### Northeast Town mayor seeks more details on why swing bridge deemed at 'end of life'

by Alicia McCutcheon

LITTLE CURRENT—Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin has some concerns with the swing bridge study, commissioned by the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) and currently underway by engineering firm Stantec. It's Mayor MacNevin's belief that not all the information on the current state of the iconic bridge is being divulged, and he'd like some answers.

"There must be something more than just wedges," Mayor MacNevin said in a Friday interview with The Expositor, referencing last year's breakdown of the bridge, which the MTO cited was a result of defunct bridge 'wedges,' which help the structure

The mayor said he's heard offhand from more than one source that there are "serious issues' with the bridge's foundation.

Mayor MacNevin said his natural inclination is to lobby to save the over century-old bridge and for the MTO to fix it, but his mind could change if he learns that there is more to it than just

"My immediate reaction is to keep it, for a whole pile of rea-

sons," he added. "First, it's part of the identity of Manitoulin, not just Little Current. The whole Island either loves it or hates it. It's like talking about the weather. Without it, what does that to the fundamental character of Manitoulin?"

"It's our Big Nickel," this reporter commented. "That's right, it's our Big Nickel," the mayor agreed.

Stantec will be making a pres-

entation to the Northeast Town council next month. During the last meeting of council there was some discussion about coming up with an official position before that meeting, or at the very least holding a meeting to discuss the bridge.

"From my perspective, when there's a real split (as he suspects there might be with his council) we need to have a conversation

### Part 1 of a series: Islands in the Great Lakes: Snapshots of islands in the Great Lakes Islands

That's so special about islands? They are, of course, surrounded by water—which gives them a certain separation and sense of definition.

They are more or less difficult to get to, and thus tend to be less travelled and more natural. They are often slightly behind the time and seem to operate at a slower pace, offering peacefulness and tranquility. They have a relatively great amount of coastline. which gives them a relatively great amount of beauty.

They have definite boundaries, creating a sense of place. They often have a smallish population, a unique history, and a substantial number of shared interests. Islands tend to think and act as communi-

Although there is something ineffable about exactly why, islands are different. Perhaps it's the air—if not the water. Whatever the case, anyone visiting an island feels the difference as soon as a foot touches shore. On an island you are somewhat removed to someplace special.

So what's the best way to think about islands? According to Christian Pleijel, chair of the Nordic Archipelago Cooperation in the Baltic Sea and former Director of the European Small Islands Network, there are three helpful ways:

1) the natural landscape (the island without humans), 2) the cultural landscape

(what happens when we humans move in to the island, what we do, how we survive, what we need), and 3) the technical landscape (the infrastructure we build to meet our needs of transportation, energy, water, waste and overspill we produce).

These three considerations are also an important part of the thought process of the relatively young organization operating in our part of the world. The Great Lakes Islands Coalition (GLIC). GLIC is an association of year-round-occupied islands in Lakes Superior, Michigan, Huron, Erie, Ontario, and the St. Lawrence River. There are about 20 of us.

### This Friday marks deadline for municipal election nominations

MANITOULIN—The deadline to run in the October 22 municipal elections is this Friday, July 27 at 2 pm, and there are a few things you should know if you're interested in throwing your name in the ring.

According to the Ontario government website, in 2018, candidates for municipal council in municipalities with more than 4,000 electors must collect 25 signatures endorsing their nominations. A person who is eligible to vote in the municipality may provide endorsements to as many candidates as they choose and may endorse candidates for any office on the municipal council. A person who is running for a ward councillor office may submit signatures from voters who do not live in that ward.

Candidates must also open a bank account before incurring any expensthemselves or their spouse). A candidate who does not spend any money or accept any contributions does not have to open a campaign bank account. The campaign bank account must be used exclusively for campaign purposes, but the previous requirement that the account be opened "in the name of the campaign" has been removed.

There is now a limit for contribues or accepting any contributions of tions that a candidate for municipal money (including a contribution from council and their spouse can make to

# Get charged with impaired driving—we will report it

This newspaper has a long-established policy of usually not reporting the names of those who have been charged with a crime until they have been found guilty in a court of law. This policy is based on the difficulty inherent in not being able to cover all court cases in order to report if someone has not been found guilty, but after recent events, we will now start publishing the names of those who the police report as having been charged with impaired driving, hoping that this small act will, at least sometimes, be a deterrent to anti-social behaviour that could end in tragedy...and too often does.

We all need to stop enabling impaired drivers. We now feel that by not publishing the names of people charged with impaired driving offences, by not bringing to bear this threat of public shaming, we may have been part of the enabling community.

Too many people crossing the Little Current Swing Bridge or arriving on Manitoulin aboard the Chi-Cheemaun ferry lean back, heave a sigh of relief at being freed from the constraints and stress of the urban life—and crack a beer. Being in the country, it seems, leads some people to believe that the normal rules need no longer apply, but they most certainly do.

Tragedy can strike in a heartbeat and far too often those tragedies are ones that could have been so easily avoided if the driver of a vehicle had simply not sat in front of a steering wheel after consuming alcohol or drugs

The pain of losing a loved one or having one subjected to life-threatening or life-altering injuries are among the most terrible events that can strike a person's life. Your world is turned upside down in an instant and will never be the same.

Waiting by the telephone while a loved one is in the hospital undergoing medical treatment from an accident is possibly the most stressful activity that can be faced in life.

It is too easy to fool ourselves that we are immune to being the perpetrators of that pain. That somehow the rules of the universe will give us a bye and we need not fear the terrible consequences that might come from that lapse of judgement. Too many are still willing to gamble that the odds will fall in our favour and we will escape those consequences.

The time to make the decision to not be the cause of unbearable pain to a mother, a father, a husband, a wife or a child, is before taking that drink, or toke, or pill. Alcohol is still high among the main causes of fatal accidents—although distracted driving has apparently toppled it from first place. The first thing that goes out the window when a person begins to drink is their sense of judgement, so putting in place the contingencies to avoid the temptation to drink and drive is very important. So are the reactions of those around the drinker.

If you see someone getting behind the wheel of a car after drinking or doing drugs, help save the life of someone's beloved child—make an effort to stop them. Pick up the phone and call the police if that is not possible to convince them not to drive. It is a simple number to remember—9-1-1.

If you are concerned about the guilt you might feel about "ratting out" a friend or colleague, just place that guilt on the scales weighed against the sound of the cries of grief coming from a mother who has just learned that her child has died or is injured in a life-threatening way. Place it on the scales against helping to carry the coffin of your best friend out of a funeral service. If you honestly think about it, the scales will tip heavily toward making the call. Taking the chance that an impaired driver will get away with driving under the influence and that no one will get hurt is not worth the gamble.

For many years, the number of impaired drivers has been on the steady decline, but lately, it seems, that trend is starting to reverse according to press releases received by this newspaper from the three local police forces. We must not let that happen. It is time to take a stand.

Now we have nobody to turn to. How did this happen? How did Manitoulin become part of the Sudbury Board of Education? Why did this rural island get sucked into the city? The City Mouse just doesn't understand the Country Mouse (regarding certain curriculum, busing, extra-curricular everything, our spirit vs the spirit of a city, etc.)

#### Jim Munro

Jim Munro, of Scottish heritage, grew up in Billings Township amidst a thriving hatchery business, started by his dad, Russell Munro, on Sunnymead Farm. Two thousand chicks were hatched at a time to supply much of Manitoulin and areas beyond.

That business declined in the 1950s, and Jim left the Island to try several vocations before he settled into his working life at Dofasco in Hamilton. He and his wife Willie also spent many adventurous days travelling by motorcycle across Canada and the

USA.

Maternal grandparents George and Cora Robison moved to Englehart from Minnesota where George had worked in the newspaper printing business. In Engle-Grandfather Robinson worked for the Temiskaming and Ontario Railroad, Northern

T&NO, in the roundhouse, repairing locomotives. At age 90, George made his own rotary lawnmower using an electric motor, homemade blades, welded into place on a steel plate with wheels.

Paternal great grandfather David Munro arrived to Billings about 1870. He and his brother walked over Jerusalem Hill to several Anishinabe farms to help with the harvest, returning with seed grain for their own farms. Grandfather Munro helped construct the first road to Espanola, farmed and taught Sunday School until he was 86. Willie was a student. David's first car, a Maxwell, was never driven by him, only by his sons who had driver's licences.

"My parents met on the Island," Jim continues. "Mum Emily Robison had worked in the hospital kitchen in Minnesota before she moved to Englehart and did the same work there. One of her coworkers was Margaret Baker, later Foster, from Manitoulin. Margaret would tell Emily about the charm and beauty of Manitoulin and eventually Emily came south for a visit. Emily met Russell

Munro at a get-together and they hit if off, marrying in 1925.'

Jim has three siblings. Dave was born first, then Jim on December 3, 1933. "My dad went to church one Sunday morning and my mother went into labour with me." Russell was summoned as was Dr. Strain who arrived with just a few minutes to spare. Sister Eleanor came next and Robert, last.

"As a little gaffer, I was accident prone. I was on the horse-pulled democrat with my family, when a truck back-fired and the horses took off with a jump-start. I fell off and broke my elbow," Jim confirms. "One month later, my feet found rotten floor boards in the barn and I fell through, breaking my leg."

"Christmas was always special.

I would get a new Mechano set," Jim recalls, "Getting the Christmas tree from the bush with David, dad and the hired man was fun. David liked the balsam firs, but I preferred spruce trees. David's choices usually won, until much later, when I had my own family and Spruce trees were king.'

Jim's family farm was in Billings Township, two miles from school. "I remember the last day of classes, when I was in Grade 4. The town and country schools got together for a picnic at Tennant's Point on Lake Kagawong. "I saw this cute little six-year-old girl with a Dutch haircut. I offered to push her on the swing and then walked her to the picnic where I cut a stick for her to roast a wiener. We were married 12 years later.'

There was the time young Jim pocketed a slithering little garter snake, to be duly released at his mother's Ladies' Aid Meeting. As expected, the ladies screamed, and the snake was retrieved. "Of course, I did get into trouble with mum after the meeting.'

"Mother was an artist, painting with oils. She also created and refurbished hats for potential sale. She cooked for the busy farm folk, using her yodelling skills to fetch the men from the fields. She milked cows and fed chickens until the kids were older and could help." When Jim was seven, Russell became an Allis-Chalmers farm equipment dealer. "I started to drive tractors at that age and later added balers and combines. By the age of 15, I could fix much of the equipment. I preferred this to the poultry business."

Dad Russell, however, was invested in raising poultry. Rumour had it that turkeys were first introduced to Manitoulin when a batch was shipped to the island in in 1890 to combat an infestation of grasshoppers. The success of this venture fueled the poultry business. An advertisement for turkey breeding was sent by an aunt from Aurora and it piqued Russell's entrepreneurial spirit. He befriended the Aurora hatchery owner who urged him to get serious about running his own hatchery. Russell did, calling his business Sunnymead Farm. It was located on the 10th concession road near Kagawong and he started with chickens.

Russell built a new incubator that could house 2,000 chicks. The fertilized eggs were obtained from the breeding flocks of four local farmers. 'Barred Rocks' and 'Red New Hampshire' varieties were popular. The trays held 100 eggs each. They were placed into a drum that would be rotated 180 degrees four times a day, midnight, six in the morning, lunch

time and six in the evening, so that the yolks or embryos would not stick to the shells. Roosters were 'caponized' through castration to encourage more growth. When Russell was injured in a fall in 1940, wife Emily took over and kept production going.

In the early 1940s turkey hatching was added to the job list. According to local publication "A Link With The Past," Manitoulin turkeys were prized in southern Ontario, with as many as 7,000 shipped per year, to Toronto hotels, as well as to Eaton's and Simpson's at Christmas, starting as early as 1924.

Jim delivered chicks to all parts of Manitoulin between March and May. Chicks also made it to southern Ontario, other provinces and the States. The tiny birds could survive for 2-3 days with no food. "I would take the seats out of the car and or pick-up truck and get eight or nine boxes of 100 chicks in. We delivered about 1,200 per week. One shipment made it all the way to Newfoundland with only two or three dead chicks. A mixture of water and feed had been placed into that crate. Dad always put an extra chick in each of the four sections for the box that held 100 birds. Some farmers would get 103 live chickens from his boxes.'

The poultry business ended abruptly one disastrous day. The hatching area was heated with a hot-water furnace which had to be filled and stoked regularly, when the eggs were also being rotated. Russell accomplished this for many years, but one very cold night in February, after a little celebration with some friends, the owner of Sunnymead fell asleep and didn't stoke the fire at midnight. The furnace burst and the eggs froze. However, the tragedy was mitigated by the fact that the poultry business on Manitoulin was declining because the south-

ern feed companies were building huge operations closer to the main market for the products.

"During the Sunnymead years. I remember my parents entertaining Mike Pearson a few times, once after the cattle sales in Little Current. Of course, he was treated to mum's famous fried chick-

Willie Sloan, of Irish descent, and Jim Munro, with a Scottish background, were marred on December 22, 1956. Willie's brother and Jim's sister were home from university, so it was a good time. "We awoke to a snowy day, but when we arrived at the church, a red carpet, a 'runner' had been laid out for us, stretching from the road to the United Church. It was a very kind gesture by one of our friends. We found out later the carpet had been purchased by and intended for the Anglican Church. However, the carpet was not damaged, and all was well."

After the wedding the newlyweds lived at Sunnymead for two years during which daughter Leslie was born. Anne arrived three years later. In 1959, Jim began to work for Lewis Runnalls at Barrie Island. Lewis ran hogs and there was a lot of field work. Jennifer (Jendi) was born on Barrie Island. After that, Jim drove the milk truck at Farquhar's. "Empty bottles were driven to Espanola, where Jim put them through the automated washing machine before refilling them mechanically on an assembly line."

There was a short stint in Elliot Lake, but the mines were shutting down. "I saw an ad looking for workers for 'National Steel Car' in Hamilton but found the jobs were taken, after we drove through the night to get there. The next stop was the Unemployment Insurance Agency which happened to be nearby. They didn't have to help me as a Northerner, but they did. Maybe they felt sorry for me after that long drive.'

"I got work building boat trailers in Grimsby. I operated presses and made frames." Fourth child Melissa was born in Grimsby. After 18 months this business dropped off, and Jim moved to Wilson Engineering as a welder lay-out and fitter. Lastly, before his long-term employment at Dofasco, Jim worked on a tower for the Skyride at Expo 67 while at Arc-Wav Industries in Burlington.

Dofasco's 'melt-shop' was the last stop. Jim became a Millwright and did maintenance work. After three years at Dofasco, an explosion caused a serious injury. "Water had inadvertently gotten into the molten steel furnace, causing a powerful eruption. I suffered burns and my skull was depressed by the violent force. A piece of bone had to be

replaced with a hard material about the size of a toonie." Jim was rehabilitated and continued to work at Dofasco. He had another close call when a walkway collapsed in the dark. Luckily Jim turned in the right direction and did not fall 50 ft. to the floor.

In 1970 the couple bought a cottage in Grimsby Beach for \$8,000 and \$500 down and turned it into a 10-room home. "The old fellow who sold it told us he wanted \$80 a month for a good box of cigars and a bottle of whisky. He died two months before we paid off the mortgage.'

Jim spent a day observing home construction, built a scale model over the winter and began his own project in the spring. Willie cut the frames and Jim put them together. The heating ducts went through the concrete slab floor providing in-floor heating. He had an island counter in the kitchen with an extra sink and a lower counter beside the stove for oven racks. Years later, when the family was moving back to Manitoulin, these unusual modifications made the sale a little harder, but Grimsby Beach was a soughtafter location by then. Jim also built his own motorhome. "We loved camping, so I bought a new chassis, frame and wheels. The motorhome took the family to many locations over the years. '

The triangle chime became a neighbourhood phenomenon. It would be rung at supper to summon the Munro kids and it would seem, all the other local children to their own homes as well. It had been intended only for the Munro kids, but it worked well for the other families. At Christmas, the high ceilings invited the selection of a spruce tree that touched the ceiling. Decorating such a large tree was challenging but the splendor was rewarding.

Willie became a secretary at Beamsville Secondary School, and later, she had a similar role at the elementary school in Grimsby. She also spent 25 years with the West Lincoln School Board which included Beamsville and Grimsby. Jim was also active in the local school and both volunteered at the United Church. Jim was also a regular blood donor and he was recognized after having given 100 pints of blood. Lastly, Jim loved to sing so he joined a Barber Shop Quartet.

By Christmas 1975, the children had outgrown the motorhome, so Jim and Willie became motorcycle owners. "We were in our midfifties and were looking for adventure." Riding a motorcycle gave us better peripheral vision and acute awareness of traffic. We travelled to many locations in Canada and the USA, the highlight of which was a trip along the west coast, including San Francisco. We had flown to this city and then jumped on the bike. Salt Lake City, Yellowstone Park, Wyoming, Colorado, Denver, Kansas and Topeka were visited. It was below freezing in Denver and 100°F in Topeka the same day. We saw flash floods. We were totally surprised by the speed and velocity of the sudden water surge."

In the spring and fall, international competitions for the barbershop singing groups attracted the biking Munros. "Although the Grimsby chapter did not compete at that level, we liked to visit the competitions. We helped raise funds for Arthritis, Heart and Stroke and Logopedics for speech therapy students.

The couple retired in 1991. By then, they owned a one acre lot on Mudge Bay, Manitoulin. "We built an A frame cottage which we lived in to build our home on the same property. The children had grown up with children of their own. All four daughters inherited their father's love of music and had participated in the school band or

## Killarney forest fire forces evacuation order, restricts travel

KILLARNEY—Tinder dry conditions across Northeastern Ontario have contributed to dozens of forest fires in recent days, with smoke heavy in the air in many Island communities. The blaze in the Killarney area was still out of control as of Monday, with unconfirmed reports that at least five cottages have been destroyed and mandatory evacuation orders and travel restrictions being implemented

All travel and and use on the French River waterway, Pickerel River (west of Highway 60/400), Henvey Inlet, the Key River basin and all associated tributaries that access those river systems, including all access from Georgian Bay and all islands on Georgian Bay within the French River Provincial Park boundaries, Dokis Island system and Puddick Island and all islands north of Henvey Inlet near shore is prohibited. All access roads west of Highway 69/400 north to the French River area are closed.

pretty scary,' admitted Killarney Mayor Ginny Rook. Mayor Rook and her husband Jim, also a municipal councillor and the town's emergency coordinator, had been on their phones most of the past few days. "We have two portable phones and the batteries have been pretty much drained."

"Any businesses not associated with the fire are closed," noted Mayor Rook, pointing out that the fire has taken a significant toll on local businesses.

Reports have suggested that as many as five cottages have been destroyed, but it is still too early to have an accurate assessment of the damage.

"The MNRF are going out in the air to have a look later on today, so we might have a better idea of the damage tomorrow," said Mayor Rook. For the moment residents are breathing a cautious sigh of relief that the winds are pushing the fires to the west and away from the built up areas.

So far the fire in the Key River area is anticipated to be in the "out of control" category for the next 30 days and has so far consumed more than 8,000 hectares. The Henvey Inlet wind farm has been ordered to remove equipment to clear a path for helicopters and water bombers.

A press release from the municipality confirmed that the fire has started to move in a westerly direction and away from the Pickerel River. The release notes that the fire area confirmed so far is 4.380 hectares "with some projections indicating that it could grow to 8.000 hectares depending upon the weather, rain, wind direction, humidity etc."

The mandatory evacuation order for water access properties is expected to be in force for a minimum of five to seven days, although depending upon what happens over the next couple of days the order may be extended.

all cottagers and campers return home," suggests the release, going on to note that "over the time that the order is in place the Key River, the French and the Pickerel River will be patrolled by the OPP to pro-

"We would suggest that tect your properties and to stop attempted access. OPP will be posted at all access points on the three rivers."

The Emergency Area Order, signed July 21, was issued by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry prohibiting access and travel in portions of Sound District Parry "where there are public safety hazards as a result of increased fire activity from Parry Sound #033."

The measure was put in place "to ensure public safety while allowing fire personnel to safely and effectively suppress the fires in the identified area."

The ministry order notes that if a member of the public believes that access within the restricted travel area is necessary for nonrecreational purposes, they

should call 705-746-4201 to request a travel authorization permit. The MNRF will review the request for access based on the rationale provided, local fire activity and the potential fire risk.

### Island farmers step up and offer to accept animal refugees

ONTARIO—With fires raging through the bonedry forests of Northeastern Ontario, the plight of those farmers and their livestock whose pastures lie in the path of the flames has touched the hearts of fellow livestock owners across the North, including Manitoulin. A Facebook page, Northern Ontario Wildfire Livestock Re-Location, has been set up to assist in connecting those in need of a safe haven for their livestock with those who have room.

"I offered on the Facebook page," admitted sis like this can place on a farm. "When your Dave McDowell, who operates McDowell Farms with his wife Theresa. "My cattle are all out on the grass, so I have an empty barn available," he

Mr. McDowell noted that although he has space, also thanks largely to the bone-dry conditions, his feed is limited. "I am pretty sure we could find some neighbours to help out if with that if need be," said the Assiginack farmer, adding that he understands the pressures a crifarm goes in something like this, you lose all your pasture and your stored feed."

Mr. McDowell said that once that happens, as a farmer you are faced with some hard decisions. "If you don't have the pasture or the feed, you will probably have to decide to send them to mar-

So far there have been no takers on his offer,





### Coast Guard ship Samuel Risley departs for its first-ever Arctic mission

ARCTIC—The Canadian Coast Guard's annual Arctic operational season is underway and includes a maiden voyage to the Arctic by the Canadian Coast Guard Ship Samuel Risley.

Samuel Risley departed Quebec City Thursday, July 12 with 25 officers and crew on board.

Their first task will be to support the annual resupply mission for the United States Air Base at Thule Greenland. "My crew and I will be doing the Operation Pacer Goose mission. We are very much looking forward to seeing and working on the rugged west coast of Greenland, a place few people ever get to experience,' said Captain John Cork, who is in command of CCGS Samuel Risley for the first month of its eight week Arctic mission. "This is a wonderful opportunity for the crew, and personally I am thrilled to have this as my last assignment before I retire after 34 years with Canadian Coast Guard."

Twelve hundred kilometres north of the Arctic Circle, Thule is locked in by ice about nine months out of

the year. Icebreaking service is needed to allow for a rapid resupply of food, fuel, construction materials and

After CCGS Samuel Risley will transit to the eastern Canadian Arctic and the waters of Baffin Bay, the Hudson Strait and northern Hud-

son Bav. Captain Signe Gotfredsen notes her crew members are truly looking forward to providing Coast Guard service in the north. Captain Gotfredsen will assume command of the ship during the second half of this mission. "For a number of the crew, this will be their first time plying Arctic waters, so there is a sense of exploration onboard," said Captain Gotfredsen. "Some of our preparation time has been spent on training including Indigenous Engagement, helicopter slinging operations and environmental response.'

CCGS Samuel Risley joined the Coast Guard fleet in the fall of 1985. During most of the navigational season the ship operates out of the Canadian Coast Guard base in Parry

Ontario. The vessel is multi-tasked and in addition to its icebreaking and aids to navigation duties on the Great Lakes it has also served on Canada's east coast.

Canadian Coast Guard's Arctic operational season will run into late November, providing extended vessel presence in the Arctic under investments from the \$1.5-billion

CCGS Risley joins other coast guard ships serving the Arctic this year including Amundsen.

Ms. Meert explained the development of the program for ages 4-7, level one, was a one day session




"It was a busy two days for the older kids with lots of information for them to digest," said Ms. Meert.

the candidate's own campaign. This limit does not apply to school board trustee candidates. The limit for campaign contributions to 1 candidate is now \$1,200, increased from \$750. Corporations and trade unions are not permitted to make contributions to candidates.

There is a separate spending limit for expenses related to parties and expressions of appreciation after the close of voting.

Municipal clerks are now required to review contributions that are reported by candidates and third party advertisers to see if any contributors have given

To run for a position on council you must be eligible to vote in that municipality. On the day you file your nomination, you must be a Canadian citizen aged 18 or older, and qualify as a resident or non-resident elector.

If your municipality has wards, you can run in any ward—you do not have to live in a particular ward in order to be its councillor. However, if you run in a ward where you do not live, you will not be able to vote for yourself. Having a campaign office or a business in a ward where you would not otherwise be eligible to vote does not make you eligible to vote in that ward.

You cannot work for a municipality and be on its council at the same time. If you are an employee of a municipality and you wish to run for office on that municipality's council, you must take a leave of absence before you file your nomination form. If you are elected, you must resign from your job.

If you are an employee of a municipality and you wish to run for office in a different municipality, you do not have to take a leave of absence or resign. However, you may wish to check with your employer to see if there are any policies in place that could affect you.

The fee to file a nomination is \$200 to run for head of council and \$100 for all other positions. This fee must be paid to the clerk at the time you hand in your nomination

Your nomination fee will be refunded if you file your campaign financial statement by the deadline.

School board trustee candidates are not required to submit endorsement signatures.

Municipal elections will take place on Monday, October 22. See next week's paper for a full list of who's running and each of the municipalities

#### **Madeline Island**

Located in Lake Superior just off Wisconsin's North Coast, Madeline Island is the largest of the twenty-two Apostle Islands in the Archipelago. It is 22.5 kilometres long and almost five kilometres wide and is the only one of the islands with commercial development.

To reach Madeline Island, board one of the four steel-hulled car/passenger ferries that ply the waters between Bayfield, Wisconsin and the Island. It is a twentyminute, four kilometre trip over crys-


talline waters to the Town of LaPointe, on Madeline's southern shore. Not only is the ferry ride necessary to reach the island, it is a great scenic cruise on Lake Superior! During mid-summer days, the ferries run every half hour. Check the schedule for early morning, evening, and off-season hours of operation. Ferries typically operate from March to mid-January depending on weather conditions.

The year-round population of the Island is approximately 265, but swells to between 2.500 and 3000 when the summer residents arrive - many of whom are descendants of early Island settlers who came to log, fish, and farm, while some came just to establish a summer retreat.

While school is in session, the Island's two-room. K-5 school has between fifteen and twenty students, while the older students travel to the mainland to attend other schools.

Islanders must adjust to seasonal changes in the mode of transportation between the Island and the mainland. The ferries operate from March through mid-January; the windsled (air-propeller driven boat) during freeze-up and break-up periods, and the "ice road" is available to travelers during the heart of winter.

County Echo is the thriving, beating heart of that community" she noted

The experience fueled a desire to look deeper into rural and community journalism. A 5,000 word article turned into 10,000 words. Ms. Long did not fulfill that assignment; instead, she applied for a Canada Council grant to investigate further.

She was inspired by the book, 'Emus Loose in Egnar: Big Stories from Small Towns' by award-winning journalist Judy Muller. Ms. Muller wrote about her grassroots tour of rural American newspapers and the surprising success of small weekly newspapers across the United States.

"When I interviewed her," said Ms. Long, "she suggested this project. There was not a lot of information about Canada; what there was, was hard to find." Ms. Long's plan was to drive across Canada, visiting small communities and their newspapers along the way. "It was a crazy proposal," she said. "I was interested in the actual people

There have been some substantial changes in the Expositor Salmon Classic, which has been growing every year to become a significant new tourism draw to the region, explains Mr. Patterson. "The changes are based on the surveys we have conducted with the people taking part in the Classic. I think that's one of the keys to our success.

bringing people what they want. One of the things we have noticed is that this is an event that people can share with their children, it's really a very family-oriented event."

"The first change this year is the prize money," he said. "There is a \$1,000 prize for the biggest fish (salmon or trout) caught in the first week, but after that there is no weekly prize. Instead, we

have taken that prize money and put it into the daily prize." That will see the daily prize for biggest salmon or trout hauled into the weigh-in stations doubling from last year's \$100 to \$200.

The second key change is in the weigh station times and locations. "We have moved the Spanish station to Vance's Camp from the Municipal Marina," he said. "The hours have

changed in Providence Bay to 10 am to 1 pm and 6 pm to 10 pm. We based it on the traffic, and people wanted it open later at night." In that vein, South Baymouth will be open until 10 pm. "The other weigh stations will be dictated by the marina hours," he said.

In other good news for fishing Manitoulin waters, Mr. Patterson noted that there are also significant numbers of smelts making an appearance. "There are huge schools of smelts the likes of which I haven't seen in years," he said. "The salmon fishing is the best I have seen in a very long time."

But with the salmon numbers rising, Mr. Patterson has noticed an alarming trend. "I have guys telling me 'oh, I caught four 'pinks.' But when I take a look at the actual fish what they have is immature Chinook." Those baby Chinook salmon should get a chance to grow into the potential whoppers, suggests Mr. Patterson. "I have a new saying to get out there: 'If it's a jack, put it back!"

But with that slight

But with that slight caveat, Mr. Patterson urges everyone to "get out there and get fishing!" But make sure you (and everyone in your boat that are fishing) have a ticket if you want a chance at The Expositor Salmon Classic's growing prize board.

and Councils of Manitoulin (UCCM) Anishnaabe Police Service were attending a separate incident, also in Sheguiandah First Nation, when they learned of the hit and run. Police then changed the charge against Mr. Doucette to 'driving while ability impaired causing bodily harm.'

Ms. Tribinevicius has been left gravely injured and, as of press time Monday, had undergone four gruelling surgeries at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto, where she was airlifted Friday.

The police force's battles with impaired drivers weren't yet over for just one hour later, OPP laid another impaired driving charge, this time against a woman, 32-year-old Kimberly Waindubence, also in the Sheguiandah area.

Community Services Officer Marie Ford said there was yet another impaired charge laid on Island roads, on Sunday night, leading this newspaper to question whether impaired driving is once again on the rise and leading this publication to make an editorial standpoint to begin publishing impaired drivers' names from now on by way of a small act of deterrence.

In the Sunday night charge, two vehicles

were involved in a collision on Highway 551 with one driver being charged with impaired driving, 29-year-old Tanya Armstrong of M'Chigeeng. The other driver was injured in the accident with non-life threatening injuries.

however, and he thinks that might be a combination of things playing a role there. "There have been a lot of people offering to help," he said. "You would probably want to take up an offer further south as that is closer to markets."

"Most of the need seems to be for horses," said Mr. McDowell.

The site coordinators have put together a list of those offering refuge to the displaced livestock which includes whether the location can accept horses, cattle, dogs, cats and whether there is trailering available. Some are also offering to put up human refugees as well, offering space for RVs and campers on their property.

undoubtedly at a new location, what this would mean for the roads infrastructure and, most importantly, the impact on businesses. "It would be interesting having a welcome centre that's not on the right road, and even the new hotel and Rob Sheppard's property (the real estate purchased from the municipality by Rob Sheppard for business development)—those are big investments."

Mayor MacNevin said he also has concerns over the bridge's importance to the boating community and, with a year-round Manitoulin Island population of just 13,000, the government may think twice about spending millions on a bridge that accommodates boating traffic.

"There is a risk that they'll only focus on land traffic," he said.

The mayor said he will be noting a study that is currently underway about increasing cruise ship traffic to Great Lakes ports to the Stantec engineers when they visit next month. The results of that study will be released this fall.

The MTO/Stantec study points to addressing the "need and justification" for the study to determine the next steps for the swing bridge and the mayor said he hopes that they do just that, and first thing.

"I'm not na $\ddot{\text{u}}$  enough to say the bridge will be there forever, but I want justification," he added.

skills training within the region's Indigenous labour force."

The investments made today stretched from one end of the Island to the other. Northeast Town Mayor Alan MacNevin attended the FedNor announcement his municipality received \$1,060,000 to accelerate business development and economic growth by extending wastewater services to accommodate commercial development in Little Current. Funds will also be used to construct a new access point to the highly popular Cup and Saucer Trail.

Other funds awarded in Little Current will enable Kelly and Craig Timmermans, owners of Manitoulin Radio Communication, to see the installation of a new broadcasting tower to the tune of \$163,285. This will help create and maintain 17 local jobs and will support the ongoing success of Country Fest. An

investment of \$60,000 will go towards this very popular festival to complete capital improvement to the Country Fest venue. attracts 20,000 tourists a year to the region.

Also situated in the Northeast Town, the nonprofit Northern Ontario Permaculture Research Institute (NOPRI) has received \$31,500 to hire a vouth intern for a one-year period. This intern will help implement the final design and construction of an innovative greenhouse that uses renewable energy, recycled materials and mobile communication technologies. The goal of the project is to demonstrate the viability of producing food year-round in Northern climates using a full-scale 1,000-foot version of the company's prototype greenhouse.

Anong Beam, the executive director of the OCF, was pleased to accept a Fed-Nor investment of \$188,395, and it is very good for other organizations also because it shows that we are supported federally." The OCF funds will be used to establish an Indigenous arts and crafts entrepreneurship incubator pilot program. This will lead to job creation and will provide a new social enterprise revstream. Entitled enue Enaamijge Yaang Studios (Our Vision), the program will feature workshops with access to quality materials and a fully-equipped studio.

Weengushk Film The Institute will also receive FedNor funds. This \$31,500 will be used to hire a youth intern for a one-year period. This will allow Weengushk to expand its operations to become a world-class media education and training facility. The intern will explore new programming opportunities such as Indigenous arts media training, Indigenous media pitch competitions, new production skills workshops and industry mentoring, and determine the viability of establishing satellite campuses throughout Northern Ontario.

M'Chigeeng First Nation Chief Linda Debassige was thankful for the funding through FedNor's Northern Development Program which means so much to community. her "This investment," she said, "highlights the important role the Government of Canada plays to advance the social and economic well-being of First Nation communities and municipalities on Manitoulin Island and beyond. By supporting key sectors of our economy such as tourism, manufacturing, innovation, and telecommunications, FedNor is helping to ensure people, businesses, and communities have access to the resources they need to succeed.'

Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI), will also receive FedNor funding to the tune of \$611.556. These monies will be used to purchase and install state-of-the-art equipment and furnishings at the Institute's new Anishinawbek Skills. Innovation and ...continued on page 13

involved, in boots-on-the-ground journalism. That's why I began this project, to defend the small paper. You don't have to work for the Globe and Mail or Toronto Star: the stories that rural Canada are telling are equally important to their communities."

Ms. Long visited Manitoulin Island and The Manitoulin Expositor as part of her research. In all the places she has visited, The Expositor is only the second to interview Ms. Long, the first being The Watrous Manitou in Saskatchewan.

She left Oshawa on April 25 and drove out west in her mother's Saturn Ion, which was packed full of camping and other gear. With connections in Haida Gwaii from previously living there, it made sense as a starting point. She has travelled to the Yukon and has stopped in every province as she makes her way back to Ontario. "I have some papers picked out," she explained, "but have discovered that locals know their papers and are very proud of them. I've stayed off the main roads and discovered some new papers.'

After a brief stop at home (Ms. Long hails from Oshawa), she will continue east. passing through Quebec and making stops in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Canada's vastness is what stands out most for Ms. Long. "This country is huge," she said. "You don't know how big it is until you start driving and meandering." It was a last minute decision to drive to the Yukon Territory. "I turned up this little road, the Alaska Highway. Three days later I was in Dawson City. The first day, there was nothing but forest and 12 black bears. There was no cell service, no CBC, no news. I reached the first community, Dease Lake. It contains a gas station, motel, a grocery store. It was a whole other day to get to Whitehorse and another to Dawson City. There's just a huge amount of space."

She spoke of a lack of infrastructure in rural Canada that leaves people with a lack of access to Internet and wireless services that many take for granted. "With the lack of services, of cell service, in some communities it's just not feasible - they don't have the infrastructure for digital news. In Dawson City, it took over five minutes to download my email."

The warmth of small communities surprised Ms. Long. "People opened up their offices and their homes to me," she said. In the Kootenay region of British Columbia she was invited to a tapas tasting along with the local newspaper. She saw first-

### History Day 2018 explores the Birth of Kagawong and revisits the Dodge tragedy

KAGAWONG—History Day in Kagawong has been a popular summer sojourn on Manitoulin for many years, and this year the series of lectures and multimedia presentations will focus on two streams. The first portion focusses on the early days of the settlement as a timber town and the town's founders, the Henry brothers, and the town's early settlers and the second portion on the tragic tale of the death of Daniel Dodge of which this year marks the 80th anniversary.

Back in the days when timber was king a pair of hardy entrepreneurs ventured to the frontier's edge seeking to expand their fledgling empire onto the shores of Manitoulin, bringing with them 12 equally robust settlers and skilled workers to establish a mill on the banks of the Kagawong River. It was a quest that was to come to a tragic end in 1882, when both brothers ended in a watery grave when both of the Henry brothers were drowned in two steamship wrecks that occurred almost a year apart: Robert aboard the Asia and James aboard the Manitoulin.

'The story of the Henry brothers, who founded Kagawong back in the late 1800s, is really a story we are looking forward to sharing," said museum curator Rick Nelson. "It's a great story and our museum committee members Dianne Fraser and Sabine Huege have been putting in a lot of hours getting it ready."

'One of the speakers at this year's History Night is the great, great granddaughter of William Henry," said Ms. Fraser. "One of William's sons grew up to be premier of

Ontario from 1930 to 1934." A testimonial letter about William Henry, written by his son and requested by Billings Reeve Austin Hunt in 1957 is part of the museum's permanent collection and will be featured at History Night.

The life and times of the original settlers of the region will come to life in a multi-media presentation that will feature their original words, as gleaned from journals and diaries, and local musicians such as Lyle and Darren Dewar will intersperse the conversation with the top 40 hits of the 1870s and 1880s and, thanks to the hard work of volunteers, the baked items popular during that epoch will also be featured to connect to the period with every

The story of Luc Chatreau, an early French Canadian settler in the region whose happenstance meeting with the Henry brothers had drawn the brothers up north in search of the rich timber stands to be found here, will also come to life. In fact, thanks to living links to those hardy souls such as Peter Gordon, Ethel Newburn and Don Lloyd those attending History Night will learn a great deal about what it was like to be an early pioneer on Manitoulin Island.

In the second part of the History Day presentation, John Van Etten, son of Laurine Dodge (Daniel Dodge's wife) from her third marriage, will be on hand as one of the VIPs said Mr. Nelson. "Also Roger Weber, the News 4 NBC affiliate reporter who created a documentary about the Dodge tragedy," he said. "He will be talking about his

...continued from page 11 Research Centre for skilled trades programs.

Enaadmaagehjik, the Wikwemikong Development Commission, will receive funding \$1,338,782 to support the growth of the community's first light industrial park, leading to the maximization of economic opportunities and to the creation of middle-class jobs. The band will also hire an intern for a two-year period to work as an information and comtechnology munication business support officer.

The Manitoulin Tourism Association will receive \$33,525 in funding to support the development and implementation of a sustainable tourism management action plan. This will form help strategic alliances between industry stakeholders and will identify destination management best practices and promotional strategies to enhance tourism and economic growth throughout

The Split Rail Brewing Company, situated in Gore Bay, continues to expand, and a repayable FedNor investment of \$66,600 will lead to increased productivity through improved water efficiency, and energy reduced packaging costs, and enhanced quality control. The initiative will allow the owners to purchase and install new equipment and adopt new technology that will open fresh distribution and retail markets and include gaining access to The Beer Store and the LCBO.

The Township of Billings so received FedNor monies of \$818,276 to boost tourism and spur economic growth. This will enable the municipality to implement phase one of its waterfront revitalization project, which will see major improvements to the local docks and will create an additional 12 slips. As well, a diesel fueling facility and septic system will be installed. Power pedestals will be installed to provide lighting, power, and water to the existing docks at the Austin Hunt Marina and larger docks will be installed at the Small Craft Basin.

Government of The Canada is also investing \$100,000 in the Dawson Citizens Improvement Association (DCIA) to modernize the Meldrum Bay marina and campground to help entice boater and recreational vehicle enthusiasts from southern Ontario and the United States to visit the area. Specifically, the investment will support the installation of a new, above ground. double-walled, dual-chamber, 2,000-litre tank for gasoline and diesel fuel, as well as a new 2,000gallon-capacity sewage holding tank and pump out system to accommodate

boats and RVs. A second access point from the marina to Highway 540 will also be established.

Sheguiandah First Nation will also receive FedNor funds. The amount of \$15,907 will be used to help complete a feasibility study to support business development on its recently purchased agricultural property. The study will help maximize the economic potential of the 131 acres of farmland by identifying community-owned businesses that could utilize the land to create new employment and generate positive economic benefits for the community

The Waubetek Business Development Corporation, situated on Birch Island, also received a Government of Canada investment for \$234,000. This will allow the coordination and undertaking of regional economic and business development projects for a three-year period. Specifically, this targeted investment will support Indigenous youth leadership, Indigenous women's entrepreneurship programs, as well as the implementation of the Aboriginal Fisheries Strategy. The project will also support the implementation of an aquaculture business development and regional mining strategy, as well as the proposed Centre of Excellence for Indigenous Mineral Devel-

Willie keeps busy with volunteer work at the Manitoulin Lodge. "I do paperwork for them and help with special events." Both Willie and Jim go to the United Church and participate in regular activities there." Jim sings in the Choir for the United Church in Silver Water and he is a member of the Masonic Lodge in Gore Bay. "These days I



"You've done so much; we look up to you and can only hope for that kind of life," Ms. Hughes said. "The amount of people here is a testament to you. Happy century!"

Fellow Assiginack Historical Society board member Dave Smith also gave his birthday wishes from the board, known locally, he joked, as the 'Assiginack Hysterical Society.'

"Jean was one of the founding members but she was a mere 37 when it was founded in 1955," Mr. Smith recounted. "Even then, she was one of the movers and shakers of this community, dances with live music. The committee was horrified as they only had \$67 to their name. Bev Maguire, treasurer, told Ms. McLennan there would be no piano; the order must be cancelled. "To this day the old barn remains piano-less."

"She also took a great interest in Michael's Bay," Mr. Smith continued, sharing the story of travelling annually to the historic townsite by horse and buggy with Ms. McLennan to place name markers on gravesites.

For this work, and so

much more, Mr. Smith announced that a bench in Ms. McLennan's name would be placed on the museum grounds "in recognition of the time and expertise she gives, and still gives."

"Her attitude is always to give to community," Mr. Smith added. "I challenge young people to be a Jean McLennan; that is the greatest birthday gift you could give to Jean.'

Former Assiginack reeve and Manitowaning businessman Dave Ham has sat on many a committee with

Ms. McLennan and also spoke to her community mindedness.

"My goodness," Mr. Ham began, "Jean has always had a project or two, or three, or four, all at the same time."

He told the story of a fire that razed the old Manitowaning arena in 1960 "on a cold January night; a devastating thing for the community. Who jumped up to get it back but Jean, working with council," he shared.

"She got together a gang














### Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute proudly holds the 2018 graduation ceremonies





Wow, we finally received some long awaited rain. I could feel the plants in my garden just opening up their leaves to absorb the moisture and laughing with glee. So was I, because, even with the watering, the garden just wasn't growing like it would with a good rainfall. My red currant bush produced very little this season, about one cup full, but enough to make some muffins which were delicious.

#### **Blueberry Oat** Muffins

I used one cup red currants and one cup fresh blueberries. Instead of brown sugar I switched it to coconut and date sugar. When you use either of the coconut or date sugar I find the sweetness cut in half. I also added hemp and black sesame seeds for extra crunch.

2 cups fresh or frozen blueberries

2 cups Loon Song oats or large flaked oats

1 cup chopped walnuts or substitute with your favourite nuts or seeds

2 cups skim milk, coconut, soy, or almond milk

1 cup all-purpose flour or spelt (I didn't use white just spelt)

1 cup whole wheat or spelt

flour

3 tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp baking soda

1 cup light brown sugar or

date or coconut

1/2 tsp cinnamon

2 tsp grated orange 2/3 cup sun flower seed or

coconut oil

2 eggs

# Visiting Manitoulin?

### Traditional and contemporary Anishinaabe

by Isobel Harry

M'CHIGEENG—The modern architectural form of the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation (OCF), fully situated in the present, pays homage to the everlasting traditions of the Anishinaabek—the Odawa, Ojibwe and Potawatomi of Manitoulin Island and the Great Lakes region.

Light permeates the open circular atrium that forms the heart of the entryway and of the building itself. Towering cedar poles buttress the room's soaring canopy, lifting the

cedar poles buttress the room's soaring canopy, lifting the









spirit in the upward gaze. Activities radiate likes spokes from a wheel in offices, a large workshop and activities area, a Healing Lodge, also circular, that holds a sacred fire for ceremonies, Ojibwe language radio station CHYF-FM and a museum that reflects on the inexorable links between traditional creative expression and modern manifestations of Anishinaabek art.

Upon entering the OCF's museum, a large dreamcatcher bathed in soft spotlight compels the visitor to consider the meanings it conjures. Originally crafted by Ojibwe mothers to protect sleeping children from harm, the dreamcatcher still acts as a symbolic filter, trapping evil and letting good flow through wherever it is hung. This dreamcatcher, in forged steel by M'Chigeeng steelworker artist Kathryn Corbiere, evokes the traditional uses and construction of this beloved cultural emblem, but seems imbued with even more than the usual resistance in its use of materials, perhaps in response to increasing modern threats to the environment, and thus to identity and

A beautiful work of art, Ms. Corbiere's Dreamcatcher is hung near the museum's entry doors, a powerful sentinel, a steely reminder of what endures, its metal web perhaps shredding malevolent spirits to bits, allowing only positivity to pass into the museum experience beyond. Lillian's Museum is adjacent to Lillian's Crafts on Highway 540 in M'Chigeeng First Nation. A donation gains entry to a storehouse of traditional Anishinaabe arts and crafts collected over more than 50

We pause before two glass cases, each displaying an elaborately beaded1870s 'bandolier bag' gifted to the OCF; with a flat bag in front conceived "to show off a big panel of beaded design," according to Ms. Beam, the bandolier has a wide beaded strap diagonally crossing the chest to one shoulder.

Anishinaabe bandolier bags, modeled on rifle bags worn by Europeans, "evolved with increasing trade in the Great Lakes region and the acquisition of new materials such as cotton and wool cloth, beads and ribbons." The tiny glass 'seed beads,' sewn densely in elaborate patterns onto cotton, wool or hide backing by the women, carpeted the bags in symbolic imagery and dazzling colour to be worn ceremonially by the men. "Beads allowed for curves in patterns where before, the use of quills did not," says Anong Beam. "The signature floral patterns on these bags were made possible by the flexibility of the newly available materials.'

Beyond the antique bags, another bag is displayed close by, 'beaded' by contemporary artist Barry Ace, using salvaged computer components and copper wire to form complex floral motifs based on traditional designs. Says the artist: "I am referencing Anishinaabeg beadwork as a metaphor for cultural continuity, bridging the past with the present and the future, and as a demonstrable act of nationhood, resistance and modernity. My contemporary practice intentionally, yet respectfully, transcends and moves forward conventional Anishinaabeg cultural boundaries as a confluence between the historical and contemporary.'

Confluence is felt in all the Museum's exhibits: in the art of Christian Chapman, entitled 'Kings and Queens,' that fuses silkscreen onto Woodlands-style paintings, in the traditional jingle dress side by side with one silkscreened all over in small faces, in the quill box made by Mamie Migwans and designed by Carl Beam ("she was the first to use toned-down colours in quill work," says Anong) and in the large display of contemporary quill, black ash and textile art by members of today's community next to a wall-size interactive introduction to Anishinaabe life precepts.

Anong Beam scans the visually evocative space: "With Anishinaabe art, there is a constant push for new expression. The push comes from a desire to build bridges between traditional and contemporary expressions, to show them together in a continuum of creativity.

A stone's throw from the OCF, around the corner and east on Hwy 540, is the unmissable Lillian's Museum, a dedicated space attached to Lillian's Crafts' large shop that holds owner Lillian Debassige's prized 70-odd-yearold collection of Anishinaabe arts and crafts.

A big room is arrayed from floor to ceiling in unique pieces of local Anishinaabe art dating back to the 1940s: rare ash baskets woven with consummate dexterity and intricate quill boxes with lifelike animals and plants tufted in quills by artists Anne Pangowish, Rose Williams, Josette Debassige, Mildred and Melanie Aguonie and many others whose work is preserved here for posterity.

The distinctive and highly collectable paintings of Wiikwemkoong artist Leland Bell line the back wall; ceramic bowls, beaded hide moccasins with fur trim and skillful carvings of antler and bone, going back many decades,

line glass cases. Lillian's collection is far reaching but intimate, inviting viewers to appreciate the age-old techniques, materials and designs used in the creation of these cultural treasures.






