Swing bridge in Virginia, similar to Island model, replaced in nine days

GLOUCESTER POINT, VIRGINIA—Some Islanders have picked up on the engineering feat that is George P. Coleman Memorial Bridge that spans the York River, joining the communities of Yorktown and Gloucester Point, Virginia (near the famed West Point Military Academy) when it comes to thinking about our own Manitoulin Island swing bridge replacement.

The George P. Coleman Memorial has the claim to fame of being America's largest double-lane swing bridge at 3,750 feet long (and second largest in the world)—supporting four lanes of traffic. The bridge replaced an older structure in 1996 in a matter of nine days by being built off-site, 48 kilometres downriver in Norfolk, then floated upstream to replace the older two-lane swing bridge.

This new bridge replaced a swing bridge constructed in

1952 that had exceeded its traffic capacity of 15,000 vehicles per day

To start, crews floated in a 560 foot-long, 8.1 million-pound anchor span and a 210 foot-long, 2.58 million-pound suspended span, according to a 1996 article from the Gloucester-Mathews Gazette Journal. Each of those spans had been placed after the original bridge was torn down. (It was eventually dismantled and sold for scrap.)

"The swing span had to be moved inch by inch," the Gloucester-Mathews Gazette Journal reported, describing the maneuvers as a "very delicate installation" that took several attempts due to high winds that hindered the

Judge rules Robinson Huron Treaty's \$4 annuity needs update

Last increase was in 1874; ruling impacts 30,000 people

SUDBURY—It was a decision that has been a long time coming, but on Friday, December 20 the Honourable Justice Patricia Hennessy of the Superior Court of Canada ruled that the Crown has been shortchanging the First Nations signatories of the Robinson Huron Treaty by not increasing the \$4 annuity they have been paying band members since 1874. The ruling has been lauded as historic and a major step forward.

In her finding, Justice Hennessy said the annuity agreement was a living document and not a one-time agreement. "As the historical and cultural context demonstrates, this was not the case; the parties were and continue to be in an ongoing relationshin"

Further, Justice Hennessy rejected the position of the Crown that they had unfettered power to determine their own treaty obligations saying that was to "invite unending litigation."

The presiding judge further added that "since 1850, the Crown has acted with unfettered discretion in their interpretation and implementation of the treaties in a way that has seriously undermined their duty of honour." She also concluded that the court has the authority to "impose specific and general duties on the Crown."

Hearings began in Thunder Bay last September, but the battle to get the issue into the courts stretched much further back.

An exact amount was not set out in Justice Hennessy's ruling, but her decision clearly indicates that the annuities are to now be unlimited in their scope and that they are intended as a mechanism to share the wealth generated by the resources within the treaty territory. The annuities would

have to jump several thousand percent just to meet the Bank of Canada inflation rates alone—and considering the immense wealth that has flowed from the region, probably considerably more. Perhaps even more important than the money itself is the precedent this decision sets, one that could have implications for every other treaty.

Potential cannabis sales will be legal in Assiginack

by Alicia McCutcheonASSIGINACK—At its first meet-

ing of the year, Assiginack council decided to opt-in to allow for cannabis retail sales in the municipality.

Councillor Hugh Moggy began the discussion, saying "I've had a difficult time with this but have come to the conclusion that this is the right thing to do. I think we might as well be there," he said of opting in.

Ontario municipalities have until January 22 to opt out of allowing cannabis retails sales in their community. All municipalities received \$5,000 late last year and will receive another \$5,000 this month, regardless of whether they opted in or out. These funds are to be spent on any increase to paramedic, fire or police services, bylaw enforcement or policy development.

Opting out, however, shuts municipalities out of Ontario's share of the federal government's excise tax share of any surplus of more than \$100 million moving forward. Many municipalities have argued that the increased costs will remain, whether they opt in or out.

Currently, the only legal way to purchase cannabis in Ontario is online through the Ontario Cannabis Store but by April 1, 25 brick and mortar stores are expected to be open via an Alcohol Gaming and Commission of Ontario lottery, which will take place this Friday, January 11.

Strangely, Manitoulin Island has been included in the Western Ontario portion of the province, including Dufferin-Wellington, Hamilton, Niagara, Haldimand-Norfolk, Brant, Waterloo, Perth, Oxford, Chatham-Kent, Essex, Lambton, Middlesex, Huron, Bruce and Grey, which has been allotted seven stores in the lottery.

SPRING BAY—Emmanuel Kuepfer has been training driving horses all his life and the Spring Bay farmer is finding his services in high demand as the number of horse-drawn vehicles on Manitoulin has been increasing recently.

"My parents are Amish," explained Mr. Kuepfer. "We have always trained horses."

The trainer explains that horses should be trained fairly early on, although there are some who feel they should be older than that. "It's good to start them around two years old with a light drive," he said. "Kids start learning things much sooner than that if you stop and think

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Manitoulin's economic dependency ratio over 1.5x higher than Ontario

ONTARIO—Manitoulin's ratio between income and government transfers is among the highest for connected communities in the province, according to a recently-released commentary by the Northern Policy Institute that states the cost of healthy food in Northern communities is much higher than in the south, despite programs designed to help offset these price disparities.

"The crisis of food insecurity in Ontario and Canada's north due to the high price of the Nutritious Food Basket is a complex problem with many possible solutions," writes Eric Melillo, author of the commentary.

The paper states that Northern communities, especially those without road access, face higher food prices because of reasons that include higher travel costs, less market competition and a lack of suitable transportation infrastructure.

Although Northern communities that

have road access to other markets still face higher costs than their southern counterparts, the commentary finds "a positive relationship between community remoteness and the cost of healthy eating," meaning these effects are felt even stronger in communities without year-round ground transportation links.

The Rainy River and Kenora districts make up the Northwestern Ontario Health Unit. This unit has the highest cost of healthy food per month for an average family of four—\$1,018.20. This is \$159.39 more expensive than a Toronto family's average expense, which is \$858.81 per month. Over the course of a year, a Northwestern family would spend \$1,912.68 more than the Toronto family.

The Canadian government has in place programs designed to address these challenges. Nutrition North Canada (NNC) is designed to reduce the cost of healthy food in remote areas. It has been operational since April 1, 2011 and serves to subsidize

several perishable and nutritious food items such as fruit, vegetables, milk, eggs, meat and cheese that have to be shipped by air. It also subsidizes traditional or "country" food that is commercially processed in the North and shipped by air, such as Arctic char, muskox and caribou.

According to Mr. Melillo, the fact that healthy food is much more expensive in Northern Ontario than other parts of the province means the current initiatives are not doing enough to increase food security.

High food basket prices are not exclusive to remote communities. Connected Northern communities, including in the Sudbury and Algoma regions, also face steep costs to eat well. Algoma and Sudbury, each around \$900 per month, have the fourth and sixth highest healthy food basket prices, respectively. Hamilton is the lowest health unit of the 20 in the diagram, coming in at roughly \$750 per month. Seven of the nine highest-priced communities are in Northern Ontario.

Food insecurity is a complicated issue. There are a number of factors that all contribute to the availability of healthy food or lack thereof in various communities. According to previous research, Mr. Melillo cites inadequate income as being closely linked to food insecurity. Factors such as unemployment also negatively impact the ability of individuals to eat healthy foods.

In Northern Ontario, the average unemployment rate is 9.3 percent, according to Statistics Canada. That is more than one percentage point higher than Toronto, at 8.2 percent, and over two percent more than Hamilton, at 7.0 percent. In the Manitoulin district, the unemployment rate is 13.4 percent as of 2016.

"That is consistent with a couple things. The trend is to see higher unemployment in rural rather than urban centres. In Parry Sound or Sault Ste. Marie, for example, unemployment is lower because there are more jobs per capita in those communi-

Island lost a champion historian on New Year's

LITTLE CURRENT—Doug Tracy passed away on New Year's Day, but his legacy will live on with such events as the annual Little Current Lions Club Haweater Weekend, of which he was a founding driving force, and in the work he accomplished with the Island's genealogical and historical societies.

A Haweater through and through, Mr. Tracy's Island pedigree is as firm as any non-Native's could practically be, with a progenitor traced back to William Tracy and an 1820 homestead located in Carnarvon Township

Along with Honora Bay's Doug Hore and Gerry Bond, Mr. Tracy was one of the driving forces behind the creation of Haweater Weekend, and is largely credited with the creation of the Haweater Dollar.

"When it comes to the Haweater coin, he was the boy," said Mr. Hore, who as a contemporary of Mr. Tracy when it came to his Lions Club days. "In fact, it was Doug who brought me into the Lions Club. He was instrumental in the horse show and the midway every year."

Like many people who remember him down through the years, Mr. Hore recalled his friend as a "persistent" individual.

That persistence didn't always endear him to those who didn't share his vision, but all agree that he was the kind of man who would drive an idea to a conclusion. "He is going to be missed," said Mr. Hore.

Manitoulin Genealogical Society member Norma Hughson also recalled Mr. Tracy's persistence and drive. "He often had good ideas," she said. "His family came here early and I believe they were on the ship that burnt in Manitowaning Bay. The story went that they only escaped with what they could carry; the rest went down with the ship. He was active with just about every historical society on the Island at one time or another."

Another legacy of Mr. Tracy is a database he founded, Manitoulin Family Trees, an index that has expanded to include some 31,000 families—some of the entries go as far back as the 1700s. It can be found on the ancestry.com website.

He also received permission from Jack McQuarrie to index the famous 'Through the Years' pamphlets published by Mr. McQuarrie when he ran The Recorder and a printing company in Gore Bay.

In a 2012 Expositor 'Now and Then,' contributor Petra Wall noted of Mr. Tracy: "It seems that his personal history of family, work, friendship and research,

Whitefish River First Nation election voting period begins

BIRCH ISLAND—Voting is now open for the Whitefish River First Nation (WRFN) chief and council elections.

Band members have until 5 pm on Saturday, February 9 to cast a vote online. Mail-in ballots are also available for eligible voters who live off-reserve; these individuals should have already received a voting package. There will be a regular, in-person poll at the WRFN Community Centre from 8 am to 8 pm on Saturday, February 9.

Online votes can be cast at OneFeather.ca/Nations/WhitefishRiver where a full list of candidates and a notice of election can be read. This is the first election to be held under WRFN's new election code that it passed in September 2018. Part of the changes include a shift from a two-year term to a four-year term, similar to municipalities.

There are 26 candidates for the seven spots on council, one more spot than the current council. The candidates are: Anastasia (Stacey) Cywink, Nicholas Francis, Candice Jacko (Assiniwe), Gail Marie Jacko, Sandy Jacko, Anita Ruth McGregor, Brian McGregor, Cara (Caralyn) McGregor (incumbent), Francis Eugene McGregor, Leslie Florence McGregor, Lynn Marie McGregor, Murray McGregor Jr., Todd McGregor, Valarie McGregor, Beverly Nahwegahbow, Leona Nahwegahbow (incumbent), Esther Osche (incumbent), Gail (Kiki) Pelletier, L. (Bird) Pitawanakwat, John Recollet, Dave Shawanda (incumbent), Jacinta Maria Shawanda, Mark Hilary Shawanda (incumbent), Martha (Marti) Shawanda, Marilyn Stevens and Murray Still.

Time for both Crowns to negotiate settlement of historic wrong

The First Nations signatories of the Robinson Huron Treaty across Northern Ontario are celebrating an historic December 27 court victory that determined both Ontario and Canada have been short-changing members of those communities for 150 years. By not increasing a promised annuity that formed part of the payment arrangement agreed to by the First Nations the Crown has been found to have failed in its duty.

This is an historic wrong that must be corrected and corrected with dispatch. No appeal of this court decision should be countenanced by either level of government and both sides should move to negotiate a fair and equitable solution to this travesty of justice.

In case you may have missed it, the Crown has been paying out an annuity of the ludicrously low sum of \$4 since the last time the payment was increased in the mid-1800s. Now \$4 was a goodly sum back in the day, and was probably reasonably close to a fair share of the resource revenue being derived from the lands those communities had passed over to the Crown. But somewhere along the line the powers that were decided to cap the deal on the simple basis that they thought they could and nobody could do anything about it.

In her late December ruling, Justice Hennessy pointed out that this wasn't actually the case.

There are no shortages of these unconscionable wrongs to be found in the dealings between our nation (and provinces) with the First

Nations, but few are more clearly evident to the common person as not increasing a payment, as had been promised, for a century and a half.

The natural inclination of the Crown in these dealings has often been to appeal, appeal and otherwise delay meeting their obligations. It's a lot of money and no government likes to have to part with the taxpayers' dollars

But to be clear. This isn't taxpayers' dollars we are talking about. The annuities in question are the agreed upon sharing of the royalties derived from the resource wealth that has, and is, flowing from the territory that the First Nations turned over to the Crown. In fact, the evidence heard by the court pretty clearly established that the 21 First Nations that were part of the original agreement were helping the early Ontario government with its cash flow problems by accepting the deal.

The Crown quite clearly has a duty to make this right. While the tried (we won't use true) method for dealing with these setbacks by the government has been to delay the inevitable, this is so clearly wrong that it would be a monstrous waste of time and money to devote any further of the taxpayers' purse on lawyers.

It is long past time to settle this issue in a fair and equitable manner Get on with it

An op-ed from the Health Sciences North CEO

Meeting our future healthcare needs, together

To the Expositor:

One thing I have noticed since taking over as CEO of Health Sciences North (HSN) in Sudbury last year is the lack of knowledge and awareness across Northeastern Ontario that we truly are a regional hospital serving people from communities like North Bay, Timmins, Sault Ste. Marie the James Bay Coast and all points above and in between.

People are surprised when I tell them that while we were intended 20 years ago to be a one-site hospital, we currently have 13 sites in Sudbury and an additional 25 sites across the region where our staff provides care and information technology supports,

The majority of visits to our Cancer Centre are by patients from outside Sudbury – while that number is more than 30 percent of surgical procedures. Meanwhile, 60 percent of all patient visits to HSN for Cardiac Care were by people from outside Sudbury.

HSN is your hospital during the most critical times in your life and the lives of your loved ones.

This year, you've most likely heard about some challenging times at the hospital. HSN, along with almost every other hospital in Ontario, is facing systemic pressures of overcrowding combined with an aging population, which have put added strain on the healthcare system. It's because of those pressures and years where annual provincial funding increases did not keep up with inflation, that HSN found itself in financial trouble and had to make some very difficult decisions to bring its financial house in order and deal with an \$11 million deficit. This hasn't been easy, however it has been necessary. We feel we have turned a corner

After months of hard work and a record amount of consultation, we will be releasing in February a new five-year strategic plan, with a renewed purpose statement and a small number of key goals and specific outcomes to be achieved by 2024.

During the consultation process, we travelled extensively throughout the northeast, meeting with thousands of patients, stakeholders and community leaders, asking them what they wanted to see from HSN. We visited First Nations and went to Noëlville, Espanola, North Bay, Blind River, Elliott Lake, Manitoulin Island, West Parry Sound, Timmins and Sault Ste. Marie, among many other communities.

There was one simple message we constantly heard. People want to see more of HSN. More mental health and addictions care. More remote patient monitoring. Faster access to a MRI. Effective care transitions.

More use of technology to provide access to test results or schedule follow-ups. More collaboration on research to find long-term health care solutions for the people of Northeastern Ontario.

You want us to provide high quality health services, support learning and generate research that improves health outcomes for the people of Northeastern Ontario. You want us to carry out our patient care, teaching and research responsibilities with

integrity, ensuring patients and families remain the focus of all we do. You want us to partner with humility, valuing each person's and each community's strengths and ideas to bring the best care, education and research solutions forward.

We are hard at work to meet these expectations. HSN will finalize plans in March to support a regional electronic medical record to make care safer, make health information available to health providers throughout the region and reduce the need for patients to re-tell their stories or repeat tests. We will launch in May a new Capital Master Plan to meet future demand and reduce the need for patients to travel outside the region for care.

That being said, we must be aware of our future challenges. Ontario's population will grow by 1.8 million in the next 10 years. That's the equivalent of the population of Saskatchewan and Newfoundland combined. All of that growth will be outside of Northern Ontario. As the government increases health care services to a growing population in southern Ontario, the Northeast will need to rely more on collaboration and fundraising. This is our shared reality.

As we welcome 2019, the board and senior leadership team at HSN and I are feeling optimistic. We believe the worst is behind us. HSN has worked very hard at eliminating its deficit and we are confident a balanced budget will be achieved by the spring. The Ontario government is committed to ending hallway medicine, enhancing mental health and addictions supports, and creating more long-term care beds. This will help address the systemic pressures facing the system.

I want to thank HSN's 7,300 employees, members of medical staff, learners and volunteers for their exceptional commitment and hard work. On their behalf, I wish you a happy and healthy New Year.

Collision results in impaired charges

On Sunday, December 23, 2018 at approximately 4:12 pm, officers from the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, with the assistance of emergency medical services (EMS) responded to a single motor vehicle collision on Bidwell Road, in the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands.

The male was transported to hospital with minor injuries. Investigation revealed that the driver had been consuming alcohol.

As a result of the investigation, Vince Migwans-Panamick, age 30, from M'Chigeeng First Nation has been charged with: operation while impaired – alcohol and operation while impaired - blood alcohol concentration 80 plus.

The accused is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on January 23.

OPP charges more than 500 impaired drivers during Festive RIDE campaign

The Festive RIDE campaign resulted in OPP officers removing 539 alcohol/drug-impaired drivers from roads during Festive RIDE stops between November 23, 2018 and January 2, 2019.

An additional 384 drivers where issued Warn Range Suspensions for having a blood alcohol concentration in the .05 and .08 range.

Officers conducted a total of 10,270 RIDE stop events throughout the province during the campaign, marking the first time the number of OPP RIDE stop events exceeds the 10,000 mark.

During the previous (2017/18) Festive RIDE campaign, the OPP charged 587 drivers with alcohol/drugimpaired driving, issued 366 Warn Range Suspensions and conducted 9,830 RIDE stops.

'I am extremely proud of our officers for their commitment to keeping our roads safe over the holidays,' said OPP Interim Commissioner Gary Couture in a press release. "Whether drivers were charged with alcohol-impaired driving, drug-impaired driving or issued Warn Range Suspensions, the bottom line is that our officers took close to 923 impaired drivers off our roads and eliminated the threat they posed to those who were sharing the road with them that day.'

Tragically, there were 42 alcohol/drug-related road deaths on OPP-patrolled roads in 2018.

The OPP is reminding drivers that as of December 18, 2018, police can demand a roadside breath sample from any lawfully stopped driver without first having to suspect the motorist has been drinking.

Under the new legislation, drivers impaired by alcohol now also face higher mandatory minimum fines and some higher maximum penalties.

Traffic violation leads to impaired driving charges

On Saturday, January 5 at approximately 2:23 am, an officer from the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) was conducting patrols when he observed a traffic violation on Centre Street in the Town of Espanola.

A traffic stop was initiated and the officer determined that the driver of the vehicle had been consuming alco-

areas that would be in the agreement including access for drainage, adjacent landowners concerns, and that the municipality has the right of first refusal if the Conservancy wants to, say, liquidate some of their holdings. The municipality paid \$60,000 for the property.

Finance and Economic Development

There was a request from the vendor of the mobile vending truck at 6100 Highway 542 to remain on site until October 31, 2019. The vendor wants to operate in the same place next year and cited his concerns with the need and cost to disconnect the truck and then reconnect in the spring. Council has also accepted the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing reports including the municipal financial profile and the financial indicator review.

The minutes of the Planning Board meeting have been accepted by council.

Office and Administration

Council approved the closure of the municipal office on December 24, 25 and 26.

The 2018 annual update of the strategic plan 2016-2021 was accepted with the change of item 3. V (recreation facility) becoming a strategic priority for the finance and economic development commit-

The January meeting schedule changes, for January only, were accepted by council.

Security, Health and Education

Council approved bylaw 2018-12 to control the coyote predator population with the change that a valid hunting or trapping licence must be shown when compensation for kills are being sought.

Recommendations to council were accepted for the health and safety policies and procedures for the municipality including terms of reference and the high risk/lone worker policy and the harassment, bullying, discrimination and violence in the workplace policy were accepted along with a confidentiality clause for the

Council accepted the cannabis store legislation as outlined by the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario and the Ontario government.

The animal control report for September to November 2018, was accepted as well as the fire chief's verbal report of November and the emergency management program committee minutes were accepted.

Mayor Stephens announced the committee heads that were determined at the new council first meeting on December 4. Councillor Dale Scott will head the Manitoulin Information Centre operations committee, Councillor Farquhar will be the chairperson of the Hilly Grove cemetery committee and Councillor Stephens will oversee the Mindemoya Old School committee.

All the Central Manitoulin council committee financial reports were accepted with Councillor Stephens noting that all committees are within, or under, budget.

Anishnabek perspective and honoured Anishnabe law and placed it on equal footing before the foreign court systems," said Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier, one of the main spokespersons for the plaintiffs.

Justice Hennessy indicated in her decision that the two sides need to sit down and negotiate new terms.

"The Anishinaabe and the Crown now have an opportunity to determine what role those historic promises will play in shaping their modern treaty relationship," she wrote. "The pressures they faced in 1850 will continue to challenge them. However, in 1850 the Crown and the Anishinaabe shared a vision that the Anishinaabe and the settler society could continue to co-exist in a mutually respectful and beneficial relationship going into the future. Today, we arrive at that point in the relationship again. It is therefore incumbent on the parties to renew their treaty relationship now and in the future."

The lawsuit, which was originally launched in September 2014, finally got underway on September 25, 2017 in Thunder Bay and four weeks of court time was booked there. The case then shifted to Garden River First Nation and Manitoulin Island. The final stop on the court case road trip was in Greater Sudbury on

November 2017.

Originally, the annuity was set at \$1.60 per treaty member and for the next 24 years it was incrementally increased.

"It was discontent about mining activities by settlers without the free, prior and informed consent among the Lake Huron Anishinabek that forced the Crown to enter into a treaty relationship to get access to the lands and resources they coveted," said Ogimaa Dean Sayers, of the Batchewana First Nation of Ojibways. "Unfortunately, the failure to honour the treaty promise meant the discontent continued and will continue until the case is settled. This decision is the first step to have the treaty enforced and to deliver a sharing of the wealth that our ancestors negotiated."

The Crown has a set period in which they might appeal the decision, but Ogimaa Peltier said that he was confident that the decision will stand as both the province and the federal Crown agreed during the proceedings that the payments should have been indexed.

Leaders from Robinson-Huron treaty are now calling on provincial and federal governments to negotiate settlements rather than risk ongoing litigation which could take at least a decade and cost untold amounts in legal fees for both sides.

"The decision was very explicit that there must be full disclosure of the revenue derived from the territories," said Ogimaa Pelti-

But as it stands at press time Monday, the First Nations had yet to hear back from the Crown about when those negotiations were likely to start.

The employee has done it for some time now, he added, and everyone is pleased with his work. Mr. Cooper also noted that the trapping is done on the employee's own time.

Burns Wharf Committee

Council passed resolution number 06-01-19 to establish a Burns Wharf Theatre Advisory Committee to search for theatre building renovation funding opportunities and that the following individuals be appointed to the committee: Peter Baumgarten, Burns Wharf Theatre Players; Chuck Vanderveen, Burns Wharf Theatre Players; David Ham, Assiginack council; and Robert Maguire, Assiginack council.

Economic Development Officer

Mayor Ham led a discussion surrounding the need for an economic development officer. He told council that he and Councillor Maguire had a meeting with FedNor's Arik Theijsmeijer in December to talk about the various initiatives that FedNor would support.

"I was very impressed by the amount of money they throw in," the mayor said, noting that the maximum grant on offer is 90 percent of \$300,000.

There is also funding available for the hiring of an economic development officer.

Councillor Moggy asked if this would just be for an intern or if it could be for someone with experience.

"If you mean a seasoned individual able to carry out the tasks at hand, then yes,"

Councillor Maguire responded.

"It's something..." Mayor Ham began.

"We need!" Councillor Moggy completed the mayor's sentence.

about it. You wouldn't wait until a child was a young adult before you started to show them how to do things, would you?" Just like people, he explains, the longer you wait to show them the right way to do things the more bad habits they will pick up and it is harder to change established habits than to teach someone how to do things the right way, right away.

Mr. Kuepfer can accommodate quite a few horses on his Spring Bay ranch, and he buys and sells horses on a regular basis as well. "I have bought and sold horses for 20 years," he explained. He estimates he has transferred about 500 horses over the past two decades.

Currently, he can handle about 40 horses at a time. "You don't work every horse every day," he explains. "You really could-

The horse industry underwent a few difficult years when the province changed the slot machine agreements with race track owners and the provincial subsidies for the racing industry, but things have

improved markedly in recent years. "Horse racing is way back up," he said, and prices have risen quite a bit. "A horse can be worth a good bit of money, if you get a good one," he said.

Long a familiar sight on southwestern and eastern Ontario roads, horse drawn carriages used to be ubiquitous on Island roads as well, but the dominance of automobiles made them increasingly rare on Manitoulin (although many in living memory recall the days when they were still in

quite common use as transport in Island communities). But, with the increase of the number of Amish and Mennonite families choosing to settle on Manitoulin Island in recent years, they are becoming a much more common.

Horse-drawn vehicles are one of the slowest moving of all road users, notes the Ministry of Transportation Ontario (MTO) website. They range from two-person carts to open or closed buggies carrying up to eight people, along with

carrying crops, equipment and other goods. "These vehicles will travel primarily on the shoulder of roadways, but may straddle or enter the paved lane where shoulders are narrow or no shoulder exists—such as bridge crossings," notes the MTO, but cautions, "Remember that it is common to see horse-drawn vehicles throughout southwestern Ontario and increasingly in eastern and Northern Ontario."


Horse-drawn vehicles on the road must display an orange and red slow-moving sign on the rear of the buggy, but many drivers chose to have reflective tape affixed to the side and rear of the vehicle. This sign warns other drivers that this vehicle is travelling at 40km/h or less and the reflective tape illuminates as headlights hit the buggy.

"If you see a horsedrawn vehicle, slow down and be very cautious," cautions the MTO. "Maintain a safe following distance and only pass when it is safe to do so. When approaching drawn vehicle travelling in

large, wide farm wagons the opposite direction. move to the far right of your lane. When passing, give as much distance between you and them as possible. Passing too closely could scare or startle the horse, causing it to change direction suddenly on the roadway."

"A horse is not a car," said Mr. Kuepfer. "If you pass too close you could startle it and a horse can jump sideways two feet. Even a welltrained horse could jump into trouble. Besides, it is just simple respect.'

She thought the municipality should be better advertising the many interesting things going on in the municipality, including to members of the boating community to entice them to the Manitowaning Marina.

"The whole idea of how people vacation has changed," she added. "It's about experiences."

Councillor Jones also encouraged building relationships with neighbouring Wiikwemkoong.

Councillor Moggy listed the municipality's infrastructure as a cause for concern, specifically a new roof for the museum, the public works garage, getting the Burns Wharf Theatre building up to code, Roller Mills siding, the landfill, Rogers Creek Bridge "and we have to keep improving our network of roads.'


Rogers Creek Bridge committee

...continued from page 3 have listed flooring as the most important upgrade to the long-term care facility, a goal that is estimated to cost about \$100,000.

For the first time, the Manor has welcomed sponsorships from businesses and other organizations, creating gold, silver and bronze sponsorship tiers. This year saw 43 businesses sponsor the Tree of Lights in the new tiers.

...continued from page 3 ties," savs Charles Cirtwill. founding president and CEO of Northern Policy Institute.

"Education levels on Manitoulin have gone up in recent years, but they are still lower than the provincial average. That makes it likelier to see higher unemployment," he adds.

Mr. Melillo writes that

dependence on social assistance and other government transfers is strongly correlated with food insecurity. Economic dependency ratio (EDR) measures the amount of government transfers per \$100 of employment income. This includes child benefits, pensions and employment insurance in addition to social assistance. Almost seven percent of Northern Ontarians received social assistance in 2015, up from the provincial average of 4.9 percent.

This commentary looks at EDR per couple family and finds that food prices tend to rise directly alongside a region's EDR. It cautions, though, that it has not found any direct causation between the two. Further study would be required to establish what causality, if any, can be shared across the two.

To examine EDR in Northern communities, the provincial average is set as the baseline to which all other regions are compared. Moosonee, for instance, has a 25.6 percent higher EDR than the provincial average. Algoma's EDR is 88 percent higher than the provincial average but Manitoulin stands out—the Island has a 161.7 percent higher EDR than the rest of the province. Attawapiskat, by comparison, is nearly 300 percent higher than the Ontario average.

"Government transfers play a big role in the EDR statistics. If there are more seniors on the Island collecting Canada Pension and also a bunch of seasonal workers, that could lead to part of these stats," says Fern Dominelli, CAO of the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board.

On average, Northern Ontario couple families using social assistance receive \$1,359.03 more per year than Toronto families. This increase becomes much less pronounced when considering that families tend to be larger in Northern communities.

"One thing we do know about the Island is there are usually more children in families. There are more seniors and a lot more seasonal work than other places. Those are things that could contribute," Mr. Dominelli adds.

"EDR is driven by the amount of income you're receiving from government transfers, whether social security, retirement income, welfare or employment insurance. So when you look at Northern Ontario generally, and Manitoulin specifically, you're seeing higher and higher ratios of funds from government sources versus employment. On Manitoulin, vou'd see a high number of individuals collecting these types of payments, which includes payments from bands," says Mr. Cirtwill.

The increase in social assistance funding for Northern families does not cover the additional healthy Northern food costs as outlined above. Factors such as lower housing prices and extra subsidies, however, would have a bearing on the results. Housing costs are especially difficult to measure on reserves, according to the commentary, so more study would be needed to fully

It is important to note that in a Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board homelessness survey released in September 2018, 53.9 percent of the individuals identifying as homeless in the region are living on Manitoulin Island. In the study, Indigenous people represented 52.2 percent of the adult respondents, despite comprising only 26.3 percent of the total population.

Mr. Melillo writes that programs in Ontario to help address nutritional concerns are part of its Food Security Strategy. These programs include the Student Nutrition Program, Ontario's Healthy Kids Strategy and the Urban Aboriginal Healthy Living Program. In Northern Ontario, there exists the Northern Fruit and Vegetable Program that provides children with enough healthy fruits and vegetables. However, the commentary despite the program's promise it only serves one specific demographic.

Mr. Melillo states that changes in grocery store models may make some impact on food insecurity. Grocery store availability on Manitoulin is also a concern for Mr. Dominelli.

"There are not a lot of grocery stores. That makes it harder for people to go buy food, especially without transportation. They have no choice but to drive," says Mr. Dominelli.

Mr. Melillo suggests a possible remedy to grocery unavailability is starting cooperative stores in which community members buy into a store and run it as a collective, rather than a forprofit company. This would likely result in lower prices than profit-driven models. However, he cautions, it would not be an effective solution to food insecurity

He also advocates for a basic income guarantee either alongside or instead of social assistance.

"Currently, 70 percent of households on social assistance are food insecure," writes Mr. Melillo, "which suggests that current social assistance programs are not sufficiently addressing this issue.'

Mr. Melillo notes that Ontario has scrapped its basic income pilot project, with an end date of March 2019. He says this will result in a major loss of information that would have been possible to gather if it had continued.

"Had it been fully completed and analyzed, this pilot project would have provided crucial information on whether and how to proceed with a provincial basic income."

However, the relationship between income and food insecurity is non-linear, meaning there are likely more factors working to drive the outcomes that exist.

Ultimately, Mr. Melillo writes, this is a complex issue that requires a complex solution.

"Federal and provincial governments could consider adopting more than one approach to address high food costs in Northern Ontario," he states.

Mr. Cirtwill says communities in the southern part of Northern Ontario such as Manitoulin are starting to see some positive benefits, such as transportation improvements with the twinning of Highway 69 and investments in local agriculture.

"Although there are ups and downs in agriculture on Manitoulin, as a general sense around that region, we are seeing localized

agriculture starting to expand. The closer food is to you, the easier it is to get it to the shelf and the cheaper it's going to be," says Mr. Cirtwill.

In January 2019, NNC will be revising its subsidized foods list and increasing its subsidies for certain nutritious products. This will be an additional \$62.6 million commitment to NNC over five years.

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
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Chickadees the most seen species at annual Christmas bird count

by Chris Bell, compilerMANITOULIN—Two thousand, four hundred and forty-eight birds of 52 species were counted on the 45th annual Mindemoya Christmas Bird Count on Saturday, December 15. Twenty-seven feeder watchers, including four new volunteers, took part this year. There were 29 birders, including four new recruits, in nine areas within the 24 kilometre circle.

Several of the regular counters commented that there were very few birds to be seen in the countryside this year.

Most numerous birds this year were the 499 black-capped chickadees, 247 American crows, 212 blue jays and 193 mourning

Uncommon birds for this time of year included seven Canada goose, a belted kingfisher along the Manitou River, an American kestrel, two brown creepers, a ruby-crowned kinglet in Providence Bay and an American robin in Mindemoya

Ducks were scarce. Much of Lake Manitou and Lake Kagawong had frozen on the morning of the count.

The ground had been snow covered since November but there was only about three centimeters on the count, making travel easy. The traditional hike along the Lake Huron shoreline went ahead but very few ducks were seen. The big flocks of several years ago no longer appear to winter here now. Hare's Creek and a section of the Manitou River were also walked

Only 12 bald eagles were seen but we did find several hawks. There have been several snowy owls sightings this fall and we found two on the count. We also saw two barred owls. For some reason this year more downy woodpeckers were seen than hairy woodpeckers—the reversal of the usual finding. Thirteen pileated woodpeckers were counted—the highest total in

several years.

Every year a few birds that normally move further south in winter stay on Manitoulin. Three common grackles and one red-winged blackbird turned up on the count as did 10 dark-eyed juncos but only three tree sparrows-fewer than usual. There was also a single white-crowned sparrow

Both the pine grosbeaks and evening grosbeaks were seen on the count in good numbers. The count of 106 evening grosbeaks was the highest since 1997. The evening grosbeak is a declining species so perhaps the high numbers here this year indicate Manitoulin has more suitable grosbeak food than in other parts of the continent. There was a good selection of winter finches on the count but fewer purple finches and American goldfinches this year. Pine siskins were numerous in November but mostly gone in December. Common redpolls are the most common finch this year.

While several feeder-watchers had almost no birds, four had 12 or more species. Blanche McDermid of Providence Bay reported 12 species including the redwinged blackbird, a grackle and purple finches and wins the 2018 Award for the most successful feeder.

The Mindemova Christmas Bird Count is a project of the National Audubon Society and the Manitoulin Nature Club.

The following is the full list of birds counted: seven Canada goose; 25 black duck; 97 mallard; four long-tailed duck; one bufflehead; 31 common goldeneye; two hooded merganser; 98 common merganser; three red-breasted merganser; 13 ring-necked pheasant; 11 ruffed grouse; eight sharp-tailed grouse; 88 rock pigeon; 193 mourning dove; 88 herring gull; 12 bald eagle; one northern goshawk; one redtailed hawk; two rough-legged hawk; two snowy owl; two barred owl; 11 red-bellied woodpecker; 42 downy woodpecker; 38 hairy woodpecker: 13 pileated woodpecker; one American kestrel; five northern shrike; 212 blue jay; 247 American crow; 85 common raven; 499 black-capped chickadee; 20 red-breasted nuthatch; 64 whitebreasted nuthatch; two brown creeper; one ruby-crowned kinglet; one American robin; 137 European starling; 106 evening grosbeaks; 28 pine grosbeak; 15 purple finch; 137 common redpoll; one hoary redpoll; 24 pine siskin; 49 American goldfinch; one snow bunting; four American tree sparrow; one white-crowned sparrow; 10 dark-eyed junco; one red-winged blackbird; three common grackle; and eight northern cardinal for a total of 2,448 birds of 52 species.

tend to be very accommodating with horse drawn vehicles, generally giving them a wide berth, Mr. Kuepfer said he fears that might because of the novelty. "Down south they are a lot more common and drivers don't give them the space they should. They just fly by.'

That novelty has also brought with it some challenges when it comes to the general public and driving horses parked on the street. The lack of hitching posts isn't so much a problem for a well-trained team, but when people come up to horses waiting outside of a store and start petting the animals or clucking they can accidently indicate to the horse that it is time to get going, or startle them. When it comes to children, it is too easy for the horse to accidently step on them or kick if they stand in the wrong

A lot of children on Manitoulin do have some farm experience, but an increasing number of younger people have little experience with large animals. The safest course of action is to get your child to understand that they need to stay well clear of the horses.


horses, Mr. Kuepfer said he usually pairs a younger horse with an older and more experienced partner. "They pick up what to do from the older horse, when to go, when

When it comes to what local governments can do to make their communities more horse-friendly, Mr. Kuepfer has a few suggestions. "More signs," he said, "especially where there are places like just as you are coming into Mindemoya, where my parents live. There is a straight stretch with a steep hill, it is hard to make a turn into their driveway from the highway, especially if you have a trailer, even with my truck. Someone coming over the hill can't really see you in time if they aren't warned to slow down. That's a place where there should be a sign.'

In addition to his driving horse training and trading, Mr. Kuepfer will be offering horse drawn buggy/sleigh rides to the general public.

"I have no problem if someone wants to go for a ride sometime," he said. "Just give me a call and we can arrange something."




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

bridge corridor, the newspaper wrote. Special pumps were aboard the barges that filled up with water to set a new piece of bridge into place and then emptied to lift an old section off its pier cap. Cranes were also part of the process.

Crews of 240 ran around the clock to get the bridge into place while the United States Coast Guard also patrolled the area, keeping the area clear of traffic for safety reasons and stopping recreational traffic from passing through. Boaters were threatened with up to \$25,000 in fines for breaching the safety zone set up by the coast guard, the newspaper reported.

One life was lost during the construction of the swing bridge, a 25-year-old construction worker who fell to his death.

The new bridge, with two swinging spans, was opened in August of 1996 to great fanfare and was called an "amazing feat of advanced engineering" as the new bridge sections were created in Norfolk just three months before their installation.

"For the first time ever, a bridge was built with everything needed to carry traffic," then-Virginia Governor George Allen told the crowd during the official opening, according to the Gloucester-Mathews

Gazette Journal. "The deck was paved, the barrier walls were in place, the light poles were up, even the bridge tender's house was

ready to be occupied. Nothing like this has ever been done on a bridge this size."

The new bridge came with tolls, however, 50 cents for a round-trip upon its opening. This was a contentious issue for the community. Today, the toll is \$2 for a double-axle vehicle.

Quinton Sheppard, a reporter for the Gloucester-Mathews Gazette Journal, told The Expositor that much like Manitoulin, the people of Yorktown and Gloucester have a special connection to their swing bridge and it's an iconic piece of scenery for the communities it serves. Like the Manitoulin swing bridge, the George P. Coleman Memorial Bridge is featured in many a photo

and is an important part of the landscape.

Perhaps the George P. Coleman Memorial Bridge can serve as an example to the Ministry of Transportation of what can be done for

the Manitoulin swing bridge, replacing the bridge but keeping this important infrastructure—a swinging bridge—that is key in the hearts and minds of so many



I read the Globe and Mail online and sometimes pick up the Saturday Globe because I like that feeling you get when you turn the pages of a book or newspaper. This week Lucy Waverman (food and wine section) wrote an excellent article about "embracing some of the new kitchen appliances." Mmmm, I could relate. It's always interesting to hear what gadget people have bought to save them time in the kitchen, or just to walk down the kitchen appliance aisle of Canadian Tire to check out what is new and available because it will make cooking so much easier.

The question for me is "how often will it be used and where will I store it?" There are a few gadgets that I use all the time—immersion blender, Vitamix, slow cooker, Lee Valley's popcorn maker and a Soda Stream. I am still on the fence with the Instant Pot, and those great big rice makers-maybe next year I can find a deal at a yard sale!

Orange Fresh Fruit Ricotta Cake

I had to make a dessert and wasn't in the mood to be over-the-top and go all out. I needed a recipe that had simple ingredients and was quick and easy to make. The following recipe worked. You can use either frozen or fresh blueberries but the raspberries should be fresh. Instead of white sugar I used coconut sugar which gave the cake a light brown color.

- $1\,1/2\,cups$ all-purpose flour
- 1 Tbsp baking powder
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 /2 cups butter, melted
- 2 tsp grated orange or lemon zest
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup each fresh raspberries and blueberries
- 1. Preheat oven to $325^{\circ}F$. Line a 9 inch springform pan with parchment paper and brush sides with oil; set aside.
- 2. In a bowl whisk together the flour and baking powder. 3. In a large bowl, beat together sugar and eggs until thickened and ribbons remain when lifted. Slowly beat in ricotta cheese, butter, orange zest and vanilla. Stir in flour mixture until combined. Fold in the blueberries. The batter will be thick.
- 4. Scrape about 1/2 to 3/4 of the batter into the prepared pan. Place the fresh raspberries on top of the batter and gently press them in. Take the rest of the batter and spread gently over top of the raspberries. Bake for 45 minutes or until tester inserted in centre comes out clean. Let cool completely and turn cake out onto a serving plate.

*To dress the cake up serve it with either ice cream, whipped cream or yogurt. I used yogurt with just a splash of maple syrup.
