by Isobel Harry LONDON, ENGLAND—It's a long way from being a server at St. Francis of Assisi Anglican church Mindemoya—and Esther in Anstice herself calls her new job at St. Paul's Cathedral in London "surreal"—but the determined young woman who grew up on her parents' dairy farm in Tehkummah and last weekend met Queen Elizabeth II during the monarch's 90th birthday celebrations takes it all in stride.

Born in Mindemoya, Esther Anstice attended public school there and then onto Manitoulin Secondary School before obtaining a teaching degree from Nipissing University in North Bay. She returned to the Island and got her first job at The Expositor as circulation manager, which she held for four years. After her stint in the newspaper business, Ms. Anstice resumed studies at Fanshawe College in London, Ontario, thinking she'd become a paramedic. (She had worked in a volunteer capacity as a member of Tehkummah's unique First Response Team and felt the urge to take formal paramedic training.)

But Ms. Anstice felt the pull of England, the birthplace of both her paternal and maternal forebears, and in 2010, as a newly graduated paramedic, she moved to the UK on an 'ancestry visa.' "I have Yorkshire and Somerset roots," explains Ms. Anstice. "My maternal grandfather was born in Shrivenham, my paternal greatgrandparents were born in Axbridge, Somerset and arrived on Manitoulin in the first years after WWI. So, in a way, the UK was already a family home when I got here!"

Wikwemikong band member receives honourary doctorate from Nipissing

NORTH BAY—Native Women's Association of Canada (NWAC) President Dawn Lavell-Harvard, a Wikwemikong band member, received an honourary Doctorate of Education from Nipissing University at a June 9 convocation ceremony held in North Bay.

"It's very exciting," said Dr. Lavell-Harvard when contacted by The Expositor following the ceremony.

This will be the second doctorate for Dr. Lavell-Harvard, an alumnus of Queen's University and the University of Western Ontario. Dr. Lavell-Harvard has dedicated the academic part of her career to the study of education, including the experiences of indigenous women in Canadian secondary and post-secondary school systems.

"It is a great honour to be acknowledged and recognized by Nipissing University," said Dr. Lavell-Harvard. "Equal access to education for indigenous peoples is such an important part of our struggle for equality in Canadian society."

Dr. Lavell-Harvard noted that, as honoured as she was personally with the award, she was even more pleased with that the focus of the work that she has championed throughout her career, that of indige-

Aboriginal suicide funding announcement

OTTAWA—In another response to the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission on Residential Schools, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced on Monday \$69 million in new funding over three years specifically earmarked for suicide intervention and other health issues plaguing First Nations communities.

On Monday, James Bay area Chief Bruce Shisheesh of the Attawapiskat First Nation met with the prime minister in Ottawa when the announcement was made.

"While we will continue to engage indigenous partners in finding long-term solutions to these pressing issues, we know that urgent action is needed and it is needed now-to address the health and mental wellness crises being faced by indigenous people," Prime Minister Trudeau said in a written statement Monday afternoon

The funds are planned for use in animating urgently needed mental health services. The federal government has also committed to working with First Nation leaders on a long-term plan to alleviate conditions that foster suicide.

Attawapiskat Chief Shisheesh's community has been riven by numerous suicides and suicide attempts, largely from drug overdoses.

MISSISSAUGA-Manitoulin Group of Companies and its staff across the country have donated \$24,370 to the Canadian Red Cross to help those impacted by the Fort McMurray wildfire disaster. Through the Government of Canada's commitment to match the portion of funds donated by employees (\$12,185), the total contribution is \$36,555. The company has also donated transportation services to get essential supplies into the area.

On May 3, when massive wildfires triggered the largest fire-related evacuation in Alberta's history, tens of thousands of people were forced to leave their homes in more than 12 communities, including Fort McMurray. Only recently have residents been allowed to start to

Sea container bylaw public meeting in Central Manitoulin hears concerns from local farmers

MINDEMOYA—The council meeting for the Municipality of Central Manitoulin on June 9 was preceded by a public meeting to consider Bylaw Draft 2016-07, which reads in part that council agrees that it is in the public's best interest to control the placement and usage of travel trailers and the number of days that they are allowed to stay on a property.

The other consideration was draft Bylaw 2016-08, which reads in part that a shipping container shall be used for storage purposes only and not for human or animal habitation. Council was seeking to amend Bylaw 2002-07 and that the temporary placement of shipping containers or portable storage containers shall be allowed in a Hamlet, Settlement or Shoreline Residential Zone for a maximum of one year, during the period of construction and is to be used for the storage of materials only.

The first member of the public to speak at this meeting was Glenn Black, a resident of Providence Bay who, along with his wife Judy, owns a 100-acre farm in Central Manitoulin where they produce foods such as pastured poultry, free range eggs, lamb and goat. Mr. Black feared for the loss of his

farm and livelihood, saying, "If this draconian bylaw against sea containers is passed, my farm is dead," as he uses sea containers extensively to store animal feed and seeds, to store farm machinery, as a brooder for chicks, and for storing fresh and frozen meats produced by the farm. "If the bylaw specifically says, 'no animal in a sea container'," Mr. Black spelled out, "I am done."

Mr. Black also cited several reasons why sea containers make perfect sense in that they are affordable, better than storage sheds and garages which may cost up to \$50,000 while a sea bin is \$6,000, the bins keep the mice and rats out, they are fire proof and are of an all steel construction which means a life of 50 to 70 years.

Mr. Black also spoke of the use of sea containers for housing and a quick Google check will endorse this as thousands of homes have been built using these units for housing all over the world. Indeed, a grand prize of the \$1.1 million Dream Lottery is a home made from eight sea containers and the Days Inn Hotel in Sioux Lookout was built in 2014 using 120 bins, as Mr. Black pointed out. He also emphasized that the municipality is responsible for

Two percent increase to Assiginack Township tax levy in 2016 budget

MANITOWANING-Assiginack council passed its 2016 budget last month with a two percent increase to the tax levy again this year.

The largest portion of this year's capital budget comes from engineering expenses for the replacement of the water filtration systems and a forcemain operational review. The major roads projects are Queen and Arthur Streets, which are scheduled for resurfacing, as well as culvert work on Clover Valley Road, which will commence shortly.

CAO Alton Hobbs noted that there is a lack of "free flowing" investments from the provincial and federal governments currently and that it is Assiginack's hope that by investing in engineering work potential fall funding announcements will come and this will mean the municipality is ready to apply with shovel-ready projects.

There is also money in this year's budget, \$200,000, to be offset by gas tax revenues for the landfill expansion, which will also begin this

Local conservation club efforts bear sportfishing fruit

While it's disturbing to read in this week's paper reports of ran-domized fish mortality this spring in Lake Manitou, the fact is that Manitoulin Island's sports fishery is healthy and increasing and a great deal of this is due to the volunteer efforts of groups like the Little Current and District Fish and Game Club which last weekend celebrated 50 years of conservation service.

In a week's time, the efforts of the Manitoulin Streams organization will also be extolled at the upcoming gala fundraising dinner this important organization is undertaking.

In Gore Bay, that community's Fish and Game Club has long maintained a salmon hatchery and, in fact, was able to relocate this facility two years ago to town-owned property which not only gave the hatchery operation more stability but also allowed the club access to cooler water thanks to a water intake system already in place when this plant had served as the municipality's water treatment plant.

The praise heaped on the Little Current and District Fish and Gamers by representatives of municipal, provincial and federal governments at Saturday evening's anniversary celebration was a clear indication of the support this club's efforts have earned thanks to its commitment to conservation, particularly to pickerel rearing and notably because each year the club involves Grade 4 classes from five Island schools in the process.

Likewise, this year the Gore Bay Fish and Game Club has established a small salmon rearing station in C.C. McLean Public School in Gore Bay where students observed the fish growing and assisted in their feeding and, recently, similar small hatcheries have been established at Assiginack Public School in Manitowaning and Shawanosowe School in Birch Island.

There is a commonality of purpose among these organizations: the fish and game clubs in Little Current and Gore Bay work cooperatively on projects and both also work with Manitoulin Streams on Island stream improvement that, in turn, makes the fishery for local anglers, both Manitoulin citizens and tourists, much more produc-

One of the speakers at the Little Current group's golden anniversary celebrations made reference to projects begun 30 years ago that are paying off today in terms of improved angling.

Manitoulin Streams has not been around for that long but one of this organization's signature projects, in cooperation with the Little Current club, has been the restoration of Bass Creek at Sheguiandah as a productive spawning habitat for pickerel and rainbow trout.

The agile mind of Mike Meeker, Manitoulin Island's first aquaculture operator, has given the Gore Bay club ideas for unique pickerel rearing stations that have been utilized successfully. In Kagawong Lake the United Fish and Game Club of Manitoulin is pushing for its own pickerel hatchery near Mindemoya Lake and is presently awaiting provincial support and participation.

There is a lot of hard work, volunteer driven, going on all around Manitoulin. These efforts enjoy municipal support and that aspect of the local tourism industry that depends on angling for its success is reaping benefits from this work.

Kudos just now to the Little Current and District Fish and Game Club for five decades of dedication to conservation and to educating young people about the merits of being stewards of their local natural environment.

This club has had good and visionary leadership for 50 years as the list of accomplishments indicates.

The same can be said of the Gore Bay Fish and Game Club which prevailed in establishing its original salmon hatchery, sometimes against great odds, ultimately prevailing with a successful model.

Manitoulin Island can and must be proud of the work of the volunteers who have remained loyal to their club's original purpose (some of them for more than 50 years) and have, in the process, made Manitoulin a healthier and more prosperous place in which to live, work and play

I recently visited your beautiful island. It had been a dream of mine since I was a child to see the swing bridge in action. Boy that thing can really swing when it wants to. Or when someone uses the controls. I was able to sample the local Swing Bridge Blonde Ale during my visit, which tastes exactly like a swing bridge.

During my visit, I encountered not only one

I was lucky to be able to hike up the Cup and Saucer, which has one of the most beautiful views I have ever seen. It's too bad the view was tarnished by the lying plaque. If the swing bridge plaque was lying about the number of stoplights on the island, how could I trust that the trail was named the Cup and Saucer, and not the Fork and Ladle, or possibly the Moustache and Tophat? The truth is. I knew I couldn't trust that trailhead sign, or any other sign on the Island, since I had exposed the very first sign I encountered as a lie.

The flashing amber lights in Little Current are cautionary, but not stoplights, so I think it is fair to say that the swing bridge has the distinction of being the only official, full-time stoplight on Manitoulin.

re arrive back at the cottage, after an absence of six months, road weary and bedraggled. It's the first day of May 2014. The forest seems oddly sere and empty—we last saw it luxuriant and suffused with autumn color. The rivulets, runnels, and rills are hurrying downslope, and the swales are full to overflowing. The bay appears to be a solid slab of dull, dark of ice.

It's already well into afternoon when we pull into the driveway. The dog, extremely anxious to see how things have changed since he last surveyed the territory, explodes out of the car. We too are anxious to reconnoiter, but know things need to happen if we want to be settled before dark. The delights of hot and cold running water are never far out of mind.

Inside, six months of hard winter chill lies in the bones of the structure. We'll need days to take that edge off, but there's plenty of dry kindling and a pile of hard ash splits under the overhang, so soon the stove is ticking and clanking its way to warmth. A heave on the main breaker switch gives us light, with the wide-open below zero. At home in Wisconsin, we were advised by the city to keep a faucet trickling so our service line wouldn't freeze solid.

By March the Great Lakes were almost completely frozen over—greater than 90 percent, perhaps a record. The cold continued well into April, thawing was slow, and on the first of May our bay on the North Channel was still iced over. As always, the melt had begun around the shoreline where all the incoming runoff lifted the edges, and where the sun warmed the dark shallows. But putting in the water line would require an icebreaker, namely me.

So, I survey the scene, then unlock the garage and pull the old chest waders off their peg. I struggle into these and begin hauling the hundred foot black plastic pipe down slope, out of the woods. I have a long way to go, over a disturbingly wide beach. Where the water once was when we bought the property are now exposed boulders, irregular puddles, and flats of mud.

The last autumn, at cottage shut down time, the beach had been wide and the water low, but like the frog in a slowly warming pot, we had rather gotten used to it. Water had been dropping and the beach expanding for the past 14 years. Since the summer of 1998 the water level of Huron/Michigan (all one body) had been trending downward, fluctuating seasonally as always, but in general going down. In January, 2013, it had hit the lowest point

for boat passage, marinas are inaccessible, waterlines are sucking air. Dredging is necessary all around, from northern Michigan to southern Georgian Bay. The shipping industry needs to lighten its loads. And as the water recedes, phragmites marches in.

For me, on the first of May, 2014, ice is a bigger problem than the ominously wide beach. Heaving on the black poly line, I finally reach water. I mush through brash ice for a few paces, and then reach the more solid stuff where I have to step up and on, letting my weight sink and detach rotten chunks. It is slow going, but with time I reach a depth sufficient for an initial deployment of the foot valve but still safely below the top of my waders. I lower the pipe-stand to the bottom.

From that point on, hot and cold running water is only a matter of ordinary plumbing-connecting the line to the pump, using the Guzzler hand pump to draw water up the line into the jet pump, re-connecting all the open lines in the cottage, putting a few capfuls of bleach into the particle filter housing to "shock" the system, and then, once things are running clear, putting in a new particle filter and turning on the UV system and water heater. All this is accomplished rather easily, but with a numb and vividly pink lower torso.

Then, with a functioning kitchen sink, reduced reliance on the outhouse, and the prospect of hot showers, we settle on a sofa, afghans around our shoulders and a bright fire in the wood burning stove. We're back, back once again in our ever most favorite place.

Happy as clams, we are, but worried nonetheless. That vast and waterless beach out front is deeply disturbing. As we sit near the stove, sipping little somethings, we ask ourselves where all the water has gone, and we wonder if it will ever come back. We try to reassure ourselves that this is a widespread problem and we are not alone in our worry, and maybe something can and will be done.


In fact, a deepening dread has been building across the upper Great Lakes-from Green Bay, along the upper west Michigan shore, through Les Cheneaux islands, along the North Channel, and around and down Georgian Bay. Not only is the disappearing water costing lots of money, but it's messing up the ecology-diminishing wetlands, reducing the manoomin harvest, preventing trout and salmon from getting into their spawning rivers, and facilitating the spread of invasives. The whole way of life across the Great Lakes north is threatened.

What if, we wonder, this 14-year long decline continues? What if the water continues to drop and drop and drop?

Naturally, attention across the upper Great Lakes turns to the St. Clair River, which drains out the bottom of Lake Huron. The St. Clair has been heavily dredged for over a century, and that combined with mining and erosion, has dramatically increased the outflow, up to something like 120 billion gallons a day. And, naturally, attention turns to the International Joint Commission (IJC), which is charged by the Boundary Waters Treaty of 1909 to deal with Great Lakes levels and flows. Serendipitously, it turns out that the IJC has been studying the upper Great Lakes for a number of years as part of the anticipated revision of its Lake Superior Regulation Plan. (The outflow of Lake Superior, controlled at the St. Marys River in Sault Ste. Marie, is an important source of water for Michigan/Huron/Geor gian Bay.) In 2011 the IJC's Study Board holds hearings all around the watershed, and they get an earful about the amount of water being lost down the St. Clair. In 2012 the IJC commissioners themselves, after reviewing the Study Board's recommendations, hold hearings-and again they hear about the St. Clair. In April. 2013, the IJC sends its revised Lake Superior plan to the governments of the U.S. and Canada; and along with it, the recommendation "that the governments of Canada and the United States investigate structural options (in the St. Clair) to restore water levels in Lake Michi-

gan-Huron..." The commission suggests that it might be a good idea to put some kind of control on the only part of the Great Lakes without any. They recommend flexible controls that can moderate the extremes of high and low water.

Apparently, that's all Mother Nature needs to hear. In April 2013 the level stands at 576.61 feet, very low; but by the end of the year, thanks to a wet fall, is has climbed a bit, to 577.33. Then the polar vortex cranks up! The Great Lakes freeze almost solid; and being covered in ice, they are protected from the typically huge evaporation that

occurs when cold, dry winter winds blow over relatively warm water.

So, when we arrived back at the cottage in May 2014 and found all that ice on the bay, the level stood at 578.31, up over two feet from the 2013 nadir. However, the water was still low, and the beach still ever so wide.

The day after arriving, and after enjoying a hot shower, I write in my journal:

The water is up, not way up, but up some from last October, and it's still early in the water cycle. Perhaps over the next two months we'll make it all the way up to the long-term average.'

It turns out to be a wet spring, and the water does inch up. On July 1 the water has risen above the historical average. I'm astounded. And then we have heavy thunderstorms. On July 4, the 100-foot boardwalk we built (out of planked-over cedar logs) to get to water across the flats, starts to float. We weight it down with boulders. And then we have (heavy) rain. On September 5, a seiche lifts the decking off the pier. On October 3 high winds push big waves over what used to be dry land and the boardwalk is ripped up and washed in. When I pull the water line on October 7, the level is standing at 579.20.

Then comes the winter of 2014-2015, and again it's cold. The polar vortex again gives us special weather statements and cold temperature precautions, and early in March Great Lakes ice cover is again extensive, nearly 80 percent.

fridge beginning to hum, superfluously.

But what about the water? Water for dish washing, for the indoor shower and tub (forget the outdoor shower for now), for the comfort and convenience of not having to trek up behind the garage to the iced-up outhouse. While it is possible to camp in a cottage-hauling buckets of lake water for dishes, sponge baths and toilet flushingthose of us accustomed to pressurized hot and cold tend to like it.

However, this cottage, like many others along the shore, has neither well nor water main: its domestic supply comes from a long black-poly line run from a pump-house on shore to a foot-valve resting on boulders about five feet below the surface of Lake Huron's North Channel. And when you're running a pipe into a lake, ice poses a problem.

The winter of 2013-14 had been a cold one, with unrelenting bitterness from November through March, driven by the widely hyped and vociferously excoriated 'polar vortex.' A loop in the jet stream, firmly anchored, ran up the west coast to high latitudes and then swooped down on the Midwest and East, overlaying the Great

ever recorded, and, although recovered a bit, in October it was still way low.

Dropping water makes for an ugly beach. at least on our rocky stretch of it. Boulders slowly expose themselves covered with brown slime. In between are puddles and mucky flats that dry to cracked hardpan. It's a wasteland.

But then, after a few rains, the boulders begin to blend with all the others along the shore, and the newly established waterland interface starts to seem natural. And, when no one's looking, vegetation moves in quickly to claim new territory.

In the decade and a half of water drop, the bay receded over a hundred feet, and our waterfront changed from beach to meadow and proto-forest-with sedges, grasses, and ninebark and alder, and cedar, spruce, and willow. And cardinal flower. lots of it, forming a swath of jaunty red along the shore.

But, while we think we have it bad, conditions elsewhere are worse. Cottages along shallow shorelines have seen the water completely disappear from view. The ferry running to Washington Island, Wisconsin, can't get into its normal dock. The dock in

Surviving this winter, we arrive back at the cottage on the second of May 2015, after an absence of six months, road weary and bedraggled. We find, unlike the previous year, that the bay is mostly open. We see icebergs drifting by, but putting in the water line is routine.

On May 27 I write in my journal: 'Three hours of heavy downpour last night, coming down on an already saturated forest—so lots of runoff. Tyson's creek, a raging torrent. After lunch, suspecting there might be considerable water to watch, we decide to walk the river trail to the falls (which we have not done yet this year). What we see is stupendous—surging power, twisting and shouldering its way from the thundering cataract all the way to the bar at the mouth of the bay."

The water level continues to climb, and by mid-summer we are wading knee deep where the cardinal flowers once displayed their fiery blooms. The actual fire pit has disappeared beneath the foam, and big

Notices given to Old School tenants

MINDEMOYA—Notices have been sent to the two remaining tenants of the Mindemoya Old School building by the Municipality of Central Manitoulin, indicating that leases would be terminated as of September 1, although council has indicated that they would entertain the possibility of a month-tomonth rental option after that date.

The building known as the Old School has been the subject of much debate in recent months, as council has wrestled with the cost of maintaining and upgrading the facility (tagged at more than \$500,000 in some reports). Council has maintained that the municipality would be hard pressed to make a business case for keeping the facility, despite an outcry from a number of residents concerned about the building's historical legacy in the community.

The Old School building, built as one of the first schools in the province where many students were bused into attend classes from outlying areas, had previously served as the town municipal offices and following that, operated as a business incubation and social services centre. Currently, there are only two remaining tenants in the building, the law offices of Janelle Proulx and the Health Services North offices.

and Mayor Stephens and approved by council.

The committee, as set out in a motion by Mayor Stephens and Councillor Baran, recommended to council to consider in the 2017 budget the updating of the sign on the Discovery Centre building to reflect its rebranding. Councillor Baran stated that the cost of the sign would be \$1,100 to \$1,200 and that that seemed outside of the budget and was therefore felt that it should go to 2017 and get a requite at the appropriate time.

Councillor Scott asked if this would be a permanent name to which the town clerk replied in the affirmative. He also asked, "Why the name change?" to which Councillor Derek Stephens replied that all the displays had been updated and everything was changed, and that the Interpretive Centre, as it had been called, was completely redone.

Council accepted the motion.

It was recommended to council, moved by Mayor Stephens and Councillor MacDonald, and approved by council that Roxanne Reid and Mary Jo Gordon be appointed as members of the Discovery Centre Board.

Councillor Baran and Mayor Stephens recommended that council consider in the 2017 budget a summer student position for the Providence Bay Spring Bay Historical Preservation Society similar to the positions council provides for the Central Manitoulin Historical Society for half days. Councillor Stephens made the comment that the volunteers really do good work, that they just need some help, and that the half day would really help them.

Councillors Stephens and Taylor recommended to council that C. Pearson and Son be awarded the tender for 900 cu. m. of Class 2

Aggregate for the unit price of \$17.12 for a total of \$15,408.00 and 200 cu. m. of HL 3 Aggregate for the unit price of \$20.49 for a total of \$4,098.00, both plus HST of \$2,535.78 for a total contract price of \$22,041.78. The motion was approved by council.

Communication

Mayor Stephens noted that for the last number of years council has excluded the month of July from council and committee meetings and that they will endeavour to do that again this year, barring any emergencies.

Mayor Stephens also noted that the strategic plan

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



Max, who will be attending Queen's University in the fall to earn a BA, then took to the podium to give the fol-




Hats fly skyward in a traditional burst of exuberance as the graduation ceremony draws to a close.




Manitoulin Rainbow District Board Trustee Larry Killens addresses the student body.

affordable housing and he urged council to get on board with the use of sea containers for housing. "In 2011," he said, "Central Mortgage and Housing reported that 40.4 percent of Canadians have sub-standard housing. If we don't have a plan, it is a little premature to ban sea containers." He emphasized that these bins are easily converted into housing at a cost of about \$65,000.

Steve Shaffer of Mindemoya was another speaker at the public meeting. "Why are we looking at this bylaw at all?" he asked. "Have there been complaints?" to which Mayor Stephens replied, "Yes." Mr. Shaffer also spoke about the 21 days that the council wants to impose on travel trailers. "Have you done an inventory?" he asked. "How many are out there? Who is going to know when the 21 days are up? How are we going to control this? We are creating more bureaucracy and we don't need more bureaucracy. We need to simplify our bylaws, not add to them. You are creating a lot of confusion for no benefit to anyone. I don't see a need for this."

There were several young people at the meeting and one man, after saying that he had a degree in architecture, told council that these types of bylaws are too confusing while adding that beautiful homes can be built and that there are just too many things that can be done with sea containers, while a young woman added that everyone is really focussed on the environment now and the usage should be supported.

She had visited before, "regularly travelling to the UK many years ago as part of a choir, conducted by noted organist Ian Saddler. We would fill in for the regular cathedral choirs when they were on holiday and sing the services in their place. I suppose that's when the real attraction to working in a cathedral started. On one of the trips we sang services at St. Paul's itself, and of course it was an overwhelming and wonderful experience.

Living in the UK, Ms. Anstice worked first for eight months at Oxford University, digitizing mediaeval manuscripts before applying for a job as Weddings and Baptisms Administrator at St. Paul's Cathedral (prompted by mom Dorothy, who is still St. Francis of Assisi's organist while dad Jim is a former church warden, who saw the posting on the Cathedral's website). She snagged the job handily and worked in London at the famous church for the next four years. When the post of Deputy Head Virger (spelled verger in Canada) became vacant 11 months ago, she applied and got that one, too.

"I liken the job of virger to that of a stage manager," says Ms. Anstice by way of clarification, "and St. Paul's to a theatre. We 'put on the show,' we're responsible for the props, sets and costumes. That includes the ceremonial plate and furnishings, the candles, vestments and the order of the service.'

St. Paul's Cathedral, however, is no ordinary stage: massive Anglican the Cathedral sits on a site that first saw a church built there in 604 AD; the current cathedral was rebuilt by the architect prominent Christopher Wren after the great fire of London in 1666, opening its doors for worship 30 years later. Its spectacular dome, at 365 feet high, was the tallest building in London until the 1960s.

"Last Sunday, June 5, we dropped Shadow off and he was happy to see the farmer and he brought him inside while we drove away," the owner explained. "After a while he let Shadow out and went back inside to do some dishes.'

When the farmer returned inside, around 10 am, Shadow ran away.

"We searched everywhere for Shadow, reached out to friends who posted on Facebook, put advertisements in both The Expositor and The Recorder, contacted the OPP and EMS to keep and eye open for him on the roads and talked to the folks on the Gore Bay docks," she said.

Shadow's owners had been working with him to train him to know which boat was theirs at the Gore Bay Marina.

There had been no sightings other than early Sunday morning and Shadow's owners were starting to lose hope. "We had a call Wednesday evening from

a Gore Bay resident so I was heading to the last sighting to set up a 'comfort station'," the owner said. "The Island has a fantastic network and someone knew someone in Winnipeg who tracks lost dogs and she had suggested setting up comfort stations for Shadow with an item of my clothing with my sent on it and food.'

While on her way to Gore Bay, she received another call, a boater at the Gore Bay Marina said they had just seen Shadow on the dock headed towards his owner's boat.

"We don't know how, be he somehow found his way back to us," she said. "As an Austrian cattle dog, Shadow is very tenacious, but I have a new found respect for

"I often felt hopeless looking out at the expansive fields of the Island when we were on the roads looking for him, but the support that we got from everyone kept us positive and our hopes up. ...continued from page 1 to see how many people living in Sheguiandah whose dogs had been affected,' said the mayor. "I found the evening to be very informative personally. I had no idea that the quartzite in Sheguiandah would make the soil there acidic. When you consider how most of the Island is limestone, you wouldn't think that there would be acidic conditions in the soil.⁴

Interest in the presentation actually extended far

the symptoms presented by blastomycosis provide a signal challenge when it comes to diagnosis as they largely mimic common respiratory ailments. Ms. Browne presented data that indicate an incidence rate in the general population of two in 100,000.

Ms. Browne explained that blastomycosis is an infection uncommon caused by the fungus blastomyces dermatidis, usually found in soil. The infection affects mainly the lungs and skin and although it has really only hit most people's radar recently (particularly with two recent deaths attributed to the disease), it has actually been a known infection for many years. The geographic region that blastomycosis is known to exist in is vast, stretching from the Mississippi River, through the Great Lakes. Saskatchewan, Manitoba, through Ontario and into Quebec. Its symptoms include a cough, shortness of breath, sweating, fever, fatigue, malaise, unintentional weight loss, joint and muscular stiffness and pain, and can include a rash and skin lesions. As common as the symptoms may be, the infection itself is quite uncommon.

said Ms. Browne. Less than 50 percent of those who have blastomycosis even present symptoms and another complicating factor is that the incubation period for the infection is relatively long, from three weeks to three months, ensuring that the onset of the symptoms can occur long after the initial exposure. "I don't remember what I had for dinner three weeks ago," admitted Ms. Browne. "I don't know if I would think to tell a doctor" about a possible exposure. The ideal conditions for contracting blastomycosis are by breathing in the spores from disturbed soil (such as working in the garden, digging a house foundation or a well), while less common is rubbing the fungus into broken skin. What you cannot do is to contract blastomycosis through person to person (or pet) contact. The spores occur naturally, but little is known about the spores and their environment. It is thought to thrive best in moist, acidic soil that is high in organic matter—especially excrement, decaying vegetation and rotting wood. Both testing for the presence of the spores and treatment to decontaminate soil is problematic, with complications apparently thwarting all

beyond Manitoulin's shores, with calls coming in from as far away as Parry Sound just prior to the event. While the time between exposure and first symptoms ranges from three weeks to three-and-a-half months, it most often manifests between 30 and 45 days. Diagnosis is usually confirmed through sputum or tissue samples (which is a very invasive procedure that is not without the risk of complications).

Asked after the meeting whether the cost of testing was a factor in the frequency of testing, Dr. Cooper gave an emphatic "no!" in response. "Cost of a test is never a factor," he asserted. "If a test needs to be done, it is done if the test is of clinical use."

The long incubation period may well explain how the highest rates of incidence are in urban areas such as the Greater Toronto Area. With larger populations, the higher reported incidents from those centres make sense if one was to consider that people would not be aware of the symptoms until they had returned home from vacationing at the cottage or camp.

While Toronto is number one in reported cases, Sudbury ranks at number four.

Each of the health professionals emphasised that the key element in triggering the diagnostic tests for blastomycosis would be a prolonged persistence of the symptoms listed.

Protection from blastomyscosis focusses on being aware of the activities that might bring about exposure and taking relevant precautions. Exposure can occur when close to shorelines, hunting, trapping, camping, gardening with shovels, clearing weeds, chopping wood, working with rotting wood or digging holes.

"It is important to keep perspective," cautioned Ms. Browne. "The risk of infection is low and medications do work."

Mr. Hawkins noted that exposure to the spores would be more likely to occur through the hauling of wood to the woodpile than in the chopping of the wood. But advised that if you are going to be working with clearing rotted wood, stronger precautions may be warranted. Protective gear can include long sleeve shirts and long pants, work gloves, proper footwear and a disposable filter dust mask. "Not one of those dental masks," cautioned Mr. Burgess, "one with a disposable filter."

Blastomycosis is not a "reportable" infection, complicating the data picture, but the reasons that it is not in that category have basis. solid First. а reportable infections tend to be those that can be transmitted from person to person and have the potential to grow significantly in numbers, secondly, the reason for being "reportable" is to locate the source of the infection, such as in the case of a listeria or salmonella outbreak. In the case of blastomycosis, the source of the infection and its locale are fairly well delineated.

The incidence of blastomycosis amongst pets, particularly dogs, is less uncommon than among humans. "You see it a lot more in dogs," said Dr. Paquet. Diagnosis of the condition amongst dogs may well be aided by the fact that the infection is usually very far along in the pet before the owner brings them in, she noted.

The infection leaves a distinct pattern on an x-ray, a kind of snowstorm that fans out across the lungs.

The same precautions for pets generally follows as that for humans, she noted. "Try and keep your pets away if you are digging big holes. Stay on the path and steer clear of sandy soils and beaches."

Dr. Cooper, chief of staff at the Manitoulin Health Centre and northern representative on the Ontario Medical Association board, was in Toronto for meetings but attended the presentation via teleconference.

Dr. Cooper reiterated the low incidence of the infection "2.4 per 100,000 in the Sudbury/Manitoulin area, we might see two to three cases in a year, but in Toronto, with .29 per 100,000, there are more cases reported."

The complicating factor in diagnosis, the doctor confirmed, is likely due to the symptoms being "so non-specific." Dr. Cooper gave an example of an eight-year-old boy presenting at the local emergency department with muscle strain symptoms. "We see lots of kids with muscle strains over the course of a summer," he said. As to confirmed cases of blastomycosis, however, "I might have seen one or two in my whole career," he said. "If presented with the symptoms, most doctors would think of the more common things."

With the long term aspect of the infection, Dr. Cooper noted that it would be something more likely to be caught in a doctor's office or clinic than in an emergency room visit.

Asked why testing for blastomycosis is not more common, Dr. Cooper responded that it was a great question, and that should something be seen on an x-ray to indicate such an infection, tests should be conducted. But he noted that there are no simple tests that are reliable for blastomycosis, and that the invasive scopes and tissue samples required to confirm a diagnosis have their own complications and are not without some risks themselves. Again, it is in the persistence of symptoms that the case for blastomycosis infection overcomes the weight of those risks.

"I think that I can assure everybody on Manitoulin that if a cough does not respond, we will consider it," said Dr. Cooper.

When it comes to treatments for blastomycosis, anti-fungal agents have proven effective. "Like with a lot of things, it's not the bug that kills you," noted Dr. Cooper, "it's your body's response to it, not the virus that gets you."

Responding to questions on the colour or taste of sputum (phlegm or "spit"), Dr. Cooper noted that there was no colour or odour known to identify the presence of the spores. The depth of a cough that would be required to bring a

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Reports of dead fish on Lake Manitou

LAKE MANITOU—Reports of dead and dying fish on Lake Manitou have been reported across the lake in recent weeks with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry attributing this to spawning stress and warmer-than-normal surface water.

Dave Ham, who lives on the north side of Lake Manitou near Manitowaning, told The Expositor that he has heard reports of dead fish too and had three suckers wash up on his own shore and learned of dead pickerel in the next bay to his property.

When contacted by The Expositor, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) responded, "In the later part of May, the MNRF became aware of dead and dying fish in Lake Manitou. The majority of fish reported as dead or dying have been common white suckers."

The MNRF went on to report that the

mortality in late May was attributed to spawning stress combined with the weather conditions that were hotter (some days were over 30° C) and calmer than usual. "This past May, there was more rapid than normal surface water warming," the MNRF reports.

Reports are continuing to come in and the MNRF is working to obtain fresh samples to provide to the University of Guelph for testing.

The public can report large fish die-offs by calling 1-800-667-1940. Information that a caller will be asked to provide includes: name and contact information; location (as close as possible by District, Township, water body); number and species of fish, if known (e.g., carp, yellow perch, bass, etc.); condition of fish (dying, dead, decomposed); and recent weather or environmental conditions.

There was some question as to why there was not more information available to tourists and visitors to the region at local information kiosks. Ms. Browne noted that the SDHU would be happy to supply the information, should tourism or municipal offices wish to display it.

Following the information meeting, the organizers of the meeting noted that interest in the issue was strong enough to indicate another meeting should be considered, perhaps in the fall.

The final words of the presentation, its key messaging as it were, is to keep perspective as the risk of infection is actually very low, and to stay informed, take reasonable precautions and tell your health provider that you are from a blastomycosis-prone area.

In both cases, the blastomycosis infection was quite advanced by the time it was diagnosed and treated.

The cost of treatment for the disease was anything but reassuring, however. Ms. Norris supplied that the cost to treat her husband exceeded \$6,000 and took several months.

The cost of treatment for animals is also quite high, agreed the veterinarians in the room.

Sheguiandah resident Joanne Wade described in heartbreaking detail the loss of her own pet to the disease in 2013, from cross discussion in the room it became apparent that a number of residents had similar experiences.







Pet rescue sends donations for Fort McMurray SPCA

ans were shocked to see the devastation done by wildfires in Alberta in May and June and the displacement of 80,000 people from Fort McMurray and surrounding areas.

Canadians, including Islanders, immediately reached out to help those in need and Red Cross donations hit \$86 million in 10 days with the amount raised to be matched by federal government funds. Firefighters from other countries came to help with the firefighting effort and included indigenous firefighters as well as teams from Mexico, the United States, the Northwest Territories and South Africa. A situation that was also

on people's minds was 'What about the pets?' Many cats and dogs had to be left behind as people were forced to grab what they could and leave their homes or were at work or out and could not get back to their homes. It soon came to light that RCMP members and emergency workers were watering and feeding any animals they could. Also, according to CBC news, 600 pets from Fort McMurray were rescued by the Alberta SPCA and housed in an Edmonton warehouse until they could be reunited with their families. This was not just cats and dogs that were taken in,

but also lizards, hedgehogs, rabbits, snakes and birds.

On Manitoulin a special posting went out saying, 'Our hearts go out to the people of Fort McMurray and so, here at Manitoulin Pet Rescue we are reaching out to all our members and animal lovers on Manitoulin and surrounding areas in helping us raise funds to send to the Fort McMurray SPCA Disaster Relief Fund that is used to help the pets that have been displaced due to the wildfires." On June 10. Julie McDermid posted a thank you to everyone that donated money and said, "We are happy to report that we will be sending a cheque to the SPCA in Fort McMurray

...continued from page 5 waves have piled black windrows of dead vegetable matter high along the shore. By late summer the level is almost 4 feet higher than the 2013 low.

That's a lot of waterfour feet straight up over a surface area of nearly 46,000 square miles (119,000 sq km). "Unprecedented and historic," according the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

But then we get to the winter of 2015-2016, and this time, no ice. Instead of polar vortex, it's El Niño. We wonder if the change of pattern and the lack of ice are going to stop the rise and re-start the drop. But apparently no, not so much. Much of the winter is chilly, misty, and gray, but with no biting winds causing lake-effect evaporation. Instead, long bands of moisture stream up from the Pacific and the Gulf piling onto Lakes Michigan and Huron. In April, much of northeast Ontario receives a rainfall warning and then a snowfall warning, and then a rainfall warning, and the water level is above where it left off last October, and over 5 inches higher than it was same time last year. And then, once again,

the calendar says May.

And then, once again, we're back at the lake—in time to open up, light a fire in the stove and put in the water line. The dog is more subdued than in previous years, recovering from a knee operation. But, for us, putting in the

what's to be made of such extremes? What does the future hold? With the changing climate, will we eventually enter long-term drought, as a number of, forecasts predict, and see the Great Lakes drain back to-and below-the record low? Or will the warmer atmosphere's ability to hold more moisture keep filling them to the brim? Or will we see wild swings like those of the past few years?

Right now, high water has left organizations dedicated to water preservation pretty much washed out. The dread that accumulated during the years leading up to the low point in 2013 has eased. The IJC's recommendation that the U.S. and Canada investigate structures to regulate the flow of the St. Clair River seems dimly remembered. People along the Wisconsin shoreline are starting to worry about-erosion.

And me? I sit here on the lower deck on a summery

day in 2016, watching errant breezes swirl catspaws around the bay and listening to waves slap high along the highest shore. Mergansers hunt for where flowers lunch bloomed. I am thankful for what the polar vortex and El Niño have done.

I stare across the bay...and try to see the future. But in spite of the bright sun, what I see is cloaked in fog. Will Mother Nature get back to being natural. with the Great Lakes following the cycles they have followed for thousands of years? Or will climate change wreak havoc? If anything is visible through the fog, it's uncertainty. And, given that we

humans have contributed to this uncertainty, I see quite clearly the need for planning and for prudence. I think it makes sense to ask human science and human engineering to pitch in and give Mother Nature a helping hand.

water line is less of a chore than normal. The day is bright and warm and flat calm. While there's a small pile of snow on the back deck, there's no ice at all on the bay. After I walk the foot valve out as deep as the chest waders will allow. we use the rowboat to tow the pipe-stand out to the full extent of the line. We're in deep.

For the water is deep. It's considerably higher than it was last fall. It's creeping under the dock sections we stored high and dry last October, and lapping disturbingly close to the pump-house. Logs and various bits of flotsam have been flung where, in my memory, water has never been before.





House of Kin founder Chris Sherdan retires

SUDBURY—It was 19 years ago that the House of Kin first opened its doors and since that date, more than 300,000 people from across the North have made it their home away from home while seeking medical treatment in Sudbury. A recent gathering at the Caruso Club in Sudbury celebrated the retirement of the House of Kin founder and chairman of the board, surprising the guest of honour and providing the opportunity for communities across the North to show their gratitude to the man who made it all happen.

"They managed to surprise me," laughed Chris Sheridan, who explained that he had been told the dinner would be a quiet private affair with the members of the board. Instead, Mr. Sheridan found himself the unaccustomed centre of attention of more than 220 people gathered for a dinner in his honour emceed by Moose FM's Bob Alexander.

It was in 1982, as Mr. Sheridan was leaving a board meeting at the Memorial Hospital, that he noticed numerous people sleeping in their cars and in the chairs of the lobby. He quickly discovered that these were people who were "supporting a friend or a family member who were undergoing specialized medical treatment and

As the House of Kin notes, "this name reflects the true expression of family and people who care and support one another; a quality provided for those staying at the facility."

In the intervening years, the House of Kin had made it possible for family members across the North to be there to support their family members as they go through the trauma of medical procedures, including the recovery, diagnosis or treatment process.

Mr. Sheridan soon enlisted the help of local hotel/motel associations, and the concept for a program was developed and presented to the local Sudbury Kinsmen Club. By the fall of 1983, the program began providing hotel rooms at a substantially lower cost to qualified applicants and in its first year, the Kinsmen Club had assisted 120 families through the program, and by the second year that number had grown to 280 families.

In 1997, "after tireless efforts by the board of directors and volunteers," the foundation purchased the Grand Prix Inn and changed its name to the House of Kin/Maison de Kin. ed Mr. Sheridan, in whom the House of Kin will be a legacy that doubtless will remain a lasting reminder of the contributions that a determined individual can make.

As for Mr. Sheridan's role with the organization, while he is stepping back, the founder will remain active on the board as an ex officio member and he remains on a number of committees. "Like the property committee," he said. "My experience is in that industry."





Little Current District Fish and Game Club celebrates 50 years of successes

LITTLE CURRENT—The Little Current and District Fish and Game Club (LCDFGC) can be credited with accomplishing many things over its 50-year span, but perhaps most notably is its great successes in the education of the public in caring for the environment. In particular, the club has led the way in rehabilitation and has used this as a model to involve youth in conservation concerns.

Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin acknowledged the efforts of the LCDFGC on behalf of town council, noting in particular the annual school trips to the pickerel hatchery. "So much effort goes into keeping the environment and fishery sustainable—hats off to you."

The mayor then presented President Bill Strain with a plaque, a replica of which will be installed at the fish viewing station on Bass Creek in Sheguiandah.

Bill Strain told the large crowd

that the night was all about looking back on 50 years of the club. "I don't imagine these gentlemen would have known what kind of legacy they would have achieved," he added, gesturing to a photo displaying the original executive.

"These two guys have been members of the club since day one," he said. "It's mindboggling the amount of volunteer hours they have put in."

helping to teach his daughters the importance of partnerships and that actions speak louder than words and hard work pays off.

"You've shown that when we work together we can achieve great things," he added.

John Diebolt, a retired conservation officer with the MNRF for 30 years, said he was very honoured to be a member of the LCDFGC. He spoke of the many encounters he had as a CO with poachers at Bass Creek during the pickerel spawn and how the COs could not manage the destruction being done.

"Members of that club, led by Bill Strain, saw what was happening and knew what had to be done," Mr. Diebolt said, explaining the creation of the river watch program after Bass Creek was declared a fish sanctuary. "It was local people looking out for local people. Shifts were made, from 10 pm to 10 am, and people were told, nicely but firmly, that you cannot fish here, and here's why." "As a CO, it was so good to see the club members with flashlights," Mr. Diebolt said. "This has way more meaning and impact than some far-flung govlit in the afternoon. One day, two of the original members came across a frozen bear at the dump and decided to pull a practical joke on the firelighters, bringing the bear to the cottage and setting its frozen mass up in the doorway. That afternoon, the two firelighters came in only to shine their flashlight on the bear, propped up on its hind legs. Needless to say, Mr. Cooper chuckled, the men beat a hasty retreat back to Little Current and they refused to return that day.

"It's a good club and still is a wonderful club and I thank you," Mr. Cooper said.

The Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters was also on hand to offer their congratulations, presenting the club with a painting. Rick Gjos and Bruce Burnett also recognized the efforts of Bill and Linda Strain, to many hoots and hollers from the crowd. Throughout the night, many draws were held with the grand prize winners of three tickets to the upcoming Manitoulin Streams fundraiser going to Patty Beaudry, Linda Erskine and Ron Bowerman.

ernment organization or a CO like myself."

Larry Killens, Rainbow District School Board trustee, told the audience that the success of the LCDFGC didn't happen by accident, calling them a "world class organization" who wrote the book on 'going green.'

Since the hatchery tours began, over 700 students have made their way through the Sheguiandah hatchery, receiving fishing rods, learning how to build bass nests and how to keep streams clean.

"Thank you for all you're doing right now for our kids and the environment—the future," Mr. Killens said.

1969 LCDFGC President Don Cooper shared the story of the first meeting at its official clubhouse. He explained that 50 years ago, Cliff Fielding gave the club use of a cabin on LaCloche Island. A big drafty cottage with a stone fireplace, it was noted that if there was to be an evening meeting, a fire would have to be

Carol Hughes and MPP Michael Mantha, who were unable to attend, Seija Deschenes of Manitoulin Streams addressed the crowd.

Ms. Deschenes noted that she first met Mr. Strain in 2007 as he was a member of the Manitoulin Streams board of directors. She spoke of their work together on Bass Creek and through the school tours.

"The one thing I come home with after working with this club is the amount of work they do," she said. "It's a real group effort."

She spoke of the excitement at seeing young stewards of the environment leaving the hatchery each and every year excited about the things they had learned, pointing to the many posters and letters that lined the stairwell from Grade 4 students at Little Current and Central Manitoulin Public Schools thanking the LCDFGC. Fish and Game Club member Tony Ferro sells tickets on a framed painting (held by Garry Elliott) as a fundraiser for the club.

Bob Florean, retired fish and wildlife specialist with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), said that through the LCDFGC's efforts, much has been accomplished, and those accomplishments are now showing up, 30 years later.

"What best describes the LCD-FGC is a sense of community and belonging," Mr. Florean said. "They've got your back they're good, good people. Kudos to the work that's gone on here."

Mr. Florean said he first got involved with work on the Bass Creek fish ladder. Mr. Strain had approached him after numerous failed attempts at working with the MNRF, he recalled.

"What happened there (the fish ladder) was leading, ground breaking stuff—nowhere else in North America was anything like that going on," he continued.

He too noted the school trips and the hard work that goes into them.

"These guys are true stewards of the wild and a model of success for others to follow," he said, encouraging anyone "bored in retirement to hook up with those guys."

Neil Debassige also spoke as a First Nations school principal, environmental steward, and as a father. He explained that for the past nine years Lakeview School has taken part in the hatchery tours which is an important part of his school's outdoor education program. Club members' volunteer hours translate into long hours of discussion on environmental stewardship in the classroom, he explained.

Mr. Debassige thanked the LCDFGC for helping to keep Manitoulin beautiful and for

Birch Street culverts to be replaced this summer During its June 7 council meeting, council heard from Gary McKay of Tulloch Engineering regarding options for the replacement of the Birch Street culverts on Clover Val ley Road.

Mr. MacKay said that he and township roads superintendent Ron Cooper viewed the culverts recently and found them to be in "very bad shape. The bottom is rotting due to corrosion and rust." This, he explained, causes water to run around the perimeter of the culverts rather than through them, causing sinkholes, which then cause the road to collapse.

"There is no imminent danger, but I am worried about a pumper truck or emergency vehicle (crossing the culverts)," he told council. "I wouldn't let it go until next spring.'

He said there are pluses and minuses for bridges. "They are expensive but have their place."

Mr. Cooper explained that the culverts, at seven feet in diameter, run completely full of water in the spring and suggested that a move to eight foot culverts might be in order.

The cost ranges between \$125,000 and \$150,000 for new culverts, and up to \$225,000 for a new bridge.

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry has been contacted and Mr. MacKay was told that there is a fishery in that creek so the workable window for construction is between July 1 and the end of August. If construction does not take place in that window, Assiginack would need approval from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO). Assiginack would also need DFO approval if the municipality decided to change from culverts to a different structure.

Mr. MacKay suggested getting galvanized steel culverts with a polymer coating, which will last an additional 50 years over regular galvanized steel. The cost for this is \$800 for one linear metre. The culverts are almost 21 metres in length.

The engineer also suggested a guard rail system as the Ministry of Transportation is now recommending this action be taken. Mr. Cooper suggested to council this wasn't necessary.

"Good contractors can do this job without shutting traffic down, or at least to one lane," Mr. MacKay continued. If not, traffic on that road could conceivably be closed for two weeks

CAO Alton Hobbs asked Mr. MacKay if a guarantee of one lane closure during construction could be written into the specs of the tender. Mr. MacKay said it could and suggested mailing the tender as an invitation to a few "reputable" companies. Mr. Cooper said he would email him a list the following day, including Manitoulin contractors.

A motion was made by Councillor Brenda Reid, seconded by Councillor Leslie Fields, that the tendering process for the Birch Street culvert replacement commence.

Accounts for payment

Council passed a resolution to see staff pay the following accounts: general, \$241,552.58; and payroll, \$59,563.29.

Belgian waffles coming to Manitowaning

Council reviewed a letter from Tammy Reynolds regarding the opening of a Belgian waffle business in Manitowan-

ing. "We may be setting up at our property at 96 Queen Street intermittently through the summer and wanted to know if there were any bylaws or requirements for us to do so," she wrote to council. "We have been in contact with the health board (unit) in Mindemoya and will be certified by them for operation.

Council had no objection to the request.

New Museum Advisory Committee member

John Pennie has been appointed to the Assiginack Museum Advisory Committee.

Drinking water financial plan

Assiginack council passed a resolution to complete a financial plan for the municipality's drinking water systems, as per government regulation.

They also passed a resolution to petition the government: "And whereas the plan must be approved by resolution indicating that the water system is financially viable; and whereas this report is to be given to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing; and whereas we received our most recent report on March 15 and it indicated that our system is not financially sustainable; now therefore that we petition the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing and the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change for direc-tion as we cannot satisfy the regulation requirement regarding financial sustainability."

Mr. Hobbs pointed to the Sudbury and District Health Unit minutes that contained a motion regarding the importance of fluoridated drinking water and referencing a private member's bill to support mandatory fluoridation. He told council that he asked a representative of the Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA), which maintains the water treatment plants, the cost of installing a fluoridation system and was told the cost would be \$84,000 per plant (Manitowaning and Sunsite).

"The province has lost track of the fact that small municipalities cannot afford this," Mr. Hobbs said.

Council passes alcohol policy

Council passed Bylaw 16-07, being a bylaw to amend Bylaw 14-02, with changes made specifically for the South East Manitoulin Lions Club Summerfest weekend. The

exceptions to the alcohol policy are as follows: 1. A small self-contained mini pavilion may be erected near the baseball diamond. It will be served by Smart Serve-certified staff and will only be open during the baseball tournament and will not have direct access to the baseball diamond; 2. The Lions Club is permitted to serve alcoholic drinks in aluminum cans. Bottles must be retained in the serving area and the drink must be served in a plastic cup; and 3. The Lions Club is permitted to have at a minimum one Smart Serve certified staff at all times at each location where alcohol is sold.

by Michael Erskine AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING-Head dancer Michael Ramsdin of Aundeck Omni Kaning has no problem blending his cultural heritage with success in his chosen career, in fact, he has just celebrated his red seal certification as a plumber—the first to do so through Mnidoo Mnising Employment and Training.

"He is our first red seal," confirmed Mnidoo Mnising Employment and Training program manager Marilyn Stevens. "We are so proud of him.

Mr. Ramsdin, who, along with his sister Jennifer Ramsdin, the Saturday male head dancer at the Aundeck Omni Kaning Powwow, has only been dancing for about three years, less than half the seven years he spent gathering his hours for his certification.

Ramsdin hasn't Mr. always wanted to be a plumber. "I started out in my early 20s not knowing what to do," he recalled. "I pretty much knew that the trades were the way to go." In order to get a handle on a career path, Mr. Ramsdin took an exploratory college course. "I did different stuff every day," he said.

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


