# Mystery of dead fish recurs on L. Manitou

# First major die-off since 2016

**by Warren Schlote** LAKE MANITOU—High numbers of dead whitefish, lake trout and suckers are washing up on the shores all around Lake Manitou, causing significant concerns for area residents who are worried about what the presence of these dead fish mean for the health of the lake.

"I just came from the lake there now, and there was at least another 25," Sandfield resident Peter Hutchinson told The Expositor on Monday. "We picked up a wheelbarrow full yesterday, another 25, and there's a lot more on the top of the water that are out a ways and haven't drifted in yet."

Mr. Hutchinson said he had never seen a die-off of this scale, nor had his 95-year-old father Doug Hutchinson or his 100-yearold aunt Jean McLennan. He noted that most properties he had

seen on the lake lost up to two feet of shoreline due to higher water levels, which may be causing an influx of silt in the water.

"The whole (Sandfield) bay is just a milky gray colour from the silt being washed in from shore. I'm no biologist, and I don't know

# Hep C program offers cash for a cure in vulnerable populations

MANITOULIN—As many as 100 drug and other substance users in Sudbury and Manitoulin will have a chance to receive financial incentives for undergoing hepatitis C virus (HCV) testing as part of a pilot project led by Réseau Access Network (RAN).

"This is an important program to not only treat and eliminate HCV among patients who are often overlooked for treatment, but also to build and strengthen relationships with Indigenous and other marginalized community members and agencies that are integral to the success of working with smaller, harder-tocommunities." Dominica Anderson, an outreach testing nurse with RAN.

"Our treatment nurse Brandi went to a conference in Portugal last year and realized that half of the world is doing incentive programs to treat people," said Ms. Anderson. "It's such an easy infection to diagnose and treat, so we thought, let's try to get something in our catchment that can benefit people and change lives.

RAN is a non-profit organization based in the Sudbury area that advocates for wellness, education and harm and risk reduction. It is especially targeted toward supporting individuals and its community in a holistic, comprehensive approach to HIV/AIDS, HCV and other related health concerns.

It has received what's known as a Hepatitis C Micro-Elimination Grant from Gilead Sciences Cana-

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# Debaj mainstage production explores communication in 'Crossing the White Line'

MANITOWANING—Sitting down with the Debajehmujig Storytellers to discuss one of their upcoming productions is always a fascinating experience as the pen is constantly challenged to keep up with the creative flow of the conversation. The conversation around this year's production of Michael Mulvihill's 'Crossing the White Line' provides fascinating insights into the genesis onto the stage.

working on," recalled Mr. Mulvihill. "I mentioned I had a story that germinated 25 years ago while I was working with the Sudbury Fringe Festival."

It was a lightbulb moment.

"That's what we need," said Ms. Helmer. "I asked 'can you go ahead and write the play?'"

Mr. Mulvihill agreed, but noted that he would need an Indigenous support and input. Enter Debaj's Johanna Berti who agreed to help make the connection.

Soon Mr. Mulvihill found himself working with the incomparable team of Debaj artistic director Bruce Noakwegijig and Debaj alum Tabitha Peltier on a two-hander play that explores communication between divergent perspectives. Two protagonists who have very different "truths" to tell, and who in the telling, discover much more about themselves than they could ever have had they remained as solitudes.

"Working with Tabitha, I have been quite impressed by her professionalism and abilities," said Mr. Mulvilhill.

# Rare pillow basalt table will be raffled off in a Manitoulin Streams fundraiser

GREEN BAY—Rock-hounds and gem collectors alike will be green with envy over Ed and Connie Ferguson's unique tabletops cut from a massive pillow basalt stone found in Mr. Ferguson's Green Bay gravel pit about a decade ago.

"I've dug up some rocks you've got to see to believe, but this one was really unique," said Mr. Ferguson.

"We knew it wasn't jade but we knew it was really strange," he said, recalling the moment it was unearthed in its entirety. When struck with a hammer, it rang out in metallic tones.

He took a sample out of the 8,100-pound rock and brought it to Colonial Brick and Stone (which operates a quarry on Manitoulin Island). That wedge showed promise of an interesting interior, so they arranged to have the entire boulder brought down to

the Kitchener-area stone shop.

When the crews arrived to pick up the boulder, one of the crewmembers seemed jaded at the prospect of the stone being anything special.

"I showed him the wedge sample and he immediately said, 'don't touch that stone with any metal equipment'," said Mr. Ferguson

Colonial Brick and Stone informed Mr. Ferguson that they would be cutting slabs of the rock on a given date, and strongly suggested that he be present for the occasion.

"As soon as they finished the first cut, everybody was amazed," said Ms. Ferguson, who noted that the owner of the company has been dealing with stones for his whole life and had never seen such a specimen. "It took them more than an hour to cut each slab."

The Fergusons reached out to an employee at the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines who identified a piece of the stone as pillow basalt.

"Where it came from is unclear because this type of stone mainly comes from a volcanic eruption. It's probably three billion years old, from around Timmins, and was left here by a glacier 13,000 years ago," said Mr. Ferguson

The 18 slabs went to Midhurst Granite for polishing—the proprietor had to buy two new tools to get the job done up to his standards due to the rarity of this kind of stone.

The slabs are sized at three feet by four feet and smaller and the base can be chosen by the purchaser. In the Ferguson home, which might be mistaken for a basalt showroom with its abundance of tables, there are units with stainless steel, cedar trunk and custom wood shapes.

One slab will be going to each of the Fer-

Officers took this occasion to share with everyone their heartfelt gratitude for the support they received during their search. "In a community like this, everyone feels responsible for one another," said Constable Ford.

"I cried," said Loraine Mucha, vice-president of the South Bay-

mouth community group and Little Schoolhouse and Museum curator. She felt relief upon learning of her safe return. "I felt pret-

ty bad because I knew what shape she was in."

There were approximately 60 rescue service officers and volun-

teers during the search, according to OPP Officer Roch Perrault. Sixteen of those were in the emergency response team, four in the marine unit, two officers in the helicopter, six detachment officers and an estimated six in the underwater search and recovery team.

"She disappeared it seemed like minutes," said Duncan Robbie, husband of Ms. Robbie. "She was there in the front lawn and all of a sudden she was gone." Ms. Robbie lives with dementia.

Support from the South Baymouth community was almost immediate after learning about Ms. Robbie's missing status. "It was all word of mouth," said Ms. Mucha. Information was shared door to door, which then led local businesses and volunteers to provide support for responders.

Huron Motor Lodge provided coffee while Wigwam Pizza, Pierside Restaurant and residents of South Baymouth gathered their provisions to provide additional food and support when necessary.

"That what we do in this community," said Ms. Mucha. "You

# Weengushk International Film Festival unveils an exciting lineup of must-see films

M'CHIGEENG—Building on the foundation of sharing knowledge and telling stories, the Weengushk International Film Festival (WIFF), presented by Weengushk Film Institute in partnership with Brock University, announced the selection of 30 unique and diverse films for the July 12 – 14 weekend. WIFF is a celebration of the creativity of Indigenous filmmakers and uses film to advance the goals of truth and reconciliation to highlight indigenous related films and filmmakers.

Located in the heart of the largest freshwater island in the world, WIFF will be hold opening ceremonies at the Four Directions Complex located at 1300 Highway 540 in Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation at 4 pm on Friday, July 12. A second venue, also in Aundeck Omni Kaning, is at the administration office hall located at 13 Hill Street. Workshops will be in M'Chigeeng at the Weengushk Film Institute.

"We are very proud of this year's lineup of films and events,"

said Jonathan Zagula, WIFF board of directors member. "We have something for everyone. From a cultural exchange with a Maori media group from New Zealand, industry workshops and a top class musical blues showcase; but the thought-provoking and diversity of our films this year will be sure to spark conversations, which is one of the goals of WIFF."

Opening the festival is a film directed by eight New Zealand women titled 'Waru,' a powerful and challenging story surrounding the tangi (funeral) of a small boy Waru who dies at the hands of his caregiver and how the boy's death impacts the community.

There are over 30 films in this year's lineup from hard-hitting documentaries, to feature films to shorts and animation. One of the highlight films this year directed by Tasha Hubbard is 'Nîpawistamâsowin: We Will Stand Up.' The film follows the Boushie family, their lawyers and others as they seek justice to this senseless

act that caused national and international outrage directed against the Canadian justice system.

The second day of the festival opens with films created by youth who attend Weengushk Film Institute and Brock University, followed by a question and answer session. A new addition to the schedule is a feature film "Trouble"

in The Garden' directed by Roz Owen, who will be in attendance for a question and answer session. 'Trouble in the Garden' is a feature film that is inspired by the '60s Scoop. WIFF will also be holding industry workshops on Saturday, beginning with a language workshop at the Anishnaabemowin Gaming in M'Chigeeng.

Additional workshops include a music workshop with Billy Joe Green and Vern Cheechoo, an acting workshop with Gary Farmer and a co-production workshop with New Zealand filmmaker Nicole Hoey.

#### Charles C. McLean receives highest honour as Ontario EcoSchool

SUDBURY—Rainbow District School Board is once again among the top 10 fastest growing school boards to receive EcoSchools certifications for the 2018-2019 school year. To date, 60 percent of Rainbow Schools have earned certifications, 21 percent higher than the provincial average.

This year, 27 schools achieved EcoSchools certifications, including all of Manitoulin's Rainbow schools: Assiginack Public School, Central Manitoulin Public School, Charles C. McLean Public School, Little Current Public School and Manitoulin Secondary School

Seven schools achieved a gold certification, 15 achieved silver, and three achieved bronze. In a first, Charles C. McLean Public School and R.L. Beattie Public School were certified platinum, the highest level for Ontario EcoSchools.

Certification recognizes achievement in six key areas: ecological literacy, energy conservation, environmental stewardship, school ground greening, teamwork and leadership, and waste minimization.

"The Ontario EcoSchools program provides students with proficiencies, perspectives and practices that will help them become environmentally responsible citizens inside and outside of the classroom," said Judy Noble, Superintendent of Schools and chair of the Board's Environmental Committee.

"Each year, I am amazed at the strategies staff and students implement to reduce their carbon footprint," said Director of Education Norm Blaseg. "Even the smallest of changes can have a profound impact on our health, and the health of our planet. We are extremely proud of the work being done to make green a vibrant part of our Rainbow."

# Violent confrontation of neo-facists is counterproductive

Hate is a powerful and dangerous emotion that seems to be ascendant in these days of hyper-polarized partisanship and social media flashmobs as members of the alt-right and white supremacist groups, emboldened by the tacit, and even overt, courting of these groups by mainstream centre right political parties, take to the streets in growing numbers to target marginalized groups such as the LGBTQ2S, refugee, Jewish and Muslim communities.

The rise in visibility of far right demonstrations taking place recently in a number of Canadian urban centres has seen a concurrent rise in push back by those on the left, working under the umbrella label of Antifa (roughly translating to anti-fascist) as those championing the causes of those marginalized groups seek to quell hate speech.

Too often the result of these clashes of ideology has been injury and even death (the Charlotte confrontation rose to global attention) with a concurrent rise in media exposure. For generations the Nazi and neo-Nazi undercurrent that has always been with us in some form or fashion has been relegated to the fringes, treated more as tragi-comedic figures not to be taken seriously. Nothing could be further from the truth—these are dangerous ideas that run full counter to peace, order and good government and the hard won rights and freedoms that we as Canadians have come to largely take for granted.

With the seeming reluctance of centre-right politicians to condemn outright the alt-right and white supremacist movements, those groups have gained a legitimacy and profile that runs counter to those fundamental values we cherish as the foundations of our civil society.

That very reluctance helps feed the fires of passion that fuel the most militant of the Antifa and in turn provides a tacit legitimacy to a vigilante current that seeks out violent confrontation in the name of defending the defenceless targets of the hate groups.

But with incidents of violence rising on both sides of the divide, the attention being given to what are still very much fringe ideologies further emboldens hate groups. Antifa supporters decry the media focus on violent acts of the left, which they feel is unfair as their cause in the defence of those unable to defend themselves—after all, they are just reacting to the hateful provocation and threats from the far-right.

Unless we as a society enforce those laws which outlaw hate and the

incitement of violence against others we will continue to see a rise in such incidents. This isn't anything new. The original Antifa was born out of the rise of the fascist and Nazi movements in Europe prior to WWII, and that earlier organization had noble and laudable goals as well. But the rise in violence and unrest did not result in the suppression of the Nazis and their message of hate, instead that unrest and violence resulted in the quiet centre opting for a strong hand and the promise of restored order.

The supporters of Antifa are quick to point out that silence allows the forces of hate to rise unchecked.

Silence is not the answer. But not remaining silent does not equate to engaging in violent confrontation. Although fighting the good fight against the forces of darkness has always been more romantic and dashing than lobbying our political leaders to enforce the laws against hate speech and violence, especially for passionate youth who want to do something concrete, to "kick at the darkness until it bleeds daylight" as referenced in a line from the Bruce Cockburn song 'Lovers in a Dangerous Time.'

For the vast majority of Canadians who support universal equal rights and freedoms and who desire to live their lives, as framed in our constitution, with peace, order and good government, silence is the enemy. We must stand united against hate, against violence and racism in all of its myriad and insidious forms if we are to preserve the peace that allows us to raise our families in an environment without fear.

We cannot stand idly by, and through our silence give voice and legitimacy to the purveyors of hate and xenophobia. Too often in history when it becomes obvious to the centre that it is time to man the barricades, it is too late and the fanatics of the right and left will take away our cherished rights and freedoms, supposedly for our own good.

We already have the laws we need to protect the marginalized and defenceless, all we need is the political will to ensure those laws are enforced. There is volume in numbers, so pick up the pen, the keyboard and the telephone and make your voice be heard in the halls of power—if enough of us do that, mainstream politicians of all stripes will listen.

# No fan of new Chi-Cheeman parking fees

#### Frequent travellers will be following the Highway 69/400 corridor to avoid the new fees

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an open letter to the Owen Sound Transportation Company and has been reprinted here at the author's request.

Dear Ms. Johnson,

I am writing today to formally complain about the upcoming implementation of parking fees for overnight and multi-day parking at the Tobermory and South Baymouth ferry terminal parking lots. I am a frequent traveller on the Chi-Cheemaun averaging about 30 crossings a season. I typically have two other people with me in the off-season and up to four other people with me during the peak season.

With the proposed implementation of the parking fee I will no longer be using the Chi-Cheemaun, which after 15 years of being a consistent traveler on the ferry, is very unfortunate. I find this decision to implement a parking fee to be very short-sighted and targeted at your most loyal and frequent travellers. This is not the way to treat a customer, who in my case is generating revenue close to \$2,000 a season with myself and others who travel with me. Multiply that by the 20 or 30 other frequent travellers and it will be well short of the money you generate by

charging for parking. Luckily the 400/69 corridor has continued to expand and I, along with many other frequent travellers, will be choosing to travel this more direct and convenient route than paying an outrageous fee to leave a vehicle in Tobermory and South Bay. As you noted in your strategic business plan, the expansion of this highway is a threat—and one that senior management is propagating through this decision.

The parking lot was full this past long weekend and into overflow. If you are counting on that continuing with your implementation of an egregious parking fee I wish management all the best. I know from conversations with other frequent travellers on the Chi-Cheemaun that they too will be travelling by car up the 400/69 corridor rather than paying this ridiculous parking fee. Incidentally, your own staff at both locations and on the ferry are also against this change, but have resolved that management does not know what it is doing. Sincerely,

# Billings Old Mill Heritage Centre museum returns to its roots for the 2019 season

KAGAWONG—Sometimes we get so used to the spectacular event that we are in danger of forgetting just how wonderful our ordinary can be. The Old Mill Heritage Centre museum in Kagawong has a long history of hosting some very unusual exhibits, including the recent Lester B. Pearson exhibit which highlighted Manitoulin's famous member of Parliament and former Canadian prime minister, and with its 10th anniversary this year one might anticipate another blockbuster. This summer, the threat of extensive road work encouraged the museum to head back to its roots for a hiatus from extravaganza to provide a fascinating trip back into the region's historical roots.

"We are still going strong after 10 years," said curator Rick Nelson. "When it looked like we would be facing all kinds of construction the museum committee decided to tweak our existing exhibits. By the time we found out that the road construction wasn't going ahead this year it was too late to plan for something else."

But that opportunity to retrench doesn't mean the museum isn't a great place to visit this year. "Our mandate is to gather research and exhibit historical informa-

tion pertaining to people, places and events in Billings Township," noted Mr. Nelson, referencing the museum's mission statement. "Back in the day, Billings Township had a heritage building that was not being used and it was decided that the museum board would house a museum inside. Thanks to some short term government funding, we soon had it operational."

The result was a snapshot of the historical development of a Manitoulin community, documented right back to the town's beginnings with vintage photographs, historical documents and artifacts. One of the highlights this year is a recreation of a typ-

ical blacksmith shop from the early days of settlement. The transformation is quite startling, as the former Lester B. Pearson office has metamorphosed into a place of fire and iron.

"Blacksmith shops were the heart of any rural community," said Mr. Nelson. "Everyone needed their services at some point since they made everything from horse

tackle to nails, wheel rims to hand tools."

The Old Mill Heritage Centre also features a very detailed military exhibit and, with the advent of the 75th anniversary of D-Day, there is special meaning in its

exhibits. "We have sand from Juno Beach (the Canadian landing zone in the greatest contested amphibious invasion in history) and dirt from Vimy Ridge."

Then there is the Island's greatest mystery, the story of Danny Dodge. "It's the story that just keeps on giving," said Mr. Nelson

"We can't forget the Post Office museum either," said Mr. Nelson. "It has been renovated and is new and improved thanks to the Trillium Foundation and FedNor."

There is a high tech digital kiosk that displays the historical trails system and the markers that the museum created in concert with 4elements Living Arts that tell the history of the town.

One of the highlights of the season for history buffs is the annual History Day and this year the focus will be on Harbour Island, from its glory days as a high end playground of the elite to the current restoration.

"We will also have a talk by Chris Kohl on the shipwrecks of Georgian Bay," he said.

The official celebration of the museum's 10th anniversary will take place on August 24 with a community barbecue.

"It's going to be a great season," said Mr. Nelson.

## An ode to coach Peter Kategiannis


Milgwetch for all the championship moments

The gymnasium at the Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) holds irreplaceable memories for many Island athletes. In the early '90s there was a changing of the guard of sorts. The major influencers of many legendary Mustang competitors were nearing the end of their careers. Incumbent coaches like Ted Jackson and Peter Flanagan were handing the torch to the likes of energetic rookies such as Margot Bickell and Jim Stringer. A new-to-the-Island teacher was soon to join their ranks, a young spark-plug by the name of Peter 'something or other' with a crazy long last name that starts with a 'K'.

Coach Peter Kategiannis was a through and through rugby man. MSS had no rugby team, but coach didn't flinch. Knowing very little about volleyball, he tossed his hat onto the court and ended up as the coach of the junior boys' squad. With primarily a basketball focus myself at the time, I too was on the junior volleyball roster by default (we didn't have a basketball team in those days). Coach K, aka Kat, was as committed to learning a new game (in a new home) as he was to developing the athletes he was leading. In short order, we had our very first volleyball championship banner to hang.

Over the next quarter century or so, Peter Kategiannis continued his winning ways. Numerous NSSSAA and NOSSA banners were hung and Manitoulin became known as a bit of a volleyball school. No disrespect to the long lineage of track and field lore and Mr. Smith's archers of yesteryear, but the MSS seniors boys' program set the bar for our competition, often touted as straight-up unbeatable. Full bleachers for regular season games were common place and even the annual Thanksgiving Alumni game has been known to draw a substantial crowd.

Mine has yielded many of my closest lifelong friends, it played a significant role in my career choice as a physiotherapist and it was on the court that I met my wife Joanna (a McMaster varsity player herself).

I have had the pleasure of either playing for, or coaching

I have had the pleasure of either playing for, or coaching alongside Pete for much of his tenure. Recognition for the thousands of hours spent in the gym or on the bus alone is deserved. I'll add that he has taught many Islanders the value of teamwork along with consistently demanding more of us, truly demonstrating what it takes to be a champion. For 20 years his athletes (at his behest) have routinely approached me after ridiculously difficult practices, by individually thanking me and shaking my hand. # More discussion on the renewables fossil fuels file

#### Hydrocarbons find favour because they are reliable, dispatchable and cost effective

To the Expositor:

In a June 12 letter ('Some facts regarding the transition away from bitumen'), Derek Stephen McPhail (DSP) took exception to some of the facts I presented in a recent note regarding wind/solar/batteries as they relate to electrical generation and distribution. The title of his work starts off with "some facts," which seems a bit odd since there isn't a single fact in his entire article. Here are my responses to the various points that he presents.

A quote from David Suzuki starts things off. First there is a statement that costs and inefficiency make oil sands products less desirable on world markets. Sorry, Suzuki but that is not how markets work. The things you are talking about will drive up production costs and if they get too far out of hand, the producers will be forced out of the business by market pressures. A second point in the sermon from Suzuki is that clean energy technologies are advancing rapidly. Really! Here is where a few facts would be appropriate. Wind and solar producing two percent of the world energy requirements doesn't qualify as advancing rapidly. For contrast, since 2000, the world has doubled its coal-fired power capacity to ~ 2,000 gigawatts. A further 236 GW is under construction and an additional 336 GW planned. (Carbon Brief 25 March 2019)

Next a quote from DSP, "Many think tanks supported by the fossil fuel industry, like The Copenhagen Consensus Centre (CCC)..." He inserts a quote from Wikipedia and if he looked just a few paragraphs down on the page from where the quote was taken there is a note about funding. It says very clearly that the CCC does not accept funding from fossil fuel interests. Here we have an oversight or a blatant disregard for the truth. Bjorn Lomborg won't accept money from oil interests because he knows that people like DSP will criticize this action. It is a shame that

organizations like the CCC cannot take advantage of oil money. The work that the CCC does is to review conditions in developing countries and help the authorities to identify opportunities where money can be most effectively spent to improve the human condition. For example, clean water, pest control, lighting so that students can study after the sun goes down etc. Bjorn Lomborg and the initiatives he has undertaken with the CCC are well documented. His major point is that diverting just a little of the money being spent on climate change would do a tremendous amount of good in the developing word.

Another DSP quote, "Conflating energy with power does not properly compare the equivalency of oil with solar and wind power." This is a classic word salad devoid of meaning. Gas fired turbines, steam turbines, diesel engines, and wind turbines etc. all are able to drive generators. These machine combinations have name plate capacities usually stated in mega watts. They all have typical mechanical availabilities and operating utilization factors. Knowing what these various numbers are, it is quite a simple matter to determine how they compare.

The next item DSP discusses is the Tesla factory. He claims that I criticized the factory when I pointed out that all of the batteries from a full year's production connected to the USA grid, could power it for three minutes. Again, a simple fact: one that DSP doesn't like but welcome to reality. Additionally, what I said about improvements in wind/solar technology was that we cannot expect additional radical improvements going forward since the technology is bumping up against the limits imposed by the laws of nature. I did not say that wind/solar haven't made significant advancements. Marxist ideological rants will not change the science, they might conspire to shroud the facts of the situation which is the only tactic DSP seems able to

nplov.

Now to the Goggle affair. Here is a bit more information. In 2007 Google unveiled a project that was to make renewable energy competitive with coal. The project was called RE<C. in 2011 Google cancelled the project. We know a fair bit about it because two of the engineers who worked on the project, Ross Koningstein and David Fork published a review after it was cancelled. Here is a quote from the paper; "Trying to combat climate change exclusively with today's renewable energy technologies simply won't work; we need a fundamentally different approach." Again, DSP attempts to fog the issue with some information about the energy Google uses in its operations. This has nothing to do with the RE<C project. Just for the record, data centers in general are responsible for 1.3 percent of the world's electricity consumption. Google says it accounts for a mere one-hundredth of that statistic.

In summary, energy from hydrocarbons find favour because they are reliable, dispatchable and cost effective. Wind and solar are none of these things. If there are other sources of energy that can compete, and there are, that is a good thing. Some are site or location specific, such as geothermal in Iceland or water falls compressed air in Cobalt Ontario. We shouldn't expect a large or significant contribution from these sources. Other technologies such as nuclear have a track record of generating base load energy requirements in a safe, reliable and cost effective manner. Ontario is a good example, France is a better one. Whatever the technology one cares to review, the numbers have to add up as David MacKay pointed out again and again – with mixed success!

#### The inaugural, Current to Killarney!

Wow! A what can only be called (the much too used) "epic" adventure happened this past Saturday. The first annual Current to Killarney canoe race, normally traversed by big water, yachts or power boats that may decide to go for their fish and chips on "another day!" However, 150 brave souls set out to make the 40km-ish trek. Of course, when you plan for months and work to become sanctioned by the province's paddle-sport governing body, you can't say "try tomorrow" to 40-plus km/h gusting headwinds on the start-line!

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# Island veterinarian hosts tech recycling program in partnership with Toronto zoo

MINDEMOYA—As technology continues to spread into more facets of life, more and more waste is generated when these devices become obsolete—a problem that only grows more dire by the day. It can be difficult to know what to do with old electronics, so an Island veterinarian has partnered with the Toronto Zoo to offer a solution that might make Islanders go ape.

"I ordered two (electronics recycling) boxes to be situated at Island Animal Hospital and Little Current Veterinary Services so that if individuals are wondering, 'where oh where can I dispose of my old phone,' they now have two convenient locations," says Dr. Janice Mitchell.

The Toronto Zoo has run its 'Phone Apes' program since 2006 and it has since grown to become a leading cell phone recycler in Toronto, winning top awards for its program in 2007 and 2009. The zoo offers recycling that ensures every component of old cell phones end up out of landfills and it has partnered with numerous groups throughout Ontario to offer collection boxes.

The program is named after the Grauer's gorilla, a species which lives exclusively in eastern Congo and is under threat. Coltan is a mineral that's crucial to the manufacturing process of circuit boards and it's principally found in these sensitive environmental regions. Dr. Mitchell says the miners are often poorly compensated so, in addition to harming the gorillas' natural habitat, the miners frequently turn to the gorillas for bush meat.

"Eighty percent of the worldwide supply of coltan is from that one spot in Africa. We are so dependent on technology these days; it's pervasive in our culture and it also becomes obsolete so fast. It's nice to know we can continue to recycle so we're not continuing to harvest it, destroy habitat, harm the apes and keep funding these wars," says Dr Mitchell

The refined coltan used in manufacturing can be salvaged from old technology and reused in the creation of new devices. This is further encouragement to participate in the program, considering its high degree of effectiveness. Dr. Mitchell says it forms an important aspect of global citizenship, in addition to its environmental impacts.

"Everyone can play a role. People are getting doubtful and pessimistic, people are becoming negative about the future. But you *can* do something, play a role, even if it's just a small part," she says.

Recycling programs and other environmentally conscious initiatives tend to only be as successful as the amount of extra work required of individuals to partake in the service. Many a recycling program has failed due to being perceived as an inconvenience to those who may prefer to simply toss their old technology in the trash. For this reason, Dr. Mitchell has established collection boxes

at the both Island Animal Hospital in Mindemoya and Little Current Veterinary Services.

"A lot of times with recycling programs, it's extra work for people who say they don't have the time for that. If we can have two easy locations open six and three days a week, hopefully it makes this into something they feel they can do," says Dr. Mitchell.

Dr. Mitchell has worked at other vet clinics in southern

Dr. Mitchell has worked at other vet clinics in southern Ontario who have offered the service. She noticed a lack of electronics recycling programs on the Island and decided to bring the idea North.

Between 2007 and 2014, the Toronto Zoo has collected 23,871 cell phones—in other words, an average of nearly 10 cell phones on every single day during that timeframe. The recycling organization that processes the zoo's collected phones, GEEP (Global Electric Electronic Processing) breaks down all the materials in electronics and deals with them appropriately.

The zoo requests that all donors wipe their devices clean before donation and cancel any service plans that may exist on the devices. If they encounter data that has not been erased, the zoo promises complete confidentiality and will obliterate the leftovers. The program also collects donations for field conservation works in support of great apes.

The Island Animal Hospital in Mindemoya is open weekdays from 8:30 am to 5 pm and Saturdays from 8:30 am to noon. The Little Current site is open on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9 am to 5 pm. Cell phones can be dropped off in the specially marked collection boxes on-site during business hours. When full, Dr. Mitchell will transport the devices down to the zoo.

# ...First Nations assert right to legalize pot sales

...continued from page 1 jurisdiction for First Nations in the province.

The Chiefs of Ontario passed a motion exerting control over all matters cannabis during the June 13 45th Annual All Ontario Chiefs Conference in Sault Ste. Marie.

"There was little or no community consultation by the federal government and there are still no provisions in the legislation which address First Nation social and cultural needs, and rights to economic development, health and public safety," the resolution The reads. resolution acknowledges that First Nations may consider following federal and provincial regulations while exploring opportunities within the cannabis industry, but it clearly defines that First Nations have the jurisdiction to establish their own laws and regulations.

"First Nations must have their autonomy and authority recognized as rights holders at the table as governments when asserting their interests in the cannabis sector," reads the resolution. The resolution goes on to assert that First Nations jurisdiction over its own operations, which includes "regulation of the growth, processing and sale of cannabis and in all its derivatives."

The Chiefs of Ontario called on the federal and provincial governments to eliminate barriers and to desist from interference that would impede nationto-nation trade and commerce.

Limiting those number of stores is contrary to what we call community sovereignty—that is those communities making their own decisions whether they're going to operate a retail cannabis operation," Ontario Regional Chief RoseAnne Archibald shortly after the news of the provincial expansion broke. "It's an attempt by the government of Ontario to assert its jurisdiction where it doesn't belong."

Under the Canadian constitution, jurisdiction in First Nations is a federal power.

"Why are these rules coming from the province?" asked Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Glen Hare. "There was just a big raid on the Kettle and Stoneypoint First Nation. These raids are causing a lot of questioning in our territories. It is up to the First Nations as to how we want to regulate this in our communities."

Grand Council Chief Hare noted that the bar for entry into the industry under the provincial game rules is far too high for most communities or individual Indigenous entrepreneurs to meet. "They want a \$250,000 investment and a bond of \$50,000, that's \$300,000; not many of us has that kind of money to put together that quickly in our communities," he said. The turnaround time for the

provincial licences is July 29.

Grand Council Hare quickly turned the question of cannabis regulation and enforcement around to what he said was a real crisis in the communities he represents.

"They are doing these raids over these pot stores, but there are far more serious problems in this province with hard drugs, where is the action on that? We are not seeing it," he said. "There needs to be a better balance, in my opinion." Grand Council Chief Hare was quick to point out that he is not directly involved in the question of cannabis at an official level. "It is up to the communities to decide for themselves how they want to approach this, but it is up to them and not for the province to decide. The province should take their hands off of this, it is our business. Let us do what we want to do, it is not a provincial matter.'

As of writing the Aundeck Omni Kaning and Wahnapitae First Nations had held referendums on the retail sale of cannabis within their territories, with both showing support for the industry expansion and economic opportunity potential.

Several Island First Nations communities are currently in a consultation and education process regarding how cannabis will be dealt with within their territories.

In order to collect a good

representative sample of both its on-and off-reserve membership during the busy summer season, Sheguiandah First Nation is utilizing both a three poll canvas and a mail-in ballot option. The first two plebiscites took place on May 30 and June 12 with the third and final vote slated for July 13. The consultation vote includes both closed (yes/no) questions on whether there should be band regulation and more open-ended questions on how that process would take place.

possible analysis.

whether that's the major factor, but I believe it has a good part to play in this," said Mr. Hutchinson.

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) and Manitoulin Streams Improvement Association are both aware of the presence of these dead fish. Concerned residents gathered fish samples from the summer kill, froze them and transported them to both groups for

MNRF issued the following statement regarding the Lake Manitou situation:

"From time to time, there are sudden die-offs in fish populations. These deaths can be caused by low oxygen levels in water, stress from spawning or changing water temperatures. We are aware of the dead fish and specimens will be collected for testing."

The majority of reported dead fish have been whitefish and lake trout, both of which are deep-dwelling cold-water species that are sensitive to water conditions. The recent heat wave over the past couple of weeks would have had an impact on the water temperatures as well.

Mr. Hutchinson said he feared what impacts this may

have on the lake's fishery on a longer term. Confirmed reports of dead lake trout and whitefish have surfaced, with Mr. Hutchinson saying he spotted a dead ling as well.

"What concerns me more than anything is not what I see on the top of water, it's what is below the water," said Mr. Hutchinson. "The whitefish and lake trout are floating in but I don't know what's happening below the water."

Members of the public are welcome to contact MNRF

whenever they spot multiple dead or dying fish, especially if the fish exhibit any signs of disease. This helps the ministry to understand diseases and how they spread, improve disease management and protect fish populations.

Anyone calling to report a die-off will be asked for the kind of fish, the species, how many have been found, what condition they are in and any visible signs of illness. They are also asked for the waterbody, nearest municipality, location or landmarks of the exact spot where the fish was found and recent weather or environmental conditions.

To report a fish die-off to MNRF, call 1-800-667-1940 on weekdays from 8:30 am to 5 pm. If a caller suspects that the fish may have died due to a spill or disease, they are asked to contact the Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change's spills action centre at 1-800-268-6060.

...continued from page 1 da, Inc., a research-based biopharmaceutical company that discovers, develops and commercializes innovative medicines in areas in need.

Gilead Sciences Canada offers grants to community-based organizations to diagnose and treat people from high-priority populations who live with HCV.

RAN is aiming to reach 100 patients who inject drugs, as these individuals are more likely to also suffer from HCV infection. Through the grant, RAN is starting up the Sudbury/Manitoulin

Micro-Elimination Project which will combine incentivized HCV treatment and opioid agonist therapy (the use of methadone or suboxone to prevent withdrawal and reduce opioid cravings)

Numerous studies have shown that incentivizing treatment for drug abstinence and HCV treatment can lead to increased compliance rates. One randomized control trial published in Open Forum Infectious Diseases in April 2019 noted that the impact of incentives ended up being relatively small, but these results may only apply to the one clinic featured in that study.

The North also has extra factors to consider such as the high stress of housing insecurity, especially in the winter. By incentivizing treatment follow-through, participants may be less inclined to put off treatment in favour of other pri-

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The incentive program through RAN began in February of this year and runs until March 2020. The organization estimates that

until March 2020. The organization estimates that 90 percent of its patients in the program will undergo testing and diagnosis, and that 80 percent of those diagnosed will go through to the HCV therapy stage.

Drug users have a particularly high risk of contracting HCV if they share any equipment used to prepare or inject drugs, and may be more likely to make risky sexual choices while under the influence of a substance. An estimated 70.6 percent of people who inject drugs have HCV.

"There is a significant need to increase the capacity and consolidation for screening and treating people with HCV in our isolated region," said Ms. Anderson.

The federal government has committed to eradicating hepatitis C by 2030. More than 110,000 people in Ontario alone live with a chronic hepatitis C infection, part of an estimated 250,000 nationwide. An estimated 44 percent of those

living with a chronic hepatitis C infection are unaware of their status. The Sudbury/Manitoulin Micro-Elimination Project is the first program in Ontario to offer financial incentives for undergoing treatment, according to a Gilead Sciences release. Although many cases are covered under government funding programs such as the Ontario Drug Benefit, the cost of the treatment purchased outright in other jurisdictions can be upwards of \$100,000.

There will be four periods throughout the treatschedule clients will be eligible to receive a financial incentive of \$25. The first stage is when results come in for a client's pre-treatment lab work. Stage two is when results are received for an ultrasound and the third stage is when a client meets with a physician for an intake assessment appointment to determine their existing health status. The final \$25 stage comes at what's known as 'SVR12' or sustained virologic response for 12 weeks, which means the

virus cannot be detected in the bloodstream for three months after finishing treatment.

The program is running in partnership with organizations including Northwood Recovery, a clinic that provides opioid agonist therapy. Every month, Ms. Anderson goes on a multi-day 'Island tour' with a social worker to communities around Manitoulin Island, meeting potential new clients and following up on the progress of existing ones.

Potential clients usually hear about the program through word-of-mouth when they visit affiliated clinics for related conditions. RAN has some posters on display in these types of settings to further inform the public of its availability.

According to Ms. Anderson, the project has been having a considerable impact on the lives of vulnerable individuals who have made use of the service.

"A gentleman a couple of weeks ago said with the money, he could finally buy a new pair of shoes. Other people said, 'I can treat myself to a lunch or a hot dinner, and I don't have to go to a food bank'," said Ms. Anderson. "It's really heartwarming."

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
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### Aundeck Omni Kaning beekeeping course calls for being prepared for sweet harvest

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—Beekeeper Wavne LeBlanc has been hauling in a sweet harvest as an accomplished apiarist for more than 15 years and recently he shared the knowledge he has garnered through experience on what it takes to become a beekeeper, including apiary (bee yard) setup and live extraction. A real sweetener for the students was that they could each bring home their very own copy of the Ontario Beekeeping Manual. Bee suits were supplied—but not to take home.

Mr. LeBlanc currently lives in Lively, but is a Wiikwemkoong band member who plans to return someday and currently has a couple of bee yards on the Island. "I had a lot of great assistance with the course

one young attendee. "I learned a lot." But when it came to whether he was planning to start keeping bees, the seven-year-old was reluctant to commit.

"We covered quite a bit, but it is hard to do it all in a day," said Mr. LeBlanc. He has already been asked whether he would consider holding another course in September: "I will be doing another one soon in Serpent River."

One of the more important pieces of information imparted by Mr. LeBlanc to his students was the importance of not keeping your bee suit equipment inside your home or anywhere where it would be in close regular contact with people.

The venom from bee stings is toxic," he said. 'When it dries out and the dust becomes airborne it can cause a very dangerous allergic reaction.'

Following some simple precautions, however, beekeeping can be quite fun and rewarding. But like any agricultural pursuit, things have to happen on the bee's schedule, not necessarily

Mr. LeBlanc asked The Expositor to provide a follow up on the government's "bear fund" for his students. "I had mentioned that OMFRA (Ontario Ministry of Food and Rural Affairs) will compensate beekeepers for wildlife damage," he said, "but I wasn't able to get into my laptop to provide the information. This is the process: first take pictures, second, contact the provincial bee inspector for your area, third apply for compensation inside of 72 hours and four, get a premises identification number."

Mr. LeBlanc said the process seems deliberately set up to make it almost impossible to collect.

A premises identification number is a unique identifying number assigned to a parcel of land that is associated with agri-food activities. When you register your bee yard (a free but mandatory process) In Ontario, premises are identified and registered in the Provincial Premises Reg-

"More information is available on the Ontario Wildlife Damage Compensation Program from omafra.gov.on.ca," he said.

Mr. LeBlanc said he was also looking for a small bee jacket that was misplaced after the course. "It has the SDBA logo on the left front," he said. "My thanks to the attendees, it was very enjoyable in spite some of the organizational problems. Remember PPPPP (military slang for "preparation planning prevents p\*\*s poor performance)."

just say the word and we're there."

Mr. Robbie felt an overwhelming sense of relief upon learning about his wife's safe recovery: "It was amazing. Two days of stress, getting to the end of the second day...it seems liked the 11th hour. Then they said they found her."

Ms. Robbie was found in the area two days later, on Wednesday, June 18. She is currently staying in a care home in Sault Saint Marie, close to her two daughters.

For Constable Ford, circumstances like these offer an opportunity for the greater Manitoulin community to better inform themselves about services for people affected by dementia or who may wander.

Services like Project Lifesaver and Medic Alert offer quick response rates by informing law enforcement with up-to-date information about the missing person and a tracking service that is both reliable and efficient.

For one, services like these can cut down on search time and resources considerably. For Project Lifesaver, Constable Ford says the average time to find someone lowers to half an hour. "It's extremely quick," notes Constable Ford.

The OPP is hoping to expand Project Lifesaver's reach across Manitoulin.

"The big thing that comes to mind for people with dementia, it's like looking after a toddler at a swimming pool," says Mr. Robbie. "You have to never let up watching them because things can happen in an instant, and a person with dementia will get lost."

Ms. Peltier brought her experience in Pochinko Clown (named for Canadian clown trainer Richard Pochinko) and her studies under the inimitable John Turner of the Manitoulin Conservatory for Creation and Performance (MCCP) (aka the Clown Farm).

Spoilers—just a bit—the storyline revolves around a lost character who is drifting aimlessly and the discoveries about his perceptions of reality that come about through interaction with Ms. Peltier's character as she "tells her truth."

While a deep exploration of some difficult issues, as with most Indigenous storytelling there is a leavening of humour that plays a role in the storytelling.

As a tri-partnership collaboration between the playwright, Debajehmujig Storytellers and AMS, the Debajehmujig mainstage production seeks to build bridges and explore the value in opening up lines of communication.

AMS itself has an interesting history that stretches back to the scary days before Canada boasted a national health care system. The not-for-profit foundation was founded by Dr. Jason Hannah in 1937 as Canada's first physiciansponsored, not-for-profit

prepaid health care organization. An Ontario-based corporation, AMS served hundreds of thousands of people who would not otherwise have qualified for membership in a prepaid health insurance plan. The health services included those of a private physician chosen by the patient, diagnostic services, hospital care including surgery, as well as maternal and childcare and home visiting.

AMS's role as a health care provider concluded on October 1, 1969 after the province of Ontario joined the national Medicare program.

In the end, 'Crossing the White Line' is a play about hope—a new story about redemption, recovery and love—that is shaping up to be a great summer diversion.

'Crossing the White Line' will be previewing at Debajehmujig Creation Centre at 43 Queen St, Manitowaning and opening on Thursday, July 18 at 7 pm. service life and the swing bridge has been identified as the oldest structure on a highway in the province.

According to Carole Paiement, communications services coordinator for the MTO's North East Region the study being conducted by Stantec included "the development of problem and opportunity statements, identifying and assessing alternatives to the undertaking (how well do the alternatives address the problem and opportunity statements) and publishing the study design report."

"The transportation needs assessment was presented at the first public information centre held on August 22, 2018," she said, adding that further information on that assessment could be found in the Study Design Report that was published in November and can be found on the project website.

Ms. Paiement noted that the second public information centre is scheduled for July 17, where "preferred alternatives to the undertaking will be presented, as well as Ontario Heritage Conservation options, the preliminary evaluation criteria and the process that will be used to identify a preferred plan."

The public information centre, number two, on the swing bridge will take place at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre at 66 Meredith Street East in Little Current from 4 to 7 pm. The public information centre will follow a drop-in format and members of the project team will be available to respond to questions from the public.

The public is also encouraged to participate in the study and provide written comments. Information as the project progresses will be made available at the project website at swingbridgestudy.ca and comments can be made there as well.

Ms. Paiement added that engineering, natural environment and socio-economic factors will be taken into consideration when determining alternative methods to the undertaking (what, if anything will be done with the bridge) and that the ministry continues to review and take into consideration all comments received.

"The objectives of public information centre number two is to present and seek input on the results of the assessment of alternatives to the undertaking, the preliminary design alternatives and on the Ontario Heritage Conservation options," she continued. "Public information centre number two is also an opportunity for the public to review the preliminary evaluation criteria and evaluation process that will be used to identify a preferred plan."

That preferred plan, whatever form it will take, is expected to be finalized in late

Changes may be made as the ministry continues to review and take into consideration comments received throughout the study and public information centre number three will be scheduled for sometime in the summer of 2020 and a transportation environmental study report (TESR) will be made available for a 30-day public review at the end of the study.

as Voyageur) canoes were available for teams to rent, in addition to the paddlers who attempted the journey in standard tandem canoes, kayaks and outrigger canoes (OCs).

"There hasn't been that many canoes together paddling that distance since 1967, the centennial year,' said Mr. Hagman, referenc-Centennial the Voyageur Canoe Pageant that saw 12 North canoes travel from central Alberta to Expo 67 in Montreal. "It's very unique in that way and we hope to increase the number of big canoes next year so more people can participate."

Safety was a considera-



Team Manitoulin took first place in the big canoe category with a time of four hours and 46 minutes. The OC-2 team of Peter Buday and Abbie Robertson was first overall; four hours and 16 minutes.

also hoped for more sponsorship in future years.

'We basically organized this on a bare-bones budget this year with sponsorship from our company, Killarney Mountain Lodge and Destination Northern Ontario. We want to make it a race that's going to grow and become a really professional, top-of-the-line race that will draw a lot of interest," said Mr. Hagman. "If we got that additional support, we'd be able to make it a very high-end race that people would want to participate in."

One new area Mr. Hag-

man hopes to expand to for next year is an increased involvement with OC paddlers, whose boats are designed for both speed and stability.

"That community seems to have a real strong interest in wanting this race to continue and to have more OC boats for next year," Mr. Hagman said.

As for the people above and beyond the 150-participant cap for this year's event, they will undoubtedly be waiting eagerly to snap up a coveted spot in next year's race.



The morning after the race, all paddlers were welcome to get shuttled back to Manitoulin Island aboard North Channel Cruise Lines. The tandem canoe team of Emilio Nunez and Paul Huggins went home with the title of first place in their division with a time of six hours and 12 minutes, and Jim Olding took home first in the solo kayak category with a time of seven hours and 15 minutes.

tion for the journey. Nine volunteer support boats traversed the journey (an average of a boat for every two paddle teams) and there were four checkpoints along the route. Three boats from the Ontario Provincial Police and UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service were also in the water.

The paddlers were in for a daunting challenge. Fierce north winds battered the crafts relentlessly throughout the journey and caused swells of a few feet in height. Mr. Hagman said these were unpredicted based on weather reports that they had been consulting regularly. The organizing team had decided that 25 kilometre-per-hour winds would be the maximum safe limit.

"Luckily, on our part, we had all the support and volunteer boats available to be close to all the paddlers so, if anybody did have challenges, we were able to either pull them out or keep a close eye on them," said Mr. Hagman.

However, not all crafts are created equal and some aspiring paddlers were forced to retire from the competition early on.

"The tandem canoes really had a hard time in those conditions. Three canoes were pulled out from the race before Strawberry Lighthouse (the first checkpoint, just east of Little Current in the open water)," said Mr. Hagman, noting that the North canoes are built for those conditions and all teams made it to the finish line as well as the kayaks and the OC. "They had no issues making it to the finish other than the head-





"Even with all the wind and the grueling paddling they had to get through to reach Killarney, everybody had a big smile on their face," he said. "A lot of people said they would do it again. I was surprised by that because they day was very challenging."

Mr. Hagman said the next steps will be to form an organizing committee to review the successes and challenges of this year's inaugural event. He

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

# APS students complete fibre arts project

MANITOWANING—This year Heather Jefkins' Grade 3/4 class at Assiginack Public School has been working on lots of traditional fibre arts projects.

"We have learned about quilting, weaving, spinning and cross-stitching," Ms. Jefkins says. "We have had several guests in our room this year who helped us learn about different traditional craft and art forms. We have had a chance to use both modern and traditional equipment and to see how much work goes into traditional crafts."

In May, Bob Case (local farmer and APS bus driver) heard about the class project and offered to give the students a freshly shorn sheep fleece to help them learn more about how yarn is created. Once the ewe was shorn, Mr. Case brought the class the fleece and they got ready to learn more about preparing it.

"Fleece Cleaning Day' was June 10.

"First we had to pick the fleece, which means removing all the yucky bits (dried manure and bits of hay and seeds), and then we had to wash it," Ms. Jefkins explains. "It had to be washed and rinsed three times! We learned about how natural sheep fleece contains lanolin and it needs to be removed before the dye will take to the fibre. Once it was clean then we were able to dye our fleece."

Cheri, of ACME Fibres from Fort Erie, donated all the specialized dyeing equipment and dyes for our project.

"She said she 'had a soft spot for rural schools' because she went to one herself, and was happy to help support our project," Ms. Jefkins says. "We also used materials that were easily located: buckets, a granite turkey roaster and large Mason jars!"

Dyeing Day was June 11. The class first had to mix up the dyes, which required a lot of hot water, then they put the fleece in two big pans and covered it with the dyes. After the fleece was soaked in dye it had to simmer (but not boil) for 3.5 hours. It had to cool down overnight. Vinegar was used to help set the dye, so the Grade 3/4 room had the aroma of pickles.

On Wednesday, June 12

all the fleece had to be rinsed and washed. Once the water ran clear, the class knew the excess dye was rinsed out of it. After that, the students pressed all the water out of it and put it out to dry.

On Monday, June 17 students began carding the wool using special Ashford carders made in New Zealand. Once the wool was carded, students learned how to use a drop spindle to spin the wool into yarn.

"The worst part was taking the poop out of the wool," Darius says of the experience.

Lily adds, "The best part was dying the fleece."

"I would like to do it again because it's lots of fun," Maddy notes.

"It was messy, but fun!" Keenan exclaims.

"As a someone who has always been involved with traditional crafts and knits and weaves myself, I really wanted to have my students learn about these traditional skills," Ms. Jefkins adds. "I knew that a project such as this had lots of ties to the Ontario Social Studies Curriculum, such as looking at the challenges facing settler families had in producing clothing and bedding (Grade 3) and looking at daily life in early societies (Grade 4), and how the production of fibre and fabric was labour intensive before industrialization and mass production became common place in the 20th Century.

"I am a knitter and a weaver, and I sometimes bring in items I have made to show my students when I am discussing different topics such as patterning in math, or the use of colour in design," the teacher continues. "I thought my students would really enjoy learning about quilting design from Jackie White, so we worked together to create a set of lessons for my class, tied to the early settlement of Ontario. The idea for the 'big' project really started when some of my students asked questions about what I was going to be making next, and I started talking about my loom. I decided it would be interesting to teach them how to weave, so I brought in my small rigid heddle loom for them to try. We ended up making a scarf for APS Principal Heather Pennie. From there, the project just grew from student-led inquiry questions and research. I am currently part of the Canadian Museum of History's National Teacher Advisory Group (CMH TAG), and wanted to have my students use the current online resources from the CMH in order to be able to provide more input

at the next TAG meeting.

The CMH is looking for educator input as it redevelops these educational resources for a national audience, and I felt that having my students use the current resource would provide me with lots of ideas for suggestions for the new resource. As my students looked at different artifacts through the CMH website, they asked more questions, and we were led to explore different traditional fibre arts, and how they are still relevant which, in turn, led to the 'From Sheep to Yarn' culminating project we are completing this June.'

M'CHIGEENG—A more perfect morning could not have been chosen for the outdoor graduation ceremony at Kenjgewin Teg recently, a day of celebration for the 55 newest graduates from the school's numerous secondary and postsecondary educational programs.

Craig Fox led an opening drum song as the group entered the ceremony area. Kenjgewin Teg director of post-secondary education and training Beverley Roy served as emcee and began by welcoming elders, family, guests and

She then invited Anishinaabemowin specialist Rhonda Hopkins to lead the attendees in the preamble to the Anishinabek Nation's constitution. Student support counsellor Wayne Trudeau smudged the ceremony area at the same time.

Kenjgewin Teg executive director Stephanie Roy spoke next to offer a congratulatory message to the graduating class, and acknowledged the instructors, faculty and staff who helped the students get to their final goal.

'Graduates, you gave up your valuable time and ensured you were here getting the training so you can get that piece of paper, that credential that says you did it! You earned it, and you are good enough. I hope you always carry that feeling with you," she said.

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

# Manitoulin lighthouses: Sentinels of

he historic lighthouses of Manitoulin Island are evocative outposts of the mysterious. Built to pierce a lifesaving light into fog-shrouded or blizzard-blanketed expanses of Lake Huron and Georgian Bay, their classical, white-painted forms are the ghost-like keepers of long-whispered stories, now become legends.

Between 1866 and 1918, nine lighthouses were built on

Manitoulin Island and all have been designated of significant heritage value. Three of these were constructed in the 'Georgian Bay style,' with a home on the second floor and the lantern light on the top floor, reached from inside by a steep ladder up the light tower. Mississagi Strait (1873) in Meldrum Bay, Janet Head (1879) in Gore Bay and Strawberry Island (1881) near Little Current are outstanding, original examples of this style.

Within their clapboard walls, families of the keepers lived, children were born and gardens and livestock kept. At the beginning, barrels of whale oil had to be hoisted up the narrow steps to keep the light lit, later powered by kerosene, diesel generator and batteries and finally electricity and solar LED panels. In remote, isolated locations at the mercy of all the elements, the lighthouse lights and foghorn were true beacons and lifelines for the weary, storm-tossed, sometimes lost and in great peril, sailors of the Great Lakes.

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

At Janet Head Lighthouse, at the northeastern entrance to Gore Bay's namesake wedge-shaped port, the square white wooden building with red trim and 40-foot light tower gleams brightly in the summer sun. On the steps is Miriam Wailes, daughter of the last live-in keeper of the lighthouse, Stephen Fletcher.

Ms. Wailes knows her Janet Head Lighthouse lore and was fortunate to spend her summers here as a young adult. In the 1960s, all lighthouses were automated, obliterating the need for a keeper entirely; when her dad applied for and got the job in 1967 to 'keep' the lighthouse, it no longer required keeping and was unpaid. The light still turns in a unique sequence of flashes that identifies its location for navigation but, with automation, there was little for a keeper to do but report on problems, if the light went out and, just by being there, minimize vandalism. Miriam's dad ran a grocery store in town, Steve's Grocery, while mom Muriel and the family out at the lighthouse for the summer played games, swam and sunbathed at the bay's edge and roasted wieners and marshmallows at the fire pit in the evenings. "Our imaginations ran wild out here." says the family's keeper of memories.

out here," says the family's keeper of memories.

"When we first saw the lighthouse, it had been unused for several years and badly vandalized," recalls Ms. Wailes. "There was no insulation or electricity, we used coal oil lamps. After a few years Hydro allowed for one line so we could have light in the kitchen." Some of the plum and apple trees still stand in the yard and the outhouse, built by her father, still wears his 'Bomb Shelter'

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The Janet Head Lighthouse was built at Gore Bay's entrance in 1879 in the 'Georgian Bay' style; it accommodated a lighthouse keeper and family in living quarters attached to the light tower.

Lighthouse keepers kept diaries, explains Ms. Wailes, in which they recorded first and last lamp lightings for the year, ships' passings and other events, and she has kept her mother's 'guest book' that dates back to their first year there. In it are notes on weather, first and last day in the lighthouse, first swim (often Muriel was in before the ice

had melted in the bay), who won at Monopoly and other markers of a summer well spent.

Some stories, undoubtedly passed on from keeper to keeper over almost a hundred years, still haunt the woman who has known Janet Head since she was a girl.

Perhaps none is more vivid than the story about the first lighthouse keeper, Robert Boyter, a Scotsman who had come to Canada in 1868 only to suffer momentous personal tragedies. His diary contains heart-wrenching entries for the winter of 1885: "I am sorry to say my remarks this time are of a very melancholy nature," he writes, describing how his wife and eldest son had left on the 11th of April to go across the lake ice to the son's farm on the North Shore with a yoke of good oxen. "But," he continues, "owing to the depth of snow and water on the ice," and the oxen tired, the party camped out overnight on an island before arriving in Spanish Mills at noon the next day. Chilled to the bone, his wife, Isabella, died on April 19 and although his son survived the ordeal, "if he gets over it he will be crippled for life," Mr. Boyter concludes grimly.

The first rescue team of two men, 'Mr. Currey and Doctor Johnson,' left Gore Bay with horse and sleigh and reached the son with medical help. On the return trip, engulfed in a fierce blizzard, they became disoriented and hopelessly lost; they decided to give the horse free rein and it found its way back to Gore Bay with the two men safely in tow.

But that was not the end of the tragic tale. Robert Boyter, too, was making for the North Shore over the ice from Gore Bay to retrieve the body of his wife. George Thorne and his team of horses, Mr. Boyter, two young women and one young man were flying over the icebound lake, "when," the lightkeeper writes, "there came one of the worst snow storms I ever witnessed; so blinding was it we could not tell in what direction we were going and so wandered about the ice until Monday morning."

When it was over, one young girl had frozen to death, another was "in doubtful state," the young man's legs had

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



to be amputated as had been both legs of Robert Boyter's son, David. One horse died just as it reached the town. Fate was kinder to Thorne and Boyter, who were taken to the Ocean House Hotel. Almost as an afterthought, the diarist adds, "I had my hands and feet frozen ... the doctor says I will be alright in a short time."


Before signing his name to the entry, he pens the most understated of understatements: "I might add that this has been the severest winter I have ever witnessed.'

The last 'real' keeper at Janet Head, George Thorburn, would bicycle in from town to tend to the light and record his share of local stories. But the most mysterious writing left behind by Mr. Thorburn was the letter found tucked into the lathe and plaster of the kitchen wall behind the stove by her father, Stephen Fletcher. The note, now in the Gore Bay Museum, was perhaps too personal for the diary, a reflection on failing health and the prospect of losing his job to automation.

And so the legends of the lightkeepers of Janet Head are handed down, misfortune and happy memories in equal measure.

After remaining closed for a number of years, the Janet Head Lighthouse is enjoying a renaissance of fresh attention. Its function remains undiminished and its mystery

Eating food, fresh from the garden is such a treat, like lettuce, juicy, sweet, strawberries, garlic scapes and herbs. When the strawberries which are in season, like now, I use them in every recipe I can find!

#### Chicken and Strawberry Salad with **Chocolate Vinaigrette**

The chocolate seems a bit weird but it does work. The original recipe called for melted dark chocolate which made it too complicated so I switched to cocoa powder. Start with 1 Tbsp cocoa and then add more to taste. No cocoa nibs—use sunflower seeds or your favourite nut. If the dressing is too thick add a bit more oil or water. This dressing has lots of flavour so a little goes a long way!

- 1 lb boneless chicken breast
- 6 cups of fresh garden lettuce
- 2-3 cups strawberries, sliced 1 English cucumber, sliced
- 1/2 cup crumbled feta cheese
- 1/4 cup cocoa nibs
- 2 Tbsp cocoa powder more if needed
- 1/4 cup sunflower seed or olive oil
- 2 Tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 3 tsp honey or maple syrup
- 1 tsp Dijon or grainy mustard
- Dash of hot sauce (optional)

In oven or a skillet cook the chicken breast for 20 minutes, or until no longer pink inside with internal temperature of 165°F. Let cool and slice.

In a large bowl toss together lettuce, strawberries, cucumber, feta, cocoa nibs and chicken.

In a separate bowl whisk together the cocoa powder, oil, vinegar, honey, mustard and hot sauce. Adjust the flavours to taste—more cocoa, honey, mustard or vinegar.

Divide the salad among four plates or bowls and drizzle with chocolate vinaigrette.

#### Strawberry Rhubarb Oat Crumble

The strawberries sweeten the mixture enough to keep the sugar down. I used maple syrup instead of the brown

- 1 lb rhubarb, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 2 cups chopped strawberries
- 3 Tbsp brown sugar or maple syrup 2 tsp fresh ginger, grated
- 1 star anise, coarsely chopped
- 3 Tbsp spelt flour

#### TOPPING

- 1 cup rolled oats (not quick cooking)
- 1/4 cup almond flour
- 3 Tbsp butter
- 2 Tbsp brown sugar or maple syrup


#### Preheat oven to 375°F

Combine the rhubarb, strawberries, brown sugar, ginger, star anise and flour, then spoon mixture into a 4-cup baking dish.

For topping, combine oats, almond flour, butter, sugar in a bowl and rub together with your fingertips until mixture has the texture of coarse crumbs. Scatter over the rhubarb mixture.

Bake until rhubarb is bubbling and topping is crunchy, 45 to 50 minutes.

Serve with yogurt or whipping cream.
