can be seen just south of the Interpretive Centre; staff will point out the tree that stands on the shoreline of what was once Lake Nipissing during the last Glacial Era.

A 60-foot Red Oak dominates Blair's Cash and Carry on Hwy 542 in M'Chigeeng. The famous "Maple tree with a saw in it" can be seen (especially when leaves have fallen) across from the entrance to Oakes Cottages on Monument Road near Mindemoya. A Black Cherry tree that "has been there at least 70 years" and a nearby Chokecherry tree likely were planted by the great-great grandparents of Gloria Corbiere, and can be viewed in the grounds of Mindemoya's Pioneer Museum and Welcome Centre.

A striking tree of singular provenance is to be found on Queen Street's north side in Manitowaning, just west of the LCBO; the "dramatic weeping habit" of the Camperdown Elm and its thick, contorted branches are noted by all who pass, but few know its history. The elm is a cultivar and cannot reproduce from seed; it must be grafted to a Wych Elm, as it is here. In 1835-1840, in Dundee, Scotland, a young contorted elm tree was discovered in the forest of Camperdown House by the Earl of Camperdown's gardener. Every Camperdown Elm in the world is descended from a cutting from that original Scottish tree, and we might well imagine early settlers bringing a cutting in their belongings to their new home.

There are many more examples of distinctive trees collected in the Notable Trees project, and even more will be gathered. "We encourage people to go out, look around the property and send us an entry," says Gail Robinson. "Residents can find their own 'deep affection' for nature and submit the trees that touch their hearts."

1 large homegrown tomato 1 large avocado 3-4 green onions chopped 4 crispy bacon slices, crumbled 1/4 cup sliced black olives 1/4 cup feta cheese Salad dressing

1. Slice the tomato and arrange on a plate.

2. Slice avocado and place on top of tomato slices.

3. Sprinkle onions, olives and bacon on top along with the cheese.

4. Drizzle desired amount of dressing on top.5. Let sit for 15 minutes.

Vinaigrette

Make this ahead and keep in your fridge. I use sunflower seed oil because it doesn't solidify in the fridge.

 $1/2~{\rm cup}$ olive oil or sunflower seed oil

1/4 cup apple cider vinegar

1 Tbsp low-sodium tamari

1 Tbsp maple syrup or honey

1 Tbsp Dijon mustard or grainy mustard

1 garlic clove minced

Place all ingredients in a glass jar and shake until combined. Refrigerate and store for up to 1 week.
