The proposed settlement with the federal government will include everyone who attended a Federal Indian Day School. Com-

pensation will range from \$10,000 "harms associated with attending a Federal Indian Day

# Median age of workers very high across all sectors

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Island's workforce makes considerably less money and is far older than the District of Sudbury and the City of Greater Sudbury, something that could have major

impacts according to a report released last week by Workforce Planning for Sudbury and Mani-

toulin (WPSM).

"The proportion of older workers in (Manitoulin's) labour force is higher," states the report. "This may lead to significant problems down the not-too-distant road as there will not be enough people of working age without increasing migration and immigration into the district."

The report shows that across several employment sectors on Manitoulin, the amount of workers aged 55 and older ranges from a low of 43.8 percent of retail and wholesale trade managers to a staggering 100 percent of "general farm workers.'

WPSM executive director Reggie Caverson says the farming sector is likely split into two groups, with a second category of "managers in agriculture" having a

rate of 64.3 percent being older than 55. She suspects this catego-

ry includes one-person operations or the managers of family-run farms without formal employees-WPSM's data comes directly from Statistics Canada which sets its own category definitions.

For Sudbury District, the lowest proportion of 55+ workers is in carpentry, with a proportion of 36.4 percent. The district's highest proportion is 87.5 percent of its bus drivers and transit operators over that same age.

In the City of Greater Sudbury, 35 percent of property administrators are over 55 years old, its lowest proportion, and 66.7 percent of its railway and yard locomotive engineers are over 55, its highest percentage.

Across all job categories, 39.5 percent of workers in the City of Greater Sudbury are older than 55. Sudbury District follows closely behind at 41.7 percent. Manitoulin, however, has a median of 64.3 percent of its workers being older than 55.

"The aging population on Manitoulin Island is going to cause significant problems on several fronts. For one, if these businesses are employing other people,

# Central council seeks answers to who pays abandoned vehicles' costs

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—A vehicle left the highway and spun into a ditch during a recent snowstorm in Central Manitoulin and the driver made their way to a neighbouring house. What followed ended up prompting the

question-who is responsible for public safety when a vehicle is abandoned on a highway? Council passed a motion at its March 14 instructing CAO/Clerk to write a letter to the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) seeking clarification on that agency's roles and responsibilities regarding municipal roadways, especially regarding abandoned vehicles.

"It was a terrible night out, you couldn't see the road in front of you," recalled Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens of the night the incident occurred. "The vehicle went into the ditch up by Jim Gilpin's house. The driver went to one of the neighbours. It

# Island municipalities get word on OMPF funding

MANITOULIN—After a period of uncertainly, Manitoulin municipalities are breathing a sigh of relief as Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF) contributions were announced last week.

The Island municipal breakdowns are as follows: Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands, \$1,541,300 (\$1,510,800 in 2018); Assiginack, \$697,100 (\$709,500 in 2018); Tehkummah, \$369,900 (\$366,400 in 2018); Central Manitoulin, \$1,375,500 (\$1,373,300 in 2018); Billings, \$484,300 (\$468,400 in 2018); Gore Bay, \$464,300 (\$459,000 in 2018); Gordon/Barrie Island, \$621,000 (\$597,900 in 2018); and Burpee and Mills, \$295,100 (\$279,100 in 2018).

The OMPF is the province's main general assistance grant, primarily for Northern and rural municipalities.

It was initiated during the last Conservative regime, that of Premier Mike Harris and was at that time intended to assist municipalities, especially small rural ones, help finance downloaded services previously paid for by the province.

"For 2019, the government is maintaining the OMPF structure as it was in 2018, while allowing for annual data updates and related grant parameter adjustments, in keeping with the program's responsiveness to changing municipal circumstances," a note on the Ministry of Finance website states, leaving some municipal officials to worry about what shape the OMPF will take in the years to come.

TORONTO—Maja Mielonen and Guy Nielen, the driving forces behind Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) have just returned from an adventure to Ecuador and the Amazon, but before that had an encouraging annual trip to Toronto and the Toronto International Bicycle Show.

Each year, MICA hosts a booth at the bicycle show, helping to spread the good word about Manitoulin's cycle tourism and handing out 1,200 copies of the hot-off-the-press 2019 edition of This is Manitoulin magazine.

"It was a great show and we had a great response for our tours," Ms. Mielonen said when contacted by The Expositor, noting that as of February MICA already had 140 people registered for the annual Manitoulin Passage Ride and expected a sell-out event following the bicycle show.

With news that both Highways 6 and 540 will soon boast paved shoulders, both west and east of Little Current, this can only mean even better things for Manitoulin cycle tourism, Ms. Mielonen said.

For the icing on the cake, Ms. Mielonen also attended the Ontario By Bike Tourism Conference, which coincided with the bicycle show, where she was bestowed with the Regional Tourism Organization Region 13a Cycle Friendly Tourism Award for her work as proprietor of Maja's in Mindemoya.

"I had the chance to speak for two minutes, so I spoke for 15," she laughed. "I spoke about who we are, what we do and where we are now. It gave Manitoulin good exposure."

# WTPS host first-ever youth opiate awareness conference

LITTLE CURRENT—The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service (WTPS) is organizing and hosting a first-of-its-kind event for Manitoulin Island on March 30 and 31, a Youth Empowerment and Safety (YES) drug/opioid awareness conference intended to help combat the national opiate addictions, and overdose, epidemic.

"Use, abuse and addictions to prescription drugs are a major concern across Canada," a press release from the WTPS states. "Moreover, there is a heightened concern and crisis situation–especially with opioids–within First Nation communities nationwide. Our most vulnerable group falling into the opioid crisis trap are our youth."

"It's for these reasons that leadership in our First Nation communities continue to work together to help spread awareness, information and engage youth in understanding the harsh realities of drug/opioid use, abuse, addictions and other related negative consequences," the press release continues.

At the YES conference, being held March 30 and 31 at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current, youth from across Manitoulin Island will learn about the impacts of drug and opioid addictions, the resources available to fight addictions and what leadership is doing to help combat the crisis. Messages will be shared by local Anishinabek leadership along with nationally renowned motivational speaker and award winning aboriginal hip hop musician Rob KASP Sawan and nationally known poet/musicians Mary Black and Blaine Constant of Bloodline-Music, 'Motivation and Inspiration for the Next Generation,' who are serving as main workshop facilitators.

"All three of the keynote speakers have suffered substance and alcohol abuse and continue their healing journeys-journeys they will share with conference participants through their workshops and through a dance party performance on Saturday evening," the press release continues.

Police Chief Terry McCaffrey told The Expositor that the conference is thanks in part to a grant through the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services and is intended to provide Island youth with a strong understanding of what Canada is facing in terms of the opiate epidemic.

Police Chief McCaffrey noted that he hopes the guest speakers will "bring a sense of realism" to the conference through the stories of living with, and coming through, addiction that youth can relate to.

While the conference is being held by the WTPS with the aim of reaching Wiikwemkoong youth, the police chief invites all of Manitoulin's young people, Native and non-Native, to attend.

Pre-registration for the conference is encouraged and can be done by calling either Roxanne Recollet at 249-878-1360 or Kerry Assiniwe at 705-677-9069 or directly at the WTPS detachment in Wiikwemkoong.

Members of the Mnidoo Mnising Mental Wellness Crisis Response Team will also be on hand for those who may feel triggered by the things they hear and learn, the police chief noted.

"It's going to be a great time," Police Chief McCaffrey added. "The hip hop dance party on Saturday with special guests Rob KASP Sawan should be a lot of fun."

"Ultimately, youth are our future," the police chief continued. "We need to invest in them as much as they need to invest in themselves."

Police Chief McCaffrey said it's time to start looking at this opiate crisis in a much broader scope and not one with an enforcement lens. "WTPS is about working with all our community partners and seeing positive, healthy relationships. All we can do is bring awareness; the youth are the key to success."

# Labour study results call for pan-Island legacy strategy

The results of the latest labour market study from Workforce Planning for Sudbury and Manitoulin deliver a clear and urgent message, our Island workforce is aging fast and there is nothing on the horizon to indicate that the workforce will get younger any time soon.

Several agencies, including the now-defunct Manitoulin Chamber of Commerce, and LAMBAC have been urging local businesses to institute legacy plans for several years as business owners are also aging out in alarming numbers. But a rapidly greying labour force from which to draw on adds another mountain to the range of challenges to legacy planning.

The invisible hand of the market may erode those barriers, but counting on that solution is not likely to prove as efficacious as needed, particularly in the short term.

On the bright side of the equation, there are a host of government programs (mostly instigated at the federal level, but harnessing provincial and private investment as well) aimed at meeting those challenges by solving a few others, notably the tendency of new immigration to settle in the big four urban centres and the need for timely and relevant educational opportunities—but there are also local strengths to build on when it comes to harnessing available resources to fill the labour gaps.

The Ontario Growth Plan famously pointed out that over the coming decades 25 percent of the Northern workforce will be coming from First Nations communities and educational institutes such as

Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute, Contact North and Cambrian College are making tremendous strides in the creation of a skilled workforce from which Island businesses can draw upon.

But more needs to be done. It is past time that key organizations such as the aforementioned educational institutes, government funding agencies such as FedNor and NOHFC, along with our local Community Futures Development Corporations, LAMBAC and Waubetek, come together with local business leaders and potential entrepreneurs to formulate a plan to build a stronger and more complete workforce as the incumbents move on into retirement.

With a comprehensive approach to the challenges ahead we can chart a better informed course that will allow us to put in place strategies that are tailor made to leverage those of our advantages, and we do have a number of advantages (including a growing Indigenous population), to meet the challenges ahead.

Such a conference should span more than a single day and be spread across a number of months and even years to bring about a maximum efficacy.

This might seem at first blush to be an ambitious or even quixotic undertaking, but where would we be if not for the ambition and ingenuity, and yes even unwillingness to fall under the sway of naysayers and doubt, that is inherent in our Northern heritage. Let us not be victims of circumstance and history. Together we can forge a better future.

# Writer revisits the continuing polar bear controversy

Facts don't seem to matter

To the Expositor:

I have recently returned from a bit of time in the sun and notice that more climate hysteria has been featured courtesy of a prominent local Climate Chicken Little. I refer to the February 20 edition. It starts with "the claim that polar bears are not at risk from global warming is inconsistent with what is known." Really!

Let's review "what is known."

The polar bear population was decimated first by commercial whalers around the turn of the twentieth century and continued until about 1930. Unregulated hunting then took place well into the 1960s. We don't know with any degree of accuracy how many bears were left at the end of the sixties but probably around 10,000. Clearly the bears were in decline and something needed to be done. In 1973, the Polar Bear Specialist Group (PBSG) helped to organize an international treaty to protect the bears. We all agreed to stop shooting them

Since that time, numerous population surveys have been carried out. I listed some of the surveys in my last note. The surveys show a slow and steady increase in numbers to about 30,000 today. These surveys are an integral part of the science. PBSG has been involved in a number of them. In addition to the population estimates, most surveys also provide additional information such as the condition of the bears observed, reproduction capabilities and other relevant information. The more recent surveys are most encouraging as they indicate that the bears are in good health and seem to be thriving. The Chukchi Sea survey is a good example of this.

These are the facts regarding the polar bears. The population in increasing. The bears are healthy. Any reasonable person would have to

conclude that there is no evidence to support a claim that polar bears are currently in decline.

So why the hysterics? Why would someone looking at the facts conclude something at odds with the evidence?

The simple answer is that facts don't seem to matter to some people. If the facts don't fit the climate change narrative, they are ignored.

I again reiterate that the bears have been placed on the Red List because of population projections based on models developed by Steven Amstrup. One of the factors that he included in the models is summer sea ice. Mr. Amstrup assumed that loss of summer sea ice would result in increased bear mortality. Most scientists now conclude that it is spring ice that is critical. During this three to four month period the bears prey on seal pups and consume about 70 percent of their annual uptake. In short, the models that were used to project population trends were wrong. When facts start to indicate that a hypothesis is wrong, good science calls for a review of the original assumptions.

I will endeavour to discuss some of the other issues the February 20 letter touched on in future submissions. With one exception, Greta Thunberg, the child, and others like her. We need to encourage children to enjoy their childhood, take them fishing, take them to Disney, provide them with opportunities to check out the world we live in. Most importantly, teach them how to think critically.

For the bigger kids, the ones with climate change derangement syndrome, I can only suggest Scotch and/or valium.

# Austin Hunt inducted into the Order of Canada

OTTAWA—Escorted by his sons Wayne and Michael, Billings political icon Austin Hilliard Hunt made his way down the aisle at Rideau to receive his Order of Canada medal from the hand of Canada's 29th Governor General Her Excellency the Right Honourable Julie Payette during a March 7 induction ceremony.

With a longstanding association with those at the very highest levels of Canadian politics throughout his seven decades of public service, Mr. Hunt is no stranger to pomp and circumstance, but this time it was personal.

"He has a deep belief in a type of public service that is directed to those most in need; it was dedicated to the proposition that government works best when it helps people to help themselves," reads the letter submitted by his nominators, which included Intergovernmental Affairs Minister Dominic LeBlanc, a longtime personal friend of Mr. Hunt and a fellow traveller in partisan politics. "He also showed how settlers were able to work together with First Nations on community projects."

Despite his deep connections to the Liberal Party of Canada, Mr. Hunt was renown for his ability to set aside any partisan blinkers to work to further the interests of his community with those of any political affiliation. It is an attribute that seems to be eroding from public life in what may be the most hyper-partisan of times.

"I am so extremely pleased that Austin is receiving the Order of Canada," said Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes. "He has made a real impact on his community and the region with such a long record of service and it is easy to understand how this is

well-deserved."

Mr. Hunt also served as the liaison to the Prime Minister's Office for a number of projects designed to build community infrastructure across Northern Ontario. When Mr. Pearson died in late 1972, in recognition of the close relationship he shared with the Mr. Pearson, the Pearson family appointed Mr. Hunt as an honorary pallbearer.

Mr. Hunt has long maintained that civic engagement transcends partisan politics, and he worked tirelessly to show that "what counts in this country is not where you live but what you can contribute to making community life better."

First elected to public office in 1953 as a Township of Billings councillor, Mr. Hunt was elevated to the position of reeve in 1968. He

LITTLE CURRENT—Mnaamodzawin Health Services hosted its three-day 2019 Wellness Week at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current recently, offering featured talks from guest speakers and seminars on cooking and healthy eating.

"The event was a huge success. We reviewed the evaluations afterwards and received overwhelming comments of the enjoyment of all participants," said Craig Abotossaway, Mnaamodzawin Health Services' executive director.

"I think we provided enough of a spectrum of speakers from cooking to mental health, physical wellness, traditional medicine and spiritual discussions, so we try to fit all aspects of the medicine wheel," said Mr. Abotossaway. "We hope they can take something away from any one of the presenters that causes a little or a significant change in their life to put them on a better path to wellness."

Derek Debassige delivered a keynote address on the first morning of the three-day event. He discussed ergonomics and body mechanics, making use of the human body and how the aging process impacts one's body.

Then, Joe Pitawanakwat presented on various medicines made from local plants and shared plant teachings about some native plants to the area. He brought in two teas he had made and offered tastes for the attendees.

Finally, Pierre Harrison explored the ability for children to learn through play. He encouraged parents and caregivers to not hover over their children and advocated for unstructured play that would allow them to take risks and set their own limitations.

On Wednesday, Indigenous celebrity chef David Wolfman began the day with a presentation on nutrition and healthy cooking. Mr. Wolfman hosts and produces the show 'Cooking with the Wolfman' for the Aboriginal Peoples Television Network.

He offered the room his recommendations for healthy and affordable shopping, cooking, planning and eating, including such tips as opting for frozen foods to find good nutrients without the high costs of fresh foods, or shopping for groceries seasonally to save money and support local producers.

Included with the presentation were several resources that could be consulted for healthy eating and healthy weight tips.

Following the lunch break, Mr. Wolfman entertained the audience with a live cooking demonstration. His wife Marlene Finn operated a camera for a close-up video feed of the cooktop action that was projected onto a nearby screen.

Mr. Wolfman prepared a collard green soup, polenta and baked salmon stuffed with sautéed vegetables for the eager audience that had gathered to ask questions and bask in the sensational sights, sizzling sounds and spectacular smells.

The collard green soup was finished first, which he served in small biodegradable cups for all to try. When the salmon came out of the oven, he served it with fresh lemon zest and rested it on a polenta base. Judging by the facial expressions of the audience members, this was a delicious and highly sought-after snack to close out the afternoon.

On Thursday, the final day of the conference, Diane Hill began the day with an exploration of 'Ethnostress,' or how colonization has changed Indigenous spiritual beliefs and practices. She stressed that people can still do good work even if they are being blocked from being their best, but that healing is required to reach one's fullest potential.

"You can still be a wounded healer and help people, but to be whole you are more powerful," she said. "Just know that peace, love and joy is available to you all the time."

Then, Ms. Hill explored the residential school system in North America and how some 150,000 Canadian Indigenous children were part of these schools. Many lost their pride in their Indigenous heritage.

"It was a forced learning process. They wanted you to forget," she said. "And it almost worked."

She described the outcomes of this process as self-hatred and shame, with anger and fear being the main emotions left in shattered communities.

'Ethnostress' was defined as "a disruption of the aboriginal spirit due to the loss of a joyful and positive Native identity." To illustrate this point, her assistants distributed cards containing negative self-statements to a random selection of people around the room. They were told to walk around and hold the negative affirmations in front of them to visualize the impact that past trauma can hold over a person.

Both Indigenous and non-Indigenous people took part in this card activity, a decision by design so Ms. Hill could show the room that feelings of negativity and hurt extend to all cultures. Then, they were asked to stand at the front of the room. Some who had blank cards were asked to identify their own personal negative affirmations from their childhoods.

Then, there was another interactive activity using 'energy sticks,' tubes that lit up and played sounds when both ends touched the body and completed the circuit. Small groups of people stood in circles holding hands and, when one person let go, the lights would go out. This symbolized the power of community strength in healing.

Ms. Hill added that historical oppressors need to be loved too, because it's hurt people who hurt other people, she said

"You've got to have heart for the colonizers, too. We're all in this together and have to be able to extend our hand to all others," said Ms. Hill.

Ultimately, she said Indigenous teachings would be widely sought after in the future, although the question of when that might occur is difficult to answer.

"Peace, love and joy are universal," she said. "Non-Native people will seek us out, and we need to be ready to

teach them."

At the end of her presentation, Jordan Teshakotennyon's Miller discussed his R.E.A.L. (Reality Education and Applied Life skills) school that teaches leadership develop-

ment and personal discovery.

That afternoon, Maria Montejo offered a complimentary session that built upon the lessons from the morning session. She presented on an Indigenous multi-dimensional approach to wellness, from the perspective of a Mayan worldview

In what seemed like a short span of three days, the conference had concluded and the guests returned to their daily lives armed with the teachings and viewpoints that can only be garnered through community learning.

"Our presenters were top-notch level, and there were great things said about every one of the speakers that spoke this week. We look forward to next year's," Mr. Abotossaway said.

# Trauma and addictions conference seeks healing path forward

WIIKWEMKOONG—A two-day Trauma and Addictions Conference at the Wiikwemkoong arena upstairs hall sought to provide knowledge and wisdom signposts that would assist health workers and community members "to follow the healing path to the good life" (Ka naag doo naa Naandwe Miikaan ji dgoshniyinf mina bimaadziiwin).

At the beginning of the conference Wikwemikong Health Centre's Mary Jo Wabano and Wiikwemkoong Police Chief Terry McCaffrey signed a protocol agreement between the Mnidoo Mnising First Nations Mental Wellness Crisis Response Team (established under the Wikwemikong Health Centre and Nadmadwin Mental Health Clinic) and the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service to ensure a culturally appropriate mental wellness response to crisis, setting out policies, procedures and processes with a promise to promote an ongoing working relationship between the two parties.

The conference, put on by the Wikwemikong Health Centre March 6 and 7, was co-facilitated by Emcees Dwayne Animikwan and Kerry Assiniwe and featured a number of local and outsourced professionals in the trauma and addictions field, including Indigenous Program Director Tim Ominika from the Northwood Recovery Treatment Centre, registered psychotherapist Nico Mulder, Emmy Mitchell and Leonard Lazore from Native Connections, Naandwe Miikaan case manager worker Amy Assinewai, community members Dwayne Animikwan and Maigan Fox, as well as sessions on laughter and play by Nadmadwin Mental Health Centre Mental Health Clinic team members Sherri Wabanoose, Cody Wassengeso and Sylvia Recollet.

In addition to the daytime activities and workshops, a mini powwow and community feast was held on the

Wednesday evening, complete with a healing jingle dress dance for the community and Ms. Mitchell and Mr. Lazore held an evening loss and grief circle on Thursday.

Mr. Ominika discussed how assisting in one's wellness is not the job of any one organization, but a collaborative effort of the whole community.

Mr. Mulder's presentation took his listeners through his life story and personal relationship with trauma and healing. Born on a farm in South Africa with a racist farmer father, Mr. Mulder experienced the loss of his friends (the children of his father's black farm workers) as the deepening gulf of apartheid policies widened with each passing year of his childhood until they were lost to each other. His father attempted to kill him with his pistol at one point, resulting in post traumatic stress disorder and its host of associated symptoms.

Mr. Mulder challenged the prevailing approach to dealing with trauma (cognitive behavioural therapy or CBT, therapies in which he holds advanced degrees) and put forward a detailed and convincing set of reasons for his position while advocating a more direct and primal approach. CBT, he maintained, while effective in a number of circumstances, simply takes too long and is aimed at the wrong side of the cerebral equation.

"I can see trauma," he said. "I can sense trauma." His voice filled with emotion as he recalled his own brushes with traumatic events.

He took his audience on a journey through the human brain, from the central processor or thinking centre of the cortex (which is the general target of the CBT approach), down through the limbic system to the base animal reaction centre of the amygdala, ground zero for all things fearish.

The thinking part of the brain, that part that differentiates between the relative personal dangers of the sound of a gunshot you hear in the woods during hunting season and the sound of a gun being fired in the hallway just outside your bedroom, is short-circuited by the impact of trauma; effectively cutting out the sensible balancing impact of the "rationale" brain and putting the raw animal instinct centres in charge of one's reactions. Put that way, it all makes remarkable sense.

"The issue is not in the cortex," he maintained, noting that aiming therapy at that part of the brain, while eventually effective, will by definition take a lot longer to bring results. By targeting therapy strategies at the limbic system on the other hand, "sometimes the problem can be dealt with in one session."

Mr. Mulder enlists the limbic system, that part of the brain that deals with input from the senses, hearing, smell and even tactile, to go directly to those parts of the brain inducing reaction to trauma. He points to oils such as ylang-ylang and sounds that induce a calming effect as key tools.

The psychotherapist notes there are four methods that the brain uses to deal with trauma: fight, run, numb and freeze. These take various forms, fight can include lashing out and harming oneself and/or others; run includes fleeing into video games ("I see dad's playing video games, I see mom's playing video games") just to get away from the problem; numb includes food, drugs and alcohol ("you can try to get rid of your trauma that way, but it doesn't work"); and freezing will not get you anywhere. "There has to be something more we can do," he said.

As part of his therapy sessions, Mr. Mulder asks his clients to write a narrative in the third person (using first person retriggers trauma and is counterproductive to the process); by disassociating or distancing themselves from the trauma it becomes less threatening and therefore more approachable.

That narrative begins some time before their birth, nine months before their birth and what happened to their mother, their family environment in which they were formed in the womb. The narrative, usually limited to about six pages, is read back to the therapist at the next session and provides a list of the traumatic things that have happened to the individual. The introduction of bio-lateral music, a steady light snare-like beat-backed combination of white noise and instruments induces brain-spotting and calms the brain down.

Once the brain is calmed, channels are opened to the cortex and a rational assessment of the trauma becomes possible. Sometimes those channels can actually resolve the trauma in one session, but it can also take several sessions, he noted.

One of the most important messages Mr. Mulder brought to the gathering was that, thanks to neuroplasticity of the brain, it can recover. "Your brain can change," he said. The idea that nothing will ever change is a false prophet that prevents movement along the path of healing and the good life we all desire.

#### Wikwemikong Tribal **Police Service Officer** charged with Drive Over .08

Tribal Wikwemikong Police Service (WTPS) have charged a fellow officer of the WTPS in relation to an investigation into an offduty incident.

On the afternoon of March 1, WTPS officers conducted a vehicle stop while responding to a traffic complaint in the community of wemkoong.

The officers identified that the driver was an offduty WTPS officer and that the driver had recently been consuming alcohol. A subsequent mandatory road side test was conducted which resulted in a fail. The driver was then arrested and taken to the police station for further testing.

As a result of the investigation, the male has been charged with Drive Over 80 mgs.

The court information has now been formally sworn allowing WTPS to release the name of Sergeant Mark Trudeau, who was released on a promise to appear for court on

The officer is currently on long term leave from the service and is not on active duty. A Professional Standards Investigation has also been initiated.

"The WTPS are committed to the fight against impaired driving, and we hold our members to the same, if not higher, standard than members of our community," said Chief McCaffrey. "We continue to remind our members of their responsibility to live the values of our organization (our Seven Grandfather Teachings) both on and off duty."

WTPS thanks members of the community for helping stop and arrest impaired drivers by calling 9-1-1. "We consider these incidents an emergent crime in progress and will continue to respond to these calls appropriately."

'We are reminding drivers that WTPS conducts RIDE spot checks yearround and that our officers are always watching for suspected impaired drivers. We also continue to encourage citizens to call 9-1-1 if you spot a suspected impaired driver."

Officers laid multiple Traffic Āct Highway charges including nine distracted driving charges.


Distracted driving remains a serious road safety issue. The OPP is





# Plan on getting the most out of your garden this season

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—Home gardening can become much more successful if it begins with a solid plan. That's the core idea driving Noojmowin Teg's From Seed to Table garden planning workshops running next week in Sheshegwaning, Wiikwemkoong and Little Current.


"It's a beginner's guide to getting a garden started, but also for someone who's been gardening for a few years and wants to up their skills and knowledge to get more productive harvests or to try growing different things," says Kristin Bickell, Manitoulin Community Fresh Food Initiative project manager with Noojmowin Teg.

The workshops will involve a look at soil preparation, tilling, succession planning for future years of growth and companion planting—choosing plants that grow well together. Ms. Bickell says these tips will increase garden productivity.

The guest facilitators for the workshops are Chuc and Linda Willson of Our Garden Products and Anastasia Eranosova of The Island Gardener.

Ms. Eranosova brings over seven years of gardening experience and expertise to the presentation. She organized the second-annual Tehkummah Seed Exchange earlier this year and has been gardening on Manitoulin for three sea-

"There will be a big emphasis in the beginning on seed starting as a follow up with the seed exchange. People have lots of seeds and we feel it's important to pass along knowledge of

what to do with all their seeds," says Ms. Eranosova. She adds that some of the biggest benefits of saving and growing one's own seeds is that the process can build confidence and offer opportunities to grow varieties not available in stores.

"We'll also be talking a little bit about different approaches to gardening, for example a permaculture approach, square foot gardening and traditional row gardening," says Ms. Eranosova.

All the workshop facilitators say they plan to discuss strategies to deal with the challenges of growing on the Island.

"We're going to talk about pollinators and how important they are for gardens. We'll also talk a little bit about troubleshooting and how to deal with pests and insects and drought and cold weather, all the different things that get thrown at us doing gardening on Manitoulin," says Ms. Willson.

She and her partner have been gardening for over 30 years and create unique plans for their gardens every season. When The Expositor spoke with them over the phone, they happened to be in the process of planning their own gardens for the upcoming season.

"I've done a course in square foot gardening and two in edible forest gardening, so I'm going to bring some of my experience and things I've learned from those programs to the workshop. Anastasia brings a whole wealth of her own information, experience and expertise to it, too. I think it will be interesting," she says.

Ms. Willson adds that the workshop is designed for beginners to moderately experienced gardeners and will cover topics such as the elements of the soil, garden layouts, raised and flat beds and watering techniques. They will discuss the importance of pollinators, soil preparation, sun exposure and protection from

the elements.


"Every year we try something new. Sometimes it's successful, sometimes it's a flop. We've garnered a lot of experience from gardening just by doing, but we've also done a lot of studying," says Ms. Willson. "Over the years we've developed a lot of interesting techniques we want to share."

Both Ms. Willson and Ms. Bickell say the key objective of this event is to enable people to eat healthier through growing their own food.

"When we run workshops like this, it's to support the idea of not just putting a garden in someone's backyard but really giving them opportunities to learn and build knowledge and skills to make it successful," Ms. Bickell says.

The garden planning workshop arrives at the Sheshegwaning Health Centre this coming Tuesday, March 26, Wiikwemkoong Children's Services on Wednesday, March 27 and The Island Jar in Little Current on Thursday, March 28.

The Sheshegwaning and Little Current workshops start at 6 pm and the Wiikwemkoong date begins at 10:30 am.

served as president of the Northern Ontario Development Council, as president of the Rainbow Country Travel Association, president of the Manitoulin Municipal Association, president of the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities and on the executive of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario. He sat on the inaugural board of the Northern Ontario School of Medical School and as part of Laurentian University's Board of Governors. He served for many years on the Manitoulin Tourism Association, where he was a founding director, helping to promote tourism businesses across the Island. Mr. Hunt has also served as a warden for St. John's Anglican Church in Kagawong, as well as on local library committees and history organizations. He was, in short, the very definition of a pillar of

the community.

Mr. Hunt was unavailable for comment as of press time Monday, but when he does comment on the accolade being bestowed upon him he can be counted upon to remain, true to form, self-effacing and the very essence of humility as evidenced by his reaction upon learning he had been named to the Order of Canada: "I have always loved my community and I wanted to get involved. I have thought that this was a great way to be involved in things. You can't always please everybody so it has its moments that are not so pleasant, but you have to at least explain to people why it is you couldn't do what they wanted you to. It doesn't always make you or them happy, but you owe that to the people you are trying to represent. In the end, it has been an experience where I have very few regrets.'

# Cryo/Cuff cold therapy available on Manitoulin

LITTLE CURRENT—The Edgewater Pharmachoice pharmacy is offering surgery and injury patients a cool new healing tool that promises to improve recovery times by as much as two weeks: the Aircast Cryo/Cuff.

Cryo/Cuff.

"We've had this product available for about six months. A gentleman brought this to our attention when he was going in for an operation, we sourced the product and he was thrilled with the result," says Kelli Hobbs, manager of Edgewater Pharmachoice in Little Current.

The pharmacy offers rentals of the motorized unit which provides cold and compression therapy. A cooler holds ice-cold water and its built-in circulation pump ensures a fresh, cold water supply circulates through the system. Tubes from the unit connect to a wrap that's similar to a blood pressure cuff which gets wrapped around the problem area.

It's important to note that the item for rent is only the motorized cooler unit—not a complete system. For hygiene reasons, patients looking to use the machine must purchase their own cuffs that can be attached to the cooler.

"We have all the braces in stock and, if needed,

we'll gladly get more coolers in. We're happy to support whatever this community and the Island needs," says Ms. Hobbs.

"From the couple of people I've talked to, it's reduced recovery time by a minimum of two weeks, which is incredible," she adds.

One of the firm believers in the benefits of Cryo/Cuff therapy is nurse and retired midwife Mary Buie, who recently underwent minor knee

photo by Alicia McCutcheon surgery to repair her meniscus. The procedure involved scraping out the torn parts from within her knee, a relatively minor operation compared to a total knee replacement.

She says she figures the Cryo/Cuff reduced her recovery time by two to three weeks.

"My daughter Jen is a physiotherapist; she suggested Cryo/Cuff therapy would be very helpful. I had never heard of it before in my life," says Ms. Buie.

She says the prospect of the Cryo/Cuff was intriguing so she contacted the physiotherapy department at the Little Current hospital about how far she might have to travel in order to find the equipment. They told her that Edgewater Pharmachoice had recently begun offering rentals of the system.

"I thought, good heavens, that's just absolutely incredible that it was a pharmacy in Little Current," says Ms. Buie.

She went into the pharmacy to get fitted for her cuff and to purchase the right size for her knee. She walked out with the rental machine in hand, which costs \$20 per month. The cuffs themselves can be rather expensive, with some sizes running well over \$100.

"This is very efficient because it goes all the way around and fits like a blood pressure cuff," says Ms. Buie. "To begin with, I used it every two to three hours after surgery for a day or two. It helps recovery and makes inflammation and swelling go down."

She adds that she slowly "weaned herself off it" after about a month. Standing put a lot of strain on her knees after surgery and soon she was just using it for short-term relief from when her knee started to bother her.

"It feels very good after doing your exercises and it can reduce the rehab time after surgery," says Ms. Buie. "I would thoroughly recommend it. It's a more efficient way of using ice and it really works. Having this is good for Manitoulin and good for Little Current."

Manitoulin Physio clinic director Derek Debassige says the tool has proven useful and fits in well with recovery strategies.

"Studies have shown patients report less postoperative pain using cold compression devices such as the Cryo/Cuff. Effective pain and swelling control is an important part of a good rehabilitation plan," he says.

The Expositor has contacted other pharmacies on the Island but has not found any other locations that offer Cryo/Cuff rentals.

This machine is worn by expectant mothers around their abdomens and it measures different metrics about their babies, such as heart rhythm and the baby's movement. MHC's existing non-stress test machine is approaching the end of its life and needs to be replaced.

"It's pretty critical. If we didn't have this equipment or its replacement it would make it very difficult for expecting moms. They would likely have to be diverted to Sudbury," said Ms. Foster, adding that an OBGYN specialist visits MHC and needs the machine regularly.

"There's a lot of referrals from the clinical staff for that equipment," she said. "It's a critical piece of equipment when any hospital is hosting an obstetrics program"

The remaining funds will be directed towards the purchase of a vital signs machine and an intravenous (IV) pump.

"I want to emphasize that the province doesn't pay for this sort of equipment anymore. They pay for the operating funds to run the hospital but in terms of equipment, the burden of that lies with communities," said Ms. Foster.

"We rely on our committed volunteer fundraising groups like the auxiliaries. We're really quite appreciative and MHC, our board, physicians and clinical staff all value our auxiliaries and how giving they are of their time."

# ...Study shows Island workforce diminishing, not being refreshed

...continued from page 1 they need to be looking at succession planning right now," says Ms. Caverson.

She says WPSM is currently working with the LaCloche Manitoulin Business Assistance Corporation (LAMBAC) to create a video specifically for Manitoulin employers about succession planning.

"We don't want to lose places that are closing up. One, they provide a service to the community but two, they also provide employment," says Ms. Caverson. "We know the population of Manitoulin District is growing a tiny bit now, but in five years who knows what it could look like. Right across Northeastern Ontario the demographics are changing significantly."

Manitoulin's biggest economic industry is a group called 'agriculture, forestry, fishing and farming.' Next is 'retail trade,' 'construction,' 'accommodation and food services' and finally 'real estate, rental and leasing.' In the other two

regions as well as Ontario as a whole, 'real estate, rental and leasing' assumes the top spot economically.

Since farming makes up a significant portion of the Island's economy, to see that all its general workers are nearing old age could be cause for concern. Ms. Caverson says beef operations tend to stay within a family, but horticultural farmers have found difficulty getting their children to take over the operations.

"It's hard to keep a business growing if you don't have people to do the work. We're finding a lot of young people not wanting to get into (farming) and who aren't prepared to do that kind of work. In the Windsor area, a lot of farming is done by temporary foreign workers because they can't get people to come in and do the work," says Ms. Caver-

There are 4,930 people in Manitoulin Island's labour force with slightly more females employed compared to males (2,525 as opposed to 2,405). Thirtyfour percent of those people identify as Indigenous, 30 individuals identify as visible minorities and there are 130 francophones.

One notable statistic is salaries on Manitoulin Island. When accounting for all male employees, Manitoulin wages are almost half compared to the District of Sudbury. The median income on the Island is \$29,347 compared to the district's \$57,987.

When only accounting for male full-time employees, the gap shrinks marginally; however, male fullworkers Manitoulin earn roughly 39 percent less than those in the District of Sudbury— \$39,638 on Manitoulin compared to \$65,407 in Sudbury District.

Ms. Caverson says this could be reflective of the lower cost of housing on the Island and may not be entirely unreasonable.

Manitoulin presents unique statistics when looking at wages for female workers. Women out-earn men's salaries on and overall categories, and the category of all female workers has a higher median income on Manitoulin than in the District of Sudbury. However, full-time women in Sudbury District and all female employees in the City of Greater Sudbury still earn a higher wage than women on Manitoulin.

"Manitoulin seemed to be a bit of an anomaly. We can't say if this contributes or not, but we're finding more Indigenous women going on to post-secondary education and taking on more leadership roles, so we're trying to understand what that means," says Ms. Caverson.

She notes that in Island Anishinabek businesses and governance there have been more women assuming management roles, something which would contribute to higher wages. However, she says another factor could be the largelymale farm workers and managers who either earn lower wages or underreport their income.

Beyond Manitoulin there is a significant wage gap between women and men. Even when only accounting for full-time workers in both categories, men earn \$69,260 and women only make \$49,206 in the City of Greater Sudbury. That's over 40 percent more than for men.

"It confirms what we already knew, based on recent national studies looking at the same types of questions," says Ms. Caverson.

The report notes that sales and service jobs mainly represent the lowest median income for both men and women, there is a growing demand for personal support workers (PSWs) that may be difficult to supply, a decline in the number of apprentices and training opportunities for those apprentices and an underrepresentation of women in all skilled trades except hairstyling.

There were 193 Manitoulin-area jobs posted online in 2018, up from 128 in 2017. Employers cite "work ethic" as the highestranked competency they search for in potential employees. Nearly 30 percent of all jobs posted online are for sales and service positions, and employers say it is increasingly difficult to find reliable people to fill these jobs.

The report also notes that many employers do not provide training for their positions which makes matching job-seekers to industry needs increasingly diffi-

...continued from page 1 became quite a kerfuffle to find someone to move the vehicle.'

"The OPP were called, but even they weren't going to take responsibility for it," said Mayor Stephens. "It was too dangerous to have people out at all. So, whose responsibility was

The incident occurred on provincial Highway 542 and, since the vehicle was half in the ditch and half out on the roadway, "it was an iffy situation," said the mayor. "A tough call for everybody."

In light of the confusion over who was responsible for dealing with the issue, council decided to seek clarification.

During discussion on the motion at the council table, Councillor Al Tribinevicius noted that he had discussed the matter during a recent committee meeting with Manitoulin OPP detachment commander Inspector Megan Cavanagh. "She said that she didn't think the towing was an issue, they can just call any towing company available to take it away," he recalled.

On a related note, Councillor Tribinevicius said plans were in the works to install cameras at the highway near Bridal Veil Falls and that tickets would be issued for vehicles parked illegally at that site. "Maybe something similar could be considered for Jake's Corner," he said, referencing the ongoing issue of parking too close to the intersection located in front of a Mindemoya furniture retailer.

'(I recall) from an earlier meeting on the issue of parking on the side of the highway that the OPP couldn't issue a ticket if the driver wasn't there," said Councillor Derek Stephens

"That is going to be changed," noted Councillor Tribinevicius. "They won't have to wait for the

driver. If you have kids that are driving your car, you will pay the fine. It will be the vehicle, not the driver.'

In another weather-related motion, council directed the CAO/Clerk write a letter to the Ministry of Transportation requesting clarification on the minresponsibilities regarding curb to curb snow removal, focusing on why the parking lanes in Mindemoya have not been cleared of snow. The recommendation from the Road, Water and Waste Committee noted that the committee "feels this is a safety issue for the public and further that we express our concerns over flooding potential because the parking lanes and storm drains have not been cleared of snow.'

"We are starting to see some of that flooding right now because the storm drains have not been cleared," said Councillor Derek Stephens. "I saw a young member of our Manitoulin Community Living family chipping away at the ice from the storm drains so the water could flow.'

"Our town crews do a great job in our community roads clear," said Councillor Dale Scott. "There is no reason the MTO cannot do the same.'

Residents were invited to join in on three days of winter family fun for the 2019 Shtaa Taa Haa Days event at the community hall and outdoor rink, an event named after the Ojibwe expression meaning 'wow' or 'awesome.



Yabba dabba doo! The winner in the most creative sled competition goes to "The Flintstone Mobile," assembled by Giizhik Aguonie, Jessica Aguonie, Beth Miller and Tammie Assinewai.

"It was a really great weekend. It was so nice seeing so many people attend, especially the youth. We had many volunteers throughout the weekend," said Valerie Assinewai, economic development officer at Sheguiandah First Nation.

The events included a potluck dinner, casino night, community breakfast, inflatables for the kiddies, a nail drive, log toss and log sawing competitions. Then came the main event: the G'Chi Anishinabek Team

McCormick shoot their wedding, despite her reluctance since she had never photographed such an important occasion before. Since then, she has worked as a professional photographer in 12 countries including Jamaica, the Netherlands, Austria, Romania and Italy—in 2018 alone. She has plans to add at least four more to that list in the next two years.

"It was terrifying. I did so much research and prep work before the wedding, which was a 14-hour day. It was a pure adrenaline rush the entire time and I came out of that day feeling that this is what I want to do. No doubt, this was where I needed to be in life," says Ms. McCormick through a Skype interview from her winter home in Medellín, Colombia.

Living in unique places is nothing new for Ms. McCormick. She moved to Manitoulin Island with her mother Dana Biernacki when she was 10 years old and stayed here through high school. Before that, they had lived in Webequie First Nation north of Thunder Bay and Bella Bella, British Columbia.

Following a degree in politics at Queen's University, she moved to Ottawa where she was working part-time jobs as a hostel manager and a bartender, in addition to shooting photos for a clothing designer.

"My schedule was insane. Photography was my pas-

sion so I was doing that as a third thing, but I eventually started weeding out the other jobs to focus on that," says Ms. McCormick.

Ottawa was also where she met her partner Erik—the two relocated to Denmark three years ago following his work and have since relocated with his job to Colombia. However, Ms. McCormick still spends her summers in the Ottawa area.

"We always gravitated towards islands for some reason. I've spent more of my life on islands than not; even when we were in Denmark we were on an island," she says with a laugh, adding that she still considers Manitoulin to be her home.

Pursuing photography as a full-time job was born out of necessity for Ms. McCormick. She couldn't find work overseas because she did not speak Danish, so she elected to try photography full-time. With her partner's financial support, she was able to direct all her time toward that goal.

"I put in a lot of time, worked my butt off and did everything I could to hustle and make it work for myself, because I knew I had to do it to pay my bills to survive. That's pretty good motivation," said Ms. McCormick. "Erik really supported me. I don't know if I would have had the guts to do it on my own."

Ms. McCormick specializes in wedding and elope-

ment photography. She says the latter often carries certain misconceptions because traditionally, elopement has referred to people running off to get married in secret. While that can still be the case, the term is now used to describe intimate, personal ceremonies.

"In this day and age, it can be so overwhelming to plan a wedding for so many people. They have to think about so much on their wedding day so people choose to forego that," she says. "It can be on a mountaintop, in their backyard, anything they want."

Ms. McCormick contends that this style of celebration gets to the heart of what marriage is all about.

"It allows people the

chance to spend time together and express how they feel and what their sentiments are for the person that they're marrying, without the pressure of a big wedding day," she says. "It has a special place in my heart. I love being able to document them; they're very relaxed, very personalized and very 'about them'."

Regardless of whether the ceremony takes the form of a grand celebration or an intimate elopement, Ms. McCormick says she brings a personal and caring mindset to every shoot.

"I really get to know my clients. They become family to me. It's not conventional but I find that works for the people I attract and the couples I'm attracted to," she says. "I treat them like family and get to know them so when I show up to the wedding, I know what they will want to see in their photos. Because it's more than just pictures, it's their memories of the experience that goes beyond the physical."

She adds that creating such a friendly dynamic makes the process smoother for both her and the clients and the couples will often start asking for her opinions on non-photography-related topics about their wedding day.

"Growing up on Manitoulin was a huge influence because of the small-town hospitality and getting to know people more than just saying 'hi, bye.' We really get to know our neighbours and I think that fostered something in me that I wanted to carry into my business," Ms. McCormick says.

Part of her work centres on trying to decrease the intimidation factor that a big milestone like a wedding can carry.

"It doesn't have to be scary. I approach it like I'm hanging out with my friends, paparazzi-ing them and being like the third wheel," she says. "I get comments all the time from people saying they didn't realize I had taken a picture, or didn't realize what was happening in that moment. There can be such a difference in the way a photo looks versus the way they thought it was happening."

...continued from page 1 School" up to a maximum of \$200,000—depending on the severity of abuse suffered. Eligible class members will receive a payment reflecting the most severe harms they suffered while attending an Indian Day School, irrespective of the number of schools attend-

The proposed settlement would also include a \$200 million legacy fund intended to support "commemoration projects, health and wellness programs, as well as language and culture initiatives for communities."

The class action began in 2009, when the late Garry McLean (Mr. McLean passed away from cancer at age 67 this past February) launched a class action lawsuit against Canada seeking compensation for the harms suffered by Indigenous students who were forced to attend Federal Indian Day Schools across Canada. The survivors of the Federal Indian Day Schools were specifically excluded from the earlier Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement.

"He was just a small boy of six or seven years old when he began attending the Dog Creek Day School on his First Nation," the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs said in a statement. "Mr. McLean has said the school bell rang at 9 am and at 9:05 am he was getting the strap because he did not know how to say 'good morning' in English."

In 2009, Mr. McLean became the lead plaintiff in the \$15 billion class action lawsuit against the government of Canada

About 200,000 Indigenous children attended the federally run day schools during

the reign of a government policy that began in the 1920s and ran separately but largely concurrently with the residential school system. In the day school program Indigenous children experienced many of the same traumas as their compatriots in the residential school system, but returned home each evening to their families.

"This agreement will bring us one step closer to a lasting and meaningful resolution for survivors and their families of this dark and tragic chapter in Canadian history," said Crown-Indigenous Relations Min-Carolyn Bennett during a March 12 ceremony held in Ottawa to announce the proposed settlement. "Many Canadians are aware of the tragic legacy of Indian residential schools but ... a lot did not know, and most Canadians still do not know, that beginning in the 1920s. 200,000 students attended federally operated Indian Day Schools," Minister Bennett said.

"They left school at the end of the day but many experienced trauma and were subject to physical and sexual abuse at the hands of individuals who had been entrusted with their care."

Minister Bennett expressed dismay that Mr. McLean did not live to see the results of his efforts come to fruition.

During the December 6 announcement that the federal government intended to seek a settlement, rather than appeal the court judgement, Mr. McLean said that he, and his family, have since forgiven the Canadian people for what they had endured in the Indian Day School

# The settlement approval hearings will take place at the Federal Court in Winnipeg between May 13 and 15. Class members wishing to attend the hearing may do so. Those who wish to speak at the hearings, either in support of the proposed settlement or to share their concerns, are to be able to do so at this time. The court will then announce its decision regarding the settlement

Being behind the lens is offering Ms. McCormick a unique perspective on photography as a whole and provides lessons as to what she would look for if she were hiring a photographer some day.

As a small business owner, she recognizes the need for ensuring her clients are happy. However, she also has to focus on developing her company while recognizing the small accomplishments she reaches on a daily basis.

"Erik, being a business guy, is helping me set targets every year," she says. "It's not one big triumph or one big success; there's no moment when you'd say 'this is it, we've made it.' It's more just an accumulation of the small, everyday victories."

Ms. McCormick says she adjusts and recalculates her goals every year but one constant she doesn't see changing is living in different places around the world.

"It's exciting to imagine where we'll be next; I think I can just imagine extending the business gradually over time," she says.

She has recently brought on associates in other locations to work as sub-contractors, with the intent that they could shoot weddings nearer to them and expand the brand.

Ultimately, Ms. McCormick says receiving feedback after a shoot is her favourite part of the job.

"At the end of the day, I'm trying to deliver the best photos of one of the best days of their lives. If I get that excited message or call when the couple sees their photos, that means I've succeeded. It's the best news I could ever get and it's what keeps me going," Ms. McCormick says.





# Jeopardy! host Alex Trebek diagnosed with pancreatic cancer


LOS ANGELES—Sudbury-born Jeopardy! host Alex Trebek has recently announced that he is battling cancer.

We would like to take some time today to share a bit about how dietitians impact our communities right here on Manitoulin!

Hello, my name is Joby Quiambao and I am a registered dietitian (RD) with Noojmowin Teg Health Centre working in the First Nations communities of Aundek Omni Kaning, Sheguiandah, wemikong and Sheshegwaning, within the District of Manitoulin Island. As an RD, I support and promote the nutrition wellbeing of Anishnabek and aboriginal individuals, families and community members through nutrition counselling and education. I enjoy empowering clients to explore their

nutritional needs, build skills to create and reach their goals and nourish their connections to food. Likewise, I strive to integrate, through Degohnegaadeh (Anishnaabemowin word which means to blend), and honour the Seven Grandfather Teachings—respect, humility, bravery, truth, honesty. love and wisdom—in my dietetics practice. I am grateful to work alongside amazing colleagues and communities, unlocking the potential of food to heal and support overall holistic health and wellbeing.

Natalie: My name is Natalie Hastings, I have worked as a dietitian and certified diabetes educator with Noojmowin Teg for six years. Dietetics does come with stereotypes but I promise not to suggest you "eat like a rabbit," judge what is in your grocery cart or make unrealistic goals. Instead, dietitians help clients understand, embrace and enjoy food while considering their needs and challenges. Happy nutrition month everyone!

This week we have highlighted how two registered dietitians help our communities embrace the potential of food. Dietitians also work in family health teams, public health units, long term care facilities and hospitals to help Canadians unlock the potential of food.
