Bruce Woods concerned about possible harassment

by Alicia McCutcheon GREEN BAY—Less than two months after charges were laid against his friend, neighbour and fellow Green Bay farmer Paul Skippen, Bruce Wood received a knock at his door on July 8 from two Manitoulin Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) conservation officers regarding what they took to be an illegal trap belonging to the farmer. Mr. Wood, however, is suspicious as to the ministry's actual motives.

In an interview with The Expositor, Mr. Wood alleges that the conservation officers (COs) appeared at his door on July 8, informing him that they had taken his trap. The farmer asked the COs what gave them the right to do so as it was a racoon trap, and

Prison death inquest offers no suggestions

NAPANEE—A coroner's juried inquest was held into the death of 29-year-old Jordan Trudeau of Wikwemikong who died at the hands of corrections officers at the Millhaven Institution's maximum security gymnasium on March 20, 2011 from a gunshot wound to the chest. There were no recommendations from the coroner's jury.

Jordan Trudeau was serving a life sentence for his involvement in the brutal death of Wikwemikong's Clarence 'Tate' Lewis when a fight broke out among inmates in the gymnasium where Mr. Trudeau is reported to have been seen stabbing a fellow inmate.

Narcotics Anonymous chapter formed on Manitoulin Island

LITTLE CURRENT—Those afflicted with drug addiction face a daunting and usually lifelong battle where sometimes the world and events seem destined to overwhelm them. But it is not a battle they must face alone. A chapter of Narcotics Anonymous (NA) has recently been established in Little Current, sponsored by the Espanola chapter and supported by members from the Sudbury chapter as well.

"I am a member," said organizer Jane Smith (not his/her real name, the organization is anonymous after all) of their motivation for starting up the chapter here on Manitoulin. "Narcotics Anonymous is a world-wide organization based out of Nuys, California with chapters all over the world."

Anyone who wants to stop using drugs may become a member of Narcotics Anonymous, noted Ms. Smith. "Membership is not limited to addicts using any particular drug. Those who feel they may have a problem with drugs, legal or illegal, including alcohol, are welcome in NA. Recovery in NA focuses on the problem of addiction, not on any particular drug."

Even the supposedly benign drug marijuana, long touted by advocates as "non-addictive" can be an addiction, especially with the potent versions on the streets today.

"Some people with an addictive personality will become addicted even to pot," said Ms. Smith. "People start altering their reality and it can become a problem in their lives that they find they can't break free from on their own."

Mr. Smith explained that the key element is not the drug, but rather the personality that tends towards addictions. "Addiction is in the personality, not so much the drug itself."

The basic premise of anonymity allows addicts to attend meetings without fear of legal or social repercussions, noted Ms. Smith. This is an important consideration for an addict thinking about going to a meeting for the first time. Anonymity also supports an atmosphere of equality in meetings. It helps ensure that no individual's personality or circumstance will be considered more important than the message of

NetCentral Western Manitoulin cell tower project gets the green light with funding from FedNor

MANITOULIN-Residents, business and tourists in Western Manitoulin, including Evansville, Providence Bay, Sheshegwaning and Zhiibaahaasing First Nations and Meldrum Bay, will soon have access to expanded cellular and mobile broadband high speed Internet services due to a \$4,458,906 public-private investment arranged by NetCentral Community Communications Network. The investment is made up of a \$1.486.302 grant from Fed-Nor, \$1,486,302 grant from the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC), a \$647,528

commitment from Bell and a \$838,774 commitment from Rogers.

The Expositor reported earlier this month on the grant from the NOHFC, with NetCentral General Manager Morry Brown commenting that NetCentral was still waiting on a formal announcement from FedNor before the project would proceed with that announcement coming late last week.

Mr. Brown explained that both companies will co-locate on the towers so that there would be

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

Happy endings shouldn't be marred by scapegoating

Late last week, the Southeast Manitoulin Lions Club's feature Manitowaning Summerfest event was cancelled then reinstated.

The event is the club's Sunday afternoon smashup derby where decorated and modified cars run into one another (at low speeds and in strictly controlled circumstances and, as often as not, operating in reverse gear) until only one vehicle is left to be driven off the field, dented but victorious.

The event is great good fun and attracts both participants and spectators from all over Manitoulin Island and beyond and it has been a mainstay of the weekend for more than 30 years.

Somehow, last week and due to the club's insurers' concerns about recently-built structures in the centre area of the Manitowaning Racetrack where the event takes place, the Lions made the decision to cancel the event.

Fans, using social media, immediately expressed their displeasure with the decision, many of them faulting the municipality for its insensitivity to the importance of this event to the overall financial success of the Summerfest Weekend. Mostly, though, people looking forward to seeing the 2015 edition of the annual spectacle were just annoyed that it had been cancelled.

Then there was the vandalism (by yellow paint) of the municipality's new welded iron leaping deer sculpture, something that may or may not have been related to the cancellation of the car crash spectacle, but of course many people used social media to link the events but not to justify the vandalism.

And then, on Friday, the smashup derby was reinstated and on Sunday the cars crashed as usual and a large crowd got their money's worth.

Who knows how all of these events came together for a happy ending (except, of course, for the vandalized sculpture but this may well have been a totally random act).

The main thing is that, in the end, common sense prevailed and the Southeast Manitoulin Lions Club was able to present their usual funfilled weekend complete and as advertised.

Hopefully, the criticism levied at Assiginack council and staff via social media last week has dissipated in light of the event running as usual on a bright and sunny Sunday afternoon.

Hopefully, there are no hard feelings on anyone's part.

Service clubs like the five Lions Clubs we have on Manitoulin, the two branches of the Royal Canadian Legion and the Gore Bay Rotary Club all exist to make some money that can, in turn, be reinvested in community projects and activities in the very same communities where the money was raised. These fundraising events almost always serve the parallel and equally important function of providing the club's community with a major community weekend event.

Often, if not usually, the festivals become the host community's main festival event and so achieve the status of major social significance as they provide a venue where people can come out just to have a good time. These events often also serve an important "homecoming" function and that, in fact, is the actual name of the Central Manitoulin Lions Club's summer festival around Canada Day each year in Mindemoya: Homecoming Weekend.

The Southeast Manitoulin Lions Club event last weekend was also just such an activity and it came off, despite a couple of hiccups, as planned.

That is the main thing.

Our communities on Manitoulin are too small, and life is too short, to hold grudges and assign blame. We should be thankful for what we did have and refrain from dwelling on what we almost didn't have.

Canada Geese and Asian carp share a government response

<u>The bureaucratic way is to delay!</u>

To the Expositor:

Readers of your July 10 edition will probably make a connection between the nuisance Canada geese problem which local farmers are facing and the dangers of Asian carp gaining access to the Great Lakes; a very serious concern to commercial fishermen. The problem is the refusal of authorities, when faced with an obvious threat or problem, to take decisive action before it is too late.

With respect to Asian carp the only sure-fire way to prevent their access to the lakes is to, as the chair of the Sierra Club Ontario has noted, ensure the complete separation of the two water bodies concerned.

The way to deal with the geese problem is probably to allow an appropriate cull when numbers become overwhelming. The geese, by the way, are also a significant problem in urban areas; as just one example, there is a popular park in Guelph where families cannot sit on the grass and children cannot play freely due to the constant and unremitting droppings from big flocks of Canada geese which settle in the park by the river.

All too often it seems that, whenever possible, authority takes the easy way out--delay! When dealing with the Asian carp call for another study; when you don't want to act on the goose problem--charge the farmer! Such tactics take time and you don't have to make a clear decision!

North being shortchanged in stocking policies

The government must be lobbied to provide the same plants as southern Ontario

To the Expositor:

It's time that the people of Manitoulin and Northern Ontario demand that the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) and the Liberal government start to rebuild our fisheries.

We are treated like second class citizens when it comes to fish stocking. What we are getting from the Blue Jay Creek hatchery is nothing compared to southern Ontario.

Example: The pools of Lake Ontario get plants of over a million salmon a year not including the rainbow trout.

We in the North pay the same licence fees and taxes as they do, but get nothing.

Our municipal governments and the Manitoulin Tourism Associa-

five years or more.

We need hundreds of thousands of salmon and rainbow planted along with huge plants of alewives for the next 10 to 12 years.

During the '90s you could count 100 to 220 boats fishing the south shore out of Providence Bay and South Bay and the North Channel. Now you might count four or five.

Fishermen and sportsmen are the tourists that are needed back here. People with trailers and fifth wheelers, boats and motors, who spend \$200 to \$300 a day, not the flower smelling bicycle riders who spend next to nothing and even get free passage on the ferry.

We need the people who spend money and the fishermen who spend money on lodging, gas, tackle and food.

We have a fish hatchery here on the Island that is only at about one quarter capacity. This hatchery could raise our salmon and rainbow trout. This hatchery is capable of putting out eight to 10 million fish a year. Why is it not doing it? The Manitoulin has to work together to get our tourists back and fishermen are tourists that spend money. We must channel our government to give us the same plants as southern Ontario. Team and skills-building in 4 Elements' crosss-cultural Paddle Lab

KAGAWONG--On a beautiful July morning in Kagawong's Mudge Bay, an ebullient group of about 20 teenagers and young adults aged 14 and up descended on the beach while half a dozen canoes were deposited on the shore.

It was the day for the Paddle Lab, a program organized by 4elements Living Arts (also known as 4e) based in Kagawong, a multidisciplinary, cross-cultural, non-profit arts organization established on the Island to "investigate and integrate relationships between landscape, creativity, and community, through research, arts creation, and community cultural and economic development."

"What land-based experiences means," says programs assistant Patricia Mader, "is getting people out on the land and the water to observe what's around them in nature, and to create art inspired by nature using natural materials. 4e encourages participants to manifest themselves in

creative ways."

4elements executive director Sophie Edwards described the Paddle Lab as "an experiment on the theme of reconciliation" inspired by the recent release of the report of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) which, among many other recommendations, calls for better integration of indigenous knowledge and teaching methods into educational programs.

Heather Thoma, a facilitator with 4e who has an environmental background, says that the non-profit organization "uses creative thinking and interdisciplinary perspectives" to design its programs. "Paddle Lab is an exploration, a social laboratory that builds teams and skills while connecting with the landscape."

"This program's theme is based on working cross-culturally, and it was suggested by Lindzii Taibossigai who works with youth on environmental issues in M'Chigeeng First Nation," adds Ms. Thoma. "We have also partnered with Social Enterprise Evolution (SEE) in Sault Ste Marie, and Jordan Tabobondung of SEE is here to join our expedition out on the water and to offer some important teachings. Stephanie Recollet of Wahnapitae First Nation is an expert canoeist and guide who works with youth and she will be guiding this trip. Today is not about distance, but about conversations."

The mixed group of youths from Manitoulin towns and First Nations gathered in a circle around Elder Josh Eshkawkogan of Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI), who passed a shell to each person with a smouldering smudge of sacred herbs. "Today you will learn how to apply the principle of working together on the water," said the elder, "and how to use your gifts with respect for what's around you. Water is grounding. Be aware and be safe."

<u>Leave your beer on the pier</u>

Jordan Tabobondung gave a teaching on the two-row wampum by drawing lines in the sand to illustrate two parallel lines that "embody the nation-to-nation relationship, separate but equal."

Stephanie Recollet then led the group in a session on canoe safety and paddling strokes while everyone strapped on their life-vests before loading packed lunches, snacks and water into the canoes and climbing in.

Patricia Mader, who came from southern Ontario with B.A.s in both Art History and Fine Arts to work on a oneyear contract with 4e, describes the day's paddle as "a great exercise in trust-building. We paddled out and along the east side of Mudge Bay carrying out activities that had been designed by Stephanie to get conversations going. We learned to switch places in the canoes without tipping over, and we rafted up the canoes, each exercise serving as an icebreaker and in developing trust in each team member while we paddled."

The group stopped for lunch on a far shore and made bannock together, playing creative games and talking together about reconciliation. "When we got back about 6, we made dinner together on Coleman stoves with the day wrapping up about 9. It was a tough paddle coming back, with the wind against us, but that just served to strengthen our really great team."

<u>more letters</u> Think twice before you decide to drink and boat this season

To the Expositor:

Drinking and boating continues to be a factor in approximately 40 percent of boating-related fatalities. An IPSOS-REID study commissioned by the Canadian Safe Boating Council and conducted in 2014 cited some disturbing perceptions amongst boaters who drink and boat at least occasionally. These included: It's not dangerous to drink and boat; drinking while boating is just part of the overall relaxing experience; and the chances of getting caught are extremely remote.

The first two of these suggest that we as boaters need to be better educated on the dangers of drinking and boating.

It's been proven that the combination of

sun, wind and rocking motion of the boat significantly increases the intoxicating effects of alcohol. Not only are your senses dulled but so are your abilities to safely operate a boat. Reduced inhibitions often also lead to us taking risks that we wouldn't normally engage in like operating their boat at speeds unsafe for the conditions or letting passengers sit on the bow of the boat with their legs hanging over the edge while the boat is in motion. It's all too often forgotten as well that, we as boat operators, are responsible for the safety of everyone on board. A good question to ask yourself is how you would feel if someone you love was hurt or killed as a result of your boating while impaired.

With respect to the chances of getting caught drinking and boating being extremely remote, the probabilities in 2015 have increased significantly based on two initiatives that will be in full swing this season.

The first is called "Operation Dry Water" which was initiated by the Canadian Safe Boating Council in 2013 and has progressively gained momentum to the point where it should be in full swing across Canada this upcoming season. It runs during the August long weekend and involves police agencies making increased vessel checks to both educate boaters on the dangers of drinking and boating and to enforce their local laws relating to the practice.

The second is called 'Help Us Catch Impaired Boaters – Dial 911.' It was introduced in 2014 across most of Canada, again by the Canadian Safe Boating Council, and eagerly received by police and 911 agencies alike. The intent of the initiative is to both act as a preventative influence and to empower everyone on the water to report instances of suspected impaired boating.

Make this season one in which you'll decide to leave your beer on the pier for when you return. It will not only be nice and cold but it'll go well with your stories of your trophy catch or breathtaking scenery.

Former chief offers rebuttal to Expositor article

All is not peaches and cream in Sheguiandah First Nation

Re: Deputy Chief Georgina Thompson takes the helm at Sheguiandah First Nation (July 15, page 3).

I was so offended by the blatant lies and misinformation in regards to the aforementioned story I found it necessary to respond. It is obvious that the photograph was taken outside of the Expositor office; I can only infer that Councillor Georgina Thompson approached your newspaper for an interview and not vice versa. I would like to state that I do not know which is more disturbing, The Expositor printing a story without verifying and checking its authenticity (why didn't the writer think to ask how or from where Georgina Thompson derived her authority?) or that Georgina Thompson continues to perpetuate the lie of her being some kind of chief and that everything is peaches and cream in Sheguiandah First Nation (SFN).

Firstly, there is no such thing as deputy chief on SFN. My reserve does not have a custom election code and falls under the jurisdiction of the Indian Act. During the "Hoax of 2012," I had asked for clarification from Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) because we had a rogue band councillor going around claiming to be deputy chief. In a letter dated August 17, 2012, Monique Dion, Director of Governance, INAC, writes that "Subsection 74(2) of the Indian Act states that a band council shall be composed of a chief and councillors. The Indian Act does not mention or identify the position of deputy chief." I had previously written to The Expositor in regards to this issue in 2012 and even provided a copy of the letter from INAC, once again I will provide another copy of this letter because obviously it has gotten lost and forgotten. Even the term "councillor" is only used during duly convened council meetings. Once the meeting is over, it's just "Georgina Thompson."

Secondly, in regards to Georgina Thompson claiming that, "it's certainly not something I expected to be doing" is laughable. When we had our election in 2013, it was held on a Saturday and the following Monday Georgina appointed herself to a supervisory role in the band office and has been there ever since. This was done even though SFN receives no funding for her made-up position. It should be noted that Georgina Thompson was calling herself deputy chief long before the passing of Richard Shawanda. (I have correspondence with her made-up title and signature).

Thirdly, given Ms. Thompson's eight years of experience, one would expect that she would know what the definition of fiduciary responsibility is. A fiduciary responsibility is a sacred trust between a member of council and the members of the First Nation wherein the council member is supposed to act in the best interests of all band members. By unilaterally declaring herself deputy chief, Georgina Thompson has shattered that trust. This article is nothing more than an election ploy and Georgina's justification for seizing power although there is no legal basis for it whatsoever.

Lastly, I was in attendance at a community meeting on July 8 and it clearly showed how dysfunctional the structure of the band office has gotten in the last 21 months. There was no cohesion or consensus amongst the councillors. Georgina was sharply criticized by the other two councillors for not sharing information and being deceptive. Ms Thompson's refusal to show expenditures to the other two councillors has resulted in them not signing off on agreements. Georgina's retort, "I put them in your bins" fell flat! At any time, she could have walked down the hall, retrieved the file and made copies for the councillors but she did not. Deception...I'll let the court of public opinion decide that one. If the other two councillors are being deceived, the whole reserve is being deceived.

COLOMBIA—Evansville shotputter Joseph Maxwell placed sixth at the IAAF World Youth


Championships as part of Team shotplaced week.

...continued from page 1 anybody has the right to trap racoons. He said he was told that the trap was too big for racoons and that it must be a bear trap. Mr. Wood explained that the live trap is big enough to trap a family of racoons, in turn making the relocation even more humane and that nowhere can he find any regulations as to the size of a racoon trap.

Before the arrival of the COs, Mr. Wood said he had taken some medication that makes him feel unwell. At the start of the questioning, he said he told the officers that he was not well and that if the questioning was only going to take a couple of minutes, that would be fine. He said they assured him it would be a short interview, however it was two hours later that the officers left his premises.

"They were trying to get me to say that the neighbour helped me make it. Paul Skippen," Mr. Wood said.

The visit, he believes, stems from the articles in The Expositor and Mani-

toulin West Recorder on Mr. Skippen's charges from shooting a Canada goose without a permit and subsequent court battle over farmers' rights and crop damage due to nuisance wildlife. "One week after the court case, where I'm there in support of Paul, and I'm being harassed," he said.

It was indeed a neighbour who helped Mr. Wood create the trap, but it was the late Don Hughson, a retired MNR employee, who actually helped to fashion the device.

"I kept telling them that I had the right to protect my property, livestock and family," Mr. Wood said.

A comment from one of the COs stayed with him, he said. "He said 'please don't follow your neighbour's actions and embarrass yourself and us'," Mr. Wood recalled, noting that this, to him, was a direct referral to Mr. Skippen and his time in the news.

"I was unwell through the whole thing, and kept telling them that," Mr. Wood said.

Halfway through the questioning, the COs asked Mr. Wood if he wanted legal counsel, to which he replied yes. They gave him a card with a 1-800 number for legal aid, but he gave them his lawyer's name and number instead. The lawyer was never contacted and the interview process continued for another hour.

"They finally just gave up and left," he said.

That night, still feeling poorly, Mr. Wood said he woke his wife and had her drive him to the emergency department at the hospital in Little Current. "My blood pressure was through the roof and I had to stay there until 3 am.

The next morning, after a short sleep, Mr. Wood began his usual morning farm chores. "I still had the band on my arm from the hospital when the MNR officers showed up again," he explained. "You guys are harassing me'," he said half an hour into questioning, at which point the officers got into their truck and left.

that I wasn't going to be charged, but they weren't going to return my trap because it was too big," Mr. Wood said. However on Tuesday, July 14, the following week, the trap was returned, this time by a different CO.

After the COs left, Mr. Wood went inside his home and began a series of phone calls, firstly to MPP Michael Mantha's office whose office staff advised him to call police if he felt he was being harassed, which he did. An OPP officer took his statement, but admitted it would likely do little to solve his problem, but advised him to call back again if he continued to feel harassed.

He also called MNR supervisor Dave Scarlett in Sudbury, a former Manitoulin Island conservation officer, who apologized and said his trap would be returned.

"What gives the MNR the right to steal my property (the racoon trap) without being charged and without consent?" he asked this reporter. "This, I



feel, is retaliation." "I have over 1,500 acres with at least 50 deer," the farmer explained. "We pasture them, so why is there no compensation?

"I really don't want to have to shoot them (or trap them), it's time, resources and I just don't want to, but we (farmers) have to look after our livestock," he added. "If I were to harass wildlife the way MNR harassed me, to the extent that I ended up in emergency, I would be charged and fined and possibly have to serve jail time because of it.'

Mr. Wood said he lost between five and 10 percent of his gross income last year because of wildlife damage. "Between five and 10 percent of everyone's gross wages should be taken by the government to cover losses by farmerseveryone should contribute to looking after wildlife, not just farmers.'

Before the COs left, one officer handed Mr. Wood's son a business card telling him that if there was ever a case of their cattle getting out due to nuisance bears (who are known for opening fences and gates) to just give him a call and he would come and help, as he knew his father was not well. This kind gesture sat well with the farmer, despite the previous events.





At a council meeting last month, and attended by Lion President Bill Smith, the topic of the horse ring was again discussed, with council and the Lions coming to an agreement that a portion of fence would be removed but that this would have to be done by public works for insurance purposes.

According to Mr. Smith, he received word late Tuesday evening of last week from the Manitoulin Horse Club that the horse show scheduled for Saturday afternoon was indeed a go. The president admits that the following day he was involved, as a volunteer, with the Knox United Church charity golf tournament and didn't get word to the municipality until Thursday morning. According to Assiginack Reeve Paul Moffat, the municipality had been asking the Lions Club for some time as to whether the horse show was going to be part of its Summerfest program in order to schedule the public works crew to remove a portion of the controversial horse ring so as to soothe the Lions' insurance company for the Sunday derby. He told The Expositor that it was his opinion that any Summerfest event, such as the horse show, should have been planned months in advance, not just the week of the event. Mr. Smith, however, was only able to get confirmation from the horse club of their participation in the weekend events late Tuesday night (July 14).

According to Mr. Smith, when he went to the municipal office on Thursday to speak with project and events coordinator Jackie White, he was told that public works would no longer be removing a portion of the fence and that "he

In speaking with Mike Deforge following the meeting, Mr. Deforge told the president that he was a third-party insurance holder through Assiginack and would be pleased to help with the fence removal. A phone call to CAO Alton Hobbs and a letter of reinstatement to the municipality and the following day the derby was back on.

"The Lions are getting the impression that the town doesn't want them doing it," Mr. Smith said, noting his parting words with Ms. White last Thursday in which she is reported to have told the president that "council has not been very happy with the Lions for a lot of years.'

"I didn't know that," Mr. Smith told The Expositor.

He acknowledged the busy nature of the Assiginack public works crew, but added that Summerfest has been a community staple for 38 years, as has been public works' involvement in it.

When contacted Monday afternoon, Reeve Moffat noted that while Mr. Deforge volunteered to remove the fence, he in fact only removed the top railing.

"Personally, I'm upset that the Lions didn't come to the office a lot earlier to confirm that the horse show was on," the reeve said. "You can't just wait until a few days before an event to say if it's going to be running or not," he continued, adding that he was glad that the event ended up going over well.

BIRCH ISLAND—The summer funding announcement season is full upon us, and Sault Ste. Marie MP Bryan Hayes arrived bearing a swath of good news for local organizations in the form of FedNor grants.

Mr. Hayes, who was representing the Honourable Greg Rickford, Minister of Natural Resources and the minister in charge of Fed-Nor (Federal Economic Development Initiative for Northern Ontario), made the Island announcements during stops in Gore Bay and at the Waubetek Business Development Corporation offices in Birch Island.

'Our government is proud to support strategic initiatives that stimulate business development and Northern growth in Ontario, while strengthening the economy and creating jobs," said Mr. Hayes. "The funding announced today will deliver immediate and long-term economic results for the region by providing businesses and communities with access to the resources they need to thrive in the modern economy.'

"Today's announcement demonstrates the confidence that the Government of Canada has in Community Futures organizations to strengthen and grow the regional economy," said Waubetek Chair Martin Bayer. "These investments will enable us to respond to the needs of local businesses and communities, enhance tourism and help create jobs right here in the Manitoulin and LaCloche areas."

'Waubetek is honoured to be one of the only a couple of Community Futures **Development Corporations** in Northern Ontario to receive a five-year funding agreement," noted Waubetek General Manager Dawn Madahbee Leach. Ms. Madahbee Leach added that Waubetek contributes "at a higher level" by providing advice and information on broad initiatives promoting new types of development. Among recent initiatives were remodeling aboriginal education to be "locally controlled and rooted in aboriginal culture. Along with this, we support the National Aboriginal Eco-Development nomic Board's recommendation to establish a task force of aboriginal experts and academics appointed by aboriginal organizations to redesign education programming."

Waubetek has also assisted in "Developing discrete strategies for closing the gaps for First Nations on reserve as a governmentwide priority," she said. "The federal economic agenda needs to concentrate on First Nation treaty rights, obligations and relationships. working There also needs to be a concentrated effort on building knowledge and education of First Nation culture and the history of First Nation lands. A revised relationship needs to be considered with respect to resource revenue sharing and federal transfers that will allow First Nation communities and people to take advantage of, and participate in, economic and business opportunities.'

Ms. Madahbee Leach concluded her remarks with a quote from Chief Clarence Louie of Osoyoos in British Columbia. "If you want to kill a man, take away his job. If you want to kill a community, take away its economy." ment will encourage development, promote sustainability and, in the end, strengthen all of Ontario," she said.

Among the announcements at Birch Island were \$1,732,200 for Waubetek that will "encourage business development and growth and job creation in the organization's service are, which includes 28 First Nations communities in Northeastern Ontario."

The FedNor funding (\$1.5 million) will enable Waubetek to continue its role providing small and medium enterprises with access to capital and business counselling over the next five years. This funding has enabled Waubetek to invest over \$58 million in more than 2,000 aboriginal businesses.

The second segment of the funding, \$232,200, will support regional and economic development activities across Northeastern Ontario, including implementing an aboriginal fisheries strategy and an aboriginal mining strategy, deliver business management and youth entrepreneurship workshops as well as providing support to the Ontario First Nation Economic Developers' Association.

Whitefish River First Nation received a \$163,000 FedNor investment to support two projects. There is \$100,790 for the completion of engineering designs and required studies to establish a new industrial park located on the reserve and \$63,000 to enable Whitefish River First Nation to hire a youth intern for a two-year period. The intern will support the implementation of the community's economic development and strategic plan priorities such as expanding the local farmers/artisan market, implementing a youth employment strategy, establishing an industrial park and pursuing revenue generating solar energy projects for First Nations. Also on the green energy

front, the Manitoulin Wind and Solar Institute will receive \$43,000 to complete a feasibility study to determine the viability of assembling and selling solar-powered generators and small wind turbines—with the goal of establishing a new local business on the M'Chigeeng First Nation that will create new jobs and support long term viability of the community. the Lions in some time, the reeve said it was news to him, "the Lions have always had support from council."

Did municipal staff overstep its boundaries in providing commentary on behalf of council to the Lions Club president? Reeve Moffat said he thought not. "It's hard for me to comment on a meeting I wasn't privy to," the reeve stated.

"It was a good event, one of the best in years," Reeve Moffat added. "I think it's in great shape and hope it continues to be in the future."

Both the reeve and the Lions Club president were on the same page when it came to the condemnation of the municipal deer statue vandal, however. Sometime during late Thursday night or early Friday morning, hours after the news of the cancellation of the derby, a vandal or vandals dumped yellow paint on portions of the new whitetail deer sculpture erected only a couple of weeks prior to the event (along Highway 6 at the site of the Manitowaning tourist information booth). An investigation into the vandalism has been launched by the Ontario Provincial Police.

"That's not the way you do things," Mr. Smith said.

"I can't conceive of anyone being that malicious," the reeve said. "Council is doing their best to improve the municipality and it's pretty hard when something like that happens."

The defacement of the sculpture may not be connected in any way with the controversy surrounding the smashup derby event, however.

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Know the facts on the invasive giant hogweed plant

by Erica Bond, OFAH invasive species liaison MANITOULIN—The giant hogweed is a large flowering perennial herb that reaches an average height of 3-5.5m that comes from Eastern Europe and Central Asia. It was first found in Ontario in 1949.

Hogweed is usually confused with the native species of plant is called cow parsnip. Both plants have a sap that comes from their stems. When the sap gets on your skin, it lowers the UV protection and can cause second degree burns. If you do come into contact with hogweed make sure to go straight inside and wash well with dish soap and avoid going outside for at least 48 hours. If you don't notice when your skin comes into contact with the sap, after a couple of hours of being outside you will start to feel a burning sensation on your skin that will start to blister soon after that. The chemical that causes your skin to burn also deters animals from trying to eat the plant.

The giant hogweed has hollow stems that have purple blotches or are completely purple with thick course hair that holds the sap. The stem's diameter is typically around 10-15cm, whereas the cow parsnip does not have purple or coarse hairs on their stems, with a diameter of 5cm at the base of the stems. In addition, their leaves have a jagged look to them and can





reach up to 1m in width.

The flowers are whitish in colour and in mid-June they cluster into an umbrella shape of flowers. Each plant can have between 50-150 rays which can create up to 50,000 flowers on one plant. Their seed can travel around 10m (33ft) away from the parent plant with the wind and can travel by water for three days before they sink. The plant normally only lives for two years, but can live up to five years. Between one and four years it is considered a young plant and in its fifth year it will become a mature plant that flowers. Subsequently, after the plant is done flowering the plant dies.


Hogweed likes to live in wet areas such as marshy wetlands, by lakes and in the ditch. If you do have giant hogweed on your property or think that you do, you should call someone who has knowledge on the plant to come and confirm that it is hogweed and not cow parsnip. An easy way of getting the plant identified is to download an app called EDDMaps or to go onto their website, www.eddmaps.org, and send in a picture(s) of the plant and they will let you know if it is giant hogweed or another species.

If it does turn out to be hogweed the best thing to do is call a company that specializes or deals with hogweed to come and remove the plant from your property so it will not spread else and you help contain the spread of the invasive species in general. According to the NA website, like AA, NA's primary approach to recovery is "its belief in the therapeutic value of one addict helping another. Members take part in NA meetings by talking about their experiences and recovery from drug addiction. NA meetings are informally structured, held in space rented by the group, and are led by members who take turns opening and closing the meeting."

"We are a self supported self help group that works on the same basic steps as Alcoholics Anonymous," said Ms. Smith. Adding that NA meetings and other services are funded entirely from donations by the group's members and the sale of recovery literature. In fact, financial contributions from non-members are not accepted.

NA meetings are held regularly at the same time and place each week, usually in a public facility. In the case of the Little Current meetings, they will take place at the Little Current Public School library every Thursday at 7:30 pm. There are two basic types of meetings, open meetings that are open to the general public and closed meetings for addicts only or those who think they may have a problem with the disease of addiction and are closed to the public. "There is a component

The Little Current meetings will be of the open variety, at least to start. "Anyone with an interest in addictions is welcome to come," said Ms. Smith. "All we ask is that what goes on at the meeting is kept confidential by those attending."

NA operates on the principle of addicts helping each other recover and members meeting regularly to talk about their experiences in recovery. "More experienced members (known as sponsors) work individually with newer members," noted Ms. Smith.

The core of the NA program is the Twelve Steps. Those steps are a set of guidelines outlining a practical approach to recovery. By following these guidelines and working closely with other members, addicts learn to stop using drugs and face the challenges of daily living without the crutch of their addiction.

While NA is not a religious organization and "does not mandate any particular belief system" it does teach basic spiritual principles such as honesty, open-mindedness, faith, willingness and humility that may be applied in everyday life. "There is a component that people believe in a higher power, but the interpretation of what that means is very broad," said Ms. Smith, who said that the higher power component is more of a spiritual nature than any formal religious foundation.

The NA website notes that "the specific practical application of spiritual principles is determined by each individual. Recovery in NA is not a miracle cure that happens within a given period of time. It is a process, ongoing and personal. Members make an individual decision to join and recover at their own pace."

"This is definitely needed on the Island," said Ms. Smith, adding that she hoped that people afflicted with the disease of addiction from across the Island will be encouraged to come out and learn more about the support system provided by NA. The meetings will take place at the Little Current Public School library every Thursday at 7:30 pm and there is no charge for attending, although a free will offering is encouraged for those who are able to help support the program.

access for both Bell and Rogers customers on all four towers.

"Our target date for having service in place is late 2016," said Mr. Brown. "We are looking forward to being able to provide great cellular and broadband coverage for Manitoulin residents, youth, businesses and tourists."

"Four new communications towers will be constructed over the next 24 months to provide cellular and high-speed wireless broadband services through Long Term Evolution (LTE) technology," notes a press release from NetCentral. "Broadband LTE provides download speeds of up to 25 megabites per second (mbps) which enables users to transmit and receive large data files.'

"Bell and Rogers together committed one-third of the capital cost of the project to construct two towers and co-locate on each other's towers," the press release adds. "FedNor and NOHFC each committed one-third of the capital cost of the towers and equipment which will serve Highways 551, 542 and 540 and communities including Providence Bay, Evansville, Sheshegwaning First Nation, Zhiibaahaasing First Nation and Meldrum Bay."

NetCentral completed a seven-tower project on (and just outside of) Manitoulin last fall with towers erected in Kagawong/M'Chigeeng, Manitowaning, Mindemoya, South Baymouth, Little Current, Sheguiandah and Wood Lake (Highway 6, south of Espanola).

Francesco Yates discusses Dylan, Williams and meeting the expectations of pop music

LITTLE CURRENT—Francesco Yates may be one of the hottest up and coming young entertainers to grace the pop music scene in recent memory, but there is no trace of any diva symptoms developing in his character. Instead, the 19-year-old musical phenomena from Toronto comes across as a young man almost totally devoid of pretension or artifice—his hair may be big, but success has done nothing to swell his head.

That may not seem like too much of an accomplishment, but when you have megastars like Pharrell Williams (he of the ubiquitous earworm 'Happy') giving out quotes equating Mr. Yates as "the next big thing, but not like you've seen," staying grounded must take some serious effort, or a substantial font of personal integrity.

When The Expositor arrived at the Flatrock Entertainment grounds on Harbour View Road in Little Current for an afternoon interview following Mr. Yates' and his backup musicians sound check, the musician was trying his hands, quite credibly, on the drums. We retreated to the quiet confines of the musicians' trailer.

Mr. Yates is one of those very few pop entertainers who wields a musical instrument onstage, he plays guitar with a confidence and skill that belies his youth. His onstage style is a fusion that finds its roots in his earlier 'progressive rock' years. Mr. Yates has been a serious musician since he was 14, but he originally left the guitar behind as he pursued a more 'pop music' career. He credits Mr. Williams with bringing the guitar back to his onstage persona.

"Pharrel Williams has been a very good influence," he said. "He redirected me back to the guitar. I always played it before." Mr. Yates noted that getting a shout out from the likes of Justin Timberlake has done wonders in boosting his career to where it is today. "It has helped me a lot."

The entertainer credits Mr. Williams with providing him with a major piece of invaluable advice. "You have to be alert and focussed as a musician and as an artist," he recalled. ' "Sometimes you can have a lot of self-doubt, it's natural. But you have to push through all that to get where you want to be. You have to listen to the way the music makes you feel, don't question what your gut is telling you, go with it and you will find it won't steer you wrong." When it comes to meeting the expectations of the music industry, or perhaps more accurately his fans, in influencing his music and the impact of accommodations he makes to meet those expectations, Mr. Yates shrugs softly. "(It influences you) all the time," he said. "You have to be aware of it and pay attention, but you can't be selfish. As a musician you want to make music that other musicians appreciate. But vou bridge between what makes you happy (and the mechanics of the pop music genre)." He describes the actual accommodations he has had to make in his musical career to date as "not a lot." Whatever the source, Mr. Yate's well runs deep. It is nigh on impossible to turn on a pop music station without hearing his "ultra-funky" hit 'Better To Be Loved.' When Coca Cola was looking around for a young fresh talent to celebrate the 100th

anniversary of its curvaceous bottle, Mr. Yates was it. "It was amazing," he said of the experience. "The campaign referenced all these icons of pop culture, people like Ray Charles and Marilyn Monroe, to be amongst that was...amazing."

Mr. Yates draws on the experiences he encounters every day to create his music, but when it comes to the inspiration that fuels a hit song, he tends to agree with the legendary Bob Dylan in that the well from which lyrics are drawn remains somewhat mysterious, even to their creator.


"Even when I sit with some of the biggest writers in the world they will tell you that in two minutes there will be something that sets you off; it comes from somewhere else."

Mr. Yate's best creative work occurs "mostly at night." But there is little mystery in that, the life of an up-and-coming pop star means maintaining a grueling work schedule. "There is less stuff to do at night," he said. "There is a lot that has to be done in the daytime, you have to maintain that."

But when it comes to finding the inspiration, Mr. Yates said that he tries to maintain as open and malleable to the influences and experiences around him as he can. "It is something you just have to do," he said.

Mr. Yates agreed to provide some words of advice to the Wikwemikong music business students and the young musicians seeking a career in the industry at Manitoulin Secondary School. "Keep in touch with it," he said. "If your goal is to make it and do it, then find what you want to do and don't stray from it," he said. "Have a relationship with what you want to do musically, hone your craft, and everything else will fall into place. You can learn the business but you need to take the time to hone your craft."

As the interview is drawing to a close, Mr. Yates unconsciously demonstrated the class that marks him apart from many young musicians. As bassist Alex St. Kitts steps out of the sun and into the cool of the trailer, Mr. Yates points to him. "He is one of the best bass players in the world," he said.

Mr. St. Kitts plays bass for a number of the world's top musicians from performing on the Much Music Video Awards with Ed Sheeran, to sharing the stage with greats such as Tony Royster Jr., Jeremy Taggart, Adrian X (Drake), Mike Stern, JP Saxe, Slakah The Beatchild and The Cliks, to touring China with Jazz-Fusion combo Gia and The Unpredictable Update, he is in much demand, but he also has his own projects such as The Astro Droids and has recently launched his first solo EP entitled "The Projektor."

inflammatory bowel disease when he died from cardiac arrest," shared Ms. Peltier. "The doctors, nurses and other staff at CHEO were so amazing to not only Mackenzie but to our whole family. They did a lot to help get us through what we hope is the worst thing that will ever happen to us. We started the walk because we wanted to support CHEO and ensure that other kids continue to get the same level of care."

"I don't think a lot of people on the Island know, but depending on what children are diagnosed with, they

could get referred to CHEO instead of Sick Kids as we are part of the Ottawa hospitals catchment area."

This year's funds will be split between Project Stitch—a \$5 million project for the creation of two new operating rooms at CHEOand the pediatric and intensive care units.

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Meet the new managers of the Mississagi Lighthouse and Park

MELDRUM BAY—It makes a great story: a young man and a young woman from the opposite ends of the earth meet at the De-ba-jehmu-jig Creation Centre in Manitowaning. She is from St. Catharines and is serving a Theatre Group. He is from Australia and is travelling the world as an agricultural volunteer, a Woofer.

They fall in love, become a couple and, as it happens, Ron Berti, Artistic Producer at De-ba-jeh-mu-jig is also the president of the Manitoulin Tourism Association which, through a 40-yearplus agreement with the Canadian Coast Guard operates the Mississagi Lighthouse Campground and Park at Manitoulin's furthest western tip.

The person who has been managing the facility on behalf of the MTA wasn't coming back after the 2014 season and Mr. Berti suggests to the young couple, Jenna Ebene and James Baker, that they might want to take on the job.

"I don't know what they could have done if we hadn't come along," laughs Ms. Ebene who is now happily ensconced, with Mr. Baker, at the historic site.

It's a scenic place, unique in that, on a clear day, you can see across Lake Huron to Michigan from the craggy shoreline.

The lighthouse, Manitoulin's oldest beacon (built in 1873) stands proudly and, just across from it, Ms. Ebene and Mr. Baker greet visitors in their combination receptive centre and recreation hall located in the "fog plant", the building built to house the mechanism which would blow a giant foghorn whose job it was to warn mariners navigating the treacherous Mis-Straits sissagi (between Manitoulin Island and its large island municipality, Cockburn Island) of hazards on days and nights when the fog was so thick the beacon on the lighthouse would be invisible in the gloom.

This building has also previously functioned as a restaurant and café, "but not this year," Mr. Baker says. He and Ms. Ebene have every intention of being back in 2016 and are taking advantage this year of assessing the park and campground's assets and looking for ways of renewing the restaurant equipment.

gets from the waters of the Mississagi Straits, with waves often splashing impossibly high on the rocks that look across to the U.S.



Good luck, Ruby, on your new adventure.




"It's hard to be in both places at the same time," laughed Ms. Dolan, "but we are doing our best. The response from visitors has been very positive."

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

by Michael Erskine GORE BAY—If you are looking for a craft beer brewed here on Manitoulin Island you might want to pop by the Gore Bay waterfront this Friday (July 24) around 5 pm to 7 pm for the official opening (and rib-bon cutting) of Mani-toulin's first craft brewery.

Split Rail Brewing Company began as a kernel of an idea buried within a LAMBAC study produced in the year 2000, according co-founder Eleanor to Charlton.

Lifelong friends, Andrea Smith and Ms. Charlton first met at Camp Pine Crest in Torrance, Ontario. "Andy was born and raised on Manitoulin Island and we knew each other since we were kids," said Ms. Charlton. "We both went different places in our lives, but always kept in touch. In 2009 I bought the house next door to her and we worked together in the social work field for years. We found that we were a great fit professionally."

The duo looked for a project that would be different than what they had been doing in the social work, so

did a lot of "We research," said Ms. Smith. "We took a look at the LAM-BAC study that was done back in the year 2000. There were a lot of great business ideas in there.

"It was around the year 2010 that we really started to talk about setting up a craft brewery," said Ms. Charlton. "We knew it would be a great fit for us." The craft brewery business hit a lot of the key elements they were looking for. "We enjoy working together and there is a lot of autonomy and creativity involved, and, of course, we

both like beer.' Coming up with the concept was the easy part, however. Ahead lay a long road of research, discovery and experimentation—which involved a lot of the aforementioned creativity.

"We both went to Chicago to learn the craft beer industry," said Ms. Charlton. "We lucked out there when we met up with Ian

Stanners, he set us up with an introduction to Glenn Fobes." Mr. Fobes, who hails from Oakville, has been in the brewing industry for decades and has brewed beer for many of the large labels across the globe.

"Glenn is a marvel," said Ms. Charlton. "When it comes to beer, his eyes just light up.

Mr. Fobes helped guide the neophyte brewmasters through the shoals and reefs of the industry and played a large role in getting the brewery to where it



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Kagawong Summerfest's Old-Fashioned Fun a Day to Remember

KAGAWONG—Summerfest is always a treat in mid-July in Kagawong, "Ontario's prettiest village," and last Saturday's celebration was no exception. Threatening morning clouds did not dampen spirits one bit, and when they cleared by midday, people were crowding around the many events, enjoying the old-fashioned family games, food and fun in the warm sunshine.

Austin Hunt Mayor through strolled the grounds on the shores of the North Channel, obviously pleased with the turnout. "I remember summer activities happening here forever. There were costumes, there was a greasy pole over the water at the marina that was a lot of fun and before there was a community hall in Kagawong, we had dances at the marina too. Summerfest has been the name for these activities for 20 years now. I love to see people enjoying themselves.'

The day began with a filling pancake breakfast at the Park Centre, hosted by the United Church Men, while the United Church Ladies ran a silent auction. There was early-morning yoga on the beach and the famed 'Running of the Balls' ran all day. "It's a little-known fact that nine to 10 percent of permanent and seasonal residents in the Kagawong area are francophone," Ms. Erskine explained. "A lot of francophones attend our events. We are acknowledging them by having the Voyageur canoe here today and the singer Marcel Beneteau performing "Les chansons des voyageurs" twice, at the marina and at the River Bend Stage." The French-Canadian voyageurs (or travellers) transported furs in big canoes, like the one handbuilt by Mark Gibeault on display at the beach, during the booming fur trading days of the 18th and 19th centuries. There were burgers being flipped and market wares on sale in the pavil-

Even if they had gone the outsourcing route, there were still a great many regulatory hurdles to go through to even market and sell an off-Island produced beer. The brewers felt that just added to the weight on the scale on whether to stick with an on-Island brewed brew.

"Our research indicated that a locally brewed and produced beer was what people here really wanted," said Ms. Smith. "We could have produced the product much faster (and in bigger batches) if we had gone that route. But it wasn't recipe in the hopper, as it were, but until they are able to make room on the brewing schedule or expand the facility capacity, Manitoulin beer aficionados will have to remain patient. If the reviews on the current beers are anything to go by, it will be well worth the wait.

In the meantime, Ms. Charlton and Ms. Smith are looking forward to the opportunity afforded by the official opening to thank many of the people who have supported them to date.

"The community has been incredibly supportive," said Ms. Smith. "We are so very grateful to so many people. Not being independently wealthy, it has been a real struggle to get this off the ground, so there are all of the people who assisted us with our Kickstarter campaign as well."

The official ribbon cutting is anticipated to take place at around 5:50 pm on Friday, July 24 at the Split Rail Brewing Company brewery located in Gore Bay (across from the Harbour Centre and Marina) at 31 Water Street Gore Bay.

"We have a very small brewing capacity, 50 litres, so we have to keep brewing non-stop," laughed Ms. Charlton. "Thank goodness we have the support of friends, family and the community behind us."

The first beer recipe, and the company's signature brew at this point, is a copper lager, but they have also created a locallyinspired Hawberry Ale.

Ms. Smith describes the lager as "tasty, flavourful but accessible. It is not a bitter, hoppy beer, but it is robust enough to please the craft brew crowd."

There is one other beer



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

Kagawong hosts annual Blessing of the Boats Marine Service

KAGAWONG—The pews were full for the annual Blessing of the Boats Marine Service at St. John the Evangelist in Kagawong this past Sunday.

The service started with the Blessing of the Boats on the Kagawong docks by officiate Rev. George Gaiser, followed by the singing of 'He's Got the Whole World' led by Doug Alkenbrack on guitar.

Back inside the church, Dianne Fraser introduced guest speaker Seija Deschenes of Manitoulin Streams who discussed an improvement project commencing on the Kagawong River.

"The Kagawong River is a very unique and important habitat for fish and wildlife," said Ms. Deschenes. "This summer Manitoulin Streams is working with Kagawong to complete an enhancement strategy on the river. We have identified 22 sites along the river that require work. This summer we will be working on the lower sites."

Ms. Deschenes explained the work being done will include bioengineering to improve bank erosion and bring back stream depth, creating channel constrictors using boulders and rocks and adding root wads to reduce the impact to corner bends of the banks and create a natural habitat for all species of the river and planting trees of various species along the river trail to off set the possible threat of the emerald ash borer.

The project will also partner with 4elements Living Arts for a River School Project, educating youth about streams and the importance of river systems and artist Michael Belmore, who will be carving art into boulders to be incorporated into the Kagawong River trail system.

Following Ms. Deschenes' presentation, the congregation sang 'Will Your Anchor Hold.'

Rev. Gaiser began his homily with a quote from Kenneth Grahame's 'Wind in the Willows.'


"Believe me, my young friend, there is nothing—absolutely nothing—half so much worth doing as simply messing about in boats," quoted Rev. Gaiser. "What does it mean to bless boats? I have been in some holy boats, but holy as in h-o-l-e-y. We bless our food numerous times a day, but does that mean we end up with holey food? Holy in this case means the Eucharist. We bless the food for our use so we might be blessed for God. We are blessing vessels so that we may bless others."

Mary Buie led the congregation in the prayers of the people, which was followed by the prayer for Manitoulin and the singing of the hymn 'I Feel the Winds of God Today.'

Dianne Fraser read a poem by former St. John the Evangelist Reverend Beth Topps.

KAGAWONG-The 2015 Billings budget was presented in open council on Tuesday, July 7 from a motion put forward by Councillor Tom Imrie. All members of council (Sharon Alkenbrack, Barbara Erskine and Brian Parker) were in favour and it was passed.

Two public meetings were held leading up to the final reading: June 7 and 16. At each of these gatherings no major concerns pertaining to specific departments (i.e. fire, marina or public works) were brought forward by council.

A few questions were posed to Clerk Treasurer Kathy McDonald at the June 7 meeting in regards to how they budgeted for things like inspections. "This number is based on the number of building permits purchased for home inspections completed by Dan Osborne," said Ms. McDonald

Ms. McDonald brought some items to their attention such as the decrease in the budgeted amount for hard top from 2014 (\$141,000) to 2015 (\$125,000). The reason, as explained by Ms. McDonald, was because last year more was spent on loose top to prepare the roads for hard top.

Under salaries and wages \$10,000 was added to allow for a three percent increase during the year.

Two thousand dollars was allotted to the landfill site budget in order to add to the number of summer students hired. "We need students on site more to get it (the landfill) cleaned up," stated Ms. McDonald.

One of the annual expenses that council cannot manipulate is for the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) which includes funding for ambulance, Ontario Works, Ontario Disability Support Program and social housing. The 2015 amount is \$384,994.

"91 Main Street is making a profit for the first time in 20 years," shared Ms. McDonald. Last spring 4elements living arts moved into the upper floor which generated rental income for the township. Money was spent in the spring of 2014 to reinforce the structure. There are no plans for (improvements) this year, said Ms. McDonald. The Spot Fitness Centre is located on the ground floor of the building which is leased by the Recreation Committee.

The rental agreement has been renewed between the Township and Dave Hurcomb of Boo Bau Lou Candy Cabin (located at 156 Main Street) with a \$600 budget allotted for the replacement of eavestroughing.

Five thousand dollars was added to beef up the fire department's budget as the building is not in good condition, stated Ms. McDonald. The money is earmarked to be spent to hire a qualified company to assess the building to determine what repairs and upgrades are necessary.

Ms. McDonald asked members to review the budget as presented and "think about it." A second meeting was scheduled for June 16 for further discussion prior to bringing the final budget to the public.

During the June meeting, Ms. McDonald advised members of council that there is a \$65,000 surplus from 2014. After a lengthy discussion it was decided the monies be put towards purchase of a new four-wheel drive truck with a budget of \$30,000 to \$50,000 (to be tendered) and four AVL (automated vehicle locators) at a cost of \$10,000. These units are currently being used in both the Northeast Town and Central Manitoulin.

Ms. McDonald feels this will be "one of the best investments the township could make."

'The units, when installed in the plow trucks," informed public works foreman Rick Rusk, "are an effective way to report winter road patrol. The basic Ace model will give us what we need," shared Mr. Rusk.

2014's budget was \$3,565,700 compared to 2015, which is \$2,717,838.00.

The 2015 budget is available at the township office.

Prestigious new award graces La Cloche Art Show accolades

WHITEFISH FALLS-The works of Ivan Wheale have become almost synonymous with the shorelines of Georgian Bay and Manitoulin, capturing the wild and rugged landscape with his intricate brushstrokes in oil while leaving his subjects untamed upon the canvas.

Mr. Wheale surprised just about everyone at the La Cloche Art Show this year when he announced a new award, a memoriam in part of his late wife Jean, putting in place a long-talked about dream the couple shared.

"Jean and I talked about it for a few years," said Mr. Wheale. "This year I decided to make it happen—but although a delightful excuse to look at all of the exhibits, it wasn't an easy thing to just choose one."

The artist walked among the various exhibits at the 38th Annual La Cloche Art Show "for ages," trying to make a very challenging decision. "There were so many that I could have selected," he said. "But in the end you have to make a choice."

So, in the end, it was Kathy Dolan's 'Tucked Away' that received the august nod—and Ms. Dolan was totally taken by surprise.



Raising poultry

Raising chickens, turkeys, ducks and other poultry can be a rewarding experience. There are numerous hatcheries in Ontario supplying chicks and they are usually ordered through your local feed store. Typically, you can order in day old chicks but sometimes, as is the case with laying pullets, you can order larger ready to lay birds as well. It can take up to five months to raise pullets (young hens) so the time savings is considerable. While every chicken coop or hen house might be different, some of the key features for healthy, profitable birds are the same:

Keep your eye out for a bald eagle that was spotted

1. Dry, draft free – birds like all livestock, do best with adequate ventilation and fresh air. Premises should keep birds drv and draft free.


2. Heat - Day old chicks need a warm environment, normally a 250 watt heat lamp hung about 18 inches above the floor will do. As chicks get older, less heat is required. If chicks are cold they'll tend to bunch under the lamp, too hot, they'll be scattered away from the brooder lamp. Adjust temperature by either raising or lowering the lamp.

3. Bedding - Well bedded with straw, shavings or some similar bedding material.

4. Secure - rodents and wildlife such as weasels and raccoons can ruin a good flock. Make sure buildings are tight enough to protect flock. Be watchful of windows; consider heavy mesh instead of home window screening.

5. Feeding and Watering – adequate space for all birds to feed and get access to fresh water. Purchased feeders and waterers work well but homemade feeders and waterers can also do the job. Generally birds perform best on prepared feeds usually available in pellets or crumbles. Make sure all chicks are started on feeds with medication for the control of coccidiosis. Young chicks are particularly susceptible.

6. Adequate Space – Young chicks don't need much space as they'll stay close to the brooding area to stay warm. As birds grow however, make sure the facilities provide a minimum of 2 - 4 sq. ft. / bird depending on type. The larger the bird, allow more space. While every farm is different, it's reasonable to expect to raise 4 lb. meat birds in about 6 weeks and heavier 9-10 lbs roasters in 10-12 weeks. For layers, if all goes well, expect a flock of 10 to lay 8-10 eggs per day, declining as birds get older to 6-7 eggs /day by the end of 13 months production.

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
