## Ojibwe language remains strong in Island communities, census shows

OTTAWA—The latest StatsCan figures on life in Canadian homes have been released and, according

to the data, Indigenous languages spoken in the home appear to be on the rise overall, although some that does not hold true for all

provinces, there appears to be a slight decline in Saskatchewan.

Anishnabemowin, or Ojibwe as defined by StatsCan's survey, is spoken by 21,800 Canadians at home, but Cree remains the most common Indigenous language spoken at home with 83,985 speakers reporting it as the language they speak at home. Inuktitut is spoken by some 39,025 Canadians at home.

In all, some 228,770 Canadians speak Indigenous languages at home, and that outstrips the number who claim an Indigenous language as their mother tongue. The key is that more young Indigenous Canadians are learning their native tongue as a second

LITTLE CURRENT—Tenants of 86 Vankoughnet Street East, which includes Barney's Bargain Barn Home Store and residents of the five apartments above, received notice last week that they would need to vacate the building.

'An Unsafe Building—Order to Make Safe, Pursuant to subsection 15.9 (4) of the Building Code Act, 1992' was posted on the building on August 3, and references an inspection completed by the Northeast Town building inspector on August 2 at the building.

"A review of the building occupancy has determined that final inspections and engineer/archi-

## Assignack council questions impact of centralizing all OPP administration for Island, Espanola

ASSIGNACK—Manitoulin detachment commander, Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb recently addressed Assignack council's concerns regarding the fate of the Manitowaning detachment and the current level of staffing. The staff sergeant admitted that Manitoulin is not up to its full complement of frontline officers, but that the level of service provided by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has not changed.

Councillor Brenda Reid began the deputation by asking the staff sergeant for an update on the new detachment, slated for Little Current, as well as the detachment buildings currently in use across the Island, including one on Highway 6 in Manitowaning.

"The decision for (choosing) Little Current (for the new headquarters) was not an OPP decision," Staff Sgt. Webb responded, noting that he found out about the new location the same day the municipalities did.

To address any concerns with the decision-making process, he suggested council contact Infrastructure Ontario.

"As for the four other facilities (the current detachments are in Manitowaning, Mindemoya, Gore Bay and Espanola), the information I've received is they are separate issues," he added.

The staff sergeant told council that when a plan of action for the new detachment is announced, the OPP will then look at the deployment strategy for Mani-

toulin. This could mean storefront offices or keeping one or more of the current detachment buildings.

"Central Manitoulin is growing, Manitowaning is located beside the Island's largest community and Gore Bay has the court house—these are all things to consider," he said.

Staff Sgt. Webb assured the council that there will be a larger discussion involving all the municipalities as to how the police services will be delivered.

"Police still need to respond to a community that's 150 km long with a population that grows between 10,000 and 30,000 in the summer," he added. "This is a conversation that hasn't even begun."

"When we know when the contract is awarded and what the

# FedNor invests \$860,000 in Island First Nations

**M'CHIGEENG**—There may have been a torrential downpour going on outside the Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute building but the smiles were bright and sunny inside as Nickel Belt MP Marc Serré announced FedNor would be investing a total of \$863,000 in three Island First Nations projects.

Chiefs Patsy Corbiere of Aundeck Omni Kaning, Linda Debassige of M'Chigeeng and Andrew Aguonie of Sheguiandah joined Mr. Serré, FedNor officials and Island band employees during the August 2 announcement. Chief Debassige introduced Mr. Serré, who was making the announcement on behalf of the Honourable Navdeep Bains, minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development and Minister responsible for FedNor.

“It is great to see so many students here,” said Mr. Serré, who acknowledged the traditional territories of the Anishinaabek.

Mr. Serré noted that the \$712,572 FedNor funding being invested in M'Chigeeng was “to assist Indigenous entrepreneurs in M'Chigeeng First Nation develop and grow their businesses.” FedNor had provided funding for the construction of the business centre currently underway, this funding will assist with the operations of the centre.

“We wish you and your community success with this endeavour,” he said. “You should be proud of what you have accomplished and we would like to help.”

Both Mr. Serré and Ogimaa Debassige acknowledged the work of FedNor and in particular Community Economic Development Officer Arik Theijsmeijer, who Chief Debassige said “went above and beyond to assist.”

Mr. Serré went on to note that a M'Chigeeng First Nation member from Ottawa will be returning to the community to open a pharmacy in the new business centre.

In addition to the funding for the M'Chigeeng business centre, there was a \$100,000 investment to provide members of Aundeck

Omni Kaning First Nation “greater access to health, fitness and cultural programming at the community’s cultural and recreation centre, and \$50,594 to improve Sheguiandah First Nation’s cultural park and provide local families with a safe, modern and accessible community space.”

Mr. Serré noted that not everyone is celebrating Canada’s 150th anniversary this year, particularly Indigenous peoples who were heavily impacted by the residential school era and its legacy, but expressed hope that reconciliation can take place going forward. “As Justice Murray Sinclair of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission has said, ‘Education got us into this mess and education will get us out,’” he said.

“Miigwetch for your powerful message,” said Ogimaa Debassige to Mr. Serré. She thanked the staff and Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute for arranging the announcement ceremony on short notice.

Ogimaa Debassige pointed out that the business centre, which will include the long sought goal of a grocery store, was a project that grew from the grass roots of the community. She recalled the vision of a grocery store was prevalent in the community when she was a “little girl.” Ogimaa Debassige credited the work of her community’s previous leadership in laying the groundwork for the current project coming to fruition.

Ogimaa Debassige recalled the words of the Honourable Carolyn Bennett, minister of Indigenous and Northern Affairs, who said to her “think outside the box” when it comes to moving the community forward. “It is nice to see the government listening to the needs of communities,” she said. Making communities healthy again will require innovation to come from the grassroots.

Ogimaa Patsy Corbiere noted that her community built their multiuse centre over the course

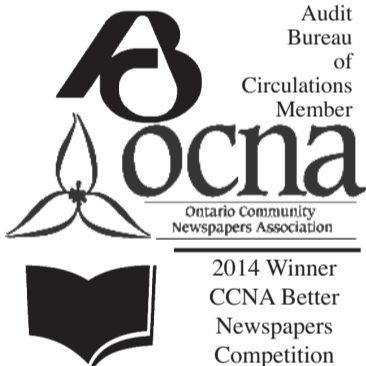

## *This weekend displayed the true power of volunteers*

The August civic holiday weekend on Manitoulin is traditionally the busiest weekend of the summer, with commerce across the Island in full swing and employee rosters stretched to the maximum. You have to make hay while the sun shines, and Haweater Weekend and the advent of the Wiikwemkoong Cultural Festival are certainly the shining sun of the the tourist season on Manitoulin.

Returning Island expats raise the boats of commerce in all Island communities this weekend, from the corner store in the most remote Island community to the relatively bustling commercial hubs of Little Current, Wiikwemkoong and Mindemoya, everyone seems to be going flat out on this busiest of times.

But neither the Little Current Lions Haweater Weekend in Little Current, with its impressive fireworks finale, or the Wiikwemkoong Cultural Festival with its performers and tourists drawn from all four corners of the globe, could be possible without the dedicated army of volunteers that give up their own holiday time to ensure that those events are a stellar success each and every year.

Lions Club members in their distinctive purple and gold vests can be seen scurrying from event to event throughout the weekend as they fulfill their scheduled commitments, and for the annual Hawfest dance it is largely all hands on deck, but added to those stalwart folks are numerous community members who step up each year to throw their shoulders to the wheel, sometimes quite literally.

In Wiikwemkoong the Wikwemikong Heritage Organization has been working diligently to marshal that community's volunteer spirit into an organizational force that would be the envy of communities many times their size.

The Wiikwemkoong event has morphed from those first tenuous

steps taken out and onto the dance arena back in 1961 as 'Wikwemikong Indian Days,' encouraged and nurtured by visionaries such as the late Rosemary Odjig as a way to revitalize the powwow, into the major force for education and reconciliation it is today.

None of this could happen without the largely unsung and behind the scenes efforts of an army of volunteers.

Moreover, events such as the Miss Manitoulin pageant, which draws its contestants from both Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities to select each year's Island ambassador, and the welcoming atmosphere of Manitoulin's powwows (both of the cultural festival variety and the traditional celebrations of welcome hosted by each community every year) draw all of us together in a unified expression of pride. It is upon these kinds of events, events which draw our communities closer together rather than apart and celebrate our commonality as well as our differences.

If there is one facet of our communities that is mirrored in the other, it is the wealth of community and volunteer spirit from whose well we draw upon so deeply at this time of the year.

There are other times we can see these virtues come to the fore, witness the community efforts that respond to local disasters such as the microburst experienced on the Island in the not so distant past. For both communities, that of the descendants of those ancient Indigenous hosts who shared this land with non-Indigenous newcomers who settled here, are imbued with a spirit that binds us together as Islanders even as the world seems bent on driving us apart.

At the end of the day, we are all Islanders and we have every right to be proud of that and all that we accomplish every year.

## Disappointment in Canada's support of the Line 5 pipeline

*The profits of a small group of people outweigh the concerns of thousands*

**To the Expositor:**

What a great disappointment. How disheartening.

Glenn Thibeault, Ontario's energy minister, recently sent a letter to the State of Michigan in support of continued use of the decrepit, 63-year-old pipeline that runs under the Straits of Mackinac.

The state up Michigan, which grants the easement for this pipeline, has been accepting comments on a plan to decommission it, a plan supported by legislators, environmental organizations, many businesses, and tens of thousands of citizens on both sides of the U.S./Canada border.

The pipeline, known as Line 5, is operated by Enbridge, a company with an awful safety record—and the company responsible for the worst oil spill in Michigan's history—when one of its pipes burst, gushing more than a million gallons of heavy crude into the Kalamazoo River.

Line 5 is a disaster waiting to happen. University of Michigan studies call the Mackinac Straits the "worst possible place" for a Great Lakes oil spill, which could pollute up to 720 miles of shoreline along Lake Michigan and Lake Huron. Even a moderate spill would foul the entire south shore of Manitoulin Island. Even a moderate spill would cost us in the North thousands of jobs and billions of dollars in lost income.

Sections of Line 5 are cracked and dented. Some segments have lost over a quarter of their original wall thickness to corrosion. Long

stretches under the Straits are unsupported, flexing continuously in the strong currents. In spite of this, 23 million gallons of heavy tar sands crude (thinned with benzene) continue to flow under one of the most environmentally sensitive areas in the world.

Several authoritative studies have shown that there are reasonable alternatives to Line 5 and that decommissioning would have little overall economic impact on either side of the border.

And, of course, escalating climate change calamities are making the need to move away from fossil fuels ever more obvious.

As of the first of August, the State of Michigan had received more than 21,000 comments requesting that Enbridge Line 5 be shut down. Unfortunately, Minister Thibeault wrote in support continued flow, seeming to think the profits of a small group of people associated with the petro-chemical industry trump the well being of the Great Lakes, all the people who live, work, and recreate along them, the natural environment, and the Earth's climate.

What a disappointment.

I wonder if Mr. Thibeault might consider applying for a job in the Trump administration; I'm quite sure he'd be welcome there.

# Artist's portraits of Wiikwemkoong chiefs unveiled

WIKWEMKOONG—The Wiikwemkoong Annual Cultural Festival is a great opportunity to gather the relations and celebrate stories and enjoy a sense of community, so what better time to unveil portraits of the former ogimaa (chiefs) of the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territories?

Current Ogimaa Duke Peltier acted as master of ceremonies for the unveiling of the completed portraits of nine recent former chiefs. Those nine chiefs' portraits include paintings of Ronald Wakegijig, who served seven times as chief between 1970 and 2000; Henry Peltier 1978 to 1980 and 1990 to 1992; Arthur E. Manitowabi who served four terms between 1992 and 2001; Walter Manitowabi 2002 to 2004; Hazel Fox-Recollet 2008 to 2012; Margaret Peggy Pitawanakwat 1997 to 1998; Gladys Wakegijig 2001 to 2002; Robert Corbiere 2004 to 2008; and Duke Peltier 2012 to the present. 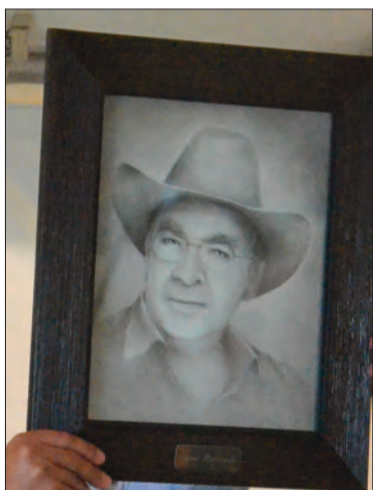

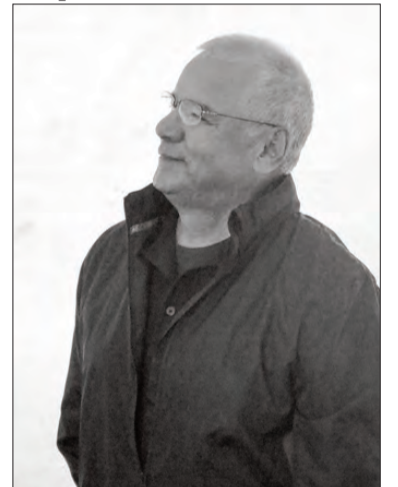

WINNIPEG—Joseph Maxwell of Evansville won gold in shot put and silver in discus at the Canadian Summer Games last week in Winnipeg.

build time is, the talks will begin; what's the policing, on and off duty, going to look like in these communities?" the staff sergeant continued.

Staff Sgt. Webb went on to commend the "dedicated" municipal Community Policing Advisory Committee representatives.

As to the issue of active duty officers—an issue that had been raised by Assiginack council previously—Staff Sgt. Webb admitted that the numbers of OPP officers on Manitoulin has diminished for several reasons, but that data entry is now a specific job and does not rest on the frontline officers who were often bogged down by paperwork.

"My goal is to ensure that the proactive part of policing is at the root of it," he said, "responding proactively, reducing crime. It's paying off."

An example of this, he said, is getting information, building cases and then acting on them, pointing to the officer whose job is solely to deal with drug cases. In the last quarter, the OPP has had 13 drug-related calls for service and almost all were proactive (meaning officer initiated), he said. "Out of those 13, nine involved search warrants—at least double from five years ago."

"We have challenges with the number of people we have, but we are operating at what the province says is an acceptable level of service," he said.

As for rumours that some officers are working alone, he said that information is

false, but said there are some times when an additional officer needs to be called in to assist. He also spoke of the good working relationship between the OPP and the UCCM Anishnaabe Police and Wikwemikong Tribal Police and the how each of the police services helps the others when needed.

"There are enough people to respond to all the municipalities, unorganized townships and First Nations," Staff Sgt. Webb said. "If the OPP requires all its officers, for instance, the UCCM knows this and will respond and assist accordingly."

Councillor Leslie Fields asked the staff sergeant for actual numbers of active duty officers. He told council he that he couldn't share this information as it was a matter of public safety.

"Our officers here work very hard, but never put our communities in a situation where the officers don't have backup," the detachment commander added.

"So UCCM or Wikwemikong will respond?" Councillor Fields asked.

"Yes, could and have," Staff Sgt. Webb responded. "We have the failsafe. And it goes both ways."

Between all the detachments, including Espanola, there are 40 constables, six sergeants and himself, one staff sergeant. He also noted that the OPP will go to 22-hour service in the next week.

The staff sergeant explained that he has a full-time analyst employed who

finds information that points to the times and places that need greater attention.

Councillor Reid asked whether the number of calls for service will play a role in whether a detachment closes. In Assiginack and Tehkummah, the calls for service equate to about 11 percent.

"Not necessarily," Staff Sgt. Webb said. "Every one of the communities could benefit from a police presence." While he would consider this as ideal, it's not likely going to happen, he said.

"With the exception of that 5 am call (when there are no officers on duty), we can police the same way we always have—even if it's out of one building," he said. "That's not my vision, though."

A police presence, he added, could mean a cruiser in that community (an officer living in that community would take the cruiser home if it's not needed elsewhere).

Councillor Fields pointed to the Tehkummah OPP storefront office, which "slowly faded away," doubting that it wasn't done intentionally.

"Well, I wouldn't waste my time," Staff Sgt. Webb said of putting something in place that would not be a permanent solution.

"Whose job is it to make a claim to the decision makers (on keeping the detachments open)? Your job? Our job?" Councillor Fields queried.

"Both of our jobs," he said.

Mayor Paul Moffatt said that if Manitowaning loses its detachment, how would they convince an officer to move to the community in order to have a cruiser presence. The staff sergeant agreed that that could be of concern. "You're right, if they're not coming here, where do they want to be? Probably closer to the new detachment. This will probably be an issue for any new hires."

Staff Sgt. Webb said it is a safe assumption that at least some of the current detachments will eventually close or go up for sale.

"Is it time to start lobbying Infrastructure Ontario?" Councillor Fields asked.

"Perhaps it is," he responded.

Councillor Fields pointed to the presence of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) conservation officers in the Manitowaning detachments. Staff Sgt. Webb explained that they were there as guests of the OPP and this would have no bearing on the decision-making process.

She asked whether there is an obligation to include

municipalities in any closure discussions. He said that he feels obliged, but added that nothing will happen until more information is known.

He also told council he felt it was doubtful that the area would be limited to only one detachment, considering its size.

"We're looking at yourself and your agency being proactive with us rather than us having to be reactive after-the-fact," the mayor addressed the staff sergeant.

## Northeast Town Council Notes

### Assisted living

Council discussed what to do with the property donated by the municipality for senior housing development. Council had a deputation by Dr. Roy Jeffery on behalf of the Island Seniors Housing group at a council meeting last month. Dr. Jeffery updated council on their work in developing an assisted living facility on the property, noting that they were having problems securing funding.

Mayor MacNevin said that staff is looking for direction as to whether they should continue to work with the group on developing the project, or open the project up to other potential project developers.

Council decided to direct staff to continue to work with the Island Seniors Housing group on their project, but also to contact other developers who have expressed interest in the property in the past.

### Stop up and close

Council carried a motion to stop up, close and sell a portion of public road not travelled to the adjacent property owner at 89 Manitowaning Road.

### Landfill report

Town CAO Dave Williamson reviewed the annual monitoring and operations report of the landfill with council.

He noted that there a few recommendations such as "the additional down gradient property (the former Mountain View Trailer Park) be registered as landfill buffer lands and that the existing Environmental Compliance Approval be amended accordingly to recognize the new buffer land."

The report also recommends that the surface water sampling be revised from twice annually and during storm events to three times annually, in the spring, summer and fall to coincide with the groundwater monitoring program.

"It is recommended that the leachate sample schedule from the manhole be decreased from monthly to quarterly," the

report also recommends.

Council carried a motion, accepting the recommendations and the report.

### Fire department

Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey informed council that there had been 24 calls for service to date for 2017. He also shared that the department had responded to a call for assistance with the OPP and EMS to retrieve an injured hiker on July 17. "Firefighters have been doing extra training outside of our regular Tuesday training," he added, "on a couple Sundays each month to keep their skills in check at our training house. As well, apparatus and equipment is in good working order."

### Community services and public works

Community Services Manager Reid Taylor's report stated that staff are busy cleaning, painting and prepping the recreation centre for upcoming events.

"Pickle ball continues three days a week and there will be numerous events at the recreation centre as part of Haweater Weekend in August," he states in the report. "Spider Bay is seeing steady business daily and very busy weekends and the downtown docks are now busy every day," the report continues. "The parks are being inspected regularly and the ball fields and soccer fields are being maintained. The community picnic at Low Island Park was very well attended."

Mr. Taylor said that the Port of Little Current will have cruise ships on July 29, August 6, 7, 16, 21 and 24.

Staff recommended a two percent increase to the recreation centre rates. The committee made a recommendation to council to approve the change. who spoke on the positive impact the two volunteers have had during their many years of unpaid service to those who have lost a loved one.

"It is an honour to be here to honour these men for all that they do," said Ms. Dickson. "Both go above and beyond for the families they help."

"It was totally unexpected," said Mr. George. "They just told me that they were honouring volunteers at the powwow and that I was to show up."

Instead of standing in a large anonymous group of community volunteers, however, Mr. George and his compatriot Mr. Maiangowi found themselves uncharacteristically the centre of a great deal of attention as the community

honoured them for their work in supporting people during some of the most traumatic times of their lives.

Mr. George said he was deeply honoured by the recognition. In addition to his work with the bereaved, Mr. George is also a community historian and is very active with Wiikwemkoong Heritage Organization and its Anishnabemowin elders advisory group.

During the presentation, Mr. Eshkibok reminded the recipients of the key tenets of the eagle feather teachings, to follow the teaching of the Seven Grandfathers and to walk with wisdom, love, respect, bravery, honesty, humility and truth in all that they do.

of 2015-2016, a \$4.5 million project located beside their ballfield that benefitted from both federal and provincial funding. That allowed a centralization of recreational facilities for families. But the fitness centre equipment that had to be moved into the new facilities was old and in sore need of repair. Not only will the funding assist in bringing in new equipment, it will also assist in securing LED lighting for the facility to reduce costs and increase efficiencies.

Ogimaa Corbiere thanked Kathy Bebamash, her community's economic development officer and Mr. Theijsmeijer, without whose hard work "this would just not have happened. He went above and beyond."

Ogimaa Aguonie acknowledged the other chiefs and commended everyone for working together to make things happen in their communities. "We have never really capitalized on our own community's location," he noted. Sheguiandah First Nation is cited on the main Highway 6 corridor leading from the ferry in South Baymouth through Manitoulin to Espanola and Highway 17.

He referenced the work of Cynthia Trudeau, his community's economic development officer.

The FedNor funding will assist with beautification of the community, particularly in relation to the powwow grounds. "While \$50,000 might not sound like a lot of money, it is a big

deal to a small community such as ours," he said. He noted the work being accomplished by students in his community to eradicate and control invasive phragmites to reclaim the community's beach.

In her closing remarks, Ogimaa Debassige noted that building a relationship of trust between the First Nations and the government is the starting point for building reconciliation. Government, she said, must build greater flexibility into their approach to dealing with First Nations communities. Cookie cutter solutions and approaches will not meet the needs of the communities.

# ...Ojibwe language remains strong in Island communities

...continued from page 1 language.

Not everyone is taking the data at face value, however. Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territories Ojibwe (chief) Duke Peltier suggested that at least some of the data may be skewed by a greater uptake in the national survey by Indigenous communities.

"There are more people filling out the surveys," he said. For many years the national survey was viewed with some suspicion by Indigenous communities and many chiefs suspected the data from the surveys was intended to reduce or counterbalance membership and residence figures upon which federal funding was based. But those days have largely passed.

These days it is generally recognized that the StatsCan data is augmenting the position of the leaders of Indigenous communities, highlighting the shortfalls in living standards and services in First Nations and Inuit communities relative to those enjoyed in the rest of Canada.

"It's backing up what we have been saying all along," said Ogimaa Peltier.

But when it comes to learning languages, the

elastic brains of children younger than 10 have been demonstrated to have an easier time picking up another language and the rise of immersion programs in First Nations communities, such as many of those on Manitoulin, is quite likely playing a role in the rise.

In the 2016 census there are 1,625 speakers of Indigenous languages living on Manitoulin, divided 800 male to 825 female. Of those, 1,085 list Ojibwe-Potawatmie, and 1,455 list Ojibwe, divided 715 male to 740 female. The number who list the language as being "spoken in the home" is much smaller in every category, however.

Canadians in general are becoming more bilingual as defined in the mainstream Canadian sense, that is fluent in French and English, overturning a trend that has been in play for more than a decade as numbers of those claiming to be bilingual had largely tended to stay static.

With the steady influx of immigration from non-traditional sources having risen dramatically over the last few decades, it is hardly surprising that new languages are also on the rise nationally. The number of Canadians who speak a language other than French or

English at home has risen 14.5 percent since 2011 to 7.6 million.

There are 22.9 percent of Canadians who report a non-official language as their mother tongue, and that is up from 21.3 percent in the last census. Even among the 69.9 percent of Canadians who listed a non-official language as their mother tongue, the vast majority speak English or French at home. StatsCan reports that a whopping 98.1 percent of Canadians can hold a conversation in either English or French.

As of 2016, the national rate of bilingualism in Canada jumped to 18.0 percent, the highest recorded since 1901. Canada's national bilingualism rate has been roughly 17.7 percent for the past 15 years, outside of Quebec, most provinces and territories experienced a decline in bilingualism between 2006 and 2011. Bilingualism is on the rise in a every single province and territory, excluding British Columbia and Manitoba. The areas that experienced the sharpest rise in French and English speakers were the Northwest Territories, New Brunswick, Yukon and Quebec, of course.

Quebec has the highest rate of bilingualism with

in its population, with 44.9 percent. New Brunswick is a second at 34.0 percent, with Yukon, Prince Edward Island, Ontario, Nova Scotia, and the Northwest Territories all having bilingualism rates above 10 percent.

Quebec is becoming more bilingual, too. In 2016, there

were a little over 3.6 million bilingual people living in Quebec, an increase of around 300,000 people from 2011. This increase in Quebec's bilingual population accounted for 64.0 percent of Canada's total growth of the bilingual population.

According to the 2016 data, most native English-

speakers outside of Quebec achieve bilingualism in school between the ages of five and 19. For the first time, however, bilingualism increased for all student age groups, particularly students in the 10 to-14-years-old group.

# ...told to vacate building premises deemed unsafe

 tect reports were not submitted and an occupancy permit was not issued," states the notice. "The complete building is to be vacated until such time as all conditions noted in order to comply 2017-01 have been met."

The order is issued to the Kilganan Group Ltd, care of Joe Cividino who is in possession of the building.

"I went in to talk to town staff on July 28, to see about getting the building rezoned from industrial to commercial," Mr. Cividino told The Expositor. "Staff were surprised to learn that there were five apartments and told me I needed to get an engineering inspection done. I asked town staff for the permits/inspection reports, but that was the last I heard from them. Then next thing I know the building inspector is posting that the building isn't safe, meanwhile people have been living there for the past five years."

Mr. Cividino said he will be contacting a lawyer and hopes to resolve the issue by working with the town.

"I hope they can give me time to resolve this, but already Barney (Rodney Deforge, the owner of Barney's Bargain Barn Home Store) was told that he would be fined if he opened and it happened to fall on the busiest weekend of the year," added Mr. Cividino.

The Expositor was unable to reach Mr. Deforge as of press time on Monday, but spoke with a few of the apartment residents.

"I've lived here five years," said Ted Gunness. "Now I find out I need to find a new place—I've been trying since I found out but it's hard in Little Current. I work for Cold Water Fisheries, but if I can't find somewhere to live I'll need to move to Sudbury. I hope the landlord takes care of this, but I don't even know how long we have."

"I talked to the landlord and he said that we didn't need to worry about it, that he had a lawyer working on it," said another tenant of 86 Vankoughnet Street East. "I found another place and I'm moving next Tuesday. The stairs were hard for my wife and when this came up, it was just time to find somewhere else to live."

Northeast Town building official Gerry Strong was also unable to be reached as of press time Monday.

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson said he was unable to comment on a building enforcement case.

The Manitoulin Planning Board filed an appeal with the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) in 2013 opposing a zoning bylaw amendment by the Northeast Town that would allow residential units the building, which is in an industrial zone in Little Current.

An industrial building is permitted one apartment for a caretaker or owner per business. Since

the building housed three businesses at the time, there were three apartments, however the building's owner wanted to add an additional apartment and allow the apartments to be available for rent to the community. Despite concerns from the MPB, the Northeast Town council carried a motion on August 6, 2013, approving a zoning bylaw amendment to allow for four residential units on the second floor of the building that housed the former Turner's Home Store. The MPB responded to the bylaw amendment by

carrying a motion to appeal council's decision to the OMB.

The building owner withdrew his application because he felt the MPB's appeal to the OMB was going to be costly to the taxpayers of Manitoulin's municipalities and specifically to the Northeast Town taxpayers.

This case was one of the deciding factors on the Northeast Town withdrawing from the MPB and establishing its own planning authority.

# Sheguiandah moved by volunteer support after grandson's 30 ft. fall at Meldrum Bay

## Falls 30 feet backward at Mississagi Lighthouse Park

SHEGUIANDAH—In an instant, things can change dramatically, sometimes permanently.

It's a truism but it's one that Barb and Wade Kearns, the busy proprietors of Green Acres Restaurant and Campground of Sheguiandah, together with their large family are experiencing just now. Their 27-year-old grandson, Scott Wheeler, remains on life support at Health Sciences North, the result of a dramatic 30 feet-plus fall and ensuing injuries.

Scott Wheeler lives in St. George, a community located near Brantford. This summer, when he was between jobs, he volunteered to help his grandparents at Green Acres. So did another grandson, 16-year-old Logan Kearns, who is from Cambridge and will begin Grade 12 this fall.

Two weeks ago, on July 25, the cousins decided to take one of their exploratory trips to see more of Manitoulin Island. This day-off

The MOU was signed in M'Chigeeng First Nation in conjunction with Kenjgewin Teg's graduation ceremonies, a time when the new teaching lodge nears its opening celebration.

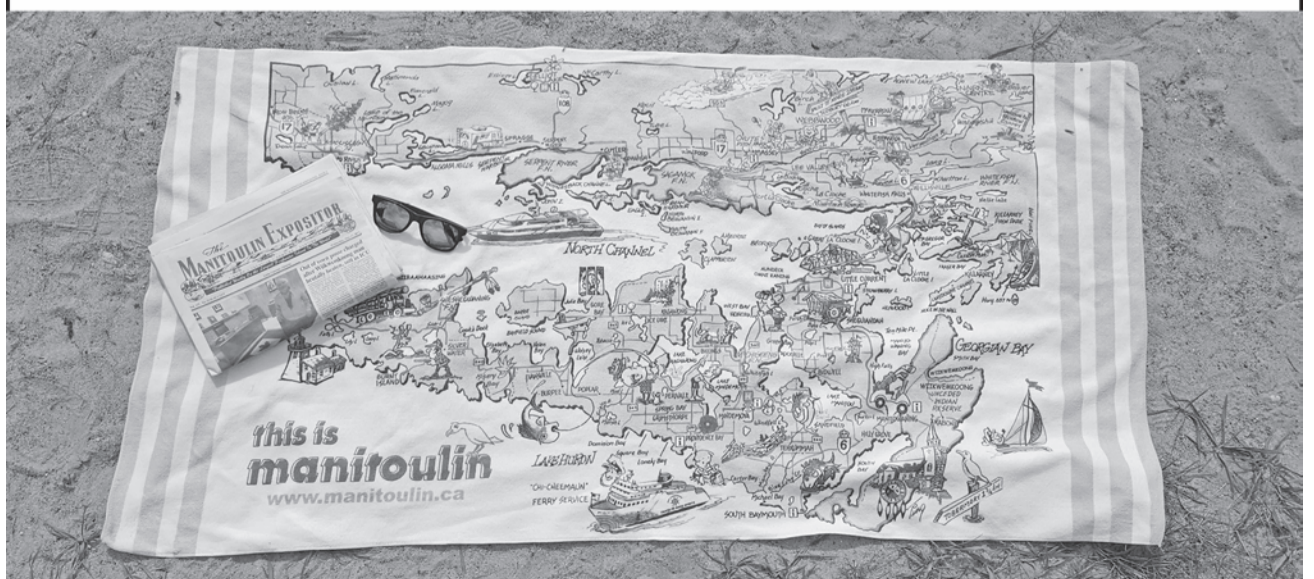

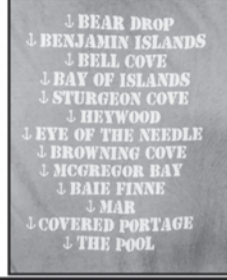



...continued from page 14 merged rock.

Things happened quickly after that. Logan yelled out when he saw what was happening and he remembers someone nearby coming over to see what was going on, and that person in turn calling out to friends.

Logan, meanwhile, leapt into the water from the same height from which his cousin had fallen but in his case, he landed feet-first on a rock beach adjacent to where Scott had hit the water on his back. Logan is a wiry youth, surprised now that he didn't hurt himself with the jump and landing. He remembers putting out his hand to stabilize himself on impact. "I jumped down to see what I could do," he says now. He figures that his instinct to make the jump right after his cousin's fall was guided by "pure adrenalin."

And things continued to happen quickly. Remember that Logan had called out when Scott fell and someone came quickly to the top of the cliff, also hailing his friends?

One of them, in the Kearns family's opinion, is

a hero and they would like to contact him.

This man, who Logan thinks is an American who was also exploring the Mississagi Lighthouse site that day, quickly made his way down to the water's edge where he helped Logan move his cousin out of the water and onto the rock beach.

At this point, Scott was fully conscious and, Logan suspects, in shock. "He actually got up and was walking. He went about 30 feet to a spot where he wanted to sit down." Logan and his unknown helper urged Scott to lie down. He would only sit, though.

Cell service was not good and Logan says it took "three tries" to reach 911 and explain that urgent emergency medical help was needed at this remote site.

By 7:20 pm, the emergency medical helicopter had landed nearby and Scott was on his way directly to Health Sciences North in Sudbury, Northeastern Ontario's main trauma centre.

Scott was stabilized and given a CT scan on arrival at the hospital. This

revealed that one of his vertebrae was shattered by the impact. His spinal cord, tests indicated, had not been severed so he has been handled appropriately, and has been in an induced coma and on life support (which included dialysis, grandmother Barb Kearns explains) during his stay in hospital in the trauma unit.

This past Sunday, August 6, he received surgery to stabilize his spinal column.

This was his second surgery. The first one was an emergency procedure the morning after he was admitted to hospital when it was discovered that his small intestine had ruptured and he had subsequently suffered a major bleed out.

Barb Kearns explained that, around 6 am the morning after his fall, her grandson "flatlined" in the hospital. A surgeon worked to repair the ruptured organ and he has been on continuous antibiotics to stem to the abdominal infection resulting from the release of intestinal products into his abdominal cavity.

Scott's family has been with him in Sudbury since the accident and the senior

Kearns have been to the hospital when they can get there and are getting sometimes-hourly updates from their daughter.

Logan wasn't the only member of the family to begin to operate "on adrenalin" after Scott's mishap. When Wade and Barb learned what had happened, they closed down the restaurant immediately, Wade recalls, asking a full house of diners to leave, explaining what had just happened. The grill was turned off but food was left on it.

They left immediately, planning to drive the length of the Island to the Mississagi Lighthouse Park but by the time they got to M'Chigeeng, they realized that Scott would be airlifted to Sudbury by the time they made the long drive. Wade was inspired to stop at the UCCM Police Services main office in M'Chigeeng where Consta-

ble Brad Mack let them in and they were able to hear precisely what was going on with the emergency medical evacuation of their grandson on the police radio. They heard the talk of Scott being loaded into the helicopter and leaving for Sudbury which was their prompt to turn around and also head for Health Sciences North.

Constable Mack continued to be part of Kearns family's support system that day when he drove to the scene of the mishap to pick up Logan and bring him home. This ended up being a relay effort as Constable Mack was required elsewhere and, on the way back, Constable Baxter took charge of Logan's transport, bringing him home to Sheguiandah.

These officers are important to the Kearns family, as is OPP Constable Daryl Leighton who was the first police officer on the scene

and who has remained in touch with and supportive of the family.

Wade and Barb Kearns and Logan would very much like to contact the person who helped Logan move his cousin out of the water that day. Logan thinks he was a visitor from the U.S. but otherwise has no idea of his identity. The Kearns family can be reached at 705-368-2428 if anyone has any idea of who this person may be and how he can be contacted.

And finally, something about Scott Wheeler. Logan recalls that, when he was airlifted from the beach, Scott was conscious and made a point of thanking everyone who was there to help him, including shaking everyone's hands. Scott was in pain and was swearing, and then apologizing for swearing.

"Scott is a very kind man and very respectful," Logan notes.

# Beyond Rx

## Get active, get healthy

Since I've been on Manitoulin Island, I have had the pleasure of meeting and working with many different healthcare providers. My friend Joanna and I met when we collaborated on a program aimed to decrease risk of falls for our elderly patients. We bonded over our shared passion for physical activity and exercising and it is with great excitement that I have asked her to be a guest writer for this week! Joanna Rosenbaum is a registered kinesiologist (RKin), registered massage therapist (RMT) and personal trainer at Manitoulin Physiotherapy Centre with 12 years experience.

As we age, our bodies change. Over time, we can experience decreased strength, flexibility, endurance and sense of balance. However, there is a treatment that can be prescribed that allows us to maintain all of these things, as well as maintain bone health, manage a healthy weight, prevent falls, improve overall well-being, and ultimately help us to maintain our independence as we get older. That magical treatment is exercise. It is a treatment that helps us to maintain quality of movement, which in turn relates closely to our quality of life.

Now this word exercise may conjure up images of sweaty power lifters or marathoners, but here's a secret: exercise doesn't have to be intense, complex or even lengthy in order to be effective. The key is to formulate the right plan for your current health and fitness level, with an appropriate progression for your abilities, and then be consistent with it. Find something you like to do, someone you like to do it with, and fit it in to convenient days and times. If you're concerned

about your health risks, talk to your family doctor. Consider enlisting the help of someone who is an expert in the field of human movement, such as a Physiotherapist or a Kinesiologist, or consult a fitness professional such as a personal trainer or yoga instructor. On Manitoulin, there are many of these professionals that can offer guidance to people of all shapes, sizes and abilities, and there is an ever-increasing range of classes, programs and approaches to improving fitness, mobility and independence.

One such program that I have had the pleasure of delivering with other health professionals around Manitoulin is called "Stand-Up." This is an excellent fall prevention program for seniors that combines 12 weeks of progressive exercise for two days a week, with educational sessions relating to many different topics that help you learn how you can change the way you do things in order to decrease your chance of falling. The next opportunity to join this program will be in September, in Mindemoya. # Manor Minutes

## PSW support letter

The Manor board reviewed the first draft of a letter being crafted to the premier and the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care, advocating for personal support working in the long-term care field. Feedback was provided by the board members which will be incorporated into the final draft.

## Administrators report

Manor Administrator Michelle Bond presented her report to the board. She was pleased to note that the Manor didn't use any agency staff last month.

"We have five PSW vacancies that we have been advertising, but we have received three applications," said Ms. Bond.

She said that the new call bell system is being installed and will be fully functioning in three weeks. The new system was made possible thanks to a fundraising campaign to raise money to replace the home's ailing nursing call bell system, the communication system between the nurse's desk, the residents' rooms and common areas—when assistance is required by a resident, the bell is rung and the nurses on the desk respond.

Ms. Bond explained the new system will include display panels in each hallway which will save nurses having to run back to the station to see which residents are in need.

"We overspent in food last month, but this is mainly due to implementing the spring/summer menu and because the proceeds of the Canada Day barbecue won't be reflected until next month," said Ms. Bond.

## Financial report

Extencicare Regional Director Keith Clement said that the home was anticipating a \$6,000 surplus for last month, but that it came in at a \$4,500 surplus due to an employee being off in the laundry department with a broken arm and repair work to the boiler. He said that even with the drop in the anticipated surplus, year-to-date the Manor was still \$19,000 better than budget.

## Fundraising

Board member Wendy Gauthier reported that volunteers were working on a float for the Hawewater Weekend parade. She also reported that ticket sales for the Ivan Wheale painting were going well and that sales were at \$3,625, with the goal to reach \$5,000, the value of the painting. The ticket sales bring the total fundraised for patient ceiling lifts to \$40,000, over half of the \$75,000 goal.

The board will not be meeting in August. The next Manitoulin Centennial Board Meeting will be held on Thursday, September 21.



# Visiting Manitoulin?

## Magical Meldrum Bay, Manitoulin Island's

**MELDRUM BAY**—Meldrum Bay is an hour west of Gore Bay and a world away, a tiny waterside hamlet at the end of the road (Highway 540 ends here reads the last road sign) where visitors may sample the latest exciting lifestyle trend at their leisure: slow living. With the map of the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA), touring on bicycles is also idyllic in this tranquil township ([www.manitoulincycling.com/maps.html](http://www.manitoulincycling.com/maps.html)).

As the road rounds a last curve then glides downward toward the pretty marina and stone breakwall nestled in Macrae Cove, the white-painted boats and sun-lit buildings in the village sparkle against the huge sky and water-scapes of deep Manitoulin blue in an exquisite maritime setting.

This is the stretch where, in the 1880s, three sawmills operated at full-tilt and hotels and boarding houses held

the hundreds of employees of the thriving industry. On the left below the hill the Meldrum Bay Inn, built during the boom in 1906 as the Grand Manitoulin Hotel, retains the same country charm of those days, meticulously maintained by hosts Shirin and Bob Grover. The wide front staircase climbs to spacious verandahs and an elegant interior full of antiques and period décor; guests still fill the rooms and the restaurant (dinner only) is the only one for miles and miles, considered well worth a special trip, [www.meldrumbayinn.com](http://www.meldrumbayinn.com)

When Liz Durham and her husband Fred lost the harvest of their 200-acre Michigan fruit farm in 1975, recalls Liz in the kitchen of the charming red-roofed cottage she and Fred later bought, the avid sailors took their boat “up the upper peninsula of Michigan and discovered Meldrum Bay. There was a church supper when we landed, with homemade pie. That did it for my husband,” laughs

Liz, a native of Ottawa who met the American veteran of the Korean War at the Université de Montreal. “We both liked remote places that are off the beaten path and Meldrum Bay seemed like a time capsule from mid-century.” Fred Durham passed away 10 years ago, and today Liz remains a community stalwart who still loves “the caring concern of the community, the rural way of life, the way people pitch in and make things happen together. For example,” says Liz, “the harbour is maintained by the villagers who also put in the docks in the spring and take them out in the fall.” Community members—“around 50 stubborn people”—hold dinners and bake sales to raise money for projects they want to realize.

We head out of town climbing west up the escarpment, past the United Church (1920) and the Community Hall (1932), along roads that define Manitoulin at its most rural. Tall elms and maples and old rail fences line Mis-

# maritime marvel then and now

Mississagi Lighthouse Road and broad fields demarcate the still-active beef farms and lands abandoned long ago. We arrive at Wickett Lake, declared a bird sanctuary by George Wickett, whose family had arrived here in 1877, where cricket and bird song fill the summer air around the stillness of the small lake. Those interested in birding and kayaking on Wickett Lake should “ask locally,” says Liz, “about how to get here,” as the drive to the lake is through a working farm.

On Cemetery Road North, “a great, glorious drive in fall,” the cemetery’s old stones tell many stories of the early settlers; the road leads to the intersection of Maggie’s Road, named after Maggie Doyle who lived in the minuscule log cabin as a mother and widow whose grandchildren now keep it in pristine condition, still

without electricity or running water.

At the end of this road, we come upon the dazzling Mississagi Strait Lighthouse perched at Manitoulin’s farthest western edge in a dramatic landscape of high limestone cliffs and crashing waves below. Mississagi Strait (and its magnetic shoals) is home to perhaps the most spectacular tales of shipwrecks, including rumours of the French ‘Griffon’ in 1679, and of whisky smugglers, hardships of the weather and the rugged, lonely life of the keepers at the western treacherous tip of the Island. The clapboard lighthouse was built in 1873 and is “an outstanding example of the Georgian Bay style” of lighthouses, with living quarters on a second floor and the light on the top, lit by

coal oil fires.

The 1873 lantern house from the top of the lighthouse sits in Liz Durham’s yard, “the one in the well-known vintage photograph of the gathering at the lighthouse to celebrate Queen Victoria’s Diamond Jubilee,” she says. “My gazebo is the original wooden top that was replaced by steel in the 1920s, during Ab Grant’s tenure as lighthouse keeper. Instead of burning the discarded lantern house, Mr. Grant and his two older boys brought it by boat around to his home in Meldrum Bay and set it up as a playhouse for his younger children.”

The Fog Horn Station building now houses a lounge ...continued on page 10A

# Wiikwemkoong 57th annual cultural festival a social occasion

WIKWEMKOONG—The Wiikwemkoong Cultural Festival has been taking place for 57 years, drawing participants from across Canada, the US and beyond. This year was no exception, with visitors hailing from Switzerland and participants who brought their Aborigine dance traditions to share all the way from Australia.

The invocation was delivered by elder Alex Fox, who spoke in Anishinabemowin before switching to English. Mr. Fox gave a thanksgiving for life and the importance of having a good mind and a good heart in the Anishinabe culture and understanding of life.

“We have to have unity in the world,” he said. “We need to have unity in the world. The flags under which the warriors of Wiikwemkoong served were processed through the dance arena as High Eagle Singers performed a flag song. Flags and eagle staffs were posted under the direction of the head veteran Robert Eshkibok, US Marine Corps, and the arena director David Trudeau of Wiikwemkoong.

Masters of ceremonies for the weekend’s proceedings were Dennis Bowen of Seneca, New York and Wiikwemkoong’s own Chris Pheasant.

The head dance judge, an important role as the cultural festival functions as a competition powwow, was Amos Key of the Six Nations of the Grand River. Smoke Dance singer was Sheldon Sundown. Host drum was Mystic River of Groton, Connecticut.

Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier delivered the welcoming remarks in both Anishinabe-

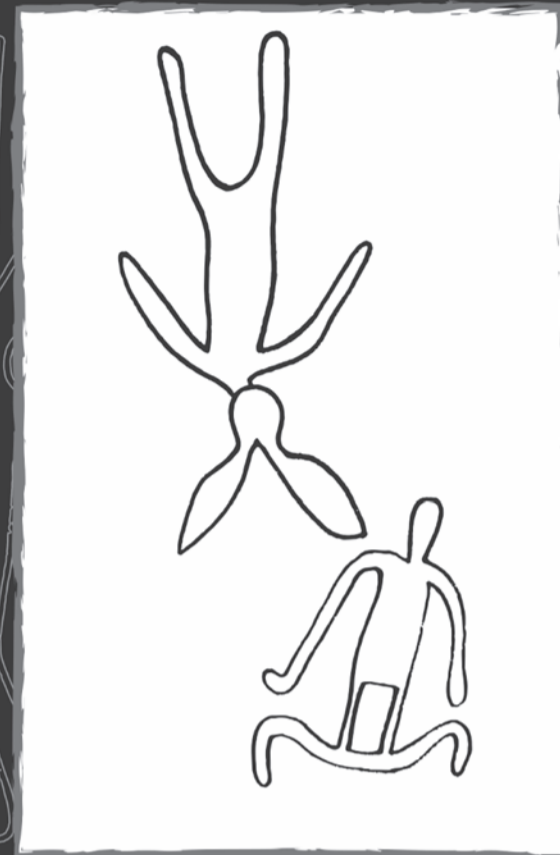
