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Extreme fire risk across Manitoulin

Fire bans in place across the Island

MANITOULIN—The Sudbury-Manitoulin District is currently at high to extreme risk for forest fires, according to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), with a restricted fire zone placed on the Northeast region over the weekend, with the exception of Manitoulin Island. However, all Island municipalities have total fire bans in place.

The risk will fluctuate depending on weather station data, explained MNRF's Isabelle Chenard, fire information officer. "Risk will vary with wind speed and direction, relative humidity and cloud cover. The (forest fire information) map updates in real time."

MNRF fire information officer Shayne McCool explained that the restricted fire zone was put in place due to much of the Northeast being hit by a lightning storm last week, which caused a number of forest fires to start. Because Manitoulin Island did not receive the same storms or fires, the region, as of press time, does not include Manitoulin Island.

"As we move forward, we will continue to reassess," Mr. McCool said.

The fire information officer did note that of the 78 fires currently burning in the Northeast, the

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

Justice delayed costs each of us dearly in more ways than one

Two 2017 reports on the Canadian system of legal aid, one from the Senate and the other from the House of Commons, have once again confirmed what members of the legal community have been long reporting—Legal Aid is direly underfunded all across this country.

That funding shortfall, and it is dramatic, threatens not only the right of an accused to a speedy trial, but the very legitimacy of our legal system to purport to be a system of justice in any sense of the

word. There are those who would paint the adequate funding of defence as an affront to victims and nothing more than the just desserts of the criminal offender, but there is more than a shade of fascism implied in that approach to the rule of law. Our system is based on the fundamental concept of presumed innocence, and with the advent of modern DNA evidence there have been innumerable instances of the innocent being found to have been convicted of heinous crimes, spending decades of their lives incarcerated for crimes they did not commit, while the truly guilty have walked free.

Far too often it is only the wealthy few who can afford to hire capable defence lawyers at a cost that runs into the hundreds of dollars and hour, making a mockery of our legal system's claim to justice.

As more and more defendants are forced to represent themselves, greater and greater delays are forced upon an already overloaded system with the result that many who are guilty walking free due to the unconscionable delays in their trials engendered by the need for the presiding justices to explain the intricacies of an increasingly complex system to the defendant.

The delays caused by self representing defendants are also costing each and every taxpayer greater and greater sums as more court time, more lawyers, courts and jails are needed to deal with the delays and complications caused by the issue.

Moreover, it is a matter of fundamental honour to our country as a modern nation that our legal system be pulled back from this travesty of injustice and adequate resources be allocated to provide both timely, and ultimately cost effective, justice for all.

That this situation exists is no secret or surprise for the Justice Minister or the rest of cabinet. That it is a politically tricky issue cannot be denied-there is no shortage of the aforementioned "hang 'em all and let God sort it out" mentality among a large portion of the electorate. But it is long past time that we truly begin to "do politics differently" and actually tackle the issues at hand without the realpolitik lens that has too often coloured our political leaders' lens.

Let us make the 21st Century truly a time of justice for all, not just the rich and connected.

A longtime resident waxes on the current Tehkummah council

An open letter to the residents, taxpayers and voters in the Township of Tehkummah

An open letter to the residents, taxpayers and voters in the Township of Tehkummah: Since 1973, I have been a resident, artist and long-standing business

owner in the hamlet of South Baymouth in the municipality of the Township of Tehkummah.

In September 2016, we were thrilled that council had chosen to hire Karen Gerrard as clerk-treasurer, as she brought with her many years of experience working in municipal administration as well as being a former municipal councillor.

The first council meeting of October 2016 saw a definite change in the manner in which municipal business was going to be conducted, wherein, the door to transparency and accountability was flung wide open, and this was a welcomed change as now there would be light shone into the dark world of municipal government.

Since the suspension of Clerk-Treasurer Karen Gerrard, the blatant disregard for processes that provide transparency and accountability on municipal matters has taken a step back into the dark ages. We, the people, are being kept in the dark.

One of the practices that Ms. Gerrard put in place, until a website could be implemented, was a municipal group email list that I and others subscribed to, in order to get notices of meetings, agenda, agenda reports, meeting minutes and other important notices. This was our link to the municipal business. Since the suspension of Ms. Gerrard, this group email list has not been used and we are kept in the dark. When the office staff are questioned about why we are not getting the meeting notices, the answers range from "the list is lost" to "the machine is not working." This begs the question: where is the form that I completed and submitted to the office to be put on this group email list? Surely there is a binder somewhere that has all of those completed forms that can then be used to create the group email list in the outlook address book. This is not new technology; this shows that the office staff either do not have the skills or are not interested in customer service or were told not to use this communication tool-which is it?

If it wasn't for the very recent article in The Manitoulin Expositor, we, the residents and taxpayers, would not have known that the council for the Township of Tehkummah had dismissed Clerk-Treasurer Karen Gerrard at their meeting of June 5, 2018.

The news article spells out the sequence of events leading to this decision, but one has to question why. Why was this decision made in a closed meeting and then not made public? According to those in attendance at that meeting, they were ushered out of the building and then were not called back when the closed meeting concluded and the open meeting resumed. (This is a violation of the Municipal Act and something that this council had recently been warned about by the Ombudsman, yet, they still continued to not follow the rules.) There is no way that the public was going to know that the council had dismissed the clerk-treasurer. Why did we have to be told, by those attending the subsequent council meeting when they "connected the dots," that consultants were being hired to do the work of the clerk-treasurer? Why did the respondents (a majority of council members) to the workplace complaint not want to address the workplace issues that were identified in the report from the investigator and ensure a safe and healthy workplace for all employees? Why were the respondents to the workplace complaint allowed to deliberately spread malicious rumours and make comments in an open public forum about past and present performance of duties by Ms. Gerrard and commit these actions with an intent to harm and injure her? What is the real reason for termination?

called meetings with the sole purpose of terminating the clerk-treasurer without the benefit of ever having a performance review and without her being present.

What a cowardly way of doing things!

Using her skills, Ms. Gerrard had saved the taxpayers significant costs and here are a few examples: Ms. Gerrard was able to update the Asset Management Plan on her own, rather than using an outside firm – savings of over \$10,000; shopping for municipal insurance saved about another \$10,000; fixing errors in taxation resulted in increased tax revenue of more than \$40,000; tax arrears decreased and almost all of the delinquent accounts were paid up; and prior to 2016, the Township had the budget prepared by an outside accounting firm at a significant cost. In October 2016, with less than three weeks on the job, Ms. Gerrard was able to prepare the budget as part of her duties as clerk-treasurer. Ms. Gerrard even held a town hall meeting to discuss capital budget needs with input from the residents.

Now that council has dismissed Ms. Gerrard, the council, upon hearing from the deputy clerk-treasurer that she cannot prepare the budget, have decided that it would be better to have a consultant prepare the budget. Why are they contracting out clerk-treasurer duties? Can't the deputy clerk-treasurer with 14 years experience do it? If not, then what has she been doing all of these years while at the office?

If there was any contracting to be done, it would be for an administrative assistant position that can be receptionist and cashier. It is only business sense to have subordinates move up to the next position to cover the duration of leave. Especially when the deputy clerk-treasurer has been working for the municipality for such a long time.

The taxpayers are paying for the mistakes made by the majority of council.

Based upon information that is at hand, the costs for not having Ms. Gerrard as clerk-treasurer far exceeds her annual salary.

\$24,000 - Council passed a motion to hire Doug Nadorozny at a cost of \$4,000 per week for a minimum of six weeks, to draft policies and do the budget and address the recommendations from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs report.

When addressing the council and the people in attendance while presenting their report into their investigation into financial and administrative practices, the Municipal Advisors had stated that the now former clerk-treasurer (Karen Gerrard) had been addressing the deficiencies. Ms. Gerrard had been telling council what needed to get done; had presented policies for adoption which council did not adopt; had implemented procedures that minimized risk and liability for the municipality, however, Doug can do this at the low, low price of \$4,000 a week for six weeks. A 24K bargain! Now that the election season is upon us and budget work and tax billing is to be done, the two remaining office workers don't have time to research and draft policies. Council should give up preparing any new policies, since the incoming council will probably have a different vision, and especially if there is a lame duck council. \$2,700 - Then there was a motion passed to hire another consulting firm to prepare the budget. This appears that Doug Nadorozny is farming out the work that he was contracted to do. However, one cannot be certain as to what Doug is really supposed to do, since there is no written proposal submitted by him; no terms of engagement; no scope of work. Doug was hired by council based solely upon the recommendation of Acting Clerk-Treasurer Barb Deforge who stated that she knew Doug and he came highly recommended. Has anyone even checked into the credentials espoused about Mr. Nadorozny? \$100,000 - Approximately for the costs of dealing with a workplace harassment complaint, filed by the now former Clerk-Treasurer Karen Gerrard, including: paid suspension; investigation by DRC Performance; legal costs for defending five individuals and the corporation for an Ontario Labour Relations Board application for unlawful acts of reprisal, severance package, if any, that may be presented to Ms. Gerrard. What is the price to be paid to put a gag order on Ms. Gerrard and

Gerry Timmermans July 27, 1923 – June 21, 2018 *His mark on Little Current will stand as a lasting legacy*

Gerry Timmermans may have been born and raised in Blind River, but through a long life well lived his accomplishments have left behind an indelible tribute to his foresight and commitment to the Island community.

At the tender age of 17, Mr. Timmermans heard the clarion call to serve his country during World War II and, with the permission of his parents (his father had served in the First World War) in 1940 he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force. Mr. Timmermans flew countless missions over occupied Europe as a wireless gunner. where he learned about the field of electronics long before most. Mr. Timmermans trained as a front turret gunner and radar operator, "they called us wireless air gunners," he said during a 2016 interview.

"There were six of us boys in the family and five were in the air force," he said, "I didn't want to be put into the army." Mr. Timmermans also had a sister, Ruth

Brookes who has survived him and who is now 97.

Whatever the rank, being part of an RCAF air crew meant going up each night to brave the enemy flak and night fighters that prowled the dark skies over Europe. "Night after night there, we hardly got back half of them," he recalled. Many nights less than half of the massive bombers returned to the Yorkshire airfield where they were based. Mr. Timmermans survived the war, as did his brothers, but one brother did lose his life flying over the jungles of Burma in 1946.

Mr. Timmermans was recognized for his contribution to the war effort with the presentation of a certificate in 2016, signed by the prime minister. That certificate's unanticipated arrival in the mail was a welcome surprise to

attended local dances. It was there that he spotted a beautiful young English nurse who was to have the most lasting impact of his sojourn in England.

Brave enough to clamber into the nose gunner cupola of a bomber, Mr. Timmermans admitted that he was terrified to approach the pretty girl to ask her to dance—but he did. They soon began courting and were wed a year later. Elizabeth, best known as Betty, would remain at his side through thick and thin until her passing in 2003.

They would have three children, Bob, born in Blind River, Catherine, who was born in England while Betty was home for a visit and Craig, who was born in Little Current.

Canada was a rude awakening for Betty. The couple were staying at the Turner House and she would later recall waking up to find the coffee pot frozen on the stove in the morning.

Mr. Timmermans returned to Blind River, but in 1947 he was offered the position of customs officer, serving a number of years in Blind River, and in 1957 he moved to a position in the Port of Little Current. He remained a customs officer, supervisor, until he left that service in 1952.

A serial entrepreneur, Mr. Timmermans started many businesses following his departure from the civil service.

At one time he operated one of the largest bait companies in Canada, employing dozens of one of their largest customers.

But it was after reading a piece in a magazine that Mr. Timmermans was inspired to make a major entrepreneurial jump. "It was in an American magazine, I remember, they were talking about how the next big thing was going to be what they called 'home centres,' a business where you could get everything you needed for a home," he said in his 2016 interview. "When I read that piece I realized that this was going to be the number one business, so I went into that business." Thus Tim's and Co. was born. That business still operates today as the Little Current RONA Home Building Centre.

Among his other enterprises was working closely with the late Barney Turner of Turner's of Little Current to import English textiles. For a time he also operated a furniture store that was located beside the old Tim's and Co. building on Vankoughnet Street. major expansions to the town's sewer and water systems took place. "He used to go down to Ottawa to fight for funding and, more often than not, returned home successful.

"That was always my father's advice," recalled his son Craig Timmermans. "Go down there and lobby. It turned out to be great advice."

Always heavily involved in the community, Mr. Timmermans served on the Manitoulin Centennial Manor board and the hospital board (of which he was particularly proud).

But his public service did lead to one of his life's greatest regrets. Business interests on the west coast drew him away to deal with an emergency situation and led to him being labelled as an absentee mayor as it took far longer to settle matters out west than he had ever imagined.

Still, he had a strong hand in the building of Spider Bay Marina

worm pickers across the province. Betty would oversee much of the day-to-day operations, often working late into the night to unpack the boxes arriving from all points after the rest of the workers were home in bed. Canadian Tire was



"I remember his marketing slogan 'Poor old Tim, he's giving stuff away'," recalled friend Marcel Gauthier. "I thought it was brilliant." Poor old Tim would lament the inevitable path his ridiculously low-priced refrigerators were leading him down. "I know people who still called him 'poor old Tim'," laughed Mr. Gauthier.

Even after stepping away from his businesses, Mr. Timmermans would remain an active player in the stock market. "It keeps me sharp," he would laugh. On another note, his late night poker games with local cronys on the outskirts of town are nothing short of the stuff of local legend.

After he sold Tim's and Co. Mr. Timmermans operated the Shaftsbury Hotel in partnership with Linda Kelly. and much of the present-day infrastructure of Little Current.

After his retirement, Mr. Timmermans travelled the world extensively and after the passing of his wife Betty, he would find love for the second time in the person of Peggy Paisley.

Mr. Timmermans will be recalled for more than his political acumen and business sense as a man with a great sense of humour and ready wit, always on the lookout for his 100-pound sack of 100 dollar bills.

After a fall at home and an emergency trip to Sudbury, Mr. Timmermans settled into the same hospital room in which his wife Betty died.

"He was laughing and joking

'Purple heroin' found in Espanola and area, Pulic Health Sudbury warns

ESPANOLA—Public Health Sudbury and Districts, on behalf of the LaCloche Foothills Community Drug Strategy, are warning the public that the distribution of "purple heroin" has been suspected throughout Espanola and surrounding areas. Purple heroin in other communities has been confirmed to be heroin mixed with fentanyl or carfentanil and can also be sold under the name "purple" or "purp."

Carfentanil is an opioid that is used by veterinarians for very large animals like elephants. Carfentanil is 100 times stronger than fentanyl. An amount the size of a grain of salt, or 20 micrograms could be fatal to a person.

This is a health and safety alert and does not provide an update on the status of any ongoing police investigations.

Overdose symptoms include: blue lips or nails, dizziness and confusion, can't be woken up, choking, gurgling or snoring sounds, slow, weak or no breathing, drowsiness or difficulty staying awake.

If you are using drugs, please do so safely: Have naloxone (NARCAN®) ready and use with other people, but not at the exact same time. Never use drugs alone. Start with smaller amounts than usual.

An overdose occurs quickly. Call 911 if you suspect the


Mischief calls perturb councillor

"That considering that this is Trustee Killens' sixth sanction for violating the Code of Conduct, that, employing progressive discipline, he be sanctioned and barred from attendance at all meetings of the Board effective immediately until November 30, 2018.

"We need to get to the bottom of this," said Mr. Chandler, who noted that he has had his own struggles with the board in dealing with an issue involving a youth, which, while that issue came to a "favourable conclusion," he had found the whole process difficult and frustrating.

"They don't like to answer questions," he said of his interactions with the RDSB.

Mr. Chandler said that Mr. Killens was the only contact that acknowledged receipt of his concerns on that earlier issue when first contacted. "I sent emails to the principal, the superintendent, the education director and the chair," he said. Larry was the only one to reply to say he had received my concerns." Asked whether Mr. Killens was helpful in that

Mr. Chandler said that he believes there needs to be more oversight and control exercised by the Ministry of Education. "I think that's the best tactic," he said.

Since announcing the meeting, Mr. Chandler said that he has heard from a number of parents who have their own issues in dealing with the board.

Mr. Chandler said he views the board's actions in banning Mr. Killens as being an indication that the RDSB board is frustrated with Larry (Killens) himself, but one that he believes is outside of the board's mandate and powers. "I don't believe they are allowed to do that," he said. Mr. Chandler said that, due to his previous tussle with the RDSB, he has become something of an expert in the relevant legislation. "It was quite the learning curve," he said, referring to the labyrinth of bureaucratic language contained in those documents he needed to interpret and navigate in dealing with that earlier issue.

"We need to have our questions answered," he said. "I would like to see as many parents out as possible.

Asked if he was considering running for the RDSB trustee position Chandler himself, Mr. laughed and replied with a definitive "no."

"I think it is a thankless job," he said. "I think of the number of times that Larry has done what he has on behalf of the people who elected him. He works for the people, not for the board. I hope that whoever does run is for the people."

Former Billings Councillor Kim Bilbija said that she was outraged by the RDSB banning of the Man-

what was done to Larry is in any shape or way allowed," she said. "My she said. "My concern is that Larry is our elected representative. By banning him from any further meetings they are cutting off our elected voice.'

Ms. Bilbija said that when she called the RDSB to gain further information she was asked "are you with the press." She noted that a return call that was left as a voicemail message by RDSB chair Dewar informed her that Larry Killens was still the area's elected representative, but that all trustees work on behalf of the entirety RDSB region and that she, or parents, could contact any member of the RDSB with their problems or concerns. Ms. Bilbija said that she wanted a written response to her concern. "I have the recording of the message, but I would like a written response."

"Over the weekend I printed out the entire Code of Conduct for the RDSB from their website," she said. "I went through it line by line." She has since sent her questions and concerns on to Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha and RDSB administration and board. "I sent it out to 25 people. If I have read it right, the board can ban someone from a committee meeting for a specified time, but not board meetings.'

She is referring to section 13.1 "If the Board determines that the trustee has breached the Board's Code of Conduct, the Board may impose one or more of the following sanctions: a) Censure of the trustee. b) Barring one or more committees of the Board, the trustee from attending all or part of a meeting of the Board or a meeting of a committee of the Board. c) Barring the member from sitting for the period of time specified by the Board."

In a statement sent to media on behalf of the board chair, Ms. Dewar notes that "Rainbow District School Board is governed by the Education Act and the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act. As elected officials. we have a legal and moral obligation to ensure that we comply with this legislation.

Act, we have adopted Board Policy No. GOV-05 the Code of Conduct for Board members.

'This governance policy guides the actions of Board members/trustees of Rainbow District School Board as they carry out their duties as described in the Education Act, regulations, and Board policy.

'This policy aligns the conduct of Board members with the guiding principles in the Rainbow District School Board Code of Conduct.

"Board members occupy positions of public trust and responsibility.

"They are expected to maintain the integrity of the Board and their positions as trustees by acting in a professional and impartial manner.

"It is imperative that trustees act, and be seen to act, in the best interests of the young people they serve. GOV-05 is available on the Board website.'

Ms. Bilbija suggested that "this is not the first time the board has gone after Larry" citing previous sanctions and the board's nebulous sanctions against "perceived or anticipated violations" following an Ombudsman Report that had cleared the trustee of any wrongdoing. She noted that she believed that concept was quietly dropped.

Ms. Bilbija also cited the board chair's decision to address the Manitoulin Secondary School graduating class as something she interprets as a slight towards the trustee.

"Larry has been to every graduating class, at every Island school, that I can recall," she said. "I don't ever recall the board chair giving the address before. Why now?'

Mr. Killens has until 4 pm on August 17 to file a written submission, addressed to the chair of the RDSB, in regards to the sanctions imposed.

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

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Little Current company makes new video panels rentals available across the North

by Michael Erskine LITTLE CURRENT—Big screen LED displays have become de rigour at music festivals and other large scale events, but for organizers in Northern Ontario cost has always proven to be an almost insurmountable hurdle. That mountain has now been reduced to something of a molehill by local entrepreneurs Craig and Kelly Timmermans, organizers of Manitoulin Country Fest (MCF), a popular country music festival, and now the latest rock music addition to the Flat Rock Entertainment roster Rockin' the Rock.

"We were renting video panels from companies in Toronto or Montreal and the cost was enormous," said Mr. Timmermans. "Typically we would spend \$18,000 over the course of MCF weekend." In addition to the cost per 2-foot by 2foot panel that ranged in the \$180 a day range, there was the cost of hauling enough panels and their controllers

up (and back) from down south to be added into the mix

With a little help from government funders (that will likely remain nameless until after the current provincial election) the duo were able to purchase enough of the panels and controllers to build a single 24-foot by 18-foot panel or a couple of panels of different size configurations.

"These are the highest definition LED panels on the planet," said Mr. Tim-mermans. "They are the number one panel for outdoor use. It can be a bright summer sun shining directly on them and they are still bright as day. Unlike projection models, which the company has experimented with over the year, the panels are not washed out in the daylight hours. "With the projection screens you couldn't really make them out even when it was pretty well dusk. They only worked in the night." The new LED panels will

provide a welcome revenue stream for the production company as the plan is to rent them out when their own festivals are not utilizing them.

'We are the first video wall company in Northern Ontario," said Mr. Timmermans, "and we plan to make it more affordable." Typically, the panels rent out for upwards of \$100 per day, plus shipping. "We are planning to offer them for \$40 a panel per day, and when it comes to shipping them we have our own trailer that we can bring the equipment to

'Yeah, I got a bit of sun lately," he admitted. "We just spent the last week up on the mountain pouring pads for the new radio tower." That tower will loom 450-feet above the skyline, extending the reach of the couple's radio station by an exponential level.

"There are three pads," explained Mr. Timmermans, "they will each take 12 square metres of concrete. Most towers they just drill holes and put in rock bolts, but this tower is a lot bigger.'

RDSB passes \$203 million 2018-2019 budget

SUDBURY-Rainbow Dis-School Board trict approved a budget of \$203.6 million for the 2018-2019 school year at its regular meeting on July 3.

'On behalf of the Board, I would like to commend staff for re-aligning expenditures to revenues throughout the 2017-2018 school year," said Rainbow District School Board Chair Doreen Dewar. "We were well positioned to approve a balanced budget for 2018-2019 with a modest draw on reserves.'

The budget provides the financial framework for the ongoing implementation of Strategic Directions, with more investments in student success, special education, Indigenous education, experiential learning, 21st Century learning, mental health and well-being.

In addition, the Ministry of Education is providing support to help Grade 7 and 8 students make successful academic transitions and engage in career and pathways planning

Rainbow District School Board is projecting a decline of 171.5 full-time equivalent students this fall, primarily at the secondary level. Enrolment in Rainbow Schools is predicted to be 12.988 stu-

The Board also offers educational programs at Barrydowne College (a reengagement school at Cam-College), the brian Native N'Swakamok Friendship Centre, the Shk-

lescent Mental Health Pro-Frank Flowers gram, School and Cecil Facer Secondary School.

closest to Manitoulin was on a small island located south of Phillip Edward Island, known as Sudbury 54.

Complete fire bans are in place in Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands, Assiginack, Tehkummah, Billings, Central Manitoulin, Burpee and Mills, Gore Bay, Gordon/Barrie Island and Killarney. This means that no fires of any kind are permitted; typically, a complete ban also includes fireworks.

In Whitefish Falls, fires are not allowed between sun-up and sundown.

The unorganized township of Dawson-Robinson will implement a fire ban when or if the MNRF adds Manitoulin to its list.

Local First Nations do not have any official bans in place but are advising their members to use caution due to the extreme fire risk.

immaculate cottage, nestled privately within a cedar wood located on Manitoulin's northern shore. It is a bright sunny day and the world around us is full of life. Ms. Rochat's son, Canadian Air Force Pilot Captain Marcel Rochat, joins us at the kitchen table as we start to discuss her death by exploring a little bit of her life.

Born in Zurich, Switzerland, Ms. Rochat grew up in that mountainous country that, in many ways, acts as a crossroads for Europe. "I was a businesswoman, married, had a kid, divorced, found another man and moved here," she said, neatly summing up her life prior to 1979. The business she built in that earlier life was an agency that provided translation services.

"I have lived half my life here in Canada now," she said. Her new partner worked at INCO, the mining giant around which the Sudbury economy rotated for generations. It wasn't long before Ms. Rochat became restless. She is not one for being idle. "I said to myself, 'I have to have a business here, I can't just sit around'," she explained. After some research she opened a Mr. Donut franchise, then a second. There was plenty keeping her busy then, not to mention being an early example of the sandwich generation. "I had my dad with me," she said. "After eight years we decided to sell and retire early, so that's what we did."

The couple had a summer cottage in McGregor Bay and they moved from their home located on the hills between the Memorial and Sudbury General Hospital and settled into life in the bay. "We had a place in Florida as well, but when my partner got sick, travelling in and out by boat came to be too much," she said. They began to look for something more accessible. "We settled here," she said, referring to the Honora Bay home. "My partner loved Manitoulin Island," said Ms. Rochat. "It is beautiful, the whole Island is so beautiful—and the people."

Like so many before her, Ms. Rochat watched her partner die a slow and painful death. She came to a firm decision about her own life.

"I said to myself, 'I am not going to go like that'."

When five years ago a diagnosis of terminal lymphoma came her way, Ms. Rochat knew what had to be done. "I always said that if I get sick I am jumping on a plane and going there (Switzerland)."

Ms. Rochat still held dual citizenship, having gained her Canadian citizenship but she also retained her connection to Switzerland. Legislation in her native Switzerland permitted medically assisted death at the time; Canada had yet to embrace that option. It was not until 2016 that medically assisted death became an option in this country.

In February 2015, the Supreme Court of Canada ruled in Carter v. Canada that parts of the Criminal Code needed changing to meet the requirements of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, specifically that those parts of the law that prohibited medical assistance in dying were invalid. The Supreme Court gave the government until June 6, 2016 to create a new law. That law has now been in place for two years, but until now no one on Manitoulin Island has exercised that option.

Medically assisted death used to be referred to as medically assisted suicide, but the pejorative and legal connotations of the term "suicide" has led to it falling out of use for the procedure.

When her partner died, Ms. Rochat began making the connections she would need should the occasion arise. "I joined a club (Dignitas, a Swiss non-profit members' society that provides assisted death to members who suffer from terminal illness and or severe physical and/or mental illness)," she said. "If medically assisted death had not become available in Canada I guess I would be on a plane right now."

Instead, Ms. Rochat was able to explore that option in her chosen home and said she was very pleased by what she discovered.

"There is good support and the medical team here has very good people," she noted.

For most of the past five years Ms. Rochat has had a good quality of life, despite of her diagnosis. "I have been very lucky," she said. "I have had relatively good health and without pain." She chose to eschew chemotherapy, particularly since the process would have impacted her remaining quality of life and she felt therapies would only have extended the later stages of cancer, leading to existence simply for existence sake. "Why should I live in terrible pain?" she asked. Ms. Rochat used her remaining time to check off things on her bucket list. "I had a wonderful time," she said. "I went to Alaska, Cuba, I used the last few years I had well." "But recently things began to go badly," she said. Her health deteriorating and pain becoming intense, Ms. Rochat sought prescription relief, but there was a key complication. "I am allergic to morphine," she said. Still, her doctors were able to delve into modern pharmacopeia to find something that worked outside the opioid family. "There is good support and a medical team, there are good people here," she said. "With the pain medication I am good now." She admits that the pills leave her a little fuzzy, "and some times a little bit aggressive," but judging from her conversation with The Expositor, she must have started out one sharp woman, because there was no indication of any cognitive impairment during the interview and she was nothing but the epitome of grace throughout.

As Ms. Rochat began to go through the process of accessing medically assisted death, she was subjected to a battery of thorough interviews to determine if she met the criteria. "You don't want to wait too long, you have to have all of your marbles," she said, pointing to her temple. Should dementia or some other cognitive impairment set in you do not qualify.

"I guess that makes sense," she said. "Sometimes there might be someone pushing the person into applying for medically assisted death so they can get their money."

Those applying for medically assisted death in Canada must also be facing a terminal illness from which there is no reasonable hope of recovery and death would be imminent in any case. "You can't just be in pain or suffering from a mental illness," notes Ms. Rochat.

The entire interview process is taped.

Once you have signed the application for medically assisted death, you have 10 days in which to retract your request, but Ms. Rochat advises extreme caution. "If you revoke your signature, you can't go back." She recalled someone she knew whose pain abated and decided to not go through with the medically assisted death process. But pain the medication could not overcome came back and "he could not renew," she said. "He died in terrible pain."

As there was no local medical professional who has experience with medically assisted death, a doctor from southern Ontario came up to begin the process, and a doctor from Elliot Lake will come to her home when the final day arrives. "The new doctor from down south has done it 40 times now already," she said.

"Dr. Cooper and a nurse practitioner will be here to observe and learn," she said, pronouncing herself pleased that her death will be a teaching moment so Island residents will have access and the comfort of dealing with familiar faces when they seek the release of medically assisted death for themselves.

The process itself is fairly straightforward and has a number of safeguards to ensure that the medically assisted death will move to completion. "They put two lines into each arm," she said. "In case one does not work."

A sedative helps to relieve any anxiety and the patient "within two minutes, you drift off to sleep, very gentle, very beautiful," said Ms. Rochat. "You say 'nighty night' and that's it. The coroner comes and signs and it is done."

Ms. Rochat's son said that he is "pretty much of the same mind" as his mother. "Maybe it is my Swiss upbringing, maybe it is my profession," he said of sharing his parent's practical approach to death. Mr. Rochat is no stranger to death, he lost one of his own children, a baby born with heart issues who was the youngest heart transplant patient at the time. "We were living in Edmonton at the time, so there was great medical support," he said. But it wasn't enough.

As he recalls that terrible time the seasoned air force pilot's face remains stoic. His mother gets up from the table and fetches him a tissue for his eyes.

table and fetches him a tissue for his eyes. "Every province is different," said Ms. Rochat, once again picking up the narrative. "There is a number to call, they take your story, they tape everything. They said 'if you don't hear back from us in a week call back'." She called back.

"Lots of doctors don't want to do this," Ms. Rochat said of medically assisted death. "Nurse practitioners can do it, but they have to refer you."

Cost is no barrier to medically assisted death as "OHIP pays for everything," she said. "I didn't pay a cent."


As to religious concerns, Ms. Rochat acknowledges that may be a barrier for some, including medical professionals, but said religious barriers were not an issue for herself. "I was raised religious," she said. "But I am now what you might call spiritual, agnostic. I have certain beliefs, but I believe everything around us has a spirit. I believe in nature." Ms. Rochat said that she was glad that medically assisted death became available in this country. She said that she hoped her pioneering journey down the path to medically assisted death would help others with their own decision when facing an inevitable and painful death.

...continued from page 1 great deal of smoke coming from the north tip of the island. Upon closer inspection he saw two people waving their arms and towels in the air and jumping up and down, obviously trying desperately to gain the ship's attention.

Captain Grant said the vessel was too large to aid in their physical rescue, but he did call the stranded kayakers' location into the coast guard and blasted the ship's horn to let them know they had been seen

and assure them that help was on the way.

"They were 40 knot winds and three to five foot seas," he told The Expositor, adding that the kayakers, three of them, had made a fire on the beach and when they saw the ship approaching, added boughs to the blaze to smoke signal the passing vessel.

"It happens from time to time," Captain Grant said of seeing boaters, not so often kayakers, in distress in the Great Lakes.

According to the Detroit

On the night of April 2, Ms. Williams-Manitowabi left a residence to walk home. Mr. Jacobs left at the same time and walked in the same direction. When Ms. Williams-Manitowabi stopped at another residence, Mr. Jacko lingered. When she left that residence and approached the entrance of the trail that would take her home to her mother and one-year-old daughter, he attacked.

Her survival instinct kicked in and several times she ran for her life. She headed for the youth centre, where she knew there was a surveillance camera. In spite of her efforts, Mr. Jacko persevered and brutally assaulted her. Evidence showed bruising all over her body. She received stitches in three places on her scalp as well as on her eyebrow and inside her lip. Her back and buttocks were scraped and her knees were raw down to the bone from being dragged. She dug her fingernails into the ground in an attempt to stop the dragging. A finger on her right hand is held together by pins now. Her ankles were swollen from Mr. Jacko's grip as he dragged her into the bush; one ankle was severely sprained. He used a stick to beat her; her face was so swollen she could not open her eyes.

Angel Manitowabi, Ms. Williams-Manitowabi's mother, received a phone call that no mother wants. "It's been a nightmare," she said. "I think it's any parent's worst nightmare to get that phone call and see your

daughter on the (hospital) bed like that. I was with her every day at the hospital. I suffered with her from day one.'

The process post-assault revictimized her daughter, said Ms. Manitowabi, "Throughout explaining, this process the hardest part was the way she was

treated in the hospital. We had to go to Sudbury at 3:30 in the morning for the rape kit." There was no transportation available at that time. "I had to carry her into my car. By the time we got there, the pain medications had worn off and she just wanted to get back." Pain medication couldn't be offered in Sudbury because of the required testing. There is a 72-hour window in which to complete that process, so time was a concern. "There should be kits in our hospital," she said.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Earlier this year The Expositor reported that Noojmowin Teg Health Centre had received funding from the Ministry of the Attorney General's Indigenous Justice Division to develop sexual assault services, including forensic testing, for victims of sexual assault and domestic violence on Manitoulin. A project status update was not available at press time).

Before the drive to Sudbury, Ms. Williams-Manitowabi received stitches

for her head and facial wounds. "No pain medication was given," said Angel Manitowabi. "She suffered with that pain on five different spots."

Mr. Jacko wasn't arrested for several days following the assault. "Our locks had to be changed," said Ms. Manitowabi. "We didn't know this man. We didn't know if he would carry through on his threats. She was terrified he was going to come there."

Williams-Mani-Ms. towabi attended physiotherapy for her ankle but still experiences pain and cannot run. Writing is difficult because of the damaged finger. On the surface, Ms. Williams-Manitowabi looks almost normal.

...continued from page 1 way 16 were blocked and traffic was being detoured into the southbound lanes.

Investigators were still on the scene as of press time Monday and no further details were likely to be released until Tuesday, according to the RCMP Martenville detachment.

Dalmeny is about 25 kilometres northwest of Saskatoon.

The couple were making their trip to British Columbia from their southern Ontario home in order to raise awareness of Canada's milk supply management system which is under threat from US trade negotiators in the ongoing North American Free Trade Agreement talks. Tragically, that was to be a cause to which Ms. Schuurmans would give her life. The couple were in very good spirits right up until the time of the accident, and many local farm families like the Anstices of Tehkummah were following the progress of the couple's journey daily online. "It's just terrible," said Dorothy Anstice, who along with dairy farmer husband Jim and son Alex were among those following the couple's progress. The devastating photographs posted online show debris scattered across the highway and an overturned tractor just visible above the highway ditchline. "Their family must be seeing these same horrible photographs online."

...continued from page 1 chose Manitoulin for this short trip was the amazing reviews we heard about how friendly it is to cyclists, and we found that it's so true. The roads are awesome for cycling. There's wide, paved shoulders in lots of areas. Even the cars that do pass, they give you wide berth and they seem to be quite comfortable and accommodating to cyclists, so I felt really at ease."

Visiting the Island and taking in its scenic, natural treasures has given him a different perspective. "One of the things when you spend time out here you can really appreciate the beauty of the lake and how important it is to the way of life out here," he said. "I've always been a strong defender of the environment but when you spend time out here you really appreciate the water and how important it is to protect it. To be stewards of these lakes, to support conservation and protection of diversity of nature. Biodiversity but also just protecting the water and keeping it clean and keeping the levels at a level that is sustainable for the environment."

Jagmeet Singh is troubled by the new Ford government in Ontario to disregard the importance of environmental stewardship. "What we're seeing right off the bat is some troubling signs about the direction the current government is headed in. They said they cared about every-

day people but everything we're seeing contradicts that. The new proposed tax cuts actually benefit the wealthy; they don't benefit everyday people. They're focused in on proposals that ignore some of the important things that matter to the province (such as) a commitment to moving towards sustainable energy and protecting the environment. They're seeming to disregard the importance of that. It's a troubling trend where the priorities aren't actual priorities that everyday people care about, such as protecting the water and protecting the environment: not just making sure we have a safe place for today but also for future generations. It doesn't seem that those priorities are being respected."

"We're concerned but we've got an incredible team, one of the largest oppositions in the history of the province if not the largest," he continued. "Andrea (Horvath) is my older (previous) boss, I've got an incredible love for her. She's got a great team. Michael Mantha here in Algoma-Manitoulin and Gurratan here, newly elected in Brampton-East. It's going to be a strong opposi-tion to hold the government to account.'


Added MPP Mantha, "One of the things that's especially concerning for me, being a member from Northern Ontario is the combination of the Ministry of Energy with the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines and the Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation. It seems like it's a huge step backwards. Their priorities have been clearly identified and it's not going to be First Nations-based. They've clearly sent out a signal that that's not going to be a priority for this government. They've clearly sent out a signal that the environment is not going to be a priority for this government. There are some serious alarm bells, so going back and working with new colleagues and veteran colleagues in the largest opposition at the provincial level, I'm quite encouraged and I'm eager to go back. Quite frankly, we're back next week for the first few days. We'll be hearing the throne speech. It's

going to be a very interesting new government. Yet working with new voices and new ideas is going to be quite refreshing for all of us."

Gurratan Singh also spoke of NDP support of environmental protection. "As the official opposition we are steadfast in our opposition in our support to protect the environment. That is now our job to fight for the communities across Ontario so if the Conservatives are taking a direction to have a negative impact on the environment now, our job is to hold them accountable and do whatever we can do to fight this. After travelling and seeing firsthand the beauty that is present on Manitoulin Island, it really gives you an appreciation beyond just reading about it. When you

experience it; when you walk into the water; when you walk in the forest; when you see the Cup and Saucer and see this beautiful expanse of forest ahead of you; you really feel that we are stewards of the planet. 



really did. Maybe things would have turned out different if the help was there.'

Her mother reached out to Wiikwemkoong Grandmothers Donna Pangowish and Alison Recollet for assistance. "I didn't know where to go," she explained, "or who to talk to. Before that we tried to go to local counselling and were told there was a nine week waiting period to be seen, nine weeks in that crisis we were in. I couldn't believe it.

They found counselling in Sudbury; however, that meant two hours travel each way. Ms. Manitowabi was missing work to drive her daughter to appointments. "She missed two sessions in Sudbury because I had made other

arrangements for her travel as I had used up all my time. Brooke didn't make those appointments. When she was ready to go back, she had to pay for those missed sessions at \$100 per session."

Ms. Williams-Manitowabi's daughter was just over oneyear-old when the assault happened. "Brooke was such a loving, caring, nurturing mother (before the assault),' said her mother. "What made her move out of my place was her screaming in her sleep, her nightmares. She shared a room with her daughter. She woke the baby up with her screaming, so she didn't want to be there anymore. She was angry with the feelings, the dreams, the nightmares."

Ms. Williams-Manitowabi moved in with her father. It was then that she began drinking and self-medicating. "I watched the system fail my daughter on so many different levels," said Ms. Manitowabi. "It shouldn't have been that way when she needed the support. She didn't ask for these things to happen. She didn't consent to any of it.'

Ms. Williams-Manitowabi had to put high school on hold. By the time she could return she had aged out of the system. Many of her friends had already graduated and



were continuing their post-secondary journey. She had enjoyed her studies and dreamt of becoming a doctor but was unable to follow through.

Family members travelled from Sudbury and Toronto to offer support at every single court date. They were present at sentencing. An uncle sat with Ms. Williams-Manitowabi in a private room where they observed proceedings on closed circuit television. An auntie read her victim impact statement to the court as she was too afraid to be in the same room as the defendant. 'You don't know me," she wrote in her statement, addressing Mr. Jacko. "But you've violated me, intentionally, forcibly, sexually with malicious intent. My life has been on hold for two-and-a-half years. My structure collapsed.'

By the end of the trial she was too tired to speak. "I would leave drained, silent," she wrote. "I would go home, turn off my phone and for days I would not speak. I learned what it meant to be re-victimized. You admitted guilt to the other serious charges but not that one charge you did to me. I know from the plea you had no remorse, no

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





to see the direction the Ford government is taking. We don't share that position but we're in a position now where we can hold them accountable in that fight to protect what we so desperately need to protect."

Many Islanders have been concerned about the use of pesticides in our environment over the past few years and MPP Mantha spoke to this. "I've been proud to take my position in the previous sitting of the house and reading Island petitions in the house and raising some of your concerns. You're right: the hands of the municipalities are tied. We need to be using organizations like AMO and returning some of that power to localized community leaders so they have that power to say yes or no or these are the conditions. A lot of the use of pesticides has now become a standard operating procedure. It's taking away from opportunities of creating an economy or jobs. Let's look at different ways of doing things and let's not just make it an easy decision."

Keeping our water clean and healthy is important not just here on Manitoulin but across the country, and is of special concern in First Nations, feels Jagmeet Singh. "The first basic thing is that everyone in this country should have access with clean drinking water," he said. "That is probably the most direct and stark, massive inequality in our country. Many of us in this country have access to clean drinking water but many don't. That to me is unacceptable. The government talked about addressing it but in the last budget didn't put any money into the

feeling that what you did was wrong. Never once was I asked – never once did I give consent."

"You pushed me and my family through two and a half years of inexplicable, unnecessary suffering, of anger, anguish and uncertainty. The loss of time with my baby. You have no idea how hard I have worked to rebuild parts of me that are still weak. You took a lot of things away from me that are taking so long to regain. My damage was internal, unseen. I carry it with me.'

"You took away my worth, my privacy, my energy, my time. My baby girl's time, my safety, my intimacy, my confidence, my own voice. Until today. What you've done to me doesn't expire. It doesn't just go away after a set number of years. It stays with me. It's part of my identity. It has forever changed the way I carry myself, the way I live the rest of my life," she concluded.

The family didn't sleep much the night before sentencing. "It's been a long two-and-a-half years," said Ms. Manitowabi. "My Ms. Manitowabi. biggest worry today is just finding out what's going to happen."

They all believe now that sentencing has been completed, the real work budget for it."

Bear a surprise visitor in Providence Bay

by Lori Thompson PROVIDENCE BAY-Some Providence Bay res-

idents were a little surprised to see a small black bear wandering about last week. The bear, likely a female two- to two-and-ahalf years old, certainly startled a few visitors but didn't appear to be looking for trouble. The Manitoulin detachment of the **Ontario Provincial Police** were called initially; the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) was ultimately called and live traps were set.

Bears have only recently emerged from their dens and usual food sources won't be found in abundance for another week or two. To avoid bear confrontations, keep garbage in sealed containers; clean your barbecue when you're finished cooking; don't leave soiled baby diapers in the open; put away your bird feeders; and keep your dogs on a leash.

For non-emergency bear concerns, call the Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327. This means the bear is roaming around, checking garbage cans, in a tree, breaking into a shed where garbage or food is stored, pulling down a bird feeder or knocking over a barbecue. A bear moving through a backyard but not lingering is not an emergency.

Call 911 if you feel a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety.

... continued from page 26 we put forward in the last session just recently was a bill that called for the United Nations Declaration for the Rights of Indigenous Peoples," he said. "Parliament put forward a bill that would implement that in Canadian law. That bill has passed but we need to ensure our laws reflect that. We believe our First Nations are sovereign nations that should be treated as that. We put the government to the test and said, now that the bill has passed will you look at energy projects, at job creation with this lens; that it's got to be done in a way that's consistent with this declaration with the informed consent of the nations that are impacted? They voted against that. We're putting forward not only a bill that says let's respect the right, the identity and the values of the first peoples of this land. The government voted for the bill but then voted against the motion to implement the bill. That's what we're going to continue to do, put forward concrete steps towards reconciliation.' The Expositor also spoke with the NDP leader about health care, trade wars and other concerns. See next week's paper for more of our conversation.





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Visiting Manitoulin? A nostalgic walk in the park through Mindemoya's

MINDEMOYA—On Manitoulin, as each new township was surveyed after the still-controversial 1862 Treaty between the Anishinaabek and the Crown, the first settlers, mostly from the Collingwood and Coldwater areas of Ontario, homesteaded the land of Campbell (1867), Carnarvon (1867-70) and Sandfield (1870), former townships now amalgamated into today's Municipality of Central Manitoulin.

The pioneer days of Central Manitoulin's proud heritage of farming, fishing and lumbering are carefully recreated



in the historically evocative outdoor settings and local exhibits of the compact Pioneer Museum, conveniently attached to the Welcome Centre on Highway 551 in downtown Mindemoya.

Last fall, the Central Manitoulin Historical Society hired the museum's first curator, Caty Virostek, on a one year contract, recently graduated from the Museum Management program at Fleming College. Ms. Virostek, who is from the Sarnia area, has been cataloguing the collections and the many artifacts that are held in storage. "There are so many artifacts," she says, "and no place left to put them. We need extra space." The curator has re-designed the displays and labels to highlight unique items within organized themes, so that each exhibit has breathing room; a carefully curated selection of artifacts evokes the people, places and events of the early days without overwhelming the visitor.


Local farm histories, photos and mementos of early schools and businesses are evidence of the dynamism of the burgeoning community of the mid-1870s. Wagg's

Creamery, founded by A.J. Wagg in 1907, thrived until 1981, when it was sold to the Farquhar dairy family. The former stone creamery's cornerstone now stands at the front of the Central Manitoulin Welcome Centre and Pioneer Museum. Inside the museum, a display case dedicated to Wagg's business holds original butter boxes, milk bottles, a miniature Wagg's delivery truck and a poster for 'homogenized ice cream"; another reminder of the Wagg

family is the forested parcel of 42 acres with easy walking trails called Wagg's Woods, east of the town's centre, around the corner on Highway 542.

One side of the museum's bright room displays sever-

al survey maps of the first land partitioning, and on the opposite wall hangs a most unusual quilt hand stitched by the late author, activist and artist Marion Seabrook, a replica in cloth of a section of the Photo by Isobel Harry

'Landowners of Carnarvon Township Survey Map' that Ms. Virostek found in storage.

For 40 years, from 1928 until 1968, Marion Seabrook's parents, Joe and

Jean Hodgson, operated a popular tourist resort on Mindemoya Island, Lake Mindemoya's prominent landmark of Ojibwe legend. The Hodgsons bought the 'largest freshwater island within an island in the world' and re-named it Treasure Island. A resort brochure describes the 14 two-and three-bedroom cottages and boasts of "no mosquitoes or blackflies!" Several histories of Treasure Island were written by this literary family, and are available for browsing: Jean Hodgson's 'Treasures from Treasure Island,' and Marion Seabrook's story grandfather's her of arrival on Manitoulin in 1874, entitled 'One Man's Journey,' and 'Once Upon an Island' and 'Touched by an Island.'

In the peaceful, leafy park off the museum's back deck, a dollhouse-like log cabin built by William and Agnes King in 1867, was donated in 1993 to the Central Manitoulin Historical Society by Jack and Marion Seabrook, who had it moved first from its original site to their new golf course, Brookwood Brae. They spent four summers in the simply furnished two-storey cabin before bequeathing it to the museum.

A large barn with '1921' emblazoned at its peak displays rare early farm machinery, pulled by oxen or powered later by steam, side by side with vintage



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

Optional property tax class

Information about a new optional property tax class that was approved by the Ministry of Finance in May 2018. According to the OFA website, the approved changes allow upper-tier municipalities the ability to create a new property tax class for on farm "value-added" activities. The intent of this new property tax class is to "provide sustainable property tax treatment to farmers who diversify their operations by engaging in small-scale processing or retail activities as a direct extension of their farming business." In municipalities that adopt this optional property class, the first \$50,000 in assessed value of on farm value added facilities will be taxed at 25 percent of the local commercial or industrial tax rate. Facilities with an assessed value of greater than \$1,000,000 will not be eligible for this new optional property tax classes. 

I went to Burt Farm's and picked up some beef side ribs not really having a recipe in mind but they looked interesting and yummy. I found a recipe that called for beef ribs but I used the side ribs instead and they turned out awesome.

Beef Ribs with Chimichurri Sauce RUB: 1/2 cup coarsely ground black pepper 1/4 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup paprika 2 Tbsp coarse salt 6 lbs beef ribs, trimmed 2 bottles beer CHIMICHURRI SAUCE: 6 cloves garlic 1 white onion, finely chopped 2 bunches Italian parsley, stems cut off Juice of 2 large lemons 1/2 tsp chili flakes 1/4 tsp cayenne (optional) 1/2 cup olive oil


- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp ground pepper

1. To make the chimichurri sauce use a blender or food processor. Add everything to the food processor except the oil. Process until blended then slowly add the oil in a steady stream. Process until relatively smooth and thick. Add salt and pepper. Set aside.

2. In a small bowl, combine pepper, brown sugar, paprika and salt. Mix thoroughly.

3. Rub beef ribs with spice rub. Place in roasting pan. Pour beer around beef; cover pan with foil. Bake in a 300° F degree oven for 3 hours. Cut into individual rib portions.

4. Preheat barbecue to a medium high. Grill ribs for 5 minutes or until crusty. Serve with chimichurri sauce.



gold in their EcoSchools certification. Students enjoy planting the school vegetable gardens. Herbs and peppers are grown in a classroom throughout the winter. A salmon hatchery was maintained by the Grade 5 class. Fish developed from eggs to fingerlings were released into a stream in M'Chigeeng this past spring. A Grade 5 classroom is home to a vermicomposter, which converts organic waste to soil for plants around the school. Some 100 litterless lunch containers were provided to students through funds from environmental organizations such as Learning for a Sustainable Future. Students have enthusiastically led many of these initiatives, including organizing composting, fish farming, recycling and gardening.

School GoGreen Club is a group of 23 staff and students who meet weekly to work on environmental initiatives. Some include recycling activities, adding GOOS (Good On One Side) paper bins to classrooms, morning announcements. and challenges such as Sweater Day, Earth Hour, Litterless Lunches and energy conservation. Club members created bird feeders for the schoolyard. They also spearhead a gardening program, with some food donated to the Grow-a-Row program. Students take part in annual Earth Day events, eco workshops and community clean-ups. Club members participated in the 4Elements World Water Day workshop in Kagawong. Grade 4 students were involved in a pedometer challenge inspired by Autumn Peltier and her

work to protect water.

Delicious garden vegetables grown in the courtyard at Manitoulin Secondary School is among the initiatives that led staff and students to certified gold status with EcoSchools. More seatshade and native ing, species are being added to the school grounds. The school's composting program is improving and expanding every day. Students are recycling batteries and hosted an e-waste collection in the spring. New GOOS (Good On One Side) bins have been added to all classrooms and work areas. Students take part in an annual Earth Day cleanup as well as a day of tree planting. The entire school community also enjoys taking part in boardwide environmental challenges each month.




