hitchBOT 'killed' one year after Manitoulin visit

Successfully crosses Canada, part of Europe but lasts two weeks in US

PHILADELPHIA—Only two weeks into her American adventure, hitchBOT, or Biiabkookwe (Iron Woman) as she was named during her stop at the Wikwemikong Cultural festival last year, was stopped in her tracks in the City of Brotherly Love, found dismembered in the cold streets of Philadelphia.

hitchBOT, the hitchhiking robot that found a worldwide following when she started her Canadian adventure last year—thumbing it across the country and relying on the kindness of strangers to get her from destination to destination—was the brainchild of David Harris, an assistant professor at Hamilton's McMaster University, who came up with the

idea of creating a collaborative art project centred-around a socially animated hitchhiking robot. Professor Smith had said that that hitchBOT was also "an experiment that looks at the interaction between people and increasingly ubiquitous technology."

The size of a child, with pool noodle arms and donning a pair of rubber boots (hitch-BOT was prepared for any weather), the robot successfully made it across Canada, as well as the Netherlands and Germany. At her stop on Manitoulin during the Civic Holiday weekend last summer, Sheshegwaning elder Bill Antoine bestowed upon the little robot a traditional Anishinaabe name—Biiabkookwe—while visiting the Wikwemikomg pow-

After hot, dry July. Lk. Huron water still above 2014

LAKE HURON—Despite the lack of rainfall and high heat experienced in the month of July, Lake Huron water levels were actually up by one centimetre at the end of the month over the July 1 measurement.

The July lake-wide average was 176.73 metres, still above the 1918-2014 long-term average of 176.57 and not far off the July 1986 record high average of 177.39 metres. The July average for 2014 was 176.46 metres. In a previous interview with this newspaper, Environment Canada explained that, should the lake experience dry conditions this summer, it would still see above average numbers, which it has.

It is this time of year that the lake typically begins its annual seasonal decline, which did not occur last year due to a wet summer and fall.

"We asked Ontario residents to call a hotline talking about sharing their's or a loved one's experiences or issues with the Ontario Health Care System," OCHU

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

Ont. gives \$72K in aquaculture market expansion undertaking

LACLOCHE ISLAND—Blue Goose Aquaculture's North Wind Fisheries cage culture site hosted an unusually large contingent of visiting dignitaries and provincial civil servants Arthur Potts, parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Agriculture, Food Food and Rural Affairs stopped by to tour the facility and announce \$72,000 in grants to support two market expansion projects that will help the growing Ontario aquaculture industry make inroads into the important US market.

Mr. Potts was introduced to the podium set up in front of staffs bearing the Ontario provincial and Canadian flags flapping in a stiff breeze at the ramp leading to the fish farm cages.

"Few jurisdictions can match Canada's and specifically Ontario's natural advantages when it comes to fish farming," said Karen Tracey, executive director of the Northern Ontario Aquaculture Association,

"an enormous coastal geography, an abundance of cold, clean water, a favourable climate, a rich fishery tradition, established trade partners and a commitment to protect our environment."

Ms. Tracey went on to assert that Ontario aquaculture operations have "set the gold standard in environmental protection. We have embraced a balanced approach that puts fresh affordable and healthy food on the table with common sense, sustainable solutions that are good for generations to come."

The aquaculture advocate went on to say that "families deserve peace of mind when shopping for environmentally friendly alternatives at their local grocery stores, and Ontario fish farmers know that we can grow our sector to meet current and future demands while respecting and protecting our shared water resources."

March of Dimes expands reach to Manitoulin Island

MANITOULIN-The March of Dimes was born out of the scourge of polio that afflicted thousands, both rich and poor, before the advent of vaccination programs almost banished it to history. However, in 1949 the disease was still a terrible plague and desperate mothers canvassed neighbourhoods fundraising dimes to fight the disease. It was famed entertainer Eddie Cantor who coined the phrase 'March of Dimes' at that time based on the song, 'Brother Can You Spare a Dime.

The March of Dimes eventually morphed into a support organization for people with barriers to employment and is now expanding its services onto Manitoulin Island.

"We have been trying to expand into Manitoulin for a number of years now," said spokesperson Janine Roy. She explained that the challenge for Manitoulin is largely two-fold: the small population base and the relatively small number of employers available for the program. "We can't afford to hire full-time; we hire people on an on-call basis so it has been a struggle."

Ms. Roy noted that the group has made an application to the provincial organization for support and that they have received some support from the national office.

Another issue is related to the availability of employment opportunities. "We don't want to get people's expectations up if there are no jobs available," she said. "We wouldn't want to set people up like that."

But the response so far has been good. "Some of our employers are great," said Ms. Roy. "Everyone has skills." One of the most productive approaches has been to ask employers what jobs they have that their employees don't like doing. "What are the

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

Haweater's energy may be diminished by police numbers

In 2009, at the end of Haweater Weekend festivities at that time, minor chaos broke out throughout the town of Little Current following the Sunday night street dance.

Nothing too serious happened, but citizens were concerned that roving groups of people they did not know were being seen throughout the community that night.

There was an incident in the downtown where some young people had gotten onto the roof of one of the buildings and then were seen running from one end of the front street to the other, high above the sidewalk and business owners were justifiably concerned about liability issues in the event that someone fell and was hurt. There were also acts of vandalism in the downtown when a window at the Edgewater Restaurant was smashed.

This resulted in meetings among the Ontario Provincial Police's (OPP) Manitoulin detachment, the Little Current Lions Club, the Little Current BIA (that represents the downtown business community) and the Northeast Town council.

The result was that the OPP brought in a larger police presence the following Haweater Weekend, in and around Little Current, and the police service, through its community service officer, has been stressing "zero tolerance" concerning infractions of the Liquor Control Act since that time, especially just prior to all subsequent Haweater Weekends. The Little Current Lions Club also scaled back its Sunday night street dance, ending it when the fireworks began.

The following Haweater Weekend, 2010, there was indeed a much heightened OPP presence and the previous year's one-time party scene and downtown ruckus did not reoccur, nor has it since, and noone can object to this. The heightened police presence has remained in place for all subsequent Haweater Weekends.

This past weekend, however, the police presence in and around Little Current seemed unusually high and this has been an observation that has been much repeated during and since Haweater Weekend.

Police services are charged back to the municipality and so the greater use of these services, the larger the corresponding cost to tax-

That is something that municipal officials may wish to consider for Haweater Weekend 2016 and make suggestions as they see fit.

The other factor is, plain and simply, one of intimidation. The more officers that are in circulation, whether in OPP vehicles, on foot (usually in pairs or even three officers together), on bicycles or driving bright yellow four-wheelers (again, two at a time), the effect on some people minding their own business and intent on enjoying the weekend is unsettling and this has also been a concern that has made its way around the community as people wonder why, exactly, so many of these uniformed officers were among them all weekend, speculating that perhaps the police know something of potential "trouble" that has led to such an increase in the law enforcement presence.

Most officers who come to an event like Haweater Weekend for extra duty are not part of the local detachment and so are not known to local citizens and there is often not much opportunity for conversations about why so much policing with the officers themselves.

The one year when there was more impromptu partying than usual in Little Current (almost exclusively by non-Manitoulin revellers) has led directly to this year's seemingly above-average police presence.

Perhaps, for all of the reasons cited, it is time for the local police administration, the Lions Club and the municipal council to once again talk about what is required by way of police presence for a safe and happy Haweater Weekend in 2016.

The point has now been well made that "zero tolerance" is the rule for Liquor Control Act infractions and perhaps, based on costs alone, the municipality can recommend through discussions a decrease in the number of officers on patrol during the annual festival

There is no question that the other concern, that of implied intimidation, should also be taken into consideration as the community and the event's organizer, the local service club, consider how they wish to present themselves to visitors to the town during the year's main civic celebration because last weekend, during the brightest hours of daylight, there was a police presence virtually everywhere.

This factor, taken over the past six Haweater Weekend events, will almost certainly have had a cumulative effect on people deciding whether or not they'll come to the annual Haweater Weekend party with their family. If attendance has diminished at some events, which it has, it is very likely due in part to the fact that some people do not consider a large police presence or particularly welcoming symbol as they may easily think that this implies a troubled community and this is something that, once observed, can be passed on to friends and relatives and so "word of mouth" advertising can easily be harmful to the community and to the Lions Club's event.

This observation is certainly not meant either as a welcome to any criminal or hooligan or as criticism of the Ontario Provincial Police as they carry out the tasks they've been given. The OPP's "zero tolerance" message is appropriately directed to the anti-social element and this message appears to have been hitting home.

But for many years, there was a unique and vital energy that infused Little Current just prior to and during Haweater Weekend.

That energy, by observation, is now much diminished and it is fair comment to connect this change, at least in part, to the large and public police presence during the past six annual Haweater events.

It is time to reinfuse energy into the 'Island's big bash,' especially as it nears its 50th anniversary.

Haweater Weekend, which over its nearly half-century, has seen constant and continuous changes to keep it current and relevant, will of necessity keep on changing.

A part of this renewing and reviewing of Haweater Weekend should include the consideration of the absolute policing requirements necessary for Haweater Weekend, together with the mandate imposed on the officers assigned to 'Haweater duty' in order to determine a rebalancing of the appropriate police presence required during this major

This commentary is by no means meant to be critical of our police service but it would be unfortunate if a major police presence becomes a permanent and abiding part of people's memories and images of this signature Island event.

It was conceived of as a fun and carefree homecoming-style event and so it has remained for most of its history and so it should continue into its next half-century.

It's time to rethink all aspects of our much-loved Haweater Weekend.



Signs at Island stores remind pet owners to keep dogs out of hot cars

by Betty Bardswich MANITOULIN—Every summer, in Canada and throughout the world, the SPCA and other humane groups as well as fire departments and police receive thousands of calls about dogs left in vehicles on hot days. Many of those dogs suffer brain damage, exhaustion or kidney failure from the heat and many of them die. According to the group People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA), the temperature inside a vehicle can soar within minutes, and leaving the windows of the car, truck or van open a crack or a lot does not really help—and neither does parking in the

shade.

"I work with Manitoulin Pets United," Ms. McDermid told The Expositor, "and our group has been fortunate to be able to connect with other rescues and the individuals across Canada who help people reunite lost pets. One of these people was Lenora Chapman Bisson who has close ties to Manitoulin but calls Manitoba home. She has been a wealth of information and a support system for our group. It was through her that I connected with Barry Piasta."

Mr. Piasta, who also lives in Manitoba, works in animal rescue. He is the creator of Dog Adoption MB and started a sign campaign to remind people not to leave their dogs in a vehicle in warm or hot weather. As Ms. McDermid explained, Mr. Piasta works with a small company also dedicated to animal rescue. "They are willing to produce the signs in small quantities and still keep the cost low but the quality very high. Barry tries to have fundraisers to cover the cost of each sign that goes up if a business does not pay. His goal is to get the signs across Manito-

Mr. Piasta has put 150 signs up across that province and the venture has now spread to Ontario and Minnesota with interest expressed in Saskatchewan and British Columbia. "Julie has been a great help in getting the signs out into Ontario," Mr. Piasta said as he added that yearly there are reports of dogs that have died or have serious neurological irreversible injury because they are left in hot cars.

Ms. McDermid's goal was to get the signs up across the Island—and she did. She purchased 20 signs and all 20 have been bought and posted by businesses and municipalities across Manitoulin with Island Foodland, Home Hardware and Williamson Hardware, all in Mindemoya, first off the mark. Others

include the Township of Tehkummah, the Township of Billings, Andy's store in Wikwemikong with another to be placed elsewhere on the reserve, Turners of Little Current, Loco Beanz and Cedar Chalet in Manitowaning and Anchor Inn in Little Current. Ms. McDermid was also successful in getting a sign placed at Wolfies Store in Birch Island and Quality Flowers and Gifts in Elliot Lake. It is noteworthy that in the Home Hardware Williamsons Hardware stores in Mindemoya and Turners of Little Current dogs are allowed.

There are different signs

available to remind people to keep their pets out of the vehicles when the weather is warm, but Ms. McDermid went with the signs made in Manitoba for a reason. "There are a lot of signs out there," she said, "but the ones that seem to be actually effective are these ones that ask you to call 911 if you see a dog in distress. I believe most people on Manitoulin Island who witness a dog left in a hot car will try other means prior to calling 911 unless the animal is in extreme danger. I myself have sent someone into the business to have the vehicle make and plate number and the reason announced.

I have found that people respond very quickly. Some are annoved and some really just did not realize how quickly the temperature had risen even with the windows down. Regardless of the media exposure this real concern has had, dogs are still being left in hot cars daily across the country. These signs produced over 4,000 calls last year. They are effective and they do save lives. Either way we cannot let this keep happening. And I believe, through the awareness brought with these signs on display and the proper education made available

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Sea Cadets' summer filled with novel experiences

MANITOULIN—When it comes to opportunities for new and exciting summer experiences, it is hard to beat the Manitoulin Sea Cadet Corps for both cadets and officers alike. This summer, every cadet in the corps who expressed an interest in attending summer camps found a place that fitted their age and level of experience.

"For those in the very young category, from 12 to 13, they were able to attend a two-week training camp, while the majority were able to partake of a three-week program, while the more experienced are on a six-week course,' noted Lt.(N) Denis Blake, who himself had the opportunity to shepherd a group of 10 cadets from across Canada on a trip to an American naval base.

"Two years ago I had the opportunity to take a group of five cadets on a 10-day trip to Bermuda," he said. "This year I applied again. I applied for the UK, Holland and Australia. They offered me the US," he laughed.

This time he would be in charge of 10 cadets. "We were going to an active naval base in Newport, Rhode Island where they train officers for the navy and marine


June 21 found Lt. Blake ensconced in the Pearson Sheridan, a stone's throw from where he and his cadre of cadets would be flying out to Boston on the first leg of their journey together. "The first little while the cadets spent getting to know each other," he said. "They had never met each other before. There were two from Newfoundland, three from Quebec, one from Halifax, two from Ontario, one from Calgary and one from Vancouver."

Although the cadets in the group had never met before, they did find they had a lot in common. "These were all senior cadets," said Lt. Blake, who noted that in addition to spending a day visiting the CN Tower and Ripley's Aquarium, the cadets were able to spend a little time shopping in the Eaton Centre as well.

"The next day we flew into Boston where they had arranged transport for us," he said. "It was a two-hour drive to the barracks where we would be staying." Lt. Blake described Newport, R.I. as "the Muskoka of New England." The barracks provided all the comforts the cadets needed for the next couple of weeks.

"This was a training exchange, not a cultural exchange," noted Lt. Blake, who pointed out there was plenty of the former involved. "We were up every morning before 6 am," he said. The cadets visited a coast guard station, the region known as "battleship row" where they explored a WWII battleship and submarine and a museum containing, among other things, the famed PT Boats. "It was very interesting," said Lt.

"We spent a day at a submarine base that is both a college and a

base, where we got what we were told was 'pretty rare' access to the training room," he said. That room is an intense computer simulation centre where the walls are comprised of a 360-degree screen and the floor moves to simulate the rolling deck of an active ves-

The cadets then sailed in Boston harbour, "almost to the Atlantic," in an 80-foot schooner. "There were a lot of sailboats," noted Lt. Blake. "The sea lanes there are very active."

The troop spent a day in Boston, with "plenty of hiking," as the preparations for the July 4 celebrations were underway before heading out into the harbour in a vintage DUCK amphibious assault vehicle. "The DUCK was part of the invasion of Sicily," said Lt. Blake. "It seats about 30 and we drove right off the ramp and into Boston harbour."

Their US hosts did not stint on our own nation's celebrations, presenting the group with a huge cake decorated with the Canadian flag. "Each of the cadets gave a presentation on their region and, since two of our cadets spoke almost exclusively French, we taught them O Canada in both official languages," said Lt. Blake.

Before they headed home, the cadets were treated to two nights in New York City where they were given the opportunity to not only take in the iconic sights of that great city, but also had the opportunity to take in the Broadway play 'Wicked.' "Ten of our cadets got to go backstage to meet the cast," he said.

With a view from the 'Top of the Rock' at the Rockfeller Centre the cadets were able to plot out their expedition and breaking up into groups of six they set out. "The

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

...continued from page 3 things that tend to be put off or never gotten around to?" she asked. In those niches can be found a wealth of opportunities for willing workers looking for an opportunity to prove themselves.

The employment does not have to be a 40 hour week work schedule, noted Ms. Roy. "It can be 10 hours, 12 hours, it really is very flexible when it comes to providing employment opportunities.

Ms. Roy said that the March of Dimes is hoping to set up a working dialogue with local First Nations. "We really need to build a relationship with the First Nations," she said. The organization is hoping that their presence on Manitoulin will help to establish the groundwork for building those relationships and trust.

The March of Dimes delivery steps includes job exploration and assessment, in which the interview and assessment will ask questions that will determine if an applicant is ready and committed to work. It explores existing skills, knowledge and experience. "Through our question and answer format, we will determine existing supports you already have in place in order for successful employment and figure out what barriers may prevent you from obtaining your goal," noted Ms. Roy.

Some of the questions in the interview may get personal or seem intrusive,

she noted. "Don't be afraid to ask your MODC staff member why they want to know this information. All of our inquiries are geared to help us find you work faster. If, after the explanation, you still feel uncomfortable answering the question, you are not required to do so."

If after the interview March of Dimes is unsure of the type of job best suited to an applicant's skills, the interviewer may ask an applicant to participate in specific activities such as a work trial. "These activities will help you explore iobs available in your community that match your skills," she notes.

The next step involves an Employment Action Plan. The Employment Action Plan is the applicant's roadmap to work. "It will detail activities you need to do to determine a job goal or, if you already have a goal, activities that will prepare you to be placed in a job," said Ms. Roy. "Your plan is a living document that can be changed if required. The plan is developed with you, based on the employment assessment. Both you and your vocational rehabilitation specialist (VRS) will be signing off on the plan."

The March of Dimes placement readiness activities will help to prepare the applicant for work. These activities will help develop the skills and experience necessary to get the job. All preparation activities are geared to prepare the applicant for a job. "If

vou are unsure how these activities relate to your job search, inquire with your VRS," advised Ms. Roy.

"Our job developers have relationships working with hundreds of employers in the community,' said Ms. Roy, drawing on experience in the Sudbury market. "They will introduce you to employers in your area of interest, accompany you to job interviews and help you through the hire process. Job developers work for you and use their knowledge of the employer to ensure you are comfortable with the work."

Finally, there is on-thejob support. Getting a job is one thing," notes Ms. Roy, "but your longer term goal is to keep it. Employment support workers (ESW) can provide you with on-the-job training and work supports to help you understand the components of your new posi-Not everyone tion. requires an ESW but they are an excellent way to ease you into the work routine.'

Whether or not an applicant uses the services of an employment support worker, a VRS will be in contact with you on a monthly basis to support you. An applicant can discuss any challenges they are experiencing with the work or the employer and they will intervene on the applicant's behalf. Maybe that discussion will simply be about how great it is to work, said Ms. Roy, who pointed out that retention support will continue for up to 36 months after the applicant is employed.

Northern Ontario Vice

told The Expositor. "We
received a total of 600 calls
and completed a report."

"We are calling on the provincial government to fund hospitals adequately and provide funding for public and not-for-profit physical therapy, speech therapy, asking to reopen hospital beds and more alternative level of care beds."

"The past 20 years has seen a cutback of 19,000 hospital beds, while Health Sciences North (HSN) in Sudbury is under a five-year funding freeze and referral rates for therapy services have severely decreased," explained OCHU President Michael Hurley.

The report states that Northern Ontario has been greatly affected by hospital cutbacks, which is being made worse by the challenges of Northern Ontario's geography, as high levels of poverty and unemployment.

"We found that people in Northern Ontario have lower life expectancies then the rest of Ontario with chronic conditions and cancer more prevalent," said Mr. Hurley.

He added that Northern Ontario is more harshly affected by hospital cutbacks than southern Ontario and that this is exacerbated by the challenges of geography and by poverty and underemployment.

"Citizens in Northern Ontario have lower life expectancies then the general Ontario population," states the report. "Northern Ontario's resources extraction and processing industries have suffered severely from globalization with a significant impact on employment levels and on the standards of living of many Northern communities."

Mr. Hurley said that one would expect that these issues would lead to more funding for Northern Ontario, but he pointed out that the report shows this isn't the case.

The report notes that New Liskeard announced in 2014 that the operating

room would be closed for 50 percent of the time and that 18,000 hours of nursing time per year were to be cut, equaling 10 percent of the total hospital stuff.

Timmins plans to cut 26 of its remaining beds equaling a cut of 16 percent of its beds, as well as closing outpatient physiotherapy.

North Bay is also being forced to implement big changes such as the closing of the health rehabilitation unit meaning 56 staff will be cut.

Closer to home, Sault Ste. Marie is planning on cutting 50 hospital beds, 500 hours of nursing care per year and 34 personal support workers while Health Sciences North in Sudbury is implementing \$5.1 million in cuts affecting inpatient psychiatry, day surgery, surgery, obstetrics, mental health services, oncology, critical care and emergency.

"A key finding of the report is that rather than delivering the right care, in the right place, at the right time," the provincial government's health reforms are failing Ontario patients on many levels," continues the report. "Ultimately, many people are not getting the healthcare supports they need in hospital of at home, under this out

patient community-based care model."

Mr. Hurley said that the most affected are the elderly, who are often pushed out of hospital when they are still ill or in need of in-hospital care and therapies to help with swallowing and communication following a stroke

The report also points out that over the last 20 years hospital funding has been reduced considerably while the money has not been transferred to home care and other community-based services.

"Between 2004 and 2009, funding per capita for home care declined 14 percent," explains the report. "Today there are over 10,000 Ontarians on a waiting list for some type of health service support at home and another 25,000 waiting for a nursing home bed."

"Ontario has fewer beds to population than any other Canadian province," said Mr. Hurley. "On average the length of stay in hospital has dropped 25 percent resulting in one in six patients being readmitted to hospital within 30 days of being discharged."

Mr. Hurley shared some of the tragic stories contained within the report, in addition to sharing with The Expositor his own personal experience with the Ontario health care system

"My mother fell in her home and my sister, a registered nurse, advocated for her," said Mr. Hurley, "but we were at a large urban hospital and the staff spent all their time asking what we were going to do with her after she left the hospital and didn't notice that she had a heart attack while in their care. They said that she was to old and that there was nothing they could do for her and she died in the hospital. When I think of the people that I am advocating for, I think of my mom.'

The report makes several recommendations to the government Ontario including reopening chronic and alternative level of care beds, stopping the closure of acute care beds. funding hospitals adequately, reinvesting in hospitals, putting funding into care not profit and providing those who need home care, therapies and services the care hours they need without fees.

"We really hope this report helps bring attention to this pressing issue," concluded Mr. Hurley. "Things need to change."

ter has set the election date for the 42nd Parliament since Confederation, as determined by the fixed date election law, for October 19.

In calling the election Prime Minister Harper set off a storm of protest and criticism from the opposition and other government critics who claim the election call, which will see an 11-week election period, one of the longest in Canadian history, was made to favour the Conservative Party of Canada, whose

influence the vote result with non-party campaigns. Until the election is official, they're effectively able to spend whatever they want, but once the writ has dropped, the limits drop to what is, in national terms, a paltry \$200,000 nationally per organization.

Most party insiders expect that, with the exception of signs popping up on lawns and byways in the next few weeks, the election will not really begin to ramp up until the beginning of September, as most Canadians are focussed on their vacations and other summer preoccupations.



to pet owners, we can someday call this a thing of the past."

Ms. McDermid is right about the media exposure. Recent articles in both print and social media have shown a policeman who made a woman sit in the hot car after her dog had been rescued to educate her about the seriousness of the situation, and a policeman in one instance and a veterinarian in another who volunteered to sit in a hot vehicle for several minutes to show the public how fast a person, or especially an animal, can get very, very uncomfortable. More education is obviously needed. For example, the police and SPCA in Kewlona, British Columbia held a news conference to talk about the dangers of leaving animals in vehicles. While the teach-in was going on, five complaints about this very subject came in to the local animal shelter. An RCMP constable in attendance placed stuffed dogs in two

cars with an internal temperature of 26°C. Within 10 minutes, the car in the shade was recording a temperature of 34°C while the car in the sun showed 45°C.

The Ontario SPCA also has a program to help save the lives of pets. Owners are encouraged to go to nohotpets.ca to take an online pledge and will receive a decal for vehicle windows saying, "if you see a pet in a hot vehicle, call your local police service."

The public is also reminded that asphalt and concrete can get extremely hot and can easily burn the pads on a dog's feet. When walking your dog in hot weather, it is advised that you walk on

Assiginack Council Notes

Lagoon closed to dumping

Council learned at its July 21 meeting that high phosphorous levels in the Manitowaning lagoon means it is closed, until further notice, to sewage dumping from outside sources.

CAO Alton Hobbs said the Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA) hopes it will only be a six-week issue. At the moment there is nowhere else in the municipality to dump.

Councillor Leslie Fields said that notice should be given to those ratepayers with septic systems that they arrange for pumpouts in the spring and fall and not during the hot summer months.

At the first of July, the lagoon was using three of its aerators, but it was expected that all nine will be in use before month's end. This will also mean the consumption of "a huge amount of energy," Mr. Hobbs warned.

By way of explanation, Mr. Hobbs told The Expositor that the sewage that comes from the system in Manitowaning is somewhat treated and discharged into the lagoon where it goes through a further treatment and is ultimately discharged into the bay. The process involves chemicals and aeration and introduced 'fresher' raw materials.

When a septic hauler discharges into the lagoon, it is the older and more concentrated raw material which does not receive much of the treatment process. "Therefore, this material requires much more chemical and aeration and this increases the operating costs of the lagoon in the summer months," Mr. Hobbs explained. "It requires this additional work or the phosphorous levels in the lagoon to rise and our Certificate of Approval for the lagoon has a maximum number that we are not to exceed."

Both Central Manitoulin and the Northeast Town have agreed to allow access to the haulers for their sites, under their policies. OCWA will monitor the levels for the foreseeable future.

Reeve turns mayor

Council reviewed a motion to change Assiginack's head of council from 'reeve' to 'mayor.'

"Why?" asked Councillor Brenda Reid.

Councillor Hugh Moggy spoke up, explaining that it was his idea and that there are very few municipalities left on Manitoulin with the moniker of reeve. "We're in the 21st Century now,"

In researching the name, CAO Alton Hobbs explained to council that of the 444 municipalities in the province, 59 still use reeve, most of which are in Northeastern Ontario. He also shared that the word mayor has

its roots in ancient Rome while reeve is an old English term.

Council passed the motion, thus naming the former Reeve Paul Moffat the new Mayor Paul Moffat of Assiginack.

Tractor donation in the works

Councillor Hugh Moggy shared with council the discussions the Assiginack Museum committee is having with Burton Case who has offered to donate his 1946 Massey Ferguson tractor, complete with a bill of sale. Councillor Moggy said the tractor looks as new as the day it was purchased. He added that many people remember seeing Mr. Case's father doing the custom threshing circuit using this tractor in the 1950s.

The plan is for the tractor to be displayed with the threshing machine that is already at the museum. "It needs to be cranked to be started right now, but he doesn't want to give it away until he gets it fixed," Councillor Moggy said.

Online tax payments

Staff prepared a report for council on giving taxpayers the option to pay taxes online, exploring the many service providers and their respective costs.

Councillor Moggy asked how much it would cost.

CAOAlton Hobbs explained that the municipality currently pays about \$8,000 a year in fees to process credit and debit payments. An increasing number of people are choosing to call in their credit card numbers to the municipal office, "which now leaves us open to potential liability," he said, adding that he believes adding an online option would help to limit their costs.

"We levy over \$2 million in property taxes and wouldn't doubt that 10 percent use credit cards, and that's expected to rise," the CAO said.

It also will enhance collections, Mr. Hobbs added.

Accounts for payment

Council approved the following accounts for payment: general, \$105,821.81; and payroll, \$24,930.14.


Before passing the motion to approve the payments, Councillor Moggy asked about the beach sand payment and whether or not it had been tendered. Mr. Hobbs explained that staff had around called and received three quotes, but it had not been tendered. Mr. Moggy said he would like to see more tenders.

Bylaws

Council passed Bylaw 15-03 to adopt the updated cemetery policies, interment rights contract and price list for Hilly Grove Cemetery. Councillor Moggy asked that 'natural stone' be added to the list of what is allowable for headstones.

Council also passed Bylaw 15-21 to appoint a drainage superintendent, Gary MacKay of Tulloch Engineering, pursuant to the Drainage Act.



Northeast Town council meets with planners to develop own Official Plan

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town council met with Sarah Vereault, a planner with J.R. Richards and Associates Limited. to review the process and discussions around creating the municipality's own Official Plan.

The Northeast Town decided it wanted to create its own Official Plan (OP) after feeling that its concerns with the draft Manitoulin OP were not being addressed by the Manitoulin Planning Board (MPB). The Northeast Town has also been pursuing leaving the MPB to establish its own planning authority, however is still in negotiations with the Ministry of Municipal Housing and Affairs (MMHA) on this

Ms. Vereault reviewed with the Northeast Town council concern that it and J.R. Richards had when council hired the firm to review the draft Manitoulin OP, noting that the concerns and priorities identified would be used when developing the municipality's own OP.

"An OP is enabled by the Planning Act and is a policy document providing general direction for future development patterns," said Ms. Vereault during her presentation. "It provides a framework for implementing tools (i.e. zoning bylaws, community improving plans etc.).

She also noted that OPs divide the planning area into land use designations and help decide where roads, water/sewer, garbage dumps and parks and other services will be built.

"It is adopted by a town council, and then must be approved by the province," explained Ms. Vereault.

In reviewing the Northeast Town OP process, Ms. Vereault identified three stages: Stage 1 (May to July 2015), background review, core-team meeting, special meeting of council (last week's meeting) and growth projections and land needs; Stage 2 (July to September), identify preferred direction, undertake draft text and schedule, public consultation (August 20 tentative date) and consider input and prepare final draft OP; and Stage 3 (October to December), finalize text and schedule changes, statutory public meeting and council adoption, submission to the MMAH for final approval."

Ms. Vereault said she will be incorporat-

ing town documents into the Northeast Town OP including the Sustainable Community Plan, Asset Management Plan, Strategic Plan, Sheguiandah Community Development report and Age Friendly Community Plan.

'JLR is preparing a background report to review population projections and land needs in the municipality," said Ms. Vereault. "This will form the basis for the land use designations and settlement area boundaries proposed in the new OP."

Ms. Vereault distributed handouts to council including J.L. Richards' previous comments regarding the draft Manitoulin OP and council's key concerns with the OP.

"Based on meeting with the town and provincial ministries, issues to address in the new Northeast Town OP include: settlement area boundaries and limited rural development, private roads and water access, waterfront development, agricultural uses, lakeshore capacity and community improvement plans.'

Councillor Paul Skippen stressed that keeping development around the municipal lakes was important in the new OP.

Councillor Laurie Cook was concerned about development on Islands and wanted to restrict future development.

"I'm not keen on a blanket ban," said Councillor Michael Erskine. "I don't like shutting down development in any area of the municipality and there are restrictions currently.

Town CAO Dave Williamson recommended that generally council would want to create an OP that was broad and unrestrictive, but still met the provincial policy regulations. "That way it leaves the decisions in the hands of council, without having to go to through the process of an OP amendment," said Mr. Williamson, giving the example of not listing 'at capacity lakes. "It locks in lakes as 'at capacity' even if the ministry changes their status."

"Council needs to find a balance so that we can make our own decisions," added Mayor Al MacNevin.

Ms. Vereault said she will be incorporating council's concerns into the draft OP and that the next step would be a public open house in late August where all ratepayers in the municipality would be invited to contribute their input into the draft OP for the Northeast Town.

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Kagawong River restoration project now well underway

KAGAWONG—Manitoulin Streams Improvement Association in partnership with Billings has begun a restoration project on the Kagawong River.

"We completed an environmental assessment on 182 watersheds and identified the top 10 streams that were in need of restoration on Manitoulin, developing enhancement plans for each. So far we have created enhancement plans for five of the streams including the Kagawong River, Manitou River, Blue Jay Creek, Mindemoya River and Creek," Grimesthorpe Manitoulin explained Streams Project Coordinator Seija Deschenes

The enhancement plan for the Kagawong River identifies 20 key areas in need of work, the concerns for each of the areas, the solutions to resolving the concern and the estimated costs.

"We have planned to tackle three sites this summer at the lower end of the river by the mouth," continued Deschenes. restoration will include improving the riparian vegetation on both sides of the river, improving the canopy on both sides, repairing bank erosion, reducing the stream width and increase the streams depth, improving center habitat, improving the edge habitat and accommodating flow fluctuations due to the hydro dams. Site designs have been created to restore the aquatic and fish habitat, improve river hydrological function and connectivity to critical aquatic habitat for various species."

"We will be using the water and in-stream structures to do the work for us to create carving pools and cleaning any sediment off prime spawning habitat," she added. "We will also be adding boulder clusters which will oxygenate the water and provide habitat for fish. Vortex weirs will improve centre habitat and direct the water flow into the center and away from shoreline banks causing erosion. We will also

stabilize the banks by using boulders and root wads, while providing habitat for fish and aquatic invertebrates. Using coconut coir matting, which biodegrades over time, we will prevent the erosion of banks and place banks with seeds of native grass seen and plant trees over top."

To assist with the invasive emerald ash borer, which has been identified on Manitoulin, Manitoulin Streams will be planting various tree and shrub species to replace the many ash trees which line the river should they be impacted by the insect.

"We started planting the trees this spring before the poison ivy came out," said Ms. Deschenes. "The trees and shrubs will provide shade to reduce river water temperatures, provide shel-

ter for fish and wildlife, while the roots will absorb nutrients before it enters into the river acting as a filtor"

In addition to partnering with Billings, Manitoulin Streams has partnered with 4elements Living Arts on the Kagawong River

restoration project.
"4elements is hosting a

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


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




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

The new Official Plan will contain goals, objectives, policies, and schedules relating to land use in the municipality. It will be in conformity with provincial plans, have regard to matters of Provincial Interest, provide consistency with Provincial Policy Statements and set a course for the development of the Town over the next 20 years. If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands before the proposed Official Plan is adopted, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.


When threatened by rain, the dancing often moves indoors to the Wikwemikong Arena, but with radar showing that the rain and thunderstorms were going to pass, the organizers decided to brave it out by delaying the Sunday grand entry for several hours.

Although the dance competitions provide most of the pageantry and suspense of a competition powwow, there was still plenty to see and do at Thunderbird Park while waiting for the rain to abate.

The drums were kept busy under the arbours, as was emcee Chris (the Pleasant) Pheasant, whose steady banter kept any hint of the doldrums at bay and many of the vendors came prepared for inclement weather, setting up tarpaulins and covers for their wares. The cultural teachings and artistic displays were already well undercover, safe from sun or rain under tents.

In the end, the organizer's confidence was well-placed as the rain abated and the lightning passed over the grounds making way for the grand entry and the completion of the competitive dance events.

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
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Visiting Manitoulin?

A trailer sailor's guide to exploring the North Channel

MANITOULIN—The North Channel Marine Tourism Council proudly brands the waters of the North Channel as "the best freshwater boating in the world" and the members of the Trailer/Sailors Association heartily agree.

definitely "We are ambassadors for the North Channel," said John Clement who, along with his wife Irene, paused in the de-rigging of their 26foot sailboat Taranui to discuss the Trailer/Sailor organization, sailing the North Channel waters and the community of fellow travellers who spend two

weeks every year exploring the thousands of coves and Islands for which the region is justly famed.

John is a former president of the organization, having joined in 1990 (the organization itself was founded just five years earlier in 1985) and his wife was one of the co-organizers (along with Diana Nelson) of this year's trailer/sailor cruise. The organization began with a half-dozen to a dozen like minded souls who joined forces to explore North Channel waters.

"We joined in 1990 and we have been coming most years ever since," said Mr.

John and Irene Clement sit high above a gathering of trailer sailors in

Clement. "I ran five of the cruises, then Mike Nelson took it on and Diana Nelson took it on after him."

The Clements began sailing in small dinghies when they were younger, but with the advent of their children they realized they needed something more substan-

"With small children you need to be able to anchor so they can go ashore, go swimming and it is good to have a boat big enough to be able to have some space below," said Ms. Clement. "The kids need to go ashore sometimes.'

"So that is what trailer

sailors did, anchor, go ashore to go blueberry picking and explore in little dingies," agreed Mr. Clement.

Since trailer/sailors tend to smaller boats, usually from 16 to 25-foot vessels that fit easily on trailers, they tend to have more limited space for supplies and amenities. "We plan every three days to be in a marina where we can pump out the head (toilet tanks), pick up ice, get an ice cream," said Mr. Clement. "Oh we like the ice cream," laughed Ms. Clement, "in fact we will probably go and get one after we are finishing derigging this afternoon.'



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It takes about three hours to take down the rigging and mast on a small sailboat, between two and four, depending on the winds.

The amenities onboard a trailer sailor's vessel can vary widely, largely dependant on the character of the boat and its owners. The Clement's Taranui is at the large end of the trailered sailboats in the association, and their vessel even sports a wood burning stove. "That's pretty unusual," said Ms. Clement. "This was a boat-builder's boat. Not all boats have refrigeration, some people choose to do without, but we like cheese and milk."

The key element that attracts trailer sailors to the lifestyle, however, is the deep sense of community they enjoy, whether newcomers or long time veterans. "Whether it is their first time or 20 years, there is a friendship link," said Mr. Clement. "The mood has always been the same an extended family.'

The sailors tend to keep together while sailing the waters of the North Channel, providing mutual support and camaraderie and engaging in group social

events. "We might select a flat rock and say that is where we will hold a potluck at 6 o'clock," said Ms. Clement. The sailors will return to their boats to create a dish and meet together at the appointed time on the selected 'flat rock.' "We had a pancake breakfast one morning,' noted Ms. Clement.

The group will hold a layday, a two-night stay in one location to provide for better opportunities to socialize and build the sense of community that holds them together.


Most of the trailer sailors have a wide and eclectic skill set. "If someone has an issue with their boat or some piece of equipment, someone will know how to juryrig a solution and someone else will have the parts," said Mr. Clement.

The Trailer/Sailor Association logo is a stylized combination of a boat in the water and on a trailer. "Half in the water and out," half said Clement.

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


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48th Haweater Weekend of

honour amongst the trailer sailor community, noted the couple. "Roy is a life member because of all that he does for the boating community," said Ms. Clement. Kelly O'Hare and the

catering staff of the Anchor Inn Hotel are also held in high esteem by the group. "We have a half point dinner hosted by the Anchor Inn where we have 60 people at the pavilion on the docks in Little Current," said Mr. Clement. "Kelly and her staff have been wonderful.'

Some of the safety items the group insists on are mast lights that help show where a boat is located in the pitch dark of a moonless North Channel night. If a boater's anchor drags and you have to anchor, it helps a lot to know where the other boats are located. The light located at the top of the mast takes the guesswork out of the process. "It has to be visible for 360 degrees," said Mr. Clement.

The sailors are also encouraged to have their VHF licence. "I think Roy does an excellent job of reminding people what each of the channels are used for," said Ms. Clement.

The Island marinas have most of what trailer sailors need to make their stay enjoyable, particularly enough room to set up their boats when they arrive. "A good ramp with

depth to get into the water is important," said Mr. Clement. "The ramp here in Spider Bay Marina is excellent and Gore Bay's is very

Many people have been asking and writing in about the narrower beach level this year. The fact is that the water level in Lake Huron is at its highest is has been in over 17 years after the historic low of 2013. Due to many factors including the very cold winters we have had with complete ice coverage on the Lake Huron adding to the water level. This ice coverage also reduces the amount of evaporation over the winter and therefore changing the shorelines here and throughout Lake Huron. However, this is temporary since fall storms will erode into beaches and dunes and 'reset' beach conditions. If water levels stabilize and don't increase further, people will notice wider beaches next summer. But dunes are nature's No. 1 shore protection device, and continue to ensure

that the water continues to be clear and that swimmers can enjoy a nice sandy bottom.

There have been ques-

tions about an invasive species called phragmites (a long reed) found in Providence Bay and other areas of the Island. There was recently a meeting between various stakeholders in Central Manitoulin. Manitoulin Streams and other stakeholders to come up with an action plan. They have applied for a permit to apply a pesticide to eradicate them and are waiting for approval. This must be done by a licenced professional. In the meanwhile, you can make sure to not spread them by not driving vehicles (ATVs) on the beach, as this spreads the loose (rhizomes) on the beach. Learn more by going to the Discovery Centre about the dynamic beach system including and non-native native species.

Program Announcement: Chicken Farmers of Ontario – New Programs, Artisanal Production

Chicken Farmers of Ontario (CFO) has announced that it is launching a portfolio of new and revised programs that will meet the needs of Ontario consumers while creating new opportunities for farm-

ers and processors. The new programswhich were developed following extensive public and industry consultations—will use a portion of the future growth in Ontario's production allocation to facilitate new business opportunities. The Artisanal Chicken Program allows farmers to grow between 600 and 3,000 birds annually for commercial market purposes. It will appeal to smaller independent, family farmers who wish to raise chickens on a smaller commercial scale and sell to selected local markets. For example, a farmer that wished to provide specially grown or processed chicken to support the defined needs of a local restaurant or a local farmers market might choose to join this program. This is an application based program requiring a production licence from CFO. The application for the artisanal production is online and applications are open until Friday, September 4, 2015. 



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
