Police find weapon likely used in M'Chigeeng fracas

M'CHIGEENG-UCCM Anishinaabe Police officers have recovered a gun that they believe was used on February 2, the day of the shooting incident on M'Chigeeng First Nation that saw two people injured and six more arrested.

Residents were offered an update last week when the UCCM Anishinaabe Police Service announced it had recovered a gun that officers believe was used on the night of the incident. According to Police Chief Rodney Nahwegahbow, UCCM Police does not believe there are any outstanding weapons that have yet to be found.

'On February 5, members of the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service, acting on a search warrant, attended a residence on M'Chigeeng First Nation and seized a firearm that is suspected to be the same one that was used in the shooting incident," stated a press release from UCCM Police.

Residents within the community have speculated that the shooting may have been drug-related. Chief Nahwegahbow

Body found in cabin burned in Green Bush

GREEN BUSH—The Green Bush Road in the Northeast Town was an unaccustomed hive of activity this past week as vehicles from OPP forensic units, an OPP canine unit, Office of the Fire Marshal Emergency Preparedness and Response Units and the NEMI Fire Department were lined up along a laneway off of Green Bush Road and Columbus Mountain Road during an investigation that was cited as "a possible structure fire."

The news quickly turned ominous, however, as by Thursday the OPP released a statement indicat-

ing that "suspected human remains" were found at the site of the fire.

The location of the structure fire was approximately five kilometres beyond the part of the road known as The Steps. Due to the heavy snowfalls that had taken place, getting to the site proved difficult.

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Chief Shining Turtle returned to office in Whitefish River FN election

WHITEFISH RIVER FIRST NATION—Incumbent Chief Shining Turtle (Franklin Paibomsai) was returned to office with a convincing plurality in the first band election under the new Whitefish River First Nation custom election code, garnering 181 votes, with 20 coming from mail-in ballots, 72 being cast electronically and 89 in person at the Whitefish River First Nation Community Centre.

"We are extremely proud to have community support for our four-year term for chief and council," said Ogimaa Shining Turtle. "This new term allows for a sustained and measured effort to achieve the goals and objectives for our community. We will show sustained progress over this term. We are very pleased to have provided the electronic voting to our members. We had 138 citizens use the online voting and this is just the beginning of a new era of voting for our citizens. I feel that with the technological advancements that there will be much more availability to electronic voting coming for us. This is good news for sure." This will be Ogimaa Shining Turtle's ninth term as chief, having first been elected to the post in 2002.

As for his re-election as chief

and his views on the next four years, Ogimaa Shining Turtle said, "I am extremely humbled by this opportunity to keep moving our community forward. What is the next four years going to look like? Four years of opportunity!"

Joining Ogimaa Shining Turtle around the council table are seven councillors: Esther Osche with 189 votes, Dave Shawanda with 168 votes, Cara (Caralyn) McGregor with 151 votes, Leona Nahwegahbow with 141 votes, Todd McGregor with 131 votes, Brian McGregor with 130 votes and Francis Eugene McGregor with 126 votes.

The new chief and council will serve for the next four years as the terms for council were increased under the custom election code from the former two year terms.

Results for the other candidates for chief were: Carianne L. Agawa, 27 votes: 11 by mail-in, eight by electronic ballot and eight in-person; Rose Jacko, 124 votes: six by mail-in, 44 by electronic vote and 74 in-person; Donald McGregor, 91 votes: 11 by mail-in, 21 by electronic vote and 59 in person. There were two spoiled ballots among those for chief

SUDBURY—Manitoulin-raised Kyle Chandler will soon be on his way to the Canadian Police Curling Association (CPCA)'s national championship in St. John's this March and April alongside police colleagues from Sault Ste. Marie and Timmins.

"I'm very confident about our team. Our skip Charlie Roberts has been to the mixed nationals at least two times in the last couple of years and is very good. Our second Steve Muenier is going to the nationals this year. Our team is made up of curlers who have been very successful competitively," says Mr. Chandler, who is the vice on his team and a constable with Greater Sudbury Police Service's Tactical Unit.

Constable Tony Chilton of the Timmins Police Service is the team's lead. Mr. Muenier is a sergeant with the South Porcupine OPP detachment and Mr. Roberts is a constable with the Sault Ste. Marie OPP detachment.

"We all get along well and are good friends. We didn't just choose anybody. The camaraderie is there and we all

respect each other. That's why I'm curling with people from different departments from different ends of the province; we have a lot of fun," says Mr. Chandler.

He adds that he has competed with this rink in the CPCA for two years. Last year, they had made it to the provincial finals but lost in the end.

Mr. Chandler is not the only Islander who has been participating in competitive curling events this year, nor is he the only competitive curler in his family. His brother Jordan has recently returned from the Northern Ontario Curling Association (NOCA) men's provincials in Nipigon where his rink finished tied for sixth place.

"I curled with my brother (Jordan) for many years, but I was a couple years into my police career and found it too much for my schedule," Mr. Chandler says.

At a bonspiel in Sault Ste. Marie that the brothers attended, Mr. Chandler says he met Mr. Roberts who was competing for another rink.

tle. "What that means is our operators care about water and are proud of the work that they do." The chief noted that the community is also very proud of their staff and the work they do.

Standing watch over the community's drinking water supply is a responsibility Mr. Shawanda has never taken lightly. In fact, when he first stepped into the job, the Walkerton water disaster was all over the news and he wasn't at all sure he wanted to take on that role

But he found security in doing things strictly by the book and keeping his credentials well up to speed. He said he was very aware of the importance of ensuring safe water to the community that he serves.

The Water Challenge Cup competition panel consists of four anonymous judges who judge the competitors on a series of exercises. "We had a lot of different things we had to do," said Mr. Shawanda.

SNC-Lavalin a case of damned if you do, damned if you don't

There has been a great deal of media attention focussed on the question of whether former Attorney General and Justice Minister Jody Wilson-Raybould was pressured to intervene in the prosecution of Quebec-based engineering company SNC-Lavalin by the Prime Minister's Office (PMO).

The corporation is currently facing charges of fraud and corruption in connection with payments of nearly \$48 million made to public officials in Libya under Muammar Gaddafi's government, allegedly bribing its way into winning contracts, along with allegations the corporation defrauded Libyan organizations of an estimated \$130 million.

The Globe and Mail broke the story that an unnamed government insider made the claim that Ms. Wilson-Raybould was being pressured and there has been plenty of speculation that her shuffle from that portfolio to Veterans' Affairs was punishment for not playing ball with the PMO.

SNC-Lavalin is a major employer in Quebec and if it should be found guilty in a criminal case the company, and its workers, would be locked out of bidding on any government contracts both domestically, and by extension internationally. The result would inevitably lead to the company declaring bankruptcy and, by extension, end up with massive layoffs in that province. A decidedly unpalatable result for Quebec and the Canadian economy by anyone's measure.

There is in place a mechanism by which the company, which has since replaced the offending personnel, could dodge the guilty verdict and be able to continue doing business by admitting guilt and paying an indemnity. This is the gist of the conversations that the PMO has readily admitted took place.

That is not to say that such conversations should not be closely watched and that whatever result comes out of those discussions as a policy decision vetted and judged by the Canadian electorate—they should. But in the increasingly hyper partisan world we find ourselves in during these post-Trumpian days, the truth is a casualty of

less than friendly fire from all sides

The opposition parties will attempt to make hay out of the issue, with increasing volume and righteous rage, right up until polling day. Nevermind that Conservative leader Andrew Scheer had his own conversations with SNC-Lavalin executives about the case.

What is perhaps almost as disturbing as window opening into the world of Realpolitik where corporations are deemed to crucial to the economy to fail just because of some off-shore skullduggery in obtaining foreign contracts, is the Conservative leader's assertions that SNC-Lavalin are Liberal supporters. Mr. Scheer knows, or certainly ought to know, that corporations are not allowed to provide donations to political parties in this country. That Mr. Scheer appears to be unaware of this fact could call into question how his own party raises funds

Right now the PMO is being accused of trying to save thousands of jobs in Quebec by using a legal remedy that is available in many other countries where such underhand jockeying for contracts take place in foreign lands.

Is this a case of being damned if you do and damned if you don't? It would be a terrible dereliction of duty if the federal government did not use every legal means at its disposal to save the jobs of thousands of innocent Quebecers. Even if it does mean holding its nose.

The situation dovetails nicely into a perfect political scandal since the ongoing nature of the case will likely mean that releasing the former attorney general from her attorney-client muzzle is not going to happen any time soon. But should it turn out that when Ms. Wilson-Raybould is unfettered from her shackles and should she then confirm the position taken by the prime minister and his office that the only discussions that took place were both above board and in the best interests of the country, Mr. Scheer and NDP leader Jagmeet Singh will come out much the worse for wear on the credibility front.

Sadly, with the current state of credibility in politics, this should not prove to be any real hindrance come the next federal election.

Why do First Nations defer to the federal government to govern?

Expose the moose in the living room

To the Expositor:

There is an addenda to the Serenity Prayer. It goes, "...grant me the courage to change the things I cannot accept." The addenda appeared in connection with the Idle No More movement several years ago. The movement is still alive and well, but has taken on different manifestations.

There is also another powerful phrase which was spoken after World War II: "never again." Both of these phrases speak to changing things that are not acceptable, but also to speaking up when one sees things that need change. On local fronts, "never again" can refer to speaking up when injustices are perpetrated on vulnerable people. It's called bystander intervention. Or, if referring to the Seven Grandfather Teachings, it's called speaking the truth, exercising honesty and exhibiting courage.

On the international front, changing things that one cannot accept can refer to helping those less fortunate as they leave their home countries in search of better lives. Oh sure, walls can be built to keep the less fortunate out. But walls can be climbed over, burrowed under, busted through, or gone around. Better yet, why not those who can speak up for the less fortunate demand that they be given asylum or refugee status and bring them in to countries which are experiencing labour shortages? Or why not organize ships to bring them up the coasts to the land of eagles? Interesting that the ones squawking the loudest about walls are descendants of refugees to the Americas.

It's election time at Whitefish River First Nation again. But here's something to consider. If people say they are self-determining, or they say that they are a 'First Nation,' why is it that a First Nation has to have the approval of the federal government before they can "govern" via band councils? Doesn't that defeat the whole purpose of being self-governing? It's kind of ridiculous to need the approval of a foreign government before a "nation" can exercise the sovereignty that they say they never gave up via the treaties. There are always democratic solu-

tions. If one does not like the current leadership, vote them out. If they don't get voted out, then there is always the prospect of organizing another "band" or community, or "nation."

Here's another one that kind of boggles the mind. There was much ado recently about a court decision in favour of status Indians of the Robinson-Huron treaty. The issue was a badly outdated annuity payment of \$4 per year per Indian in exchange for the vast territory making up the Robinson Huron area and the resources that were extracted therefrom. Of course, the province of Ontario immediately appealed that decision–no surprise there given that Ontario is led by Doug Ford. But here's what no one clued in to. First of all, Canada consists in 9,985,000 square kilometres of land. When the British treaty commissioners were negotiating with the Indians for the land covered by the Robinson Huron treaty in Northern Ontario, they realized that they could not afford to pay the principal price of the land. So they looked at interest on the principal. The commissioners realized that they could not afford the interest on the principal, either. So someone came up with the brainwave of "let's only pay the interest on the interest," in other words, an annuity-in-perpetuity, hence the \$4 a year. What the case should have been about was what amount of GDP came out of Robinson Huron treaty lands since 1850, and what amount that would be today with compound annual interest. What the case should have been about is the value of the land taken by a foreign government, and the principal and interest owing to descendants of the Robinson Huron

Dear Central Manitoulin council:

Sometimes when you have too many young, inexperienced councillors on board the result can be damaging for a municipality. It's wonderful to have them accepting this responsibility, but they need to slow down and contemplate what has happened in the past for a particular building or item that affects the people of those towns. In this case, Providence Bay and Spring Bay.

For these twin cities, going back as far as 1948, gathering enough money to fund building an arena was an enormous task. They canvassed each family in town and at farms all over the area. In 1950, after selling debentures, putting on fall suppers, euchre parties and fun days with \$10 donations from all families, they got it built. A number of years ago both Prov and Mindemoya arenas were condemned. Moe Keller held a meeting in the Mindemoya Hall and said, "they are of no use the way they are, so we are going to put steel framing in," and it happened. They were again opened.

ened. They were again opened. Since then, with the artificial ice in the Prov arena it has had a new roof, new boards and glass professionally done, new hydro-saving lights, a new ceiling barrier to stop ice bumps and keep the cold in, the refrigeration unit has been revamped with a lot of new equipment and now we have a new ice resurfacer. And now you're thinking to close this beautiful structure? It was built in memory of our veterans, it houses a very large agricultural fair, it's open for the Bluegrass in the Country, it's open for weddings, it's open for the Ride Manitoulin motorcycle rally, it's open for hockey and skating, it's open for the summer program for children and it's open for two large hockey tournaments. These two towns of Prov and Spring Bay don't have much to offer our residents, but we do have a beautiful arena.

You want a sports complex? Better check the extreme cost of these buildings. It's enormous. And after 20 years of use, rejuvenating them is out of reach in terms of cost.

February ice storm damaging to Manitoulin residents and the environment

MANITOULIN—Rain on snow events in mid-winter are always a source of concern for residents of Manitoulin Island, live-stock, wildlife and the environment. The storm during the night of Thursday, February 7 was particularly harsh as it turned the entire Island into a giant skating rink and hillsides that looked like luge runs at an Olympic site.

The storm resulted in one cm of ice forming on the surface of about 100 cm of snow from Manitoulin to Sudbury where we began our perilous trip to Mindemoya at around noon the next day. Like everyone on Manitoulin, getting out of our Sudbury driveway and onto roads that had yet to receive sand or salt was a major challenge. Our plan was to visit Manitoulin to photograph the ice fishing derby and winter sports.

Thankfully, the roads from Sudbury to Manitoulin were mostly ice-free but one dare not step out of your car in a parking lot once onto the Island without taking extreme caution. We waited until noon on Saturday to visit Lake Manitou and Manitowaning Bay to watch the fishers, but if it was not for tracks made by snowmobiles, we could not have walked onto the lakes.

Over the two days we drove from Mindemoya to Manitowaning, Providence Bay, Gore Bay and Kagawong, venturing down side roads where we were amazed that our Grand Caravan remained firmly on track. However, it was an eerie feeling seeing fields free of footprints and realizing that deer were unable to walk on the surface without breaking through the ice crust and damaging their legs.

There were no signs of deer along the boardwalk at Providence Bay and few footprints at the sites we usually see deer in Gore Bay.

As reported in the February 6 issue of The Expositor, deer on Manitoulin were already in trouble this winter before the rain event. Deer Save has been calling on volunteers to cut trails around feeding grounds with snowmobiles, but with the ice storm, the need for more trails and compacted deer yards with feed is even more important.

Unfortunately, the layer of ice will have an impact on more than deer, cattle and people. Small mammals such as voles and mice that remain active throughout the winter under the snow will have their lives

altered

Shrews, voles and mice live in a space under the snow where the temperature remains near 0°C throughout the winter, there is abundant food, and they are protected to some degree from predators. This space is called the subnivean environment and small mammals, insects and spiders are able to move about in relative comfort regardless of the temperature above the snow.

Oxygen and carbon dioxide freely passes through the snowpack but with the formation of an ice layer, an exchange of gases will be impeded, to the peril of subnivean animals. Plants that continue to photosyn-

thesize in the subnivean environment throughout the winter will also suffer from the ice barrier.

Mice and voles often tunnel to the surface to disperse to new feeding sites, but will be unable to penetrate the ice layer. This in turn has implications for foxes and owls that feed on mice and voles.

The high insulative nature of snow is also used by grouse that dive into the snow pack on cold nights making a kind of quinzhee (a shelter made by digging a cavity in a mound of settled snow). Grouse will not be able to penetrate ice one cm thick and will likely be severely damaged when they attempt to do so.

Rain on snow events have occurred on Manitoulin Island in the past; however, the event on February 7 appeared to be more severe, widespread and damaging than usual.

A 2015 report on the impact of climate change on the Great Lakes Basin, prepared by the Ontario Climate Consortium and Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, predicted an increased intensity of winter rain and snow. Hopefully future rain events in the winter will be accompanied by warmer temperatures and thick layers of ice as we just witnessed will be avoided.

Even the helpers are sick too, I have been around that, I just did not hang around in this community for I got much wiser about life. Now they are suing the government for this and to me it's not abuse, but the abuse came from the First Nations people. It's still happening today.

I listened to the teachers, they were very nice and treated

me well. I remember getting punished during my school years, I think it only happened two or three times during that time because that's the way of life. Eating less readymade food and more home cooked meals, putting in a garden and a stock of water and non-perishable food items, and considering the purchase of a backup generator and a wood stove, are all reasonable considerations.

I am especially inspired by the challenge that the North Bay couple have embraced, as described in the 'Big Wild Year Notebook – Part I of a series' by Warren Schlote. All the best to Delphanie Colyer and her partner Jeremy St. Onge for embarking on a year of eating only food they either hunt or forage. I am looking forward to following their adventure. As a retired construction contractor, this parallels my own ambition to build an "earth house" and an "earth greenhouse," also called a Walipini. (The low tech Walipini was originally developed by the South American Aymara people of Bolivia and Chile, which they claim helped them survive the last ice age by being able to grow vegetables all year round.)

Endless debate in the media has not slowed corporate lobbyists from stepping up their program to confuse the populace with misleading authoritative studies and flooding the media with self-important pundits attempting to justify a denial of the reality of climate change. Tehkummah Council Notes

February 5, 2019

Opening motions

Council moved to approve the agenda as presented and Reeve David Jaggard asked if there were any questions concerning the meeting's schedule. Terry Willemsvandyk, a member of the public, interjected with a question of why there had been nothing posted on the website about this meeting, other than the document outlining the meeting dates for the month of February. Acting Deputy Clerk-Treasurer Barbara Grigg responded that she had forgotten to post the notice, an action that is required per section 6.1 (a) of the township's procedure bylaw.

Councillor Michael McKenzie requested that the budget discussion be deferred to the following week since Acting Clerk-Treasurer Roy Hardy was unable to attend the meeting and present his budget notes. The agenda was updated accordingly.

Public participation

Tehkummah resident Andy Bowerman raised concerns about backtracking and timeliness in snowplow operations. He said the township could better streamline its operations to save time and money by not backtracking along its routes.

"We've lived there 30 years and this is the first time that we've had to wait until 1 o'clock in the afternoon to get out, so I don't think it's very fair," added Linda Bowerman.

Reeve Jaggard introduced new roads superintendent Kevin Dunlop and said that Mr. Dunlop would be working to improve organization and efficiency. Mr. Dunlop's hiring was approved by council resolution later in the meeting.

"I'm sure that Kevin, having heard this, will know how to deal with that and the issue of backtracking," Mr. Jaggard said. **Membership fee**

payments

Council voted to pay membership fees for the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Municipal Finance Offi-Association of Ontario (MFOA), Municipal World magazine, Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) Association of Municipal Managers, Clerks and Treasurers (AMCTO) and the Manitoulin and North Shore Road Supervisors Association out of the operating budget.

Water and sewer rates for 2019

Council moved to issue water and sewer rates for the first quarter of 2019 at the same rate as the last quarter of 2018, with future adjustments to be made to the remaining three quarters' bills when the 2019 rates had been set.

OCWA expenditure and approval, fire truck budget request

Council received a notice from the Ontario Clean Water Agency that the chlorine analyzer at the South Baymouth water treatment plant, according to the report, is showing signs of beginning to fail.

The total cost to replace the analyzer is \$5,927.19, of which \$4,565.04 is required for the part and \$585 is required for labour. There is also a "non-claimable tax expense" of 1.76 percent, worth \$80.34, and an administrative fee of 15 percent, worth \$696.81.

Councillor McKenzie asked what the administrative fee was for. Reeve Jaggard and Ms. Grigg were unsure of the purpose of the fee.

"I don't pay bills without knowing what they are," said Councillor McKenzie. Tehkummah Fire Chief Wilson requested \$60,000 be set aside in the budget, sourced from reserves, to try to purchase a new tanker-pumper truck. This is to be the maximum allowable expense and the truck

might not end up costing that much.

Council deferred both motions until the next meeting, pending more information.

January 15, 2019

Cost analysis report and budget update

Mr. Hardy presented an interim cost centre analysis for the unaudited 2018 budget figures.

He stated the biggest negative costs from 2018 were from legal and audit expenses, stemming from staffing issues, and the outstanding litigation surrounding the Government Road bridge which totalled \$175,000 in 2018. Legal and audit costs will be managed in the future through staff training on the accounting system and on

pre-audit procedures, as well as developing new finance and administration policies.

Taxation revenues were up, partly because of an increase in overdue tax collection, including federal payments from its seized properties.

Tehkummah will be replacing its full-time clerk-treasurer position with a part-time clerkadministrator position on contract until council makes further staffing model decisions.

Mr. Hardy noted that there was no spending on emergency management in 2018, "which should be a cause for concern.'

Landfill operating costs in 2018 totalled roughly \$75,000, with an additional \$15,000 in staffing. Its revenue was only \$3,000. Mr. Hardy suggested a higher tipping rate or a landfill charge to township residents to offset the costs. He added "a capita/room/passenger

charge of \$50 would offset these costs on the tax bill."

Mr. Hardy also offered a preliminary budget update for 2019. Some highlighted amounts included supplementary notes at the end, such as the cost to replace the office photocopier, replacing weatherstripping on doors at the municipal garage and a budget for a nearly-new pickup for township operations.


To pass the 2019 budget as proposed, Tehkummah would need to bring in a 15 percent higher tax levy than 2018. Assessment values increased by six percent, so in order to deliver the budget as-proposed,

taxes would need to raise by nine percent. Mr. Hardy reminded council that the draft was intended as an all-in figure that would show how much certain initiatives would cost, and council could then determine what was worthy of keeping in the final approved version. Every \$11,000 worth of spending in the budget reflects a one percent tax increase.

Assiginack joint committee

Assiginack has requested a member of council work with them on the issue of replacing the jointly-owned Rogers Creek bridge. Mr. Hardy suggested they could also discuss other concerns and potential opportunities through the committee. He

Mustangs girls make history with a perfect season

Boys' and girls' teams getting ready for playoffs

M'CHIGEENG—The Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) Mustangs girls' hockey team has made Island history—last week, they played their final game of the season against Espanola and finished with a 6-0 win. For them, 2019 was not simply a good year.

It was a perfect season.

"They tried to act real cool, but I hope and think they understand what they accomplished was something special. He added that they adjusted their defence as well based on the strong Espanola players who could run the puck down the length of the rink.

"Our defence stayed together and stayed back, forced their players to go wide and put them at a disadvantage. They had bad angles for their shots," said Mr. Meeker.

At the beginning of this week, the girls headed to Toronto to play in a tournament. When The Expositor spoke with Mr. Meeker last week before the trip, he said the girls would likely be looking forward to the games equally as much as they'd enjoy shopping and hanging out in the Big Smoke.

"I think they're going to stack up really well. That's another positive about this team. The better the team we're playing, the better they play generally. They step up their game," Mr. Meeker said.

Ontario government announces review of Species at Risk

TORONTO—The Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks has announced plans to review the province's Endangered Species Act.

The government is ensuring stringent protections for species at risk, while continuing to work with conservation organizations, businesses, Indigenous communities and the public to improve the effectiveness of the program. As a first step, the province is undertaking a review of the Endangered Species Act, notes a government release.

"As part of the commitments contained within our made-in-Ontario environment plan, we are consulting to improve the effectiveness of our environmental protections to ensure a balanced approach between a healthy environment and a healthy economy," said Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks Rod Phillips. "During the past decade of implementing the act, we have heard what works well and what can be improved."

According to the provincial government, the review will look at ways to ensure "positive outcomes" for at-risk species, increase "efficiencies in service delivery" and streamline approval processes, all while maintaining an "effective government oversight role."

As part of the review, a discussion paper has been posted on the Environmental Registry for a 45-day consultation period inviting the public, Indigenous communities and groups, conservation organizations and businesses to comment on how the province can "achieve positive outcomes for species at risk while reducing burden and increasing efficiencies for businesses."

The focus of the review and the discussion paper will be on: enhancing the government's ability to enforce regulations under the Endangered Species Act; ensuring that species assessments for the Species at Risk in Ontario List are based on current science; streamlining related approvals and processes; maintaining effective government oversight; and increasing transparency around the process for listing species on the Species at Risk in Ontario

In making the announcement, Mr. Phillips said the province was "reaffirming our commitment to the Endangered Species Act is part of the government's made-in-Ontario environment plan to protect our air, land and water, prevent and reduce litter and waste, support Ontarians to continue to do their share to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and help communities and families increase their resilience to climate change. The plan will help protect the Ontario we know and love, ensuring that its pristine beauties and strong communities can be enjoyed now

Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were requested to check on the well-being of a male at a residence in the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands," notes an OPP release. "Officers were unable to reach the location due to inclement weather and remote location."

On February 5 the Manitoulin OPP, with the assistance of the Ministry of

Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) and the OPP North East Region Emergency Response Team (ERT), located a burned structure hidden under the deep snow. By February 6, with the assistance of the North East Region Canine Unit (K9), suspected human remains were located inside the structure.

The investigation is continuing by members of the Manitoulin OPP Detachment, Manitoulin OPP Crime Unit and OPP Forensic Identification Services (FIS) working in conjunction with the Office of the Chief Coroner and the Office of the Ontario Fire Marshal.

The intensity of the structure fire and the condition of the remains have made positive identification challenging and the identity of the individual the OPP had been requested to check in on has also not been released.

...continued from page 1 declined to comment on those rumours.

"Because it's an ongoing investigation, we cannot discuss (possible motives). We're still doing interviews," Police Chief Nahwegahbow told The Expositor Friday afternoon.

As of Monday, the two female suspects had been released on bail with their next court date set for February 20. A male youth's bail was being reviewed as of Monday. The adult male suspect is due in court on May 20.

The press release also extended the police force's thanks to members of the public who had provided information that led to their recovery of the weapon and the initial arrests.

"We are actively seeking the public's assistance on anything that may be relevant to the investigation," said Police Chief Nahwegahbow.

"As we learn more, we

will keep (the public) apprised. The public wants to know, and we want people to keep focused on what the truth is."

The First Nation has begun to heal from the shooting that rocked the community at the beginning of the month. Last Thursday, February 7, M'Chigeeng held a community meeting at the M'Chigeeng Community Complex that included an information session about the shooting incident.

UCCM Police were scheduled to attend the meeting to listen to the concerns of band members regarding "the policing issues," along with the chief and council and senior band management

"This meeting is to allow for a safe space for our membership to debrief, make recommendations and voice concerns," stated a poster advertising the meeting.


Police Chief Nahwegahbow said he was unclear about the meaning of a "policing issue" and said he expected that might mean discussions about areas that could be improved upon in the future.

"Whenever a community goes through a situation like this there's always lessons to be learned and ways we could improve our service delivery," Police Chief Nahwegahbow said, adding improved communication would likely be a concern for residents.

"We couldn't go into the neighbourhood and notify residents because it was an active situation. The fact (residents) weren't contacted at the time may have been an issue that would be raised to us," he said.

The following day, the First Nation held a separate meeting for community elders to "debrief, make recommendations and voice concerns," such as with the above-mentioned "policing issues."


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



Couple soon will be celebrating their 70th anniversary

LITTLE CURRENT—This Valentine's Day will mark barely a month until Little Current's Pee Wee and Ting Oliver celebrate their 70th wedding anniversary on March 15. (That's Wilbert and Dorothy Oliver actually, but you would be pressed to find someone who uses those names.) The couple will also be celebrating both their birthdays in February, Mr. Oliver will be 89 and his wife a year younger.

"We first met at school," recalls Mr. Oliver. But it was his love of construction work and ice skating that helped cement the burgeoning friendship that would go on to fuel seven decades of marital bliss.

"Her father was building a house across the street from where my parents lived in Sault Ste. Marie," said Mr. Oliver, who was 12 at the time. "I would go over there to watch and learn what I could about building, and there was this girl sitting on a pile of lumber." As you probably have guessed, that girl was Ting. Mr. Oliver was soon helping out with the building project.

"You were always helping my dad, but you were very young," said Ms. Oliver. "He was also my paperboy."

In fact, Mr. Oliver did have a paper route at the time and he soon found himself spending some of his hard-earned wages on chocolate bars that he gave to Ting. "That was what won her over, the chocolate," laughed Mr. Oliver. "She was probably fascinated with the chocolate bars I would buy her." Ms. Oliver smiles, but doesn't correct that speculation.

"We went together for about five years, I guess," said Mr. Oliver. "Ever since we were young," interjects Ms. Oliver. "I think it was me who set my sights on her first," said

At 16, Mr. Oliver left school and went to work as an iron worker at the Algoma Steel Mill in Sault Ste. Marie but even though the money was welcome, that job did-

n't hold much of a grip on the young Mr. Oliver. The war and a recovering domestic market made it easy for young men to find

work. Ms. Oliver was working cash at a local store called Pinche's as she grew up. "Later I worked the floor at Kresge's until I got married," she said.

"She was nice, polite and fun to be with," recalled Mr. Oliver of the woman who was to become the love of his life. "We seemed to hit it off."

Mr. Oliver played football, hockey and baseball in Sault Ste. Marie. At Sault Collegiate, he played third base on the ball team. He played hockey for the Sault Redmen in the Jr. A league and the Buckley Cubs. This was the team that later morphed into the Sault Greyhounds.

Ms. Oliver shared a love of skating with Mr. Oliver (in her case, figure skating) and she practiced at a nearby pond were Mr. Oliver would join her. The couple attended dances at the Steelworker's Hall, burning up the floor with the Jitterbug and the twist.

The couple were married on March 15, 1949 at the Salvation Army Headquarters in Sault Ste. Marie and the reception with 25 guests was held at Ting's parents' home. "There was no snow left and the sunshine warmed the wedding party," she recalled.

Mr. Oliver almost arrived late for the wedding, as he had been playing center for the Sault Redmen in Sudbury. Since train connections were not to be had, the team left Sudbury on what were then some "pretty bad roads." He ended up getting lost on the way.

"We were pressed for time to get back before the wedding. To top it off, we got lost but thankfully, made it back late that evening before the wedding,"

chuckled Mr. Oliver.

There wasn't time for a honeymoon as Mr. Oliver had to return to work (and of course hockey), but three months later the couple were able to get some time off and decided to visit Manitoulin.

"Pee Wee spent three of our six days playing hockey in Sudbury," laughed Ms. Oliver. "The remaining three days we spent on Manitoulin." When Ms. Oliver's father decided to move back to Manitoulin to start a construction business, the stars began to align.

The couple originally moved to Evansville, where they lived until 1962, and Mr. Oliver played hockey in the winter for the Gore Bay Senior League squad and baseball in the summer.

In 1962 the couple moved moved to Little Current where Mr. Oliver built the house they currently live in. The work was done mostly on weekends, but occasionally some evenings were available as well.

"I had used Rowe's boarding house in Little Current from time to time but it made sense to move closer to where most of the work was," said Mr. Oliver. Gore Bay's loss was Little Current's gain. "There was quite a rivalry," recalled Mr. Oliver, "between Gore Bay, Little Current and Wiky." For Ms. Oliver, the draw was curling. Mr. Oliver began to be a part of the Little Current senior hockey league team, going on to coach the Rolston's Senior team.

The couple raised four children, Roger (who sadly passed at age 48 from a heart condition), Darlene, Michael and Wanda. Together they now have nine grandchildren, 12 great grandchildren and four great great grandchildren.

"We love them all," said Ms. Oliver. "I'm Ma-Ting and he is Pa-Pee Wee."

As to the secrets of a long and happy marriage? "Well, it's been a lot of hard work but we have had a good life," said Mr. Oliver. "It's keeping the family together by doing as much as possible with them," added Ms. Oliver.

"I raised the children," said Ms. Oliver, "but now he does the cooking."

Last June, Lakeview held a robotics day and invited Mr. Mara's robotics team and their award-winning "Biaabco Niimoosh" robot to speak with the students. The event also included the Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) Manitoulin Metal team, headed by

Alan Davy.

After some information sessions, the Lakeview team decided to enroll in the FIRST Lego League (FLL), a division of FIRST Robotics Canada. All rookie teams receive at least \$500 in grant funding, but the Lakeview School team qualified for \$1,500. This covered the league registration cost, Lego bricks, a mat on which they could conduct their missions, registration for the Sudbury FLL qualifying tournament and other expenses like travel and team

School custodian Adam Roy took the standardized specifications of an FLL competition table and built a custom surface for the team's robots.

The robotics competition was first offered to the 14 girls in Grades 5 and 6. Eventually, this was brought down to a core team of six members: Scarlett Shogga, Harmony Panamick-Shawana,

Aspen Debassige, Mya Debassige, Mia Manitowabi-Armstrong and Gnaajiwi Migwans. Their two coaches were Ms. Glasby-Debassige Connie Freeman.

Their team name? M'Chigeeng Kwesensag #42176, which roughly translates M'Chigeeng Girls. The number is assigned as part of the registration process.





the teams had to identify a human physical or social problem faced during longterm space exploration within the solar system, as well as a proposed solution.

In addition to considering the three aspects of the FLL program, M'Chigeeng Kwesensag #42176 also incorporated the Seven Grandfather Teachings in their work. The issue they chose to tackle was the possibility of depression due to space's isolation.

"We wrote down a list of things that we thought were interesting and we wanted to do, and got down to the final two which was low reflexes and depression. Then, we just voted and picked depression," Mya

Their solution came from Ms. Freeman's therapy dog Bear that she brings into Lakeview School for the students. They decided that, rather than taking a real dog into space, they could explore a virtual reality simulation that mimicked the companionship of a real dog. Their project soon had a name-Astro-Bear—and they completed their model and got ready for the Science North Sudbury tournament.

At the tournament, the girls had to present their five-minute project overview, a four-minute robot design executive summary and take part in a task that would demonstrate the FLL core values and the Seven Grandfather Teach-

For the second half of the day, they took part in four robot matches of two minutes and 30 seconds each, where they tried to complete as many of the 15 missions as possible with their robot, named RoboBear.

During the closing ceremony, M'Chigeeng Kwesensag #42176 got the news they had been hoping to hear: they were ranked in the top three and were one of the 40 Ontario teams that would be advancing to the provincial championship this past weekend in Waterloo.

For this bigger competition, the team received an even larger grant from FIRST Robotics Canada that covered the registration cost and travel and accommodations for the girls. There was some money left over, so a few of the parents made the trip down to cheer on their

"There were a lot more people there. It was a lot more noisy and it's scarier," said Mya.

However, Ms. Kaiser said the initial jitters did not remain present for very long.

"It was really upbeat. They had music playing, things to do and the flow kept going. Nothing was at a standstill," she said, adding that the FIRST principle of gracious professionalism was on dis-

"The kids were racing to beat the clock, not to beat a

team on the other table. Everybody was happy for everyone else."

This competition followed much the same format as the Sudbury regional. There were 15 missions to complete using the robots, along with a presentation component.

It was a hard-fought effort, but the girls team ended up leaving the competition with a judge's award.

"During the course of competition, the judges encounter teams whose unique efforts, performance or dynamics merit recognition," states the description of the judge's

awards on the FLL website. The team specifically won the 'Rising Star' award, which recognizes "a team that the judges notice and expect great things from in the future.

"We all jumped up and

screamed and ran to get the award," said Mya.

Ms. Kaiser said the opportunity to compete was significant.

"To compete at that level, it's a big deal for them, even just for the respect they have for one another and the teamwork they put into it," she said. "We were all proud of them from the beginning, sticking through it every day, during recess, after school and

snow days. We're so proud they made it as far as they did!"

If their initial thoughts are any indication, some of the girls in the competition have found a new passion and activity to which they might dedicate the rest of their lives.

Mya said this experience was a lot of fun and that she hopes to explore a career in automotive engineering.

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

"Wow! What a weekend," said an enthusiastic Luke Wassegijig, manager at Wikwemikong Tourism. "There were tons of fish caught."

And they called it puppy love

t this time of year, we can all use and give extra love. Perhaps at this moment you are thinking of buying someone flowers or chocolate (yes please!) or thinking of making a delightful meal. May I gently suggest a variation on that theme and direct your thoughts to one who would want to be your valentine fur-ever. Yup, our four legged friends. So here are some suggestions to show and give love to these creatures who give out this emotion constantly and unconditionally.

No 1. Time. As with anyone in your life, your presence is a present, and it means that much more to a canine or feline who depends on you for their care. For both species, exercise is such a happy stimulant. A good walk with Bowser is great for your health and such a reward for him. Playing a good game of fetch or laser pointer is as much fun for our pets as it is for us humans to play hockey or board games. It gives all our brains much needed dopamine, the happy hormone.

No 2. Health. This includes many things from feeding a good diet, a fit weight, a healthy mouth, and addressing any agerelated changes that may require some advice or help from a professional. A healthy pet will be more engaged and have an increased lifespan thereby having the bonus of living with you for many more vears to come.

No 3. Treats. Speaking personally, I know I love yummy goodies and so does my cat Bee and my family dog Molly. However, I also know that treats can add up calorically and have to keep in mind that moderation is key. As well, some of our kitty and doggy friends have food allergies to cer- moisturizing mousse mastain meats and grains so we must keep that in mind. In the canine world, I must admit that dog trainers are

right; liver is top dog as a treat, and some cats like it too. Benny Bully's (freeze dried liver treats) have always been the preferred treat at the veterinary clinics I have worked at. They are Canadian, low calorie, ingredient and absolutely delicious, so my doggy friends tell me when they drool on my hand. Some crafty people make their own liver treats by cooking beef liver and freezing it, or just dehydrating it altogether with a food dehydrator.

There are numerous other baked treat recipes one can make for both feline or canine as evident on a Google search. I have included a recipe at the end of this article that I tried and taste tested approved on Molly. Cats tend to be a little more finicky in their taste testing so be prepared to try a few recipes. The baked treats tend to have more calories than the liver treats due to the added grains in either flour or oatmeal. For the felines, I prefer to either offer canned food (less calories than dry baked treats), or simple cat grass or catnip. In the canned food department, most cats really like either chicken liver, turkey giblets or ocean whitefish pâtés. A friend who boarded cats could always count on Fancy Feast as a hit, and I must confess that she has been mostly right. For the gardeners in us, starting a pot of cat grass (which is either oat, barley or wheat grass) or a flat of catnip (Nepeta Cataria) is a great way to get some greens into our kitties who crave more harmful houseplants at this time of year. I grew some cat grass (super easy) for my cat Bee and coworkers' cats and it was appreciated by all, including my family dog Molly!

No 4. Beauty...or a good groom. Who doesn't love a good pamper or spa treatment? Although a lot of cats and dogs hate their nails being trimmed, they at least love a good brushing especially with a soft bristle brush or comb. For the pets with skin issues, a therapeutic shampoo bath can be instantly relieving to irritated skin. And for those with dry skin saged in to their coat feels wonderful. Needless to say, the underlying theme is a gentle touch, or massage that our pets crave the most...especially if it's given by one they love.

Are you fe-line the love? This February 14, remember all the creatures great and small in your life. Sure enough, there's someone who woofs you and thinks you are purr-fect.

And to quote the singer Jackie DeShannon, "what the world needs now is love, sweet love."

used safflower) 1/4 cup natural peanut butter


1/2 cup honey 2 tablespoons water


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Providence Bay News and Notes

The purpose of this public meeting is to consider a proposed Zoning Bylaw Amendment under Section 34 of the Planning Act for the islands zoned SR1 and all Crown Land located on islands, Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands.

The effect of the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment is to amend the name, permitted uses, and zone provisions for the Shoreline Residential – Restricted (SR1) Zone to include the same uses and provisions as the Shoreline Residential (SR) Zone, but require larger lot frontage (60 m), area (8,093 sgm), and front yard setback (10.0 m) and reduce maximum lot coverage to 5%. The name of the SR1 Zone will also be amended from "Shoreline Residential – Restricted" to "Shoreline Residential Island". In addition, the proposed amendment will rezone all Crown Lands in the Bay of Islands and McGregor Bay to the Open Space Conservation (02) Zone.

No key map is provided, as the proposed amendment applies generally to all islands zoned SR1 and all Crown Land located on islands in the Town.

If you wish to be notified of the decision of the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands on the proposed zoning by-law amendment, you must make a written request to the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands.

If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision. If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to do so.
