## Water levels on inland lakes are below recommended minimums

MANITOULIN—The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) tracks water levels on a number of inland lakes on Manitoulin Island and those lakes are either close to or below their recommended levels.

"We track the water levels on the three lakes on the Island, each of which has an MNRF operating dam: Lake Manitou, Mindemoya Lake and Big Lake," said Brian Riche, Sudbury District resources management supervisor with the MNRF, in an email communication with The Expositor. "We also monitor the water levels of Kagawong Lake through the Water Management Plan for the Kagawong Power dam.'

Shoreline residents on Big Lake have been noting that the current levels are the lowest they have seen in their lifetimes. While low water levels on inland lakes with dams are often controversial, with an associated tendency toward hyperbole in debate, in this case the data seems to back that observation up.

"Water levels for Lake Manitou, Mindemoya Lake, Big Lake and Kagawong Lake are close to or below the bottom of recommended winter levels," confirmed Mr. Riche. "We have had this past

## **Manitoulin ranked No. 15** for Ontario opioid deaths

Ranking drops from No.1 in world this summer

MANITOULIN-It was just this past summer that Manitoulin found itself touted in the media as having the dubious distinction of having the highest number of opiod-related deaths per capita in the world, but more recent statistics contained in a November 2016 research report 'Opiod Use and Related Adverse Events in Ontario' have relegated Manitoulin to 15th in that category.

The report, published by The Ontario Drug Policy Research Network, are according to the report, "a province-wide network of researchers who provide timely, high quality, drug policy relevant research to decision makers.<sup>3</sup>

"It is very hard to get up to date numbers," noted Brenda Stankiewicz, a public health nurse with the Sudbury District Health Unit (SDHU). "We are usually about two years behind."

The recent report, which covers opioid-related deaths over a fiveyear period between 2009 and 2013 (the most recent year for which statistics are available), averages yearly opioid-related deaths during this period per 10,000 population (using population estimates from Statistics Canada). The data on cause of deaths was obtained from the Office of the Chief Coroner of Ontario's mortality data

## Blue Umbrella program to expand to Manitoulin Island

Program seeks to help communities provide support for residents living from dementia

SUDBURY—There are many challenges presented by an aging society and few are more daunting than those dealing with the rise of incidents of dementia, such as Alzheimer's, in the general public. While we have all heard plenty of comedy routines and jokes based on the loss of memory and cognitive abilities, dementia is no laughing matter to those afflicted or to the people who care for them. The Alzheimer's Society's Blue Umbrella Program is seeking to help communities to provide support for those suffering from dementia.

Piloted in Bobcaygeon, the Blue Umbrella Program grew out of the concept of the dementia-friendly community, which itself was developed in Japan as a response to a rapidly aging population.

According to the Alzheimer's Society, dementia-friendly communities 'help people with dementia feel included and supported in the places they work, live and play. Dementia-friendly communities began in Japan as a way to support the increasing numbers of people living with dementia as a result of an aging population. From there, the initiative spread to the United Kingdom.

The program successfully rolled out in Thunder Bay and North Bay in 2016 and was introduced to Sudbury in the latter part of the year.

"The official name of the program is 'Living Well With Dementia Blue Umbrella Program'," said Jessica Bertuzzi-Gallo, public relations/community development representative with the Alzheimer Society Sudbury-Manitoulin North Bay and Districts. Ms. Bertuzzi-Gallo noted that since the program's launch in Sudbury the response has been brisk. "We have been getting a lot of interest," she said. "It is picking up steam big time.

Ms. Bertuzzi-Gallo noted that a dementia-friendly community focuses on stigma reduction and the inclusion of people with dementia. "People are educated about dementia and know that a person with dementia may sometimes experience the world differently," she said. "In a dementia-friendly community, people living with dementia feel supported by their community members whether they are at post offices, retail out-

lets, using transportation or enjoying hobbies out in the community." The term "community," she points out, can mean a location like a neighbourhood or city, "but can also include groups of people with shared interests or features, such as professional groups, religious organizations or businesses." What this means is that while your municipality can become a Dementia-Friendly Community, so can your book club, faith group or business, such as a local coffee shop or grocery store. In fact, one of the key elements of the Blue Umbrella program is that the Alzheimer's Society will book a short 30-minute training seminar with your group or business to learn how to engage with dementia suffers (and their caregivers).

The seminars teach how to communicate and best serve persons with dementia and their caregivers," explained Ms. Bertuzzi-Gallo. This allows people to feel comfortable going out in the community without experiencing stigma

An example might be if a dementia sufferer is standing in line at the bank. One of the bank employees might take the client off to a quieter part of the office to assist them with their business. Simple things like eye-contact and understanding how dementia can impact a person's cognitive functions can help reduce stress on both sides of the counter.

According to Ms. Bertuzzi-Gallo, dementia-friendly communities "are defined by both their social and physical characteristics. These attributes can help support people with dementia by reducing anxiety, stigma or frustration.

So in dementia-friendly communities, people come to realize that those with dementia are more than their diagnosis.

Dementia can affect a person's cognition, behaviour, emotions and physical capabilities, and everyone can play a role in recognizing people

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

## Liberal's Achille's Heel is Justin Trudeau's elite label

You don't have to look too far to see where the Conservative, NDP, and yes, Liberal, strategists believe the is key to scrapping some of the polish off of Liberal leader Justin Trudeau's shine in the polls. A brief glance at some of the front pages of the major newspapers tells the story.

Playing on the nice hair theme, the opposition parties and their teams are taking every effort to paint that picture in people's minds before the next federal election cycle comes around.

With previous Liberal leaders, the well-oiled and well-financed Tory attack machine were able to set their own hooks to bring them down by getting in early and planting the seed that could then be nurtured into a poll winning strategy.

In that manner, Stephane Dion, a bona fide Canadian hero with a reputation as a paragon of integrity, a man who kept the nation together during one of its darkest hours during the Quebec referendum, was painted as a fool who would lead the nation into penury through his ill-advised strategy of combating climate change. Then the big guns turned on his successor, Michael Ignatieff, a man with a towering global reputation as a thinker who, like so many other Canadian icons, had built much of his fame in academia, and overseas. He was painted as a selfish glory seeker who was simply "not in it for you."

This strategy of attack ads setting the narrative backfired when it came to Justin Trudeau because, unlike his predecessors in the crosshairs, Canadians already had a long standing narrative to fall back on. Many of us had grown up with him, he had a winning smile, and yes, great hair, but he also followed a strategy of hope, a belief that we could find a better, more quintessentially Canadian way of approaching challenges. Sunny ways.

This played so well against the angry old stock male persona that Canadians had come to associate with the Harper government that, once they started to pay attention, resonated in the Canadian psyche. Of course, it helped tremendously that the polished, very accomplished political warrior that is NDP leader Tom Mulcair lost credibility by attempting to be Liberal-lite, some might even suggest Torylite in the end (not to mention that his Angry Tom played poorly against his own predecessor Jack Layton's Smiling Jack version of sunny ways).

Deep in backrooms of the various party headquarters (perhaps in an atmosphere no longer heavy with cigar smoke and the smell of expensive scotch, but still well shrouded in shadows), strategists have poured over the entrails provided by focus groups and targeted polls to settle on where the best traction can be found.

So for the foreseeable future, expect more stories of the prime minister hanging out with well-heeled old family friends like the fabled Aga Khan (a pall bearer at Justin Trudeau's father's funeral) because, well, how else to convince the electorate that Trudeau the Younger is not in touch with their daily travails? The lightweight-nice hair mud just didn't have much sticking power. Apparently we kinda like our leaders young, hip and stylish.

On the other side of the ledger, between now and the next federal election, expect to see a lot more of the prime minister connecting with "ordinary" Canadians and criss-crossing the country on campaign-style junkets. Because the Liberal strategists know through their own focus groups and polling that this is where the answer to their opponent's gambit lies.

Sadly, the new political reality seems to be focussed solely on facile stratagems conducted for a celebrity, reality television driven world, and we in the fifth estate seem destined to play the enablers to this deplorable waste of time. Because in a celebrity, reality television driven world, those stories sell.

We can only hope and pray that those headed into the next round of focus groups and polling responses identify policy initiatives and sensible long-term planning as the government of the day's Achilles Heel. Perhaps then we can have government's totally focussed on the job at hand, because, in a phrase coined by the late, great Liberal 'Rainmaker' Keith Davey, in politics—perception is reality.

## Manitoulin in 1867 Part II: Manitoulin's Anishinaabe residents

EDITOR'S NOTE: In the first edition of the Manitoulin Expositor for 2017 Shelley Pearen gave readers a glimpse of Manitoulin in 1867. She summarized Manitoulin's history and described a typical New Years. Today she describes the resettlement of the Anishinaabeg occurring in 1867. In future columns she hopes to describe the first non-Native settlers, settlements and industry.

In 1867, Manitoulin was five years into its post-treaty transition from ancient home of the Anishinaabeg, to surveyed land claimed by settlers, farmers and speculators with clusters of lots assigned to the Anishinaabeg.

The Indian Department's local superintendent, Charles Dupont, was desperately trying to resettle the Anishinaabeg according to the terms of the 1862 treaty. Meanwhile, Anishinaabe leaders were attempting to have the treaty annulled.

Every Anishinaabe was supposed to "make his own selection" providing the lots were adjoining, and in compact settlements away from potential town plots, harbours, and mill sites. These rules potentially affected every Anishinaabe resident of the Island.

Dupont devised his own plan. He proposed making three Indian settlements, at "Sheguiaindoh, Metchekewedenong, or Sheshegwahning." When the people resisted, he revised his plans, repeatedly.

In June 1866, land was released for sale in the newly created Howland, Sheguiandah, Bidwell, and Billings Townships, although many Anishinaabeg were still residing on these lots.

Dupont's entire Indian resettlement scheme came into question in 1867 after he declared that all the Anishinaabe residents of Little Current and Manitowaning should move to Sheguiandah, and then he applied to purchase lots in Little Current and Manitowaning for himself.

The Anishinaabe population of Manitoulin in 1867 was at least 1,300. Rev. Jabez Sims at Manitowaning estimated the non-Native population at less than 120, including his family of 9, and 8 Roman Catholic priests, Brothers and Sisters.

As resettlement proceeded the Anishinaabeg realized that some of the promises made before and during the treaty negotiations were worthless.

John Arthur Manitowaussen wanted to settle as a merchant in Little Current but despite being acknowledged as intelligent, literate and industrious, his application was refused and he was told to devote himself to agriculture.

Joseph Shewetagun (sometimes known as Joseph Salter) was in the sugar bush when he learned that Superintendent Dupont had sold his four-year-old log home at Little Current. He returned home to discover the new owner had taken over. Joseph had no choice but to move his family to Sucker Creek. He eventually received \$15 for his house but nothing for his garden or lost income.

It is possible to trace most Anishinaabe families' journeys from their pre-treaty to post-treaty lives. The story of the men who signed or rejected the 1862 treaty provides a glimpse of the transition. Though by 1865 all the treaty signatories except Assiginack regretted signing the treaty and attempted to have the document annulled, they were resettled along with their bands.

Chief Jean-Baptiste Assiginack died at Manitowaning in 1866. Benjamin Assiginack and his family were relocated to their garden plots at Sucker Lake, which became a reserve for members of the Assiginack and Tehkummah families.

Chief Maishegonggai of Manitowaning had been told at the treaty negotiations that "the Indians should have their pick of the best land in the Island and the white men shall have the remainder." Maishegonggai was also promised that he could return to his Sheguiandah birthplace if the treaty was signed. He and the rest of Manitowaning's residents were caught up in Dupont's numerous resettlement plans, assigned and then reassigned lots in Sheguiandah and Manitowaning. Chief Maishegonggai was eventually permitted to return to Sheguiandah. Most of his band members were persuaded to join him.

The actual Sheguiandah settlement was located south of their original location on the bay, despite their request for land north and west of Bass Lake if a move was necessary.

Chief Okemah beness and Charles Keghikgoobeness also joined the Sheguiandah settlement in 1867. Dupont merged Maishegonggai's and Okemah beness' bands but within a few years some of the latter's band declared: "We have nothing to do with Meshahquangas people, we want to live in our Reserve." Several families returned to their traditional land at Whitefish River.

Chief Baibomsai claimed that he had been promised land at Sheguiandah during the treaty. His claim was ignored and he was settled at Whitefish River.

At Wewebijiwang (or Little Current) Chief Kushkewahbic (or Columbus), Joseph Shewetagun, George Obettossoway and their neighbours did not want to leave their settlement where they had developed a profitable trade in steamboat wood. Dupont persisted and they were persuaded to move four miles inland to Sucker Creek over the winter of 1866-67 and told to become farmers.

The Obettossoway (or Ahbedossway or Abotossway) family had settled at Little Current in the early 1850s and had successfully supplied wood to the steamboats and provided temporary accommodation for many years there. George said he had been told at the treaty that he would be permitted to remain at Little Current but Dupont insisted that he move to the new Sucker Creek Reserve.

Michigiwatinong (now M'Chigeeng) and Sheshegwaning residents were more fortunate than others in the post treaty land shuffle. They were assigned land close to their settlements. This was due to their isolated location and their unanimous resistance rather than government benevolence. Michigiwatinong chiefs Paimoquonaishkung and Taibosegai and head men Abence and Naiwotaikezhik and their band were assigned to lots between "Honora Bay," now West Bay, and Lake Mindemoya.

Sheshegwaning's Chief Itawashkash and his band were also allowed to remain near their traditional land.

South Bay West's Chief Waibenessieme died in January 1867. His band was under pressure from aggressive settlers by 1867. The band was relocated.

Maple Point's Chief Pahtahdagwishkung and his band moved west. They preferred isolation and tradition to Western civilization and Christianization.

Wikwemikong's Chief Louis Tehkummah was expelled from Wikwemikong in November 1863 for supporting the treaty. He lived in Manitowaning until the Indian Department agreed to settle the Assiginack and Tehkummah families at Sucker Lake.

The Wikwemikong chiefs tried repeatedly to have the 1862 treaty annulled. By 1865 they had been joined in their action by all the signatory chiefs. Chief J.B. Atagiwinini died in 1867. His son Jako remained active in anti-treaty activity. Chief Louis Wakekijik and Chief Tomah Kinojameg (or Mokomanish) and their families, and other Wikwemikong residents, were punished for their anti-treaty activity. Their names were removed from the Robinson treaty annuity list by Superintendent Ironside in 1862, and were not reinstated until 1896.

In 1867 the Anishinaabeg were being isolated on reservations, just as a generation earlier they had been isolated on the island itself.

Shelley Pearen has been researching Manitoulin history for 40 years. Her ancestors settled on Manitoulin prior to 1867 and witnessed this period of transition. She is the author of the popular books 'Four Voices The Great Manitoulin Island Treaty of 1862' and 'Exploring Manitoulin.' Ms. Pearen is currently transcribing and translating the Jesuit's Wikwemikong Diarium 1844-1873.

## A Lester B. Pearson Award Student Reflects on Canada's Coming of Age (1966-2016)

EDITOR'S NOTE: In conjunction with Canada's Sesquicentennial in 2017, members of the Manitoulin Writers' Circle are crafting stories and poems to pay tribute to our country on this pivotal milestone birthday. The following memoir takes the reader back to that period just before Expo '67 when both the country and the Baby Boomers were coming of age. by Margo Little

Cool April breeze was blowing off Harrington Lake as the Prime Minister, sporting a fine cut Maple Leaf Tartan sports jacket and clutching his walking stick, gazed across the water at the thick forest around his tranquil summer home. The occasion was his 69th birthday and he was joined in the celebration by visitors from his home riding of Algoma East which included Manitoulin Island.

In the spring of 1966 I was fortunate to be one of nine young people selected from the high schools in Lester B. Pearson's electoral district to travel to Ottawa and witness the workings of government first hand.

Although tours of Rideau Hall, the National Gallery, the RCMP barracks, the Experimental Farm, the National Parliament, the Americar Council, Carleton University were all memorable, it was the interlude at Harrington Lake that lingered in my memory. In my trip diary I wrote about the mood of that special day: "In the house we saw all of Mr. Pearson's grandchildren. Michael was the most lively youngster and kept wanting his picture taken. Mr. Pearson had an old pole he had picked up to use for a walking stick instead of using the one he got for his birthday. He received several funny cards and passed his chocolates around. We all had Cokes while he lit a fire in the hearth. It seemed very cosy." At that time our young country was preparing to mark 100 years since Confederation and there was a communal sense that Canada was definitely coming of age and was destined to play an even more crucial role in international affairs. It seemed fitting that our Prime Minister would invite a teenage delegation to dine with him and learn how things were done in the nation's capital. As Grade 12 and 13 students we were approaching graduation and the choices of work or university As youth raised and educated in rural Northern Ontario we led somewhat sheltered and insular lives so the opportunity to be the guest of the PM was very exciting. It was as if we were all family; after all, our national leader was known simply as "Mike" and he seemed very down to earth and approachable. When the invitation went out, I got the nod from Gore Bay High, Milford George represented Little Current, Vicki Farquhar, Mindemoya and Daniel Manitowabi was designated by Wikwemikong. Chapleau sent Robert

McEachren, Elliot Lake, Mary McGurk, Thessalon, Alice Wolgemuth, Blind River, Regina Samulski and Espanola, Eric Ralph. Austin Hunt of Kagawong and Mary Macdonald, the PM's secretary, served as our chaperones and guides for the trip.

Before we arrived at that 69th birthday celebration, Mike Pearson had lived a life and then some. He had been a soldier, a businessman, a coach, a scholar, a civil servant, a professor and a diplomat. He had participated in the Hague Conference on the Codification of International Law, the Geneva World Disarmament Conference and the organizing of the League of Nations. In the 1940s he served as assistant under secretary for External Affairs in Ottawa and became ambassador to the US. And in the 1950s he was chair of the NATO council and president of the UN general assembly. In 1957 he won the Nobel Prize for organizing the UN Emergency Force to resolve the Suez Canal Crisis. We regarded him as the father of Canada's image as a peacekeeper in the world.

Looking back at the black and white photographs snapped on that momentous day in the Gatineau Hills. I

ing Question Period in the House of Commons: "The members seemed to be poking fun at each other. Questions from the Opposition were quite often asked with tongue in cheek. Later one of our group made the inadvertent remark that the Government did not seem to be doing much work. Of course, that brought gales of laughter."

Another highlight of the trip was, of course, dining with the Pearson family at 24 Sussex Drive. In my diary I recorded the gracious way we were greeted: "We were presented with red roses to pin on our dresses. My rose really stood out on my jade green suit. We went into the living room where we met Mrs. Pearson and also Mrs. Jeff Pearson (the Prime Minister's daughter-in-law.) We were given orange juice to drink before lunch. Mr. Pearson was in gay spirits because it was his birthday. His wife gave him a carved walking stick and our group presented some Manitoulin maple syrup. The PM received several humourous cards. For lunch we had fish, potatoes, peas and ice cream for dessert. We all had place cards and the meal was lovely except for the confusion among many concerning the finger bowls. After lunch we went out to the lawn for coffee and saw a wonderful view of the river." In retrospect, I appreciate that we were very lucky to enjoy that intimate time with "Mike" and to get a glimpse into the family life at 24 Sussex and Harrington Lake. It was a precious encounter since he retired two years after our visit and he passed away in 1972. I can only imagine what he was contemplating as he drew us all together that day by the lake: the affairs of state undoubtedly weighed heavily upon his mind. On Canada's 150th birthday July 1, 2017, I will be remembering the nine young men and women who travelled by train to experience this life altering event; I can only hope that the peace of Harrington Lake remains in their hearts wherever they have journeyed in life.

notice that we are all looking to the horizon with expectation and satisfaction. Perhaps we all wanted to cherish and preserve the peace that was the hallmark of Canada in the mid-60s. Now as Canada reaches its sesquicentennial, the Baby Boomers have a chance to reflect on 50 years of life experience and to watch the current generation cope with a world we could never have envisioned during the lead up to the monumental Expo '67.

The PM's hospitable gesture received some press coverage April 22-23, 1966. The Sudbury Star ran a photo of the lakeside gathering and noted that Mr. Pearson looked 'relaxed" as he pointed out the scenic spots at his country retreat. The Ottawa Citizen took a teasing approach to the advent of northern Ontario youth to the big city lights. Rural teenagers are looking pretty sharp these days if the nine Algoma East high school students who chatted with Prime Minister Pearson in his office Friday are any indication," the daily said. "They fielded press questions, grinned for cameramen and met their leader with a disarming combination of poise and enthusiasm." The Manitoulin Expositor documented the occasion with a shot of the Island representatives early on the Thursday morning before the long train ride to Ottawa. Beneath the headline (Island Students Visit Ottawa) the vintage snapshot shows Aus Hunt with two young men neatly dressed in white shirts and ties while the young women are wearing trench coats over dresses.

When we returned, I published my journal entries from the adventure in the Gore Bay Recorder. In an article entitled Journey to Ottawa, I described our experience watch-

### Man facing criminal charges in domestic dispute

In the evening of January 12, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) received a report of a domestic dispute in Little Current.

The victim sustained minor injuries.

Little Current man has been charged with the following: fail to comply with a recognizance, overcoming resistance to the commission of an offence, uttering threats, assault with a weapon and mischief.

The male was arrested and is in custody pending a bail hearing in the Ontario Court of Justice on January 16 in Gore Bay.

### M'Chigeeng man faces additional charge of sexual exploitation

On January 11, the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service rearrested Frederick Migwans, age 52, of M'Chigeeng First Nation.

The accused was previously arrested and charged with the 12 counts of sexual assault contrary to section 271 of the Criminal Code of Canada but now faces an additional count of Sexual Exploitation contrary to section 153(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada involving another alleged victim.

The accused was released on a recognizance of bail with conditions on January 13 with the next court date set for January 17 at Gore Bay Provincial Court.

### **Obstruct police leads to charge**

On the evening of Friday, January 13, officers of the Wik-wemikong Tribal police attended an apartment on Genevieve Street in Wikwemikong in regards to a loud disturbance. Upon arrival officers entered the residence and determined that the adult male and female were intoxicated and that there were four children under 12 in the residence

The 31-year-old female, who was the mother of the children, was uncooperative and did not allow police to check further through the home or to check on the welfare of the children. As a result, officers had to physically arrest the female who was actively being resistant towards the officers. It was at this moment when the 49-year-old male began to obstruct the police by trying to physically inter-vene in the arrest of the female, throwing himself on the officers as they were trying to arrest the female.

Officers used their Taser on the male adult who was then subdued and arrested where he was then returned to the detachment and lodged. The male has been charged with obstructing police.

Arrangements were made to have a member of the family pick up the children as both intoxicated adults had been removed from the premisis.

**Disturbance leads to charges** On the evening of January 15, officers of the Wikwemikong Tribal police responded to a disturbance call at an apartment on Andrew Crescent. Officers were met at the door by an irate adult male questioning their presence at his apartment. Officers explained that they were responding to a call and checking on the well-being of the individuals inside. The apartment was found to be in disarray as the stove was turned over and there was damage to the walls. The male then slammed the door closed on the officers.

Officers then knocked again and the male answered charging out at the officers with a metal frying pan over his head. Officers deployed the Taser and were able to effect an arrest on the male where he was returned to the detachment and lodged pending a bail hearing.

The 27-year-old adult male from Wikwemikong has been charged with, three counts of assault police, two counts of assault with a weapon and one count of mischief. He is scheduled to appear in bail at Gore Bay on Monday, January 16 to answer to the charges.

## 2016 Festive RIDE check results from Manitoulin OPP

Four drivers were charged with driving impaired due the consumption of alcohol during the Manitoulin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Festive RIDE (Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere) roadside checks this past holiday season. Last year there were two impaired driver charges laid on Manitoulin during the 2015 OPP Festive RIDE

Festive RIDE roadside checkpoints conducted by the OPP have become a familiar part of the holiday season and an effective countermeasure to the road safety issue of

impaired driving. Impaired driving remains the leading cause of criminal death in Canada.

One drink can reduce your ability to concentrate and slow your reaction time. The more alcohol in your blood, the more your ability to operate a motor vehicle is affected. Drivers who blow over the legal limit of .08

or who refuse a breath test will have their driver's licenses suspended immediately for 90 days under Ontario's Administrative Driver's Licence Suspension Program.

This 90-day suspension is separate and distinct from any criminal charges. Immediate roadside suspensions of driver licenses are issued by the OPP to drivers who register a blood alcohol concentration in the "warn range" of .05 to .08. Offenders will not be allowed to drive from that point on for a minimum of three days.

The Manitoulin Detachment of the OPP conducted the annual Festive RIDE campaign from November 22, 2016 to January 7, 2017. During the 2016-17 campaign, 63 RIDE checks were set up. One thousand one hundred and sixtythree vehicle drivers were checked by police. Of those drivers stopped at the RIDE checks, one was found to be impaired by the consumption of alcohol and charged accordingly. Two other drivers were charged with Highway Traffic Act offences.

Three other drivers were charged for impaired driving after police conducted traffic stops over the same period.

Constable Hart reported that during the OPP Festive RIDE program last year, from November 23, 2015 to January 2, 2016, there were two impaired driver charges laid by the OPP during checks. There was a roadside "warn range" suspension issued. Three vehicle occupants were charged under provisions of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act

While the OPP does increase the number of RIDE stops over the holidays, RIDE checks continue throughout the year. The OPP is reminding motorists that there is no safe amount of alcohol consumption when driving.

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to even the best of drivers and last week's vicious storm took its toll on drivers.

The Expositor caught up with Rodney (Barney) Deforge, proprietor of Barney's Bargain Barn in Manitowaning as he surveyed the damage to one of his loads when a transport truck and trailer flipped into the ditch on Highway 6 by LaCloche. The load was not insured.

"No, there was no insurance," said Mr. Deforge. "We were only able to recover about 20 percent of the load. Even a lot of that 20 percent is likely going to have to be thrown out because of the dirt."

The accident hasn't slowed down the flow of goods to Barney's Bargain Barn much, however. "We have had about three loads come in since," said Mr. Deforge, who indicated that the same company made those deliveries. "They are a great company," he said, "we are certainly going to continue to use them."

Mr. Deforge noted that the load that was lost was a mixed load, with a lot of bottled water in that mix. "There was a lot of water," he said, and water was a big factor in the loss. "There were a lot of canned goods, unfortunately a lot of it got wet." As anyone who has had to deal with a wet canned good, the slip of the label can quickly make the contents mystery food.

'The real issue was dirt," said Mr. Deforge.

Mr. Deforge's operation moves a lot of goods, particularly accessibly-priced food. "We distributed something in the range of a million pounds of food last year, most of it to Manitoulin and the North Shore," he said.

## Manitoulin biathlete to compete at **National Biathlon Championships**

"I have been in Quebec for about two-and-a-half weeks racing and training," said 18year-old Mackenzie on Monday during an interview with The Expositor. "For the rest of the season I am going to focus on staying healthy and performing well at Nationals in March and will also be competing in four more race weekends between now and then."

Mackenzie, who graduated from Manitoulin Secondary School last year, took this year off to focus on her athletics, but is also taking some online college courses.

'I'm just taking some general courses right now but I am going to be working towards becoming an ecosystem management technician," Mackenzie explained. "My season has had a little bit of a bumpy start. Out in Canmore the races were cancelled because it was too cold and that also made the training difficult and right before my next set of races I got sick the day before leaving to compete, which led me to not have the results I had hoped for."

Despite the "bumpy" start, Mackenzie is looking forward to the rest of the season and nation-

revealed at the public meeting with the Hydro One Ombudsman held on the evening of December 12 at Manitoulin Secondary School that a late payment by the abattoir has led to a demand for a security deposit by the utility to keep the power flowing.

'There was one good thing that came out of the meeting," said Mr. Heitkamp, "I got a call the very next day from Hydro One and they arranged to waive the security deposit."

As Mr. Heitkamp had noted during the meeting with the Hydro One ombudsman, the not-for-profit was having trouble meeting its energy bill, let alone the onerous security deposit, so the relief from the security deposit was just that-a very big relief.

But energy costs are still a major issue for the abattoir going forward, admitted the treasurer.

Although energy costs are a big issue the facility is also facing another challenge in the animals coming into the facility to be processed and sold through the retail arm and outlet channel of the company.

On the face of it, the facility should be going gangbusters, and many local cattlemen do use the facility, but too many of the available cattle on the Island are

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## **Tehkummah Council Minutes**

## November 1, 2017 Roger's Creek Bridge

Council reviewed a petition from Andy Bowerman regarding repairs to or the replacement of the Roger's Creek Bridge. Council carried a motion moved by Councillor Laird Lee and seconded by Councillor Ron Hierons that council would take the petition under consideration.

## Accounts payable

Council carried a motion moved by Councillor Lorie Leeson and seconded by Councillor Laird Lee to pay the accounts payable for period 10 of the fiscal year in the amount of \$165,653.70, as per the accounts payable control report.

## **Fire Underwriters Survey**

The Fire Underwriters Survey contacted the municipality in 2015 and early 2016 to initiate a fire insurance classification update but received no response. Council learned that concerns were raised regarding the fire hydrants and homeowners insurance premiums in the municipality.

Council carried a motion to direct the fire chief and clerk-treasurer to contact the Fire Underwriters Survey in order to update the fire insurance classifications for the municipality.

## **Plow/dump truck**

Council carried a motion, moved by Councillor Paul Bowerman and seconded by Councillor Lorie Leeson, to direct the clerk-treasurer to contact the municipality financial institution to see approval for a short team loan to purchase a plow truck for \$65,341 plus tax.

## Winter storage at the marina

Council carried a motion, moved by Councillor Ron Hierons and seconded by Laird Lee, "Be it resolved that the public works superintendent is given authority to tow away any items that remain on the municipal property without a storage agreement beyond the date of November 15, 2016.

## **Records management**

Tehkummah council discussed how the township needs to implement a records management system. Councillor Paul Bowerman carried a motion, seconded by Councillor Lorie Leeson, "Be it resolved that Bylaw 2016-12, being a bylaw to establish retention periods for records of the Corporation of the Township of Tehkummah, be given a first and second reading as attached."

## Allocation of contract holdback

Council discussed how the municipality was holding back its final payment to Belanger Construction and Kresin Engineering for the contract regarding the Government Road Bridge. Council carried a motion to authorize the clerk-treasurer to transfer \$210,000 from the general operating account to a special interest bearing savings account as soon as the funds permit.

## Municipal building heating system

Council authorized Campbell Heating, the service professional of record for the municipal office building's boiler heating system, to supply and install an air scoop and exchange the expansion tank at a cost of \$2,040 plus tax.

## **Temporary relocation of meetings**

The meeting room of the municipal office will be required for working space during the records manage- works operator/landfill attendant.

## ment project. Council carried a motion for the council meetings to be held at the Tehkummah Community Hall for the duration of the project.

### Air quality

Council and town staff discussed concerns about vehicle exhaust fumes entering the fire hall and adjoining municipal office building. To handle the problem, council asked that the supplying and installing of a proper exhaust system be marked for the 2017 budget and that a cost estimate for the project be obtained.

### Landfill

The public works supervisor presented an operation plan for the landfill site. His suggestions included: the removal of the glass crusher as it is not safe to operate; move the attendant's shack to on top of the hill near the trenches and recycling bins so that the attendant has control of the traffic; attendant's shack needs a heat source, a propane heater with an outside vent could be installed; a portable toilet needs to be set up for the attendant and users; the public works superintendent will contact the fire chief to do a controlled burn of the burnable pile; a track based mini backhoe is to be acquired for use at the landfill site as a rubber tired machine is not suitable; and communication methods need to be explored so that attendant has either a cell phone or radio system.'

Council approved the plan and authorized the public works superintendent to put the proposed items into action.

## **Public works building**

Council discussed the history of black mould in portions of the public works building and the potential health risk to employees. Councillor Ron Hierons, seconded by Councillor Lorie Leeson, carried a motion directing the clerk-treasurer to contact qualified companies to submit an estimate on the cost involved in determining the cause and the cost associated with a plan to remedy the cause.

## **Bridge inspections**

Tulloch Engineering completed mandatory structural inspections of Ontario Structure Inspection Manual qualified bridges and culverts within the municipality and presented that report to council.

The two bridges over the Manitou River were identified in the report as being in need of extensive rehabilitation work including replacement.

Council carried a motion to contract Tulloch Engineering to complete structural evaluations for bridges 2 and 3 at an estimated cost of \$5,000 per bridge and that in preparation for funding applications, tender call documents for the engineering design for the replacement of bridge 2 and bridge 3 should be prepared to go out as soon as possible. The motion also included that minor repairs to bridge 7, Black Creek, will be undertaken by the municipal workforce when weather conditions permit.



either going to other facilities to be processed and sold, or are only going part way through the facility—being killed on the floor but not moving through the rest of the facility. The question is why?

"I really don't know the answer to that question," said Mr. Heitkamp.

The issue isn't price. Although the prices at the Mani-

toulin Island Community Abattoir are slightly higher than those of some other facilities, the all-in costs generally match up fairly closely and certainly much more favourably once the cost of transportation to facilities further afield are taken into account.

No cattlemen contacted by The Expositor were willing to speak on the record—but some did offer their own insights and opinions on background.

Kill schedules were not cited as an issue, the facility usually processes animals one day a week, although that can vary slightly if there are not enough animals scheduled to make a kill day economically viable. "We do have to have a provincial inspector come in and we have to staff for the day," noted Mr. Heitkamp.

Cash flow concerns have been cited as an issue by some producers, who note other avenues tend to turn around the cheques much faster and therein may lie the rub. The fewer animals processed locally the more challenging spreading costs across those animals becomes.

"It doesn't cost less to run the coolers if they are only half full," notes Mr. Heitkamp. So energy costs take a larger bite out of the overall budget per animal. If there are more animals being processed, the largely fixed costs can be spread out better—making the whole operation more efficient and cost effective.

What might be the solution?

"Perhaps just getting the word out to use the abattoir more," suggested Mr. Heitkamp.

It took a very concerted community effort to get the

## ... Manitoulin ranked No. 15 for Ontario opioid deaths

...continued from page 1 The report makes a

strong attempt to offset the skewing that can come from extremely small datasets in some districts by presenting an annualized rate of opioid-related deaths over the five-year period between 2009 and 2013.

Asked to comment on the previous declaration that Manitoulin had the highest rates in the world, Ms. Stankiewicz suggested that might have been an extrapolated assumption-with some basis. When it came to prescribing opioids and opioid-related deaths, "Ontario had the highest rates in the country, Canada had the highest rates in the world," she noted. It is a simple step from there to extrapolate that if Manitoulin had the highest rates in Ontario, it would hold the record for the world. "We don't really have the information," she noted.

Interesting comparisons note that Sudbury had 108 opioid-related deaths with a population of approximately 106,000. Sudbury ranks 27th in the number of opioid-related deaths per 10,000 population in Ontario. There were 49 counties and 14 Local Health Integrated Networks included in the study.

As with any scientific study, making the leap to direct conclusions in one particular area can be very complicated. With a population of approximately 13,000, Manitoulin registered less than five opioidrelated deaths in 2013 and six over the range of 2009-2013.

Another facet of the study that makes interpreting the data a bit challenging is the definition of "opi-oid." While to the general public this would trigger a direct co-relation to drug abuse and the abuse of prescription drugs, that is not what the data is actually indicating. First off, the definition is actually quite broad. The code table for opioid-related hospital hospital admissions and emergency department visits includes: poisoning by opium, by heroin, other opioids, methadone, synthetic narcotics and "other and unspecified narcotics.'

A key challenge for determining opioid-related deaths lies in the data coming from the coroner's office and the way causes of death have been assigned.

Often the actual cause of death may have been determined to have come about due to some other underlying cause, even though an opioid overdose may have been a contributing factor.

Nonetheless, Northern Ontario, both east and west, tend to have high rates of opioid use and abuse and the current introduction of new and more powerful opioids is setting off alarm bells in jurisdictions across Canada.

The report itself is a reaction to those concerns, noting: "the rising prevalence of abuse, misuse and addiction related to opioids has driven concerns regarding accidental opioid overdoses that may lead to hospitalizations for toxicity, and sometimes death. Indeed, in an analysis of opioid-related deaths abstracted from the Office of the Chief Coroner of Ontario, we found that rates of opioid overdose deaths increased 242 percent between 1991 and 2010. By 2010, there were 550 deaths related to opioid overdoses in Ontario, many

of them in young people,

representing a major impact on public health." The scale of the issue is in itself daunting. According to the report there were 660,674 opioid users in Ontario in 2015, 33,693 maintenance therapy users (methadone and suboxone etc.), 3,241 opioid related emergency department visits in 2014 and 638 opioidrelated deaths in the province in 2013. Of those deaths, the vast majority fall in the two middle age cohorts, 25-44 at 283 to 45-64 at 279. This isn't an issue of youth—those in the know say that with age comes pain.

But when it comes to opioid-related hospital admissions in 2014, the numbers skew alarmingly. Although the number of opioid users in the under 25 category is less than a third of that of the 25-44 crew, and barely an eight of the 45-64 bunch, they have half the number (631 to 1,129 and 1,039) of opioid-related emergency



department visits and (191 to 388 and 632) opioid-related hospital admissions.

On Manitoulin, there were less than five hospital admissions (ranking the Island 12th) and six emergency department visits (that place us eighth). In terms of opioid deaths, Manitoulin again had less than five in 2013 (for a rank of 15) and when averaged over five years the number stands at six (for a ranking of seventh).

There is a silver lining to the high number of Island residents undertaking replacement therapy in which the Island ranks second, noted Ms. Stankiewicz. "That to me is a good news story," she said. "People are looking for help."


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## Father Gerald (Gerry) McDougall came late to the cloth

Wikwemikong—Father Gerald (Ger-ry) McDougall SJ was born in Montreal, but spent most of his formative years growing up in Ottawa. His first career was as an electronics technologist and he spent eight years in that capacity until he answered the call to the ministry and donned the Roman collar. Today he serves as the primary priest for a number of Manitoulin parishes, including Wikwemikong and Birch Island.

In an interesting connection to the Island, two of the first priests that had defining impact on Father McDougall are names that would be very familiar to Island Roman Catholics, particularly those living in Wikwemikong and M'Chigeeng. The first is Father Daniel Nazaar, who served in Wikwemikong for many years before being transferred to Central Europe, and the second was Father Michael Stogery SJ, who served the community of M'Chigeeng for many years. The third was Father Doug McCarthy, who also served for many years in Wikwemikong and who was Fr. McDougall's noviciate master.

Fr. McDougall began his journey into the clergy in 1989, but becoming a Jesuit priest is not noted for being a quick career path. It wasn't until the vear 2000 that he began the formal steps toward becoming ordained as a fully fledged Jesuit priest.

Thunder Bay was my first assignment," he said. He was assigned there to work with the Apostolate Amongst Indigenous Peoples, particularly with the Kitchitwa Kateri Anamewgamic church, named for St. Kateri, the first Native American to be recognized as a saint by the Roman Catholic church. The church is described as "a sacred place where all can feel welcome and respected. It is a place for healing, seeking to bridge the gap between native and Catholic ceremonials and spiritualities-where traditional

Native ceremonies and rituals can be used to express the Church faith.'

Rounding out his early experience in the order, Fr. McDougall spent two years at the parish of St. Peter's, a Sloval National parish (one of only two in Ontario).

"Both had their great joys," he recalled. In 2007 he began the final stage of tertianship, progressing toward his full vows. This involved travelling to Australia, where in eight months he managed to see about oneeighth of that continent then it was back to Canada and Winnipeg, where he spent the next seven years at St. Ignatius Parish. It was quite a change of pace, as St. Ignatius was a big city parish.

Following a six-month sabbatical where he polished up his francophone skills, Fr. McDougall was ready to return to Manitoulin.

Fr. McDougall noted that he takes

great inspiration from the charism of the Jesuit Order "all for the greater glory of God." It has sustained him on his 27-year journey in his faith. "Finding God in all things," he explains. "The greater Glory of God, finding God in all things." It isn't complicated, he notes. "You find God in things very simple. In the love between two people, in families.'

But he also notes that it has not been a trial. "I have enjoyed being part of God in the world," he said, "it is part of the Jesuit spiritualityfinding God in all things." He points out that, if you take the time to look, wherever you are on the roadway of life, "God is there."

expanding, with new treatments such as suboxone showing promise and the ready availability of the opioid antidote naloxone may help to reduce the number of deaths.

"There are important things to know when it comes to being with

someone who is experiencing an overdose," said Ms. Stankiewicz. "First call 911, call for help. Second, keep them breathing," she said. This may well involve artificial resuscitation. "Opioids slow down your brain, so your brain stops telling your body what to do," she said. "So you stop

breathing." But opioids tend to be very short lived in that respect, so keeping someone breathing until they start again on their own can have a big impact. "Third, administer naloxone and fourth, and this is very important, stay with the person until help arrives."

spring, summer and fall on the Island with below average rain fall.'

"We will need significant snow this winter or significant spring rain to bring these lakes back up to normal levels for next summer," said Mr. Riche.

But as to whether the levels are the lowest in living memory, the evidence is not as close to hand. "We have easy access to records for

seen, since at least 1990." said Barry Williamson of Williamson's Hardware in Mindemoya, who lives on the shores of Big Lake. Mr. Williamson noted that while his home has "knock on wood" not been negatively impacted as they have a well. "anyone drawing water from the lake would likely be having a problem.'

While he admitted to not having the answer to the issue, Mr. Williamson suggested that not drawing water levels down as much during the spring runoff might help.

'They have thrown a lot of brainpower at it over the vears, so you would think they have it pretty down pat," said Mr. Williamson. The lack of precipitation

comes as no surprise to Islanders, many of whom seem to have been in the thrall of near drought conditions for the past decade, but if the current water levels of inland lakes on Manitoulin are to be reversed, the Island mantra over the winter months may well be "let it snow, let it snow let it snow."




Manitou, Lake Minde moya Lake and Big Lake for the past 20 years," he noted. "Previous to that, the records have been archived. For Kagawong Lake, you would need to contact Kagawong Power."

Although Islanders are very familiar with the experience of watching rainstorms pass to the north and south of Manitoulin, dousing the mainland and Lake Huron, it seems we are not alone in experiencing low inland lake water levels.

"In MNRF Sudbury district, we manage and track water levels for 16 MNRF operating dams," said Mr. Mr. Riche. "Of the 13 dams not on the Island, eight of them are near to the bottom of their recommended winter range.

"The water levels are definitely the lowest I have

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## Northeast Town Council Notes

January 3 and 6 MICA donation The Northeast Town

council reviewed a request from the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) to donate \$300 towards the group attending the International Bicycling show in Toronto.

"As you know the ferry count was again over 5,500 cyclists in 2016, representing a rise of nearly six percent," states the letter to council from MICA President Maja Mielonen. "That is economic impact for all museums, business, libraries and much more found on Manitoulin Island."

A motion was carried which was moved by Councillor Michael Erskine and seconded by Councillor Paul Skippen to donate \$200.

**Funding** Council learned that the Northeast Town was successful in receiving \$33,100 towards the Sheguiandah Archaeological Site Development from the Canadian Cultural Spaces Fund Program through the Ministry of Canadian Heritage.

The town also received \$15,000 for a Canada 150 celebration community mural from the Minister of Canadian Heritage.

"The staff does a great job of applying for these grants," said Councillor Marcel Gauthier, commending town staff.

## **Fire department**

Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey reported to council that there had been a total of 54 calls for service in 2016. The calls for service in December included responding to a motor vehicle accident on Highway 6 North, a carbon monoxide call to White's Point, a hydro pole fire in Sheguiandah and a chimney fire on White's Point. He noted that all the fire trucks and equipment were in good working order.

## Public works and community services

Public works manager Gary May reported to council that regular winter maintenance was underway with roads and sidewalks. He said that the landfill operations were going well and that the town equipment was being maintained and repaired as needed. In terms of water and sewer, he told council

activities were well attended, as was the family New Year's event. Event staff did a great job running all the holiday events."

This month at the recreation centre Mr. Taylor said that Skate Canada Programs were resuming after the holiday break, as were the Manitoulin Panthers, Manitoulin Secondary School boys' hockey and Little Current Minor Hockey. Upstairs, ballet, marital arts and fitness programs would be resuming. He noted the annual Winterfest Hockey Tournament will be held Friday, February 3 to Sunday, February 5 and that there will be a Family Day skate held on Monday, February 20.

## **Building controls**

The building controls report stated that there were a total of five permits issued in 2016 with a total construction to date of \$4,886,436 and a total building permit revenue of \$61,442.37. Town CAO Dave Williamson added that the overall construction activity in the town was down approximately 25 percent from 2015.

## Accounts receivable

Town Treasurer Sheryl Wilkin reported that there was a total of \$164,404 in payments in December for accounts receivable taxes. As for water and sewer, she said that there had been \$20,704.35 made in payments in December. She also said that there were currently six accounts over \$400 and that one had been disconnected, that two were over due to penalty applied for December and that in payment three cases. arrangements had been made. The next billing due date is January 31.

## Budget

Council reviewed changes to the 2017 municipal town budget. Mr. Williamson walked council through the changes which included: a \$4,000 increase to the council conference and travel line item; a \$1,000 increase to computer supplies; a \$500 increase to livestock compensation; a \$2.000 increase to snowplowing contracted services; \$500 added to shop meal allowances; a decrease of \$4,000 to streetlight hydro; an increase of \$5,000 to the municipal building rent; a

decrease to the DSB land ambulance of \$10,439 and \$8,639 to the DSB levy; and a \$16,000 decrease from penalties and interest on tax arrears. The changes resulted in a proposed \$125,641 increase to the levy this year or 2.96 percent.

Council set the date for the public budget meeting for Tuesday, January 24 at 7 pm.

## December 20 and 22 Expression of interest

The Northeast Town council carried a motion to accept a recommendation from the administration and finance committee, accepting the expression of interest from the Manitoulin Seniors Residential Development Team, in principal, and authorizing staff to work with Dr. Jeffery and his team on the development of an agreement.

### Winterfest Hockey Tournament

Council reviewed a donation request from the Little Current Lions Club for a reduction on the cost of ice time for the annual Winterfest Hockey Tournament

February 3, 4 and 5. Councillor Bill Koehler suggested that council donate \$200 towards the Lions ice time as "the Lions do a lot of the community."

Council agreed and a motion was carried to donate \$200. Council also carried a motion to declare Winterfest weekend 'a community festival.'

## **Doctor recruitment**

The Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) sent a letter to council requesting the Northeast Town contribute to the physician recruitment partnership again for 2017 (\$6,000).

Council agreed to donate the funds, but the donation is conditional on the 2017 Northeast Town budget being approved by council.

"Early in 2017 we will be organizing a meeting of all partners," states the letter from MHC CEO Derek Graham. "This will provide an opportunity to review a full year of expenditures, review the activities and from successes our recruiter and to discuss the broadening of the base of stakeholders.'



## Manitoulin's south shore offers the best of Great Lakes surfing

by Alicia McCutcheon MANITOULIN-Most of us don't realize it, but Manitoulin is home to some of the best surfing waters the Great Lakes has to offereven in January.

For the past seven years, Helene Alegre Filion of Sudbury has been plying Manitoulin's south shore waters on her board in all months of the year, including just last week.

"It was great!" Ms. Alegre Filion enthused of her Island surf when contacted by The Expositor Monday.

Ms. Alegre Filion said Manitoulin Island's south shore is blessed with many amazing places to catch a wave, but last Wednesday she settled on Dominion Bay due to wind speed and direction—surfing really is a fine science.

The surfer explained that she had her first taste of surfing in Tofino in British Columbia. Like so many before her, once she tried the sport she was hooked and couldn't wait to do it again. The problem is, she said, funds to jet to some of surfing's more known locales is costly and she simply couldn't afford it.

She recalled the many summers of her youth spent on Manitoulin, largely aboard her father's salmon fishing boat, and the days they couldn't head out on the bounding main due to high winds and waves. Manitoulin, she thought, could be the perfect spot to catch some waves.

Ms. Alegre Filion described the complex anatomy of what makes a good wave, starting with the bathymetry of the Island's shores—ideally a surfer wants a place where the lake bottom suddenly goes from shallow to deep. This creates pressure which in turn creates a good wave. Couple that with the right wind speed and direction and you could have yourself some nice seven foot waves to ride.

She explained that she got to work, studying the lake's geography and finding areas she thought would make for ideal surf spots, heading to Manitoulin two to three times a week to test her theories. Eventually, she got it right and never looked back.

Ms. Alegre Filion said that any place in the Providence Bay area is typically good for surfing, keeping in

mind that almost all of Manitoulin's land is private and landowner permission may be needed before heading out for a surf. In the wintertime, the surfer goes armed with a surfer-specific wetsuit with a hood, neoprene boots and gloves, Vaseline for her face, a rope and a ladder.

Typically, she said, an ice shelf will have built up along the shore. Tying a rope to a nearby tree or other stationary item, she will head out across the ice shelf and jump into the lake, which usually registers a chilly 0°C to 4°C. The ladder is needed to get back on top of the shelf once the surf is over.

"You're surfing in slush sometimes, and sometimes there's big chunks of ice to avoid that have broken away from the shelf," she added.

Ms. Alegre Filion noted that Manitoulin Island is one of the few places in the Great Lakes where the surfing is good all of the time, even in the summer months when heat often means smaller waves or no waves at all. Waves increase in size in the fall and winter, when the winds increase too

Next to Manitoulin, "my heart belongs to Barbados,'

Ms. Alegre Filion said of her favourite surfing haunt. "It reminds me of a more tropical Manitoulin," she added, noting the unexplored shoreline, friendly people, beautiful landscape, "and the food is fantastic, and there's fresh fish-just like on Manitoulin!"

It floors me that you can do this sport right here on Manitoulin," she added.

Once she began to post

her findings online, others began to take notice, including Little Current's own Cooper brothers, Chris and Rvan, and Geoff Lovelace, who reached out to Ms. Alegre Filion on how to get started.

"If you have the opportunity to do this—try it," she urged. "If I had known about surfing on the Island when I was growing up ... continued on page 15

When it comes to dementia-friendly physical environments, providing a physical environment that is welcoming to people with dementia includes: clear and legible signage placed at eye level; flat, wide and unobstructed sidewalks; and clearly marked accessible washrooms in public spaces and landmarks; distinctive structures; open spaces and places of activity and rest.

After successfully completing Dementia-Friendly Communities training, the business or organization are usually given the opportunity to be included on the Alzheimer Society's website and newsletter. They are also given a Blue


Umbrella decal to place in their window so that people can recognize them as a dementia-friendly haven.

A secret shopper visit one to three months after the education session will provide feedback on how well the organization is doing, and follow ups come at three to six months, six to 12 months and 12-18 months.

there, it would have changed my whole life," the Northern Ontario Medical School student attested.

While surfing is not something most people can just pick up on the first time, it is good for all ages, Ms. Alegre Filion said. It is highly addictive, she warned, and could cause you to miss major moments in your life. "I missed both my university graduations because it was a good surf day," she admitted.

The lack of public land on, specifically, the south shore of Manitoulin does make it more difficult to surf (she recalled fondly the days of surfing at Carter Bay), but she still urges people to try—in the summer months to start. Ms. Alegre Filion said she wishes Manitoulin would embrace the surfing culture as there could be much benefit to its people, noting the many people from all over who message her about surfing Manitoulin.

Seven years on, the Great Lakes surfing community is growing with a whole fellowship out there for Ms. Alegre Filion to share her knowledge and resources with.

It is her hope that the bug that has so fully hooked her will be instilled in other Island youths and with it the values of respect and kindness to others and the guardianship of our waters and beaches that are so integral to her way of life today.

Conference requests Mayor Al MacNevin spoke to council about requests to attend various municipal conferences for 2017. He reminded council that only three councillors could attend each conference in order to stay within budget.

Some councillors withdrew from the conference they had requested to attend, and the matter was settled.

**Street light** Council reviewed a request from Barb Baker about placing a streetlight along the eastern end of Water Street.

This is a very travelled sidewalk (between downtown and the hotel) as well as a regular exercise walk path both day and night," states Ms. Baker's letter. "There is no street lighting from the last hydro pole at the dock and the far end of our driveway and that light is on the opposite side of the road.

Councillor Paul Skippen asked about the public work staff's streetlight list. Staff replied that they would bring the list back to council to review.

**Stroke recovery** Council carried a resolution to support Bill 9, End Age Discrimination Against Stroke Recovery Patients Act. The Bill reads, "Subsection of the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care Act is amended by adding the following paragraph: '12. To ensure that any treatment recommended by a physician from a patient who is recovering from a stroke is provided to that patient promptly, regardless of the patients' age'.'

## MICA

The Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) sent a letter to council asking for a letter of agreement to erect

trailhead and way-finding signs in the municipality.

"MICA is in the process of applying for a Trillium grant for trailhead and way-finding signs along more than 800 km of cycling routes," states the letter to council from MICA President Maja Mielonen. "Our routes roll past First Nations territory and along municipal roads. We would like to ask you for a letter of agreement to erect these way-finding signs along your roads. We will use your agreement as an 'in-kind' contribution in our grant application."

Council asked staff to contact Ms. Mielonen to find out more information about where the signs would be located and their size.

**Airport** Councillor Marcel Gauthier reviewed the Manitoulin East Municipal Airport report with council.

"The flights were down for November," said Councillor Gauthier, "but financially we are doing really well. Our revenue is up. There is still the month of December, but things are looking good.

He also noted that the airport manager is in the process of finding a replacement snow blower.

## Highway 6 speed drop

The town received a letter that the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) will be implementing a 60 km/hr speed zone on Highway 6 in front of the new Little Current RONA Home Building Centre on Highway 6.

The proposed 60 km/hr speed limit zone will extend the current speed zone 155 metres southerly, to a point measured 810 metres south from the centerline of its intersec-tion with Harbour View Road," states a letter from the MTO. "This proposed 60 km/hr speed limit zone is intended to provide a safer environment for motorists using the Highway 6 corridor in support of new development in the area.'

Council gave Councillor Michael Erskine credit for suggesting the change. He said that he couldn't take full credit, as it was a suggestion made from one of the ratepayers to him.

## New light towers

The town also received a response from Hydro One pertaining to the new lights on the towers at Goat Island.

'The quick answer to the new light is: Hydro One was directed by Transport Canada to the type of lights that were installed, brightness and flashing sequence," stated a letter from Brian Dellandrea, customer operations manager with Hydro One. "The windmill lights fall under direction from Transport Canada as they are not affected by the channel crossing.

As to questions if the lights can be dimmed or if it is required for them to flash, "No, as per Transport Canada regulations on catenary crossings, the lights need to be of at least medium intensity," said Mr. Dellandrea. "There is a requirement that they flash.'

Regarding a reduction of their impact on nearby residents, Mr. Dellandrea said that that question needed to be addressed by Transport Canada, as they are the regulating body for the installation of aviation lighting.

The requirements on catenary crossings are different of those for wind turbines," the letter continues. "As per Transport Canada requirements and for safety reasons, the lights on catenary crossings flash at a 60/min rate as opposed to 40/min from other applications. The reason is to warn the floater plans early on that they are approaching a catenary crossing and there are hanging wires on their path.

Council was informed that the town clerk had sent a letter to Transport Canada for further answers concerning the lights.

Please keep in mind that the ice is not yet safe for riding and with the warmer weather being forecast for this week, it may be some time before it is safe. Just a reminder: If the ice is 7 cm (3") or less stay off the ice, ice that is at least 10 cm (4") is safe for ice fishing, walking or cross country skiing. Ice that is 12 cm (5") is safe for a snowmobile or ATV, a car or small pick-up truck requires at least 20-30 cm (8"-12") and a medium truck requires at least 30-38cm (12-

### Job Summary:

In partnership, Whitefish River and Noojmowin Teg Health Centres are seeking the full-time services of a Mental Health Child and Youth Counsellor. The successful candidate will provide one-on-one and group mental health and addiction counselling services to children and youth ages six to under eighteen. The position will further be responsible for providing targeted culturally relevant prevention programming (ie. Strengthening Families, Triple P, Safe Talk, etc). The mental and addiction counseling services will be implemented using a wholistic approach with the children, youth and their families consistent with Anishinabek values. The Counsellor is responsible for the coordination of integrated services delivery from intake to discharge and referrals for all assigned children, youth and their families.

The services will be both community and school based. Within the elementary and high schools in Espanola, the counsellor will be available to WRFN students as a priority and also to other indigenous students within the schools as culturally relevant mental health and addictions counselling support. The incumbent will work in close collaboration with community based providers, mental and other health practitioners, traditional and cultural supports, teachers, school counsellors, principals and parents. The incumbent will report to the Noojmowin Teg Mental Health & Addictions Manager, and will work closely with the Whitefish River Health Manager and other team members. Hiring and other decisions related to the position will be done in collaboration between the two health centres.

Given the traditional practices of the Ansihinabek, from time to time, exposure to wood smoke and the burning of sacred medicines, including tobacco, sweet grass, sage or cedar, may occur within the work setting.

### **Duties and Responsibilities:**

- Complete a comprehensive process from intake, clinical assessments and interventions, treatment plans, one on one and group treatment and counseling, referrals and discharge, specifically with Anishinabek children and youth under the age of 18 years;
- Work within the Whitefish River community health centre participating in a circle of care with internal and external multiple disciplinary professionals;
- Work within elementary and secondary school environments with school partners;
- Consult with parents of children and youth;
- Demonstrate sound knowledge of area children, youth and family services;
- Develop and implement community-based and culturally relevant mental health prevention and promotion programming to engage children and youth within their community;
- Chart and communicate within an electronic health environment;



One of my favourite kitchen appliances is the slow cooker. The best part is being able to take some time in the morning to fill the slow cooker with tasty ingredients, walk away and by dinner time it's all ready. If mornings don't work put everything together the night before, place in your refrigerator and in the morning just plug it in.

Another thought for 2017—are you supporting our local farmers? Make an effort, buy local, produced meat!

## **Chicken Dijon**

If you have time, brown the chicken. You can use boneless chicken breasts or skinless chicken thighs, your preference. Adding oil to the butter means the butter won't burn as quickly when browning the chicken. If wine is not available, use apple cider or orange juice.

2 Tbsp oil 1 Tbsp butter 6 to 8 bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs 1 tsp salt Freshly ground black pepper 1 cup of red or white wine 4 potatoes, unpeeled, cut into chunks 2 onions, cut into chunks 2 carrots, cut into chunks 2 stalks of celery, cut into chunks 8 ounces mushrooms, halved 3 cups chicken broth or water or vegetable broth 1/2 cup whipping cream (35%) 1/4 cup Dijon mustard 2 bay leaves 6 to 8 sprigs of fresh tarragon, minced or 1 Tbsp dried

1. If you have time, brown the chicken. Heat the oil and butter in a sauté pan, season the chicken with salt and pepper and add to the sizzling butter. Brown on both sides, remove from the heat and place in your slow cooker. If you are not browning the chicken, simply season the chicken with salt and pepper and place in your slow cooker.

2. Pile in the potatoes, onions, carrots, celery and mushrooms. Whisk together the chicken broth, cream, mustard and wine. Pour over the works. Stick in the bay leaves. Cover and cook on low until the chicken and vegetables are tender, about 6 hours. Remove the chicken to a plate and take out the bones, then return the chicken to the slow cooker. Just before serving sprinkle in the tarragon.

### **Pork with Almonds**

If you don't have almonds use pumpkin or sunflower seeds. It will change the texture and taste just a little. If you have time brown the pork in some oil and butter.

2 Tbsp sunflower oil 1 Tbsp butter 2 onions, chopped 3 garlic cloves, chopped 2-inch cinnamon stick (optional) 1 cup ground almonds 1.5 lbs boneless pork, cut into 1-inch cubes 19 oz can of diced tomatoes 1 cup green olives, pitted 1 jalapeno pepper, diced (optional  $1 \, 1/2$  cups chicken stock Salt and pepper Fresh cilantro chopped

1. If you have time heat up some oil and butter in a pan and brown the meat otherwise just place the meat in the slow cooker.

2. Add the onions, garlic, cinnamon stick, ground almonds, tomatoes, green olives, jalapeno pepper, chicken stock and salt and pepper to the slow cooker. Gently mix it
