BIDWELL—Sylvia Moggy made a startling discovery last week following the rain and thaw—fresh tracks leading to the location where the family's hay is kept near the Bidwell Road then leaving again from the spot where the Moggy's outside hay stash had been stored, but leaving the square bale cache much smaller. The number of missing bales, Ms. Moggy says, numbers in the hun-

Ms. Moggy immediately got to work, finding a perfect boot track that had flash frozen after the quick drop in temperature and began estimating how many bales they had lost. The boot and tire tracks were "clear as day," she said. Following a poor hay season, Ms. Moggy said they managed to get 2,275 square bales from their fields-1,000 less than they normally would have had.

The Moggys then called the police, who visited the scene that morning and determined that the tire tracks show that a trailer was not used to enter the property and take the hav.

Doing some sleuthing on her own, and with a photo of the boot track in hand, Ms. Moggy began to try and discover the make of boot that it belonged to, heading to NAPA Auto Parts in Little Current then to RONA Little Current Building Centre to looks at treads.

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Island's Internet users get boost as suppliers expand their coverage area

es on Manitoulin will be improving in the coming months with both Xplornet Communications Inc. and MSD Technical Services in partnership with Vianet expanding services on the Island.

Xplornet, which currently offers satellite home Internet to some areas of Manitoulin, has announced a large project on Manitoulin, a fixed wireless expansion that the company says will improve Internet speed and reliability.

"We will be constructing 10 towers on Manitoulin Island which will provide residents from Little Current to Meldrum Bay with service," said Xplornet Vice President of Public Affairs and Communications James Maunder. "Xplornet is a rural broadband service provider and we saw a need on Manitoulin."

The towers will be constructed near the communities of Shesheg-waning, Barrie Island, Lorne Lake, Gore Bay, North of Gore Bay, near the Hindman Trail, Kagawong, M'Chigeeng, Mindemoya, Sandfield and Manitowaning. Xplornet will also be constructing a tower at Birch Island.

Mr. Maunder told The Expositor that Xplornet applied to a government program, Connecting Canadians, and received the con-

He explained that under Connecting Canadians the objective is to ensure that citizens in rural, remote and northern parts of the

country can have access to similar Internet services as urban

"The projection is to deliver high-speed Internet at a speed of at least 5 megabits per second (Mbps), but we will be going above and beyond this and offering speed packs up to 25 Mbps," said Mr. Mauder. "To stream video, like Netflix, requires at least 5 Mbps, but with the new service we will be offering, customers will be able to stream on multiple devices."

Mr. Mauder said that the packages will average \$85 a month, depending on how much data the customer wishes to purchase.

"This will be a superior service," said Mr. Mauder, noting that Xplornet was pleased to be bringing this service to Manitoulin.

FedNor investment to bring faster Internet to Wiikwemkoong Unceded

WIIKWEMKOONG-Nickel Belt MP Marc Serré travelled to Wiikwemkoong to announce a \$104,000 investment in that community's Internet infrastructure on behalf of Minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development Navdeep Singh Bains. The funds are flowing from the Connecting Canadians program that provides underserviced communities with Internet access at speeds of five megabits per second or more.

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Motion aimed at school trustee fails at the table

SUDBURY—You might expect that Manitoulin Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) trustee Larry Killens would be crowing at least a little bit over the failure of a motion brought forward from the board's March 7 strategic planning committee meeting to change the board's code of conduct to pre-emptively exclude a trustee from in-camera discussions if "a breach of confidentiality is likely to occur" based on "past actions," but vou would be wrong.

"I don't see this as a victory, while it went in my favour," he said, citing the whole sorry mess as a symptom of what he sees as ailing the

Mr. Killens said that he had spoke for "about half an hour" on the motion that would have allowed the board chair to continue to exclude him from in-camera meetings (a previous 2015 ban of Mr. Killens from in-camera meetings was struck down following a complaint filed by Mr. Killens with the Ontario Ombudsman's office). "It died," he said of the motion, which failed to receive a second.

The unprecedented policy would have allowed a pre-emptive barring of an elected official on the basis of what they might do, rather than their actions. The concept would have been a clear violation of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Mr. Killens, who prefaced his comments with a statement that he was speaking on behalf of his own concerns as a duly elected public official and not on behalf of the board, said that he was not prepared to lie down and be quiet.

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Hydro outage planned for the Island Sunday, April 2

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Island will be without power for four hours on Sunday, April 2 as Hydro One crews compete "critical work" to the area's transmission stations, according the utility company.

The communities that will be without power include Bidwell, M'Chigeeng, Sandfield, Mongowin, Wikwemikong, Gordon, Carnarvon, Burpee and Mills, Little Current, Howland, Barrie Island, Assiginack, Birch Island, Tehkummah, Killarney, Allan east, Gore Bay, Curtin, Billings, Dawson/Robinson, Allan west, Zhiibaahaasing, Cockburn Island, Sheshegwaning, Central Manitoulin, Sheguiandah, Aundeck Omni Kaning, Sheguiandah First Nation and the Bay of

Islands from 7:30 am until 11:30 am on Sunday, April 2.

"On April 2, Hydro One crews require a planned outage in order to complete critical work to the area's transmission stations (TS), Manitoulin TS and Espanola TS, Tiziana Baccega-Rosa, Hydro One media spokesperson, told The Expositor. "The work includes replacing switches and other station components."

"In addition, local crews will be installing new equipment on a main line which runs north on Hwy 6 along with installing a few new poles and line and insulator maintenance," she added. "All of this work will help ensure Manitoulin's homes and businesses have the reliable power they

Delay in Asian carp defence plans ill-considered

The current president of the United States, Donald Trump, made little secret of his contempt for all things environmental while on the hustings, but news that he has begun to follow up his electoral rhetoric with negative action has brought cries of dismay on many fronts.

Among some of the latest moves has been the delay in the implementation process of creating a crucial defence barrier to an invasion of Asian carp into the Great Lakes.

The US Army Corps of Engineers was to release draft results of a study, begun in April 2015, on possible structural or technological upgrades at the Brandon Road Lock and Dam near Joliet, Illinois, a few miles downstream of a network of electrical barriers intended to repel the carp. A final version of the plan was to be released in early 2019. These things take a lot of time to bring to fruition at the best of times, and the draft report still had a public commentary process to go through before any final plan could be finalized, so throwing a further delay into the process borders on the unconscionable.

While the Trump administration had not admitted complicity in the delay (aka call for review) it is no secret that business and shipping interests have long been against the project, as have some Illinois state officials and other members of the US Congress who say it could hamper inland navigation.

It would seem shipping trumps fishing and boater safety in the mind of President Trump and his advisors.

The potentially devastating impact of the Asian carp seems to hold little, if any, traction in Washington. Perhaps the notoriously avaricious appetite of the invasive fish has found a kindred spirit among those whose hands now wield the levers of power.

America was born in a land of plenty and its inhabitants have long been used to the seemingly inexhaustible largesse bestowed upon the continent by Mother Nature. The buffalo had to go in the interest of agriculture and conquest in the Midwest. The carrier pigeons who once darkened the skies made cheap pies to feed the legions of workers who powered the growing industrial might of the nascent nation seemed inexhaustible—they weren't.

With nothing to stop the advance of the Asian carp, it is likely the native species that we have grown up stalking with bobber and pole will go to join the dodo and the carrier pigeon as no more than a memory, or at best a shadow of their former selves.

Perhaps it is fitting, if sad, commentary that the native fisheries replacement will be a creature as notorious for it avaricious appetite as the unfettered American version of capitalism currently ascendant in our neighbours to the south. Fitting, but terribly sad.

Energy minister weighs in on provincial hydro bill plan

A plan for fairer hydro bills

To the Expositor:

On March 2, Premier Wynne announced a plan that will lower residential hydro bills by an average of 25 percent starting this summer. This significant reduction in rates will go to every household in Ontario with no asterisks, loop holes or exceptions. And your bill won't increase beyond inflation for at least four years.

I don't have to tell you why this is needed. I have heard from people across our province struggling to deal with bills that have gone up too much and too quickly. Household budgets are stretched. Something

What I want to share is how we got to this point, how we're fundamentally restructuring the system to give you the biggest rate cut in Ontario history, and why you can be certain that this change is going to

For a long time, Ontario enjoyed one of the best electricity systems around. But for decades, governments of all stripes stopped investing. About 15 years ago, those quick-fixes caught up with us. Brownouts, blackouts and dirty coal plants were a danger to our health, our environment and our economy.

So, we closed all of Ontario's coal plants, built new transmission lines and invested in renewable energy. We now have a clean, reliable system that is going to benefit us for decades. But that came at a price. And the terms we set to finance these necessary renovations weren't

In effect, we put the \$50 billion cost of the rebuild onto the hydro bills of just one generation. That was a mistake. It meant high bills because you were paying for past neglect and subsidizing ratepayers who will benefit from these energy assets for years to come. By stretching those costs out over a timeframe that better reflects the lifespan of the assets

we're paying for, we can lower everyone's bills today and keep them from jumping back up. That's the fairer way forward.

We have also been asking ratepayers to pay for things that should really be part of the province's budget. Our program to help lowincome families afford hydro is one example.

But I want to highlight the Rural or Remote Rate Protection Program (RRRP). The RRRP helps subsidize the high cost of delivering electricity to 350,000 rural residential customers. We're taking the cost of the program off bills and enhancing it so that now about 800,000 homes will qualify for lower delivery charges.

Hydro is a necessity. But for many of us living in the North, high delivery charges were leading to impossible choices between groceries, rent or electricity. That's not right. With this change, everyone in Ontario is going to be paying roughly the same in delivery charges. Again, it comes down to fairness.

As you can imagine, these huge and lasting structural fixes do come with a cost. We can afford it because of Ontario's strengthening economy, which is the fastest growing in Canada. After a decade of deficits, the provincial budget will be balanced this year. Our recovery is on track, but it hasn't been evenly shared. Many families I speak to, whether in Sudbury or Timmins or Sault Ste. Marie tell me they aren't any better off than they were before the recession. It is why our team is determined to make sure growth in our economy means more opportunity and security for people in our community and all across Ontario. Using the province's newfound fiscal strength to give everyone the break they need on their hydro bills is the right thing to do for the province and the fair thing to do for your family.

Supply management in the dairy industry has passed its due date

Thoughts from a neither harmless nor useless character

To the Expositor:

This is a response to the editorial of March 1, 'Don't throw the baby out with the milk quota.' The industry data quoted are principally from a series of articles written by Martha Hall Findlay, University of Calgary, School of Public Policy. She is a former Liberal MP. There are a number of important issues mentioned in the editorial and I would like to deal with them individually.

Supply management (SM) assures food supply quality: dairy, poultry, and eggs are the only segment of Canada's food production that are controlled by supply management (SM). This segment is six percent of the food industry. Food quality is managed with regulation, food labelling and food inspection. it should be evident that these methods can be effective regardless of the food product.

Customers pay "slightly more" as a result of SM: SM costs the average family \$300 per year. For a family with a modest income, this is significant. Canadian import tariffs for eggs, 168 percent; chicken, 238 percent; cheese, 246 percent; butter, and 300 percent. Without these tariffs, the costs for butter could be reduced by about half.

SM Protects the Dairy Industry: In 1971, there were 145,000 producers in Canada. There are now 12,000. This statistic should indicate clearly that SM has done very little to ensure that small famers will thrive. Not only has this not happened, but industries that rely on dairy for raw product are also negatively impacted. It is very difficult for cheese manufactures to be competitive when milk costs are prohibitive. Not only is the cost of milk high but cheese makers also have a very difficult time expanding due to restrictions in supply.

Ideology trumps sound economic sense? Not good when this happens as all would agree. It is SM that ought to be painted as Ideology, not sound economic analysis indicating that SM is not good for a nations'

In any discussion of this sort, it is always useful to look for examples in the world economy where some useful comparisons might help to support proposed policy. India has been an interesting story with the way it's economy has improved following the removal of many tariffs

but an even more salient example for comparison is New Zealand. Following WW2, NZ was a major supplier of dairy products to the UK. The NZ industry was then protected until the late '70s when a number of events placed the dairy producers under severe economic stress. Chief among these outside forces was the UK joining the EU. At that time trade restrictions for dairy products in NZ were removed and as eco nomic theory predicted, the industry in NZ thrived. Ninety-five percent of the industry product is exported and at the same time, butter in NZ sells for half of the price experienced in Canada. Producer Subsidy Equivalent (PSE) is an index used to gauge how much an industry is subsidized. A number that is certainly used during any trade negotiations. Not surprisingly, Canada is at 15 percent, NZ is one percent.

It is also interesting to note that the Dairy Farmers of Canada association spends about \$80 to \$100 million dollars trying to convince politicians and the general public that SM is a really good deal. It might have been 50 years ago, now, not so much.

Having said all this, there may well be a sound argument for subsidizing small family farms and I would certainly like to think that we could do this. However, it should be done by direct subsidy for two reasons. First, agri-business interests would not qualify for any subsidy, and secondly, the subsidy would be paid by taxpayers and not by families with modest incomes.

Finally, an aside for Lyle Dewar. Do not presume to assign hate as a motive for my criticism of the federal and provincial governments. You don't know me, you know nothing about me. People across Ontario caught the attention of the government regarding out of control power rates. This is how a democratic government is supposed to work. I close with a quote from Pericles 461 BC to 429 BC. Among his many accomplishments, he was responsible for building the iconic Parthenon and he also transformed the character of Athenian democracy. He had this to say about participation, "Athenian citizens regard a man who takes no interest in public affairs not as a harmless, but a useless character."

Manitoulin in 1867 Part II: The town of Little Current in 1867

EDITOR'S NOTE: In the first edition of The Manitoulin Expositor for 2017, Shelley Pearen provided Expositor readers with a glimpse of Manitoulin in 1867. She summarized Manitoulin's history and described a typical New Years. On January 18, 2017, she described the resettlement of the Anishinaabeg occurring in 1867. Today she shares 19th century descriptions of Little Current. by Shelley Pearen

ittle Current, called Wewebijiwang by its Anishinaabeg residents, Petit Courant by French traders, and Shaftesbury by the post office, was an active Anishinaabe settlement in the early 19th century. The Hudson Bay Company's La Cloche post records, which survive from 1827, indicate that their traders regularly visited Petit Courant for maple sugar, fish and skins.

La Cloche post traders also visited Sheshegwaning, Point aux Erables (Maple Point) and Sheguiandah but it was Little Current's unique location that made it desirable not only for Anishinaabe entrepreneurs, but also traders, government officials and settlers in the mid-19th century.

By the 1850s, Anishinaabe families at Little Current sold wood and supplies to the steamboats travelling east and west. The Obetossaway (or Ahbedosswey) family were well-known for selling fuel wood and providing short term accommodation to travellers

An 1860 census for "Wyabegwong," population 52, included the Eshkewahbic, Ahbetosowai, Eshkemah, Mocataibin, Cahcahkewai, Shokan, Manitahben, Sahquaibeness, Bob Mocataibin and George Obbetosoway families. They grew corn, potatoes, oats, peas, beans, and squash; raised horses, milk cows, oxen, pigs, and fowls; owned 130 fish barrels and 4 mackinaw boats; and produced a large quantity of maple syrup. Clearly it was a vibrant fishing and trading community.

Though three Little Current residents were persuaded to sign the 1862 treaty, they were clearly not told that the treaty meant that they and their neighbours would be relocated. The Manitoulin Treaty of 1862 stipulated that Anishinaabe residents could not select or remain on potential harbours, town sites or mill sites. Little Current included all three prohibitions.

An 1864 census of Little Current by Rev. Jabez Sims listed the George Ahbedosswey, Henry Eshkemah, James Columbus, Manitwahssen, Ohbwinwawaajewunookwa, James Sac, Oogemah, John Mukkudabin, Robt. Black, Minegwud, Kitty Ahbedosswey, Wm. McGraw, Charles (Cooper) Kahgahgeway, Cooper's son in law, Peter Metahbe, and Shewetabgun families. Sims estimated the population at 79 or 16 families.

That same year, surveyor Alexander Niven reported that nine families or 52 people, lived at Little Current who "subsist chiefly by fishing, growing Indian corn and potatoes, and making maple sugar." Niven was clearly focused on surveying lots and not on counting residents.

In 1865 Sims listed: G Ahbedosswey, McGraw, Columbus, Oogemah, Mukkuhdabin, Kahgahgeway, Minegwud, Metahbe, Ishkemah, Sacquabunesse, Manitowaussen, and Kitty Ahbedossway as Anishinaabe residents of Little Current, all members of the Anglican mission. He also noted that four non-Native families were living there.

In October1865 Charles Dupont, the Indian Department's agent responsible for



resettling Anishinaabe according to the terms of the treaty, reported that there were eight Anishinaabe families living at Little Current who wanted to settle immediately in the rear of the village.

On December 31, 1866 Rev. Sims reported that a few poor settlers who had located on some government land, in or near Little Current, that a store or two were in existence in the village, and "that worst of all adjuncts —a tavern." Six months later, in mid-1867, he noted that 15 settlers had come to the Island.

In March 1867, Superintendent Dupont described Shaftesbury as containing Thomas Dodd's store and wharf, James Phipps agent and wharf, John McClarty's house and proposed wharf, David Moor Smiley's large wharf and building under construction.

Rev. Sims, who had settled at Manitowaning in 1864, witnessed the transition of Little Current from an entrepreneurial Indian settlement to a non-Native settlement. In 1867 its original Anishinaabe fishermen and wood suppliers were being relocated to the new Sucker Creek Reserve. Non-Native traders quickly took over the lucrative steamboat trade. Sims expressed his concern: "The settlement of the Island by the whites has operated very much against the interests of the Indians."

An 1868 census of the Little Current Anishinaabeg, recently relocated to Sucker Creek, listed the Ooshkewahbik (2nd chief), Wahsahgezhik (2nd chief), Shewetahgun, Medahbe, M'grahShoken, Mukuhdaben, Kahgahgeway, Sacquabuness, Eshkemah, Cath. Qwewis, and James Barr families, population 62.

Sims made a list of non-Native settlers in 1868, with their date of settlement. For Little Current he listed the following families: G.B. Abrey 1868, John Burkitt 1862 (left), E. Johnston 1866 (left), J. McClarty 1866 (left), D. Mckenzie 1865, D.M. Smiley 1866, J. Burnett 1866, Taylor 1866 (left), Dodds 1865, Miller 1868, Brodie 1866 (drowned), Bryan Mackey 1866, Abraham Johnson 1868, Wm. Sullivan 1865, and George Burkitt.

Sims' list for Howland Township included: Abraham White 1868, John Atkinson 1866, S. McLean 1866, Wm. Dempsey 1866, H.C. Fraser 1864, Humphrey May 1860, Griffiths 1868, David Lewis 1866, Nelder 1868, Nicholson 1868, Oliver 1867, John Douglas 1867, Ferguson 1867 (left), and Boday 1865. In addition, he listed John Dunlop 1866 in Bidwell, Philip May 1830 at Wallace Mine, R. McKenzie 1866 La Cloche, 20 English at the mill at Michael's Bay 1867,

and the Indian Department's surgeon T. Simpson, superintendent Wm. Plummer and clerk McGregor Ironside at Manitowaning.

Ontario Land Surveyor T.J. Patten, who described himself as a resident of Little Current since 1867, wrote an article entitled "The Early Beginnings of Little Current" that was printed in the magazine Mer Douce in June 1923. The following extract is from Mr. Patten's account.

"In 1865 my brother-in-law, George B. Abrey, Dominion Land Surveyor, came to the Manitoulin to survey townships for the Indian Department. He came in a small schooner with his party from Hamilton, and the passage occupied about six weeks. My sister, Mrs. Abrey, and her two little girls, one is Mrs. Stuart Jenkins of McGregor Bay, followed the next year and wintered at Little Current in the small log house which is shown in the corner of the stockade on the side of the hill, to the left. in the picture. Shortly after they bought the dwelling which had been built by the Hudson's Bay Company, and lived in it until they removed to Toronto in 1882. Mr. C.L.D. Sims a few years ago bought the property and remodelled the dwelling. A portion of the old dwelling is shown behind the large store in the centre of the picture.

"The writer came to Little Current in 1870 to live with the Abreys. At that time there were only about five or six white families in the village, and a few Indians. Humphrey May, the first white child born on the Manitoulin and still living here, hale and hearty, had been settled here a few years, also William McKenzie, whose father, Donald McKenzie, was lightkeeper for many years. George P. Burkitt, Donald McKenzie's son-in-law, had kept a store. He was later Captain of the Waubano, on which he was lost, with all hands, in November, 1879. Capt. Burkitt's father, was some years previous to 1870 in charge of the Anglican Church Mission here. The late Rev. J. W. Sims had been in charge of the Anglican Mission of Sheguiandah.'

William Griffiths, Mrs. William McKenzie's father, kept a hotel. Bryan Mackie, Mrs. Brydon's father, also kept a hotel, and David Miller, J.P., kept a general store, and had a shop license to sell liquor. Mr. Abrey had completed the surveys allotted to him, and had bought a general store which included a shop license. The late Warren R. Abrey, Registrar, was subsequently a partner, and were known as Abrey Bros. Quite a contrast to present conditions under the Canada Temperance Act which has been in

force on the Manitoulin since 1913.

There were a few settlers in the adjoining townships. The land had only recently been in the market for sale. The surrounding country was mostly dreary and uninviting owing to the terrible fires which swept over the Island.

As in all new settlements law and order was disregarded somewhat. As an instance, the first school section on the Island had just been organized, and a Mr. Tom Reid was engaged to teach. Tom was a character, of the good-hearted, jovial rollicking type, and had served in the Confederate army. Like a certain writer's definition of a boarding house landlady, he was equal to anything. He boarded at the Mackie hostelry. In addition to his hotel business, Mackie, who was also a school trustee, had built a small saloon on the steamboat dock, thinking of course to better serve the travelling public and enhance his income as well. When the steamboat whistle blew, Tom would immediately dismiss school and go down to the wharf and tend bar, and sometimes did not return to school that day. Of course, those conditions did not endure long. The saloon building was moved to the south side of Campbell Street, near Mrs. Maltas' dwelling, where it stood until recently, and was known to old timers as the "Bummer's Roost."

During church service also, when the steamboat whistle blew, it was customary for the congregation to rush down to the wharf without waiting for any benediction.

The first colonization road on the Island, from Little Current to Manitowaning, had been recently built. It is now known as the old road. The new, or lower road, is the one which is nearer to the lake shore and goes through the Ten Mile Point settlement.

In winter the mails came from Penetanguishene, and later from Parry Sound, also from the Sault, and were exchanged here. In spring and fall it was not unusual for them to be as much as two or three weeks overdue, particularly the one from Penetanguishene. One from there never came. One courier and the dogs and mail drifted on the loose ice into Georgian Bay and were never seen again.

Shelley Pearen has been researching Manitoulin history for 40 years. Her ancestors included Rev. Sims and D. McKenzie. She is the author of the popular books 'Four Voices The Great Manitoulin Island Treaty of 1862' and 'Exploring Manitoulin.' Shelley is currently transcribing and translating the Jesuit's Wikwemikong Diarium 1844-1873.

Many questions and few answers in land purchase

To the mayor and council of Billings Township

Re: Need to communicate to taxpayers how recent tax

arrears purchase fits into plans
Earlier this month, council outbid a number of other bidders for approximately 80 acres of land above the Kagawong River. The price was \$95,000. On the surface, this may appear to be out of the blue. I suspect the clerk/treasurer had three years to see this opportunity maturing (tax sales usually take place after arrears have built up over three years) – though it doesn't seem to be reflected in any Waterfront Plan, Sustainability Plan etc. that I have seen.

As council prepares an interim budget, will this large extraordinary expenditure be factored into 2017 operating budget, or is there some general purpose reserve in place to cover it? In fact, is the \$95,000 a real outflow, or does it go out in one line item and flow back as revenue in another (less of course the actual tax arrears that will never now be collected)?

In reports in the Recorder, councillors offered up suggestions—we need a new firehall, library, town offices. Do these show in the current Sustainability Plan—or will they in the updated plan due this year?

Was this surprise acquisition simply going after the latest bright shiny object, or does council have some plan to build a Civic Centre up on top of the bluff? But wait, this land is effectively inaccessible. How much might be budgeted for access roads, provision of services etc. up there?

Lots of questions, very little to date in communication from council. Maybe time for an official statement to be issued where council's thinking is going on this.

Nairn Centre crash claims two lives

On March 10 at approximately 3:45 pm, members from the Espanola/Sudbury Detachments of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), the Nairn-Hyman Fire Department and the Greater Sudbury Fire Department as well as the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board Emergency Medical Services (EMS), responded to a two vehicle collision on Highway 17 east of Nairn Centre.

The driver of the pick-up truck, 32-year-old Christopher Brule of Webbwood, was pronounced dead at the scene. One of the passengers in the pickup truck, nine-day-old Trystan Brule of Webbwood, has also died as a result of his injuries. A second passenger of the pickup truck, 32-year-old Ashley-Carole Richer of Webbwood, remains in hospital where she is being treated for serious injuries. The driver of the 10 ton truck, 62-year-old Claude Laforest of Sudbury, was also transported to hospital and has since been released.

The collision remains under investigation and further information will be provided as it becomes available.

Man charged with threatening in domestic disturbance

In the late evening of March 6, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) received a 911 call from a witness reporting a disturbance at a residence in Gordon Township.

Police attended the scene and a man was arrested following an investigation. No injuries were reported to any of the involved parties.

A 35-year-old Gordon Township man has been charged with uttering threats to cause bodily harm or death, contrary to section 264.1(1)(a) of the Criminal Code of Canada.

Northeast Town Council Notes

New trackless

Council passed a motion authorizing town staff to spend up to \$14,000 to purchase a trackless for the public works department when one within that price range comes on the market.

Annual water system report

Mr. Williamson reviewed the Little Current and Sheguiandah Water Treatment reports with council.

Mr. Williamson noted that overall, operations were going well at both sites.

Council carried motions to accept both reports.

Jailhouse laneway

The Manitoulin Sea Cadets sent a letter to council requesting that the laneway at the old jailhouse in Little Current, which is used as the office space for the Manitoulin Sea Cadets, be plowed by town staff.

Mr. Williamson explained that the lease agreement between the town and Manitoulin Sea Cadets specifies that the Sea Cadets are responsible for the care of the property, which would include the clearing of the laneway.

The letter noted that the laneway had been cleared by town staff in the past. Mr. Williamson noted that if this had been done, it was not authorized by the municipality.

Council asked staff to contact the Sea Cadets and "correct the misunderstanding."

Manitoulin Trade Fair

Council reviewed a letter from the Manitoulin Trade Fair 2017 requesting the town to sponsor the event.

Responding to inquiries from council, Mr. Williamson explained that town staff does a number of tasks to help with the preparation of the Trade Fair.

Council decided not to sponsor the event with a monetary donation in lieu of town staff helping with the preparation of the Trade Fair and various elements during the event at the Little Current Recreation Centre.

Military Service Recognition Book

A request came to council for the municipality to purchase an advertisement in the Royal Canadian Legion's Military Service Recognition Book.

Mr. Williamson told council that staff had the funds set aside in its advertising budget to purchase the advertisement, opposed to council making a donation. Council deferred the matter back to town staff.

Accounts receivable

Town Treasurer Sheryl Wilkin walked council through the accounts receivable reports for water/sewer and taxes.

For water/sewer, Ms. Wilkin reported \$215,454.20 made in payments in February. She noted that there were currently 18 accounts over the \$400 limit. Of the 18 accounts, two had been disconnects, four were over the limit due to penalty added for February, in seven cases financial arrangements had been made and five accounts will be receiving letters of disconnection.

For taxes, there were \$1,285,442.31 made in payments in February.

She noted that the next due date for taxes was on April 28.

Library bylaw

Council reviewed proposed bylaw (2017-13), the Establishment of a Library. Mayor Al MacNevin explained that the town may have had a bylaw from when the library was originally established, but that staff was unable to find it and that it would have been from pre-amalgamation (between Howland and Little Current). Council reviewed a draft bylaw prepared by staff and discussed several changes. Mayor MacNevin noted that he will be taking the draft bylaw to the library board for their feedback prior to it returning to the council table for final input and passing.

On March 7, members of the Manifoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) received a complaint of a domestic disturbance at a residence in Carnarvon Township.

Following the investigation, police arrested a 46-year-old Carnarvon Township man. He has been charged with three counts of assault, contrary to section 266 of the Criminal Code of Canada, and one count of mischief under \$5,000, contrary to section 430(4) of the Criminal Code of Canada.

The male has been remanded into custody pending a bail hearing in the Ontario Court of Justice on March 10 in Gore Bay.

Shoplifters arrested at Espanola grocery store

Since February 19, the Espanola Police Service have responded to three separate shoplifting occurrences at an Espanola grocery store, charging four individuals with theft under \$5,000.

On February 19 at 4:10 pm, a 38-year old male and 35-year old female, both of Wikwemikong, were arrested by a staff member at the grocery store after they exited without paying for \$400 in sundry items that they'd attempted to conceal in two reusable shopping bags. Upon police arrival, the pair were charged with theft under \$5,000 and will appear in Espanola Court on April 10.

On February 24 at 2:20 pm, the Espanola Police Service received a complaint from a local grocery store advising

that a male patron had just been caught shoplifting food items valued at \$72. Police attended and charged the 27-year-old resident of Espanola with one count of theft under \$5,000. He will appear in Espanola Court on April 10.

On March 3 at 2:30 pm, the Espanola Police Service responded to another

complaint of a shoplifter, and upon arrival, discovered that a 38-year-old female from Espanola had attempted to steal \$85 in sundry items from the store. She was charged with one count of theft under \$5,000 and will appear in Espanola Court on April 10.

In addition to receiving a criminal charge, which could result in a criminal record, the four individuals were also trespassed from entering any grocery store, associated to the grocery store chain.

Due to a rise in these related occurrences, the UCCM Police decided to take a pro-active approach towards violence prevention, domestic violence, and being a good neighbour was the first presentation offered. The next two topics offered will be on sexual assault and bullying/lateral violence.

The UCCM. Police were very pleased with the turnout at the Lunch and Learns and encourage the members of the UCCMM. Communities to be on the lookout for posters and flyers for the next series of dates and locations.



the work competed by the summer, August," Mr. Mauder concluded.

MSD Technical Services (a Little Current company) in partnership with Vianet will also be building a new tower on Manitoulin and expanding Internet services to the Lit-

tle Current area.

This is a project we have been working on for a number of years," said MSD owner Craig Timmermans. "I was in Toronto last week meeting with the tower manufacturer. We are partnering with Vianet to put up a new 500-foot tower on our property on McLean's Mountain.'

"The new tower will be a multi-fold project increasing connectivity to people on Manitoulin through enhanced Internet services," added Mr. Timmermans. "It will allow Vianet and MSD extended reach—allowing the service to be available to more Island residents. It will also provide a backup link. Currently, a lot of customers are fed (Internet) through fiber, but it goes down often on Manitoulin. With the tower, it will also provide better reliability and better speeds for Vianet and MSD customers."

Mr. Timmermans said that he and Vianet are currently working with an engineer on the design of the tower, with the tower to be operational by September/October of this

year.
"The tower will also drastically increase the broadcast range for Country 103 and Glow 100.7," said Mr. Timmermans, who also owns the stations along with his wife Kelly Timmermans. "We are anticipating the range will be 15 hours of drive time on the Trans-Canada Highway. We will be able to reach Parry Sound to Sudbury and down the Bruce Peninsula to Port Elgin."

"Because of soaring energy rates, we are also looking at the possibility of going off the grid with the new tower," he

charges, along with the other reductions announced generally, will have a positive impact on First Nation communities across the province. "It's going to be a big help to our communities for sure," he said. "Some of the communities are really struggling. Every little bit helps.'

Under the plan an across-the-board relief of 17 percent is coming this way by this summer, in addition to an eight percent rebate that took effect on January 1. Those changes are estimated to cost about \$1 billion per year.

Several other measures were announced by the premier to help lowincome and rural residents at a cost of \$2.5 billion over three years. A program that gives a rate subsidy to those customers in rural and remote areas will also be expanded, so that ratepayers covered by local distribution companies with the highest delivery charges may also see their rates cut.

The Ontario Electricity Support Program for low-income ratepayers

will be funded through government revenues and the benefits are being increased. A household that qualifies for the smallest credit, a single person earning less than \$28,000, will soon save \$45 a month instead of \$30.

The province is also establishing an affordability fund for electricity customers who don't qualify for lowincome conservation programs to make energy efficiency improve-

"How can I when we see that plans were being made to spend a million dollars on a soccer dome and we have 12 schools that are looking at closure?" he asked. The soccer dome issue prefaced the resignation of a school board trustee for which the board is now seeking a replacement.

"I have problems with how that is being done as well," he said. "I didn't receive the package (of resumes of the 13 candidates that have put their names forward to fill the vacancy) until Friday, right before the March break. The board meeting to decide on the matter is the day after March break is over. Many of the candidates are away for the break with their families."

Mr. Killens notes that since the trustees will only be dealing with the resumes of the candidates and not meeting each face-to-face, the decision will be challenging. "Add to that the discussions will be taking place in-camera, and according to board policy you can't take notes," he said. "With that many candidates, how can you keep track properly?" adding "I am getting older."

Mr. Killens said that he intends to continue to challenge the board whenever the proper procedures and processes are not being followed. "If you don't clean and process the fish properly, don't bother going fishing in the first place," he said. "You will just wind up throwing the whole thing out. If you don't do it right it will fall apart later. I will object to anything that goes about, if it is not done properly."

Mr. Killens said that his interest is first and foremost the children. "If nobody is standing up and making noise, who is going to look after the kids?" he said. "I am going to bring things to the table, even if they are unpopular deci-

enhancing this year's fireworks and new entertainment for the 12-16 age group."

Manitoulin Country Fest, August 10-12 in Little Current, has been given \$100,000 in funding through the program, while the Elemental Festival 3, September 28 to October 1, hosted by the 4elements Living Arts in Kagawong, has been given \$10,325.

"The Elemental Festival is a multi-day outdoor event that brings together artists, both local and visiting, and community members to engage with and enliven the local landscape," explained 4elements Curator and Cultural Programs Coordinator. "It marks a very special year for the festival: not only is it 4elements' 15th anniversary, but it will mark the unveiling of the Billings Art and Heritage Trail, which is being built over the next year. The trail will see an additional seven permanent public artworks and 40 heritage plaques installed across Billings Township, including one sculpture which will be collaboratively designed by local community members. The trail is supported by a generous grant from Canada 150 funding."

"Both the trail and the festival aim to make space for conversations about land, land-use history and reconciliation to occur and to make more visible multiple historical narratives," added Ms. Mader. "Participating artists have been asked to respond to the historical context of Billings, thinking about the role of creativity in imagining a new way forward; 'learning from the past, creating a shared future.' The weekend will have live music including Melody McIver and Nick Sherman, workshops, the unveiling of the permanent works as well as artists creating nonpermanent works along the river. The Elemental Festival is supported by multiple funders this year including grants from Celebrate Ontario, the Ontario Arts Council, and the Ontario 150 fund. Without the support of these funders, a cultural gathering of this kind, with such a diverse group of high quality artists participating alongside community members and tourists, would never be possible. We kindly thank them all.'

"We are thrilled that we were chosen to receive funding," said Country Fest organizer Kelly Timmermans. "We will be using the funds for some venue enhancements such as a video wall and fencing. It will also help offset some of our artists cost."

This year's line up so far includes two-time Grammy Award winner Dwight Yoakam and Joe Nichols, along with Michelle Wright, Corb Lund, Washboard Union, Crystal Shawanda, Meghan Patrick, Chris Buck Band, Western Swing Authority, The Lovelocks, David James, The Abrams, Nicole Rayy, Mikaila Cooper and Jessica Pearson and The East Wind.

Ontario is supporting a record number of festivals and events this year, 304, to showcase the province as a vibrant place to live and visit during Ontario's 150th anniversary.



Mr. Killens suggested that his candor may lead to further censure for himself. "They have told me not to talk to the press," he said. "I am not speaking on behalf of the board, I am speaking on behalf of the people who elected me. I asked them to tell me where it says that I am not allowed to speak to the press. Nobody has shown me where in the Act it says that."

"FirstTel would like to take this opportunity to thank Nickel Belt MP Marc Serré, Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada, chief and council of Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory, Ogimaa Duke Peltier and the Board of Directors of Enaadmaagejik Development Commission, for their commitment in providing alternative telecommunications Internet broadband service to residents in the village of the Wiikwemkoong Unced-

ed Territory.' Ms. Sandford went on to explain that "four years ago, a seed was planted with KNET, Penny Carpenter for the expansion of broadband services in Wiikwemkoong with the announcement of the Connecting Canadians Program Funding. FirstTel was able to use a network of partnerships to facilitate the construction of the wireless broadband with the help of Brian Walters and Irwin Heshka of Wire IE Holdings International inc. to allow First lei to provide an Internet service within the community with a target of 200 households. FirstTel Communication's project team included: Anne Marie Sandford, Communications Business Manager; Joseph Corbiere, Finance Officer and Rachel Cooper,

Customer Service Representative and representatives from Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory, Wiikwemkoong High School, KNET, Wire IE International Holdings and Wiik-Enaadmaagejik wemkoong Development Commission.

"Since its incorporation in 2003, FirstTel has been on the leading edge in providing cost-effective alternative telecommunications throughout Ontario for First Nations," continued Ms. Sandford. "With the funding from the Connecting Canadians Program, FirstTel will facilitate growth and improve the competitiveness of the existing services. anticipate success in implementing this alternative broadband telecommunications service to increase the opportunities for wealth, opportunity and quality of life for the community.

Ms. Sandford noted that Wiikwemkoong has been underserved in terms of access to high-speed Internet based on the current technology deployed in the community. "There are a number of areas within the community that either had no service or very limited bandwidth," she said. "The Connecting Canadians funding has provided FirstTel Communications Corporation the ability to offer an enhanced Internet service with minimum speeds of five Mbps to an area which includes the main Wiikwemkoong community as well as coverage within five kilometres of the new network."

Ms. Sandford said that the first phase of the new wireless broadband network will incorporate both a new fiber build from Wiikwemkoong High School to the community's water tower—which is the main distribution point for the wireless network—as well as a new wireless link to the Cape Smith tower owned by the community.

"From these two towers wireless access points will provide high speed wireless Internet to residents, community locations and businesses within a fivekilometre radius of the towers," said Ms. Sandford. "This same infrastructure will be used to provide more reliable connectivity to two of the schools and several community locations which currently use unlicenced wireless links. The test subscriber locations deployed are experiencing dramatically higher speeds (burst in excess of 50 Mbps) versus their current low speed connections. FirstTel is the ISP offering these services to residents, businesses and other community locations and will be testing other value added services prior to launch which are planned to be offered to customers on the new network. FirstTel's basic service package is five Mbps with a premium package offering speeds up to 20Mbps plus."

Ms. Sandford concluded her remarks with acknowledgements of FirstTel's partners in the project. "FirstTel partnered with and would like to thank the businesses that provided support and equipment such as Enaadmaagejik Wiikwemkoong Development Commission, KNET, Wire IE Holdings International Inc., Wiikwemkoong High School, the Wiikwemkoong Water Treat-Facility, ment Wiik-Unceded wemkoong Territory, Eastlink, Hydro One, JJ Pole Lines, Stantec, Greenstick Interactive, Thompson Electric, Anixter Alliance Cornora tion," she said. "Again a very special thank you to everyone who worked very hard to put this exciting opportunity together."

WIIKWEMKOONG—Smiles were broad as First Nations health officials and representatives of Telus Health gathered at the Wiikwemkoong Health Centre for the launch of a electronic health records program that offers to revolutionize health delivery to residents of Wiikwemkoong and, as the program extends to more First Nations, other communities as well.

Michael McGregor, Giiwednong Health Link digital health program manager, acted as master of ceremonies for the event and introduced local drum group High Eagle Singers who performed a welcoming song.

An opening invocation was given by Wiikwemkoong elder Rita Corbiere.

Mr. McGregor explained that the "Giiwednong Health Link (GHL) is a health and information management collaboration between the Manitoulin Island and North Shore First Nation health organizations. GHL is focused on planning for and implementing electronic medical records

...continued from page 1 the matching boot, something clicked.

"I have a photographic memory," she told this reporter.

Ms. Moggy believes she was able to track down the person who took the hay, which she said accounted for about 100 bales. Ms. Moggy, who keeps meticulous records of the family's hay sales, says there could be as many as 500 bales unaccounted for. She believes now this was only the latest in a series of hay heists from her family's farm this winter.

Ms. Moggy said the missing hay is "definitely related" to the poor hay crop of last summer when months

of no rain meant a stunted harvest. The Moggys recognized the need for square bales early on and, only needing about 600 bales for the family's horses, put the hay on the market as they often do.

"We've had customers from all over—Beaver Lake, Goderich—desperate for hay," she said. "We knew early on in the year there was a limited amount so we decided to sell."

"We've had a number of calls just this past month," Ms. Moggy added, "and have had to turn people away."

Ms. Moggy said they have decided to not sell any more hay as they have customers who have orders that still need to be filled. "We may not be able to fill those obligations now," she added.

"Our hay sales cover our mortgage—we count on that." she continued. "It's a

disappointment, but we're used to living on a tight budget, so we will get by."

Ms. Moggy said the security is now tight on the property. "We're not taking chances now."

Ms. Moggy said she can understand why the hay went missing, but said she'd never do something like that herself.

"When you're responsible for an animal's wellbeing...it's a desperate place to be," she said.

Brian Bell, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) ag rep, told The Expositor that he is aware of some beef producers who are trying to source hay for the next couple of months before their livestock can graze on pasture. "Some have very tight hay supplies and some are okay," he said.

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Wikwemikong's robotic team is rocking the STEM challenge

wilk wemkoong—Starting out three years ago with little more than a handful of borrowed tools and a box full of donated gears and motors, but steeled with plenty of dogged determination, Wikwemikong First Robotics Team 5672 quickly grew into a force to be reckoned with. This year, thanks in part to support from Microsoft, the team is competing in two of the 2017 First Robotics Competition events.

One thing that makes the Wikwemikong team unique among its colleagues is that each of its components is led by a female team member.

This year's team, which has a large complement of rookie members on its roster, has just completed the first of those events hosted at Durham College's

Oshawa campus. Held from March 3 to 5 the 2017 First Robotics Competition Ontario District event attracted more than 1,000 students on 41 teams.

This year's team is composed of Trinity Jacko, Angel Peltier, Alex Desmoulin, Jason Mishibinijima, Annie Wemigwans, Reynold Assiniwe, Tim Pitawanakwat, D.J. Maiangowi, David Jackson, Mikaila Dokum-Trudeau, Eileen Letander-Trudeau, Geordan Lewis, Amber Smith and Grey Neganegi-

jig.

FIRST is an acronym denoting "For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology."

This year's games, in which robotic creations compete for top honours by demonstrating their engineering skills and knowledge through their robotic surrogate, is a steampunk inspired series of challenges that centre on launching a steam-powered airship.

"There were three main tasks that had to be com-

pleted, noted wemikong High School teacher Chris Mara, the team's coach. machine, which operates autonomously to complete its tasks through pre-programming and sensors, had to collect a set of fiveand-a-half inch wiffle balls (aka steam), fire those balls into a bin to provide the "steam pressure" lift and deliver a set of gears to a human assembler, who prepared the steampunk vessel for liftoff, and even climb aboard via a rope. As the gears are put in place, they engage rotors on the steamship, with four rotors spinning, the craft is considered airborne.

The team placed 32 in the

elimination round, although their position seesawed up and down the rankings throughout the competition. "Of the teams

The team's creation was a good all-round competitor, but other teams specialized more in the single aspect of delivering gears to the human assembler. The 5672 creation was a great climber, noted Mr. Mara. and it delivered a high volume of steam pressure.

"This has been a real learning experience," said Mr. Mara. "This is the first year that the robot operated in autonomous mode, without a human driver.

The teacher expressed great admiration for the dedication of his team. "The students spent hundreds of hours, spending their weekends 10 to 10 working on the project," he said. The result is a "new improved robot."

By the end of the compe-







Farm girl finds calling on globetrotting adventure

by Robin Burridge LITTLE CURRENT—When many of Alexandria (Ali) Cosby's friends headed off to college or university this past fall, Ali chose a different path—to take a 'gap' year and travel in pursuit of discovering her passion in life.

"I wasn't sure what I wanted to do with my life after graduation (from Manitoulin Secondary School)," shared 18-year-old Ali of Little Current. "Instead of just picking a university program and going in blind, I decided I would travel and attempt to find my life

Growing up on a farm, Ali has always had a passion for animals and decided to travel to Costa Rica and Thailand to work with wildlife rescue groups to see if she should transform her passion

'I started my trip in Northern Ireland, working at a hostel and surf shop," said Ali. "It wasn't animal related, but I wanted to learn about my family's history; we have ties to Ireland.

She said her experience in

Northern Ireland for two months was a good way to get her feet wet with travelling, coming out of her shell and meeting new people.

"I lived with a girl from the

Czech Republic and one from Holland," she said. "I met a lot of new people from all over the world and I learned how to surf."

From Northern Ireland, Ali

travelled to Costa Rica where she started her month-long trip living with a family and attending a Spanish language school.

"I spent a lot of my time in Costa Rica working at an animal rescue," she shared. "I lived and worked at the rescue and worked every day except once a week when we were given a day off. The rescue worked primarily with sloths, but we worked with other animals as well."

Ali rounded off her trip with a month in Thailand, working at an animal refuge.

"Two of the weeks I worked with just two elephants," Ali said. "It was an amazing experience."

Ali worked with two elderly elephants, 60-year-old Choke-dee and

65-year-old Malai ngun.
"They were both severely abused from the logging industry," she explained. "They had back problems and bad arthritis. I would take them for walks and swimming to help them from seizing up, clean them and feed

them."
"I formed a close bond with
Malai ngun, who was blind in one eye," Ali continued. "She trusted me enough that I could walk on her blind side."

Ali said that her travels not only confirmed that she wants to pursue a career helping animals, but that she also learned a lot about herself and grew as a per-

"I was 17 when I started travelling," she said. "It was scary at first, but I discovered that I can do it. It was a big achievement for me—travelling, trying new things and meeting new people. I became really independent. I'm really proud of myself."

Ali has been accepted to the University of Guelph for zoology. She is hoping to continue her work helping animals between now and the fall, which she said could lead to even more globetrot-

ting.
"I love helping animals—working with my hands to make a difference," she concluded. "I hope after graduating (university) I can travel back to the organizations I worked with in Thailand and Costa Rica and continue to help.'

Veterinary student's passion will take her to Africa

HONORA BAY—Cassia Michel has known her goal for most of her life and for the past several years she has laid the paving stones in her path to becoming a veterinarian by working at the Honora Bay Riding Stables, volun-

teering with animal rescue centres, working on volunteer projects overseas and carefully selecting her courses at high school and university with an eye to that endgame. Ms. Michel grew up in Sudbury, but has spent nearly all of her summers on Manitoulin Island. The family cottages lies iust behind the Jansen farm.

This summer, Ms. Michel will be working at a Volunteers for Healthy Animals and Healthy Communities project in Uganda with Veterinarians Without Borders (VWB). Ms. Michel's presen-

tation focussed on the VWB project and the types of work she will be engaged in there before segueing into the mechanics of following her career path.

Ms. Michel noted that the African nation of Uganda has a population of around 38 million people. "So about the same population as Canada, but all living in a country about a quarter the size of Ontario," she said, noting that although about 1.5 million people live in the city of Kampala, "75.3 percent of the people make their living from agriculture and animal husbandry."

A big difference between Canada and Uganda lies in their rankings in the Human Development Scale. "Uganda ranks at 163 on the list, while Canada ranks around ninth." Life expectancy in the African country is 58.5 years.

Uganda is still suffering heavily from the HIV and AIDS pandemic that has swept that continent and there are about 1.5 million orphans, many of whom are now living in grandparent-led homes.

One of the programs Ms. Michel will be working on is the Goat Pass On, where a goat is supplied to a family, usually a woman, and as the goats are bred and the herd grows, the family gives a goat back to the program to be passed on to another family.

"We will be checking the goats for parasites, and doing bloodwork," she said.

As part of her contribution to her trip with Veterans Without Borders Ms. Michel is expected to fundraise \$2,000, basically a nominal amount, considering the cost of flights and accommodations. The volunteers will be living in a student-style residence in Kampala, three to four to an apartment, and travelling out to the rural communities.

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
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Never trust a falling tree

by Michael Erskine TEHKUMMAH—Trees are tricky. You can never take anything about felling one for granted. At any moment they can turn on you, even when you have done everything right—ask Tehkummah farmer John McNaughton.

Mr. McNaughton spent over six months recovering from a broken leg after finding himself pinned beneath the trunk of a tree he was felling.

"It wasn't even that big a tree," he said ruefully. "It was a poplar."

Mr. McNaughton has felled literally thousands of trees over the course of a life-

time spent on the farm. "This one got me," he said.

The farmer is a stickler for doing things right. He had scouted the site of the tree, walked around the trunk and the drop zone and ensured that he knew his escape routes should something go wrong. Nothing was left to chance, he thought. But it was winter, and lying beneath the surface of the snow something lurked to trip him up.

"In a way the snow helped to limit the damage," he agreed, helping to cushion the crushing blow that left him with a broken tibia and fibula. "But it was probably the



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

...continued from page 3A snow that stopped me from getting out of the way."


As the tree began to fall, the tree swung 90 degrees from the planned direction of fall. Mr. McNaughton's carefully planned egress came to nought as he found himself pinned beneath the tree, and like many experienced small farmers, he was working alone at the time. Luckily, despite the pain and blow from the tree, Mr. McNaughton remained conscious.

"I had my cell on me and I was able to call for help," he said.

He was to spend the next six months recovering from the accident before he could really return to work, and it was a year before things really began to approach the before accident state of normal. "The leg's doing good now," he said. "But it is still kind of sore."

Mr. McNaughton said he was immensely grateful to his wife Christine, who carried a large load while he was in recovery, keeping the farm on an even keel, as well as a host of friends and neighbours who in typical Island fashion stepped up to help. "I am very fortunate with friends and family helping out," he said.

As to advice he could offer from his experience, Mr. McNaughton paused before going on. "Never get complacent with safety pro-


cedures," he said. Having dealt with felling trees all his life, Mr. McNaughton felt confident he knew how the day would play out. But trees are tricky.

And a serious accident brings your preparedness in case of a workplace accident on a farm into sharp focus.

"I had some insurance," he recalled. "I thought I had enough." But most people's calculations of their needs tends to fall far short of reality and insurance doesn't cover everything. "It really doesn't," he agreed. "I had some EI (Employment Insurance) too, but that only goes for 15 weeks." Getting back on your feet from an accident involves more than just the physical mending—there is other rebuilding that has to take place as well.

take place as well.

As for the fate of the tricky poplar tree? "It wasn't a real big one, but it has all been chopped up into firewood now," said Mr. McNaughton.



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Sugar bush safety: take care to ensure a sweet maple syrup season

by Robin Burridge MANITOULIN—The maple syrup season is upon us, with many producers having already tapped their trees, waiting for the sweet

stuff to come dripping in.
While the sugar bush may seem like a safe environment, it can prove dangerous if producers don't take the necessary precautions to ensure their safety.

Todd Leuty with OMAFRA's orchard horticulture and forestry division explains in a Ontario Maple Syrup Production Report, "While working in the sugar bush, maple syrup producers should take all necessary safety precautions to ensure the risk of injury is minimized, such as: Have a daily plan to let family members

Agriculture-related injuries on the decline

CANADA—According to the latest Canadian Agricultural Injury Reporting (CAIR) information, agriculture-related fatalities are declining. CAIR is the only source of national agriculture-related fatality data in Canada.

From 1990 to 2001, an average of 116 people died due to an agriculture-related incident. From 2002 to 2012, the average number of agriculture-related fatalities declined to 85 per year. Also encouraging is the fatality rates of all age groups saw decreases in this period.

"The decrease in the fatality rates is encouraging," says Marcel Hacault, executive director of the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association (CASA). "It means that

we are moving in the right direction."

Between 2003 to 2012, farm machinery continued to be involved in most agriculture-related fatalities with runovers (18 percent), rollovers (18 percent) and being pinned or struck by a machine component (nine percent) accounting for the top three ways people were fatality injured.

Fatality rates due to rollovers and from being pinned/struck by a machinery component also declined. Rollover fatality rates decreased an average of 3.6 percent annually and fatality rates from being pinned/struck by a machinery component decreased an average of 7.8 percent annually.

"Tractors or other heavy equipment should have rollover protection and impact frames installed over the driver," explains Mr. Leuty. "Wear the seatbelt. Also, never work alone in the sugar bush, especially when using chainsaws. Have cell phones or a radio with you to call for help if necessary. If you need to call 911 in an emergency, know your exact address in advance."

Marion Fowler of Little Current shared a story with the paper of when her late cell phone or radio with you husband was injured in the sugar bush.

"Gerry was up at our camp in Maple Lake by himself when he got burned," said Ms. Fowler. "We were always careful up there, but this time he was transferring sap into the pan and burnt his hand. He said it happened quickly. He ran out and put it in the

Ms. Fowler said that Mr. Fowler was lucky enough to be able to drive himself to the hospital, but it was a bad situation. This story happened before the time of cellphones, but stresses the importance of having a

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





