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Tetrastichus wasp

Ontario Medical Association members unhappy with provincial financial ceiling and considering job action in protest

Voices of compromise dampened just now

TORONTO—A lot of Ontario doctors are furious with the provincial government, and not all that happy with their own association either. Doctors have found themselves locked in an arm wrestling match over compensation that dates back to before a temporary 2012 pack that scaled back their pay in which they find themselves in a battle with at least one hand tied behind their backs.

Subsequent negotiations have included both a facilitator and a conciliator, but not binding arbitration which is near the top of the doctor's wish list. Oddly not designated as "an essential service," doctors are essentially forced to negotiate hemmed in by their Hippocratic Oath to "do no

harm." That oath precludes many courses of traditional job action, such as strikes or work to rule which technically lie within their negotiating toolbox.

Dr. Stephen Cooper, former chair of the Ontario Medical Association's Section of Rural Medicine Northern, noted that frustration over the lack of progress and perceived government reneging on earlier commitments has resulted in a deeply imbedded distrust that will be very difficult to overcome. Dr. Cooper himself is a casualty of that deep-seated anger, having campaigned for his seat on the board on a platform of working with the government to find a solution to the impasses that remain between the parties. He lost to an opponent who advocated taking a stronger stance in dealing with the government. "The majority of doctors, not all, but a majority, now want to have stronger action."

"I need emphasis that I in no way speak for the OMA," cautioned Dr. Cooper. "Currently I am just a regular physician with more than average OMA experience."

Back in 2012 the OMA came to a short term agreement with the province resulting in a .5 percent reduction in physician fees. As part of that agreement there was a recognition that some form of co-management of the process would be in the offing. In 2014, there was another agreement reached that stretched to the end of 2015. A facilitator and conciliation were involved in finding some common ground between the two parties. "The facilitator recommended three things," recalled Dr. Cooper. The OMA was advised to accept the government's proposal, but the government was cautioned not to go back on its word and that the two parties should "find a better way of negotiating.'

"Essentially there was no way to negotiate in good faith under the current process," noted Dr.

The path forward continued to be fraught with potholes, with Ministry of Health backpedaling on the agreement and the two parties were unable to agree on a better way to negotiate. "Over the next year and a half there was increasing animosity," said Dr. Cooper.

What followed were "fairly aggressive" campaigns by both combatants seeking to win the public's hearts and minds over to their side of the line

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Leaked documents indicate US will claw back funding for Great Lakes cleanup

LAKE HURON—According to a leaked US federal document, the Trump administration is likely to slash the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GRLI) budget in 2018. This news immediately follows the leaked information that the Trump administration has asked the United States Army Corps of Engineers to hold off on its continued battle to keep the invasive giant Asian carp out of the Great Lakes, specifically by not releasing details of a plan for a crucial Illinois river choke point.

The Trump administration will likely cut the GRLI's annual funding from \$300 million down to \$10 million.

According to the GRLI website, the initiative was launched in 2010 "to accelerate efforts to protect and restore the largest system of fresh surface water in the world—to provide additional resources to make progress toward the most critical longterm goals for this important ecosystem."

Dairy farmers meeting updated on the state of the market

LITTLE CURRENT—The Dairy Farmers of Ontario (DFO) Manitoulin West Sudbury Dairy Producers annual general meeting was held at the Little Current United Church hall on Thursday, March 9. Following a beef lunch prepared by the Little Current United Church Women, local dairy producers were brought up to speed on the latest trends and concerns facing the industry by DFO representatives.

During the dairy committee elections, Keith Emiry was acclaimed chair and Sally Orford was acclaimed treasurer secretary. Following discussion, the committee decided that with the small number of producers in the area it would be simpler to have everyone on the committee, although limited to one vote per licence. A quorum will consist of a majority of the producers.

The decline in the number of dairy producers in the zone reflects the trend overall in the province, according to a report provided by Steve Runnalls, Region 12 director for the Districts of Northern Ontario and Haliburton. Although there have been 46 new producers come on line in the past year, when set against the number of producers remaining in the industry overall there was a net decline of 106.

Zone O service representative Jean Guy Seguin noted that there have been 11 new producers entered into the system in the North and five new entrants have accessed the New Entrant Quota Assistance Program (NEQAP). The P5 (Ontario, Quebec, Prince Edward Island, New

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First full year accredited course at Weengushk receives rave reviews

M'CHIGEENG—The first year of the Weengushk Film Institute's (WFI) Film Studies course accredited through Brock University will be soon drawing to a close and students have been wrapping up filming on their projects with enthusiasm to spare.

projects with enthusiasm to spare.

"It's been a wonderful year," said Shirley Cheechoo, WFI executive and artistic director. "That the program is accredited is huge for aboriginal and diverse youth."

While the WFI program is accredited and students build university credits, it is open to students that may not have the traditional entry requirements for university therefore it can "open doors for higher education and open up careers in the industry for youth," noted Ms. Cheechoo. "By the time the kids finish here in April, they will have eight films on their résumés. They will all be going to Brock to graduate."

The instructors taking part in the program are nothing short of impressive. "We have really good instructors," said Ms. Cheechoo. "Mark Irwin (Robocop, Something about Mary, Dumb and Dumber etc.) has shot a lot of Dreamworks films. Producer Patrick Cassavetti (Brazil, Waterland, Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas) is amazing, Phyllis Ellis has two Gemini Awards, two films premiering at the Sundance Film Festival and has lots of US screenwriting awards and Navin Ramaswaran whose recent projects include the Coca Cola freestyle campaign, Late Night Double Feature and One More for the Road."

Ms. Cheechoo notes that there has also been international interest in the WFI program. "It is a good thing for storytelling," she said, "and a good thing for Manitoulin."

Each student creates their own short film during the eight-week run of the course, and undertakes a variety of hands-on roles in their colleagues' projects.

Jonathan Zagula hails from Mississauga and has already spent three years at Brock University studying film theory and history and is also a former student of WFI. He is interested in the production side of the industry and when the opportunity to take the film studies course at WFI. "I took it right away," he said. He said he found the biggest attraction in coming to WFI was "the family-like atmosphere. Everyone is really close together and working together." Mr. Zagula's production is called "This Time.' The one-line synopsis for the production is: "Risking life and sanity, a time-traveller creates rips in time while trying to find the woman he loves."

Isaac Kakegamic of Thunder Bay came to WFI to "improve my writing and directorial skills." His interests lie in screenwriting and this is his second year at WFI. "I have worked in the industry for two years," he said, mainly as an assistant director. His project is entitled 'Reclamation.' Its one-line synopsis is: "One year after the end of the world. A woman discovers traces of her humanity returning after taking a young boy into her protection from the dangers of the new world."

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Old School building may find new life as retirement home

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The Municipality of Central Manitoulin passed a motion confirming its support in principal of a proposal to turn the Mindemoya Old School building into a retirement home, but things are still in a very early stage of planning.

"I run a nursing agency (Dawn of Angels Health Inc. in Hamilton) and have been working with homes on the Island," said the proponent Lisa Moyo when contacted recently about her proposal. "There is a great need for this type of facility on the Island,"

"I think we're still quite prepared to look at it once we receive a formal proposal," said Mayor Richard Stephens

Town CAO Ruth Frawley responded to a query from Councillor Ted Taylor about a recent tour of the building by the proponent. "It went good," she said of the tour. "Our building-maintenance supervisor was there, and he outlined all the things that would need to be done in the building."

"I did take a tour of the Old School building and I

agree it needs a little bit of work to be done," confirmed Ms. Moya. "I've been looking at a building if I don't buy a piece of property. I would like to work with the community on the Old School building; there is just something about an old building like that. A lot of people in the community probably went to school in the building."

Ms. Moya gave some indication of the size of the proposed facility.

"I initially was looking at a facility for 20 people," said Ms. Moyo, "but, in looking at the population of the Island, a retirement home/assisted living facility that could accommodate 25 to 30 people would go a long way towards solving some of the need out there."

Councillor Pat MacDonald pointed out there was discussion regarding a possible partnership with the municipality that will need to be clarified. That discussion apparently centred on the municipality's community improvement program and how that program could be leveraged to assist in making the proposal viable.

Island Animal Hospital expanding services to Little Current this May

Island Animal Hospital's Steve Fisher, clinic manager, and veterinarian Dr. Johanne Paquet said they decided to make the additional move to Little Current three days a week to better serve the number of clients that travel from the Little Current area and beyond. Island Animal Hospital sees pets from as far away as the North Shore and Espanola, the couple explains. The Little Current clinic is set to be open Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays starting May 1. The Mindemoya clinic will keep its usual hours.

"It will be a veterinary office," Dr. Paquet said. "Appointments,

Photovoice Exhibit tackles intimate violence with positive images displayed at Architecture School

SUDBURY—Violence in the home has tended to be a taboo subject across most cultural cleavages in Canada and, despite the best efforts of health, social and law enforcement workers to draw back the veil, dealing with the issue effectively still remains an issue. In First Nations communities the issue of intimate partner violence is fraught with challenges, but an innovative project spearheaded on the front lines by Mnaamodzawin Health Services in collaboration with the Northern Ontario School of Medicine has been tackling the issues from an indigenous approach.

For the past year and a half, Northern Ontario School of Medicine associate professor of medical anthropology, Dr. Marion Maar, and graduate student Beaudin Bennett have been working with Island health agencies in a process known as photovoice. A tangible by-product of that endeavour has resulted in the Noojamadaa (let's heal) Project.

In mainstream society, with its vestiges of puritanical punishment reaction to violence, attempts to counteract intimate partner violence has focussed on punishment and a negative reaction rooted in crime and punishment.

But the research team led by Dr. Maar has collaborated with Manitoulin First Nations communities and organizations on a photovoice project to support healthy relationships and counteract intimate partner violence that takes a more positive tack.

"In Photovoice methodology, participants are invited to take photographs and share their narratives to stimulate community action," noted Dr. Maar. As part of the methodology Dr. Maar and Mr. Bennett, who is in the third year of his Masters of Indigenous Relations program at Laurentian University, invited participants to take photographs and share their stories over a period of several months, but they did it with a twist.

In discussing the process and the photographs the participants would bring in, participants in the program indicated that they wanted to take a positive approach to the issue—focussing on pictures that relay positive family interactions and healthy relationships rather than the negative.

By using an experiential learning approach to foster and promote healing and reconciliation, the project has been enjoying considerable success, noted Dr. Maar. The participants in the Photovoice project are now set to take part in the knowledge translation aspect of the project, she said. "That involves gallery installation and film footage in collaboration with the indigenous theatre group Debajehmujig Storytellers and the Laurentian University School of Architecture."

Born is the Noojamadaa Exhibit. Noojamadaa means "let's heal" and the exhibit provides a safe space for indigenous and non indigenous peoples "to reflect on our shared journey towards wellness, through contemplation of our relationships with one another and our surroundings."

"This project is a new opportunity to raise awareness about the characteristics of intimate partner violence and to help inform community health strategies that can then begin to address this important issue," said Dr. Maar. "In undertaking this project Manitoulin First Nation communities have taken new steps toward community-based solutions to intimate partner violence. The project is guided by an indigenous community advisory committee, to ensure that the work continues to reflect the needs of communities."

"Debajehmujig will be creating a new production on the same topic that will accompany the exhibition at the Debajehmujig Creation Centre and shown twice once on April 5 and once on April 6," noted Debaj artistic director Joe Osawabine who, along

Privy Council Office rolling polls a cause for concern

News broke last week that for the first time in Canadian history, the Privy Council Office issued a contract for a running poll that will test the temperature of the Canadian electorate on issues every week, beginning next month, following the release of the federal budget. This is a troubling development.

This isn't a government department checking the pulse of the nation in regards to its particular bailiwick. This is the agency that advises the prime minister himself and the data that is collected from these running polls will be de facto available to the political officers of "the centre." The Centre, for the benefit of those outside the perception distortion field known as the Ottawa bubble, is the political heart of the Liberal Party of Canada—at least when it holds the levers of power in its hands.

There has been a long running tendency towards centralization in Canadian politics. Former Prime Minister Stephen Harper was infamously known as a control freak, but the polling proliferation actually dropped under his watch, at least at the start. Truth be told the centralization of power in the PMO (prime minister's office) has increased with just about every new occupant in the top office. The current incumbent's father, Pierre Elliot Trudeau, is famously credited with the start of the trend toward the centralization of power in the PMO—but he is far from the exception following on.

Regardless of who has done what, the latest news is troubling because it reveals a greater nod to populism is taking hold on the government. Making decisions on what "plays well in Peoria," rather than what demonstrably needs to be done in the interests of the country is a recipe for disaster. Some decisions are hard and downright unpopular, it is the double-edged sword of democracy, but when decisions are the right ones to make those decisions should be made.

Politicians are already notorious for swaying with the wind, but the rule by polls approach comes at a cost in credibility that is already strained too close to breaking point.

Throughout the history of modern democracy, political parties have played an important role in what the political scientists like to term interest aggregation. Parties tend to coalesce a certain pressure on the leadership to produce policies that at least somewhat trend in the direction of a particular ideology of how things should be done. But as time has gone on, the party role in government has all but disappeared.

Concurrent with that trend has been a centralization of power in the office of the prime minister and cabinet, with a strong tendency to the former—leaving the backbench MPs largely straw horses harnessed into line by party whips. This move to government by a single central strongman and his/her close cadre of friends rarely, if ever, ends well.

While it would be specious to suggest that the thin edge of a wedge leading toward a populist dictatorship is being driven into the halls of Parliament just yet, too much of a dependency on rolling polls in making governing decisions is definitely a worrying trend.

Torture of solitary confinment prolongs colonization travesty

A young man and his family are being victimized by an uncaring system

To the Expositor:

The murder of Sherman Quisses in Thunder Bay District Jail and the subsequent allegations against Adam Capay, followed by charges laid by Superintendent Wheeler, are a travesty of justice. I feel for the Quisses family, for you Tristan. The systemic racism First Nations are subjected to, in the justice system and corrections have been revealed at a tremendous cost to the Quisses and Capay families, both. Self-government for First Nations and alternatives to a broken, colonial imposition of justice are imminent.

The rumors in the press that a "stay" will be granted to Adam at his upcoming trial, apparently set for March 20, provoked a response from the Quisses Family, demanding that justice be served in the untimely and tragic death of Sherman Quisses. 'Justice denied' are the only words that describe the torture Adam Capay endures. He is now 1,700 miles from home with no familial support, and no visits from friends. Who knows what challenges he faces in Waypoint Mental Health Centre in Penetanguishene?

The Canadian Government and we the people of Canada, receive victims of torture from other countries with open arms. These survivors of torture are given refugee status and provided support, but not for one of

our own sons. What support have Adam and his family been offered by the innumerable officials and delegates who represent us? Nothing, absolutely nothing! His family, friends and supporters have rallied to raise \$1,200 dollars on a GoFundMe campaign, for a "Family Visit for Adam Capay."

It is clear that the First Nations of Canada, a young man like Adam, are of little or no consequence. That we, as Canadians are allowing Adam Capay to suffer and languish in yet another of our imposed institutions, Waypoint Mental Health Centre, is outrageous!

Adam Capay is not merely a poster boy for solitary confinement. He is Glenda's boy, a brother, a nephew and a member of a community. He needs access to his own traditions and culture, his family, friends and community to heal from torture, to even begin to heal the wounds we have inflicted. The very least we can do is to demand that resources and support are now available to him and his family. Let's be as generous to an Ojibwe man from Lac Seul, Ontario, one who has survived four years of torture, as we would to a refugee from a foreign land.

Island doctor weighs in on current negotiations

Hopes job action is not necessary to reach a fair agreement

To the Expositor:

As a doctor who cares deeply about my patients and the health-care system, I believe it is important to explain why doctors are talking about job action.

Ontario's doctors have been without a contract for three years. And because we have been without one, the provincial government has been able to arbitrarily cut funding for the medical services me and my colleagues provide. They have also made significant changes to the healthcare system without the input and expertise of doctors.

In order to solve the impasse we have with government, doctors have been asking for access to binding arbitration—a fair and independent process to which all other essential service providers have access to.

The government has repeatedly refused our request and so we began

planning for job action. Only recently has the government agreed to discuss binding arbitration and while we are hopeful, we must be prepared in the event they do not follow through on this promise.

I never imagined having to contemplate job action to be treated fairly by the government. Unfortunately, job action may be necessary as a last resort. Patients should be assured that no doctor would deny urgent care to patients or act in a way that would compromise patient safety.

I hope job action is not necessary, and that we are able to achieve binding arbitration so we can reach a fair agreement and work together with government to improve care for patients.

Fifty shades of maple

s I look out my window, I see two gracious, 50 yearold maple trees adorning the front lawn, providing shelter and shade, standing as sister sentinels, creating a barricade against the traffic on the highway in front of our house. "Traffic, on the Island?" you may query, with skeptically arched eyebrows. But yes, when these trees were planted in 1967 by my husband's twin sisters as a 4-H project to celebrate Canada's Centennial year, the idea of traffic driving past this homestead was laughable (except of course, on Providence Bay Fair weekend). In fact, it was commonly noted that if you wanted to know the population of Manitoulin Island, all you had to do was take a drive past people's houses and count how many heads you saw in the window. In 1967, passing cars were something to stop and notice with eager curiosity. Fifty years later, when I have to look both ways before crossing the road to collect my mail after the May 24th weekend, I am continually reminded of the faster pace of life and the fact that Manitoulin is now on the radar of north bound urban dwellers. Summer visitors stream here from the cities to enjoy our local charm and the breathtaking scenery that people born and raised here, often take for grant-

These maples, commemorating Canada's Centennial, are now middle aged. Like many of us in this age bracket, their trunks have gradually filled and they've thickened in the middle. It is no longer possible for passing cars to count the heads in our windows

because the entwined maple tree limbs act as curtains, with a cedar hedge in front, for a valance. Thankfully, more accurate meth-



ods of documenting the population have been devised.

Like all of us who celebrated Canada's Centennial and have been fortunate enough to witness another 50 shades of grey on our own heads, these trees have weathered many storms and adapted to countless social, and environmental changes.

Our current prime minister wasn't even born in 1967, but his father, Pierre Eliott, then Minister of Justice, cut a dashing figure, wearing a top hat and a long black cape in a "film version" of Canada's Centennial song, before the days of video. Children's voices exuberantly rang out with 'C-A-N-A-D-A we love you'... as he strategically swooped through the crowds with a flower in his lapel. Thanks to modern technology, you can check it out on YouTube now. A year later, Pierre Trudeau became the prime minster and was much applauded for his style and charisma. He knew the persuasive power of a well-placed photo. History tends to repeat itself in cycles, with our current 'selfie' loving PM.

The leaders who guided the

Canarvan Township 4-H club in 1967, have left a living, growing tribute to Canada's coming of age. In the years since the maples were planted, their branches have burst into vibrant green shoots during 50 seasons of spring. They modified the uncomfortable heat of summers and reminded us as their leaves turned gold, of encroaching winter. Manitoulin hosts Suicide Prevention Youth Symposium

Conference encourages youth to 'honour life, honour self and honour spirit'

LITTLE CURRENT—Manitoulin hosted a Suicide Prevention Youth Symposium last weekend, bringing together 120 youths from eight communities at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in Little Current to hear from numerous guest speakers and take part in workshops.

"I am happy to see all your beautiful faces here from all your wonderful communities," said symposium organizer Natalie Neganegijig, a youth mental health worker with Nadmadwin Mental Health Clinic in Wikwemikong. "My heart is full of goodness and love and I am very grateful for all you attending. I look forward to the next couple of days of learning and new connections."

Suicide Prevention Youth Symposium organizer Natalie Neganegijig, a youth mental health worker with Nadmadwin Mental Health Clinic, welcomes all 120 participants to the weekend long conference.

The opening ceremonies included a prayer from Hope Osawamick and welcoming remarks from Wiikwemkoong Band Councillor Sylvia Recollet.

It was noted that there were representatives from each community present throughout the weekend if anyone needed to talk and the representatives were asked to stand and make their presence known.

The keynote speaker was Lena Recollet. The poet, singersongwriter and actress is from Wikwemikong, but resides in Toronto.

Ms. Recollet shared her personal story about suicide, and her journey to how she became the strong, confident woman she is today.

"Twenty years ago I attempted suicide," said Ms. Recollet, after warning youth that the story may be a trigger for others. "I felt a lot of shame and guilt—I didn't want anyone to know."

Ms. Recollet said that while she was attempting suicide, she was "woken up" to the sound of her family on the other side of the door.

"When I woke up in the hospital, I knew that I needed to forgive myself and one day share my story," said Ms. Rec-

ollet.

She said that the feelings that led to her suicide attempt stemmed from an experience as a young child when a neighbour tried to sexually assault her and threatened her life when she escaped.

"For seven years I had to relive and retell my story," she said. "I am 36-years-old and I realize now that moment impacted me—my insecurities that led to my depression."

Ms. Recollet worked through her suicide attempt through creating a short film. Her poetry, spoken word and other artistic mediums were her outlet for her emotions.

Other speakers throughout the conference included: Debby Denard on Life Promotion; Curtis Kagigie, breakdancing; remarks from Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Pat Madahbee and Deputy Grand Chief Glen Hare; Recollet Consulting, Suicide Talk; Geesohns Manitowabi, teachings on spirit; Jared Big Canoe; Bryden Kiwenzie, round dance and beats; and Sylvia Recollet, western door teachings.

"Overall the conference went really well," said Ms. Neganegijig. "Our speakers have been supportive and brought good meaning to the youths' lives. The youth have expressed that they have been happy with the topics and the presenters."

Ms. Neganegijig said she wanted to organize the conference to bring awareness to the area about suicide "and let youth in the area know that people are here for them."

"There is a lot of talk about what is happening in the flyin, Northern communities, (concerning suicide), but it is happening here too, and I want our youth to know that they aren't alone and that there are people available to help," she added

Ms. Naganegijig said that she hopes to organize a similar conference again in the future.

While doctors' attentions were focussed on the repeatedly lobbed public opinion artillery, the OMA and MOH were quietly hunkered down in what could be characterized as "back door negotiations" to come up with a negotiated plan. Unfortunately, the lack of transperancy in the talks came back to haunt the process, as doctors were essentially caught off-guard when they were presented with what many of them took as an attempted fait accompli.

"The OMA should have been more open," suggested Dr. Cooper. In the end, a lot of doctors "rejected it out of hand."

The province's fixation on a "fixed" budget, with a clearly defined bottom line has proven to be major stumbling block, particularly when overages are clawed back

ed for specific projects on both sides of the border. In Sault Ste. Marie, the entry point of the St. Mary's River has been noted as an AOC. Delisted AOCs on the Canadian side, thanks to funding from the GRLI, include the Collingwood Harbour, Severn Sound and Wheatley Harbour.

The total funding of America's Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), which funds the GRLI, is also likely to see its budget slashed from \$8.2 billion to \$5.7 billion, according to the same documents. This would also mean a reduction of 3,000 EPA employees.

Canada's like initiative is the Great Lakes Sustainability Fund, which has contributed around \$23 million from 2006 to 2015 for Canadian AOCs.

From 2015-2019, federal agencies planned to continue to use Great Lakes Restoration Initiative resources "to strategically target the biggest threats to the Great Lakes ecosystem and to accelerate progress toward long term goals—by combining Great Lakes Restoration Initiative resources with agency base budgets and by using these resources to work with non-federal partners to implement protection and restoration projects," the website continues.

"To guide this work, federal agencies have drafted GLRI Action Plan II, which summarizes the actions that federal agencies plan to implement during fiscal years 2015-2019 using Great Lakes Restoration Initiative funding," the statement continues. "GLRI Action Plan II outlines the next phase of work on Great Lakes environmental problems and associated human health issues—many of which will take decades to resolve. GLRI Action Plan II lays out the necessary next steps to get us closer to the day when we will be able to achieve our long-term goals for the Great Lakes and our commitments under the U.S.-Canada Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement."

Plan II seeks to: combat invasive species, curb nutrient-fueled algae blooms, clean up toxic messes and restore sensitive fish and wildlife habitat.

On February 13, 14 members of Congress penned a letter to President Donald Trump, noting their strong support for efforts to protect and restore the Great Lakes.

"Specifically, we respectfully request that you include \$300 million for the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) in the Fiscal Year 2018 budget request," they write.

"The Great Lakes are truly a national treasure. The Great Lakes are the largest freshwater system in the world, holding roughly 18 percent of the world's fresh water supply and 90 percent of the United States' fresh water supply. The Lakes are also an economic driver that supports jobs, commerce, agriculture, transportation, and tourism for millions of people across the country.

"More than a century of environmental damage has taken a significant toll on the Great Lakes, which the GLRI is helping to correct. Since the initiative was launched in 2010, GLRI funds have been used to support over 3,000 restoration projects to improve water quality, protect and restore native habitat, clean up environmentally-impaired Areas of Concern, fight invasive species, and prevent beach closings.

"The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative is showing real and measurable results, but there is still a great deal of work to do. The Great Lakes Basin is vulnerable to various pollutants and invasive species, which threaten the health of the Great Lakes. For example, in 2014 a toxic algal bloom in Lake Erie forced 400,000 residents in the Toledo area to go without home water service for three days. While the GLRI has prioritized monitoring efforts, which help drinking water treatment plant operators and beach managers minimize health impacts associated with these toxic algal blooms, more must be done to better understand and prevent these algal blooms in the future.

"The federal government commits significant resources each year to address the challenges the Great Lakes face. In particular, GLRI resources have supplemented agency budgets to fund coordinated efforts to protect and restore the Great Lakes ecosystem, and we must ensure that this important work continues. To that end, we urge you to include \$300 million for the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) in the Fiscal Year 2018 budget request."

from doctors when the budget line is exceeded in any set

A patient seen in an emergency room by a doctor results in a \$33 fee paid by the government, but if the government's budget line is exceeded in that pay period, the physician can find that payment taken back.

In 2015, the province clawed back fees for certain specialties as well, putting forward the rationale that those specialists are overpaid as a fiat, rather than trying to work with the doctors on the issue.

While Dr. Cooper said that he can see both sides of the fixed budget issue, his was a perspective that didn't play well in the field of animosity and acrimony that has been nurtured by what many physicians see as an ambivalent government stewardship of their section of the health care reform

From the doctors' perspective, the arbitrary nature of the province's fixation on a budget bottom line that is set in stone does not take a wide range of variables that can cause higher health care costs in a relatively shorter term and places a disproportionate amount of the burden of meeting fixed health care costs on the backs of doctors

Two proposed government bills are adding fuel to the fire.

Bill 87, the Protecting Patients Act, which seeks to have more government say in the regulation and discipline of physicians (a job now performed by the self regulated College of Physicians and Surgeons) is another sticking point. The semi-autonomous nature of the current regime fits more closely with many doctors' self-image as essentially self-employed contractors.

Bill 41, the Patients First Act, is setting off alarm bells for doctors who say its shortcomings include that access to a doctor will be decided by government employees; confidential patient health records can be accessed by bureaucrats; funding will be taken away from hospitals and the frontline care provided by doctors and nurses to instead hire more government bureaucrats; provincial medical standards will be decided by bureaucrats and politicians instead of by medical experts; and the government will have control over all aspects of a patient's healthcare, with more emphasis on saving money instead of saving lives.

So with the Hippocratic Oath tying their hands in the way of job action and a prevailing general public perception that doctors are already well compensated, what avenues are open to doctors to bring the government to heel, or at least even the negotiating playing field? Especially since doctor perceptions of government intransigence is putting the OMA under a lot of pressure to bring in some form of job action.

"I don't know what that will look like," admitted Dr. Cooper, but the current climate of a complete lack of trust in the government on the part of doctors would seem to make some action seem almost inevitable.

The concept of withdrawing or delaying elective or non-essential procedures has been bandied in some circles, recent court interpretations in other jurisdictions of what constitutes non-essential or elective procedures found such delays cause undue pain and suffering for patients further complicates the playing field for doctors.

While the tentative agreement did contain some elements that could form the basis of a rapprochement, that prevailing climate of distrust is likely to prove to be an insurmountable stumbling block in the short term at least.


MTA Director of Operations Shelba Millette commented that the MTA is thankful for the funding from the OTF.

organization.

"I am learning about film to make me a better actor," he said. He described the Weengusk program as "a program on steroids, it is so much more indepth." The most challenging part of the program for him has been the financial side. "Numbers are not my strong suit," he laughed. The one-line synopsis of his project is: "Take a pulp novel and a comic book, combine them, then fall into it."

Brian Fowler of M'Chigeeng first came to WFI as a summer student and he was hooked. "I found it really cool," he said. He said his main goal was to work in the industry as a grip (in sound). Any chance of his taking up acting? "No, he laughs. "I like working behind the scenes." Mr. Fowler's project is entitled 'Venture in Wager' and the three-line synopsis of his project is: "Two friends enjoy themselves too much. A money-hungry casino owner, drinking, gambling and bad judgement. Johnny must collect evidence to prove his cousin is innocent.'

Kendra Wesley-Trapper is from Moose Factory and her project is entitled 'A Buffalo Song.' This is Ms. Wesley-Trapper's second stint at WFI. "I was here in 2009, but I had some personal issues," she noted. But undaunted she has returned six years later to continue her dream. "I am interested in screenwriting," she said. Ms. Wesley-Trapper originally began her education at college in Timmins, a lot closer to home, and her field of study was Law. "I learned a lot about myself," she said. Discovering that she could write, Ms. Wesley-Trapper is driven to "share my stories." Eventually she hopes to direct her own feature film. The synopsis of 'A Buffalo Song' is "When the weight of life gets too unbearable, sometimes a push from the other side is all you need to break the chains.

Jasminn Jacko is another local student at WFI, hailing from Birch Island. The synopsis of her project 'Treble' is: "A young aspiring pianist overcomes adversity to fulfill her "My mom shared a thing about WFI on Facebook," she recalled. "I heard they were taking applications and I want to go to college in the fall." The WFI program seemed an interesting intro to academia, recalled Ms. Jacko. "It's good, I like it," she said of her first experience in post-secondary education. Ms. Jacko said that she enjoys working "in the curtains," working on the hairstyles and makeup. Zander Metz is originally from Florida, but calls Buffalo, New York home these days. Brunswick and Nova Scotia) group's NEQAP "is designed to assist those with an interest in dairy farming who may not otherwise have the financial means or opportunity to get started in the industry. The P5 makes available up to 120 kilograms of quota per year for the program in Ontario. Subject to DFO issuing a licence to produce market milk and approving an order to issue quota, DFO will allocate up to 12 kilograms of quota to each successful applicant. DFO allocates 12 kilograms of quota for five years and takes back one kilogram per year starting in year

Mr. Seguin presented this local dairy producers. General certificates of excellence were presented to Pleasant Valley Farms of Billings and the Anstice family dairy farm (Oshade-Holsteins) Tehkummah. A coveted gold certificate was presented to Bud and Brad Wilkins who have been perennial recipients of the gold certificate recognition of outstanding quality for as long as anyone present could recall.

Mr. Seguin took the committee members through changes that have come to

the screening process and quality assurance inspections process. As noted at the DFO meeting last year, inspections are now taking place without the significant prior notice that had been the case in previous years. The change in process did result in more deficiencies being uncovered and Mr. Seguin pointed out the significant financial impact that results from a fall from grace. Each visit costs the producer \$250, and the result of a serious infraction will amount to several visits over two years to rebuild standing. That's a \$1,500 hit over the two years.

Traceability is definitely the latest focus of the industry, but several producers voiced dissatisfaction with the website and its interface, noting that while the website "recommends you take the course. it is not that easy to find."

The issue is far from moot, as the six-hour course must be completed by May 1.

Mr. Runnalls noted that DFO pays for the veterinarian to train producers as a group. But if the training is to take place at a producer's farm, they have to pay for it.

The challenges with traceability did not stop at the website, however, as one producer noted "there are four tags on every animal and one at the stockyard, you get the report back from the stockyard and the number means nothing.

Since animals might be sold a number of times before arriving at a stockyard, the initial number identifying the source producer has little validity when it comes to tracing the animal.

"It is an issue we are aware of," agreed Mr. Runnalls. "For traceability to work it has to be followed throughout the system." The advice was put forward that producers should "take a photograph when you put the animal on the truck. You all have phones in your pocket, take a picture on the truck and protect your-

Veterinarian Erica Spec was introduced to the committee members and she indicated she was willing to provide the required training for local producers.

Mr. Runnalls reported that, among the P5 provinces, "the volume of milk is down, but there is more butter fat," adding that is a good thing.

Cheese sales have been really strong, and since almost 40 percent of milk goes into cheese, that is a positive indicator. Mr. Runnalls also noted that the Tim Horton chain is moving to a whole milk product in their lattés. "They have found they can make a betproduct," he said. "Before there was a teaspoon of milk in the coffee, now we are seeing 12 ounces of milk with a teaspoon of coffee in it." But with that positive news there comes some challenge, as too much milk handling through pumping etc. changes the way the milk froths, so new methods of production will be required heading into the future.

The new free trade deal with Europe will be opening up the Canadian market, posing a challenge to the industry, but the federal government has committed to providing assistance to productivity through equipment on a 50/50 cost share.

Financially, the local dairy farmer committee is in good shape, according to the treasurer's report delivered by Ms. Orford. The committee finances show a balance of \$1,600 remaining on the books at year's end. Ms. Orford noted that there might be some additional expenses relating to the closure of the RBC branch in Massey and the account relocation to Espanola, but that none were anticipated at this time.

cializing in the Chinese wasps who find emerald ash borers a tasty treat.

For the past few years, the United States Forest Service has been supplying their Canadian counterpart with two different types of Chinese wasps that specialize in seeking out and destroying EAB larvae.

Ms. Ryall confirmed with the Expositor that the Great Lakes Forestry Centre was able to rear some of its own wasps last week. These and more will be released over the summer in yet-to-be-determined locations in Ontario, along with the American-bred wasps.

She explained that the female wasps work by seeking out EAB larvae, boring through ash bark and laying their eggs (up to 60 of them) on EAB grubs. When the eggs hatch, they eat the grubs and emerge as new baby wasps. The wasps are only a couple of millimetres in size and pose no threat to humans, Ms. Ryall assures. "They're like the size of an ant," she added. "They're not big yellowjackets or anything like that.'

Chinese wasps were imported to do the job as EABs are themselves an invasive insect with no North American enemies. There are two Chinese wasps that have been approved for use in Canada and the United States and another Russian wasp that is pending approval by the Canadian government. The Russian wasp, Ms. Ryall explained, survives colder climates.

The Canadian Forest Service had not yet picked out the spots for the release of the Tetrastichus, but guessed Algoma would be a spot as it is rich in ash trees and has an out-

break of EAB. When asked if Manitoulin would be under consideration, Ms. Ryall said she would look into the status and said the island could be put forward for consideration for a wasp release.

"They're very EAB specific," Ms. Ryall reiterated. "She knows what she wants," she added of the female wasp.

Ms. Ryall said people need to realize that this is a long term project. "It's important to note that it could even be several decades" before results for future ash trees are seen. "It's not an overnight solution."

The scourge of the EAB continues to spread across the province, largely through human movement of infested materials, such as firewood.

Every year they (EAB) continue to find new areas," Ms. Ryall said. "In 2016, EAB was found in Thunder Bay for the first time and it had likely been there for a couple of years before it was discovered." It's now in Quebec too.

According to Natural Resources Canada, within six vears of EAB infecting a woodlot, more than 99 percent of the ash trees will be killed.

EAB was confirmed on Manitoulin in the fall of 2013.

Assiginack Council Notes

Minor hockey recognized

Councillor Leslie Fields gave her commendation to the Manitowaning Minor Hockey Association "who just wrapped up a really good season," noting the full parking lots each Sunday night.

'The people who organize that deserve so much credit for bringing them from one place in the fall to another level come the end of the season," Councillor Fields added.

"It's a testament to the work of volunteers," Councillor Hugh Moggy added.

Budget meeting

Council met on February 27 to discuss their priorities for the 2017 budget.

Councillor Bob Case suggested that the Queen and Arthur Streets rehabilitation and resurfacing project should be the highest priority public works project, should necessary funding be secured.

Councillor Brenda Reid suggested the following projects for the 2017 budget: repaint and add shelving to the medical clinic basement; repair entrance to the lower level of the library; engineering/design of a fire hall/public works garage; confirm sufficient arena drainage; review a list of roads to be resurfaced, surface treated, in need of gravel and ditching provided by public works; review the town equip ment; move ahead with the landfill expansion; look for grants or reserve contributions for an ice resurfacer and the ice plant; review the museum budget; address the heating and sewer issues at the post office/BMO building; and review the financial statement of the Manitoulin Centennial Manor.

Councillor Hugh Moggy put forward the following for consideration: a zero increase to the tax rate, if possible; the marina to be staffed for the summer; lower debt levels; Old Mill siding repair or alternatives; Burns Wharf Theatre should be the primary project for grant opportunities; departmental reviews for operating budget efficien-

cies; leave the Manitoulin Superintendents Association; sidewalks; view the Manitowaning waterfront as an asset and as a priority.

Councillor Fields reminded council that: funds must be set aside to fund the Steamship Society lawsuit; that Canada's 150 celebration will cost money, regardless of funding; "we need to stay ahead of road issues"; and that boat launches should be in good repair and usable at all times.

Paul Moffatt Mayor asked to focus on debt retirement and asked that council address the public works garage and fire hall.

"There was a general discussion on the need to demolish the 'Mastin house' once the property is vested in the Township's name," the minutes state. "It was agreed that we would not proceed with purchasing 53 Napier Street as it does not secure all of the necessary property for seniors housing and the ad hoc committee has not found a willing private sector partner."

"There was a general discussion, with no resolution, on the Burns Wharf Theatre being the highest priority for funding application when other projects may be just as important or beneficial to the community," the minutes continue.

OMAFRA RED program

Staff made an application to the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) Rural Economic Development (RED) program to conduct a brandstudy for the ing municipality.

"We expect the cost would be \$25,000, leaving a municipal contribution of \$12,500 and would require hiring a consultant,' explained Alton Hobbs, CAO, in a report to council. "The objective of the exercise would be the development of a municipal 'brand.' Identifying what people think of when they think of Assiginack. A branding study then allows staff to develop marketing strategies as we use these newly identified 'brands' to market ourselves to the greater pub-

Accounts for payment

Council approved the following accounts for payment: general, \$45,558.49; and payroll, \$18,054.64.

Assisted living care

Council received an informational handout from the Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) for physicians regarding services offered which prompt-

ed much discussion on the lack of knowledge on what is available in terms of services on Manitoulin.

Mayor Moffatt noted that the Assiginack Family Health Team did not have a copy of the CCAC sheet.

"Doesn't that say something," Councillor Fields responded.

Mayor Moffatt suggested people don't know the criteria for accessing assisted living, with councillors giving their thoughts on what assisted living means and what is available on Manitoulin.

The mayor noted that the VON is "worked to death" at the moment.

Bylaws

Council amended Bylaw 15-05, the municipal donation policy, to Bylaw 17-07 by adding: "a public call for donation requests will be issued by the Township in January of each year on the Township's website and in the local newspaper" and "requests for donation of any type received after April 15 will not be considered by council."

Council also passed Bylaw 17-08 to authorize a municipal forest fire management agreement with the Ministry of Natural resources and Forestry.

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
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


Cover crops

Cover crops are an integral part of crop rotations. Research has shown that 30 percent or more cover can reduce erosion by 60 percent or more. This is significant in terms of keeping soil in place and maintaining overall soil health and productivity. Beyond erosion protec-

tion, there are other benefits from 30 percent cover. Cover, particularly with a density greater than 30 percent, can help with weed control. Another key benefit is soil temperature and moisture moderation. Bare soil is somewhat like a desert. The surface layers dry out readily and are prone to wide temperature

swings between day and night. In early summer, dry, bare soils like sands can easily get above 40°C during the day. Much of the life in soil, for example the bacteria that drives the nitrogen cycle, is highly sensitive to temperature fluctuations. The optimum temperature range for most biological processes is 20-30°C. Keeping soil covered can help to moderate temperature changes and support more active cycling.



It is the first day of spring and International Day of Happiness and we are tapping maple trees and the crocuses are just peeking out a bit. The season is right on. I remember about 15 years ago chit chatting with a gentleman that was from my generation and had lived all is life here. It was early March and I was asking about tapping trees, he smiled and said "oh well, I don't get to excited until the middle of March and then sometimes it doesn't really get going until the end of March." That thought has stuck with me ever since and you know he was right, 9 out of 10 times. The other times I'll just say global warming.

Maple syrup and honey are my go to sweetener's in just about everything I cook with. You need a dash of sweetener for your salad dressing, marinade, stir frying vegetables, smoothie and a healthy dessert. I use the darkest, dark maple syrup that we make. Trust me, ours starts as dark and goes from darker to darkest to "what is that black syrupy stuff." As my 91-year-old mother says every spring, don't forget I would like some of your "burnt maple syrup—it's the best." Thanks, Mom.

Following are some new recipes I experimented with on my family, and as John always says "wow, is that ever good-did you follow a recipe?" Myanswer is no, I just used it as a guideline.

Carrot and Zucchini Salad with Maple Syrup

So here I am with this recipe, subtly changed to suit my eclectic tastes. I turned the salad into a tossed. I added in some lettuce and grated carrots and beets and switched the sunflower seeds to walnuts.

- 1 lb carrots, peeled and grated
- 1 zucchini grated 1/4 cup plain, unsweet-
- ened yogurt 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 3 Tbsp maple syrup 1 tsp fresh ginger, grated
- 1/2 cup sunflower seeds 1. Make the dressing by
- mixing together the mayonnaise, vogurt, maple syrup, and ginger.

2. Mix together the carrot and zucchini.

3. Pour dressing over the salad, toss and sprinkle sunflower seeds on top.

Crustless Maple Vegetable Quiche

Serve the quiche alongside a mixed greens salad for an easy dinner.

- 1 Tbsp olive oil 1/4 cup breadcrumbs
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup milk 1/4 cup maple syrup 1 small carrot, grated
- 1/2 zucchini, grated 1 leek, sliced thin 1/4 cup cheddar cheese,
- grated Salt and pepper to taste
- 6 cherry tomatoes,
- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F. 2. Oil a 10-inch baking pan and coat with bread-
- crumbs. Set aside. 3. In a large bowl, beat together the eggs, milk, maple syrup, carrot, zucchini, leek, cheese, salt

Shawonosowe School students set their micro-hatchery charges free

BIRCH ISLAND—Anticipation had been building for weeks as students at Whitefish River First Nation Shawonosowe School watched the development of tiny brook trout as they hatched from helpless eggs into tiny fry capable of surviving in the bay until the spring runoff brings nourishing nutrients into the lake.

On Friday, February 17 the students scooped the now well-hatched fry from the micro-hatchery in their classroom and placed them into a white plastic bucket for the trip to Birch Island's J & G Marina, where a hole had been cut in the ice in anticipation of their arrival.

The 12,000 tiny fry barely took up three

(tobacco) along with the invocation.

Students gathered around the hole in the ice, eagerly anticipating their turn as they watched their colleagues settling the fry into the hole.

"This is great, wonderful really," said Rolly Frappier, the Microhatchery Project representative who has been working with students in area schools to set up the microhatchery program. "This is the future," he said, pointing to the students. "Look at her," he said, singling out one young girl who was delicately placing the dip net in the hole. "She is so excited. I see her every time I come to the school. She is just so engaged in this."

season

"We will be back in the spring with the walleye," he noted.

The tiny fry are very tough. "You would be really surprised at just how tough those little fellas are," said Mr. Frappier. "I took about 40 of them up North, not in water, just on ice. When I placed them on the slide under the microscope, they just started wiggling about. After we were done, I put them back on the ice and brought them home to go back in the micro hatchery. They did just fine."

As the planting got underway, Chief Shining Turtle arrived to join in the fun with his daughter. "I'm ready to get right in there,"

he offered with a grin, but nonetheless patiently waited his turn. With the dip net.

Encouraging a sense of stewardship of our province's natural resources among youth is vital to ensuring those resources will be here for future generations, notes Mr. Frappier.

In the case of First Nations students, the lesson dovetails perfectly with traditional teachings, which emphasize the responsibility of each generation to preserve and protect resources for the next seven generations.

"It is wonderful to see," said Mr. McGraw. "The students are learning so much from all of this."



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

The Garden of the Mind.

The mind is like a garden.

For years I have cultivated a garden and I have learned a lot of lessons from it. I never grew any fruits or vegetables in it that I did not

first sow or plant and then cultivate. Although I did not sow weeds and grasses in it, it

always produced them, and unless I hoed them down or pulled them up with the roots the weeds took over.

If it did not rain I had to water the vegetables, or they would not survive, but the weeds always came back.

It takes labor to cultivate the desired vegetables.

It does not take labor to grow weeds. In the parable of the sower Jesus explains that the seed is the word of God, LUKE 8:11. In MAT.13:25-40 Jesus explains that an enemy, Satan, sows weeds. False doctrines (lies) are like weeds, they grow whether you like it or not. Sound doctrines (truth) are like desirable vegetables; they only grow when they are sown and cultivated. As there is no subject where the N.T. spends more space on then on warning against Satan and his lies (false doctrines), there is nothing more important for a Christian than sowing sound doctrines and weeding out false doctrines.




