Sea plane crashes in Gore Bay harbour

Pilot unharmed

GORE BAY—What was meant to be a quick trip for Richard Peever took a turn for the worse when his plane was buffeted by the wind and ended upside-down during a routine takeoff from the Gore Bay harbour.

"I came in this morning (Friday) at 12:30 for the dedication,' stated Mr. Peever, president of Huron District Contracting in Goderich, which was responsible for the Gore Bay breakwater building project.

"I was preparing to leave north to south (like I had come in) but the winds were gusting around the point, and it caught me under the left wing," Mr. Peever told The Expositor. "I was heading out far enough to come back into the wind about 1/2 mile out. One gust kind of lifted it a bit and I got that under control but before I could slow down another one got me and the wind tipped across and then it just barrel rolled.'

Thanks to Mr. Peever's preparedness and clear mind, he escaped unharmed.

"I had my seatbelt on and lifejacket on. I just waited until the water came up and just opened the door.

Maurice Bachand and his wife were swimming when they saw ... continued on page 10

Northeast Town earmarks land gift from Fielding family for seniors' housing with donor's blessings

Land adjacent to Manor valued at nearly \$700,000

by Robin Burridge LITTLE CURRENT—Lily Field-ing and her family have donated a portion of land located adjacent to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor and Channel View Apartments to the Northeast Town to support the development of affordable senior housing in the municipality. The gift represents the largest private donation to the community in its history.

"August 19 will be my grandmother's (Lily's) 100th birthday and she wanted to support some special initiatives for her 100th year," Jeff Wallace said to The Expositor on behalf of his grandmother and family. "She has a subscription to The Expositor and reads it diligently. She learned of the need for senior housing from the recent articles in the paper and wanted to help. La Cloche and Manitoulin is very near to her heart—it's her favourite place in

Ian McCauley dies 11 years after daughter's drowning death

by Robin Burridge M'CHIGEENG-On Saturday, July 23, 41-yearold Ian McCauley of M'Chigeeng First Nation drowned in Whitefish Lake (also known as Otter Lake), two days before the 11-year anniversary of his daughter Alicia's drowning.

In the early morning of July 23, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and the United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising (UCCMM) Anishnaabe Police responded to a report of a drowning on Whitefish in M'Chigeeng Lake Nation. Mr. First

McCauley and a group were on the lake in a pontoon boat. Witnesses reported that Mr. McCauley dove into the lake and didn't resurface. The OPP Underwater Search and Recovery Unit (USRU), a helicopter from the OPP Avia-

tion Services and an OPP Marine Unit were called in to assist. The USRU recovered the body of Mr. McCauley. The coroner has ordered a post mortem examination and the OPP North East **Region Crime Unit and** the UCCM Police Crime

Unit are assisting with investigation. the Reports indicate that there were no life jackets on the boat and alcohol was a factor in the drowning.

On July 25, 2005, Mr. McCauley and his wife Crystal McCauley lost their seven-year-old daughter Alicia Marie Violet McCauley who drowned in West Bay.

Alicia was found unconscious in four feet of water near the beach in West Bay and could not be resuscitated. She had been swimming with a friend and her older sister when difficulties arose while the three were playing in the

GORE BAY—The trial for Green Bay farmer Paul Skippen opened Monday, July 25 in the Provincial Offences Act courtroom in Gore Bay with the room filled with Skippen supporters including farmers and members of Island fish and game clubs.

Mr. Skippen faced four charges

for the unlawful shooting of a Canada goose outside of the hunting period under the Migratory Birds Convention 1994. These charges included unlawfully hunting a migratory bird outside of the open season, failing to immediately make every effort to retrieve a migratory bird, unlaw-

SHEGUIANDAH—An early evening fire on Friday, July 22 destroyed the Sheguiandah home of Alicia McCutcheon and Aaron Case.

"We received a call at approximately 6:15 pm," said Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey. "By the time our first truck arrived at about 6:24 it was fully engulfed and through the roof already.

The fire team was on the site

until 9:30 pm. "We had a couple of situations at the same time," noted the fire chief. "There were a couple of 200-pound propane tanks that were screaming at us and with the strong winds we had a couple of grass fires start up from flying embers that we had to deal with."

The propane tanks presented a particular hazard. "We set up unmanned nozzles to keep the water on them as they burned off," noted Mr. Bailey.

Northeast Town to leave Manitoulin **Planning Board**

NORTHEAST TOWN—The Northeast Town will be leaving the Manitoulin Planning Board (MPB) and becoming its own planning authority, said Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin, following a letter from minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) Bill Mauro last week.

"We have been working on this (leaving the planning board) for a while now, so we are pretty happy that we have finally been given approval," said Mayor MacNevin. "The MMAH staff will be working with our staff and the planning board on a transition plan for us to pull away and establish our own planning authority."

Mayor MacNevin said he was unsure of the number of members that would be on the new Northeast Town planning board, but that it would be made up of the municipality's councillors.

We will be staying with the MPB until our Official Plan is approved," added the mayor. "Right now the MMAH and the various ministries are making comments on the draft OP and going back to our staff and our consulting firm JR Richards, but we believe the OP should be ready by September."

"Over the past several years, the Northeast Town has expressed ongoing concerns with its membership on the MPB and a desire to become its own independent planning authority," said the letter to the Northeast Town from Minister Mauro, which was carbon copied to the MPB and the mayors and reeves of Manitoulin. "The town has formally requested that I permit its removal from the planning board and grant it planning approval authority. Despite the considerable efforts of all involved, I understand that the board and the town have been unsuccessful in reaching a mutually-acceptable resolution of ...continued on page 8



M'Chigeeng murder trail date set for November

M'CHIGEENG-Kimel Corbiere will stand trial for the first degree murder of M'Chigeeng elder Johnny Panamick in November, The Expositor has learned.

On Sunday, May 14, 2014, Johnny Panamick was found in his M'Chigeeng home by a neighbour, severely injured. The neighbour called 911 and Mr. Panamick was brought to the Manitoulin Health Centre then airlifted to Health Sciences North in Sudbury. Nearly one month later, on June 13, Mr. Panamick died from his injuries. On July 17, 2014, Kimel Cor-

biere of Mindemoya was charged with the murder of Mr. Panamick and has been serving time in a correctional facility ever since.

Jury selection for the trail will take place on November 28 with the trial to start on November 29. Three weeks have been slated for the trail, expected to end on December 16.

Clinton Haggart, who has been charged with seven counts of arson in Little Current, with all of the fires taking place between June and August 2014, will also likely see a trial date set next month.

Private public partnerships are enriching Manitoulin

The use of private and publicly-owned property is sometimes a contentious matter, a fact driven home by the current threat of the withdrawal of crucial privately-owned Manitoulin Island properties from Manitoulin Snowdusters Snowmobile Club and Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs trail use.

Two events this past week speak to the benefits of a cooperative model with examples of both private land becoming public and of the augmented use of private lands, to the benefit of the larger community.

In the case of the private land coming into public (municipal) hands, this refers to a gift from Mrs. Lily Fielding (widow of Cliff Fielding) on behalf of the Fielding family of nearly three acres adjacent to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor and Channelview Apartments properties in Little Current, overlooking Low Island Park and the North Channel.

The land, which had 50 years ago been gifted to the town along with the Low Island Park property by the Little Current Lions Club, had eventually been sold by the town for the development of condominium-style housing by the private sector.

This particular parcel changed hands twice more before coming to the Fielding family and Mrs. Fielding decided to deed it back to the municipality.

Because of its location and proximity to existing seniors' services, the municipality has announced it is earmarking the land for potentially new seniors' housing.

This is appropriate because Dr. Roy Jeffery has recently begun to campaign for assisted living housing in Little Current. He chose Little Current as a location because he felt some services (dietary, food preparation, laundry) could be provided by the Manitoulin Centennial Manor which could, in turn, profit from such an arrangement.

What an appropriate gift of particularly useful real estate, because of its location, to a municipality.

A few days later, at Norton's Creek just where it travels under the Bidwell Road, a dedication was made to the memory of the late owner of the property that contains all of this small creek which goes on to flow into Lake Manitou.

The late Bob Hutton had purchased the property and then he and

his family had worked diligently with the Manitoulin Streams organization to bring back Norton's Creek to the brook trout spawning grounds it once was.

This was Mr. Hutton's dream: he provided the stream and Manitoulin Streams provided the expertise. The stream is now a brook trout sanctuary and in a few short years of planting eggs, several generations and age categories now inhabit the creek and also Lake Manitou where they have become a viable species for anglers. The adult brook trout are now returning to Norton's Creek to spawn and so the cycle continues.

The memorial to Mr. Hutton includes a monument attesting to his vision but the Hutton family has also built an outdoor classroom on their property just off the Bidwell Road where students from area schools can come and help out with the egg planting process (that is, for the time being, continuing) and where they can also be taught about the fish's life cycle in the creek and, as adult fish, in the adjacent lake.

These are two recent examples of private-public partnerships working to the larger community's advantage.

There have been several other of these, often involving streams: the walleye spawning zone, also a sanctuary along Bass Creek between Sheguiandah Bay and the Bass Lake dam beside Highway 6, is an example.

This has been a cooperative arrangement between the Little Current Fish and Game Club and Manitoulin Streams that has seen a successful and strong walleye/pickerel fishery re-emerge in Sheguiandah Bay, once again augmenting the tourist economy.

Along the Blue Jay Creek and Manitou River, neighbouring farmers have cooperated with the upgrading of these water bodies as a rainbow trout and salmon spawning grounds and this has also been the case along the Mindemoya River between the Lake Mindemoya contral dam and the river's mouth at Providence Bay where, once again, the river has been augmented by Manitoulin Streams with the cooperation of neighbouring landowners.

Manitoulin is by far the richer for these cooperative ventures for they all are serving to add value to this important and unique Island.

An open letter to Central council on the fate of Wagg's Wood

<u>It was worth preserving</u>

Dear Mayor Stephens and members of council, I am adding my voice to those concerned about the decision to sell some of Mindemoya's forest parkland.

I have been to Wagg's Woods many times since returning to live in Mindemoya in 2003. The trail lacks the professionalism we see in many trails these days, but I was glad the forest had been set aside for conservation and recreation. I thought someday it would be fixed up, but at least it was there, it was worth preserving, it had potential.

It still does. An old yellow birch, the biggest tree I've ever seen on Manitoulin, is still there. The creekbed is littered with fascinating fossils. And in this hardwood forest, there are always pleasant surprises, like the jack in the pulpits I found in the spring or the partridge I spotted a few days ago. The public hasn't been informed as to the amount of proceeds of the sale, but whatever the amount, it would be some comfort if the money was dedicated to making improvements to the remaining 42 acres of Wagg's Woods. A more prominent entrance with perhaps a picnic spot would help. I've spoken to many local people who don't seem to know it's there. I can imagine better trails, with a few benches, signage identifying the 20 species of trees in the woods and stone stairs leading up a bluff to another trail at the south end, perhaps even a lookout...and so on. Perhaps shrubs on the periphery would help esthetically. The Municipality could start by taking up the Manitoulin Nature Club's offer to help develop a plan and improve the trails, as they said in a recent letter (published in The Expositor July 13) and hire professionals too. Misery Bay Provincial Park and Bebamikawe Memorial Trail in Wikwemikong are two lovely Island trails that could inspire ideas

Energy Minister Thibeault chastised by the PC leader

Average Ontario household now pays \$1,000 extra a year for electricity

To the Expositor:

Minister of Energy Glenn Thibeault's refusal to call the impact of Ontario's skyrocketing hydro rates on rural and Northern customers a "crisis" proves just how out of touch the Wynne Liberal Government has become.

I have visited Northern Ontario 18 times over the last two years, and with every single visit, I hear story after story about the impacts of Ontario's skyrocketing energy rates on businesses and families.

I've met with seniors who are being forced to choose between eating and heating their homes. Floyd Lockyer

Floyd and Lila Lockyer live in a beautiful brick home on the corner of Little Current's Campbell and Worthington Streets in a house this writer has admired for years for its charm, the impeccably manicured lawn, finely trimmed bushes and shapely trees. It is the perfect home to sit on a popular corner across from St Bernard's Catholic Church. Young Floyd grew up in this town and hockey was a vital component of his early years. He was a member of the Little Current Flyers. Floyd left school at 16 for a great summer job at Okeechobee Lodge, later followed by a satisfying career with the MTO where he ultimately became 'Area Patrol Supervisor.'

Floyd Autrel was born on May 26, 1933 to Clifford and Anne Lockyer in their Vankoughnet home. He was named after his father's good friend, Autrel Wilkinson. Floyd was a younger sibling to Betty and Audrey (Toots McDermid). Sally (LaChapelle) and brother Dean would be added later. Clifford worked at Richie's Grocery Store where the TD Bank is today. His love of hockey and fishing surely inspired his son. Anne worked in her garden and loved to cook. She was an enthusiastic member of the Anglican Church.

Floyd had many friends and he was an active supporter of his community. When he was seven, a buddy offered to give him a dog. He accepted the gift and quietly brought his new friend home. where he hid him in a small shed. Despite his best efforts, the dog was found by the family before Floyd had gathered enough intestinal fortitude to bring the subject up. "Although he was a big dog, he was very friendly and I was overjoyed when the rest of the family seemed to like him. I was very grateful that my newly adopted pet was allowed to stay.

As mentioned, Floyd was passionate about hockey. He was Assistant Captain for the Flyers when Bill Cunningham was Captain. "Our team coveted the McGovern Cup for the Island. For a few years, Blind River and Espanola teams joined our league but it seems that they had unfair advantage. Some of their players joined semi-professional teams and later returned to play for the North Shore teams in our league. They consistently beat our teams until one year when we played our hearts out and one of our teams got the trophy back. There was a decision to keep the cup on Manitoulin after that. We had a fine coach, Don Cooper, who put a lot of effort into his teams for many years. He was a vital part of getting the McGovern Cup back to Manitoulin."

"The first day of school was rather eventful because we were all sent home," Floyd points out. "I don't remember what our small



ers and uniforms back in the '40s and '50s.

At season's end in 1949, Mr. Reg. Stansbury, the owner of Okeechobee Lodge surprised Floyd with a trip to Toronto. "He offered me a week of holidays. I thrilled. was 1 packed up and got down to the train station in Little Current. In Toronto, I was picked up by Mrs. Stansbury. She drove me to their farm in Markham. On the way, we stopped at a men's store and I was measured up for a fine blue suit.

They had horses at the farm and Floyd was encouraged to ride them. During the week Mr. Stansbury decided

to buy two new Ford Floyd and Lila in the mid-1950s. Meteors. "He asked

me to drive one of them home for him. That was an added thrill. The week went by pretty fast. Just as Mrs. Stansbury was getting ready to take me back to the train bound for Manitoulin, her husband called me over. 'Here's a little something for you.' He handed me a \$100 bill. I was astounded and thanked them very much for the wonderful trip and all the gifts.'


The following summer of 1950, Floyd, by then 17, got summer work at Ontario Hydro, helping to lay the power lines between Manitowaning and Wiky. After that job was done, the teen expected to go with the Hydro team to Kirkland Lake but his boss said "no, but someone will contact you." It was winter and hockey season when

Vankoughnet home, which was newly finished. In the early 1970s, they moved to the corner of

Campbell and Worthington Streets. A beautiful brick exterior was chosen, both for beauty and low maintenance. Floyd could help with much of the construction but a bricklayer was hired to do the vast exterior of the building. "I have always wanted a brick house so this was perfect."

The couple had two children, Tammy and David. Tammy has retired as an office manager for the OPP and now lives in Toronto. David is a shop foreman for Manitoulin Transport in Toronto. He has two girls, Shannon who works in administration for the RCMP in Toronto and Mabayla who is just nineyears-old and is still a student.

Floyd had grown up in Little Current and he was well-known, so he was not surprized when Bid Smith,

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endowed with a great sense of humour, put a snake on the seat of his parked car one day. Floyd was shopping at the AJ Smith Hard-ware store. "I was startled to find the snake but I quickly realized how it had got there. Bid enjoyed playing a few pranks from time to time; I'm sure he felt they helped to make life more interesting and they surely did.'

Working for the MTO as Highway General Foreman kept Floyd away from Manitoulin most weeks. "I would head home Friday night and get back Sunday night. It was a bit stressful being away so much, but we had some fun too. The truck rodeos were very successful." Floyd got quite talented at manoeuvering his truck. The MTO put on several truck rodeos including one in Sudbury in October of 1962 as well as one on Manitoulin and another in Toronto. Floyd did quite well in the Toronto Rodeo. "That was immensely rewarding. I loved being in my truck and was gratified at driving it in a skillful way that was appreciated by the MTO.' "Later when the job as patrolman came up on the Island I decided to take it so I could be closer to family. Being away so much was not good. Moving home meant a cut in pay, but I was happier. In 1969 I became Area Patrol Supervisor for road maintenance until my retirement in 1989. I oversaw all the numbered highways on Manitoulin, up to Espanola. This entailed the repairing of roads with their limitless potholes."

"I recall one outfit from Huntsville that had been sent up to paint the lines on a section of road we had just rebuilt with new pavement, between Little Current and Honora. They arrived and did their job one afternoon. When I got to work the next morning, one of the crew asked me if I had checked out Hwy 540 at all. I said 'no, why?' 'You should go and check it out,' he advised, so I drove down to inspect their work and when I got there, I couldn't believe my eyes."

"This zone painting crew had zig-zagged all over the road with that yellow line. It was a terrible job." Floyd headed back to the vard and saw the Huntsville crew gearing up to finish their work. 'We had a rather heated discussion and I wound up sending them home. The lines had to be sand-blasted off and redone." Floyd was teased for some time, about that job done under his watch. At his retirement party, an ongoing joke was about the snakes that had gotten into the paint on that job.

Close to his retirement date, another issue rose to prominence at the MTO. "Yards were being consolidated and some closures were made as well as some relocations. There were two salt sheds in Meldrum Bay and they were slated to be moved to Silverwater to the Priddle Rock area. This seemingly benign move created a lot of animosity. People just don't like change. I was 56 and it was

1989, late in my career. Being a negotiator to such passionate controversy was enough to encourage early retirement."

When the dust finally settled, Floyd did retire and enjoyed the prospect of no more arbitrations or negotiations. "Nevertheless, I had enjoyed my many years with the MTO; there were lots of times we celebrated completing a job and feeling proud that we made Manitoulin roads a little safer."

For his retirement party Floyd was handed a huge green rock named 'Priddle Rock' with the caption,

toulin was presented to F.

'Porky' Lockyer by his coworkers on June 17, 1989; Both symbolic of his unerring dedication to his Highway Patrols and to his beloved Island. God's Blessings.'

After his retirement, Floyd decided to take things easy. He worked around the home, cutting grass and doing odd jobs, but he felt he needed to do more. He had joined the local council in 1988, staying for three terms. But the council work still left some free time. The entrepreneur started a part-time aluminum siding business, buying his materials in Sudbury and then returning to the Island for installations. "I fixed up quite a few houses in town," he adds. "and did some roofing as well." He was on the Resident Landfill Committee for NEMI and in his spare time, he was also a Mason. "I have been part of the Masonic Lodge for 55 years and I enjoy my time with the Brothers." "I guess an important event in my working life was coming to that cross-road decision when I left sailing the big lakers and made a career move with the MTO. I have never regretted this decision. A good salary for 36 years and now a good pension with benefits, starting at age 56, have been rewarding and given us a feeling of security. "Summer is my favourite time of the year. Weather is good and we enjoy the warmth. In 1988, a few months before retirement, we bought a place in Florida so we could enjoy warm winters too. We loved Florida and drove there

group of kids had done to offend Mrs. Siry, but she was upset and all of us got out early and nobody got the strap." Later, in high school, Latin was the subject Floyd disliked the most. "I could not understand why we had to learn this ancient language that only priests used. I decided I was not going to learn it and I skipped the exam. I left school part-way through Grade 12 and started to work.'

Okeechobee Lodge hired him for a dream job. "I got to run the speedboat from the mainland to the lodge. Guests would arrive to the nearest spot on the mainland, park their cars and then be escorted by boat to their lodgings. I loved that work. Okeechobee Lodge was a busy place. On any given day, you would see five or six float planes and 40 to 50 yachts. I remember the Fruehauf family coming for a meal by boat from Killarney." They were famous for manufacturing heavy truck trail-

the MTO finally called and offered a job. Floyd could work from home and still play hockey.

The following summer Floyd and a few friends decided to try a stint on the big boats. "We got hired onto the 'Laketon', an iron ore and coal boat that travelled between Thunder Bay and Cleveland. I didn't really like this work so left after three months. I couldn't find my 'sailor's legs' and had fought nausea much of the time. The rough water helped me realize I wasn't cut out to be a sailor."

Floyd spent another summer at Okeechobee then went back to the MTO to his foreman Denny Callaghan and asked if he could come back. Danny had told him if the sailing job didn't work out to give him a call. "An opening came up in August and I stayed for 36 years, later moving up to 'Patrolfor Hindmans of Owen Sound," Lila explains. "My mum was Ellen (Moggy) and my brothers are: Earling who lives in the Manor, Bud and Norman, who have died. Ted. retired on Lake Manitou and my youngest brother, Harley. He lives in Little Current on Vankoughnet St, in the house Floyd and I built after we were married.'

The couple was wed on September 12, 1956 at the United Church in Manitowaning. "We had about 60 guests and all went well, apart from the rain. But they say it is lucky to have rain on your wedding." A supper was held at the Bass Creek Resort on Lake Manitou in the Bidwell area. The honevmoon took them to Toronto and on to Niagara Falls, the perfect place to celebrate nuptials. When they got back, they moved into the

Haweater incidents down from 2012, OPP aims to top 2015 stats

LITTLE CURRENT—This is Community Services Officer Constable Steve Hart's first Haweater Weekend on the job in his new role with the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, but the pre-long weekend message is the same—the OPP will be taking a zero tolerance approach to all things under the law this weekend.

Constable Hart urged drivers to be aware that RIDE checks will be conducted all weekend long and at varying times of the day and that drinking and drugged driving is never okay and officers will be out in full force, keeping Manitoulin roads safe.

As well as officers in patrol cars, members of the OPP will be keeping Island waterways safe through the marine unit while other officers will be travelling through our streets and parks on foot, bicycle and on ATV.

On the topic of ATVs, The Expositor questioned the OPP's practice last year of having ATVs travel through pedestrian thoroughfares and through family friendly events. This caused a great deal of upset last year, and was noted in the pages of this newspaper and its online resources by many festivalgoers. Constable Hart explained that the OPP had met with municipal officials and the Little Current Lions Club over the course of the year and said that a change in the use of ATVs will be dictated ahead of time. "The when and where will be different," he said.

Constable Hart explained that the operational requirements of the OPP fluctuate based on the statistics from the last five years. He noted that 2009 and 2011 were bad years with many calls, but from 2012 to 2015 there were no impaired drivers, nor were there any criminal incidents at any of the venues. An increase in police presence has been seen since 2012 due to the increase of incidents in 2009 and 2011.

"The method of policing has also changed," Constable Hart continued. "Officers are encouraged to get out and engage with the public, making themselves more accessible at the same time.'

"Just visibility has an affect on discouraging public disorder," he added.

In 2009, there were 107 incidents, in 2011, 177 incidents and by 2015, 92 incidents. In 2011 police laid 109 Provincial Offences Acts charges and last year, that number was down to 47.

'Those calls are coming down because of the actions we've taken," the constable said, "and thanks to the zero tolerance approach taken."

"It would be nice to see zero offences, but we'll keep working on that," Constable Hart said.

On the evening of July 11 the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service received a call of a vicious dog attack on the M'Chigeeng First Nation. A 64-year-old female resident and her dog were walking by a residence on Old Highway 551 when a two-year-old bull mastiff escape its compound and attempted to attack the small dog. The victim picked up her small dog and the bull mastiff continued the attack and bit the victim. The victim sustained a large bite wound to her right torso and received numerous stitches to repair the wound as a result of the attack. A 62-year-old man from M'Chigeeng First Nation was charged under the Dog Owners Liability Act because of the attack and was summoned to Provincial Offences Court on the September 1 in Gore Bay. The UCCM Police Service would like to remind dog owners that they are liable for damages resulting from a bite or attack on another person or domestic animal.

"After careful consideration of the information provided to me, I will reluctantly consider redefining the planning area to exclude the (Northeast) Town, the effect of which will be that the town will no longer be a member of the planning board," continued Minister Mauro. "I will also consider delegating approval authority for land-division applications to the town and consider exemption the town from minister's approval of Official Plan amendments. I have directed staff to prepare the draft documents that would put in place these changes for my review. Please note, however, that any changes would be conditional upon the town's Official Plan coming into effect."

The Expositor was unable to reach MPB Chair Ken Noland, but did speak with founding MPB member and Billings representative on the board, Billings Mayor Auz Hunt.

"I'm rather sorry to see this happen," said Mayor Hunt. "The MPB has been together for 40 years and was working well for 40 years—it's a shame to break it up. We started the planning board after the war (WWII). We, the other municipalities and ours, were concerned about new development. We were getting a lot of new summer development and didn't have common rules and regulations in place."

Mayor Hunt also noted how the Northeast Town's contribution to the planning board's finances, based on assessment, is one-third of the planning board's overall budget and how the loss will be felt financially by the other municipal members of the board.

MPB Secretary-Treasurer Elva Carter said that it "was far to early" to know the

ramifications of this decision on the MPB.

"The letter is somewhat vague," said Ms. Carter. "It seems like there are still several hoops that they (the Northeast Town) will have to go through (until they are granted their own planning authority). We have a way to go before it is finalized."

The Northeast Town staff is to be contacted by regional ministry staff shortly to arrange a meeting to discuss next steps.

...continued from page 3 fire," she said. Ms. McCutcheon asked her neighbour if she had called 911 (she had) when her mind turned to her pets.

"We have three cats," she said.

Two of the pets have since been located. Ms. McCutcheon's father Rick McCutcheon discovered one walking down the road in Sheguiandah while another greeted him as he pulled in the driveway to set out food in hopes of finding them that same night. One cat, Bunny, which is deaf, is still unaccounted for. "She is a really good hunter so we are still hopeful she is said alright," Ms. McCutcheon.

Cliff Jewell drove Ms. McCutcheon out to the "It was fully scene. engulfed when I got there,' she recalled. Concerned friends and neighbours began to arrive as word spread of the fire.

"There were some very kind boaters who were stranded by the fire trucks blocking the road who gave me some water to

drink.' said Ms. McCutcheon, who was beginning to feel overwhelmed by emotion and was badly dehydrated. "I went down to the government docks and just sat there and waited.'

Ms. McCutcheon's partner Aaron was at work in Gore Bay at the time of the fire

The aftermath of the fire is beginning to really sink in to the family now that the initial shock has worn off and there are a million details to deal with.

"Dawn Madahbee was kind enough to pick up Rudy's medicine (one of the cats suffers from blastomycosis) from Sudbury and we have been dealing with the fact that all of our clothing was in the house," she said. "Our friends and family have been so good to us," she added.

The losses are also beginning to come home to roost. Although the couple is insured, there are items that money simply cannot replace. "There was the family piano and a bookcase from the 1850s that was from my dad's family farm in Nobleton and I had received a lot of Bill Trimmer's (Mr. Case's grandfather) memorabilia from the heyday of Manitoulin senior league hockey," she said. Ms. McCutcheon is the editor of and a writer for the Manitoulin Expositor and had written a series on the history of Island hockey. "Those are things that money can't replace. It is kind of a cliché, but you quickly discover that it is true," she said.

The outpouring of support from the community has been somewhat overwhelming, admitted Ms. McCutcheon. "People have been very kind and concerned," she said. "It is a very humbling experience. Aaron and I are just so thankful to everyone who has dropped off a gift or shared a kind word—we just can't thank you all enough."

The cause of the fire remains undetermined. "While the direct cause is undetermined, it appears to have started in the front room," said fire chief Bailey. "We do not believe it to be suspicious.'


into a mystery weight contest.

Area anglers encouraged to be on the lookout for tagged fish

NORTH CHANNEL-Manitoulin's anglers are asked to be on the lookout for tagged fish in Lake Huron, Georgian Bay and the North Channel.

"Ontario's anglers have always played a vital role in assisting the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) in providing sound fisheries assessments and management and your help is still required,' states a press release from the MNRF. "In order to learn about population size, fish health and fish movements, the MNRF routinely places tags in fish we capture and live releases during our assessment programs. Of note are tagging projects for walleye and muskellunge in the Spanish River and Delta for 2016 and 2017. If you

should encounter these tags during your angling activities we request that you pay special attention to these fish.

David Gonder, resource management supervisor with the Lake Huron office of the Upper Great Lakes Management Unit, spoke to The Expositor about what the information gathered by the tagged fish is used for.

"Generally, we use the information for population assessments," said Mr. Gonder. "We also gain an understanding of the fish's movement patterns and their rate of movement from the information and insight into the ages of fish.'

not remove the tag and provide the following information: the location of capture, a GPS waypoint is the best, but otherwise as much detail about where the fish was captured; tag number (this information is critical so please make every effort to get the number sequence correct); tag colour, description and locations on the fish's body (a digital photograph of the tag is also helpful); fork length, tip of the mouth with the jaw closed to where the two lobes of the tail join; total length, tip of the mouth with the jaw closed with the tail lobes compressed to give a maximum possible length; and other information such as weight, gear type (angled, trap net, gill net etc.) and DCR (applicable to commercial fishers).

...continued from page 3 time she is sewing and braiding material to make rugs which can be square, rectangular, round or oval.

The party began with a blessing as Joe Fox said the Lord's Prayer in Ojibwe and was followed by a delicious meal that included fresh vegetables and dip, pizza, chili and coconut cream pie.

Grace Fox, a community activist and educator, then told the audience about the work that Ms. Panamick does and showed a large framed braided rug, covered with glass, which is to be hung in the Centre in her honour. At a later day, Ms. Panamick will receive a gift that she can keep at home.

As was explained, Ms. Panamick was born in M'Chigeeng in 1932 and was raised at a camp in the bush and attended elementary school. She later went to Sudbury to work in a restaurant and then moved to Toronto where she completed her high school education and then worked as a sewing machine operator. After several years she returned to M'Chigeeng.

When Ms. Panamick makes her rugs, she is very

exacting about the methods used. She takes the time to colour coordinate each piece and is sure to measure her material exactly right and then she begins the sewing. Next comes the braiding and she makes sure that there are no lumps or twists. When she is finished with the braiding, she decides on the shape she wants and starts sewing, using sinew, a very strong material from the ligaments and tendons of animals. From start to finish and working daily, the finished product takes two to three weeks.

Panamick loves Ms. going to Anishinaabemowin Gamig and is very happy to have people around her. She also sells her braided rugs or table runners and will custom make it to ones liking as the customer picks the colours and shapes and sizes themselves. 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

the accident.

"All you could see was the tail sticking out of the water," Mr. Bachand said. "It went down so fast. But there was a guy at the swimming beach that had a dingy sitting right there and he jumped in his dingy and went. And he said by the time he got there the guy was popping out of the water.'

"I had family and friends down at the boat, Hankyspanky," said Jim Kiviaho. "And (when I saw the plane) I just threw my stuff on the dock and took off running. I used to be a paramedic." Both Mr. Kiviaho and Norm Foster were two of the first people to reach Mr. Peever.

"By the time I got out and on top they were on their way," said Mr. Peever.

After determining there were no injuries, Transport Canada was able to release the scene within an hour. But it was another four hours until the plane was completely removed from the lake and back on dry ground. Ron Campbell of Dad's Sales and Service used his crane to hoist the Cessna 185 Skywagon, letting it drain before righting it.

Mr. Peever said whatever happens next will be up to the insurance company. "We got it out of the water, and there were no oil spills, nothing like that, which was my main concern. And I'll leave it up to them. Who knows.'

Mr. Peever has been flying for at least 10 years. "I enjoy it. And I'll fly again."

On July 19, Ms. McCauley posted on Facebook, "if I can turn back time I would have made sure my daughter had her life jacket on. Her anniversary will soon be upon us and that tragic day will play over and over in my head as it has for several years. And the blame I will forever carry in my heart and soul. The forever guilt is impossible to live with at times and I completely break down and cry and wish that I was gone and not her. We buried our daughter on my husband's birthday and to this day he does not celebrate his day. What keeps me going every day is my children and seeing a part of her in them.'

Sadly, only a few short days after her post, tragedy struck the McCauley

family again with the drowning of Ian.

"This is my life and my forever best friend has left to be with our angel in heaven," Ms. McCauley posted to Facebook on July 23 following her husband's death. "My heart is shattered and I will never forget our life together. You're my heart and soul and there will never be another you. I would give everything to hold you and kiss one more time. Forever my love—forever my friend.³

The Expositor was unable to reach Ms. McCauley but she posted on Monday, "Eleven years today is the first time I felt a pain like no other. My heart was ripped out of my chest and I knew my life would never be the same. God called my Alicia home with him and took a piece of my heart away as well. Now 11 years later he takes the love of my life, the father of my children, an amazing son and brother. My world is at a stand still and I am not sure what to do—I am angry, resentful, pissed off, and so many more feelings I can't even explain. I have went through this once but now twice. How can this happen to my loved ones, to me, to my children? I know they say God only gives you what you can handle but this is just too much. To my two angels, I will have a love for you both like no other and promise to do my best; please guide me when I ask for guidance and visit me often. Sing and dance together and always and know you're my heart and soul.'

The family had not released the details of the service as of press time Monday.

...continued from page 1 the world. She saw the need and had access to land to donate towards the cause. She would like to see the challenge (the lack of senior housing on Manitoulin) addressed.

"Having spent time in the Northeast Town with my family over the years, I am aware of the town's needs for senior housing and welcome the opportunity to be part of the solution to that problem," Ms. Fielding said in a press release. "I am not putting any conditions on the donation. We are giving the property to the town and trusting council to make those decisions that are in the best interest of the municipality.'

"Ms. Fielding and her family have donated approximately three acres of land, valued between \$600,000 and \$700,000, adjacent to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor, overlooking Low Island Park," said Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin at a press conference announcing the dona-tion last week. "We have been trying for some time to develop affordable senior housing and were having difficulty securing funding. This donation is going to help this effort greatly. Lily Fielding and her family believe in supporting the communities that they live and work in and I can't express my gratitude enough for this gracious gift to our municipality. This is an exciting opportunity for our community and I look forward to working with the private sector to create additional housing and support for seniors in our municipality and Manitoulin.'

"I think this donation is fabulous," said Manor board chair and Assiginack Mayor Paul Moffat. "Hopefully something can come together with this and the private sector and we can develop something to help the seniors of Manitoulin. This is a much needed facility and a perfect location. We (the Manor board) will definitely be speaking with Dr. (Roy) Jeffery because this fits his proposal.'

eventually got out of the landlord business and demolished the homes. When the government set up a committee to develop a long-term care home on the Island, Little Current seemed like the best location because it had the infrastructure and the hospital, though the West End was against it and wanted it there. Eventually it was decided that the Manor would be built in Little Current and the town donated the land in the mid '60s with the Manor built in 1967."

...continued from page 3 fully disarming a firearm in the travelled portion of a right of way for public vehicular traffic and knowingly making a false statement to a conservation officer.

Don Williams, the Northeast Region provincial prosecutor for the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), rose at the beginning of the proceedings to announce that the charge of failing to make every reasonable effort to retrieve a migratory bird had been withdrawn with the Crown then having to prove, beyond a reasonable doubt, the three remaining charges.

Rupert Grigull, who lives on Lake Manitou, was the first witness called. Mr. Grigull testified that he was towards the field and was several feet from the ditch. He further said that he heard a shotgun discharge, that it was definitely a shotgun, and that the shotgun is the only legal gun you can use to kill fowl. Mr. Grigull heard three shots and saw one goose on the ground with "its feet moving in death throes."

When asked why he called the MNRF, Mr. Grigull said it was "a blatant disregard for the laws. It was nesting season and out of season." He also said that his wife was afraid and so was he. "I am 100 percent certain that Mr. Skippen was standing on the road," he also added.

Prosecution witness Elizabeth Hercun was also on her way to Little Current via Rockville Road and onto truck's two open doors and called the MNRF because she said, "it is dangerous for people to be shooting in the middle of the road."

Mr. Alison questioned the witness about talking with another witness about the case. Ms. Hercun answered that CO Wood came to her house to talk with her. She also testified that she did not see a gun and did not see a blast of air from the shotgun blast.

Mr. Skippen spoke to The Expositor during a courtroom break and talked about his aversion to geese at times. "They destroyed my barley rop," he said. "The biggest problem is new growth. They pack it down with their feet and they don't just eat off the top, they pull the whole thing out. And if you are growing corn, they pull the seeds out." When asked if farmers receive any compensation at all for these losses, Mr. Skippen replied, "Absolutely no compensation." The case is expected to wrap up today, Wednesday, July 27, in Gore Bay.

"It is a privilege to be in a position of impact," he adds. "We all need to be reminded of where we shine."





Lion Dancers coming to Annual Wikwemikong Cultural Festival

WIKWEMIKONG—For 56 years the Annual Wikwemikong Cultural Festival has been revitalizing the culture and heritage of the Anishinaabe, first as the Wikwemikong Powwow (often referred to as the grandmother of eastern powwows) and later under its current name.

Each year the festival features a cross-cultural sharing, noted Sheena Wassegijig, cultural events co-ordinator for the Wikwemikong Heritage Organization, the hosts and organizers of the festival. "This year it is the Toronto Lion Dancers' Wushu Project, the only national lion dancer cultural sports association recognized by China in Sunday. "It will be sometime between 5 pm and 7 pm, but closer to 5 pm," she said. "So if people want to see the Lion Dance it would be best to be there earlier than later."

The Lion Dance is often mistaken for the Dragon Dance, but the Dragon Dance has only two dancers operating the costume while the Lion Dance requires many dancers within the body of the costume.

Like any major community festival, the Wikwemikong Cultural Festival's continued success depends upon an army of volunteers and the coordinated efforts of many band departments.

"We have it down to a pretty good system now,"

"The judges change fin every year," said Ms. de Wassegijig. "We try to pick Ju the best from the connections we have on the powwow trail." This year the head dancer is a local from sc the Wikwemikong community itself, Elizabeth in Webkamigad, while the head drummer is Gary He Parker from the Towanda Au Seneca Nation in New he York. W

Another novel contest is the Long Hair contest for boys. "That comes from Arizona, where it is very popular," said Ms. Wassegijig.

Specials (sponsored dance competitions) are held to celebrate important life events in the community. "You can submit a request to the committee and they will assess the request," said Ms. Wassegijig. first time author and residential school survivor June Shawanda Richard entitled 'Silent Whispers From Within: My life story from Indian residential school to finding love, family, forgiveness and healing.' "We hope to launch her book at Wikwemikong Heritage Days July 30 to August 1 of this year," said her daughter Darlene Wells. "I say hope, due to time crunch with printer and editor who have assured us that they will meet our deadline.³

The Wikwemikong Cultural Festival runs from Saturday, July 30 through to August 1 and begins at 10 am.

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Canada," she said. "They are coming with three lions, a sound group and a drum group."

The Lion Dance is a form of traditional dance in Chinese culture in which performers mimic a lion's movements in a lion costume. The lion dance is usually performed during the Chinese New Year and other Chinese traditional, cultural and religious festivals. It may also be performed at important occasions such as business opening events, special celebrations or wedding ceremonies, or may be used to honour special guests by the Chinese communities.

"We are really excited about the Lion Dancers," said Ms. Wassegijig, who pointed out the performance will take place on said Ms. Wassegijig. "Everybody pretty much knows what they have to do."

In addition to the many competitive dance categories (the festival functions as a competitive powwow dance demonstration as well) there are specials the dancers have come to expect, but this year there will be an interesting take on the specials. "We are having a cowboy special," said Ms. Wassegijig. "We are inviting people to come out in their best cowboy and cowgirl costume. We hope local farmers will come out to take part."

The dance competitions sport some very serious prize purses and attract many of the best competitors on the powwow trail, as well as some of the most accomplished judges. Among the great events taking place are the Wikwemikong Art Show and a Cultural Pavilion and Saturday morning the competitors in the Miss Wikwemikong (and Junior Warrior) competitions. "There are categories for boys and girls," said Ms. Wassegijig. But it is Miss Wikwemikong that has the option to go on to the Miss Indian World competition in New Mexico.

This year comedian Ryan McMahon will be back in the emcee saddle along with Allan Manitowabi and the famed Whitefish Bay Singers will be also be taking part. Another exciting new event is the launch of a new book by 77-year-old

Aundeck Omni Kaning social worker to recieve 2016 Premier's Award

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—A recent telephone call from the president of Sault College alumni took Darren Madahbee completely by surprise.

"He told me that they were going through the graduates from the social work program at the college and that they thought I would make a fantastic candidate for an Ontario Premier's Award," said Mr. Madahbee, who works for the Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation in the mental health and addictions field. Shortly after that telephone call, Mr. Madahbee received confirmation that he was being awarded a 2016 Ontario Premier's Award for Social Development. Mr. Madahbee, who is no stranger to being thrown (he founded a number of local ju-jitsu clubs for Manitoulin residents in communities across the Island), found himself stunned by the news. "I almost fell off my chair," he said.

"In high school I would have been voted the most likely to not succeed," he laughed. "I was headed nowhere really fast. I really didn't like myself. If I had stayed on that path, I would be six feet under a long time ago."

While he was raised by a single mother, Mr. Madahbee does not see that as why he was struggling with his issues.

"I was really lucky, I had some very important mentors appear in my life," he said. "They seemed to appear just when I needed them the most."

Mr. Madahbee cited "my uncle Pat (UOI Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee) was always there for me and wasn't afraid to give me a good kick in the butt," he said. "At the same time, he was always positive, gave me options, but he always gave it to me straight."

A well-known local drummer (of the rock and roll variety), Mr. Madahbee recalled the late Chris Tilson as an important mentor and martial arts fellow traveller. "We studied karate together and he helped get me into music actually. That was 19 years ago now, time flies.'

Another positive influand mentor Brazilian Jujitsu's Israel Segora. Asked what it was that acted as a catalyst to turn his direction around, Mr. Madahbee did not hesitate for an instant. "My oldest son coming into the world," he said. "I wanted to be here for him and to be someone he could be proud of. I didn't want to be nobody." Mr. Madahbee set about changing himself into that person he wanted to be, looking to the people in his life he knew and respected as models. "I went back to school and I really haven't stopped going since," he said. He has completed studies at the University of Toronto, Sault College in Sault Ste. Marie and then there is the constant parade of skills develop-

ment courses and workshops that travel through his life.

Another development that has kept him on his toes was his appointment as the first aboriginal member of the Ontario College of Social Workers and Social Service Workers (OCSWSSW). "I am on the development committee," he said. "I have studied so many rules and regulations, I feel like I am just about qualified to be a judge.'

The OCSWSSW gig has not been a completely smooth ride, he admitted. "I have butted heads," he said of running into preconceptions and perceptions that had to be overcome and the need to explain the considerable differences between indigenous and main stream culture and practices. "But you don't give up," he said. "You never give up and you keep pushing for the changes that need to be put in place."

Mr. Madahbee has developed sharing circles for the UCCM Tribal Police and OPP, established jujitsu classes (open to everyone) in Wikwemikong, Aundeck Kaning, Omni Birch Island, Sheguiandah and Sheshegwaning. "We have students from Little Current, Gore Bay and Mindemoya," he said. "It's wide open.'

The classes help act as a tremendous bridge between communities. "We have each other's back," said Mr. Madahbee, who hopes those bridges can help with the reconciliation between peoples.

Mr. Madahbee still finds time in his busy schedule to play music, "hard rock, heavy metal and blues mostly" and he has a new project on the go that he hopes will be a big hit. "Bubble soccer is coming soon to Aundeck Omni Kaning," he said.

"People can turn their lives around," said Mr. Madahbee. "If you believe in people, like people believed in me, then it can happen."



After celebrating 28 years of business On Manitoulin Island

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Ombudsman cites lack of due process in Rainbow motion

SUDBURY—The Ontario Ombudsman has weighed in on the case of the exclusion of Manitoulin Rainbow District School Board Trustee Larry Killens from in camera meetings of the board with a report indicating that the board did not follow proper procedure in making its decision.

"Our office's review of your complaint found that the school board has a code of conduct to address trustee conduct issues and that the formal procedure outlined therein was not followed in this case," reads the report. "The code of conduct ensures procedural fairness is provided. In response to our office's review, the chair committed to proposing a number of amendments to the code of conduct that would help capture the types of concerns that led to the motion. Our office will monitor the progress of these amendments."

The report was initiated following a complaint from Trustee Killens that the board voted on April 14, 2015, during a special in camera meeting of the whole of the board of trustees, to remove him from discussions on labour discussions due to concerns about his conduct. In the fall following that action. Mr. Killens complained to the Ombudsman's office. That office had acquired jurisdiction over school boards on September 1 of that year. Mr. Killens noted in his complaint that the board had not followed the conduct complaint process as set out in the Education Act or the board's own policies.

Mr. Killens complained that the board of trustees had also failed to ratify the in camera vote in an open meeting of the board of trustees, which is also contrary to both the Education Act and board policy.

The Ombudsman launched a review of the complaint and sent a report to Trustee Killens on June 20, and a letter to RDSB Chair Doreen Dewar. Mr. Killens provided The Expositor with a copy of the report.

The report delved into the reasons for the board chair's rapid response in bringing the censure upon Trustee Killens. According to the report, Ms. Dewar "brought her concerns to the attention of the board members at the April 14, 2015 meeting. She stated that, in bringing the motion, she was trying to protect the school board."

Those precipitous actions were not in keeping with proper procedure. "While the chair felt this was a timesensitive issue, the lack of notice and opportunity for you to respond is inconsistent with procedural safeguards in the act and the school board's policies around trustee conduct matters," the Ombudsman's report told Trustee Killens.

"This isn't something I am happy about," said Trustee Killens. "Even though I am the one who brought the complaint. Because of the constant pushback (by the board towards Trustee Killens) our kids are losing out."

Trustee Killens did admit, however,

that the report did bring him some peace of mind. "I was beginning to doubt myself," he said, "but a third disinterested party has said that my concerns were true." "I relate this to a charge in court,"

Trustee Killens, a former police officer, said. "Had the judge made a ruling like that, that charge would be thrown out. It would be history. The same should hold true here. The builtin safeguards were bypassed and the procedures outlined were not followed, this motion should die. That's unfortunate, because I don't get to be heard."

Trustee Killens noted that the board chair has indicated that the matter will not be revisited.

"I have been under sanctions from in camera meetings for 14 months by a process that was not done properly," he said. "It was not properly justified."

Trustee Killens said that he wants the record to be completely expunged and that the matter should be dealt with in an open meeting.

"The people who voted me in have a right to know," he said.

Trustee Killens, who attends some meetings from his winter home in Florida, is now concerned that the board intends to ban attending meetings by teleconference. "When we amalgamated the Manitoulin board with the Sudbury board, that was an important consideration," he said. "I have never missed a meeting in 14 years."

Georgian Bay Preservation Alliance calls on Manitoulin municipalities to implement mandatory septic inspection by Robin Burridge property owner with over- and northern shores of Councillor Cook, "Council

by Robin Burridge GEORGIAN BAY—The Georgian Bay Preservation Alliance (GBA) is calling on area municipalities to support their call for a mandatory septic inspection program for all cottages on Georgian Bay.

"The GBA agrees that it is in all Georgian Bay residents' and visitors' best interests to ensure that cottage septic systems are installed properly and well maintained," states a letter sent to area municipalities including the Northeast Town. "The primary primary responsibility for proper maintenance of septic systems rests with the contractor with oversight by the local municipality. The primary responsibility for proper maintenance of septic systems rests with the

property owner with oversight by the local municipality. On the latter, amendments have been made to the Ontario Building Code through Ontario Regulation 315/10 requiring the establishment of mandatory 'one-site sewage system' inspection programs by municipalities where there is a source water protection plan in place. Through our involvement on the South Georgian Bay-Lake Simcoe Source Protection Committee we are aware that the jurisdictions in that area combine their inspection programs with proper-

ty owner education on septic system maintenance." The letter goes on to state that while there is no source protection plan in place in any of the municipalities along the eastern and northern shores of Georgian Bay, "we believe that each of these municipalities should have septic inspection programs in place combined with a property owner education program."

The Northeast Town sent the letter back to the GBA noting that the Sudbury District Health Unit oversees septic systems in the area.

Ward 1 (the islands) Councillor Laurie Cook said that she wasn't in support of the request from the GBA as she felt that a mandatory inspection would be a violation of individual's privacy.

"It is our drinking water (in Ward 1), so I would like to think that people are careful as it is their drinking water source," said





parks as they do not have water at their sites."

Mr. Deschamps goes on to list the strict guidelines the park enforces on fires for their campers such as fires only between 4 and 10:30 pm, no unattended fires, at least one adult in attendance of a fire, limited size of fire, and that the fire drums are placed in a safe area.

"With a limited tourist season, all businesses on Manitoulin Island must capitalize on attracting people to come to the Island," continues Mr. Deschamps. "With an exemption, it allows us to bring in families that would otherwise stay in campgrounds off the Island that have been granted an exemption. Without this exemption, it is not just lost revenue to our campground but to many other businesses within the municipality.'

Town CAO David Williamson explained that Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey had reviewed Mr. Deschamps' letter prior to council and could not support the request.

Councillor Michael Erskine said that he was "inclined to support" the request but questioned the use of fireworks at the park.

Mr. Deschamps, who was in the audience, responded that fireworks are banned from the campsite.

Councillor Laurie Cook asked if council could amend the bylaw to only exempt Batman's because of their strict regulations and not all campgrounds, as council was unaware of their policies.

"We could," responded Mayor Al MacNevin, "but it would make it awkward to only exempt one campground.'

He said that everyone wants to enjoy a bonfire and roast marshmallows or hot dogs, but the risk of a spark leading to a forest fire during a drought is the same if it is in someone's backvard or a campground.

Councillor Bill Koehler said, "if we allow for them (to have a fire ban exemption), we have to allow everyone too.'

"I also hate to do something against the recommendations of the fire chief and he said he couldn't support this," added Councillor Koehler.

"It (the fire ban bylaw) should be a blanket policy for everyone," said Councillor Bruce Woods.

In a recorded vote, requested by Councillor Koehler, Councillor Erskine voted in favour of the amended fire ban bylaw as requested, while Councillors Cook, Marcel Gauthier, Bill Koehler, Dawn Off, Melissa Peters, Paul Skippen, Bruce Woods and Mayor MacNevin voted against it. The motion was defeated and no exemption was granted.

HEBR 6:1-3. "Not laying again the foundation of repentance of faith towards God, of instructions on baptisms (plural) of laying on of hands, the resurrection and eternal judgment." explains in MAT.7:24-27 and LUKE 6:46-49, that building a house (the church) without laying a solid foundation is foolishness, and that wisdom is doing what He (God) says. Without following the instructions given in the bible you are never going to have the right foundation or the true church. Here in HEBR.6 It is explained that the foundation of the true church includes instruction on faith, repentance, baptisms, laying on of hands, the resurrection and judgment. In this article I like to deal with baptism. Before baptism a person needs to agree that he is a sinner, and in need of salvation he must understand who Jesus is and what he has done to save people from sin and the curses that are the result of sin. He must not only believe that Jesus died, but also that he rose from the dead. He also must believe that after his own death he will be resurrected and stand before the judgment seat, REV.20: 11-15 and all sinners will be punished by being cast into the Lake Of Fire, REV.21: 8. Where the sinner's soul will be tormented forever and ever. And the only way to escape this judgment is by accepting Jesus Christ as Lord and savior, JOHN 14:4, ACTS 4:12. Before Baptism a person must make confession of sin and confession of faith and be willing to live in obedience to God (his commandments and instructions) after baptism and the laying of hands, he will receive power (The Holy Spirit) to obey God. Recently I witnessed baptisms in a Pentecostal church and in a Baptist church. Neither of them was followed by the laying on of hands as is the case in Acts 8:14-17, Acts 19: 1-6. These people were also baptized in the name of the Trinity instead of in the name of Jesus as it was done in Acts 2:38, 8:16, 10:48, 19:5. Baptism is identifying one self with Jesus in his death, burial and resurrection, see ROM. 6:1-6, as neither the father nor the Holy Spirit died or were buried, baptism with the father or spirit is nonsense. The word trinity is not in the bible, the doctrine of the trinity was developed about 300 years after the church was established and so the apostles and the early church did not use a Trinitarian doctrine and you won't need it either. MAT. 28:19 was likely added later by some Trinitarian (just like 1 JOHN 5:7 see footnote in most study bibles.) The word baptism means to immerse in water, sprinkling or pouring is not the biblical way of baptism, and the person to be baptized must first confess his sinfulness and repent and understand what Jesus did. If a person has not first decided to obey God, the only thing baptism does is get him wet, even if it is done right by complete immersion in the name of Jesus. There are many denominations that baptize right, by immersion in the name of Jesus. Locally I believe Jehovah Witnesses, Christadelphians and Latter Day Saints baptize this way. So if you have not been baptized this way, do it right. You will never understand the importance of this until you obey these Biblical instructions. 





...continued from page 5 faithfully, apart from one year in the 1970s when there was a gas shortage. Two years ago we found coping with the lengthy trips had become less enticing. We sold the vacation home a year ago, but our daughter and son-in-law have a home in Florida and we can visit them if we feel nostalgic.'

We can't leave out the 'famous dog' story. Lila and Floyd have owned two dogs, 'wiener dog' or Dachshunds, and both were recognized for skills they had. The first one, Butch won a ribbon for being a great representative of his breed in a dog show. Their second dog, Wrinkles, on the other hand, was nominated for stardom. Coming back from Florida one time, the couple and Wrinkles made a stop in Flint, Michigan. They spent the night in a motel and the next morning Floyd started to transfer the luggage back into his car.

As he was exiting the motel room door, a stranger put a gun to his head and demanded he move back into the room. Floyd did as he was told. At that precise moment little Wrinkles, more than 12-yearsold and diabetic, reacted to the stranger's voice, jumped off his chair and clamped his jaw tightly on the offender's ankle. This action forced the attacker back out of the room. The door was quickly locked and calls were made. Wrinkles had saved his master's life. The beloved pet was later nominated for entry into the Purina Pet Hall of Fame for his fine deed and he is memorialized there in the hall fame's downtown of Toronto location.

"Television isn't on a lot in our house, but when it is, we generally watch the news or a sports program." Lila adds, "Floyd has a strong work ethic and he is a very organized person. He still lives to work. He put in this hardwood floor and did such a good job." Another sideline was fishing. The 'teaching lodge,' in the shape of a longhouse set up for storytelling, demonstrations and workshops, is where GSCT's CEO, Kevin Eshkawkogan, settles in for a lengthy interview.

The Great Spirit Circle Trail is in its 20th year of hosting experiences designed to showcase "the history and culture of the region and its original inhabitants—the Ojibwe, Odawa and Pottawatomi peoples," the Anishinaabek. Sitting in the shade of the lodge's earthy interior drinking ice water on a very hot day and talking about current issues of tourism and economic development seems to embody the motto, 'Experience the past, enjoy the present.'

"In 1997, First Nations' elders and economic development officers on Manitoulin identified a need for aboriginal-run tourism," explains Mr. Eshkawkogan. "Tourism was happening in First Nations but at the time it did not include First Nations in its design. Non-First Nations guides would share the history, culture and traditions of the Three Fires, often getting things wrong. The elders and others decided to get involved in the industry by developing a tourism strategy. GSCT grew out of that strategy in 2000, and today is a leader in aboriginal and cultural tourism."

Kevin Eshkawkogan was a development officer with Waubetek (the business development corporation that provides support to Aboriginal entrepreneurs) when he was asked in 2003 to help with the Circle Trail's development as a part-time volunteer.

"Then, there were four cabins to rent in Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation, called Endaa-aang, or Our Place. The rental office was in the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation (OCF), with one employee."

In 2006, the focus of the GSCT became "to develop more product," continues the chief executive officer. "Tourism basically is concerned with food, accommodation, transportation and experiences. People were coming to us for nature and aboriginal experiences and our communities

responded: Zhiibaahaasing First Nation built 'the world's largest peace pipe, drum and dreamcatcher;' Sheshegwaning renovated Nishiin Lodge and hiking trails; Aundeck Omni Kaning continues to develop Endaa-aang; Sheguiandah is planning an interpretive centre, campground and trail; Whitefish River renovated Rainbow Lodge and added two more cabins; Sagamok purchased a fishing lodge near Ritchie Falls and has a strong tourism department headed by Matthew Owl, my predecessor at GSCT; Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve has its own tourism organization and their far-reaching vision recently saw the opening of Pointe Grondine Park, 7,000 hectares of scenic wilderness; M'Chigeeng became the largest investor in the Aboriginalowned and run Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current, and is the seat of the OCF and the Great Spirit Circle Trail.'

GSCT's experiences and packages can be customized and are geared toward "fully independent travellers and to group tours"—anywhere from two people to 400 who choose what they will do based on their interests and skills levels—learning how to make tea from fresh-picked herbs, or bannock over an open fire, how to distinguish which plant, trees, herbs and shrubs have medicinal, practical, edible or spiritual uses, listening to traditional stories, canoeing old trade routes or overnighting in a teepee. "We engage all the senses, and the spirit," says Mr.

Eshkawkogan. "We connect with people on a spiritual or emotional level. It is not unusual for visitors to cry when hearing time-honoured stories on our canoe tours that are about these lands, this water. Our experiential tours are educational and interactive for people who come with open minds and hearts.

'When we think of our grandmothers' homes, we think

Social housing changes

Donna Moroso, director of integrated social services of the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB), gave a report to the board at the June 22 meeting in Espanola, updating members on changes to the Housing Services Program.

She noted that the DSB is in year two of its 10-year Housing and Homelessness Plan and will undergo three policy changes to the Long-Term Affordable Housing Strategy regulations "to help residents who struggle with affordability in their housing to remain where they are residing, in their neighbourhoods, schools and close to support and family." The three policies to be changed are: the centralized waiting list and tenant selection; eligibility rules; and direct shelter subsidy.

The waiting list priorities have been re-evaluated as follows: retain victims of family violence as the top priority, followed by homelessness (due to fire or natural disaster, notice of early termination due to their landlord taking over their unit for their own family or family member's use, building condemnation or financial hardship incurred due to a drastic change in income), then seniors. All other applicants are ranked on the waiting list based on their income and assets.

"Considerations will be given to the waiting list at the time the vacancy occurs to ensure that the ratio is

conducive to the community needs and to determine the best mix for the building based on the existing waiting list in order to create a more vibrant mixedincome community,"

report to the board states. New to the waitlist system is the re-ranking of an applicant at each refusal of an apartment unit. An applicant's refusal will result in an adjustment of ranking to the application that will result in applicants not receiving consecutive offers (that is to say, they would not be offered the next available unit). The number of refusals will not be limited to three, however each refusal will result in a re-ranking of the applicant on the waiting list.

The Direct Shelter Subsidy will also be expanded to other people in need than just those on Ontario Works, including those on the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) and low income households. The subsidy will be offered to families who are currently on the waiting list and living in areas of the DSB where no housing is available (Tehkummah is an example) and will be calculated by determining the difference between the rent geared to income calculation or affordable housing calculation and the actual market rent of the unit. The hope is that the subsidy will provide greater access to a variety of housing options and ultimately assist more

food, drink and visit. This is the spirit in which we welcome visitors.

The Great Spirit Circle Trail's guides are trained traditional heritage interpreters. All of the "soft adventure" tours are "big on safety." In addition to their training, interpreters add their own personal touches like humour to help break down stereotypes. "If we tease you, we like you!" jokes GSCT's CEO.

This year, the Great Spirit Circle Trail "has accomplished the goal of realizing its vision," Mr. Eshkawkogan declares. GSCT has been "swamped" this summer, offering two or three experiences a day. Partners Honora Riding Stable, with whom GSCT offers Legends of the Land on horseback and North Channel Cruise Line, that offers boat tours and meals with onboard Voice of the Drum presentations, report a similar upsurge in business this year.

"The benefits of the Great Spirit Circle Trail do not lie only with GSCT," elaborates the CEO. "In addition to pro-viding opportunities for every one of the member First Nations, we contribute through our membership in [and founding of] the Aboriginal Tourism Association of Canada, and in Aboriginal Tourism Ontario to the \$15m impact that aboriginal tourism is having as a whole on northeastern Ontario's economy. Many non-aboriginal tourism organizations also ask our advice on our experiences.

"Locally, through employment opportunities, we are

people and house people faster, potentially reducing the DSB's waitlist.

The DSB is also allowing 'a healthy mix of rentgeared-to-income, affordable and market rent units in each building to ensure financial viability throughout the portfolio" while ensuring that community needs are supported.

Scholarships and bursaries are now also excluded as income. Fern Dominelli, DSB CAO, noted that a 16-year-old is considered an adult in the eyes of government and, previously, scholarships or bursaries would be considered as household income.

The way people are screened to become ranked on the centralized waiting list is also changing.

DSB member Stewart Meikleham said he was concerned with those who are homeless having only a fiveday turnaround to accept a unit. Being homeless would mean that it would also be harder to reach that person. "Five days is not enough," he said.

Mr. Dominelli said that, for the most part, homeless-

ness in this area means 'couch surfing,' but that there are a small minority of people who are living on the streets.

"You're right, we do have to manage that carefully.' the CAO added.

Paramedic service review


Chief of EMS Mike MacIsaac informed the board that the DSB had just finished a three-year audit with the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. While the DSB will not see a final report until likely the fall, the initial results are promising.

The review was undertaken at eight of the DSB

paramedic stations with Mr. MacIsaac stating that he has never had such a good meeting with reviewers.

All of the 60 paramedics audited (picked at random) had all of their accreditation up-to-date and on file and 100 percent of everyone audited who required an incident report (responses to cardiac arrests, motor vehicle accidents, crime scenes, etc.) had one. "That's unheard of," he said.

"The Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care representative said our vehicle records are the best they've seen in the province," the Chief of EMS said proudly. -



helping young people to learn about themselves and have healthier and more respectful views of the culture; guides are training younger interns; we're a business, we provide for ourselves while providing opportunities and services for others.

"The first thing the Great Spirit Circle Trail did was to establish cultural integrity guidelines for the business. We offer culturally authentic experiences and connection; we're not trying to 'convert' anyone or sell ceremonies, we share stories and our traditional way of life on land and water.

For this passionate CEO, having a position that is about "spreading knowledge and culture while developing the economy" has been a dream job. "Now it's time to develop a new vision," says the 10-year veteran of the Great Spirit Circle Trail about his plans to move on and help aboriginal athletes, in particular hockey players, realize their potential. "There's always a need for fresh energy once longterm strategies have been implemented and are successful. I've done my role, and new people will pick it up and move it forward." Preparations for the transition, which will take some time, have begun.

"Our elders say, 'If you carry knowledge," says Mr. Eshkawkogan, "'you share it." The Great Spirit Circle Trail's aboriginal experiences enrich the life and economy of Manitoulin and the region by putting this sharing philosophy to work.





St. Francis Anglican Church packed for ordination of new minister

MINDEMOYA—St. Francis of Assisi Anglican Church was filled to overflowing on Friday, July 22 as the Right Thomas Reverend Α. Corston, retired bishop of Moosonee, presided over the ordination of the Reverend Aiden Armstrong.

The ordination, which took place on the feast day of St. Mary Magdalene, was due to be presided over by the Bishop of Algoma, the Right Reverend Dr. Stephen Andrews, but a family emergency called the bish-

op away. "It was a great day, a celebratory occasion," said Rev. Armstrong, who has been associated with the Diocese of Algoma for three years and who, as a deacon, has been serving the parish of Birch Island in McGregor Bay, which he described as "a great kickstart to serving the five parishes on Manitoulin (Little Current, Mindemoya, Gore Bay, Kagawong and Manitowaning)."

The preacher for the ordination was the Reverend Joan Locke, who admonished the newly elevated priest to resist those who would place him on a pedestal in his work as a minister. "This is the only time that I would feel comfortable offering advice," said Rev. Locke, who began her sermon by quoting the shortest sermon on record given in the sweltering heat by a preacher in the deep south. "She climbed slowly up the steps to the pulpit, looked out over the congre-

gation and pronounced 'it's hot in here, hell's hotter, don't go there' and climbed back down.'

Reverend Locke was undaunted by the heat out-side and the venerable stone walls of St. Francis kept the inside remarkably cool despite the midsummer sun outside and the pews filled with the faithful.

Reverend Locke said that she was delighted to have an opportunity to preach in the parish where she was baptised as a child. "The Manitowaning mission was my father's first mission,' she said.

While the tone and mood of the ceremony was upbeat, there was deep solemnity in the proceedings as the congregation followed the lead of the bishop as he presented the candidate for ordination.

"Good people, this is he whom we purpose, God willing, to receive this day unto the holy office of priesthood, for after due examination we find not to the contrary, but that he be lawfully called to his function and ministry and that he be a person meet for the same. But yet if there be any of you who knoweth any impediment or notable crime in him, for the which he ought not to be received into these holy ministries; let him come forth in the name of God and show what the crime or impedi-ment is," intoned the bishop. There were no challenges issued.

Reverend Armstrong's fiancé, Sarah Jackson, was not only present at the ceremony and one of those who officially presented him before the bishop, but also read the epistle, the seventh verse of the fourth chapter of the letter of Paul to the Ephesians.

Reverend Armstrong, who originally hails from

ate degree at Western, followed up with his graduate studies at Wycliffe College, a theological school federated with the University of Toronto and affiliated with the Anglican Church of Canada and is Low Church (evangelical and Protestant) in orientation.

Reverend Armstrong said that he felt the call to ministry during his undergraduate studies. "I felt the call while studying theology during my undergradu-ate years," he said.

He has three siblings, two brothers and a sister, who he described as being "very supportive" of his decision to join the priesthood.

Reverend Armstrong will be taking up his duties at the Manitoulin parishes in September, but in the meantime there is no rest for the ordained. "I will be right back in it in McGregor Bay," he laughed. A large contingent of the Anglican church members from Birch Island were in attendance at the ceremonies.
