Recovering drug addict has real concerns about new benign views on pot

SHEGUIANDAH—Plans for the legalization of marijuana are barrelling down the legislative highway and, despite a few Senate bumps in the road, seem destined to become a reality sometime late this summer (slightly delayed from the federal government's originally planned July 1 rollout). Judging by media reports, a disinterested observer could be forgiven for thinking that everyone was in lockstep on the concept—but a Sheguiandah First Nation resident is definitely not on board with the idea and is putting out a call for others of like mind to help him get the government to put on the brakes.

"I am starting a petition for the prevention of marijuana legalization in Ontario," said Cody A. Towers. "I would like to keep marijuana as a strict medically prescribed substance only."

Mr. Towers dropped by The Expositor offices to outline the

New 'Rowan's Law' demands youth sports must enact, enforce concussion injury protocols

The late Rowan Stringer had Island ancestry

QUEEN'S PARK—On March 6, and after years of lobbying and education efforts from the Stringer family, Bill 193, or Rowan's Law, was passed with unanimous support at Queen's Park. Rowan's Law was named for Rowan Stringer, an aspiring rugby player, who died just shy of her 18th birthday, a result of Second Impact Syndrome due to concussion

Rowan was the daughter of Gordon and Kathleen Stringer and the great granddaughter of the late Gordon and Stella Stringer (Wood) of Sheguiandah and Little Current. Her grandparents were Ralph and Cathy Stringer. Rowan Stringer had been a student athlete at John McCrae Secondary School in Nepean, an Ottawa suburb.

According to the website

rowanslaw.ca, Rowan was an athlete from the beginning, trying her hand at just about everything, but she fell in love with the sport of rugby, eventually becoming cocaptain of her team.

"On May 3 (2013) she participated in an all-day tournament, playing three shortened games," the Stringers wrote on the website.

MANITOULIN—The Ontario Northland Transportation Commission (ONTC) Manitoulin bus service start date has been announced as Monday, April 9 and while the vendors for tickets have yet to be made known (not all ticket sellers have been finalized), the route has been completed.

The Island Ontario Northland bus route is as follows: Little Current, Sheguiandah, Manitowaning, Wiikwemkoong, South Baymouth, Sandfield, Spring Bay, Mindemoya, Evansville, Gore Bay, Kagawong, M'Chigeeng, Aundeck Omni Kaning, Little Current, Birch Island, Espanola, Nairn Centre, Health Sciences North and Laurentian University.

The original bus route did not include a stop as far west as Evansville, but thanks to encouragement from Burpee and Mills reeve Ken Noland, who noted the growing Amish population on the West End during consultations, Evansville is now a stop.

Stantec gets nod to consult on future Island bridge link

\$2.5 million contract

LITTLE CURRENT—The Ministry of Transportation (MTO) announced recently that it has hired Stantec Consulting Ltd. to conduct a planning, preliminary design and environmental assessment process request for proposals for the replacement of the iconic Manitoulin Swing Bridge.

"The bridge is approaching the end of its service life," said Gordan Rennie, MTO media spokesperson, northeast region, told The Expositor. "The study is necessary to determine the best alternative for a new link to Manitoulin Island."

"It sounds as though the existing bridge has been 'written off'," this reporter noted to Mr. Rennie. "Is this the case? Have they been hired to determine a new link only, not see if it's worth fixing the swing bridge?"

Mr. Rennie replied, "No. The project will follow the Environmental Assessment Process where alternatives, including replacement, will be developed and assessed. The study will result in the selection of a recommended option. At the same time, the bridge is approaching the end of its service life, which is the reason for initiating the study."

Mr. Rennie also noted that the assignment is valued at \$2.5 million and is expected to take approximately two years to complete.

"The study will involve looking at various options for a new link

Little Current Lion donate \$10K for new auto extrication tools

NORTHEAST TOWN—The Little Current Lions Club, thanks to the help of the community, donated a generous \$10,000 to the Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands Fire Department on Monday of this week, allowing the fire department to purchase new auto extrication tools.

Fire Chief Duane Deschamps explained to the Lions that the new tools—a spreader, cutter and ram—are battery operated and much lighter than the tools the department is currently using; tools that are over 25-years-old.

He explained that when the fire department is called to respond to a multi-vehicle accident, the tools will prove invaluable as there is no longer an external power source or hose hookups needed. The old tools, too, weigh in at around 70 pounds while the new tools weigh between 35 and 45 pounds.

Fire Chief Deschamps explained that the new steel used in cars has become noticeably more difficult to cut through. With these new tools, this will no longer be a

"It all takes time with the old tools," the fire chief added, "which is a big factor when responding to an accident." He noted that with the old equipment, it took at least four firefighters to set up while with the new extrication tools, it will only take two.

"I give a big thank you for enabling this," Fire Chief Deschamps addressed the Lions. "Funds are tight every-

where, municipally and provincially. It's people like you and your volunteer efforts that make this a reality," he added before calling for a round of applause.

New \$1.2 million Mindemoya fire hall operational, grand opening in May

MANITOULIN-CENTRAL Trucks, tankers, hoses and turnout gear have been transferred to the new \$1.1 million Mindemoya fire hall and the crews will be operating out of it going forward, but the folks will have to wait until May for the grand open-

'We have had it open for quite a while now actually," said Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard

Stephens, "not officially, but it is operational."

The new hall is financed by the municipality through a combination of loan and reserves. Although the municipality had submitted funding requests, they did not come through leaving the town to take out a \$900,000 loan.

"We had to have it," noted Mayor Stephens. The new facility is fully compliant with all the specifications for a modern rural com-

Although the new fire hall will be replacing the Mindemoya fire hall and is considerably larger, the municipality has no plans currently to close any of the other fire halls in the municipality.

"We have four of them," noted Mayor Stephens. "But closing any of them? Not at this point."

The new facility, located on Highway 542, was constructed by Sheppard Custom Building Limited close to the Mindemoya Hotel. It has a 46-foot by 105-foot footprint for a total of 4,830 square feet and is a pre-engineered steel building frame and meets postdisaster specifications.

The building features a large meeting room/training area, two storage rooms and a fire chief's office and has a number of important upgrades including electric doors, infrared heating, a truck exhaust system—and as an added bonus, the building utilizes LED lighting and is dark sky compli-

Employee safety is a key feature of the building, so in addition to the truck exhaust feature, the building has an emergency decontamination shower, and adult change room and handicapped accessible washrooms automatic gas detection and ventilation and propane hot water on demand.

There were 16 nominations for the 10 seats on band council candidates, those are: Albert Beaudin, Charles Beaudin, Jesse Beaudin, Brian Bisson, Andrew M. Corbiere, Dennis Corbiere, Ray Corbiere, Adam Debassige, Howie Debassige, Mark Debassige, Sam Debassige, Whitney Ense, Forry Hare, Tom Hare, Henry Panamick Sr. and Tiffany Recollet.

Candidates who do not provide a criminal reference check or proof that it has been initiated by March 23 will be removed from this list. Any candidate may withdraw at any point up to the final election date of April 21, however any mail in ballots for them will not count.

The September 9 election results may be reinstated, as both the M'Chigeeng Appeals Committee and former Chief Linda Debassige (who won the contested election) have agreed to set the court order aside and allow the September results for chief and council. If that were to happen, the new April 21 present election would be called off.

MANITOULIN—Three Manitoulin municipalities received Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) Top-Up funding. Municipalities each receive OCIF monies annually, but can apply to the Top-Up fund for special projects.

Billings received \$927,836 for 'Main Street improvements.' Billings clerk-treasurer Kathy McDonald said the improvements will include better drainage and a widening of the street. "We'll be doing something with the side of the bluff," she added.

The work in Billings will likely commence in September so as not to interfere with the summer season.

In Gore Bay, the municipality saw \$1,822,500 for the rehabilitation of the water and wastewater system on New Street. Anette Clarke, Gore Bay CAO, told The Expositor that the funds will see the water lines and storm drainage replaced on New Street, and the street itself rehabili-

"We've had significant drainage issues," Ms. Clarke said. "It (New Street) regularly gets washed out, and the water line itself is very old

The work on New Street is expected to begin in late spring with an anticipated completion of this fall, with the exception of the final coat of asphalt, which will take place next year.

Also in the West End, Burpee and Mills saw \$235,569 to reconstruct

MTO detour through town roads more than just inconvenient

Township of Tehkummah councillors are faced with numerous budgetary challenges, so much so that they have recently instituted a spending lock that has shut out even the Easter Bunny from township funding, but one thing they most certainly didn't need was the added stress of traffic being rerouted across town roads by the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) while it works on replacing three culverts over Blue Jay Creek at Highway 542.

Although the MTO has apparently given Tehkummah assurances that the ministry will return the main detour route, along the 10th Sideroad and Townline Road, to "as good or better" condition when they are done, the council's concerns that the detour will increase traffic on the other township roads remains an issue. True, the signage does seem to be fairly clear, despite councillors' concerns to the contrary, but when dealing with folks coming from the Chi-Cheemaun ferry and travelling to the west of the Island through Mindemoya, they will quite possibly not be familiar with the alternate route and there quite will likely be greater traffic on the roads.

As a number of Tehkummah councillors have pointed out, that municipality's roads are challenged by the impact of tight budgets and high turnover in the roads department in recent years and are quite likely not up to the challenge of increased traffic. It is understandable that Tehkummah council members have concerns about how the increased traffic will impact their other town roads.

This being a free country, keeping travellers off of public roads is

clearly not an option, although placing load restrictions on those roads that are particularly sensitive to high and heavy traffic may well be an option council may wish to consider. But recent roadwork in other parts of Manitoulin by the MTO have illustrated that there are other options available.

The recent work conducted on Highway 540 in Honora Bay witnessed culverts being replaced while traffic was routed through a single lane, as was work elsewhere on that route. Of course, there was no convenient alternate route through municipal roads available in those instances, and the work took considerably longer than might have otherwise been the case, but the system seemed to work with a minimum of inconvenience to the travelling public.

The detours in Tehkummah could have a potentially significant impact on local business and the increased traffic on municipal roads places a burden on a township that is already struggling with significant challenges. Tehkummah councillors don't need the additional worry and strain that a detour utilizing municipal roads would entail.

While road restrictions on the non-detour roads might help alleviate the situation, policing such regulations would place yet another onerous burden on a township budget that, as council has recently indicated, can no longer even afford the cost of a donation to support an Easter egg hunt for the youth of its community.

Water rates can be brought under control

All townships need to work together to negotiate an Island-wide contract

To the Expositor:

In response to your story 'Hike in Sheg water rates' (March 14, Page 3).

As someone who has taken a vested interest in the Assiginack water rates for the last few years, where we have seen in working with staff and council a very small increase or a reduction in the rates, and are expecting a reduction for 2018, I can offer this:

The single biggest cost of clean water in Assiginack and NEMI, and I assume other towns based on the information I've gathered, is the invoice the towns receive from the Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA). OCWA is the company that looks after the running of the town's water plants and lagoons. This government agency was formed after the Walkerton incident where people died due to unsafe water. They are hired by the towns to ensure that we have clean water. They do a good job, and we do have clean water. Their billings, however, account for over 50 percent of the total costs. Included in what they charge is a built in 16 percent profit! That's right, the government agency charges us a 16 percent profit. There are also other extra costs associated with water plants and lagoons such as Hydro and repairs, but if not monitored correctly, these "extras" could become a major cost.

I have been pressing Assiginack to have a plan for hydro or implement better controls on hydro use for two years. Though there is some

progress, we still have a way to go. We must remember that water bills are calculated, at least in NEMI and Assiginack, by taking the total cost of the water operations divided by the number of users. It has nothing to do with any town costs such as new garages, firehalls or trucks. I have seen both the recent contracts with OCWA for NEMI and Assiginack and, in my opinion, there is some "fat" in the contracts, especially the 16 percent profit.

There is a lot that can be done to lower water and sewer rates, but we all need to participate: 1) ask your town to monitor and improve on hydro usage. 2) Conserve water where you can. 3) Don't pump your sump water into the sewer, less water to the lagoon means less cost to treat or perhaps smaller lagoon size, thus less cost. 4) Report leaks to your town. 5) Write to your provincial government and tell them you're not happy with being charged a 16 percent profit.

Perhaps if the Island townships work together as one to negotiate an Island-wide contract with OCWA, a reduced cost would be attainable? You and I both know having all the towns work to this goal has as much chance as a snowball in July, but it may save all water users some money in the end.

Residential School conference seeks to build resilience

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—Any time you bring a group of residential school survivors together is fraught with challenges, especially if they are going to share their thoughts and experiences. So it was with Noojmowin Teg Health Centre's Indian Residential School Conference held in Aundeck Omni Kaning recently.

A number of panel members and speakers were overcome in the final moments before attending the conference and deferred their arrival, but luckily, the roster for the conference was quite deep in any event and moved forward.

The conference began at 7 am with a sunrise ceremony at the Noojmowin Teg Healing Lodge and a sacred fire was kept burning there for the solace of the survivors throughout the conference.

Noojmowin Teg's Executive Director Pam Williamson welcomed the attendees to the conference, noting that, but for a short decade's interlude, she might well have found herself taken from her family and sent to a residential school. "I got to stay home with my parents," she said. Ms. Williamson noted that "we are a combination of many things," alluding to the different spiritualities in First Nations communities, but that "I hope that these next couple of days will be of benefit to you."

Danielle Roy McDonald began the conference with a drum song honouring Anishinaabe-kwe, as the conference was taking place on International Womens' Day. "I thought it was appropriate," said Ms. Roy McDonald. The song can be found on her

group's CD 'New Moon Medicine' by the Odemin Kwe Singers. The second song she drummed also spoke of the challenges facing Anishinaabe-kwe and other Native women.

The conference was organized by Noojmowin Teg Health Centre's Margaret Jackson and elder and residential school survivor Rosella Kinoshmeg and emceed by Barb Nolan, a familiar figure when it comes to residential school events on Manitoulin Island.

As is usually the case at residential school and reconciliation events, strong emotions can be triggered and the organizers made sure at the beginning that survivors knew that two Noojmowin Teg staffers were on hand to sit and talk with them should they feel the need. Barb Recollet and Margaret Jackson stood ready to provide assistance, as was AOK social worker Darren Madahbee.

The first speaker at the conference was Rosella Kinoshemeg, who related her experiences at the St. Joseph's residential girls school in Spanish. She told of the good things that came from her education. "I learned to speak English in one year, I made lifelong friends and I got a good education," she said. "We still spoke our language, but we just made sure we did it where we were not going to get caught." Ms. Kinoshmeg went on to become a registered nurse and accomplished administrator, but there were plenty of bad memories associated with her time at the school. "Cod liver oil," she said with a shiver. "I worked in the chicken coops and I still can't eat chicken. Our older sisters were across the hall, but we couldn't go over and talk to them." That division set a barrier between her and her siblings that she never successfully crossed in future years.

Then there were the bells.

"Bells to line up for everything," she said. "I still can't stand lining up to a bell to this very day."

Flutist Julian Nahwegahbow provided a soothing musical interlude between the

keynote speakers.

Other speakers on the first day included panels with survivors, a presentation on elder safety by UCCM Police Service Constable Murray Still, Thai Chi with Wendy and an art demonstration by Brian Waboose. Isabelle Meawasige was on hand to provide energy massages and artist Mark Seabrook conducted art therapy sessions—making masks.

The second day also began with a sunrise ceremony and sacred fire, but the drum song was provided by the M'Chigeeng Language Immersion children.

Geriatrician Dr. Janet McLehaney gave a presentation on Alzheimer's and dementia and Henry Burke and Pete Williamson stepped up with their fish skillet skills while Louis and Jett Francis provided a fire making demonstration.

Break music was provided by celloist Jonathan Poenn.

Brent St. Denis, former Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP and longtime Spanish resident, joined a panel to discuss his own experiences of the Garnier Residential School. Mr. St. Denis is a member of the Spanish Residential School legacy committee, although he downplays his role.

When Mr. St. Denis was a child growing up in Spanish, his elementary school was razed by fire. "The Jesuits changed the schedule at the Garnier School to accommodate us," he recalled. "But if there was a theme to my talk," he later explained, "it was that there were two solitudes there. We never got a chance to mix or mingle with

the Anishinaabe students. The only time we would see them would be on the fire escapes during a fire drill. We didn't play sports with them, our paths rarely crossed at the school." The Native students would be in the classrooms in the morning while the non-Native students would take over in the afternoon. "We couldn't see them, it was like they were invisible," he said. "There was no attempt to have us play sports together. What a lost opportunity."

It was a situation that would be totally unthinkable today, but was considered normal operating procedure at the time, he said. It seems completely counterintuitive to the stated goal of integration of Natives into mainstream society. "But that was how it was," he said. "We were together, but apart. Two solitudes if you will."

Mr. St. Denis said that because of this separation, his perspective was that of "an outsider looking in." Not that he was completely cut off, however, thanks to his father's grocery store and hiring some of the older students to work in it, he did make some lifelong friends from the school and later through his family.

"I got a really nice letter from Dr. Cecil King, who lives in Saskatchewan," said Mr. St. Denis. "He had a lot of nice things to say about my father Frank."

Other members of the panel with Mr. St. Denis included Dave and Val Lavallee and Courtney Kurek. Following lunch, Ms. Lavallee provided a session on grief and recovery. MichaelAnn MacLean gave a

yoga demonstration and Barb Nolan provided a demonstration of language immersion techniques.

New Northeastern LHIN CEO weighs in on the new direction of the organization

A call to share experiences, both good and bad, in order to ensure a more patient-centred and caring system

To the Expositor:

As many of you know, last year the former North East CCAC transitioned over to the North East Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN). Our new organization, now more than 700 employees strong, spent some time considering what values should guide our work, both as a health care system manager for the 565,000 people who call Northeastern Ontario home and as a provider of home and community care services to 17,000 Northerners.

In February, our Board of Directors approved a new set of values for our organization. There are six values altogether, but our first and guiding value is "people," recognizing that:

"People are what really matter. Our health care system is people caring for people. We include patients, families, caregivers, health service providers, community partners and employees in our decision-making. We value and respect their input."

We know people have had a mix of experiences with the health care system here in the North East—a system of care that includes hospital, home and community care, mental health and addiction services, long-term care, primary care and community health centres.

And while it's always nice to hear about the success stories, as a LHIN, we also need to hear about the challenges in order to improve our Northeastern Ontario health care system. On our website, you can find a page called "Complaints, Concerns, Compliments" (nelhin.on.ca/complaints.aspx). On this page people can register a health

care complaint or concern, as well as let us know what is working well related to the care they or their family is receiving. And people can call us anytime at 705-310-2222.

We're committed to resolving or overseeing the resolution of complaints in a timely manner. A review process is

in place to ensure that reported complaints are: received with courtesy and recorded accurately; acted upon promptly and fairly; and are kept confidential and protected.

Members of our Patient and Family Advisory Committee are also helping us to improve our process. Complaints and concerns can often shed light on systemic issues within the system–problems we need to act on.

We recognize that our work needs to be guided by listening to and acting upon the feedback we get from fellow Northerners. Since last fall, we have been opening our Board and Senior Leadership Team meetings with patient stories. These stories have helped ground the local decision making of our Board Directors and Senior Leadership Team by focusing everyone's attention on the people who matter most—the patients. And starting this year, we will be reporting back to fellow Northerners on the actions we have taken as a result of hearing these stories. While it's good to listen, we also want to take these sometimes difficult experiences and use them to help improve health care in the North East.

Putting people first requires putting egos aside and being willing to learn from stories that might be critical or unflattering. So, yes, we want to hear your experiencesgood and bad—and our promise to you is that we will learn from them, so that our health care system becomes more patient-centred and more people-focused.

Opioidrelated deaths continue to increase in Ontario

MANITOULIN—The latest data shows that opioidrelated deaths continue to rise in Ontario. There were 1,053 opioid-related deaths in Ontario from January to October 2017, compared with 694 during the same time period in 2016, which represents a 52 percent increase. From January to December 2017, there were 7,658 emergency department visits related to opioid overdoses compared with 4,453 during the same period in 2016, a 72 percent increase.

Data provided by the Ontario Drug Policy Research Network shows the number of opioid users and opioid maintenance therapy users in Manitoulin District increased between 2011 and 2015, although opioid related emergency department visits decreased between 2011 and 2014. Manitoulin District ranks eighth out of 49 in Ontario for rate of opioid users (2015) and opioid related emergency department visits (2014), second for rate of opioid maintenance therapy users (2015), 12th in rate of opioid-related hospital admissions (2014) and 15th in rate of opioid related deaths (2013).

Ontario is expanding access to addiction and harm reduction services across the province to help combat the crisis, with more than 85 mental health and addiction providers across the province expanding treatments services and supports for opioid use disorder. Twelve of these providers are targeting supports for youth. Over 20 providers are investing in withdrawal management services in Ontario. than 30 communities will also benefit from new or expanded Rapid Access Addiction Medicine (RAAM) clinics.

In January, the Northeast Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN) launched its Opioid Strategy at a meeting of its Regional Mental Health and Addictions Advisory Council, which was instrumental in developing the strategy and will work with Opioid Task Forces within each of the North East LHIN's Sub-Regions —Algoma, Sudbury/Parry Sound/Manitoulin,

Cochrane, James and Hudson Bay Coast, and Nipissing/Temiskaming implement the strategy.

The NE LHIN is investing \$1.65 million in base funding across Northeastern Ontario to increase

Romance scam is the most emotionally

devastating fraud Many hearts are broken in the quest for love, leaving some people financially wounded. Romance scams cause victims severe financial loss and, due to the emotional impact and perembarrassment, sonal these crimes are not reported to police.

Members of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Anti-Rackets Branch say criminals use the Romance Scam to find potential victims online, generally sinthis form of mass marketing fraud occurs through singles and dating-related 'meet' websites, social media platforms, or e-mail blasts. In some cases, prolonged interaction with individuals has cost some victims tens of thousands of dollars before the 'relationship' suddenly ends, usually without ever meeting in person. Among the most vulnerable are seniors.

In 2017, the Romance Scam generated 352 complaints and caused 250 victims to lose \$6.2 million in fraud in the province and police admit that this may represent just five per cent of the total num-

ber of victims.

As part of the annual Fraud Prevention Month campaign, the OPP and its partners at the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre have some tips to help you avoid becoming a victim of the Romance Scam.

First, ask yourself 'Would someone I have never met, really declare their love for me after only a few letters or emails?' If the answer is no, report it to police.

Don't give out any personal information in an name, the company name, and the addresses used.

Never send money, or give personal credit card or online account details to anyone you do not know and trust. A request to send money to a foreign country or to someone you have never personally met should be a red flag.

Check website addresses carefully. Scammers often set up fake websites with addresses that are very similar to legitimate dating websites.

If you or someone you know suspect they've been a victim of the Romance Scam, contact your local police service. You can also file a complaint through the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, Crime Stoppers at 1-

GLA:D program for those living with osteoarthritis comes to Manitoulin

MANITOULIN—all many Islanders are familiar with osteoarthritis (OA), the most widespread way of life ailment in people over 65. This condition affects any joint in the body that is covered by cartilage including the fingers, hands, knees and hips with the ailment occurring more often in women.

Treatment osteoarthritis includes a diagnosis from a medical history and physical examination.

There are exercise programs and physiotherapy for dealing with OA and now Manitoulin can boast of the 'Good Living with osteoArthritis from Denmark' (GLA:D) course that is offered in M'Chigeeng, Aundeck Omni Kaning, Manitowaning and Wiikwemkoong. GLA:D works hand in hand with local physiotherapist Leslie Green of the Northeastern Joint Assessment Centre (NEJAC), a program offered at the Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) in Little Current and it is taught by kinesiologist Maria McInnis of Kagawong.

Ms. McInnis has 10 years of experience with physiorehabilitation, therapy, ergonomic assessments and cardiac rehabilitation at the Little Current hospital. She heard about the program from Ms. Green and took training for GLA:D in

Toronto.

Ms. McInnis As explained, the eight-week program combines both exercise and education to help people with hip and knee OA and the goal is to put off surgery, decrease pain and allow one to do more activities around the house. The course works on muscles around the joints, on alignment and one's core and stretching. It is funded through the Manitoulin Family Health Teams and attendance is based on a referral from a doctor. The class has 8 to 10 people at a time and Ms. McInnis tries to cycle one new person a

week. Clients attend twice a week for the very functional exercises that do not require any special equipment.

The Expositor talked with two gentlemen who were enrolled in the GLA:D program in M'Chigeeng. Taibossigai, who resides in that community, was in his 10th session with Ms. McInnis and spoke highly of her and of the course. "It's helped me out with the pain from my Achilles tendon which I tore two and a half years ago," he said. "And my left knee has a plate. It helps my knees. I hope to be able to walk up and down stairs. That has really improved. I really appreciate how Maria teaches the course. She is very easygoing and takes her time at explaining everything. She is very professional.

John Mason of Spring Bay, who was just finishing his eighth week, is also enjoying the program. "Wonderful," he said when asked about GLA:D. "It's really helped me a lot.

Maria gave me a lot of exercises to carry on so I'm all set. Doctor Stadnyk told me about the program. I would recommend it to everyone. It really strengthens your muscles. I would recommend this to people with arthritis."

GLA:D Canada explains in a handout for class participants that OA was previously thought to be a 'wear and tear' disease that led many people to think that they cannot and should not be physically active. To the contrary, cartilage needs moderate load through physical activity to regenerate itself. Ligaments and muscles help stabilize the joint and cartilage, which has no blood supply, requires nourishment from synovial fluid. The cartilage needs to be appropriately loaded to regenerate itself. When loaded and unloaded, that is, synovial fluid is pumped in and out of cartilage, this stimulates new development of cartilage which improves its shock absorbing capacity.

As GLA:D Canada further explains that there are risk factors you cannot change, such as age, gender and heredity, when it comes to developing OA. This includes joint overload for many hours or many years but sports and regular physical activity recommendations for good health have not shown to lead to OA. Other changes that can include losing

weight and physical activi-Being overweight increases the risk of the cartilage and joint becoming overloaded. Neuromuscular activity improves cartilage quality while inactivity worsens cartilage, muscle and bone quality. Weak muscles are worse shock absorbers than strong muscles, and, as GLA:D Canada explains, weak muscles cause additional strain on the joint. Exercise is effective for pain relief and neuromuscular exercise is the most effective in addition to improving stability in the affected joint.

Other treatments for OA include pain killers, antiinflammatories, walking aids, hot and cold packs, transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation (TENS), foot supports and canes. GLA:D Canada points out that glucosamine has not been shown to have an effect on pain or cartilage structure that is greater than that of a placebo and that OA treatment guidelines from around the world do not recommend arthroscopy for OA, a noninvasive surgery which is best served to repair a torn meniscus or damaged ligaments.

GLA:D statistics show that over 13,000 people in Europe have participated in the program and most have experienced less pain, better physical function and a better quality of life

course ends and one year later. Fewer people are taking pain killers and fewer people are on sick leave. Participating in GLA:D creates the appropriate load for healthy cartilage, improves joint range of motion, improves stability joint function and improves confidence in the knee/hip by helping one move better. After GLA:D, there is less pain, better function, a higher quality of life and less painkillers.

This has held true after the

Recommendations include physical activity, which is any body movement making the heart beat faster which improves general health such as blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar levels and reduces the risk of getting inactivity-related diseases such as cardiovascular disease, diabetes and certain cancers. Another recommendation is exercise. which is a type of physical activity carried out with a specific purpose that is performed to improve function. GLA:D Canada further recommends to always exercise at a level that suits your fitness level. To show improvement, repeat exercise, increase the load gradually and continue to challenge yourself. Aim to be physically active for 30 minutes a day at least twice a week with moderate to high intensity and with an emphasis on quality and control. Do not sit down for more than 20 minutes at a time and remember, exercise therapy has been shown to produce the best pain and functional outcomes for OA.



GriefShare program returns to Spring Bay

SPRING BAY—The 13-week GriefShare program at the Spring Bay Pentecostal Church will be returning due, somewhat unfortunately, to popular demand.

'We ran it before," said Pastor Dan Thompson, "In fact, this will be the third time we have offered the program. There are, unfortunately, a lot of people on the Island struggling with grief. One gentleman just approached me this week saying he had just lost his wife of 46 years.'

No matter how well prepared we are for the loss of a loved one, the loss still can have a devastating impact on someone as the reality of their no longer being there in our lives hits home.

"I just can't imagine what that would be like, to lose someone like that," he said. Pastor Thompson said that being approached about the grief counselling program is

not an isolated incident. "I have had people from every community come to me to ask if there was any chance your church will start a support group.'

GriefShare seminars and support groups are led by people who understand what people in grief are going through and who want to help. In addition to supportive people, GriefShare provides resources to help a person recover from their loss and provide support to help them move forward to rebuilding their lives.

Pastor Thompson has had many visceral experiences with grief through his pastoral work, but he has also suffered deep personal grief as well. "My son was shot and killed in the line of duty as a police officer eight years ago," he said. His adopted son was only 37 when he was

"but it may be cheaper to build a new building and support our seniors that

Next to speak on this issue was Councillor Dale Scott who said, "Linda (Councillor Farquhar) had mentioned that to get funding, you would need a feasibility study. It doesn't guarantee money to refurbish an old building."

Central Manitoulin Economic Development Officer (EDO) Nancy Kinoshameg responded to this by telling council that a feasibility study has to be done to identify potential funders.

'Specific to seniors Councillor Scott only? asked.

"No, for the building," Ms. Kinoshameg replied. "The committee will look at the seniors' component, but the study will look at the entire building.

"The study will not guarantee that the building will go ahead," said Councillor Scott. He also asked, "If the council payment is accepted and the consultant is hired, will there be ongoing consultant fees?'

"I don't think so," Ms. Kinoshameg replied. "It would be up to council to accept." She also informed the committee that she has knowledge on how to apply for grants. This would then not necessarily have to be done by consultants. In reply to a question from Councillor Farguhar, Ms. Kinoshameg said that the study could take four to six months to complete, but that the committee could also ask the consultant to work within their time-

Councillor Ted Taylor was also at this meeting and asked if the \$50,000 was the consultant's fee for the building study and was it a set amount or could it be less? Ms. Kinoshameg said that that amount is the limit to which FedNor will pay, but it could indeed be less if, say, an engineering report was not required.

Councillor Alex Baran concluded this discussion by saying that council would have to speak on this issue for a full representative vote as all the councillors were not present at this meeting.

The vote taken at this Finance and Economic Development Committee meeting saw Councillor MacDonald vote against the motion that would see council pay \$5,000 towards the feasibility study. Councillor Scott abstained from voting. The vote was recorded at the request of Councillor MacDonald. Councillors Derek Stephens and Ted Taylor did not vote as they are not members of that committee.

The council meeting tomorrow will be an important one as the outcome of this request by MOSRC could very well spell a big step forward in whether or not the better living building is established.

It was evident at the MOSRC meeting on March 19 that there is a desire to see the Old School revamped as the committee has already received 95 responses to their survey in hand with

others still online. The survey was mailed to Central Manitoulin M'Chigeeng residents.

The canvass found that female responses far outweighed those of males at 76.84 percent of the mailed surveys. The question asking about groups and clubs saw 51.55 percent of respondents in favour of a games room with billiards, shuffleboard and other games. Next, at 48.45 percent, was the desire for a movie theatre with comfortable chairs and a large screen. Other answer choices were a book club and genealogy centre, both at 30.93 percent, a computer club at 29.90 percent and a language club with French, Ojibwe and Spanish lessons at 16.49 percent.

In the fitness category, the largest response was for low intensity yoga or Tai Chi as well as low impact exercises, both at 61.29 percent. The next favoured fitness class was training in agility and balance at 51.61 percent. Dancing, line, jazz or ballroom saw a response of 37.63 percent with seated pilates and badminton being the least favoured activities.

The survey question around interest in health. cooking and eating saw the largest response at 50.65 percent for a weekly luncheon, perhaps Mondays for seniors, while respite for caregivers was also high on the list. Many people were interested in classes that would be on such subjects as hearing, chronic pain management, osteoporosis, blood pressure and elder abuse at 36.36 percent. Following that was 'cooking for one' at 31.17 percent, coping with Alzheimers and confidence and motivation training.

The arts and crafts section of the survey saw over 40 percent of respondents ing to give the money needfavouring both textiles, which would include spinning, weaving, quilting, knitting and rug hooking

and painting. Woodworking and carving was the next to be in line and just over 30 percent saw a desire for an artisan studio and gallery where people could demonstrate, display and sell arts and crafts. Pottery classes results stood at 25.84 percent, jewellery making at 24.72 percent and 'writing memories' at 15.73 percent.

Islanders are known for their love of music and it didn't matter what the activities were on the music list, the answers were almost all in the same percentage group. These included sing-alongs and karaoke, amateur musicians getting together to jam with some instruments provided and music lessons.

Another question was around lifelong learning. The highest percentage answer was way above all the questions with the response here at 73.91 percent for the desire for classes in preserving digital photos, using social platforms like Facebook, making videos and using cellphones. Twenty-six percent of the respondents were interested in 'computer classes for the terrified' and just under 16 percent wanted to know how cannabis would affect them.

The MOSRC members were pleased with the results of the survey with Joanne Smith saying, "If we fix it, they will come." Sam Bondi agreed, commenting, "It does confirm that there is a need. The desire for it is there.'

"The feasibility study would give you a solid foundation on going ahead," Ms. Kinoshameg

The committee then turned to the situation of some councillors not wanted for the share of the study not covered by Fed-Nor.

In speaking of Council-

lor MacDonald's reason for her non-support, neither Chair committee Williamson nor Ms. McQuay said they remembered that it was agreed to that MOSRC would never ask council for funds.

Ms. McQuay also talked of the large amount of funding that the committee could potentially get from Heritage Canada. She spoke to a representative who said, "Don't give up. We can help you." It was felt that if council knew of this perhaps they would react favourably to the request for \$5,000.

Mayor Stephens remarked that it would be "almost impossible to proceed without the support of council. The key is to have the council support."

Ms. Smith added that she had been talking to people who use the seniors' centre in Gore Bay, "that they just

Ontario Votes 2018

Liberal Throne Speech promises new investments in health services, infrastructure

by Michael Erskine

TORONTO—Premier Kathleen Wynne followed up a technical prorogue of the legislature with a Throne Speech outlining the government's plans going forward into an election year. Although opposition parties were calling foul as private member's bills were tumbled into the dustbin by the move, the Wynne government asserted that no sitting days were lost (since the prorogue came during the March break) and that all government bills would be reintroduced for debate.

The government characterized the Throne Speech read by Lieutenant Governor Elizabeth Dowdeswell to open the third session of the province's 41st parliament on Monday as taking "bold action to enhance health care, home care, mental health

The government's plan going forward will "focus on doing more for people in health care, home care, mental health care and child care services. It will also expand a number of other programs that support people to care for their loved ones and help them to succeed in a changing economy."

"I hear from people every day who put caring first, whether it's at home, caring for their families, or at work, caring for patients, students or society's most vulnerable people," said Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne following the Throne Speech. "The people of Ontario are our greatest strength and our government doesn't accept that anyone should be left to fend for themselves, particularly in this turbulent, changing economy. We're taking bold steps to ensure the best care for our children, our seniors and our friends and family members. Our plan will relieve pressure on families by making it easier for people to care for themselves and for each oth-

Ontario's economy remains strong, noted the government announcement, with the unemployment rate at its lowest in almost two decades. But it pointed out the rising cost of living and that stable, long-term jobs are becoming harder to find, so that many people struggle to make ends meet as they try to take care of themselves and their families.

"As the changing economy widens the gaps within our society, the government has a plan to build a fairer, better Ontario by supporting everyone in the province with the care and opportunity they need to get ahead, notes a release on the speech.

The government's priorities, as out-

Doug Ford addresses Northern issues in teleconference

TORONTO—Newly minted Ontario Progressive Conservative Party leader Doug Ford sat down with Northern Ontario journalists by teleconference last Friday morning to discuss Northern issues and his plan of approach to meeting those challenges. Current polls have Mr. Ford on track to be the premier of Ontario following the June 7 provincial election.

Mr. Ford began the interview recognizing the challenges presented by a leadership contest. "Leadership races are tough," he said, "even tougher when you are going against friends and But he was adamant, "our party is unit-

Mr. Ford went on to assert that "I have always stood up for the little guy" before touching on the linchpin issue of "hard to afford hydro bills." He alleged that the current government is "taking money from the taxpayer" and that he was 'going to start putting money back into the pockets of taxpayers."

Mr. Ford went on to attack the current govern-

ment, saying that "the Liberal will do anything, say anything, to stay in power.'

"Under the Liberals," he asserted, "the North has been left behind." Mr. Ford then went on to attack the "insiders" who he said have profited from the current government, referencing the paycheque of the Hydro One CEO. He said that people in the North were struggling with high unemployment levels, "while people in the south are getting good paying jobs."

The Tory leader then went on to reference a recent media report on a man who spent 10 days in a hospital bathroom at Sudbury's Health Sciences North hospital (as no room was available in which to admit him) and the Liberal cuts to the Northlander passenger rail service.

His government, he suggested, would return the Northlander to service. His government would "provide people with proper transportation when we bring the train back—they will be able to find jobs a half-hour

The Northlander passenger rail service ran between Toronto and Cochrane, connecting to the Polar Bear Express train running further north to Moose Factory. The Liberal government shut down the service citing high costs and low ridership numbers.

Also in the transportation field, Mr. Ford touched on the Ring of Fire. "We are going to start building roads," he said, going on to say "even if I have to get on the bulldozer myself.

Mr. Ford attacked the curgovernment for appointing an MPP from Ottawa-Vanier (the Honourable Nathalie Rosier) to the Ministry of

Natural Resources and Forestry. "You don't put someone who doesn't have a clue about forestry and mining in charge," he said.

"My message to the North is very clear," said Mr. Ford. "The North will be open for business. The North will at last have someone who has their back. Northern Ontario will have jobs.

He concluded his statements by asserting that Northern Ontario "will have a say in every decision at Queen's Park.

Mr. Ford then took questions, one each, from Northern journalists on the line.

The first question referenced the current level of provincial debt and asked the Tory leader how he would solve the North's problems without getting further into debt.

Mr. Ford replied by way of referencing the Humber River Hospital and its effective cost reduction program. "We would use the same format," he said, citing "hundreds of millions in savings." He advised the journalist to "listen to the documentary.'

NDP outline proposed new dental plan

TORONTO—The Ontario NDP chose to announce their new \$1.2 billion dental plan on Monday just as the government was delivering the Throne Speech for the third session of the 41st provincial parliament.

The proposed plan is aimed at that one-third of the province's workforce that does not already have their coverage under employee benefits and those on Ontario Works or Ontario Disability, as well as seniors whose own benefits ran out when they turned 65.

"This is something that Ontarians have been telling us that they need," said Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha. "Many people have come into my office seeking help to cover the cost of dental treat-

via teleconference call on checkups" or delay having Monday, where she highlighted the announced plan and answered questions.

confident we can implement," said Ms. Horwath, who said it was primarily designed to prevent the 'horrifying decisions parents of kids have to make on delaying their children's



purposes) we are showing the children, the youth and future leaders of our reserves, small towns, province and country that getting high is okay," he said. "It's not—it's a poison."

Mr. Towers said that he believes that most people who start using marijuana never stop "or they will move on to worse, harsher and more addictive substances in search of a better high or buzz, or from peer pressure at a party." His viewpoint may be anecdotal, but it is also first person.

"I myself am a recovering addict," he said. "I started using in Grade 9 and I continued using it for the next 10 to 12 years, perhaps even longer. The point I am trying to make is that marijuana made it extremely difficult to focus, learn and to memorize lessons from that day, resulting in me learning very little."

Mr. Towers points to his marijuana usage as the main culprit in starting him down the road to addiction and derailing his school career. "It took away my drive, my ambition, which eventually led to my expulsion due to low marks and lack of credits."

The impact of his drug use wasn't just limited to his academics either. "It also affected my health in a negative way," he said. "It caused laziness, overeating and depression from the realization that this drug had control over me." A sense of helplessness and lack of control over his life added impetus to his downward spiral. "It drove me to smoke more from having the mindset 'I give up, might as well keep smoking; it's too late to stop'."

Eventually, that spiral took him into heavier and more addictive drugs. For himself, at least, he feels marijuana was, in fact, a gateway drug.

Without the wherewithal to supply his growing consumption and lacking the drive or education to attain a good paying job, he turned to crime. "It turned me into a thief because I couldn't afford it," he said. "Do we really want that for the potential leaders of tomorrow?" he asked, citing the

challenges that marijuana consumption poses for learning and education. If youth are not able to learn to their full potential, he suggests, "this will raise the possibility that they will give up in school from not being able to understand the work" and cause them "to go down the path of becoming a local burnout or worse—turning into drug dealers themselves."

The legalization of marijuana will lead to it becoming even more common, and with the prohibition on smoking outdoors, "this poison will soon be outside our homes, local restaurants, bars, schools, hospitals, places of business, recreational

centres, health centres and band offices."

Mr. Towers suggests that this will lead to "important leaders of our communities making decisions for our communities with clouded judgement and not having a clear, cool head on their shoulders."

Although marijuana may be pretty common and available now on the black market, Mr. Towers said that at least with it being illegal, children aren't being given the message that doing drugs is "okay. We need to show our youth that they don't need drugs to have fun, to be cool, to fit in or enjoy life," he said, "and that using drugs does not solve our problems. It only caused more problems for the future, our loved ones and ourselves."

The Ontario government has announced that it intends to sell marijuana in freestanding dedicated retails stores separate, but overseen by, the LCBO. The government has chosen a name for the new chain of pot stores, the Ontario Cannabis Store, likely soon to be shortened like its parent to OCS.

Newly minted Progressive Conservative leader Doug Ford has indicated a Tory government would look to expand sales to private entrepreneurs, a move Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne has characterized as "reckless."

The decision to legalize marijuana and regulate retails sales of the drug was made by the federal government, which originally planned legalization to take place on July 1 of this year. But delays in the Senate, which says it wants to review changes to impaired driving legislation before debating the legalization bill will likely see the pot sales bill delayed until later in August.

With the combined weight of all three major parties set against him, Mr. Towers said that he recognizes the challenge that turning the legalization of marijuana around will present, but he said that he feels it is something that has to be done for the sake of future generations.

"I can't do this on my own," he said. "I can only start the ripple, but together we can change the tide." Mr. Towers said that he hopes that like minded people in the community will contact him to work together to start the petition asking the government to step back from its legalization plans. OFA farmers have until March 25 to help direct group's future

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Island farmers who are members of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture (OFA) are being encouraged to fill out a survey to help direct the future of Ontario's largest farm lobbying group.

"Every couple of years, we reach out to members and find out what the concerns are," Brent Royce, OFA director, told The Expositor in an interview last week. "We try to grasp what the grassroots want from the OFA."

The OFA represents over 37,000 farm businesses in the province. While it's next to impossible to reach each and every one of those 37,000 farms, Mr. Royce said the OFA does a good job of getting a large sampling of farms both big and small.

Mr. Royce said farmers can expect to answer a wide range of questions such as whether they believe they are getting good value for their OFA membership and what the key issues are affecting their area.

The OFA director said he was well aware of some of the issues

facing Manitoulin Island farmers, namely damages to crops and livestock from wildlife and the problems surrounding compensation, noting the Sandhill cranes that are prevalent to the area.

Farmers will also be asked questions regarding climate change, business planning and rural Internet.

Mr. Royce spoke of one of OFA's biggest focusses, 'Producing Prosperity in Ontario'—"refocussing rural Ontario as a place to grow Ontario's economy," he noted, adding that a redistribution of wealth would also mean a decrease in the strain on urban infrastructure.

"The Ontario Chamber of Commerce has signed on," Mr. Royce noted.

Farmers only have until Sunday, March 25 to take the survey which can be done by visiting www.ofa.on.ca and clicking on the link on the main page. For those who wish to fill out a paper survey, call 1-800-668-3276 to have one mailed to you.

"Members are members, no matter where they are," Mr. Royce concluded. "We encourage all farmers to have their say."

...'Rowan's Law' demands youth sports must enact, enforce concussion injury protocols

"In the third game she was tackled, removed from play and shortly after complained of a headache. The following Monday she had a game after school and was feeling great and ready to play. In this game, someone stepped hard on her head and her headache returned and she suspected she had a concussion but told no adult. Wednesday, May 8 after school was her last game. She was not feeling well but wanted to play and in this game, she sustained her last concussion which led to Second Impact Syndrome and her death on May 12."

"It's terrible and devastating to lose a child," the parents continue. "What's even worse is that Rowan's death was preventable. This is why we've decided to do what we can to tell Rowan's story, educate children, athletes and all involved in child and youth sport. Our goal is to help to prevent future injury and death from concussion. Creating legislation, Rowan's Law, will help protect our youth and fulfill Rowan's dream of helping children."

Under Rowan's Law, a sport organization must not register an individual who is under the prescribed age in a sports activity unless the individual confirms that they have reviewed the concussion awareness resources approved by the Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport. For individuals under 18 years of age or such other prescribed age, the parent or guardian of the individual must also confirm that they have reviewed the resources, and individuals who serve as a coach or in other prescribed positions for a sport organization must also confirm that they have reviewed the resources.

Rowan's Law also states that a sport organization must establish a concussion code of conduct and a removalfrom-sport protocol for athletes who are suspected of having sustained a concussion. The protocol must, among other things, establish a specific process to implement the immediate removal of an athlete and must designate persons who are responsible for ensuring the removal of the athlete and ensuring that they do not return to training,

to Manitoulin Island," he continued. "The review of options will include identifying and assessing several factors such as safety, environment and construction. The study will identify a recommended strategy and allow the ministry to protect any required land for future construc-

Members of the public, Indigenous communities and stakeholders will have the opportunity to comment on the alternatives and the study process throughout the study. This opportunity will be available through a project website, Public Information Centres and communication with the project team.

The first step will be to issue a Notice of Project Commencement and outline the study and contact information. Consultation meetings and sessions are expected to follow in late-summer to fall 2018.

practice or competition, except in accordance with the sport organization's return-to-sport protocol.

Sports groups are also required to establish a return-tosport protocol with respect to athletes who have sustained a concussion or are suspected of having sustained a concussion. The protocol must, among other things, establish a specific process to implement the return of an athlete to training, practice or competition and must designate persons who are responsible for ensuring that an athlete does not return until permitted to do so in accordance with the

The Act also proclaims the last Wednesday in September as Rowan's Law Dav.

Rowan's Law also amends the Education Act. Part XIII.1 of the Act is renamed "Pupil Health" and a new section is added to it. The new section authorizes the Minister to establish and require boards to comply with policies and guidelines respecting concussions in pupils. The Minister is also given authority to make regulations prescribing requirements respecting concussions in pupils of private schools and to require private schools to comply with the requirements.

Derek Debassige, clinic director/owner, Manitoulin Physio based in M'Chigeeng is considered a local expert in the field of concussion, hosting clinics and helping parents and coaches determine whether a return to play is right for

Mr. Debassige said he was pleased to see the enactment of Rowan's Law, noting that the concussion conversation has advanced a great deal since 2013 and Rowan's untimely death

"It's taken some time to get to that point," he added.

"It's important to protect the amateurs, but there's also a

good education component, especially for parents and educators," Mr. Debassige said.

Rowan's Law, Mr. Debassige continued, has helped to advance concussion awareness, especially at schools; some of which had concussion protocols in place, and some of

"Having consistent messaging to parents is something we're still challenged with (in regards to return to play),

Mr. Debassige said he is pleased with the portion of Rowan's Law that asks students and their guardians to sign an agreement stating that they have read the concussion awareness resources and know the potential issues involved, particularly with contact sports, before they play.

Knowing the signs of even the mildest concussion is key, Mr. Debassige added. There is such a push to participate, to lace up for that championship game or head out on the pitch for the playoff final, that the risks are often forgotten. When weighted against the actual risk, and most individuals dramatically underestimate that risk, it's just not

Rowan Stringer's father, Gordon Stringer, played a key role in the work of the Rowan's Law Advisory Committee which came into being following recommendations from an inquest into the teen's 2013 death. Former NHL superstar Eric Lindros, whose career was sidelined due to multiple concussions, also played a major role in promoting the new legislation.

The day the legislation passed at Queen's Park, March 6, Rowan's parents were in the legislature. Rowan's father Gordon Stringer told a Toronto Star reporter that, "the heavy lifting has been done here in Ontario. This is something that needs to be addressed across the country."

Women's Day event urges women to be aware of victims of abuse, and how to help

group of women, and friends of women, gathered at the Assiginack Curling Club for an International Women's Day March 8 to join in a discussion on the topic 'When love hurts: a woman's guide to understanding abuse in relationships.'

Ngwaagan Gamig Recovery Centre (Rainbow Lodge), with help from Manitoulin Family Resources and the Mnidoo Minising Coalition Against

Domestic Violence, hosted the event featuring special guest speaker David Cory, stepping in for his wife Jill Cory who had fallen ill prior to the gathering. Ms. Cory is the co-author of the book for which the presentation is named.

Mr. Cory began the presentation by sharing startling statistics, such as half of all Canadian women over the age of 16 have experienced at least one incident of male violence and the fact that every six days in Canada, a woman is

killed.

He spoke of the many inaccurate stereotypes women who live with abuse face, like 'women are attracted to men who are abusive,' or 'the abuse goes both ways,' referencing one woman's story who was told by a responding police officer that she "gave as good as she got."

"The types of victims are greatly different," Mr. Cory added. "The impacts are greater for women," he said, noting the greater potential for fear, injury,

patterns of abuse and even stalking. Of abuse victims, 88-95 percent are women.

So how can men be part of the solution? Change the narrative; know that social justice is a shared human responsibility; remember that violence against women affects men's lives too (moms, aunties, sisters, grandmas, friends); help end a system that devalues femininity; stop being threatened by unmasculine qualities and be free from gender stereotypes.

Other stereotypes

include the thought that 'women make bad choices' and 'she can leave.'

lence' as this suggests that the violence is limited to a domicile, or home. This

Mr. Cory shared that about 26 percent of women who are murdered had left the relationship. Half of those murdered women were killed within two months of leaving. He also gave the startling statistic that women are six times more likely to be killed by an ex-partner than by their current partner and that almost 60 percent of all dating violence happens after the relationship has ended.

Mr. Cory said society should steer clear of using the term 'domestic vio-

lence' as this suggests that the violence is limited to a domicile, or home. This isn't necessarily so, he said. Family violence, too, is another confusing term as it lumps the entire family unit in when the children may not be abused.


Some of the women in attendance thought that this was unfair as even though a partner may not be abusing the children, the children are still affected.

Mr. Cory also went through the cycle of abuse, which is the honeymoon period followed by tension (jealousy, fault finding etc.)

love it" and that they are, and have been, supported by their council. Mr. Bondi then said, "There is a need, a desire, a huge senior population. Maybe we could make this an election issue."

It was agreed that member Hal Love will make a presentation to council at Thursday's meeting with Chairman Ted Williamson asking everyone to email suggestions to Mr. Love.

"If they can't do something for our seniors," Mr. Love asked, "then why are we paying taxes?"

Ms. McQuay also had comments on why this building should be saved. "First," she said, "it is part of the local heritage, a landmark, one of the first consolidated schools in Ontario and students were transported in the first school buses to operate under contract in the province." She went on to add that the building is probably the only such building that the municipality has the power to save because it is owned by the municipality and that it is still a solid, well-built building after nearly 100 years.

"Unlike many newer buildings," Ms. McQuay said, "this building was built to last. The preservation of historic buildings is a one-way street. If it is destroyed, it can never be replaced. A part of our history will be gone forever. The building could house a better living centre with multiple activities, especially for seniors, who constitute over 800 people in the municipality. This would make the municipality more attractive for people to come and live here."

...continued from page 11 able prescription drugs and lined in the Throne Speech, were: reducing wait times for health care by significantly increasing hospital operating budgets; expanding home care to provide more services for seniors choosing to stay at home, and to provide financial relief for families who are caring for aging loved ones; making historic investments in mental health and addictions services so people of all ages across the province can get the care they need; ensuring more people without a drug and dental benefits plan will have access to more afford-

dental care; providing more college and university students with free tuition through the new OSAP; making investments to train more apprentices for the workforce, including in emerging fields; focusing on regions that are struggling to achieve economic growth by investing in workers and businesses; continuing to make recordinvestments across Ontario in public infrastructure such as schools, hospitals, roads, bridges and transit sys-

NDP Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha was

sceptical. "What you are hearing is from 15 years of failed policies," he said. "They are doing what is best for the Liberal Party. Ontarians are not going to put up with that. They have had 15 years to fix the problems and what we have are crumbling infrastructure, hospitals with people lying in the hallways, our medical services are suffering and people have to choose between feeding their families and paying their hydro bills. The people of Ontario want change.'

"The Ontario government laid out its priorities today in its Speech from the Throne, with mostly disappointing outcomes in regard to working with First Nations in Ontario ahead of the upcoming election," said Ontario Regional Chief Isadore Day in a release responding to the Throne Speech. "Despite an opening reference to the fact that our peoples are still shut out of the prosperity that built this province, there were no plans on how the province will become a more active treaty partner in 'a fair and better Ontario.' In fact, there was no mention of the treaty relationship that created

this province." Still, Regional Chief Dav said he was encouraged that more First Nations students were benefiting from free tuition.

"Something we noted was the omission of the commitment to implement Resource Revenue Sharing (RRS), which has been included in previous Throne Speeches," he said. "We must continue to forge ahead on this commitment to implement a provincial Resource Revenue Sharing (RRS) policy, which will vastly improve First Nation prosperity. Revenue sharing is not just about minerals and forests, but includes a share of provincial revenues from gasoline and tobacco, to cannabis and cap and trade."

"In weeks to come," con-

tinued Regional Chief Day, "First Nations will be turning up the volume on the fact that this province, and this country, was built because treaties were signed with our peoples. Now is the time to fully include First Nations and realize that promise of shared prosperity for all. Let's chart a new treaty economic path with Ontario that fully includes First Nations. A new treaty economy also includes access to employment and training, government procurement, as well as interprovincial and international trade. Together, we will generate wealth and build a fair and better Ontario for all.'

A second question asked the Tory leader how he was going to get his message out to the people across the North. "Were you better off 15 years ago or today?" he replied. "I am going to be crisscrossing the North like you have never seen before." Mr. Ford again brought the discussion back to the Ring of Fire, noting that there are "billions of dollars just sitting there" and saying the roads will be built "if I have to jump on the bulldozer.'

Mr. Ford reiterated that he believed that the money to meet his agenda would be found in reducing and eliminating government waste. "Do you think there is four cents of waste," he said he asked the people he has met. Universally, he said, people have answered in the affirmative.

Asked by The Expositor about plans for the replacement of the Little Current Swing Bridge, Mr. Ford said "let's find a way. No way it should cost millions of dollars (to study a solution), that's not going to cut it. We are going to have to find efficiencies, it doesn't cost millions to figure out how to change a bridge."

On whether the Progressive Conservatives will see the completion of four-laning Highway 69 Mr. Ford unequivocal. "Absolutely," he said. "We are committed to finishing it." He then turned the phone over to North Bav MPP Vic Fedelli. "There said Mr. Fedelli, who said more was needed than repeated photo ops. "All governments need to do

Asked again about the Ring of Fire, Mr. Ford reiterated that his government would make sure the transportation infrastructure was built. "It will be good for everyone, First Nations communities, towns and all across the North," he said. "What takes the time is the red tape," he said. "Government drives me crazy.'

In closing, Mr. Ford said that his government would bring prosperity to the North "never seen before. We are going to open Ontario for business," he said. "We will make business prosper like never

The existing staff at the Manitoulin farm locations and processing plant will continue to be employed at Manitoulin Trout Farms Inc. "We look forward to continuing to be a key part of Manitoulin's economy, and creating quality employment opportunities for Islanders," said Mr. Cole.

Manitoulin Trout Farms Inc. is a subsidiary of Cole Munro Foods Group Inc.

Cole Munro operates a processing and distributing facility out of St. Thomas, Ontario, and operates rainbow trout netpen farms in and around Manitoulin

The Ontario aquaculture industry has experienced a recent trend of gradual expansion and diversification with significant investment by the private sector, expansion of production capacity, and enhanced fish processing facilities to service this growing production output.

In their annual industry update, Richard Moccia and David Bevan of the University of Guelph noted that the industry produced 5,560 tonnes of fish and shrimp, primarily for human consumption, in 2016 which represents a 12 percent increase over 2015. Lake-based net pen production of rainbow trout in Georgian Bay and Lake Huron continues to dominate all other land-based production systems accounting for 85 percent of the total production. They estimate the total annual contribution that aquaculture makes to the Ontario economy could exceed \$100 million.

and, finally, explosion. He noted that men will often seek out vulnerable women to

Using psychological, physical, verbal, sexual, emotional, intellectual, financial and spiritual abuse, cutting women off from social circles, using their culture as a means for abuse ("This is my culture, so I can do what I want") and even killing or harming pets are all ways men abuse

"Men do this intentionally," he said.

"They would never treat their boss this way! It's all about power and control."

Common control tactics include orchestrating her public image; women being worried of the potential for escalation; creating dependence on their male partner; surveillance and monitoring; emotional blackmail; lying; and obsessive jealousy.

Mr. Cory said men need to change from thinking that they are central, superior and deserving to being connected, equal and mutual.

One woman in the audience suggested refraining from stopping little boys from

from playing with trucks. "This should be considered a good thing—good training for when they become parents," she said.

The presenter also spoke of perpetrators and the role of substance abuse; an excuse for violence. "He only hits me when he's drinking," is a common phrase.

On the other side, alcohol dependency is 15 times more prevalent in abused women, he told the group, and girls who experience sexual abuse are far more likely to engage in risky behaviour.

When dealing with an abused woman,

playing with dolls and vice versa, little girls Mr. Cory reminded the audience that the woman is the expert on her own life and that safety is always the priority. He urged them to try and understand each woman and her complexities and to always believe

> "Do not pathologize coping and survival skills," he said. "Adopt a woman-centered approach and bring a message of hope and healing."

> "There's so much a woman has to go through," one woman said. 'Thank you for vour words on what to do and what can be done."







Under the plan, those earning under \$30,000 and those receiving government assistance would be covered by the plan, with a phase-in on a sliding scale for those earning between \$30,000 and \$50,000. The plan would not cover those earning over \$50,000. The plan for low-income workers would be on a co-pay system. "Similar to what is out there now," said Ms. Horwath. Where most plans cover 80 percent of costs, the NDP would be on a 25 to 75 percent basis. Ms. Horwath that the cost would

amount to "about \$4 a

Under the plan, businesses will be given the option of participating in the public Ontario Benefits program or a comparable private workplace benefits plan. The plan would be free for anyone earning less than \$30,000 a year, but the most anyone would have to contribute off their paycheque to cover the employees' portion of the mandatory plan would be \$4.33 a

The NDP leader was adamant that the plan would not cause a decrease in current employee benefit plans. "We do not expect to see plans slide in the opposite direction," she said.

Ms. Horwath said that the plan would also include increased accessibility measures, with an expansion of community health centres, "aboriginal health centres as well," she said. Seven dental health buses would bring dental care to communities that currently do not have a local dentist—likely similar to the CNIB's Eye Van. "We don't want anyone in our province at all to be without dental care.'

Ms. Horwath said that her party has been in consultation with Chambers of Commerce in designing the plan and that further consultation on implementation would continue as the plan was further fleshed

Employers would be carrying the cost of a portion of the new dental plan, which would see roughly one percent added to payroll costs, according to NDP forecasts.

"It will be a two-stream program," she said. "One stream will involve employers through the new Ontario Benefits program and the second will deal with social assistance.'

The employee reimbursement would come through application. "We are hoping to have reimbursements on a more regular basis than one-year, she said. "Seniors and social assistance recipients would be able to access services through their OHIP card and the upfront costs would be directly reimbursed to the service provider.'

Ms. Horwath said that

the \$1.2 billion price tag on the plan does not take into account the potential savings from diverted emergency room and doctors' visits. "There will be considerable savings to be had there as well."

Support for Seniors

Canada's aging population requires a National Seniors' Strategy now

ESPANOLA—"Canada needs a National Seniors' Strategy to address needs along the full continuum of care," said Nickel Belt MP Marc Serré at a community forum in Espanola on Saturday, March 17. MP Serré is passionate about the topic and has been hosting forums across the country to discuss how Canada can improve access to affordable housing, income security and overall quality of life for seniors.

"I'm here as a Member of Parliament (MP) representing all constituents," MP Serré stated. "We need to get the conversation going, get some action happening." His priority is income security for seniors. "We need to get seniors out of poverty," he continued, "to provide them with choices for housing and social activities. Your feedback will support the development and implementation of a National Seniors' Strate-

According to Statistics Canada, over 15 percent of our population at the last census was over 65. That number was 7.6 percent in 1960. MP Serré noted that for the first time there are more people aged 65 and older than there are children aged 0-14 years. "By 2024 Canadians 65 and older will account for 20.1 percent of the population," he explained, "and by 2036 seniors are expected to make up 25 percent of the population. We need to act now and to

continued. "We are lowering prescription medication prices through a \$140.3 million investment over five years starting in 2017-18, and we're looking at a universal pharmacare program."

"The Canadian Medical Association (CMA) has actively worked on getting the federal government moving toward a national pharthree major themes: access to affordable and accessible housing, including aging in place; income security for vulnerable seniors; and community programs that promote social inclusion and recognize the social determinants of health.

"We tend to focus on health," MP Serré said, "but the other part seniors higher. "You don't feed the neighbour's children and starve your own," he said.

"Our deficit as a percentage of GDP is still a lot lower than most countries." MP Serré replied. "I advocate that we should not have seniors living in poverty, so let's find the money somewhere. We can look at shuffling dollars but benefits," she said.

MP Serré agreed. "At the end of the day it's very important that we receive feedback from all associations and organizations. The CNA has been very supportive and practical. Nurse practitioners are very important. There are 32 or more laws that contain the word "doctor." If you just added "nurse practitioner" it would make a difference for access to care overnight."

Clawbacks to income security payments and complex paperwork requirements were other concerns. MP Serré noted that the government is working to streamline and improve service delivery but suggested people contact their MP to obtain support for accessing programs. "We can't deliver the programs but have access to staff," he said. "We are here to bridge that gap."

Long waiting lists for limited affordable housing, access to care, elder abuse and home care rounded out the concerns in Espanola. One participant mentioned a government policy to provide more housing for families, noting that the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation won't fund a building if seniors will be the only tenants. This inclusive approach has often left women and seniors neglected as they may be denied access to affordable housing. Often members of this group have limited income and can't afford market rents.

are guaranteed a high quality of life and dependable access to programs and services."

"The federal government has taken steps to address the issue,' MP Serré said. "The 2017 budget invested \$6 billion over 10 years to improved access to home care and \$5 billion over 10 years to support mental health initiatives. Over 900,000 seniors (80 percent are women) are receiving enhanced Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) benefits up to \$947 per year and the age of eligibility for Old Age Security (OAS) and GIS was restored to 65 years. A \$40 billion investment through the National Housing Strategy will see more than 12,000 new affordable housing units built for seniors and repair 300,000 existing affordable units. As well, the Canada Pension Plan will be enhanced to increase the maximum level of pension earnings to 14 percent as of 2025.'

"Through New Horizons for Seniors, community-based projects can receive up to \$25,000," he more affordable medications and we need more medications covered. Especially on the seniors' side, where medications can be very costly." He noted that Dr. Eric Hoskins, former Ontario Minister of Health, has been hired and will report on a pharmacare program by the end of this year. "It will cost \$19-22 billion," he acknowledged, "but that's completely universal." It might mean working with existing private sector plans and addressing the gaps, and the model would likely include a cost sharing component with the provinces.

Last year MP Serré made a private members motion, M-106 "Seniors," that contained four broad objectives. After the motion was adopted by the House of Commons on May 17, 2017, the House of Commons Standing Committee on Human Resources, Skills and Social Development and the Status of Persons with Disabilities began a study, "Advancing Inclusion and Quality of Life for Canadian Seniors." The study has

> One participant liked the idea of bringing seniors' incomes up to a minimum level but was concerned about the cost and how it affects Canada's deficit. He suggested shifting funds from external aid programs, and prioritize

to support other countries. "We have a responsibility," he said. "There is famine, atrocities and wars. We also have a responsibility to help our own First Nations communities that we have been awful to in the last 150 years. We need to address that and put money there."

A health care worker suggested that all those working in health care, and not just the CMA, would have valuable input. "The Canadian Nurses Association (CNA) wrote a report that offered concrete suggestions that were costed out and demonstrated cheaper

"Waiting lists across the country can be three to six years for affordable nousing," said MP Serré. "Ideally, you want to encourage seniors to stay at home as long as they can. As a government, how do we better meet these challenges?"

He thanked participants for their questions. "You have to maintain this level of engagement," he encouraged the audience. 




