## Tehkummah council opts for two monthly meetings

TEHKUMMAH—Faced with a large and growing backlog of council decisions stemming from a workload of challenging decisions, Tehkummah council decided to take action. With council rarely completing its agenda by the 11 pm deadline set out in its procedural bylaw, council moved to add an additional meeting in the month. Hours for both meetings have been adjusted to 7 pm to 10 pm from the current 7 pm to 11 pm.

## Five youths arrested in break and enters in Little Current

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has arrested and charged five youths stemming from a series of break and enters and mischief in Little Current recently. and Manitowaning. She also noted that one of the youths is 14 while the others are 17 years old.

The suspects broke into the Little Current LCBO in the early morning hours of Saturday, February 2 and stole items. Later the same day, they gained entry into the Holy Trinity Anglican Church where they caused damage and stole items from inside the church, including communion wine. month was Councillor Ron Hierons, who maintained that he did not believe it was "worth the money." Councillor Hierons also objected to a proposed 5:30 pm start to meetings, noting, " that is when I feed my cattle."

Council adjusted the timeframe to accommodate.

"I have been in favour of a second meeting, I think having a second meeting is a great thing," said Councillor Paul Bowerman. Mr. Bowerman suggested that he would be willing to forgo an honorarium for the second meeting.

The matter of council honorariums came up a couple of times during the council meeting during the later budget debates, with newly appointed Councillor Michael Mackenzie suggesting that council honorariums should be frozen as a cost saving measure. That suggestion did not go forward.

During the debate, Councillor Bowerman noted that the Municipality of Central Manitoulin had different chairs for each of its committee meetings as well, something he said he thought was a good idea.

"We are falling behind," said Councillor Bowerman. "We need to address this." He cited a number of municipal issues that need to be addressed, including roads, health and safety and economic development. "We have been struggling to keep up."

Concerns were expressed on the strain that the additional evening work would place on staff. "Maybe they could take turns," suggested Councillor Lorie Leeson. "That person could come in later." Staff at the meeting affirmed that the extra meeting would not cause undue hard-

### OPP establishes 'safe trade' spot in Little Current to transfer items purchased online

Partnership with Northeast Town **by Robin Burridge** 

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police has partnered with the Northeast Town on 'project safe trade,' which will provide a safe community location for individuals to meet and exchange online goods.

"This is a community safety initiative," explained OPP Community Services Officer Constable Marie Ford. "We wanted to work with the municipality to create a safe zone in front of the Little Current detachment for people engaging in an online transaction."

Constable Ford shared that often online purchase exchanges from sites such as Manitoulin Mall and Kijiji are made at people's homes or at parking lots.

"Once this area is established, it will allow individuals to have a safe meeting spot for these transactions in the presence of law enforcement officials," Constable Ford continued.

The location on Campbell Street in front of the Little Current detachment will include a painted, designated area with a 'project safe trade' sign.

"I am looking at having an area student put a Manitoulin spin on the existing logo," Constable Ford said.

Constable Ford noted that the project is being started in Little Current and Espanola. She added that the OPP does not assume responsibility or mediate transactions.

The Northeast Town council carried a motion earlier this month supporting the project and covering the expense of painting the parking space and the sign.

"The OPP arrested five youths on Monday, February 12," said Manitoulin Detachment OPP Community Services Constable Marie Ford. "Break and enter and mischief charges were laid."

Although the identities of the youths cannot be given under the provisions of the Youth Criminal Justice Act, Ms. Ford did state that the youths were from Little Current, Aundeck Omni Kaning Constable Ford explained that, "the charges are also in relation to mischief on a public school in Little Current (Little Current Public School)."

As of press time Monday, the trial dates had not yet been set.

The Gore Bay council has given its approval to award the contract to Sudbury based company CRCS Recreation, for the design, supply and installation of the splash pad at the town park, (south of Millsite Apartments) at a cost of \$149,241 plus HST.

## **Documentary highlights** European obsession with **Native Canadian culture**

WIIKWMKOONG-It's been called a fascination, an obsession, a fetish and an appropriation. For at least decades, likely longer, Europeans have been dressing up in regalia, dancing and living in a North American native style. Recently a documentary aired on CBC that shines a light on this controversial practice - it's called Searching for Winnetou.

Tracy Recollet has first-hand experience with the phenomenon, having been invited to Germany on multiple occasions to share her culture. Ms. Recollet is from Wiikwemkoong and was featured in the documentary alongside her partner Wesley Cleland who lives in Niagara Falls, NY.

She says her first encounter was about 20 years ago in Pullman City, a western-style theme park in Eging am See in Bavaria. "At that time it wasn't as big. It was just one man, Hunting Wolf." Hunting Wolf is a German man who is also in the documentary and believes he has a special connection with the buffalo.

Ms. Recollet says she was never bothered by him. "He was dressed up and he looked native. I thought it was kinda cool."

Not everyone in the documentary had positive things to say, however. Red Haircrow, an indigenous man from the United States who lives in Germany, called it among other things "a fetishism" and a "continuing of colonial practices."

Author and playwright Drew Hayden Taylor from Curve Lake First Nation, the man at the centre of the documentary, says that most of the response he has received about the documentary has been positive. He acknowledges, however, that Mr. Haircrow was not the only person to take offence. "They say I let them [the Europeans] off easily. That I shouldn't have soft-sold it."

Mr. Taylor acknowledges that there may be something deeper at work but feels that the Germans featured in the documentary aren't trying to ...continued on page 9

## It's time we bring free trade home to the provinces

Canadians can be forgiven for scratching their heads in disbelief when they hear about provinces setting up trade barriers to prevent their fellow citizens from purchasing products or transporting those products across provincial boundaries.

The Agreement on Internal Trade (AIT), between all Canadian jurisdictions, that came into effect in 1995 was specifically aimed at reducing and eliminating barriers to free movement of persons, goods, services, and investment within Canada. That didn't work out as planned and a lot of trade barriers remained firmly entrenched on the Canadian economic landscape.

Quebec placed barriers on labour coming from Ontario to work in that province to the outrage of labourers, skilled and otherwise, in Canada's largest province.

The situation created a great deal of frustration—particularly out west where they decided to take matters into their own hands. So, Alberta and British Columbia signed the Trade, Investment, and Labour Mobility Agreement (TILMA) in 2006 with the avowed goal of creating a seamless economic region between the two provinces by eliminating many of the existing interprovincial barriers.

Yes, that's right. The two provinces currently engaging in the first salvoes of a trade war set up their own little free trade zone, but at the first sign of trouble, out the window it goes and there will be no tippling of Okanagan's finest by the wine lovers of Alberta until British Columbia stops throwing roadblocks up to Alberta's crude. Crude, yes, but nothing new in the Canadian experience. Even the TILMA has its many exceptions, including regulated marketing and supply management of poultry, dairy and eggs—easy hurdles to overcome.

So the federal government and the provinces rolled up their shirt sleeves and negotiated the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA), trumpeted with great fanfare last April. It was a new deal touted to coordinate trade across interprovincial borders and replace limited rules put in place two decades ago that were no longer up to the job. It created a formal and binding process for cutting the myriad of trade barriers that currently exist; catching up to what provinces and territories offered Europeans in the Canada-EU trade deal, opening up, not just the same access to government contracts, but better access and it improved the dispute resolution system currently in place between jurisdictions as well, making it faster and simpler to start and doubling potential fines payable if jurisdictions can't justify regulations.

But there is a catch. Any government that doesn't like the national compromise that's reached can opt out—so inconsistencies will per-

sist, particularly where local interests are strong enough that political expediency trumps national interests.

That's what's allowing Alberta to boycott BC wine just now. This example is ample demonstration that Canada and its provinces must do better because interprovincial trade barriers are simply a ridiculous albatross on our national prosperity by both hampering our own competitiveness and in how they complicate the lives of our negotiating teams who are trying to build better trade relations in global markets.

Students of Canadian constitutional law can recall the absurd situation that existed in this country regarding the regulation of trade in the nation's early years. At one point in time, while the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in Britain served as our highest court, provinces could not regulate any product, part of which was for export and the federal government could not regulate any product, part of which was for internal consumption. As a trading nation, that pretty much left the Canadian economy a wide open free-for-all, because there were few products that did not fall into both categories—even more so today. This was a great boon for the major merchants of the day, primarily British, of course. Thankfully, that nonsense was dealt with. But as a federation of provinces, we still had a plethora of parochial mindsets to deal with. 'Cleavages' in the jargon of political scientists.

So we come to the present day, where trade barriers continue to bedevil us and the us vs. them mentality is still far too ascendant in our polity and economy.

It's not that we can't find solutions that could work as there are plenty to be found on the global stage. Canada is not the only federal system that has had to face these issues. Australia springs quickly to mind, where in 1993 an agreement was put in place that allowed for the free movement of goods and services between that country's provinces (territories) as long as those products met the standards of one province. Simply put, if you can sell it in one territory, you can sell it in another.

Before alarm bells ring out too loudly, let us consider that most Canadian provinces have very similar requirements and regulations to protect the health and welfare of their citizens.

Interprovincial trade must be fully removed from the arsenal of politicians seeking favour with the electorate in their individual provinces if we are to fully meet our potential as a G7 economic powerhouse. It is in all of our interests.

## Seeking medical care should not be hazardous

Northern Ontario Party extends condolances to young family who lost lives travelling

#### To the Expositor:

The Northern Ontario Party would like to extend their condolences to the young family who lost their lives traveling back from Sick Kids Hospital last week. This heartbreaking event is just another example of the tragedies Northerners face when seeking medical care for their children.

A number of families across Northern Ontario face similar treks; driving numerous hours down single lane highways that have no rest stops just to get their children medical care. Some Northern families do not have the option of flying down to Toronto to make these appointments, because either their community does not have an airport or the parents are trying to hold onto their jobs and are forced to drive after working 8 or 12-hour shifts.

Although Wynne and her government believe that their Travel Grant system is fair and commensurate, the sad truth is that it is not. Many Northerners have to complete heroic feats just to receive the same care that many southerners and their children take for granted.

The Northern Travel Grant will only partially cover a one-night stay at a hotel, so a parent must choose to either use it the night before or the day of the appointment.

For example, a family from Elliot Lake would have to drive 7 hours

with short breaks to get to Sick Kids. Now it is up to the family to choose whether to drive down the day before and catch a hotel to attend an early morning appointment and then head back home after spending 4 or 5 hours at the hospital. The other choice is the family can drive all night to make the same morning appointment and stay in the hotel afterward. Either way, this becomes a recipe for disaster, as this system encourages parents to drive exhausted so their child can attend an appointment.

The Northern Ontario Party believes that the Travel Grant system needs to be revamped to include a two-night hotel stay for anyone traveling more than 350 km (one way) to take a child to a medical appointment. The NOP would also like to see the creation of a Northern Ontario House, where northern families can stay free of charge when their children are attending medical appointments in Toronto.

### Island trappers warn that this year is a very intense season for sarcoptic mange

MANITOULIN—This winter has been a bad winter for mange, as noted by Island trappers and observed by Tehkummah Talk columnist Pat Hall in a recent column.

"There are many types of mange, but the type we have been seeing on Manitoulin is sarcoptic mange which is found on coyotes, foxes and even domestic dogs," said Kagawong trapper Ian Anderson. "Sarcoptic mange was extremely rare here until the mid 80s. Over the years the intensity has fluctuated but this season has been particularly bad."

Sarcoptic mange is a highly contagious skin disease found in dogs and other wild animals and is caused by the sarcoptes scabiei mite which burrows through the skin to cause itching and irritation that leads to scratching and hair loss.

Mr. Anderson said that, through talking with other Island trappers and from his own experience, roughly 50 percent of the coyotes being trapped have sarcoptic mange.

"It normally starts at the tail and moves up or we see it a lot over their front shoulders," he said. "In past years, we have seen it in red foxes as well, but not this year."

Mange destroys the animal's pelt, with even 10 percent of hair loss leaving the fur of no value in raw fur (for sale by trappers).

"In the extreme cold, these coyotes will die from hypothermia," he said. "I have found several in recent years which appeared to have frozen to death with virtually no hair."

The Expositor reached out to Island Hospital Veterinarian Janice Mitchell to learn more about mange and what it could mean for Manitoulin pets.

"In (veterinary) school, we learned if dogs had itchy ears and elbows it could be mange," said Dr. Mitchell. "We have seen several cases in the past but no major cases this year. It is easily treated with a topical product, Revolution. To truly diagnose it you need to do a deep skin scrape, but as it is easily treated and if we suspect mange infection, we usually treat it using Revolution."

## Manitoulin Health Centre Notes

#### **CEO** report

Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) CEO Derek Graham presented his report for January.

"Accreditation clinical teams are focusing on efforts to prepare the organization for next June's on-organizational practices," said Mr. Graham. "Both of the hospice suites have been completed and are now operating. Both were utilized immediately upon coming onstream. In addition, minor renovations were accomplished concurrently to the bariatric suite in Mindemoya."

Mr. Graham informed the board that the new palliative care nurse practitioner has been hired by the home care branch of the Northeast East Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN) and has begun the process of meeting with organizations and clinicians from across the Island.

"Following an extensive search throughout the summer and fall, the NE LHIN announced that Jeremy Stevenson will be their new CEO," said Mr. Graham. "MHC looks forward to working with Jeremy."

Mr. Graham also spoke to the board about how MHC is compliant with Ontario's 'no smoking on hospital grounds directive.' He noted that new policies and signage have been implemented.

"Locally, the NE LHIN is investing more than \$350,000 with the Noojmowin Teg Health Centre to help seniors remain independent at home," explained Mr. Graham. "The plan includes assisted living service for 10 high-risk seniors living within any of Manitoulin's seven First Nations communities, as well as new funding for a geriatric social worker."

#### Chief Nursing Officer report

Laurie Landry, MHC chief nursing officer, informed the board that MHC has implemented processes where patients are able to give their own pain medication through a 'pain pumps,' on an as"The nursing staff educator will be meeting shortly with our recently trained wound care nurses so as to develop an education plan," said Ms. Landry. "The plan will look at wound care products and make recommendations on those we may want to trial. They will also be looking at the option of implementing updated wound care protocols, in line with the latest care guidelines."

Ms. Landry also informed the board that MHC has revised the orientation package in order to partially compensate for the loss of the nursing new graduate initiative.

"We have lengthened the orientation time and are in the process of putting together an information package for staff to have as a resource—one that covers unusual equipment found in the emergency department."

#### **Hospital finances**

VP of Corporate Support Services and Chief Financial Officer Lynn Foster reviewed the MHC's financials with the board.

"After nine months of operations in our 2017-2018 fiscal year, MHC has a surplus from hospital opera-...continued on page 23

needed basis.

"This allows for better self-managed pain control," said Ms. Landry. "It also allows us to capture how many time the patient wanted/needed more medication before it was due on a scheduled basis. The physician uses this information to assist in deciding whether to increase the hourly dosage."

Ms. Landry said that an Omnicell representative visited both hospital sites earlier in January to look at the logistics of installing the medication automated dispensing units. 
The image took Ms. Bell 40 hours to compete.

## Bid euchre is taking Tehkummah by storm

TEHKUMMAH—The Expositor has been receiving reports of an addictive form of euchre that has been making the rounds at the Tehkummah Seniors Triangle Club and Providence Bay Community Hall, but indications abound that this pastime has been lurking unheralded in the back country for quite some time some time. The Expositor sought out contributor Pat Hall, our in-house expert in all things Tehkummah, to talk about this latest phenomenon.

"Yes we have been playing bid euchre," admitted Ms. Hall. "It is a lot like euchre, except you bid." Ms. Hall goes on to confess that "I am quite enjoying it."

Ms. Hall took pains to point out that she is not the one organizing the event. "That's Margaret Case, she's the one who put all this together."

Deep research by The Expositor (we had a gander on Google) has revealed that what is actually going on at the Tehkummah Triangle Senior's Hall may be a form of double deck bid euchre, played with a double deck of cards containing only 9 through the ace of each the four suits, but since it combines the two decks there are two of each of those cards—thus double bid euchre. But we stand to be corrected.

"You deal out all of the cards to four people, who then take turns bidding on a hand," she said.

When "trump" (or "no trump") is decided on by the player with the highest bid, that suit (hearts, diamonds, clubs or spades) becomes the top ranked cards with the



The signing of the contract with CRCS is on hold until after funding announcements on March 9, as the town is waiting to see if it has been awarded funding for the project. Ms. Clarke said that council has not yet set its 2018 budget, and if funding is not obtained, the municipality is still planning on moving forward on the project.

In its bid, CRCS Recreation stated that it will take two to three weeks for the installation of the splash pad, with the construction to begin in May of this year.

Thanks to funding from a private donor, the town will also be building new tennis courts by the splash pad and new playground equipment.

Ms. Clarke commented that the aging tennis courts by the marina will be decommissioned. She also noted that the existing playground equipment will remain, but complementary equipment to the new nautically-themed splash pad will be added. As well, the soccer field will be moved to Smith Park.

offend. "They don't believe they are native. Their understanding is very flawed, outdated and it's filtered through [the lens of] early 20th century German writer Karl May."

Ms. Recollet also shares that sentiment. She points out the limited opportunities in television around World War Two in Germany. "Back in the day, TV programs were Hitler propaganda or Winnetou. They felt a big connection with native people; respect for the land and animals."

Both Mr. Taylor and Ms. Recollet feel, however, that when non-indigenous Canadians wear regalia it is offensive. Mr. Taylor says "here (in Canada) it's out of disrespect; they're wannabees or it's fun or silly. They should know better."

But Ms. Recollet says she has seen some examples where non-indigenous Canadians were welcomed into native culture. "I have a friend I grew up with who dresses, dances at powwows and makes regalia. Everyone who knows this person accepts them and they're now family." She says this person has made baby steps into the culture over their life and that they were gifted different pieces of clothing over the years. "Next thing you knew, they were fully dressed. Our people just naturally took them in." Ms. Recollet says that ultimately "being Indian isn't just having brown skin and braids. It's what's inside our hearts."

opposing jack of the same colour being the second highest card in that trump.

The game involves scoring, with the highest points recorded at the hall to date coming in at 277. "I have only got up to 204, so far," said Ms. Hall.

A player scores 35 for first place, 25 points for second place and 15 points for third place. Since the game is played with partners, the score goes to both players, but the players move from table to table throughout the competition. "You are changing partners all the time," said Ms. Hall.

ners all the time," said Ms. Hall. Once the bidding is complete, highest bidder is declared the declarer with the trump suit being the suit named in the bid. The declarer leads the first trick. The rules of play are as in euchre, so you must follow suit, and if void of the suit led you may trump or discard at will. The left bower(s) (aka the opposite jacks of the same colour as the trump) count for all purposes as belonging to the trump suit. In double deck versions the first

A bid euchre tourney at the Tehkummah Triangle Club will have 24 players taking part, so that means six tables in play, although apparently there is plenty of room to spare should more people show up. Each player antes up a \$5 entry fee. "And then there is the 50/50," said Ms. Hall. "That's a dollar too." High stakes indeed.

It can ramp up even further from there. "If you lay a card down in front of you and you can't make your bid, you pay a dollar," said Ms. Hall.

Lay a card down in front of you? If you have a very strong hand, you can lay one or two hands down in front of you and your partner will pass over their best cards, but beware, you can't tell them what you want.

"I got caught like that a couple of weeks ago," said Ms. Hall. "I laid two cards down in front of me, but my partner didn't really have any good cards. So I lost 12 points, well we both did really, me and my partner." Sounds tricky. In fact, there is a lot of strategy involved in the game.

"It's really hard to explain," said Ms. Hall. "You will just have to come out and try it yourself sometime."

During their inquiry, students discovered the Have a Heart Day campaign, which is celebrated on Valentine's Day. Spearheaded by the First Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada, the child and youth-led movement ensures First Nations children have the services they need to grow up safely at home, get a good education, be healthy and be proud of who they are.

Inspired to take part, students decided to make moccasins for local babies born in the Aundeck Omni Kaning and Sheguiandah First Nations. From sewing to beading, students spent countless hours perfecting every detail to ensure these babies would have a warm welcome into the world.

"Moccasins are an important part of Indigenous culture," says Little Current Public School Principal Christy Case. "By handcrafting moccasins, our students are providing babies with a positive start on their journey through life."

"I extend a special thank you to teachers Casey Boisvert, Mary-Anne McGraw, and Joanne Peltier, Aboriginal Support Worker Justin Francis, Elder Elaine Nahwegahbow and volunteer Debbie Francis for their leadership efforts," Ms. Case added. 

## Billings council to review economic development ideas for old St. Pauls' Church

#### by Michael Erskine

BILLINGS—The former St. Pauls' on the Hill United Church is the oldest building in Kagawong. It is situated on a remarkable promontory property and is in remarkably good shape for its age. Billings acquired the venerable building from the Sudbury Presbytery of the United Church in mid-December last year and the town's development economic committee has been pondering how the town can utilize the asset while bringing the edifice back to its roots.

The plan being proposed by the economic development committee would see the building rented out for seasonal use while the museum and the economic development committee work on fundraising efforts to restore the building to its original state.

"It is the oldest building in town and in excellent condition, considering its age," said Billings Mayor Austin Hunt. "It was built by the town fathers around 1882-1883, shortly after the town was founded. The first two buildings they built were a school and the church."

Mayor Hunt noted that two brothers (William and Robert Henry) originally came to the area in the 1870s from Toronto shortly after the region was surveyed to take advantage of the water power possibilities offered up by the flow over Bridal Veil Falls.

"Water power was, of course, a big thing in those days," he said. "The brothers brought 15 families with them from Toronto. That was a lot of people back then."

The Henry brothers were two sawmill owners from King Township near Toronto and they knew a good opportunity when they saw it. They were granted 800 acres and the mill site, provided they built a grist mill and brought 12 families to the region. A saw mill was up and running by 1874 and

the grist facilities the following year.

Tragically, the brothers did not live to enjoy the fruits of their inspiration for very long, as both died tragically by drowning the same year—1882. One in the sinking of the Manitoulin in May and the other during the shipwreck of the Asia in September.

Billings Clerk/Treasurer/CAO Kathy McDonald confirmed that the township now owns the property; the deal closed on December 13.

While the economic

development plan being considered by council proposes a seasonal use of the building which lacks water and sewer connections and therefore presently has no washroom facilities, ultimately it is hoped that the building would be restored to its original configuration. The building currently is clad in vinyl siding and boasts a steel roof-both products applied to the church in modern times.

It is anticipated that fundraising efforts by the economic development will cover that restoration. "The way it is laid out, it really shouldn't cost the taxpayers anything," said Ms. MacDonald. "It will be

#### Sidewalk

The recommendation to Council that staff contact Tulloch Engineering and request a cost estimate for engineering a new sidewalk from the intersection of Highways 542 and 551, north as far as either the Mindemoya Hospital or the Sparrow's Nest apartment building was accepted. "I think we have a duty here," Councillor Stephens said. There are a lot of people walking here and I hope the MTO will allow us to do this. It would be great for our seniors."

CAO/Clerk Ruth Frawley told Council that the MTO has been put on notice and noted that this is a new sidewalk and so has to be engineered. When Councillor Pat MacDonald asked which side of the road the sidewalk would go on, Ms. Frawley replied that the engineer will let council know which side is the best.

Councillor Dale Scott also spoke to this recommendation saying, "I think if we do the sidewalk, I think we have to watch who is doing the work. The boulevards were all done wrong. It wasn't our project and now people suffer because of the access to buildings."

Council accepted the recommendation that the municipality request that the speed sign coming into Mindemoya from the north on Highway 551, approximately 400 feet northeast of the intersection of Highway 551 and Ketchankookem Trail, be changed to 50 km per hour from the current 70 km per hour. ## **OCF Nanabush Storytelling contest to become annual event**

LITTLE CURRENT—The inaugural Ojibwe Cultural Foundation (OCF) Nanabush Storytelling competition was held at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre on February 2 and 3, under the auspices of that organization's annual Anishinaabewin (ways of the Anishinaabe) Conference, but the event has proven to be so popular that the OCF plans to hold it again next year around this time of the year.

Tradition has it that one doesn't relay spirit stories when there is no snow on the ground, especially stories about the Trickster, Nanabush, because you don't really want to attract his curiosity by mentioning his name.

"There is also the tradition that the spirits might think you are laughing at them," noted OCF Executive Director Anong Beam. The spirits are not always benign, especially if they are offended, and Nanabush has a reputation for pulling some pretty dark jokes on the unwary or especially the unworthy. "As the OCF, we have to honour that tradition."

The Anishinaabewin Conference is usually held in the fall in Sudbury, but this year the event was moved to February and held at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current. This year's conference quickly sold out.

"We are planning on moving the conference back to the fall," noted Ms. Beam. "But the storytelling competition was so successful that we are going to hold it separately next year in February again."

The storytellers began their tales in a fully packed room before a very enthusiastic audience.

Winne s of the inaugural Nanabush Sto rytelling Competition adult category were chosen by audience applause. First place went to veteran Nanabush channeler Joseph Osawabine of Wiikwemkoong, followed by Clarisse Pangowish of M'Chigeeng in second place and Julian Nowgabow of Whitefish River First Nation in third place. Clayton King of Beausoleil First Nation and Lynzii Taibossigai of M'Chigeeng also provided entertaining stories in the competition. Winners of the youth category included first place Katryna Debassige-Bebonang of Wiikwemkoong in first followed by Jaron Panamick in second place and Harmony Panamick in third. Jude Debassige of M'Chigeeng also provided a story. In the elder category the storytellers included first place Alma-Jean Migwans, second place Melvina Corbiere and third Shirley Williams. Playwright Alanis King also provided a story. "Wasn't that wonderful," declared Ms. Corbiere following the adult category stories. She particularly cited Clarisse Pangowish, who works with the Anishinaabemowin Revitalization Project in

M'Chigeeng. Ms. Pangowish delivered her story with the aid of projected cartoon images that form part of the language curriculum products being created by the ARP. Her entire story was delivered in Anishinabemowin. "You know she hardly knew more than a few words when she first started out," said Ms. Corbiere, herself a veteran teacher and long-time advocate for Anishinaabe culture and traditions. "Now look at her, she is doing so well."

Each storyteller in the competition was limited to 15 minutes and most kept well within those guidelines. In the traditional storytelling component that took place on Day 2 of the conference, there was no time imposed. Elders Leona Nahweg limit of Whitefish River First Nation, Wilfred Trudeau of Wiikwemkoong and Lewis Debassige relayed those stories from 1 pm to 4 pm on Saturday. Each day of the conference began at 6 am with a sunrise ceremony and there were a host of workshops and events throughout the two days in addition to the storytelling. On Day 1, Carolyn Podruchny and Lewis Debassige provided a MISHI Presentation, MISHI being an acronym for Manitoulin Island Summer Historical Institute, a collaborative program between York University and the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation. Blogs by the participating students can be found online at the OCF website. Also on Day 1, Patricia Ningewance discussed 'The Funnier Side of Language Teaching. In the evening of both days there was a drum social that was open to the public. Day 2 also began with a sunrise ceremony conducted by Sheguiandah elder Gordon Waindubence who also provided a keynote presentation 'Past, Present and Future.'



## Barney's Bargain Barn reopens in old Rona site in Little Current

by Michael Erskine LITTLE CURRENT-If at first life throws you a curve ball, dust yourself off, pick yourself up and start all over again. Barney's Bargain Barn, the discount retail store that was forced to shut down when they, along with other tenants, had to vacate the building they occupied in on Little Current's Vankoughnet Street East, have reopened on the site of the old RONA building at the other end of Vankoughnet Street East at Highway 540.

"That little mess cost us about \$45,000," said owner/manager/Pastor Rodney (Barney) Deforge. "It set us back a bit, but we are back."

Although its focus is largely on serving those of somewhat limited means, the store is a for-profit business—sort of. The discount store serves as what is known as a social enterprise; a for-profit business whose profits serve a notfor-profit or charitable end. "Every cent is plowed back into our work," said Pastor Deforge.

Sometimes, when life throws you a curve, the new pitch has a lot better potential for a home run. The new location offers up a much larger space than did the old building and it's a far more visible spot. "We are still working on filling it up," said Pastor Deforge. The plan is to

"It's best before, not worst after," quipped spouse Lynette Deforge. "Health Canada recommends six months after the 'best before' date." There is often confusion between the meanings of 'best before' and 'expiry' dates. "Expiry date means that's it; it's expired," said Mr. Deforge. "We follow that to the letter. But the best before date isn't an expiry date. For those who can afford it, go ahead, get the best before merchandise. There are plenty of good quality stores around that can serve you well and you should support them. But if you have a limited food budget, if you need something nutritious to put in your kid's lunches for school or to get you through the month, you come see us. We like to

have things for kids' lunches."

Even though the prices may be rock bottom, Barney's often drops the price even lower than cost. "If it puts lunch in school, we are all for that," he said.

The non-profit end of the operation moves a very large amount of food. "We still pass out \$7.2 million to food banks," he said. "That's why we have the for-profit store. Transportation isn't cheap."

Barney's Bargain Barn is currently open Wednesday to Saturday, 10 am to 6 pm and is located at 1 Vankoughnet Street East.

The goal of the Healthy Kids Community Challenge is to support the well-being of children to "help create communities where it's easy for children to lead healthier lives."

"We set up a 24-hour challenge where families were encouraged to come on out for an indoor camping experience (with tents set up in the main gymnasium at the Four Directions Multiuse Centre in AOK) and the turnout was pretty good," said Mr. Wood. "There were a couple of the teen girls when I was going around in the schools to promote the event who looked a little nervous at the idea, but the younger ones jumped right in."

When it came down the moment of truth, Mr. Wood said that "there were a couple of Grade 7 and 8s who looked at each other, but when the event was over, everyone put up their hands when they were asked if they would participate again next year." Turns out powering off can be a lot of fun.

There wasn't really much time to fret about the lack of screentime, as the participants were kept busy with a whirlwind schedule of events.

"I even got to make a little leather medicine pouch," said Grand Council Chief Madahbee.

While about 60 people participated in the sleepover, there were more than 100 who took part in the daytime events on Saturday. "There was pretty much a perfect balance of events for young people and for adults," said Mr. Wood, and of course a balance that included both. "It was enjoyable for all."

Each participant received a backpack filled with tools for family events to take with them and Mr. Wood has been reaching out to participants to distribute a latearriving pile of family games, courtesy of a \$2,000 donation from Hasbro Quebec.

...continued from page 6 tions of \$128,000 with an overall surplus, including revenues other and expenses of approximately \$521,000," said Ms. Foster. "MHC's investment portfolio has been managed by Beutel Goodman since January 2006. Its asset under management, at book value, equal \$5,043,639 with a fair market value of \$5,591,258. The asset mix is currently 47 percent fixed income and 53 percent equity, which is consistent with the board established investment policy."

Ms. Foster discussed costs incurred under the current year's approved capital budget including: \$4,000 for a press tool for environmental services; \$6,000 for a dryer for laundry services; \$2,000 for an auto reader for the medical device reprocessing department; \$1,000 as a deposit for a new delivery van; and \$2,000 for a laptop.

"Forty-three thousand was spend on construction costs for the palliative suites, the cost of which has been partially offset by donations (\$38,000) received to date," added Ms. Foster. "Approximately \$143,000 was accrued last year."

**Chief of Staff report** MHC Chief of Staff Dr. Stephen Cooper told the board that MHC came close to reaching its staff influenza vaccination target of 80 percent.

"Our physician assistant, Katelyn Miller, is back from maternity leave and Dr. MacDonald is starting maternity leave next week," said Dr. Cooper. "The Little Current Physician Group has been unable to recruit a physician to cover her practice. Nurse practitioner Anne Gervais will cover her Little Current patients and the Little Current clinic will reduce walk-in clinics. This past month we have had two new locums

express an interest, so we are hopeful that they will help fill the gap."

Dr. Cooper said that the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) and the NE LHIN organized 'Summit North—Building a Flourishing Physician Workforce' in January which Dr. Poenn and Quackenbush attended.

"Drs. Min Ye Ngae (Health Sciences North pathologist) will be replacing Dr. Bonin as MHC lab director," Dr. Cooper responded.

## The hills are alive Manitoulin Secondary School comes alive with The Sound of Music

**by Lori Thompson** M'CHIGEENG—Rodgers and Hammerstein's final collaboration, The Sound of Music, first opened on Broadway back in 1959. The backdrop is Austria during the Nazi takeover at the start of World War II. Maria is a would-be nun who is sent from the convent to become a governess to the seven motherless von Trapp children. Free spirited Maria and the rigid Captain von Trapp fall in love and make a daring escape over the mountains into Switzerland. It is a moving story of love, hope, and the power of music. There have been countless stage adaptations of The Sound of Music over the years, and the movie starring Julie Andrews and Christopher Plummer is a much loved classic. It's a daunting undertaking, but the cast and crew at Manitoulin Secondary School does not disappoint.

As the curtain rises we are treated to the harmonic voices of the Nuns and Choir of Nonnberg Abbey. The Sisters are discussing the merits of postulants who are hoping to take their vows. It is clear that Maria Rainier is a misfit. The scene changes to reveal a barefoot Maria in her beloved hills. From the first pure notes of The Sound of Music, April Torkopoulos as Maria captivates the audience with her charm. Ms. Torkopoulos is truly radiant in the role, and moves between joy and innocence, humour and sternness, with ease.

Mother Abbess, played by Cassandra Kuntsi with wisdom and compassion, sends Maria to become governess to Captain on Trapp's children, advising Maria she must live outside the abbey before deciding to take her vows as a nun. On her arrival, Maria is treated to a militaristic display as the Captain introduces his children. The eldest, Liesl, perfectly acted by Kendra Jordison with both bravado and naiveté, marches forward. "I am sixteen and do not need a governess," she announces.

The precocious Brigitta, played by Cameron Meawasige, arrives comically late and continues to delight throughout the evening. Maria defiantly returns the Cap-tain's whistle. "I don't answer to a whistle," she tells him, "and nei-ther will the children." The Cap-tain later argues with Maria over the care of his children, but we see the beginning of his transformation when he hears the children singing.

The children fall under her spell from the first Do Re Me through The Lonely Goatherd, when all seven children run frightened into her room during a loud thunderstorm. Maria even begins to win over the standoffish Liesl when she keeps Lisel's late night tryst with Rolf a secret. Eventually, Maria transforms the von Trapp family home from a place of strict rules and regulations to one filled with joy, laughter and music. Every love story has an obstacle to overcome, and The Sound of Music is no different. Maximilian Dettweiler (played by Avery Byce) and Elsa Schraeder (played by Lauren Goddard) arrive for a visit. Ms. Schraeder has her eyes on marriage to the Captain. A comically scheming Max encourages the Captain to play both sides. In a very funny moment, Brigitta informs Maria that her father is in love with Maria and Maria is in love with him. Maria runs away to the abbey but is sent back by Mother Abbess following a strong performance of the favourite. Climb Ev'ry Mountain. The children are especially convincing in their grief at the disappearance of Maria and their joy at her return. When Elsa leaves and Maria and the Captain are married, things inside the house seem right. Outside, however, the Nazis

are encroaching and they want the Captain. The family must escape or face the consequences. Joshua Noble performs a heartwarming rendition of Edelweiss, a quietly heroic stand in the face of evil, in a concert organized by Max. Hiding out in the abbey following the concert, the family is discovered by the now Nazi Rolf, who does find his heart and allows them to escape.

The set is well designed and

realistic. Scene changes are seamless and are well supported by the live band at the rear of the auditorium. Subtle lighting enhances the scenes. Thursday night's production included a special singalong with the audience during four of the most iconic songs: Maria, Favourite Things, Do Re Me, and Edelweiss.

## **Northeast Town Council Notes**

#### Donation

Council carried a motion, based on a deputation from Craig and Kelly Timmermans last month, requesting funding for Manitoulin Country Fest and Rockin' the Rock, to donated \$1,200 to Manitoulin Country Fest and \$800 to Rockin' the Rock.

In a recorded vote, Mayor Al MacNevin, Councillor Laurie Cook, Councillor Marcel Gauthier, Councillor Bill Koehler, Councillor Melissa Peters, Councillor Paul Skippen and Councillor Bruce Wood all voted in favour of the motion. Councillor Dawn Orr voted against the motion, noting that she was concerned about the additional \$800 being taken from the donation line in the 2018 budget.

#### **Music festival designations**

The Northeast Town council carried a motion granting Country Fest and Rockin' the Rock the following: designating August 7 to 11, 2018 as Manitoulin Country Fest Week; designating both Manitoulin Country Fest and Rockin' the Rock events of municipal significance; granting the use of town fencing, if available, free of charge; the extension of hours for the beer tent until 1 am for both events; the placement of directional signs on municipal property, under direction of the manager of public works; the events listed on the Northeast Town Gateway sign; the use of the Rendezvous Pavilion, including washrooms, gazebo, fencing and picnic tables on August 8; and the use of the arena parking lot for the duration of the event, if the arena facilities are not previously rented.

#### Little Current Drinking Water Inspection report

Town CAO Dave Williamson reviewed the Little Current Drinking Water report. Mr. Williamson noted that there were no issues of non-compliance. The report did recommend that the membrane filter be tested and be possibly replaced in the near future as it is at the eight-year mark of a 10-year lifespan.

Council carried a motion to accept the report.

#### **Platform lift**

Council passed bylaw No 2018-10, being a bylaw to authorize the mayor and CAO to enter into an agreement with the Minister of Employment and Social Development for funding received in the amount of \$43, 472.00 for the installation of a platform lift at the Northeast Town office.

#### Art Tour

The Manitoulin Fine Arts Association requested the Northeast Town's support for the 24th Annual Manitoulin Art Tour, July 20 to 22.

"The Manitoulin Art Tour showcases the wide variety of art available in our local area and gives the public an opportunity to explore Manitoulin," states a letter from Marian Hester, coordinator of the Manitoulin Art Tour. "Local and off-Island visitors spend a weekend soaking in the beauty of the Island as they travel between studios, galleries and shops."

The Northeast Town Council carried a motion to donation \$200 to the tour, which will be used towards advertising, signage and promotion materials of the event.

#### **Building inspection**

Rick Armstrong was appointed as the Northeast Town building inspector. Council carried a motion passing bylaw No. 2018-08, being a bylaw to appoint Mr. Armstrong.

A new gazebo will be built in Sheguiandah at the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah thanks to a New Horizons Grant of \$13,047.

Council carried a motion to accept the grant. The funds will also be used for a bocce ball sign and chairs.

"This is a project the museum board has been working on for a couple of years," said Councillor Marcel Gauthier. "This will be excellent for the museum and its events."

#### **OPP Project Safe Trade**

Mr. Williamson explained to council that the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has approached the town about Project Safe Trade, a place where individuals can exchange online goods safely. The Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP requested that the Northeast Town paint a parking space in front of the Little Current detachment and erect a sign marking the spot 'Project Safe Trade.' "There has been high profile murders linked to Kijiji sales," commented Councillor Michael Erskine. "I am in support of this project and creating a safe spot for Island residents selling items." For accounts receivable for taxes, Ms. Knobel said there were \$142,397.60 made in payments. She added that the 2018 interim tax bills will be mailed by February 7, with due dates of February 28 and April 27.

Minutes from January 16 and 18 council and committee meetings

**Borrowing and interim tax levy** Council carried Bylaw 2018-04, being a bylaw for the borrowing from TD Canada Trust until the taxes are collected. Town CAO Dave Williamson explained that this is standard annual bylaw for the town and is a good safety net, though rarely used by the municipality.

Council also carried Bylaw 2018-05 being a bylaw to provide for an interim tax levy and to provide for the payment of taxes and to provide for penalty and interest of 1.25 percent per month.

#### Lagoon expansion

Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin was pleased to

report to council that the municipality had been successful in obtaining a \$1,000,000 grant towards the expansion of the lagoon from FedNor.

Council carried a motion for the mayor and CAO to enter into a contribution agreement with FedNor.

#### Zoning bylaw review and update

The Northeast Town council carried a motion to hire J.L. Richards and Associates Limited to conduct a zoning bylaw review and update for the municipality. Mr. Williamson informed council that \$17,000 had been set aside for the project in the 2017 budget and another \$5,000 in the 2018 proposed budget.

#### 2018 reserve schedule

Council reviewed the 2018 reserve schedule. Mr. Williamson explained that staff had recommended several changes in order to get rid of project line items that no longer exist and "clean it up." Council approved the changes.

Council carried a motion supporting the project and encouraging residents of the Northeast Town and other communities to utilize the new location.

#### Fire department raise

Council carried a motion to increase the Northeast Town volunteer firefighters wage by \$2. It was noted that there hasn't been a raise in the past five years and that the raise would bring the hourly rate from \$17 up to \$19 for fight fighters, from \$18 to \$20 for officers and \$20 to \$22 for the fire chief and deputy fire chief.

Based on the average number of calls a year, the increase would equal an overall additional cost of \$2,355.60.

#### **Financial reports**

Kim Knobel presented the accounts receivable reports to council. ## **Manitoulin Centennial Manor Minutes**

#### Administrator's report

Manitoulin Centennial Manor Michelle Administrator Bond informed the board that the home was currently sitting at 98.33 percent occupancy and that the current waiting list shows 23 applicants.

"We had eight personal support worker shifts replaced by agency staff which is down from last month," said Ms. Bond. "Staff have really been coming through and helping to cover shifts when needed.

Ms. Bond said that there had been a problem with the elevator over the weekend and the repairs cost \$4,000. "We will see that cost reflected in the February financials," she noted. She also told the board that the

home had received a quote on the new patient ceiling lifts and that, with the money that was fundraised, the home

would be able to purchase lifts for nine to 10 rooms.

#### Budget

The Manitoulin Centennial Manor board approved its 2018 budget which will see Island municipal allocations up two percent, plus an additional onetime amount to replace the Manor's heating system (this will cost \$93,000) divided between the municipalities. based on each municipality's assessment

#### **Fundraising report**

Board member Wendy Gauthier presented the fundraising report to council. She said that there was a group interested in kick-starting the next fundraising campaign for the Manor.

The board discussed possible focus options for the next campaign with staff. Ms. Bond recommended that the

removal of the hallway carpets and replacing this with flooring would be a good project for the focus of the next fundraising campaign.

She explained that the rooms had had the carpeting replaced, as have the dinning rooms.

It was also noted that the carpets limit mobility for residents in wheelchairs and are a possible trip hazard for residents who drag their feet. It was added that carpets also pose problems regarding infection prevention and control.

The board decided that the new flooring for the Manor corridors should be the focus of the next fundraising campaign.

Coach of the Senior Volleyball team, Mr. Wesno, said, "The girls had a great season. They were a fun team to work with and very talented volleyball players."




