AUNDECK OMNI KANING-When it comes to whether Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation will allow cannabis sales on its territory, it's up to the people to decide, noted Ogimaa Patsy Cor-

A recent referendum and surveys conducted with the band membership have both shown there is clear and overwhelming support for the First Nation to create its own laws governing the sale of pot and its derivatives and that the chief and council should be the ones to craft those laws with community consultation.

"I think the people have spoken," said Ogimaa Corbiere. "Not a lot of people voted, but those that did clearly were in overwhelming support, the survey showed that too. Council left it up

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Whitefish Falls the scene of two serious accidents over the weekend

WHITEFISH FALLS—Whitefish Falls was the scene of two serious accidents in two days, one of which ended in a

On Saturday, June 29, at approximately 2:52 pm, officers from the Manitoulin detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a report of a single dirt bike collision near Fox Lake Road, located approximately five kilometres from Whitefish Falls.

Sources say the rider had been driving the rail bed, which is frequented by all-terrain vehicles and dirt bikes, that leads from Espanola to Whitefish Falls. (The old CPR right of way is closed from Whitefish Falls to Little Cur-

The driver of the dirt bike, a 21-year-old male from southern Ontario was pronounced dead at the scene. The OPP Technical Collision Investigation (TCI) team is continuing its investigation.

The previous day, Friday, June 29, traffic was backed up for several hours as police and emergency crews tended to a car accident at Highway 6 on Whitefish Falls, near Grav-

According to eyewitnesses, at approximately 6:36 pm, a motorcyclist collided with an oncoming car. Police reported at the time that the driver of the motorcycle was in serious condition. He was taken from the scene by land ambulance and later airlifted to Health Sciences North from the Espanola Regional Hospital. The driver of the car sustained minor injuries in the accident.

Drivers in the lineup told The Expositor they felt helpless as they watched the motorcyclist's friends (he was part of a group of motorcyclists travelling together) stand on the side of the road, distraught at what they had just wit-

On Monday, OPP told The Expositor that the motorcyclist, a 61-year-old male from London, remained in hospital with non-life threatening injuries. Charges in the accident are pending.

Police remind drivers that with an increase in summer traffic, motorists should slow down and take their time.

"Let's make this a safe and happy summer," says OPP Constable Marie Ford.

UCCM Police project funded by Status of Women Canada

M'CHIGEENG—The UCCM Anishnaabe Police was advised on June 24 that a funding proposal was approved entitled 'Lighting the Fire Within.' The idea surrounding this proposal was to help reduce risk factors associated with domestic violence and facilitate the creation of safer, stronger and healthier First Nations communities.

The data recorded on domestic violence over the course of eight years was reviewed in the six First Nations communities serviced by the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service and showed that it was almost six times above the provincial average. This data further suggested that there is a need to strengthen services and develop interventions focusing on reducing risk factors and addressing the root causes of domestic violence. The proposal will arrive as a multi-year contribution agree-

Building on existing community structures and mechanisms, the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service seeks to: Strengthen its ability to respond to incidents of domestic violence and stem the escalation of non-criminal domestic disputes in a culturally and trauma-sensitive manner, in the hope of limiting re-victimization and address problems in their infancy before violent behaviours escalate and criminal charges are issued; and facilitate the development of a sport-based program targeting children, adolescents and young people (including adolescent survivors/perpetrators of domestic violence) with a focus on promoting healthy living, positive relationships, life-skills and enhancing engagement between Police Officers children and adolescents.

Police Chief Rodney Nahwegahbow acknowledges the important role that women have in the First Nations communities.

"We need to expand the police response to incidents of domestic violence and to do so in a culturally appropriate way so that it contributes to an improved quality of life," he says. "Further, this will help us start to align with the recommendations from the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls Inquiry.'

2019 distinguished La Cloche artist shares her origin story

WHITEFISH FALLS—The 42nd La Cloche Art Show's distinguished artist Marcie Breit spent much of her 30-year nursing career across Northern Ontario glancing wistfully at the world of art—but three years before she retired Ms. Breit began taking art lessons from such well known artists as Susan Lampinen and Barry Bowerman. The day she retired Ms. Breit destroyed the large box of "learning" art she had accumulated, picked up her brushes and embarked on her second career as a prolific and talented artist.

As she shared the story of her journey as an artist at the traditional featured artist workshop, held just before the opening reception on Friday, June 28, Ms. Breit revealed that her most consistent muse has been "nature's endless beauty which draws you to capture its essence."

A true Northern girl, Ms. Breit spent her earliest years in Larder Lake before moving to New Sudbury at age six. Married to musician Kenneth Breit the couple made their home in Lively for neigh onto a quarter century before taking up the boating life and moving to Little Current.

The artist's chosen medium is primarily acrylics and she doesn't shy from creating large format canvases that add to the grandeur of her Northern Ontario subjects.

"Telling my truth" highlights perceptions, but whither impartial observation?

The popularity of the phrase "telling my truth" has ballooned exponentially since former Liberal cabinet ministers Jody Wilson-Raybould and Jane Philpot left the inner sanctum of the governing party's summit in a high profile spat over whether the economic "national good" and preserving employment numbers in the Liberal bastion of Quebec were good enough reasons to find an alternate route to punishing a corporate entity for legal malfeasance in a foreign land.

As journalists, we have a fatalistic acceptance of a reality where every story has at least three truths (we usually refer to it as "sides"), that side of those for a given thing, those against that given thing and then some nebulous entity known as "the truth." But perception and point of view play a very large role in defining those stories, as the 1,000 BCE tale of the Blind Men and the Elephant so beautifully illustrates

For the uninitiated, the story originated in the Indian subcontinent and revolves around a group of blind men who attempt to describe an elephant. Each of the blind men explores a different part of the pachyderm and comes up with their own "truth" of that iconic animal using those senses that they have at their disposal.

One explores the trunk, that snakelike appendage that an elephant utilizes as an all-purpose hand, straw and detector of scents. As could be expected, that blind man's report varies drastically from that of the blind detective who explores the elephant's leg, or the blind man who meets the broad side of the beast, or he who explored the elephant's tail. Each brought back detailed descriptions that, although accurate as "their truth," could not be reconciled to that of the others' equally detailed reports from a limited perspective.

Journalists strive to pull together all of the divergent truths of the participants in a story and in doing so inevitably offend most, if not

all, of those participants who view events through the lens of their own perceptions. Most journalists in following a story along its many twists and turns will be familiar with the accusation that "you've changed sides." But our truth is that we are simply trying to pull together the stories of the blind men and the elephant to weave a picture of the whole truth—and that is our truth. In the inevitable challenges that come from following any given story on any given day, that tale will weave from one colour of the tapestry to another, but the best of journalists (apparently becoming less and less common in these days of the partisan news-entertainment industry) will seek to avoid adding their own analysis of the big picture, letting the reader create their own "truth" from the available threads.

In these days of hyper partisan polarization of social media, fewer and fewer threads of contrary colours are making it to the loom from which a story's cloth is woven by the reader and that presents a problem.

More and more, we are each being limited to only the narratives that reinforce our pre-conceived beliefs and any sense of a universal truth becomes not only difficult to weave, but literally impossible. We are becoming blind—limited to only our own part of the elephant.

With more and more nations on our planet holding the keys to the utter obviation of humanity within their grasp and an environmental crisis threatening to end civilization as we know it within our very lifetimes we cannot afford to only listen to one version of the truth. Our salvation lies not simply in the expression of our own truths, but in listening and understanding to the truths of others. We don't have to blindly accept the truth of others, but we must be open to the possibility of our own truths being flawed by our limited perceptions and prejudices.

Humanity's very existence depends on it.

Serious safety concerns over vacant house

Shock and disappointment that this is allowed to happen

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an open letter to the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands' Chief Building Officer, mayor and CAO and has been reprinted here at the author's request.

Dear mayor and council,

RE. Safety hazards, 47 Worthington St./time bomb waiting to happen. This letter is to address a serious health, fire and safety issue in our neighbourhood. First, I must share my background of who I am and my position to deal with this pressing safety issue. I have lived in urban and/or town neighbourhoods for most of my adult life. I am 86 years old, therefore for almost 70 years I have lived in good neighbourhoods. I lived for many years in Toronto, then Sudbury and now in Little Current. Moving here was a conscious choice. Besides wanting to live close to family, I want to live my maturing years in a safe and secure neighbourhood. I live on Blake Street West, for many years now, with no plans of moving elsewhere.

Over the past few years I have had concerns about the building at 47 Worthington Street. I can't bring myself to call it a home, as I've yet to see it established as a home. For a period, it was a 'party' house. Currently it has become vacant and a compete desecrated piece of property.

In all my years of urban living, I am shocked and disappointed at the acceptance of neighborhood communities to allow this to happen. True, the property has become an eyesore for all those who drive

through Little Current to see, but that is not my primary concern. I am an aging senior citizen. A few of us seniors who live in the area cannot move very quickly, if anything should happen. I would not have the physical capability to escape a fire catastrophe. Also, we live in a school zone with many children who are in the neighbourhood, including my great grandchildren.

As the holidays approach, this weekend with Canada Day celebrations, and all the general summer population Little Current receives I have extreme concerns. Does NEMI not also have these concerns regarding the security and safety of our town?

The property is vacant with broken windows, doors and in complete dilapidation. I am concerned, first, what if children enter it and an accident occurs. We can warn our children all that we can, but 'children will be children' and are curious. Next, is the fire hazard that it is. Between bad wiring, or mishaps gone awry – what are we waiting for?

We are community members of Little Current who have lives at risk being near to 47 Worthington. This is a concern to many of us in the neighbourhood. At this point and time, we are requesting that the safety and security of our neighbourhood be addressed. Please forward this concern to applicable parties immediately.

A call for Central Manitoulin to divest Wagg's Wood to the EBC

The EBC is protecting the very popular Cup and Saucer Trail

To the Expositor:

The future of the A.J. Wagg Memorial Park is still in jeopardy. At the June 25 meeting of the Office and Administration Committee of the Central Manitoulin Council, Bob Barnett of the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy, Gail Meehan, granddaughter of A.J. Wagg, and I all spoke in defense of maintaining the park for posterity. Many supporters came, including members of the Manitoulin Nature Club. Three years ago, the council severed two acres of the park we call Wagg's Wood and sold it, much of it to become a parking lot for a local dealership.

None of us knew that the owner of the dealership would be the last speaker, and that he would claim that no harm had been done to the park by razing the trees on the property he bought.

Had I known he would speak, I would have talked about the significance of the loss of that part of the forest. Most obvious to hikers along the creek is the sight of cars, trucks and rusty bits of things instead of forest. Walking beside a parking lot is not the same as walking in a forest. I was under the impression that cedar trees would be planted to block the view, but nothing has been done in three years.

There are effects on the forest itself. The "corridor" that leads from the park entrance has had a number of trees falling in winter winds in recent years. This could be because they were previously protected by the trees on the west side that are no longer there. Council has not yet done anything about the trees that fell last winter. Lastly, cutting trees allows more light to come in to areas that were once shaded, favouring plants that want light over the plants that have been there for many, many decades.

We are lucky that the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy, a land

trust that already owns most of the land that hosts the very popular Cup and Saucer Trail, has also offered to save the remaining 42 acres that is Wagg's Wood. Politicians are always under pressure to sell land to businesses, but a land trust like EBC cannot sell the land, so our park would be secured for posterity if they took it over.

I hope that the municipality will do the right thing and shield themselves and future councillors from political pressure by transferring the land to the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy. The EBC is protecting our very popular Cup and Saucer mountain and they can protect our beloved Wagg's Wood.

Wild Year,' the couple will
only eat wild-foraged foods
such as indigenous plants
and animals they have
hunted. Mr. St. Onge is an
environmental studies professor at Canadore College
and Ms. Colyer is a nurse
with roots in Wiikwemkoong.

In last month's update, Ms. Colyer had been recovering from an emotional low point which carried through into the first part of June. However, this month's productive foraging helped to turn that trend around.

"We had really good luck with fishing after we sure didn't during the winter months," said Ms. Colyer.

On one fishing expedition alone, Mr. St. Onge managed to pull up more than 50 pounds of catfish with Ms. Colyer and a friend, putting a significant dent into his target of 800 pounds of fish for the year. That same night, a friend messaged him saying he had found a roadkill deer.

"It had just been knocked in the head because all the meat was good. That doesn't usually happen; usually they have a broken back end and you lose a good amount of meat. It was in perfect shape, so that was awesome because we had none left in the freezer," said Ms. Colyer.

They also managed to harvest 15 pounds of morels in one trip alone, leading Ms. Colyer to have to direct Mr. St. Onge to hold himself back from the addictive practice of morel picking to focus on other species they had yet to gather.

The two travelled to the Great Lakes Foragers Gathering in late June, where they served as the keynote speakers and met a great number of likeminded individuals—though, none quite as dedicated to the cause as their experiment.

"It was a great time; it was definitely worth the trip," said Mr. St. Onge. "To be an event centred around all wild food was awesome. We've been to other gatherings where foraging might make up a portion, but there it was the whole event."

There was a marketplace set up where processors of wild foods sold their wares, which enabled the couple to purchase hickory nut oil, wild black walnut and were gifted some hickory nuts and hickory milk from a fellow forager.

"It was super cool to have people sharing that passion for wild foods. It was nice seeing what we're doing through other people's eyes, too. When you're doing it, you're just doing it. It's work; you don't think about the scope so much because you're just doing it to survive. Having other people remark on it was pretty awesome," said Ms. Colyer

They also had the chance to meet Mr. St. Onge's favourite living wild food author Samuel Theyer (the couple are now on a 'Sam' basis with him). He led foraging

walks in which he shared information about the plant species they encountered along the way.

A food contest took place for the best wild-made food and beverage. Hickory nut products took the prize, with an ice cream made of hickory nut milk, maple, vanilla and cinnamon earning the food title and a straight-up hickory nut milk won the beverage category. After the competition, the person who made the milk offered it to the couple as a gift.

"That was just so nice to have something gifted to us that we can actually have, because it was all wild food. It was awesome," said Ms. Colyer.

Back home, their freezer is beginning to fill up for the long winter ahead. Ms. Colyer said she was elated to find that a previous strawberry patch she had found was still in existence, unlike some other properties that have been ripped up in past months. They were just about perfectly ripe and ready for the picking this past weekend.

The two describe the rest of their harvesting year as having three stages: fishing and berries, fishing and

Mound gardens take shape at community foods workshop

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—Bed two of the Aundeck Omni Kaning community garden was a hub of activity recently as community members gathered to help plant Three Sisters mound gardens on a picturesque hill-top off Highway 540.

Debajehmujig Storytellers' Richard Ashley Manitowabi was the main leader of the workshop, helping to coordinate the event alongside Manitoulin Community Fresh Food Initiative (MCFFI) project manager Kristin Bickell. MCFFI is part of the work of the Child Poverty Task Force and administered through Noojmowin Teg Health Centre.

Mr. Manitowabi has been involved with Debaj's gardening program for several years and has been involved with co-ordinating seed swaps for heirloom seeds. He has also facilitated seed saving workshops which instruct participants how to responsibly cultivate their annual produce, saving a sufficient supply of seeds so subsequent seasons can similarly sprout several strong strains of savoury or sweet snacks for the sowing.

In his role as a Debaj storyteller, Mr. Manitowabi shared an Odawa version of the Three Sisters story, similar versions of which also feature in several Indigenous peoples' cultures and traditions.

"We believe in telling stories because people can connect with stories and use them emotionally, physically and spiritually," Mr. Manitowabi said.

The Three Sisters—beans, corn and squash— are notable because they can be planted in the same area as one

another and each will provide something the other plants need in order to survive and thrive. Squash grows near to the ground, providing ground shade and mulch while also warding off pests. Beans infuse the soil with plenty of nitrogen which corn needs to thrive. The cornstalks themselves offer vertical supports on which the beans can climb and find stability. The three, eaten together, are said to provide all the nutrients one needs to sustain themselves without needing meats or any other types of produce.

After hearing the story and seeing dried examples of cornstalks, beans and corn flour, the group headed down to a soil bed at the hilltop to begin work on the mound gardens.

The sizes of the mounds were approximately five foot-lengths square, with the goal of reaching the centre of the mound with a hand while kneeling at the edge.

Mound gardens can be made atop grass if necessary; Ms. Bickell suggested placing a layer of newspaper before laying down the soil mound to help preserve the moisture.

The first seed to go in the ground is the corn. First, a planter will make seven holes. One in the centre of the mound and six in a ring around the middle, planted approximately five to seven inches apart. For many people, this will be the distance between one's thumb and pinky finger.

The bridge provides year-round highway access between the community of Little Current and Manitoulin Island and mainland areas of Northern Ontario. The existing bridge is nearing the end of its service life. The purpose of this study is to identify a Recommended Plan that addresses current and future transportation needs at the bridge crossing.

THE PROCESS

This study is a "Group A" project under the *Class Environmental Assessment (EA) for Provincial Transportation Facilities* (2000) and includes undertaking environmental and engineering field investigations and seeking input from stakeholders, external agencies, Indigenous communities and the public. Upon completion of preliminary design, a Transportation Environmental Study Report (TESR) will be prepared and made available for public review. Notices will be published in local newspapers to advise the public of the TESR public review period.

The first Public Information Centre (PIC) was held on August 22, 2018. 

LITTLE CURRENT—On June 15, the Manitoulin School of Martial Arts hosted its annual year end party. Typically, students take a boat ride the North Channel Cruise Line's Le Grand Heron, however, this year due to the two locations in Little Current and Gore Bay, and the sheer number of karate students, a different activity was planned. To mark the occasion, a karate seminar was held at the 4 Directions Complex in Aundeck Omni Kaning and guest instructors invited to visit the Island and teach their craft of Japanese jiu jitsu.

Hanshi Darrell Lafrance, founder and chief instructor of Kumo Jiu Jitsu based in Oshawa, has been training for 50 years and has his ninth degree black belt. He is recognized internationally as the leading authority on grappling and was voted Instructor of the Year by the Canadian Jiu Jitsu Association in 1995. All four instructors taught the students of Manitoulin School of Martial Arts their techniques of Japanese Jiu Jitsu such as ground fighting, throws and stand-up fighting movements. With the students' ages ranging from age three to age 70, teaching and demonstrating their techniques was not a small task to accomplish, but these seasoned instructors took it in stride.



Township staff claim honour of Assiginack Community Cup

MANITOWANING—It was a beautiful morning for a day of community building and physical activity at the first-ever Assiginack Public School (APS) Track and Fun event, held recently in collaboration with the Township of Assiginack.

"It was an amazing day. We had lots of people from the community, lots of volunteers, parents and all our students and staff," said Heather Pennie, APS principal.

The event has its roots in track and field events at the school but has since evolved to a social assembly.

"We've always done a traditional track and field day, but we really wanted to take some of the emphasis off competition and turn it into more of a community gathering and fun event," said Ms. Pennie.

The day began with the standard track events that are part of a conventional school track and field day. Some students ran to the running track and arena located some 800 metres from the school and completed one lap around the track, which amounted to approximately a 1,500-metre distance for the first race. Those less inclined to longer-distance running could walk the distance to the track.

"At the school we have nowhere to run except the grass. The township prepares the running track every year and I remember even when I was a student here, the whole school would go to the track and run the events. Three years

ago, we brought back that tradition," said Ms. Pennie.

The Township of Assiginack ensured the running surface was smooth and even and applied the lane markers. They also measured out distance markers for the various races.

Around midday, the students and community members were treated to a barbecue. All the money collected from community members went back to the school.

"We were planning a barbecue lunch for the students anyway and decided it might get more people out and encourage them to take part if we opened it to the community as a fundraiser," said Ms. Pennie.

The highly anticipated event was the Assiginack Community Cup competition. Three teams—APS staff, Assiginack township staff and Assiginack Family Health Team staff—engaged in a fierce competition for the inaugural award. This event was held

over the lunch break so the students could cheer on their favourite teams and enjoy burgers and a show.

"Jackie White from the township and I brainstormed and she put together an obstacle course for the contestants to do," said Ms. Pennie.

There was a rubber chicken accuracy toss, a 'hungry hippo' scooter game where challengers had to collect balls in a basket while riding on scooters, and an Indigenous tug-of-war-style game created by APS' Ojibwe teacher. Ms. Pennie noted that traditional Indigenous games are a focus in her school's physical education curriculum.

All during the events, the school had also set up smaller Indigenous games, a beanbag toss, jumbo Jenga and 'schlocky,' also known as box hockey.

The Assiginack Community Cup challengers brought out their best spirit wear, ranging from wigs to

face paint and even a decorative grass skirt.

"Students were amazing with all their cheering and competing and it was a pleasure to work with the school on this community event," said Ms. White.

It was a hard-fought battle, but the Township of Assiginack's team eventually emerged victorious and walked away with the coveted Assiginack Community Cup—a sneaker mounted atop a bucket, all painted gold and adorned with the Assiginack All Stars logo.

"The township is honoured and humbled to win such a prestigious cup," said Ms. White with a chuckle. "The team spent countless hours training on evenings and weekends to prepare for the event. We would like to thank Assiginack Public School and Assiginack Family Health Team for their efforts. While they fell short, they certainly tried hard."

Ms. Pennie said she was incredibly pleased with how this first Track and Fun day turned out and that she hoped to continue it in future years.

"Hopefully we can get even more community involvement to keep people active and participating, and to highlight the fact that Assiginack Public School is a community

school," said Ms. Pennie.
Ms. White shared a similar sentiment, adding that her team is already preparing for even stiffer competition next year.



"We've already had six events in there so far this season. We have 17 weddings this year, 14 corporate events and a number of associations and family reunions. We're about close to three times the business we did last year," said Mr. McAree.

The grand opening event has been an annual tradition for Destination Killarney, with this year's festivities marking the fifth celebration. The celebration began with an Anishinaabe cultural display, followed by dignitaries, the owners and Mr. McAree making speeches and cutting the ribbon on the conference centre. Nickel Belt MP Marc Serré was onhand for the ceremony as well as Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha.

"In one word: spectacular. That's the best way I can describe the new conference centre," said Mr. Mantha. "It's going to help all the economies, not only in Killarney but across Mani-

toulin Island, with Killarney being a bigger destination. It's just a fabulous addition to the tourism industry as a whole in the entire area."

The rest of the day's activities included three bands playing throughout the event on the pool deck, free refreshments including two fish fries, an air show and, finally, a fireworks display to conclude the day's events.

Mr. McAree estimates about 2,000 people turned out for the party, up from a previous high of 1,400. He attributes this to a much stronger marketing push for this year's event.

Canada House is a striking addition to the property and Mr. McAree said it will create a number of impacts.

"It's enabled us to hire more people and we now have the biggest complement of staff we've ever had—close to 200," he said, adding that 60 of those staff members are local residents, up from 40 in 2015.

"In general, there's a lot more traffic through town during events which drums up quite a lot of business for places such as Herbert Fisheries, The Pines Inn and other businesses in town," he said.

There are additional benefits for the municipality as a whole too, considering the approximate \$15 million added to the town's tax assessment base.

"Overall, the community is excited for the addition and are interested to see what the future holds in

terms of the number of people coming to Killarney, and maybe even further investment from the government into our roads and whatnot," Mr. McAree said.

There was a special Manitoulin connection to the Canada House opening as well—Wiikwemkoong visual artist James Simon Mishibinijima had a series of his work displayed in the halls as part of the special event.

On question number two, "if you agree with the sales of cannabis and cannabisrelated products, do you feel sales and availability of the product be band-owned and operated (14) or band member owned and operated (30 with two spoiled ballots)" and question number three "should Aundeck Omni Kaning engage in other ventures related to the business of cannabis and cannabis-related products (cultivation etc.) for economic development (42 yes, two no with two spoiled) and question number four "who should determine these laws and regulations and who and where any funds derived from sales of cannabis and cannabis-related products would go: federal government (6) or AOKFN determines their laws and regulations (38 with two spoiled ballots).

The process of implementing First Nation control over the sale of cannabis and cannabis-related products is a complicated one, noted Ogimaa Corbiere. "You have to integrate it with the legal system," she said. "The police don't know how to enforce the law, so they turn to the Crown and the Crown isn't sure how to proceed either. All

that has to be worked out before things go forward. People have to be clear on how it works, you don't want someone setting up a shop and then having the police going in and raiding it."

The federal government has indicated that the question of cannabis retailing on First Nations will be up to those First Nations to regulate, but in the absence of First Nation regulations, provincial and federal laws would apply. In the question of criminal law, the federal government has jurisdiction. But First Nations across Manitoulin have been wrestling with the issue for some time, with education and consultation being of paramount consideration in each community.

'It has to come from the people if it is to have any chance of working," suggested Ogimaa Corbiere. "To just have the leadership making things up on their own is just to invite

M'Chigeeng, Whitefish River and Wiikwemkoong communities are also in the process of deciding how their communities are going to deal with the issue.

On June 13 at the 45th annual All Ontario Chiefs Conference in Sault Ste. Marie the Chiefs of Ontario passed a resolution enabling First Nations to assert complete jurisdiction to govern all cannabis operations within their own territories.

presentation by outlining the important role that nature plays in the provincial economy, citing a Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry report that concluded that nature contributes \$85 billion a year to the Ontario economy "south of the Shield," which technically includes Manitoulin. contribution "This

includes protection from flooding, carbon sequestration, cleaner air, water, more pollinators and many other factors including tourism and protection of rare species," he said. "Nature contributes \$1.8 billion to the economy of the Greenbelt through outdoor activities alone.

Moreover, nature is good for health and education "and is less expensive than doctors, schools, teachers and hospitals," he said. "Hundreds of doctors are prescribing getting out into nature for better health. That's why we do what we do," said Mr. Barnett in explaining the rationale for the work of the EBC. "We think protecting nature is a good thing."

Mr. Barnett explained the role of the 40 land trusts in the province, which together protect 90.000 acres province-wide. nearly as much as the province itself. Still, he noted, "development outstrips conservation by 300 acres a day, 432 square kilometres a year."

The EBC executive director went on to note that the EBC is a federally regulated charity run by local directors, including two from Manitoulin Island. and is responsible for 170 reserves conservation encompassing 54 square kilometres, many of which are smaller in size than the Wagg's Wood property.

The EBC's interest in protecting the Wagg's Wood property, he noted, is that the property includes escarpment outcrops, has a stream running through it, is the only forested park area in the municipality and is home to important species such as wood thrush.

As a significant bonus from the economic point of view, the park is located "right in Mindemoya, contributing tourism dollars to local business.'

In his proposal to the municipality, Mr. Barnett pointed out that the EBC would take on legal and liability responsibility, would maintain and build the

trails system as they have the popular Cup and Saucer trail in the Northeast Town, would provide an easement on title to ensure the town has complete access to the stream to prevent flooding. He noted that the EBC has only objected to nearby development once in its history, that being when a gravel quarry proposed digging below the water table that would have drained an EBC protected wetland.

Further, should the EBC ever fail (an unlikely proposition given its ongoing success, he added), the land could only be transferred to another land trust—in this case it could be transferred back to the municipality.

We would maintain the trail and public access," he

Councillors questioned Mr. Barnett on a number of concerns that they said had been raised by constituents over the proposed transfer.

Councillor Angela Johnston questioned the impact the EBC ownership of the property would have on adjacent property development.

Mr. Barnett noted that the EBC has no legislative authority over what neighbours do with their own land. He pointed out that there is a common misconception that the EBC is linked to the Niagara Escarpment Commission, which does have such authority. "We are not them," he emphasized. "We are solely in the business of protection of nature, but we also encourage people to get out and walk on it."

Councillor Johnston noted that one of the teachers at Central Manitoulin Public School was concerned about access for students and the school, as the Wagg's Wood property plays a central role in the school's environmental curriculum. Mr. Barnett noted that environmental education is one of the primary goals of the EBC and that short of chopping down trees or digging for oil, he couldn't envision any concerns his organization would have with students' access to the park. Mr. Barnett also reiterated the EBC's willingness to provide the municipality with access easements.

Stephens questioned why the possibility of a 99-year lease could not be considered. Mr. Barnett responded that the EBC has never entered into such a proposal for a number of reasons. "I am not a lawyer," he noted, adding that while such an arrangement might be possible and he did not entirely rule it out, it was "not as attractive."

Councillor Stephens also raised the concern that while the EBC is not currently part of the Niagara Escarpment Commission and has no regulatory role, it could someday join forces with that organization and begin regulating activities. Mr. Barnett responded by pointing out that such a union is simply not legally possible and that should the EBC dissolve the property it would revert to the municipality.

Councillor Dale Scott

raised a question about the challenging landowner in the West End over the use of their property. Mr. Barnett responded that he was not aware of that, and that if it had happened he likely would be. He suggested that Council-Scott's informant might be referring to the suggestions the EBC had provided to the Manitoulin Planning Board (MPB) that would have made conservation easier. "But I don't think the Planning Board took much notice,' he added ruefully. He noted that the MPB had objected to a severance of a portion of a property of Veronica Bingaman demanding that the EBC build a road suitable for an emergency vehicle, such as an ambulance, up the bluff. "The Ontario Municipal Board agreed that we didn't need to build a multi-million-

dollar road," he said. Councillor Scott again raised the issue of the watercourse and the need to deal with animal species causing flooding. Mr. Barnett responded by noting the classic issue is the work of beavers. "There are two answers to that,' he pointed out. "The municipality has the right to clear beaver on any property, not matter what I say. Secondly, I am not a fan of beavers.

Councillor Al Tribinevicius questioned who would

really good of them and everybody involved, because I don't think everybody would do that. There'd probably be cases where somebody would put the cat down instead, but they took him on as an emergency and endeavoured to save his life," Mr. Maguire said.

The name Dobby is a reference to Harry Potter, a universe in which houselves such as Dobby the Elf can only be freed from their masters if they are given clothing. Dobby the Elf was freed by a carelessly tossed sock, which inspired the naming of Dobby the Cat.

"We had to bandage his four paws, so once we had them all done it was the joke that master had given Dobby a sock and now he was free," said Selena DeVries, practice manager for the Walden Animal Hospital and Gray Street Veterinary Services.

The animal hospital recognized the unique tragedy

of Dobby's situation and began to post photos and videos of him on their social media. The six videos alone have garnered a combined total of 17,500 views and their posts showing photos and describing his healing journey have been collectively shared hundreds of times. Dobby has been featured in the Sudbury Star and CTV Northern Ontario News.

"We had quite a bit of hits from our clients. There was a lot of follow-up of people asking about Dobby," said Ms. DeVries. "It was nice to be able to give nothing but positive news; he honestly did quite well."

"He wound up on social media, which is how I learned of him. When I saw the photographs, it just broke my heart," said Mr. Maguire. "You could actually see the pain in his eyes in some of the initial pictures. That was the part that really got me."

He kept a close eye on Dobby's Facebook updates and, when he found out he was making a trip to Sudbury, reached out to the shelter and asked if he could meet Dobby while he was in town.

"They were really receptive to the idea, so I went out and met him. Right after I met him, I immediately knew that I would very much like to have been his adoptive home," Mr. Maguire said. "I figured he deserved a really good life, and I thought, after I met him, that I was the one to help give that to him."

Adopting Dobby came with a warning from the animal hospital: he would require further medical care including possible toe surgery and a procedure on a possible hernia. He would require an annual check-up to measure progress and may depend on pain relief for a long timeframe. Undaunted, Mr. Maguire put his name forward and was selected as the lucky new keeper of Dobby.

Rescuing cats is nothing

new for Mr. Maguire. Although he grew up in a cat household, he never planned on having any as an adult. About 18 years ago, he took in a starving stray named Omar who passed last year due to kidney disease. Mr. Maguire described Omar as having changed his life.

Then, about 11 years ago, he found a kitten aboard the S.S. Norisle and took it home. That kitten got the name Little Norisle and Mr. Maguire describes him as having "the purest heart you could ever encounter." He seems to serve as a 'healing cat' and offers comfort for those in need.

Six years ago, he livetrapped a female feral cat and took it to a rescue. They had plans to euthanize her after deeming her incorrigible, but he signed a waiver and took her home instead. Her astronomical journey deserved a stellar name, so she became known as Ori-

Finally, Swif was a feral

kitten who Mr. Maguire helped adopt out to a family in the area, but it did not work out at the other home and Swif found his way back to Mr. Maguire's doorstep where he was welcomed back with open arms.

Today, the Maguire house is a cat haven. The kitties have been getting along extremely well with each other and love exploring Mr. Maguire's catwalk with penthouse, an outdoor 'catio' which is an enclosed space for their outdoor exploration, and the crown jewel—a cat castle he built with his staff at TerraStar Building Products.

"We are thrilled with the level of care we see from Rob. I was thrilled to see not only he put in a bid for Dobby but was very concerned; even if we didn't choose him he was constantly asking for updates to know how he was doing," said Ms. DeVries. "It seems to be a match made in heaven for those two. When they have a

bond, you can see it pretty quick."

Dobby has been steadily gaining weight, growing from 0.9 kilograms when he was brought home to his present mass of 1.5 kilograms. Many people have expressed their interest in having a dedicated social media channel for Dobby updates, something Mr. Maguire said he might consider if he can make the time. For the time being, Mr. Maguire has made photos of Dobby publicly viewable on his personal Facebook account.

"Under the circumstances of what he endured, he's so very lucky to be alive. He's a very happy, good-natured little guy," said Mr. Maguire.

"We're expecting Dobby to do a full recovery. Despite a couple of minor setbacks, he should be a very active, playful kitty for rob," added Ms. DeVries.

patients have to go to access these services. It also included smaller centres such as Elliot Lake which is working on implementing its own CT scanner.

Ms. Fields consulted with physicians and nursing staff to gather their perspectives and obtained a wide range of opinions on the matter, with no strong leaning in either direction.

"We also did some literature review to see what the evidence was for having a CT scanner in a Northern rural setting. There was no compelling evidence there either, to swing either way," said Ms. Foster.

Potential benefits of the service included decreased travel, improved patient satisfaction, increased likelihood of patients undergoing scans and faster access to thrombolysis (a treatment to get rid of blood clots) for stroke victims.

Possible downsides included increased exposure to radiation, insignificant findings through the scans and increased patient demand. Any CT scanner that MHC would be able to get would be a less robust model than is available at Health Sciences North,

meaning the scope of scans would be much narrower and many severe patients would still need to be transferred to HSN for more indepth scans.

The scanner would increase the attractiveness of MHC for locum health practitioners, would offer better clinical information for specialist consultations, allow for more responsive care if a patient's health deteriorates during the diagnostic process and a reduction in the necessity for nursing escorts.

However, more staff would be needed to interpret the imaging, there is a risk of using the scanner for ill-fitting conditions, money would have to be reallocated away from other services to fund the CT scanner and a great deal more training would also be required.

The final element of the assessment was the business side, looking at how much of an impact the service would have. The team assessed patient volumes

over the past three years and accounted for a likely increase in referrals due to local practices being more inclined to refer patients to take CT scans if they were more accessible.

"It would look like an incremental increase in costs," said Ms. Foster. Although the hospital would be able to save more than \$200,000 each year

based on the projected costs of sending patients to have CT scans at Health Sciences North, in addition to receiving extra revenue for having the service through an OHIP professional fee, this pales in comparison to the operating expenses of the scanner.

A copy of the business plan includes a five-year

portions of the park had been sold to local business interests without public notice or consultation. In response to a challenge by Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens that she had more faith in an "outside organization" than in locally elected officials, Ms. Meehan responded that the aforementioned sale of portions of the park, and the manner in which the business was conducted by the municipality had shattered that trust.

In response to a challenge by Councillor Scott asking if she was aware of the protections of green space offered by the provincial policy statement (passed shortly after the previously referenced sale of portions of Wagg's Wood), Ms. Meehan responded that she was aware of that, but noted that governments change while the EBC's mandate and direction does not. Councillor Scott replied that the EBC is a provincially regulated trust—but it was pointed out that the EBC is federally regulated, although the EBC does work closely with the MNRF.

Mr. Legge noted that his was one of the businesses that purchased a portion of the Wagg's Wood property and that his expansion resulted "in six individuals moving to this part the Island" and that he has very deep roots in the township and regularly gives back to the community.

The business owner stated that while he does believe the park should stay a park, he did not support turning the property over to the EBC. He asserted that Mr. Barnett was not being fully candid when saying that his organization has no authority over neighbouring developments. Chief among his concerns was that any neighbouring property owner could object to his future expansion plans. "If I want to change something, he could object," said Mr. Legge. "He could have a say."

Mr. Barnett responded that the EBC has 171 nature reserves and has only once ever objected to a neighbouring development, the aforementioned plan to dig gravel below a watertable that would have destroyed a protected wetland.

Mr. Legge then asked if the property had been purchased by the municipality, to which CAO Ruth Frawley responded that the municipality had purchased the property for \$60,000, although the funds had come from the Government of Ontario. "It was paid for," she said.

Following the meeting, in discussion with The Expositor, lawyer Patricia Meehan, a Wagg family member, noted that her investigation into the land deal indicates that there is no proof that the family was ever paid for the property. "My grandmother insists the family never received any money from the transfer," she said.

"The land transfer departed from regular practice," continued Ms. Meehan. "There is simply a note that the clerk at the time would take care of it. It was very irregular."

Mr. Legge reiterated that he believed the park is good for the town and that he would not be against the town putting regulations in place to ensure the property stays intact, but that he did not see a need to transfer it to the EBC.

Many of Mr. Legge's statements were met with tangibly hostile exclamations by those in the room. The businessman referenced that he was likely the sole voice in opposition in the room during his opening statement.

Following Mr. Legge's presentation to the committee, Chair Linda Farquhar said that enough time had been spent on the matter and that council would not be making any decision at this time. No councillor had questions for Mr. Legge.

"It breaks the time up so differently when you think of the chores that are coming your way. There's not much time left to harvest," said Ms. Colyer.

One item that has been a staple as of late has been

cost analysis, with the scanner projected to cost MHC \$225,000 in its first year and growing to \$260,000 in its fifth year. This would result in a net loss of nearly \$1.2 million over the first five years combined.

The cost of buying a scanner in the first place is also a consideration—generally speaking, the Ministry of Health does not fund CT scanner purchases. Other hospitals in Northeastern Ontario who have purchased their own scanners have pegged the cost at about \$1 million.


Because of the above factors, the MAC resolved that having a CT scanner on Manitoulin Island would not be a sound decision at the current moment. However, the committee has suggested that the case be revisited periodically in the future to be ready for, if and when that feasibility may change.



...continued from page 13 shortly to assess their progress, information that will be shared in next month's update.

"We're still really curious about what exactly is in everything that we're waiting. We've decided we might do a Kickstarter to raise money to take a bunch of food samples and get them tested," said Ms. Colyer.

This was partially spurred by the last round of bloodwork which showed a slight uptick in mercury levels to just above the acceptable range, despite having a fairly constant diet in the two periods.

Nutrition testing is quite expensive but the two say it would be extremely useful from a scientific perspective in that it would provide nutritional information for these species that would be relevant for anybody wishing to incorporate more wild foods for years to come.

One slight drawback in June was the lack of a bear in the open season. However, Mr. St. Onge knows a hunter who may be able to gift them some of his bear fat that he was not planning on keeping, an important



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Visiting Ontario's Island Retreat?

True tall tales of Manitoulin - Jack McQuarrie

anitoulin Island has been the favoured subject of many historians and raconteurs over the years, none perhaps quite so prolific in getting the stories down for posterity as Willis John McQuarrie of Gore Bay, known to everyone as Jack.

The former publisher of the Recorder in Gore Bay from the late 1960s until the early '90s went on to publish about a dozen books on the history of the Island, including the immensely popular 'Through the Years' series from 1983 until 1997. Subtitled 'Manitoulin History and Genealogy,'

these little booklets would sell for \$2 and regale readers with reprints of historical reports of weddings and family reunions, obituaries, poems, cartoons, advertisements and many old articles and photos; together they established the annals of the Island firmly in residents' proud awareness of their roots, struggles, misfortunes and achievements of

accounts of their 'happenings,' so his books became repositories of the histories of local families, of community traditions, newsworthy and homespun events and of politics near and far; the series can be found in almost all Island libraries. Many other books, such as 'The Early Years of Gore Bay,' replete with 38 chapters of reminiscences, newspaper clippings and photos also bore testimony to the joys and upheavals common in those days. In 2014, on the 125th anniversary of Gore Bay's incorporation, Jack McQuarrie was given the town's special honour of one of three inaugural lifetime achievement awards.

But mostly Jack McQuarrie just loved a good human interest story - he revelled in the role of chronicler, listen-

ing, recording, compiling and revealing the found narratives to scores of eager readers. His 'True Tall Tales of Algoma-Manitoulin' is a classic McQuarrie compilation of fact and fiction, spun into a collection of '400 Fascinating Stories of Happenings' on the Island and around the North Shore region.

In the introduction, the author lays the foundation on which the book rests: The stories, he writes, are "true happenings," but, he cautions, "... in the telling of a story the version can vary according to the individual telling it." And a kind of disclaimer, couched in lofty language to cement its import: "If there is a story that might be somewhat separated from the absolute truth, you will certainly recognize it as simply a tall tale too good to not publish."

Some stories have been told and re-told so many times, folklore has passed into local legend; there's certainly not many who could tell you for sure whether one or the other

Folksy and conversational, the stories are written with humour and with tongue firmly in cheek, or in the grave tones of a serious incident, murder, death or ghost story. There's an index to the 23 chapters entitled Accidents, Animals, Courts, Farmers, Hunting, Mail, Phones, Schools and so on, to suit every curiosity-seeker.

The mysterious forces at play in human lives are never far from Mr. McQuarrie's mind, whether relating boyhood pranks with the glee of a young man who cherishes those bygone days, or everyday occurrences gone somehow a little or a lot wrong. Much is keen observation – watching as an inept driver rolls backwards down a hill into the bush, capturing the near-accident, the bystanders' muffled merriment, the funny side of an averted disaster – and making light of problems, using humour to defuse tension, calm nerves and hopefully survive potentially dangerous

Gruesome stories of the hardships of winter or of hazardous travel by ship or horse and buggy or of a perilous job that could result in death were reminders of "Nature's Wrath," for which no humour was adequate. A return trip from Burnt Island to Gore Bay by horse and sleigh to see the dentist for a bad tooth could take three days in winter. Seventeen feet of snow fell on the Island one year; trucks and horses and sleighs often went through the lake ice; men and women went missing in massive snowstorms and were never heard of again; marine disasters were frequent and often fatal.

Writes Mr. McQuarrie, "Given the right circumstances, life released an intrepid individual ready to meet the challenge of most anything that came along. While ready and willing, the result might well cause their demise."

Much is the amusement at the re-telling of a punchline: when a Manitoulin passenger arrives in Toronto on the train, a young tout, calling out "King Edward! King Edward!" to disembarking guests of the hotel on the train platform, bumps into him. The Manitoulin man proceeds to admonish the boy with "No, no, boy, I'm Red Neil McColeman from Spring Bay!" Jokes about the foibles of



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

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rural people unaccustomed to the newfangled ways of the 'modern world' touched a chord as the pace of life quickened around them.

There is often some element of amazement that elevates a story to the level of "That was a good one!"the escaped British fraudster who flees to Northern Ontario, builds a cabin and "became known as an artist and poet;" the boys who heard spooky knocking coming from an abandoned house, entered the dark, haunted place to find, locked in an upstairs bedroom, an angry goat; the big black dog in harness that mysteriously appeared on an ice-covered lake just as a woman began miscarrying and her husband doubted his ability to pull her home on their toboggan (the dog was hitched to the toboggan, saving the day); the crow that led a lost captain and his ship to dry

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become the legends of their localities and the characters that people them their folk heroes. Now timeless, they still resonate with good humour, ingenuity, resilience and often, divine intervention. The 'True Tall Tales' involve real men, women, children and animals in sometimes hairraising situations, some-

time lighthearted or tragic, conveying a message about the hopes of humanity for a fair shake, with some sly winks along the way to lighten the load.

Corn seeds are planted roughly knuckledeep. Any deeper and they will take much longer to break the surface and begin to stretch toward the sky. The use of seven stalks harkens to the Seven Grandfather teachings that are another key aspect of Anishinaabe culture and understanding.

Mr. Manitowabi told the group that when the flowers of wild plums begin to bloom, that is the perfect time to plant corn. The corn must be left to grow for seven to 10 days before the beans enter the ground.

Beans are planted in a ring of 13 seeds around the corn circle to approximately the same depth as the corn. Mr. Manitowabi said this relates to the 13 moons of the year as well as the 13-year phases of life from childhood to adolescence, and ultimately age 52 when one is considered an elder of life.

He recommended soaking bean seeds overnight in water to encourage them to start growing, or to ensure the ground is kept wet for a week straight after planting drier seeds. Five days after the beans enter the ground, seven to 10 squash seeds are planted in a circle beyond the beans.

From there, all that's left is to ensure the gardens have plenty of water and time to grow and bear fruit. The corn is ready for harvest when the hairs atop the stock begin to turn brown. Mr. Manitowabi said the best corn seeds are located in the centre of the cob, which should be saved for the next year, while the ones closer to the edges of the cob can be safely enjoyed as a meal.

Ms. Bickell acknowledged the help of Kitty Lynn Lickers of Six Nations of the Grand River Haudenosaunee reserve in southern Ontario who has provided the MCFFI and Mr. Manitowabi with a considerable amount of guidance and feedback to help improve their planting techniques and knowledge.

Province announces funding for mental health and addictions supports

ONTARIO—Ontario's mental health and addictions system is disconnected with uneven access to quality services, making it challenging for patients and families to navigate a confusing system and get the services they need, a report from the province begins.

Last month, the province introduced the Foundations for Promoting and Protecting Mental Health and Addictions Services Act. If passed, this act would establish a Mental Health and Addictions Centre of Excellence within Ontario Health and support the province's participation in the national action lawsuit British Columbia launched last year against more than 40 opioid manufacturers and wholesalers.

'In response to longstanding calls for stronger provincial leadership, our government is taking a system-wide approach to building a connected mental health and addictions system," said Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and then Minister of Health and Long-Term Care. "The proposed Mental Health and Addictions Centre of Excellence would ensure Ontario patients and families are able to access integrated, standardized, evidencebased care and services no matter where they live. The new centre would lay the foundation as we develop and implement a comprehensive mental health care strategy."

Creating the centre follows recommendations made in 2010 by the Select Committee on Mental Health and Addictions, cochaired by Minister Elliott and established through a motion she presented. Within Ontario Health, the proposed Mental Health and Addictions Centre of Excellence would: establish a central point of accountability and oversight for mental health and addictions care; be responsible for standardizing and monitoring the quality and delivery of services and clinical care across the province, to provide a better and more consistent patient experience; and provide support and resources to Ontario Health Teams, which is a new model to integrate care and funding, connect patients to the different types of care they need and help them navigate the system.

If passed, the Foundations for Promoting and Protecting Mental Health and Addictions Services would support Ontario's participation in the national class action lawsuit British Columbia launched last year against more than 40 opioid manufacturers and wholesalers. The lawsuit was launched on behalf of all provincial, territorial and federal governments and aims to recover government health care costs incurred due to opioid-related disease, injury or illness.

"Our government is investing in solutions today that will help reduce wait times, enhance opioids and addictions services, create additional supportive housing, build capacity in child and youth mental health, support our men and women in uniform and add services for seniors, Francophones and Ontario's Indigenous peo-

Across the government, there is \$174 million in funding that includes: nearly \$30 million for child and youth community mental health services and programs across Ontario to ensure earlier and faster mental health and addictions support in communities; more than \$33 million for consumption treatment services sites in communities across the province. For those who are struggling with opioid and other drug addictions, these sites are an important first step towards treatment through funding will also support addictions programs at the local level across Ontario; more than \$15 million for more housing supports for people who are homeless and face mental health and addictions issues; more than \$25 million to reduce wait times for community mental health programs, and services for priority including populations, Francophones; more than \$27 million to fund mental health supports Ontario's education system, which will directly benefit schools, teachers and, most importantly, students and their parents; more than \$18 million to support mental health and addictions supports in the justice sector, including direct support for corrections staff to address Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and other mental health challenges.
