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# Island elementary school teachers join one-day strike

LITTLE CURRENT—Last Wednesday, January 22, Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) members of the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) took to the streets in a one-day strike, attempting to put pressure on the provincial government to resume contract bargaining talks.

"If we had the choice between being out here (on the picket line) or with our kids, we'd pick the students every day. Strike action is never what we want to have, but there doesn't seem to be any other way to bring the government back to the negotiating table," said ETFO Rainbow Teacher Local open representative Heather Jefkins, who teaches Grades 3/4 at Assiginack Public School in Manitowaning.

Manitoulin Island teachers united in Little Current for the one-day strike last Wednesday. They set up along Manitowaning Road, with their main base stationed at the Little Current-Howland Recreation Centre and some picketers walking as far north as the main intersection of Meredith Street and Highway 6.

"We've had lots of honking, people who have rolled down their windows to cheer us on; there's a lot of positive feedback from the community," said Ms. Jefkins.

Across Ontario beginning on Monday, January 20 and continuing through this week, members of ETFO began staging one-day walkouts that rotated to various school boards within the province. These walkouts continued into this week and are expected to keep happening for the foreseeable future.

January 22's job action involved ETFO members within the RDSB as well as Thames Valley District School Board in London and the Rainy River District School Board that includes nearly 11,000 square kilometres near Fort Frances.

On Manitoulin, rather than forming small strike groups at the four RDSB schools across the Island, teachers instead grouped together in Little Current for the day's activities. Assiginack Public School and Central Manitoulin Public School teachers took the morning shift while Little Current Public School and Charles C. McLean Public School teachers assumed the afternoon stint.

"The ministry is not coming to the table to bargain with us," Ms. Jefkins said. "Our negotiating teams ...continued on page 11

# Northeast Town passes 2020 municipal budget

# Ward 2 residents will see a tax increase of 3.12 percent

LITTLE CURRENT—The council of the Northeast Town passed its 2020 budget at its January 23 meeting and with it a slight increase in taxes, most specifically for the residents of Ward 2, Little Current.

After more than a month of deliberations, council settled on a 4.62 percent hike to the levy which means the following increase in taxes per ward: Ward 1, 0.09 percent; Ward 2, 3.12 percent; and Wards 3 and 4, 1.34 percent.

Capital projects in the 2020 budget include \$2.2 million in construction on the municipality's ongoing Connecting Link project which encompasses Highway 6 (covered through provincial funding and Gas Tax funds); work to the Green Bush Road, \$484,000 (\$451,718 through grants and \$32,282 from the working capital reserve); a grade lift to Orr's Sideroad, \$20,000 covered by the Ontario Community Infrastructure Program (OCIF); surface treatment to the Green Bay road, Newby's Bay Road, Orr's Sideroad, Vankoughnet Street East, Dupont Street, Hayward Street and Red Mill Road.

Sixty-thousand dollars has also been slated for the Meredith Street drain project, from the working capital reserve, while \$20,000 is allocated to repair the downtown interlocking brick sidewalk and \$110,000 for the continuation of the Draper Street sidewalk (from the public school) to meet Manitowaning Road.

Under public works, \$21,740 has been included in the budget for an ...continued on page 11

# Ontario Works overpayment fines will harm vulnerable clients: DSB

MANITOULIN—Changes to Ontario Works' service delivery since April 2019 has meant a doubling in the 'clawback' the province requires for overpayments made on the cheques of some of Ontario's most vulnerable people, and this has some members of the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) worrying about the wellbeing of their clients.

In April 2019, the province stipulated that any Ontario Works case file review that showed an overpayment (meaning the client owes, in this case, the DSB money, usually due to monthly reporting issues) would see 10 percent of their monthly stipend removed and paid back to the DSB—double the five percent overpayment fee clients saw prior to April 2019.

As an example, the average monthly single rate for Ontario Works is \$733. For this amount, the province jumped its clawback rate from \$36 a cheque to \$73.

"This individual will be at the food bank at the end of the month, or at our front desk asking for help to pay their fuel bill," a visibly agitated DSB chair Les Gamble said at the January meeting.

"If you're renting and have your own place, that's milk, that's bread, that's a lot of money," added DSB CAO Fern Dominelli.

"It's huge," said Donna Stewart, director of integrated social services for the DSB, in a Monday interview with The Expositor.

Ms. Stewart said that the province has given parameters for bypassing a repayment, such as if it puts the client in a "hardship situation."

"We can really claim that all of our clients are in a hardship situation," Ms. Stewart continued. "We're struggling because these are people who are already receiving not a whole lot of money."

Most the DSB's Ontario Works cases have overpayments on file, she added. There are myriad reasons why this might be: a result of incorrect income reporting in one case or a late report, after the cheque has already been issued, in another.

Ms. Stewart explained that the province has told the DSB that they will be monitoring the overpayment situation closely and are abiding by the government's wishes. "But from a moral standpoint, it's a tough sell," Ms. Stewart admitted.

Ms. Stewart said the DSB has not yet noticed any cascade affects from the increase in repayments, such as help needed with bill paying, but that it is still early days. "It's something we'll be monitoring closely."

DAVOS, Switzerland—Autumn Peltier, the 15-yearold Wiikwemkoong water walker and Anishinabek Nation chief water commissioner, took part in a Time Magazine panel on January 21 alongside young activists Greta Thunberg, Salvador Gómez-Colón and Natasha Mwansa at the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland.

The panel, moderated by Time Magazine CEO and editor-in-chief Edward Felsenthal, allowed the young activists to share moments of struggle and triumph as they have been working on getting their messages across to the public.

"I personally don't feel that heard from politicians, I would say, but with my local members of parliament I do feel really heard," said Autumn, making reference to Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha who serves as a member of the official opposition in the Ontario legislature.

"He's doing a lot of work to help me achieve my goals around that area. Even Carolyn Bennett (the federal minister of Crown-Indigenous relations), she's doing a lot of stuff to help me be heard as well.

# Mental health funding an example of unfair Northern policy

Today (Wednesday, January 29) is Bell Let's Talk Day, the day on which Bell Canada will donate five cents toward mental health initiatives in Canada for every applicable text, call, tweet, social media view and use of Bell's Facebook frame or Snapchat filter. It's an opportunity for ordinary Canadians to harness their thumb skills and smart phones to help those impacted by one of the least visible challenges facing a considerable portion of our society.

A study by Canadian Addictions and Mental Health has determined that, in any given year, one in five Canadians experiences a mental illness or addiction problem and by the time Canadians reach 40 years of age, one in two have—or have had—a mental illness. That is a pretty pervasive health challenge in anyone's book.

But the method of distribution of funds by the Ontario government to combat these health challenges is woefully inadequate and very clearly weighted against the people of the North.

This should not be interpreted as a slag on the current government in Toronto, the issue is a structural shortcoming that has impacted funding for government services under every partisan flavour whose hands have held the reins at Queen's Park.

Funding for most (if not all) government funded services is based on population numbers in electoral districts and mental health and addictions funding is no exception—but it should be. Northern Ontario comprises six percent of the population of this province, but encompasses around 95 percent of the land mass. The sparse population of the North coupled with its vast geography means any funding allocated on the basis of strictly the number of people in a region will

result in services becoming a butter spread very thin, with much of those funds frittered away on travel, either of professionals to an area, or patients travelling to meet those professionals.

There is little efficacy to be found in forcing those with mental health or addiction issues to travel great distances to access the services they need and, with a transportation grid that continues to shrink despite efforts to stem that tide, those services that can be a challenge to access in the more heavily populated regions of the south often become simply unattainable to those living in the North.

This is simply unacceptable.

More needs to be done to level the playing field when it comes to accessing medical services in this province. This isn't simply a matter of finding better efficiencies. As long as funds are allocated on the basis of population numbers without taking into account the challenges presented by geography and infrastructure, Northerners will remain second class citizens in this province.

The Bell Let's Talk program is a good example of a corporation attempting to be good citizens and helping to reduce the stigma of mental health issues while increasing care and access, research and workplace safety and The Expositor heartily endorses the effort and encourages everyone to tweet, view and post in support.

At the same time let's take a moment to let the masters of Queen's Park know that it is time to stop shortchanging the North when it comes to funding for services, especially mental health, and to take the cost of providing services in this region into account.

# Food and mood

# Correlations between what we eat and how we feel are revealing

ost people are aware of the association between a nutritious diet and their physical health. However, there appears to be less emphasis on the clearly established relationship between diet and mental health, or "food and mood." Although mental health is highly complex and influenced by many factors, in light of Bell Let's Talk Day, I would like touch on how food affects mood and review a few recommendations to promote mental health through diet during a time of year when a disproportionate number of people report feeling blue.

There is a direct association between what we eat and how we feel. Consider for a moment how you felt the last time you drank alcohol, coffee or ate a piece of chocolate. Most people can relate to the short-term impact of food and mood. However, did you know that some foods can have a long-lasting impact on general mood and well-being due to the impact they hold on the structure and function of the brain?

# How the brain works

The brain is partly composed of billions of nerve cells called neurons. Neuron allows the brain to communicate with itself. The neurons and associated structures are made primarily of fats or "lipids" derived from our diet. Specifically, the types of fat we eat can influence the brain's flexibility to communicate as intended. Neurotransmitters are messages that pass back and forth between components of our brains. These neurotransmitters are made from amino acids which are often obtained directly through our diets. These neurotransmitters directly influence our moods and feelings. For example; the neurotransmitter serotonin is involved in releasing feelings of contentment whereas the neurotransmitters adrenaline and dopamine help us feel motivated

Depression is a common mood disorder with many Canadians experiencing seasonal affective disorder. Seasonal affective disorder is defined as the onset of depression that occurs during the winter months when there is less natural sunlight. Several studies have examined relationships among different nutrients and depression. Low intakes of Omega 3 fatty acids, fruit and vegetables and high consumption of refined sugars and processed foods have been shown to increase the risk of depression.

In recent decades, an increased incidence in mental health conditions such as depression may be linked to changes in our diet observed over the same time frame. Changing nutrient profiles of our food supply also support this hypothesis. The "dry weights" of our brains are made up of about 60 percent fat, and the fats we eat directly affect the structure and function of brain cell membranes. Saturated

fats, like those found in fatty cuts of meat, are expected to make the cell membranes in our brain and body tissues less flexible, whereas the Omega 3 and Omega 6 fats found in fatty fish and certain plant foods contribute to brain fat is made from the Omega 3 and Omega 6 fats we get in our diet. Both are found in equal amounts in the brain and it is believed they should be consumed in equal amounts for maximum health benefit. However, changing dietary patterns and food production processes suggest that we are eating excessive Omega 6 fat relative to Omega 3 fat intake, leading to deleterious health effects. Healthy brain function involves balanced neurotransmitters. Our dietary patterns can make the brain less sensitive to its own regulation leading to negative feelings and mood. For example, correlations between decreasing intakes of fish by country and increasing levels of depression among its citizens and the reverse have been shown for many types of depression.

Foods that nourish the brain help the brain release and efficiently balance neurotransmitters and won't lead to down regulation of neurotransmitter function. In general, added sugars, deep fried foods, excessive caffeine, alcohol and cigarettes can contribute to deficiency of neurotransmitters and are associated with mood dysregulation. Whereas antioxidants from nuts, seeds, fish, pulses, vegetables and fruits help the brain protect itself by allowing regulation of neurotransmitters

associated with stable mood. Nutrients from food almost always demonstrate superior impact than those from dietary supplements.

Increased rates of mental health conditions such as depression are complex and are associated with biological, social and economic factors. Although changes in food consumption may be only a contributing factor, it may be one we can most easily influence.

# Key points for improving mood with food

Carbohydrates are the brain's primary and preferred fuel source. Choosing complex carbohydrates such as whole grains including rolled oats, wild rice, whole wheat and brown rice release glucose slowly during digestion. Slow digestion means your brain receives a more stable flow of fuel on which to function. Many of these whole grains also contain higher levels of nutrients than their more processed counterparts.

Emphasize essential fatty acids that your brain must obtain from your diet to function. These include Omega 3-rich oily fish like salmon, trout and sardines. Try to avoid deep frying your fish, which will change the beneficial nutrient profile it naturally contains.

Aside from nutrients and how they directly affect the brain, there are psychosocial effects of food. Consider how we feel eating alone versus sharing a meal among those that we love. Eat with others whenever possible.

Nutrition is an evolving science. We don't know everything yet. Protect your health and maximize your nutrient intake by consuming the widest variety of plant food possible.

Omega 6 fats are still important for health, however we should minimize our intake of processed foods such as vegetable oils and deep fried foods which may contribute to the undesirable high intake of Omega 6 fat versus Omega 3. Consuming plant fats in their natural forms such as avocados, nuts, seeds and whole grains is anticipated to offer greater benefit than vegetable oils.

Water makes up about 80 percent of the brain and is an essential element in its functioning. Stay hydrated with water being the brain's beverage of choice.

Studies have shown a link between vitamin D deficiency and depression. Anyone living in Canada cannot produce Vitamin D through sun exposure in winter months. Although vitamin D is stored in our body fat, it is recommended to take a supplement of 400 international units per day in winter months to ensure adequate vitamin D levels.

As previously stated, mental health conditions are complex with a myriad of factors at interplay. Food and overall lifestyle remain a pillar in factors that contribute to protecting mental health. Consider investing time and resources into planning the healthiest diet you can enjoy and maintain for year-round benefit.

# Gerald and Lois Bond

Entering the Bond home, one is immediately impressed by the bountiful Christmas decorations that fill every niche in the home and spill to the yard where a snow lantern invites a guest to pause. Santas, elves, beautiful homemade crafts, a Christmas tree, fully decorated, and the pièce de résistance, the amazing, fully functioning Christmas village taking up a sizable portion of the family room are only a scant few of the cherished items Lois has collected or created. When Lois claims, "I just love Christmas!" she really means it. Lois was also a telephone operator, delivered mail, worked at Smith's Hardware Store and helped Gerry with his

Gerry has left his mark by building their homes, being a proficient mechanic, running their farm, screening iron ore for CPR and overseeing maintenance for both the Centennial Manor and the Island Lodge in Whitefish Falls. He also started his own Manitoulin Vault and Concrete Products business.

"My maternal grandparents died before I was born so I never really knew them," Gerry begins. "My paternal grandparents, Albert and Mary Bond, arrived here from England with two sons, James, 10 and Alf, nine. Albert got work on the CPR coal dock in Little Current. In time, he settled into life on the Island and joined the Orange Lodge. My dad James married Mildred Rowe. They had four sons. Two other siblings died soon after birth."

Gerry, the youngest, was born on May 1, 1941 to James and Mildred Bond. Older brother Jim had joined the army and was off to war. Len and Edwin were at home. "Dad cut wood at people's homes during the depression. In 1942, the family moved to Malton where dad worked at Victory Aircraft, the home of the Lancaster bomber aircraft. "I got used to the planes passing overhead."

When the war ended in 1945, Victory Airplane shut down and the Bond family returned to Manitoulin. James bought a 400-acre farm on the Rowe Settlement in Howland Township. "One of my first memories was coming home from Malton at four. I remember being squeezed into that 1932 Chevy with mother, dad, Len, Ed, a family friend, and all our stuff. Four of us were in the back seat, including mother. She had packed a lunch and we stopped for dinner in North Bay. It was a long trip over rough roads. There was no Highway 69 yet so we had to go through North Bay.'

'On Manitoulin, we stayed at Art Rowe's place while dad and Art got our old farmhouse ready. A freight train brought our furniture from Malton to Little Current. In the spring, we restarted our farm with 10 ewes. I helped feed them and enjoyed seeing the little lambs grow over summer but disliked having the ram repeatedly knock me over from behind. In the fall the lambs would be sold. He raised cattle too and continued cutting wood which he delivered by horse and sleigh or wagon to homes in Little Current for 10 dollars a cord."

"School meant a four-mile walk to the No. 7 Green Bush School for Ed and me. It was one room with all nine grades in one class. We had a young, first-time teacher. She was very nice. I enjoyed math and reading but hated spelling. The strap? I came close a couple of times, but I never got it.'

"One time, Marjorie gave me a ride home from school on her new balloon tire bike. Being unfamiliar, I managed to get my feet into the spokes and catapulted us both into the bushes. We weren't hurt but the bike was badly damaged. Marjorie was very upset when her mother threw the bike onto the garbage pile down the gully. She was angry with her mum, but she

didn't seem to be angry with me, which was good."

Gerry joined the boy scouts. "There were about 16 of us meeting in the United Church. I still have my uniform today." Gerry adds, smiling. High school was in Little Current but young Gerald was anxious to start working. "I went the first day but decided I would be an apprentice mechanic for Tom McMurray instead. For the next two years, I worked on old cars, trucks, tractors and small engines. I was paid \$25 for a six-day week." After that, Gerry worked one year for Art Elliott as a mechanic.

In 1959, Gerry's friend was taking out Phyllis Cosby. Gerry met Lois, her sister and there was an immediate attraction for both. Just prior to a visit, Lois detailed the location of the gravel pit in front of the house. "Be careful, it's hard to see the edges in winter," she cautioned. Lois was in the house when she heard screams and ran to the window. She


observed Gerry and his friend sliding into the quarry, about 25 feet below. Only their pride was hurt. Lois and Gerald dated, and their friendship became stronger.

Lois Isabelle had been born to Alex and Pearl (Bryan) Cosby on November 13, 1939, on the kitchen table, in Little Current. Midwife Mrs. Boyd assisted. Lois' family had been on the Island for many generations also, leaving England when work was scarce. "Mum was a baker at the Red Lodge and the Manitowaning Lodge. farmed, raised horses, hens, turkeys, sheep and pigs. My sister Helen was an 'inside' helper and learned to bake from mother. I was outside, dad's right-handman. Our youngest siblings Phyllis, Brenda and little Russell were too small.'

"I milked cows and fed the pigs, hens and turkeys and did whatever was needed in the barn and the vard. Dad saved me one day when I got angry at the turkeys for blocking me from the feed trough.

I was six and I tried to clear the way by swinging my bucket in a circle. Unfortunately, I hit three of them on the head and they fell over, dead. Dad kindly buried them, so mum never found out. At that time, food stamps were issued to help save supplies for our soldiers on the front. We had our own meat, milk and butter but we needed to buy sugar, coffee, tea and other supplies.

"I remember my maternal grandparents, Jim and Mary Bryan of Gore Bay. Mary upholstered furniture and sewed clothes. By the time I knew them, grandad had retired and was helping Mary with her upholstery work. Paternal grandparents Charles and Hanna Cosby lived

school, we were bused to Little Current by Dave Strain. He was nice. Science class was in the furnace room among old clanking pipes. There were no labs, just discussions and I wasn't happy with any of it. I left shortly after starting Grade 9 and got work with Mrs. Farquhar in Little Current. I didn't tell my parents but kept using the bus to get back home. I had to run like the dickens to get to the bus before it left the school yard."

"Nearing the end of the school year, Mrs. Farquhar, who didn't know about my playing hooky, happened to call her sister who owned the Red Lodge. She mentioned that I worked for her. Her sister called my mother. When I got home that day, mother asked me how school was. I told her all was fine. Then she angrily confronted me with her knowledge that I hadn't been in school for most of the term. She demanded an explanation. Dad came to my rescue again. He said it was alright for me to work so I continued to do just that.'

"My next job was telephone switchboard operator Sheguiandah for Leila Dunlop who operated the Howland Phone Company. We took care of the party line from Cold Springs through Little Current to Sheguiandah. There was a list of everyone on the line and the number of rings for each phone. I liked this kind of

"I also had to babysit her five boys. Mrs. Dunlop was expecting and needed a break when the kids got home from school. The boys weren't allowed into the porch where the switchboard was, but they liked to play tricks. One time I was on one of the horses when a boy slapped the horse's backside. That animal took off kicking and bucking and the boys laughed but I managed to stay on top, hopefully impressing the boys and injecting a dose of respect at the same time."

"If there was an emergency, like a fire or a death, all the phone lines lit up; everyone got five rings. All would be aware of the

across the road. They had horses and vearling cows that would be sold in the fall. They were neighbours of the Green Bay United Church. Dad looked after the church and the school there. As his helper, I cleaned both places at the end of the daily lessons or the Sunday sermon and lit the stove during the week and at the church on Sunday.'

School was at SS No. 5 Green Bay. I didn't particularly like school. I hated spelling but I got through." Lois remembers going out for Hallowe'en. "There were only about five houses within walking distance for my sisters and me. We never got driven so were limited only by our stami-

"By the time I got to high

impending catastrophe and could help if needed. "One time, Uncle Leslie Woods was on top of the hay wagon when the whippletree broke. The spooked horses began to run away from the wagon. Uncle was hanging onto the horses with the reins. He fell off and was dragged before the horses were stopped. Sadly, uncle died that day.'

After one year at the Howland Phone Company, Lois, 16, looked after an elderly, blind lady in Little Current. Lois also spent part of her summer at the Red Lodge. Her duties included taking the cows to pasture and back again at the end of the day. In time she worked for the Hans family who owned Timberlane Rustic Lodges,

I am a big supporter of buying your food local, then from Ontario, then from Canada. Buy in season and even better, right from the producer. My mantra, or I should say my belief in this, all came together when (the time of year for hibernating) I went into Netflix and started watching the show 'Rotten.' A real eye opener on how real food can become fraud and how the consumer needs to be much more aware of where our food comes from.

This week I have included a few recipes that are quick to make and healthy.  $\,$ 

**Apple Muffins** 

These are my favourite muffins. I use Loon Song spelt flour and they remain moist. I have made them with honey, with maple syrup and without the honey and just used the dates. It all depends on how sweet you are!

- 1 cup pitted dates
- 2 large apples peeled, cored and cut into small pieces
- 1 1/4 cups whole wheat or spelt flour
- 1 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 3/4 cup natural almond, peanut, or sunflower seed
- 1/2 cup honey or maple syrup
- 1 1/2 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp ground cardamom
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp baking powder

Put dates in large mixing bowl. Boil 1/2 cup water and pour over dates to cover. Let dates soak for about five minutes or until they are soft enough to mash with a fork.

Leaving water in the bowl, take a fork and mash until a puree forms. Add the nut butter and honey and mix it all together. Add the apple pieces and stir gently until they are well coated.

Add all the remaining ingredients to the bowl and stir until just combined.

With a scoop or spoon place the batter into a lined muf-

fin pan. You will fill up the 12 cups.

Bake at 350°F for 35 minutes or until a toothnick comes

Bake at  $350^{\circ}\mathrm{F}$  for 35 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean.

# **Nestle Crunch**

This recipe calls for crisp rice cereal. Mmmm easier said than done. I went to buy regular Rice Krispies and noticed the first ingredient on the ingredient list was sugar. This wasn't going to work because I didn't want to eat white sugar. In my cupboard I had a package of quinoa puffs which I used. They did not create a "crunchy" square, but were still good. I need to find some sugar-free rice cereal!

ce cerean Double the recipe to fill an 8-inch pan

- 1/2 cup coconut oil, melted
- 1/4 cup plus 1 Tbsp cocoa powder or raw cacao
- 1/4 cup plus 1 Tbsp maple syrup
- 1/3 cup crisp rice cereal \*because I used the Quinoa puffs (very tiny puffs) I added 1 1/3 cups
  Optional: seeds or nuts, about 1/2 cup

Melt coconut oil in a small pot. Add cocoa powder and maple syrup and stir. Add the crisp rice cereal, nuts or seeds. Line a small baking pan, about 5-inch size with parchment paper. Pour chocolate into pan and place in refrigerator until set. Lift parchment paper out with the bars onto a cutting board and cut into squares. Store in the refrigerator.

# **Salad Dressings**

So simple and so good. Takes up to 10 minutes from start to finish. I can't remember the last time I bought salad dressing from a store! Make extra and it will keep up to a week in your fridge.

# Blue cheese-kefir dressing

Process 4 ounces blue cheese, 1/2 cup kefir milk, two cloves garlic, two chopped green onions, 1/8 cup walnuts and 1/2 cup fresh parsley in a small food processor or blender until smooth. Add 1 Tbsp lemon juice and 1 Tbsp olive oil; blend then season with salt and pepper. Makes one cup.

# Vinegar and mustard vinaigrette

Place 1/3 cup organic apple cider vinegar, 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil or sunflower seed oil, two cloves garlic and 1 Tbsp Dijon mustard in a small food processor or blender; process until smooth. Makes 3/4 cup.

## Safety, Security and Health Committee

Council has accepted the Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) community safety planning committee terms of reference draft, executive summary and questionnaire. The committee is working as one Island-wide group. Councillor Steven Shaffer told council that this is a work in

progress and members will be meeting in February.

A request to implement a winter walking program as outlined in a memo from Marcus Mohr, the community development outreach officer, has been accepted by council. The program will take place in the Mindemoya community hall and Councillor Scott questioned the need for a waiver as the building is not accessible.

Councillor Shaffer said that this program is an extension of the walking program that people are currently doing at the Mindemoya Missionary Church to which Councillor Scott said that about half the people in that program would not be able to access the hall.

Councillor Stephens asked if the program was regularly scheduled and the clerk answered in the affirmative and said, "So no rentals while this is going on." Councillor Shaffer, however, stated that the people participating in the walking program were asked about rentals of the hall and they are willing to be bumped.

Councillor Scott was taken aback that the extension of the walking program did not see the members use the church. "I am a little surprised of why they didn't just keep the church."

## Notice of Motion - Mayor Stephens

Mayor Stephens put forth a motion that council approves the establishment of a climate action committee as recommended by the municipal climate change coordinator. This group would be a sub-committee of the property committee and would report to the same.

A second motion was that council accept the offer of three metal bike racks from the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) with the municipality being responsible for their installation, including a concrete pad for each one. One rack will be installed at each of the Sandfield dock, the Mindemoya public beach and Stanley Park public beach areas.

During the introductions a number of those in attendance spoke on their connections to the building. "I just don't want to see this building torn down," said Ms. McQuay. "I will do everything in my power to prevent that from happening." Mr. Hallett spoke on his involvement with the building, having been based there as a mental health professional.

"My ancestors actually brought the brick here," supplied Mr. Harfield. Mr. Wilton noted that in his mind, "I would put the Anglican Church in town first and this building second. I just think if it ain't broke, why fix it?"

"I'm a bit of a Johnny Come Lately as far as this group is concerned," said Mr. Dewar, "but I would certainly like to help in any way that I can."

Others in the group expressed similar sentiments—but only Ms. McQuay and Mr. Lowe (a real estate appraiser who specializes in First Nations work primarily) were members of the now-decommissioned repurposing committee.

In his remarks, Mr. Tribinevicius, who taught elementary school for 38 years and who sits on the municipal council, said "I don't want to see it knocked down," cautioning that "not that there is any such language being used by the council." He said that he had reached out to Google citing the Old School as a potential site for a server farm, raised the idea of a indoor growing operation (not grow-op, he laughed) and raised the concept of reaching out to Island First Nations to engage them. "I think it's time for maybe some kind of a partnership heading into the future," he said. "Maybe this building could figure into that."

Ms. McQuay cited the report of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission as recommending such partnerships. Later, following the tour, the concept of creating student housing for Kenjegewin Teg, an educational institution located in neighbouring M'Chigeeng was raised.

Mr. Evans then shared with the group a bit of his own background, coming from eastern Canada and the impacts that the cod fishing moratorium had upon the small communi-

ties in that region and how regional approaches to repurposing old buildings had provided many of the solutions to the preservation of historical buildings.

The group then toured the building, which is comprised of several different levels, with office spaces having been created through the division of classrooms into more utilitarian and workable spaces for the former tenants.

Heat in the building is currently turned off and the impact of that could be seen when the tour ventured into the lowest level of the building, where moisture was leading to a buckling of the wooden flooring. Beneath that flooring there are a set of risers, themselves set above a dirt floor. In some parts of the basement, such as the boiler room, the floor was concrete, while in other portions of the hallways it was terraz-

zo.

The group learned that there is some pooling of

water in the ceiling, but that leakage was not evident from the vantage point of the offices or hallways.

The building interior did appear largely sound, at least on the upper floors, and Mr. Evans noted that, with the heat off, the clock is ticking on the building's viability. "Usually, you can expect two to five years with a building of this type," he said.

It was pointed out that an Island business had offered \$50,000 to replace the roof on the building.

Following the tour, the group held a discussion in

the building hallway where more historical context was provided by the participants.

Mr. Evans noted that "the buildings we are creating today will unlikely be as adaptable, as loose-fit, as the ones we have had in our past. We try to encourage designers and planners to think about that."

The architect described projects that his company has been involved with in the past where old structures were integrated into the new plans, much like the purported plan to include the community centre in the design of any new multi-use facility.

He reiterated the community backdrop against which the current discussions on the fate of the Old School are taking place, including the challenges of a diminishing and aging population. "This is happening in a lot of communities across the country," he said. "There are lots of examples where folks have taken a regional approach." At first blush, he suggested that a regional approach, such as repurposing the facility to meet a regional need or lack of service, may be the best bet

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
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

This site is one of nine new OPP detachments being built across the province by Bird Construc-

Work began at the corner of Hayward and Cockburn streets in Little Current on April 1, 2019. At the time, the estimated completion date for the 10- to 12-thousand square foot facility was late in the summer of

"We have been working diligently to complete the detachment on time and on budget, as we know the detachments are a priority for communities across Ontario. The Little Current project is currently on schedule and on budget," stated the construction firm in an email to The Expositor.

When complete, this detachment and others in the province will include a secure functions area complete with holding cells, interview rooms, a public admittance area, admin spaces for staff and management and an operationsfocused area that includes offices and evidence stor-

age.
"The modern facilities will certainly benefit the investigative processes, making them a lot easier, more maneuverable, and will certainly assist in increasing our overall effectiveness," said Inspector Cavanagh.

A specific date has not yet been set for when operations will officially move

from the current building near downtown Little Current to the new centre.

upgrade to the town crew's radio system, \$380,000 (from the working capital reserve) for a new grader and \$350,000, contingent on a grant, has been noted for a new sand dome at the Sheguiandah public works garage.

Under the environmental services header, \$250,000, to come from the Little Current water reserve, will be used for a water main replacement in this budget. A lagoon upgrade of \$3 million, \$1 million coming from grants, \$250,000 from reserve and \$2 million from loans is also slated for this year.

Rec centre projects for 2020 include: a new ice plant at \$300,000, air conditioning system at \$65,000 and net metering system at \$110,000, all of which would be covered by modernization funds.

The capital budget also includes \$108,000 for the back parking lot to be paved (contingent on funding); \$20,000 for work on the front entrance and walkway, to come from the working capital reserve; and \$1,988,600 for a rec centre addition, \$1,458,240 of which the municipality hopes to see covered by OCIP. The remaining \$530,360 would be taken out in a loan. (The project would mean a 60- by 50-foot addition to the rec centre on its east side that would include an indoor play area for children and exercise space for sen-

Under 'parks,' \$10,000 would come from the working capital reserve for the replacement of aging outdoor 'porta potties;' \$150,000 for new fencing and seating for the 'A' ballfield at Low Island (contingent on Jays Care Foundation funds); and \$20,000 for work on the Low Island washrooms, to come from the working capital reserve.

At the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah, \$10,000 has been earmarked for archaeological site marketing, \$28,000 for permanent washrooms and \$9,960 for windows, all at a net cost to the town.

At Spider Bay, \$250,000 has been slated for Pier 6 dock revitalization, subject to grant; the replacement of 20 yard light heads at \$20,000, subject to grant; renovations to the marina office/washrooms at \$30,000, to come from the Spider Bay Marina reserve; and \$20,000 to hard surface the road, also from the Spider Bay Marina reserve.

Lastly, \$50,000 was marked for electrical upgrades and landscaping stones for the downtown waterfront, to come from the waterfront reserve.

"I know staff has done a good job, but I have concerns with the 3.12 percent increase in Ward 2," said Councillor Bill Koehler. That coupled with increases to water and sewer, he added, did not sit well. "I won't be voting for it."

Councillor Bruce Wood noted that this is the first year during his time on council that Ward 2, and not Wards 3 and 4, have had an increase.

'Bruce has an extremely valid point," Councillor Dawn

Councillor Laurie Cook said she had concerns with the budget, especially during a time of economic uncertainty, adding that she doesn't think the municipality should have spent so much on capital expenses.

In a recorded vote, Councillors Michael Erskine, Barb Baker, Dawn Orr, Al Boyd, Bruce Wood and Mayor Mac-Nevin voted in favour of the budget. Councillors Bill Koehler and Laurie Cook voted against the motion. Councillor Jim Ferguson was absent from the meeting.

"The ayes have it," Mayor MacNevin said. The motion carried.

...continued from page 3 are ready to deal with the issues like violence in the classroom and continuing the current Kindergarten model of a teacher and DECE (designated early childhood educator) providing learning for youngest students.'

The latest public communication from the provincial education ministry about the ETFO job action was on January 9, when Education Minister Stephen Lecce called for an end to the escalation and games he described as union-driven.

"We will uphold our commitment to parents to stay at the bargaining table and work as hard as it takes to reach a deal that keeps students in class," said Minister Lecce's statement.

The last time ETFO met with the province to negotiate was on December 19, 2019. ETFO stated in a press release about the job action that the union has suggested revised proposals in late December relating to key issues, but it has not received a response.

On January 15, Minister Lecce announced plans to offer parents up to \$60 per day, depending on the age of a child, to help cover childcare costs.

Based on ETFO information sheets, the union's teachers and occasional teachers are seeking class size caps for all grades, more support for special education, increases to salaries and benefits, changes to substitute teacher hiring practices, improvements to health and safety protection and workload and working condition improvements.

For professional support personnel (PSP), education support personnel (ESP) and DECEs, the bargaining goals are nearly identical but include a reduction in Kindergarten class size caps and an increase in job security.

"We all support our children. None of us took jobs in schools just for a lark; we truly care about education and providing the same opportunities that we had when we were students," said Ms. Jefkins.

If this job action tactic of  $% \left\{ 1,2,\ldots ,n\right\}$ rotating one-day strikes sounds familiar, that may be because the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation (OSSTF) has also been hosting rotating strikes on a weekly basis, beginning with a provincewide one-day strike on Wednesday, December 4, 2019. RDSB teachers under the OSSTF District Three took part in a second oneday strike on Wednesday. January 15.

The main difference between the strike conditions in December to now is that formerly, just one union was taking part in job action. Now, in addition to OSSTF and ETFO hosting rotating strikes, the Ontario English Catholic Teachers Association and l'Association des et enseignantes des enseignants francoontariens are also taking part in job action.

The Catholic teachers' association held a one-day, province-wide strike on Tuesday, January 21 and the French union has been working to rule since Janu-

This is the first time since 1997—more than two decades-that four teachers' unions in Ontario have engaged in job action at the same time.

No talks are currently scheduled between the province and its various sparring unions. ETFO has announced its rotating strikes will continue through this week, possibly extending further if no progress comes forth from the presently stalled bargaining process.





# ...Birch Island expands Shawanosowe School to accomodate daycare

Years of leadership is certainly an appropriate label—the work to bring a proper daycare centre to WRFN began in earnest in 1997, nearly a lifetime ago for a certain Expositor reporter.

A year later in 1998, Ogimaa Shining Turtle was working as engineering advisor with the United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising. He worked with WRFN operations and maintenance lead Jeff McGregor to find a building to host a temporary daycare that was within budget.

At the time, the only option was a prefabricated house. This meant multiple levels on the inside that prevented those with unique access needs from getting into the facility. It was a daycare, but still far from ideal.

In the early 2000s, WRFN administration began working toward a proposal to secure funding for the Shawanosowe School that would include a gymnasium and the daycare facility. Council secured \$2.3 million for the school but did not receive support for the gym or daycare facility.

The band set an indoor recreation space as its highest priority and put forth \$500,000 of its own funding toward adding a gym onto the Shawanosowe plans when it was built in 2005. Ogimaa Shining Turtle said he has been lobbying the government ever since then

to be reimbursed for those costs, but since they were not part of the original funding agreement Indigenous Services Canada has denied those requests.

In March 2018, during a particularly intense season of the Little Native Hockey League, Ogimaa Shining Turtle headed to Toronto for meetings about funding for the daycare. In contributions of \$500,000 each from the Ontario government, Jordan's Principle and WRFN itself, the First Nation had finally secured the \$1.5 million it needed to build a daycare addition onto the school.

Jordan's Principle is a policy that ensures First Nations children in Canada have the same supports and opportunities as non-Indigenous children. It is named after Jordan River Anderson, a boy from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba, who died at age five after spending his whole life in hospital because the provincial and federal governments could not decide which legislature would pay for needed care for his special needs.

Because of the deadlock, he never received the adequate care he needed. Jordan's Principle is about ensuring care is adequately provided, with questions about funding coming second in importance to arranging care in the first place.

Two years later, the centre was now ready for children. Following performances by Redman drum group and a set of singing students

Shawanosowe School, daycare children, employees and band representatives gathered at the front door behind a ceremonial red ribbon. Ogimaa Shining Turtle and a few of the young ones had their hands on the oversized scissors, counted down and officially marked the centre open to the sound of cheers from the gathered community members.

Inside the main entrance is a circular gathering area where the children will leave their outdoor clothes in designated lockers, storage areas that give the children a sense of ownership, according to Ogimaa Shining Turtle.

Immediately to the left is a learning wing for preschoolers. It features student learning areas as well as dedicated staff working spaces. Each learning wing has its own washrooms, complete with toilets that only stretch a short distance off the floor— designed specifically for the needs of the little ones.

The learning wings all have sliding partition walls so the space can be used responsively depending on the needs of the day.

Continuing clockwise is the toddler wing, which is presently overseen by Caitlin Pitawanakwat and Cheryl Shawanda.

"We're really trying to embody the feeling of this being like a second home. We want this to be a really warm, welcoming environment here," said Ms. Pitawanakwat.

Continuing clockwise, at the far edge of the main gathering area, is a very spacious and open kitchen area that includes some stool seating for children at a centre island. There is an industrial range, dishwasher and no shortage of cupboard space for all the necessary kitchen odds and

"We believe that nutrition is so important for our students, and being able to sit here and be part of the process is fantastic," said Ogimaa Shining Turtle, noting that provided meals is a key aspect of the daycare. The kitchen is large enough to accommodate potential expansions to prep food for some of the younger Shawanosowe students as well.

Next in the circular layout is the infant wing, designed for the youngest children at the daycare. It is similar to the other wards in that it also has a dedicated washroom and play areas tailored to that age group, with the addition of a sleep room designed for 10 small sleeping cots that has blackout curtains to create a dark environment conducive to good sleep.

Completing the circle, the last quadrant of the building is the office and administration area with good



But then when it comes to federal government it's really hard to get their attention, be heard by them," said Autumn.

A priority shift is badly needed, according to Autumn, who said world leaders are missing the issues that matter to the continued survival of the planet.

"Honestly, I would say they're all focused on just money. We need to be more focused on the actual things going on; they're not thinking about the impacts and things that are happening. It's almost like they don't even believe that climate change is real," Autumn said.

Mr. Felsenthal asked Autumn about the time three years ago when she confronted Prime Minister Justin Trudeau about water protection issues. He inquired as to whether she felt like Mr. Trudeau listened to her arguments.

Autumn acknowledged that she felt the Canadian government was at least trying to make progress on ending boil water advisories in First Nations.

"I feel like there has been change because his Canadian government is actually working really hard towards trying to resolve the boil water advisories in First Nations communities," said Autumn. "The only issue with that is every time one is resolved, a new one occurs, so it's kind of continuous. But I know in Canada they are trying to make change.'

The way forward on a global scale, according to Autumn, will likely be found when more young people join the campaign to combat climate change.

'To see change, I think what we need to do is start getting more people and youth, not only from Canada but from all over the world, and empowering other kids to stand up," she said. "What we're doing right now is empowering them because being at the World Economic Forum we're on a global stage and everyone's going to be watching this. What we say right now is going to make an impact on everyone watching.

Autumn has been a high-profile figure in the press and has received no shortage of awards, accolades and speaking engagements in the past couple of years. Although being recognized for her continued advocacy work for First Nations and clean water worldwide could be seen as a nice gesture, Autumn said those tokens of appreciation are misguided.

"I don't want your awards. If you're going to award me, award me with helping me find solutions. Award me with helping me make change. I feel that's what I would want to see, is more people trying to help us with what we're trying to achieve," she

Press coverage of the work of these young activists, including the work of Autumn as has been reported in this newspaper, has been met with no shortage of vile and outraged comments by those that appear to be content with pretending the human-caused climate crisis does not exist.

Autumn Peltier, the 15-year-old water walker from Wiikwemkoong, had the chance to meet notable activists, take part in interactive workshops and explore the majestic Swiss alps.

Whether this is because of people who are so overwhelmed with the scope of the problem that they find it easier to make jokes and deny the problem exists, because of those who have placed their faith in fringe science that defies the overwhelming scientific evidence confirming the existence of human-made climate change or because some find joy in railing against easy targets, hateful online comments can be extremely disheartening for those without the determination of the activists on

'If you have negative things to say online to us, don't even try and do that. It's so wrong and we're just trying to do good things," said Autumn. "That's the thing is that there's always going to be negative people and positive people online, and we're really just trying to maybe even change the minds of people that think negatively about the things we do.'

Ultimately, these youths have taken up the call to make desperately-needed changes to the only planet mankind has upon which to live. Autumn said it should not be up to young people to make important changes to the world but offered advice from her auntie Josephine Mandamin, the late water walker and former Anishinabek Nation chief water commissioner.

"If you had an idea or a way (forward), she'd always say 'just do it.' I just want to say that if you have an idea or a solution or a way you can help us, just do it," said Autumn, offering the closing words on the panel discussion.

Autumn's mother Stephanie Peltier, sharing her thoughts through social media, said she was proud of Autumn for speaking from the heart and speaking the truth.

Later at the World Economic Forum, Autumn spoke at more engagements and met both Jane Goodall and Al Gore. She also enjoyed some time to tour the event and take in the technological advancements and the city of Davos before returning home.

...continued from page 1 ing in the North Channel and Georgian Bay."

This year the GLCC will be returning to the Port of Little Current from Saturday, July 11 to Wednesday, July 15—although several of the 90 to 100 boats will likely be arriving a day or so before that, cautioned Mr. Aubé.

For anyone cruising the Great Lakes, the GLCC's distinctive burgee featuring five interconnected chain-links forming a circle is a familiar sight. That burgee (small triangular flag flown by vessels) identifies the boats' owners as members of the GLCC.

"We proudly fly those burgees from the bow staffs of our power cruisers, or from the spreaders of our sailboats," explained Mr. Aube. "We get around," he laughed. "GLCC members take their boats far and wide on North America's five Great Lakes and their tributaries. We can be found on the water from Duluth to Quebec; from Chicago to Buffalo and from Toledo to Toronto. At lot of our members are especially partial to the legendary North Channel, but we hold the rendezvous in communities on the shores of all the Great Lakes."

The GLCC has more than 2,500 members in both the US and Canada, with about 80 percent hailing from the latter. "We are known to be a friendly bunch of serious boaters, who warmly welcome new members," said Mr. Aube. "We are willing to share our love of the lakes and our knowledge about how to cruise them."

Club members have

been plying the waters of the North Channel for decades, he noted. "It was a very popular destination for boaters back in the 1930s and 1950s and it remains so to this very day. We have a very definite affection for the North Channel."

The 90 to 100 boats coming to Little Current will haul at least 200 people on board and those people can drop as much as \$400,000 into the area businesses, asserted Mr. Aubé. "It costs a lot to run even a two-foot boat," he laughed. "So we will be putting a lot into the local economy."

"The municipality (Northeast Town) has been extremely cooperative," continued Mr. Aubé. "We are working closely with them to ensure that this rendezvous is a memorable event for everyone."

To that end, Mr. Aubé has been seeking out local events and points of interest for the GLCC membership.

This year each of the GLCC attendees will be gifted with a "goody bag" courtesy of the North Channel Marine Tourism Council, and Mr. Aubé said that he encourages Island businesses to contact him if they would like to include information or coupons in the mix.

window views of the drop-off area. The admin wing has a separate manager's office, a washer/dryer and spaces for teaching resources and other documents.

The back of the building opens onto a fenced-in playground that is accessed through the infant and toddler wards, but also has a door from the Kindergarten room in Shawanosowe School.

Ogimaa Shining Turtle is practically skipping during the tour, not trying to hide his excitement at seeing this 23-year project finally reach completion. He said this new facility is exemplary of the community pride that already exists and should continue to be fostered within WRFN.

The next phase for the revitalization of a strong community hub will be the completion of the elders' independent living facility for band members aged 60 and older. Applications are open for band members to vie for a one- or two-bedroom unit within the centre.

Some of the daycare workers are already excitedly making plans for collaborating with the elders' residence on inter-generational learning projects such as gardening.

Ogimaa Shining Turtle added that a recreation component of walking and skating trails between the buildings included within the community hub is in the works now, with the results of a \$2.3 million grant for that purpose expected to be announced in May. This is to become part of the 'canopy of learning,' inviting all the elements of community education and well-being into the centralized hub.

Shawanosowe School principal Daniel Stargratt said he was happy to have the daycare added onto the school because it enhances the continuity of learning.

"It definitely gives it more of a community feel and shows the partnership here with the daycare and the school," he said.

WRFN's new daycare is licenced to host a total of 75 children: 10 infants, 15 toddlers, 24 preschoolers and 26 school-age children. The facility began full operations on December 9, 2019.


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# Avid Haweater coin collector Buck Belanger displays his full set of Haweater coins

LITTLE CURRENT—Over the course of four decades the Haweater coin was the principle go-to souvenir for many of those attending the annual Little Current Lions Club Haweater Weekend festivities every yearwith many seeking to add to their collections every August long weekend.

Buck Belanger bought his first Haweater coin before Haweater coins officially existed. "The first one I bought was in 1968," he said. "It was called a medallion to start."

Mr. Belanger, long time owner/operator of Mardan Glass in Little Current, is a Haweater through and through—being born on the Island—and he credits his heritage as the reason he began collecting the coins.

He recently decided to pull his collection of coins out of the shadows and put them out on display. To that end Mr. Belanger created a display board that includes one of The Expositor tourist maps in the centre, with the coins arrayed around the map on a blue background. The map is distributed free to local tourism operators to assist their clients in navigating the iconic sights and sounds of Manitoulin.

"It was quite a bit of work," he admitted. "I used a hole saw to cut the places for the coins to go and put in a blue background, because the Island is surrounded by water." Constructed of plexiglass and encased in glass within a

picture frame, the collection will be on exhibition at Mardan Glass for a while before heading home for its permanent display.

The Haweater coins were the longest continuously minted trade dollars in the world, a record Mr. Belanger believes the coins still hold and they are still actively sought by coin collectors to this day. With a face value of one dollar,

some of the coins have accrued value dramatically, especially the avidly sought 1974 coin.

"That one has the Chi-Cheemaun on it," he said. "It was the year the ferry

first started serving the Island. It was worth about \$150 the last time I looked." (A short check on eBay finds an example with a value north of \$250.) Several, he notes, have values ranging in the \$20 range. He originally had three of the 1974s, but he gave one to each of his two sisters.

Each year since 1977, Mr. Belanger would buy four coins, "one for each of my kids when they got older."


He also purchased the more expensive \$20 coins, including one that holds the distinction of being the first trade dollar to be issued with a bi-metal

design—similar to the nowfamiliar two-dollar Canadian coin.

Mr. Belanger said he was saddened when the coins stopped being produced, but he understands why. "I guess they just became too expensive to have them made and sell," he said.

The collection will likely be loaned out to the Little Current Lions for display purposes at coming events, so folks will be able to see a great example of Island history that has touched so many hearts and minds over the course of its 40year run.







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

Learning About
Depression

In January it is common for people to feel a little blue. Often this is blamed on the holidays being over, or on the shorter colder days, often with little sunshine. But when does sadness become the more serious condition we know as depression?

Depression is a common mental health condition, affecting up to one in five of us in our lifetimes. Other than feeling sad most of the time for a few weeks or longer, depression has many physical symptoms. Sleep disturbance is common. This can be not able to fall asleep or stay asleep. However, for some, excessive sleep can be the problem. Another common symptom is a loss of interest in usual activities, such as going out with friends and family, sports or

spending time doing leisure activities. Patients with depression may feel guilty about things in their lives. In older adults, this can present as a feeling of worthlessness. A lack of energy is a common symptom in all age groups. Difficulty concentrating, such as difficulty with school or work is often reported. In older adults, this can be mistaken for loss of memory and must be distinguished from it. Loss of appetite is common and weight is seen in more serious cases. However, in some people, eating too much and weight gain can also be seen. Patients may also experience anxiety and seem agitated, or the reverse can be true, and the patient may be withdrawn and much quieter than usual. Depression can affect people of all ages.

Depression can be mild to severe. It can limit a person's ability to function at home and at work. Many people feel that there has to be a "reason" why they are depressed, but for many depressed patients a specific trigger, such as the loss of a loved one or of a job, cannot be identified. There is a family history in many people with depression. It is not uncommon for depression to co-exist with anxiety or substance use. In fact, some people try to self-medicate their symptoms of depression with alcohol or drugs.

The most serious consequence of depression is suicide. From the feeling that life is not worth living, or that your loved ones would be better off without you, it can be a short

road to actively attempting to take your life. Suicide is a leading cause of death next to accidents in the under 40 age group, although it is present in all age groups.

The good news is that much can be done to treat depression. The first thing is to recognize that what you are feeling or what you are seeing in a loved one may be depression. Reaching out for help, or bringing a loved one to see a health professional can be that most important first step to getting help. As health professionals, we will take a history and may order labs. Depending on the situation, counselling and medications may be recommended. In the most serious cases, where there is a serious risk of suicide, admission to a hospital may be required. If your loved one will not see someone, it is still worthwhile talking to a health care provider for tips about what to look for and how you can be of assistance. Locally, help can be found at your doctor's office, the emergency department and at your local mental health clinic. Online resources have been developed to help

patients with depression but are not meant as a complete stand-alone treatment program. A common recommendation is

"Bounce Back" which is an online resource intended

for people aged 15 and old-

(BounceBackOntario.ca). It is a skill-building program run by the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) which also has a website with good, reliable information on a number of mental health topics. If you feel you or a loved one is depressed, there is help. Reach out!

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
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



cleaning cabins, doing laundry, setting tables and serving food. "I stayed upstairs in the old farmhouse and had to be up by six in the morning. The tourists, mostly fishermen, were kind. I left there to get married just before the end of the season."

"Gerry and I married on September 2, 1960. My mum made the beautiful multilayered cake and the lunch." About 50 people attended the Green Bay church and the reception at the community centre in Mindemoya. The honeymoon to Niagara Falls was cancelled because their car had broken down. "That didn't work out, but I am proud that our youngest daughter wore my dress at her wedding. We also had it on display for our 25th anniversary.'

"We had already started to build a house on the lake not far from my parents' farm," Gerry offers, "I used dad's sawmill to cut the boards from trees felled in winter. I did much of the work myself for our twobedroom, 24-by-30-foot bungalow. The project started in mid-April and we moved in by mid-September." The couple would have three children, Perry, Barbara and Carol.

When he was laid off at Elliott's in the slow season, Gerry did similar mechanical work at Cooper Transport in Mindemoya. "I fixed engines and drove trucks for the next three years." After that it was one year of mechanic work at Posson Volkswagen in Sudbury before moving back to Manitoulin to do iron ore screening for Carmen Fielding Construction at the CPR dock. "I was looking after the screening plant when I lost part of my hand to the drive chain in

Gerry spent two months. from late June to September, in the hospital in Toronto. "They grafted skin onto my hand which was left with two fingers, one of which had to be removed later. The hand was bound to a spot on my stomach so the skin graft would take. That alone took 21 days. I went home for one week.

then returned for another two months in Toronto."

"After I got home in November, I worked one month with the Fielding plant before being laid off for winter." Gerry's next job was at the Manitoulin Centennial Manor when it opened in 1967. He spent 13 years as the maintenance supervisor. "I enjoyed that work." In 1973 he and Lois bought their farm and she helped with the farm work. Gerry spent his last 20 working years at Whitefish Falls, the Island Lodge in the Bay of Islands. He was the cabin manager, doing maintenance work with a staff of 25. Lois cleaned cabins.

Lois took on the Little Current rural mail delivery for 30 to 40 customers. "At 8:30 am I sorted the mail

and started my deliveries. I was home by noon." Additionally, she worked at Smith's Hardware for about 14 years. "My days ended at 5:30 pm so back then, I had to put Carol on the bus to go home after school. I had driven her there in the morning."

In her mid-50s, Lois retired from the hardware store and looked after four gentlemen with prostate cancer, each in their own homes. In 1990 Gerry started his Manitoulin Vault and Concrete Products business on his farm. He built burial vaults and concrete products like patio stones. He sold this business in 2008.

Both Gerry and Lois dealt with some health issues during those years. Lois fought off breast cancer twice and kidney cancer once. "They just burned the growth off the kidney with minimally invasive surgery." Gerald came down with prostate cancer and he had surgery around 2000. Son Perry broke his back while riding a horse and jumping over a gate. A timber hit him in the back and left him with a damaged spine. He was in his early 40s and needed a wheelchair. He has two sons and two daughters. Daughter Barb has two sons and lived in Calgary before she moved back to her family home. She works in reception at the physiotherapy clinic in M'Chigeeng. Carol has three boys and works at the Hobart Plant in Owen Sound.

"We have 13 great-grandchildren and one on the way. A memorable exciting event? The life-changing birth of our first child. I spent a week in the hospital then," Lois shares. "That's unheard of now. Favourite


