

Little Current will host 2018 Men's **Northern Ontario Curling Provincials**

LITTLE CURRENT-Little Current has won the bid to host the 2018 Travelers Men's Northern Ontario Curling Provincials February 7 to 11.

"We are so excited that we were awarded the bid," said Travelers Host Committee member Crystal Morra.

"This is great news," commented Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin. "We are happy that the host committee was successful with their bid and so glad that the community groups and council put their support behind the efforts to bring this event to Manitoulin.'

"At the end of last year's AGM, the Little Current Curling Club discussed the possibility of putting a bid in for 2018 as the opportunity only comes once every six years," said Ms. Morra. "Club members expressed excitement over the possibility of hosting, noting it would be a wonderful opportunity for both the club and the town. Curling has been a beloved

sport on Manitoulin for over 100 years so it will be wonderful to bring a Brier-like curling experience for all to enjoy."

The Travelers 2018 Bid Committee (now host committee) took the reins to develop the proposal with the support of the Little Current Curling Club and the Northeast Town mayor and council. The proposal was submitted at the end of January to the Northern Ontario Curling Association (NOCA), with the bid awarded to Little Current last month.

In the past, the Little Current Curling Club has hosted the Provincial Mixed, Provincial Mixed Doubles, Provincial Juniors and summer bonspiels, but this is the first time that Manitoulin has hosted the NOCA Men's Curling Provincials.

"We hope to create a similar experience to that of the 2015 Travelers Men's Provincials in Kenora," said fellow Travelers Host Committee member and curler Jordan Chandler. "The host club, Keewatin

Police alert public to deadly carfentanil's impending arrival

World's most potent commercial opioid

MANITOULIN—The United Chiefs and Councils of Manitoulin (UCCM) Anishnaabe Police have issued a drug alert in partnership with the M'Chigeeng Health Centre advising the public of a serious health concern involving a drug known as carfentanil—a drug similar to Fentanyl but 100 times more toxic.

"The M'Chigeeng Health Centre contacted us and felt we should let the public know about carfentanil," explained UCCM Anishaabe Police Chief Rodney Nahwegahbow. "We are aware it has been found in Hamilton and Toronto and are concerned that with the presence of drugs on the Island we could see it on Manitoulin soon. We both felt that it was in the best interest of the public to bring attention to the drug and the danger."

Police Chief Nahwegahbow explained that carfentanil looks like table salt and can be absorbed through the skin or inhaled. He also said that it can take as little as 20 micrograms to kill a person.

"It looks like table salt and is a cheaper compound, so it's being mixed with other drugs like cocaine, which has had a presence

on Manitoulin for a number of years," said Police Chief Nahwegahbow. "It's a scary thing. It was developed as an elephant tranquilizer and the smallest amount can be deadly."

"We started to see it in western Canada, but now it's in southern Ontario and we are concerned it could be making its way to Mani-toulin next," said Police Chief Nahwegahbow.

Carfentanil has been linked to at least 15 deaths in Alberta between last summer and November, with Health Canada confirming the presence of the drug in

Plans for lakeside nuclear waste storage moving swiftly forward

Salmon Classic, Manitoulin Island gets much love from southwestern Ontario

LONDON—Manitoulin Island was well represented in southwestern Ontario last weekend as a team from The Manitoulin Expositor represented the Salmon Classic. This is Manitoulin, the M.S. Chi-Cheemaun and all things Manitoulin at the 34th annual London Boat, Fishing and Outdoors Show.

"Our booth was very, very well received," said Salmon Classic coordinator Dave Patterson. "We had hundreds of great 'goodie bags' loaded with brochures from Island accommodations and events, ferry schedules, and the 2017 edition of This is Manitoulin-hot off the press.'

"Last year the Salmon Classic held fort at the Toronto Sportsmen's Show but this year we decided to try a different audience and we're quite positive it's going to pay off-the visitors to our booth were so receptive and many of them were already familiar with Manitoulin so it's an easy sell," Mr. Patterson added.

"Those who are familiar with Manitoulin Island were quick to light up as soon as they saw the booth and wanted to spend time with us and share their Island memories," added Alicia McCutcheon, editor of The Expositor. "If they said, 'Manitoulin, I haven't been there in many years,'

we'd counter with 'Well, it's time to come back!' They always agreed." McCutcheon Ms. laughed.

The Salmon Classic, gearing up for its second run, has already gained a good reputation among the angling set with some of last year's derby fishermen stopping by the booth to share their excitement for this year's month-long tournament and even greater cash prizes. Many more had heard about the start-up derby and were keen to learn more. "We even had people double checking the derby dates so they could book their holidavs!" Mr. Patterson enthused.

TORONTO-The public commentary period on plans to build a permanent storage site for low to medium radioactive waste from nuclear plants such as clothing, tools and parts deep within the limestone formation less than a mile from the shores of Lake Huron ends on Monday, March 6, and the proponents are citing a lack of participation as a sign that the plan is not very high on Ontarians' radar.

Ontario Power Generation's (OPG) proposed Deep Geological Repository (DGR) would store low and intermediate level nuclear waste deep beneath the earth's surface beside OPG's Western Waste Management Facility at the Bruce nuclear generating station located in Kincardine.

Designed to hold about 200,000 cubic metres of low and intermediate level waste from Ontario's nuclear generating stations, loads of radioactive mops, rags, paper towels and clothing (aka low level waste) would be joined by the more radioactive waste such as filters, resins and pressure tubes, most of which is currently stored above ground in specialized storage buildings. No spent fuel rods would be part of this group

The ion shielding resins included in the intermediate waste category contain significant amounts of carbon-14, a radionuclide that has a half life of more than 5,700 years. A long term solution is therefore obviously a high priority.

The DGR would be carved out of the sedimentary shale and limestone rock, some 680 metres (2,230 feet) below the surface in rock formations that OPG's research has determined have been stable for more than 450 million years. But the site is located less than a mile from the shores of Lake Huron and the opposition to the facility has been widespread despite the \$130 million in research spent by the OPG since 2001

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Gore Bay Theatre prepares this year's QUONTA entry

GORE BAY—'Boiler Room Suite,' this year's Gore Bay Theatre entry in the **QUONTA Festival competition will present** a challenge for the actors, particularly John Hawke and Shannon McMullan, who will have to perform a variety of roles in the play's fantasy sequences, but as luck and planning would have it, both thespians have considerable experience before the footlights

"It will be, um, tough," admits Andrea Emmerton, who is co-directing the production with Walter Maskell. "Well they are all tough, but this play has many challenges. There are layers upon layers to it."

This will be actor John Robertson's first "serious" play, although he has had a great deal of experience in musicals among other acting gigs. "He is very good," said the director

The play is by a Canadian playwright and Ms. Emmerton notes that Theatre Ontario is encouraging Canadian plays in their festival, taking place in Ottawa this year, in honour of Canada's 150th birthday. "All three plays in this year's QUONTA festival have been written by Canadians," she said

'Boiler Room Suite' by Rex Deverell "is a

wonderful Canadian play about Aggie and Sprugg, two derelicts who have taken refuge in the boiler room of an old hotel to find warmth. The 'boiler room suite is Aggie's secret hideout," notes Ms. Emmerton in a synopsis she provided to The Expositor. "Aggie was once an actress, Sprugg was once a poet. Together they while away an evening and a jug of wine in their sanctuary. Their sometimes hilarious, sometimes tragic comradeship reveals much about being poor in material possessions and having a wealth of imagination. When Pete, the custodian appears, the drama intensifies with the boiler room becoming alternatively their heaven or their hell, with powerful results.'

"The world the Canadian playwright portrays in 'Boiler Room Suite' is one of loss, regret, sorrow, humiliation, despair and loneliness," notes critic Robert Reid in The Waterloo Record. "Conversely, it's a world of warmth, imagination, caring, compassion, kindness and hope.

The multi-award winning theatre troupe has never failed to bring engaging and high quality theatre to the Gore Bay stage, and with the depth of talent of the cast and crew in this production, 'Boiler Room Suite' is bound to continue that stellar

Tehkummah beef farmer John McNaughton attended the AGM along with fellow Islanders and voting delegates Brent Best and advisory council

It was a jam-packed agenda squeezed into two days with presentations from some of the industry's top professionals.

"Anne Wasko (of Gateway Livestock and a market analyst) did an interesting presentation on the cattle market and what she saw moving forward," Mr. McNaughton said. "She said the market will be staying in the range it currently is—currently the mar ket is down over the previous year's highs due to the growing production of pork and poultry." Anishinabek stand with Iroquois on radioactive shipping

NIPISSING—Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee says that the Anishinabek Nation is standing with the Iroquois Caucus opposing the transporting of radioactive liquid through Anishinabek Nation and Iroquois Territories.

"We assert inherent ownership of the water and jurisdiction within our regions and traditional territories," says the Grand Council Chief of 40 Anishinabek First Nations. "We will stand with our Iroquois allies to protect the drinking water. Water is the lifeblood of Mother Earth. Why would we put our precious resource in jeopardy? A spill into any of the waterways would have a tremendous impact on the Great Lakes. Millions of people would be affected-on both sides of the border."

The transport of radioactive liquid waste could pose substantial threats to the environmental and human health as hazardous materials and waste cannot be disposed of by common means, the press release from the Anishinabek Nation continues. It has the potential to cause contamination to the largest fresh water supply in the world which provides drinking water to approximately 40 million people.

The plan is to truck 23,000 litres of highly radioactive liquid from Chalk River, Ontario across the international border to the Savannah River Site, South Carolina,

using public roads and bridges.

In 2010, Anishinabek Chiefs in Assembly passed resolutions opposing the exporting and storage of nuclear waste across the Anishinabek Nation to other provinces or countries by either land or water.

Anishinabek First Nations are the caretakers of the land, water air and resources within our regions and traditional territories, the press release adds.

"Our water technicians will be monitoring this development closely as the Great Lakes water quality is so critical to the Anishinabek Nation," said Grand Council Chief Madahbee. "Transporting nuclear waste poses too much risk."

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

Don't throw the baby out with the milk quota

It seems somewhat counterintuitive for a party that holds sway largely with voters residing in rural Canada to put the dairy supply management system in the crosshairs of proposed policy, but that is exactly what the Conservative Party of Canada has traditionally done.

Stepping into power, one of the first things the Conservatives under Stephen Harper scuttled was the Grain Marketing Board, the cooperative entity that for generations had taken the uncertainty out of grain production on the Canadian prairies and negotiated large scale sales on behalf of grain farmers. The move had wide a wide ranging, and in some cases unanticipated, impact on the Canadian economy and the development of Canada's North.

The resulting dearth of grain trains headed to the Port of Churchill on Manitoba's portion of the James Bay coast has led largely to the mothballing of that port in what is certainly a totally unanticipated result that played havoc with Mr. Harper's avowed intention to strengthen our nation's Arctic presence.

Unintended consequences tend to be the norm when it comes to government interaction with the economy, but in the case of supply management, the intended outcome of keeping our farming communities and agricultural sector strong seems to have been at least a qualified success.

Thanks to the various supply management boards in place, Canadians can be assured that the eggs, turkeys, chickens, milk and other dairy products they find in their grocery stores are produced in Canada and that those who labour to produce those products can receive a living wage in return—all without the need for government (i.e. taxpayer's) subsidies. Our food supplies are the envy of much of the world and a strength that would not be there but for the supply management system.

Today, the Canadian supply management system ensures that our food supply remains of the highest quality and untainted by an influx of cheap substandard products created in an environment with poor, if any, safeguards. Ontario's agri-food industry is one of the leading strengths of our economy when approaching Asian markets and the burgeoning middle class that is appearing on the other side of the Pacific Rim.

There are challenges to supply management, to be sure. Many small farmers chafe under the restrictions imposed by having to purchase quota in order to exceed the production limits found under a supply management system. But the protections and supports for our agricultural sector that are in place supply management benefits us all, even if it does add slightly to the cost of doing meals.

The anger and angst of the Trump legions, chafing against the loss of high paying jobs to overseas markets, need look no further than to the low wages and lack of regulation in those same markets for the underlying cause of the hollowing out of the manufacturing sector that has led to such devastating job losses.

There are tradeoffs to be found in economic policy decisions that have to be made at the provincial and federal levels, but too often in those decisions ideology trumps sound economic sense.

The current actual frontrunner in the Conservative race is the libertarian focussed former Conservative cabinet minister and Quebec MP Maxime Bernier (Kevin O'Leary leads among Conservative voters with his television celebrity profile, but only a fraction of those being polled are actually party members) and he has indicated that the dismantling of Canada's supply management system is high on his priority list as he seeks the Conservative leadership.

While such a policy would bring lower prices into Canadian supermarkets, the losses among Canada's agricultural sector would be devastating and our nation's food security and sovereignty would be the long term victim of that short sighted and ideologically driven policy.

Canada's supply management system works, there is no reason to throw it out simply because it fits better into an ideology based on theories better suited to natural selection and novels glorifying the supremacy of the individual in society.

Let's keep Canada's food supply as local as it can be.

Shirley Cheechoo and Debajehmujig impacts go beyond theatre

They make an important contribution to effecting social change

To the Expositor: Hello Manitoulin! Aanii!

Been thinking about life on Manitoulin Island lately as I am recently in touch with colleagues from Debajehmujig. Those years at Debaj had a major impact on me and heightened my awareness for First Nations issues. Currently I am involved with an advocacy group to draw attention to the Adam Capay story.

This young Ojibwe man from a small reserve in Northwestern Ontario, has made headline news since October 7, 2017, when Ontario Human Rights Commissioner Renu Mandhane visited Thunder Bay District Jail. A prison guard at the jail tipped her off to a prisoner, held without trial in solitary confinement for four years! In a cell the size of an elevator shaft, 23 hours a day, a lightbulb burning constantly a young man, Adam Capay endured.

Shortly after Commissioner Mandhane's expose the news broke on CBC's 'The Sunday Edition' with Michael Enright, who gave a scathing report on the use of torture (as defined by the UN) for the treatment of Capay. That very day, my daughter Lilly Woodbury was leaving for New Zealand. She is the same age as Adam Capay, 23. After obtaining a degree in Environmental Studies at University of Toronto, she is working for Greenpeace in New Zealand, following her dreams. This contrasted so sharply to Adam Capay, who's life had become a nightmare. Recently Brett Storey, who grew on the beautiful Manitoulin, has received recognition for her film 'Twelve Landscapes of Prison.' This film explores solitary confinement in the USA. In Canada we have a kinder, gentler term—administrative segregation.

Our advocacy group has an online "Care 2" petition with 80,000 signatures. We are now working on a GoFundMe campaign—A Family for Visit for Adam Capay—as, due to public pressure, he was moved to Penetanguishene, 1,700 miles from home. As we plodded along with our efforts I kept thinking, who do I know that can spread the word on our campaign and in a flash I thought Debajehmujig!

Without people like Shirley Cheechoo, without Debaj, I may not have become involved in Adam's plight. I'd like to thank Shirley Cheechoo, Marsha Coffey, Blake Debassige and Audrey Wemigwans for getting back to me on this important issue, Miigwetch!

The arts such as theatre and film make a major contribution to the important work of affecting change on social justice issues. Weengushk Film Institute and Debajehmujig, right there on Manitoulin, with so much local support, continue to make a difference!

Shades of Our Sisters celebrates the lives behind the statistics

ESPANOLA—Numbers are sterile. They stand stark and impersonal on the newsprint page or echo passionless in our ears as we listen to the Six O'Clock News. Even through the new-age medium of a social media meme, the more than 1,200 missing and murdered indigenous women and girls that are currently the subject of a long-cried for national inquiry comes across as impersonal and distant-something happening somewhere else and to somebody else. But behind each and every single digit that comprises that stark number was a living breathing human being-a person with dreams and aspirations, and loved ones who watched them grow, shared their peaks and valleys as the made their way through life.

Shades of Our Sisters, a powerful multimedia documentary exhibition produced by a passionate group of Ryerson students, in conjunction with a group of relatives of

two of the missing and murdered indigenous women and girls, was held at the Espanola High School last week.

Shades of Our Sisters brought the lives of Whitefish River First Nation's Sonya Cywink and Andersonville First Nation's Patricia Carpenter into focus through the lens of two 20-minute documentaries and the anguished recollections of those who they left behind.

The Shades of Our Sisters exhibit at Espanola High School is the last of three public presentations, one at the Ryerson Student Centre and the second at Ms. Carpenter's home community of Andersonville First Nation.

Just outside the exhibit hall, volunteers from the Manitoulin Sudbury Victim Services sat ready to provide support to those who might be overcome by the emotions which could well up from seeing/participating in the exhibit.

Entering the exhibit hall, a visitor is greeted first by a floating mobile containing hundreds of feathers. Feathers for Women is a massive mobile comprised of more than 1,200 paper feathers upon each of which are written thoughts on violence garnered from a questionnaire sent to schools and communities across the country. Each of those feathers represents the life of a missing or murdered indigenous woman or girl, transgendered or spirit person. The mobile was created by Cree artist Waylon Goodwin of Kashechewan First

menting the birth of her son, Dakota, her writings and her books, the wallet containing her photos of her and her brothers and her baby's ultrasounds, and again, iPads and video screens to explain the significance of each of the items.

"This is a smaller version of the exhibit," explains Ms. Tse. "We usually display in a larger auditorium. We had to trim it down for the smaller space. It was a very challenging process."

At the end of the exhibit rows of chairs sit before a large flat screen television. Upon the screen, two 20-minute documentary films delved into the lives of the two young women.

We meet Patricia's mother (one of the producers of the documentary on her daughter), who talks about her Patricia's childhood and how the 14-year-old unwed mother faced the birth of her child with pride and excitement. We hear from her brother, her cousins, each relaying snippets



The young mother's baby book documents the joy of the birth of Patricia Carpenter's son Dakota. The very familiar items that make up our lives brought a sharp contrast to the impersonal numbers behind the statistics.

from the life of Patricia that rounded out her character and personality.

We meet Sonya's family members, who recall stories of her as a vibrant, engaging and funny young child and woman and listen to a letter Sonya wrote to her father, read by her sister Maggie Cywink.

Throughout the day on Friday, students at Espanola High School visited the exhibit with their teachers. So powerful was the exhibit that some teachers expressed difficulty in dealing with the subject matter. "This is someone whose family members we know," said one teacher. She recalled the reaction of one of her students following the exhibit. "What happened to them?"

It was a questioned asked by many of the visitors to the exhibit, to which the answer is "that is the point."

Getting to know Sonya and Patricia as people, not faceless numbers, we become engaged with their fates, by getting to know Sonya and Patricia on a personal level, we cannot help but to care deeply about the fate of these two young women.

But Shades of Our Sister does not answer the question "what happened to them?" A visitor can easily turn to Google to discover the news stories that focussed on their deaths.

"I want people to know my sister, her life, not her death," said co-producer Alex Cywink.

"She was a good person, with her whole life ahead of her," said Patricia's cousin Shauna, "and a son that she never got to know."

As to what happens next, perhaps that answer lies in the words of co-producer Maggie Cywink contained upon the Shades

Nation and serves as the exhibit's centrepiece.

Beneath the mobile the students behind the project, storywriter/researcher Michael Rebellato, director of photography/assistant editor Adam Gualtieri, project manager/digital director Josephine Tse, executive producer Laura Heidenheim, artistic director Tomas Maturana, editor/cinematographer Melissa Gonzalez, financial officer/marketing director Joshua Howe and director of audio Antonietta Emmanuel, stood waiting to take people through the exhibit. On the left hand side of the exhibit were artifacts from the life of Sonya Cywink. Her writings, family photos from throughout her short life, the material she used as a Miss Manitoulin contestant, her favourite music and the stark remains of her cross from the Whitefish River First Nation cemetery. Audio and video clips with headphones and iPads at each section explain the significance of the items of display.

On the right hand side of the exhibit were the artifacts from the life and times of Patricia Carpenter, her Brownie uniform, her baby's tiny jumper, the baby book docuof Our Sister website.

"There needs to be a sacred circle of healing," she wrote. "When the healing starts our family and community grows stronger. We have the answers, we just need to start listening."

Northeast Town Council Notes

Fire department report

Northeast Town Fire Department Chief Darren Bailey presented council with the January department report. He said there were four calls to service to date so far this year. The calls included a carbon monoxide call to Blake Street on January 13, an electrical fire in Sheguiandah First Nation on January 18, a chimney fire on North Channel Drive on January 20 and a chimney fire on Highway 6 south on February 8. Fire Chief Bailey also noted that the fire trucks and equipment are in good working order.

Community services and public works

Reid Taylor reviewed the community services report. He said that the ice schedule is still busy at the recreation centre and that staff are busy prepping for upcoming events. "They are also completing maintenance, repair and painting tasks," said Mr. Taylor. "The adult craft days have gone well and will continue until the end of April and the children's craft days have also been well attended and will continue until April."

Mr. Taylor said that this month at the recreation centre the Skate Canada programs will continue, the Manitoulin Panthers playoffs will occur, along with the Manitoulin Secondary Schools boys playoffs and Little Current Howland Minor Hockey. He noted that the ballet, martial arts and fitness programs are also going well.

"The Manitoulin Panthers will be hosting the Northern Ontario Hockey Association Tournament of Champions on March 10 to 12," said Mr. Taylor.

He said there were children's activities planned for March 13 to 17 and a fundraising event on March 18.

Coming soon is a 'Soup and Tomatoes' exercise program for seniors.

In terms of the parks and marina, he said that all the marina building and docks are continuing to be monitored and preparations for spring opening of marinas and buildings are being planned. "Renewals will be sent out for seasonal slip rentals and marina rates are to be set," Mr. Taylor said.

He listed upcoming community events including an Old Fashioned Family Fun Day at the museum in Sheguiandah on Saturday, March 4 and a Spring Tea and Sale at the museum on Saturday, March 25.

Mr. Reid also reviewed the recommendations for the Port of Little Current and Spider Bay Marina dockage, ramping and service rate increases for 2017. He noted that the fees reflect a two percent increase for anything that uses hydro. The committee made a recommendation to council to accept the proposed rates for 2017.

Town CAO Dave Williamson presented the public works report, noting that the manager of public works, Gary May, was busy dealing with a water main break.

He said that snow removal is underway on the connecting link and other areas as needed. In terms of water and sewer, Mr. Williamson explained that the second pump is out for repair at the main lift station and that a replacement generator is on order for the lift station with a temporary portable wired in.

Mr. Williamson also noted that public works staff have been watching for a second trackless as the rear differential went out on the town's recently.

The community services and public works committee reviewed a used trackless that Mr. May had found for sale for \$14,900. He said that it could be purchased using funds left in a stabilization reserves that weren't being used plus funds from the public works department.

There were mixed opinions from the councillors regarding the purchase, but in the end a motion was carried recommending to council that the trackless be purchased.

Library update

Council's representative on the Little Current Public Library board, Laurie Cook, told council that the board had selected a new librarian and made an offer to the said Councillor Koehler. "Government funding is being cut back, but we can't keep coming back to the taxpayers to pick up the extra."

In a recorded vote, Councillor Koehler voted against approving the 2017 municipal budget, while Councillor Michael Erskine, Marcel Gauthier, Melissa Peters, Bruce Wood and Mayor Al MacNevin voted in favour of the budget.

RV park

Council discussed a deputation that was made last month about the municipality building an RV park at Spider Bay Marina.

Mr. Williamson said he spoke to RV business owners in the municipality who were opposed to the town creating an RV park.

"We have a policy to not compete with the private sector," Mr. Williamson reminded council.

Mr. Williamson also went over some of the costs that would be associated with building a park.

Councillor Erskine said he didn't see the benefit of the municipality competing with the private sector and noted that RV camping was already being handled by business owners in the municipality.

Councillor Gauthier said he agreed with Councillor Erskine and didn't want to see the municipality competing with the private business owners in the municipality.

No motion was made towards the town building a RV park at Spider Bay Marina.

Donation

Council carried a motion to donate \$200 to the Mani-

toulin Panthers. The Panthers requested funds to help host the Tournament of Champions March 10 to 12.

There will be 10 teams coming to Little Current from across Northern Ontario as part of the conference.

Library board

Council reviewed a request for a new board member for the Little Current Public Library Board.

"I have owned property in the Northeast Town since 1989 and built a home here in 2005," said the request to council from John Royal. "I am a retired, formerly working with the Simcoe County Children's Aid Society and prior to that, with the Simcoe County Housing Authority."

Mr. Royal noted that he was a member of the Midland Library Board in the 1980s, active in promoting the new library when he moved to Barrie and has experience on other boards.

Council carried a motion to appoint Mr. Royal to the library board.

Accounts receivable

Town Treasurer Sheryl Wilkin went through the accounts receivable for January with council. For taxes, she reported that there had been \$158,975.50 made in payment for the month. For water and sewer, Ms. Wilkin said that there had been \$134,176.68 made in payments for January. She added that there were 29 accounts over the \$400 limit, with 24 accounts over the limit due to the recent billing and penalty added. She said two accounts had been disconnected and three account holders had made arrangements.

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individual.

She also said that two of the library's employees had been "holding down the fort" since the resignation of the last librarian and that the board had opted to give the two employees a temporary \$3 an hour increase to their wages while they had been assuming the responsibilities of the librarian.

Budget

The Northeast Town reviewed the draft 2017 municipal budget. Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson walked council through some of the changes since staff first presented the budget including an increase in the municipal allocation to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor and a decrease in the Northeast Town's contribution to the District Services Board. He also commended council on its due diligence going through the budget and recommended changes.

"Thanks to the efforts of council, I am very pleased to present a budget with a 1.65 percent increase to the levy," said Mr. Williamson.

Councillor Melissa Peters said that she couldn't support the budget as the municipality is stretched too thin, in her opinion, and the budget should include future increases.

Councillor Bill Koehler said that he also couldn't support the budget. "Staff does a good job, but council needs to take a long, hard look at the town's finances,"

Their second game against Bishop Carter on Monday, February 27 on home turf went to their advantage with the Mustangs



Coach Doane said that





Ontario in December.

Manitoulin was also ranked as having the highest number of opioid-related deaths per capita in the world last summer, a ranking that has since dropped to 15 but is still high and an additional warning that the deadly opioid carfentanil could have deadly consequences for Islanders.

"We have been keeping track of the drug and the overdoses out west," said M'Chigeeng Health Centre Alternative Program worker Mark Forsythe, noting the overdose epidemic that has caused the BC government to declare a public health emergency. "We figured it was only a matter of time before it made its way over to Ontario and now that it has we think it's only a matter of time before it's found on Manitoulin."

"Carfentanil is a synthetic opiate which is very strong and cheap, which is why it's being used to cut other drugs," said Mr. Forsythe. "Our main concern is with cocaine. We know that a lot of the cocaine in the area is coming from Toronto and carfentanil is in Toronto."

Mr. Forsythe said that due to the strength of carfentanil, an overdose would happen much more quickly with the typical signs of respiratory failure—blue lips, low heart rate and breathing slowing down. "It would be the same as other opiate overdoes, but a lot quicker," said Mr. Forsythe. "With Manitoulin being a rural area and emergency services having slower response times, this could be especially dangerous."

Mr. Forsythe said that carfentanil is so strong that it can be absorbed through the skin, putting first responders at risk.

UCCM Police have begun looking into carrying Nalox-

one, a counteragent that blocks or reverses the opioid, with the hope that other police services on the Island will follow suit.

Island paramedics also carry Naloxone, as do the Manitoulin Health Centre sites and the three Guardian Pharmacies (in Little Current, Manitowaning and Mindemoya).

A government program has made Naloxone kits available to the public for free through Ontario pharmacies.

"The kits contain two vials of Naloxone, two syringes, gloves, swabs and a CPR mask," explained Little Current Guardian Pharmacist Steve Bondi. "The kit is free to anyone who might want one on hand—a drug user, a bar owner, a friend or family member of a drug user."

"Naloxone is a competetive inhibitor of opioids (such as morphine, oxycodone and heroin in addition to carfentanil)," said Mr. Bondi.

The MHC sites in Little Current and Mindemoya are also stocked with Naloxone and have implemented protocols to help protect staff.

"We have a protocol for staff to wear double gloves and masks when dealing with a patient who has overdosed on carfentanil because of the toxicity of the drug," said MHC CEO Derek Graham. "We've made staff aware of any (carfentanil) protocols that have been recommended for Ontario hospitals and will add to it if any future protocols are implemented from the province."

"Police are urging the public to exercise caution with the growing presence of carfentanil in our area and ask that anyone with information regarding illegal drug activity can contact the UCCM Anishnaabe Police at 1-888-377-7135 or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS(8477)," said Police Chief Nahwegahbow.

endorsed by the joint review panel appointed to oversee the proposal. The proponents like to point out that the storage facility is "450 million years away from Lake Huron." Opponents take little comfort in either the endorsements or the analogy.

"This idea of a 'dump' for nuclear waste has been the only option explored by CNSC since the '60s," notes Sandfield's Sarah Hutchinson, CEO for the Algoma-Manitoulin Green Party of Ontario Constituency Association and a vocal opponent of the plan. "In Europe, they are only pursuing plans for nuclear waste management facilities. The difference is, in a dump such as that proposed for Kincardine, if something goes wrong the material is irretrievable. In a management facility, the canisters for the waste can be serviced or changed if

ture and pressure will have an effect on the canisters in ways we do not yet fully understand. To me it seems dangerous to create an experiment we can not control with radioactive waste, and goes against the Green precautionary principle."

Ms. Hutchinson is far from alone in her concerns, in fact, more than 160 cities, counties and states around the Great Lakes have weighed in with resolutions opposing the repository, including heavyweights like the American cities of Detroit, Milwaukee and as well as Chicago, Toronto. The Ontario's Saugeen First Nation, upon whose traditional territories the DGR would be located have also weighed in against the proposal.

Despite the upwelling of opposition, both the US Environmental Protection Agency and the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality have clearly stated they have no objection to the project. The Town of Kincardine, the proposed location for the DGR, is, however, onside with the plan.

have criticized the proponents for not exploring alternative sites that are not located beside the Great Lakes from which literally tens of millions of people draw their drinking water. In response to a government request to the OPG to provide a map of alternative sites for the DGR, OPG interpreted those instructions to mean other possible geological formations, one consisting of crystalline rock (aka granite) and one of sedimentary rock. Those two formations cover an that encompasses area roughly three-quarters of the province. OPG maintains that they have met the minister's parameters by distinguishing between a "site" and a

"location." Identifying an rnative "site," they con-, would involve a multiprocess, complete with tiple phases, that would ude finding another host-basically ling ting the process all over in from scratch, while ply identifying an alterive location involves ntifying which geologiformations are technically and economically feasible. The semantic gymnastics

can likely be traced to the bottom line. Finding an alternate location at this point would entail something on the order of \$380 million to \$1.4 billion dollars. Nothing nuclear comes cheap, it seems.

The comment period on the latest information submitted by the OPG on the DGR ends on March 6. So far, the OPG contends that the facility is not generating much interest on the public's radar. On Monday, December 12, 2016 the Governor in Council extended the time limit for the issuance of a decision statement by 243 days.

A child immigrant arrives in Canada

EDITOR'S NOTE: In conjunction with Canada's Sesquicentennial in 2017, members of the Manitoulin Writers' Circle are crafting stories and poems to pay tribute to our country on this pivotal milestone birthday. The following memoir takes the reader back to that period just before Expo '67 when both the country and the Baby Boomers were coming of age.

Grace Griffin Galbraith, my grandmother, wrote these words in 1928: "I can never regret coming to Canada. I have had, to work hard but I don't mind that for I love to work." She was 25 and a perfect candidate for regret. She immigrated to Canada as an eight year-old with her sister, Lily. The two, and later their brother, Edward, arrived through a child reneged on their contractual responsibility to send Grace to school for at least three months each year. One day, a local minister, Rev. Munroe, arrived at the farm and found Grace in alarming condition. He immediately removed her and took her to live with a family that attended his church, the Gilpins. She stayed at this safe and kind home until her marriage at age 17.

One year after her marriage to James Galbraith, a farmer with Scottish roots, Grace received the sad news that Lily had died of tuberculosis. She wrote, "It was lonesome for me when Lily died. I missed her sisterly letters."

Meanwhile, Grace's brother, Edward, who had the good fortune to live with a couple who considered him a son and included him in their will, had returned to England where he visited cult childhood days over, Grace's writings reveal a full and happy life. "I have a good and loving husband and a good home," she wrote. "We have a 100 acre farm, a large barn and a fairly good house. Jim is very good to help me. He is very fond of children. We have our place paid for now and I must add that we have a 1918 model car but we intend dealing on a new one next spring."

The Home Children were unprepared for the harshness and isolation of Canadian farm life. One boy expressed it this way: When I landed on that farm, I looked up and said, 'Oh God, where am I'?' Whereas most immigrants form communities in their adopted homelands, these children were scattered in ones throughout Canada's towns and farms. Like Grace, most had more than one placement making it

immigration agreement between the United Kingdom and Canada. After their father's death and their mother's remarriage, Grace and her siblings were placed in the Annie MacPherson Home for Children in the east end of Lon-England. Thev don. remained there until their mother's death, after which their paternal grandmother signed the Canada Clause giving the Home permission to send the children to Canada Thus, Grace became one of more than 100,000 children to immigrate to Canada between 1869 and 1939 She landed in Quebec on May 13, 1912. Most child immigrants became indentured servants contracted to work as farm hands and mother's helpers. Lily was sent to Toronto and Grace to a southern Ontario farm. At the end of her 30-day trial period Grace was returned to MacPherson's Canadian Home in Stratford because she was "not wholly satisfactory." This isn't surprising since she had never been on a farm. Her next placement also ended after 30 davs. Grace's third placement took her to Manitoulin Island. This home welcomed her at first but later

relatives and contacted MacPherson's for information about his sisters. On his return to Canada, he began a search for Grace. By the time he found her they had been separated for fourteen years.

Grace wrote, "I always have a longing to see some of my folks." She also made the sad statement, "I can never remember seeing my mother." How happy she must have been to reunite with her brother. Edward spent a lot of time on Manitoulin with Grace and then moved from Southern Ontario to Sudbury to be closer to her. By 1928 when Grace wrote that she had no regrets about coming to Canada, she was married, had four daughters and had re-united with Edward. (A son arrived later.) Her diffidifficult to put down roots. As we celebrate Canada's 150th anniversary, it's estimated that the descendants of Canada's child immigrants, the Home Children, make up 10 percent of the population. This period in our history serves to remind us how much immigration practices have changed. Today, no serious consideration would be given to a program that sends children overseas to live with and work for strangers. What a debt our country owes these young ones who endured heartbreak and loneliness to become some of Canada's hardiest and most dedicated citizens. might Grace have become bitter. Instead, she, like most child immigrants, chose to find hope in her new land. Grace's positive attitude is reflected in her statement—"I can never regret coming to Canada."

Grace spent her last 12 years at the Lodge in Gore Bay where she passed away at age 99 in 2003.



In an adjoining room a set of parents laid their baby girl on a white fur rug and were taking pictures. The majority of parents had their baby's picture taken as well as family photos, if they wished too.

Alma Jean Migwans opened the ceremony with a prayer and smudging ceremony using the four medicines (cedar. tobacco. sweetgrass, sage). This ceremony is a traditional ceremony to ask the Creator to help guide them in welcomed and thanked members. everyone present for attending this annual ceremony.

Five women (Mary D'Antouze, Alma Jean Migwans, Bonita Bebamash, Geraldine Ense McGregor and Eria Beboning) then proceeded to the front with hand drums and sang an opening song. A touch of humour was provided by a male elder when he joined the quintet and danced to the drum beat.

Lunch was then set out on the table, chicken parmesan on a bed of spaghetti with bolognese sauce, garlic bread, choice of salads, desserts and juices. Pursuant to tradition and as a sign of respect, the community elders were first to be served. The young people present were asked to help get food for those who were unable to. After a delicious lunch the babies were called to the front to receive a gift. 

Government of Canada invests in dementia research about indigenous peoples

SUDBURY-On Monday, Paul Lefebvre, Member of Parliament for Sudbury, on behalf of the Honourable Jane Philpott, Minister of Health, announced an investment of \$1 million for two research projects that will bring new and culturally-adapted approaches to address the needs of indigenous peoples living with or at risk of developing dementia. He was joined for the announcement by Marc Serré, Member of Parliament for Nickel Belt.

The new investment from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) will fund the work of top researchers at the Health Sciences North Research Institute and Laurentian University in Sudbury.

Dr. Janet McElhaney received \$500,000 to use a community-based approach that will combine indigenous practices with Western technologies to empower caregivers supporting older Indigenous peoples with dementia.

Dr. Jennifer Walker received \$500,000 to develop a Canadian Indigenous Cognitive Assessment Tool for widespread use and to lay a foundation for a national study of dementia in indigenous populations.

These projects are part of the CIHR Dementia Research Strategy, which supports research on the latest preventive, diagnostic and treatment approaches to Alzheimer's disease and related dementia.



Drought stressed maples need tender care

Leuty, Agroforestry Specialist with OMAFRA, emphasized that maple trees were stressed with last year's drought storing less sugar for use in leafing out in the spring of 2017. Sap volume for 2017 is difficult to predict as a result. Due to these stress conditions, it is advisable to handle trees with extra care at tapping time and leave trees with enough sap for reasonable leaf production. This encourages longterm productivity. Practice healthy tapping. Avoid tapping when the trees are frozen to prevent splitting the tree. Tap at 5°C or above. Tap a new hole two inches to left or right and 12 inches above or below previous hole. Use 5/16" health spile to reduce drilling damage and drill to a depth of 1.5 inches. Use a sharp 5/16 inch diameter bit and drill the tap hole at a slight upward angle to drain sap and rain water by gravity flow after season ends reducing bacteria buildup. Tree diameter of 10-18 inches should be limited to 1 tap and larger trees a maximum of 2 taps.
