## Plans unveiled, Island fundraising to start for new Mindemoya Hospital emerg dept.

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) unveiled the proposed plans for the \$2.8 million renovation and 2,300-square-foot expansion of the emergency department (ED) in its Mindemoya hospital site at a

board meeting held last Thursday, November 28.

"It was quite a comprehensive process to get feedback from all of the staff and physicians at the Mindemoya site," said Paula Fields, vice president (VP) of clinical innovation and partnerships

MHC VP of corporate services and chief financial officer Tim Vine said the hospital has made its pre-capital submission to the ministry and is hoping to hear back in the coming weeks. Although the addition is 2,300 square feet in size, the amount of renovated space totals 3,300 square feet.

This is an own-funds project, meaning the hospital will fund the expansion from community donations and earnings from its investment account. Approval of

## Signatories say an OHT would strengthen Island partnerships

LITTLE CURRENT—Members of the Manitoulin Collaborative of healthcare providers signed in support of a Manitoulin Ontario Health Team (OHT) application, a local care delivery model that is part of the phase-out of Local Health Integration Networks (LHINs), at a meeting of the group held Wednesday, November 27.

"I'm very pleased that we've come to the table with an understanding and a willingness to take this step, and I want to congratulate all the partners," said Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) president and CEO Lynn Foster. MHC is one of the members of the collaborative which also includes long-term care providers, First Nations health services, family health teams and mental health services, among others.

The provincial government announced in March 2019 that it planned to dissolve the LHIN model of regional health co-ordination in favour of OHTs. It invited groups of healthcare providers within a region to complete a selfassessment that outlines what services they currently provide, how they work together and how their structure would fit into the OHT model.

The Ministry of Health opened the first round of self-assessment submissions in April of 2019. The strongest applicants were then invited to submit full applica-

Another subset was classed as "in development" and provincial officials worked with those groups to strengthen their proposals before the full application. All full applications had to be submitted by October 9.

Just last week, Ontario began to announce the first successful candidates from the first intake. The Mississauga OHT was first to be announced, on November 25, followed by the Hamilton OHT, the

latter of which includes places such as Aurora, Newmarket, Bradford and Keswick. Further announced OHTs include, as of press time Monday, Southlake (Aurora-Newmarket Durham, Burlington, North York and Guelph and area.

The Manitoulin Collaborative has now submitted a self-assessment document that outlines which services the signatories already provide to their communities, how they work together as a group and how their plans would fit into the OHT model. Their signatures on the document are non-binding; they merely indicate the partners' willingness to proceed with the application to the Ministry of Health.

PROVIDENCE BAY—The Manitoulin Island Community Abattoir (MICA) is no more, long live the Limestone Island Abattoir. After sitting on the market for nearly a year, the abattoir in Providence Bay has been sold by the volunteer board to interests headed up by George McGaffin and Andy Stronach (son of auto parts billionaire Frank Stronach) and partners in the French River Cattle Company.

"It will be business as usual," said Mr. McGaffin of abattoir operations following the sale, but the company hopes to encourage more local producers to "fatten

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## Detailed election results show how Manitoulin Island voted

MANITOULIN—The detailed poll-by-poll results of the October 21 federal election have been released and they offer a more detailed understanding of how Islanders voted in the contest that saw incumbent NDP MP Carol Hughes secure a definitive victory in Algoma-Manitoulin-

Beginning with the victor, Ms. Hughes, she had her highest vote count in Sagamok on the North Shore. There, she secured 231 of the 316 total votes; two of the 316 total were rejected ballots.

Conservative Party of Canada candidate Dave Williamson earned his highest vote count in Bruce Station,

winning 158 of the total 345 votes. No ballots were spoiled at this poll.

Green Party of Canada candidate Max Chapman performed strongest at one of the two polls in Richard's Landing, on distant island neighbour St. Joseph's Island. There he secured 27 of the 281 total votes at the poll; none was spoiled.

Liberal Party of Canada challenger Heather Wilson had her best showing in poll 16—Hearst, earning 113 of the 224 votes, with seven spoiled ballots at that poll.

People's Party of Canada representative Dave DeLisle took home his highest vote count in Dean Lake—Iron Bridge, with 16 votes of the total 238; there were two spoiled

Finally, Le (Mercury) Marquis de Marmalade, candidate for the Rhinoceros Party of Canada, managed to secure a high score of four votes at his best-performing polling station, though this honour was shared among four polling stations. Three of these were in Hearst (four of 196 votes, four spoiled; four of 236 votes, nine spoiled; four of 224 votes, seven spoiled) and the remaining poll was in Wawa (four of 121 votes, three spoiled).

Riding poll 12—Hearst earned the title of the most rejected ballots at a single polling station in the riding, with nine voters spoiling their vote, whether intentionally or not.

## Rainbow Board secondary school teachers may hold one day strike today, December 4

ONTARIO—The Ontario public school teachers' union (along with some elementary school support staff) has served notice that if negotiations with the province fail to resolve in a contract by Tuesday, teachers will hit the picket lines for a one-day strike.

Currently, four of the province's teachers' unions are in tense contract negotiations with the province. Teachers have been working without a contract since August 31.

Education minister Stephen Lecce has gone on the record criticizing what he characterized as an escalation of the dispute, claiming the province is being reasonable and that the union's actions will hurt

For their part, the unions say they are fighting larger class sizes, mandatory online courses for high

school students, cuts to some education funding and a law limiting wage increases for public servants to one percent a year for two years.

The one-day strike being planned by the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation (OSSTF) is expected to take place today, December 4. This would be the first broad-based strike in Ontario schools since 1997, when teachers took to the picket lines to protest cuts by the then-Conservative government of Mike Harris.

While the strike loomed on the horizon at press time Monday, job action was not yet written in stone, as negotiations were slated for Monday and Tuesday.

The Rainbow District School Board advised parents and students to check the board website for upto-date information on negotiations

## Ministry of Natural Resources releases Manitoulin deer rifle hunting week stats

## Charges are down, but so are the number of hunter contacts

MANITOULIN—Results enforcement actions during this year's rifle deer hunt on Manitoulin Island are in from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), with charges and warnings trending downward compared to last year although the number of field contacts also dropped significantly.

"From what the conservation officers observed—and they aren't biologists so any observation is anecdotal—the deer population appeared to be down but there seemed to be roughly the same number of hunters," said spokesperson Jolanta Kowalski in an emailed state-

She said the number of hunters fluctuated based on which part of Manitoulin the conservation officers were patrolling. Officers from as far as Hearst were called

from the Sudbury enforcement No hunting incidents or injuries unit. On Tuesday evening of the hunt, the Ontario Provincial Police and MNRF collaborated to host a road check station.

For 2019's rifle deer hunt, conservation officers contacted 441 people on Manitoulin Island. They laid 25 charges and issued 31

The charges included: fail to invalidate tag immediately after kill—deer; unlawfully have loaded firearm in conveyance; fail to properly attach invalidated tagdeer; fail to wear hunter orange while hunting; and unlawfully possess firearm at night.

Warnings issued this year included: fail to properly attach invalidated tag—deer; hunt without having licence on your person; fail to wear proper helmet; and possess a copy or counterfeit tag.
MNRF seized two firearms and

were reported to the MNRF Sudbury enforcement unit.

In 2018, conservation officers performed 748 field contacts that resulted in 30 charges, one seized deer and 67 warnings. The charges and warnings are much higher than this year, but the difference in field contacts is also notably different.

When adjusted based on the amount of field contacts, the 2018 hunt led to an average of one charge per every 25 field contacts and one warning per every 11 field contacts. The 2019 numbers were one charge per every 18 field contacts and one warning for every 14 field contacts.

The rate of charges was significantly higher this year, even though the numbers were lower, and the rate of warnings did drop but not quite as sharply as the incident numbers might suggest.

## MTA changes name, hints at new initiatives at AGM

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Tourism Association (MTA) held its annual general meeting last week and shared updates on its evolving Island-wide branding strategy, including a hint at some upcoming initiatives that it expects to roll out in the coming year.

To start, the MTA has unveiled a new branding and working name. It will be henceforth known as Destination Manitoulin Island (DMI), which reflects the new directions the organization is taking as well as its status as the official destination marketing organization for Manitoulin Island. However, its registered name remains Manitoulin Tourism Association Incorporated.

"Our goal is to market the Island as a whole product. With that in mind, developing the 'Destination Manitoulin Island' was one way to do that. It ties well with Destination Northern Ontario," said DMI's Stan Ferguson following the AGM.

The organization has a new logo that Islanders may recognize as the former logo of the Manitoulin Chamber of Commerce, which disbanded in 2016. At that time, all of its assets were transferred to the MTA, including the old logo.

The logo repurposing was a case of "if it's not broken, why fix it?" according to DMI director of tourism Shelba Millette. The logo's structure also speaks to a geographic branding initiative within DMI.

Another former chamber of commerce asset that has been revitalized is the 'Made on Manitoulin' official brand strategy. Christina Edwards of Green Bay Lodge has taken the lead on this project and described it as an exciting tool to revitalize.

"It was just such a great idea. A lot of work went into the original concept and it shouldn't be languishing. We felt it was important to bring back," said Ms. Edwards.

DMI will be pushing this tool to all its members in the hopes of driving as much participation as possible. This is aimed to help create a unified, Island-wide branding for Manitoulin.

"It's going to legitimize what we do. Our experience at the Royal Winter Fair showed us that there's interest there (in Manitoulin products),'

## Central council chooses a mail-in by election to replace Linda Farquhar

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—During its November 28 meeting, council voted to accept (with regrets) the resignation of Councillor Linda Farquhar, declared her Ward 3 (Sandfield) seat vacant and opted to hold a mail-in ballot by election to fill the vacant council position.

The motion to declare the seat vacant and to hold a byelection by mail-in ballot was moved by Councillor Steve Shaffer and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens.

"There hasn't been an election in Sandfield for quite some time," said Councillor Stephens. "The seats have either been acclaimed or appointed. This is a good opportunity to go out to the citizens. Al (Councillor Al Tribinevicius) is a good guy, but I don't think we should appoint a second councillor."

"I know an election is expensive," said Councillor Tribinevicius, "around \$8,000 to run."

"I am inclined to agree with Councillor Stephens," said Mayor Richard Stephens. "Democracy costs money, but I prefer to opt for the democratic approach. I admit that when Al was appointed, I wanted to

## Remembering the women of École Polytechnique

This Friday marks the 30th anniversary of a mass shooting in Montreal at an engineering school affiliated with the Université de Montréal that would reverberate throughout the nation. On December 6, 1989 a heavily armed man marched into École Polytechnique, ordered the men in the room to leave and sent women to the opposite side of the room. Announcing he was combating feminism, that man opened fire on the nine defenceless women standing across the room. He then wandered the hallways for another 20 minutes singling out women targets. When the shooting was over, 14 women were murdered and a further 14 people were injured—10 women and four men.

We will not name that man, though his name will live forevermore

The victims of this misogynistic atrocity whose lives were tragically cut short simply because they were women who sought to aspire to the male dominated field of engineering deserve to be remembered. They were Geneviève Bergeron, 21, a civil engineering student; Hélène Colgan, 23, a mechanical engineering student; Nathalie Croteau, 23, a mechanical engineering student; Barbara Daigneault, 22, a mechanical engineering student; Anne-Marie Edward, 21, a chemical engineering student; Maud Haviernick, 29, a materials engineering student; Maryse Laganièr, 25, a budget clerk in the École Polytechnique's finance department; Maryse Leclair, 23, a materials engineering student; Anne-Marie Lemay, 22, a mechanical engineering student; Sonia Pelletier, 28, a mechanical engineering student; Michèle Richard, 21, a materials engineering student; Annie St-Arneault, 23, a mechanical engineering student; Annie Turcott, 20, a materials engineering student; and Barbara Klucznik-Widajewicz, 31,

These young people deserved a better future.

In the aftermath of the attack several of the survivors took their own lives, unable to recover from the shock and grief of what they had witnessed.

The killer's attack might be seen as the work of a deranged and extremely disturbed individual, the proverbial act of a madman, but his motivation and upbringing were deeply steeped in the society in which he grew up and developed his personality, a society that helped nuture, legitimize and eventually assisted in building up those misplaced grudges against women that influenced his eventual decision to commit suicide, taking as many accomplished women with him as he could.

Too many vestiges of that society remain today.

The ongoing and growing numbers of murdered Indigenous women and girls, and two spirited people, stand in unmuted testimo-

There are still countless incidents of domestic violence that occur in our communities, acts of violence most often committed by men, that go unreported or under investigated due to a long-ingrained ethos that places less value on the lives and safety of women.

The rise of the incel movement, a movement where men place the blame for their unwanted virginity on women in general instead of their own odious and self-centred personality, is just one, albeit currently particularly high profile, example of that societal dysfunction which devalues the lives of women.

We have come a long way in the past three decades, but each and every day police reports across this nation clearly illustrate we still have a long way to travel on the path to a just and civil society.

We as parents must seek to instill in our children that violence, and particularly violence against women and the vulnerable, has no place in our lives. This isn't an example of "political correctness" in a world gone soft. Cowardice has never been in vogue, even among the uber macho, and what happened in Montreal 30 years ago was cowardice of the very worst kind.

Today's children need to be taught to hold basic respect for those around them, no matter their gender, orientation, race, colour or creed. It begins at home and it begins by example.

Let's all do our part to ensure that no families in this nation must suffer the grief and agony of learning that their child has died simply for being the wrong gender.

# Thirty years on, it's time to have the conversations that can save lives

ecember 6 is the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women. It is the day that, 30 years ago this Friday, shocked our country by the demonstrated hatred of one man against women and their rights in this country. It is the day that, 30 years later, many people refer to as that "mass

school shooting that women's organizations still mark every year with vigils, etc." to talk about violence against women. These statements beg the question of why, which can be interpreted two ways: Why did this happen? And, why do we still need to talk about it?

December 6 was given that title because what occurred at L'Ecole Polytechnique in 1989 was the action of femicide, the intentional murder of women because they are women. The writings and reports of that day, the associated news coverage, all of it was very clear. One man's hatred and outlook on women being to blame for the state of his life was reason to take the lives of 14 while planning and attempting to take many more. We can assume, by his actions, that femicide seemed justifiable. It would be comforting and convenient to believe that this was, and is, a rarity of thought. It would be reassuring to assume that these

perhaps a troubled childhood, coupled with old patriarchal norms of society, that we've grown from. It would be encouraging to be able to mark that day in our history as a

moment that caused us to stop and recognize violence against women to the point of causing death, so that it could not be repeated. Unfortunately, that does not seem to be the case.

OAITH, the Ontario Association of Interval and Transition Houses, began publishing an annual Femicide List in 1995, based on names known to them of women, and sometimes children, who have been murdered by men in Ontario dating back to 1990. These are killings of women by men generally known to them, intimate partners, caregivers, etc., but in all cases where the women or their children were killed because they were specifically targeted. Fourteen women were killed on that day in 1989; over 780 names have been added to the femicide

list in the 30 years since. Over 780 violent, targeted murders that did not need to occur. How many are too many for our comfort level? How many are too many before we make it stop? How many, locally, are too many? These are our communities and our homes. We have the power to influence this. We truly are the only ones who can.

Events marking the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women will be held this week, throughout our communities, throughout our country. Some people will challenge why woman abuse and femicide are being addressed separately from domestic violence or intimate partner violence. Aren't they all the same? They are not. They are related, they overlap and the broader titles make us more comfortable, but the undercurrent from our patriarchal history that allows the killing of women to continue has not yet been resolved. And that is why we still need to talk about it and name it. We all know change takes time. Having difficult conversations is uncomfortable and takes courage. After 30 years, let's have the courage to have the conversations that can save lives. Let's create that change.

## 'Big Wild Year' Notebook:

## Part XI of a series

## Hunting success on Manitoulin Island, a hard-wired foraging mindset

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Expositor will be checking in regularly with this couple who have ties to Manitoulin Island as they embark on their Big Wild Year challenge. This is the 10th update since they began. by Warren Schlote

NORTH BAY—The finish line is mere weeks away for the Big Wild Year, with this past November allowing the couple to shore up their food stockpile and ensure they can last through their final month.

"(November) went by really fast," said Delphanie Colyer, a nurse who has roots in Wiikwemkoong.

"There was lots of unsuccessful hunting culminating in a very successful hunt," added Jeremy St. Onge, Ms. Colyer's partner and co-challenger in the Big Wild

For the entirety of 2019, Mr. St. Onge and Ms. Colyer have devised a challenge they call the 'Big Wild Year,' a pledge to eat only wild foods that naturally occur in their surrounding environments. They have mainly relied on foraging, hunting and fishing, though they have on occasion bartered with friends in other parts of the province and have, rarely, purchased wild

The two-week deer rifle season in their area began on November 5. Ms. Colver said there was a positive omen just days before the start of the season when they saw a large buck the day before Hallowe'en. Out on the land, however, it was a different story.

"We were on some good tracks and had some good spots, but we just did not see a single live deer,' said Mr. St. Onge. "Then, the day after the season closed, a big one crossed the road in front of me near my parents' house.'

It was not promising for their meat rations, but Mr. St. Onge took that deer as the motivation to get a successful harvest later in the month.

He has been hunting with the Harfields near Sheguiandah every year for nearly two decades and was hopeful about his chances. However, Mr. St. Onge was concerned about being in the hunt camp surrounded by all of the usual comforts like fresh foods and coffee.

"I worried I'd be missing the morning coffee and the big, big morning breakfast—for the nos-

talgia, the atmosphere and being part of the whole experience," he said. "But I realized I could happily do without these things. Partly because I knew my diet would be changing in 35 days.'

Ms. Colyer said she did not have the same worries about feeling left out of her social group.

"I went to the Island, cooked dinner for my friends and made my own dinner, but when we sat down it felt the same. I didn't miss any of that," she said.

Mr. St. Onge was rewarded for nis troubles when a large buck found itself before his sights at the Harfields'

"I shot the biggest deer of my life so far on that Saturday, so that was very exciting," he said.

"The Island is the best place in the whole wide world. Every single person we ever talk to always says that—not just for the deer hunting; it's got everything! Well. except blueberries," said Ms. Colyer.

Although the deer hunting season near North Bay was unsuccessful, the large amounts of snow meant Mr. St. Onge could start snaring rabbits, bringing home four, and also shooting a grouse in the process.

"Then, I caught a grouse in a rabbit snare—I've never had that happen before," he said.

The grouse were prolific during the hunting season both near North Bay and on Manitoulin.

"While we were deer hunting, we probably saw our limit of grouse every time we went out." said Mr. St. Onge.

"It's kind of frustrating because in all honesty, for all the work there is to hang and process the dear, if we'd shot all the grouse we saw we probably would have had the same amount of meat as one deer," added Ms. Colver.

While the couple's online updates have always begun with the number of days that had passed, they have recently switched to a reverse countdown of the number of days remain-

'It's going to be a flavour explosion; I'll have a happy mouth for one day," said Ms. Colyer of the approaching December 31 conclusion of the challenge.

She described recently cooking moose and deer meat and throwing fiddleheads into the pan, which served as a shock to her

"We haven't been having lots of green colour. I was startled by how colourful the pan was; that's going to be really pleasant. I'm just excited for a few fruits and vegetables," said Ms. Colver. "Some people are having a chuckle at our upcoming health issues we might have like weight gain and stomach issues.'

The two will continue with bloodwork and physiology testing for six months after their challenge ends, to get a better sense of the impacts of switching back to a more conventional North American diet.

"Having experienced all of the health benefits over the last year. I'm going to be careful getting

but I'm sticking away from nightshade (tomatoes and potatoes are members of this family)," said Mr. St. Onge.

He will undergo food allergy testing by May and said he will stick more closely to the current diet until then to ensure accurate

"I, on the other hand, am going to go nuts and taste a little bit of everything," said Ms. Colyer with a laugh, adding that she has lost most of her cravings for sweets like chocolate.

"But I would really like to have the boring things. I want lots and lots of salad, and other grainy things, too, like quinoa, barley and oatmeal," she said.

"Oats is on my list for sure. Experiencing how few grains you have on a wild diet, I'll probably try to avoid them when I can," added Mr. St. Onge, before Ms. Colver excitedly bursted in with "cornbread!!"

Snacking has been on their minds of late; Ms. Colyer recent-

ly made apple leather and pear that won't do much harm like leather, with the wild pears being apples, mangoes and bananas, gifted by her sister from a comharvest in wemkoong. She also made a surprise batch of sunchoke chips for a road trip to Manitoulin Island.

Although they are excited to switch back to a conventional diet, their foraging mindset might not give up as easily.

"I recently picked up my kid at school and when we were driving, I said 'look out the window, are the seeds ready on that lamb's quarter?' I don't know why I did, because we can coast now this year. It's funny that I'm still looking; I can see that it's just going to be a part of my life because we've been doing it for so many seasons," said Ms. Colyer. "My brain is now programmed to just keep looking for food."

Dan and Esther Duval, aka Danitoulin Productions recently announced the concept and approached Flatrock Entertainment with a plan to rent the venue, campgrounds and entertainment area, on Haweater Weekend.

Mr. Duval said that the couple made the decision to use the term "marijuana" instead of the now more common usage of "cannabis" due to the corporatization of the latter term.

'I always believed the way the government came at it and took it (cannabis) out of the hands of the people was wrong," said Mr. Duval. "They saturated the market, and are going to saturate the market even more and put it in the hands of corporations. Corporations have taken over the term

The duo did a bit of research and found there was a dearth of such celebrations in the province, particularly in the North. "Canada has always had the best weed," suggested Mr. Duval. "It's about time we celebrated our homegrown culture."

Mr. Duval said that he was concerned that the approach taken by the upper tier governments has been so ham-handed as to place children at greater risk than was the case before legalization. Events like this will assist in putting more education on the drug, both medicinal and recreational, out in the public eye.

One of the shortcomings of other festivals that Mr. Duval had researched were not following through on announced events. "For instance, creating the world's largest joint," he said. By keeping the event close to a grassroots operation, and staying real, the organizers plan to under promise and over deliver with their inaugural event.

Camping will be available onsite, with options restricted to RV and trailer sites rentals only.

"The no tenting restriction is related to another event and we are still looking into options for that," said Mr. Duval. "We are working with local campsites to rectify the issue and this may change, so please stay tuned for more updates.'

The event is planned as a safe and comfortable space for all involved, as such no gang colours or gang clothing of any type will be accepted. "Those wearing them will be immediately removed from the festival grounds," said Mr. Duval. "No exceptions." Alcohol will be permitted on RV/trailer rental sites, as permitted by law. "We will not be engaging in the selling of alcohol at this time," he said. "If this changes we will update you at that Mr. Duval was adamant that "Danitoulin Productions, and by extension the Manitoulin Marijuana Festival, is not affiliated with Manitoulin Radio Communications or its entities in any capacity except in a rental situation.'

As to the timing of the event, Mr. Duval said that it was suggested to him that the August long weekend would be the best time to hold the event.

He said that the response so far has been quite phenomenal. "We have marijuana friendly radio stations calling us up with support and a large number of online social media sites have thrown their support behind us.'

Based on the support so far, Mr. Duval said that he was comfortable suggesting the number of people attending the festival could top 5,000.

"It's time that we take the stigma out of marijuana," said Mr. Duval. "Festivals like this are one way to help make that happen.

Every poll on Manitoulin Island went to either Ms. Hughes or Mr. Williamson. Of the 33 polls on Manitoulin Island, Ms. Hughes took 28 (or 85 percent) and Mr. Williamson took five (or 15 percent): Whitefish Falls, Honora-Rockville, Meldrum Bay, Big Lake-Sandfield and

Polls within Manitoulin District First Nations voted overwhelmingly in favour of Ms. Hughes, giving her 1.114 votes, a share worth 73 percent of all 1,517 votes from these

Ms. Wilson scored second place with 162 of those votes or nearly 11 percent. Mr. Chapman came third with the First Nations vote, netting 4.2 percent (64 votes). Mr. Williamson was close on his heels with 3.9 percent (59 votes), followed by Mr. DeLisle at 0.46 percent (seven votes) and Mr. Marmalade at 0.26 percent (four votes).

Elections Canada does not provide enough data to determine voter turnout on a poll-by-poll level, so a comparison of the Island's democratic participation to that of the rest of Canada was not possible.



for provincial officials to review all applications from this intake. The next invitation for full application submissions will be in March 2020.

Several members of the Manitoulin Collaborative expressed excitement in moving forward to the next phase

"Our previous relationship goes back as far as 2014 and it's based on the good work we've done. We're committing to each other to take this on in the best interest of the patient," said Ms. Foster.

Manitoulin offers a smaller coverage area than some proposed OHTs; however, the Manitoulin Collaborative has already implemented several initiatives the province is requesting of OHT applicants.

Ms. Foster cited the strategic plan shared among collaborative partners, a quality improvement plan, the network of care providers, groups for mental health and palliative care and a shared IT system.

"The standardized infrastructure brings stability to the digital world. When our physicians and clinicians are caring for patients, they can rely on stable, sustainable infrastructure. They don't have to worry about the computer, they can worry about the patient," said Ms. Foster.

OHT applications are judged based on the strength of eight aspects of healthcare: patient care and experience; patient partnership and community engagement; defined patient population; in-scope services; leadership, accountability and governance; performance measurement, quality improvement and continuous learning; funding and incentive structure; and digital health.

"When we looked at each of those and self-evaluated our readiness, we tended to be on the stronger side. As we go down this path, given our expectations at this early stage, our group here on Manitoulin feels confident," said Ms.

Manitoulin Lodge Nursing Home administrator Sue Farren said the OHT application was a natural extension of the work that Island healthcare providers already offer.

"(The Manitoulin Collaborative) is a unique group of healthcare partners who are genuinely dedicated to quality healthcare for residents of the Island and area. The submission of the OHT self-assessment form demonstrates our commitment to continuous quality care for all those who access the healthcare system," she told The Expositor.

Noojmowin Teg Health Centre executive director Pam Williamson said the group model speaks to some of the values held by her Indigenous-focused health organization.

"Noojmowin Teg is a firm believer in having more accessible services for the community members who live on the Island," she said, adding that having all providers organized under the OHT structure would enable better co-ordination between care providers.

Ms. Williamson added that the new model may enhance the availability of appropriate care across system users on Manitoulin.

"I feel this may be an opportunity for all services to be more culturally sensitive to everybody, but also that there be some attention paid to the Indigenous services being promoted so they remain as important as they are," she

Ms. Foster noted that the application process is still in its early stages and there are questions yet to be answered, such as determining which Manitoulin Collaborative partner will hold the direct relationship with the Ministry of Health, or how to effectively manage the varying staffing models in place at care providers across the Island.

However, the ministry has called for applications with the understanding that there will be questions at the local level. It will collaborate with the ultimately successful OHT applicants to work through some of the possible growing pains.

cattle, lambs, whatever" for retail sale. While the abattoir currently does not cut and wrap product, Mr. McGaffin said that service was high on the priority list going forward. "Stage two will be getting into the process of cutting and wrapping.'

The sale was only 15 days out from closing on Monday, but the partners had already had one consultant in to review the business and more are planned for down the road. "We are gathering opinions in preparation for formulating a business plan," said Mr. McGaffin. The duo is hoping to have the way forward well mapped out in order to implement things "the first two quarters of next year."

"I think that it is important that we will be developing the brand of our own beef and bison, but we don't want to neglect the people for whom this facility was built," he said, adding that even if it would simply be to sell to friends and neighbours, getting more farmers into finishing beef would have a positive impact. Building an Island brand would bring a lot to the table for Manitoulin producers

"Manitoulin Island is known for so many things," noted Mr. McGaffin. "That's why we named our company Limestone Island Abattoir, because the Island is limestone."

You can't give people smoke and mirrors these days,' he said, noting the importance of authenticity in today's market. "You can't just put up a couple of arches and say it's Canadian beef.

Currently, the abattoir is experiencing an "upside down" financial profile, said Mr. McGaffin. "That's why

four one-bedroom apartments) Woods Lane apartment complex be placed on the market. At that time, CAO Fern Dominelli had told the board that no expressions of interest for the buildings had been received for either the Gore Bay property or two other DSB properties in Espanola.

The report had indicated that the projected cost of maintaining the Woods Lane units was expected to increase drastically to \$42.39 a square foot by 2023, up from \$1.15 a square foot in 2017.

While the properties have been sold for the sum of one dollar each, there are conditions attached to the sale. In the case of 66 Meredith, Woods Lane Apartments, 30 percent to 50 percent of the units must remain at affordable rents for 20 years and that Ontario Aboriginal Housing Services accepts all current tenants. While the vacant land, which also sold for one dollar will have new construction to begin within three years. The new construction will be a minimum of 30 units, subject to planning bylaws, and 30 to 50 percent of those unites will also remain at affordable rents for 20 years.

The Woods Lane Apartments (named after former Gore Bay mayors Marv Woods and John Lane) are Manitoulin Island's original social housing units and were first opened as a Gore Bay Centennial project in 1967.

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

...continued from page 1 the pre-capital submission will bring forth more clarity on the next steps of the project.

Ms. Fields then gave an overview of the changes to come. There is an underused large waiting room to the right of the main front doors. Part of this space will be repurposed into a small office and a 45-square-foot storage area for the Mindemoya Hospital Auxiliary. The auxiliary's current space is in the basement.

Lockable doors will be added to separate and secure the inpatient department. The present chemotherapy room will be replaced with a family care room that can be used as a smudging space. It is also a safe space for difficult conversations and family meetings. The current family meeting place is an open area at the end of a hallway.

The new chemotherapy area has several changes.

"The standards have changed that require us to have this staging of a segregation room, an ante room and then a mixing room. That's going to be going on in the current mixing room area and where the current staff washroom was," said Mr. Vine.

The current cafeteria will be turned into the chemotherapy treatment area and have two chairs—one for chemotherapy and another for ancillary treatment. This will relieve the ED from having to perform these duties. There will also be a private washroom for the chemo patients.

The small lab and ultrasound room have been separated. The lab has grown to fill the full space and will have a washroom for collecting urine and other test samples.

The diagnostic imaging registration room lies immediately to the left, followed by a universal washroom. X-ray and ultrasound rooms are located across the hall.

The ambulance ramp remains the same. Patients entering this way will turn right and enter a triage waiting room which has a direct line of sight with the triage and registration areas. There will also be camera feeds from the triage waiting room to the nurses' station.


"We're able to change the practice of registering patients and them having to walk to the ED to be triaged. Patients can be triaged and registered simultaneously," said Ms. Fields.

"If you're familiar with the procedure here at (the Little Current) site, it's going to almost exactly mirror that," said Mr. Vine.

Locking doors will separate the ED from the rest of the hospital to preserve patient privacy. Nurses will be able to key patients in and out.

The current Mindemoya ED has six treatment areas. After the renovation it will host seven. Behind the first three is a physician charting area.

iysician charting area. "It was a big ask to have



a (physician charting area) with a window; we were able to fulfill that," said Ms. Fields.

The former major resuscitation room could only hold one stretcher; there is now room for two. This provides for space to accommodate trauma patients and the flexibility to use the space for other purposes when not needed.

There will be a new mental health room up to current standards such as shatterproof glass and external locking.

Next to the mental health room is another family care room. It will be a place for security to monitor patients in the mental health room, as well as offering a place for physicians to have difficult conversations with family members.

There will also be an isolation room with an ante room for physicians and nurses to put on and take off their personal protective equipment before entering the room. It will

have negative pressure so it can be used as an alternative smudging space and will ensure airborne illnesses do not spread to the rest of the hospital.

There will be a dedicated medication room for nurses to mix their medications. It will also serve as a safe lockdown space, similar to the Little Current site, so in the case of a violent patient the nurses, physicians and staff can lock themselves in for safety. There is a phone inside to call for help.

The current nurses station has three areas at which clinical staff can sit. The new area will have six stations as well as a standing counter.

Exercises still need to be undertaken to work out the optimal flow through the space. The additional downstairs space created by the expanded floor plan will remain largely untouched for possible future expansion, though a new boardroom may be installed in a portion of the basement.

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There is a buffer of \$550,000, or roughly 24 percent, built into the project

for cost escalations and contingency. As the project moves closer to completion, the estimates will become more accurate.

The plans for the new facility are to be posted and MHC will host a town hall at the Mindemoya site so staff can learn about what requests were made or not accommodated, as well as the rationale behind those decisions.

Fundraising plans have yet to be announced for the campaign to build this addition.



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# Island municipal committee will tender for Manitoulin Welcome Centre operator

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Welcome Centre management committee and the Northeast Town will be putting the operation of the Manitoulin Welcome Centre—located next to the swing bridge and currently operated by the Manitoulin Tourism Association/Destination

Manitoulin Island (MTA)—up for tender in the new year

"We had a meeting Wednesday of the participating municipalities that were involved. Each had a representative from the committee that was negotiating with the MTA on trying to draft a new agreement with the arrangement we have for the welcome centre," said Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin.

The last meeting the management committee had with MTA representative Doug Wuksinic was in September.

"Doug indicated he couldn't recommend our draft proposal to our board, and he thought we should go forward with an RFP (request for proposals). That way, (MTA) could clarify what they were willing to do or not do regarding operating the welcome centre," said Mayor MacNevin.

The Expositor reached out several times to MTA directors for comment on the announcement of the RFP, but did not receive a statement by press deadline Monday.

The member municipalities of the management committee then went back to see whether they would

support tendering the operations of the centre or recommend amending the agreement in some way.

"What came out was the committee members said they unanimously recommended an RFP that would be drafted with the support of staff of member municipalities, to put that out to see who or what would be interested in operating the facility—including inviting the MTA to submit a proposal," said Mayor MacNevin.

The MTA has expressed dissatisfaction with the current state of the welcome centre agreement. At its annual general meeting last year, the MTA resolved to enter into negotiations with the Northeast Town for a "reasonable tenant agreement for use of space in its current location." It also resolved to enter into negotiations about the 1990 Information Centre Operations Committee Agreement.

Under the current operations regime, the MTA has use of the upper floor of the Manitoulin Welcome Centre essentially rent-free with a \$5,000 cleaning allowance.

In exchange, MTA arranges for said cleaning, holds liability insurance and makes its washroom facilities available for pub-

lic use. MTA also staffs the centre for a minimum of 21 weeks per year.

MTA has in the past raised concerns about the agreement not being inclusive, as the welcome centre agreement only includes six municipalities and no First Nations. It has also placed more emphasis on online initiatives in recent years.

One way for MTA to redefine its presence at the welcome centre would be for it to tender a proposal stating what services it would like to provide for the space. It has been invited to submit said proposal in the public RFP for new operators.

Mayor MacNevin said the building has an annual operating cost of about \$30,000. It receives some rental income from the gym and small office space downstairs but the bulk of the expenses are divided up among the participating municipalities in the welcome centre agreement.

He added that the group had never thought about issuing an RFP but upon meeting with Mr. Wuksinic, they felt it would be the right move forward.

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson will be working with representatives from the fellow



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
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municipalities that share a stake in the welcome centre operations agreement to draft an RFP that can be released early in 2020.

## Keegan Jacko has dreams of country stardom

by Warren Schlote LITTLE CURRENT—A Lit-

tle Current-born musician is making his name on the performance scene and has already set out big plans for the next few years of his musical career.

"In my first five months since I've been playing by myself, I've done 75 shows," said Keegan Jacko, who said he began his solofocused tour in March, playing three to four shows per week, each an hour long. "Eventually, playing that long became easy."

The 26-year-old new-age country performer has roots in Wiikwemkoong and his grandmother currently lives there. However, he was raised in the US and calls Lansing, Michigan his home. He said he comes back to Canada at least once per month and recently visited The Manitoulin Expositor's office to chat about his music.

"I've done shows in Nashville, Michigan, Montana, Manitoulin Island and I'm playing Sudbury tonight. I'm playing in Niagara Falls next year. We've also got the Horseshoe Tavern in Toronto booked and we're looking at festivals and stuff," said Mr. Jacko.

His musical career began when he was working at a karaoke bar. From there, he began singing publicly at 22 and started thinking more seriously about a music career at age 23. When he was 24 he picked up the guitar for the first time, was signed to a record label at 25 and is now touring at 26.

"I started playing in a band that ultimately failed. That failure forced me, in my head, to learn to play guitar because I didn't want to rely on anyone," he told The Expositor.

Chris Young and Kane Brown are among Mr. Jacko's inspirations. However, he likens his own career trajectory as similar to his biggest inspiration, American country music musician Luke Combs.

"I recently watched an interview with him talking about his goals. And I cried when I was watching it," said Mr. Jacko. He described how Mr. Combs also rapidly progressed to growing his music, making it into a profession and now playing stadium shows. For Mr. Jacko, he hopes to be headlining similar shows five years from now and also have two albums under his belt by that time.

Mr. Jacko is heading toward that goal at a steady pace. He is lined up to join an artist-in-residence program in Calgary at Studio Bell, home of the National Music Centre. That two-month program will connect him with producers and engineers while also providing access to a top-of-the-line recording facility.

He said he hopes to release his full-length EP in 2020. In the new year, he will also be going on an AM-FM radio tour, according to his manager Sherrie Kaboni.

"I enjoy performing and writing only songs that I can feel. If someone wanted me to play a song that I had no connection to, I probably won't perform it," said Mr. Jacko. I do a lot of slow, emotional songs, but that's because I have a connection. I've stayed true to that."

Mr. Jacko visited Wiikwemkoong earlier this summer to perform at the Wiikwemkoong Arts and Music Festival (WAMF). A receptive crowd welcomed him to the stage and cheered along with his music.

"It was fun. I like being on big stages like that—I've played in front of 2,000 people before. To me, the bigger the crowd, the less nervous I get. But it depends on the situation," he said.

Mr. Jacko said his Anishinaabe roots have not been a main driver of his artistic expression, simply because he did not know much of his heritage.

"I'm starting to learn a lot more just by being here. I'm getting in touch with my roots through my music," he said.

As part of his artistic journey, Mr. Jacko said he has been undertaking vocal coaching and that those who hear him are impressed with the results so far. He plans to grow his fanbase beyond Ontario and Michigan by filling tour dates, one area at a time.

"My biggest goal right now is to get my music out there further than the reach of my own arms," he said.

This career path has also instilled in Mr. Jacko the value of patience, to tune out negativity and place importance on viewing oneself in a positive light despite the challenges that come along.

## Wiikwemkoong Anishinabemowin Conference draws record attendance

by Michael Erskine WIIKWEMKOONG-The gymnasium of Pontiac School in Wiikwemkoong was packed to overflowing as delegates to the Anishinabemowin Conference listened to the event's opening remarks. The two-day conference focused on 25 workshops that included interactive learning, education, full immersion, pronunciations, beginner levels, arts and hands on craft making, holistic methods, spirituality, storytelling, teachings and history.

The Anishinaabemtooshin Pane Maawnjidiwin was initiated in 2017, where its first year focused on familiarization with the Three Fires dialect and promoting the transition from beginner to becoming fluent speakers of Anishinaabemowin. This is the third year of the conference and it focused on reconnecting with the Anishinaabe way of life.

Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier welcomed everyone to the community on behalf of council and staff.

Ogimaa Peltier exhorted the audience to continue to speak the language, to reach out to elders and other fluent speakers seeking their help. "Talk to the people sitting at the table across from you for help," he said, adding to considerable laughter from his listeners, "If they can't...move tables."

Kevin Wassegijig noted in his remarks that parents

and families talking around the supper table are critical to the health of the language. He spoke on the important role that his community has, and continues to, play in the vibrancy of Anishinabemowin. "As I travel to communities across the country where I hear our language being spoken, there is inevitably a connection," he said. "There is a route that traces back to Wiikwemkoong."

He spoke of how, before he returned to the community, when he was working with a First Nation casino, there was a plan to put out a community newsletter and he wanted an Anishinabemowin component to it—"a word of the day. The first volume, issue one, 'hello'."

Keynote speakers included Ninaatig Staats Pangowish on day one and Will Morin on day two.

Ninaatig Staats Pangowish is a teacher of Anishi-



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

## Master spinner opens Fibersden, a new yarn shop in Mindemoya

MINDEMOYA—Halibur-

ton's loss is Manitoulin's gain as Mary, also called Marty, Gryciuk and her husband Rolf have moved to Mindemoya, opened one store and will launch another in Januarv.

Ms. Gryciuk was born in Malta and learned to knit at the age of three. Once she started this craft, there was no stopping her and she always dreamt of owning her own yarn shop. After spending some time in California, the couple missed this country's four seasons and moved back to Canada, settled in Coboconk and opened a yarn store in their

Ms. Gryciuk undertook a six-year master spinner program supported by Ontario Handweavers and Spinners though Sir Sandford Fleming College, located in Peterborough. She learned to process fibre from raw material to finished yarn. The program featured the use of fibre from sheep, cows, alpacas, wolves and dogs and any plant from flax to cotton to hemp. Artificial fibres instruction was also part of the program and the students learned to use nylon and Tencel fabric which is wood pulp blended with wool that gives a shine to the finished product. Ms. Gryciuk then taught spinning classes for three years in Thunder Bay and fell in love with the North.

Ms. Gryciuk told The Expositor that she had "talked with others over the years and they told me how beautiful Manitoulin is.' The couple took up residence in Mindemoya in the spring and opened an inhome yarn shop. As well, Ms. Gryciuk joined the Manitoulin Fine Arts Asso-

ciation and also a spinning group that meets at the Tehkummah library.

It is a delight to enter the shop, named Fibersden. There are numerous types of yarn on display from natural fibres as well as acrylic blends and lace weight to worsted, chunky and bulky weight. There are novelty yarns, sock and baby yarns and silk, right from cocoon to fibre to yarn. Ms. Gryciuk also carries fibre for spinning and felting, either needle or wet, patterns and notions and spinning wheels. Towards the new year, Ms. Gryciuk will install a table in her shop where she will teach classes with instruction in knitting and crocheting as well as different methods of dyeing, including sun dyeing hemp in the spring.

The Gryciuks have two cats, a Maine coon/ragdoll mix and a tabby as well as a Great Pyrenees dog and their fur is even spun.

Mr. Gryciuk has over twenty years' experience in the health field. He had bought a defunct health business in Haliburton and turned it into the largest wellness health food store in central Ontario. "Our strength," he said, "is taking care of arthritis and so on. Our customers made us strong," as he explained that visitors to his store would tell him what was working for them. He is a certified nutritional consultant and "will order in if people want a special supplement." Although his store will not open until the new year, when he moves into the



## **Tehkummah Council Notes**

#### Animal control bylaw

Tehkummah applied for an Infrastructure Ontario loan to pay for its new snowplow, a 2020 Western Star 4700SB from Cambrian Truck Centre, for a loan value of \$286,000 over 10 years. The roads superintendent negotiated a slightly lower price than expected.

#### Fire chief's report

Tehkummah has 4,200 gallons of water to fight fires now that its new trucks are all in service. The municipality was unsuccessful in obtaining the old air filling equipment from Central Manitoulin and will have to use the Northeast Town for these services. The boiler at the fire hall needs to be replaced under warranty and would be installed while the generator installation takes place. The labour cost of replacement is not to exceed \$3,000 and will be paid by

Councillor Rick Gordon was concerned about the year-to-date expenditures on insurance and heating fuel, as well as the cost of the Smeltzer and McCauley drain work. The township is required to maintain

its municipal drains, including inspections and maintenance.

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
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

beyond the scope of the roads crew and staff are now looking at how best to address the site.

#### Library report, service agreement

The Tehkummah library is turning 30 and will create a new roadside sign in honour of the occasion. Tehkummah will have to approve the installation because it is on municipal property, but the cost will be covered by the library. Council also approved the library service agreement.

#### Revised health and safety policies

The Occupational Health and Safety Act mandated certain updates to the township's policies. Council approved clarifications regarding procedures for employees working alone, for the responsibilities for volunteers and emergency procedures when a violent situation arises within municipal duties.

Councillors expressed concerns that if volunteers have to complete extensive training to the extent as municipal employees, it may deter some from taking part.

#### FedNor funding co-application

Council was in favour of hiring a consultant to identify possible economic development initiatives within the municipality. To share the costs and better justify a position, Tehkummah expressed an interest to co-apply with the Township of Assiginack.

The funding would provide three years of coverage to a maximum of \$100,000 per year. The municipal contribution is 10 percent, which would be halved to five percent

if Assiginack joined the application. They sent a letter to Assiginack to gauge the other township's interest.

This funding is offered through FedNor's Community Investment in Northern Ontario (CIINO) program.

#### Little Schoolhouse roof

Council approved a quote to install Easy Shake style metal roofing at the Little Schoolhouse and Museum in South Baymouth for an inclusive total of \$4,959.09. Strapping and other materials will be roughly an extra \$1,000, though donations are expected to come through to offset the

#### Work on 2nd Concession

A ratepayer requested that the township maintain the 2nd Concession up to their property during the winter. This roadway was previously maintained by the township. Councillor McKenzie was concerned about agreeing to this because the township decided not to maintain a similarly requested portion of the 5th Sideroad. However, the 2nd Concession has historically been maintained by the township, unlike the other.

The road is steep and it would be unsafe for crews to drive in and back down, so council granted permission for municipal crews to use a backhoe to clear a single lane upon the property owner's request, given one week's notice. Bringing the roadway up to full standards would cost upwards of \$30,000.

Council donated \$500 to the Manitoulin Family Resources Christmas basket campaign. Council also finalized its employee Christmas bonuses and resolved to close for December 24 (Christmas Eve), December 27 and December 31 (New Year's Eve). Council also gave \$100 to the township's Christmas lunch.

#### Remembrance banners

Council approved in principle the hanging of remembrance banners for next November. These will be arranged by families of veterans and sponsored by businesses; the township would cover the installation costs. The request was approved in principle because of questions over the ownership of the light standards in South Baymouth, whether they fell under the jurisdiction of Hydro One or the Ministry of Transportation.

#### **Information items**

The township is still in discussion with K. Smart Associates about the drainage work completed this fall and is requesting reports be completed over the winter so projects can be tendered in the spring.

Council will invite Keith Flaherty of the Great Lakes Islands Alliance's Manitoulin group to present about electric vehicle charging stations on Manitoulin. This could be an initiative overseen by the proposed economic consultant.

Tehkummah must prepare a report of all of its bridge and culvert infrastructure, excluding the Rogers Creek Bridge, as per its requirements in the Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act.

Michael Walzak, who submitted a previous request to extend the maintained portion of the 5th Sideroad, sent a letter expressing his displeasure with council's decision not to proceed.

Judith Jones submitted the results of the 2019 phragmites project effort.

#### Travel trailer bylaw

Council debated hiring a consultant to develop a recreational vehicle housing unit bylaw for a cost not to exceed \$1,000. The only current bylaw that covers this matter is under the Manitoulin Planning Board.

Councillor McKenzie had concerns about hiring a consultant as he felt this could be completed by council. Mr. Berti said the township may be in conflict if it drew up and approved its own fees

Councillor Leeson said it would likely be worth the cost in the end, and Councillor Eric Russell agreed that an expert-prepared bylaw would have more clout.

Councillor McKenzie voted against hiring a consultant for the bylaw. The motion

#### **ICIP Green Stream**

Council resolved to apply to the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program's Green Stream for an amount of \$67,500, with township's 26.67 percent contribution being \$18,225. This is a new funding program and must be submitted by January. All funding must be used by 2026.

Mr. Berti consulted with Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA) operations manager Keith Stringer about required scheduled or unscheduled improvements to the South Baymouth water system.

The suggested products included a rebuild of pumps two and three, their guardrail and electrical systems at a cost of \$20,000. There are suggested programming improvements to the fire system such as bringing all alarms onto the SCADA (industrial process management) system. The water filtration media will need replacement at \$8,000, smaller projects will total \$1,000, a new pre-chlorination pump

panel will cost \$18,000, pipe modifications to ease system maintenance will cost \$5,000 and replacing the turbidity analyzers will cost \$8,500. The total of all projects is \$67,500.

#### Student aid funding

Council will use the remainder of the money it gave last year in trust to Manitoulin Secondary School as awards for Tehkummah students at this year's awards night.

It's the first week of December. The snow has fallen and now the Christmas feel is officially in the air. The rush begins. How do we avoid the holiday stress for our pets? The sights, smells, sounds and good cheer can drive some pets crazy, so let's give some tips to get you started and yet keep the festive mood alive.

The decorations are getting put up. O Christmas Tree...you make kitties crazy! I think the safest thing to summarize is to make sure that this conifer is stabilized securely, do not hang decorations on the lower limbs, and never, ever use hanging tinsel or ribbons. Cats, and puppies, find these most enticing and can eat them or get tangled in items low to the ground. My mother has

sent me a video of her little Havanese Molly trying to chew off the lower bough of the tree. and then onto the tree skirt. Either bitter apple spray, or best,

remove the stimulating objects. For the same reason, do not leave gifts with ribbons or bows attached under the tree. Frisky animals think you have just provided an in-house amusement park. Remember as well that poinsettias, holly berries and mistletoe can be toxic. Pretty, but best in an animal free environment.

Along with the festive decoration, the delightful Christmas baking begins and the consumption of yummy rich foods. Remind family and visitors not to feed bites of food from the table as some animals have extremely sensitive stom-



achs, and these morsels could lead to distressing and costly health problems. Some of our holiday favourites can be toxic to our pets, such as chocolate, alcohol, raisins, grapes and onions. And don't forget foods sweetened with xylitol-it can really damage the liver in pets.

Some pets may be travelling during the holidays, and it may be by plane, train or automobile. Getting the crate out now helps to get our four-legged friend used to it. Feeding special treats inside the kennel, including a comfy bed, and leaving favourite toys near the crate will help the pet see this box as

a good place to be, rather than a jail. Ensure that vaccinations are up to date for boarding purposes or if crossing the border. It's also a good idea to have some stress relieving products on hand such as Thunderpheromones, shirts (compression garments), anti-nausea medication, and anti-anxiety medications if necessary. There are a variety of antianxiety supplements and prescription medications and sometimes 'test runs' with these products may be necessary to see what works for your pet. It never hurts to ask your vet to see

what option is best for your dog or cat. This is also helpful in advance of the holiday fireworks—a sure thing to cause most

pets to tremble.

For the pets staying home, there may be more visitors than usual, hopefully bringing you figgy pudding. For those critters who are shy, make sure that they have a safe space now with a favourite toy and bedding to which they can retreat when friends and family come over. Whenever possible, try to meet your guests at the door so the doorbell isn't constantly going off and sending pets into a frenzy.

Finally, in the spirit of giving, remember that some gifts are more appreciated by our pets than oth-

ers. A dog might benefit from food puzzles or other toys that stimulate his or her brain instead of an elf costume it doesn't want to wear in the first place. I think I have mentioned before how much dogs love freeze dried liver treats and that catnip is the cat's meow! As a special treat for my cat Bee, some boiled chicken livers is always appreciated, despite the gagging her humans do while cooking them.

So have a Happy Collie-Day and have fun dachshund through the snow. Sorry, couldn't resist the festive kitten around. Ho Но Но.

# **Province launches Seniors Dental Care Program**

TORONTO—The Ontario government launched the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program recently with the aim of helping to relieve emergency room visits for dental care.

Each year in Ontario, preventable dental issues like gum disease, infections and chronic pain lead to more than 60,000 emergency department visits by patients, of which a significant portion are seniors. Many low-income seniors face challenges accessing regular dental care because they cannot afford it, impacting their overall well-being, a press release from the province states.

"This is why the government is investing approximately \$90 million annually for the new Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program (OSDCP), which will provide free routine dental care for eligible low-income seniors across the province," the press release continues. "In doing so, the government expects to reduce the number of dental-related emergency department visits, helping to end hallway health care."

Last week Premier Doug Ford, Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health, and Raymond Cho, Minister for Seniors and Accessibility, visited Rexdale Community Health Centre to launch the new user-friendly web portal ontario.ca/SeniorsDental that seniors can use to apply to the program.

Eligible seniors can apply to the program online or by picking up an application form at a local public health unit.

"With this program, we are making sure Ontario's lowincome seniors can age with dignity and enjoy the quality of life they deserve," Premier Ford says. "This is another concrete way our government is delivering on our commitment to end hallway health care and cut hospital wait times"

"By providing seniors with access to quality dental care and keeping them out of hospitals, this new program is a key part of our plan to end hallway health care," Minister Elliott adds. "Ontario is building a connected system of care that supports all Ontarians throughout their health care journey."

"The well-being of all Ontario's seniors is a top priority for this government," Minister Cho states. "This new dental care program will help eligible seniors receive the quality dental care they deserve. By keeping seniors healthy, we can also help seniors avoid emergency visits to the hospital, prevent chronic diseases and increase quality of life for seniors across the province."

Ontarians aged 65 and over with an income of \$19,300 or less, or couples with a combined annual income of \$32,300 or less, who do not have dental benefits, will qualify for the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program.







## More than 1,100 students from 21 schools take part in annual Fall Harvest

by Michael Erskine

M'CHIGEENG—The excited voices of more than 1,100 youth from 21 schools from across the region rang out across the M'Chigeeng Powwow grounds as the 10th annual Fall Harvest got underway earlier this fall. The students were joined by 58 teachers and more than 75 community members and other visitors.

Booths and tables were set up across the grounds with activities ranging from various traditional foods such as berries, squash, apples, beans, corn (including corn soup), bannock, fish and a host of other healthy alternatives, craft activities such as bark and rock painting, carving, jewellery and weaving rushes and other natural materials into matts and dolls, as well as activities such as drumming and games. The volume and variety of activities and accessibility is unparalleled by any other event and at the same time the interaction of youth from different cultures is also unmatched. It was common to see Indigenous youth explaining and demonstrating things for their non-Indigenous colleagues.

Last year the prognosis for the popular Fall Harvest event inaugurated by Kenjgewin Teg (KT) seemed poor, as the educational institute was no



longer able to host the event on its own. Enter the United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising (UCCMM) and the Maamwi Naadamadaa (Let Us Work Together) committee.

Kenjgewin Teg Operations Manager Brenda Francis explained that the Fall Harvest is no longer a Kenjgewin Teg event, rather that the UCCMM Maamwi Naadamadaa committee is now the official host, although KT remains involved in the event through the committee. The eight partner organizations

include the UCCMM Tribal Gwekwaadwin Council, Miikan (land-based treatment centre for youth), Noojmowin Teg Health Centre, Mnaamodzawin Services, Kenjgewin Teg, the UCCM Tribal Police Service and the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation.

The purpose of Maamwi Naadamadaa, explained Ms. Francis, is to create a structure that connects senior managers, executive directors, CEOs, band managers of UCCMM affiliate agencies and communities to create a space where collaborative culturally rich program development is the measure of success. "Specifically, the mandate of Maamwi Naadamadaa is to work together on community issues," she said. "We work collaboratively on initiatives and events that offer learning opportunities and awareness of practices and traditional knowledge of how we did things."

Under the new structure for hosting the Fall Harvest each of the organizations involved committed to setting up a number of booths

for the event and then the organizations cost-share putting on the event.

"It's amazing how all the employees step up," said Ms. Francis. "They all ask 'how can we help.' Thanks to their efforts, the Fall Harvest day was successful."


