Increased diagnoses of Lyme disease on Manitoulin cause for concern

MANITOULIN—Scott Veterinary Services in Mindemoya is part of a new study, the Canadian K9 Lifetime Lyme Study, seeking to better identify, prevent and treat canine Lyme disease and improve quality of life for both dogs and their people.

"Dr. Michelle Evason did a talk on Lyme disease at a conference I attended in January and noted how more information was needed about where dogs are contracting Lyme disease and how to prevent it," explained Dr. Darren Stinson, who took over Scott Veterinary Services earlier this year. "The study is trying to gather good solid data on where the ticks are in Canada and how we can

Symptoms of Lyme disease in canines include: fever, loss of appetite, reduced energy, lameness and generalized stiffness, discomfort or pain.

"We're so overtaxed right now building boats, we just don't have enough space to keep up with the demand," says Henley Boats proprietor Dave Ham. "We can't produce product fast enough. Sellers will only put up with that for so long.'

Mr. Ham explains that he has hired a production engineer to help him explore options, such as

Manitowaning light gets Canada 150 facelift

MANITOWANING—The Manitowaning lighthouse (or 'light station,' as it never actually housed a keeper) has had a facelift, thanks to the lobbying efforts of Assiginack mayor and council and Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes.

The light station saw work undertaken by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO), which owns the light, over the course of three weeks, with the finishing touches completed last week.

Assiginack Clerk Jeremy Rody explained that the light station was first scraped completely of its paint by the DFO crew then repainted white with the red trim also touched up. The DFO also replaced the plexiglass found in the tower with glass, which was paid for by the municipality. There were always at least two or three workers on-site over the three-week period.

Mr. Rody explained that Councillor Les Fields first brought the project idea to her council who agreed to begin lobbying. In the spring, Canadian Coast Guard representatives flew to Manitoulin to check out the light station and assess the scope of the work following a letter penned to the DFO from Ms. Hughes. The clerk said the municipality is viewing it as a Canada 150 project.

The light station is in active use and remains a beacon of light for boaters approaching the Manitowaning Bay marina. The DFO promised to return soon to trim any overgrown trees that may be impeding the light's view over the bay.

Silver carp pulled from Illinois Waterway just miles from L. Michigan

LAKE MICHIGAN—A Lake Michigan commercial fisherman made an unsettling discovery in his gill net last week when he pulled a silver carp, of the invasive Asian carp family, from the waters not far from Chicago.

The Asian Carp Regional Coordinating Committee (ACRCC) in the United States announced that the male fish had been discovered on June 22 in the Illinois Waterway below the TJ O'Brien Lock and Dam—nine miles from Lake Michigan and past the electric barrier.

According to the ACRCC, the silver carp, measuring 28 inches and weighing approximately eight pounds, was captured by gill net by a contracted commercial fisherman as part of the committee's Monitoring Response Work Group's seasonal intensive monitoring.

The find triggered two more weeks of intense sampling in the area.

"It is important to note that this preliminary finding does not confirm that a reproducing population of Asian carp currently exists above the electric dispersal

barriers or within the Great Lakes," the press release from the ACRCC states. "In eight consecutive years of intensive monitoring and fish sampling in the Chicago Area Waterway System, this is the second time a bighead or silver carp has been found above the electric dispersal barriers. A big head carp was found in Lake Calumet in 2010."

Laurentian University officially opens Indigenous Sharing and Learning Centre in Sudbury

SUDBURY—Laurentian University officially opened the new Indigenous Sharing and Learning Centre located centrally on the Sudbury campus. The official opening ceremonies took place on Wednesday, June 21 at the new centre and it was standing room only. The opening was a nice cap to the nine-year Laurentian University board of governors member Dominic Beaudry's service on the board.

"It was a great event," said Mr. Beaudry. "It was so well attended that there was standing room only. Actually, there were about 50 to 70 people who had to stand outside because there wasn't enough room inside at the ceremonies." That's saying a lot, since the main meeting hall can easily accommodate up to 200 seated people.

"All the politicians were there for the opening, including Sudbury Mayor Brian Bigger," said Mr. Beaudry. "It was pretty packed."


Unlike some efforts in the past, the new centre is not tucked away, hidden on a remote part of the

campus, but is rather front and centre where it will play an intimate role in university life. "It's not on the margins," he said. "It is a powerful statement. Incoming and new students will see the centre and know that indigenous people are a vibrant part of the university."

Manitoulin cenotaph sees renovations

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The Manitoulin District Cenotaph is looking sharp these days thanks to a bit of a floor lift, with the interlocking block being replaced thanks to the diligent fundraising efforts of a small group of volunteers and a contribution from Veterans Affairs Canada's partnership program.

"We started fundraising back in March," noted volunteer Linda Bowerman. "We raised \$800 at the Manitoulin Trade Fair after expenses."

The renovation program was badly needed, noted Ms. Bowerman, as there was a lot of plant growth coming up between the previous bricks. "They had to replace all of the bricks because the old ones were not standardized."

Ms. Bowerman was effusive in her praise for S & T Landscaping, the contractor secured to complete the project. "They did a great job and had it ready for us for Decoration Day," she said, "including the Youth Memorial."

The original application for the \$3,726 grant did not initially include the Youth Memorial, noted Ms. Bowerman, but as the project developed it was expanded to include the brick surrounding that memorial as

Culvert concerns trouble Sheguiandah FN residents

SHEGUIANDAH—A portion of Highway 6 near Ge Te Miikan Road in Sheguiandah First Nation was causing considerable concern to residents over the weekend when it appeared that the road was caving in over a wooden culvert.

A dip had appeared in the road, with a hole and crack developing. Residents note that the issue has been ongoing for some time but alleged that despite complaints and concerns being expressed there was no action being taken by the Ministry of Transportation's (MTO) contractor DBI.

The roadway was patched over the course of the weekend and the MTO has issued assurances that the roadway remains safe to travel. "At the location of culvert on Highway 6 that you asked about, there has been some settlement of the roadway above the culvert," said Lara Cantin, MTO regional issues and media advisor. "The culvert is scheduled for replacement in 2018. Our maintenance contractor is continually monitoring the site to ensure it remains safe for travel."

Trial date set for Wikwemikong Way hit and run

GORE BAY—A trial date has been set for the Wikwemikong Way hit and run case of Darin Noel Peltier, the accused driver in the November 2, 2014 accident that left a man hospitalized with life threatening injuries.

As was reported previously, on November 2, 2014 at 2:40 am, David Andrew (Andy) Oshkabewisens of Wiikwemkoong was struck by a truck with the driver fleeing the scene and leaving Mr. Oshkabewisens with life threatening injuries along the side of Wikwemikong Way.

Mr. Oshkabewisens was transferred to the Manitoulin Health Centre in Little Current from where he was airlifted to Health Sciences North in Sudbury. He remained there, in a coma, until December of that year. The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) North East Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) Acting Detective Inspector Dave Robinson, arrested Noel Darin Peltier on Sunday, November 9, 2014 and later charged Mr. Peltier was attempted murder and failing to remain at the scene. Mr. Peltier has since had his charges reduced to fail to stop, offer assistance: cause bodily harm; criminal negligence of a motorized vehicle causing bodily harm; and operation of a motorized vehicle in a manner that is dangerous to the public causing bodily harm.

The trial date of Mr. Peltier has been set for September 25 to 29, 2017 in Gore Bay court. Manitoulin Island's Newspaper-of-Record, **The Manitoulin Expositor** is published by the Manitoulin Publishing Co. Ltd. Wednesday mornings from our office at

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

There is much to celebrate about our imperfect nation

This Saturday marks 150 years since the Confederation of Upper and Lower Canada (then known as the province of Canada) along with the Maritime provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick under the British North America Act into the new Dominion of Canada—complete with four provinces, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Since then, this nation has grown from the original four provinces to 10 (and three territories).

In its formation and growth Canada has certainly seen its share of growing pains. Replete with cleavages that seemed destined to tear it apart right from its very inception, including the long-standing English-French divide, invasions from the south, both from our exuberant and boisterous republican neighbour and wild-eyed expatriate Irish patriots, the Fenians, who, in the wake of the American Civil War, wished to use our nation as a bargaining chip to free Ireland from what they saw as the oppression of the a British interloper—the British for their part were convinced they were bringing the height of civilization and Protestantism to the benighted people of the Emerald Isle languishing under the repressive hand of the Catholic Church. We still struggle with the ripples from those events onto this very day.

To many of our First Nation allies, the original inhabitants of the land upon whose territories Canada stands and thanks to whose military might we remained under the Union Jack, the 150 years since Confederation have not been anything to celebrate.

In a series of questionable "treaties" in which the First Nations were steadily and increasingly stripped of their lands to make way for waves of newcomers, and even those one-sided treaties were not honoured before the ink had even dried. Instead, a policy of cultural genocide was instituted by the founders of the nation and their minions, where residential schools under the guise of education and trades training sought to strip away their "Indian-ness" and replace it with something more amenable to being good servants of the Empire—with the end goal of their being totally absorbed into the mainstream culture. It was for their own good, the Fathers of Confederation told themselves. It was a noble cause. The indigenous victims of this cultural (and in some instances blatant) genocide have every right to disagree. But the residential system is now history, and while we may still be dealing with its aftermath, we may celebrate its demise and lay to rest the bigoted attitudes upon which it was founded.

The accumulated debt of the policies toward our indigenous hosts upon this land is so huge that the federal government (sorry, but of any political stripe) spends much of its time obfuscating and delaying settlements as a tactic of first resort—the bill is simply that large. But step by step it is being addressed, not fast enough, but being addressed nonetheless.

But despite our many failings and shortcomings, there is a tremendous amount that we as Canadians have to celebrate on July 1, both as a nation and a province. We are a rich and free nation, a vibrant swirling hodgepodge of cultures and languages in a democracy where people are largely free to celebrate their own traditions and to protest those things they do not agree with. We may express our dissatisfaction in the press, in voting a government that displeases us into the hinterlands, even to take to the streets waving placards decrying injustice (including those that still reign on reserves and in our urban centres for minorities of colour, religion and disposition).

We have political leaders who are making inroads in those historical injustices, albeit not nearly fast enough; we have a social safety net system that largely protects the most vulnerable among us; and we are blessed with a national health system which each citizen has the right to access, not simply the rich or privileged few. We have a generally tolerant and welcoming society in which most of us are secure enough to be able to celebrate each others differences. Few across this globe can boast the same.

Canada is well and truly blessed. Not perfect, we still have many hills to climb, but along that long road we have made incredible accomplishments. July 1, Canada Day, is a day to recognize not how far we have to go, but to celebrate how high we have already climbed these 150 years.

Harvesting spawning fish will destroy the resource for the next generation, let alone seven

As well, hundreds of volunteer hours have been put in doing night watch at Bass Creek for poachers. The entire process being one, to not only ensure a legacy of fish, but to also educate the youth on the processes and the need to ensure fish are there for the next generations. Hundreds of Manitoulin school children have been given tours and instruction by these dedicated volunteers, as well as volunteers from Manitoulin Streams, on the need to not only enjoy the land and the ability to fish in these marvellous Island waters but to be aware of the need to protect what we have, not just the fish but the land, streams and the water.

I am saddened to hear that the Little Current Fish and Game club volunteers are now at a crossroads and are seriously considering stopping their fish harvest and education programs because there are some, who without concern for common sense or common courtesy, have made the decision to do something for their own gain without concern for the consequences. The netting of fish during the spawning season, which has been happening for too long now, has now achieved the consequence of almost completely depleting the pickerel again. It is the opinion of the Little Current Fish and Game Club that it is no longer worthwhile to continue this worthwhile harvesting for the gain of those who just want to do the fishery harm. So very sad! It is not like the club members have not attempted to speak to those who have influence to see a change and stop the netting, but it has been to no avail. So pickerel will become a thing of the past and not a thing of the future. Too bad some more common sense and common courtesy could not come into play.

Donna Phillips

Donna welcomed this writer into her 150 year-old log home, perched on a hill on the southeast side of Lake Mindemoya. The foot-thick logs are hand-hewn. A visitor must dodge the roof line at the top of the stairs to avoid hitting their head. The top level boasts 14-inch wide floor boards that line the cozy bedrooms, harbouring traditional quilt-covered beds. The windows and doors are deeply recessed, completing the feeling of having emerged from a 'time machine.' Donna has lived here much of her life, time spent helping others, including two husbands. In due course, she formalized her experiences and trained as a health care aide.

"My maternal grandfather, Joseph Coe of the Slash, built many boats that were used on Lake Manitou to ferry goods and people to various ports. Joseph's sons, my uncles George and Armen Coe, worked on the mail boat that ran along the North Shore. "I remember the Norgoma arriving in the fall to stock winter supplies for the Island. Another boat, the Jacqueline, took us to the main shore to pick blueberries. She is buried in eight feet of water near the bridge in Little Current. I am surprised she hasn't been restored for historical purposes."

Grandmother Helene "My (Pugh) Coe used to play the organ along with my mother, my sister and Aunt Lucy. Mother was their soloist. Mother was talented enough to go to Belding, Michigan. She could have been a professional singer but came back to marry my dad."

Great-grandfather Paternal Benjamin Leeson was born in 1877. He lived near South Bay with his wife Elizabeth (Hanley) in the 'white house' he built. Paternal grandparents James and Wilhelmina Leeson lived in Manitowaning. "James was a fiddler even after he was blind. Many in our family had eye problems, tunnel vision and retinitis pigmentosa." James would sit on the porch and play under the eaves. His sister, my great aunt Elizabeth, kept a diary and lived in Squirreltown.

Donna Louisa Jane was born to Westen 'Wright' and Ellen (Coe) Leeson on September 15, 1931. She was named after her niece Donna, dad's sister, Louisa and mum's aunt Jane. Siblings are Wes, Rozella, Moyra, (deceased) and Carole (deceased). Wright was a 'jack of all trades and a master of none,' according to Donna. "Dad cut pulpwood all winter. He could size up a tree and declare with certain accuracy the number of boards to be cut. In the summer, we helped him take care of the big garden. Dad would hitch the horse to the wagon and load it with extra vegetables to be sold door-to-





their arrival. As it was near the stove, it didn't stay there, long. Gifts were often a pen or a pencil, sometimes a handkerchief and rarely, a celluloid doll. "We were happy with these gifts and just being with family. Dinner was usually a goose or a turkey and lots of vegetables. We always had some nuts too. Grandmother played the organ and grandfather the fiddle. By the time we returned home, the moon and an amazing array of stars would shine above. I used to imagine there was a man on the moon sawing wood."

'Wintertime was also prefect for sledding parties by lantern light. It was more fun but more dangerous too, with all the rocks and trees. The hill was steep and we are lucky we got to the bottom of the hill alive." Frozen lakes and rivers were ideal for skating too. "We didn't have skates so we slid on shoes and boots.'

Donna enjoyed primary school and didn't mind the walk but high school, 16 miles from home, meant boarding in Manitowaning. For Grade 9, Donna lodged with the Hunter family. Grade 10 was in the Sault where she could stay with Uncle George and Aunt Pearl Coe.

After completing Grade 10, Donna came home to work at McDermid's store in Providence Bay for \$25 a month. "The hours were long, sometimes from eight in the morning to eleven at night, especially on a Saturday. We worked until everything was done.'

"Providence Bay was an interesting place. Toots McDermid and other young ladies I had met lived there. Lots of older people lived there too and I boarded with one of them. When we had time off, we loved to hold races on the beach. Sometimes we would take the row boat out for a paddle but the river could change course and push us further out. Then we jumped out of the boat and pushed or pulled it back. We caught a lot of smelt in that river.

Donna was getting ready to head to Owen Sound for her next job, when she was offered work at Harold Burt's locker in Mindemoya, where the pet store is today. Harold took in meat for storage and he needed some help. Donna soon met her future husband, Lloyd Hallett. His friend was going with sister Moyra. Lloyd tried to join the war effort in 1945 with his friend Bill Graham, but Lloyd was diabetic and he was not inducted. He stayed in Toronto and contributed by working in the Lloyd. Afterwards the newlyweds returned home. There was no money for a honeymoon.

Donna moved in with her inlaws, the Halletts, and worked to help them for the next seven years. "They had a farm and I pitched hay for the cattle and ran the tractor to disk the land." The couple had three children, Glen, Marlene and Janis. Donna's mother-in-law helped with the children. Sometimes the babies were placed in the buggy at the edge of the field. After they had moved to their own home, four foster children were added, Roy Panamick, Lora Jean, Marion and Jimmy Corbiere

Lloyd was a carpenter and stone mason. He did a lot of work for his friend Ken Elford's dad. In July of 1960 the Hallett family moved into the log home that still shelters Donna today. The farm soon had cattle and horses. "I helped deliver calves in the spring. There was an old barn on the property and some sheds. I remember the day our bull got into the wrong stable. I put a stick through his nose ring and began to lead him back. He outmanoeuvered me and the stick fell. I tried to run but my boots were stuck in the mud so I jumped out of them and raced to the house. Thankfully the bull went back to the right barn and a crisis was averted. I have never trusted bulls.

Occasionally on Sundays they would pick up Donna's parents and take them for a car ride. "My mother had always loved the wild flowers in South Bay. A week

She got him back into the house and then got the neighbours. He was taken to Toronto for the amputation.

Donna travelled by train to visit him and was quite upset at what she found. Lloyd was very sick and weighed about 60 lbs. The nurse said to her, "Please don't touch him, we can't risk any infection. He had 'gas-gangrene' damage to his leg, similar to what some soldiers suffered during the First World War." They had to operate quickly to save his life and the next 48 hours were the most critical. Lloyd spent six weeks in isolation.

By September Lloyd had to be hospitalized with another infection. He got back home again on December 23 to join his family for Christmas. He had received a wooden leg from someone that no longer needed it, and he fitted his knee into it. He managed quite well for a number of years. He could even lay blocks with his peg leg.

When son Glen graduated from nursing in 1974, Lloyd had to have his second leg amputated. They had a bedroom set up downstairs for him so he wouldn't need to get upstairs. The washroom was close by and he was quite comfortable with Donna's help. Lloyd was 53 when he died of diabetic complications in 1977 on the seventh day of the seventh month. He had just held his first grandchild but he was blind and so couldn't see him. It was a sad time for the family.

It was three years later, in 1980, when Donna met Andy Phillips, who had been a welder for INCO. In due course they were wed and lived in Sudbury. Sadly, Andy became ill with cancer. Donna cared for him in his last years. Andy died in 1983.

In 1982-85, Donna worked in Home Care in Sudbury, helping others with their health issues for four years. In 1985 she was one of the first five people who decided to become a Health Care Aide and take classes. "We were the primary group to take this particular course and we assisted people all over Sudbury, washing dishes, cleaning kitchens and bathrooms, doing laundry and vacuuming. All patient care, including wound dressings and bathing, was done by the nurse at that time." Donna trained at Pioneer Manor and Extendicare in Sudbury.

"It was also my job to help teach patients how to exercise and do some of their daily tasks, after they had recovered from their urgent health issues. Some folk didn't know how to shop or take care of some aspects of daily living. Some had no sheets for their beds. Others wanted you to clean the silverware. One man with Alzheimer's started to rip his porch apart, likely in an attempt



her fears. The examination went well and did much to raise the acceptance level of future dentist visits

Fishing with her grandfather at Leeson's Creek was memorable as well. "All we had was a pole, a string and a fish hook we found. We caught sunfish and bull heads. Grandfather would let me hold the pole and I caught some fish myself. Sometimes we hunted partridges. He held the gun and I walked quietly behind him."

At log-shipping time, a long tent and table would be set up in South Bay to feed the workers; pails of pork and beans and corn syrup

were put out and food was taken on the run. Anishinaabe folk came to peel the logs and stack them on the beach for the boats. The logs would be chained on the outside of the boom and pushed to the boats

When the cousins came for a visit, the girls would all sleep in one bed and the boys in another, laying crosswise on the mattress, legs and feet dangling over the edge. "We had fun but not much sleep." On Sundays, the Leeson family might take the row boat and head for the beach for a shore picnic. "We loved to walk the shoreline of South Bay with dad and look for stuff, like old wooden floats from fishing nets, light bulbs or fishing tackle."

"An early memory was running away from school the day the dentist came. There were rumours he had slapped some kids." Perhaps he had been bitten first? Nevertheless, the young lass wasn't going to enter that van and ran home as quickly as she could. Mother intervened and brought

The barn was a favourite haunt. It had two layers, the hay mow and the sheep pen below. We would hold 'haw' concerts there practicing our songs for the Christmas concert, or reading poems. Occasionally one of us would get pushed off the upper 'mow stage' into the sheep pen below. The School Christmas concert was orchestrated by the teacher, much as soldiers doing a drill, with a lot of emphasis put on discipline. 'Practice makes perfect.' Everything had to be wellrehearsed before parents arrived

Donna remembers heating up blocks of wood in the oven, before they jumped on the horse-drawn sleigh to go from Hilly Grove to Manitowaning in the winter. "The wood kept our feet warm. Straw and blankets kept the rest of us warm.'

in their sleighs."

At Christmas, the sleigh would head for the grandparent's home for family festivities. The tree, all lit up in a bay window, awaited munitions plant.

Lloyd was 28 and Donna, 20 and they hit it off. "I told him my cousin was diabetic too." They dated and considered marriage but Lloyd's mother didn't want him to marry anyone. She was afraid he would not live long because of the diabetes and that it would be a big problem for him. He was on insulin and had been hospitalized many times with complications. She also thought it was unwise of him to have children. Lloyd's little five-year-old brother had died of diabetes at ten and other members of the family had diabetes too.

"I didn't agree with her position. I felt he deserved some happiness in life too." The couple married at four in the afternoon on December 24, 1950 in the Missionary House in Little Current. "We picked that date to reduce the likely number of guests because we had so little money to spend." Sister Moyra stood up for Donna and Bob Nevills stood up for

before dad died we took him back to the farm and the lake. We talked about mother's passing and Wright added, "It won't be long before they say that about me."

By January of 1961, Lloyd's diabetes had claimed his leg. The flesh in his foot had broken down. Donna discovered the extent of his injuries when Lloyd fell outside and his foot started to bleed. to fix what really didn't need fixing. Another lady lived deep in the bush with a dozen cats. Her house was hard to find. Overall, despite the barriers. I found I was indeed helping people. The job was never routine

Donna spent a year in Sebringville in southwestern

'Canada's 150 Most Famous Great Lakes Shipwrecks' book on sale now

MANITOULIN—There's another Canada 150 event marker that has been tailored to this uniquely sesquicentennial year and is relevant to both Manitoulin and the entire Great Lakes region.

Great Lakes books publishers Cris Kohl and Joan Forsberg have researched and published a book titled 'Canada's 150 Most Famous Great Lakes Shipwrecks.'

Mr. Forsberg told the Expositor the couple dived into their enormous archive and in recognition of this special Canadian anniversary year, selected 150 Great Lakes shipwrecks, each of which was selected for some unique feature.

The book is neatly divided into sections: the St. Lawrence River, each of the Great Lakes that has a Canadian side, the Detroit River and the St. Clair River system. It's interesting to note that more pages (and shipwrecks) are dedicated to Lake Huron than any other region.

In the book's introduction, Mr. Kohl and Ms. Forsberg recall that the germ of the idea for this particular book came about when the couple (along with friends) had been diving on a well-known but unidentified shipwreck in Lake Erie last summer.

They're enthusiastic researchers and they were able to finally put a name to the mystery boat: it was the Otanabee which had been freighting lumber from Collins Inlet, near Killarney when it was wrecked in a gale on September 7, 1888 with no loss of life.

Farther investigation revealed that the Otonakee had been built in Quebec City in 1867 and this, according to the introduction, became the genesis of an idea that would "celebrate Canada's glorious and dramatic Great Lakes maritime history. Working beyond the year 1867, this idea gradually developed into selecting, listing, researching and uniting the stories of our choices for the 150 most famous shipwrecks on the Canadian side of the Great Lakes."

This was a tall order, editing and compiling a representative book with the "150 most memorable" shipwrecks in time for the Canada 150 celebrating year, all from a standing start last July.

Interestingly, the publishers offered sponsorship opportunities as a way of helping to keep the price of the book as low as possible. Three of the 31 sponsors are

WIIKWEMKOONG—Nobody likes to hear the words "you're busted," but in Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory this summer those words might lead to some good things happening for youth. The Wasse-Naabin Youth Centre is partnering with the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service and other community partners in a Positive Ticket program.


"It was Special Constable Alanna Eshkawkogan's idea," said youth centre director Lawrence Enosse. "She came up with the idea to get the kids involved with the officers. The concept is "you are busted—doing the right thing."

Under the program, which will see council members, the youth centre, police and other community agencies keeping an eye out for good behaviour and issuing Positive Tickets, local businesses will be providing the positive reinforcement.

"Local businesses, like Andy's, Your Dollar Store and More, Ed's Family Restaurant and the Health Centre will exchange the tickets for treats or other items that the youth will enjoy," said Mr. Enosse. "That might be a small ice cream cone at Andy's or a small fry at Ed's Family Restaurant."

Another portion of the ticket is retained by the issuing agent to be entered in a draw for larger prizes later in the summer. "They are looking at holding draws in late August."

Good behaviour might include things like "helping an elder in the community by mowing their lawn, helping carry their bags, picking up garbage in the community or stopping someone from bullving another youth." said Mr. Enosse. Even encouraging positive behaviour in others can help qualify. Encouraging positive behaviour is one aspect of the Positive Ticket program, but building bridges between youth in the community and police officers is another positive outcome that the proponents of the program are hoping will come about. "This is all part of making our community a 'Youth Friendly' community," said Mr. Enosse. "Wiikwemkoong is recognized by the Province of Ontario as a Youth Friendly Community and we will be making a reapplication for our status in 2018. This is just the kind of program that can help keep our status intact.' So there will be some delicious opportunities for Wiikwemkoong youth during the coming summer months as they just keep on doing what they do so well.



from Little Current. The Manitoulin Expositor, Turner's store and the Port of Little Current are individual sponsors, the most from any single community.


Turner's sponsored the article on LaSalle's Griffin, thought to have foundered off Manitoulin's western tip (and the first Great Lakes shipwreck).

Little Current sponsored the article on the North Wind, wrecked off Clapperton Island with a load of grain down bound from Fort William to Little Current. Interesting, she foundered on Canada Day (Dominian Day then), July 1 in 1926 with no loss of life. The first reports of the wreck appeared in the next issue of The Expositor as a copy of that paper's headlines indicates in the North Wind story.

The Manitoulin Expositor sponsored the details of the wreck of the Asia. This ship, bound for French River from Collingwood, was lost in a severe storm on September 14, 1882 with the loss of 121 lives with only two survivors. The Asia remains Lake Huron's greatest loss of life shipwreck. The Expositor reported the tragedy of the Asia a few days after the tragedy as breaking news and many of the passengers aboard the Asia were members of Manitoulin Island families so the tragedy was a significant one here in the early days of pioneer settlement.

Stories like this one, each an interesting piece of history, comprise the content of this new piece of Great Lakes history. It will make a useful addition to any bookshelf or library and as a souvenir of this special anniversary of Canadian history.



Manitoulin Island athletes shatter records at board-wide meet

Island elementary school athletes proved their chops at the R.E. Area paramedics hope to donate 150 inches of hair for cancer patients

MANITOULIN-The Hair for Heroes event on Thursday, July 6, hosted by the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) at the Little Current EMS base, is just around the corner and community members are urged to join area paramedics in donating hair and funds to those battling cancer in Canada

"The paramedics at Manitoulin-Sudbury EMS feel it's important to reach out to our communities in ways other than our regular day to day tasks," explained DSB para-medic and event organizer Jess Wilkin. "When we meet the people in our communities, generally it's a brief and often stressful time for our patients. This event gives us a chance to meet and help out our community members in a much different way. The event will be a time for all of us to come together to help our people in need, in a controlled setting and have some fun while doing so."

The event's goal is to donate 150 inches of hair to Pantene Beautiful Lengths in honour of Canada's 150th anniversary. Pantene is Canadian-based and donates wigs free of charge to Canadians in need. The DSB paramedics are also accepting donations, with all proceeds going to the Canadian Cancer Society Transportation Program. This program supports a group of volunteers who provide rides for cancer patients to and from their cancer related treatments, free of cost.



"Through my practice here I have seen a huge population explosion with ticks," said Dr. Stinson. "We have added a Lyme disease vaccination as part of our core vaccinations because of the high incident rate. This study is so important because it will provide the raw data needed to find a solution to this problem."

The study is being conducted by Dr. Scott Weese and Dr. Michelle Evanson of the Department of Pathobiology at the University of Guelph.

"The purpose of the study is to enroll pet-owners and their puppies (seven months of age or younger) that will be followed for evaluation of exposure to ticks carrying Borrelia burdoferi (the cause of Lyme disease) and their possible development of signs of illness due to Lyme disease," the consent form to participate in the research study states. "This is part of a larger long-term (lifetime) Lyme disease and canine health study."

Dr. Stinson explained that the study will involve either himself or a member of his team drawing blood from the participating puppy at the age of seven months (or less) and repeated every 6-12 months. The puppy owner will also be asked to complete an electronic or telephone questionnaire on the puppy at six-month intervals over the course of the study (three years). Commitment to the initial phase (three years) does not commit participants to the later phases of the study but it is hoped that long-term the puppies and their owners will participate throughout following the dog's life.

"Additionally, if a tick is found on the puppy, owners are asked to submit it for identification and testing," said Dr. Stinson. "Participating in the study comes at no cost to the pet owner, it is just their responsibility to bring the puppy to have the blood drawn and complete the questionnaires."

The Expositor spoke to Dr. Evanson about the study and the motivation behind it.

"The biggest reason for the study was the frustration of vets and pet owners not knowing how or why dogs are getting lyme disease," said Dr. Evanson. "It is unclear right now if it is because of a lack of awareness on the part of pet owners or not being proactive enough or if the disease is still happening in spite of (preventive treatment). There are so many dogs contracting this disease and people are at a higher risk of contracting it if they are a pet owner."

The Expositor reported in April of this year that the Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) felt there was no evidence to support or refute an influx of black legged/deer ticks this year. They also stated that black legged ticks are not common in the area (Manitoulin) and had no plans to conduct tick dragging this year, despite the number of canine cases last vear.

Dr. Evanson said she couldn't comment on why the SDHU had elected not to do tick dragging, but did note that they are definitely in Ontario and based on the number of cases at Scott Veterinary Services, on Manitoulin.

"We know they (ticks) are here (Ontario) and there have been positive cases of Lyme disease," said Dr. Evanson. "There is probably going to be an increase as more ticks head across the boarder (from the US)."

Dr. Evanson said the Canadian K9 Lifetime Lyme Study is hoping to have 200 puppies enrolled across Ontario and is hoping to open the study to another 100 in Atlantic Canada. "We would really like to make this a Canadawide study," she said.

...continued from page 1 ty or even moving to a 24hour operation.

"It's a good problem I've got," Mr. Ham admits.

He says that should he decide to add another 40,000 or even 60,000 feet to the facility, it would mean ramping up on employees too, which would also require greater water and sewer servicing. Henley Boats currently uses a field bed, but this would not be sustainable, Mr. Ham adds. He has hired the engineering firm Exp Services Inc. of Sudbury to investigate the scope of services required.

"We're looking at all these different solutions to solve the problem," he says.

Mr. Ham has distributors of his welded aluminum boats across the country, including Victoria, Vancouver, Halifax, Yarmouth, Montreal and a freelancer in the United States. "In consumer boats, we're producing between 45 and 48 a year," Mr. Ham explains. "We're still building a lot of commercial/industrial boats, most of which go to BC. Last year, we made 13 of these boats, some of them are big, big boats that were too big to put on the swing bridge." These vessels leave Manitoulin via the ferry instead. The production engineer is also looking at staffing needs, should an expansion occur, with Mr. Ham hopeful that all of his needs can be met with Manitoulin people. The engineer is also looking into different machinery, as well as a need for more administrative staff to



see an expansion through. Mr. Ham says he hopes to have a plan in place by the end of the summer.

"I now just have to figure out what I want to do," he says. need to do this, but the number that have stepped forward really speaks to the veterinarian community in Ontario," Dr. Evanson said. "The funding right now is very limited, so the help of the veterinarians is the only way we can do this study. They are doing this because they want answers and to improve the health of pets and their owners it is really inspiring."

If you have a puppy seven months old or younger, you can contact Scotts Veterinary Services in Minde-



moya for more information or to join the study.

"Every puppy we have seen (since the study opened earlier this month), the owner has signed up," said Dr. Stinson.

The initial results will be available at the end of the year, but the first phase of the study will be held over the next three years.

The ministry truly values the opportunity to consider the UCCMM's comments on the Official Plan and to consider ways to strengthen the land use planning decision-making process

on Manitoulin Island."

The MMAH has delayed its final decision on the final draft Official Plan due to concerns raised by the UCCMM. The ministry did not issue its final decision on May 26 as the UCCMM had requested more time to respond to the Official Plan.

Mr. Spezowka would not discuss the UCCMM's concerns with the OP.

The Expositor contacted the UCCMM, but did not hear back as of press time on Monday.



Central approves detours from Tehkummah

by Michael Erskine

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—Central Manitoulin Council has approved a detour of traffic from Tehkummah's 10th Concession Road onto Townline Road at the behest of the Ministry of Transportation (MTO), but only if the MTO ensures the safety of travellers and assumes responsibility.

The detours are required as part of the bridge replacements on Highway 542 at the Blue Jay Creek culverts located approximately 1.2 kilometres, 1.6 kilometres and 1.19 kilometres north of Highway 6. Those culvert replacements, slated for next year, will require a full road closure of Highway 542.

Council agreed to the detours, but placed several caveats on their approval including that the MTO agree that gravel will be placed as needed, the roadway will be graded as needed, proper signage will be installed to ensure safety, calcium is to be applied, that the MTO assumes liability of the road during the detour, that the MTO will determine if the roadway is safe for detour traffic volumes and that the Central Manitoulin municipal road superintendent will be consulted at all times on the stated requirements.

New marina pumps to take up to six weeks

by Michael Erskine **TEHKUMMAH**—Council was sent scrambling following the opening of tenders for the replacement of a fuel dispensing pump for the South Baymouth Marina when they learned the timeline for the new pumps to come in could take from four to six weeks.

The three bids opened at the council table, which included the removal of the existing pumps, supply and installation of syphon lines between fuel tank compartments, included the winning bid of \$14,850 from J. R. Hendry, and bids of \$21,200 from Waggs and \$20.680.44 from PSL.

Questioned on the timelines and whether one of the losing bids could bring the changeover sooner, clerk treasurer Karen Gerrard noted that the other

In gravel tenders, Mike Varey and Sons Excavating had the winning bid of \$14.44 per cubic metre for gravel. C. Pearson and Son Excavating had bid \$14.77 per cubic metre. The bids are subject to material testing and determination of suitability of material by the town's public works department.

"Our step into digital media arts is ever-expanding and our new sound recording studio is a necessary complement to our fully-equipped digital animation studio suite," explained Mr. Deforge. "Our other capabilities include ADR for film, sound design, post production for film and television, radio ads and other possibilities that have yet to be explored,"

Debaj is also currently working on its visual arts component and is in discussions with renowned Anishinaabe artist Leland Bell. "We would really like to get Leland on board as a guest curator for the gallery and exhibition and have him deliver instruction in the visual arts—stay tuned."

This summer's Debajehmujig Storytellers stage production will take place in the Holy Cross Mission ruins in Wikwemikong and will feature the traditional stories of Nanabush—starting near the end of July, probably the Wikwemikong Powwow Weekend.

"And of course we have our Seven Minute Sideshows beginning in July and the Community Heritage Market," said Mr. Osawabine. "Any artist or artisan can book a table at the market, just give us a call at Debaj."

As part of the opening festivities for the recording studio, Debaj featured a stage filled with local artists' performances.

said Mr. Deforge.

"We are really excited about working with JUNO award winning artist Crystal Shawanda and partner Dewayne Strobel," said Mr. Osawabine. "They work with a lot of Canadian artists up here and it is very expensive to bring them down to Nashville for recording." Ms. Shawanda is verv familiar with the expertise and skill of the Debaj engineers as some of the studio's most recent projects included special engineering for Ms. Shawanda's recent blues album 'The Whole World's Got the Blues' and Debaj also shot, edited and produced the music video for 'Pray Sister' of the same album.

The Debaj recording studio is open for business for recording artists, corporate clients and can also be hired for on location recording, but perhaps the most exciting aspect of the operation is the ancillary support that Debaj can provide.

"Of course we need to make some money to help keep the doors open, but we can help with that too," said Mr. Osawabine. "We can assist people in finding the funding for their project as well. We will work with people. We want to make it as accessible as possible to the community."

While Debaj remains a landbased indigenous theatre company, the recording studio is open to working with any artist. "We just need you to show up with something ready to go," said Mr. Osawabine. "We want to find people who are passionate about what they are doing."

An advantage that Debaj has is that their sound engineers are salaried on staff and not an incremental cost in production. "It gives us a lot of flexibility," notes Mr. Osawabine.

GORE BAY—If you're in Gore Bay this weekend taking in the Canada Day celebrations (organized in partnership with the township of Gordon/Barrie Island), you'll be treated to a full-day's slate of fun for kids and adults, including pancake breakfast, parade, dog show, hoopdance presentation by Sheshegwaning First Nation artist Celina Cada, rib dinner, free ice cream social, beer gardens with a roster of bands and DJ Deanna Smith until 1 am and clown shows by the Manitoulin Conservancy for Creation and Performance.

That's a lot to take in, but the visitor would be wise to reserve some time to look around this little town (pop. 900) that's been "serving western Manitoulin since its founding in 1890." While the first recorded 'resident'

was the educated and eccentric Ned Saunders who, some time before 1870, lived for a while in a "hog's head" or large shipping barrel half-buried in a gravel bank, the first settler, Willard Hall, arrived at the "dense swamp" that was then the town site, in 1869. Other settlers of Scottish ancestry began arriving in earnest from southern Ontario in 1870. In 1872, the township of Gordon, in which Gore Bay was situated, was surveyed.

Wander down to the waterfront and the marina

where, in those early years, it was all happening: the first store was built in 1870 on Thorburn Street; a hotel, the Atlantic, went up (near the present-day Queens Hotel). Then came a blacksmith, liveries, sawmills, shoemakers, a wagon shop, and three more hotels (the Queens, still operating as period-style accommodations, was built in 1891). Gore Bay's oldest historical homes can be seen in this area, on Thorburn, Borron and Meredith streets, built after the town's centre gravitated southward to



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where the business core is today.

Development proceeded quickly, with the limestone courthouse, registry office and jailer's home (with jail cells in back, now the Gore Bay Museum) built right after Gore Bay was voted the judicial seat of the Island in 1888. The Town of Gore Bay, by then a boomtown, was incorporated in 1890; the flourishing commerce in shipping and lumber and fishing exports before and during that period saw churches, public halls, a water system, a public school and an agricultural building built to support the growing community. The first Island newspaper, 'The Manitoulin Enterprise,' had been published in Gore Bay in 1877.

Today, over 125 years later, the once-thriving business core on the waterfront is a bustling hub of a different kind. "The town developed around the harbour, uniquely protected between the East and West Bluffs, as water was the only way to get things in and out, including vital supplies and the mail," says Gore Bay mayor Ron Lane. "The commercial driver today is tourism."

"The harbour has been improved to attract more boaters," adds the mayor. "Now Canadian Yacht Charters' slips are fully booked, and the boat yard (where boats overwinter in storage) is at capacity. We have a seasonal community of boaters who return year after year to spend the summer here on their boats." Nearby are the perfectly preserved Janet Head lighthouse, built in 1879, the expanded patio of Split Rail Brewery, the wide verandahs of the studios, shops and galleries of the Harbour Centre and the breezy deck of Buoys' Eatery for residents and visitors keen to enjoy the bay's waterside below the East Bluff, including swimming off the dock at the beach and walking along the new breakwall and the boardwalk.

"We have to balance everything we do between residents and visitors," adds Mayor Lane. "We must continue to support the residents of western Manitoulin as we have for over a hundred years, with facilities for seniors, a medical centre, school, courthouse, shops and eateries, a government service centre, and with solid infrastructure such as ...continued on page 8A





Planning for weather

In 2016, many areas of the province saw very warm and dry conditions, creating challenges for horticulture and field crop producers. Many wells were still dry leading into the winter. In other years, like the start of the 2017 growing season, the province experienced periods of excessive rain, leading to saturated soils and flooding. No one can control the weather, but we can plan for it. The Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) encourages you to plan for future weatherconserving water and using it efficiently can help during low water conditions, and having effective drainage systems in place can help with saturated soils and runoff. Things to consider for low water conditions: Think ahead: Determine how much water you'll need for

One of my favourite meats to barbecue and eat is the flank steak. This cut is not quite as tender as a strip loin or rib-eye, but it is tender enough to grill and enjoy the deep beefy flavour. I like to marinade the steak because it will become a bit more tender and add extra flavour to the meat. Any leftovers are great on a salad the next day.

Grilled Flank Steak

Don't slice the flank steak right after grilling it, or you will lose its tasty juices. Let the meat rest for 5 minutes after cooking which will give the fibres a chance to relax and reabsorb the flavourful juices.

MARINADE: 1/2 cup hoisin sauce 1/4 cup soy sauce 3 Tbsp oil 2 Tbsp grated fresh ginger 4 garlic cloves, minced 1/4 tsp red pepper flakes

STEAK:

1 flank steak (11/2 to 2 pounds) serves 4 Freshly ground pepper

Mix together the marinade and pour into a heavy plastic bag. Add the flank steak and let sit for 4 to 8 hours.

Prepare and preheat your grill to its highest setting. Remove the steak from the marinade and season with black pepper. Grill the steak, turning once or twice, until it reaches your favourite doneness. Medium-rare will take about 10 minutes in total.

When the steak is done, let it rest for a few minutes before slicing it across the grain into very thin strips.

L's Saturday night and you're out for dinner catching up with some old friends. You're having a great conversation when suddenly someone says something that contradicts what you know. A heated debate ensues and there is only one way to determine the who is right. You take out your phone and consult the allknowing Google.

The Internet is a weird and wonderful place. The sheer amount of information that exists in the cyber world is so plentiful that it is hard to sort through. A lot of people ask "Dr. Google" their questions



about their medications, symptoms, and health conditions. However, when using the internet to look up medical information, getting false information from unreliable sites can have serious consequences. Here are some questions to ask yourself when reading up on medical information online:

Is this site reliable? Take a look at the organization hosting the site can easily give you a good idea of the reliability of the information. For example, it is clearly better to get nutrition advice from the Canadian Diabetes Association website over a blog called Sally's 100 ways to lose weight blog. If you don't recognize the organization, the link of the website can also give you clues. For example, links ending in ".org", ".gov", and ".edu" are more reliable than commercial websites ending in ".com" since there are certain regulations on who are able to have those link endings.

Is the author reliable? Look for the credentials of the author to determine if the article is written by a health professional with the necessary background and knowledge on the topic.

Is the information accurate and current?

Medical information is constantly changing so a good rule of thumb is to ensure the information you are reading is less than three years old. The accuracy of the information can also be judged if the author provides credible sources so you can see where they are getting their information from.

Is the information too good to be true? As with many things in life, common sense will always save you at the end of the day. If the website is claiming things that are too good to be true, then it probably is and the website may just be trying to sell you their product. Always watch out for bias.

With that being said, if you find yourself wanting to fact check all my articles from now, I will not take any offense. However, if you find that evaluating medical information online is just too much work, as always, just bring it to your healthcare practitioner to get their opinion and we will gladly do the work for you.

your operation, and try to predict how long your water sources will last. Have a contingency plan you can carry out in case your water sources run dry. Use the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association's Emergency Plan low water worksheet to help you with the contingency plan. Include a list of alternative water sources in your contingency plan. This can include water haulers and well drillers. Keep in mind that these sources may be unavailable at the height of low water conditions, so you'll need to plan ahead. Things to consider for flood conditions: Think ahead: Inspect your drainage systems and make improvements where necessary to reduce flooding. Consider installing tile drainage or intensifying your tile drainage network. Look for potential ponding areas in your fields and grade the land if possible. Consider changing your tillage practices, adding

organic matter into your soil, reducing compaction or using cover crops to help improve water infiltration into your soil. OMAFRA is working with other provincial ministries, conservation authorities and other partners to develop resources to help you manage water. There are existing resources that can help, too: Environmental Farm Plan Info sheet No. 13: Water Efficiency, OMAFRA's drainage resources, Books in OMAFRA's Best Management Practices Series: Water Management Soil Erosion by Water and other soil health publications and Cropland Drainage.

Ontario has business risk management programs in place to help you when factors beyond your control affect your operation. Contact Agricorp for more information about these programs. Visit OMAFRA's Adverse Weather, Low Water, Irrigation and Drainage web pages for resources to help you prepare for various weather conditions.



...continued from page 5A the replacement of sidewalks, a new water line and storm sewers. Residents and visitors all benefit from these improvements, including new swim docks and the newly completed trail from the boardwalk downtown leading to the Harold Noble Lookout on the East Bluff." The old boardwalk itself will be completely replaced this year, at a cost of \$300,000.

While the mayor acknowledges that people sometimes have to shop off-Island, "you can find anything you want every day" on Meredith Street, the business centre. "We don't want to be like everywhere else with factories and bigbox stores. People visit here not for what they can see every day, they come to see something they haven't seen. We want to be unique and continue to offer that while at the same time maintaining the requirements of the population."

One Haweater. longtime resident, historian and former teacher, Bernadette Walker, who still lives in the Gordon Township house built by her grandparents in 1920 just a few metres from Gore Bay's town line, remembers farmers' special relationship to the town back in the '30s and '40s. "Shopping in Gore Bay on Saturday nights was a big deal. Farmers worked every day and Saturday evenings they'd come into town to

shop. We'd have to clean the eggs at home on Friday evenings so they'd be ready for Saturday when we'd take the eggs, cream and butter into town to exchange for groceries."

Flovd Walker, Bernadette's husband who passed away seven years raised Charolais ago, calves to winter over at the farm then sold them the next fall, while Bernadette continuously taught school at No. 4 School in Gordon then at Barrie Island until the rural schools finally closed, finishing her teaching career in 1985 at Gore Bay public school. "We bought clothing and shoes at Smith Brothers store (now Woods Brothers). We only went to town once a week," says the nonagenarian, "but it was so exciting. We'd go to one of two ice cream parlours, sit on little wire chairs and have sundaes. We had no hydro on the farm, only a cool cellar,

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although Uncle Frank had an ice house where on summer Sundays we'd make and then eat so much ice cream our foreheads hurt!"

Much of Gore Bay's oldfashioned charm remains today, to be enjoyed especially during Gore Bay's Canada Day festivities this weekend and during the annual Harbour Days later this month (Friday, July 21 to Sunday, July 23), each a welcome respite from worldly cares. This is where the past meets the present for an unforgettable Island experience.

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

Edwards Studios summer workshops provide opportunity to explore new creative methods

KAGAWONG—Edwards Studios and Art Gallery in Kagawong has a great lineup of summer workshops for participants to explore new creative methods or to further develop existing skills.

"We are in our 21st year of business as a working studio as well as a showcase for our work and 12 regional artists," shared Richard and Barbara Edwards. "As a working studio there is always art being created and on display for the public to inquire about and learn the processes of the media being used. We have also held many workshops over the years and are continuing to offer an exciting lineup of classes for the 2017 season."

"The variety of workshops offered will allow participants to explore many new creative methods as we feature classes in fused glass, painting, creating natural pigment from plants for dyeing, sculptural wet felting and an in studio acrylic/oil painting workshop," the couple added. "Response to the selection of workshops has been very positive and classes are being filled quickly."

July 8 to 9 will be a two-day Colours of the Land workshop with instructor Nicole Varney. Participants will explore natural colour from their surroundings by gathering elements to create pigments for textiles.

The workshop will take place at the Edwards' home studio, 454 Newburn Road in Kagawong, daily from 10:30 am to 4 pm. The fee is \$150 plus an additional \$15 material fee.

Expressive Brush Stokes will take place

from July 24-28 with instructor Richard Edwards. "This will be a plein air painting class with an open choice of medium by the painter," states the workshop description. "Emphasis will be placed on painting from nature not from photographs and working in a larger format. Richard will be instructing the class on the techniques of brushwork effects, how to create edges, texture, movement and focal points in paintings."

The workshops will take place at Edwards Studios, 15 Old Mill Road, Kagawong daily from 10:30 am to 4 pm. The fee is \$50 per day with a minimum three-day attendance.

There will also be an Acrylic and Water Based Oil Painting workshop from August 10 to 13 with Mr. Edwards at Edwards Studio from 10 am to 4 pm. The cost is \$75 per day and class size is limited.




