After getting to know their new roomates, the girls had the opportunity to meet the other delegates from across the globe, youth ages 9-12 from 22 countries.



Assiginack Council uneasy with Norisle grant application by Alicia McCutcheon MANITOWANING—Following a special meeting of Assiginack council

held Thursday, November 19, council members expressed concern with applying for a grant from the Ministry of Tourism, the Tourism Development Fund, on behalf of the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society. The Society's objective is to restore the S.S. Norisle to seaworthiness and outfit her to ply the Great Lakes as a unique steam engine powered cruise boat. The estimated cost of this endeavour is \$18.5 million.

The S.S. Norisle was acquired by the municipality for \$1 40 years ago when the Chi-Cheemaun replaced two older boats in the South Baymouth to Tobermory seasonal run, one of which was the Norisle.

At the conclusion of that meeting, council decided it was a risk to spend taxpayer dollars on the grant (which would see a local contribution of one-third of the proposed \$290,000). But while they were not comfortable with this particular application, "they still supported the Steamship Society's efforts," the minutes state. "They are, however, discouraged and concerned that if the cruise ship idea is not feasible, the provincial government still has a responsibility to see the vessel removed in such a way that the local taxpayers are not paying the final

It was decided to notify the ministry that they would not support the proposed grant application but would like to find a way forward that did not cost taxpayers and to invite the chair of the society to the next meeting of council to notify them of this decision.

At the last meeting of council, Steamship Society chair Dave Ham and member Rob Maguire were in attendance and went in camera with council to discuss the matter further.

Following the meeting, Mr. Ham was contacted by The Expositor who explained that the meeting was a formal discussion between the societv and council

Mr. Ham said he and Mr. Maguire were there to provide a level of comfort to council about the grant application. "I tried to give them some suggestions about how they might look at it differently," Mr. Ham said. "They're going to take it to their solicitor and accountant. They have to be sure that what they're doing is best for their taxpayers.

CAO Alton Hobbs told The Expositor that following the meeting, council was still not comfortable with the idea.

Despite pleas from Gore Bay to reconsider, DSB moves ahead with increase to rents

ESPANOLA—The increase to social housing market rents was made official at the November meeting of the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB), despite protests from both the Gore Bay and Espanola councils that the sudden increase is both unfair and sudden.

In its board package, the DSB received letters from both communities with DSB CAO Fern Dominelli explaining that he had made a presentation to Gore Bay mayor and council on the rental increase recently.

In Gore Bay, the Gore Bay Municipal Non-Profit Housing Corporation owns and operates 25 units. At present, there are nine rent geared to income units and 16 tenants who pay market rent. Of those 16 renters, 10 will be required to pay the new market rent of \$940 (which includes heat and hydro), up from \$645 because their incomes exceed the maximum of \$37,500 (or assets of over \$100,000).

Mr. Dominelli also explained that there are 359 units in total in the DSB catchment area and a waiting list of 383 people.

It was noted that the social housing committee had a lengthy discussion about the letters and decided against any recommendations to

Billings Township moves forward with \$5.7 million waterfront improvement project

KAGAWONG—Members Billings Township Council voted unanimously at its December 1 meeting to approve the waterfront improvement draft plan and move forward to start the grant application process.

The unanimous decision from the motion (by Councillor Tom Imrie) to proceed to the next step in the \$5.7 million waterfront improvement project followed many months of meetings, consultations with architects, engineers and members of the Waterfront Improvement Committee, and most recently, an open house held October 21.

Councillor Imrie said, "we received written comments from the public following the open house, some of whom suggested changes and brought concerns forward regarding specific issues to the plan.'

"The vast majority," he shared, "are very supportive of the concept as presented."

Final details of the project are subject to amendment and change," the councillor continued. "This is not the only version. We are using this template to get the ball rolling."

Mayor Austin Hunt commented that the plan is already a year

Clerk Kathy McDonald reminded council that the master plan has been funded which includes the consultants who met with them on October 15 prior to the open house.

In attendance at the council meeting, along with a handful of others, was Mike Coomes, member of the Waterfront Improvement Committee. Following the council meeting, Mr. Coomes shared that "the (waterfront) committee is very glad to see the project moving forward to apply for the grants needed to make it all happen. Electoral reform will prove a challenge for the Liberals

The newly elected Liberal government of Justin Trudeau has promised that 2015 will be the last conducted on the first-past-the-post system that has been the hallmark of parliamentary governments based on the British system of governance for centuries. Recent history at the provincial level has proven that will be a challenging promise to deliver.

Although the first-past-the-post system is well-crafted to deliver strong governments, generally agreed by academics as favouring large well-organized centrist parties and incumbent governments, its claim to providing representative democracy is somewhat more tenuous. Rare are the majority governments delivered with more than 50 percent of the vote and often putting the near dictatorial powers of the supremacy of parliament into the hands of parties whose national vote barely stretches to one-third of the electorate. Mr. Trudeau's own "landslide" majority win of 184 seats came with only 39.5 percent of the vote.

Although the Liberals have voiced a preference for the preferential ballot, where a voter ranks candidates according to their preference (the system now used by most federal parties, at least in part, to select their own leaders), they have also committed to extensive public consultation in deciding what the national electoral balloting system will be come the next election.

Although much of the national debate on electoral reform prior to the recent federal election focussed on forms of proportional voting, where the number of seats allocated to each party matches up with the number of votes each party receives during the general election, this form of balloting has little to recommend it to those used to regional representation, as instead of members being elected to represent ridings, they are generally chosen from lists presented by the parties themselves.

In a system where parties have arguably already garnered too much control over the political process and the role of an individual Member of Parliament has been eroded almost to irrelevance, proportional representation will strip away the last vestiges of local representation from the electorate.

Canada is a country cleft with countless cleavages and regional interests that has nonetheless managed, more often than not, to forge a national consensus in its governments where each region possesses some voice within the House of Commons and governments have ignored regional concerns at their peril. It is clear, however, that 2015 demands a system of government that will better reflect the national will at the ballot box.

Proportional elections also tend to fracture the political landscape, leading to less stable coalition governments and that presents the least attractive argument to many Canadians who have watched the machi-

nations and contortions of European governments based on that model with trepidation.

It has been argued that the preferential ballot will be the death knell of the Conservative Party of Canada. While such an argument might well be true of a Harper government whose strategy was based on exploiting wedge politics, there is no reason to extend that argument to a new Conservative Party of Canada leader who may seek to build a national consensus that will offer a palatable alternative to the Liberals or the NDP in some future election.

The preferential ballot has been labelled by some as "the least objectionable candidate" system, the winner often being decided by the second, third, fourth or fifth choices of an elector (the actual number of choices depending on the number of candidates standing for election). It is not at all beyond the pale to imagine a Stansfield, a Deifenbaker or even a Joe Clark welding together a winning collection of interests to win the day and the same can be said for the NDP or any other party that steps up to the plate.

In fact, the preferential ballot will enable electors to both vote with their hearts, minds and passion while also voting strategically at the same time. By also maintaining the electoral district (riding) system of representation electors will be able to ensure that the specific issues and concerns of their region will have a voice in the House of Commons.

An added bonus will be the tacit dependence each party will have on attracting the second or third choices of a majority of the electorate. The result will doubtless be a less partisan, more respectful discourse and debate of issues, particularly in the heat of elections. Attack ads are anathema if you will need the support of other party supporters to win the day.

It can be surmised that a less acrimonious political culture will also assist in encouraging highly qualified and accomplished people to consider taking on public service. Today's tendency towards nasty mudslinging contests hardly presents an attractive allure.

Whatever system is presented to the Canadian electorate in the end, it must be simple and easy to understand if it is to be accepted by the voters. The recent electoral reform debacle in British Columbia and Ontario's own muddled (and some would suggest deliberately so by the dominant Ontario Liberals) attempt provide ample examples of how not to approach the issue.

The debate on electoral reform is likely to be a lively one. Predictions are that the Conservatives will tout the status quo, while the NDP and Greens are likely to promote the proportional vote.

Whichever method is selected, it is fervently hoped that the rise in voter turnout witnessed in the recent federal election continues to rise—for that will result in all Canadians being the winners.

Plenty of problems with renewable energy

A little reference to hazelnut oil and Jimmy Fallon can go a long way

To the Expositor:

On a Saturday Night Live segment some years ago, Jimmy Fallon commented on a plan to use hazelnut oil to pow-

New Scientist magazine reported that in the future, cars could be powered by hazelnuts. That's encouraging, considering an eight ounce jar of hazelnuts costs about nine dollars. Yeah, I've got an idea for a car that runs on bald eagle heads and Faberge eggs.

Bit of a chuckle but other "renewables" are different right?! We use them right here in Ontario.

Here is a look at energy sources globally and for Ontario. Global: coal, 29.9; oil, 32.6; gas 23.9; hydro 6.7; and nuclear, 4.5 (Renew. 1.0 Source BP Statistical Review of World Ener-

Ontario: nuclear, 62; hydro, 24; gas/oil, 10; wind, 4; solar <1; and biofuel, <1 (Independent Electricity System Opera-

Renewable energy technology has been around for some time. For example, the first solar cell was patented in the US in 1888. Why do they not figure more prominently in the energy mix? There are three major problems that render these sources unreliable and expensive.

The first problem is diluteness. Energy from the sun and wind is not available in a form that will deliver power efficiently and concentrated in the way that water can for example. It takes a lot of material to capture this energy and it is reflected in the costs required to build the panels and turbines.

The second issue is reliability. The output from solar and wind on a dark still night is zero! Not much better on a cloudy still day. If the wind blows on a bright day and the power isn't needed, it has to exported and usually at a loss as is the case in Ontario?

The third problem is that these technologies scale poorly. Drive up the Bruce Peninsula and you will get the idea. No problem spotting the wind farms. Anyone notice a nuclear plant? This third problem is the game breaker for biofuel. There just isn't enough farm land to feed biomass plants that will provide power for nine million people. Not even

Germany is often held up as an example of a positive example of how to move to alternate energy. Germany gets about 7.5 percent of its energy from solar and wind. Germany has also paid billions to subsidize this move. Sound familiar? Interesting thing is, coal generation has not been shut down, it has increased! Remember the still in the night example? Reliable energy is required to power the German economy, solar and wind can't deliver. They now have a power system that (like Ontario) is forced to export power at a loss when surplus power is generated. They don't have gas or hydro to provide the spinning reserve required to back up the solar and wind generation so they have to cycle the coal plants.

There is no power grid in the world operating with alternate energy sources and for good reason. These sources cannot provide reliable power. The intermittent power they do provide is also very high cost. There is no evidence to

suggest that this is going to change any time soon.

Speaking of Ontario, how are we doing with "renewable" power generation? Anyone looking at the monthly power bill has the answer. The Auditor General of Ontario has recently provided us with some evidence of the state of the energy file. Just a few of her comments:

Over the last decade, Ontario's power system planning process has essentially broken down and has not had a technical plan in place.

Operating outside the checks and balances of the legislated planning process, the ministry has made several decisions about power generation that have resulted in significant costs to electricity consumers.

The government scaled back the role of the regulators and took to issuing ministerial directives by the hundreds.

The details are in the report but many of the example she refers to relate to renewable energy projects.

In 2007 the cost per kWh in Ontario was about seven cents. It now varies between 14 and 27 cents depending on usage and location.

Terence Corcoran summed it up nicely in the 02 Dec issue of the Financial Post, "Ontario's electricity regime is a gargantuan fiasco, a dysfunctional, overpriced, mismanaged

Canada has its own internal refugee problem

To the Expositor:

December 6 was the anniversary date of the serial killing of women at the Ecole Polytechnique in Montreal. Sixteen years ago, a 25-year-old man shot 28 people and killed 14 women. Then he turned the gun on himself and committed suicide.

In Canada in 2015, there are nearly 1,200 murdered and missing indigenous women. A public inquiry has been called for, and has been promised. What needs to be made clear is the purpose of the inquiry. Will it bring back the murdered and missing? No. Will the abusers and murderers be found, caught, and arrested? Not likely as a result of an inquiry. Will peace and harmony be restored to the families of the murdered and missing indigenous women as a result of an inquiry? Not likely. Will there be changes to the way murders and missing are investigated as a result? Maybe. Will it stop the murderers and abusers from continuing to murder and abuse? No. What ought to happen as results of an inquiry are improved policies for investigating the abuse and murder of women. What ought to

happen is a societal change in the way that Canadians view females, particularly indigenous females. What ought to happen is a change in the Canadian polity, in an organized Canadian society, so that any female can walk unimpeded in any community in Canada without fear of being accosted, sworn at, assaulted, threatened, catcalled at or murdered.

Across the way in the United States, police officers get away with shooting black people. The police organizations investigate themselves for their officers' wrong-doing and basically exonerate themselves. Sort of like asking the fox to look after the chicken coop. But then, black people are organizing themselves, gaining allies, and protesting loudly about the police getting away with murder. And then Donald Trump goes and says, "All lives matter," forgetting that wealthy, old white men have extra layers of protection when it comes to personal security. Black people are doing the right thing by protesting loudly and long. If wrongdoing is committed, and no one says anything about it, or does anything about it, the silent

ones are just as guilty of committing

Then there are the refugees. Canada has promised to bring in 25,000 refugees by the end of this year. They'll be going to Canada's major cities, like Montreal and Toronto. Has anyone asked First Nations people if this is okay? In the citizenship preparation courses that these people are required to take before becoming citizens, are there any teachings provided to them about whose land they are really entering? Has anyone told them that there are original peoples who have been here since "time immemorial?" Has anyone told them whose ancestral traditional territories they will be living on? Is anyone going to teach them about indigenous histories, cultures, customs, and traditions? Is anyone going to tell them how many indigenous languages there still

Everyone conveniently forgets that Canada has its own internal refugee problem. It has names, too, like wrongful evictions, loss of indigenous women's rights to indigenous lands, homelessness and elder abuse. Why is it "normal" to evict indigenous women from our own homeland? Why do the "powers-that-be" turn a blind eye to the homelessness in our own back yard? Why are our 'esteemed leaders" willfully blind to elder abuse, violence against indigenous women and domestic violence? Why is it okay to turn a female Anishinaabe elder out of her own home? Why is it okay for Whitefish River's council to suggest that a homeless female elder "go and rent something in town?" Since when do indigenous females have fewer rights than anyone else?

CBC News has suspended the comments section on stories about indigenous people because of the disproportionate number of hate messages and personal attacks against indigenous people. These kinds of comments violate CBC guidelines. CBC News has made efforts to connect with indigenous communities to better reflect the realities of these communities to a national

OPP warns of tax scam

The Manitoulin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is asking members of the public to be aware of the following fraudulent activity related to individuals claiming they are calling Canada Revenue from Agency (CRA).

In this instance, fraudsters are calling homeowners and indicating that a criminal investigation has been conducted and arrest warrants were being prepared stemming from overdue taxes owed to the government. The fraudsters represent themselves as an agent of the CRA to legitimize their fraudulent attempts to get residents to send them money and gain valuable personal information in the process.

These criminals are looking for your personal information in hopes of defrauding you from your hard earned money. They usually have some information that they have gained through public online sites in an attempt to give you a sense of trust so they may gain more pertinent information such as: your date of birth, bank account information, credit card numbers, passwords or PIN numbers.

The following is some information that will assist you in protecting yourself against fraud-

- · Be vigilant when anyone contacts you representing an agency asking for personal information. Legitimate agencies that you are dealing with already have your information:
- · It is highly recommended that you do not share your personal information over communication devices;
- · Be aware that fraudsters use pressure tactics and residents should not feel pressured to give out any information or transfer any funds at any time;
- · Screen your calls to determine who is calling;
- Fraudsters sometimes use local numbers in an attempt to get you on the phone; and
- · The minute you recognize your caller's fraudulent intention, hang up.

Fraudsters are skilled in getting your information and achieving their goal to defraud you. Don't become a victim. Be informed, be vigilant and stay in control.




Mustang Jacob Moreau really took one for the team, breaking his wrist in the second period and also sporting a foot cast thanks to a blocked shot in the semi-final game.

change the plan of a two-year phase-in effective October 1 for DSB-owned properties and on January 1, 2016 for nonprofit providers.

"It was a very lengthy discussion with Gore Bay town council," Mr. Dominelli said.

He explained that in Gore Bay, for the most part, tenants have the ability to pay market rent and said that while council did recognize the need for an increase, they felt it was unfair to those 10 tenants.

"When this motion first came up, I spoke vehemently against it," said Espanola Councillor Stewart Meikleham. "This is ludicrous to see such an increase in rent." Mr. Meikleham said it should be grandfathered or implemented on an incremental basis. He asked the board to reconsider the motion.

'Stewart, we've talked about this for months now," said DSB Chair Les Gamble.

"The optics for social housing sucks," Mr. Meikleham responded. "We can look at the numbers all we want, but \$37,500 is on the threshold of the poverty level. I'd like to see it go back to staff and either see it grandfathered or raised incrementally," he reiterated.

"I've had seniors coming to me who are very challenged by this and would like to see the timeframe changed," added Espanola Mayor Ron Piche. "I don't even know how the market rent is defined. Six-hundred and forty dollars to \$940? Is that reasonable? I can't understand that—it's Mr. Dominelli explained that 16 renters will see an

"Are you asking them if they're happy with it?" the mayor asked.

"We've been talking to them since July. We know they're not happy with it," Mr. Dominelli responded.

"We should bring them into this building and get them to

tell you what they think of it," Mayor Piche answered.
"You can't expect anyone, be it someone with a \$37,000 a year salary or a \$370,000 a year salary, to change their budget in such a short time frame," Mr. Meikleham said. "I have a responsibility to the citizens of Espanola, and the residents of Northern Ontario. This is wrong.'

"The program committee reviewed it, the board has talked about it and arguments we've had have not produced any other letters than the two we've had (Gore Bay and Espanola)," Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin said. "I'm suggesting that if Councillor Meikleham wants to put a motion forward, he could."

Mr. Meikleham put a motion forward that the rent increase go back to staff. Four board members voted in favour: Ron Piche, Stewart Meikleham, Tehkummah reeve Eric Russell and West End representative Bill Baker. The motion was defeated.

Gore Bay Mayor Ron Lane told The Recorder he was once again disappointed with the board's decision to not reconsider a further look at the increase.

"It's not fair to spring a 45 percent increase with two months' notice," the mayor told the Recorder. "These people don't need this stress at this stage in life."

To me, it's about the fairness of it all," he added. "Instead of having a study, they're using numbers the province has applied. I feel the board should have been more humane, given the age of the people living there (Millsite Apartments)."

has had the opportunity to work with, as well as the ongoing support provided to the library, and herself, throughout the years.

The reaction of the staff was exemplified by Ruth Wilson's comment that she felt "very lucky" to have been able to work with Ms. Kift, a sentiment also reflected in the comments of former library staffer Susan Hart, who like many former staff and board members had travelled in to take part in the event.

Library board Chair Marian Barnett commented on the working atmosphere in the library as well. "I have never seen such a leader who was so well liked by her staff," she said. "Everybody on staff regards Judy as a good friend."

Ms. Barnett went on to note that Ms. Kift had "overseen some very progressive initiatives at the library, especially in the last five years." Ms. Barnett applauded Ms. Kift's approach to the changing dynamics of community "Judy encouraged the libraries. library to move forward with the times and to modernize," she said.

That bonhomie extended onto the board's interactions with the Ms. Kift. "All the board participated," she said of the come-and-go celebration, "right down to the washing of the last dish. It was totally shared by all of the board."

Sandy McGillivray, who was chair of the board when Ms. Kift took on the role of head librarian, recalled her impressive work ethic. "I don't think

she had any training at all when she took it on, other than working with the former librarian," he said. "She took every course she could and was very eager to learn." Mr. McGillivray, who served on the library board for 10 years, said that Ms. Kift was "absolutely marvelous to work with."

Ms. Kift started with the library in 1985, almost by accident. "I was asked to assist Catherine Paisley," she recalled. "The library wasn't open as many days back then, but Catherine was travelling and asked if I would be interested in coming in and spelling

One thing led to another and Ms. Kift became the librarian herself, overseeing a wide range of changes and helping to bring the library into the new millennium.

"We started out with one computer," she said, "now I think we have 13, although some of those are the ones we use for the technology courses and are laptops.'

By 2003 the library left the old card indexes behind to become fully automated and computerized. "It was really a volunteer effort," said Ms. Kift. "There were some staff involved, but we had a large number of volunteers who came in and helped enter the

Ms. Kift's late husband Ed was a huge support to her through the years, she noted. "I called him my mailman," she chuckled. "We used to receive packages of books from the Ontario Library Service that helped supplement our book budget. Ed

would go and collect the packages for me, and deliver back the books we did-

The library has seen a significant change in how it is used, although some things have remained the same down through the years. "There is a bigger emphasis on seniors today," said Ms. Kift. Although the library still has reading sessions for children during the summer months, today the library hosts games clubs, art programs, a knitting club, a bridge club and technology classes for seniors as well as hosting a Community Access Point that provides access to the Internet that may not be available for many low income patrons. It is a true social hub for the community.

The librarian spent much of The Expositor interview extolling the many people she has worked with through the years, the boards she has worked with and the town staff that have been "so very supportive and patient with me." But, at the end of the day, it has been Ms. Kift who has overseen the translation of the NEMI Public Library from a one-room operation to a modern information hub for the community—and this was a day to celebrate her accomplishments and thank her for her many years of diligent and dedicated service.

Ms. Kift's shoes have been proving to be a challenge to fill, but the librarian said she was adamant on sticking to her retirement. "I will still drop by for a cup of tea now and then," she said, "but I am really looking forward to taking part in the activities.'

...continued from page 9 hardly lasted much longer than Mr. Charette's song, clocking in at a very unusual 15 minutes. The speech contained few surprises, promising that the new government will "do different things and to do things differently.'

The first commitment out of the gate was to act quickly to bring in a tax cut for the middle class as the "fair thing to do" and to "provide more direct help to those who need it by giving less to those who do not," specifically through a new Canada Child Benefit, and to increase investments in public transit, green infrastructure and social infrastructure. Among those commitments are an enhanced Canada Pension Plan, a stronger Employment Insurance Plan, more opportunities for youth, especially those from low and middle income families and to work with the provinces to make post-secondary education more affordable. The Throne Speech also committed to developing a new Health

parent government, including electoral reform and reform of the Senate. Specifically, the government has committed that 2015 will be the last to be held under a first past the post system. The government has also promised to not use government ads for partisan political purposes and to avoid the use of omnibus bills to avoid

economy and a strong economy, including putting a price on carbon and greater public input. Decisions, it promises, will be informed by scientific evidence and indigenous peoples will be more fully engaged in reviewing and monitoring major resource development projects.

The Throne Speech also committed to renewing a scrutiny; to pursue a clean nation-to-nation relation-

ship with indigenous peoples—"one based on recognition of rights, respect, co-operation and partnership." The government has committed to work co-operatively to implement the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada and that it will launch an inquiry into missing and murdered indigenous women and girls as well as work with First Nations so that every First Nations child receives a quality education.

Among the other commitments are to welcome 25,000 new Canadians from Syria by February 2016; do more to support veterans

and their families; support the CBC and promote both official languages while investing in Canada's cultural and creative indus-

tries; promote trade agreements; and to build a leaner and more agile military.

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One step closer to peace in education

TORONTO—The Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation (OSSTF/FEESO) announced in a press release on Monday, November 30 that it had reached a tentative agreement with the Government of Ontario and the Council of Trustees' Associations, representing Ontario school boards, at the support staff central bargaining table on Friday, November 27.

The tentative agreement was endorsed and recommended for ratification at a meeting of OSSTF/FEESO local leaders and will be presented to members for ratification at a series of local meetings over the next three weeks. All central strike action by OSSTF/FEESO members is suspended, pending ratification of the agreement.

The terms of the central agreement will not take affect at any school board where a local agreement has not also been reached. Local support staff negotiations are ongoing with a number of school boards across the province.

The OSSTF/FEESO was founded in 1919 and has 60,000 members across Ontario. Those members include public high school teachers, occasional teachers, educational assistants, continuing education teachers and instructors, early childhood educators, psychologists, secretaries, speech-language pathologists, social workers, plant support personnel, university support staff, and many others in education.

Stop up and close

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

"For over 10 years we have been given the run around by the Ministry of Transportation, yet we see how easy it is for our neighbouring towns to implement proper safety measures for their people with the assistance of the ministry," continues the release. "Today, M'Chigeeng First Nation is taking a stand. M'Chigeeng First Nation is tired of the ministry not taking our concerns seriously. The chief and council of M'Chigeeng First Nation will be painting a proper crosswalk at the intersec-

"I promise my future children we will work to make this planet green and keep it that way," said Francesca during speech. "Our world leaders are worried about war. We also need to worry about climate change because it is happening now and it's happening fast. We have to stop it before it gets so bad that we can't do anything about it. I saw this video where it showed how we buy many things we don't need, and soon enough, we lose interest and we throw it away, wasting it. We're consuming and wasting so much, it's destroying our planet. We have to stop letting commercials on products convince us that we need things that we don't. So let's work to make a change, we were only given one earth, so let's make it

"I would like to share my thoughts about the importance of water," said Autumn during her presentation at the conference. "Our water is very important because it brings new life. We see this when babies are born when the water breaks. The reason I'm talking about the water is because our water is getting sick. The people and the factories of the world are making the water sick. If we as Anishinaabe and fellow humans don't do anything now, the sick water will make Mother Earth sick. Imagine a world without water?"

"Our animals would die, our insects would die, our medicines would die, all life as we know it would die," continued Autumn. "This makes me very sad. Some countries have very little clean drinking water. In my own territory there are First Nation families up north that can't drink the water. I have an auntie, Joesphine Mandamin 'Biidasige-kwe,' she prays for the water everyday; she understands the importance of water. The women of the world must continue

to support her, we need to heal the earth, now is the time for the future of humanity following behind us. We have to fight to save the world."

"We also went to a lot of different activities," added Francesca. "We brainstormed a lot with the other kids, talking about how we can prevent climate change. We talked a lot about climate change in our countries and how it is affecting us."

"We talked about how the air is being affected in Espanola and how in Sudbury this summer bears were coming into the city because there was no berries."

The communiqué, or 'Children's Demands,' was written and signed through thumbprints by the 64 children who attended the conference. The document called on

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muniqué. "We like to draw, play football and read books. We like to sing and dance. But now we will fight to save the world. We are kids, and we have to pav for mistakes that we haven't made. You adults are giving us a world in chaos, and we are scared. But our future children should live in a better world than this. So we will fight to save the world! We are kids, we're still young and have a lot to learn. But this is the last chance to save our planet, and we don't have the time to grow up. Our planet is dying This has to end. That's why we're here to tell you adults: act like us kids – and fight to save the world!"

"We are kids, and we like

to play," continues the com-

"The communiqué took all the ideas from our speeches that we gave and combined them," Autumn further explained. "I really hope they listen to what we said and that we made a difference."

"It was a huge honour presenting the minister (Minister Romson) with the communiqué," said Francesca. "There was a lot of media and it was really cool."

In addition to handing it to Ms. Romson to take the document to COP21 in Paris, three children from the conference travelled to Paris to present the document to the world's leaders.

"When talking with the other youth we heard a lot of different concerns," said Autumn. "The ambassadors from Sweden told us that that they were worried about the reindeer and that global warming was thawing the ground and then freezing their food so that they were starving. Our roommates from Paris talked about the pollution to the river that runs through their city. A lot of what the ambassadors said was happening in their countries made me sad. I learned that global warming is affecting all the countries, and many a lot more then ours."

"I am very glad that I was able to attend the conference and I hope our leaders make a change. It's going to take everyone working together to make a change. If the leaders don't listen our world could end and if we ruin our world all the money and gold people are profiting from hurting our Mother Earth will be worthless."

Francesca said that the conference inspired her to be more passionate about climate change and encouraging others to make a change.

Back home on Manitoulin, Autumn and Francesca said they are going to work on keeping her community litter free and keeping the water clean, and encouraging others to do the same.

Northeast Town takes second look at draft 2016 budget

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town council took a second look at the 2016 draft municipal budget, reviewing line items and trying to find savings after learning proposed charges have brought the increase to the levy up 6.13 percent over last year (from the originally proposed 5.35 percent).

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson reviewed with council the changes they recently approved to the budget including a \$2,000 contribution to the Great Lakes Cruising Club, \$5,000 to doctor recruitment (new doctor initiative), \$6,000 to doctor recruitment (support) and \$5,000 to Manitoulin Steams, plus a \$24,000 reduction to the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund's contribution to the municipality. He explained these changes had resulted in a 1.04 percent increase to the levy. There was a silver lining with Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board coming in \$10.913.60 under budget, reducing the total by .27 percent, but the overall changes still resulted in a 6.13 percent increase to the levy over last year.

Councillor Paul Skippen questioned the council's training budget line items and travel expenses, noting that there was still unspent money is this year's budget.

Mr. Williamson responded that the numbers that Councillor Skippen had were only up until September, and that he expected

those line items to come up to the budgeted amount.

Mayor Al MacNevin suggested that this was not an area to cut as councillors had already signed up for training and conferences for 2016, unless they wanted to look at reducing the number of councillors that attend training, which council had already done earlier this year (reducing it to a maximum of three councillors and the mayor)

Councillor Laurie Cook suggested reducing the staff training budget as it also had funds left. Mr. Williamson reiterated that the numbers Councillor Cook were looking at were only up to September and that staff had attended conferences and training events recently that would bring that number up.

Councillor Michael Erskine and Councillor Melissa Peters noted that they did not want to see staff training cut in any way and that they felt staff training and education are important.

Councillor Skippen brought the snowplowing line item to council's attention, suggesting that cuts could be made since the municipality hadn't experienced a big storm

Staff responded that it would only take a few heavy snow falls and or storms for the funds to be used.

Councillor Bruce Woods asked council to look at reducing the leachate management budgeted line item of \$70,000. Mr. Williamson explained that the money would need to be used in 2016 for the development of a plan for the extenuation of the landfill to reduce leachaid.

Councillor Peters was concerned with the Manitoulin East Municipal Airport's seven percent increase to their budget and suggested that the budget be cut by \$2,000.

"I can't support a department looking for a seven percent increase when it generates a surplus every year," said Mr. Peters.

Mr. Williamson explained the reasons behind the increase were the cost of environmental liability insurance and in ground fuel testing.

Council directed staff to go back to the airport manager to review the budget for any savings. Mr. Williamson noted that the manager was "very frugal" and would find savings if he could.

Council questioned the six percent increase to the Little Current Public Library budget.

Mr. Williamson explained that the board expressed that the increase was to help offer a higher wage in order to attract a new head librarian.

Councillor Peters said that doctor recruitment should be funded by the province, but since it wasn't she wanted to see a more detailed budget from the doctor recruitment group next year. Mayor MacNevin agreed.

Councillor Skippen said he felt that the recreation centre's cleaning supplies budget was high. Reid Taylor from public works explained that all the cleaning supplies were billed and came to the recreation centre for the municipality and then were dealt out to the various municipal buildings.

Councillor Erskine noted that the exercise of reviewing the budget line items look for savings was a 'good exercise,' but that "last year we cut the budget down as much as we could and ended up cutting it too much to the bone that now we are looking at a deficit for 2015."

"We may not personally like the (6.13 percent) increase, but unless we look at cutting services I think we have once again cut this back as much as we can," said Councillor Erskine. "I wish the OMPF funding was higher and the hydro cost was down, but they aren't."

"Council needs to think about the budget globally," Mr. Williamson further explained. "We have the lowest tax rate in the area because council has done such a good job, but we are going into our third year looking at a deficit."

"We have 72 people who can't pay their taxes and we are considering a six percent increase over last year," responded Councillor Skippen. "I'm just saying we need to look at saving where we can."

"We are in a situation where we are going to be running a deficit again," continued Councillor Erskine. "I'm not happy putting the municipality more in the hole. We push the line year after year and at some point we will have to just start cutting services if you guys want to cut things any more and I am not comfortable with this. I would rather take the political hit and do the job properly. We also need to keep in mind we have the lowest tax rates in the region."

Mr. Williamson added that if the budget was reduced any further, the municipality would be looking a deficit again for 2016.

Council tabled the discussion for the evening, and scheduled the next budget discussion for Thursday, January 7.

has been no response from the province."

"The safety of pedestrians and motorists is a top priority of the Ministry of Transportation," responded MTO spokesperson Gordan Rennie when contacted by email for comment. "MTO has a team of traffic experts to review concerns and ensure our highways are operating safely in Northeastern Ontario."

Mr. Rennie said that the "MTO has been working closely with a committee from Manitoulin Secondary School to review their request for a school crossing and guide them through the process. We last met with the committee, as well as with municipal and First Nation representatives, on October 28 to outline the process for a school crossing—such as council endorsement, the hiring of a crossing guard, supervisory oversight, police services notification and approval. Once the community has these steps in place, MTO marks the pavement and installs associated signs."

Mr. Rennie went on to write that "the ministry has not received confirmation from the committee or the affected municipalities and First Nation regarding these needed steps. MTO's process is designed to ensure safety. We encourage all involved to follow the official process to ensure the safety of students, pedestrians and motorists. In the meantime, any third-party applied measures do not comply with the Highway Traffic Act and do not have the force of law."

Whether there is "force of law" or not, the community has ordered their own signs and flashing lights to alert drivers of the presence of school children and intends to install them in the near future, stated Chief Debassige.

Mr. Rennie noted that the MTO has "reached out to the First Nation to discuss this matter further, adding that "we welcome the opportunity to work together."

Although Chief Debassige said that she and her fellow councillors were prepared to face arrest, the OPP liaison officer onsite approached the chief to note that the photographs he was taking were meant to be used in a Power-Point presentation to show the work his unit does with First Nations and not as part of any investigation.

The creation of the crosswalk took place peacefully and without incident and children from the local daycare crossed the roadway with Chief Debassige once the paint had fully dried. As of press time Monday, the guerilla crosswalk has remained in place.

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

Little Current refugee committee nears readiness

LITTLE CURRENT—The Little Current Refugee Committee is eagerly awaiting word of the arrival of the Eritrean refugee family they will be sponsoring as part of an Islandwide effort to settle five families in Manitoulin Island communities.

'We were overwhelmed with gratitude for all the donations that we have received," said committee spokesperson Linda Erskine. The committee's Monday night meeting continued to make significant progress, she noted. "We are fairly certain that we have everything we need to set up the Little Current household, we may need one more dresser, and at this point we are going over things to determine if there is anything else that we need."

Volunteers have stepped forward to help put the house in

order and are planning to be cleaning on December 28 to 29, reported Ms. Erskine. "We hope to move furniture in on December 30.

A list of volunteers has been drawn up "according to our expertise and experience" to tackle the tasks ahead, said Ms. Erskine. "We even have volunteers willing to move all the furniture.'

Transportation to Manitoulin from Toronto, where the refugees will eventually land, has been arranged. "The refugees are responsible for their own flights to Canada," pointed out Ms. Erskine. "They will be responsible for paying the Canadian government back for the flights within a

There is another member of the family who may be joining the refugees in a year, noted Ms. Erskine. "She is not a direct member of the family, but they hope she will be eventually able to join them."

On a practical note, Renata, a speaker of the refugee's language from Little Current, assisted the committee members on the pronunciation of the six family members' names and a tentative contingency plan has been drawn up in case the family is to arrive before the house is ready for

"We will have six days' notice before their arrival," said Ms. Erskine. "While we hope that they will not arrive until we have everything in place, we don't want to leave anything to chance."

Other Manitoulin groups are also well advanced in their preparations and will be meeting later this week.

MANITOWANING—"Don't call it a performance," are the cautionary words provided by director John Turner as we sit down to a dinner in the kitchen of the Debajehmujig Creation Centre in Manitowaning, a dinner that was to be followed by a reading of playwright Karen Hines' new play 'Crawlspace.' But reading is certainly an accurate description of the event, as the work is delivered by the author sans stage props (unless that stack of paper qualifies), special lighting or music soundtrack before the small audience of 22 patrons.

For all of what the reading is missing over a full-on performance, 'Crawlspace' the reading turns out to lack little in the way of spellbinding prose as the playwright/actress delivers her monologue in a rapid cadence that kept her dinner guests spellbound and



...continued from page 22 NYC), Word Stage, Factory Theatre, Magnetic North, One Yellow Rabbit and Beme Theatre in Munich," well, you get the picture. This lady has some serious theatre chops. But Ms. Hines is also a two-time finalist for the Governor General's Literary Award for Drama for her trilogy of Pochsy Plays and for 'Drama: Pilot Episode.' The awards list is pretty

But 'Crawlspace' is a new work and it turns out to be a wonderfully

neurotic/chaotic journey narrated by the mind of a marvellously complex individual.

Before the "reading" begins, the staff and crew of Debajehmujig Storytellers bustles about serving dinner to an audience made up of many familiar faces on the Manitoulin theatre scene. Executive Director Ron Berti is among the bustlers, setting plates of food and drink down in front of dinner guests, as is administrative director Joahnna Berti. This is definitely a theatre troupe with a difference.

As the dessert is nibbled away, Ms. Hines takes her place at the front of the room, settling in with a loose-leaf binder full of notes and lines and begins to read her new work.

Not to deliver too much of a spoiler, the message behind this new work is propelled through a medium that would be very familiar to most denizens of any major urban centre, finding and buying a new home. This semi-biographical monologue is a cautionary tale of first buyer angst and the perfidy of big city real estate agents (or maybe more than semi, the author admits her work is "based on a true story" and the gamut of emotions she expresses rings too true in her delivery to be simply an exercise in make-believe storytelling, but then, Ms. Hines really is truly an outstanding storyteller (she is a Second City alum after all), but the message behind the story digs down into the urban fairy tales we are raised to believe in sans query.

The audience is small, very small, barely the aforementioned 22 patrons of the arts, but it is by design, not a box office accident that the number is limited. The close quarters at Debaj will be replicated when the play is actually mounted as a boutique performance in a Toronto art gallery.

The intimate atmosphere of the...reading...can provide a bit of confusion for an audience member, from the very beginning the fourth wall appears to be challenged, or is it? Since the author is 'talking' to the audience, relating her experience to what might be a group of close friends and acquaintances at a cocktail party the normal wall between audience and actress fades into transparency—but there is no breaking of thespian faith here, more like a redefining of the audience/actor relationship into an intimate relationship—not completely unexplored territory, but certainly a different experience than the norm.

Following the "reading" (really, there will be a music score and lighting, particularly in the acid scenes, when the play is actually mounted—have we said too much?) the truth comes out. This really is a reading in the standard meaning of the term, as director John Turner and Ms. Hines

return to settle in front of the audience to get their feedback on the work. The final tuning is taking place, the play itself was mounted in a few short days later in Toronto, and Ms. Hines and Mr. Porter were attentive to the impressions of the audience. Much of the response is laudatory, but there are nuggets of constructive criticism as well, particularly from the older members of the audience.

Should this work return to a full-on performance on Manitoulin Island it would be well worth an evening's

Property owner urges residents to ensure clear title of their properties

LITTLE CURRENT—Edgewater Restaurant owner Chris Loosemore approached the Northeast Town council recently, requesting to purchase a road allowance, a piece of land in front of his property that his Water Street building is encroaching upon that is causing him issues with the refinancing of his building.

Although, council carried a motion for the stop up and closure and sale of the road allowance, Mr. Loosemore warned others to investigate their property and ensure clear title so that they wouldn't have the same problems as him.

"My mother purchased the property in 2003," explained Mr. Loosemore. "At that time the issue of the (building) encroachment (onto town property) was dealt with by the various partners and a mortgage was allowed against the title. In 2007, when it was refinanced with a local development lender, once again the mortgage was allowed to be registered for the purpose of

financing. Again the issue of encroachment was not dealt with and was not an issue at that time."

"In my most recent efforts to refinance the property with a financial lender in Ottawa (Mr. Loosemore stressed that no local lenders were willing to offer reasonable terms) to allow for the repayment back to the local development lender, clear up any past property taxes and any overdue utilities, I encountered the problem with the encroachment. Using a local solicitor, I attempted to INST NO. 60042 have a new mortgage registered, but no lender will now register a mortgage against a property that is not clearly owned by the borrower.'

> Loosemore further ty was originally purchased, it

comprised of a number of separate parts on the survey, one of which was identified as the encroachment of the building over Water Street.

'In order to obtain clear title and thereby obtain any of the required financing, this encroachment area has to be conveyed to me by the town," said Mr. Loosemore.

Mr. Loosemore previously obtain a signed copy of an Encroachment Agreement with the Northeast Town, but the bank would not accept the property as collateral for the mortgage unless the problem was completely cleared up giving him a

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Island women participate in Sudbury climate change rally

SUDBURY—In downtown Sudbury last Sunday, more than 50 people gathered at Memorial Park, part of the growing people's movement to curb the greenhouse gases that are causing global warming. Marches and events like the one in Sudbury took place around the world ahead of the International Climate Conference in Paris which started Monday. Mary Yett and I drove from Manitoulin Island to make our voices heard too. Worldwide 600,000 people in over 2,000 communities participated, calling for an international accord that will bring meaningful action now.

Cathy Orlando, national manager of the Citizens Climate Lobby (CCL), coordinated the Sudbury event, which was also supported by the Council of Canadians Sudbury and the Coalition for a Liveable Sudbury. "We need climate justice—we need to protect our planet," she said. "By 2050 we need to be off fossil fuels."

Ms. Orlando told the gathering that the day's events worldwide had kicked off with 60,000 people marching in Melbourne, Australia. Even in Paris, where the planned march had to be cancelled for security reasons, people still made a statement by placing 10,000 shoes at the Place de a République to symbolize their call for action.

The people gathered in Sudbury were well bundled

up for the chilly weather, which felt like -9°, but the event did not last long. They had made their point by just showing up. Gerry Labelle, also with the CCL, led the Sudbury group in a minute of silence for planet Earth. Later everyone linked arms in a large circle, and sang a song urging Prime Minister Trudeau to resist the tar sands and oil lobbies.

After some group photos, people chatted for a bit before leaving. It was easy to talk because we all shared a deep concern for the environment.

Canadian environmentalists have high hopes that Prime Minister Trudeau will play a constructive role

on the world stage. He already met with the provincial premiers to prepare for the international conference, and invited them and leaders of the opposition parties to attend the Paris talks, setting a tone of cooperation in dealing with this issue.

At the provincial meeting, Alberta's premier Rachel Notley surprised many by announcing a new tax on carbon. Taxing carbon dioxide emissions directly is a simple and straightforward way to reduce emissions, based on the principle that the polluter should pay. If the carbon tax is offset by a corresponding reduction in

income tax or sales tax, then it's not a tax grab, it's just re-designing the tax system. Many environmental groups are advocating this kind of revenue-neu-

tral system to avoid placing an extra tax burden on individuals and families.

Ontario recently announced it will implement a more complicated "cap and trade" system. In this system, the government sets a ceiling or "cap" for carbon emissions for individual companies, and companies that are above their allowed cap have to buy permits to pollute from companies that are below their cap. Ontario will raise revenue by also auctioning off permits.

Despite new measures at the provincial level, Prime Minister Trudeau had to go to the Paris Conference without a greenhouse gas target for Canada.

There is a lot at stake. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change warns that global warming of 2°C above 1990 levels will result in mass mortality of coral reefs, and one-quarter of the world's species being committed to extinction. That kind of damage is nothing less than catastrophic, but if global temperatures rise more than 2°C, the effects will be even worse



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




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Island schools Christmas concert showcases student talent



Every December I pick up a bunch of our Ontario grown cabbages (and then make some sauerkraut) and create wholesome and hearty meals—just what the doctor ordered for typical cold and flu season. The following recipes use this cabbage and sauerkraut and even though this December, with the effects of El Nino being felt across Canada, it is unseasonably warm—they will still hit the spot. (And if you have never made a cake using sauerkraut, now is the time to start)

Cabbage Colcannon-Style

A great way to use up leftover mashed potatoes and trick people into eating cabbage who do not like cabbage

Finely shred a medium head of green cabbage and cook it in a small amount of boiling salted water until just tender crisp. Drain well and press out as much liquid as possible. In a large cast iron frying pan, sauté a chopped medium onion in butter and olive oil until translucent. Add the cabbage and cook, frequently stirring for about 10 mins. Mix 2-3 tablespoons of melted butter with about 2 cups of mashed potatoes and add to the cabbage. Season the mixture well with chopped parsley, salt and freshly ground black pepper. Put in a 350°F oven for 10-15 mins., dotted with more butter and finish under broiler to brown the top just before serving. Grilled sausages are perfect with it.

1950s Sauerkraut Cake

Way back when, sauerkraut was commonly used in cakes. It created a warm and not too sweet cake that was served in squares. Try it you will love it.

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups sugar (I use coconut sugar)
- 2 large eggs 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- 1/2 cup cocoa 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp baking powe
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 cup sauerkraut, rinsed, drained, and roughly chopped
- 1 cup milk

Icing sugar for dusting (optional and I do not use)

Preheat oven to 350°F. In a large bowl beat the butter and sugar until fluffy, beat in the eggs and vanilla.

In a smaller bowl, whisk together the flour, cocoa, bak-

In a smaller bowl, whisk together the flour, cocoa, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Add half to the butter mixture and stir just until combined, stir in the sauerkraut and milk, then the rest of the dry ingredients, mixing until just blended.

Pour into a greased or parchment-lined 9X13 inch pan and bake for 30 minutes or until springy to the touch. Serve warm dusted with icing sugar if you like.

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
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
