"MHC has a multi-year plan which has included renovations and expansions at both sites including the Family Health Team in Little Current and Mindemoya and the emergency department in Little Current," explained MHC CEO Derek Graham. "Moving forward we want to look at the Mindemoya Hospital and see what is viable whether that be renovations, expansion or possibly a new building in the future."

Mr. Graham said the MHC has hired Yallowega Belanger Salach

Architecture (YBSA) of Sudbury to do a study of the Mindemoya site and that an assessment of the

Another turnover

M'Chigeeng election is back on again as judge declines to bless settlement

M'CHIGEENG—The case of the on again off again M'Chigeeng election has once again taken another turn after a former chief applied for intervener status in the settlement between the winner of the September 9 election, former Chief Linda Debassige, and the M'Chigeeng Election Appeals (MEA) committee that had appeared to have laid the matter to rest by setting aside the overturning the election by the MEA. The election has been called for April 21.

Former Chief Joe F. Hare filed a notice of motion for an order allowing him to stand as an intervener.

The grounds for Mr. Hare's motion included Section 109 of the Federal Court Act. The case of Rothmans, Benson and Hedges Inc (with various affirmations) (a case that laid out some of the criteria for the granting of intervener status essentially a question of whether anyone was adequately representing those being impacted by the case) and the Canada vs. Pictou Landing Band Council 2014, which also established

Ontario Northland takes inaugural Manitoulin bus trip

Maps tentative new bus route

by Robin Burridge

MANITOULIN-Ontario Northland is preparing for the launch of its new Manitoulin bus service and was on Manitoulin last week mapping out the tentative route.

The Expositor got a sneak peak at the new bus service and route, hopping aboard the demo bus, a 35-foot Temsa, for the trip.

"We are planning to start the service in late March or early April of this year," said Ontario Northland Senior Manager of

Bus Operations Ken Grube as the bus made its way from Little Current to Aundeck Omni Kaning. "The bus will be a mini coach, either a 35 foot with 36 seats or 30 foot with 34 seats.'

"The Manitoulin bus will be similar to this one with a washroom, be wheelchair accessible, have Wi-Fi and individual electrical outlets at each seat so people are able to charge their devices," added Mr. Grube.

The trip started at the Mani-

toulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current. The hotel has signed on to be the first agency location (selling tickets) on Manitoulin.

"The bus's home terminal will be in Sudbury," Mr. Grube explained. "The bus will be leaving Sudbury at 5 pm and travelling to Little Current (with a stop in Espanola). It will then do the Island route. The following morn-

Vandals break into Anglican Church, LCBO over the weekend

CURRENT—Parishioners of the Holy Trinity Anglican Church are left feeling "violated" after they found the Robinson Street church broken into and ransacked over the week-

"They butted cigarettes out on the altar," Ursula Paxton, a Holy Trinity Rector's Warden, told The Expositor. "There were ashes and candlewax on the altar cloth and cigarette butts on the floor.'

She said the vandal(s) also tried to get into the church's trap door, causing insulation to be pulled out, broke into the sacristy, ransacked the office and stole a half bottle of communion wine and a butane lighter used for lighting candles on the altar.

"They knocked some stuff around and broke some praying hands," Ms. Paxton added.

She said she assumed the people responsible were after money. We don't keep any money in the church. We feel we've been violated. It's kind of upsetting."

Police canvassed the neighbourhood on Sunday, asking for people to recall any suspicious activity they might have seen over the weekend.

The OPP also responded to a break and enter at the LCBO on

Manitowaning Road in Little Cur-

Two charges against **AOK** chief withdrawn

GORE BAY—Charges of criminal breach of trust and intimidation of a justice system participant laid against Aundeck Omni Kaning Chief Patsy Corbiere, age 60, by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) at the request of the United Chiefs and Councils of Manitoulin Police Service in October of 2016 have been withdrawn. A third charge of harassment remains on the docket with a trial date scheduled to be set on June

Chief Corbiere has vowed to

contest the charge and a statement from her lawyer Michael J. N. Haraschuk of Weaver, Simmons LLP received by The Expositor regarding the charges stated: "Chief Patsy Corbiere denies the allegations and maintains her innocence. The matter is currently before the court and Chief Corbiere looks forward to vigorously defending herself."

No firm date has yet been set for a trial on the third charge against Chief Corbiere.

Central Manitoulin tax rate to rise 4.9 percent

by Michael Erskine CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The Central Manitoulin mill rate, the amount of taxes charged per \$1,000 of property assessment, will rise by 4.9 percent in 2018, following the passage of the municipal budget at the January 25 meeting of council. The overall budget for 2018 (with the educational portion estimated) will be \$9.9 million, down from last year's budget of \$10.1 million.

Overall assessment in the municipality rose by \$18.1 million (up from \$322 million in 2017 to \$330.8 million in 2018), year over year. Residential assessment in the municipality rose by \$9 million this year, while farm assessment rose by \$7 million and commercial assessment also saw a slight increase. Despite the significant increase in overall assessment, and a drop in the overall budget by roughly \$200,000 over last year and an increase in the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund transfers from the province, the mill rate still rose by 4.9 percent as other factors came into play to reduce municipal revenues from other sources, according to treasurer Denise Deforge.

Still, council was unanimous in passing the 2018 budget motion recommended from the January 24 committee of the whole meeting. The budget motion was moved by Councillor Ted Taylor and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens. Councillor Dale Scott was absent from the vote as he was attending a conference the day of the meeting.

Mayor Richard Stephens noted that the budget process had been fairly smooth going this year and that council at committee of the whole

Northern Ontario's son would have been the better choice

If there is any single action in the past few weeks that speaks to the quality of the common sense of the Progressive Conservative caucus at Queen's Park it was the choice of North Bay's Vic Fedeli as the party's interim leader, announcing that he was their preferred choice to carry the Tory blue banner into the fast looming June election with cries of jubilant "Vic Tory."

Alas, it was not to be.

In almost the same instant as Mr. Fedeli was elevated to the post of interim leader, the party's backroom operators determined that, despite the immediacy of the upcoming provincial election, and the cost in electoral powder (read money) that a leadership contest would spend, the dictates of grassroots democracy demanded they ignore the choice of the people who were elected by the people, to launch just such a divisive gladiatorial bout.

It was a decision that they likely soon came to regret. In fact, there was an eleventh hour attempt to pull their chips from the fire and cancel the leadership call, but wiser heads were failed to prevail despite the ignominious axing of the party president who led the charge for a leadership contest under his own cloud.

The dinner was a fundraiser for the 348 Manitoulin Sea Cadet Corps and there was plenty of tartan to be seen across the hall as people settled in with friends old and new.

The evening's festivities began with Piper David Beaton leading in the head table and then conducting the traditional marching in of the haggis, that Chieftain of the Pudding Race so celebrated in poem and Scottish lore.

In her welcoming address, Chief Corbiere cited the importance of the Sea Cadet Corps to the youth of her community and the important role the Sea Cadets play in teaching discipline to Island youth.

Organizer Rick McCutcheon welcomed celebrants and introduced the evening's master of ceremonies, Bernie Andrews, whose wry wit and distinctive brogue added much to the ambiance of the

...continued from page 1 some of the criteria for intervener status in common law.

In his submission to the court, Mr. Hare identified himself as an elder, retired chief and stated his band number. He declared himself a "proper person" to intervene in the matter, cithis birth in M'Chigeeng, his work in private business, for the Ontario Federation of Indian Friendship Centres, for the Department of Justice in Ottawa and for the Secretary of State. Along with personal details of his family, Mr. Hare noted that he had served as chief in the community for over 25 years, his election as a councillor

and his position as deputy grand chief of the Union of Ontario Indians for three terms. He also noted that he is a trustee of the Robinson-Huron Treaty Annuities Claim and that he is an elder, a fluent speaker of Anishinaabemowin, a resource elder for the Kina Gbezhgomi Child and Family Services Agency and that he is a pipe carrier.

He also included the assertion that "I have no axe to grind."

Mr. Hare went on to note that he is directly affected by the outcome of the election and that non-band members had voted in the election, affecting its outcome. Key to Mr. Hare's application is that he

asserted that "I will be affected by the submissions of the two parties, who are now essentially of the same position" and that "There will be no one to tell the court of the many, if not most, of the band members of this reserve respect the laws, including the Membership Code and the Custom Election Code."

Mr. Hare went on to

assert that there "may not be anyone to tell the court that there was undue pressure and intimidation by members of the communitv upon the members of the Election Appeal Committee." Mr. Hare submitted a copy of a Manitoulin Expositor article 'M'Chigeeng election tally will stand' as Exhibit A in supporting this claim. That article cited the chair of the MAC as feeling that she had been bullied.

Mr. Hare went on to say that "non-members are not required to comply with Section 5 of the Member-

verify their knowledge about the history, customs and traditions of the Anishinabek: therefore they are likely to diminish through their vote the enjoyment, survival and appreciation of our culture which will result in the continuing loss of self esteem of who I am as an Anishnabek." He went on the assert that "Protection of my rights may not be upheld if this knowledge of the history, customs and traditions of the Anishnabek is not understood and appreciated."

Mr. Hare asserted that band members were not being allowed to see the documents filed with the court by the Appeals Committee, only those of the plaintiff. "So I can bring transparency."

The former chief said he would share all documents. He also said that "I see collusion as a result of both parties withdrawing from their agreement and

ship Code which asks to verify their knowledge aside the September 11 about the history, customs the court order (setting aside the September 11).

Mr. Hare cited the values of peace, order and good government (the preamble to the Canadian Constitution) and that he felt that "there will be a fundamental breakdown of the Rule of Law in this community as a result" and "there will be no one to trust."

Since there will be no one left to argue these points following the compromised settlement reached between MAC and Ms. Debassige "our community will begin to flounder despite good managers in place."

In addition to requesting that the original order invalidating the September 9 election be upheld, Mr. Hare requested that a petition referred to in the community be ignored "as non-band members signed the petition and not all band members had a chance to view it."

Mr. Hare also requested

that the court order "an independent review of the membership list in accordance with the Membership Code to be completed within one year to restore certainty."

The submission to the court was sworn before Stacey Haner on January 27, 2018 as commissioner of oaths or as may be a lawyer.

In light of Mr. Hare's submission to the court, the court would not entertain the minutes of settlement that the MAC and Ms. Debassige had signed off ordering the reinstatement. That settlement had both parties agreeing to recognize the September 9 election and to the reinstatement of the chief and council elected in that poll, with the three-year term to commence as of the September 9 date.

Arrangements for a new election to take place sometime before April 21 are now underway.

Dog sledding alive and well in Kagawong

KAGAWONG—Jason Quinlan of Kagawong has had an interest in dog sledding from a young age and when he was old enough, began buying dogs and establishing a team.

"I remember my dad bringing home a photo of a guy who was going to the Yukon with his dogs to race," said Mr. Quinlan. "In 2003 I started learning more about dog sledding and building my team.'

Mr. Quinlan said he learned from books and acquired a mentor, a friend he still has today, who taught him about sleds and the lines (that the dogs are attached to).

"My mentor John had Siberian huskies and taught me a lot about them which is why I started with them," said Mr. Quinlan, who noted that his dogs' bloodlines track back to the 1920s. "There is a lot of history in the breed.'

Mr. Quinlan and his family currently have 14 dogs $\,$ ranging in age from five to 10 years. All are Siberian huskies except one, an Alaskan huskie named Leda.

"I use to do 6 miles sprints with the team but it took me as long to get ready as it did to do the race," laughed Mr. Quinlan. "We don't really do races very often anymore—they are costly and take a lot of time and training.

Mr. Quinlan talked about how he had done a 30

Novice Island sledders learn the ropes

LITTLE CURRENT—Nearly 50 students spent Wednesday, January 3 at the Little Current Recreation Centre with their attention focussed on snowmobiling driving instructor Scott Willis as he took them through the intricacies of safe sledding.

"That's the important thing we want people to take away from this," said Mr. Willis, "how to come home safe after a day on the trails."

Mr. Willis described the turnout for his class as "great. It's probably in part due to there not having been any group on the Island for three years."

The instructor decided to become a snowmobile driving instructor after seeking a course for his own child. "I looked into it and couldn't find anyone to do it locally," he said. "So I took the course for the Ministry of Transport

The January 3 course was Mr. Willis's first and was conducted under the guidance of master instructor Dean Gates. "He watches the first one," said Mr. Willis. "He only came up two times, just to make sure I stressed a couple of points, dotting the i and crossing the t as it were on some things that needed to be stressed.

The class ran from 9 am to 4 pm, with two three-hour sections and now that Mr. Willis is an instructor there will likely be courses held two to three times a season. "I am hoping to do one in February," he said. The date for the next course is not set yet. "It will be advertised so just watch the paper."

In order to take the course a student must be at least 12years-old, and most of those attending the course at the recreation centre appeared to be between 12 and 16, but a couple of adults had also registered. The course is manda-

Mr. Quinlan, his wife Jenn and four children moved to Manitoulin in 2016 "for a change of scenery." Mr. Quinlan began as the operations manager for Split Rail Brewing in Gore Bay, while Ms. Quinlan started at Manitoulin Trans-

The Expositor quickly learned during its Tuesday morning visit to the Quinlan's Kagawong home that sled dogs

"We feed them twice a day and take them out for rides two or three times a week," he said. "Sled dogs are bred for a purpose and love doing their job. They have so much fun going out with the sled. Depending on the conditions we use a four wheeler."

Each morning begins with Mr. Quinlan, with the help of his family, preparing and feeding the 14 dogs.

The team eats a high calorie diet of dense food made for working dogs. Water is added into the food (a mix of raw meat and special kibble) to help the dogs stay hydrated in the winter. In addition to their meals they get snacks and lots of water after runs.

After each dog is fed, Mr. Quinlan cleans up their fencedin yard and gives each dog an individual visit.

"It's important that I visit with each of them individually each day," said Mr. Quinlan. "It lets me spend some oneon-one time with them and check each dog to ensure that they are healthy and happy. There is a lot of work that goes into caring for the dogs behind the scenes."

When it is time to take the dogs out for a run, the dogs selected for the team are placed in their harness (each specific to them) and taken out and attached to their position

If there isn't enough snow to go sledding, Mr. Quinlan attaches the lines and dogs to a four-wheeler.

"It's all about safety first," Mr. Quinlan told The Expositor, "for the dogs and for people. Icy conditions are hard on the dogs and make things dangerous."

When training the dogs for a specific event, Mr. Quinlan takes it slowly.

"Sled dogs are long distance athletes," he explained. "I train them in stages and each season we start over. We go slow at first, getting the muscles developed and conditioning the ligaments and joints. Dogs will inherently go as hard and long as you let them, but you need to control the team so they don't get injured."

Mr. Quinlan said that his dogs also look forward to events and getting to visit with the public.

They get a lot of enjoyment from running and going out and meeting people," said Mr. Quinlan. "We also take people out for sled rides, which the dogs really enjoy.'

When asked if Mr. Quinlan and his team will get back

into racing he replied, "Who knows. Right now I am just enjoying the journey. Dog sledding has been part of my life for the past 20 years and I hope it can continue to be.'

...continued from page 1 tory in order to operate a snowmachine on the trails.

"It is important to know that unless you are over 16, you can't cross roads with a snowmachine," he said. "So, between the ages of 12and 15-years-old, you can't cross roads."

There are a lot of rules involved in the operation of a snowmachine, noted Mr. Willis. "A large part of this course is explaining to the young people that these aren't just 'mom and dad's' rules. There are serious consequences if you don't follow them.'

The morning session is a classroom session going over those MTO rules and regulations, while the afternoon was described as a more hands on session. The students learn the importance of proper attire, hand signals and "what you need to do to get home safe." Included in the afternoon session are such practical things as safely changing

Outdoor learning spaces welcome at Island daycares

centres in Little Current and Mindemoya have welcomed new, outdoor learning spaces to their daycares in recent months.

"We believe that children learn best through strong relationships with their families, educators and other children environment, said Diana St. Pierre, children's services program director, Manitoulin Family Resources. "Creating a rich natural environment allows children to explore and question nature. Discover and observe how nature grows.'

Research suggests that connection to the natural world contributes to children's mental, physical, emotional, and spiritual health and well-being. Providing daily opportunities to explore, care for, and interact with the natural world helps to strengthen these connections," Ms. St. Pierre noted.

'Over four years ago we started dreaming of creating a richer outdoor space for the children attending the Little Current Child Care Centre," Ms. St. Pierre explained. "With the financial support from the District Services Board and through funding from the Ministry of Education we were able to start this process. We also received some additional funding from TD Friends of the Environment to purchase some of the plants for our space. Looking at many outdoor playground companies, we chose Bienenstock. The staff was very helpful and flexible through the whole process. Once Little Current's design was completed we were in the process of a possible expansion of our child care programs in Mindemoya as well and were able to receive more funding to build a new outdoor learning space there as well."

It was important to MFR to have a piece of the community in the design so children would have a sense of belonging. During the beginning stages of designing Little Current's space a bridge to bring children across to "goat island" with a rock creek flowing under the bridge was envisioned. "The landscape is hilly for gross motor skills and symbolizes our island landscape. With the high costs, we had to take out the bridge for the time being but with plans to have a bridge built in the future.,' she said.

In Mindemoya, the outdoor space includes a pathway flowing around a mass of land which represents Treasure Island.

"We were able to obtain

donated logs, gravel, sand and boulders all from local companies to keep all materials from the Island," Ms. St. Pierre added.

Once the project had a tart date of this past Octo ber, that's when the excitement started.

Parents, family members and staff, along with the Northeast Town Mayor Al McNevin and the DSB's Children's Services Supervisor Lori Clark came out to break ground in Little Current and help demolish the "old, dull" play space.

"It was so exciting to see both projects come together," Ms. St. Pierre added. "With H&R Noble delivering boulders from Lafarge, H&R Noble donating gravel and sand and more boulders courtesy of Don Eadie Construction. Evan Roy of ER Construction hauled cedar logs from Don Eadie Construction as well as hardwood logs from John Lewis's sawmill. Paul Sheppard from Sheppard Brothers Construction loaded up stumps for us in his field."

Throughout the construction phase the children from child care, Early ON programs and the school watched, observed, did predictions of what the playground would look like documented process. Once the construction phase was completed, students from the school were invited to help with

the planting. "We look forward to added bits and pieces to the spaces, growing vegetables, creating habitats for animals and insects to learn from," she said.

'We welcome you to come and discover our spaces in both Little Current and Mindemoya," Ms. St. Pierre concluded.

ing it will loop the Island the opposite direction and then head back to Sudbury. The Sudbury stops will include Laurentian University, Health Sciences North and the Northland bus terminal on the Kingsway. The bus will also stop in Espanola at DFR Family Restaurant. It will operate five days a week."

Although the agencies in the other communities haven't been selected yet, the bus will be stopping in Aundeck Omni Kaning, M'Chigeeng, Kagawong, Gore Bay, Spring Bay, Mindemoya, Sandfield, South Baymouth, Wiikwemkoong, M'Chigeeng and Sheguiandah. The agencies will not only sell tickets, but will also be the pick up and drop off location in each area. During last week's trip, Ontario Northland also explored adding a stop in Evansville due to feedback from a recent Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) meeting.

"We supply each of the agencies with a monitor, the system, a printer and provide staff training," explained Ontario Northland Agency Sales Coordinator Marc Dubeau. "We have some locations in mind to be agencies and I will be approaching them soon. We just wanted to get some more feedback from the community about the route first."

Along the way, Mr. Dubeau pointed to locations in each community he hoped to secure as agencies, noting that ample parking and a central community location were key factors.

The Expositor's fellow passengers included inaugural bus tripper Guy Dumas of March of Dimes Canada (MODC) who is spearheading the United Manitoulin Transit, a committee of service providers and Island organizations looking to improve transportation on Manitoulin.

Although the committee was struck prior to Ontario Northland announcing the new Manitoulin bus route, Mr. Dumas said that they will still be moving forward seeking funding for a feasibility study on improving and expanding transportation on Manitoulin.

"Ontario Northland has been seeking feedback from us about the route and new service," explained Mr. Dumas. "This service will be great for Manitoulin, but we are still moving forward on a feasibility study."

The Ministry of Northern Development and Mines (MNDM) recently announced that it would be launching a Community Transportation Grant Program to help municipalities, Indigenous communities and other organizations throughout the province provide more travel options in areas that are not served, or underserved by public transit and intercommunity bus.

"There is funding out there for municipalities and First Nations to develop their own infrastructure to help supplement the Ontario Northland service," said Mr. Dumas. "I'm encouraging municipalities and Indigenous communities to access these funds."

Although the cost of the Manitoulin bus service hasn't been officially set yet, Mr. Grube said that they will be keeping ticket costs as reasonable as possible and that

passengers shouldn't expect to pay more then \$20 a trip.

"We also have a 'track my bus' feature through the Ontario Northland website that allows passengers to see where the bus is on its route," said Mr. Dubeau. "Individuals will also be able to book and reserve tickets and view the schedule online."

The bus service will also allow individuals to ship parcels which will be same day or next day delivery.

"Passengers travelling with their bike will be able to purchase a bike box for \$20 which will be stored in the luggage compartment under the bus," added Mr. Grube. "The box will ensure that both the bike and other passengers' luggage is protected."

Ontario Northland will be expanding its bus service to other areas in the north as well including Espanola, Sault Ste Marie, Wawa and White River. "The new routes will make life easier for Northerners by connecting our passengers to hospitals and college and university campuses," said a press release from Ontario Northland. "The expansion is part of the provincial government's investment into improved intercommunity bus transportation in the North."

"We're adding over 750 kilometers and 20 communities to our system," added Director of Passenger Operations Tracy MacPhee. "We look forward to conveniently connecting passengers where they need to be; whether for medical appointments, school, travel or family visits."

...continued from page 3 had been unanimous in the

passage of the motion.

"As you can see from the budget figures, our revenue for 2018 is anticipated to be about \$7 million, while our operating costs are a little over \$6 million," said Mayor Stephens. "That leaves us with a surplus of about \$900,000 for capital expenditures."

The approved capital expenditures will be around \$3.1 million, noted the mayor, while transfers in the form of provincial grants for capital will be "a little more than \$2 million." The rest will be dealt with through "some financing."

The \$175,000 shortfall in operating funds will be

made up through surplus reserves. "The net result is quite respectable," said Mayor Stephens. "It leaves us in good stead." The biggest costs have been the new fire hall, he noted.

Councillor Derek Stephens agreed that the result was not out of line when taken in context. "In the life of this council we have seen a 25 percent reduction, 15 percent in the first year and 10 percent in the second," he said. "Last year we went up 4.9 percent and again this year by 4.9 percent. That means we will still be lower than when we came in."

"As you know we started at zero percent and ended up at 4.9 percent," said Mayor Stephens. "We didn't want to deplete any further our reserves."

Councillor Alex Baran noted that the amount of capital spending in the municipal budget matches well with the projected spending in the town's asset management plan. "It's good to see," he said.

"I think we may be the first municipality to have finalized their budget," said Mayor Stephens.

The final tally that will be seen on the municipal tax bills when they arrive in property owner's mailboxes will vary slightly from the budget numbers passed by council as the final education levy rate has not yet been finalized.

Mr. Leonard and his three-man team arrived in Little Current on Saturday evening and got right to work. "It takes about 36 to 40 hours to completion," he

said on Monday evening. "I am just about ready for a nap about now." He will be onsite for "90 percent of the time."

"We have a couple of floods to do yet," he explained on Monday, then it is down to the fine art of scrapping and pebbling.

Strangely, cold is a bigger challenge to the ice maker than heat. "We want heat, actually," he said. "The ideal is around 40 degrees Fahrenheit." So fans need not fear, the radiant heat in the stands will be going strong.

Along with his three-man professional team, the committee that brought the Northern Traveler's Ontario Men's Championship to the Island has arranged a small army of local volunteers who will be assisting in maintaining the curling sheets in tip top shape throughout the week-

Mr. Leonard said that the ice plant in the arena has "plenty of horsepower" to do the job and that he was confident. "The bigger challenges are usually air temperature and humidity," he said. As for his prediction on whether the ice will be slow or fast during this competition, the ice maker did not hesitate for a second. "It will be fast," he

Mr. Leonard made one more prediction for the ice on the weekend. "This will be the best ice they will play on all week," he laughed.

Manitoulin Brewing Company introduces new small batch brews

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Brewing Company (MBC) has been busy over the winter collaborating with Manitoulin businesses on two new small batch brews.

Recently, MBC introduced a porter, containing dark chocolate from Manitoulin Chocolate Works in Kagawong, and a cream ale, featuring Isleaway honey from Lake Manitou. Kendra Edwards Design of Little Current designed the small batch brew labels.

"The porter is a dark ale," explained Blair Hagman of the MBC. "We sourced dark chocolate from Manitoulin Chocolate Works. We mixed the chocolate and malt together and the flavour really comes through in the finished taste-there are subtle notes of chocolate and coffee."

Louise McKeen of Manitoulin Chocolate Works said she enjoyed collaborating with MBC.

"This is the first time we have collaborated with a brewery," said Ms. McKeen. "I had never thought about it before. Blair (Hagman) told me about the flavour he was looking for and we prepared a 53/70 dark chocolate blend. I'm in Perth for the winter (at the other Chocolate Works location), we haven't had a chance to try it, but we are looking forward to it."

Ms. McKeen said that her daughter Heather, who operates the Perth location, has been speaking with a local brewery in their area who approached her about making a chocolate with its mocha stout.

With the new MBC golden cream ale, honey from Isleaway was added during the boil when creating the

"We connected with Isleaway in Mindemoya and used 6 kg in the creation of the cream ale," explained Mr. Hagman. "There are subtle notes of honey in the taste and aroma with a balanced crisp malt finish. The golden colour comes from the malt and the honey mixing together during the boil."

'We were very pleased when we were contacted regarding the possibility of using our Isleaway honey as an ingredient in one of their new brews," said owners Dave and Nancy Kains. "We appreciate MBC's efforts to shop local, including the sourcing of ingredients. The results have proven themselves as we have sampled the new cream ale and are encouraged with the results. It was outstanding.'

"We just created 2,000 litres of each small batch and are just selling it from the retail shop at the brewery (in Little Current)," explained fellow MBC founder Nishin Meawasige. "We want Islanders to be the first to try them and we want to hear their feedback."

The pair revealed that they have a third small batch brew in the tank but were closed lips about what type.

"We will be announcing the third beer soon," said Mr. Hagman.

"We really want locals to try these new beers and let us know what they think," added Mr. Hag-man. "Based on the feedback we get one could become part of our core brand and be branched out to LCBO and licenced establishments."

"I was pleased to work with another local business on designing the small batch labels," said Kendra Edwards Kendra Edwards Design. "It was also great getting to taste test the new prod-

MBC brand ambassador John Kift has been travelling over the winter across Ontario, expanding MBC's reach.

Eight o'clock, I'm in my bunk. One cat across my knees, they'll maybe warm up. I'll be happy when this cold weather takes a hike.



Oh' Dem Achy Bones - Part 2

by Dr. Janice Mitchell With cold winter temperatures and the accompanying stiff achey bodies, part two of this article, as promised, will focus on the supplements and medications used to combat chronic joint pain.

There are numerous treatments and products to manage joint pain.

Each one has proponents and detractors. One thing that is agreed on by experts is that arthritis management should be "multimodal" which means best results come when many different approaches are used concurrently.

Let's start with the cartilage and muscle support supplements.

The body has natural mechanisms to rebuild damaged cartilage and improve muscle mass on its own but these mechanisms require raw materials. A common method of addressing arthritis, especially when it is in earlier stages,



is to provide these materials orally as nutritional supplements. There are two important caveats:

· First, these products require weeks to build up in the body to a point where there is a detectable result. They are considered slow-acting, plus their effects are generally

 You can identify products that have been authorized for sale in Canada by looking for the eight-digit Natural Product Number (NPN) or Homeopathic Medicine Number (DIN-HM) on the label. A NPN or DINHM means that the product can be legally sold in Canada and is safe and effective when used according to the instructions on the label.

1. Glucosamine and chondroitin sulfate.

These products are cartilage components harvested chiefly from sea mollusks. By taking these components orally, the patient is able to have plenty of the necessary building blocks needed to repair damaged cartilage.

2. Creatine: Creatine is a substance contained mostly in muscle and taking supplements in modest doses will improve endurance and muscle strength.

3. MSM (Methyl Sulfonyl Methane): MSM provides nutritional building blocks for cartilage repair. Beyond this, MSM seems to have anti-inflammatory properties and may act as an antioxidant.

4. Hyaluronic acid: Helpful especially in the production of lubricating joint (synovial) fluid.

There are also a number of natural extracts and herbal products with anti-inflammatory properties. Some are antioxidants while others interfere with the inflammatory cas-

...continued from page 21 cade to limit pain as well as the inflammation.

Most are modest in their abilities. Some are fast acting while others must build up in the body for several weeks. For brevity purposes, I will list off the commonly used anti-inflammatory supplements.

- 1. Green-lipped mussel extract
- 2. Omega Three Fatty acids: derived from coldwater fish oils, this supplement has primarily been used to treat itchy skin but has also benefited many arthritic dogs and cats. These products require at least one month to build up to adequate amounts.
- 3. Devils' Claw (a South African herb) and similar plant polyphenols like turmeric.
- 4. Cannabinoids currently there are numerous legal and regulatory issues surrounding this one.
- 5. Antioxidants such as Vitamin C, Vitamin E, sAMe they help inactivate free radical molecules and slow age-related changes.

And now for the prescription medications. Two major categories include the anti-inflammatories (known as the Non-Steroidal Anti-Inflammatories or NSAIDS) and the

straight pain relief medications.

...Paws for Thought

NSAIDS work by suppressing the effects of prostaglandins.

Prostaglandins are important mediators of inflammation and pain in joints and we definitely want less of them. That said, there are "good" prostaglandins that one needs to maintain kidney and stomach circulation.

So we want to hamper bad prostaglandins and leave the good ones alone.

Common NSAIDS that achieve this are prescribed by your veterinarian and may include meloxicam, deracoxib and robenacoxib to name a few. Cats are uniquely sensitive to these medications as the feline liver processes them extremely slowly. Meloxicam and robenacoxib are approved for cats and only for extremely brief use (single use or a few days only).

What about aspirin? Human beings are much more resistant to the problems caused by suppressing good prostaglandins. Most of us can just grab a bottle of ibuprofen or aspirin out of the medicine cabinet and take a couple of pills when

we have inflammatory pain. The problem with the human over-the-counter NSAIDS is that they suppress all prostaglandins both good and bad and this is not really optimal/safe pain treatment for dogs and is out of the question for cats. When it comes to NSAIDs, it is crucial to consult your veterinarian.

Straight pain relief medications, such gabapentin and tramadol, do nothing for the disease process but they do help with the pain. They can be combined with each other and/or with any of the othmedications/supplements listed here. These medications have some potential for drowsiness that will make a weak animal even weaker, so it is important to find the dose that relieves pain and improves mobility without making the pet sleepy.

In conclusion, the arthritic pet has a large menu of medications to select from and while proper medication is an important part of therapy, weight control and proper exercise should not be forgotten. Proper exercise is excellent

physical therapy for the arthritic pet, as it

is crucial to maintain as much muscle mass as possible to support the abnormal joint. Remember, treatment for joint disease is likely to involve a combination of medications in addition to physical activities and to check with your veterinarian before attempting to assemble a regimen on your own.




