Councillor Paul Bowerman requested that votes on all motions be recorded.

The delegation and review of the code of conduct lasted until

Mr. Rust-D'eve began his delegation outlining his considerable experience in municipal law, having been called to the bar 43 years ago and spending the past 40 years of his practice in that field. "Almost entirely on the side of municipalities," he said. He noted that a soon-to-be passed bill in the legislature would require all municipalities to have a code of conduct. Currently there are 84 municipalities in the province with a code of conduct and nine of those municipalities have Mr.

Amish horses dead after horse and buggy mishap on Hwy. 6 at Fossil Hill

FOSSIL HILL—Manitoulin's relatively new Amish community is dealing with its first horse and buggy accident on an Island roadway, thankfully not involving a motorized vehicle.

On Saturday morning Manitowaning's Shirley Hamilton and a friend were on their way to breakfast at JD's Garden Shed Café in Tehkummah when they made a starting discovery while cresting Fossil Hill on Highway 6, just before New England Road.

"We were just coming up that grade when suddenly horses came wildly running at us," Ms. Hamilton told The Expositor. The horses, two of them, and still bound by their harnesses, were running down Fossil Hill, northbound, having obviously been spooked.

"They came up over the hill, stuff still rattling around them," Ms. Hamilton added, referencing the remnants of the buggy.

Ms. Hamilton and her friend then came upon a distressing

New emergency room officially opened at Little Current hospital

LITTLE CURRENT—The successful completion of a long and challenging journey toward a new modern emergency department at the Manitoulin Health Centre's (MHC) Little Current site was celebrated with an official opening ceremony and ribbon cutting at the hospital on Thurs-

Chair of the hospital fundraising committee and member of the resource and strategic planning committees Angela Becks acted as Master of Ceremonies for the official opening and took those present on a short journey back in time to the 2010 start of the emergency depart-

"Better served patients—patients first," was the vision that guided the process, noted Ms. Becks. She said that without targeted funding for the refit, the hospital staff, administration and board had to engage in "very concerted thought and planning" in order to find the funding for

As a result of that effort, two things came into being, said Ms. Becks. First, the goal of planning the physical space that would meet the challenges presented by patient needs and second, a strategic plan

embarked upon by the MHC board that was approved in January 2016. "I am still getting used to public service," joked MHC board chair Terry Olmstead. "I am still trying to make a profit."

Mr. Olmstead acknowledged the work of former board member and chair Suzanne Norris "who got this going." The chair also noted that the challenges faced by the staff during this process were considerable. "First we tore their house down, and then it was another eight months that they succeeded in making it through while doing a great job. To Lynn (Foster, vice president of corporate support) and her team—great job. The board is extremely pleased.

Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin came to the podium joking that he had a lot of experience operating on a non-profit basis. "It is a privilege to be here," he said. "We have always been very proud of the facilities we have here." Mr. MacNevin congratulated the board and the staff in being able to bring the project to fruition despite the budgetary constraints that are all too familiar to public institutions.

Chief of Staff Dr. Stephen Cooper pondered his mixed emotions on the new facility, noting that there are many memories of challenges, victories and defeats that flood in when the door to the old emergency

Four highway construction projects slated for work on Manitoulin this summer

MANITOULIN—With the summer construction season upon us, Islanders and visitors to Manitoulin can expect a number of Ministry of Transportation road and bridgework projects over the next few

Crews will be continuing work on the Kagawong Creek bridge replacement on Highway 540 at Kagawong. The bridge project should be completed by the end of June. Traffic is currently reduced to one lane by means of temporary traffic signals.

Replacement of the Mindemoya Creek bridge on Highway 551 is currently underway in Providence Bay. A single lane temporary modular bridge has been utilized as a detour while the existing bridge is removed and replaced. Traffic will be reduced to a single lane controlled by temporary traffic signals. The estimated completion for the bridge is late fall 2017.

Highway 6 will see 23.6 kilometres resurfaced 10.5 kilometres north of Highway 542 (0.8 kilometres north of Cowan's Side Road) northerly to 0.3 kilometres south of the Ten Mile Point Lookout. Daily single lane closures on Highway 6 will be managed by traffic flagging operations while resurfacing is carried out. Construction is anticipated to be complete in early September 2017.

The reconstruction and resurfacing of Highway 540, one kilometre west of Highway 6 at Little Current, westerly for 17.6 kilometres. Daily single lane closures will be managed by traffic flagging for culvert replacements and ongoing paving operations. The anticipated completion of this project is late fall 2017.

Northeast Town planning now through municipal office

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town officially became its own planning authority earlier this year, meaning that any severance (consents), zoning or minor variances in the Northeast Town are now handled by town staff, with decisions made by council opposed to the Manitoulin Planning Board (MPB) (which the municipality is no longer a part of).

"The only big change in terms of planning is that Northeast Town residents (or landowners) come here, to the town office, now," explained Northeast Town Clerk Pam Cress.

Ms. Cress said that residents are welcome to come to the office and have a conversation with her, or make an appointment if she is unavailable, to figure out if the project fits into the Official Plan or Provincial Policy Statement and what steps need to be taken such as filling out the

"I then take a period of time to review the application and make sure everything is in order," explained Ms. Cress. "From there, a notice is advertised in the paper regarding the application for 20 days prior to

Getting things done on councils calls for discipline and order

It's challenging to get things done in a democracy. There are all those annoying contrary opinions on what the right course of action might be and which policies to enact in order to meet the needs of the public. How tempting it must be for politicians and civil servants to simply deal with things behind closed doors and through quiet phone calls away from prying ears and eyes and all the fuss and controversy they tend to engender.

With no need for long explanations to people who are not inclined to listen or evidence-based policy, a policy maker could just fly along on gut and intuition or just do things "they way we have always done them." As Fiddler on the Roof's Tevia was wont to sing, "tradition!"

But this isn't the early 19th century and, like it or not, we do live in a democracy, so municipal councillors have to relinquish some of the 'way we have always done things" and pay attention to the legislation that defines their roles.

This isn't a bad thing, in fact, it is a really good thing. But it is a change and change is hard.

Direct democracy is often put forward as an ideal by those who don't actually have to go through the challenges of getting something done. In the days of the Greek city states, when everyone could gather in the town square and hammer out what needed to be done about the Spartans gathering outside their gates, or how to respond to a neighbouring community's depredations upon their fields and/or shipping, it was the epitome of democracy. People apparently had a lot of time on their hands in those far off benighted days. It really didn't work out all that well in the end. By the time decisions were made the Spartans had already scaled the walls and the pirates made off

Getting things done in a timely manner requires a certain amount of discipline. Getting things done fairly and honestly calls for a great deal of transparency and accountability, and yes, decorum. That means behaving like civilized ladies and gentlemen as well as having set rules on who speaks when and how.

Most modern councils work on the principle that should someone wish to enter the discussion at the council table they make an application for a delegation. Random interactions from the floor, that realm so pejoratively characterized by the late W.C. Fields as "the peanut gallery," is a sure recipe for chaos, complete with red herrings and white rabbits for all.

If you think getting things done in a democracy is tough, try shouting your way through an anarchy.

While it may seem wrong to "muzzle" citizens in the council chambers, it is the chair (usually the reeve or mayor) who must enforce the rules of order, in the interests of actually getting the work of council done. It is not an easy task, no one likes to tell their friends and neighbours to sit down and stay silent—but it has to be done if order is to be maintained and work to proceed in a timely manner.

Nearly all councils on Manitoulin do follow those basic tenets of modern democracy. It is past time for all councils to shake off the shackles of the past. What worked well enough in the 1880s is not going to cut it in the 21st Century. Better to catch up to time than be forced into it through the offices of the court or provincial interven-

Billings council needs a comprehensive plan for its properties

Ban on jumping off the Kagawong dock will backfire like the pesticide issue

To the Expositor:

Two agenda items in the last Billings council meeting seem to highlight some of the problems this community faces. They highlight the biases and influences that history, tradition and religion have in decision making in this Township.

First, a delegation representing the congregation of St. Paul's on the Hill United Church approached council to inform the community that the congregation is dissolving, and asking whether the Township would be prepared to buy the property. An interesting request, since it is my observation that council is heavily influenced in its decision making by the congregation of St. John's Anglican church—what one might call "the competition." In fact, there was a lively debate about the different models—the Anglican one being "top-down" and St. Paul's being, in the words of John Christian, who along with Jacquie Gordon, represented the congregation—being bottom up! Either way, though Mayor Hunt claimed that the church is, in his opinion, 'the centre of the community,' even on a very good day St. John's is very happy to have more than 60 people attending its Sunday service. I've always been of the opinion that politics and religion should be kept apart, so, not to make too blunt a point of it, but the power base of the current Billings administration, appropriate or not, seems to be melting away!

On the decision—to buy or not to buy—St. Paul's church stands in

the middle of town-owned land so it could well fit (with de-consecration and some expenditure on insulating the building and possibly structurally adding another floor), into a planned and well thought out civic complex, along with a new fire station, possible library etc. What the Township can't afford is to keep collecting property, either through tax arrears acquisition, or in unique circumstances like the present one, without having a plan approved by the community as a whole.

The other item that caught my eye was a motion by council to ban the "jumping off the marina dock," which has been a tradition, to quote the mayor, for as long as he can recall. Indeed, he expressed opposition to the motion, even though on a vote the motion passed. The fact that all council offers as an alternative is a small swim platform anchored out in shallow water is, I predict, going to backfire badly on this motion. Of course, there are liability issues, but those have existed "for as long as the mayor can remember" too! What is more to the point is jumping off the Kagawong Marina dock has become quite the tourist attraction (as well as a right of passage for Billings youth and not so young residents). I predict this decision is going to bounce back and forth through as many meetings as it took to come to a resolution on the pesticide spraying issue!

Anishinabek First Nations will continue lead and build alliances and relationships with their neighbours through constructive dialogue and actions that support reconciliation and healing.



Swing bridge closing issues last week caused by proximity switch failure

LITTLE CURRENT—Experienced travellers heading to and from the Island on Highway 6 tend to time their arrival and departures to avoid the opening and closing of the Little Current Swing Bridge (although just about everyone gets caught occasionally), but recently timing wasn't everything as the oldest structure on a provincial highway stalled twice in one week throwing an unanticipated delay into some travel plans.

"There was an electrical fault on one of the proximity switches on the bridge," said Carole Paiement, communications services coordinator with the Ministry of Transportation. "The proximity switches monitor the position of various moving components of the bridge as it swings

According to Ms. Paiement the electrical fault in the proximity switch triggered a circuit breaker in the main control panel interrupting the bridge's ability to swing closed. "This event occurred while the bridge was closing on Monday, June 12 and again on Wednesday, June 14,' said Ms. Paiement.

She went on to note that "during the two events when the circuit breaker was triggered due to the electrical fault, bridge staff were able to manually override the main control panel and close the bridge. Disruption to highway traffic was minimal and there were no swings lost for marine traffic.'

Things should be back to normal operations now. "The electrical fault in the proximity switch has been corrected and the bridge is back to routine operation," said Ms.

One Friday night I hopped on the Greyhound bus and travelled back to Little Current to spend the weekend with my mother. When I returned on Sunday night to our apartment, Marie said she'd made a friend while I was gone. She told me all about how she'd been approached by a young woman while on her way to work. I was already preparing my lecture about talking to strangers when she said, "Her name is Frances and she has brothers." I cut the lecture back by half.

It turned out there was way more than one young woman; the entire group of Newly Met Persons included two sisters, three brothers, a brother-in-law, two young children, and a slew of friends, all of whom came from P.E.I. Suddenly my life was full of P.E. Islanders and as the weeks, months and years went by we became solid friends.

I learned a bunch of new phrases common to the folk of that other Isle. For instance, "S'notting" which, when translated, seemed to mean "Can you believe that?" And:

'Is that all the far you are?" Which is selfexplanatory and seriously cracked me up. And "Weak, eh?" which is explained with this example: if someone bought a new car, in admiration one would say, "Weak, eh?"

Receiving a charm of P.E.I., something so inconsequential back in Grade 8, took on much greater significance after Marie met

Frances. In honour of my new friends, I strung the charm on a silver chain and wore it faithfully for years. That group of people had a big impact on my life, but an even bigger one on my sister, Marie's. She married one of the brothers, Ralph, and they moved to British Columbia, where together they grew a great family.

If my sister had not met Frances, and if we had not all become friends, she would not have her family and I might never have had the experience of standing at the rail of the ferry that ran from the mainland to P.E.I. 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Island Track and Field

The annual Manitoulin Island Elementary Track and Field Championships took place over two days last week in Gore Bay. As per usual there were supportive crowds and excellent competition in attendance at the June 13 and 15 event. Amazingly, there were 12 Island track and field records that were broken, by seven individuals and one team, over the two days, despite softer track conditions. In the 9-year-old girls' division, **Alexandra Wilson-Zegil** set the new record in high jump with a 1.24 m bar!

In the 10-year-old girls' **Ava Assinewai** upped the ante in two events as she eclipsed the high-jump mark, setting a new target of 1.27m. Finally, she absolutely was on her game to beat the old 1500m record set by none other than former, super-Eagle, OFSAA alumnus **Emma Tallman** by 9 seconds in the 1500m. Ava clocked a sub-6 time of 5:59.47 to break the 15-year-old tally. **Malachi Joseph** beat the long jump with a leap forward of 3.81 m while **Eli Locke** moved the mark up to 1.28 m in the high jump. **Jayden Hayden** completed the strong 10-year-old hit on the records with a new rank in standing-long with a 2.09 m mark.

In the 11-year class, **Delaney Bridgeman** took home two new records as she obliterated the old standing long jump by 12cm with a 2.22 m in addition to her triple jump record with a 8.65 m measuring.

In the 12-year-old girls' division, **Sophie Heitkamp** had a mind-blowing, three records fall to her efforts. She racked up a new long jump of 4.23 m, standing long jump of 2.23 m and a high jump at 1.37 m!

Finally, there was a large cheer emitted from the C. C. McLean 13+ girls' relay team as their time of 1:01.95 was called out as they reduced all future teams' targets to win the gold medal.

As well as these record results, individual medal winners featured: 9 and under tied girls' gold medal recipients Mya Balfe and Alex Wilson-Zegil, Sadie Bridgeman with silver and Zaagaasge "Z" Corbiere-Toulouse and Tessa Merrylees sharing third. On the boys' side it was Rhyis Arthurs in sole possession of the goal, Jack Carter of the silver and then Noah Thorpe and Cody Campbell each taking home a bronze medal.

In the 10-year-old girls' class Ava had a perfect 12 point gold, **Brooke Gibeault** amassed 9 points for the silver while cousin **Annie Balfe** was a close bronze with 8 tallies. On the guys' side it was **Malachi Joseph** taking gold, **Davin Deschenes** with a silver and **Jaydan Hayden** and **John-Michael Taggart** each picking up the bronze with 8 points aniece

The 11-year-old girls' set highlighted a rare perfect-12 tie between Delaney Bridgeman and **Aysia Debassige** who managed to each win all of their four events but not to have to meet each other in them. Taking silver **Shaolin Roy** in silver then **Amelia Osawanimiki** and **Jazmin Colwell** each in bronze. The boys' event featured the C. C. McLean 1-2 punch of **Bay Migwans** with the gold and **Mason Leighton** taking silver. Tying for bronze was the Little Current pair of **Allan Wilkin** and **Billy Biederman**.

In the 12 girls' Sophie Heitkamp posted a perfect-12 while teammate **Teah Migwans** was second and Wasse Abin's **Victoria Trudeau** and LCPS's **Autumn Deschesne** in thirds. The guys division was tightly contested with the push for gold naming three gentlemen counting 10 points to each take gold including: **Trent Bell, Liam Bridgeman** and **Latrell Peltier**. In silver, both **Julian Wemigwans** and **Jacob Wilson** scored eight points and finally wearing bronze was both **Carter Moggy** and **Darwin Wood**.

The 13-plus division was very competitive and predicts great things for their future team ast they move into secondary school next year. In the girls' category. **Malia Leighton** was golden with teammate **Ayriell Nodecker** close with the silver. Donning the bronze was CMPS athlete Hailey McGills-Prior tying Wikwemikong's **Francesca Pheasant**. The boys' set featured **Owen Duncanson** with a perfect 12 points, **Nyron Panamick** in a close second with 11 points and **Rory Dearing** in bronze with 9


Fundraising barbecue to complete Classic summer athletic event



office (now a storage facility) is opened. "I can still feel the ghosts and the stories of patients who passed through those doors," he said. "But we have a new room, trauma one and trauma two, a bright functional space. The tools you need are right at your fingertips. The space works and it is easy to connect to specialists in Sudbury—it's a very modern emergency room." Dr. Cooper said that he was leaving nostalgia behind, happy that there is a facility where patients can now get the best care possible. "Thank you to the board for having the courage and the vision to move forward."

Dr. Simone Meikleham said that the construction crew should receive commendation for their consideration and care taken during the process to minimize their negative impacts of the construction on patients and staff. "Especially those times when they showed up in a construction hat when an umbrella might have been more appropriate."

"This has been a dream for this facility for many years, long before I came here," said MHC CEO Derek Graham. He noted the countless attempts over the last 11 years to secure funding. "For whatever reason, those attempts failed to hit the sweet spot," he said. Mr. Graham recalled the board chairs that have helmed those efforts, including both the board of today and the board of years goneby. "We have been fortunate to have such wonderful leadership."

which they will be attending the week of July 8."




He noted that a highlight of his time with the cadets was the opportu-

Administrators report

Manor Administrator Michelle Bond presented her report to the board. She said that the home was at a 94 percent occupancy rate with 17 applicants on the waiting list.

"A family I know were told that it could be up to a year to get into the Manor," said Board member Dawn Orr.

Manor Director of Care Sylvie Clark explained that it depends on what type of room the individual requests. "If they just request a basic room it could take a while, but if they choose basic, semi private and private, that's three separate lists and they could get in sooner."

Ms. Bond was pleased to report that former Manor chef Chris Lethbridge had been taken over the role of dietary manager and a new chef had been hired.

She said that unfortunately, the Manor had to fill 33 hours with agency personal support workers in May.

Ms. Bond noted that they have hired two personal support worker students and are continuing to advertise, but are short staffed due to sick leaves.

The board discussed the need for more PSWs across the Island and the province.

A letter will be crafted to the premier and Ministry of Health and Long Term advocating for personal support workers in the long-term care field.

Financially, Ms. Bond said that the Manor had a surplus of \$429 in May. "Year to date we have a \$19,000 surplus which is good—a bit of a buffer for the summer," said Ms. Bond.

Fundraising

Board member Wendy Gauthier told the board that the fundraising campaign for the new patient ceiling lifts is at \$36,316.50. The goal is \$75,000.

Ms. Gauthier noted that the Manor did well at their booth at the Manitoulin Trade Fair in May and sold \$2,000 in raffle tickets for the Ivan Wheale painting, which had been donated earlier in the year. She added that it was good promotion for the Manor as well.

Board member Pat MacDonald commented how wonderful it was that Mr. Wheale helped staff the booth at the Trade Fair and how many people stopped at the booth due to his presence.

Ms. Gauthier said that volunteers would begin selling Tree of Light tickets this summer and that their goal this year is \$15,000.

The next Manitoulin Centennial board meeting is scheduled for Thursday, July 20.

"It's primarily a safety thing," said derby coordinator Dave Patterson. "We looked at the number of people who were coming across to Gore Bay to weigh in. It is a long crossing and probably not a great idea, especially if there is inclement weather. We had a chat with Pam Lortie (CAO of the Town of Spanish) and put it together for this year."

Another great new addition to the derby this year is the chance to grab one of 600-plus salmon lures being offered to the first 600 people to weigh in a fish. "Jack Hicks of Osprey Lures generously donated the lures," said Mr. Patterson.

"They are high quality lures—I use them myself." The opportunity to secure one of the lures is limited, though, as they are "while quantities last."

There will also be a \$100 daily prize this year for the heaviest fish to be weighed in that day. "So you should definitely weigh in your fish," said Mr. Patterson. "That five-pound salmon or trout might be just enough to win if everyone else is having a

bad day."

Mr. Patterson is an avid angler himself and just a little bit competitive, so a new contest offers a chance to "out fish Dave." Each day that Mr. Patterson weighs in a fish (no, he doesn't qualify for prizes) if your salmon or trout weighed in is heavier than his, your name goes into a draw for \$500 to be drawn at the close of the derby.

Also new for this year is a youth ticket (14 and under) that sells for \$35 and not only qualifies for any of the prizes, but also a special for youth prize of \$500. "We want to encourage families to get out and fishing together." said

sight—the buggy to which the horses had obviously been tethered was found along the rock face across the highway from New England Road, smashed into many pieces. The pair got out of the vehicle to look for any passengers and found nothing, until they caught sight of an Amish man making his way around the rock face, bleeding but mobile.

"We put him in the back seat of the car and called the ambulance," Ms. Hamilton said, noting that her friend is a nurse and checked him for injuries, but that besides a gash to the face and chest, he appeared to be okay.

The man, Ken Albrecht, told the women that the horse on the right had come into contact with the guard rail, setting it off, in turn spooking the other horse. He had been pitched from the buggy on impact, which destroyed the vehicle.

Before the ambulance came Mr. Albrecht gave the women an address book of all his family and relatives, including the couple who leases land from him. Knowing the couple would have a phone in the home (Amish tradition dictates that no phones or

other electronics can be within the home), they called the tenants to let them know what had happened to their landlord and to tell the appropriate people.

tell the appropriate people.

Mr. Albrecht and his family had just moved to Manitoulin less than three months ago.

Still bound together, one of the horses jumped to its death over the guard rail. The other horse did not make the jump and was found to be suffering greatly on the highway. When the Ontario Provincial Police arrived on scene the horse was euthanized.

"He sat there, in the backseat, the whole time with this sweet smile," Ms. Hamilton said of the gentle nature of the man she helped. "Meanwhile he'd just lost his wagon and two horses."

"You just never know what's around the corner," she added thoughtfully. "It was just like being in the Wild West, with horses racing at you."

Ms. Hamilton said that while sorry for the accident, she was pleased that it didn't involve a motorized vehicle.

"There's more Amish moving here and we want to make sure they are safe on the roads," Ms. Hamilton concluded.

for and two peripheral individuals were caught up in the sweep.

The investigation and arrests attest to a wide crime network of related to gangs stretching into every corner of the province.

"We are often asked if something is gang-related," noted Wikwemikong Tribal Police Sergeant Chris Cooper. "But how do you really know? This time there are definite links to the Driftwood Crips and to the Hells Angels. It's not a guess anymore."

Project Kronic is the third large police operation targeting the Driftwood Crips and involved more than 800 police officers from 20 police services across the province, leading to more than 660 charges and 120 people being accused of charges related to an alleged criminal organization.

Charges across the province range from drug trafficking to attempted murder, trafficking in firearms as well as kidnapping conspiracies.

There were 33 suspects swept up in raids conducted in Sudbury and a combined 141 charges were laid in that community. A number of the charges laid in Project Kronic relate to the spread of fentanyl, with 193 fentanyl patches and 194 pills seized in the raids across the province.

The Driftwood Crips are described as one of Toronto's oldest criminal gangs with a highly organized command structure. One of those individuals swept up in the Sudbury raids is described as a member of the Hells Angels.

Charged with conspiracy to traffic cocaine contrary to section 465(1)(C) of the Criminal Code is a 38-year-old female of Wijkwemkoong.

innovative fundraising platforms including Polar Plunges, Tip-A-Cops, NHL Alumni Games, Torch Rides and Endurance Series to name a few. Since its inception (1987 in Ontario), the Torch Run has "raised more than \$35,000,000 and changed millions of attitudes."

Dayne Tipper's mother related how Special Olympics has impacted her son Dayne. "When he first started he had a challenge to run 50 metres," she said. "Now, 11 years later, he's running 1,500 metres and 800 metres in track, and now he is going that distance wearing snowshoes."

MSO community coordinator Janet Anning recalled the earlier iteration of the Special Olympics on Manitoulin, then noted how the latest organization began from humble beginnings as a bowling team to grow into an organization that competes in

dozens of categories. She went on to point out that the opportunity for people to compete against their peers has had a dramatic impact on the athletes lives and encouraged them to stretch to their fullest potential. "You don't just get to go because you want to go," she said. "You have to work hard for the opportunity."

MSO athlete Matt Bedard recalled his experience getting into athletics. "When I saw Kelsey and my other friends competing, it looked like they were having a blast," he said. He went on to speak of how much he had learned through the process. "It's been great," he said. His success includes three gold medals at the nationals in Newfoundland. "Never give up," he said. "Keep doing what you do to be the best that you can be.

...continued from page 1 still pumped from the experience when contacted by The Expositor noting that the experience was "pretty exciting." Ms. Letander-Trudeau said that, when it comes to the STEM field subjects (science, technology, engineering and mathematics, she "really enjoys all of it."

Her passion for STEM developed when she entered high school, said Ms. Letander-Trudeau. "We really didn't have a lot of it in grade school, it wasn't until I started high school that we really began to get into it," she recalled.

The Wiikwemkoong team was one of only two from the North and the only one coming from a First Nation school. "The other teams were from places like Toronto and Windsor," said Ms. Letander-Trudeau, which gave the team members an opportunity to network with students coming from urban schools. "They divided us up into teams for group activities," she said. The groups worked on the issues facing women in the STEM fields and how to encourage more young women to enter those fields with the fastest growing opportunities in the 21st Century.

Ms. Letander-Trudeau was on a panel that included Minister Hunter and Bruce Witmaker of RBC Management along with two of the first alumni of the FIRST Robotics competitions.

"I never really saw myself as a leader," said Letander-Trudeau, but that perception obviously wasn't shared by others. Today, she finds herself taking on a role on the highest levels in the province. She now sits on the Girls in STEM executive council. "I will be giving them my ideas on how to get involved." more

Wikwemikong High School's FIRST Robotics team is a bit of an anomaly on the provincial stage, noted team mentor and Wikwemikong science teacher Chris Mara. "On other teams you might see one or two female students." he explained. "On our team the female members have always been in leadership roles.

Mr. Mara recounted one

of the recent competitions that the FIRST Robotics team entered where an issue developed with their robot. "There was a team surrounding the robot working on it, determining what the issue was and finding a way to remedy it and they were all young women, working it out themselves. You just don't see that happen with other teams. I think we represent something that is unique to the FIRST Robotics competition."

The Wikwemikong High School FIRST Robotics team has always enjoyed a strong participation level from both male and female students.

Ms. Letander-Trudeau has some advice for those young women who may be looking to the STEM field. "Don't give up on it," she said. "You can do it. A lot of people might try to tell you that you can't because you are a girl. Don't buy into that thinking, because you will find out when you try that you are as good as anyone else if you put the work into it."

Asked if there were any significant differences between the urban teams that the Wiikwemkoong contingent met at the Kingsbridge Centre and theirs, Ms. Letander-Trudeau noted the main difference comes down to access to sponsorships.

"We have to do a lot more fundraising," she said.
"There is a lot of travel that we have to do to just reach the competitions. Putting together a state-of-the-art robotic competitor also calls for a lot of support from business and corporate sponsors and finding those sponsors is a greater challenge in the North.

There may be challenges, but the Wikwemikong High School students, both male and female, have risen to meet them and prevailed. Those interested in sponsoring the team and its efforts are encouraged to contact Chris Mara at the Wikwemikong School.

Rust-D'eye as an integrity commissioner.

Mr. Rust-D'eye invited any member of the council, staff or member of the public to ask questions. "I like answering questions," he said. "I like assisting people."

The lawyer went on to explain the general source of authority of municipal councils, which act as a creature of the province and are enacted through provincial legislation and remain under the care and control of provincial legislation.

"A municipality enacts its own bylaws," he said, which are in themselves a form of legislation, although not with the force of criminal penalty. "In the late 1990s, the province of Ontario adopted a new approach to municipal government." That new approach stressed accountability and transparency. "Municipalities are elected by the people and govern in the public interest."

As part of that new approach, legislation should be "clear to the people reading it," he said. "There was a tradition of bylaws being too complicated."

But the new legislation went even further, continued Mr. Rust-D'Eye. "Municipalities must not only act in the public interest, but also must appear to act in the public interest."

Mr. Rust-D'eye said that one of his principle roles as integrity commissioner is to receive complaints from the public. "I do not act for the municipality," he cautioned. "As an integrity commissioner I deal with councillors, not council as a whole."

One change in the way the role is now interpreted, he said, was that in the past all complaints had to be written out. That is not necessarily the case now. In fact, Mr. Rust D'eye can even act without any complaint at all being officially registered, guided by what he sees as a potential issue facing councillors. But not all complaints have to be major official investigations or inquiries.

"Very often I can deal with complaints by talking to the parties," he said. "But if someone wants to file a complaint, it must be in writing."

Once a complaint is filed, Mr. Rust-D'eye must then assess that complaint to determine if it is serious enough to warrant intervention. "Can it be solved quickly? Most of the time it can."

Mr. Rust-D'eye dealt with an aside at this point in his presentation. "I want to confirm right now that the Township of Tehkummah has an excellent clerk-treasurer," he said, referring to Karen Gerrard. "You are very fortunate." As the main record keeper of the municipality the clerk treasurer has a number of statutory obligations, he went on to note. "Ms. Gerrard has been of tremendous assistance"

As to the code of conduct presented at the meeting, Mr. Rust-D'Eye said that the document "must be something that the councillors can live with."

He went on to say that a lot of councils spend a lot of time "fiddling with details they don't need to." Mr. Rust-D'eye then indicated that he was going to go through the code of conduct in detail.

A question from the floor asked if the code of conduct "was going to control the councillors" and make them work in the public interest "instead of following their own agenda."

"It is desirable to work together," said Mr. Rust-D'eye, but he added the caveat "you can't force people to get along." He admitted that in the case of councillors acting poorly, "there is not a lot I can do." He noted that in some

instances he had even witnessed council meetings degenerating into fistfights and violence. "People were looking to me saying 'can't you stop this?" Mr. Rust-D'eye is a very senior lawyer, with a less than intimidating appearance or demeanor.

"If you don't work together, then the township won't exist," he said. "Any member of the public is free to make an address to council. Send a document in writing. I strongly urge, if you have a complaint, make it in writing."

Mr. Rust-D'eye went on to explain that "if the code of conduct is passed by council, it becomes law. It doesn't get dealt with in provincial court, it is dealt with on council."

In the case of a violation of the code, the integrity commissioner produces a report in the form of a public document. "That, to me, is the key," he said. "I am an independent officer, not beholdened to any. I have in the past insulted councillors, that's tough."

Most of his work is done by telephone or email, he said. "I have seen a lot of bad press, it doesn't matter. How can I solve the problem in the most reasonable and appropriate manner? I am good at it. I am here to serve, just as council is here to serve."

The conversation moved on to the composition and procedures of the town's recent hiring committee. In response to an assertion by Councillor Laurie Leeson that the hiring committee had not been formed by the council, Mr. Rust-D'eye noted that the town already had a bylaw that governed the composition of the hiring committee, which clearly indicates that the clerk treasurer and town foreman sit on the committee. A fact he described as "wholly appropriate"

Councillor Bowerman then interjected that he was "fed up" with how the business of the municipality has been historically conducted. He made general allegations of nepotism and actions and decisions being made without the input from all of council.

"Decisions are supposed to be made at the council table, not in a coffee shop or a garage," he said. "Things have been purchased without motions, resolutions have been changed in order to get government funding." Councillor Bowerman did not give specific examples or evidence of his assertions. "I am tired of dodging the bullet," he said, alleging that he has been the target of harassment. "No

Ontario Art Association juried show, held each year at a different art club, where only 40 pieces are chosen. Ms. Cairns is also a regular contributor to the LaCloche Juried Art Show.

One of the most important features of Jan McQuay's pottery is that it is stoneware and she uses commercial glazes that are safe for dinnerware. Ms. McQuay works mainly on the potter's wheel, creating functional items like plates, mugs and a lot of bowls. Her photographs are all taken all across Manitoulin Island and she tries to capture the "best" of the Island in her landscapes so that "people will look at them and smile."

Linda Jack is also inspired by Manitoulin landscapes, and her work is infused with her love of nature and animals. She works in watercolour, oil and acrylics and her enjoyment of photography has provided her with a never-ending stream of subject matter.

Artist Marcie Breit's landscapes utilize acrylic media and she enjoys producing large original fairly paintings. She has been the proud recipient of several art awards for her work. 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
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Manitoulin Brewing Company officially open

matter how transparent I try to be, it is not good enough." Mr. Bowerman said that he hoped that the code of conduct would help deal with those issues.

But in a later exchange in response to a challenge by Councillor Leeson, he asserted "this council doesn't want a code of conduct, they want one that shuts me up.

The conversation continued to revolve around the hiring policy and the role of the

clerk treasurer in that process.
"Does she get a vote?" asked one member of the public, referencing Ms. Gerrard and her role on the hiring committee.

"Basically the answer is yes," replied Mr. Rust-D'eye. "Unless council says otherwise, quorum is the majority of the committee.'

Conversation then moved on to the actions taken in the course of the last hiring committee sessions, with Councillor Bowerman repeating his allegations that he had been asked if he had voted twice by the reeve.

"I didn't do that," responded Reeve Russell. To which Councillor Bowerman

The lawyer then interjected to point out that any gathering by members of council, whether by phone, sequentially or all at once, "even if a meeting is not called or advertised, is a meeting. If it is a series of phone calls, emails, if it discusses town business, it is a meeting."

Mr. Rust-D'eye then dropped a bit of a bomb-shell. "That is an illegal meeting."

But unless the matter were to end up in court, there is also little recourse to dealing with the issue.

The question then becomes a matter of public exposure of the practices. "When the public gets wind of it, especially if it is just before an election..."

before an election..."
Enforcement otherwise is very problematic. "You can't listen to every phone call," he said. Following further discussion, Mr. Rust-D'eye reiterated that "primarily it is the press" and the exposure they provide that calls councils to account.

There are some sanctions available to council as a whole to rein in maverick councillors, including docking of pay and removal from committees.

Several audience members interjected to demand that council get on with the business of governing the township and asked if there was a way to force council's hand on issues. "You can't force councillors to vote," said the integrity commissioner.

For his part Councillor Lee relayed an error he had made in attempting to do his job as councillor when he requested private information that he was not entitled to as a councillor. "Hats off to you," he said, referring to the clerk treasurer. "I got smacked."

The audience members again challenged the councillors to do their job. One audience member asked why there was a high turnover among employees. "Why have we gone through three road superintendents in eight years? One only lasted three weeks."

At this point an audience member asked why he was taken off the agenda. "You know why you were taken off," replied Reeve Russell. "That's between him and me."

The complainant, Jim Fawcett, then made a formal written complaint to the integrity commissioner, supplying the press with a copy of the email communication between himself and the reeve.

"Karen regretfully informed me that I will not be on the agenda for the meeting," reads the first line, followed by the query "can you inform me by correspondence why you don't feel my concerns are valid to the ratepayers of Tehkummah?"

The reeve's reply, also by email, read "Why would you think I would consider adding you to the agenda after that letter you wrote to the Expositor? If you were to issue a formal written apology I might consider your request in the future. Until then, just know that I don't tell lies and I don't play games." The reply was signed simply 'Eric.'

The meeting continued with some further injections, but in the end council voted to pass the code of conduct by a recorded vote of four to one. The sole dissenting vote was cast by Councillor Leeson.

A correspondence item in the package that was not addressed at the meeting was a response from the Minister of Municipal Affairs (MMA) to a petition from the ratepayers indicating that the minister would not order a provincialmunicipal audit of the financial affairs of the township, but that the clerk treasurer had been contacted by the office of the MMA Advisor and that the ministry would be sending "at least three people (legal advisor, policy advisor and financial advisor) to spend at least a week at the municipal office. Once the review is completed, the staff will report back to the minister and the report will be available to council and the pub-

The same soil where good fruits and vegetables grow will grow weeds, thorns and thistles. If the weeds, thorns and thistles are not removed they will hamper the producing of the desired fruits and vegetables. This is true of the garden of a mind too; the same mind that can expound on important biblical truth can expound heresy. A person can believe sound doctrine and also false doctrine at the same time. There is not one subject the NT spends more space on than on warning against believing false doctrines. Believing false doctrine is a sin that will keep the person believing them out of the Kingdom of God, GAL. 5:19 21. Like all other sins this sin puts a person into bondage of Satan, see JOHN 8:31-44. PROV. 5:22. All sin is also an act of unbelief and this blinds the mind, 2 COR. 4:4 and it confuses the mind DEUT 28: 28. A person may be sincere, intelligent, well educated and know the Bible (like the Pope and Billy Graham and many other Christian theologians). But when he rejects a biblical teach ing he accepts a false doctrine and he will be spiritually blind and mentally confused, especially on the doctrine he rejects, and is partly in bondage to Satan (evil spirits). PS. 111:10 says "A good understanding have all those who obey God's commandments. DEUT 4:6 says, "Obey these (10) commandments for that will be your understanding." When only one of God's commandments is disobeyed, understanding goes out the door and confusion takes its place. The word Babylon means confusion. Everyone who sins or believes a false doctrine accepts a lie of Satan and is automatically taken captive by Satan into mystery Babylon. All people who believe a false doctrine, a lie of Satan (reject biblical truth), are taken captive by Satan to do Satan's will, 2 TIM 2:26 (Doing Satan's will includes teaching this same false doctrine to others.) In EX. 31-13+17 and EZ. 20:12+20 it is explained that the sanctifying of the Sabbath is a sign (mark) that a person truly belongs to God. ...continued from page 15 up to—now to actually bring people into our location and show them who we are as a company has been very satisfying," enthused MBC partner Nishin Meawasige.

The Silo is a unique feature of the brewery.

"We wanted to create a unique environment," said Mr. Hagman of the outdoor patio. "Nishin had the idea for The Silo—he saw the idea in a photo for a bar. We tried to find one, but didn't hear from anyone. One day I was driving to work along Highway 6 and saw a silo at a farm just outside of Little Current and I stopped and spoke to the owner about buying it and what we wanted to do. He agreed to sell it. In the spring we started to dismantle it at the farm to get it here, which was a bit of a challenge. Our carpenter Bud Spry did amazing work converting it into a brew house.

On tap is Manitoulin Brewing Company's Swing Bridge Blonde Ale, the Bridal Veil Pale Ale that was released earlier this year and MBC's newest brew, Cup and Saucer English Ale. This month on tap will also be Duxbury Cider. "We will be rotating a guest brew on tap—featuring a brew from an Ontario brewery," said Mr. Hagman.

"For the Cup and Saucer English Ale we focused on using maris otter malt," explained Mr. Hagman. "It gives it a nice, light finish. The name fits with our marketing and branding theme of highlighting different landmarks on Manitoulin. It also works as 'cup and saucer' is associated with England."

The Cup and Saucer English Ale is only available at the Little Current location and Mr. Hagman said there will be more brews launched exclusively onsite throughout the summer.

The Trough and Silo will have a 54 person occupancy with Manitoulin's OneKwe building custom tables. Other local companies that were part of the new brewery were Corbiere Construction, which did the landscaping, O. Bond and Son Plumbing and D and H Electric.

Since Mr. Hagman and Mr. Meawasige started MBC in their garage five years ago, the company has grown to include a new partner (Joet Dhatt) and created seven new







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

KAGAWONG—In early June, the first annual Ontario Trails week was celebrated across the province. 4elements Living Arts has come up with another fun and creative way to get people out on local trails on Manitoulin. "Drawing Boxes" that are also geo-caches have been installed on trails across Manitoulin Island.

Heather Thoma, coordinator of 4elements' Outside the Box program, says that getting people off the beaten track, and providing an interesting way to attract people to trails who might not otherwise venture out, is what stimulated the idea for the project.

These beautiful wooden Drawing Boxes are the brainchild of 4e, and are handcrafted by Manitoulin Crate Company. They are filled with 4e trail maps, paper, pens, stretching tips by yoga instructor Lise Baronet, and trail info. The invitation at these geocached spots encourages hikers and paddlers finding the box to make a simple drawing along the trail, and then choose a drawing in the box, made by someone else.

"We enthusiastically encourage people to find new places to walk, or paddle, to see new corners of the Island, and learn more about the ecosystems that are here," Ms. Thoma says. "The learning starts with getting out there, and paying attention to what can be found along the trails and

waterways. Stopping and looking and making a drawing is an awesome way to see the landscape more fully and notice new things!"

For those that prefer a guided walk rather than solo visits to the Drawing Boxes, 4elements is offering another series of its excellent creative walks and paddles through the spring, summer and fall.

Mira Jones, 4elements education development facilitator, will be facilitating some of the guided outings, and she has also spearheaded getting the boxes up on the geocaching.com website and highlighted through Instagram.

"People travel far and wide to come to Manitoulin, and many people who travel use geocaching as a way to explore new places," she adds. "You will see at ceocaching.com that it's both locals and visitors who come to the caches on the Island."

A contest has now been launched, to invite people to send photos of themselves at all of the Drawing Boxes and be eligible for a small 4e gift. More about the contest can be found at the Facebook Page for the OTB program: Outside the Box-4elements.

Drawing Boxes can be found from Northeastern Manitoulin to Assiginack, from Silver Water to the south shore, with a few more still to be added. The Drawing Boxes are located on gentle trails, approximately 1-2 kilometres into

the trail, so at a reasonable distance which is accessible to many ages and abilities, offering great opportunities for families, school classes, just about anyone, to venture out and engage at the Box. One box is even water access only, so you can dust off your canoe or fishing boat and join in that way too.

You don't need a GPS or electronic device to find the boxes. Locations of the trailheads (or boat launch sites) for all of the boxes, are listed on the OTB webpage: www.4elementslivingarts.org/programs/outside-the-box/.

The Outside the Box project received support from The Ontario Ministry of

Tourism Culture and Sport, and also from many local organizations and businesses, and local landowners and trail organizations are hosting the boxes. The Agricultural Youth Green Jobs Initiative is back

The great success of the Agricultural Youth Green Jobs Initiative, launched in 2016, has led to its renewal this year with an additional \$5.2 million available over the next two years. The program gives farms or farm groups access to funding so they can hire Canadian youth to complete environmental projects. The initiative is part of the Government of Canada's Youth Employment Strategy to help young people gain the skills, work experience and abilities they need to succeed in the labour market. It helps farmers, non-profits and other organizations in the agricultural sector create jobs for Canadians who are 30 years or younger and want to work in agriculture. In the program's first year, 45 green farm jobs and 102 green internships were created across the country. Projects included composting, permaculture, land preparation for certified organic production, and the construction of a root cellar for alternative storage for a family operation. Agricultural companies, conservation area organizations and associations completed more than 100 green internships. Some of

these involved sustainable crop analysis, environmental instrumentation and monitoring, and projects to support consumer education for local food baskets. If you are looking to make environmental improvements to your farm, or if your organization provides environmental benefits to the agriculture sector, you may be eligible to apply. There are two streams: The Green Farms stream offers farmers funding for up to 50 percent of the cost of hiring young interns, to a maximum of \$10,000 per worker. The Green Internships stream offers organizations up to 50 percent of the cost of hiring young workers (up to \$16,000 per intern) for environmental activities, services or research that will benefit the agriculture sector. Non-profits with five or fewer employees may be eligible for funding of up to 80 percent. For both streams, projects must be no longer than 12 months in length and interns must be between the ages of 15 and 30 inclusive. The internship stream requires that the interns be post-secondary graduates. Applications are being accepted now, and will be approved on a first-come, first-served basis until all funds have been allocated. For more information, call 1-866-452-5558.

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

Ontario strawberries are here and what a treat. You can't compare them with the ones that come from half way around the world. Even better yet are the ones from your very own garden. I don't have any planted but they are on my list for next spring. My 91-year-old mother planted some last year and she was so excited about "the plants being loaded with flowers and you should see all the berries that will be ripening." I called her the other day to see how the garden was growing and she tells me how she was sitting on her deck and watched a mother racoon with three little ones walk down the driveway and how cute they were. The phone call the next day was in a totally different tone—"they ate every single red and green strawberry, there is nothing left for me to eat," she said. "Well, Mom, you can go and support your local farmers' market, they will love to see you.

Summer Berry Salad

My lettuce is growing like crazy and John is complaining that instead of his cauliflower ears he is getting lettuce ears! Who doesn't love fresh-from-the-garden salad, and this time of year when you can add fresh fruit, it makes it extra yummy. Instead of the almonds and Brazil nuts I used pumpkin seeds and sunflower seeds. I also switched the raspberries for the dressing to strawberries. The best way to make this salad is to arrange the lettuce on individual plates or one large plate, then top with the rest of the ingredients.

NUT CRUMBLE:

1/2 cup almonds

1/2 cup Brazil nuts

1/2 tsp cinnamon 24 mint leaves

4 Tbsp hemp hearts

RASPBERRY DRESSING:

1 cup raspberries

20 mint leaves

2 Tbsp minced shallots

1/2 cup olive oil or sunflower seed oil

Juice of 1 large lemon

2 Tbsp maple syrup or honey

1 tsp Sea salt

Freshly ground pepper

BERRY SALAD:

4 cups mixed lettuce

1 cup fresh strawberries washed and sliced

1 avocado, sliced or diced

1. For the dressing combine all ingredients in a blender and process until smooth and creamy. The dressing will keep up to 4 days in the fridge.

2. Arrange the lettuce on a large plate, and then top with the berries and avocado. Drizzle with the dressing, and sprinkle with the nut crumble. Serves 2.

Strawberry Cardamom Cobbler

This is a quick dessert and to make it a bit healthier switch the flour to Loon Song spelt and the butter to coconut oil. It will make the cobbler a bit denser. The apples are added to give the cobbler some body and absorb some of the juices.

2 cups fresh strawberries, sliced in half

2 cups apple peeled and diced

1/2 cup sugar

2 Tbsp all-purpose flour

1 tsp cardamom

1/4 tsp cinnamon

2 cups all-purpose flour

3 Tbsp cornmeal

2/3 cup sugar

2 tsp baking powder

2/3 cup butter, cut into pieces and chilled

2/3 cup milk

1 tsp lemon zest

1 tsp vanilla extract

1. Preheat oven to 325°F.

2. Toss the fruit with 1/2 cup sugar, 2 Tbsp flour, cardamom and cinnamon and spoon into a baking dish.

3. In a mixing bowl combine the 2 cups flour, cornmeal.2 /3 cup sugar, and baking powder. Cut the butter until it's an even crumbly texture. Blend milk, lemon zest and vanilla and add to pastry, mixing until pastry just comes together. Spoon dough onto fruit, leaving a little space between spoonfuls to allow for expansion as cobbler

4. Bake for 35-45 minutes.

5. Serve with whipping cream or ice cream.

which are used to treat infections

Infections are interesting in that not every infection requires an antibiotic. Antibiotics are only useful in bacterial and not viral infections. A lot of the common infections such as the common cold, flu, sore throats, sinus infections, ear infections, and coughs are caused

by viruses. These conditions may be annoying and may take a while to go away, however they will eventually go away on their own. Using antibiotics in these conditions will not help relieve your symptoms and may actually put you at risk of problems such as nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea. Antibiotics also kills off your good gut flora so that you are more at risk of getting a potentially deadly bowel infection called Clostridium difficile.

A problem with using antibiotics in everyone with an infection "just in case it is bacterial" is that it puts you at develop drug resistant bugs so if you were to get another infection, you may need a different antibiotic that may not work as well to treat it. These resistant bugs can spread to people are already vulnerable. It is our young kids, our elderly parents, and our friends, family, and neighbours that have multiple illnesses and are the sickest. The combination of the increase in medication resistance and the limited number of antibiotics we have require us to be more careful with how we use them.

Antibiotics are used to kill the bacteria to treat the underlying infection. It should not be used for pain. It should not be used to help with just a fever. It should not be taken on an "as needed" basis. Your antibiotic is prescribed for a set number of days to ensure that it will kill off the bacteria causing the infection. It is crucial to finish the whole course of treatment or else there is a chance the infection will come back and will be resistant to the same drug and you will need to start from scratch with another

antibiotic. If you are using your antibiotics properly, you should not have any leftover pills after your treatment. Leftover liquid antibiotics should also be brought back to the pharmacy for proper disposal.

The throat swab I did came back negative for bacteria and my throat started getting better a day or two afterwards. Thankfully, I had ended up not taking any of the antibiotics and this whole incident was a good reminder for me to practice what I preach. I am glad my cold is over and the whole antibiotics issue can be postponed to the next time I get sick again.


