Manitoulin in 1867

As Canada turns 150, a look back at the Island in the year of Confederation Part I of a series celebrating Canada 150 on Manitoulin Island by Shelley J. Pearen

by Shelley J. Pearen manitoulin Island was in transition in 1867. Journalists writing in the mid-1860s described it as being forcibly transformed from an isolated island reserved exclusively for its Indian residents, into a reputedly vast resource for farmers, lumbermen, fishermen and speculators.

Manitoulin Island (Mnidoo Minising or Odawa Minising, the "Island of Manitou" or the "Island of the Odawa") has been the home of Anishinaabeg, the First or Original People for thousands of years.

In 1836, the Anishinaabe proprietors of Manitoulin signed an agreement with the government in which both parties agreed to withdraw their claims to the islands, making "them the Property (under your Great Father's Control) of all Indians who he shall allow to reside on them." The ogimaag (chiefs) who signed the agreement in 1836 believed the government was acknowledging and affirming their title to Manitoulin and the adjacent islands; they were agreeing to share it, forever.

Twenty-five years later, in 1861, Manitoulin Island's Anishinaabeg met new government representatives who claimed that the Anishinaabeg had not populated Manitoulin sufficiently, so a new agreement should take place. An offer to allow 25 acres for each Anishinaabe family, plus non-Native settlement on the balance

unceded or unsurrendered to this day.

Surveyors started exploring the Island within weeks of the signing of the treaty. As the surveyors worked Manitoulin's Anishinaabe residents carried out a campaign to have the treaty annulled. They petitioned the governor repeatedly, and successfully attracted the attention of journalists and members of Parliament.

Concurrently, the local superintendent of Indian Affairs attempted to resettle Manitoulin's Anishinaabe residents according to the terms of the treaty. The treaty reserved potential harbours, mill sites and town plots for non-Native settlement. coincidentally the current locations of most Anishinaabeg. In June 1866, land was released for sale in the newly created Howland, Sheguiandah, Bidwell, and Billings Townships, although many Anishinaabeg were still residing on these lots. They were persuaded or coerced over the following four years to relocate to Sheguiandah, Sucker Creek, or Sucker Lake.

cents an acre with a requirement for immediate and 3-year continuous residency. Except for a brief initial rush, sales were slow and the price was reduced to 20 cents an acre in 1867. The price reduction created a few bargains, but also meant there would be no financial benefit for the treaty Anishinaabeg who were also forbidden to purchase lots.

Clearly the descriptions of Manitoulin as being in transition in 1867 were accurate.

New Year's Traditions The New Year has been documented on Manitoulin since December 31 1844 when Jesuit priest Father J.P. Choné described his first New Year's Eve at Wikwemikong. Choné recorded: "First, the chiefs come in a body towards evening. At nightfall the principal people below the chiefs conducted by two miccinawe, gather together in front of the house of their Father the Black Robe. They start with a serenade of horns and a type of drum, thus forming an orchestra. After the serenade the 1st miccinawe starts ... continued on page 8¹

Norisle Steamship Society lawsuit seeks \$10 million from Assiginack Township

Citing breach of trust, claiming ownership as Tobermory makes plans for dive site

ASSIGINACK—The S.S. Norisle Steamship Society has begun legal proceedings against the Township of Assiginack since learning of the municipality's plans to sell the historical ship to the Tobermory Maritime Association (TMA) to be sunk and used as a dive site. According to the Statement of Claim filed with the Ontario Superior Court of Justice against the Township of Assiginack on Tuesday, December 13, the Steamship Society is claiming \$10 million for damages in addition to an order declaring that the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society is the owner of the S.S. Norisle by way of constructive trust. The Society is also claiming \$250,000 for "aggravated, punitive and/or exemplary damages," an interim order restraining the town from disposing of the Norisle until the matter has been tried, an interim order "compelling the defendant to continue to provide status quo administrative tasks including providing all risk insurance, to maintain its current accessible dockages, road access and snow removal, utilities service and ongoing maintenance at its expense until this matter is

tried, full indemnity costs of this proceeding plus all applicable taxes" and "such further and other relief as to this honourable court may seem just."

The claim goes on to accuse Assiginack of breaching a joint venture agreement between the

of Manitoulin, was flatly rejected.

The following year, in October 1862, senior government officials brought a revised offer to Manitoulin. Some of the Anishinaabeg succumbed to persuasion and signed a new agreement or treaty in which most of the island was surrendered. They subsequently claimed that they had been threatened and frightened into surrendering the land, and requested cancellation of the treaty.

The people of Wikwemikong refused to sign the government's offer and their peninsula remains

Canadian Coast Guard prepares for Great Lakes icebreaking operations

MANITOULIN-The Canadian Coast Guard, in partnership with the United States Coast Guard and the Ontario Provincial Police remind all recreational ice users to plan their activities carefully, use caution on the ice and stay away from shipping routes and icebreaking operations throughout the Great Lakes.

In Ontario, Coast Guard icebreaking operations to assist commercial shipping are scheduled for Midland as early as December 31, 2016 and Whitefish River on northern Lake Huron January 5, 2017. The Canadian Coast Guard Ship Samuel Risley will be transiting to its home port of Parry Sound on or about January 1, 2017.

These are the first of many ship transits throughout the winter months. Dates and routes are subject to change with little or no notice, due to weather, ice conditions, shipping schedules or other unexpected situations.

Broken and fragmented icy tracks left behind by icebreaking operations and other ship traffic may not freeze over immediately. In addi-

Trillium grant boosts LAMBAC local food programs

LITTLE CURRENT—Local food got a boost thanks to a \$51,700 grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation. Over the course of 11 months, funds from the grant flowed through the Growing Local project to support new and transitional farms and businesses with capital, training and mentoring.

The event held to acknowledge Trillium and the 11 months of activities was held at Hayden's Custom Cutting in Little Current, one of the business that benefitted from the LAMBAC-led pilot project.

LAMBAC general manager Mike Addison thanked Hayden's Custom Cutting proprietor Ken Hayden for hosting the group, introducing Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Michael Mantha.

Mr. Mantha gave a "hats off" to the Ontario Trillium Foundation for their work.

"They really identify with local businesses, local needs, and provide a service that is much needed in the area." he said. "(The funding) offers a hand up, not out, to people like Ken.'

Trillium really has community-oriented projects at heart, and it's happening all over Algoma-Manitoulin," the MPP continued. "You'll have your presence now and security for a long time to come," Mr. Mantha added, speaking directly to Mr. Hayden.

Mr. Addison explained that the Growing Local pilot project supplied training, mentorship and very low interest rate loans to people like Mr. Hayden (a butcher), and also to honey producers, market gardeners and other business with an interest in local food. The project was run between LAMBAC, the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs and the Local Food and Farming Cooperative (formerly Eat Local Sudbury).

It was noted that the Growing Local pilot project was wrapping up locally, but would be expanding to other areas of the North.

Manitoulin Trillium Grant Review Team member Michael Erskine explained Trillium's commitment to working with organizations like LAMBAC through its Seed granting program (which funded the Growing Local project), which enables Trillium to try new programs and test new approaches.

'The idea for Growing Local was to support local people and businesses in the agri-food sector

through workshops, mentorships and providing access to capital," Mr. Erskine continued.

'Over the past year, funds from your grant were used to help with staffing and administrative costs, supplies and the costs of hosting 10 workshops as well as rental space expenses."

"It's been a pleasure working with Ken," said Maureen Strickland, LAMBAC's loans and business development officer. "It's nice to see you're open for business," she added, commenting on the "nice looking beef" Mr. Hayden was busy cutting up before the event commenced.

Ms. Strickland explained that the Growing Local project impacted 52 individuals, saw 98 people attending 10 workshops on such topics as marketing, sales, basic business planning, nutritional labelling and canning for value-added products. It also saw seven businesses/proprietors mentored, three loans administered and a direct impact of seven start-ups and seven expansions. First Nations participants were also engaged in the process, she added.

Mr. Hayden, it was noted, has been mentored by LAMBAC since February.

"It's a fantastic project and I was pleasantly surprised at the good reception at the workshops," said Peggy Baillie of the Local Food and Farming Cooperative.

"Everyone brings skillsets that vary," added OMAFRA ag rep Brian Bell, adding that the networking was of great benefit to the workshop participants.

Ms. Strickland thanked the Ontario Trillium Foundation for the Seed grant, which they can continue to leverage in the North.

Mr. Addison spoke of Little Current's involvement with the Growing Local program, as the workshops were held out of the Cambrian College satellite office.

'To me, our relationships has always been a very positive one," said Northeast Town Mayor Al Mac-Nevin. "I'm always glad to see these programs are available. Congratulations, Ken."

Let's make 2017 a year of random acts of kindness

"Just a spoonful of sugar helps the medicine go down. In a most delightful way." You don't have to be a Mary Poppins or a Pollyanna to recognize what a little kindness can do to sweeten up just about anybody's day.

Being kind and doing kind things for other people not only tends to create a flutter of warm fuzziness deep inside of the person doing the kindness (as well as the person on the receiving end of the kind act) but kindness has been identified as an integral part of the human condition.

When we commit an act of kindness, we inevitably feel better. Now from one perspective that good feeling is a spiritual element of our humanity, but for the biochemists it can be traced to a chemical chain reaction that increases levels of dopamine in our brains—a natural high that has the added bonus of being really hard for any government to tax as it is basically sin-free.

Kindness has been identified as a key element in the development of social behaviour and bonding that helped strengthen early bands of humans and enabled our ancestors to survive in hostile environments where a lot of the critters we shared the landscape with tended to see us puny hominids as a delectable, if somewhat boney, snack.

Not only are there group benefits to kindness, ensuring the wellbeing and continued existence of humanity in general, but there are benefits to be felt at just about every level of social and individual weal.

Kindness has been shown to reduce the level of emotional distance between individuals. Not too surprising—we tend to like the people who are kind to us. This is hard-wired into who we are as a species. Seriously, there are literally kindness genes in the human genome and there are ample rewards to being kind than simply a warm fuzzy feeling. Not only do acts of kindness build stronger relationships (think bringing your partner a nice cup of tea or cocoa on a blustery day) there are documented health benefits to acts of kindness.

Kindness actually slows down the aging process, reducing both free

radicals and inflammation in the body, which not only slows aging, but promotes heart health as well.

As has become their custom, the students of Manitoulin Secondary School are forging a path to a better world. December was Kindness Challenge Month and throughout the school calendars were posted so students could see a daily kindness challenge. These challenges ranged from putting a coin onto the vending machines, hugging someone you care about, complimenting a stranger, making a stranger laugh, making a card for an elder, leaving a happy note for someone to find, helping a friend, thanking your teacher, smiling at someone you don't know well, to smiling at everyone you see. There was even a Take a Kindness Board put up in the cafeteria organized by the Transitions class and Ms. McCann. Students wrote something supportive on a sticky note then stuck it to the board so other students could then take a sticky note to help them lift their spirits.

Kindness transcends cultural boundaries and in these ever-soscary days of global strife, a little act of kindness can go a long way. Acts of kindness, big and small, can literally change the world.

Islanders' efforts to assist those fleeing global conflicts have opened a place in their hearts and homes for several families of refugees and every year literally hundreds of local volunteers assist with the annual food hamper program run by Manitoulin Family Resources. The folks at the Manitoulin radio stations stepped up this year to create a new community dinner to bring people together, complete with local musicians providing holiday music to entertain.

While the Christmas season tends to generate these outpourings of acts of kindness, proving the adage that kindness begets kindness, such a benevolent contagion is something we all should endeavour to extend through the entire year.

The eddies that spread out from each random act of kindness will help to improve all of our lives and make things just that little bit better for everyone in the coming year.

Writer expresses her loss of faith in Rainbow School Board

A clear lack of transparency in the process

To the Expositor:

As a parent of a school that was slated to be closed along with 11 others in the latest Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) Accommodation review, I was tasked with coming up with "creative solutions" to a yearly \$3.6 million shortfall. While I felt that this was not my role as a parent and that the RDSB had financial advisors for this, I undertook it with as much enthusiasm as I could. The end result if I did nothing was that my child's school and community would be decimated. I have witnessed the annihilation of our community services under the "Greater City of Sudbury" and wasn't prepared to watch one of the last remainthe first option in choosing a replacement is "appointing the candidate who came in second in the general election." The other option is to hold a by-election. Chair Dewar stated that "the remaining trustees, who were all democratically elected, have already voted to move forward with an appointment instead." Since when do eight out of the nine trustees take over the "democratic process" and decide who represents our area? Why are they so opposed to this candidate?

It would be like me saying to Trustee Grace Fox that the First Nations don't need their own police service on the Island with OPP so close by, or saying to Trustee Bob Clement that the McKerrow Fire Department doesn't need their own trucks and station when Espanola F.D. is more than equipped to respond instead. When second count, they are only minutes away. Is that not good enough for them? Would they be happy with someone from Onaping Falls making those decisions on behalf of their community? Why then are they making decisions for my small town when the constituents have already recorded their voice? It is no secret that I have lost faith in the RDSB's ability to make rational and sound financial decisions. I am now being force fed their idea of what will be best for my community and my child's education. There has been a clear lack of transparency in this process-and it was clearly an exercise in futility. Instead of pushing pause on the school closures, they are willing to forge ahead with a bank full of surplus money and fulfill their agenda at all costs. These costs should not include our community voice being stifled. I am demanding that the RDSB either appoint the one and only person who has shown genuine interest in becoming the Area 2 Trustee (Anita Gibson) or to call a byelection-regardless of the cost. To continue to make "democratic decisions" that appear to be anything but aren't acceptable.

It wasn't up to me to expose the fact that a multi-million dollar soccer bubble was well underway with architectural drawings, and \$1 million having been set aside for soccer turf and offered up to the City by Tyler Campbell at Norm Blaseg's request. This deal was uncovered in an FOI (Freedom of Information request) that resulted in Ward 2 Trustee Tyler Campbell stepping down as a result of this conflict of interest. RDSB Chair Doreen Dewar felt it appropriate to let the media know that he was not stepping down due to this conflict, but rather has become too busy in his role as a manager with the city. If that is the case, then our trustee just quit in the middle of the largest single school closure review. To make matters worse, while the RDSB has revealed their budget in August (as they have in 2013, 2014, 2015) they waited until all the presentations were done with parents and students begging for their schools and announced the very next day (although hidden until December this time) that they don't have a shortfall to compensate for but rather a surplus of \$3.6 million instead. That means that they were able to find an extra \$7.2 million to not only cover their projected shortfall, but to add a significant portion of this to their reserves which are near \$15 million at this time.

One would think that this accommodation review would be halted, yet it appears to be going full steam ahead in Area 2, which has three schools affected without representation. In the 2014 municipal election, Tyler Campbell was the chosen candidate with 57 percent of the votes. The runner up was Anita Gibson with a very handsome 43 percent of the vote. The Rainbow School board has chosen to 'appoint' a trustee for us because quite simply they don't seem to like Anita Gibson. It does not seem to matter to the Rainbow School Board that 1,265 of us chose her to represent us. According to the Ontario Good Governance guide,

Robin, snowy owl spotted during annual Christmas bird count

by Chris Bell

MINDEMOYA—Two thousand nine-hundred and forty-five birds of 45 species were counted on the 43rd annual Mindemoya Christmas Bird Count on Saturday, December 17. Uncommon birds for this time of year included a Canada goose on Hare's Creek, one snowy owl, an American Robin, a red-winged blackbird and a hoary redpoll.

Most numerous birds this year were 760 American goldfinches, 378 blackcapped chickadees, 210 pine siskins and 207 starlings. Twenty-nine watchers, inclu

watchers, including three new volunteers, took part this year. There were 21 birders, including three new recruits, in seven groups.

feeder

There had been lots of snow before count day, leaving 30 to 40 cm on the ground making some longer walks impractical. The Manitou River walk was cancelled but the Lake Huron shoreline walk went ahead with snowshoes and was much enjoyed.

The large inland lakes

including Lake Manitou and Lake Kagawong were open but largely devoid of waterfowl. Six types of ducks were seen on the count, including a single long-tailed duck in West Bay. Thirteen red-necked grebes were also found in West Bay. There were very few common mergansers and almost no gulls this year.

Last year we found 44 bald eagles but many have moved away from Manitoulin this month after a successful nesting season and we counted only 14.

Youth charged with weapons offences

On December 21, 2016, the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a report of a youth waving a knife at a second youth.

The youth has been charged with the following: Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, contrary to section 88 of the Criminal Code of Canada; uttering threats, contrary to section 264.1(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada; and assault with a weapon, contrary to section 267(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada.

The youth was released from custody and is scheduled to appear in the Ontario Court of Justice on February 7, 2017, at 10 am, in Gore Bay.

Driver charged with drug possession at OPP traffic stop

On December 22, 2016, a member of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) conducted a traffic stop on Highway 6, at Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands (NEMI) Township.

As a result of the investigation, a 27-year-old of Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation has been charged with possession of cannabis marijuana under 30 grams, contrary section 4(1) to the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. As a result of this investigation, a 46-year-old female of Little Current has been charged with refusing to provide a sample of breath on demand, contrary to section 254(5) of the Criminal Code of Canada. Her licence to drive has been suspended for 90 days.

The accused is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on February 7, 2017.

The OPP is reminding motorists that there is no safe amount of alcohol consumption when driving. Anyone who suspects a driver is driving while impaired is urged to call police by dialing 9-1-1 immediately.

Vehicle in the ditch leads to numerous charges

In the early morning hours of December 23, 2016, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a report of a vehicle in the ditch on McLean's Mountain Road, just west of Little Current. The driver was arrested after officers determined he was impaired by the consumption of alcohol.

As a result of this investigation, a 22-year-old male of Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation has been charged with the following: impaired care or control of a motor vehicle, contrary to section 253(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada; care or control of a motor vehicle with over 80 milligrams of alcohol in his blood, contrary to section 253(1)(b) of the Criminal Code of Canada; uttering threats, contrary to section 264.1(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada; and assault with intent to resist arrest, contrary to section 270(1)(b) of the Criminal Code of Canada (two counts). His licence to drive has been suspended for 90 days. The accused is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on February 21, 2017.

ing. Anyone who suspects a driver is driving while impaired is urged to call police by dialing 9-1-1 immediately. reported to birders. We have now had a snowy owl on four of the last five counts.

There are more red-bellied woodpeckers here this year and 12 were reported on the count. Manitoulin is the furthest north that this woodpecker ventures and the first Mindemoya report was in 1987.

Blue jay numbers vary from winter to winter and this count of 141 is very low with most observers noting fewer than usual at bird feeders.

The usual selection of finches is here this winter. We had record numbers of both American goldfinches, 760, and purple finches, 142. There were several large flocks of pine siskins and common redpolls have started to move in. The single hoary redpoll was with a flock of common redpolls. Very few pine grosbeaks were reported.

Some lucky people were able to find evening gros-

beaks. Evening grosbeaks have declined for unknown reasons throughout their range. We had them at Mindemoya on every count from 1974 to 1999 with counts in most years being over a hundred and a peak of 451 in 1987. The 10 found this year is the highest total since 2005.

Seven feeder-watchers had red-bellied woodpeckers and eight had cardinals. Dark-eyed Juncos were found at four of the feeders and tree sparrows at three feeders. No other sparrows were noted this year. Terri Thompson of Spring Bay reported 12 species and gets the 2016 Feeder Watcher Award.

The Mindemoya Christmas Bird Count is a project of the National Audubon Society and the Manitoulin Nature Club.

...continued from page 1 company repeat the "Hurrah" with the same intonation, then the miccinawe: "Hurrah", the company: "Hurrah," the micc.: "Hurrah," then the company "Hurrah" and then guns are discharged. The ceremony is repeated three times for a Black Robe and once for a chief. As we were two priests there were six serenades, six "Hurrahs," and six gun shots. Then the leaders of the company came and greeted the $\tilde{B}lac\dot{k}$ Robes, offering their hands. The Black Robe gives something, some cake or some sugar or tobacco and pipes and makes little cakes for all the visitors."

January 1 1845: "All the natives, grands et petits, came to greet us. Some knelt, others genuflected, others only offered their hand. This seems to be a custom degenerated from coming to ask their Father's blessing."

The New Year's gatherings continued and soon evolved into competitions between Manitowaning and Wikwemikong. In 1848-49 the Jesuits recorded that Manitowaning officials had provided their Indian visitors with larger and fatter bread rolls, well-sugared cups of tea, and greetings from not only the superintendent, but the doctor, school master and Anglican minister, while the volume and quality of the Wik-

Rev. Peter Jacobs, the Anishinaabe minister, described New Years at Manitowaning in January 1863-64.


"On New Year's Eve about 20 Indians paid a visit to the superintendent, to myself, and to Dr. Layton. They also visited some of the other people in the village. The evening was very stormy but this did not prevent them from making their accustomed New Year's Eve visit. They were dressed up in true Indian style. Their faces were painted with vermillion and black paint, Eagle, hawke, owl and turkey smitts were fastened on their heads and a string of quills hanging from one shoulder like a belt. One had a beautiful headdress of feathers which hung halfway down his back. One had a drum and another a rattle. While they were at the superintendent's they were asked to sing and dance as the Indians in former days used to do. Presently the head man of the party, who was neatly dressed, took the drum and sang a war song, and about six of the Indians danced round and round, one of them shaking the rattle. While dancing they occasionally gave the war whoop. The dancing and singing were very exciting. The Indians went through the same performance at the other houses. They received something at each house. It is only once or twice a year that they dress themselves in the way I have described. New Years Day was a very stormy day. Comparatively few in consequence attended church. Nearly all who went to church wore snow shoes, women as well as men. After the service all the Indians called at all the houses, where they received cakes."

In addition to greetings and gifts among the community, chiefs and warriors from as far away as Shishigwaning and Mitchegewedenong (M'Chigeeng) visited, social calls were and exchanged between priests officials at Wikand wemikong and Manitowaning.

At Manitowaning New Year's 1866-67 would have included the usual visits, greetings and gifts, however several medical emergencies meant the festivities were not recorded. Dr. Thomas Simpson, the newly appointed medical doctor, responded to two urgent requests from Little Current while Rev. Jabez Sims, walked to South Bay to offer spiritual and medhelp for Chief ical Wabenasemin. By the end of the first week of 1867, Mr. Abrey's child and an un-named Anishinaabe woman had recovered, but the chief had succumbed to his injuries and been buried.

At Wikwemikong, on December 31 1866: "The Warriors and Natives came as ordinarily wishing Happy New Year about 6 o'clock in the evening. We gave them the customary presents. The Daughters of Mary visited." On January 1: "Everything as usual. Fine weather, quite mild. The ice in the bay is very weak. The Congregations came, one by one, wishing Happy New Year. The Fathers visited the Daughters of Mary." The following day however another medical emergency arose and the Father travelled to Superior Jiboananing (Killarney) to attend to the elder Salomon.

On Manitoulin in 2017, 150 years later, residents still exchange greetings and step up to assist in emergencies. The only marked difference is that they are no longer obliged to walk between Manitowaning and Little Current, or South Bay to do so. EDITOR'S NOTE: Shelley Pearen has been researching Manitoulin history for


tion, newly fallen snow may obscure icebreaker and ship tracks. Changes in weather contribute to unsafe ice conditions that may remain long after the ships have left the area

...Northeast Town opens two road allowances to Snowdusters

needed before the eastern trails are opened.

"We're waiting for snow and cold weather," said Snowdusters president Doran McVey in a Monday interview. "Trails are still closed because there's not enough snow."

While the groomers did head out on trails on Manitoulin's West End and in the Little Current and Sheguiandah areas before Christmas, the warm weather and rain since mean that the trails have had a setback.

As reported last month, the Snowdusters turned to the Northeast Town after key parcels of land were removed from the trail system by four landowners in the Sheguiandah and Honora areas.

Snowdusters found two The unopened road allowances which they felt could be of benefit for them: the first is a road allowance that runs in a north/south direction along the west side of the Sheguiandah First Nation. and more particularly, the part that runs from Indian Mountain Road southward to Red Lodge Road (Bidwell Lot 1, Concession 7 to Sheguiandah Lot 1, Concession 9); and second, the road allowance that runs in an east/west direction from the 20th Sideroad west to join into Guida Sideroad (where municipal road maintenance starts), and from there out to Hwy. 540 (Howland Concession 1 and 3).

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson explained to council at the Tuesday, December 20 council meeting that he had met with representatives of the Snowdusters and explained the request to council.

"I think it is really important to establish a connection for the trails," said Councillor Michael Erskine. 'Especially for Little Current, which is current cut off (from the rest of the trails). It sounds like this will have the least impact on local landowners and seems like a good solution to the problem."

Councillor Paul Skippen expressed concerns with fences being removed on the unopened road allowances for the trails. Mr. Williamson stated, "It would not be unreasonable to add a condition that, if a gate is removed, it must be added back at the end of the season." The condition was added to the motion.

"Why did this come up in the first place?" questioned Councillor Bill Koehler. "Why were good trails cut off? This is unfortunate as there is not much for families to do in the winter.

"I support this request from the Snowdusters," said Councillor Marcel Gauthier. "People come here to use our trails and it stimulates our economy in the winter. It is a good resolution and I will support it."

"It is unfortunate that the trails were cut off, but it was on private property," said Councillor Erskine. "People have a right to enjoy their private property and allow usage as they see fit. We needed to find a solution

that works for everyone and this one does."

The conditions asked for by council are: that the Snowdusters provide the municipality with evidence of permission from Sheguiandah First Nation for the use of the road allowance that abuts the reserve; it is the responsibility of the Manitoulin Snowdusters to ensure all work being done is on municipal property and the municipality will not be held responsible for any damage done or work performed on private property; Manitoulin Snowdusters will provide the Northeast Town with proof of insurance with the municipality as a named insured for the development and maintenance of the trail system at a rate of \$5 million on an annual basis; any and all trees removed from the road allowance will be offered to the adjacent landowner; all work done will be subject to supervision and approval of the manager of public works; and any fencing removed for the development of the trail will be reinstated at the end of each sea son

Both motions for the use of the unopened road allowances were carried by council.

Mr. McVey said that the Snowdusters are in the process of setting up a meeting with Sheguiandah First Nation chief and council but until that happens, coupled with the need for more snow and cold weather, all snowmobilers can do is wait.

"The parties acted in accordance with their joint venture team effort up until the latter part of 2015, when in November the municipality abruptly and without discussion or notice withdrew its support," the claim states. "On July 4, 2016, seven months after the municipality locked out the Steamship Society, the plaintiff received a letter from the municipality stating that all support for the Steamship Society and S. S. Norisle project as proved by the MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) was withdrawn. The plaintiff states that the municipality's above described action breached their joint agreement and ended the joint venture relationship. This was done without good reason and without any discussion with the Steamship Society. The municipality breached its duty of good faith, trust, honesty and reasonable forthrightness. The lack of any attempt at communication with the Steamship Society was in

Steamship Society Director of Restoration John Coulter and long-time member Rob Maguire, who both said they were unable to comment on the Norisle or the lawsuit.

The Expositor also contacted Assiginack Mayor Paul Moffatt inquiring if the municipality had received the lawsuit, to which the mayor responded, "It's common knowledge that we have.

As to the claims, Mayor Moffatt said he had "no comment" and that the matter had been handed over to the municipality's insurance provider.

The lawsuit was the topic of the Assiginack council's in camera session at the Tuesday, December 20 meeting, but no motions were made as a result.

As The Expositor previously reported, Assiginack had begun negotiations with the TMA in the fall of 2016regarding the sale/donation of the S.S. Norisle to be relocated to Tobermory, sunk and used as a dive site.

despite hearing the news of the lawsuit.

"If the Steamship Society is able to successfully make the Norisle into a cruise ship-fantastic-it would be beautiful to see it sailing again," said Mr. Marcotte, 'but if it doesn't work and it's going to be scrapped, it is part of history and we want to keep it available to the public. We aren't stopping—I just put the last permit in a few days ago and we are still planning to go ahead with obtaining the Norisle and sinking it to be made into a dive site in the event that the Steamship Society isn't successful.'

Mr. Marcotte said he had been following the efforts to make the Norisle a cruise ship and came to the Island with his wife last summer to see the vessel.

"I asked the municipal office as to the status of the ship and they said they had no plans and were looking to get rid of it," said Mr. Marcotte. "We called a TMA meeting to investigate bringing the S.S. Norisle back to Tobermory as a dive site. I have submitted all the paperwork for approvals with the Ministry of Transportation, Department of Fisheries and Oceans and Ministry

of Natural Resources and Forestry. We are just waiting to hear back.

The TMA was formed in 1998 and obtained and sank the Niagara II in May of 1999, said Mr. Marcotte. Since then the TMA has created four additional dive sites in addition to working in partnership with Parks Canada overseeing the Fathom Five National Marine Park, with a total of 28 ship wrecks.


If the TMA obtains the necessary permits and the Norisle, the ship will be sunk in Little Cove.

Little Cove is home to two other ship wrecks: the Niagara II and the Lady Dufferin and Mr. Marcotte said that the S. S. Norisle would be sunk between the two.

The Norisle has been in the municipality's care since 1975 and, according to the original agreement, was to revert back to provincial ownership this year.

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itself an unreasonable action. The plaintiff made numerous attempts to reengage the defendant, all of which were rejected."

The Steamship Society claimed a breach of fiduciary duty as well. "The plaintiff reposed trust and confidence in the municipality," the claim states. 'It trusted that the municipality would act reasonably in fulfilling the objectives of the joint venture and MOU and continues to work towards securing funding for the project. The plaintiff felt betrayed when the municipality withdrew its support.'

The claim also sites unjust enrichment and constructive trust, negligence, damages and a restraining order.

The Expositor contacted the S.S. Norisle

Ah yes, the New Year has arrived, where we say or think 'I need to make a change.' The word change scares most of us-we do not like change. I prefer "I need to improve my habits." Take small steps one at a time (and then all of sudden you have made a change).

Cooking, eating and exercising right is very important. Keeping your health goals throughout the year means eating healthy, a small step at a time. Here are a few tips to get you going.

1. We brush our teeth at least twice a day every day without thinking about it. When you wake up do the 5T5 excercises (check them on YouTube) without thinking about it—iust do them.

2. Change your bread and cereal. Check the ingredient list and buy the kind that doesn't have the word "sugar" in it.

3. Eat vegetables at every opportunity. Eat them as snacks and part of your meals—half of your plate to be exact

4. Try one new recipe a week. Most people never dust off or crack open their cookbook.

5. Make a healthy meal using beans and lentils.

6. Eat more healthy fats; avocados, seeds and unrefined, cold pressed oils.

Mediterranean Lentil Sandwich

I turned this recipe into a dip because I am not a huge fan of "sandwiches." I would rather eat vegetables or crackers. To make the mixture creamier, just add a bit of water, one tablespoon at a time, otherwise leave as is for the sandwich. The chunkier the better. I switched the walnuts to pumpkin seeds. This makes enough for 5 sandwiches.

2/3 cup brown or green lentils

3/4 cup oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes

1/3 cup walnuts, pumpkin seeds, sunflower seeds or your preference

- 1/3 cup pitted kalamata olives
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 small onion, chopped
- Juice of 1 lemon
- 2 tsp fresh thyme
- 1 tsp paprika
- Salt and pepper to taste

3 roasted red peppers, sliced or a fresh, sweet red pepper sliced

Lettuce

Place lentils in medium-sized saucepan along with 3 cups water. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer for 20 minutes, or until very tender. Drain and let cool.

Place lentils, sun-dried tomatoes, walnuts, olives, onion, garlic, lemon juice, thyme, and paprika in food processor container and blend until slightly chunky texture forms.

To assemble each sandwich, spread some lentil mixture on a bread slice and top with roasted red pepper, lettuce, and another slice of bread.


