

## Over \$1 million awarded to local communities for green projects

TORONTO—Local communities have scored over one million dollars in green for green projects from the Small Communities Fund.

One of the largest grants in this round, which saw the federal and provincial governments provide 13 small communities with over \$10 million to build and repair critical infrastructure and help create jobs across the province, went to Wikwemikong, who received \$814,568 to install a new solar-powered electric micro-grid that will provide cost-effective power to over 50 local homes and help reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

"This proposal will help us reduce the energy costs for at least 50 buildings in our community," said Wikwemikong Chief Duke Peltier. "We still have to

identify which buildings have the highest potential for savings," he added. Among the community buildings that are in the running is the community arena, whose energy bill hit can run to tens of

## Gore Bay's 'Kindertransport' scores big at 2016 QUONTA

The "Gore Bay Theatre production kept us spellbound for an hour and 40 minutes with brilliant acting, strong set and lighting design for a magical evening of theatre," said adjudicator Rita Huschka in her remarks on the Gore Bay Theatre production of 'Kindertransport.'

"We got the most awards of any production at the festival," said a jubilant Walter Maskel, who codirected 'Kindertransport' with Andrea Emmerton. Mr. Maskel had high praise for this year's QUONTA hosts, noting that "everything went very

## Health Unit expanding harm reduction supplies and services programming

SUDBURY-MANITOULIN—The Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) is pleased to announce that over the next six months, access to publicly funded needle exchange services is expanding to include Health Unit office locations throughout the Suabury and Manitoulin districts. Ontario Public Health Standards mandate the SDHU to ensure access to harm reduction services in its service

To achieve this expansion, the administrative responsibility for distributing safe drug injection and inhalation supplies is being transferred back to the Health Unit from the Sudbury Action Centre for Youth (SACY). This approach is consistent with other programs across Ontario where public health units administer harm reduction programs.

The administrative transfer will have no impact on clients' access to services through existing sites, including SACY, Réseau ACCESS Network and the Ontario Aboriginal HIV/AIDS Strategy (OAHAS). For example, clients who currently access needle exchange services at The Point, located at the Sudbury Action Centre for Youth, may continue to get supplies and services there. SACY historically distributes over

700,000 needles a year through its main site and street outreach pro-

"It is no secret that for over 20 years, the Sudbury Action Centre Youth has demonstrated tremendous leadership in providing these much needed narm reduction services to help protect and improve the health of their clients," said Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, Sudbury and District Medical Officer of Health. "We are committed to working closely with SACY and all partners to ensure that clients continue to have access to these essential services."

The Point has worked hard to earn the trust and respect of its clients by offering services without ever passing judgment. Regardless of whether clients are experimenting with drugs, using regularly, or living with longer term addiction, the program is available to them.

Réseau ACCESS Network and the Ontario Aboriginal HIV/AIDS Strategy (OAHAS) have also been longtime partners in providing harm reduction outreach services, and these partnerships will be maintained with the Health Unit.

For some clients, needle exchange programs are their first point of access to basic health care services, such as counselling

and addiction services. Harm reduction programs have been shown to reduce the spread of diseases as well as other serious health conditions. Having access to clean needles and other supplies decreases the spread of infectious diseases such as HIV and hepatitis B and C.

In addition to providing safe injection and inhalation supplies, clients receive education about safer drug use practices to reduce risky behaviours, safe disposal of used sharps and other drug use

"A key pillar of the Community Drug Strategy is harm reduction. Access to harm reduction supplies and services is a proven way to help to protect the health of our community," said Chief Paul Pedersen, Greater Sudbury Police Service, and Co-chair of the Community Drug Strategy. "We are pleased to be working with such a committed group of organizations who provide these much needed services that are critical for public

## Simple solution ignored by the Ontario Energy Board

That the Ontario government has sought to cushion the most vulnerable citizens in the province from escalating electricity costs is laudable, but with uptake in the Ontario Electricity Support Program (OESP) languishing barely above 25 percent we beg to differ with the Ontario Energy Board's excitement over the efficacy of the program.

By the Ontario Energy Board's own estimates, there are more than half a million low income Ontarians who are eligible for relief through the OESP. Many of those people are regularly faced with the decision of whether they will buy enough groceries to feed themselves and their families for the month or make their rent payment. Shelter or food, it is the daily reality still faced by thousands of residents of one of the wealthiest regions on the planet, and this decades past the days of the Mike Harris slash and burn run through the Ontario Works (OW) and Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) and the less-than-inflation increases applied by his successors, Progressive Conservative or Liberal.

There are reasons that people find themselves on welfare and, despite the coffee shop rants of the curmudgeonly inclined, statistics clearly establish that those reasons are only most rarely that recipients don't want to work. Adding to that, the numbers clearly indicate that most Ontario Works recipients are "on the dole" for a very short period of time. Also to be mentioned are the so-called "deserving poor," those whose disabilities prevent them from being able to hold down a job and who find themselves on the slightly less meagre stipend provided by ODSP.

Then there are the working poor. There are many reasons that people find themselves unable to find employment that does much more than keep the wolf from the door, barely managing to keep their heads above water, anything that can be reasonably done to lighten that load should be done.

For the latter group, the outreach programs, YouTube videos, newspaper, radio and television advertisements may be the only real option to bring the OESP to their attention, but for those on Ontario Works and ODSP there was, and is, a much simpler and more elegant solution

Since everyone on OW and ODSP qualifies for the relief, they could (and should) have been automatically qualified for the program, as could/should everyone who receives the Guaranteed Income Supplement component of Canada's old age security safety net.

While there are some challenges to that approach, those challenges could hardly exceed those challenges created through the current program, never mind the duplication of resources necessary to vet the applicants and to validate the individual consents that applicants are required to submit.

With the validation of the social workers who already assess each OW or ODSP applicant for their eligibility already taking place (never mind that those workers are also already seconded to assisting people who need such help with preparing their applications) it seems counterintuitive that a duplicate process is put in place with a completely separate agency.

Since any error or omission in an application can short circuit that application, causing further delay and hardship for those in society the OESP is purported to assist, the elegance of working through existing programs would seem, on the face of it at least, a sensible course of action

There are those who might suggest that the provincial government is more interested in being seen to do good than actually solving the problem, since the fewer successful applicants taking up the offer reduces the immediate costs and, since the program is not retroactive, delays in bringing those eligible into the program also helps to mitigates those costs (albeit on the backs of those who can least afford it). With the ongoing privatization of Hydro One it also begs the question of who is paying for what is, in its essence, a social program. Social relief is properly the purview of the provincial government and should not be provided through the inefficient and indirect vehicle of the hydro bills of other users of the system.

The provincial government should recognize the lack of efficacy inherent in the current approach to providing electricity cost relief to those most in need and take steps to provide that relief through the proper channels.

## Colon Cancer Awareness Month: a personal experience

### Aundeck Omni Kaning Chief Patsy Corbiere relates her own family's experience

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—It is a silent killer that doesn't have to be. March is Colon Cancer Awareness Month and a local First Nation chief has brought her own family's story forward in order to shed light on one of the major causes of untimely death in Anishinaabe communities.

In 2000, Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation Chief Patsy Corbiere's husband was shocked when he was diagnosed with colon cancer following a routine test for an unrelated health concern.

"We didn't know anyone who had had cancer and the fear of his diagnosis led us to believe he was dying," recalled Chief Corbiere. "Then I discovered that there had been a lot of cancer in our community but people just didn't talk about it." Chief Corbiere explained that her husband travelled to Toronto from their home in Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation for surgery and treatment. Today her husband is cancer-free.

The experience led Chief Corbiere to start the conversation and promote cancer awareness and prevention in her own community and when she learned about the Canadian Cancer Society's Screening Saves Lives program, she signed on to be a volun-

teer Health Ambassador.

The Screening Saves Lives program recruits and trains community-based volunteers to deliver cancer screening messages and guidelines. These Health Ambassadors then engage their friends, families and networks in conversations about cancer screening. The initiative promotes screening of colon, breast, and cervical cancers in under- and never-screened populations in Ontario.

In Ontario's First Nations communities, the overall rate for new cancer cases nearly doubled between 1968 and 2001. Today, incidence rates of some cancers in these communities are approaching or even surpassing levels of the general population primarily, due to growing colon cancer rates. These communities are less likely to be regularly screened for colon, breast and cervical cancers, putting them at greater risk of dying from cancer.

Chief Corbiere says that fear of the test results and fear of travelling somewhere they don't know is why many in her community don't get screened.

"Many people don't want to take the time to get screened because they're scared. The volunteers in the Screening Saves Lives program help them understand that it's not the test or the place they fear, it's the results," said Chief Corbiere, adding that "we also help them understand that the earlier the cancer is detected, the better off they will be."

The peer educator approach of the Screening Saves Lives program successfully addresses screening barriers in many communities in Ontario. As the First Nation chief and as someone who has lived on the reserve for most of her life, Chief Corbiere has a good understanding of the barriers to screening and the misconceptions people have.

"Even though this is a remote area, I'm helping people to understand that there are services, that they're not scary and that they need to use them," she said. "Early detection of cancer can save your life."

"We are proud of the work that our volunteers have accomplished with our First Nation communities in collaboration with our local health centers and health partners to increase screening rates among our First Nation people," said Jo-Anne Thibodeau Audette, coordinator of Screening Saves Lives for Manitoulin Island First Nation communities. Ms. Thibideau Audette said that she hopes more volunteers will come forward to help get the word out in local communities. "We need more volunteers in our communities. Too many people are dying needlessly."

## Misery Bay Blanding's turtle researcher awaits final field results

MISERY BAY—Misery Bay Blanding's turtle researcher Donnell Gasbarrini says a conclusion has yet to be made in the cause of death of over 71 turtles in 2013, but the researcher says she will know more once further data is collected next month.

"Things are starting to wrap up, I am aiming to have my final defence this coming August, which will be the final step in finishing the masters degree," Ms. Gasbarrini told The Expositor earlier this week. "Similar to last winter, I have been out at Misery Bay once per month since October—I was going roughly every two weeks during the fall-and have been collecting information such as ice thickness, snow depth. dissolved oxygen content of the water, evidence of predators such as tracks in the snow, scat, trail camera photos and turtle locations. While the turtles do hibernate during the winter. Blanding's turtles elsewhere have been known to move small distances (a few meters or so) during the winter, possibly to reach flowing water with a higher dissolved oxygen content. This data has been collected to evaluate the failed overwintering hypotheses for cause(s) of death: a) lack of sufficient oxygen in the water, b) predation during the winter months, and c) freezing).'

Ms. Gasbarrini explained while tracking these turtles during the late fall and into the winter, it was "really incredible" to see some of them return to the exact sites where they overwintered last year.

"I've read about overwintering site fidelity in papers about Blanding's turtles elsewhere, but it was really neat to see it firsthand in this population," she said. "While most of them are overwintering where they were last year, some of them have chosen different areas to spend this winter in. With only a couple of exceptions, all of the turtles are overwintering in groups, very few are alone, although there could be turtles with those individuals that we don't know about because they're so good at hiding. Overwintering in groups is hypothesized to be advantageous for these turtles as it provides opportunities for them to mate in the spring, when they are in close proximity to one

another I've actually seen several pairs mating during the spring over the past two years! This is great news for the future of this population."

With winter quickly coming to a close, Ms. Gasbarrini said she has collected all of the data for the dissolved oxygen and predation, but has not yet got all of the temperature data needed for the freezing hypothesis.

"I have temperature data loggers adhered to 22 of the turtles' shells, and also to 21 'fake turtles' (bricks stationed in the wetland)," Ms. Basbarrini explained. "The bricks are a similar size to the turtles, so the data logger will remain at a similar height from the substrate as they would be on a turtle's shell. These bricks are stationed in areas where we do not know of any turtles overwintering, focused on areas where mortality occurred. To collect the data loggers, we need to wait until the turtles emerge from their overwintering sites, as pulling them out of their sites in such cold temperatures before they are ready could be fatal. At the rate that temperatures are warming and ice is melting, they will likely emerge at some point in April."

Since some of the data has only just been collected, and because Ms. Gasbarrini must wait a little longer to retrieve some of it, the analyses have not been completed to the same degree for all hypothe-

"However, at this point there is strong supporting evidence for the 'predation during the active season' line of evidence," she shared. "We have identified predators within the park, we have had a turtle exhibit markings on her shell that suggest a recent predation attempt, though she lived and is fine, and one of the decoy turtles that was stationed in the wetland has been dismembered in a very particular way. It's head, limbs, and tail were removed while the rest of it, the shelled remained essentially untouched. This is a very similar fashion as what has been recorded as occurring in otter predation events elsewhere, whereby otters would consume the head and limbs, as they contain high protein and fat content, and would leave the remainder of the carcass. While this line of evidence is strongest to date, it is important to keep in mind that it is also the area in which all of the data has been collected and analyzed. I must stress that the other lines of evidence are still in the works, so no conclusions can be made as of

In addition to determining the cause(s) of death at Misery Bay Provincial Park, Ms. Gasbarrini is also working on critically evaluating multiple recovery strategies to determine the most effective conservation initiative to recommend to the park managers (the Friends of Misery Bay and Ontario Parks/Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry).

"To do this, I am using population viability analyses (PVAs) which are models that can be used to estimate a population's success into the future," she explained. "These models are provided with as much site-specific information as possible, and will be supplemented with information from other populations of Blanding's turtles where necessary. Since this study has only been going on at Misery Bay Provincial Park for three years, and a Blanding's turtle can live in excess of 75 years, we truly have only gotten a glimpse at their lives in the park. Some of the information that is incorporated into a PVA includes age at sexual maturity, average clutch size (number of eggs per clutch), sex ratios, and the number of adults and juveniles currently present. With prior knowledge that the loss of only 10 percent of the adults in a turtle population can have effects that last for decades, this approach enables us to both gain information about the mass mortality event by determining the cause(s) of death, as well as ensure the success of this population into the future.'

"As I said earlier, it is important

to note that no conclusions can be made as of yet, as analyses are still underway," Ms. Gasbarrini concluded.

As The Expositor previously reported, Ms. Gasbarrini, a Laurentian University Masters of Science student working on her masters under Dr. Jacqueline Litzgus, a professor and herpetologist in the Department of Biology at the university, extended her field study over the winter, visiting the park monthly to further explore theories of predation and hibernation.

Ms. Gasbarrini lived near Misery Bay from May to September 2014, conducting daily monitoring of the Blanding's turtles as part of an \$80,000 (over two years) grant to the Friends of Misery Bay (FOMB), in conjunction with Laurentian University, from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry's (MNRF) Species at Risk Stewardship Fund.

Using radio trackers, Ms. Gasbarrini and her field assistant Amber Koldzik monitored a total of 18 Blanding's turtles in the park in addition to using turtle decoys and field cameras to monitor potential predators.

Ontario Parks ecologists Anna Sheppard and Ed Mooris discovered dead turtles throughout April and May 2013 at Misery Bay Provincial Park while working on radio-tracking turtle movements, habitat and behavior, which initially raised the alarm.

## Powerful, profane and disturbing, Huff storms Debaj stage

MANITOWANING—If one word was to be used to describe Cliff Cardinal's onstage performance in Huff this past week at the Larry E. Lewis Creation Centre that word is "intense."

During his one-man show Mr. Cardinal brings several characters to life, racing through a breakneck paced 70-minute production (spoiler alerts) that begins with the startling revelation of Wind, the main protagonist, attempting suicide as the stage lights rise.

In Wind's opening monologue, the audience's gaze is locked in horrified fascination on the plastic bag as it puffs in and out with each breath.

The actor deftly pierces the fourth wall by acknowledging the audience as his imaginary friends/hallucinations, before enlisting one of his newfound 'friends' to rescue him from his current suicide attempt, entrusting the volunteer with the means of his demise and admonishing him not to give it back under any circumstances, while promising that his course of action has a perfectly rational explanation—and, as we journey along with Wind through his family's beginnings, dragged along through a path of soul destroying barrage of alcohol and drug abuse infused with domestic violence, sexual abuse, profanity and mental health issues, horror arises to new levels as the realization that Wind's chosen course of action takes on an

irrational rationality.

The Thursday afternoon matinee per-

formance attended by The Expositor was also attended by a full house of senior high school students from Wikwemikong. One young audience member could be heard to sum up the barrage of imagery conjured by Mr. Cardinal during his performance gasping "that's f\*\*\*\*d up." It was. As the story of Wind and his brothers unfolds, your heart is ripped from your ribcage and brutally shoved back in your face. Some audience members could be seen getting up and leaving shaken during the performance.

The youngest sibling's gift from Creator, the ability to send a wave of joy through a

person by reaching his arms back and blowing on them, is not able to protect him from the violent sexual abuse of his eldest brother, the FASD afflicted Charles. That Creator's gift is lost in the 10-year-old's accidental suicide following his rape.

The loss of culture and mangling of stories related by the characters in the story is particularly poignant taken in the context of the Truth and Reconciliation process—although the TRC is not directly referenced in the production.

Mr. Cardinal's play (he wrote the script over the course of a year) is set on a remote reserve, the kind of community beset with an epidemic of suicides, murders and abuse. The kind of community that remains far outside the comprehension of most viewers of the six o'clock news. But surprisingly, Mr. Cardinal, who hails from a successful thespian family and was raised in Los Angles and urban Alberta, has little personal experience with the rez life directly—surprising because the writer/actor's script dialogue and the events and environment he paints upon the canvas of the stage resonate with authenticity for those who do.

Chatting with the artist following his performance Mr. Cardinal admits that most of what he so deftly brings to life on the stage has come from acquaintances and research—he goes on to add, "and of course I am an Indian."

The unseen villain of 'Huff' is Trickster. It is telling that one of the young Anishinaabe audience members asks Mr. Cardinal if Trickster is a Metis legend. He responds that Trickster exists in many First Nations cultures, including the Anishinaabe. The student could be forgiven for not recognizing the Trickster familiar in local stories in the malevolent spirit that inhabits Huff. There is a reason that the elders admonish the children not to speak his name when the blanket of snow is not on the ground, lest they attract his attention. Trickster is not a pleasant companion.

"Don't do anything you see in this play," admonishes Mr. Cardinal as he chats with the students following the play. "Don't even repeat the jokes." So sombre is the audience response to that caveat he has to add, "that was a joke."

As the play draws to a close, and Wind approaches the audience member for the return of his freezer bag and duct tape, the audience leans forward on their seats, holding their breath.

"Does anyone ever give the bag back?" asks veteran Wikwemikong actor Greg Odjig.

"No," replies Mr. Cardinal, before qualifying his answer, "the audience always steps in to stop them if they try." Stage manager Jennifer Stobart adds, "at one show there was a lady who was so mesmerized by Cliff's performance that you could see her just automatically reaching for the bag, but the audience began to shout at her."

If there is a redemption or hope contained within this play, perhaps that audience reaction is where it lies.

tions that are believed to be required to bring the building up to snuff.

One community member with deep roots in the community has no illusions as to whether the current situation is viable.

"The Old School bears a plaque commemorating my father, Farquhar Anglin, as a long-time reeve," noted Perry Anglin, himself a former reeve of the community. "He would be the first to agree with council that the township has no business renting out office space at a loss."

But Mr. Anglin stopped far short of endorsing tearing down what many consider to be a building of historical significance in the community, even though it lacks official recognition as a

heritage building.
"I am sure he would also want the building to be preserved as a historic Mindemoya's Old School building. site and used for the good of the community," Mr. Anglin continued. "Some years ago it was poorly conceived as a

aged at below market rents," he asserted. "Even with renovation it may not be competitive as office space." That assessment was somewhat telegraphed by the municipality's own approach to the building, he pointed out. "Our ever-expanding township recently preferred to build new offices."

business centre and has been badly man-

"What to do with the Old School was an issue in the last election," Mr. Anglin continues. "I understand council has now decided to act.'

"Built in handsome stone and brick, the building is almost 100 years old and truly historic," he pointed out. "It may have been the very first 'consolidated' school in Ontario under a new law designed to bring scattered one-room schools into one building, with different classrooms for the different grades.

A different perspective comes from someone who signed a three-year lease in the building in December, lawyer Janelle Proulx. "I find it disappointing," she said of the suggestion that the municipality



might be cutting short the arrangement. "Why did they allow me to sign a three-year lease and go through all the expense of setting up the office? I signed with no caution (notice) at all.'

Ms. Proulx just recently finished installation of a new door, drywall and associated

painting to prepare for a long tenure.

Not only had Ms. Proulx not been informed of the likelihood of the municipality closing the doors on the Old School building when she was negotiating her lease, "I still haven't been officially noti-

Ms. Proulx said that the Monday visit by the councillors seemed "not very positive. Some of the councillors barely even came into the office. I have nearly 700 square feet and three rooms.

She said that she first heard about the issue a couple of weeks after she signed her lease. "I heard about it the same way the rest of the public did," she said. She wrote to each of the Central Manitoulin councillors and the mayor and that she only received a reply from three. "One came to called me and one sent me an email," she said.

Ms. Proulx was further disappointed when she attended a property meeting and a council meeting after finding out about the potential closure. "Councillor Derek Stephens said that this was nothing new," she recalled. "He said they have been talking about this for eight vears.

The lawyer has had to put her plans for a satellite office in Gore Bay on hold as a result of the situation. 'When I first decided to set up practice on the Island I was encouraged Expositor file photo to consider Gore Bay

where a lot of people told me they need a lawyer," she said. "When I decided to set up in Mindemoya the last thing I thought I would be doing is looking for another place to set up my practice. Why am I in there?

Ms. Proulx reiterated that her main feeling on the matter is disappointment. "As a young professional, setting up a business, putting so much into this," she said. "It is all so preventable.'

Adding to the grief the situation is causing her, Ms. Proulx finds she is discussing the matter "two or three times a day. It's been very negative," she sighed.

The Old School was controversial in its own day, even before the first stone was mortared into place, as many questioned the need for a consolidated single and central building that would require the expense of busing students in to classes. "Doing so was furiously opposed by farmers content with the frugal status quo," Mr. Anglin recalled. "The Rev. W.W. Anglin, my grandfather, was physically threatened at a meeting where he spoke at length in favour home safe he said he was lucky he was with three strong sons to protect him.'

The reverend's own children attended the new school, noted Mr. Anglin, and "one of them taught there."

"Many years later, his son Farquhar Anglin was reeve and arranged for the township to buy the old school when the school board built a new one," related Mr. Anglin. "The building housed the library, a council chamber and township staff," adding, "I don't know why it was abandoned in favour of the undistinguished municipal building we have now."

Mr. Ānglin, as it turns out, has some interesting ideas about what to do with the historic edifice. "The Old School would be a splendid art gallery or a magnificent museum, provided it had a worthy collection," he surmised. "The only one that comes to mind is the nearby Jack Seabrook collection of farm implements and tractors." Mr. Anglin pointed out that the late Mr. Seabrook's collection is "of provincial and perhaps national importance."

Mr. Anglin went on to point out that "the family was interested in loaning the collection and looking after it in a township building some years ago when I was the first reeve of Central Manitoulin. I don't know if they would be interested now."

A commemorative plaque celebrating the contributions of Mr. Anglin's father is affixed to the outside of the Old School and Mr. Anglin has some views on the fate of that plaque and his father's considerable

'Whatever the building's fate it would be nice if my father's plaque stayed connected with education," he suggested. "Taking after his father, he took heat in some places when he promoted building our present 'consolidated' high school and maneuvered some federal funding that made it happen. There are stories about that," he confided, referencing his family's longstanding connections with the halls of power.



...continued from page 1 through 16 inches of ice," said Mr. Barlett. "It had just turned into honeycomb.

From a relatively safe and sound base the world had turned swiftly to dangerous unsound ice.

Mr. Barlett, whose company he estimates has recovered over 60 sunken vehicles in the past 15 years (the company has been towing for 30), said that he has never understood chancing taking a vehicle out onto the ice when the temperatures start to rise. "Back in the day, when we had to fish for food, maybe, but not now,'

Mr. Barlett said that it is far easier to work from the ice, but that his company has to put safety first.

The decision to go out on the ice is costly, but Mr. Barlett was hesitant to estimate an average. "It's a lot like asking 'how much does it cost to build a house?' There are a lot of variables with each job," he said. "If we had been able to go out and do the job (on Lake Wolsey) in one day, it would have likely come in under \$10,000." Now all bets on that prediction are off, but there was some good news."

'Because the bumper was still sticking out, we were able to attach a line and airbags to the vehicle," explained Mr. Barlett. Under normal circumstances, the team would have cut a series of holes to the shoreline (the vehicle is located some distance from shore), passing the rope from hole to hole to the shore, where it would be

attached to a winch mechanism.

"Then we would sink the truck to just under the ice and float it in," said Mr. Barlett. Once near the shore, the team would have cut a channel that would allow them finish pulling the

truck onto the shore.
"Now we will likely have to wait until the ice is out,' he said. "But then the weather has gotten colder, so we will have to reassess the situation and we may be able to move forward."

For vehicle owners caught in the situation of having their vehicle go through the ice the good news is that they are likely covered under their insurance. "Most people are insured for at least the recovery," he said. "If they have full insurance, they may even be covered for replacement.'

While that may be some consolation, it hardly covers the danger of the situation for the driver and their passengers and the environmental impact of leakage from the vehicle.

...continued from page 1 approximately 1,000 applications per day.'

Ms. Evans went on to explain that the Ontario Energy Board (which is responsible for handling program) "expect the between 300,000-340,000 consumers to enroll by year-end 2016. We are already more than one third of the way there after just four months."

While the response to the program remains far short of the number who are believed eligible for the program, the OEB considers the numbers to be posi-

"We believe the application performance is very good and there are a number of reasons for this," said Ms. Evans. "We have done a great deal to communicate the program to consumers through agencies, utilities and other government offices. The communications plan (started November 1, 2015) included print, radio and transit advertising. Additionally, bill inserts were included in all ODSP and Ontario Works cheques twice and with electricity utility bills and websites. We have also engaged through social online targeted digital media, advertising and created a 'how-to' video for YouTube (www.youtube.com/watch ?v=aP7C4mv8Ym0). We are continuing to work with social service agencies, food banks, libraries, MPP offices, the Ontario Native Welfare Administrators

Association, legal aid offices, senior living centres and others to ensure that eligible Ontarians are aware of this program."

Apparently the campaign has had some success. Ms. Evans notes that "our research shows that 41 percent of Ontarians are aware of the OESP (as of January 2016). At the time of this research the program had been in market just two months." But when one considers the positive impact a reduced Hydro One bill would have for those whose incomes qualify, the uptake is still puzzlingly low.

Ms. Evans notes that efforts to expand the number enrolled have continued unabated. "We have contracted with more than 120 agencies in 172 locations across Ontario to help consumers apply inperson," she said. "This is especially helpful for those without computer access, those who prefer to apply on-paper and for those who may not have filed income taxes recently. Consumers are encouraged to contact one of these agencies if they need application assistance. For a list of agencies, customers can visit the application portal or give us a call - Ontario-ElectricitySupport.ca or 1-855-831-8151.

Ms. Evans asserted that "we have designed the online application process to be user friendly and it seems to be working for most consumers. We do have a rigorous approval process so it is necessary for consumers to fully complete their applications and ensure that the information they enter matches their income documentation and utility bills exactly. Sometimes, customers will be notified that we are unable to advance their application because their information is incomplete or doesn't match their documents. At this point customers can call us to verify and correct their application information or they can contact an intake agency

The Manitoulin Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) has been firing on all cylinders in an effort to get all their clients (Ontario Works and Ontario Disability Support recipients' Program income falls well below the threshold for the program), notes DSB CAO Fern Dominelli. "We have 96 applicants," he noted. "Of those, 83 are on social assistance."

On the bright side, the CAO notes that a number of those who have been approved have been entered into the program for a five-year period, meaning they do not have to reapply every year or two (which is more the

Once approved, the amount of credit an applicant can receive depends on how many people live in the home and the combined household income. The OESP website gives the example of a home with four people and an annual income of \$37,000 who would receive an onbill credit of \$34 each month. The website goes on to explain that if your home is electrically heated, or you rely on medical devices requiring a lot of power, OESP offers a higher level of assistance. First Nations and Métis also qualify for a higher level of assistance.

There are a number of caveats, however. The program is not retroactive and it takes several weeks for the application to be approved.

When making an application, make sure you have your electricity bill, the names and birthdates of all the residents in your home as registered with Canada Revenue Agency, and Social Insurance Numbers (SINs), individual tax numbers or temporary taxation numbers for residents over the age of 16.

If you are found eligible, the credit will appear directly on your electricity bill in about six to eight weeks from the date of approval. You will receive OESP for two years before having to reapply.

But if you have not filed an income tax return recently, or if your situation has changed since you last filed, you can apply for OESP through a local intake agency (such as DSB). You will need to bring all of the documents listed above, plus proof of your household income.

The application can be found online at ontarioelectricitysupport.ca, and if you are unable to access the Internet yourself, or have issues in working with computers and or literacy, contact your local DSB office to access support. The micro-grid will utilize existing battery technology to store electricity, backstopped by the current electricity grid.

Burpee and Mills Township received \$11,753 to install a solar-powered heating system in their municipal garage. Once completed, notes a news release on the funding announcement, "this new clean-energy technology will help generate cleaner that electricity will improve the local community's environment and health.

The Municipality of Killarney received \$276,512 to expand a local landfill site and install a new system to collect and treat environmentally harmful liquids. "These upgrades will help mitigate waste disposalrelated environmental impacts," notes the news release.

"We are very excited to see the money come in," noted Killarney Mayor Ginny Rook. "We applied for this back in 2014, so we didn't think we were getting it." Since the community could not afford to complete the project on their own they were forced to put it on the back burner. Although the municipality will have to take another look at their budget, the news is very exciting nonetheless. "This will help us to extend the life of our landfill site." noted Mayor Rook. "We have been told in the past that we are nearing the end of the lifespan of the landfill." Any community engaged in the costs associated with building a landfill site, a tab that generally comes in at the multi-million-dollar range, knows all too well how important it is to extend existing landfill

When I roast a ham for Easter I usually buy a big one! Leftovers are the highlight from sandwiches with a savory mustard, ham and eggs for breakfast, adding diced ham to homemade macaroni and cheese and then if your tired of ham you can freeze it up to 30 days. Try the following recipe.



diced (use a potato variety meant for mashing) 2 Tbsp butter

2 Tbsp milk

1/2 cup grated sharp cheese or blue cheese

2 pounds potatoes,

CRUMBLE TOPPING: 3 tbsp butter 1 onion, diced

2 garlic cloves, minced

2 tbsp wholegrain mustard 3 cups fresh whole-wheat bread crumbs

4 Tbsp chopped fresh parsley

Salt and pepper

1. Cook the potatoes in boiling water for about 10 minutes, until they are tender

2. In the meantime make the crumble topping. Melt the butter in a skillet. Add the onion, garlic, and mustard and fry gently for 5 minutes, until the onion is softened, stirring constantly.

3. Put the bread crumbs in a mixing bowl and stir in the fried onion mixture. Season with salt and pepper.

4. Drain the potatoes thoroughly and place them in a mixing bowl. Add the butter and milk, then mash until smooth. Stir in the grated cheese while the potato is still

5. Spoon the mashed potato into a shallow ovenproof dish and sprinkle with the crumb topping.


6. Cook in a preheated oven for 20 minutes until the crumble topping is golden brown and crunchy. Serve.

#### **Brown Sugar Glazed Ham with Raisin Drippings**

This is a slowly roasted ham with lots of flavour. You can omit the raisins which won't change the flavour but make sure you do use a Dijon mustard.

1 cup dark brown sugar

1/2 cup Dijon mustard

1/2 cup apple juice or white wine

1 cup raisins

1 large bone-in ham (8 to 10 pounds/3.5 to 4.5 kg) A handful of whole cloves (optional)

1. Preheat the oven to  $325^{\circ}$ F.

2. Stir the sugar, mustard and juice together in a small saucepan over medium high heat. Bring to a boil then reduce the heat and simmer for a few minutes. Cool.

3. Tightly pile the raisins in the middle of a roasting

4. Using a sharp knife, carefully score the fatty surface of the ham in a diamond pattern, cutting all the way through the fat and about 1/2 inch into the meat beneath. Place the ham (cut side up) down over the raisins making sure the raisins stay underneath the ham.

5. Pour about half of the glaze over the ham, thoroughly working it into the crevices with your fingers. If you want to take the time and like the flavour of cloves. pierce the center of each diamond with a whole clove.

6. Cover the ham to make a tight seal (tin foil works better than the lid of the roasting pan). Bake the ham until it is tender, about 2.5 hours.


7. Uncover and carefully pour the remaining glaze over the ham. Bake, uncovered, for another 5 minutes or so. Remove from the oven and spoon the juices and glaze back over the ham. Continue baking for another 5 minutes. Continue basting and baking until you have a rich, shiny glaze, 20 minutes or so.

8. Rest the ham for 15 minutes or so before slicing. Stir the pan juices, drippings, scrapings and raisins together, forming a sauce of sorts. Add some water if needed to make it moiré saucy.

9. Slice the ham and serve with the sauce.
