Northern Credit Union moves to one Island office

All services to be amalgamated to Little Current; Mindemoya closing

MINDEMOYA—Mindemoya businesses and residents were shocked to discover that Northern Credit Union intends to close its Mindemoya branch. In a press release sent to The Expositor late last week, the company that took over operations of the former Espanola and District Credit Union five years ago announced that the Mindemoya branch would be closing its doors on November 30.

"Nothern will give its Mindemoya members four months to help with the transition," reports the news release.

The news was received by local members of the Northern Credit Union delegate group after it was released to local politicians and the media, leaving some delegates privately disgruntled that they were not given advance notice in order to be better prepared to answer questions.

Manitoulin Country Fest starts tonight, Wednesday, August 8

LITTLE CURRENT—The 12th annual Manitoulin Country Fest is returning to Little Current this week, promising good times and a "little bit of something for everyone" with performances running from Wednesday, August 8, to Saturday, August 11, including Billy Ray Cyrus of "Achy Breaky Heart" fame headlining the show.

"It's a large festival with an intimate kind of feel," says Country 103's KT Timmermans, co-organizer of the festival alongside her husband Craig.

Country Fest events start the day before the festival shows, beginning Wednesday evening. The first event is a sold-out fundraising boat cruise with North Channel Cruise Line, featuring music by George Canyon. This is the third year of the fundraising cruise and proceeds are going to the Manitoulin Diabetes Network

Also on Wednesday is the Kick-Off to Country Fest party at the Anchor Inn, which gets underway at 8 pm. The 19+ event has a \$5 cover charge, with funds also going to the Manitoulin Diabetes Network. Toronto-born singersongwriter Nate Daviau will be there performing original songs

and covers. Ms. Timmermans says she hopes to donate upwards of \$10,000 through the pre-festival events.

Noojmowin Teg achieves CCA accreditation

AUNDECK OMNI KANING— Noojmowin Teg Health Centre (NTHC) received confirmation that it has been formally accredited through the Canadian Centre for Accreditation (CCA).

Having CCA accreditation is recognition of the organization's commitment to developing and following good practices and processes," says Ryan Corbiere, board chair. "The First Nation and Indigenous communities and community members we serve, as well as our health partners, can be assured that we have undergone an extensive internal and external review process that measures our practices against highly reputable standards of practice. Accreditation also opens doors to be explored by board and staff moving forward."

After extensive work on policies and procedures, a formal CCA accreditation review was completed by a neutral and third part review team comprised of three volunteers in May 2018. The review was based on assessing whether Noojmowin Teg followed accepted organizational practices that promoted ongoing improvement, and responsive, culturally relevant and effective services to community members. The three team members spent a week carefully reviewing organizational documents and processes, completing a site visit to an external First Nation clinic, and conducting interviews and surveys with clients, community partners, staff and board. The team assessed the organization using specific CCA mandatory requirements and leading practice standards in the areas of governance, organizational planning and performance, leadership and risk management quality of services, and most importantly, from a cultural lens. Noojmowin Teg met all required organizational, and community-based primary healthcare standards.

BAY OF ISLANDS—The Love Your Bay shoreline cleanup currently underway in the Bay of Islands is a perfect example of what can be accomplished when a group of determined people get together to help preserve something they love.

"It is going very well," said Celesta Bjornson. "I am really proud of our community.'

It's rather difficult to pin down an actual number of how many people are participating in the Love Your Bay event, but anecdotally it is pretty impressive. "Most of our bay is taking part in it," said Ms. Bjornson. "I can't say for sure, 70, 80, 100 people? Almost every island has people taking part.'

Before the effort got underway, a community barbecue was held. "We had a big barbecue and and a meeting with a large map," said Ms. Bjornson. "Everyone highlighted where they were committing to cleanup so we didn't have a duplication of effort."

The Love Your Bay cleanup was made possible through a grant from the Great Lakes Guardian Trust. "The grant from the Trust is sure being put to good use," said Ward 1 Councillor Laurie Cook. "Many thanks to Dave Williamson for suggesting that NEMI apply for it on behalf of Ward 1.'

The funds have provided for the steady flow of debris pouring into the bins stationed at the landing to be hauled away for disposal at the landfill. "We have emptied a bin just about every day," said Ms. Bjornson.

Charge of criminal harassment withdrawn against Patsy Corbiere

GORE BAY—The final charge of criminal harassment against Aundeck Omni Kaning Chief Patsy Corbiere was withdrawn at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on Thursday, August 2. The charge was withdrawn after Chief Corbiere completed a diversion program.

Speaking on Chief Corbiere's behalf, her lawyer stated, "This was not an admission of guilt. She simply wanted to put the matter behind her."

Charges of criminal breach of trust and intimidation of a justice system participant laid against Chief Corbiere by the Ontario Provincial Police following an investigation requested by the United Chiefs and Councils of Manitoulin Police Service in October of 2016 were previously withdrawn.

A deadly challege to the foundations of democracy is underway

We are under attack by the enemies of Western democracy. It is a war that is already claiming very real casualties on the front lines.

On June 29 a gunman barricaded the back door of the Capital Gazette newspaper and then entered the front door with a blazing gun, brutally murdering Rob Hiaasen, 59, an assistant editor and columnist; Wendi Winters, 65, a community correspondent who headed special publications; Gerald Fischman, 61, the editorial page editor; John McNamara, 56, a staff writer who had covered high school, college and professional sports for decades; and Rebecca Smith, 34, a sales assistant who had just been hired that past November.

That attack serves as a canary in the cage moment for one of the foundational pillars of freedom and Western democracy and should act as a clarion call to the populists and demagogues currently infesting our public offices and trolling social media sites that they are going too far in their vilification of the press.

In recent days we have witnessed the most powerful man on earth, a man putatively holding an office that was once heralded as being the leader of the free world and stalwart defender of democracy, vilifying the media as an enemy of the people. Fascism, it seems, is once again on the rise and some of us can still remember how that all worked out last time for humanity. How long will it be before brown shirts once again bash in the doors of newspaper offices to wreck the press? We have seen it all before. Jackboots freely crushing in the heads of those who would speak truth to power and suppressing the public's right to know.

Think it can't happen here in the bastions of democracy? Think again—it is already happening.

The office of the president of the United States was once held by people like Dwight D. Eisenhower, who (futilely as it turns out) warned of the dangers presented to his nation's democratic institutions by the military-industrial complex; John F. Kennedy, who stood nose to nose with the despots of the Soviet Union instead of colluding with them to subvert his nation's democracy; Franklin D. Roosevelt, who brought a New Deal to America's downtrodden and guided his nation through the horrors of the Second World War; and (was it really so very recent?) Barack Obama, America's first Black president who seemed destined to finally start his nation down the path of laying the odious legacy of slavery and civil rights abuses to rest.

Now? Not so much.

In the wake of the demise of a free press and public transparency of government action come the Pravdas, partisan newsletters masquerading as sources of "news."

With recent developments such as official press releases coming out of Queen's Park that bear a distinct resemblance to 1930s Comintern pronouncements and an Ontario premier who has used taxpayer's funds to set up a "news" channel reminiscent of the failed effort he and his brother hosted briefly on the now defunct Sun TV channel, we can't count ourselves safe from this disturbing trend south of the border.

American authorities have convincingly determined that America's (and Canada's) enemies have been leveraging social media to undermine our democratic institutions. Sadly, the click-bait formulation of those social media posts plays perfectly in the genre, with those who profit from playing on people's prejudice and darker natures amplifying their subversive reach.

The unfettered rhetoric of the demagogues and populists who are vilifying the press for their own political profit mean that there will be more Capital Gazettes in our future. Let us fervently hope that this trend reverses.

We can all play our own small part in defending the democracy that our forefathers gave their lives to defend in the trenches. It's simple. Don't forward and share reactionary and divisive posts on social media, even if they are something you tend to agree with, without checking the facts. Be your own censor, shut down the trolls and throw your support behind your local and national media outlets. Take action, before we all wind up paying the price.

Reducing electrical energy costs in Ontario

Opportunities abound to renege on contracts through the power of the legislature

To the Expositor:

With all but seven (not so magnificent) Liberal MPPs kicking cans down the road and with Doug Ford and the PCs winning a majority in the recent provincial election, the opportunity to reduce the cost of hydro power presents itself. With the moves the PCs have made thus far, there is every indication that something will be done.

How did hydro rates surge to the point where they are now among the highest in North America? The clear answer is that The Green Energy Act and the resulting emphasis on renewables are the cause. There has been noise about the gas plant scandal, smart meters, executive salaries etc. but they all pale in comparison to the costs associated with renewables. The Ontario Auditor General has estimated that ratepayers in Ontario paid \$37 billion over fair market value for renewable energy from 2006 to 2014. Ratepayers will pay an additional \$133 billion by 2032! Kind of makes the \$1 billion gas plant scandal seem like chump change! Here are a few initiatives that would help to address the energy cost problem: cancel all renewable energy projects that are now in progress. With the move to stop the White Pine project in Prince Edward County, this has started; rescind the Green Energy Act; Advise all current contract holders that Ontario is devising a plan to reduce power costs; initiate a study to determine the effect wind turbines have on wildlife and in particular, birds and bats. This information will provide a basis for determining the tax to be levied on all wind farm operators; inform all wind farm operators that they must immediately post a bond to ensure site clearance at the end of the contract. A million per turbine sounds like a good number but might be a bit low; and notify all contract holders that discussions will be held with the intent of reducing costs to Ontario rate payers. Suggest doing this one contract at a time with the oldest contracts up for discussion first. The Ontario Government should also notify all contract holders that if negotiations are not successful, contracts will be cancelled. There are many other options available to assist in lowering power rates but the suggested initiatives should serve to generate a little thought. The option of cancelling renewable energy contracts will no doubt cause a few heads to explode and there will be those who will insist that 'a contract is a contract and it should be complied with." The argument has also been made by many that there is no compelling economic, environmental, moral or legal case for the government to honour odious contracts. These energy contracts can be classified as odious for a number of reasons. First, many people at the lower end of the income scale cannot afford the current cost of power. Granny freezing in the dark is an

image we should keep in mind. Secondly, high power costs are forcing industry to move out of Ontario. Manufacturing and the attractive wages paid by this sector are the first to go. The third reason is that the Liberal Government failed to conduct a reasonable cost/benefit analysis before introducing the Green Energy Act and presented the case for renewable power to the people of Ontario with claims that were based on little or no evidence in support of these claims. For example, time and again, the liberal government stated that health costs due to coal power plant particulate emissions were costing the province \$3 billion annually. This claim was made at a time when the power plants were responsible for one percent of total emissions and the total health care budget in Ontario was \$35 billion. How a source generating one percent

of particulate emissions could be responsible for 10 percent of the health care budget was and remains a mystery. The Fraser Institute has published a number of papers outlining the details if anyone is interested.

A couple of other ill-conceived statements made by successive energy ministers concerned the number of permanent jobs to be generated and the emerging cost of power as renewables were brought online. Fifty thousand jobs were promised and we "wouldn't notice" any increase in rates!

What about the legal question? I again refer to The Fraser Institute for reference. In October of 2014, when the power cost issue was heating up, the organization issued a study entitled Cancelling Contracts: The Power of Governments to Unilaterally Alter Agreements. The author was Bruce Pardy, a law professor at Queen's University. Mr. Pardy states clearly that a government may change or cancel a contract by enacting legislation and in addition, if the Ontario legislature passed a statute that explicitly denied the right to compensation, then no compensation would be payable. For political justification, here is a direct quote from the study: "If democratically elected governments are to establish their own policies, they require the ability to make unilateral changes to agreements made by previous governments. If they cannot do so, then their predecessors can control policy decisions beyond the terms of their democratic mandates."

It will be a long hard road back to economic sanity. The hardship that the previous government imposed on the people of Ontario caused by exorbitant power costs well into the future provides the moral case for putting to an end to the arduous renewable contracts responsible.

WIIKWEMKOONG—Internationally-acclaimed vocalist Crystal Shawanda's annual homecoming party brought friends, family and fans together under the setting Wiikwemkoong sun to the sounds of blues and country hits last Friday.

The event, now in its 11th year, was a more intimate affair than past years which have drawn hundreds of people. One of the factors for the smaller size was the usual stage being in poor repair this year.

"And to be honest, I have a little 17-month-old baby now, and I just didn't want to wear myself out worrying about it," said Ms. Shawanda. Her daughter Zhaa Zhaa was at the show, excitedly running around to meet the many new faces around her.

The floor-level stage for this year's event was set up facing the sun which, although slightly blinding when the clouds occasionally parted, offered a striking backdrop for the performance. Ms. Shawanda was joined on stage by her husband Dewayne Strobel, providing all of the musical accompaniment on his electric guitar. It was a special day for the musical duo—homecoming coincided with the couple's 15th anniversary.

Ms. Shawanda created the original idea for the homecoming shows out of necessity.

"When we first started doing these events, it was because there was nowhere to play in the area," said Ms. Shawanda. "Basically, the closest place I was playing was Toronto."

Despite her relocation to Nashville, Ms. Shawanda has remained committed to her home in Wiikwemkoong as well as some places which have fostered her growth. Her international successes are what have enabled her to express that gratitude back home.

"Now I'm at a point where I do what I want to do. I visit the communities that have nurtured me through my childhood when I first started singing," said Ms. Shawanda. Since she has started playing at more venues around the province, fans have not needed to visit her family's home to see her perform. That factor also contributed to the diminishing size of the event.

This year's smaller event also

meant more time for Ms. Shawanda to interact with old friends, family and long-time fans, something that tends to be difficult at big shows. "It's nice to invite the Island here so we can catch up. Having that support is nice."

Derek and Celina Blakeney travelled from Sudbury for the show. Ms. Shawanda's music has been a recurring presence in their lives—last year, she sang 'Happy Birthday' to Ms. Blakeney at the homecoming event. When the couple got married, Ms. Shawanda's 'You Can Let Go' played as Ms. Blakeney walked down the aisle.

"We'd bring my parents every

year," said Ms. Blakeney. "Usually we come out as a family to homecoming because Crystal is my mom's favourite artist."

Ms. Blakeney's father died three years ago, turning the annual homecoming trip into a sentimental tradition. Ms. Shawanda performed the emotional 'You Can Let Go' near the end of her first set, which brought Ms. Blakeney up to the front to dance with another audience member.

For Ms. Blakeney, the personal connection Ms. Shawanda brings to her performances—especially homecoming—has resonated the deepest.

"I like how she gets involved

with all her fans; she treats them like family," she said. "It's like a gathering of friends celebrating music."

A number of people in attendance were members of the Espanola Autism Acceptance group. That group has partnered with Ms. Shawanda on numerous occasions in the past and are major supporters of her work. Several of them were seated in the front row, and did not hesitate to get up and dance along to the performance.

About 75 people had gathered by the end of Ms. Shawanda's first set. It was a mixture of original tunes and covers from both a

blues and a country repertoire. The setlist was appropriate for Ms. Shawanda, who began her career as a country singer but has been moving more firmly towards blues in her latest few albums.

Ms. Shawanda's most recent album 'Voodoo Woman' came out in late 2017. Even though she is still actively promoting that release, she is already back in the recording studio working on another blues album. While her most recent release contained a number of cover songs, the new project will feature more original tunes. Ms. Shawanda said she hopes to release that album in early 2019.

I am writing to you today in regards to Orkambi. Orkambi is a drug which treats the underlying defect for many of those suffering from cystic fibrosis, specifically those with the F508del mutation. This accounts for over 700 people in Ontario.

My 10-year-old son Benjamin has cystic fibrosis (CF). CF is the most common fatal genetic disease affecting Canadian children and young adults. Ben has already undergone a non-transplant surgery and frequently deals with lung infections that severely curtail his enjoyment of life.

The approval process for Orkambi has taken longer than expected. A similar drug called Kalydeco was made publicly available in Ontario recently. Kalydeco has the same success as Orkambi in reducing or eliminating many symptoms for many individuals taking it. Kalydeco works like Orkambi, except that it is targeted at a different cystic fibrosis mutation.

Orkambi currently costs more than \$250,000/year. Many major private insurance providers cover Orkambi. Many western nations have negotiated pricing agreements. France, Ireland and the United States make Orkambi publicly available for those who meet eligibility requirements.

While Health Canada has already approved Orkambi, the Canadian Agency for Drugs and Technologies in Health, the Common Drug Review, the Committee to Evaluate Drugs and the pan-Canadian Pharmaceutical Alliance must also approve the drug.

Negotiations can significantly reduce the current cost. The long term benefits of drugs like Orkambi can be measured in fulfilling years lived, and in a more practical sense, money saved for the taxpayer by way of less hospital visits and expensive procedures that will only increase as time moves on for untreated individuals.

Orkambi may alleviate many of Ben's symptoms and prevent much future lung deterioration, however, damage already present cannot be undone. Transplants are often

the last resort for individuals with CF. Please consider to act as a voice for my son and others like him. Please contact Christine Elliot to request that Orkambi is made publicly available as soon as possible.

History Day in Kagawong this Thursday, August 9

by Michael Erskine KAGAWONG—One of the most anticipated events of the summer season has to be the History Day in Kagawong series. This year there are two themes backstopping the event, the tragic tale of the two Henry brothers and the Danny Dodge tragedy.

"The story of the Henry brothers, who founded Kagawong back in the late 1800s, is really a story we are looking forward to sharing," said museum curator Rick Nelson. "It's a great story and our museum committee members Dianne Fraser and Sabine Huege

have been putting in a lot of hours getting it ready."

Avoid ticks, and Lyme disease, this summer you need treatment. Lyme

SUDBURY DISTRICT— With the warm weather upon us and people enjoying the outdoors, Public Health Sudbury and Districts is reminding you to protect yourself and your family against tick bites and to learn what to do if you are bitten.

Infected blacklegged ticks can spread the bacteria that causes Lyme disease, and they have been found in the Sudbury district. Although the risk of contracting Lyme disease remains low, people need to protect themselves. In Ontario, blacklegged ticks are found more commonly in rural areas along the north shores of Lake Erie, Lake Ontario, Lake Superior, and the St. Lawrence River.

"Checking for ticks immediately after activities like gardening or hiking is one simple way you can protect yourself from Lyme disease," said Jon Groulx, an environmental support officer with the organization.

Blacklegged ticks cannot fly. They wait on grass and bushes for animals or humans to brush against the vegetation. Ticks vary

How to remove a tick: If you find a tick attached, use fine-tipped tweezers to grab the tick close to the skin and gently pull straight up. Wash the area with soap and water, and put the tick in a container and bring it to your local public health unit for it to be sent for testing for Lyme disease. If the tick has been attached for more than 24 hours, follow up with your health care provider to determine if

Avoiding a tick bite in the ed, Lyme disease can cause serious complications to the heart, joints, and nervous system. One of the signs of Lyme disease is a rash that looks like a red bull's eye around the bite area. 

"If you're at all thinking about it, come out, or come to the stroke improvement class," Ms. White urges.



The property was publicly listed for \$20.6 million, however, until the transaction has completely closed, the purchase price cannot be made public.

The property features 6.5 kilometres of uninterrupted Georgian Bay shoreline, representing 22 percent of the park's coast and is home to at least 10 federally listed species at risk including the Masssauga rattler, some of the oldest trees in eastern North America, and dozens of significant cave systems.

...continued from page 1 The issue is likely to be discussed at the next delegate meeting scheduled for August 18.

The release notes that "While the credit union will no longer offer a bricks and mortar location in Mindemoya, its valued members will be able to access the physical branch in Little Current and Espanola. Or, if these members prefer, they can conduct their inbranch duties at any one of Northern's 32 branches located across Northern Ontario."

"I received an email earlier this week," said Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens. "I was a little bit disappointed that we didn't get some advance warning at the municipal level."

Mayor Stephens did have an opportunity to engage with one of the company vice presidents at the Mindemoya branch on Thursday. "I expressed to him my concern that we had spent a long time at the credit union trying to bring them in because Central Manitoulin is a growing community." The vice president, Steve Hatzipantelis, assistant vice president retail sales and service, reiterated much of what was in the press release. "He talked about the change in banking and how bricks and mortar operations are not needed so much anymore and that a lot of banking is moving to telephone and the Internet these days," recalled Mayor Stephens. "I haven't been able to speak to all of council, but I have spoken with a couple of them and they too expressed their concern. But it is a business and at the end of the day you can't do too much about it."

Mayor Stephens noted that the official did indicate that the lease on the current location was coming up. "In the end I guess they looked at things and decided it wasn't a viable location for them."


A statement from the Al Suraci, Northern Credit Union CEO, notes: "This consolidation was a very hard decision. I want to assure our esteemed members that we always keep their best interests at heart. This consolidation may not seem to be in-line with this commitment, however, I can promise our members and Northern staff that this decision was made for the overall good of our credit union."

The credit union points out that "Mindemoya members are also extended a host of other banking options to help ensure they continue to receive the same high level of service they have become accustomed to. These include online banking and digital procurement tools and resources that allow them to access Northern's products and services online everything from chequing and savings accounts to investments and more."

The press release goes on to say that it is "doing its best to ensure that all Mindemoya employees remain a part of Northern and will serve in their current capacity, or be extended opportunities to further their career."

In the letter sent to local politicians, Mr. Suraci notes that "These past few years, Northern Credit Union has achieved countless community- and business-related goals, all working towards making us the one true financial institution of the North. While we continue along this successful journey, we are not immune to change, along with the adverse effects it can have."

The missive from the CEO to local political leaders, which includes the information sent in the press release cited above, adds that: "To continue with our 60-plus year history of keeping it True North Strong, this consolidation was necessary. You see, the banking industry has changed. Where banks, credit unions and other financial institutions were opening more branches not



"I just found out," said Jim Gilpin of Spring Bay, former chair of the Espanola and District Credit Union who was at the helm when that organization was subsumed by Northern Credit Union, where he is now a delegate. "I am very disappointed to see it go." Mr. Gilpin said that he was under the impression, although not specifically stated at the time by Northern, that the Mindemova location would stand for at least five years. "That was our general understanding," he said.

Members of the board and delegate group were reluctant to speak on the record about the closure, noting that it is the chair who speaks for the board.

"Not avoiding you but I don't have anymore information that I can add," replied delegate member Steve Schaffer. "I'm still digesting the announcement myself. Our delegate group has it as an important agenda item for our August meeting." Mr. Schaffer referred The Expositor to delegate committee chair Jim Brandow.

Tehkummah council approves 4.78 percent tax rate increase

TEHKUMMAH-Tehkummah council approved the 2018 budget and a 4.78 percent tax rate increase at its July 24 meeting. Acting Clerk-Treasurer Barb Deforge told council the 2018 budget must be approved prior to nomination day, July 27. She noted there were three options: pass the budget as presented, follow the 2017 budget, or wait for the new council to be elected.

The budget was prepared with assistance from Susan Shannon of 910090 Ontario Ltd. o/a Shaping Organizational Solutions (SOS), based in Port Severn, Ontario. According to the report provided to council, since the 2017 audited financial statements were not yet available, the 2018 budget was based on the unaudited figures in the 2017 general ledger, other 2017 information provided

2018 revenues and expen-

The report to council stated, "Clearly the preference would have been to wait for the auditor's final adjusted figures for 2017, but given the urgency to have a 2018 budget passed due to the pending 2018 municipal elections and the need to produce the 2018 final tax and water bills, it is recommended that council pass the 2018

budget as presented.' The report also noted the budget may require amendment once 2017 audited statements are available. "The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing has confirmed to staff, 'if' the audited results for 2017 determine there is a need to amend the budget, the township does have the ability and authority to do so before ... continued on page 11

repurposed or reused and another for the most bizarre thing found," she said. What was the most bizarre thing found so far? "That had to be a melted outhouse," said Ms. Bjornson ruefully. "It was all melted from being in a fire, including a grate."

"This all really started out with a group of us out kayaking," said Sheile Williams, who is co-ordinating the effort with Ms. Bjornson. Both are members of the Bay of Islands Community Association (BICA). "We said to ourselves 'isn't it terrible to see what people throw away or just hide along the shoreline?" There are discarded docks, all kinds of stryrofoam, oil drums from back in the day that people have just hidden on the shore."


In fact, the BICA members have discovered and dismantled six abandoned docks that have drifted into the bay. "We have another two to deal with yet," said Ms.

Williams.

As for the most re-purposable/reusable item found to date? "That has to be the big black dock floats that we found," said Ms. Bjornson.

The Love Your Bay effort has a true international flavour to it due to the number of Americans who call the Bay of Islands home during the summer. That dichotomy is reflected in how the BICA acronym is said. "Americans pronounce it 'bike-a' and Canadians say 'beek-a'," laughed Ms. Williams.

community is located along the shores of northern Lake Huron in Michigan's Upper Peninsula between St Ignace and Drummond Island. The community includes the towns of Cedarville and Hessel which are connected by M-134, designated Pure Michigan Byway that is accessible from I-75.


Our land and water make us who we are. There are 36 islands in the Les Cheneaux archipelago, eight nature preserves and numerous public recreation areas in the community.


Our people connect to this place. Our living heritage includes our community's Native American culture and traditional hand-built crafts and educational experiences such as wooden boat and paddle building and local culinary and fine arts programs. We are proud of our historic connection to Aldo Leopold, a famed leader in land conservation, who spent his childhood summers here. We host an annual festival to honor his legacy and to celebrate the lands and waters that inspire us all today. Our local businesses and community events are infused with respect for our history and our land ethic. Our vision for our future honors our past and celebrates the land and water we love.

There are many ways to enjoy the natural environment on Les Cheneaux. Our current conservation projects cover a wide range of environments and opportunities for locals and visitors. Birding opportunities are abundant: The North Huron birding trail highlights the abundant bird species and creates more opportunities for people to learn about and view the birds of Les Cheneaux, and Search Bay, the 2,000 acres of the Hiawatha National Forest where drivers, hikers, and campers can see

various bird species and other wildlife. Paddlers have an opportunity to travel over 120 kilometres of the northern-most shores of Lake Huron from the Carp River near St Ignace through the Les Cheneaux Islands, continuing on to DeTour Village at the mouth of the St. Mary's River. Hessel beach, improvements to Cedarville Harbor, and Government Island, the only wholly publicly owned island in thearchipelago with nine campsites, also give visitors access to the abundant water. Hiking opportunities abound in Les Cheneaux's eight separate nature preserves representing more than 3,500 acres of conserved lands

that are open to the public. Other opportunities on the island include: the Avery Arts and Nature Learning Center, which is a non-profit housed in the Hessel Schoolhouse and also serves as the trailhead for the North Huron Birding Trail, and the location of the annual outdoor Aldo Leopold Festival; the Lex Cheneaux Culinary School, which offers students a comprehensive one-year program, the last four months of which are spent working in the adjacent 55-seat restaurant; and the Great Lakes Boat Building School, which is the only licensed school of its kind in the state, teaching quality wooden boat building skills and preservative craftsmanship.

year end. If the audited changes are minor, there would not be a need to amend the budget," the report concluded. "In this case, staff would simply adjust operations to try to meet budget or run a deficit at year end to be picked up in the 2019 budget."

Total 2018 budgeted expenditures are \$1,709,644 operations and \$59,894 capital costs for a total of \$1,769,538. Costs are offset by \$680,586 non-tax revenues leaving \$1,088,952 to be levied.

Councillor Paul Bowerman was concerned by the increase as property owners are also affected by a Municipal Property Assessment Corporation increase, asking if there was an option to offset the municipal tax rate increase by transferring from gas tax reserves to roads and water and sewer. Ms. Deforge noted, "If you change any of this you won't be passing the budget."

In a recorded vote, Reeve Eric Russell and councilors Paul Bowerman, Lorie Leeson and Mike Mackenzie voted in favour of passing the budget as presented. Councillor Ron Hierons voted against the motion, noting there were too many unanswered questions.

Later in the meeting, council also approved water and sewer billing rates on the recommendation from staff "that the water and sewer second quarter billing be sent out at the 2017 rates until the 2018 budget has been approved and passed."

Second quarter water and sewer billing had been delayed for various reasons.

Language and cultural camp offers foundational knowledge

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—Drum circles, charades, fire teachings and card games may not seem like natural complements, but they were all key parts of Mnaamodzawin Health Services (MHS)' Anishnaabe Aadziiwin Language and Culture Camp, held last week for its employees.

"It's important they have the skills to have an introductory discussion with their clients, and they have a respect for the language of the people they serve," said Craig Abotossaway, executive director of MHS.

The camp's intention was to enhance cultural competency when providing care within Indigenous communities. Some of the activities, such as the card games, were chosen because of their engaging and easyto-understand nature. This introductory camp was designed to create a foundational knowledge base onto which participants could further develop their skills.

The language and culture camp also

offered traditional teachings outside of the introductory language games. Attendees participated in ceremonies such as smudging and drum circles, and gained cultural knowledge through teaching lodges.

"The cultural competencies in this program link back to medicine. The learning is all about understanding the ceremonial practices that relate to healing, Indigenous health practice and how those relate back to the work they do," said Mr. Abotossaway.

Initiatives such as this camp are all part of MHS' newly-enacted Anishinaabe Aadziiwin policy. The policy aims to ensure all staff members measurably increase both fluency and cultural competencies every year. Exact details of how fluency will be measured and what levels will be required are still being finalized.

MHS began offering weekly language classes a couple months ago for its employees to learn basic parts of speech such as greetings. This camp offered the team ...continued on page 15

SANDFIELD—On a breezy Saturday night, dancing alongside close friends and family members at the Sandfield Schoolhouse Community Hall, Rose McIntosh was living how she envisioned her 95th anniversary.

A potluck style diner was provided by guests. Slowmacaroni and cooked cheese from her granddaughter, chilli from her granddaughter-in-law, salads, chips and dip. The General Store and Country Kitchen also pitched in three large pizzas of their making. Indeed, the delicious meals provided was food fitting for a woman who had surpassed heart disease.

In between 30 to 40 attendees, largely family members and friends, were present to celebrate Ms. McIntosh's vibrant, infectious love of life after she turned 95 on Friday, July 13. People drove from Montreal. Ottawa, from the Toronto region, Niagara Falls, and the Greater Sudbury region to see her. Friends from the Island were also in attendance. Rose plays cribbage at the Sandfield Schoolhouse, often organizing the event on Wednesday nights. Ms. McIntosh is not a woman who will sit back while activities unfold. But on this rare occasion, she allowed her close family to take the reins over her birthday: "I didn't have nothing to do," she says. "It was really good because Garfield and Duncan [her sons] set it all up. I let them do it the way they want and it turned out so good."

Towards the end of the evening, Ms. McIntosh was presented with a twofeet wide heart-shaped vanilla cake cooked by the Sandfield County Kitchen.

dinner, After the evening was filled with melodies spun by Ms. McIntosh's French Canadian relatives. Leon and François Bédard strummed the guitar as Darell Dewar fiddled singalong songs alongside Bernard Noël de Tilly. She could be seen dancing with Jill Edward and her eldest son Garfield.

When many guests had left for the evening, Ms. McIntosh had finally sat down in the schoolhouse. In between conversations, she made time to speak with me: "The people here feel like brothers and sisters to me. All my neighbours. I really enjoy that."

Ms. McIntosh is no stranger to small town notoriety. In 2007, she was recipient of the township of Sandfield citizen of the year award for her contribution to her local community.

Over the last year Ms. McIntosh learned of a long-lost daughter-in-law from her late husband dur-

weeks prior. Over a short period of time, Ms. McIntosh had open her arms and become increasingly acquainted with Ms. White. In fact, the former had hopes of them staying for another week. "She's such a lovely person," said Ms. McIntosh.

"She stayed for three days. We got to be so friendly.. they were so amazing that I almost started to cry."

'I describe Rose as one of a billion exceptional and exquisite woman," shared Sehar Horton, a family friend of Ms. McIntosh. She met Ms. McIntosh the day prior to the anniversary, but felt very welcomed into the family: "She can make you feel like her own within the first moment of meeting her." They met the day before the anniversary. For Ms. McIntosh,

achieving the ripe age of 95 was never out of the question. "I feel perfect," she shares. "I feel like I'm good to work." As for her tips on succeeding in longevity: "I sleep good. I eat very well, and I enjoy other people in my house all the time. I don't feel older. I have my flowers, my garden. I'm always occupied."

"She has her religions she follows, and she gardens every day," adds Ms. Edward. "Her house is her everything. She loves her

home and cherishes it." "I felt like I have known this woman all my life," adds Ms. Horton. "The birthday evening was an amazing family affair. I have never witnessed or experienced so much joy and love.

As for Ms. McIntosh, she looks forward to the future

members a more immersive environment to reinforce and go beyond their introductory language skills.

"We were able to come together as a staff with a defined goal," said Anna Grigull, director of care at MHS.

"It's been a good teambuilding experience," added Kate White, the home care team lead. The camp participants appeared to be enjoying their time together. Many of them spent their time between activities sitting with their coworkers and getting to know each other better.

Ms. Grigull said building a cultural connection is crucial during the care process. She estimates that currently, only one in four staff members are fluent in Anishinaabemowin

"The more we're able to engage with our own clients on a cultural level, that helps to build trust and rapport," she said. "We come in at a vulnerable time, so anything that can build a relationship is helpful."

Often, even if care providers are unable to carry a full conversation, the effort they make is the most important part.

"(Clients) like to see us try to speak, and

then they'll respond in an area they know we can't reply. Then, we all start laughing and they actually teach us a bit more," said Ms. Grigull.

"A lot of times when we try, it results in humour, and in Indigenous practices humour goes a long way," she said.

The benefits of the immersion camp extend beyond the participating NHS employees. Their heightened cultural knowledge will help to support a better environment for their clients and the community as a whole.

"As much as young people have the ability to learn from elders, the elders can learn from young people," said Ms. Grigull.

MHS provides health services to five First Nations in the Manitoulin area. This includes its home location in Aundeck Omni Kaning, Sheguiandah, Sheshgewaning, Whitefish River and Zhiibaahaasing First Nations.

The traditional teachings at the camp involved elders from each of its five member First Nations. Mr. Abotossaway said the camp will become an annual event to continue encouraging language and cultural knowledge development.



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
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Young Eagles soar over Manitoulin

by Warren Schlote MANITOULIN EAST— The Young Eagles took to the sky once more as the annual event landed at Manitoulin East Municipal Airport on Haweater Weekend.

Saturday morning saw a number of families attend for the opportunity to take a short flight over Manitoulin.

"It was a bit nauseous, but a lot of fun," said participant Adrian Manitowabi.

"The main goal of this event is to promote aviation," said George Dobbs, airport manager. "It gives the local residents some benefit of having an airport here, some fun for the kids."

The Wisconsin-based Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) started Young Eagles in 1992 to allow young people to experience flying, often for the first time. Manitoulin East Municipal Airport has hosted its Young Eagles event since 2004.

Youth aged 8 to 17 were welcome to participate in a free flight during the event. Four pilots were on hand to facilitate the flights. Two were staff members at the airport, one came in from Timmins and the fourth came from Sudbury.

"The pilots that come here volunteer their time and their aircraft," said Marcel Gauthier, chair of the Airport Commission. The commission covers the pilots' fuel costs.

The weather was picture-perfect on Saturday morning. It was bright and sunny with only a minimal breeze and very high clouds. The conditions offered great views of Little Current, a highlight for participant Luka Brisebois who had come with his family from Lively.

"My favourite part was looking at all the houses and stuff. Everything was tiny," said Luka. It was his first time ever being in a plane.

Mr. Dobbs said their luck with the weather seems to follow a two-year cycle, offering perfect conditions roughly every other year.

The Expositor asked Luka if he would ever consider getting his pilot licence. Although he wants to become an architect, Luka said he might get his licence just for fun.

That idea intrigued his parents, who joked about being taxied around with their son. But Luka had other ideas.

"I would make you pay for a trip, dad," he said.







All of us consume too much sugar. There are so many articles and studies on the damage that the consumption of processed sugar does to our bodies when we eat it that we are on information overload and we tend to ignore the data. We are addicted to white and brown sugar in all its forms-it is cheap and is found in a lot of our food.

I am always trying out new recipes where you use a natural sweetener like maple syrup, honey, agave syrup, coconut or date sugar-still a form of sugar, but much healthier.

We have to train our taste buds to get away from the big sugar rush and wow factor of a piece of pecan pie to that of a healthier substitute which eventually becomes the new WOW!

The following recipe is great-no sugar, very healthy (and John has something to nibble on with coffee)!

Carrot Loaf with Cashew Frosting

If you don't have maple syrup switch to honey and for the pecans use your favourite nuts or seeds. To get the smoothness for the icing you do need to use cashews and they have to soak at least for 2 hours.

LOAF: 1 egg $1 \, 1/2 \, \text{cup spelt flour}$ 2 tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp baking soda 1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp ginger powder 1 tsp grated orange rind 1/4 cup shredded unsweetened coconut 1 1/2 cup shredded carrots 1/2 cup unsweetened applesauce

1/4 cup coconut oil 1/2 cup maple syrup 2 tsp vanilla extract 1/2 cup coconut milk 1/4 cup chopped pecans

CASHEW FROSTING:

1 cup raw cashews, soaked 1/4 cup fresh lemon juice 2 Tbsp honey 3 Tbsp coconut milk 1 tsp vanilla extract Pinch salt

DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Grease a loaf pan or line with parchment paper.

2. In a large bowl, combine the spelt flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, ginger, pecans and coconut. Add the shredded carrots to the bowl but do not stir them in. Set bowl aside.

3. In another bowl combine the egg, applesauce, maple syrup, melted coconut oil, vanilla, and coconut milk. Combine until smooth.

4. Pour the wet ingredients into the bowl with dry ingredients. Stir everything together until combined. Pour the batter into the loaf pan and bake in oven for 35-40 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean.

5. Drain the cashews. To make the icing put everything in a high-speed blender and blend until smooth. Add additional coconut milk if needed to thin out the frosting and more honey for sweetness.

6. Allow the loaf to cool for at least an hour. Spoon the frosting on top. Sprinkle with shredded coconut or chopped pistachios.



Shingles. You have probably heard about it from a friend or family member who has suffered the painful rash, or maybe you've experienced it yourself. Shingles is caused by the same virus that causes chickenpox. When you have chickenpox, the virus stays dormant in your body and can be reactivato cause shing er in life. Shingles is known to initially cause pain in one area of the body, then an itchy, red rash develops. After this rash heals, the pain can continue for weeks to years. It is important to seek medical attention early in the course of this viral illness as early treatment can help to prevent transmission to your loved ones, reduce pain, and help to prevent the rash from worsening. You may also have heard about ZOSTAVAX, the vaccine that you can get to reduce your risk of shingles, and perhaps vou have received it; but have you heard of the new vaccine, SHINGRIX? SHINGRIX is an adjuvanted, inactive vaccine. An "adjuvant" is a substance that is added to a vaccine to boost our body's response to vaccine - this means that it helps increase how well the vaccine works. "Inactive" means that the virus in the vaccine is not able to cause shingles. Here are five things you should know about SHIN-GRIX 1. How well does it work? SHINGRIX can reduce the risk of developing shingles by about 90 percent in people 50 years and older. On the other hand, the older vaccine, ZOSTAVAX, has been shown to reduce the

risk of shingles by about 50 percent, and the protection declines over time since the injection.

2. How many shots do I need? SHINGRIX requires two injections that are separated by 2-6 months. ZOSTAVAX requires only one injection.

3. Are there any side effects that I should now about? With SHINGRIX the mos common side effect that you will most likely experience is pain where the injection was given. You may also experience some muscle pain, feeling tired and a headache. 4. How much does it cost? SHINGRIX is not covered under Ontario Drug Benefit or Indian Affairs. If you have additional insurance, a portion or all of the cost may be covered. The cost of SHINGRIX is approximately \$154/vaccine - coming to a total of approximately \$308 for both vaccines required for the two shot series. In contrast, ZOSTAVAX is covered by Ontario Drug Benefit for those 65-70 years of age. The cost is approximately \$190 for the vaccine. 5. I have already received ZOSTAVAX, should I get SHINGRIX? There are no current Canadian recommendations. If you have received ZOSTAVAX more than five years ago, you can ask your doctor, nurse practitioner, or pharmacist for more information. Developing shingles can be devastating. While neither of these vaccines are 100 percent effective, they can both be used to help reduce your risk of developing shingles and the pain that comes with it.





Wiikwemkoong Cultural Festival fun for all ages

58th annual festival draws international visitors, media attention

WIIKWEMKOONG—Germany, Netherlands and Sweden were among the more distant countries from which Wiikwemkoong Cultural Festival attendees travelled.

The festival, held this past Saturday to Monday, offered a chance for all nations to gather and experience some of the best displays of Anishinaabek cultural traditions.

"It looks like participation is up; numbers have increased this year," said Ogimaa Duke Peltier.

Chris Pheasant assumed the lead MC role, a position he has held at many past festivals. The Grand Entry ceremony featured elders, incoming Wiikwemkoong Tribal Police Service Chief Terry McCaffrey, veterans and the royalty of Miss Wikwemikong, Little Miss Wikwemikong, Wikwemikong Lil Brave, and Junior Miss Wikwemikong.

The powwow received international media attention, most visibly with a team of camera and drone operators present on Sunday to shoot a television special featuring a Texas entrepreneur visiting cultural events in Ontario. Photographers Without Borders was also present shooting the festival.

Ogimaa Peltier said he was happy to see the documentarians in attendance.

"We hope to increase interest by sharing the story of this festival. Our goal is to continue promoting tourism in this region, partly because of the economic benefits for Wiikwemkoong and Manitoulin Island by having the premier cultural festival in Northeastern Ontario," he said.

The Expositor reached out to the on-site producer for the television shoot, who said he was unable to provide any details about the production for confidentiality reasons.

Jingle Dress dancers honour late Connie Phillips

In the early afternoon, the Phillips family entered the arbour to host the Connie Phillips Memorial Old Style Jingle Special. Ms. Phillips was from the Oneida Nation of the Thames and Chippewas of the Thames. Elizabeth Edgar-Webkamigad, a childhood friend of Ms. Phillips, was asked to speak for the family.

"They consider Wiikwemkoong to be part of their home," said Ms. Edgar-Webkamigad. "They have lots of extended family and connections to this community."

The memorial special marked 10 years since Ms. Phillips' death. Her family worked with the community to arrange the special. Family matriarch Donna Phillips chose the drums specifically, as she had watched the singers grow up.

Ms. Edgar-Webkamigad said the last time she saw Ms. Phillips, she taught her the importance of repairing relationships, being brave and making amends with others despite the challenge.

The winning dancer in the Connie Phillips Memorial Old Style Jingle Special was Kyla Sanderson, a Plains Cree who lives in Saskatoon. She has danced since the age of five, but began to travel to farther powwows in her teens.

"I felt like I needed to dance. It's a memorial special in their time of need, because their mom was a jingle dancer as well," said Ms. Sanderson "More importantly, to help heal the family because the jingle dress is a healing dance." Ms. Sanderson said she mainly tours the powwow trail around Saskatchewan and Canada's Midwest, but she attends Wiikwemkoong every year to visit with her partner's family who live here. In her teen years she was crowned Miss FSIN, a contest held by the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations in Saskatchewan.

"I was nervous dancing in front of the other jingle dress dancers because the Great Lakes region is its home," said Ms. Sanderson. "It really was an honour because it was a memorial special for their mom."

Ms. Sanderson said she likes attending the Wiikwemkoong powwow because "it's laid back and I feel at home."

Now that she has started a family of her own, Ms. Sanderson has gained new perspectives.

"I have a six-year-old son who already dances and it's a blessing feeling, raising my son in this environment of powwows and his culture," she said.

For Ms. Edgar-Webkamigad,

seeing the roughly 75 dancers standing to support Ms. Phillips was a powerful image.

"It was a reminder of the meaning of the circle," she said. "The circle is here for you. We're going to take care of you."



Visiting Manitoulin? Last Net Shed in Meldrum Bay a museum of

MELDRUM BAY-Nearly 150 years ago, Meldrum Bay began to be settled by Scots coming to Manitoulin Island from southern Ontario, attracting fiercely dogged, independent-spirited types drawn by cheap, plentiful land covered in virgin forest and the immeasurable waters of Lake Huron teeming with fish

Working with the first survey party of 1876 in Dawson



Township, the original settlers staked their claims, under which conditions they had to clear and fence five acres and build a house (usually a two-room log cabin) before they could own their land's title. Then, they would venture over the water to Cockburn Island's land office to acquire their patents-two settlers drowned on that treacherous journey—or by foot in all weather through bush to Gore Bay's land office. The hardships, the harsh winters and lack of even the most basic supplies, the isolation and backbreak-ing work of survival, the innovations and small victories of those days are stuff of legend. No roads, electricity, telephones, doctor or dentist softened the tough, often brutal, way of life.

In the early 1880s, lumbering quickly became a thriving industry everywhere on the Island, with sawmills built in all the feasible ports for easy transport of logs and lumber by boat to the US and England. Meldrum Bay's fist sawmill

was built in 1880, situated where the marina sits today, hiring hundreds of workers to process the huge quantities of wood being harvested up, down and around the Island's western tip.

Fishing also became big business; fish abounded in these Great Lakes waters and the 1890s saw fishing stations built to supply the boats from Collingwood and Sarnia with as much as 24 tons of fish weekly.

Several net sheds ringed the bay, their rooms and attics

large and airy workshops in which to dry and repair nets; the day's catch was packed for shipping and the fishermen prepared for the next morning's pre-dawn start on the lake. In a few short years after settlement, Meldrum Bay was a boomtown with stores, hotels, blacksmiths, school and boarding houses to service the flourishing community.

Now home to the Net Shed Museum, the last remaining net shed in the bay, built by fisherman Joe Millman in about 1902, stands resplendent in its lighthouse-red, original cedar shakes. The long, rustic building offers itself to be savoured as a unique historical artifact in its own right.

Inside, small windows on three sides and wide screened doors on the fourth side let in a surprising amount of light through gauzy curtains; the wide plank floors, heavy log rafters and poles supporting the ceiling testify to the handmade origins of the structure.

Founded in 1967 by the Meldrum Bay Historical Society as a Canada Centennial project, the museum is maintained scrupulously inside and out by a dedicated band of community volunteers. Across the road in Joe Millman's old family home lives the treasurer of the Historical Society, Dawn Marie Wickett, a descendant of Millman's through marriage into the Millman/Wickett families. 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
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

um intern who greets visitors and keeps the place spiffy; a high school student, he lives in Brampton and loves to re-live Meldrum Bay summers and stay with his grandmother. The president of the His-torical Society is Liz Durham, who lives just up the hill and has been active in the museum since its founding, taking part, with other volunteers, in the annual opening of the museum in spring and closing in fall and in dreaming up fundraisers such as the popular annual beef barbecue.

Community members donated all the museum's artifacts: jewellery, beaded appliqués and sewing baskets, photographs, linens, washtubs and irons, butter churn and moulds, quilts, school desks and blacksmith and farming implements. "Remember," says Liz Durham, "electric power only came to the village in 1950. Until then, people used coal oil lanterns and phones were handcranked." One donation, from the Joyce family, was of two large steamer trunks full of beautiful clothes and trimmings that had been owned by their "two elegant Irish dressmaker cousins."


