Canada declares microbeads toxic

by Alicia McCutcheon

LAKE HURON—Last week the federal government moved to list microbeads as a toxic substance under the Environmental Protection Act, thus giving the government power to ban the use of the microplastics (plastics smaller than five millimetres in size) in items such as body washes, cleansers and toothpastes.

According to Environment Canada, a substance is considered toxic if, "it is entering or may enter the environment in a quantity or concentration or under conditions that: have or may have an immediate or long-term harmful effect on the environment or its biological diversity; constitute or may constitute a danger to the environment on which life depends; or constitute or may constitute a danger in Canada to human life or health."

The ban follows a motion posed last year by NDP MP Megan Leslie to see microplastics added to the list of toxic substances, with unanimous approval from all parties.

The Environment Canada notice also points out that five of the 14 companies belonging to the Canadian Cosmetic, Toiletry and Fragrance Association have already eliminated the use of microbeads from their products

"A lot of tourists stop, but the locals are used to it now," laughed Ms.



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
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

Student-designed sculpture unveiled in Mindemoya

MINDEMOYA—Last year, the organization 4elements Living Arts and the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) joined to create a sculpture along with the split Grade 7 and 8 pupils at Central Manitoulin Public School (CMPS), with the students doing the actual design.

A grant from the Ontario Arts Council (OAC) had enabled the arts group to partner with MICA, a nonarts association. The purpose of the partnership was to work together to get permanent sculptures on cycle trails on Manitoulin and began with Sophie Edwards, the executive director of 4elements, Maja Mielonen, the head of MICA, Guy Nielon, a MICA board member, and Heather Thoma, a member of the arts group meeting with the students and to begin the process of teaching them about scale, sites and composition. The students were also taken on a bike ride to a path in the woods that led to the area where the final piece would be erected which was by the government dock on Lake Mindemoya.

There were four artists that worked with the project including Ms. Edwards, Heather Thoma, Marianna LaFrance and Patricia Mader. As Ms. Edwards explained, a development process led to teaching about design principles and a process for designing a sculpture and how to do a creative collaboration.

Great Lakes water must, above all, be returned to the lakes

It is troubling that, of the nine American states bordering the Great Lakes and whose governors or their proxies had the final say to a proposed water diversion in Wisconsin that will send Great Lakes water beyond the Great Lakes Basin and into another watershed area, none of these states ultimately objected to the proposal as they could have done under the terms of the Great Lakes Compact.

The provinces with Great Lakes coastline, Ontario and Quebec, are not part of the Great Lakes Compact except by observer status although representatives from the two Canadian jurisdictions were invited to the table when the decision was made to grant the city of Waukesha, Wisconsin the right to eventually divert as much as 8.2 million gallons per day of Lake Michigan water.

Granted, the city of Waukesha was forced to modify its original request which was for a higher volume of water which would have been dispersed to an area beyond the city. As it presently stands, only the city itself and its outlying boroughs will benefit from the eventual diversion.

The diverted water, which will eventually become Waukesha's single source of water, will be returned as treated sewage to Lake Michigan via the Root River.

In a letter to the editor in last week's edition of The Expositor, Wisconsin resident Jim Nies, who also spends time at his Kagawong area cottage and is a keen environmental observer, quoted the mayor of Racine, Wisconsin, through which Waukesha's treated sewage will pass on its trip to Lake Michigan, as saying that, with this decision, the Great Lakes compact "is over."

Racine Mayor John Dickert has also threatened a lawsuit from his city if the Waukesha plan was to proceed, which it now has licence to do

Waukesha, about 50km northwest of Racine, geographically straddles the Great Lakes Basin so the fact that it enjoys this historic surveyor's perk opened the door for it to apply for Lake Michigan water not only for the city itself but also for communities definitely outside of the Great Lakes Basin but which are associated with Waukesha.

The main point of this exercise is that, as Mr. Nies pointed out in his well written letter, this has been a precedent-setting decision and the ramifications are enormous to the Great Lakes, situated as they are to the north of central and western United States regions that are running out of fresh water.

Now that this battle has been fought and won with the ultimate acquiescence of the other eight Great Lakes governors and the quiet permission of the premiers of Ontario and Quebec, the next time such a request comes before the Great Lakes Compact, and such a request (or several of them) are doubtless being drafted right now in the wake of the Waukesha decision, it will be difficult for the group to ultimately deny it (them).

Granted, we're sitting beside a large proportion of all the world's fresh water as residents of Great Lakes communities.

We can only assume that the governors and premiers determined

that it would be unfair to continue to hoard this wonderful resource in light of the case a community like Waukesha made to be able to continue its growth and development, even beyond its primary urban perimeter.

It's not that the water is being sold; it's being diverted and most of it will return to the Great Lakes as treated sewage, just like Chicago, Toronto, Buffalo, Cleveland, Thunder Bay, Sault Ste. Marie (both of them), Kingston, Belleville, Owen Sound and all Manitoulin Island communities on the North Channel and Lake Huron equipped with waste water treatment systems presently do.

We are used to drinking and bathing and cooking with water that has passed through millions of kidneys and has been treated, disinfected and returned to source.

That is not the point of all the concerns that are being raised.

The point is, for future applications for diversion from any of the five Great Lakes, how far beyond the Great Lakes Basin will it be pumped and piped?

Will it be 50 km? 100 km? Half a continent?

In the current debate, Waukesha is committed to bearing the cost of pumping and piping in the diverted Lake Michigan water, treating the waste water and routing the treated water through a river system that brings it back to Lake Michigan, Lake Huron's twin lake in terms of water levels.

It appears that we are going to have to live with this new arrangement.

What we should not have to live with, however, and the politicians we send to Ottawa, Queen's Park and Quebec City should receive this message loudly, clearly and soon is, based on this precedent, the Great Lakes cannot be seen as a watering can for vast and thirsty areas of North America south of the 49th parallel.

We now will, within a decade, be sending some water beyond the Great Lakes Basin and we'll be getting most of it back.

The precedent must be this but no more than this.

The Great Lakes is a unique repository of fresh water but it is, like most natural resources, not inexhaustible.

During the past 30 years, the levels of Lakes Huron and Michigan have fluctuated by as much as 10 feet and, only three years ago when these lakes' official measure of depth finally dipped below chart datum, there was enormous concern among the residents of communities that border these two enormous bodies of water.

The water is coming back up now, but when it was low that had nothing to do with water diversions and much to do with the vagaries of nature, over which we have absolutely no control.

The Great Lakes Compact, both its American and Canadian delegates, must bear in mind the natural ebb and flow of these lakes when other application for water diversions are being considered.

At the very least, the rule that the water taken out of one of the Great Lakes must be returned to it must be honoured above all.

"I am so glad to be part of the Union and honoured to be here today," said Rama Chief Rodney Noganosh. "Thank you for welcoming us back with opening arms."

After opening remarks from AOK Chief Patsy Corbiere, Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee and Deputy Grand Council Chief Glen Hare, the elders panel was introduced: Elsie Bissaillion, Leroy Dolson, Mike Esquega, Gordon Waindubence and Donna Debassige.

Mr. Esquega, from Northern Superior, began the panel discussing how the Union is all one big nation working together as a family. "We need to be sovereign and to govern ourselves," said Mr. Esquega. "We should respect each other and we need to visit those seven grandfather teachings to live the best we can. Our language and culture is who we are as people and we need to work with the elders in our communities to learn the language and learn the ceremonies so we can know the culture."

Ms. Debassige, from M'Chigeeng First

Nation, spoke in Ojibwe, which was translated by Chief Glen Hare. She stressed the importance of sweat lodges and standing together as a nation. She also spoke of missing and murdered aboriginal women and how something needs to be done to stop

Ms. Bissaillion repeated the importance of "language to our nation."

"The teachings from elders has always been of value," said Ms. Bissaillion. "The creators instilled in us to be caretakers of

She explained that the eagle staff, wampum belt and bundle are all message carriers to the Creator. "They let us take messages back like the eagle, one of the birds that can fly the highest," she said.

'We need to bring that spirituality back to our people for our younger generation,' said Ms. Bissaillion.

During the assembly there was also a chief's circle, an opportunity for the chiefs to talk about what is happening in their communities, a review and resolutions concerning the Child Well-Being Implementation Plan, a discussion of the Anishinaabemowin Language Portal and discussions related to restorative jurisdiction, lands and resources, economic development, the Motherrisk Commission and the annual portfolio panel.

It's time to be vigiliant for turtles and snakes on our roads

Many Ontario turtles and snakes are endangered species

To the Expositor:

At this time of year drivers need to be on the lookout for turtles trying to cross the road. Every year I come across dead turtles and snakes in my travels. This year I found two turtles and one snake. All three were in places with slow speed limits where they should have been easy to avoid hitting. I found a dead painted turtle today, on Ketchankookem Trail near Mindemoya, where the speed

limit is 40 kilometres per hour. If that speed is slow enough to avoid toddlers, it should be slow enough to avoid turtles. So what happened? Was the driver speeding, or not watching the road? Or was the driver trying to kill this vulnerable animal? Painted turtles move during the day, so it was likely run over in the morning. Poor visibility at night was not likely a factor.

Many Ontario turtles and snakes have become species at

risk, their numbers steadily shrinking. We drain their swamps for our homes and cottages, leaving less and less habitat for them, and kill them on roads. Sometimes it's unavoidable, but often I think a more careful driver could have safely avoided them.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Fire department

Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey reported that there had been three calls for service recently including an assist with a brush fire in the Otter Lake area on May 19, a fire alarm on June 11 at the Manitoulin Health Centre and a bush fire in the Perch Lake area.

Mr. Bailey commended the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) on their work with the water bomber helping fight the Perch Lake fire. He also noted that there wouldn't be a charge to the municipality other than for the ground crew from 10 am to 2 pm (even though they stayed the night) because they were already in the area and it was a first response.

Mr. Bailey also stated in his report that there had been 28 calls for service so far in 2016 and that a few members of the department attended an auto extraction training session along with other members from across the Island with Paratech Rescue representatives.

Community services and public works

Reid Taylor presented council with the community services report for June. He said the recreation centre staff was busy prepping for upcoming events and completing maintenance tasks.

"The Sea Cadet Review and Little Current and District Fish and Game dinner went very well," said Mr. Taylor of two events recently held at the recreation centre.

For parks, Mr. Taylor said that youth sport programs were completed by June 30 and that the trails, parks and washrooms were being inspected and maintained regularly. He added that the Northeast Town Community Picnic is being held on Sunday, July 10 at Low Island.

"Spider Bay Marina is operating and seeing increased business each week," said Mr. Taylor. "The Port of Little Current is open and seeing more traffic each week."

Mr. Taylor said that there were two rendezvous that would be visiting the port—one on June 28 and the second on July 21.

He also noted that cruise ships would be visiting on June 28, July 7, July 13, July 20 and 21.

The public works report noted that grading and the placing of calcium on roads was underway and that culverts were being replaced where needed.

The report also noted that roadside grass cutting was underway and that operations at the landfill were going well. The new half-ton truck has arrived and the Highway 6 crossing (culvert) will be starting shortly.

Councillor Mike Erskine suggested posting bear alert signs next time there is a bear at Low Island Park, referring to an incident of a bear at the park in June when the park had to be shut down until the bear moved on.

Building controls

Council was presented with the building controls report for June. The report stated that there had been 22 permits issued to date and that another three applications had been submitted and are under review.

"The total value of construction to date is \$2,890,636 with total building permit revenue of \$34,780.53," the report stated.

Transfers

Council approved the transfer of \$31,249, representing one-time funds received in 2015, to the working capital reserve account. Council also carried a motion authorizing the town to withdraw \$97,235 out of the working capital reserve account to cover the 2015 operating deficit.

Canada Day

The Northeast Town council contributed \$1,900 to the Little Current Business Improvement Area that the town received through Celebrate Canada for Canada Day events and activities in Little Current.

Council reviewed a letter from Joan Bell requesting the installation of a frog/turtle/snake sign on Limekiln Road and Townline Roads.

Man tasered outside Tim Hortons

On June 24 at 4 am, the Espanola Police Service received a call to attend the Tim Hortons on Centre Street, in relation to a customer who was causing a disturbance inside.

While responding, an officer was waved down in the area of Queensway Street by a frantic male and female, who told the officer that the individual from the Tim Hortons had followed them out of the restaurant, and wouldn't leave them alone. The male, later identified as a 30-year old resident of Sarnia, was across the street yelling at the two individuals, and appeared agitated. He then began walking in an aggressive manner towards the police officer, despite the officer's commands for him to stop, and ignored warnings to stop yelling or he would be arrested for causing a disturbance. 

of dollars into the renovations that would be needed for the arena (\$500,000 in one instance and a further \$750,000 in another proposed renovation and upgrade). Buildings have a lifespan, and the Mindemoya arena was built in 1946, so there comes a time when you have to assess things with an open mind. There are a lot of issues with the current facility."

Our biggest problem is we are looking at buildings that we have such as the (Mindemoya arena) and accessibility requirements that have to be met in the next few years and whether we should keep spending money on repairs on buildings such as the arena that is 70 years-old when it does not meet accessibility standards," said Mayor Stephens.

"The (MAAC) committee said we need to make sure the all the municipal community centres are on board and if a new building is constructed than it should be a multi-use facility," said Mr. Bridgeman. "We are in the very, very early stages of this whole proposal."

A new modern facility would enable more activities and services to be provided, noted Mr. Bridgeman, who cited his students' use of the current arena and the example of his own parents who live in southern Ontario. 'They go to a local mall where there are walking programs in the winter. With a modern facility you can use it for a lot more things.

The current ice service remains wet for up to seven weeks in the summer, pointed out Mr. Bridgemen.

At the council meeting last week, Councillor Derek Stephens said, "I'd like to see at least one councillor from each ward to work on the committee. Because of what this investigation is all about, I would like to see the whole township working together on this project.'

Mayor Stephens said, "the appointment of Mr. Bridgeman would be to lead the committee but there will be a number of people from the community on the committee."

"In the committee they said they would use the MAAC committee members, and I have no problem with that, but I think there also needs to be broader representation," said Councillor Derek Stephens.

Council passed a motion to appoint Mr. Bridgeman to lead a broad-based committee composed of members appointed by council from all three wards of the municipality to investigate the replacement and options for a new multi-use facility, considering such things as location and activities and this committee report to the property committee with their findings.

Appointments have not yet been decided or announced, but potential community representatives are being vetted and the committee will likely start work soon. "We are in the very early stages," reiterated Mr. Bridgemen.

In a related issue, council passed a motion at its meeting for municipal staff to proceed with the original plans as set out in the funding application for the east wall repairs at the J.H. Burt Memorial Arena.

amounted to little more than tokenism that would not be of much help to children with autism living in the North. "It's Mike Harris all over again," she assert-

The Ontario Autism Program was initially slated to be implemented in 2018, but will now begin in June 2017 according to an announcement by the Ontario Ministry of Children and Youth Services. The programming will now begin a full year ahead of the original plan and will also boast increased access to services and supports.

The province promises that the new Ontario Autism Program will provide all children, regardless of age, with more flexible services that will meet child's individual each

Autism or Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a lifelong, complex, neurodevelopmental disorder, characterized by persistent deficits in social communication and interaction and where symptoms can vary significantly and range widely in severity.

According to the provincial announcement, the new program will increase the number of treatment spaces and significantly reduce wait times to accommodate the rising prevalence of autism diagnosis.

There are an estimated 40,000 children and youth in Ontario with autism and according to some studies in the US, prevalence has grown from 1 in 150 in 2002 to 1 in 68 in 2010.

The government met with experts, stakeholders and families since the initial 2016 announcement of the program to aid their development of the support they will provide. The additional supports include: access to earlier diagnosis, more direct funding and more choice, more resources for families and more supports in schools.

The 2016 Ontario Budget had committed \$333 million over five years for the program, in addition to the \$190 million Ontario provides for autism services annually, but the enhancements will now invest an additional \$200 million over the next four years to better support children and youth with autism and their fami-

lies. Ontario NDP leader Andrea Horwarth called this new program an important win for youth and children with autism. "Parents and children across Ontario living with autism stood up to fight for the services they need, and today is a victory for families," said Ms. Horwath. "They knew that with the right supports, their children could live up to their full potential, and they didn't give up hope. Today is a win for the future of all of those children.'

As part of the new approach being touted by the province, an advisory committee of parents, stakeholders, advocates and service providers will begin meeting this summer to advise the ministry on the design of the new program.

Kids of all ages with an autism diagnosis can now count on the treatment when they need it, regardless of age, said Children and Youth Services Minister Michael Coteau during an announcement made at Queen's Park. "The new program will provide all children, no matter how old they are, with the level of intensity they require. Every single child will receive the services they need, period."

The new announcement indicates that the Ontario government has backed away from the controversial age limit it imposed earlier this year on funding for intensive therapy for children with autism where children over five would be cut off, regardless of how long they spent on the waiting lists and has introduced a new program for therapy funding in the province. In March, the province had announced \$333 million in funding for autism programs over five years. but at the same time eliminated government-funded intensive therapy for children aged five years and older.

That move was widely criticized by affected families and advocates leading to a Tuesday, June 28 media release stating that it "has listened closely to experts, stakeholders, service providers and families.

The government's new autism plan adds another \$200 million over four years to speed up program delivery and provides \$1,000 per week for therapy for children five years old

and up while they're on the wait list.

The transition to the new program will begin in June 2017 instead of 2018, the ministry said, adding that "the new program will provide all children, regardless of age, with more flexible services at a level of intensity that meets each child's individual needs, significantly reduce wait times for service and increase the number of treatment spaces available to serve more children and accommodate the rising prevalence in autism diagnoses," the province said.

Additional supports announced on June 28 include a choice of direct funding or immediate and continuous access applied behaviour analysis (ABA) services and supports for children five and over who were on the intensive behavioural intervention (IBI) waitlist, to provide access to continuous service until children are able to enter the new program next year. The supports include strengthened autism supports in schools to help children transition to and continue in full-time school; increased access to diagnostic assessments to allow for earlier diagnosis and treatment; greater

...continued from page 1 with nine more companies committed to end their use by the end of this decade.

In a 2011 Great Lakes survey of microplastics, Dr. Sherri Mason, a chemistry professor at the State University of New York at Fredonia, was able to take 21 samples from three of the Great Lakes, eight of which came from Lake Huron.

The samples taken closest to Manitoulin came from near St. Joseph Island, which also showed the largest amounts of plastics in Lake Huron—up to 5,000 pieces of plastic per square kilometre.

Lake Superior had the smallest number of plastics in a sample, Lake Huron had more and Lake Erie had the most—up to 600,000 plastic particles per square

kilometer in two of this lake's samples.

These plastics are found in the food chain, as they are too small to be caught in wastewater treatment systems and end up in our lakes and river systems and into the stomachs of fish and birds. The long-term affects on microplastics on these animals is not yet

access to information and direct supports for families to help in transitioning to the new program.

"It is a complete sea change for the autism program from what was announced in March and what was going on beforehand," said Bruce McIntosh, president of the Ontario Autism Coalition. "They have stepped forward in a major way and it's going to meet the needs of every kid touched by autism in Ontario. Whether they've been on the wait list, whether they've been in the [Intensive Behavioural Intervention] program, it's going to take care of all of them."

"What the parents are looking for more than anything is a clear statement that if their kid is over the age of five and has a severe diagnosis, that they're not going to get thrown under the bus, that they will get intensive intervention," said Anne Jovanovic, spokesperson for the Alliance Against the Ontario Autism Program.

The Ontario Autism Coalition will be participating in a new 12-member implementation committee to guide the transition under the new policy.

"We are delighted that the government has recognized the urgency of the need to move forward with the accelerated implementation and the assurance that the 2,200 children removed from the waiting list are not left behind while also ensuring the

needs of those in service continue to be met," reads a statement from the coalition. "This program will be addressing the unique individualized clinical needs of each child with autism living in the province of Ontario."

"The most important thing is early intervention," said Ms. McLaughin, who credits IBI with changing her child's future for the better. "We spent a relatively short time on the waiting list," she said. "Others had to wait much, much longer to access the services they need.

Ms. McLaughlin noted that the therapy helped her daughter develop language skills that allowed her to go to school. In an odd Catch-22 with the previous program, Molly improved so much by the time she was six, that she no longer qualified.

"It allows children to grow up knowing how to communicate, to be able to go to school, get a job, be able to take care of themselves," she said. "I know governments are always looking at the short term, this budget, the next election, but over the long term being able to be employed, to be able to look after themselves, children with autism will not be a burden to society in the long term. Which makes more sense.'

At first blush, it seems the provincial government has decided that Ms. McLaughlin and her fellow parents are



Biofest attendee turns presenter at the fourth annual Batman's Biofest

by Robin Burridge SHEGUIANDAH—The

many attendees at the 4th annual Batman's Biofest were in for a special treat this year, as a long time seasonal resident of the campground and past Biofest attendee himself, Noah Loiselle, was one of this year's presenters, sharing his passion for the snakes of Manitoulin.

"I have been interested in reptiles and amphibians as long as I can remember," shared 18-year-old Noah Loiselle of Dowling. "My family grew up renting a cottage at Batman's, eventually having a permanent lot there, and I have been attending Biofest since it started.

Mr. Loiselle said that he was introduced to Biofest organizer entomologist Dr. Joe Shorthouse by the owners of Batman's several years ago and what started as a mutual love of nature and its critters turned into a friendship.

He also knew this year's fellow Biofest presenter herpetologist Dr. David Lesbarrers, after being connected through his biology teacher.

During his presentation, 'Snakes of Manitoulin: Our Misunderstood Friend,' Mr. Loiselle talked about the nine of the 17 species of snakes found in Ontario that live on Manitoulin. He described how to recognize them and explained the importance of snakes.

'Snakes are important for the ecosystem—they play an important role," said Mr. Loiselle. "Snakes have gained a bad reputation from TV, but we need to teach kids that snakes are important."

Mr. Loiselle said he woke up at dawn on the morning of Biofest and went out in search of a snake to show

"I had been out searching at 6 am, and minutes before Biofest started (at 9:30 am) I found a water snake and was able to catch it," said Mr. Loiselle. "The kids really loved it. They were so curious.'

Mr. Loiselle explained how he had just returned from a year studying in Ecuador where he had the and Dr. Shorthouse and Mr. Loiselle hopes to attend Laurentian University next year to study zoology.

Dr. Shorthouse gave his presentation this year on beetles. During his presentation he pointed out that both the largest and smallest insect are beetles.

"If you lined up all the animals in the world every fifth species would be a beetle and every 10th would be a weevil," said Dr. Shorthouse, before reviewing what a beetle is.

He also reviewed what beetles do on Manitoulin including walking on water, making light, swimming and eating trees and noted how they were the first pollinators on the planet.

Dr. Lesbarreres talked about the difference between reptiles and amphibians. He also spoke of the importance of frogs as biological indicators for both water and land.

"Another cool thing about frogs is that they have been around for over 250 million years," said Dr. Lesbarreres. "That is something that we need to respect and we need to protect creatures that

Golden retrievers get second chance in loving Manitoulin homes

excitement! The great anticipation. The tears and laughter. Ten couples waited at Toronto's Pearson Airport Air Canada Cargo West building on June 1 for a very special delivery. People came from Collingwood, Bowmanville, Whitby and other parts of Ontario as well as Fall River, Nova Scotia to meet their canine fosterdogs who had come all the way from Turkey.

Overseeing the orderly welcome for the dogs and their handover to their new owners were volunteers from Golden Rescue, a Canadian not-for-profit organization that has been rescuing and rehoming golden retrievers for over 25 years.

Volunteer Vive Tann, chair of the Golden Rescue Board of Directors, had wel-

comed the expectant owners saying, "A huge thank you to all of you who are here to adopt and open your homes and your hearts to these goldens." This was the ninth Mission of Love of the organization for Operation Instanbul, an initiative to rescue dogs from a country that does not support euthanization. Hundreds of dogs are spayed or neutered and receive their rabies shots and are left to survive on the streets, in the woods or in shelters.

Goldens are a docile bunch and do not fare the best on the streets of Istanbul as they are attacked by other dogs. A volunteer funded trip to that city to size up the situation of the goldens led to the Canadian organization extending their reach beyond this country. Many of these dogs from Turkey have found for ever homes here and Golden Rescue will continue to transport the animals, stopping only when weather gets too hot, as Air Canada will not allow the transport of the goldens under those circumstances. A temperature of 29°C at either Instanbul or Toronto airports will mean the end of rescues for a while.

When the goldens arrive at Cargo West, they are released one by one from their travel crates and two volunteers spend a few minutes to reassure the dogs after their long flight and tie a bandana with their name on it on them. The animals are already wearing a necklace of Turkish charms, called Nazars, made by the shelter workers in Istanbul to insure safe travel. They are then passed on to their owners-to-be who are given an envelope containing a health passport, which includes confirmation of the rabies vaccine, a Turkish commands and translation sheet, two home alone wallet cards, a vet information sheet and a copy of the organization's quarterly newsletter. The dogs are given water and a trip outside before posing for a group photo and heading off to their new homes.

Here on Manitoulin, goldens are also included with the rescues of any type of dog or cat by Manitoulin Pet Rescue. As one of the founding members of the organization told The Expositor, there have already been 55 rescues and adoptions by the organization since its inception in September of 2015. Julie McDermid also added that, "Our foster families are slowly increasing which allows us to help more animals in need. We are still experiencing a huge shortage of foster homes for cats and kittens. The communities on Manitoulin and the North Shore have shown us such tremendous support by sharing all our adoption posts with families and friends, by donating gently used pet supplies and food and by providing financial dona-

...continued from page 3 cal Society had installed new windows and the transformation it created showed its potential."

duo had been involved in many galleries and were well aware of how much time and effort such an undertaking would entail. While on vacation in Mexico, the decision was made to not take on the endeavour. However, when they returned everyone asked when the gallery opening would take place. That was March. The gallery opened in June with a little help from their friends.

"A lot of people helped get it ready," he stated. "There was incredible support. It could not have been possible without you."

"I am really impressed with the turnout; this is awesome," Mr. Edwards continued. "Jim's music adds so much. Both he and (wife) Joanne were here 20 years ago when we first began. This has been a wonderful experience; we have enjoyed it so much."

Mayor Aus Hunt was in attendance and said, "we are very fortunate to have you here (in Kagawong)."

In 1976 Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) art teacher Jacquie Gordon met Mr. Edwards at an art show in southern Ontario. Ms. Gordon invited her new friend to lead a silk screening demonstration for her high school students. This was the first taste of Manitoulin Island for Mr. Edwards. In 1983 the couple built their home studio in Kagawong and became permanent residents 10 years

After moving to Kagawong, the couple worked from their home studios until transforming the upper story of the historic Old Mill into a working studio and art gallery.

Mr. Edwards has conducted workshops in many locations over the years, predominantly plein (French for 'the open air') classes in watercolour, acrylic and oils. He has been the instructor of the La Cloche Art School for the past 26 years. Edwards Studios has led countless workshops and demos since opening in 1996: everything from fashion shows, jewellery making, paper making and painting.

For the 2016 season they will be holding fused glass workshops led by Ms. Edwards. The technique uses pieces of coloured glass and transforms them using a layering method which is then kiln fired to create plates, wall hangings, ornaments and other beautiful pieces of art. There will also be demonstrations and workshops in pottery, spinning, weaving and lamp work bead making.

The art gallery which is flooded with natural light and charm, showcases paintings, weaving, pottery and other items. The gallery opened its doors to the public for the season during the Victoria Day long weekend and runs until the Thanksgiving weekend.

While neither of them come from artistic background Mr. Edwards "can't remember when I didn't draw or paint." When he was in school, people told him all the time that he would be an artist. He did not believe them. "Barb is always drawing," commented Mr. Edwards.

Mr. Edwards feels that it is amazing that for a village the size of Kagawong it boasts both a museum and an art gallery. When he and his wife were first settling into the gallery space 20 years ago, their friends

When first exploring the

When first exploring the Island as a potential permanent home, they visited other communities, "but we always came back to Kagawong," shared Edwards. The couple had a Top 10 list of must haves for where they would make their Island home and luckily Kagawong had all 10. Some of these included year round road access, a school for their then young children, a library (as they both love to read), a beach for swimming and a post

The view of the Channel through the building's north facing windows provides "perfect light for painting," shared Mr. Edwards. "You can look out the same window each day and the water is never the same," he noted. Mr. Edwards' love of nature and water is evident in his creations and many of them are of bodies of water. He enjoys the four seasons as they offer a variety of appealing and inspirational subjects for painting.

A new addition to the gallery's collection, 'Moonlight,' depicts Kagawong's must see Bridal Veil Falls; the moon shines above give back to the community in their already busy lives. Ms. Edwards sits on the Library and Museum Boards and Mr. Edwards was on Billings Economic Development committee for many years. Ms. Edwards said she feels Kagawong has a strong sense of community and Mr. Edwards finds people are "fairly progressive; not afraid to try something new."

The support of the fulltime residents in the village is the basis of the gallery, stated Mr. Edwards. Many have become their friends, bringing visiting family and friends to the gallery.

Approximately 15 artists from Northern Ontario showcase their work at the gallery including pottery, wood workers and textiles.

Edwards Studios is a working studio, "so there is always glass work, painting, weaving and framing underway as well as custom framing," shared Mr. Edwards.

The couple is hosting an art show in September at Artists in Elgin featuring Mr. Edwards original serigraphs and Ms. Edward's fused glass

fused glass.

Mr. Edwards has been involved with the La Cloche Art Show for numerous years and this year his painting 'Clear Water' was awarded first place in Watercolour.

Their son Morgan is a graduate of Ontario College of Art and Design and daughter Kendra is a graduate of the University of Ottawa. Morgan's paintings can be viewed at the gallery and Kendra's graphic designs are at the Outpost General Store in Little Current and Mudge Bay Mercantile in Kagawong.

La Cloche Art Show presents 39th

WHITEFISH FALLS—Getting a piece into the juried La Cloche Art Show is a seminal highpoint in many artist's careers, such is the competition.

Before the opening reception on June 30, this year's distinguished artist Kathy Dolan of Espanola provided a workshop on how she creates her stunning pastel landscapes which was very well attended.

"I am just so thrilled and surprised," said Ms. Dolan on being chosen as Distinguished Artist for the 39th juried show. "Ever since I first entered the show it has been an aspiration of mine to be a featured artist.'

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

PROVIDENCE BAY—The Mutchmor, the former McDermid's Home Hardware building in Providence Bay, held its official grand opening this past Canada Day and is quickly earning a name for itself as a 'must visit' destination on Manitoulin.

The name of the new space, The Mutchmor Galleries, comes from the name of the street on which is stands, with 'Mutchmor' being the original name of Hwy 551 and one of the original family names in the vil-

Matthew Garniss, proprietor of Providence Bay's Lake Huron Fish and Chips Co., purchased the 10,000 sq foot historical building last year and renovated the space along with his girlfriend Bridgette Sarpong, turning it into a café, health food store, art galleries, record store and home décor store.

"The first day was really emotional for a lot of people seeing the building open again because it means so much to people in the community. There are also a number of specialty health food items and drinks (all in environmentally friendly packaging).

The Oriole Arts Studio and Gallery is located at the front of the building, next to the Peace Café. Artists erinblythe reddie, Jan McQuay, Ursula Hettman, Detlef Heiser and Nancy McDermid share the studio, showcasing their individual works. Ms. Reddie's work includes beaded scarves, notepaper and pieces featuring Haiku, while Ms. McQuay creates pottery and takes beautiful photographs. Manitoulin woodworker Detlef Heiser's Shaker boxes show his exceptional craftsmanship and Ms. Hettman's stunning jewellery and unique cloth-



Public input opportunity on Local Food Act goals

TORONTO—The Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) is seeking public input on a draft of local food access goals stemming from the second aspirational goal of the Local Food Act, 2013.

Under the Act, the goal entitled 'increasing access to local food' was proclaimed and stakeholders and other interested organizations and communities were engaged to refine three (deliberately broad) preliminary draft goals earlier this spring.

"The goals are intentionally broad in order to capture as many local food conversations as possible," notes an OMAFRA release.

ans to choose local food when available, and to make local food more available to everyone, the draft aspirational local food access goals are as follows: increase opportunities for all Ontarians to choose local food; increase the variety of local food offerings to celebrate the diversity of Ontario and its foods; and increase collaborations and strengthen partnerships among producers, communities, and the public and private sectors.'

Manitoulin local food advocate Valerie McIntyre said that the local food organization here has been frustrated by a lack of input into decisions in the region, particularly on Manitoulin. "I keep trying to have us included, but it has been frustrating," she said. "We were told that the local food hub would be in place on the Island by 2016, but we have not heard anything. We have no idea what is going on."

Ms. McIntyre said that the local group is planning to submit input.

"We are no longer part of the Island Good Food Box program," she noted, pointing out that including the local food options in the box is problematic because of agreements to purchase from local retailers. "They told me it wouldn't be fair to them. They are trying to source Ontario food."

Local food is defined within the Local Food Act

as "food produced or harvested in Ontario, including forest or freshwater food, and subject to any limitations in the regulations. food and beverages made in Ontario if they include ingredients produced or harvested in Ontario; this definition recognizes the traditional knowledge, diverse cultures and holistic belief systems of indigenous peoples and includes their traditional

The Ontario government is looking for public input on the draft local food access goals. "We'd like to hear your general comments regarding the draft aspirational goals and answers to the following guiding questions: How

could the draft goals be revised to better support increasing access of local food to all Ontarians?; What is currently happening in your community to support local food access?; and how should success toward the draft local food access goals




