Sandfield store facing hardship as Tehkummah detour shaves 70% off retail trade Highway 542 detour continues until mid-October

SANDFIELD-Entering the Sandfield General Store and Country Kitchen (Sandfield Kitchen) feels like taking a step back in time. Located in the former Watson's General Store, proprietor Charlene Hyytiainen has retained the ambiance of days of yore. Antiques abound and the worn wood plank floors provide a sense of comfort and warmth.

However, the Sandfield Kitchen has gone largely unnoticed during construction on the Blue Jay Creek culverts at Highway 542 in Tehkummah. That's not a figure of speech. While one of the official detours directs traffic to Highway 542, Sandfield is generally by-passed in favour of Government Road by summer visitors. Sales are down 70 percent in May and June of 2018 over previous years, said Ms. Hyytiainen.

tion. "I should be starting to show a profit now," she said. July numbers aren't in yet but she estimates sales at 25 percent of expectations.

A lack of customers isn't the only problem. Not all of her suppliers will travel the detour route, from Tenth Sideroad to Townline Road to Highway 542. If you're heading down Highway 6 from Little Current, this detour adds 10 to 15 minutes of driving time. The alternate route from Little Current is to detour through Mindemoya, which adds even more time to the trip but avoids dusty gravel roads. One supplier drops off her orders at Ward's General Store in Tehkummah for Ms. Hyytiainen to pick up. Last week that supplier had a new driver. He didn't know how to get to Sandfield Kitchen and wasn't aware of the option to leave the order at Ward's. The

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This week marks **Phragmites Week**

Get involved, help stop the spread of phragmites

MANITOULIN—Coming up this Saturday is the start of the annual Phragmites Week. The goal of the Manitoulin Phragmites Project is to keep knocking back the advance of this invasive grass so that the property owners' annual maintenance will allow them to keep up with the attack.

Phragmites grow up to 15 feet tall and will take over any damp location from shallow water areas to beach locations. It grows so thick that cottage owners cannot even see the water and accessing their shoreline requires a brushcutter. Left unchecked, the plants double in area in just one year, along with the obvious loss in property values.

For example, the Manitoulin Phragmites Project has a massive goal for this summer. Picture this, all around the mouth of our beautiful Blue Jay Creek are 17 hectares of super-dense phragmites. For the fisher-people among us this means that this takes away a huge, important fish spawning and feeding grounds. While talking with project leader Judith Jones, she said that even the lowly carp, the fish so down the hierarchy that they are not even protected by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, cannot find a spot to spawn among the dense stands of phragmites.

During Phragmites Week last year, more than 200 volunteers were involved and have made a huge difference in the sprawl. The project again is graciously offering house-calls to identify and prescribe a treatment for individual properties. All week, from July 21 to the 27, the Manitoulin Phragmites Project is holding work-bees and demos. They will

let us know what works and what doesn't. Unfortunately, without knowledge of how this plant operates. Cutting it off with brush cutters is often counterproductive as just little bits of phragmites 'shrapnel' can sprout more of the menace.

Other things that we do that are

making things worse is our use of machines. In the winter when we cross through those tall weeds poking through the snow we spread seeds and plant bits to take root in the spring. During the nonsnow portion of the calendar, we drive quads through phragmites and help its already rapid spread.

Wikwemikong Health Centre celebrates 30 years of community health care

WIIKWEMKOONG—Judging by the huge crowd that gathered at the Naanwechige-Gamig Wikwemikong Health Centre (WHC) on the afternoon of July 11, a community barbecue is one of the best ways to hold a summer celebration of a 30th anniversary.

It was happy birthday for an organization that has spent "three decades strong in helping you achieve your health and wellbeing goals."

The event started out with a welcome by Kerry Assiniwe, WHC communications and media services, who acted as master of ceremonies.

Following a prayer by Dorothy Wassegijig-Kennedy and a celebration song, courtesy of Harvey Bell Jr., WHC acting director and mental health clinic manager Diane Jacko and Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory director of operations Kevin Wassegijig provided remarks on the important role that WHC plays in the community.

It was on July 11, 1988 that the WHC opened its doors and by 1994 Health Canada had transferred most of the services to the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory. All services provided at the Health Centre are provided in both Anishinaabemowin and English to best serve all members of the community.

The WHC shield is a 150-year-old replica of the medicine shield used by the healers of the Wabanowin Medicine Society of the Odawa tribes and "represents the entire universe with the all-knowing Thunderbird at the top as the representative of the Great Spirit. The Thunderbird was entrusted with the knowledge and ability to look after the well-being of the Odawa's, spiritually, emotionally, mentally and physically (a holistic approach)."

'The Thunderbird was also given the responsibility of looking after the Upper World," notes the WHC leadership, "which included the movement of the stars and all the

Manitoulin seeing well below normal precipitation levels

MANITOULIN-This will come as no surprise to Islanders, but Manitoulin is seriously lacking in precipitation this summer.

According to Gerald Cheng, Environment and Climate Change Canada meteorologist, May was an "okay" month with 82 millilitres of rain, but June's numbers dropped drastically to 22.8 millilitres and, as for the first 11 days of July, there has been no rain to speak of. (These figures come from the Gore Bay Airport's Environment Canada weather station, which was missing the data from July 12 to 16.)

"From experience, there should be around 70-80 millilitres for this time of year, June, July and

August too," Mr. Cheng told The Expositor. "It's been dry, especially around Georgian Bay.'

The meteorologist said he hoped the cold front, due to have appeared yesterday (Tuesday, July 17), will bring with it showers.

"We're looking at mostly seasonal temperatures for the rest of the month," he added.

The average millilitres for May through July are: May, 66.6 millilitres; June, 66 millilitres; and July, 52 millilitres.

The dry weather means Island farmers will be struggling with their second cut of hay this season and could be looking to supplement their winter supply with purchased feed for their livestock.

Building infrastructure lays the groundwork for prosperity

Two things are inevitable in life, said Benjamin Franklin, those two things he went on to identify as being death and taxes, coincidentally perhaps those two things are, with a few notable exceptions, pretty much universally reviled. Nobody likes to pay taxes and we are generally very easily convinced that we are paying far too much for far too little.

But those same people who push the voting public's buttons on cutting taxes and reducing government waste are generally the same folks who rail on about how government should be operated like a business, and in fact, would argue that most government services should be put in the hands of private enterprise to deliver.

But public services are generally not well served by private enterprise and the route of privatization moves most of those services into a price point where only the wealthy can afford easy access to them. When it comes to public services, everyone wants access to them, but nobody wants to pay the bill, particularly in the Internet era—it's all about the free lunch.

But moreover, large public infrastructure projects, the very (sometimes literally) roadways upon which private enterprise makes its way to profitability are financed through the public purse and what business would long survive without strategically investing in its own infrastructure. The one exception perhaps being those corporate buccaneers whose stock in trade is the dismantling of profitable corporations in order to salvage their more valuable constituent parts? Business likes stability, and revolutions, even those couched as being "for the people" rarely deliver anything remotely resembling the kind of stability that has helped to make Ontario the engine of Canadian prosperity. To be clear, this province with the lowest unemployment rate in recent memory and substantial investment, both internal and foreign, remains the main engine of the Canadian economy—Western non-renewable resource extraction bumps notwithstanding.

With a looming Baby Boom retirement and health care crisis staring us in the immediate face and with thousands of high paying jobs in this province going unfilled due to a lack of skilled applicants the provincial government must look beyond the ideological underpinnings of its populist promises and govern with a long lens. Sadly, all indications coming out of Queen's Park, at least in the short term, are all of just that—short term solutions without any long term substance.

In order to ensure stability, business must be able to depend on a government that thinks long and hard before it jumps to act on its gut intuition or a populist meme. Right now there is no indication that kind of lens is being put to use. We must hope that this government comes to its senses in the short term, and begins to plan for a better future.

Two fears are driving things today

If it looks wrong, smells wrong, or feels wrong then it is wrong

To the Expositor:

Someone once said, "all you have to fear is fear itself." There are two big concepts that are driving things these days. One is fear. The second is fear of the other. Other refers to people who look different, sound different, and have different cultures, religions, and lifeways than yours. For example, the new provincial government cut out the new sex ed curriculum for Ontario's schools, and will use one that is 20-years-old. The fear that is shown by this is fear of other-gendered, and of others with sexual orientations not like 'yours.' In another instance, the speech from the throne opening the Ontario government's summer session did not refer to indigenous peoples or francophone peoples in any way. The new provincial government also did away with the curriculum development team that was creating curricula on indigenous peoples, histories, cultures, and languages for use in Ontario schools. This is fear of the otherness of indigenous peoples.

In an international context, fear of the other is exhibited by a leader who wants to build a wall to keep out immigrants. That same leader authorized the "jailing" of children, and separating children from their parents. Now that same leader is poking around in the internal affairs of another country telling them that one of their Prime Minister's decisions was ill-advised.

In a world-wide context, fear of the other is exhibited by a type of warfare called rape. Women are stoned, burned, beaten, 'disappeared' and murdered just because they are women. In other instances, women are harassed, sexually assaulted, belittled, and threatened in workplaces.

In a more local context, fear of the other is demonstrated when an Anishinaabe man evicts a family member from her home on Indigenous homeland. Fear of the other is shown when a band council tries to throw out a female Anishinaabe elder for exercising her right to live on traditional Anishinaabe territory. Fear of the other is shown by courts, lawyers, and judges when they refuse to hear that Indigenous peoples own Indigenous homelands that were never "surrendered" to the government of Canada.

If it looks wrong, if it smells wrong, or if it feels wrong, then it is wrong. As a human being with inalienable human rights to free speech, freedom of expression, and freedom of assembly, you have the right to express their opinion. We have noticed an advertisement run recently in this newspaper that draws attention to the efforts of a group called the Coalition for Responsible Governance at Whitefish River Indian Reserve #4 which the ad says is circulating a survey on the leadership and management of the rez.

Another famous phrase is "never again." If we don't speak up when we see something amiss, if we don't object when leadership of any colour, stripe, or political persuasion tries to diminish, remove, or obliterate our rights, then we're allowing ourselves to be subjected to the same insanity that saw 6 million people halfway around the world murdered just because they were 'other.'

We human beings have eyes to see, ears to hear, minds to think and process. We have speech, but to use wisely, and sparingly. If you let tyrants keep you from seeing, listening, using your brain or your speech, you're letting yourselves walk right back into that scenario where millions of people were done away with because no one spoke up and said, 'this is wrong.' Doesn't matter if the tyrant is in a political micro-environment or in a big venue like the place to the south of us, we human beings need to call out when we see something amiss.

In other words, yes, there is climate change, there is inequality, and there is a huge, yawning gap between the poor and the mega-rich. There are 7.5 billion of us on Mother Earth, and we all need to keep our eyes and ears open. We need to speak our truth. We need to call it like it is. Na haaw, mii sa iw.

A cautionary tale of two bridges

The Nipigon Bridge failure should provide lessons for future decisions

Will Ontario's Ministry of Transportation (MTO) screw up our beloved Manitoulin Swing Bridge, same or similar to MTO's Nipigon Bridge failure?

MTO commissioned the four-lane Nipigon Bridge on the Trans-Canada Highway; a five-year, \$106 million project which opened in January 2016. The bridge survived just 42 days before catastrophic failure, and still isn't fixed 2.5 years later. Repairs are now estimated to waste as much as another \$12 million of taxpayer's hard earned money.

I have recently reviewed the MTO website and the failure report that MTO commissioned from Associated Engineering. The report by Associated Engineering identified the immediate failure causes were due to poor design, non-compliance to the Canadian Highway Bridge Design Code (CHBDC), anchor design and/or fabrication errors, poor or no inspection and approval of fabricated components prior to use, inadequate prevention and detection of installation error (eg. mis-alignment, bolt torquing, etc.), lack of engineering notes prohibiting field modifications without approval, and a design that made proper and easy installation of anchor components almost impossible. I can find neither assessment nor correction of MTO's indirect errors and systemic flaws that contributed to these immediate defects. There appears to be no "mea culpa" admission by MTO.

I have some outstanding questions. Why weren't the latent design flaws detected early in the design process? Why didn't the original bridge design meet the mandatory and recommended requirements of the CHBDC, yet it proceeded to construction? Why wasn't there adequate engineering and construction quality inspection controls to prevent use of poor designs, defective parts, misalignment, fabrication errors, and improper torquing of bolts; all known risks? Did MTO specifications include mandatory reviews, verifications, and validations of proposed bridge designs, and/or use of proven techniques such as FMEA (Failure Mode Effect Analysis), FTA (Fault Tree Analysis), PPA (Potential Problem Analysis), MCA (Monte Carlo Analysis), FEA (Finite Element Analysis), quality assurance inspections, strain gauges, runout gauges, and other similar techniques proven to detect and prevent all same and similar catastrophic failures like what occurred here?

More than enough time has passed for MTO to have properly reacted on their own volition. As a taxpayer, I would insist that MTO discover all its direct and indirect root causes for the Nipigon disaster, report to the public all root causes (and all potential latent defects also discovered) with MTO's proposed fixes, and with proof that a comprehensive root cause assessment was done. After receiving the public's comments and adequately addressing them, MTO must fix the root causes and latent defects, then verify that all fixes to MTO systems are 100 percent effective.

If MTO does not do this root cause analysis for the Nipigon bridge disaster, MTO should be considered an "accident going someplace to happen." The Manitoulin Swing Bridge could be MTO's next bridge disaster.

Shortcomings with the Ombudsman's Office highlighted by Garcia letter

Citizens stand alone, with no government support or action despite clear violations of the law

To the Expositor

Re: Response to letter from Jose Garcia Mr. Garcia:

I read your letter with great interest and can sympathize completely with the almost impossible situation you and other residents of Tehkummah face with your council. I have faced a number of councils that really had little expertise in governing a community, but never one so completely out of touch with the requirements of the position as you describe.

You mention positions given by the Ombudsman of Ontario, which went unheeded. Despite the requirement under Section 239 of the Municipal Act, for the requirement to notify the public of meetings of council, and the requirement for

them to be open to said public (with few exemptions), the only thing the Ombudsman does is basically slap an errant council on the wrist for a violation. Despite the hype over "strengthening" the Ombudsman's Act, no penalty for violating the law of the land has ever been levied. Since the departure of Andre Marin as the Ombudsman, the initial response to any complaint made by the public is a phone call and the caller tries to talk you out of pursuing your complaint. If you insist, they "may" grudgingly proceed with what they call an "investigation," which usually amounts to a phone call to the municipal clerk and, possibly, a "letter" to council, which must be read in open council, and form part of the agenda. End of any involvement, until

council screws up again and another complaint made. Then it's a complete repeat of it all.

You also mentioned an "investigation and recommendations" from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs. From the content of the recommendations, it seems that there were clear violations of the Municipal Act, such as a "required" procedural bylaw; a "required" procurement policy for goods and services; a "required" financial control policy, etc etc. Given these "requirements" are clearly spelled out in the Act, and are serious requirements for any municipality, one would feel that something more than a list of "recommendations" should have been in order for ignoring the law of the land. Unfortunately, this Ministry, like many others, refuses to enforce the legislation they are responsible to administer.

Citizens, like yourself and me, stand alone, with no government support or action, despite clear and proven violations of the law. Likely, because there would be no revenue forthcoming to the province for doing any enforcement. And, municipal politicians learn this all quickly, and thumb their collective noses at the law, as they pursue their own power trips. Again, sir, you have my sympathy, as I understand your frustration all too well. Good luck to vou.

A Gore Bay resident praises the utility of an electric car

Up front costs are higher, but the maintenance costs over the life of the car bring everything into balance

To the Expositor:

Why an electric car?

We are one month into our first electric car and waited patiently for 2.5 years as the Tesla factories were built in California and Nevada. As gas prices steadily rose over the past few years and oil prices dropped it was clear to us we needed to find another means of transportation. A Tesla was always the dream car and financially out of reach, but then they announced the Model 3. This was the affordable electric car we had been waiting for and we quickly put a deposit down.

The initial math at that time considering all costs of vehicle ownership over a period of 10 vears showed a significant savings. In May of this year we finally picked up our car among the first 300 deliveries in Canada. One month in and we have driven 5,198 km and have spent \$143 in electricity compared to the \$545 on gas we would have spent with our previous vehicle (Kia Spectra). It couldn't be more different from a gas car with a quiet driving experience, self-driving capability, worry free navigation, and an interactive entertainment system

that keeps us entertained on our roadtrips. The car has a 500km real world range and superchargers are readily available to quickly refill. By the time we stop for a washroom or food break the car has added 250km of range! The car maintenance is also dramatically different with no oil changes, engine, and transmission to maintain. The brakes are rarely used since the electric motor slows the car down and regenerates electricity which leads to less wear and tear.

The requirements for maintenance with our Model 3 is an



Wiikwemkoong hit and run trial begins Monday

GORE BAY—The trial is set to begin in the Wikwemikong Way hit and run case of Darin Noel Peltier, the accused driver in the November 2, 2014 accident that left a man hospitalized with life threatening injuries.

As was reported previously, on November 2, 2014 at 2:40 am, David Andrew (Andy) Oshkabewisens of Wiik-wemkoong was struck by a truck with the driver fleeing the scene and leaving Mr. Oshkabewisens with life threatening injuries along the side of Wikwemikong Way.

Mr. Oshkabewisens was transferred to the Manitoulin Health Centre in Little Current from where he was airlifted to Health Sciences North in Sudbury. He remained there, in a coma, until December of that year.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) North East Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) Acting Detective Inspector Dave Robinson, arrested Noel Darin Peltier on Sunday, November 9, 2014 and later charged Mr. Peltier with attempted murder and failing to remain at the scene. Mr. Peltier has since had his charges reduced to fail to stop, offer assistance; cause bodily harm; criminal negligence of a motorized vehicle causing bodily harm; and operation of a motorized vehicle in a manner that is dangerous to the public causing bodily harm.

The trial of Mr. Peltier will begin next Monday, July 23 in Gore Bay court.



K2O again!?

The Manitoulin product, rocket canoe will once again be putting the Island on the map. The eight person voyageur canoe that was made for the epic 2013 Yukon 360 Race down the Stewart and Yukon rivers from Mayo to Dawson City was constructed of all Manitoulin wood, initially thanks to **Rob Mellan**'s chainsaw. He harvested the cedar needed for the planking and the ash used for the gunwales, seats and frames. With a huge effort, those trees were turned into lumber then planed into boat-building quality planks at **Mark Gibeault**'s shop. Then a winterlong project took place to turn those trees to the super, fast vessel that won its inaugural 360km race up north.

That boat and crew also had the fastest (tying) time for the memorial "Dennie" race that ran from Blind River to Little Current. Despite the audible, nasty bruises it took from vindictive and sneaky shoals on that voyage, the cedar stripped craft survived.

This canoe, then, took its Team Manitoulin crew all the way from Kingston to Ottawa in the 2016 K2O race. The 200km non-stop race saw the canoe finish first in its voyageur category and third overall in just 27 hours. Notwithstanding the one-and-a-half hour lightning storm lay-over and helping the eventual second place, surf-ski participant lost in the labyrinth at midnight, scary flying, light-attracted, bow slamming bass and the 20 locks to portage the 200lb plus boat around, it did well.

Enter 2018, and after the discovery of a nasty bit of damage to its hull, the master builders Mark and Rob have the 29-foot canoe shipshape once again and it will transport its crew through another selfmalice session this coming weekend for this year's Kingston to Ottawa Race. The race will start at 6 am Saturday morning with 57 teams and 98 paddlers taking part in the 200, 100, 50 and 25km events with only 23 teams (mostly solo) will start out at the St. Lawrence River in downtown Kingston. Project Stitch has also purchased a new MRI machine providing the most modern diagnostic technology to CHEO patients."

...continued from page 1 driver couldn't be negotiated with. On a summer Friday, Ms. Hyytiainen was left without supplies for the weekend. She had to drive to the grocery store in Mindemoya, taking time out of her day and paying full retail prices for her supplies.

Summer visitors to Manitoulin who arrive by ferry can't follow the usual route of Highway 6 to Highway 542 to get to Mindemoya or points beyond, meaning potential customers take Government Road instead.

Local patronage has also dropped off. While Sandfield is technically a part of the Municipality of Central Manitoulin, it is located physically nearer to Tehkummah. Tehkummah residents have been lamenting the awkward detours and poor road conditions due to the construction almost since it began. Former customers from Tehkummah have been avoiding the area. Local Tehkummah businesses Garden's Gate Restaurant

and Beacon Images were suffering also; however, prominent signage has since been added for those entities

Ms. Hyytiainen is concerned that a continued reduction in sales will force her to close her doors. "Hydro costs are fixed and high," she said. Insurance is another fixed but necessary cost. It's difficult to

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

"This is something Ontario Command is totally excited to be a part of," said Mr. Pond, noting that the collaboration with Wounded Warriors Canada is a first for the Legion, but something that is fully in keeping with the mandate of the Legion.

Mr. Pond introduced the keynote speaker of the event, Capt. (Rtd.) Medric Cousineau SCCD KStG, a recipient of the Canadian Star of Courage for his part in a helicopter borne dramatic North Atlantic air-sea rescue in October 1983 and a tireless campaigner in the battle to secure better services for service people and first responders caught up in the nightmare of PTSD. Thanks largely to the efforts of Capt. (Rtd) Cousineau and the Paws for Thought organization he founded, 107 pairs of service dogs have been

Capt. (Rtd) Cousineau took the audience packing the Branch 177 Legion hall back in time to that storm swept night when he was being lowered onto a 6-foot by 6-foot patch of tossing deck on a highliner where two people were in serious medical distress. It was one of the most intense air-sea rescues ever attempted.

"Dangling on a cable lowered from a helicopter and facing a 35-foot wall of water I was struck by two things: one, how big the universe is and how small you are, and the second thing that grabs your attention is brown...

Capt. Cousineau first slammed into that wall of water and then bounced back to hit the back of the ship. That section of his body went numb. Thankfully.

"When my boots hit the deck, and the oil slick covering it, my feet went out and I then slammed into the wheelhouse, the only good thing to happen that night was that it was the side that was already

Cousineau was awarded the Star of Courage. "My consolation prize from the night was PTSD.'

The physical hit from that night largely passed, but onslaught of depression, suicidal thoughts and other symptoms kept him locked in the basement and created a gulf between him and his friends and family. "Ugly, ugly, ugly," he shared of the experience of PTSDand there was no hope of relief in sight. "When I got hurt they didn't even know how to spell PTSD let alone treat it," he said. Even now, there is no current cure for PTSD, he noted, only ways to help manage it.

Finally, locked away for most of the day in a wood shed in the back yard where he could watch any approach, he suffered a full on psychotic break. Most of what followed is lost to his memory.

When he learned of the potential of a service dog. he discovered a massive

Between World' was where everything to sustain life was placed," continues the WHC lore. "This included the four sacred herbs, sweet

photos by Michael Erskine grass, tobacco, sage and cedar and the triangular heart of the Thunderbird represents the three components of man: mind, body and spirit." The WHC shield symbol was known "to only a very few traditional healers due to the influence of church

and state. For over 100 years, law forbade our people to practice their spiritual ceremonies such as the sundance, potlatch and shaking tent. With the establishment of the Medicine Lodge within the Health Centre Complex this Shield was once again brought out and has become the symbol of Health and Wellness in our Community."

In 'A Glimpse Back in former Time,' WHC employees Phyllis George and Daniel Manitowabi recalled their time with the organization before joining the community for the barbecue and cake.

'This is actually my third retirement," laughed Mr. Manitowabi. Although he retired from helping to set up mental health infrastructure in communities all across the North Shore several years ago, he was enticed to return to the traces at the WHC and in M'Chigeeng before finally settling in to focussing on the retirement cottage he recently built out of timber he milled himself.

called on Premier Doug Ford to explain why he removed reconciliation from the Ministry of Indigenous Affairs and relegated the ministry to a part-time minister. "Why did the Ford government drop reconciliation from the mandate of the Ministry of Indigenous Affairs and what is behind the decision to have the minister share his time between northern affairs, mining, energy, and, Indigenous affairs?" said MPP Mamakwa.

Mr. Mamakwa said First Nations communities are concerned about the Ford government's step backward away from reconciliation. He referred to Nishnawbe Aski Nation Grand Chief Alvin Fiddler who said, "It is difficult to see how progress can continue to be made when First Nations are reduced to only how they relate to the government's ability to access the resources within our lands.'

During the campaign, Mr. Ford famously said he would, "get on a bull-

dozer himself" to get the Ring of Fire underway, and he also said, he would, "stop talking" and, "start doing."

"From the First Nations perspective, the only way you 'start doing' anything in their territories is to, 'start talking' to their communities, said Mr. Mamakwa. "How does the premier propose to do this with a parttime minister?"


Efforts will continue by the Anishinabek Nation and educational partners to share the history of the treaty relationships in Ontario and educate those seeking a richer understanding of treaty knowledge. The kits "We are all Treaty People" (for Grades 1-8) and the "Gdoo-Sastamoo Kii Mii" (for Grades 9-12), which were produced in 2015, are educational tools that incorporate knowledge of the treaty relationships into the classroom in various subjects in the Ontario curriculum including Math, Social Studies, Language and Art, in an interactive and engaging way. "We look forward to continuing the development of educational tools like the 'We are all Treaty People' kit with Ontario so that everyone can continue learning about treaty relationships,' says Grand Council Chief Hare. "The kits have been an awesome way for kids and teachers in all schools, both Indigenous and non-Indigenous, to learn the history and significance of treaties and nation-to-nation relationships."

In the wake of the cancellation of these meetings, many educators have taken to social media to express their disappointment and reaffirm their commitment to the TRC and bringing Indigenous education into classrooms.

'While the cancelling of these meetings is very disappointing, the public support and concern has been a testament to the need and desire from both Indigenous and non-Indigenous people to learn more about our culture and history, and I believe that people will come together, push forward and allow the good work to continue," adds Grand Council Chief Hare.



... continued from page 1 old at the time. "The following year my father built a stone guest cottage. The house has been sold, but we kept the cottage. My oldest son Mark still visits every year," said Tim. "The others live too far away. The property is owned jointly by Mark's family and my nephew Paul now."

"One winter when I was 17, my immediate family came up to see what the Island was like at Christmas time. There was so much snow! The north wall of the stone house was covered with hoar frost two inches thick. We wore our coats the whole time we were there but it was so beautiful," he remembered.

He made a lot of friends during his stays on the Island, both local and seasonal residents, naming Charlotte Eddington, Jill Warden, Ruth and Jordan Edward as memorable. "I more or less grew up here. I went to all the dances, they were the main social activity at the time. I remember dancing the Manitoulin trot.'

"Older people on the Island will remember the old party line phone system," he said. "You could always tell when someone else came on the line. We never said anything personal. One time my mother wanted to cook a turkey and phoned a neighbour to find out where she could get one. Another woman spoke up and told her where to go.'

Another memory is of driving to Manitoulin by way of Tobermory. "It was just a one track road then. Some people got seasick. My family liked to drive at night."

He's been on many ferries, he noted, including both the Norgoma and the Norisle. His family would rent a sleeping cabin. Livestock shared space with cars originally. "The first ferries, they could only take about 12 cars," Tim remembered. "You couldn't make reservations. You'd have to wait for the next boat, spending the night in Tobermory.'

Tim is cheerful and spry for his years. He also likes to tell some colourful tales. "They can't print that in the paper," said his wife several times, laughing. "It's so hard for me to behave

myself," he replied with an innocent smile. Tim has been married to Claire for 58 years. "And we're still talking," he joked. Ms. Cronley was born and raised in Montreal. "I first came here in 1958," said Ms. Cronley. "We weren't engaged yet but I came here to meet Tim's family. I felt like I was going to the end of the world."

After they married, Ms. Cronley and their four children used to spend summers on the Island with his mother. "All of my children swim," said Tim. "They took swimming lessons through the Red Cross, at the government dock in Mindemoya. They still remind us of that. The water was so cold."

Over the years, Tim has gone canoeing in Killarney, fished in McGregor Bay, picnicked in Baie Fine and gone on excursions to the Benjamin Islands, but his first hobby is gardening. "He has a real green thumb," said his wife. "It's a beautiful property."

"I began planning my gardens back," wav explained Tim. "I did a lot of research on perennial plants that would come back year after year and didn't require a lot of work." He built his gardens around two plants in particular. "Day lilies and hostas, intermingled with ferns,' he said.

Tim has published sever-

al poetry chapbooks. "They are meant to be inspirational," he said. "Not necessary religious but spiritual." His memoir, 'Gravity and Grace Revisited: A Journey.' is available through the Mindemoya Library.

One of the biggest changes on Manitoulin over the years is the environment. "I'm very concerned about the environment," he said. Water is perhaps his biggest concern. "The lakes, years ago, were pristine. You could drink right from Lake Mindemoya. You can't do that now. Acid rain's effect on fishing has been terrible.'

Fifteen years ago, Tim went hiking by himself along the south shore of the Island from South Baymouth to Providence Bay. "I can't tell you the trash and stuff I saw along that pristine shore," he said. There were plastic bottles, clothing, diapers and human waste, among other items. "There was a cormorant off-shore. Its neck was caught in the plastic rings from a six-pack." The bird was too far out for Tim to reach. "I couldn't free him," he said sadly.

The Island's beauty is so unique," he added. "We've travelled all around the world. I know you can't stop progress but I wish people would stop and think before they make

decisions that impact the air we breathe and the water we drink. I'd hate to see this beauty deteriorate.'

Tim feels fortunate to be in good health at this age. "I still enjoy life," he said. "I still enjoy gardening." He and his wife live in

"We had two-and-a-half weeks to ourselves at the cottage," he said. "It brought back memories. I got to work in my gardens. It was lovely."

Tim took his wife's arm and together they joined family on the deck to continue the celebration. The Island is indeed fortunate to have honourary Haweaters such as Tim Cronley in our midst.

Beach Action Day at Providence Bay tidies the North's longest sand beach

by Andre Leblanc PROVIDENCE BAY—On a glorious day this past Wednesday, July 11 more than a dozen workers and volunteers embarked on an important and largely unrecognized task of improving the essential, dynamic nature of Manitoulin's famed Providence Bay Beach.

With many people on that day enjoying their vacation by sunning, swimming and throwing their Frisbees, these beach guardians worked on the inshore periphery. То this reporter's untrained eye, many of the plants looked the same. Poky plants that discouraged you from making that dramatic dive for a spiked volleyball or retrieving that football your brother could never just get it right.

However with closer inspection and education from the masters, it became apparent which of the green things were necessary and those that needed to go. Guided by Manitoulin's ecologistic and botatanistic superhero, Judith Jones, the crew methodically weeded out the good from the bad of appropriate Manitoulin dune vegetation. The main target this year, as in the last couple of years, was sweet white clover. To me, these plants looked very familiar to those you would see on road-sides and any pasture you would find around the Island.

As it turns out, this is the case. Sweet white clover is the fragrant and frilly common plant you will have seen but may not have recognized, as I didn't. Although an important, native species to our area, sweet white clover on our dunes disrupts the natural, dynamic nature on Lake Huron beaches. Plants such as these are great at picking up and growing where they will but they also impede the natural wind and wave action on beaches. Because they are good at resisting wind they tend to make new mini-dunes around them that don't allow wind and sand beyond them. In high water events, marsh areas form behind the new bunkers and change the aspect of a beach that we are normally drawn to, with new stagnant, mosquito breeding havens.

As I have learned, Lake Huron has a regular 30-year water level cycle. We, thankfully, are finally getting above the average and benefitting with more accessible boat launches and dock slips. The other benefit of higher levels is the natural flushing of high water debris areas. Unfortunately, this only happens when the natural dune vegetation is in place. Plants like sweet white clover, phragmites, birdsfoot trefoil et al disrupts the cyclical nature of our shorelines like the Providence Bay beach.

Luckily, Central Manitoulin was granted a 25 year management plan to maintain the beach in its natural state. Groups like the Manitoulin Phragmites Project and Manitoulin Streams have championed this initiative to provide much needed assistance for this important effort. They have been removing the unnatural Scotch pine and willows on the sand but still maintaining "open sand, recreational areas" that also draw people to visit these unique areas. The goal is to keep people enjoying these oases while preventing the unrelenting wind and sand onslaught that had Providence Bay residents regularly sweeping sand off of their streets in years past.

During my visit to the beach this past week I was amazed at how much of this damaging vegetation was being pulled out and dragged down the beach. I was surprised to learn that iust two years ago, sweet white clover was removed in bales! This is a testament that sustained yearly maintenance will keep our beautiful beach the drawing force that it can be. Congratulations to all the people who helped out on this year's Beach Action Day.



Minister of Indigenous Services visits Wiikwemkoong by Michael Erskine

WIIKWEMKOONG-It may have been a whirlwind day of tours for Indigenous Services Minister the Honourable Jane Philpott as she made her first visit to the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territories last week, but the minister left with a strong and positive impression of the community and its accomplishments.

"I am very impressed with the innovation and dedication of the community," said the minister during a brief pause before heading into the Wiikwemkoong arena for a briefing on the progress being made on the band's Islands Claim and a community consultation with elders and band managers.

The Minister of Indigenous Services is one of two ministers of the Crown in the Canadian cabinet who are responsible for overseeing the federal government departments of Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada.

Minister Philpott was first elected as MP for Markham-Stouffville in October 2015. She served as Minister of Health between 2015 and 2017 and was appointed Minister of Indigenous Services in August 2017. She notes that she became a doctor more than 30 years ago in order to improve people's lives and entered politics in order to build a healthier society.

Dr. Philpott spent the first decade of her

career as a doctor in Niger, West Africa and in 1998 she and her family moved to Stouffville, where she served for 17 years as a family physician. She became Chief of Family Medicine at Markham Stouffville Hospital and associate professor in the University of Toronto's Faculty of Medicine. She led the opening of the Health for All Family Health Team and the Markham Family Medicine Teaching Unit and, an advocate of life long learning, she completed a Master of Public Health degree at the University of Toronto in 2012.

Minister Philpott dropped by the Waasa Naabin Youth Centre to meet members of the latest group of youth taking part in that organization's first 'Outdoor Adventure Leadership Experience' youth trip of the summer. Minister Philpott noted that she envied the youth heading out on the water and that she wished that she could join them on their upcoming adventure.

Other stops on the minister's tour included the Wikwemikong Health Centre, the communities addictions program, the construction sites of the new women's shelter and the community greenhouse, as well as the Wikwemikong High School, where she met with educators of both the high school, which is on break for the summer, and the adult Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System programs which are currently ongoing.







"Nobody told me about veterans' benefits," he said. "I could get her (a service dog), but I couldn't afford her.

But once he did have a service dog companion, that first night his world began to change. The dog would wake him up at 4:30 in the morning, just as the night terrors were beginning. "It is a change in your body chemistry that she can sense," he said.

When he decided to start his charitable foundation, the first fundraiser that he held "consisted of a Folger's coffee can and a folding table sitting outside the liquor store." At the end of the afternoon there was \$750 in the can. Eventually, when he had two people paired with dogs, a 1,065 kilometre walk in 50 days to Ottawa, stopping in 50 community centres, to raise awareness followed.

"I thought I would walk to Ottawa and they would embrace it," he said of the government. "I underestimated the obstacles I would run into." That included official discrimination that still clung to PTSD. "Every other disability was eligible for service dog funding except PTSD. It took five years just to get that changed.

Capt. (Rtd) Cousineau shared two stories to illustrate the impact of the service dogs on people's lives. In both cases it was the wives who approached him for help with their husbands. In one, the soldier had lost part of his brain, that part controlling emotions and his reactions to them. It took three-and-a-half hours to get him ready.

"They had lived in the for community six years," said Capt. (Rtd) Cousineau. "People were coming up to her and saying that they had no idea that she was married. They were telling her that 'we thought you were a single mom'," he said. These days that man is able once again to be a father to their children, seven and two. The second involved a man who refused to leave the motel room that he was holed up in. Through a series of what he freely admitted were devious manipulations "to get me and my dog in front of him." They convinced that man to go along on a flyfishing trip and Capt. (Rtd) Cousineau arranged to have him stay in the same hotel room. "In the middle of the night my dog woke me he recalled. "She up," kept looking over at him. She was asking permission." He gave the dog permission and she woke him up "just as the nightmares were getting bad. She can smell the change in the chemistry. Two weeks later, Eric got his dog." His room companion on that day is now set to become his second in command of the organi-







MANITOULIN-The inaugural Weengushk International Film Festival is now "in the can," having brought together an "A" list of films created in both established production houses working with budgets in the millions of dollars and through the budding talents of young artists operating on a shoestring and a diet consisting largely of pizza and caffeine. The mix was a popular success with those who are veterans in treading the red carpet into a gala award ceremony and those who were just lucky enough to have scored seats in the audience.

Following opening remarks by master of ceremonies comedian Pat Cheechoo, Aundeck Omni Kaning Chief Patsy Corbiere welcomed the opening reception audience to the festival, followed by a prayer in which elder Sally Recollet invoked the Great Spirit, the Four Directions and the sacred medicines. Cree artists Vern and Karen Cheechoo performed an honour song before Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes spoke about her admiration for the work being accomplished by the Weengushk students and that of the institute's staff in the face of diversity. "Your resiliency is just unbelievable," she said. "This is where you shine, the ability to tell your stories.

Ms. Hughes brought regrets from her provincial counterpart Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha.

M'Chigeeng Chief Linda Debassige delivered the keynote speech. Ogimaa-kwe Debassige spoke of her own childhood as a shy and insecure child who was bullied in school and the important role that Weengushk founder Dr. Shirley Cheechoo played in helping her to find herself and the role Dr. Cheechoo's improv classes played in helping her to get past her challenges and find the confidence that led to her becoming chief in her community. She also paid tribute to Weengushk student Josh Yesno, whose life was cut abruptly short just as his diamond began to truly shine, by a congenital health issue.

Following Ogimaa Debassige's address, Chief Brenda Lintinger (Bear Mother) of the Tunica-Biloxi Tribe of Louisiana, who helped fund the evening's main screening, the major feature film 'Wind River' addressed the opening reception. 'Wind River' is the third of three films financed by her band (the others are 'LBJ' and the upcoming "Shock and Awe), but the script for 'Wind River' "basically fell into our lap. We didn't set out to make 'that' kind of film.'

search for a young Arapaho woman's rapists and murderers, is tremendously timely given the focus on missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls.

It was a powerful film in its own right whose story "needed to be told.'

The issue of the murdered and missing Indigenous women "doesn't seem to get the attention of other minority groups," she said. "For far too long our stories have been told by other people. We have to take control of telling our stories so it shows history for what it really was."

Weengushk chair Scott Henderson spoke of meeting the students of Weengushk before even meeting Dr. Cheechoo, when a group of the students came to Cinefest in Sudbury. "I was so struck by their ingenuity, their creativity and their passion," he recalled. So struck was he that he called Dr. Cheechoo to tell her. From there he was drawn in and began a clos-

We may feel we need to stick to writing only what we know, and write from personal experience, but then worry about what Mom will think. And we so often avoid our protagonist's conflicts, for the same reasons we avoid our own. The result: passive protagonists and wandering storylines. My main job as a writing coach and editor is to help the writers I work with overcome their fears both for themselves and their characters, so their characters can fully engage their conflicts on the page, rather than avoid them at every turn. At the Sudbury workshop, I'll offer writers strategies to fully develop their projects."

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

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Visiting Manitoulin? **Museums in Little Current and Sheguiandah**

by Isobel Harry SHEGUIANDAH—Two museums within easy access to each other, in Little Current and Sheguiandah, each distinctive, tell of prehistoric peoples, of the settlers of large home-

steads, the builders of tlement. towns and villages, the entrepreneurs and their

struggles to establish a foothold on largely forested Manitoulin Island beginning in the 1860s when the land was first opened to set-

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Up the wide, old staircase to the second floor in Turners store on Water Street in Little Current, tucked into a far corner, is the tiny oneroom museum dedicated to the Turner family and mercantile history of the last 140 years. A bit like stumbling upon a cache of treasures in great- (or greatgreat-) grandfather's attic, the museum's collection is stacked here and there throughout the little space in and on old glass store cases and counters; an ancient typewriter collects

dust beneath the stern gaze of Turner ancestors whose framed photos cover the walls; yellowed newspapers proclaim achievements, wins in boat races and milestones in the business and political life of the town.

When Isaac and Elizabeth Turner arrived in Little Current in 1877, they had only stopped to rest for a few days before continuing on their journey west in pursuit of advantageous land prices, but the aspect of the flourishing Manitoulin town pleased Elizabeth and she refused to

move on. Two years later, Turners was established as a dry goods store, selling everything from flour to rubber boots, pots and pans and cloth by the yard. Little Current was booming in 1879, having

been surveyed in 1864-65, after the Treaty of 1862 removed the Indigenous residents, who had been living on their lands and operating businesses there since the 1850s, to the small nearby reserve of Sucker Creek

photo by Isobel Harry (now Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation). On the steamer route, Little Current became a market town, boosted by the huge trade in lumber. In about 1874, the first small sawmill was built, then the larger Red Mill in 1886 and two other large mills shortly after, hiring hundreds of men and sheltering them in boarding houses along

the waterfront. Later, Turners became widely known for its fine British china and wool; it was the place to shop for mohair sweaters, coats of camelhair, cashmere shawls, linens for table and bed and clothing for the whole family, all imported from England. "Canada's oldest nautical chart dealstill sells charts, er" reflecting the family's passion for boating of Grant Turner who founded the Great Lakes Cruising Club, and of Jib Turner, a sailor of some repute. The iconic Turners map of Manitoulin was developed by Barney Turner in 1949

after he took a course in cartography; that map, with some improvements in the 1960s and in 2006, has been a big seller for seventy years, its vintage look a favorite of souvenir hunters. Debby and Jib Turner are the owners of Turners today, in the same building the store has occupied since 1913 when it was built by George Strain, after Turn-

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

"Since the high import tariffs of British Trade Act were imposed in the 1970s, Turners has moved toward becoming wholly Canadian, specializing in more Canadiana and local art in the upstairs gallery," adds Ms Turner. In a way, Turners has come back to its roots.'

The Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah also houses an interesting artifact with international ramifications.

In the summer of 1943, US President Franklin Delano Roosevelt spent a top-secret week-long fishing vacation at McGregor Bay, just northeast of Little Current and Birch Island.

Part of the president's entourage was a mail plane, on pontoons, that was there specifically to carry important wartime messages between the president and his White House staff in Washington, D.C.

During the week, the air-

craft caught fire at its mooring and was quickly scuttled and sunk.

The fuselage and pontoons of the plane, complete with the axe marks that caused the pontoons to fill up with water and sink the plane were recovered by a Sudbury dive team about 15 years ago and placed in the museum as a memento of this important wartime visit.

The modern building housing the Museum itself opens onto a hallway lined with photographs of the area's first settlers, introducing visitors to the Heis, Nicholson, Skippen, Batman and Lewis families that arrived here over 150 years ago. A family feeling pervades the museum, with an authentic recreation of a cozy bedroom with beautifully hung starched cotton nightdress; other vintage

clothing in rich-coloured, well-preserved fabrics dot the room among a selection of antique musical instruments: an elaboratelycarved Newcombe piano, a violin and a concertina that enlivened homesteaders' long winter evenings.

The Museum hosts a wide range of events each year: the annual Heritage Alive Art Exhibition runs from July 18 until August 15, and the Manitoulin Fine Arts Association Members' Art Show from August 20 until September 8. The full line-up of summer and fall events is listed on the website.

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Sheg First Nation hosts North Meets South youth exchange

SHEGUIANDAH FIRST NATION—The two-week multi-city North Meets South Exchange kicked off with youth (ages 14-24) setting off from Union Station in downtown Toronto for Manitoulin Island. The 2018 Exchange, a joint effort between The Jr. Economic Club (Jr. EC) and Canadian Roots Exchange, was conceived in the spirit of Truth and Reconciliation. The group, made up of 10 Indigenous and 10 non-Indigenous students, were on Manitoulin Island for the first week of experiential learning, travelling back to Toronto for the second. Throughout the Exchange, the youth worked together to develop a public policy framework that aims to advance Truth and Reconciliation in Canada.

"Each and every one of us has a part to play in Truth and Reconciliation," said Rhiannon Traill, president and CEO, The Economic Club of Canada and founder of The Jr. EC. "It's so important to bring our young people together to help them see that they have what it takes to make positive change."

On Manitoulin Island the group was welcomed and hosted by the Sheguiandah First Nation. Activities on Manitoulin Island included a tour of the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation, nature hikes, a medicine walk, learning about powwow protocols and treaties, and special lessons about the Creation Story and connection to the land led by Chief Andrew Aguonie.

"Indigenous and non-

Indigenous young people are setting tone for the future of this country," said Max FineDay, executive director, Canadian Roots Exchange. "These youth are our next teachers, politicians, leaders in corporate Canada, we want them to keep what they learn over the course of these two weeks with them forever." Toronto activities includ-

Toronto activities included a special visit to Queen's Park, a Blue Jays game, mental health and wellness sessions, yoga and meditation on Toronto Island, public speaking and interview prep sessions, and a special ask me anything (AMA) with policy makers. The Exchange culminated on July 13 in downtown Toronto, when students presented their public policy framework to a panel of leaders at a lunch event.



Northeast Town Council Notes

No support for MTA

Following a deputation to council at its last regular meeting of June by Lindsay Orr representing the Manitoulin Tourism Association (MTA), council deliberated on its request for funding/advertising support.

Councillor Bill Koehler asked if council was reluctant to support the MTA because of its previous commitments to The Expositor (and its This is Manitoulin guide book).

CAO Dave Williamson explained to council that the municipality had no advertising dollars left in the budget, noting that currently, the Northeast Town's advertising dollars are spent with Manitoulin Publishing Company through The Expositor and This is Manitoulin, on radio advertising, attending sportsmen shows and through the Manitoulin Trade Fair.

Councillor Paul Skippen asked if there wasn't any money to spend currently, could the MTA money be budgeted for next year.

Mayor Al MacNevin said if there is a desire to advertise with the MTA, it could come out of reserves. He also reminded council that the MTA changed its direction last year with funding coming from buy in from municipalities

Councillor Michael Erskine said he didn't see the funding request in terms of advertising, but rather as support.

Councillor Melissa Peters said she would not support the funding request saying that the MTA needed to have a look at their own internal issues before doing any restructuring, citing the strange hours of the Mani-

Councillor Peters asked if the signs would be just for the resident's area and not for the whole road.

Council directed staff to place 'no parking' signs near the driveway on the opposite side of the road, but noting that it would likely not be enforced.

at Low Island park in order to advertise its EarlyOn programs as well as any other community events.

Mr. Williamson reminded council that the Northeast Town does not permit advertising in its parks, but said, "it's before council."

Councillor Erskine asked if there was a way to phrase the agreement in such a way that MFR must keep it maintained.

It was also noted that the pavilion would be a logical place for a signboard.

Mr. Williamson said there are a number of questions council must ask, including 'do you want to advertise in the park' and 'do you charge for this service.'

Councillor Marcel Gauthier said he would not support it, with Councillor Koehler saying he would not either.

In a recorded vote, the motion was defeated to have a sign board at Low Island.

Water Street closure for Golden Helmets

Council received a letter from Lion President Bruce Burnett on behalf of the Little Current Lions Club, requesting the street closure of Water Street during the evening of Wednesday, August 1 for a show by the Ontario Provincial Police Golden Helmets Precision Motorcycle Team.

The event takes place from 6 to 8 pm, but the street would need to be closed at 5 pm, it was noted, and during one of the busiest weeks of the year.

"Administratively, we can't guarantee the main street being cleared out," Mr. Williamson said, saying it would

be "exceedingly difficult" to do and making no guarantee.

He explained to council the way it is normally done is to have staff close the street at 6 am then spending the next few hours clearing out any remaining cars.

Alternatively, he added, the municipality could shut down a portion of Highway 6, between Draper and Blake Streets. This way, he said, traffic could be detoured with the bonus of having no parked traffic along the highway.

Councillor Orr asked about Trough and Manitoulin Brewing Co. customers being blocked in. Mr. Williamson said customers could still exit at Blake Street. Mr. Burnett also spoke to the Trough and Manitoulin Brewing Co., and this was okay with them.

Councillor Gauthier said the Golden Helmets have performed downtown before, and at the same time, and it wasn't a problem then. "What about ferry traffic?" he asked.

Mr. Williamson responded that detours would solve that problem, "It's pretty simple," he said.

"I'm not going to argue; I think the decision's been made," Councillor Gauthier said.

Councillor Erskine said he spoke to most of the downtown merchants who were in favour at first, but became leery after learning of the street closure.

"If there are vehicles, what are you going to do, tow them?" he asked.

Councillor Koehler said he agreed with Councillor Gauthier. "I'd like to see it downtown rather than on the highway.'

The motion went to a recorded vote with Councillors

Erskine and Skippen voting against and Councillors Orr, Koehler, Peters, Bruce Wood, Cook, Gauthier and Mayor MacNevin voting for. The motion to have the street closed on August 1 was carried.

Councillor Erskine suggested another motion be put on the floor to have a plan B for Highway 6.

"That's putting a lot of pressure on our staff," the mayor commented.

Plan B also went to a recorded vote with Councillors Koehler, Peters, Wood and Gauthier voting against the motion while Councillors Erskine, Orr, Skippen, Cook and Mayor MacNevin voted in favour. The motion for Plan B was carried.

Library reserves

Council reviewed a request from the Little Current Public Library Board to move its 2017 leftover operations money for training and books, from where it had been parked in the reserves account, to its 2018 operations budget for training and books.

Councillor Erskine said he thought that made "tremendous good sense."

Councillor Peters thought it should go to the capital budget account.

Manor minutes

Councillor Gauthier said he stopped in at the Manor on Canada Day and called it a "grand affair." Councillor Orr said it was.

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Discovery Centre students host Manitoulin Streams Day



Well here we are at Canada's 151st birthday month and here are some books by Canadians for you to enjoy!

'Canadianity: Tales From the True North Strong and Freezing' by Jeremy Taggart and Jonathan Torrens. This book came out of the authors very popular podcast. It takes readers on a trip across our country and focuses on local heroes, great places to eat and drink–it lists top Canadian bands, TV shows, athletes and much more. It is informative and fun. I guess it's what happens when pop culture and a taste for good beer come together.

Jane Urquhart's book, 'A Number of Things: Stories of Canada Told Through Fifty Objects' is a nostalgic look at things that helped shape Canada into a nation. The book is also beautifully illustrated by Scott McKowen. Everything from skates and lumberjacks to canoes and the CBC. The author creates a type of literary magic with these items and story she weaves about and around them. It will please and fascinate.

Fred Stenson was raised in the foothills of Alberta. His novel, 'Who By Fire' is the story of two generations of a family on a collision course with progress. It is the saga of people of the land coming head-to-head with the arrogance and greed of Big Oil. The story evolves from the 1960s through to the present day. This is an accurate and complex portrait of a damaged community as it tries to climb out of a situation caused by industrial avarice and its lack of conscience and ethics.

Richard Wagamese is one Canada's finest writers–sadly he passed away in March of 2017 and that is a great loss to literature and literacy in this country. All of his books are gems but I particularly enjoyed 'Ragged Company.' It is the story of four homeless people who come together to get out of a vicious cold snap and find sanctuary in an old movie theatre. Their chance encounter with a lonely journalist sets them all on a path of discovery–exploring the true definition of friendship and home. It is a book I will always remember.


