Whooping crane (endangered species) shot on Barrie Island deemed special case by federal government

Crime Stoppers helping to find information on who killed rare waterfowl so appropriate charges can be laid

with files from Tom Sasvari BARRIE ISLAND—The Wildlife Enforcement Division of Environment and Climate Change Canada and Crime Stoppers are seeking the public's assistance in identifying suspects with relation to the senseless killing of a whooping crane.


It is alleged that in the evening hours of May 5, unknown culprit(s) attended on private property in the area of North Line and 10th Sideroad on the north end of Barrie Island and shot a whooping crane.

The whooping crane is a rare and endangered species. This crane belonged to a small population of 100 raised and released cranes that are being monitored with telemetry bands. It was first seen on Barrie Island on April 20.

"This was a banded bird, born in 2017 in Wisconsin as part of a flock they are trying to regenerate," Terry Land, who had photographed the rare bird, told the Manitoulin West Recorder. 'Whooping cranes normally have

a lifespan of between 20-24 years. This one was a female."

"It is a very sad story," Mr. Land told The Recorder. "The flock had started by 12 eggs having been ...continued on page 13

Northeast Town axes donations budget—then brings it back

LITTLE CURRENT—Mayor Al MacNevin's warning to council that axing the municipality's donations budget for the remainder of the year was "not a hill to die on" might have struck a chord during the Thursday, June 6 meeting of council.

Following a recorded vote at the Tuesday, June 4 meeting of Northeast Town council, a motion was passed to end any further donations to community groups by the municipality, but a scant two days later, a rescind of that motion was put on the table by the two councillors who had been absent from Tuesday's meeting, cancelling the

original motion and additionally, topping up the donations budget.

The original June 4 motion, which read "Be it resolved that the council of the Corporation of the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands stops granting donations for the balance of the 2019 year" was put on the floor by Councillor Barb Baker.

"I'm definitely not in favour of this," Councillor Michael Erskine began. "We had a significant surplus of \$195,000. Most small organizations require very small amounts. We made the decision to not raise our budget for donations but at the same time supplied a

Bee advocates' project continues strong growth

LITTLE CURRENT—There was certainly a buzz at Three Cows and a Cone this past weekend as young bee advocates Lauren Goddard and Jade Cress celebrated the official opening of their bee garden with special guest Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha.

"Our school project is going to finish on Wednesday (June 12)," said Lauren. "Besides the bee garden, we've also put up another display at the (Little Current) library (since our last update).

"After the school project is done we're going to focus more on gardens," added Jade. "We started growing the plants for this garden in greenhouses at our own homes."

The girls' project is known as the Save the Bees Manitoulin Wild Flower Challenge, something originally conceived as a passion project during their Grade 12 English class that has grown into a broader community movement.

The challenge encourages people to plant native wildflower species around Manitoulin to help support bee populations. Lauren and Jade are each budding gardeners and strong supporters of bees, insects whose numbers have been steadily declining in recent years.

Both work at Three Cows and a Cone in Little Current and expressed their interest in converting one of

the building's gardens into a 'bee garden,' one that hosts a number of native species that bees rely upon as well as a small dish full of water and marbles that serves as a bee bath.

The flora in the garden includes gloriosa daisies, borages, alyssums, lavender, delphinium, bee balm, Rosie O'Days and petunias. These species are said to attract bees and, accord-

ing to owner Phil Blake, they have already spotted bees making full use of the garden. "It's amazing. You put it there and they'll come," he

said, adding that the importance of the initiative goes far beyond his eatery.

"It's not about Three Cows, it's about them and the bees. The girls have done a great job; it's wonderful that they're doing this type of thing. Bees support a lot of stuff that we don't hear about," said Mr. Blake.

The bees were not the only thing drawn to the garden at the Sunday afternoon event—Mr. Mantha dropped by to wish the girls well and drum up some excitement for the movement, signing the guestbook as the #BeeWhisperer.

'Our party put a motion forward a few weeks ago declaring a climate crisis. We're seeing high winds, floods and 50- or 100-year storms occurring frequently," he said.

The Gore Bay Flying Club is pleased to have this capable young woman receiving our first scholarship," stated Mark Wilson, chair of the scholarship committee. "We want Grade 10 and 11 students to apply for our scholarship each fall, so we can help another Manitoulin youth each year earn a licence to fly."

Some facts regarding the transition away from bitumen

Clarifying the waters muddied by fossil fuel financed think tanks

Mr. Desjardins ('Writer shares some realities with a low carbon economy,' page 5, May 22), continues to grasp at straws to deny that a near term transition away from the use of fossil fuels is not only necessary, but inevitable. "Transporting bitumen through pipelines is expensive, as every 10 barrels of bitumen must be diluted with three barrels of condensate, which costs more than light crude. Costs and inefficiency make oil sands products less desirable on world markets. Climate change poses the biggest threat to the future of energy sources like bitumen and coal. (Under the Paris Agreement, all countries committed to reduce emissions to try to keep the global average temperature from rising more than 2°C over pre-industrial levels, with an aspirational goal of 1.5°C. We're already near 1°C! That means we can't burn much of the oil, coal and gas still in the ground.) Clean energy technologies are advancing rapidly, fossil fuel divestment is increasing and people are finding ways to reduce use of these polluting energy sources. In Canada, pipeline opponents, Indigenous communities and environmental groups aren't putting bitumen jobs at risk: automation, market forces and change in the face of the climate crisis are behind the declines." ("True leaders work for us, not the fossil fuel industry" David Suzuki)

There are many think tanks supported by the fossil fuel industry, like The Copenhagen Consensus Centre, who continue to muddy the water. According to Wikipedia, "Although the Center does not challenge the scientific consensus that human emissions of greenhouse gasses cause climate change, reports from the Center do not promote taking action to strongly reduce emissions. A 2014 paper assessing climate change was criticized by several experts in the field claiming, that it underestimates the harm and misrepresents the papers cited.'

"Linda McQuaig is right: leave the oil in the soil! A lot of people rec-

ognize that a lot of the oil sands oil may have to stay in the ground, if we're going to meet our climate change targets." Mr. Desjardins is not only misguided in his choice of reactionary pro-fossil fuel opinion, but deluded in his determination to misrepresent the facts, as well as, avoid reading the writing on the wall. Conflating energy with power does not properly compare the equivalency of oil with solar and wind power. Sadness and disappointment expressed over whooping crane shooting

The deliberate loss of an iconic symbol of hope in the face of extinction is unfathomable

To the Expositor:

The Manitoulin Nature Club wishes to express its sadness and disappointment at the shooting of whooping crane, No. 37-17, on Barrie Island on May 5. While it will come as no surprise that the members of our organization are appalled at this event, it has taken some time to craft an appropriate response to it. Preaching to the converted might make us feel good but hardly changes anything; preaching to anybody else inevitably turns people off and advances nothing. In keeping with our mandate and mission statement, we believe that promoting knowledge and understanding of our natural environment is the best way to encourage greater respect for and appreciation of Manitoulin's natural heritage. The story of efforts to save the whooping crane provides a good example of what can be done. It also helps to explain why the death of every single whooping crane is a step backwards for the survival of the species. (I would like to thank club member Jan McQuay for researching the details of this ongoing mission, as described below.)

In the 1940s, there were no more than 22 of these spectacular white cranes left on the entire planet. Their habitats had disappeared as settlers hunted them indiscriminately and drained their marshy habitat for agriculture. In the 1930s and 1940s, with the advent of electricity grids, many of these large birds died from electrocution. Others in all probability died from poisoning, whether deliberate or unintentional. One small surviving flock, the very last flock of their kind, still migrated back and forth between Texas and northern Alberta. It looked like the whooping crane, hanging on by a thread, would go extinct just like the passenger pigeon in the early 1900s. The last of that species, Martha, died in a Cincinnati Zoo in 1914. With her death, a species that in the 1800s had flown in the millions across North America was completely gone.

How the one flock of whooping cranes managed to hang on is perhaps a miracle, because efforts to save these magnificent birds did not begin until 1967 with the first captive breeding program. But in spite of conservationists' Herculean efforts, the number of whooping cranes has grown painfully slowly. Whooping cranes don't breed "like rab-

bits." They don't start reproducing until they are about five years old, they rarely lay more than two eggs in a year, and it is even more rare for more than one chick to survive to fledge. They are also migratory, and they must learn migratory patterns from their parents. As a solution to this shortcoming of the breeding program, biologists in Maryland came up with an ingenious solution: they donned whooping crane costumes and even modified an ultra-light plane to resemble a crane in flight.

The hope—well-founded, it turned out —was that juvenile cranes raised without parents would imprint on a plane and follow it into the skies, on a migration path from places like Florida to Wisconsin. One of the dedicated pilots, Joseph Duff, was a Canadian. This team led a total of 186 whooping cranes on migration routes between 2001

But after 13 years, US authorities issued a disappointing summary of the eastern migratory program. Of 250 captive whooping cranes released between 2001 and 2015, only 93 still survived in 2015 and there were only 27 reproductive pairs. Only seven baby chicks had survived to fledge and only two of those had nested successfully by 2015.

Last year, in 2018, the program was more successful, with six chicks in Wisconsin surviving to flight stage. Still, progress is pitifully slow. There are now about 500 individuals in the wild and 300 in captivity. In 2017 the Trump government cancelled the whooping crane recovery program in Maryland as a cost-cutting measure. Some of the individuals were moved to the Calgary Zoo.

Each individual whooping crane is so important to the survival of the species that it is tracked upon release. In April 2019, one individual, No. 37-17, flew from Indiana to the upper peninsula of Michigan, then to Thessalon, then to Barrie Island west of Gore Bay. She was a female who had hatched in 2017 and was raised in captivity. News spread about this entirely unexpected arrival, the first whooping crane sighted on Manitoulin Island, probably since the 1800s. She was with a flock of Sandhill cranes. Then on May 5, the trackers realized that she had stopped moving. Island authorities were contacted, the remains were found and it was determined the crane had been shot.

Apparently, two shots were heard that day in the vicinity, one sounding like a shotgun, the other like a 22-calibre rifle. The death of 37-17 is a blow to the recovery of the species. Both the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) and the police are taking this incident very seriously. Investigations are ongoing and the public is encouraged to help out by contacting Crime Stoppers.

But this incident is part of a much larger problem. World-wide, the picture is dire for species at risk. The United Nations published a major report just last month, warning that around one million animal and plant species are now threatened with extinction, many within decades. "Nature is declining globally at rates unprecedented in human history—and the rate of species extinctions is accelerating, with grave impacts on people around the world now likely," they conclude. The number of landbased species has fallen by at least 20 percent since 1900. A recent article by Dr. Joe Shorthouse in the pages of this newspaper indicates the numbers may be even more dire in the case of insects. Much of this is due to the indirect effects of human activities, such as climate change, habitat loss, changes in land use, indiscriminate use of pesticides, unregulated hunting, pollution and spread of invasive

The whooping crane is an iconic species, known not only for its beauty and majesty, but also as one of the most famous symbols of a (so far) successful effort to slow down the rising tide of extinction. It reminds of what people can accomplish when they work together in a concerted, collaborative effort. It is almost unfathomable to think that someone could deliberately sabotage such a hopeful endeavor. Ignorance may be more of a factor than malevolence here, but as the UN report reminds us, each of usfrom national governments down to each individual must realize that we are all part of nature and that our well-being depends on maintaining healthy ecosystems and biological diversity. We all have a role to play in making our lifestyle more sustainable.

An open letter to the mayor and council of Central Manitoulin

Some explanation of the proposed Wagg's Wood transfer to the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy

Dear Mayor Stephens and Councillors,

You wondered why the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy (EBC) is interested in obtaining a "small piece of property" in Mindemoya. I can tell you why the EBC is interested!

First, a bit of background. The EBC is a charitable land trust with a mission to protect sensitive and significant natural habitat. On Manitoulin they own part of the Cup and Saucer mountain and are maintaining a very popular trail there for tourists and Islanders. The Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands and the EBC cooperated to save the trail a few years ago when the entrance to the trail was closed. Now there is a new entrance and it is better than ever. The "small piece of property" that is the A.J. Wagg Memorial Park is a natural habitat with trails that is

The spring of 2016 marked the beginning of what is now a three-year effort to preserve the A.J. Wagg Memorial Park, after Central Manitoulin council severed two acres and sold them without notice and without prior rezoning from parkland to commercial. Much of that forest was razed to make a parking lot. Subsequently we learned there is nothing to prevent any municipality from selling its parks, and no notice is required if the buyer already owns adjacent property. That is sad but true. Many of us fear it could happen again.

At first, some of us hoped the municipality would make a covenant to preserve the rest of our park. The Mindemoya Active Living Trails (MALT) committee, a group of citizens that has the active support of the Manitoulin A land trust cannot. If EBC ceased to exist for whatever Nature Club, provided letters supporting the preservation reason, the park would go to another land trust.

of the park from the Family Health Team, the Central Manitoulin Public School and Community Living, where Judy Olacke spearheaded the Maple Ridge Trail. However, no progress was made with council on preserving our park.

Then in 2018, MALT and others had discussions with the EBC, who offered to help. MALT, the Wagg family and others enthusiastically supported their offer to acquire the park. EBC made two presentations to the Property Committee. Last December, Council approved in principle the transfer of the land to the EBC. We thought we had saved Wagg's Wood! But between December and the end of March, for reasons unknown to us, council decided they wanted to retain ownership and would only consider a 99year lease. Leases have escape clauses, so I guess that was in effect another refusal to protect the "small piece of property" that is our nature park.

In May 2019, at my urging, Mr. Barnett, of the EBC, called you and the upshot was that Mr. Barnett asked to speak at a council meeting. I attended the May 15 meeting where you relayed Mr. Barnett's request and I was stunned when you said you did not understand why the EBC would be interested in such a "small piece of property.

It is because over the past three years it has become evident that the only way to protect our park is to make sure a conservancy trust like the EBC has ownership. The EBC is offering to maintain our nature park for posterity. Anyone who wants the park preserved should support their proposal, including members of our current council. Why? Because future councils can also sell parkland at any time.

MALT, the Manitoulin Nature Club and the Wagg family, and others, support the transfer of Wagg's Wood to EBC. In other words, EBC wants to take over the "small piece of property" because concerned local citizens want them to save our park for posterity.

Despite the regrettable loss of two acres, Wagg's Wood was and still is worth preserving. It has an unusual variety of flora including some that are rare on Manitoulin, like the nodding trillium and blue cohosh, leatherwood and Canada moonseed vine. It includes a hardwood forest on the north end that has 20 different species of trees, including one yellow birch that is by far the largest tree I have ever seen on Manitoulin. The park trails have suffered from neglect, in fact, currently the main trail is blocked by fallen trees, but it has great potential as a nature reserve and as a place to walk the trails and observe and enjoy

Mr. Barnett will speak to a committee of council on Tuesday, June 25 at 1:30 pm in the council chambers. I hope council will agree that EBC offers the best way to preserve Central Manitoulin's only municipally-owned nature park and trail for posterity. Many of us who care deeply about the future of Wagg's Wood intend to be there to support their proposal!

At one point in this three-year saga, according to The Expositor, you said that the parking lot was a good use of the "property." No, a parking lot is not a good use of park-

...continued from page 1 members started in collaboration with the federal and provincial governments "to support the opportunities for success in addressing

development priorities for children. Anishinabek youth and families."

'This is so awesome for our kids," said Grand Council Chief Hare. "The Anishinabek approach to child and youth well-being and unity is premised on the principles of wellness, healing and family unity. We hope that Canada and Ontario will continue to support not only our kids, but all kids, youth and families in Ontario through effective programs and services.'

The law is an exercise of the Anishinabek First Nations' inherent right and jurisdiction over child and youth well-being and child welfare. Each Anishinabek First Nation has the authority to enact the law for their citizens.

'We all have to take control of looking after our children," said Grand Council Chief Hare. He pointed out that the Children's Aid Society "kicks kids out when they turn 18; they are on their own. They don't have information even on where they come from. I think it is even earlier than that, like 16, you are on your own. We as

One of the key projects launched at the assembly was Koganaawsawin, the central body supporting the Anishinabek Nation Child Well-Being Law aimed at returning control over First Nation child welfare to the Anishinabek.

Anishinabe people don't operate that way. Nobody has age limits except the Society.'

Grand Council Chief Hare said that he takes time to talk to the Anishinabe youth on the streets each time he goes to Toronto. "I ask them why they don't go home," he said. "Often the answer is that they do not have the money to go home. They don't have enough money for a bus ticket." For many of the young people he meets there is no family history on which to build a relationship in their home communities. "They don't know anything about where they come from," he said, adding that he looks forward to the day the Anishinabe have complete control over their children's wellbeing.

"We would like to acknowledge the ongoing support from the Province of Ontario and the Government of Canada," said Adrienne Pelletier, director of the Social Development Department at the Anishinabek Nation. "We have a sacred duty to ensure the well-being of our people. At this point in time, 19 Anishinabek First Nations have taken the initial steps to create a new reality for our children, youth and families."

Following a sunrise ceremony with Anishinabek Nation Head Getzit (elder) Gordon Waindubence, the launch of Koganaawsawin began with 'Biinojiiyag,' a ceremonial prayer song for Anishinabek children sung by The Raindance Singers.

Presentations with the remaining Anishinabek First Nations will continue to be co-ordinated in hopes that more communities, with the support of Koganaawsawin, choose to enact and implement the Anishinabek Nation Child Well-Being Law.

"At the end of the day it always goes back to the people in the communities," said Grand Council Chief Hare. "It is their children and they will make the deci-

"We have so many prizes; this year is shaping up to be a good one," he added.



...continued from page 1 top of the dock. Mr. Williamson pointed out to council that there are only 11 inches separating the water from the top of the

The Victory I also utilizes bow and stern thrusters to position itself into the dock. As it left port last week, the thrusters caused the boat to rock, slamming the steel fenders on top of the concrete portion of the dock and breaking a chunk of it off. The pressure behind the thrusters also broke the dock's wooden rub rails.

The following day, the Pearl Mist docked in Little Current with no issues. Mr. Williamson explained that the two vessels are shaped differently and said that the Pearl Mist uses rubber

Mr. Williamson told The Expositor that the Victory I has been notified about its inability to dock at the town wall. Instead, the cruise ship will weigh anchor nearby and tender visitors into the downtown core. The cruise ship company asked if they could dock at Little Current should they add rubber funders, but Mr. Williamson said that this would be of no help due to the vessel's shape. Should

the boat rock, the steel fender would still cause damage.

'There are only 11 inches to the top of the dock," Mr. Williamson reiterated. "If that level increases, the Pearl Mist will have to anchor out too."

The Northeast Town has other concerns with rising levels. water Mr. Williamson explained to council that the main drain for the west end of Little Current enters the North Channel below the municipal office and that as of last week, there was only a matter of inches from the top of the drain to the

"This could cause flooding," he warned.

To be on the safe side, 600 (empty) sand bags have been ordered for the public works department.

As of last week, Lakes Michigan and Huron are up 29 inches from the longterm June monthly average, two inches off the highest June monthly average.

...continued from page 1 ment in life is he doesn't hesitate—it's the work he's done encouraging Indigenous youth to make smarter choices.

On Monday, June 10, Mr. Leach's accomplishments were recognized as he was awarded an honorary doctorate from Brock University and where he gave the convocation address during the opening ceremonies of the university's spring convocation at Brock's Ian D. Beddis Gymnasium in the Walker Sports Complex.

"It's quite an honour," said Mr. Leach, who lives in Aundeck Omni Kaning—he is a member of the Berens River First Nation in Manitoba. "The things I have done over the years since I retired are about giving back and steering people in the right direction.

Mr. Leach is as much known to a new generation these days for providing inspiration and acting as a a signpost to the good life.

'I try to explain to kids about the mistakes I made as a teenager and young adult. It's our responsibilitv to guide these young people in the right direction," he said.

Mr. Leach now lives on Manitoulin Island, but it was during his time as a teammate of Bobby Clarke and playing with the Flin Saskatchewan Bombers that his star began to rise. After a stellar junior career, he was drafted by the Boston Bruins and played there and with the California Golden Seals before being traded to Philadelphia, the defending Stanley Cup champions, in

Mr. Leach helped the Flyers successfully defend their Stanley Cup championship in 1975, and nearly again in 1976. Despite his team losing in that 1976 contest, Mr. Leach was awarded the Conn Smythe Trophy as the playoff MVP. It was an incredible season for the Riverton Rifle that saw him set Philadelphia's all-time single-season scoring record of 61 goals, a mark that still remains

Mr. Leach was an NHL 11-Star in 1976 and 1980 and was inducted into the Philadelphia Flyers, Manitoba Hockey and Manitoba Sports halls of fame. He was a recipient of an Indspire Award in 2008 and

Many Island beaches to be monitored less often in 2019

Reduced testing announced after years of consistent good results

MANITOULIN—Public Health Sudbury and Districts (PHSD) has scaled back its testing of several Island beaches from a once-weekly to a oncemonthly schedule.

In a notice to the Township of Tehkummah, the health unit stated that the water samples at the South Baymouth beach have been satisfactory over the past five years and it had therefore decided to reduce the amount of required testing at the site.

"We will continue with the annual pre-season environmental assessment which will be to confirm the suitability of the site for public recreational use," the notice states, an activity that is scheduled to take place in mid to

late June of this year. Should the beach pass the test, PHSD sampling and inspections will occur in mid-July and mid-August.

If the health unit discovers concerning water quality issues or any hazards at the beach, its staff will resume the weekly testing regimen.

Other Island beaches that will be monitored on a monthly schedule are Gore Bay beach, Little Current beach, Green Bay's Sandy Beach, Manitowaning beach, Sandfield beach, Monument Road beach and Sheguiandah beach.

Providence Bay beach, Maple Ridge Sandy Beach and Kagawong beach will remain on the weekly sampling Tehkummah resident David Samuels submitted a letter and photos to council to express his concerns about debris at the South Baymouth beach. He stated his efforts last year, approved by the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, reached a snag because there was no easy way to remove the debris.

Tehkummah clerk-administrator Roy Hardy said the township had a number of pressing projects currently underway but expressed his hope that volunteers may step forward and offer their assistance on the beach. He noted that with the current high water levels, the amount of beach space was next to nothing as the water rose to the edge of the grass.

...continued from page 3 recommendations in the report of the Lyme Disease and Tick-Borne Illnesses Task Force. Mr. Mantha was a member of the non-partisan task force that included patients, medical doctors, researchers, Ministry of Health officials, healthcare professionals and advocates.

The report complemented the work of Public Health Ontario and Health Quality Ontario in the management of tick bites and informed the Ministry of Health's Lyme disease policy and programming. The report was accepted by the previous Liberal government, but the recommendations were not implemented. The report has also been supported by many organizations across the province and the country.

"Chronic Lyme disease has the potential to affect every system in the body and can result in paralysis," Mr. Mantha said. "The

Ford government can take action now to stop the spread of Lyme disease and to treat Ontarians suffering from it today."

Northwestern Ontario faces the highest infection prevalence of Lyme disease in Canada. A research study on Corkscrew Island, located 20 kilometres southwest of Kenora, found that Lyme disease was found in eight species of ticks, with 41 percent testing positive for Lyme disease.

"The risk of Lyme disease is potentially at crisis levels in Ontario. This government can, and must, take action now to protect the people of Northwestern Ontario and protect families across this province," said Mr. Mantha.

The 10 recommendations from the Lyme disease and tick-borne illnesses task force are as follows:

1. Establish centres of excellence for tick-borne illnesses with all stakeholders including patients and patient advocates, care-

givers involved in the development processes;

2. Conduct a review of current clinical practice guidelines focused on the assessment, treatment and prevention of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses:

3. Improve communications to regulated health professionals regarding standards of practice for diagnosing and treating Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses;

4. Provide professional education opportunities for regulated health professionals and establish a coordinated care model for patients with Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses at all stages of these diseases;

5. Improve education and awareness of tick-borne illnesses among the general public;

6. Continue engagement with school boards, community groups, associations and other provincial ministries to highlight

importance of tick-borne illness prevention;

7. Establish a community-based research blueprint for tick-borne illnesses with principles of inquiry and an implementation process;

8. Review current testing methodologies for diagnosing Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses;

9. Conduct a review of current tick surveillance activities in Ontario; and

10. Establish a task force with tick-borne illness expertise and engagement with all stakeholders to provide ongoing advice and to review an annual report on progress of implementing Ontario's 10-Step Education and Awareness Plan and the recommended actions from this report.

...continued from page 3 rather large amount of money to a local musical event which severely reduced the amount we have available for other small community groups."

Councillor Erskine went on to note that council can, moving forward, weigh each and every donation request on its merits and make decisions of support accordingly.

"Lots of our line items go over; lots go under," the councillor continued. "The idea that we should not support things like children's programs, athletic programs or donate so that those groups can leverage large amounts makes me very uncomfortable."

Councillor Erskine then suggested giving smaller amounts.

"Saying no is a wee bit disingenuous," he added. "Look people in the eye and tell them no, don't just pass a motion."

"As a council member who approved a budget with set line items, I understand there's all kinds of times where budgets are exceeded," Councillor Baker responded. "As a business owner and budget person, when I reach that limit I don't continue to spend. To continue to knowingly exceed a line item, that's not what it's there to do. Everyone should live within a budget."

Councillor Al Boyd said

he was surprised that council exceeded the donations line item and that while he agreed with Councillor Erskine when it comes to youth programming, "I think we owe it to the community to put a limit on it."

Councillor Erskine once again pointed out that the municipality saw a significant surplus. "It was clear from the start that the figure wasn't going to be sufficient. We debate, discuss, go over the smallest asks. At the end of this year, while weighing each ask on its merits, we should have a good idea of what the budget should be. This line item has been static for a long time."

Councillor Erskine pointed to the volunteer appreciation night hosted by the municipality in honour of its many volunteers and service groups each April. "I dare you to look those people in the eye and say we have a surplus but hey, you're really not that important.' I have a problem with that," he said, imploring council to not go ahead with the motion. "Let's put our money where our mouth is and say 'you're important enough to make that \$200 investment," he concluded, referencing the oft-given donation amount.

Councillor Jim Ferguson asked if council could amend the budget midterm.

CAO Dave Williamson said yes, they could, but the additional funds would have to come from a reserve account.

Mayor MacNevin then weighed in, saying it's a philosophical debate.

"It's historical that a number of our community organizations can come to council and be helped out from time to time," the mayor said. "This is really such a small item that it really has no bearing on a deficit or surplus situation."

"If you're trying to

enforce an accounting principle, weigh it against the first person who comes into these chambers and asks for a donation to their worthwhile cause; I don't think that's a worthy principle," Mayor MacNevin continued. "It's not a hill to die on for me, but I think you'll find out the first group that comes in here between now and Christmas and gets turned down for a donation, well, I won't be taking the blame."

Councillor Bill Koehler shared with the council that he's never been in favour of the donations budget, and that he supported Councillor Baker's motion. He said that with a set budget that would not be exceeded, "maybe some people will get applications in earlier next year."

"This donations budget is not life or death to me," Councillor Koehler added. In a recorded vote, Councillors Baker, Boyd, Laurie Cook and Koehler voted in favour of the motion while Councillor Erskine, Ferguson and Mayor MacNevin voted against. Councillors Dawn Orr and Bruce Wood were absent from the meeting. The motion was carried.

On Thursday night, June 6, Councillors Orr and Wood were back in the chamber and not happy with the motion and the vote they had missed.

A new motion was put before the council to rescind the June 4 motion and top up the donations budget from the capital reserve account by \$2,500.

"I think it's very valuable, in my opinion, to help out these small groups," said Councillor Wood. "I know it's always been a touchy issue. We need to help every group equally; you can't just stop half-way through. If you want to quit you need to quit at the start of the year."

Councillor Koehler asked Councillor Wood if he would be in favour of a limit on donations the following year.

"I'd rather see everyone get a small amount then be cut off completely," Councillor Wood responded.

"I've spoken to this a number of times," Councillor Orr began. "Some (donations) are line items, some aren't. One particular group gets two very large donations, which means others get less."

"This shows that the community is supporting them," Councillor Orr continued.

"We can't go halfway through the year and say 'no.' We have to be realistic in the amount we set aside. We need to look really hard at it next budget. Small groups need our support and don't need to be cut off at the knees."

Councillor Cook said she would like to see a limit on

what each group gets. "It's not fair that one group gets more."

In a recorded vote, the motion to rescind the June 4 motion and top up the donations account went as follows, with two councillors changing their vote: Councillors Baker, Boyd, Erskine, Ferguson, Orr, Wood and Mayor MacNevin voted in favour while Councillors Cook and Koehler voted against. The motion to rescind was carried.

Ms. Wuksinic thanked the Manor's head of maintenance, Wendell Bailey, for putting the room together.


"We're just a few in numbers but we're certainly hard-working people."

Bluegrass in the Country's 10th anniversary



The ever-popular Manitoulin Special Olympians' square dancing brought out three generations of dancers to join in on the fun.

PROVIDENCE BAY—The 10th anniversary edition of Bluegrass in the Country was a widely-popular event that carried on the strong tradition of celebrating bluegrass music while also supporting Manitoulin Island's Special Olympians.

"Our 10th anniversary brought bigger acts and the Special Olympics angle is huge. This was also the first year we've had an electronic sign that showcased the achievements athletes' throughout the year, as well as our sponsors," said Brother John Featherstone, the event's founder and lead organizer.

Bluegrass in the Country began a decade ago, with Mr. Featherstone describing this year's crammed-full camping area as a "far cry' from the first year's draw of eight campers for one afternoon of music.

Mr. Featherstone moved to the Island in 2004 and his son Austin, who has autism, soon began competing in Special Olympics events. Austin Featherstone went on to become a world champion runner by taking gold at the 2011 Special Olympics in Athens, Greece. He was also named Special also named Special Olympics Ontario's Athlete of the Year in 2011.

Austin Featherstone originally suggested to his father that they could host a bluegrass festival as a fundraiser for the Special Olympics. The festival now covers the expenses of Manitoulin Island's Special Olympics chapter for a whole year.

The main event at the Providence Bay grounds began on Friday with an opening performance by Bowmanville's Alicia Robicheau and Lonesome Sound. Jim Beech took the stage next who, along with Ben Lentir, had been part of the very first Bluegrass in the Country event. Hard Ryde followed and then Bluegrass in the Country 'house band' The

Canucky Bluegrass Boys closed off the Friday set.

Music began to flow at noon on Saturday, beginning with Different Picks, a band from North Bay. The New General Store followed, a band that came out of retirement in honour of the 10th anniversary festival. County Road 44 offered a sizzling set after them.

Mr. Lentir followed, the musician who serves as Northern Ontario Country Music Awards representative for the Manitoulin district. Alicia Robicheau returned for another set before Manitoulin's Robbie Shawana played his selection of crowd favourites.

Following Mr. Shawana's set, Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes popped onto the stage sporting her Bluegrass in the Country t-shirt.

"I always tip my hat to Brother John and everyone else who puts the festival together, as well as the sponsors who see the need to support our Special Athletes," said Ms. Hughes.

"Special Athletes always put everything they have in what they undertake, and we must support them. This is a great way to do that."

She then introduced Special Olympian Austin 'Aussie the Clown' Featherstone to perform a hilarious clown routine as a helpless, reckless old man.

Brock and Brenda Chisholm, on behalf of Steve and Becky Chisholm of Uncle Steve's Park and Cabins, presented Manitoulin Special Olympics with a donation of \$1,365 from their annual Christmas in July event, snapping a photo with all the athletes during the hand-off.

As the sun dropped lower in the sky, the stands became jam-packed as the main events began. 2018 Providence Bay Fair ambassador April Torkopoulos introduced a perennial favourite show, the Manitoulin Special Olympians' square-dancing routine. Three generations of dancers took part in the event which was called by

Around 7:30, The Next Generation Leahy took the


stage, a family band from

Cyclists pour onto Island for 2019 Passage Ride

MANITOULIN—A steady stream of cyclists flowed across the ramp leading from the stern of the MS Chi-Cheemaun and onto the lawn beside the ferry's berth, 204 strong. Hailing from across the province, the eclectic crowd crossed the full gamut of cyclistsfrom the carbon fibre framed gazillion speed ultralights to your good old Canadian Tire special steel framed 12-speeds harkening back to an almost forgotten era in cycling.

"We are sold out," announced a beaming Maja Mielonen, the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocate organizer who, along with her partner Guy Nielen, organize the Passage Ride, an annual cycling tour of Manitoulin.

Ms. Mielonen pointed to the number of vehicles travelling off the ferry bearing loaded bicycle carriers. "Look at that," she beamed. "These aren't even part of our Passage Ride. Manitoulin is becoming known for its great cycling opportunities."

"Welcome to great riding on Manitoulin Island," said Ms. Mielonen in greeting the cyclists. She noted that the cyclists would be enjoying "great food, great

and lasting friendships during our special two-day fully supported ride."

The Passage Ride includes a free ferry ride for the cyclist and their bicycle, courtesy of the Owen Sound Transportation Company and the Chi-Cheemaun, ride insurance, a Saturday night dinner with live entertainment and Sunday lunch. The two-day full ride includes mechanical support, support stations with light snacks and three route options each day.

"Many accommodations partner with MICA on the Passage Ride and offer free luggage shuttle for their clients participating on this ride," noted Ms. Mielonen.

The Passage Ride begins at 11:15 am at the ferry docks in South Baymouth and ends on the first day in Little Current at the Manitoulin Brewery on Highway 6 for post ride snack. The first day ends with dinner and live music and dance at the Little Current Recreation Centre at 7 pm.

The second day's ride starts at the Little Current Recreation Centre and ends at the ferry docks, with the ferry departing at 3:50 pm.

"We have been members



Mr. Schlote said he learned there were three things that would make the ride a bit more fun for him. "Number one would be a graphite bike, number two would be a greater selection of gears and number three would be biking shoes with clips on the pedals," he said. "I think cycling like this is very much a social event, but it is hard to socialize if everyone else is pulling ahead of you by two kilometres every time your chain falls off." Did that happen a lot? 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

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

ADAM TIMOTHY MCDONALD



My rhubarb loves this weather, wet and cool. A rainy day and a quick bake was on my list in using some of the over abundant rhubarb!

Rhubarb Upside Down Cake

This is so easy and quick. You can switch it up with spelt flour, coconut sugar, coconut oil and coconut milk or whatever you have on hand. It is a very forgiving cake.

1/4 cup butter 1 cup brown sugar 4 to 5 cups rhubarb

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Melt the butter in a 9" x 9" baking pan, add the diced rhubarb and sugar mixed together and spread over the butter, covering the bottom of the pan. Set aside.

BATTER:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- About 2/3 cup milk

Place the sugar, flour, baking powder and salt into a bowl. Add the butter and cut or crumble it into the flour mixture until fine. Beat the egg with the vanilla and milk until well mixed. Pour the egg mixture over the flour mixture and blend until smooth.

Spread the batter over the rhubarb evenly. Bake for about 30 to 40 minutes until the cake tests done.

Serve warm with ice cream or yogurt.

*If you want a complete change over to a Rhubarb Upside-Down Gingerbread Cake simply add 1/2 tsp each of cinnamon and ginger and 1/2 cup molasses instead of half the sugar.


